To His Excellency OLIVER AMES,
Governor and Commander-in-Chief.

SIR:—I have the honor respectfully to submit the report of this department for the year ending on this date.

The year just closing has been one of remarkable success in a military point of view, the earnest and active efforts of officers and men having contributed to continued progress, raising the standard of excellence and increasing the efficiency and effectiveness of all the commands.

The remarkable attendance at all tours of duty during the year is also a source of gratification, and it is a pleasure to refer your Excellency to the reports of the various officers on the duty performed, justifying, as they do, the assertion that the State has in its service a well-equipped and well-disciplined force of citizen soldiery, which, with attention to matters of detail and practical work the coming year, may be made *excellent*.

The militia needs the recognition and influence of the business public, without which it is discouraged. Young men of good character are needed to fill its ranks and enhance its *personnel*, where obedience to constituted authority and discipline is taught, which bears fruit in all walks and callings of life. Let the clerk or employee have the time required for duty in the State service, aid rather than prevent him in joining the regular State force, and

armed protection to property may be readily at hand by the co-operation of the business men with those actively interested in the welfare and maintenance of such a force.

New companies, upon petition therefor, have been organized in Boston, Lowell, Plymouth, North Adams, Newburyport and Southbridge, which, having been mustered into the State service, completes the number of companies allowed by law.

The petition for a company in South Framingham was rejected:

The twelve new companies authorized and accepted under Act of 1887, to increase eight-company regiments to twelve companies each, are in good condition and composed of excellent material.

Company A, Eighth Infantry, having been found below the standard of efficiency, has been disbanded.

The strength of the militia now allowed by law is 390 officers, 5,468 enlisted men, — a total of 5,858. The aggregate on the rolls at date is 369 officers, 4,790 enlisted men; total, 5,159.

Chapter 366, Acts of 1888, authorizes the formation of a naval battalion, to be attached to the militia whenever the United States government is ready to furnish arms, equipment, and a vessel of war for instruction in duties. Up to the present it has been impossible to carry out, in full, the provisions of the act, and the battalion has not been organized. Early in the year efforts will be made, in connection with the United States, to carry into effect the act of Legislature above mentioned.

Your Excellency's attention is called to the matter of independent military organization, and to the fact that some stringent measure should be devised to prevent such unauthorized military bodies assembling or parading with arms, without the license of the Governor, as provided by law. The authorities of cities and towns should be required to prevent the formation or parade of such unauthorized and illegal bodies of men within their corporate limits.

TOURS OF DUTY.

The annual tours of duty required by law were held as follows : —

Annual drills were held October 3, when the troops were assembled in Boston for instruction.

Troop A, First Battalion Cavalry, Captain Isaac H. Allard, was detailed, by Special Orders No. 61, as your Excellency's escort to Harvard College, on the occasion of its annual commencement exercises; and the Eighth Regiment of Infantry, Col. Francis A. Osgood, by Special Orders No. 66, as escort to His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, at the unveiling of the Bartlett monument at Amesbury, July 4.

General Orders No. 12 assigned to the First Regiment Infantry, Lieut.-Col. T. R. Mathews commanding, the duty of funeral escort to its deceased commander, Col. Austin C. Wellington, on the 23d of September.

ENROLLED MILITIA.

The total number of enrolled militia, as reported to this office from the returns of assessors of cities and towns, is 312,438, being an increase of 16,313 since last report.

HEAVY ARTILLERY.

Such work as could be performed in armories and at State camp ground has been done. A wider field and greater facilities will be had another year for this important branch of the service, arrangements having been partially made with the United States government in this direction.

ARMORIES.

Improved armory accommodations have been provided in the city of Springfield for Companies B and G, Second Regiment; Amesbury, for Company B, Eighth Regiment; Lynn, for Companies I and D, Eighth Regiment; Southbridge, for Company K, Sixth Regiment Infantry.

The armories of Companies C and G, Sixth Regiment, in Lowell, were destroyed by fire January 11, since which date these companies have occupied temporary quarters.

Many of the armories provided for the militia are inadequate and unsuitable, not affording sufficient room for drills, and in some places better are not obtainable.

RIFLE PRACTICE.

This essential and important duty has made steady and constant progress. A team from the militia has this year, for the third time, contested successfully in the interstate and other matches annually held at Creedmoor, retaining the prizes previously won, and maintaining its prestige.

It gives me pleasure to call your attention to the report of Col. Horace T. Rockwell, Inspector General of Rifle Practice, for the details of the work performed.

QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT.

The military property of the State at the arsenal is in satisfactory condition; all old and useless material has been disposed of by sale, and the money received therefor turned into the State Treasury.

During the year new dress uniform coats, with haversacks and canteens, have been issued to the entire force, a portion of the canteens being drawn from the United States.

The militia is now fully equipped, and but little expenditure for this purpose will be required for some time.

The returns made by officers responsible for property show smaller losses and better care than heretofore.

By the destruction of the armory at Lowell in January last, the entire equipment of Companies C and G, Sixth Regiment Infantry, was destroyed by fire, causing considerable expense for new uniforms and equipments.

From the same cause losses were incurred in Company D, Sixth Regiment, and Company A, Ninth Regiment, whereby the State suffered loss of property.

By the extensive conflagration at Marblehead, on Christmas night, all the State property in the possession of Company C, Eighth Regiment, has been consumed, which will necessitate the replacing of the lost property by an entire new outfit. This company was called out by precept of the selectmen, and responded promptly, in citizens' dress, for duty at the fire, and, at three o'clock on the morning of the 26th inst., were in uniform and armed from the equipment of other companies of the regiment.

The canteens, the property of the State, — of which a few have been issued to the troops, — have proved to be leaky, the straps rotten, and generally unserviceable. They should be condemned and replaced with new.

The new bill of dress for officers changes the fatigue cap from drooping to straight visor. The same change should be made in the caps of the enlisted men.

There still remain in use with the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Massachusetts, the Institute of Technology, Dummer Academy, Massachusetts Reformatory, Agricultural College, and State Prison, articles of State military property, for which annual returns are required.

I have to report the loss by death of one of the horses used at the State arsenal.

The saddles now in use with the mounted troops are in poor condition, having been long in use. They are unsafe, and should be replaced by serviceable ones.

There has been drawn against the annual appropriation by the general government, apportioned to this State for supplies, the sum of \$14,219.99, leaving a substantial balance due the State, the amount of which cannot now be stated, no detailed statement of that account having as yet been received from the War Department.

CAMP GROUND.

The camp ground remains in good condition, the necessary grading being done from year to year.

The old storehouse, which was wholly unfit for the purposes for which it was designed and required by law, and was

condemned by the chief engineer of the South Framingham fire department as dangerously near the arsenal and magazine, has been removed to a position in rear of the camp line, and a new building erected, which gives to each company a separate storage room, and relieves the State from all responsibility for not providing suitable storage facilities.

The matter of water supply at the camp ground is one that should receive attention the coming year. The wells upon which we now depend have become foul from lack of constant use, and are unfit for use as well as dangerous to health; and, if water can be introduced from the town supply at a fair price, it should be done, otherwise the State should erect a pumping station, and supply itself with pure water for the use of the troops. For this an appropriation will be needed.

Outside of ordinary repairs, but little will be needed at the camp for a time; but economy still favors the erection of battalion headquarters.

The suggestion that mess-rooms be erected is again renewed, as well as the assumption by the State of the subsistence of troops in camp. The present system is unsatisfactory, inviting as it does the attendance of camp followers, who hang around for their food, as well as for anything else that comes within reach and can be appropriated by them.

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE.

The organization of the militia remains the same as last reported.

The accounts of this office, except as otherwise provided by law, are made up to December 15. All bills to that date have been presented to the auditor for payment.

The annual appropriation by the Legislature for this office, which includes the Militia, War and Naval Records and Soldiers' Messenger Corps, is		\$194,800 00

The Regulations M. V. M. provide for funeral honors to officers and men who may die in the military service of the Commonwealth.

The appropriations heretofore made contemplate pay for regular duty prescribed by law, the large attendance at which this year has exhausted the appropriation.

Under the authority of the Regulations, the First Regiment Infantry was ordered for escort at the funeral of its late commander, Col. Austin C. Wellington; and, the pay-rolls for this duty having been sent to the auditor, provisions for payment should be made.

The balance of special appropriation for clothing on hand January 1 was \$77,932.38; expended during the year for dress coats, overcoats and equipment, \$77,927.86; balance, \$4.52.

By reason of the losses by fire previously mentioned, the expenditure from this appropriation was considerably increased.

During the year the discarded military clothing and old material has been disposed of by sale, the proceeds of which have been turned into the State treasury as required; and the account is as follows:—

Twenty-seven hundred and ninety-four letters and endorsements have been written during the year. Fifteen General Orders, 133 Special Orders and nine circulars have been issued.

WAR RECORDS AND CLAIMS.

From the establishment of the claim bureau to the present time, 11,925 claims of all classes have been recorded, for prosecution of which 9,455 received favorable and 2,015 unfavorable adjudication.

The computed amount of collections on the claims allowed during the year is \$3,107.60, and the total amount of the settlements from 1866 to date, \$1,995,425.66.

During the year ending December 1 the following claims have been prepared: Original invalid army pension, 5; original invalid (navy), 4; widows, 7; dependent mothers, 1; increase (army), 30; increase (navy), 4; miscellaneous, 2; total, 53. Twenty-five applications for commutation for artificial limbs and surgical appliances have been made. Of the pension claims recorded during the year, 8 have been allowed, 8 rejected and 37 are still pending. The number of claims unsettled Dec. 1, 1888, is 455.

Progress has been made in the arrangement and indexing of the records in fire-proof room, which will be continued until systematically completed.

The calls for information from the records have not diminished; certificates in large numbers, for purposes contemplated by State and national legislation and the Grand Army of the Republic, have been given.

NAVAL RECORDS.

The work upon these records shows commendable results, the final record of six hundred and fifty-two enlisted men having been determined and recorded, also what is con-

sidered a complete record of two thousand and twenty-one officers.

By report of 1887 twenty-two hundred and fifty-three calls were made upon the Fourth Auditor's office of the United States Treasury for final records. The work was accepted and promised during the year to enable this office to commence the printing, as by appropriation called for. After many months the Treasury Department announced that the work could not be accomplished in consequence of limited clerical force. Other measures were proposed; but the conditions being uncertain as to time and expense, a more definite plan will be pursued to insure a correct return of such records as are incomplete.

On account of the delay occasioned by the action of the Treasury Department, it was found impossible to print the book this year, and I would recommend the renewal of the appropriation for the coming year, when it can be placed in the printers' hands.

I am indebted to Commodore John G. Walker, Chief of the Bureau of Navigation, and Commodore W. S. Schley of the Bureau of Equipment and Recruiting, for their courtesy and zeal in aiding Captain Wilson, in charge of Naval Records, in such matters as have been important to carry out this work.

SOLDIERS' MESSENGER CORPS.

The appropriation for this corps remains as established in 1883; viz., \$800.

The force consists of thirteen members at this date, stationed at various points in the city of Boston, most advantageous for them. Each member is furnished with a red cap in winter and a light canvas helmet in summer, with tariff rate cards and slates for orders at each station; and are required to report in person, weekly, to the Adjutant General, a statement of their earnings, which, during the past year, have averaged from two to eight dollars per week.

