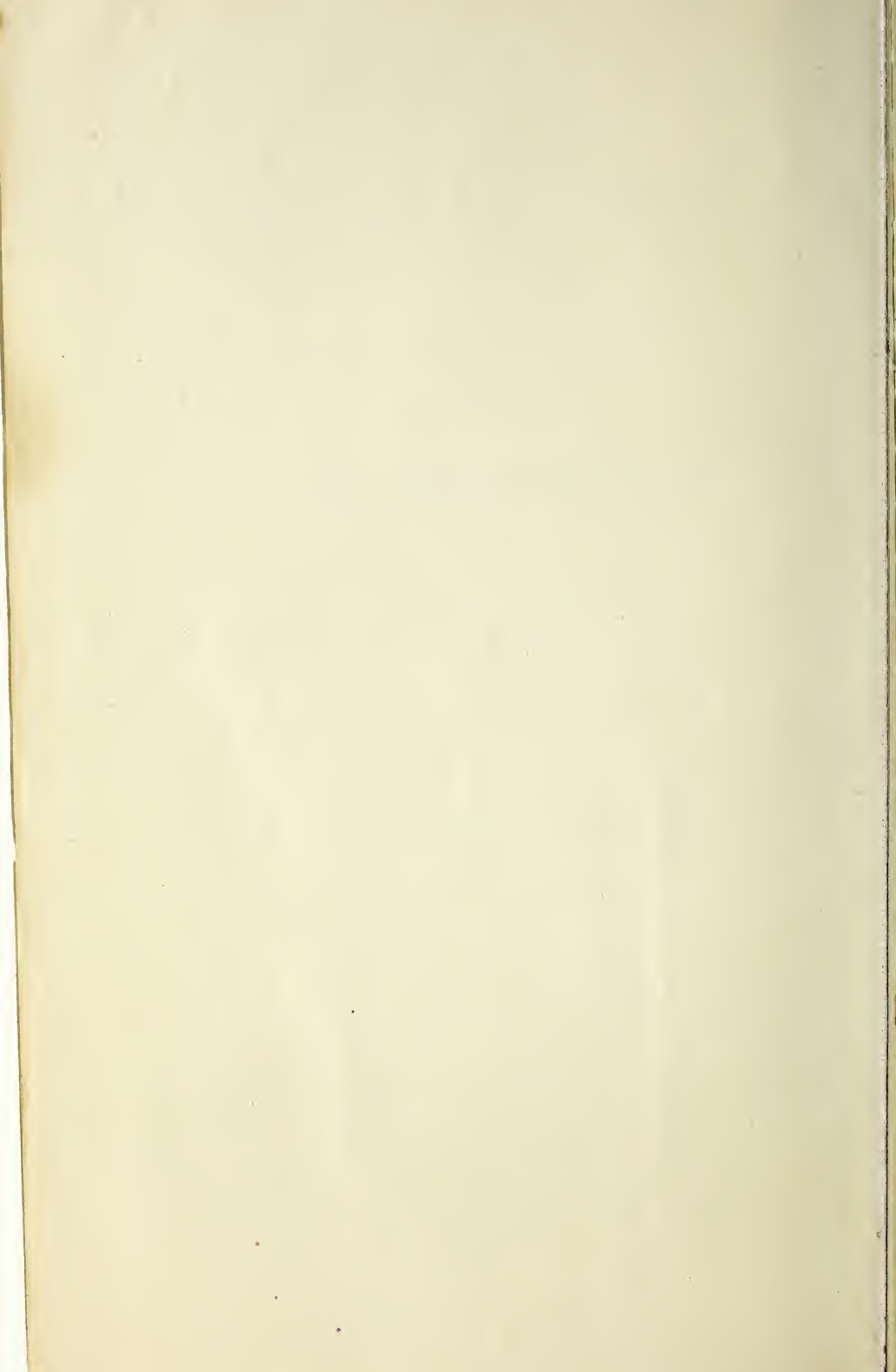

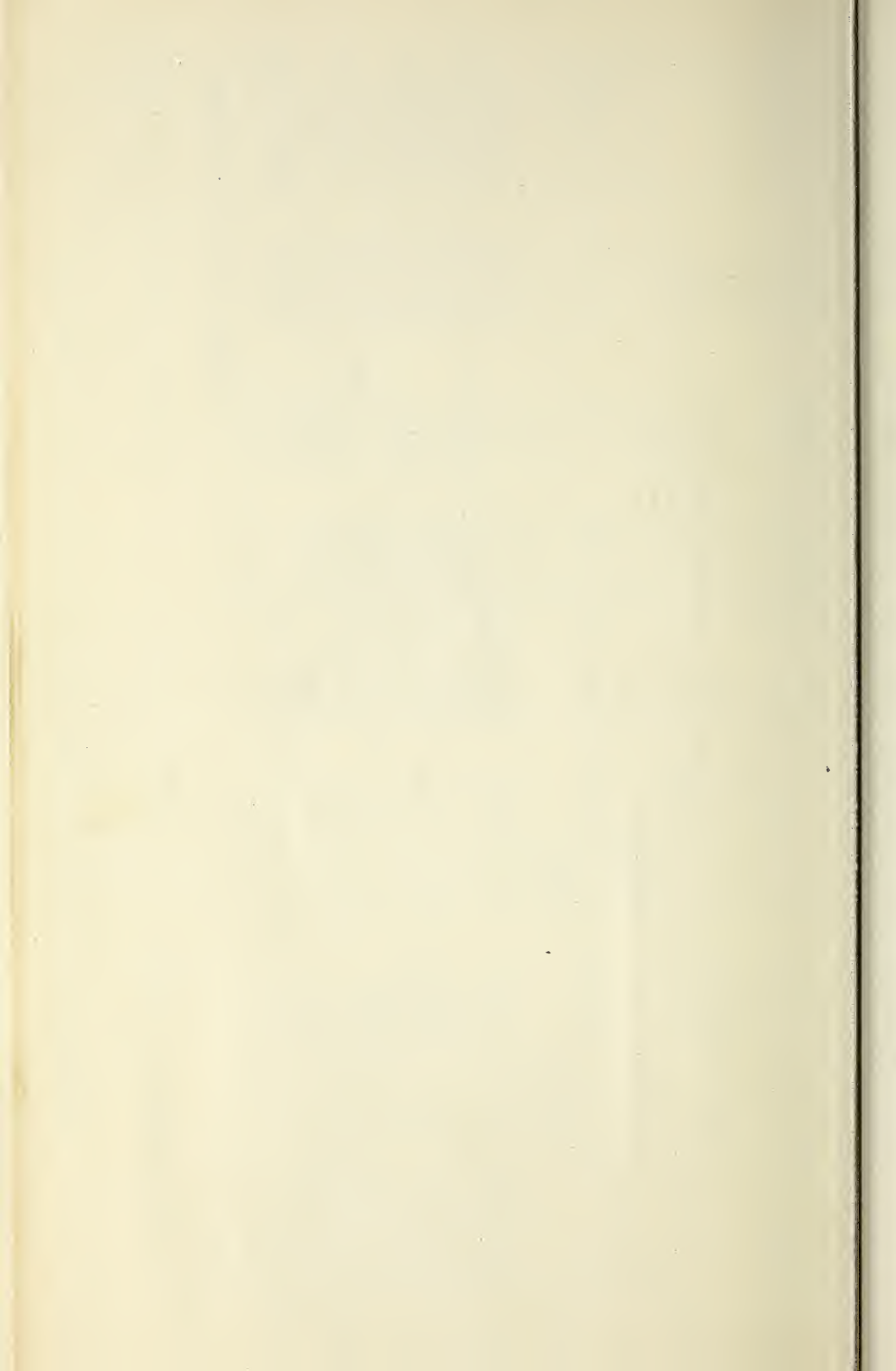

