

To the citizens of Dixfield:

Upon the resignation of your duly elected and efficient superintendent, Miss Etta Holman, I was selected by your school committee to fill the vacancy, and to-day it gives me great pleasure to report a year of progress in our schools.

The teachers have been selected with care and, in nearly every case, they have fulfilled all expectations.

At my visits I have been greeted with bright boys and girls and equally bright recitations.

It is a source of some regret that the parts of the town are so situated geograpaically that no profitable combination of districts has ever been tried. The rural schools are in many cases small. If they could be combined in some way it would be much more interesting and profitable.

The town has maintained ten schools for the time required by law, 20 weeks. This is one more than the previous year.

The condition of the school buildings has been carefully investigated, and with the small sum (\$65) as apportioned by the selectmen for this purpose from the wood and repair appropriation, it has not been possible to do much. There are some repairs needed in No. 7 and No. 2. These are the most urgent.

It will be necessary for the town to raise the sum of \$841.60 as it has a population of 1052 people. I should also urge the regular high school appropriation. No town in the State has a better right to this liberal offer than Dixfield. It is a source of pleasure to announce that a class of six young ladies will have completed the course as prepared by a previous school board and printed in the report for 1900. They will therefore graduate this spring. It is a class that would be an honor to any town.

It seems almost necessary to make a change in one book, the geography, so I would recommend an appropriation of \$150 for books the coming year.

In conclusion, gentlemen, I wish to thank you for the interest you have shown in the schools the past year, and trust the youth of our town have been so instructed under our guidance that they may ever be noble boys and girls and true citizens.

SEVENTH.—To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor and to defray all other town charges for the ensuing year.

EIGHTH.—To see how much money, if any, the town will vote to raise to pay on the town debt and interest on the same.

NINTH.—To see how much money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the support of free high schools the 'ensuing year.

TENTH.—To see how much money, if any, the town will vote to raise for wood, and repairs on school houses the ensuing year.

ELEVENTH.—To see how much money, if any, the town will vote to raise to provide school books the ensuing year.

TWELFTH.—To see how much money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial day.

THIRTEEN.—To see if the town will vote to buy a road machine, and if so, how much, if any, shall be appropriated for same.

FOURTEEN.—To see if the town will vote to exempt the Odd Fellows from taxation for the term of five years.

FIFTEEN.—To see if the town will vote to have a discount on all taxes paid before a special time, and how much.

TWENTY-FOUR.—To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



To the citizens of Dixfield,

GREETING: One year ago you elected me to serve you in the important and honorable position of school superintendent. I have tried to faithfully perform the duties of the office, often not an easy task. I can say for your gratification that the past year has been one of progress. Good work has been accomplished all along the line. I have been hampered by the meagre salaries I have been obliged to pay teachers, but, on the whole, have succeeded better than could be expected in securing competent teachers at very low wages. I would suggest that the town raise one dollar per inhabitant the country pupils, in particular, may enjoy at least twenty-four weeks schooling, instead of twenty, as is now the practice.

A class of four is to graduate from the High school next

June, having pursued the prescribed course with credit to themselves and to the gratification of the school authorities. Prof. Ormsby, who is an indefatigable worker for the best interests of the school, has raised it to a high grade of efficiency.

The appropriation for text books was insufficient. The town voted to purchase new geographies, but failed to provide the necessary funds. A bill of over one hundred dollars will soon be due for geographies and physiologies. The purchase of new readers is an absolute necessity, the old ones being nearly worn out. At least two hundred dollars should be raised the coming year.

One school, district No. 4, has failed to attain an average attendance of eight, and is therefore suspended by operation of law, unless the town, by special vote, continues it.

Owing to the removal of one family, nearly all the pupils in the Farnham school (so-called) have left the district. It seems impracticable to continue the school.

If the school in district No. 2 is to be continued, the building must be repaired, as it is at present wholly unfit for service. The expense need not be great. All the schools have been maintained for at least the period required by the law, twenty weeks.

If the high school is to be maintained, as of course it must be, the town must vote to raise the sum of \$500 for that purpose, although the sum actually raised in our town will be but \$250, the remaining \$250 coming from the State.

In conclusion, I wish to thank all who have aided me in this work. The education of American youth is one of the most important duties society owes itself and them. May you help the teachers to instill those seeds of knowledge and virtue that shall blossom and fruit in lofty character and a noble, refined manhood and womanhood.





TO THE CITIZENS OF DIXFIELD, GREETING:

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In presenting this report of the progress and condition of our schools, I must first thank you for the honor bestowed in electing me your superintendent.

In return for this confidence it has been my purpose at all times, to serve the best interests of our schools.

During the year just closed there has been the usual number of delicate questions to be considered by the school authorities. A few of these have brought an extra amount of care and responsibility to your superintendent, but, by the help and advice of the school-board he has endeavored to arrange them as satisfactorily as possible.

At this time I deem it my duty to thank publicly the members of the board who, holding an office without salary and almost without thanks, have always had the welfare of the schools at heart. It is a pleasure too, at this time, to remember that there has been no friction among its members.

No place is more worthy of our regard and patronage than that in which the future of our boys and girls is being influenced and formed. To one interested in such things, it has been a pleasure to go from school to school observing growth in mental stature in all places.

It takes time to produce a sturdy oak on the mountain side; it takes time also to bring forth a boy or girl fitted to meet the questions of life. Our schools are doing a noble work and the past year has been one of unusual advancement.

The teachers have been loyal to their charge and have labored, I believe, not without good results: the pupils have been interested in this work, as can be seen by any casual observer. I wish it were my happy privilege to report the same good things of all the fathers and mothers. I wish the list of visitors at each school were twice as large as it is. We need to encourage not only our pupils but our teachers by the presence of father and mother in the school room. Not only as superintendent but as teacher do I urge this. Try to spend an hour each term with your boy or girl in the school-room. It will help us all.

Since no action was taken by the town at its last annual meeting, no school has been held in the Paul district. The question of holding a school there the coming year must be decided by you. The town furnished means for transportation to the Lancaster School. In this, as in all other cases of a similar nature, there are advantages on either side which present themselves to a thoughtful mind.

In the Farnham neighborhood, a school was supported during the fall term,—in the spring the pupils were transported to Severy Hill.