Several needy soldiers have been furnished aid in meals or money in small amounts from this appropriation.

Any work which our citizens can put in the way of the soldier messengers, — such as doing errands, carrying messages or bundles, distributing circulars or business cards, — will be aid worthily bestowed.

IN MEMORIAM.

During the year the militia has been called to mourn the death of Col. Austin C. Wellington, First Regiment of Infantry, M. V. M.

A loyal and conscientious officer, a courteous gentleman and valued friend.

He discharged all trusts imposed with rare ability and great fidelity.

This department, in common with his regiment and comrades in arms, sincerely mourn his loss.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

It is recommended that the regulations for the government of the militia, authorized under chapter 44 of the Resolves of 1878, and adopted in General Orders No. 8, A. G. O., dated Dec. 30, 1878, be revised and reprinted.

Many of its paragraphs have by reason of changes become obsolete, and the ceremonies which form a part, being provided

for in all books of tactics, should be eliminated, which would reduce the book to smaller compass, make it more comprehensive, and lessen the expense; a new index would also be an improvement.

If possible, and found practicable, such rearrangement of companies or units of organization should be made as will bring each battalion as near as possible to its headquarters. Some commands are widely separated.

The requirement of company by-laws is of doubtful utility. The law provides that they “may” — not shall — be adopted; but such by-laws “shall not be repugnant to law or the regulations for the government of the militia.” Strictly, a company can only make rules for the government of its civil affairs. By-laws are forwarded to this office for approval, which provide how a man may join a company; when, in fact, it is optional with the captain and the colonel of the regiment whether a man shall be accepted, and the company can in no way interfere with this option.

The books and accounts of the treasurer of a company cannot be examined even by the colonel of the regiment, it having been decided that these accounts come within the scope of the civil administration of affairs.

It is recommended that all authority for company by-laws be rescinded, and the system of “company fund” which now obtains in the United States Army be instituted instead, guarded by some plan for examination under State supervision, which may ensure its proper administration.

The recommendation that a medal be issued to officers and men for long and meritorious service (as is now done in other States), as a recognition of faithful service to the State, is renewed.

With a renewal of my thanks to your Excellency for many timely suggestions and uniform kindness, this report is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR'S DEPARTMENT.

To the Adjutant General, Boston, Mass.

SIR:—I have the honor to forward the annual report of this department for the year 1888.

Armory inspections were had early in the year, all the commands being inspected in armories, with the exception of Companies C and G, Sixth Infantry (whose armories had been destroyed by fire), and the new companies which have been added to the militia since the last report, and which will be inspected before the year closes, or early the coming year.

All State property in possession of the militia was thoroughly inspected, and, as a rule, was in good condition and well cared for.

Companies were drilled under the eye of the inspector by all commissioned officers, and sergeants were required to give orders, to test their knowledge; questions were asked in relation to guard and other duties, books and papers examined, and everything tending to show the condition of the company fully inquired into.

A large majority of the companies were found in satisfactory condition; seven were found in fair condition (three of which have since shown marked improvement); five companies and one signal corps were found in poor condition, the commanders of which were informed that improvement must be made. It is the opinion of this department, that, in the case of all the commands found poor, the fault lies with the commanding officer rather than with the men, the former either being unfit for the position or careless and neglectful of duty. The continuance of such officers in the service is detrimental, and a reflection on their superior officers.

Armory drills should not be confined to routine company drill, but evenings should at intervals be devoted to guard duty, when

men should be stationed on "post," and questioned in the hearing of all others on the various duties; other evenings might, with profit, be devoted to the reading and explanation of tactics. These evenings, interspersed with drills in company movements, would accomplish much, and relieve the monotony of continuous company drill in movements only which average armories allow.

CAMP DUTY.

The entire force performed the annual tour of camp duty required by law; the First and Second Brigades at State Camp Ground, the First Corps Cadets at Hingham, and the Second Corps Cadets at Essex.

Routine duty in all the camps was intelligibly performed, in accordance with orders, in the several commands.

Military courtesy and discipline were better than in former years.

The camps were absolutely clean, and an earnestness on the part of officers and men to perform their whole duty was manifested.

The knowledge and performance in guard duty has not kept pace with other duties, although that of the Second Brigade is worthy of special mention.

More earnest work on the part of lieutenants should be required in the matter of guard duty. Non-commissioned officers were, as a rule, well instructed, and in more than one instance a good guard was the result of their efforts; while at the same time lieutenants were found inefficient. The coming year, an officer of the guard found inefficient or neglecting his duty should be at once called to account, and replaced by one having the requisite knowledge and the disposition to render faithful service.

The experiment of regimental guard in the Second Brigade proved successful, showing that battalion commanders are ready to assume responsibilities, and do improve when allowed to control their camp lines.

The conduct of the enlisted men after "taps" was almost invariably good, and the criticisms heretofore made find no place in this report.

As a whole, the camps were improvements over those previously held, showing continued progress in the duties of the soldiers in a noticeable degree.

The appearance of officers in uniform has improved; a few relics of former days, however, yet remain.

The aggregate officers and men on the rolls at the date of encampment was 5,525, of which 5,090 performed camp duty; to which may be added the bands, making an attendance of 5,378; showing commendable zeal and endeavor on the part of officers and men alike.

Four hundred and thirty-five enlisted men were reported absent for the following reasons: no excuses, 96; sickness, 82; business and refusal of employers, 257.

The following-mentioned companies are deserving of mention, every officer and man of which, of a full enrollment in each, having performed, in whole or in part, this tour of duty: Companies H and I, First Infantry; K, Second Infantry; E and H, Fifth Infantry; G and H, Eighth Infantry; G and H, Ninth Infantry; and the Ambulance Corps of the Second Brigade.

The following reported every officer and man less one of a full enrollment: Companies B and L, First Infantry; C, D, F and I, Fifth Infantry; A, Sixth Infantry; I and K, Eighth Infantry; C and M, Ninth Infantry; Ambulance and Signal Corps, First Brigade.

Company E, Second Infantry, performed camp duty with forty-three officers and men, being the smallest number reported by any company of infantry. This company has had a good record since its formation, and no fault can be attributed to officers or

men for their small attendance, which was occasioned by the refusal of employers to allow the men to leave work for the performance of military duty, under the penalty of loss of employment; and, in fact, five men who did respond to duty were discharged by their employers.

ANNUAL DRILLS.

The annual drills of the year were all ordered on the same day throughout the commands, and at various places; and in subsequent orders the troops were directed to proceed to Boston, for the purpose of ascertaining how promptly the force could be assembled, and to give practical instruction in matters pertaining to the movement of troops. A complete record,—of the time occupied in travel, hour of reporting, in loading and unloading artillery and horses, and such data concerning the rapid assembly and despatch of troops as was considered useful,—was made and reported by the officers detailed for that purpose by this department.

Too much praise cannot be accorded the enlisted men for their excellent conduct on this tour of duty. One man who did misbehave was promptly voted out of his company by the required “two-thirds vote,” before the company was dismissed.

Of the 5,462 officers and men on the rolls, 4,769 performed duty at annual drills, and, with the addition of bands, 5,009.

Of the 660 absentees reported, 24 were on furlough, 164 without leave, 118 on account of sickness, and 354 on account of business and refusal of employers. All men absent from camps and annual drills without leave or proper excuse were discharged by the Commander-in-chief, on recommendation of this department. Those absent from refusal of employers to allow them the time, nearly all desired to and would have performed the duty but for the refusal above referred to.

Company G, Eighth Regiment Infantry, is entitled to special mention, having reported with every officer and man of a maximum enrollment; several companies also reported with but two men less than the full number allowed by law. Companies H, Sixth Infantry, and A and C, Eighth Infantry, are mentioned as parading the smallest companies at the annual drills.

Average per cent. of attendance at camp, 92 $\frac{1}{2}$; annual drills, 88 $\frac{1}{10}$; for all duties, 90+; nearly all the commands making substantial gains, this being the largest average attendance ever attained at the annual tours of duty, and showing constant and steady increase year by year.

From a careful observation of the duty performed by the militia during the year, this department is enabled to assure the Commonwealth of the possession of a well disciplined, equipped, and effective force, the tone of officers and men giving assurances for the maintenance of its present standard and continued progress in efficiency in the future.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

That the plan of annual assembling of the troops be continued, but that the assembly be by brigades in the various cities of the Commonwealth, for the acquirement of knowledge pertaining to actual service.

That some means be devised whereby the business man may be made to understand that the duty performed by the citizen soldier is important, and that the objection of employers to employees joining and performing duty with the militia, tends to injure the service and detracts from the attendance.

By reports received from commands, and letters from employers, filed with the Adjutant General, it appears that nearly sixty per cent. of those absent was by reason of the refusal of such employers to consent.

That all commanding officers take measures at once for the removal of ignorant and careless officers (fortunately, there are but few), as no command should be allowed to suffer from poor officers or poor companies, when good material can be had in place of either.

That, at the encampments of the coming year, there be less of ceremony and more attention to details. The militia has now reached a point which calls for attention to such minor details as the arrangement and care of quarters, reduction and simplification of baggage or impediments, and, in general, more practical work.

That the manner of the payment of troops be simplified, and, if possible, the payment be made at camp. An annual correction of the rolls by company commanders, it is believed, would enable this to be done.

That no recruit be permitted to drill in the ranks of his company until first being thoroughly instructed in the "set-up" of the soldier; this is of importance, and, being the course adopted in the new companies, caused many of the old to appear to disadvantage when brought together in line. The gun should not be placed in the hands of a recruit until he has been properly instructed in the position of a soldier.

That, for all tours of duty, transportation in kind be furnished

by the State, and that an allowance be given each company for repairs. Under the present system of transportation, by mileage allowance, some companies derive a profit on the allowance, while others make nothing, and in some instances suffer loss.

That some uniform rule be established, fixing the limits of commands for recruiting. The enlistment of men twenty miles distant from the armory of a company should not be permissible, more especially in the case of delinquent companies.

This department is under many obligations to the Assistant Inspectors-General, Colonels Rockwell, Currier, Sampson and Wellington; Major Sanger, First Brigade; and Captain Thompson, Second Brigade, for zealous and intelligent services. During the year these officers have given their time cheerfully and without pay, save that due them for regular authorized duty at camps and annual drills. The suggestion of one year ago, that these officers should be paid for duty at armory inspections, is renewed.

Thanks are given to the officers and men of the militia for their cheerful acceptance and adoption of suggestions, and for many courtesies.

SIR:— I have the honor to submit the report required by law for the year 1888.

In compliance with regulations governing the Massachusetts Volunteer Militia, instructing the Surgeon General to make such inspection and inquiry into the sanitary condition of the several encampments as he may deem necessary, the following personal inspections were made:—

First Brigade, Lieut. Col. George E. Pinkham, Medical Director, Friday, June 15.

First Corps Cadets, Friday, July 20.

Second Brigade, Lieut. Col. Thomas Kittredge, Medical Director, Friday, July 13.

Second Corps Cadets, Friday, Aug. 10, 1888.

All of these inspections showed the same good sanitary conditions of the camp grounds and surroundings, cook houses, stables

and sinks that have been observed in former years, the details of which have been described in former annual reports, and therefore do not require repeating here.

All of the medical officers, at these inspections, were found active and vigilant in the care of the few that were sick, and in the performance of their duties in looking after the sanitary condition of their camps. The scrupulous cleanliness observed everywhere could only be brought about by careful, constant and painstaking work on the part of the medical staff, and the zeal and energy displayed in this direction is worthy of the highest commendation.