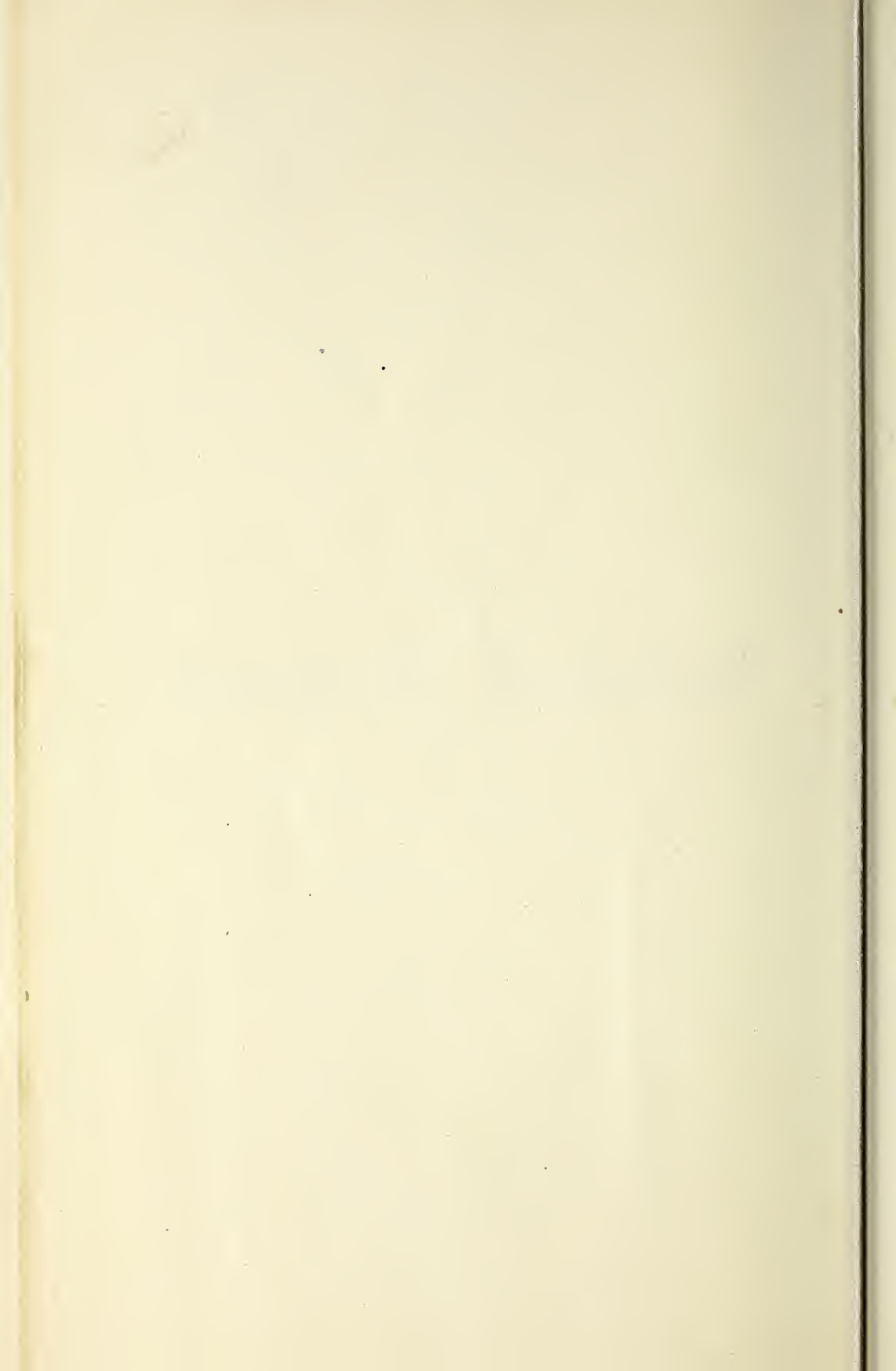

SCHOOL REPORT.