By law this school is also suspended, unless the town by vote decide to continue it. The situation of the district is rather against transportation.

At the begining of the year, the desire of the board was for economy and business like action along certain lines in order that prior bill might be duly reported and settled.

This has been my policy in so far as it has not interferred with the progress of our schools. You will see by the financial report of this department that a good sum has been saved on Text Book Acct, and a small sum on Wood and Repair Acct., in spite of the fact that prior bills to the amount of \$61.65 have been paid from this vear's appropriation, I earnestly hope the article in the warrant, asking that their balance may be used to pay the prior bill of the town of Wilton for tuition, may meet the approval of the town. Finally, I am glad to say that all bills against the town have either been paid or reported (a thing not always done by people holding bills against this department), so that we really know on what grounds we stand.

I should advise the sum of \$150 as sufficient for textbooks for the coming year and \$225 for wood and repairs. These estimates are made on the supposition that the balances now on hand are taken to pay the Wilton bill, thus leaving no balance of any importance to be added to the above figures. It is also a wise course to avail ourselves of the liberal offer of the state in supporting a high school. I should by all means recommend the usual amount.

Space will not permit me to encroach longer upon your time. I only ask that in the perusal of the report of this department you use a thoughtful consideration.

In conclusion I wish to thank you for your aid and encouragement in the year that is past. May men and women never be lacking who will stand by our schools as friends, as teachers and as officers.

#### To the Citizens of Dixfield:

In accordance with the customs of the past, I take pleasure in presenting the report of your schools for the year just closing.

The statement of the financial condition of the schools may need a few comments. You may notice that the amount due from the town of Mexico for tuition is much smaller than in former years. This is caused by the action of the Mexico school-board in voting to refuse to pay the tuition of pupils attending high-schools in any other town. For the same reason, you will observe, the amount received for tuition from other sources is correspondingly larger.

Your superintendent has been unable to obtain any returns from the town of Wilton in regard to the number of pupils attending their school at East Dixfield, the length of the terms, tuition, etc., although he has written repeatedly for such data. Judging by the past, I should say a bill for \$125.00 might be expected.

There is one striking fact I wish to bring to your consideration at this time. By comparing the various statements in the financial report, you will observe that the amount appropriated by the town for common schools and high school, exceeds the sum received from the State for the same purposes, by only seventy-six cents. In other words the State has practically furnished one-half.

The town should raise, I believe, \$1,000.00 for common school purposes.

In spite of the fact that there are scarcely enough pupils in three sections of the town to maintain schools, your superintendent enrolled more persons between the ages of 4 and 21 than ever. This must prove that the west village is increasing in numbers. Although no action was taken at the annual meeting to continue the Paul School, your committee, after consulting the chairman of the selectmen, decided to open a school there without putting the town to the extra expense of calling a special meeting. No means of transportation could be secured.

This school maintained a good average for the year. (7.4 in the spring and 8.8 in the fall, making an average of 8.1 for the year.)

The school at Science Hill failed to maintain the average as required by law and is therefore suspended. Action must be taken at the annual meeting, if it is to be continued. No school has been maintained in the Farnham neighborhood. Transportation to the school on Severy Hill was secured.

Special attention should be paid during the coming year to insure more school property. At the present time only two buildings are insured, the village and the Torrey schoolhouses. To do this, a larger sum must be placed at the disposal of your school-committee. I would recommend, therefore, for wood, repairs and insurance, \$300.00

No great changes are necessary in the text-books. During the year the Cyr Readers have been introduced and a large number of the arithmetics have been replaced by new ones.

I would suggest that the sum of \$150.00 be raised to purchase text-books and supplies.

I also wish to call the attention of the town to the system of heating in use at the present time in the building at the village. It is simply inadequate. Something really ought to be done to remedy the extreme uncomfortableness of this building. I trust this may appeal to every one who feels at all for the comfort of our schools.

In conclusion, I wish to thank all who have helped in any way to maintaine and build up good schools. We need more of them. The future of our Town, State and Nation, depends upon the intelligence of the rising generation. The influence of the schools dotting this broad land is more powerful than the forts along its borders.

The Torrey and Lancaster schools have each failed to maintain the average required by law, and can be continued only by vote of the town at its annual meeting. I suggest that these schools be discontinued and the pupils carried to the Village and Center schools. The present cost (teacher's wages) of instruction in these two schools for a term of ten weeks is ten dollars per pupil. It ought to be possible to transport a pupil, for that time, for less than *half* of \$10.00

The disproportionate expense of maintaining these smaller schools is easily seen by a comparison with the cost of some of the larger ones.

One glance at the above figures is sufficient argument for consolidation. It is a fact, recognized by prominent educators everywhere, that the rural schools can never improve much on their present condition until they unite and do away with the small, unprofitiable schools.

The school building at the Center is gone. Nothing remains but an old shell unfit to properly house our cattle . and horses in winter; and the Lancaster building is no better. Something must be done for these two buildings in the immediate future, and, it seems to me, the most natural, inexpensive, and far-sighted thing to do is to sell or abandon what little is left. The town would then be ready to construct, on some central location, a two room building to accomodate the pupils of the Center, Lancaster and Towle schools. The cost of such construction would be hardly more than the proper repairs on the above mentioned buildings, but the results then possible, in saving expense, better facilities for instruction, a higher standard of ability in the teachers, could hardly be compared with the present meager results. I ernestly hope that in another year the town will make some such arrangements for these schools.

Another great need of our schools for the coming year is a more efficient method of superintendence. This is no *inverse* compliment to myself or any of my predecessors in office, but the recognition of an existing condition. No one can properly fulfill the duties of superintendent and, at the same time be engaged in some other business; neither could anyone, to the present time, have been superintendent of schools in Dixfield and *not* be engaged in some other business. There is a way out of the difficulty, which has been successfully followed by many of our sister towns and a majority of the towns of the neighboring states. These towns have united with one or more towns for the purpose of employing a superintendent who, by law, can have no other business. As the State pays one half of such superintendent's salary Dixfield could, without any noticable increase in expense, have the services of the best talent which this section, or even the whole State, affords. I believe the voters of the town will serve the best interests of the schools if they act favorably in their meeting on the article relating to this matter.