The regimental hospitals, used for the first time at the last annual encampments, were again used this year, but were much better supplied with furniture.

These regimental hospitals are, I believe, not only a great convenience, but a necessity, and should be organized on a permanent basis. In order to do this, there should be supplied to each regiment a hospital tent of sufficient size to contain six or eight beds. For the last two years we have issued for these regimental hospitals two wall tents; these have been pitched in the most inconvenient place, and usually have not added to the symmetry of the camp, and have not been convenient for hospital purposes.

For these reasons I recommend that three tents of proper size and shape be procured for the use of the militia as hospital tents.

A few days before the encampment of the First Brigade, a personal inspection of the wells on the State camp ground at South Framingham was made, and as a result of this inspection the attention of the State Board of Health was called to this source of water supply, and a number of samples were collected by the inspector of this Board from these wells and analyzed.

The following is the report of the analyst:—

Well No. 4 has been used constantly for two weeks.
 Well No. 8 has been used constantly for six weeks.

Well in Superintendent's house is twenty-five feet from a vault, and forty feet from a cistern for sink water, etc. New leathers have recently been fitted to the boxes in the pumps at all wells, except, possibly, that at the Superintendent's house. The well at the Superintendent's house is in constant use throughout the year.

There has been a strong suspicion on the part of the medical staff for two or three years that these wells were in some way being contaminated, and one of them (the one near the corner of the field behind headquarters) has undoubtedly been the cause of cases of diarrhoea that have occurred in persons using water from it, and the water from some of the others has at times been disagreeable to both the taste and smell.

The report of the analysis fully confirms our suspicions, and these wells should be at once condemned as a water supply.

For some days before the encampment of the Second Brigade these wells were pumped so as to thoroughly change the water daily; even after this the water in some of them was offensive to either the taste or smell, and such were closed by removing the pumps.

I recommend as a health measure, and one that is imperatively demanded, that these wells be abandoned as a water supply. I have conferred with the Adjutant General in relation to this matter, and he is now considering different plans for doing away with this danger to the health of the troops in camp, by obtaining water from some other source. As such a change will entail a considerable expense, I also recommend that an appropriation be made for this purpose.

The ambulance corps have been inspected and examined in their armories by me once each during the year. Both officers and men were found well informed in their duties and interested in their work.

No special manual has been issued or devised for handling the stretchers in use by these corps. This has been delayed in order that we might have the benefit of the work of Major Charles Smart, Surgeon United States Army, who has been detailed by the Surgeon General of the Army to prepare a manual for the use of ambulance students.

During the present winter these corps will, in addition to reviewing the work of the past year, be instructed in improvising temporary splints and other appliances.

During the year one medical director, one surgeon and five assistant surgeons have resigned and been discharged, and one surgeon has died; one surgeon and three assistant surgeons have been examined, found qualified and commissioned in the militia. The resignation of Brigadier General Nat. Wales, First Brigade, during this year, brought with it the resignations of some of his staff, and among them that of Medical Director George E. Pinkham.

Colonel Pinkham has served in the medical department of the militia twelve years, six of which he has occupied the position of

medical director of the First Brigade. During this long and honorable service he has always been active and vigilant in his duties as chief medical officer, honoring himself as he has honored the militia by his conscientious and useful work. I am sure he leaves the militia with the very best wishes of the medical staff with whom he has served.

During the year one surgeon, Dr. Mullen of the Ninth Infantry, has died.

Appended to this report, and a part of it, are the reports of the medical directors and those of the surgeons of the Cadet Corps.

I also call attention to the tabulated statement of the medical and surgical property appended to this report.

STATE AID.

Three hundred and eight soldiers have presented themselves for examination who were applicants for State aid, or for admission to one of the soldiers' homes. All of these were carefully examined as to their disabilities, and a record of their cases kept for reference. Many of these cases require the most careful consideration and study, for upon the result depends in some degree the amount these disabled soldiers are to receive from the State.

One hundred and twenty soldiers have been examined who were applicants for license to peddle without payment of fee.

REPORT OF CHIEF MEDICAL OFFICERS.

ENCAMPMENTS.

LOWELL, MASS., July 17, 1888.

Brigadier General ALFRED F. HOLT, *Surgeon General, Massachusetts.*

SIR:—I have the honor to present the following report of the encampment of First Brigade, M. V. M., at South Framingham, June 12 to June 16 inclusive. With a larger number on the field than ever before under the present organization, there was a decrease in the number sick; the total number during encampment being but twenty-three, only one case, a private of Battery B, being serious. He, having a severe attack of hæmatemesis, was sent home, arriving there safely.

The sanitary condition of the camp was excellent, though, as usual, many of the cooks could not be made to believe that neatness was a necessary accompaniment of their duties.

I have no recommendations to make different from my previous reports.

Private Charles H. Woods of Company C, Sixth Regiment, was detailed as acting Hospital Steward.

My thanks are due to the medical staff of the brigade for their assiduity in the performance of their duties.

I inclose the consolidated morning sick reports.

MASSACHUSETTS VOLUNTEER MILITIA,

SIR: — I have the honor to submit the following medical report of the encampment of the Second Brigade, M. V. M., at South Framingham, for the five days ending July 21.

The health of the command was most excellent throughout the time, there being no more than the usual amount of sickness, and no accidents of any severity. Six cases were admitted to Brigade Hospital, as follows: Hepatic disturbance, one; acute gastritis, one; prostration from heat, one; exhaustion, one; laryngitis, two. The first case was discharged, relieved, on the following day. The second was taken to the railroad station on Saturday in the ambulance, in charge of a detail from the ambulance corps, and turned over to the regimental surgeon. The other four eloped from the hospital early in the morning of the day following their admission.

Brigade Hospital Steward Hunting, in charge of the hospital, had the assistance of a permanent detail, day and night, from the ambulance corps.

The ambulance corps performed a hard week's work, and has become most proficient in its drill in handling the disabled and rendering first aid to the injured.

The camp was at all times most thoroughly policed, the sinks carefully covered and the stables kept clean and neat, the teams employed for the purpose doing the work promptly and well. The food furnished the men was of the best quality and well cooked. The cook-houses were very neat and the ground about them was kept cleaner than I have ever known it to be before. Many of the iron barrels for the swill and waste water are broken and leaky, and I suggest their being replaced by large ones, covered with wood, to prevent denting and breaking.

The condition of the wells was bad, as you know, and it was a source of great anxiety to me throughout the encampment. Fortunately we had no extremely hot weather, or I fear we should not have got through the week without serious trouble. I was obliged by the bad condition of the water to close two of the cavalry wells, one of the artillery and one of the Eighth Regiment. There being danger that the few wells remaining might give out, at my suggestion, the horses of the cavalry and artillery battalions were watered at a pond near the camp ground, where a trough was provided by the Quartermaster General, and a man to keep it full.

I thoroughly believe that the last encampment that can be held with safety on the grounds at South Framingham has taken place; and I most urgently recommend the immediate introduction of running water for the use of both men and animals.

I forward herewith, as a part of this report, the reports of the surgeons of the different organizations in the brigade, and a consolidated sick report for the encampment.

GENERAL:—I have the honor to submit the following report of the medical department of the First Corps of Cadets during the encampment at Hingham, from the 7th to the 14th of July, inclusive.

The weather during the week, as will be seen by reference to the meteorological record, was all that could be desired. The general range of temperature was much lower than usual at this season of the year. Owing to the secure manner in which the tents were pitched, the gale of Wednesday night, which at times was very severe, did no damage.

The health of the corps was excellent. During the entire camp not a single case of diarrhœa came under the care of the medical department. The two men reported as sick were placed in the hospital, in order that they might thus secure a rest, which could not easily be obtained in quarters during the daytime.

As in previous camps, the dietary was daily submitted to the examination of the medical department.

The quality of the food was excellent and the supply abundant.

A temporary wooden building was erected on a line with the headquarter's-tents at the extreme southerly end of the camp, which proved to be of great convenience to ladies visiting the grounds. Galvanized-iron barrels were substituted for the wooden ones heretofore used for the receptacle of swill, and these were placed in two large covered wooden boxes at the extreme north-easterly end of the sinks.

SIR: — I have the honor to submit the following medical report of the encampment of the Second Corps of Cadets at Essex from the 6th to the 11th days of August, 1888.

The corps left Salem at 9.30 A.M. with threatening weather, but owing to the forethought of the commanding officer most of the tents had been previously pitched and all were sheltered before the onset of the rain, which commenced to fall about noon and continued steadily throughout the remainder of the day and night.

The sun did not shine till the following Thursday, but no more rain fell, and the camp duties were not interfered with.

Since the last encampment a new well has been dug, which furnished an unfailing supply of excellent water, free from the sediment of sand, which, in previous years, necessitated the filtering of the water obtained from the old driven wells.

A permanent cook-house has also been built. The sinks were inspected daily and generally found to have been properly cared for. A very large sink was used for the disposal of the garbage, but it is to be hoped that in the future covered receptacles for the same may be provided and the waste be taken daily outside of the grounds.

The policing of the quarters was well carried out, but many pieces of paper and other rubbish were deposited just within the margin of the woods, yet not out of sight, and detracted somewhat from the generally tidy appearance of the camp.

The health of the corps was excellent. Although between forty and fifty more men were present than at previous encampments during my term of service, the calls for medical aid were not more numerous than heretofore.

But few cases of diarrhœa occurred, and only one man was confined to quarters by sickness, — a mild case of cholera morbus, — occasioned probably by an indiscretion in diet while absent from camp attending to some private business. Two men had slight attacks of syncope and dropped from the ranks during the funeral service held Thursday afternoon in memory of the late General Sheridan. They soon recovered and returned to duty.

SIR:—The returns embodied in the following tables, which show an increased number of qualified marksmen, an enlarged attendance and improved average of scoring at the State rifle matches, and the renewed success of our State team at Creedmoor, all point to the conclusion that our system of rifle practice is producing results which may be characterized for the time being as satisfactory. A material advance is looked for the coming year.

The State rifle matches at South Framingham, September 25, were participated in by about 725 officers and men, and the summary of scores appended sufficiently demonstrates the general effectiveness of the force. A study of these scores will further indicate that some organizations are still lacking in systematic attention to rifle practice.

I have obtained from the battalion inspectors reports of the

detailed work in their several organizations. I deduce from them, and from my own observation, these conclusions:—

1. The best results are only obtained where company officers take an active part by their presence and example. Fair results only are obtained where the officers take a partial interest and depend on non-commissioned officers to do the active work. Poor results are easily traceable to the indifference of both officers and non-commissioned officers.

2. The only remedy for cases of neglect is to make this branch of duty obligatory instead of permissive: or

3. If the “permissive” policy is to continue, those organizations which continuously neglect the work or perform it in a perfunctory and unprofitable manner, should be cut off, as a whole, from the privileges of marksmanship and participation in the State matches.

4. The expediency of a continued issue of ammunition for armory practice remains a question to be determined by local circumstances. It is clear that those companies which are interested derive a benefit from it. They should be permitted to continue it. In those companies where indifference prevails, the issue should be cut off.

5. Companies which have a two years’ record of fifty per cent. of marksmen should have their allowance of field ammunition increased.