In closing my work as member of the School Board, I would express my appreciation of the kind and courteous treatment which I have received from parents, teachers and pupils; the teachers especially deserve a word of commendation for the heartiness with which they have taken up whatever has been suggested for the benefit of the schools.

During the past three years we have had written examinations in all schools with uniform rules for the same. These have proved of great value but have made extra work for pupils, teachers and members of the School Board, but this has been cheerfully done. This work should be continued, not only for the present benefit derived, but as a preparation for what pupils meet every few weeks in the higher schools.

By careful management and the aid of the state fund we have been able to have twenty-seven weeks of school, an unprecedented number we believe. In several districts schools have been discontinued and pupils conveyed to others. School work will be resumed in these districts whenever it seems best. It is a mistaken idea with some, that a small school where each pupil can receive a large share of the teacher's time is best. It is not special attention that the average pupil needs so much as something to stimulate to work themselves, and this stimulus is found in the large school rather than in the small, where there is and can be but little competition, therefore it has been our policy to unite wherever practicable.

State aid has been or will be received to the amount of \$185.43, which will materially lengthen the schools of another year. Teachers in surrounding towns are receiving

higher wages than heretofore. We shall have to come into line or put up with inferior teachers, which will be a serious mistake.

Owing to the new law, whereby the tuition of pupils in High schools or academies corresponding, must be paid by the town, aided by the state in proportion to the tax rate, the amount of money paid by Campton for education will be considerably more than usual, but we earnestly hope this will not lead to cutting down the amount usually raised, but rather let us work to have the defects in the law remedied, as we believe they will be at the next session of the legislature. Pupils going from our schools in the past have done credit to our town; let us endeavor to keep up and raise the standard higher in the years to come, taking this for our motto, "Knowledge is power."

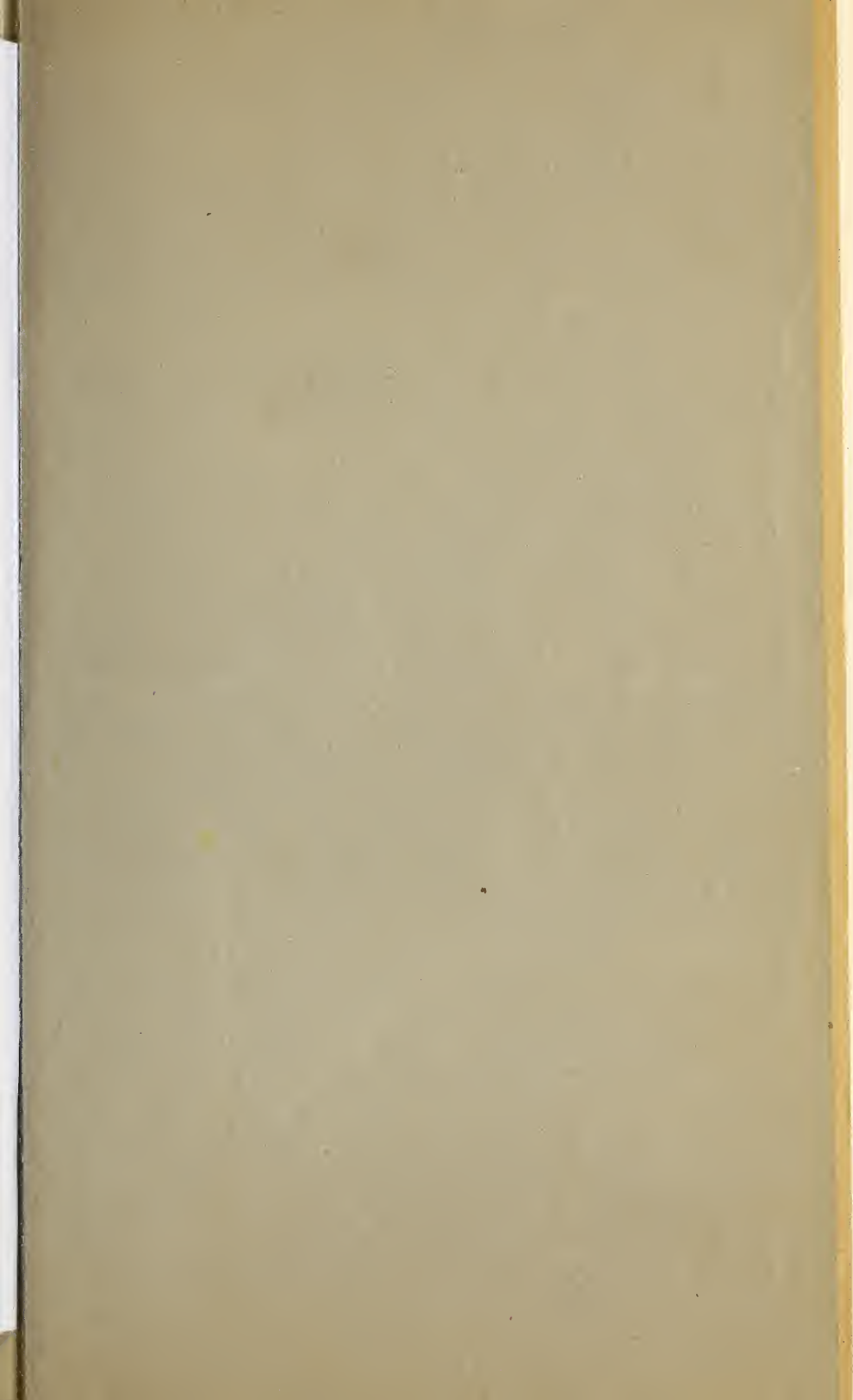

SCHOOL REPORT.

The majority of the schools of the town were a success during the past year.

There were twenty-seven weeks of school, the same as last year.