You have been very fortunate (with few exceptions) this year in your selection of teachers and consequently the schools have made good progress. Still better work could be done by these same teachers if they should have more active cooperation of the parents. If you, as parents, are interested in your child's welfare in school and through life, do not (especially in the child's presence) criticize and find fault with the teacher, but encourage and help him, both by frequent visits to the school room and kindly words of encouragement. Under such conditions your child will never be troublesome in school.

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We have, this year put into all the schools in town new geographies and grammars and into the Village schools new readers. The adoption of a new course of study for the high school made necessary the purchase of additional books, so that we have overdrawn the book account \$31.87. You have planned to make further changes next year and I suggest and recommend that the town make the following appropriations.







During the past year your schools have as a rule maintained a fair average attendance. The Ferry School has failed to maintain the average required by law, and can be continued only by a vote of the town at its annual meeting.

The Lancaster School has been discontinued for the past year, and the pupils have been transported to the Paul School. The results have been satisfactory in my judgment, both from a financial, and educational standpoint. I sincerely hope that this arrangement will be continued another year. Small schools are not as a rule profitable, for the simple reason that we cannot pay large enough wages to secure the best teaching facilities. School authorities throughout the State have come to recognize the fact that consolidation wherever it is practical gives the best results.

The school house at the Center is in very bad shape. Something must be done in the very near future in the way of repairs.

The most profitable thing to do, in my judgment, would be to construct a new building upon some central site, and combine both the Center and the Towle schools. I believe that this was suggested by your former superintendent. The cost of such a building may seem large at first thought, but we must remember that after we have repaired the building at the Center, we still have only an old schoolhouse. For that reason I believe the cheapest way is to build a new building.

Some repairs should also be made upon the schoolhouse in the Paul district the coming year.

I hope that the voters in town will take some action upon this matter at the annual town meeting.

During the past year we have put new readers into all the rural schools in town. The purchase of a large number of new books to supply existing needs in the village schools and bills of (1905) to the extent of \$28.33, have caused us to overdraw the book account.

Still further changes have been suggested for next year,

and I hope that the appropriation for books will not be less than \$200. We can barely supply existing needs for \$150, to say nothing of making any changes, and if we wish to keep abreast of other towns in the grade of work that is done in our schools, we must make certain changes from year to year.

We are living in an age of intensiveness, and I do not believe it is policy to keep a text book in our schools after one has come from the press that takes up the same work in a better way.

The other appropriations I consider sufficient.

I would suggest the following appropriations for next year:

Text Books,\$200 00Wood and repairs,300 00High school,250 00Common schools per capita,1 25

I have endeavored to secure good teachers in all the schools for the past year, and (with few exceptions) have met with good success. In nearly every case the teacher has worked hard for the interest of the school, and has met with deserved success.

But still better work could have been done, especially in some of the smaller schools, if we could have a little more active co-operation on the part of the parents. Don't expect your child to be allowed to do things in school which you would not allow him to do at home. Be ready with assistance, and sparing of criticism. If you wish to criticize a teacher, do so to the school authorities or to the teacher herself, and not to your own children. Never accept the statement of a child as actual proof of what happens at school. Go to the teacher yourself. I would urge upon all parents the necessity of frequent visits to the schoolroom. Many teachers during the past year have expressed their surprise that parents do not visit their schools more frequently. If teacher and parent can work together in har274

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mony, your child will rarely be troublesome in school. Neither parents nor school authorities ought to underrate the value of the common school. It is the foundation of the future educational, social, and economical career of the pupil.

It should be our aim to raise it to the level where the pupil who never goes farther than the common school may go out from it equipped for practical everyday life, and those who wish to go farther may have a training that will enable them to do so.

### REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE DIXFIELD HIGH SCHOOL

For the past year I have had an average attendance of about 18 scholars in the high school proper. Our visiting list shows a number of 15; of these, 4 are from the parents. I would ask for more support from the parents and townsmen in this work. Have you a right to criticise us if you do not come and see the existing conditions? We want to see you, we want to know you, we want to feel you have an interest in this, your institution.

I want to thank for the school, those who are helping us to obtain a small school library. I think the school will show you later that the aid you have given it in this is not wasted.

#### OUR NEEDS.

We need a laboratory in order to support a standard course of study such as is supported in other high schools and academies. Without one, we cannot give your boy or girl some of the most practical needs of education, neither can we prepare them for college. The attic of Dixfield High School building can be fitted up satisfactorily for a laboratory and class room. With these and another teacher, you will be able to support a standard course of study. You may take in students from other towns, and by their tuition, not only help support this institution, but also make it a growing, living one.

This is not for villagers alone, but means every voter of this town, for then you may send your scholars here and be assured you are getting the same as in other high schools and academies. You have great prospects before you. This in an academy, Dixfield Academy, incorporated in 1883, and you can make it as good as any in the State.

Maine's best crop is its boys and girls, and let us make our part a profitable one. I appeal to every voter in this town to vote for articles above named for the sake of your children and the coming voters of Dixfield, (our boys).

- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for repairs on and fuel for school houses.


- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for the observance of Memorial Day.

The past year your schools have, as a rule maintained a fair average. The Torrey school has had the number of scholars as required by law.

I believe that it is better for the scholars to have their district schools, with a fair average of scholars, rather than convey them, as it is almost impossible to hire anyone to convey them, without paying more than to hire teachers. and I deem it advisable to have the town vote to continue schools in the Paul, Dunn and Torrey districts. I believe in consolidation, whenever it is practicable. We have had schools this winter in the Lancaster district and at the Common, with good results. The parents thought it would be as well for their children, and not much difference in expense, and it has proved to be the best that could be done. The school houses have been repaired to quite an extent, and the Paul and Common school houses must be repaired this year.

It has been suggested to build a new school house upon some central site, to accomodate scholars from both the Center and Towle districts, and your superintending school committee were to report this year, agreeable to the vote one year ago.

New books have been put in to the schools to some extent and more are needed, and will have to be bought. The old ones are badly worn. The amount appropriated last year through the advice of your former superintendent is as small an amount as ought to be raised.

I would suggest the following appropriations for the coming year:

I have secured as good teachers as could be obtained at the salary paid, and with few exceptions have met with good success. The teachers, as a rule, have worked hard for the interest of the schools.

The schools, as well as school officials, need more active cooperation on the part of the parents. Criticism is proper at times, if made to the proper parties, and in a friendly way.