6. It seems to be necessary to impress upon company commanders the necessity of using more thorough precautions to protect the “qualification,” as well as their own good faith, from abuse in making certification. I shall recommend, in the issuance of orders for 1889, that this matter be carefully covered.

7. Nearly all the cities and towns of the Commonwealth having militia companies to provide for have in some form complied with the law which requires them to furnish target facilities; but there are a few conspicuous instances of failure to make any provision whatever. I suggest that it may be wise and proper to take some official notice of these cases.

ACTION OF THE MASSACHUSETTS LEGISLATURE.

[Chapter 85.]

RESOLVE RELATIVE TO THE CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION OF THE SETTLEMENT OF OHIO, AND THE ESTABLISHMENT OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT IN THE NORTH-WEST TERRITORY.

Resolved, In view of the approaching celebration of the centennial of the anniversary of the settlement of Ohio, and the establishment of civil government in the north-west territory, in which citizens of Massachusetts were prominent, and in order to accept the invitation of the legislature of Ohio to have the Commonwealth of Massachusetts represented at such celebration, which has been fixed for September fourth in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, at Columbus, Ohio, that there be allowed and paid out of the treasury of the Commonwealth a sum not exceeding five thousand dollars, to be expended under the direction of the governor and council, to enable the Commonwealth to be properly represented through the following officials of the state government:—The governor and staff and a committee of three members of the executive council, the president of the senate and speaker of the house, the joint committee on federal relations, a special committee of five senators and fifteen representatives to be appointed by the presiding officers of the two branches, the clerk of the senate and clerk of the house, and the sergeant-at-arms. [*Approved May 23, 1888.*]

By resolve, chapter 97, approved May 29, 1888, a sum not exceeding twenty-five hundred dollars, in addition to the five thousand dollars authorized by chapter 85 of the resolve approved May 23, was appropriated by the Legislature.

REPORT OF THE ADJUTANT GENERAL —
OHIO CELEBRATION.

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, BOSTON, Sept. 10, 1888.

To His Excellency the GOVERNOR AND HONORABLE COUNCIL, *Executive Department, Boston, Mass.*

GENTLEMEN : — In compliance with the order of your honorable body, dated June 13, 1888, authorizing the Adjutant General to incur such expenses as may be necessary to carry into effect the provisions of chapters 85 and 87 of the Resolves of the year 1888, I have the honor to submit my report.

On receipt of your order I at once proceeded to make the necessary arrangements for the fifty-five persons named in the resolves as the representative delegation, forty-seven of whom having signified to me by letter their intention to accompany the delegation to Columbus, O.

Upon this number as a basis I commenced to make my arrangements.

A contract was entered into with the Fitchburg Railroad to transport the party to Columbus and return at thirty-seven dollars each person, including meals en route, the State to pay at the same rate for each person in excess of forty-five, which number of fares were guaranteed.

Arrangements were also made with the proprietors of the Neil House in Columbus for fifty or sixty persons, at four dollars per day each, for three days.

Carriages were engaged of the Columbus Transfer Company, as follows : —

Eight landaus at ten dollars per day, and eight coupés at eight dollars per day, each ; all carriages used after 6 o'clock P.M. to be charged for by the hour, at two dollars and one dollar and fifty cents, respectively.

Thirty-eight only of the appointed delegates reported for the excursion, the baggage master making thirty-nine persons. Cigars were purchased and arranged in convenient manner for distribution ; a badge of metal, similar to the one provided at the time of the " Centennial Constitutional Celebration " at Philadelphia, was procured for each member of the delegation, to be retained as a souvenir of the occasion, and a time card, showing time of arrival and departure from different points en route, as well as a book containing a history of the event to be celebrated, with a complete itinerary furnished to each.

The party assembled at the State House on Sunday, September 2, at 2 o'clock P.M., taking carriages to the depot at 2.30 o'clock. The train was delayed by accident at Buffalo, N. Y., but reached Columbus on the evening of the 3d at 5.10 o'clock P.M., Western time. The party proceeded at once, on arrival, to the Neil House, where quarters had been provided.

During the evening the delegation were entertained at the Commercial Club by invitation of Governor Foraker. On the 4th the delegation paid their respects to the Governor of Ohio at the State House, from whence they were escorted to the reviewing stand and witnessed the passage of the Ohio National Guard, at the conclusion of which proceeded to the exhibition ground, where the opening ceremonies took place, speeches being made by Governor Foraker and others.

In the evening a reception to visiting governors was given by Mr. Firestone, a citizen of Columbus.

On the morning of September 5 the delegation proceeded to the exhibition and were welcomed by General W. H. Gibson of Ohio, which was responded to by Lieutenant-Governor Brackett of Massachusetts in an eloquent and scholarly manner.

The afternoon was spent in visiting State institutions, and in the evening, by invitation of the entertainment committee, visited the exhibition, "Last Days of Pompeii."

September 6 was devoted to drives in and about the city, and, at 4.45 P.M., departed for home, arriving in Boston at 11.25 o'clock P.M. on the night of September 7, where all who were unable to reach home were provided with hotel accommodations.

Badges and itinerary were sent to all members of delegation who were unable to attend the celebration, and to Governor Foraker and other State dignitaries at Columbus, as well as to Governor Ames and the State Library.

In arranging this excursion the correspondence was large in consequence of the indefinite information from Columbus, copies of which, with the duplicate bills, are on file in this office.

REPORTS OF COMMANDING OFFICERS.

HEADQUARTERS FIRST BRIGADE, M. V. M.,
BOSTON, Nov. 10, 1888.

Maj. Gen. SAMUEL DALTON, *Adjutant General, M. V. M.*

SIR:—I have the honor to report the annual encampment of this brigade from June 12 to 16 inclusive as having been highly successful, and officers and men are to be congratulated for it. Too much praise cannot be given to the commanders of companies for the work done by them throughout the year in armories.

I would respectfully suggest that the State follow the example set by the First Corps Cadets by prescribing and issuing tent equipage for officers and men. The gorgeous fittings of many of the quarters are unsoldierly, to say the least.

The camp ground at South Framingham having become a *permanency*, I suggest looking into the feasibility of filling in and grading the swamp and facing the camp towards the arsenal, the rear resting on the Worcester Turnpike, brigade headquarters being located on the hill in rear of the targets or in the field to the north of them. If on the score of expense this cannot be done, I am still of the opinion that it would be well to change brigade headquarters and reverse the camp. The rear of the present line is honey-combed with old sinks in dangerous proximity to the wells, one or more of which are yearly condemned as unfit for use. With the new year there would be no opportunity to throw away offal and sweepings, thereby making the placing it in barrels a necessity. The removal of State and brigade headquarters to the hill would give the entire field for drilling, besides giving headquarters an outlook which would command the whole camp. Should the State at any time desire to sell the camp ground, the reclaimed swamp (now of little value) would largely repay for filling and grading.

The improvement in guard duty by officers and men may be largely attributed to the little book on that subject issued by the Adjutant General's office, and I sincerely trust that in the near future more reading matter may be issued to the entire militia.

There is so little opportunity to acquire practical knowledge, that much would be gained by having officers, and particularly enlisted men, begin the duties of camp week with a fair theoretical knowledge. I look on the militia as a school to fit men for positions from colonels to second lieutenants in case the general government should have occasion to call for volunteers as in the "sixties," and I do not consider the issuing of the small number of tactics and regulations as is done at present sufficient.

I would also suggest that an order be issued obliging officers to recite lessons (previously set them) at the six yearly meetings allowed by law, too many of these meetings being frittered away in discussions on subjects other than those prescribed.

I understand fully the difficulties in handling the liquor question, but there is no reason why the different headquarters cannot set a good example to the men by banishing liquor while in camp. Having tried this at brigade headquarters the last two camps, I know it can be done.

I earnestly request, as a slight recognition of their work, that the ambulance corps have issued to them five rifles for target practice.

SIR: — In accordance with General Orders No. 13, C. S., A. G. O., I have the honor to report as follows: —

Major Hinman and Captains Parker and Bouvé were detailed to accompany the Second and Sixth Infantry and Battery B from Huntington Avenue freight yard to the Common. The Signal Corps, Lieutenant Lyford, Ambulance Corps, Lieutenant Howard, and Troop F, Cavalry, Captain Fletcher, in order, reported promptly at 12 o'clock M.; the First Infantry at 12.15 P.M., followed by the Second Infantry at 12.20; the Sixth Infantry and Battery B at 12.25, and were formed in line and column of wings, arms stacked and rations eaten. At 12.59.10 I gave the order to march, and the head of the column passed out of the Charles and Beacon Streets gate as the clock on the Arlington Street church struck one. The conduct and discipline of the troops were highly commendable, and must have afforded friends of the militia much

satisfaction. This brigade was dismissed at 3 o'clock P.M., and were, so far as my authority went, aboard of their trains ready to start at the appointed hour.

GENERAL:—I have the honor to submit the following report of the encampment of this command for the year 1888:—

I am pleased to be able to report an improvement in every duty performed over that of previous encampments.

The idea of each organization guarding its own quarters was inaugurated at this encampment, and much better results were obtained than on any previous tour of duty of this brigade. I am convinced this is a move in the right direction. I look for better results in the future, which can be realized if officers and men will make themselves familiar with the contents of the "Manual of Guard Duty"; a portion of the evening drills should be devoted to instruction in this duty. Officers should not only be posted in their own duties, but should be able to instruct others.

A rifle skirmish match was also inaugurated at the encampment of this year which proved quite a success for the first attempt. Fully believing in the importance of instruction in this branch of the soldier's duty, I trust we shall be able in the near future to very much increase its scope and benefits.

The attendance at camp was very satisfactory as a whole, the brigade having for duty a total of 2,540 officers and men. Companies E and H of the Fifth Regiment, G and H of the Eighth Regiment, G and H of the Ninth Regiment, and the Ambulance Corps of the brigade are entitled to much credit for having every officer and enlisted man of a full enlistment present for duty. Companies G and H of the Eighth Regiment, and the Ambulance Corps of the brigade, are entitled to special mention, as this is the third camp in succession that the former company, and the second time in succession that the latter company and the ambulance corps have had the maximum number of officers and men present for duty.

The erection of the storehouse on the camp ground, by which each battalion headquarters and each company has been provided

with a room for the storage of its property, has proved of great benefit and convenience to the troops. I trust that the time is not far distant when mess houses can be provided, believing that with permanent wooden mess houses the troops could be better fed and better served at less expense than now, and much trouble in keeping the rear of the camp clean would be avoided.

I am also of the opinion that the time has come for a prescribed uniformity of the inside of tents; the appearance of the camp can be much improved by doing away with useless articles that encumber the tents, and by providing conveniences that can be utilized in many ways.

I respectfully renew my recommendations of last year, that the Legislature be asked to so amend the Militia Law as to provide that the encampment shall be for at least six days' duration, and that the ambulance corps be increased to twenty-five men each, and add thereto my earnest appeal for a different water supply than that we now have at the camp ground at Framingham; the risk of sickness among the troops from the use of the water from the wells is, in my opinion, too great for us longer to continue to depend on that source of supply. For three or four years past we have been obliged to prohibit the use of the water of one or more of these wells on account of the impurity of the same, rendering it very inconvenient to a portion of the troops.