In two school districts sickness prevented the completion of the full number of weeks.

This long term of school was made possible, partly by the aid of the "apportionment fund" furnished by the state. As the amount of this fund coming to the town is reckoned on the per cent of attendance of all the schools in the town, it is easily seen that every scholar who absents himself from school is depriving the town of a portion of that fund, so it is hoped that parents will see that their children attend school every session that it is possible for them to do so.

In reading, there has been, in my opinion, a great improvement, especially among the younger children. This is owing in a large measure to the new Baldwin readers introduced by the schoolboard during the year, much interest having been taken in them by the children.

With the exception of the schoolhouse in district number eight, the schoolhouses have been put in good repair, new shades having been added to some, making a great improvement in the looks of the room.

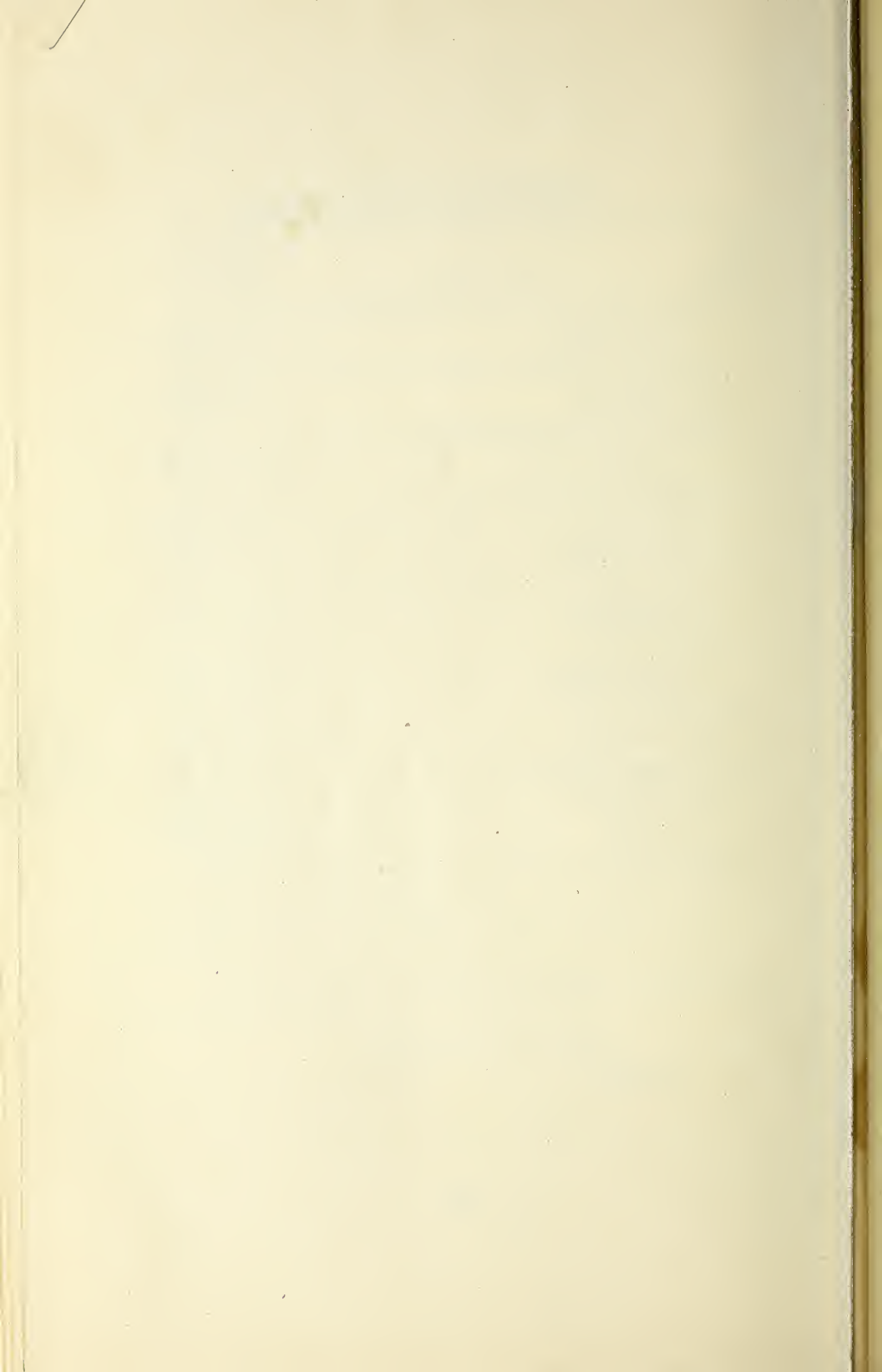

For the reason that other towns made a better showing in this respect than Campton, (according to the State Superintendent,) we were deprived of any aid from the so called equalization fund this year.