I wish, in closing, to say that the High school building is inadequate for the needs of the schools taught in the building. I trust the town will vote favorably on the articles in the warrant, for the betterment of schools, and town, and hope the suggestions of your former Supt. (1906) in relation to the future of the rising generation will have your hearty approval. The needs before the town look formidable, but think, and act carefully as citizens, and if we act wisely, future generations will be benefited, and we shall be honored.

Thanking you for the assistance you have rendered me in my work, and also extending my thanks to the teachers and scholars for the courteous treatment received from them in my visits to the schools throughout the year, I am.

### **PRINCIPAL'S REPORT**

In my report I shall endeavor to inform you of what has been done in the high school during the past year: to call your attention to the inconveniences under which your high school students labor: and to state, what in my opinion is needed to make the Dixfield High School what it by right ought to be, a model modern high school.

During the past year, a few improvements have been made. By the erection of a partition the grammar school and the high school have been separated. This little improvement has been of much assistance both in the matter of discipline and in the quality of work done by each department.

For the first time in its history, the Dixfield High School is on the approved list; that is, a standard course of study has been adopted and a principal's assistant has been added to the teaching force. For both the fall and winter term we have had an attendance of 26. It is worthy of note, that of this number 15 have come to us from Peru, in which town no high school is maintained. The tuition thus received together with the amount, which would have been paid to Wilton Academy, has been more than sufficient to pay the wages of the assistant principal. **Mark the fact** that to maintain a high school having a standard course of study and two teachers has cost the town less in actual cash than it has cost in previous years to maintain a nonstandard school and one teacher.

A step in the right direction, however small, is a reason for encouragement, but much greater improvements must be made before the high school can be a credit to the town or even consistent with the progressive strides that the town has taken in the field of industry. Pray what industry can engage the mind of man that is more important than the education of the young? Upon the solution of its problems depends the future welfare of the individual, the community, the state, the nation.

Please view with me the inconveniences under which your students and teachers are trying to solve the problems of education. First let us notice the location of the present school building. Placed in a heep of sand, standing almost in the traveled roads, having no play ground worthy of the name, a more cheerless, bare and desolate place could hardly be found for a child to spend the greater part of his time awake. Surely Providence never intended 100 active youth to be confined within such narrow bounds, else he would not have endowed them with arms and legs and an unlimited desire to use them.

Secondly, four schools are being conducted in a building barely large enough for one. For the high school there is barely a third as much room as there ought to be. In a room 38x12x10 sit 26 students. Moreover, in this room there is no method of ventilation except by the opening of windows, which, owing to the fact that students are compelled to sit near the windows, makes the danger of cold and grippe second only to the danger of breathing the inevitably foul air.

In the short days of winter and when the leaves are on the trees, the light is so poor as to endanger the eye sight of every student faithful in the performance of his duties.

Again, the sole cloak room for two schools having a combined membership of 45 is a little larger in size than an ordinary piano box, and a part of that is occupied by the book cupboard.

For the use of these four schools with a combined membership of over 100, closets are provided which are a shame and a disgrace to any civilized community. Common decency, and respect for the feelings of modesty of the children, to say nothing of regard for their morals, require a radical reform. It is impossible to make children feel respect for that which they know is not respectable.

The absence of a basement to which the children may go for play means endless confusion in the school room or cruel restraint of animal activity.

Partly because of insufficient facility of heating, and partly because of poorly paid janitor service, there have been days when to keep the school in session would have been to place in jeopardy the health of teachers and students. As it is, every teacher but one and many of the students have lost from one to two weeks of school through illness, brought on I have no doubt by irregular temperature and lack of proper ventilation.

As yet no laboratory has been provided for the proper study of physics and chemistry. If we do not have such a laboratory, or if the plans for a new building are not then in progress, the high school will be taken from the approved list on July 1, 1908.

In conclusion, so many radical improvements are useded in the line I have pointed out, and so inadequate are the present facilities, that in my opinion there is but one true course and that is to erect a new school building, having modern conveniences for the pursuance of education, and modern facilities for heating and lighting.

To secure such a building without an excessive burden of taxation is, I believe, not only possible but entirely feasible.

Greeting:

In the name of the state of Maine you are . hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Dixfield, qualified by law, to vote in town affairs to assemble at Tuscan Opera House in Dixfield village in said Dixfield on the first Monday of March, A. - Art. 7 To choose one or more members of the School Committee for the ensuing year.

- Art. 8 To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9 To see if the town will vote to grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, to purchase school books, to repair school houses, to care for the poor, to repair roads and bridges, and to pay all miscellaneous expenses and defray all other town charges.
- Art. 10 To see if the town will vote to continue the Free High School as established and raise money for the support of same.
- Art. 11 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for the Highways for the year 1908.
- Art. 12 To see if the town will raise, appropriate and set apart for the permanent improvement of the main highways within said town such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by Sect. 5 of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of the year 1907 being the sum of \$65.50
- Art. 13 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the proper observance of Memorial day.
- Art. 14 To see if the town will vote to authorize and direct the Selectmen to expend such sums of money as may be paid for entering the sewer in Dixfield village, in extending said sewer.
- Art. 15 To see if the town will vote to continue the school in the Torrey district.


- Art. 17 To see if the town will vote to continue the school in the Dunn district.

- Art. 24 To see if the town will vote to build a new bridge at the easterly out-let of Webb river and what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for the same.







## **REPORT OF THE**

## SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee of Dixfield:

Gentlemen:

K)

In making this, my first annual report of the public schools of the town, I have, for convenience of reference, arranged the matter here presented, under special heads, placing reports of the High School Principal, Board of Health and all tabulated data as an appendix to this part of my report.

In tables 1 and 2, pertinent numerical data have been arranged in a form that will be found convenient both for reference and for comparison. In order that the statistics included in table 1 may deal with completed terms only, it has seemed best to make the report of the High School cover the school year ending with the Fall Term on Dec. 18, 1908, while the data for the common schools cover the school year ending with the Winter Term, 1909.

#### Enrollment

#### Teachers

Specific mention of individual teachers is uncalled for, sufficient for me to say that 1 have found earnest, zealous and interested teachers, the most of whom have had to work under adverse conditions. To each and every one I desire to express my appreciation for their efforts in all the work undertaken.

