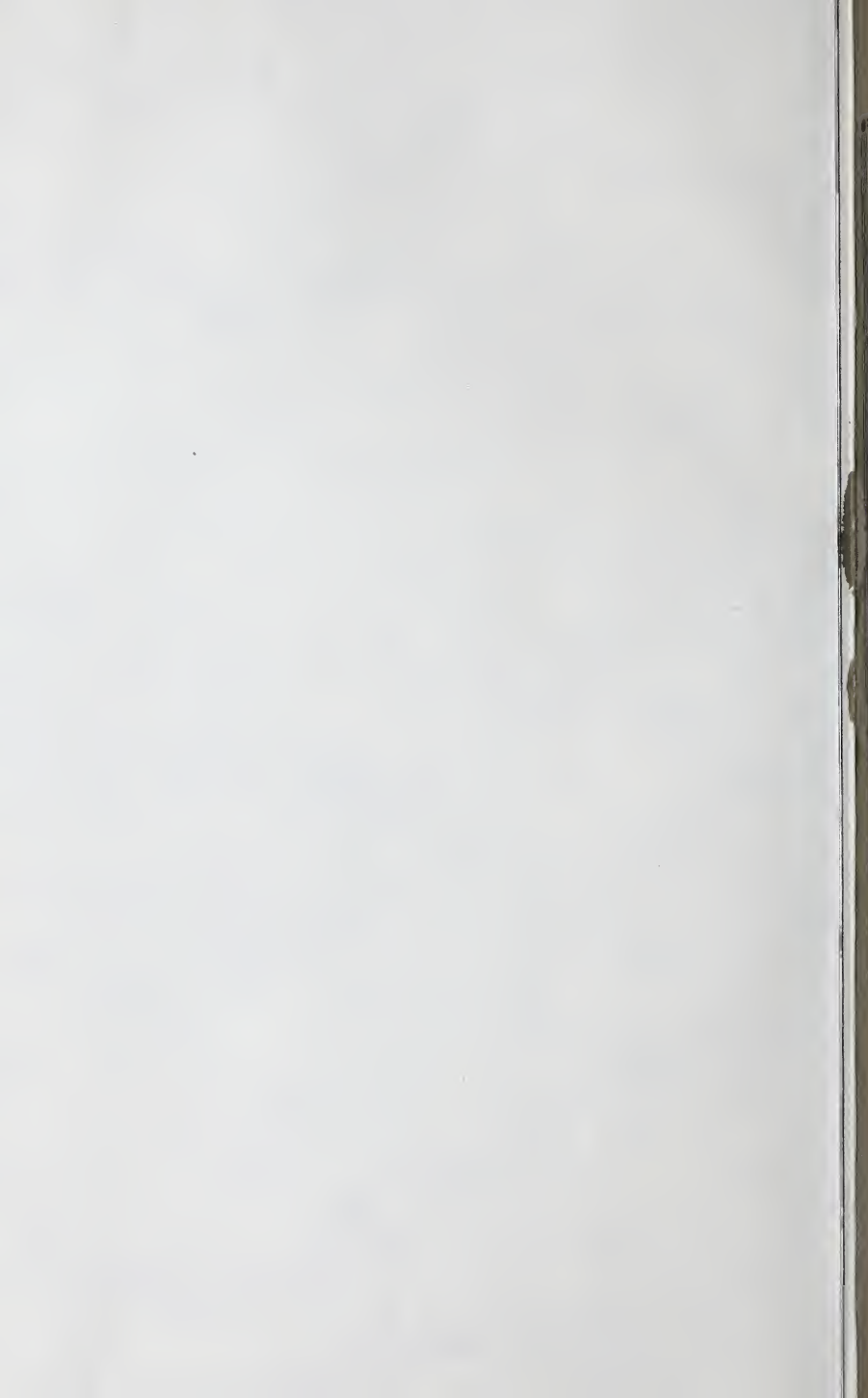

Report of Superintendent of Schools.

In giving account of our stewardship, we are reminded that we are standing in the place of another. George A. Littlefield, an honored citizen of the Town of Wells and who was appointed to this service last March, finished his work and suddenly passed to the eternal, September 7, 1909.

We record the fact with reverence and respect, for he had served the town in so many capacities. In taking up the work with our schools, we were impressed with the generous provision the citizens of the town had made for the instruction of our youth. Good school buildings and well equipped. Although to some the amount raised for public schools may have seemed large, let us never forget that the very best investment a town can make, is the investment for the educational training of its boys and girls; its citizens of the future. There need be no special appropriation for new school buildings, or extensive repairs, but during the coming summer vacation several of the school rooms will need the painter's brush to render them attractive and wholesome.

The school board has rendered valuable aid to the superintendent. Careful, painstaking, economical, each school district being given impartial care and supervision. The school year covers a period of 36 weeks—one term of fourteen weeks, two terms of eleven weeks each. Seventeen schools have been maintained with an attendance of 400 different pupils. Each school has met all the requirements of the law with the exception of Division 12, where there has been an average attendance of but four pupils. It will be one of the responsibilities of the School Board of 1910, to decide whether this school shall be continued.