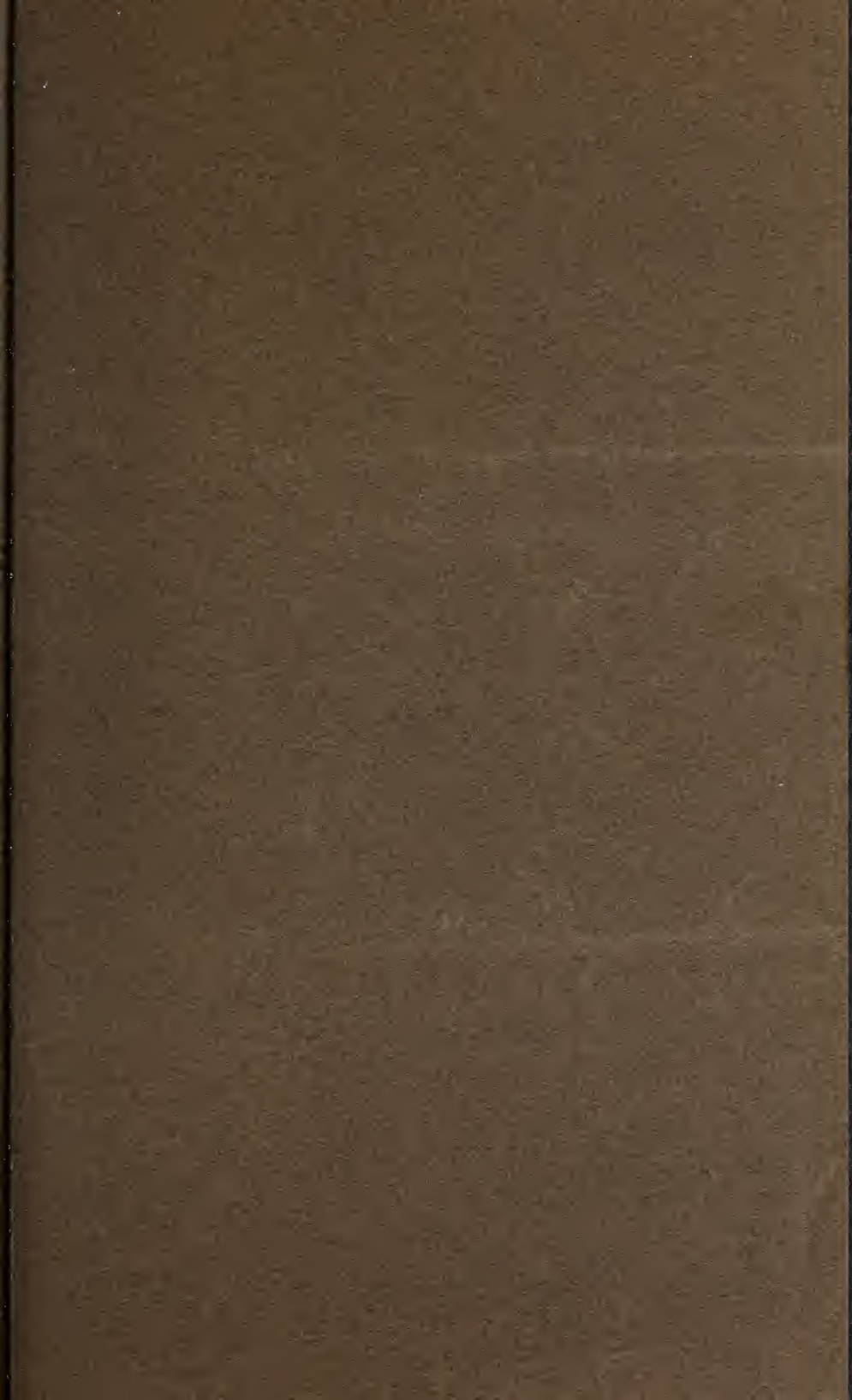
Singing was introduced during the past fall term with very good results, and an opportunity will be given the parents to vote to see if they wish to have it continued and and if any extra money be appropriated for same.