#### Length of Schools

The length of the school year in each district, the High, Grammar, Intermediate and Primary Schools, may be as-. certained on reference to table 1.

#### Laboratory

The course of our High School study approved by the State Superintendent as required to make the school a "Standardized High School" demands the finishing and furnishing of a laboratory with full and complete physical and chemical apparatus.

It has been thought best under present conditions not to finish at present the room and complete the fittings of the laboratory, as it is possible, yet with inconvenience, to temporize as has been done this year.

From the appropriation made last Spring for the laboratory, an amount sufficient to provide for the class work in chemistry this year has been expended, and while conveniences were not provided, quite satisfactory work has been accomplished. Of this appropriation it will now be necessary to expend an amount sufficient to make a beginning in the purchase of physical apparatus for the class this year.

For details of High School work, your attention is directed to the special report of Principal Fortier, which is herewith submitted:

#### Report of the Principal of the High School

#### To the Superintendent of Schools:

In accordance with your request I hereby hand you my report for the school year just passed. I shall speak of the general progress of the schools under my charge, and shall make a few suggestions pertinent to the continued improvement of the village schools.

Nearly every department of the school work has shown an evident though gradual progress from good to better. One thing worthy of observation is the increased percentage of attendance and punctuality; that which, in my opinion, testifies to a deeper interest in school work and intimates that better results are being accomplished. The classes which returned in the Fall are doing better and more accurate work than before. The entering class of the High School, numbering eleven, comes to us better prepared to carry the work required, than did the beginner's class of last year. What I have said of the High School applies equally well to the Grammar, Intermediate and Primary Schools.

No great alterations have been made in the arrangement of the building, but looking to the greater comfort and convenience of the student body a few valuable additions have been brought about, as follows:— a servicable dictionary and stand have been provided for the High School, a sink and faucet have been installed on the second floor for the use of the upper schools, thereby relieving the lower schools of a great deal of the former confusion. Through the united efforts of pupils and teachers in the grade rooms, pictures have been hung on the walls, and in the lower room a new clock has been secured.

We have been furnished with a good supply of regents and apparatus for the study of chemistry, and by the construction of locker-benches the none too large recitation room has been made to do service as a laboratory. In spite of most uninspiring and discouraging inconveniences, the class in chemistry has done commendable work. What we shall do when it becomes necessary to add an equipment for the study of physics is difficult to predict.

The janitor work has been efficiently and conscientiously performed.

Though I have tried to be optimistic, too many intolerable conditions exist, to make it possible to obtain results that are gratifying to pupils, teachers or parents. Crowded school rooms poorly ventilated, insufficient and inadequate dressing rooms, and utter lack of opportunity for the pupils relaxation, during the winter months, interfere seriously with the efficiency and discipline of the school.

Because our school building is far too small to accommodate the school population of the community, extensive remodeling would be of questionable value and in the end would be bound to be unsatisfactory. However, if for any reason it should be necessary to continue its use a few changes might be made which would aid materially in the conduct of the schools, and in some measure would safeguard the physical and moral welfare of our young people. First, I offer as a suggestion early connection with the sewer and the institution of flush closets in the basement. Second, provision should be made whereby the boys and girls may have separate dressing rooms, especially in the Grammar and High Schools. I know of nothing more conducive to disorder than indiscriminate mingling of a body of pupils in cramped and narrow quarters. Possibly the attic could be made into a girl's cloak room if it should de decided not to convert it into a laboratory.

In closing I should like to express my appreciation of the faithful and conscientious efforts of teachers and pupils in the several departments; also to thank you, Mr. Superintendent, for the generous support and encouragement Respectfully given,

#### Repair

The school building in the Dunn District is sadly in need of repairs throughout. The building needs attention to the underpinning, and to be newly clapboarded and painted. Within, it needs to be plastered, new floor laid, painted, blackboards, about ten or twelve new chairs, desks and a new stove. In the appropriation for repairs this must be taken into account. At the Towle District, new chairs and desks are required.

#### **General Conditions**

Citizens by personal observation should become acquainted with the needs and possibilities of our schools. To do this, the casual and uninformed observer has only to visit well appointed schools to find a standard.

The most prescious asset, as regards the future of any community, is to be found in the children and the value of that asset will depend upon their educational training, morraly, intellectually, and spiritually. The school and the church are today, as they ever have been, the safe guards of every community. The formation of the character of the growing children will prove far more economic in the end to the State and the community than the effort to reform the adult gone wrong—to say nothing of the menace to society.

The child's environment has quite as much to do with his education as the mere intellectual attainments. The live teacher with strong personality, surroundings that appeal to the æsthetic taste, conditions that hamper neither the physical well being, nor the successful performance of school duties at a time of life when the child should be surrounded by the pleasantest influences, are imperative if best results are to be obtained.

The opportune time to begin is at an age none too young. To those charged by the State and community with this pressing responsibility, it seems commanding to urge everyone to realize his duty to the coming generation and to do all to awaken an immediate interest in the schools. As the question of improving the schools is of equal interest to the village and to the rural communities, each may help the other.

There can be no doubt that the annual length of our school terms is altogether too brief and should be lengthened. Our rural schools should have not less than twentyeight weeks and the village schools, where the greater proportion of the scholars reside, a somewhat longer period.

One of the best means to good discipline is a well appointed play ground, where the activities of youth may be exercised without galling restraint at the period of recreation. This is important to the healthful conduct of a good school. The village playground does not furnish this need and the children are under constant and unpleasant restraint and must play in the street and to the annoyance of neighbors, if freedom of play is indulged in. Without attractive conditions it is not unlikely there may be a falling off in attendance at our High School by pupils from out of town and a possibility of losing the Standard High School, as a good source of the revenue is from tuition of pupils from towns not having a Standard High School. How can one give practical support to the schools in the community in which he lives? One way it to do everything not only to build up the standard of the schools but also to secure improvements. There is always one thing necessary; let more money be spent in the education of the children.

Another practical thing to do is to improve the school

#### buildings.

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The first present, urgent demand in the village schools is to secure more room and ample facilities for the execution of successful plans of education, and to furnish conditions that will not only be attractive to resident pupils and that will enable those in charge of the work to secure interest and method, but will also attract students from outlying districts and towns where standard schools are not maintained. This alone will give support.