In closing my report I take pleasure in acknowledging my appreciation of the uniform good conduct and the devotion to duty as shown by the promptness and faithfulness in which the troops comprising the various organizations performed their duties; while in a few cases the service could be improved by more activity on the part of the officers and more care in the department of the men, yet, in my opinion, the encampment of the present year was the best we have ever had and very creditable to the militia of the Commonwealth.

GENERAL: — In accordance with paragraph II., General Orders No. 13, C. S., I have the honor to make the following report of the parade of the militia of this State at Boston, Oct. 3, 1888: —

Pursuant to instructions contained in Special Orders No. 96, C. S., I assumed command of the troops comprising the State force at 12.30 P.M. on the above-mentioned date.

The various organizations were reported promptly at the time designated in orders, having been in position some minutes previous.

The command moved at precisely 1 o'clock P.M., and passed over a route three miles in length, paying a marching salute to His Excellency the Governor and Commander-in-Chief, who, accompanied by members of his staff, the council and other distinguished gentlemen, were located at the Brunswick Hotel. The head of the column arrived back to the point from which it started in one hour and twenty-five minutes from the time of starting. The column was one and one-eighth miles long and required thirty-two minutes in passing a given point.

The division was dismissed as the right of each brigade and cadet corps arrived at the corner of Beacon and Charles Streets after having passed over the route. At this point I assumed command of the Second Brigade and proceeded to the parade ground on the Common and held a dress parade, after which the various organizations of the brigade were dismissed.

By their excellent deportment, neat and soldierly appearance and strict attention to duty the troops won and received the commendation of the vast number of citizens who occupied the buildings and sidewalks along the entire route, and I take pleasure in adding my appreciation of the prompt and faithful manner in which this tour of duty was performed, fully demonstrating the fact that the Commonwealth has an efficient force of militia on which they can rely in any emergency.

I believe this tour of duty was of great benefit to the militia, and recommend that in the autumn of next year the troops assemble by brigade in other cities of the Commonwealth.

HEADQUARTERS FIRST CORPS CADETS, M. V. M.,

GENERAL:—I have the honor to report that my command, by my order, went into camp at Hingham, Mass., on the afternoon of Saturday, July 7, so remaining until the morning of Monday,

July 9, which day, in accordance with Special Orders No. 72 from State headquarters, was the day for the annual drill of the corps. On the following day, Tuesday, July 10, the regular tour of five days of camp duty commenced, and continued until Saturday, July 14, when the corps returned to Boston, reaching the armory at 2 o'clock P.M., exactly seven days after the hour of assembly at the same place on the previous Saturday.

The benefits resulting from this lengthened term of camp, now tried for the second year, are so apparent that I hope the corps will never again encamp for a shorter period; and I believe the rest of the militia, if it tries the same experiment, will gain a similar benefit.

The number in camp averaging 164, with 166 on one day, exclusive of the band, was the largest ever known in the history of the corps, and so was the average of proportionate attendance to the number on our rolls, viz., 83 per cent. This is the more satisfactory because no discharges were made of men who could not attend. On the contrary, the corps has adhered, as I hope it always will, to the wise and sound military custom of keeping on its rolls as long as possible its long term soldiers, who, although they may not every year be able to encamp, are always available as reliable and skilful men in case of an emergency, to say nothing of the good moral influence of their relation. Of the absentees, eight had certificates of temporary disability from the surgeon, and five were absent on furlough beyond State limits. The remainder paid fines, four dollars per man for each day's absence. One man was discharged on surgeon's certificate of disability while the corps was in camp, and one man for removal of residence from the State.

The weather during the whole tour was delightful. Rain fell only once, and then interfered with but one duty, a tattoo roll-call. A high wind on Wednesday night and nearly all day on Thursday would probably have laid many of our tents flat, had they not been pitched with stanchions and side-rails. The only damage done was to the headquarter marquee, which had one corner torn.

The duty of the camp was conscientiously performed, officers and men working hard throughout. The drills showed steady progress in improvement, and the way in which the guard duty was done showed that the Guard Manual had been carefully studied. Upon the authority granted in paragraph 550 of the Regulations M. V. M., I have habitually ordered undress uniform to be worn by the guard in camp, especially as this uniform in my command is essentially a service dress, admirably adapted to camp duty in such a warm month as July. The full dress, though very handsome and adapted to occasions of grand parade, is in reality a

relic of the past, retained from a sentiment of its long association with the corps, and hardly fitted for the rough service of a camp. I ordered it worn by the guard only between the hours of 4 and 6 P.M. daily, except on Friday, when it was worn from 2 until 8. The formal ceremonies of inspection and muster and dress parade were performed in it. The colors were escorted to the battalion in form daily, previous to inspection and muster, except on Friday, when they were escorted previous to the review.

On Friday, July 13, in the absence of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor visited camp with a portion of His Excellency's staff, and reviewed the corps.

Maj. Gen. Samuel Dalton, Adjutant General and Inspector General, was with us in camp during the greater part of the tour, and Col. Augustus W. Sampson, Assistant Inspector General, was with us, by detail, from Monday, July 9, until the conclusion of our duty. The presence of these officers was a pleasure to the corps.

The camp was pitched complete previous to our arrival. It was struck by the corps on Saturday, July 14, and all the tents neatly folded for transportation to South Framingham.

I append a table showing the attendance each day, and enclose the reports of the medical officers.

GENERAL:— I have the honor to submit the following report of the annual tour of camp duty performed by this command in compliance with Special Orders No. 74, dated July 2, 1888, on August 7 to 11, inclusive:—

The recent change in the organization to a four-company battalion has infused new life into the whole command, and has

resulted beneficially in many respects. The corps has at the present time a larger number of enlisted men than ever before, and has reported in camp a number far in excess of any year of its existence.

The corps left Salem August 6, by special train, at 9.30 A.M., for Essex, where, at Centennial Grove, the encampment has been held for several years past. Arriving in camp at about 10.30 A.M., the remainder of the day was chiefly spent in perfecting the arrangements of the camp and getting settled in quarters. The afternoon and evening were rainy, but no inconvenience or discomfort was experienced; the camp having been pitched by a detail before the arrival of the command, the quarters were dry and comfortable.

Tuesday, the first day of official duty, was a good day for work, and the prescribed routine was duly carried out from first to last.

At reveille the national ensign was hoisted to the peak, and then half-masted as a mark of respect to the memory of the Lieutenant General of the United States Army, Philip H. Sheridan.

While the weather was not all that could be desired, yet the week proved to be a good one for camp work and duties, and daily improvement was noticeable in company and battalion drills and in all ceremonies. Much attention was given to rifle practice under the direction of the battalion inspector.

On Friday, His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, accompanied by members of the Governor's staff, visited the encampment, and reviewed the corps in the early afternoon.

I am indebted to the Inspector General and officers of his department, including Col. F. W. Wellington, specially detailed for duty in the camp, for many valuable suggestions during the tour of duty, and feel more than pleased with the cheerful and enthusiastic manner in which all the officers and men present in camp performed their duties, their efforts resulting in the most successful tour of duty ever performed by the corps within my recollection. Camp was broken at noon on Saturday, the 11th inst., and the corps was dismissed in Salem at about 4 P.M.

SIR:—Complying with the requirements of paragraph II., General Orders No. 13, A. G. O., Oct. 5, 1888, I have the honor to report the movements of this command, made in accordance with General Orders No. 9 and Special Orders No. 96, C. S., as follows:—

The companies of the battalion assembled promptly at 8.30 A.M., Oct. 3, the hour designated in orders from these headquarters, and at 9 A.M. the line was formed on Washington Square, Salem. One hour and a half was devoted to company and battalion drill, and to an inspection for general appearance, made by Col. R. F. Barrett of the Governor's staff, who arrived at about 9.30 A.M. The command paraded with a larger number of men than ever before in its history.

The men were provided with a liberal supply of sandwiches, carried in the haversacks, while the canteens were filled with water.

At 10.30 A.M. the battalion, accompanied by the Salem Cadet Band, marched to the Eastern Railroad Station and embarked on regular train due to leave Salem at 10.48 A.M. Some delay east of Salem made the arrival in Boston about twenty minutes later than schedule time. No time was lost in re-forming the line, as the embarking at Salem was made in accordance with instructions, and the formation was made very easy and devoid of confusion in the depot in Boston. Passing through Causeway, Staniford and Temple Streets to Mt. Vernon, horses for the field and staff were taken, and a halt was made near the corner of Charles Street on Beacon Street, and report of arrival made to Brig. Gen. B. F. Peach, Jr., at 12.20 P.M., ten minutes before the hour mentioned in Special Orders before referred to.

The position assigned this command was the left of the division, and the march over the route was made in column of companies of sixteen files, breaking into column of platoons in the narrower and crowded streets. Throughout the march the men showed a remarkable steadiness considering the slippery state of the pavements in many streets.

At the conclusion of the parade, and after dismissal, the First Corps of Cadets tendered the courtesy of an escort to Young's Hotel, where dinner was served to this command at 5 o'clock. At 7 P.M. the command marched to Causeway Street, when companies A, B and C embarked on the 7 P.M. train for Salem,

Company D being dismissed to reach Lowell *via* the Boston and Lowell Railroad.

The plan of mobilizing the militia of the State seems to have been quite successful, and it is in my judgment a decided improvement as a yearly occurrence over the former annual drills. Better and more effective work is done, as was evidenced in the splendid appearance of the entire force. To the extent that this command is concerned, I am sure that the drill on Salem Common in the morning and the march afterwards taken in Boston, together with the instructions in discipline, both by circular from the A. G. O. and verbally by the officers of the corps, made the day by far the best and most valuable of any annual drill for many years.

The petition of Laurence A. Sullivan and others of Boston, to form a company to be attached to the Massachusetts Volunteer Militia, is hereby granted.

Col. Albert L. Newman, Assistant Adjutant General, is hereby appointed aide-de-camp, with rank of colonel.

II. Col. William M. Strachan, commanding Ninth Regiment of Infantry, Second Brigade, will arrange for the enlistment and muster into service of the new company in Boston on the evening of January 6, which will be known as Company I, Ninth Regiment of Infantry.

Colonel Strachan will detail a mustering officer and an officer of his medical staff to assist in this duty.

Company I will be instructed until further orders in the set-up, general duty, military courtesy and details of company formation.

When it is the opinion of the regimental commander that the company has sufficiently advanced to receive arms, he will so report to this office.

The matter of medical examination in the new company is left to the discretion of the regimental commander.

III. Col. Albert L. Newman, having been duly commissioned and qualified as colonel and aide-de-camp, will be obeyed and respected accordingly.

V. Regimental commanders will detail the major assigned to visit companies to attend the inspections of the companies of his assignment, except new companies, in full uniform. These visits will be returned for mileage, counting as one of the number allowed by law.

VI. All property will be in armories. Companies will be formed in full uniform, except knapsack and overcoat, promptly at 8 o'clock P.M., and the number present at that time only will be returned as number present.

VII. Maj. John W. Sanger, Assistant Inspector, First Brigade, and Capt. Newell A. Thompson, Acting Assistant Inspector, Second Brigade, are detailed for duty at armory inspections, and will report to the Inspector General for instructions.

VIII. The Commander-in-Chief expresses his high appreciation of the work performed by the militia during the year just closed, and is confident that the earnestness and attention to duty already shown insures progressive work for the present year.

IX. Brigade and cadet corps commanders are charged with the promulgation of this order.

GENERAL ORDERS No. 2.