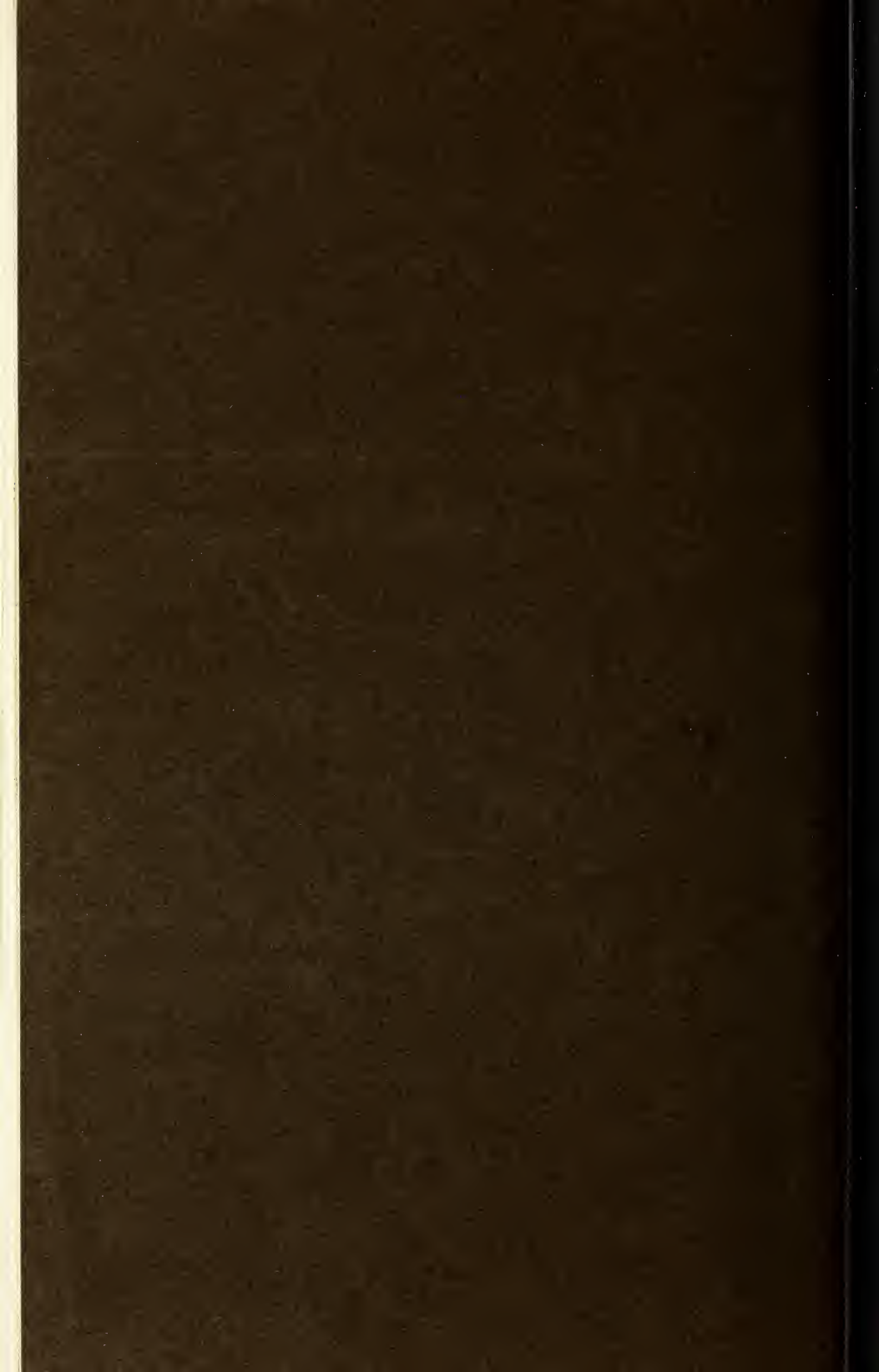

REMARKS.

There were twenty-three weeks of school during the past year. If the "literary fund" had been received from the state earlier, there would have been sufficient money for a longer term the past fall.

The Superintendent of Public Instruction urges the school board to place an article in the school warrant to see if Campton shall vote to become a supervisory district, and unite with other towns, and hire an expert superintendent of schools, the state to pay one-half of his salary and the towns the other half, (proportionately.)

The purpose of this is to enable towns to raise the standard and increase the efficiency of their public schools.

About 53 per cent. of the children in the state are now under expert supervision.

It is hoped that the voters of this town will give this matter careful thought, as anything that will further the interests of education is what we should strive for.

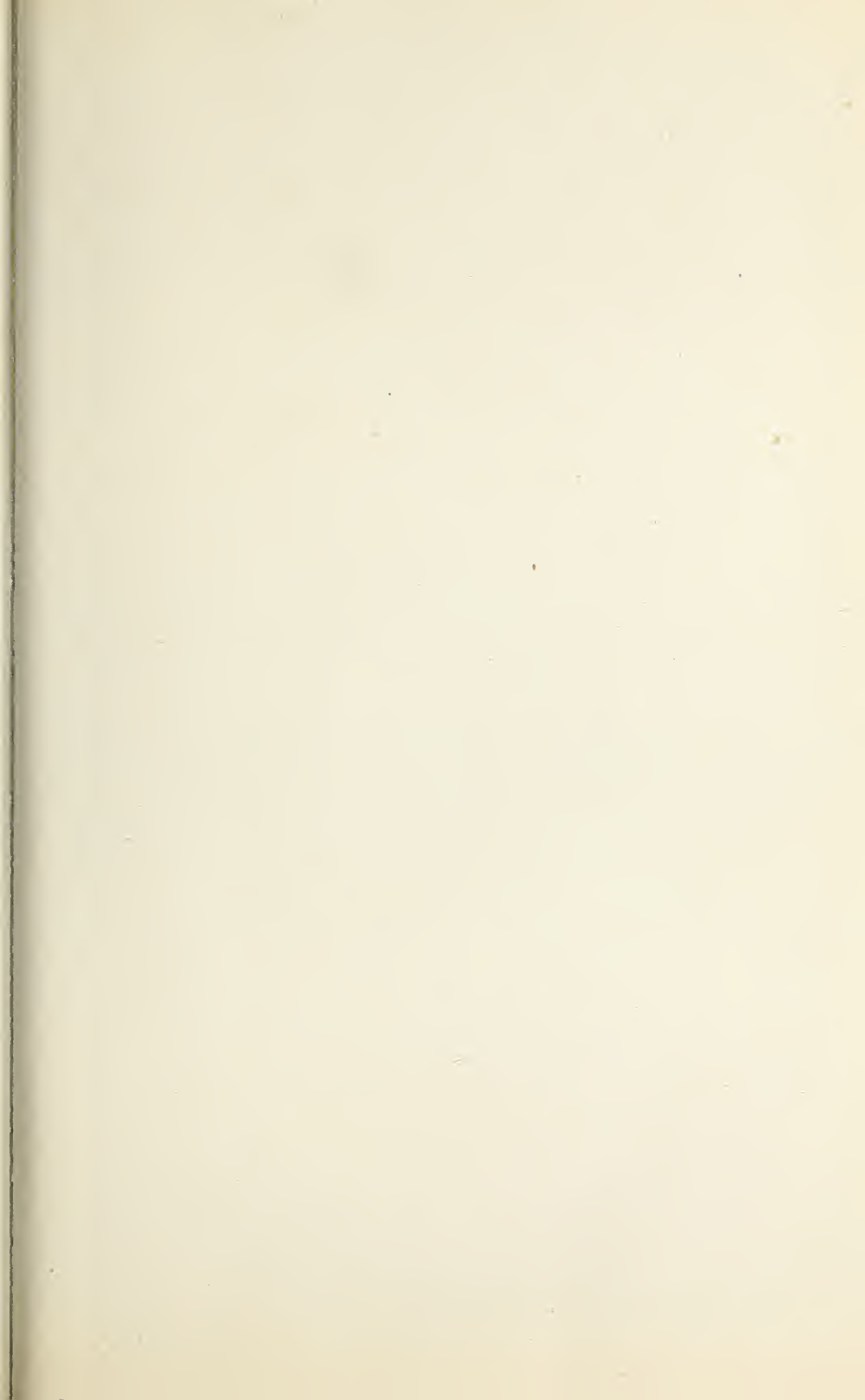

The library met a great loss in the death of Mr. Little, who had been librarian and trustee since the establishment of the present library. At the present time, there is no permanent librarian.

The trustees still have to plead for some provision in the near future for a decent reading room and library. The place at present is a disgrace to a civilized community. There is insufficient room for the books and also no room for one to sit down and consult a reference book if they so desire.

