

Winter term taught by Mr. Royal Boston of No. Anson. Mr. Boston succeeded fairly well.

## DISTRICT No. 5.

Summer term taught by Miss Annie Butterfield. The work accomplished in this school was satisfactory to all. Fall term taught by Miss Francis A. Jones of Norridgewock. Miss Jones maintained good order and the scholars showed that they had learned their lessons to remember.

## DISTRICT No. 6.






Spring and Fall terms taught by Miss Stella Holmes of South Smithfield. Miss Holmes is a practical teacher, using only the methods calculated to give the best results.



# SCHOOL REPORT.

---

TO THE CITIZENS OF SMITHFIELD :

Your attention is respectfully invited to the progress of our public schools for the year ending Feb. 20, 1894. It has been a year of an unusual amount of sickness with the scholars, thereby the average attendance is not as good as we wish. On the whole the minds of the pupils have been on their work, and I am more than pleased with the work accomplished for the past school year.

## SCHOOL BOOKS.

But few books have been purchased during the year. The several teachers have used much care in the preservation of the books and but few have been destroyed. We need a few books for the coming year, also some record books so as to keep an exact account of the books each scholar has.

### DISTRICT, NO. 1, OLIVER STEVENS, AGENT.

Spring term taught by Miss Alice Miller. I am sorry to say the school was not what I expected. Miss Miller was a young teacher and will probably meet with better success in the future.

Fall term opened by Miss Edith Ellis. At my first call I found the best of order and both teacher and pupils busily at work. I was not notified at the close of school.

### NO. 2, JOHN WENTWORTH, AGENT.

Spring term commenced by Miss Dolly Holmes, winter by F. H. Clark, both of Smithfield. Good attendance and the co-operative labors of the teachers and pupils made No. 2 one of the most profitable schools in town.

### NO. 3, A. B. COLE, AGENT.

There being more scholars in this district than usual it was thought best to have a summer school. The first term was taught by Miss Margie Cunliff "of town," who gave so good satisfaction that she was engaged for the second term.

NO. 4, F. H. CLARK, AGENT.

The spring and fall terms were taught by Miss Alice Rogers. Miss Rogers has taught many schools and met with usually good success.

Winter term opened with F. H. Clark as instructor. "Quality and Quantity" is his motto. The attendance was not quite to the standard owing to large storms occurring during latter part of the term.

NO. 5, FRANK LAWRENCE, AGENT.

Both spring and fall terms were taught by Miss Frances Jones. Miss Jones has taught several terms in this district and is liked very much by her pupils. I wish to make special mention of the advancement of the grammar and arithmetic classes.

NO. 6, HOWARD VARNEY, AGENT.




NO. 7, CHAS. MARSTON, AGENT.