An attractive building for the housing of all grades with the High School, and for accomplishing the work of a modern course of study would seem to be immediately imperative if any marked improvement of the schools is to be expected.

Whatever is done looking to the advancement of the schools would doubtless be a good business proposition for a town beautiful by nature as Dixfield is with its picturesque and attractive outlying districts. The many desirable people of means who are seeking Summer homes and permanent ones in Maine, are attracted to such towns with good schools and live churches.

In the rural school districts there are three schools that might successfully be united in a union district, requiring inexpensive but modern and up to date appointments. Equipped with two best trained teachers that can be obtained such a school could be maintained economically- and the result the State is seeking to obtain could be secured, with the assurance that the Common School moneys are not being wasted.

With good appointments in town, the children of the rural schools would have an objective point towards which to work, and their ambition would be stirred in that direction. The school question it seems to us is one of mutual interest to all citizens of Dixfield.

The Principal of the High School has stated very aptly

in last year's town report the condition of the High School building, to which attention is again respectfully directed.

The Govonor of the State in his recent inaugural has called the attention of the legislature to several recommendations relative to our Common Schools and High Schools in Maine, which are particularly essential, it seems to him, to the State, if it is to keep in line with the rest of New England in educational matters. Among them are:

"The requirements of a state certification of teachers with a view to secure better qualifications from the teachers and higher salaries for the teachers. The average salary in the schools of Maine is lower than any other northern state. and few southern states have a lower average. The result, of course, is a constant drain of our teaching force to other lines of work and to other states. So great is this drain upon us that even our Normal Schools, supported largely by the State, fail fully to serve us in the supply of teachers because a large percentage of their graduates leave soon after graduation for more remunerative fields of labor. Money spent for the common school brings highest possible returns in good citizenship. The school house is the poorest place conceivable for the display of parsimony. The teacher is peculiarly worthy of his hire, and I believe if we are to maintain the standard of our schools on the basis of other New England states, we must pay salaries which shall be proportional to the salaries paid by them, based upon the cost and standards of living in those states. I believe that, today, we have as fine a teaching force in Maine as can be found in any other State in the Union, but it is an unquestioned fact that every year the difficulty of retaining our best teachers is greater than before". The time is soon at hand when a state certification of teachers will be required of all who are to teach in our common schools.

#### Report of Board of Health

We consider that the school building in Dixfield Village is extremely unsanitary from cellar to attic, and the places used for toilet rooms are filthy beyond description, and it would be impossible to keep them in any reasonable sanitary condition. And we consider this building to be a menace to the health of all persons who are compelled to spend the usual school hours there. It is noticable, every term, that the scholars begin to fail in health after the first or second week. During the past term, the large scholars, as well as small scholars fainted in school owing to the bad sanitary condition of the house.

## Warrant For Annual Town Meeting

#### Greeting:

In the name of the state of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Dixfield qualified by law, to vote in town affairs to assemble at Tuscan Opera House in Dixfield village in said Dixfield on the first Monday of March, A. 5th To establish a rate for collecting taxes and to choose a Collector of taxes for the ensuing year.

- 7th To choose one or more members of the School Committee.
- 8th To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.
- 9th To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintainance and support of schools, to purchase school books, to repair school houses, to care for the poor, to repair roads and bridges and to pay all miscellaneous expenses and defray all other town charges.
- 10th To see if the town will vote to continue the Free High School and how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of the same.
- 11th To see if the town will vote yes or no upon the adoption of the provisions of chapter 112 of the public laws of Maine for the year 1907 relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1909.
- 12th To see if the town will raise, appropriate and set apart for the permanent improvement of the state road within the town such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by section 5 of chapter 112 of the public laws of Maine for the year 1907, being the sum of \$7:3.00
- 13th To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the erection of guide boards.

- 14th To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the proper observance of Memorial day.
- 15th To see if the town will vote to continue the school in the Torrey district.
- 16th To see if the town will vote to continue the school in the Paul district.
- 17th To see if the town will vote to continue the school in the Dunn district.
- 18th To see if the town will vote to purchase a suitable lot for a school building at Dixfield village and authorize the selectmen to take a deed of the same in the name of the inhabitants of the town.

- 20th To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise by loan or otherwise to purchase lot and build a new school building at Dixfield village.
- 21st To see how much money the town will vote to raise by loan or otherwise for the purpose of fitting up a class room and laboratory at Dixfield village and equipment for same.
- 22d To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise by loan or otherwise for the purpose of repairing the school house at Dixfield village.
- 23d To see if the town will vote to authorize and direct its Superintending School Committee

- 24th To see if the town will vote to authorize and direct the Selectmen to assess a special tax of not exceeding one per cent on all real estate passed by the sewerage system constructed in Dixfield village during the year 1908.
- 25th To see if the town will vote to authorize and direct the town Treasurer to expend the sum of special tax accrued under the preceeding article (No. 24) in part payment of the loan of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) authorized to be made for sewerage construction by vote of the town at special meeting held October 12, 1907.
- 26th To see if the town will vote to authorize and direct the Selectmen to make a minimum charge of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for entering the sewerage system in Dixfield village now constructed and all extensions thereof.

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



# Report of the Superintending School Committee, Dixfield

It is the pleasure of the School Committee to present to the citizens of Dixfield their Annual Report.

We shall need an appropriation amounting to two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for support of the Common Schools during the ensuing year. This amount includes the cost of instruction, of conveyance, of janitor service, which by the way, requires extra this year because of the new school building, of fuel, of lights, and of tution. And also for one more week of school in the rural schools than was given last year, the State requiring this year at least twenty-six weeks in all schools.

We shall need for books and supplies for the ensuing year three hundred dollars (\$300.00). Our books are, in many cases, in very poor sanitary condition, and we lack books suitable for the arrangement of properly graded courses of study in English. Some of the books which are in good condition, as far as the sanatary element is concerned, are not up to date in other ways. There is also a need of maps in all the schools.

The appropriation for repairs should be at least three hundred dollars (\$300.00). The reason for this demand will be found in the Superintendent's report.

For our share of superintendence we shall need an appropriation of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00).