I. Armory and field rifle practice will be conducted during 1888, substantially as heretofore. The maximum company allowances of ammunition will be five hundred rounds for armory practice, and one thousand rounds for field practice. In lieu of the latter, three thousand rounds of bullets and primers will be issued, on request.

II. Requisitions for armory ammunition must be forwarded before April 1, and for field ammunition June 1, *with return of armory practice*; but if commanding officers elect to take bullets and primers, they must give notice at once. A blank is provided for this.

III. Qualifications of marksmen remain as heretofore. The permission heretofore granted for the wearing of marksmen's buttons does not permit the procuring of buttons before the names of the marksmen have been returned to this office, at the prescribed period. Sharpshooters may have gilt buttons.

IV. The requirements for qualification, etc., are, participation in armory practice by sixty per cent. of unqualified men, and in field practice by fifty per cent. of the same men. If for any valid reason permission be granted to omit armory practice with ball cartridge, efficient and satisfactory aiming drill must be substituted.

V. Returns are to be made of armory practice on or before June 1; of field practice on or before November 1. The latter refers to full returns of individual practice. A general certificate of compliance with requirements may be called for at an earlier date, with reference to entries for State rifle matches.

VI. The permission heretofore given to the Inspector General of Rifle Practice, to sanction the wearing of medals other than those permitted by regulations, is revoked; this revocation to take effect March 1, 1888.

VII. A circular of the Inspector General of Rifle Practice, of this date, has been approved at this office, and its requirements will be respected and followed.

VIII. Brigade and cadet corps commanders will promulgate this order.

GENERAL ORDERS NO. 3.

I. A special meeting of Board of Examiners will be held at State House on Wednesday, February 8, at 1.30 P.M.

All officers ordered for examination will appear on that date.

The regular meeting of the board occurring February 22, the date is changed to February 24.

All boards of officers, members of courts-martial or courts of inquiry, and all officers appearing before such boards, except in case of first commission, will appear in full uniform, unless permission is granted otherwise.

Officers visiting other organizations which are performing

ordered duty will appear in either full or undress uniform, as the case may require.

Permission is hereby granted to Board of Examiners and Medical Board of Examiners, and officers ordered before such boards, to appear in undress uniform.

No officer will appear before the board unless ordered, and no officer will be ordered to appear unless election returns are received at this office one week prior to meeting of board. The attention of commanding officers is called to this, and they will govern themselves accordingly in ordering elections.

Col. William M. Strachan, commanding Ninth Infantry, Second Brigade, M. V. M., will detail a private from his command to attend the meetings of the Board of Examiners as orderly. He will be instructed to report to Brig. Gen. B. F. Peach, Jr., president of the board, for duty, and will be borne on the returns of the board for pay and mileage. Colonel Strachan will report the name of the private so detailed to this office.

II. Armory Inspections in the following commands, ordered in General Orders No. 1, A. G. O., current series, are postponed until further orders: Companies C and G, Sixth Infantry,—all property having been destroyed by fire; companies I, K, L and M, Second Infantry; companies I, K and L, Fifth Infantry; Company B, Eighth Infantry; Company I, Ninth Infantry,—not being fully equipped. Assistant Inspectors will govern themselves accordingly, and return inspection books to this office.

III. The custom of forwarding resignations just prior to a tour of duty acts to the injury of the service. Hereafter resignations will not be received, except by special permission from this office, between the days of May 1 and November 1, each year.

IV. Hereafter enlisting and mustering officers will be more particular in enlisting and mustering men. The blank application will be required in all cases; and if applicant has done previous service, the reason for discharge will be thoroughly investigated before enlistment or muster.

Applications for discharge before expiration of service will not be forwarded by intermediate commanders, unless reasons are fully stated in the application.

Applications for discharge of enlisted men will not be granted unless received at this office ten days prior to tour of duty.

V. All company, signal, and ambulance corps commanders will forward to this office requisitions for new dress coats and chevrons. Commanders of new companies will also include in requisition a full equipment for their commands.

Requisitions will be forwarded at once, and requisitions will show the number of each size required, as per following table. Blouse sizes will be made up from dress-coat returns : —

If smaller breast or waist measure is required, requisition will so state.

Commanders of new companies, in requisitions for trousers, will give waist and inside leg measure.

It is important that these requisitions be forwarded as soon as possible, in order that proper sizes may be provided.

GENERAL ORDERS NO. 4.

The attention of officers of the Massachusetts Volunteer Militia is called to the following bill of dress. Officers, when purchasing new uniforms, or parts of same, or equipments, will comply strictly with this order. Non-commissioned staff of battalions and company musicians will wear only the regulation uniform, when on State duty.

Swords for first sergeants having been discontinued, all company commanders having the same on property list will at once forward to Quartermaster General, State Arsenal, sending invoice of same to this office.

COATS.

FULL DRESS FOR OFFICERS.

A double-breasted frock coat of dark-blue cloth, the skirt to extend from one-half to three-fourths the distance from the hip-joint to the bend of the knee.

For a Major General: Two rows of buttons on the breast, nine in each row, placed by threes; the distance between each

row five and one-half inches at top, and three and one-half inches at bottom; stand-up collar not less than one nor more than two inches in height, to hook in front at the bottom and slope, thence up and backward at an angle of thirty degrees on each side, corners rounded; cuffs three inches deep, to go round the sleeves parallel with the lower edge, and with three small buttons at the under seam; pockets in the folds of the skirts, with two buttons at the hip and one at the lower end of each side-edge, making four buttons on the back and skirt of the coat; collar and cuffs to be of dark-blue velvet; lining of the coat black.

For a Brigadier General: The same as for a major general, except that there will be eight buttons in each row on the breast, placed by pairs.

For a Colonel, Lieutenant Colonel and Major: The same as for a major general, except that there will be nine buttons in each row on the breast, placed at equal distances; collar and cuffs of the same color and material as the coat.

For a Captain, First Lieutenant and Second Lieutenant: The same as for a colonel, except that there will be seven buttons in each row, on the breast.

For Chaplains: Plain black frock coat with standing collar; one row of nine black buttons in front on breast, with "herring-bone" of black braid, one-half inch wide, around the buttons and buttonholes.

VESTS.

When not on duty, officers may wear a buff, white or blue vest.

UNDRESS FOR OFFICERS.

For fatigue purposes and for general wear: A sack coat of dark-blue cloth or serge; falling collar; single-breasted, with five buttons in front, same as those worn on the dress coat. The skirt to extend from one-third to two-thirds the distance from the hip-joint to the bend of the knee; to fit easy to body.

The shoulder-straps will always be worn with this coat, and sword-belt on outside by all officers.

For Chaplain; Same as other officers, except buttons to be black.

COAT FOR ENLISTED MEN.

For Infantry: Single-breasted, dark-blue frock coat, according to the pattern in the office of the Adjutant General.

For Cavalry and Artillery: Same as for infantry, except that pipings and facings are of yellow for cavalry and of red for artillery.

For Signal Corps: Same as infantry; facings to be orange.

For Ambulance Corps: Same as infantry; facings to be olive-green.

UNDRESS FOR ENLISTED MEN.

For fatigue purposes and for general wear: A dark-blue flannel blouse, close-fitting, lined throughout; single-breasted, with four buttons; falling collar.

BUTTONS.

As per pattern in the office of the Adjutant General.

For General Officers and Officers of the Governor's and Brigade Staffs: The staff button.

For all other Officers, except Chaplains: The line officer's button.

For Chaplains: Plain black serge button.

For all Enlisted Men: The special button for enlisted men.

TROUSERS.

For General Officers and Officers of the Governor's and Brigade Staffs: Dark-blue cloth, plain, without stripe, welt or cord.

For all Regimental Officers of Cavalry, Artillery, Infantry, Signal and Ambulance Corps: Light-blue cloth, same shade of color as trousers of enlisted men, with stripe one and one-half inches wide, welted at the edges; color, that of facings of their respective arms, except infantry, which will be dark-blue.

For Chaplains: Plain black, with black cord on outer seams.

For all Enlisted Men: Sky-blue; color and style as per pattern in the office of the Adjutant General.

Non-Commissioned Staff Officers and Sergeants to wear a stripe one inch wide; *Corporals*, one-half inch wide; *Musicians*, two stripes one-half inch wide, and one-fourth of an inch apart. Color to conform to arm of the service.

CRAVATS.

For all Officers and Enlisted Men: Black or white, as may be prescribed by regimental commanders; the tie not to be visible at the opening of the dress coat.

HAT OR CAP (FULL DRESS)

For General Officers and Officers of the Governor's and Brigade Staffs: Chapeau according to pattern, with staff button; to be worn with the peak slightly to the left, showing the gilt ornaments upon the right side.

For Field and Staff Officers, Officers of Artillery and Cavalry, Signal and Ambulance Corps: Black felt helmet, cloth covered, with gold cord and tassels, and gilt trimmings, according to pattern. Officers, when on foot duty, may wear the spike without cord.

For Chaplains: Black chapeau without plume, ornament of black silk with the number of the regiment above the arms of the State embroidered in silver, on the right side.

For all other Officers: Black felt, cloth covered helmet, without plume, with metal ornaments, as per pattern.

For Enlisted Men of Artillery and Cavalry: Black felt, cloth covered helmet, same patterns as for officers, with cords and tassels of mohair, — red for artillery and yellow for cavalry. Helmet ornamented with yellow metal trimmings, as per pattern.

The helmet cords will be attached to the left side of the helmet and come down to the left shoulder, where they are held together by a slide; one cord then passes to the front, the other to the rear of the neck, crossing upon the right shoulder and passing separately around the front and rear of the right arm, where they are again united and held together by a slide under the arm; the united cords then cross the breast and are looped up to the upper button on the left side of the coat.

For all other Enlisted Men: Same as enlisted men of artillery and cavalry, but spike will be worn in place of plume.

FORAGE CAP.

For General Officers: Of dark-blue cloth, chasseur pattern with drooping visor; to have black velvet band and badge in front.

For all other Commissioned Officers: Same as for general officers but without the black velvet band and having the badge in front, the top to be even with top of cap.

For Chaplains: Black felt army hat with black cord.

For all Enlisted Men: Of plain blue cloth with drooping visor, and with regimental number and company letter on the top in front, as per pattern in the office of the Adjutant General.

For Officers of Artillery: Two gold embroidered cannon crossed, on dark-blue cloth ground, with the number of the regiment in silver at the intersection of the cross cannon.

For Officers of Infantry: Two gold embroidered rifles, crossed, without bayonets, barrel upward, on dark-blue cloth ground, with the number of the regiment in silver in the upper angle.

For Officers of Signal Corps: A gold embroidered wreath on dark-blue ground, with cross flags and torch in centre.

For Officers of Ambulance Corps: A gold embroidered wreath, with Geneva cross in centre. All caps and cap ornaments of officers to be of Regular Army pattern and shape.

Officers and men who have seen service in war may wear corps badges of cloth on top of cap.

PLUMES FOR OFFICERS.

For Field and Staff of Battalions and Officers of Cavalry, Artillery, Signal and Ambulance Corps: Horse-hair plume, gilt ball and socket; plume to be long enough to reach the front edge of visor of helmet; color of plume to be white for infantry, red for artillery, yellow for cavalry, orange for signal corps and olive-green for ambulance corps.

PLUMES FOR ENLISTED MEN.