Twenty-seven different teachers have been employed. Of these six have had college training, five are normal graduates, three others have had normal or academy privileges. Seven others were graduates of our own high school. In every instance, conscientious, faithful service has been rendered. It is the opinion and hope of the superintendent and school board that all graduates of our high school desiring to teach in our schools, first equip themselves by a partial or complete course at one of the State Normal schools.

The changing of the schools from ungraded to mixed schools with a definite course of study, looking constantly to promotion, has proved to be a wise arrangement. Better work has been done by teachers and pupils.

TEXT BOOKS

The schools are well supplied with text books. Some of them are not in the best condition. We are sorry to say that many of our school books do not receive the care that doubtless would, were they not gratuitously furnished.

The Grammars, which had been in use for a dozen years were very dilapidated, being most unsatisfactory to the teachers and Superintendent were exchanged at the opening of the winter term for the two-course books, known as "Modern English" by Emerson and Bender. The change is giving eminent satisfaction. I desire to quote the words of my predecessor, but I trust with increased emphasis, we are sadly in need of wall maps for the best work in Geography and History.

HIGH SCHOOL

Seventy-eight pupils registered at our High School the first week of the Fall term. The largest number in the history of the school. The record of attendance has been well sustained. The highest grade of faithful work has been the aim of the painstaking faculty. We are positive that quite a number have entered the High School before they were of sufficient age and maturity to do the best work in the required studies.

Ordinarily students under 14 years of age are not ready to master the work of our High School curriculum.

The amount appropriated for supplies, for our 17 schools, could all be utilized to advantage in this one school. The best work in Chemistry requires at once a special appropriation for Laboratory equipment.

The school, as in the past year, has been under the wise and careful direction of Principal Leroy L. Woods, assisted by Miss Maude M. Bradford. At the beginning of the Fall term Miss Louise Perkins, of Ogunquit, was added to the teaching force. She has had the English studies and lower mathematics.

A visit to this interesting school, by every parent and citizen would confirm this declaration of your Superintendent that our High School compares favorably with the best High Schools of our state of similar grade.

The building is a credit to the town in its improved and beautified condition. A new heating plant is a necessity of the near future.

In closing this report let me thank the school officers, teachers and citizens for their united interest and support in the intellectual and moral training of our young people.

TOWN WARRANT

To Freeman E. Rankin, a Constable of the Town of Wells, in the County of York, Greeting.

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants in said Town qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet in the Town Hall in said town on Monday, March 14, A. D. 1910, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit :

First—To chose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second—To see if the town will vote to choose one or more Road Commissioners, and woether the same shall serve one or three years.

Third—To choose a town clerk, three selectman, assessors of taxes and overseers of the poor, town treasurer, Collector of taxes, town agent, one school committeeman for three years, one or more road commissioner, one auditor of accounts, and all other officers necessary for the ensuing year.

Fourth—To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for the support of the poor and other necessary and incidental Town charges.

Fifth—To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for hydrant rental as per contract.

Sixth—To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for the support of common schools for the ensuing year.

Seventh—To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for the repairs of school-houses for the ensuing year.

Eight—To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for the purchase of free text books for the ensuing year.

Ninth - To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for the support of a free High School for the ensuing year.

Tenth—To see what sum of mney the Town will vote and raise for the maintenance and repairs on highways, roads and bridges for the ensuing year.

Eleventh—To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for 1909, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the Town to the state aid for highways for 1910.

Twelfth—To see if the Town will raise, appropriate and set apart for the permanent improvement of the state road within the Town such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by Section 5 of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1909, being the sum of \$500.

Thirteenth—To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise with which to pay snow bills of the past year.

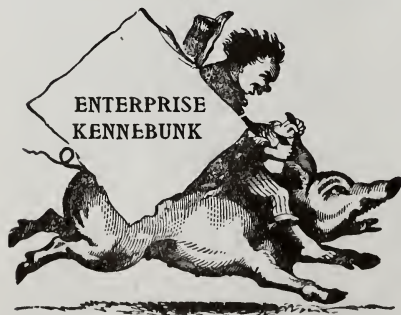

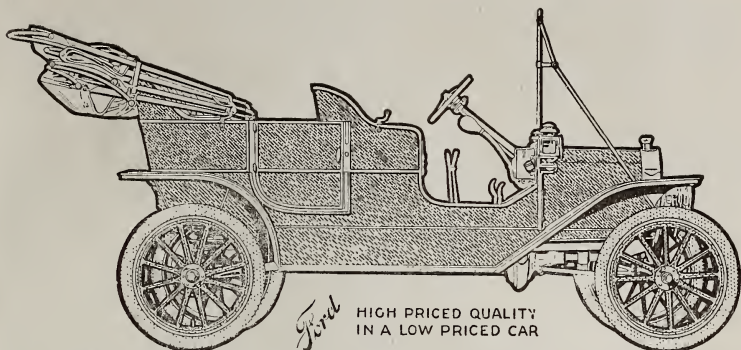