The town should vote to raise the sum of ten hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,050.00) for the support of a "Class A" High School during the ensuing year. Five hundred and fifty dollars (\$550.00) of which is to be raised by the town. Under this Class the town will be reimbursed by the State five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

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The balance of the Labratory fund unexpended, will be sufficient to meet the demands for the ensuing year.

We would also reccomend an appropriation of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for insurance.

#### Superintendent's Report

To the Superintending School Committee, Dixfield.

It is my pleasure to offer to you, and through you to the citizens of the town, my first annual report.

It is not my purpose, in this report, to dwell at any great length upon the many things we should like to do; but rather to state, as briefly as possible, that which has been accomplished.

Teachers:— The first problem with which we were confronted in taking up the work in Dixfield was the selection of teachers to fill the vacancies in the various schools of the town. Only one teacher, of the eleven required, had been elected. The teachers selected have, for the most part, exceeded our expectations. We are very much pleased with the way in which they have supported us during the past term, and we are looking foward to a most successful year's work.

The salaries paid to the teachers are, in most cases, lower than teachers receive, for the same grade positions, in some of our neighboring towns, and the demand for good teachers is greater than ever before. It would not be surprising if some of our teachers should accept offers which are being made to them, unless there is money enough appropriated to make it possible for the school board to meet the demand for higher salaries which is being made throughout the State.

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During the past term there has been organized the Mexico-Dixfield Teacher's Association. Meetings are held once each month during the school year. Much practical help has been derived from these meetings. Papers are presented, by the teachers, on practical, every-day problems in school life, and discussions on subjects pertaining to school improvements are encouraged. The enthusiasm aroused in the Association meetings is carried into the schools and a school spirit has been developed which has done much towards making the work of the term successful.

High School:— The work in the High School during the past term has been very gratifying. Under the management of Prin. Merton T. Goodrich much has been done to increase the efficiency of the school. The new courses of study which have been introduced are, we believe, an improvement over the old courses. The new courses have been approved by the State Educational Department. The work done in the High School has been of a practical nature. The Principal has sought, in so far as material would allow, to have the students form concrete ideas of the subjects which have been studied. Public speaking has been made a part of the curriculum and the speakers have been selected to represent the school in a speaking contest which will be held during the winter term.

Martha G. Knight, the assistant in the High School, has proved to be an untiring worker. She carries with her an enthusiasm which is reflected by the pupils in their work in the school. We are to be congratulated on having Miss Knight with us this year.

The action of the citizens in voting, at the Special Town Meeting held December 14, to establish a Class A High School was very commendable. We have good reasons for expressing the belief that the Dixfield High School has begun a new epoch which will be the most successful in the history of the school.

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Common Schools:— The work of the common schools in the village has been in the hands of competent teachers, and much progress has been made. A new course of study has been introduced into the grammar grades and new courses are being prepared for the intermediate and primary grades. The general aim of the work in the grades has been towards making the pupil feel the practical value of the lessons which he is required to study, and to give him, where possible, an opportunity to apply that which he learns.

The work of the pupils in the grades has shown a marked improvement since the opening of the new school building. The advantages in point of light, heating and seating has been, in large part, responsible for the development. Yet we must not underestimate the work of the teachers—Mrs. Prescott, Miss Bibber and Mrs. Lane—who have worked conscientiously for the results which have been obtained.

Rural Schools:— In the rural schools much has been done during the past term to bring about a unity of effort and increase the interest of the pupils in their school work. There is need, however, of work along the line of increasing the interest of the citizens of the rural communities in the work of their schools. Unless the citizens of these communities do take an intrest in the school in their district it is up hill work to try to develop an interest, for the duties of school life, in the children. We need greater co-operation between the parents and the teacher in the rural districts.

The school should be the center of the social life of the community—the reading-room, the debating club, the Grange Hall, the Improvement League, etc., etc. The citizens should take pride in their District School to the end that they would hold "repair-bees" and "grading-bees". The citizens of each district should aim to have their school the most servicable school in the town.

Uniform programs of daily recitations have been introduced into all of the rural schools, and nature study, especially in its relation to agriculture, is one of the subjects to which we are directing much attention. We firmly believe that the rural school course should be made up of subjects, the lessons in which, may be applied by the pupils in their home life.

Buildings and Equipment:— The new school building, which was erected during the past year is very well adapted to the needs of the town. The lighting, heating and seating arrangements, together with the furnishings and sanitary arrangement show that good judgement was exercised, by the building committee, in their work. A better building for its size, would be hard to find in this State. And, unless the town develops unexpectedly, it will serve the needs of the schools for many years.

In a building of this size, furnished as this building is furnished, there is need of repairs which were not demanded for the old building. I should think that the appropriation for repairs, for the ensuing year would have to be increased considerably to meet these requirments.

The rural school buildings are to be supplied with desks and seats taken from the old school bulding. These desks will be a great improvement over the desks now used in the schools. There is need of considerable repair work, however, aside from changing of the desks. The Dunn, Lancaster, Towle and Center schools are the buildings we refer to especially.

In view of the fact that there is need of extensive repairs in the buildings of the Lancaster, Towle and Center districts; and in view of the fact that citizens living in the above mentioned districts desire a Central School which will accomodate all of the pupils in these districts, and make possible the establishment of a graded school for which experienced teachers may be obtained, we believe that it would be to the best interest, economic and educational, of the town to erect such a building as is needed for this purpose. The problem of transporting the scholars could be met, in part, by changing the school year, in the rural schools, to meet the particular conditions existing in rural districts.

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In regard to the equipment of our schools we would call your attention to the need of maps, and to the need of changes and additions to our text book supply. There are very few maps in our schools at present, and without them historical and geographical facts are not very firmly established in the minds of the pupils. Many of the text-books now in use are in a very poor sanitary condition, while others are not suitable for the arrangement of properly graded courses of study. An increased appropriation for books and supplies will be necessary, for the ensuing year, in order that our equipment may be made adequate.

In closing my report I wish to express my appreciation of the support given to me by the teachers; for the spirit of co-operation and enthusiasm which they have shown in their work; for the progress which has been made. I also wish to express my gratitude to the School Board for the help and support which they have given me, and for the confidence which they have placed in me. To the citizens of Dixfield I owe a debt of gratitude for the many kind words and their unselfish interest in school affairs, which has done much towards making my work, for the upbuilding of the schools, enjoyable.

#### Superintendent of Schools.

This report of progress in the village schools is respectfully submitted.