For Artillery and Cavalry: Horse-hair plume, same size and length as for officers; red for artillery, yellow for cavalry; socket according to pattern.

SPURS.

For all Mounted Officers: Yellow metal or gilt.

For all Mounted Men: Of yellow metal, plain surface.

GLOVES.

For General Officers and Officers of the Governor's and Brigade Staffs: Buff gauntlets, on duty with troops; white, otherwise.

For Field Officers of Artillery, Cavalry and Infantry, and for Officers of Artillery and Cavalry, Signal and Ambulance Corps: White gauntlets, on duty with troops. All other officers, white gloves.

SASH.

For General Officers: Buff silk net, with silk bullion fringe ends; sash to go twice around the waist and to tie behind the left hip, pendent part not to extend more than eighteen inches below the tie. Officers above the grade of brigadier general may at their option wear the sash across the body from the left shoulder to the right side.

SWORD-BELT.

For all Officers: A waist-belt, not less than one and one-half nor more than two inches wide, with slings of the same material as the belt, with a hook attached to the belt on which to hang the sword.

The belt to be worn outside the full dress coat and undress sack; and underneath overcoat by all officers below the grade of brigadier general.

For General Officers: Of red Russia leather, with three stripes of gold embroidery, as per pattern now worn.

For all Field Officers: One broad stripe of gold lace on black enamelled leather, according to pattern.

For Company Officers of Cavalry, Artillery, Infantry, Signal and Ambulance Corps: Four stripes of gold lace, interwoven with silk of the same color as the facings of their arms of service, and lined with black enamelled leather.

On undress duty, marches and campaigns, officers may wear a plain black leather belt.

For all Non-commissioned Officers: Plain black leather, same as pattern in office of Adjutant General. No other will be worn.

SWORD-BELT PLATE.

For all Officers and Enlisted Men: Gilt, rectangular, two inches wide, with a raised bright rim; a silver wreath of laurel encircling the "Arms of the United States;" eagle, shield, scroll, edge of cloud and rays bright. The motto "E pluribus unum" upon the scroll; stars also of silver, according to pattern.

SWORD AND SCABBARD.

For General Officers: Straight sword, gilt hilt, silver grip, nickel and bronzed scabbards; for a major general to have two gilt stars, for a brigadier general one gilt star between the bands.

For all other Officers except Chaplains and Medical Officers: The same as for general officers, except that the grip will be black bound with gilt wire, and omitting the stars on the scabbard.

For Medical Officers: Small swords and scabbards, according to United States regulation pattern.

Chaplains wear no swords.

For Non-commissioned Staff Officers: Small straight sword, gilt bow hilt, black grip, bronzed scabbard, like pattern in the office of the Adjutant General. To be carried in a sword frog by non-commissioned staff officers of infantry.

The sword and sword-belt will be worn upon all occasions of duty except stable and fatigue.

When not on military duty, officers may wear swords of honor, or the prescribed sword, with a scabbard, gilt, or of leather with gilt mountings.

SWORD-KNOT.

For General Officers: Gold cord, with acorn end.

For all other Officers: Gold lace strap, with gold bullion tassel, as now worn.

EPAULETTES.

For a Major General: Of gold, with solid crescent; device—two silver embroidered stars, with five rays each, one and one-half inches and one and one-quarter inches in diameter, placed longitudinally; the smaller in the centre of the strap.

For a Brigadier General: Same as for a major general, omitting the smaller star.

SHOULDER-KNOTS.*

For Officers of the Governor's and Brigade Staffs: Gold cord, Russian pattern, on dark-blue cloth ground; insignia of rank and letters or device of corps embroidered on the cloth ground; an aiguillette of gold cord to be worn with the right shoulder-knot by adjutant general and assistant adjutants general, assistant inspectors general and aides-de-camp.

For Officers of Cavalry, Artillery, Infantry, Signal and Ambulance Corps: Of the same pattern as above, but on cloth of the same color.

INSIGNIA OF RANK ON SHOULDER-KNOTS.

For a Colonel: A silver embroidered eagle at the centre of the pad.

For a Lieutenant Colonel: Two silver embroidered leaves, one at each end of pad.

For a Major: Two gold embroidered leaves, one at each end of pad.

For a Captain: Two silver embroidered bars at each end of pad.

For a First Lieutenant: One silver embroidered bar at each end of pad.

For a Second Lieutenant: Plain.

The above insignia to be the same as prescribed for the shoulder-straps.

SHOULDER-STRAPS.

For a Major General: Dark-blue cloth, one and three-eighths inches wide by four inches long, bordered with an embroidery of

gold one-fourth of an inch wide; two silver embroidered stars of five rays each.

For a Brigadier General: The same as for a major general, except that there will be one star instead of two; the centre of the star to be equidistant from the outer edge of the embroidery on the ends of the strap.

For a Colonel: The same size as for a major general, and bordered in like manner with an embroidery of gold; a silver embroidered spread eagle on the centre of the strap, two inches between the tips of the wings, having in the right talon an olive branch, and in the left a bundle of arrows; an escutcheon on the breast, as represented in the "Arms of the United States." Cloth of the strap as follows: for the Governor's and brigade staffs, dark-blue; artillery, scarlet; infantry, sky-blue; cavalry, yellow.

For a Lieutenant Colonel: The same as for colonel, according to corps, omitting the eagle, and introducing a silver embroidered leaf at each end, each leaf extending seven-eighths of an inch from the end border of the strap.

For a Major: The same as for a colonel, according to corps, omitting the eagle, and introducing a gold embroidered leaf at each end, each leaf extending seven-eighths of an inch from the end border of the strap.

For a Captain: The same as for a colonel, according to corps, omitting the eagle, and introducing at each end two silver embroidered bars of the same width as the border, placed parallel to the ends of the strap, at a distance between them and from the border equal to the width of the border.

For a First Lieutenant: The same as for a colonel, according to corps, omitting the eagle, and introducing at each end one silver embroidered bar of the same width as the border, placed parallel to the ends of the strap, at a distance between them and from the border equal to the width of the border.

For a Second Lieutenant: The same as for a colonel, according to corps, omitting the eagle.

For a Chaplain: Same as for a colonel, omitting the eagle, and introducing a shepherd's crook of frosted silver on centre of the strap, which will be of black velvet.

CHEVRONS.

The rank of non-commissioned officers will be marked by chevrons upon both sleeves of the uniform coat and fatigue coat, above the elbow, and upon overcoats below the elbow, of dark-blue cloth for infantry, yellow for cavalry, and red for artillery, orange for signal corps, olive-green for ambulance corps;

divided into bars a half-inch wide, points down, according to new pattern in the office of the Adjutant General, as follows: —

For a Sergeant Major: Three bars and an arc of three bars.

For a Quartermaster Sergeant: Three bars and a tie of three bars.

For a Principal Musician: Three bars and a bugle.

For a Guidon Sergeant of Cavalry or Artillery: Three bars with two crossed colors two and one-half inches long in the angle.

For a Hospital Steward: A half chevron of emerald green cloth one and three-fourths inches wide, piped with yellow cloth, running obliquely downward from the outer to the inner seam of the sleeve, and at an angle of about thirty degrees with a horizontal, and in the centre a "caduceus" two inches long, the head toward the outer seam of the sleeve.

For a First Sergeant: Three bars and a lozenge.

For Company Quartermaster Sergeant: Three bars and a tie of one bar.

To indicate service: All non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates, who have served faithfully for five years, will wear as a mark of distinction upon both sleeves of the uniform coat, below the elbow, a diagonal half chevron, one-half inch wide, extending from seam to seam, the front end nearest the cuff, and one-half inch above the point of the cuff, to be of the same color as the facing of the coat.

In like manner an additional half chevron, above and parallel to the first, for every subsequent term of five years faithful service. Distance between each chevron one-fourth of an inch.

Service in war will be indicated by a white stripe on each side of the chevron for artillery, and a red stripe for all other corps, the stripe to be one-eighth of an inch wide.

OVERCOAT.

For General Officers: Regular Army pattern, as prescribed for general officers, and may also wear the regulation overcoat for other officers.

For all other Officers: Color, sky-blue; same in every respect as now worn by enlisted men, except the cape shall be made detachable; seven buttons, officer's pattern, double row, on front; rank designated upon sleeve by braid, and slit on left side to admit the handle of sword. Overcoat to be worn without cape, except in inclement weather. All mounted officers may wear a dark-blue cape when mounted in inclement weather.

For Enlisted Men of all arms: Of sky-blue cloth of the pattern now used.

To indicate rank for General Officers: There will be on both sleeves, near the lower edge, a knot of flat black silk braid, not exceeding one-eighth of an inch in width, and composed of five braids, double knot.

Colonel, five braids, single knot.

Lieutenant colonel, four braids, single knot.

Major, three braids, single knot.

Captain, two braids, single knot.

First lieutenant, one braid, single knot.

Second lieutenant and chaplains, without braid.

HORSE FURNITURE.

FOR OFFICERS.

Saddle-cloth for General Officers: Dark-blue cloth, trimmed with two rows of gold lace, the outer row one inch and five-eighths wide, the inner row two inches and one-fourth; and to bear on each flank corner the following ornaments, distinctive of rank, to wit:—

For Major Generals: A gold embroidered spread eagle and two stars.

For Brigadier Generals: A gold embroidered spread eagle and one star.

Saddle-cloth for Officers of the Governor's and Brigade Staffs: Dark-blue cloth, of sufficient length to cover the saddle and holsters, and one foot ten inches in depth, with an edging of gold lace one inch wide.

For all other Officers: Dark-blue felt, according to pattern; worn under the saddle and trimmed around the edges with cloth one and one-half inches wide, color as follows:—

Infantry, sky-blue.

Artillery, red.

Cavalry, yellow.

Signal corps, orange.

Ambulance corps, olive-green.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Whenever the full dress coat is worn on armed duty, by officers below the grade of brigadier general, the shoulder-knots and gilt sword-belts will be worn; when not on armed duty, the shoulder-strap may be worn by all officers.

Letters and devices to be embroidered on shoulder-knots in silver letters in Old English characters:—

For Adjutant General and Asst. Adjts. General — a shield.

For Inspector General of Rifle Practice and Assts. — I. R. P.

For Asst. Inspector Generals — I. D.

For Judge Advocate General and Judge Advocates — J. A.

For Asst. Quartermasters General and Brigade Quartermasters — Q. D.

For Medical Officers — M. D.

For Paymasters — P. D.

For Engineer Officers — a turreted castle.

Regimental Staff Officers other than Medical Officers and Paymaster — the number of the regiment.

Excepting by officers of the day (Regulations, paragraphs 581 and 806), sashes will not be worn by officers below the grade of brigadier general, or by non-commissioned officers.

BADGES OF SERVICE OR MERIT.

The badges of the Society of the Cincinnati, the Military Order of the Loyal Legion, the Grand Army of the Republic, and of armies or army corps, indicating actual service in the field, may be worn upon the left breast of the dress coat. Ribbons without clasps, or with single clasps, will not exceed one inch in length; for additional clasps the ribbon may be correspondingly lengthened, not, however, to show more than one inch below the lower clasp or insignia attached to the clasp. In like manner, medals or badges won in authorized military target matches, or in authorized matches for excellence in drill, may be worn on the dress coat.

No medal, badge, ribbon, flower or decoration other than these herein named will be worn. No target or drill match will be considered as authorized unless sanctioned by the orders of a company commander or superior authority.