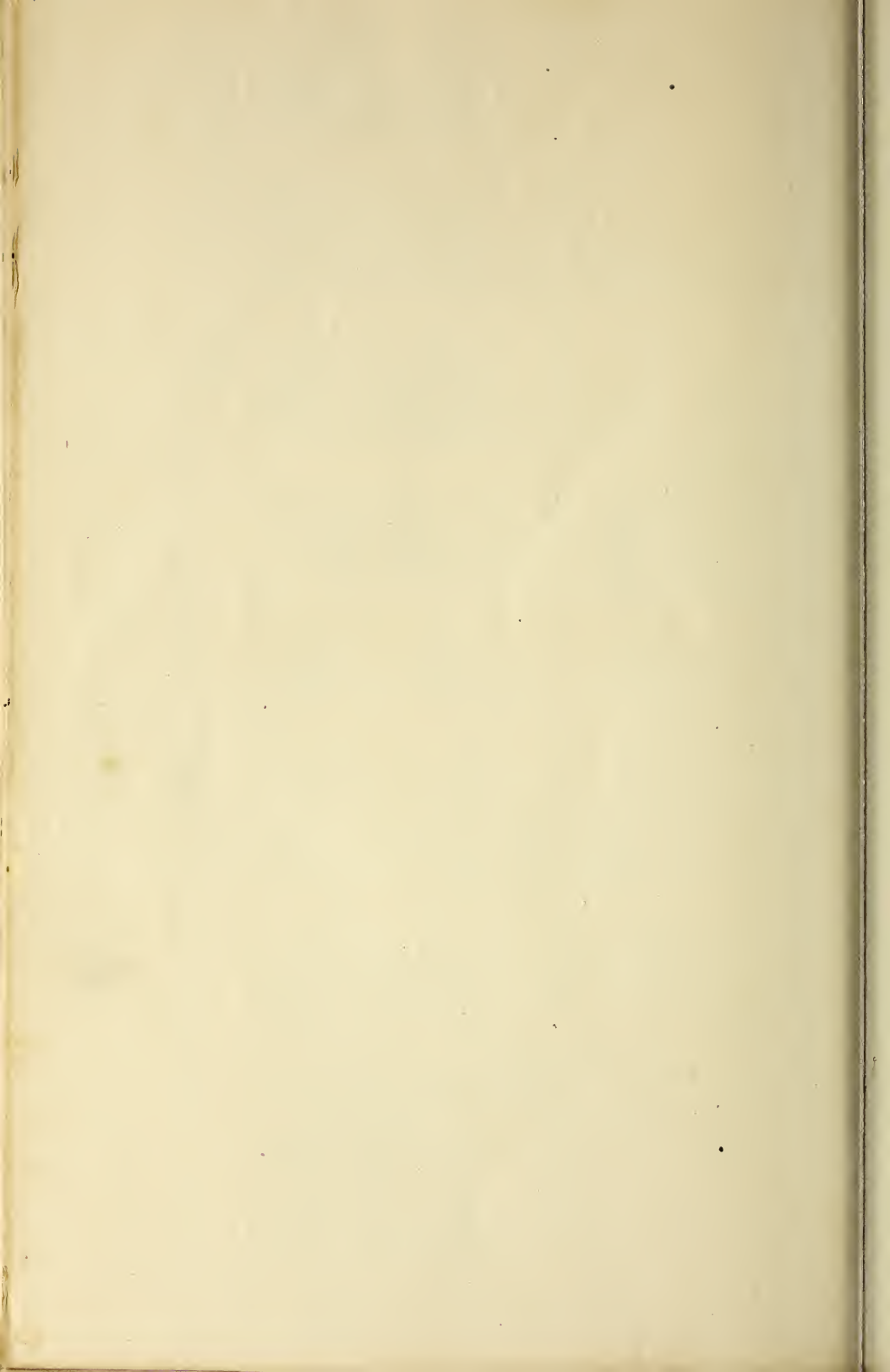