When the village schools were opened, Tuesday morning, Sept. 7, 1909, there were twelve pupils in the high school, twenty-six in the grammar school, twenty-seven in the intermediate school, and thirty-five in the primary school, a total of just one hundred. The building in which these pupils were placed had once been an excellent one but it was now too small and too old; not through any fault of its own, but because the number of children in a place usually increases, and because time and abuse will wear out any building. In spite of the poor accommodations, however, several pupils entered the different grades and the high school during the second week and a few more were afterward added.

Before the close of the term, school work had begun in the new building. There, rules were adopted, the object of which was to preserve the building in good condition as long as possible. The new surroundings have proved to be an inspiration to pupils and teachers as well. The location of the building is exceptionally good. The pupils who come from long distances eat their dinners in the basement. Two tables are needed to accommodate them. The wear on the floors in the hall would be practically eliminated if a large door mat was placed on the front steps and a strip of rubber matting or something of a similar nature was placed in the halls.

As you well know when we looked over the course of study before the beginning of the term, we found it in very poor condition. The course of study which you established for the grades has proven very satisfactory. The course of study which was established for the high school, under your approval, has also been successfull. It has been appro

Boys and girls are more valuable than courses of study. and these courses have been arranged with that idea in view. They are intended for the good of the pupils. Those who hope sometime to enter college need the College Preparatory Course. Those who desire a thorough training in Latin also need this course. Those who do not go to college, who enter upon their life's work immediately after graduation from the high school, need the Scientific Course. This course aims to give practical studies throughout all the four years. Special attention is given to practical mathematical problems such as are met with in real life. The English work is adapted to the special needs of each student and aims to form habits of correct speech and correct correspondence, while at the same time the work is sufficiently broad to develop a taste for the best literature. The work in science aims to give the pupil such a knowledge of nature, her laws and wonders, that he may get more out of life whatever his occupation may be. In the fourth year some choice is allowed, so that those interested in business. those interested in forestry or agriculture, and those interested in teaching in small schools, may each receive some special training on the subject in which he is most interested.

It is unfortunate that there is no graduating class in the high school this year. However, this means that there will be no loss by graduation next June and that next year there should be at least twenty-five pupils in attendance. Indeed the prospects for the coming year are exceptionally bright. The town has done well in furnishing the school with apparatus. It is hoped that this policy will continue, for then a successful school is assured.

You have doubtless noticed the excellent work of Miss Knight in the high school.

The work in the grades has been carried on in a very satisfactory manner. The town was very fortunate this year in having such excellent teachers as Mrs. Prescott, Miss Bibber, and Mrs. Lane have proved themselves to be. The course of study, which we have been adopting under your intert

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in irection, has made the work up to date, systematic and The aluable to the child. Such work as is now being done could Pre lot have been accomplished in the old building. However, in here is an imperative need for more blackboard room. Pict-10001 Ires are much needed also, but the School Improvement the League has raised money for this purpose. Some arrangemee nent should be made for fire protection, such as the placing all of one fire extinguisher in each of the two halls. The fire dial drill recently instituted has been very successful. All perin less than a minute after the when alarm is sounded.

The matter of attendance by pupils has been a difficult to be not be bandle, owing to the fact that the present truant officer can not leave his work so as to give prompt or regular sevice. The truant officer should be at the school house within half an hour after the beginnig of each session to receive traunt cards. As it is practically impossible for anyone with an independent business to do this, I should think some person might be elected to serve as truant officer whose occupation is such that he could give more time to the work.

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The great event of the school year was the completion of the new school house, the formal dedication of which took place, Nov. 26. The principal feels that he was very fortunate in having the opportunity to be here when such an epoch making event took place. He feels that the improvement in the schools which followed, should not be attributed to him in any way, but rather to the inspiration which this building gives to all who enter it. He appreciates your cooperation as well as that of the pupils, the teachers, and the citizens of the town.



## Warrant For Annual Town Meeting

To Joseph P. Edmunds, a constable of the town of Dixfield in the said county.

### Greeting:

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In the name of the state of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Dixfield qualified by law, to vote in town affairs to assemble at Tuscan Opera House in Dixfield village in said Dixfield on the first Monday of March, A. D. 1910, being the seventh day of March, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1st	To choose	a	Moderator	$\mathbf{to}$	preside	$\mathbf{at}$	said
	meeting.						

- 2d To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3d To choose Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.
- 4th To choose a town Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5th To establish a rate for collecting taxes and to choose a Collector of taxes for the ensuing year.
- 6th To see if the town will vote to choose one or more Road Commissioners for the ensuing year.

- 8th To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.
- 9th To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the Municipal Officers for the year ending February 15, 1910.
- 10th To see if the town will vote to authorize and direct the Municipal Officers to transfer unexpended balances of appropriations from the past fiscal year to the same accounts for next year.
- 11th To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance and support of schools, to purchase school books and supplies, to repair school houses, permanent school fund, insurance, to pay outstanding time orders due, to pay interest on outstanding time orders, to pay Municipal Officers, including Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Clerk, Tax Collector, Constable, School Committee, Truant Officer, Dog Constable, to pay Hydrant rental, to care for the poor, to repair Roads and Bridges, Interest on Cemetery funds and all miscellaneous expenses and defray all other charges.
- 12th To see if the town will vote to continue the Class A of Free High School and how much money the town will vote to raise for the support of the same.
- 13th To see if the town will vote yes or no upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year '07, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1909.

Article 14th To see if the town will raise and appropriate in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$400.00, being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, or such sum of money as it see fit.

- 15th To see if the town will vote to request the Municipal Officers to expend the money for State Highway in rebuilding and improving Weld Street, so called, beginning at the intersection of said street and the road leading to the Jeff. White Bridge, so called, southerly as far as the appropriation will permit.
- 16th To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to build sewers or provide other means for draining the surface water on that part of Weld Street in front of the land formerly used for and known as the "Fair Grounds".
- 17th To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the proper observance of Memorial Day.
- 18th To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for a Free Public Library.
- 19th 'To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay the salary of the Union District School Superintendent for the united school districts of Dixfield and Mexico for the fiscal year 1910,-11.

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


- 21st To see how much money the town will vote to appropriate and raise to meet the discount referred to in preceding Article No. 20.