On the undress coat the ribbon only, indicating a medal or badge, should be worn; to be placed in the same relative position as upon the dress coat.

I. Company signal and ambulance corps commanders will at once pack all uniform dress coats ready for shipment. When all coats are packed for which they are responsible, they will notify

this office, direct, of the number so packed, when shipping instructions will be given. New dress coats will not be issued until all old ones are accounted for.

II. Requisitions received for service chevrons for dress coats are not definite enough. All officers who require such will at once forward requisitions, giving the number required, and state how many of same are entitled to addition to chevron for service in war. Any service in war entitles the soldier to this additional stripe. Unless requisitions are received at once, service chevrons will not be issued.

VII. New companies will be instructed to devote the time for drills, for the present, in the "set-up" of the men, military courtesy, and in the details of company formations; and to send at once requisitions for complete outfit, giving measures as required for proper sizes.

GENERAL ORDERS NO. 6.

I. All orders providing for the arrangement of four company battalions in infantry regiments are hereby rescinded. Hereafter regimental commanders in detailing field officers to visit or superintend the instruction of companies will detail as they may deem for the best interests of the service; and, as far as possible, the officer so detailed shall be assigned to companies nearest his residence.

II. The troops comprising the Massachusetts Volunteer Militia will hold the annual encampments for the year 1888 as follows:—

First Brigade, Brig. Gen. Nat Wales commanding, at the State camp ground, South Framingham, June 12 to 16, inclusive; Second Brigade, Brig. Gen. Benjamin F. Peach, Jr., commanding, at State camp ground, South Framingham, July 17 to 21, inclusive; First Corps Cadets, Lieut. Col. T. F. Edmands commanding, at Hingham, Mass., July 10 to 14, inclusive; Second Corps Cadets, Lieut. Col. J. Frank Dalton commanding (place to be announced).

III. Muster rolls and assignment rolls will be prepared, and the muster of the troops be conducted as prescribed in Article XXIII., Regulations M. V. M. Blanks will be forwarded respectively to regimental, battalion and company commanders direct from this office.

Muster rolls for pay will not be received by the adjutant general upon the field, either for camp or annual drill, but must be carefully compared by paymasters before forwarding, to prevent errors. The attention of company commanders and paymasters is called to paragraph 166, Regulations M. V. M., which has not heretofore, in many instances, been complied with. Officers and men who report for duty after retreat will not be returned for pay for that day's duty.

IV. Brigade commanders are hereby ordered to assume control of the State camp grounds (excepting the arsenal and buildings immediately adjoining) on the day prior to the encampment of their respective commands, and all officers and soldiers are directed to conform to the regulations which shall be made by brigade commanders in pursuance of this order.

V. Brigade commanders will make details for provost guard, and from each battalion and unattached company the quartermaster and quartermaster sergeant for duty on the day preceding the encampments, but no detail of camping parties for pitching tents will be made. They will also detail a staff officer to attend to embarking and disembarking troops at the Boston and Albany depots, in Boston and South Framingham, on the first and fifth days at camp, who shall forward a detailed report of the same through channels to this office.

VI. The judge advocate of each brigade is hereby ordered, during the encampments, to exercise jurisdiction under section 112, chapter 14, of the Public Statutes.

VII. The officers to whom details are ordered to report will verify the same, and, on the first day of the encampment, certify the names of those present to their paymaster, who will at once see that they are reported on the proper muster-rolls in the column for extra duty.

VIII. All caterers' help and citizen employees will be provided with some badge or written pass to designate them and their employment.

IX. Requisitions for supplies will not be received or filled in camp, except in cases of special emergency, and the practice of delaying requisitions until arrival in camp will be discontinued.

X. Bills for transportation of horses, with accompanying vouchers, will be forwarded immediately upon the completion of duty, and will be paid through paymaster. Vouchers must accompany each bill for horse transportation.

XI. Certificates of loss, "lost at camp," are too often forwarded. Company commanders will at once notify his regimental commander of any loss of State property that may occur while in camp in his company, and search will at once be made to trace the lost property, even if it requires a regimental inspection to accomplish it. Any soldier who is charged with taking State property from his own company or others should be tried by court-martial at once.

XII. Dates for annual drills will be announced in orders later.

XIII. Brigade and cadet corps commanders are charged with the promulgation of this order.

Mileage will be allowed by most direct route.

Actual transportation of horses will be allowed.

II. All commands will be provided with a substantial cooked ration prescribed by its medical officers, which will be carried in haversack.

III. Overcoats for mounted officers of all arms, and enlisted men of cavalry, will be neatly rolled and strapped to cantle of saddle. Haversacks, and canteens for same, will be strapped to cantle of saddle, haversack on off and canteen on nigh side.

IV. Overcoats for commissioned officers and enlisted men of all foot troops, and enlisted men of artillery, will be neatly rolled in yoke with buttons showing, and worn from left shoulder to right side. Haversack and canteen will be worn from right shoulder to left side, canteen outside of haversack.

V. Battalion, company, signal and ambulance corps commanders will forward at once requisitions for canteens and haversacks, requiring for a number sufficient to equip each officer, enlisted man and band.

VI. Paymasters will muster for pay officers and men only who perform the entire day's duty.

VII. Company, signal and ambulance corps commanders will, immediately after the completion of this tour of duty, forward a list of absentees on the blank recently furnished from Adjutant General's office, with such recommendation for action in each case as they may deem for the best interests of the service. And hereafter, men reported as absent without leave will be discharged, for the best interests of the service, by the Commander-in-Chief, without application of captain, provided the company commander does not, in his report of absentees, report that it was impossible for the man so absent to obtain leave before the tour of duty. It must be borne in mind that each soldier takes his oath to perform his whole duty, and wilful neglect of same will be dealt with accordingly.

The excellent attendance at tours of duty by the militia this year is fully appreciated, and men wilfully absenting themselves care nothing for their honor, and have no place in the militia.

VIII. Muster-in of recruits will not be permitted twenty days before this tour of duty.

IX. Battalion and unattached company commanders will, after the completion of this tour of duty, forward direct to the Adjutant General's office a report of the time occupied by each company en route to the place of assembly, and the hour of reporting. Any company not reporting at the time ordered will be called upon to show cause of delay.

X. The following officers are detailed and assigned as inspecting officers : —

VIII. Lieut. Col. J. F. Dalton, commanding Second Corps Cadets, will report with his command to General Peach at 12.30 P.M., October 3, for orders.

M., having performed annual drill, volunteers the service of his command for duty, and will report in full uniform (without knapsacks) with haversacks, canteens and overcoats, worn as prescribed in paragraph 4, General Orders No. 9, C. X. Col. Henry G. Greene, commanding Sixth Regiment Infantry, will instruct companies A, H and L, of his command, to report to Maj. C. F. Woodward, Sixth Regiment Infantry, in Boston, October 3, at 9.30 A.M. for orders. Major Woodward will be instructed to report on Boston Common, with the above companies, to the Adjutant General at 10 o'clock A.M.

XI. Troops of the First Brigade arriving in Boston will approach the Common on streets south of Boylston, and enter through the Park Square gate.

Troops of the Second Brigade will approach Charles Street by the way of Cambridge Street, to position in line.

GENERAL ORDERS NO. 10.

I. The State rifle matches will take place at the State camp ground, South Framingham, on Tuesday, September 25. There

will be a staff team match, a company team match, an officers' match and an enlisted men's match. Officers and men will appear in fatigue uniform.

II. The matches will be in charge of Col. H. T. Rockwell, Inspector General of Rifle Practice, who will arrange details, and be responsible for their proper execution. All communications respecting these matches should be addressed to Colonel Rockwell.

III. Each company team will consist of seven members and one substitute (officers permitted on the team), and will be under command of a commissioned officer. The staff teams will consist of five members and one substitute (officers and non-commissioned officers attached to any headquarters being eligible). No person will be eligible for team or individual entry unless mustered-in previous to August 1, and unless he has performed at least one-half of all State duty to which he has been liable during the year.

IV. Shooting will begin at 8.30 o'clock A.M. The targets will be assigned by lot, and the order of shooting will be communicated to company commanders September 20. If, for reasons relating to transportation only, any company commander desires a change of hour, he must communicate forthwith with Colonel Rockwell, who will exercise his discretion in the matter.

V. In the team competition the number of rounds to be fired per man will be seven, without sighting shots. Competitors will provide their own ammunition. The rifle used by each competitor must be that issued by the State to his headquarters or company, with sights properly pertaining to the piece. Rifles must not be wiped during the competition. Minimum trigger pull, six pounds, to be tested. Position, standing. Violation of any rule, or any act of carelessness, will debar the offender. Any team or competitor aggrieved by a decision of the executive officer may enter a protest with him, and he will forward the same to the Adjutant General. No challenges of marking or non-marking will be permitted, except at the discretion of the executive officer.

VI. Entries of company teams (which embody the required certificate of company qualification) and of individual competitors must be received at this office on or before September 18. They should go through regular channels; but duplicates sent direct will be received if on time, *otherwise not*. Commanding officers will observe the notes on return and entry blanks. (As the team entry and general return of company practice are upon one blank, this supersedes the necessity of making any other returns of practice than the final returns of individual qualification to be forwarded November 1.) Officers, either of headquarters or companies, may enter outside of the team limits.

Pay and transportation will be allowed to the officers and members of teams, to the officers and men detailed to conduct the competitions, and to all other officers and men ordered to participate in the matches.

Commanders will have muster and assignment rolls in readiness at the close of the competition for muster by the officer detailed for that duty.

VII. Paymaster R. W. Sutton, Fifth Infantry, is hereby detailed as mustering officer, and will report to the Adjutant General for instruction before the date assigned for the match.

VIII. The trophies to be competed for will be as follows: — For staff teams, one trophy; for company teams, four trophies; also for the team (excluding the first four) making the best gain in points compared with 1887, one trophy; also for teams using carbines, one trophy. For staff officers, two trophies, and for line officers, three trophies. For enlisted men, three trophies, and one additional for the best score in each regiment of infantry; also one for the best score in each cadet corps, in the signal and ambulance corps (combined), and in the cavalry using carbines, — if neither of the first four trophies are won by members of the corps named. All competitors in the team matches making centres or better on their team score will continue shooting for seven additional shots. Other competitors for individual prizes will follow the same rule; and the aggregates of fourteen shots will determine the winners of individual prizes.

IX. Transportation over the Albany Railroad may be obtained at military rates.

II. The company teams, officers and men, duly qualified and entered, in accordance with general orders, will appear at 8 o'clock A.M., unless notified that they may appear later. Staff teams may report at 11 o'clock.

Teams will present themselves for muster immediately after completing their shooting.

III. The executive officer may use his discretion as to the hours of opening and closing the matches; he may prescribe a time limit for scores, if he deems it necessary to expedite the matches; and he may adopt such method of drawing or assigning targets as he may deem proper.

All extra officers and men will follow the team of their headquarters or company on same target.

A barrier will be erected twenty feet back of the firing point, and no persons will be permitted inside except the officers and scorers conducting the match and the men who are called.

No person will be allowed, at any time of the day, to go in front of the line of firing points — to the pits or elsewhere — except the officers conducting the match, and any man violating this rule may be debarred.

IV. The formal award of prizes will not be promulgated before October 5. Records of "State duty" performed up to that date will be considered, with reference to the eligibility of competitors.
