## TOWN WARRANT.

To H. E. Briggs, a Constable of the Town of Jay in the County of Franklin, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Jay, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house in said town, on the 1st day of March, A. D. 1915, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit.:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose a moderator to preside over said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town expenses for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray pauper expenses for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Common Schools including teachers' wages, janitor work and fuel, for the ensuing year or act thereon.
- ART. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Free High School, including teachers' wages, janitor work and fuel for the ensuing year or act thereon.
- ART. 8. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for Free High School.
- ART. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- ART. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for free text-books.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school supplies and miscellaneous bills.
- ART. 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize its superintending school committee to join with such other town or towns as it may deem expedient for the purpose of employing a Superintendent in accordance with the provisions of Section 40 to 45 inclusive, of Chapter 15 of the Revised Statues.

- ART. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of Superintendent of Schools, or act thereon.
- ART. 14. To see what sum of money per day the town will vote to pay its Superintendent of schools or act thereon.
- ART. 15. To see what sum of money per day the town will vote to pay the Superintending School Committee or act thereon.
- ART. 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to maintain schools in the Stubb's Mills and Blaisdell Districts for the ensuing year or any part of it or act thereon.
- ART. 17. To see if the town will vote to maintain a school in Clay Brook district or act thereon.
- ART. 18. To see if the town will vote to pay S. M. Neiveen the sum of \$30.00, making his salary \$2.50 per day as fixed by the Superintending School Committee for the year 1914.
- ART. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.
- ART. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay for hydrants at Chisholm.
- ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to install one electric light on Church Street in the village of Jay near the residence of Geo. M. Stone.
- ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to install one electric light at Chisholm near the residence of Thomas Croteau.
- ART. 23. To see if the town will vote to install one electric light at the corner of Jewell and Knapp Streets at Chisholm.
- ART. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay for electric lights.
- ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to instruct its Treasurer to hire money for the use of the town.
- ART. 26. To see what method the town will take to collect its taxes for the ensuing year or act thereon.
- ART. 27. To see if the town will vote to fix the date for the collection of Poll and Personal taxes or act thereon.
- ART. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the abatement of taxes or act thereon.
- 'ART. 29. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- ART. 30. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$996.00 for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges;

the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

- ART. 31. To see whether the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State Highway during the ensuing year within the limits of the town under the provisions of section 9 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- ART. 32. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more firewards; fix their compensations, and raise money for the same.
- ART. 33. To see if the town will vote to have one or more road Commissioners.
- ART. 34. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to pay outstanding notes and interest on the same.
- ART. 35. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the Revising Board.
- ART. 36. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be used for cutting bushes in the highways.
- ART. 37. To see if the town will vote to build permanent sidewalks on the Main Street at North Jay.
- ART. 38. To see if the town will vote to raise \$500.00 to build permanent sidewalks on the Main Street at North Jay.
- ART. 39. To see if the town will vote to extend the sewer from the point where it terminates on Main Street in Chisholm, to Gorden's Mills, thence to the river, and to see what sum of money the town will raise to pay for same.
- ART. 40. To see if the town will vote to buy two new road graders and raise money for same.
- ART. 41. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 for the purpose of constructing a sidewalk on Dow Street, Chisholm, beginning at or near the Post Office and extending in a northerly direction along the westerly side of said street as far as said appropriation will permit the building of a suitable sidewalk or act thereon.
- ART. 42. To see if the town will vote to buy a suitable quantity of hose for use on the hydrant near the residence of E. C. Dow and what sum of money the town will vote and raise to pay for the same.
- ART. 43. To see if the town will vote to make some permanent repairs on a certain piece of road commencing at the South end of the Davenport road so called, and ending near the home of Horace Paine, the distance being about fifty rods and what sum of money the town will raise for the same.
- ART. 44. To see if the town will vote to furnish water and set a tub in the square in front of the Jay Post Office in the summer of 1915, pro-

viding the Ladies of the Pastime Club will furnish a tub, costing not less than \$60.00 and see what some of money the town will vote to raise to pay for the same or act thereon.

ART. 45. To see if the town will vote to pay tuition to some secondary school of those scholars that are so far removed from our High School that they cannot by a reasonable amount of time or money attend our High School.

ART. 46. To act on any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of receiving and correcting the list of voters at their office Saturday, February 27, 1915.

## Report of the Superintending School Committee.

To the Citizens of the town of Jay:

The Superintending School Committee recommends that the following amounts be raised by the town for the ensuing year:

For Common Schools,	\$2,400 00
Free High School,	1,500 00
Free Text Books,	600 00
Repairs on Schoolhouses,	700 00
Supplies and miscellaneous bills,	600 00

We also recommend that the town vote to maintain schools in the Blaisdell, Morse and Stubbs' Mills districts for the next school year, and that the school at Clay Brook be left with the school board.

The current year arrangement was made with the school board of East Livermore whereby they were to pay \$5.00 per week as tuition for their scholars attending that school. The prospects for next year are that Jay will have but one scholar in the district, to attend school.

Some explanation is due the town in regard to the overexpenditure of money on some of the school accounts.

Last year terms were made with some of the book companies to allow their bills to run until the end of the school year. Paying those bills and paying those of the current year, when due, has overdrawn our appropriation.

The school buildings in town, with few exceptions, are in good shape, and we believe the money laid out in repairs has been done to good advantage.

At the Chisholm schoolhouse, two of the rooms are not properly lighted, a condition that can be remedied at comparatively small expense and which no doubt will be done the coming year, appropriation permitting.

We would also call to your attention the need of larger playgrounds, at the village schools of Jay, North Jay and Chisholm, especially. This is a question we hope you will carefully consider, and that another year you will be ready to take some action toward acquiring land for this purpose.