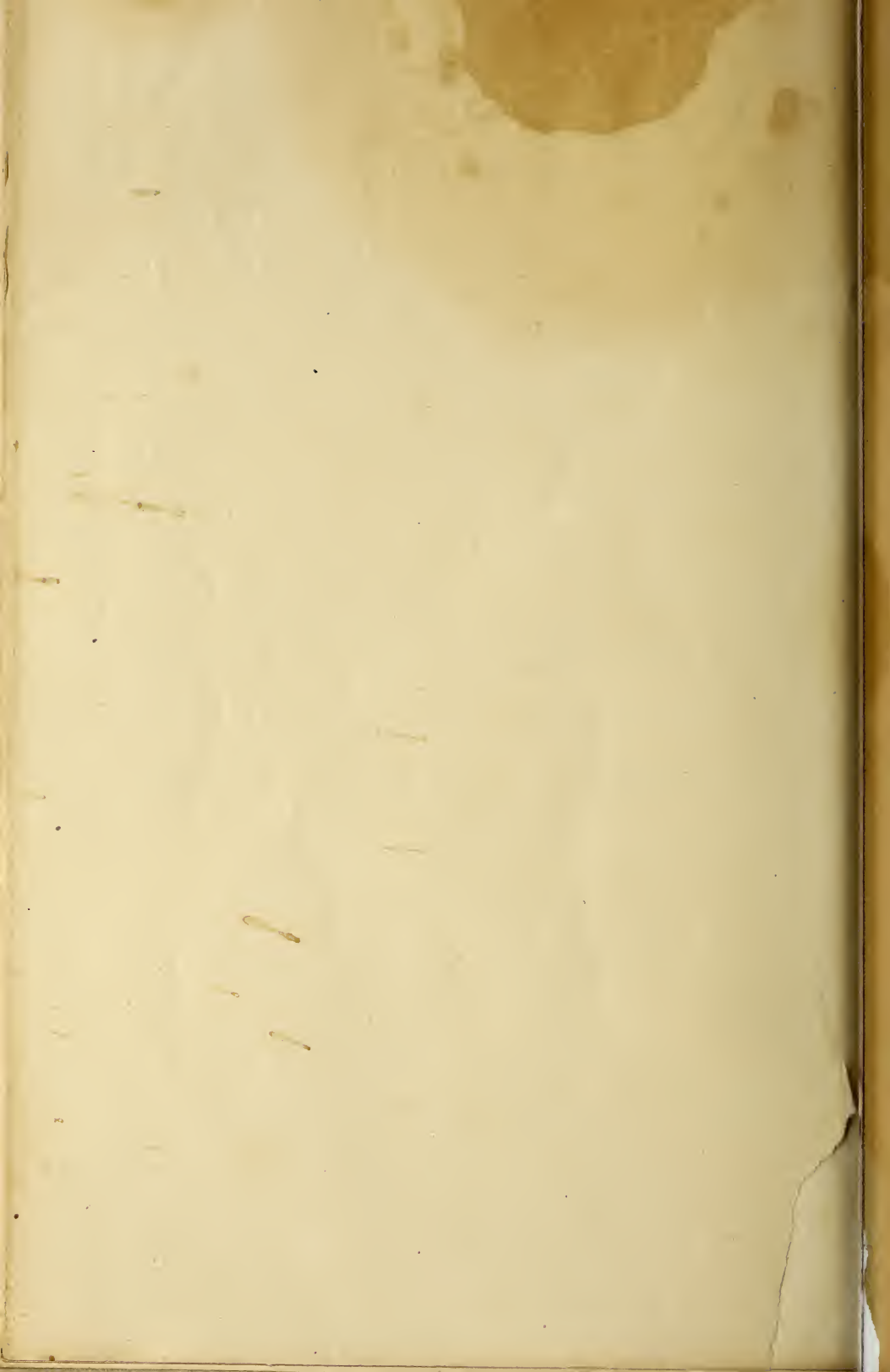

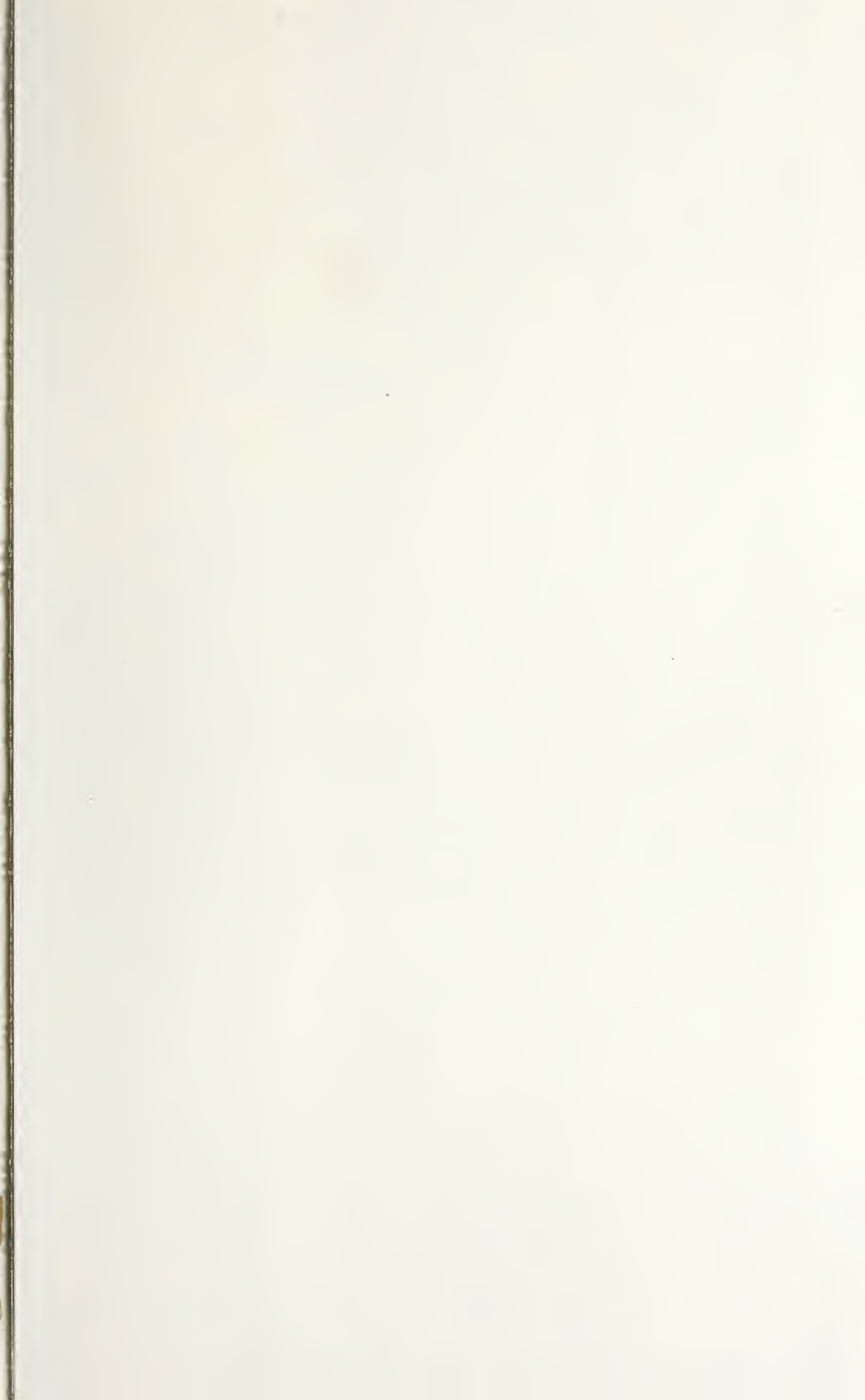
