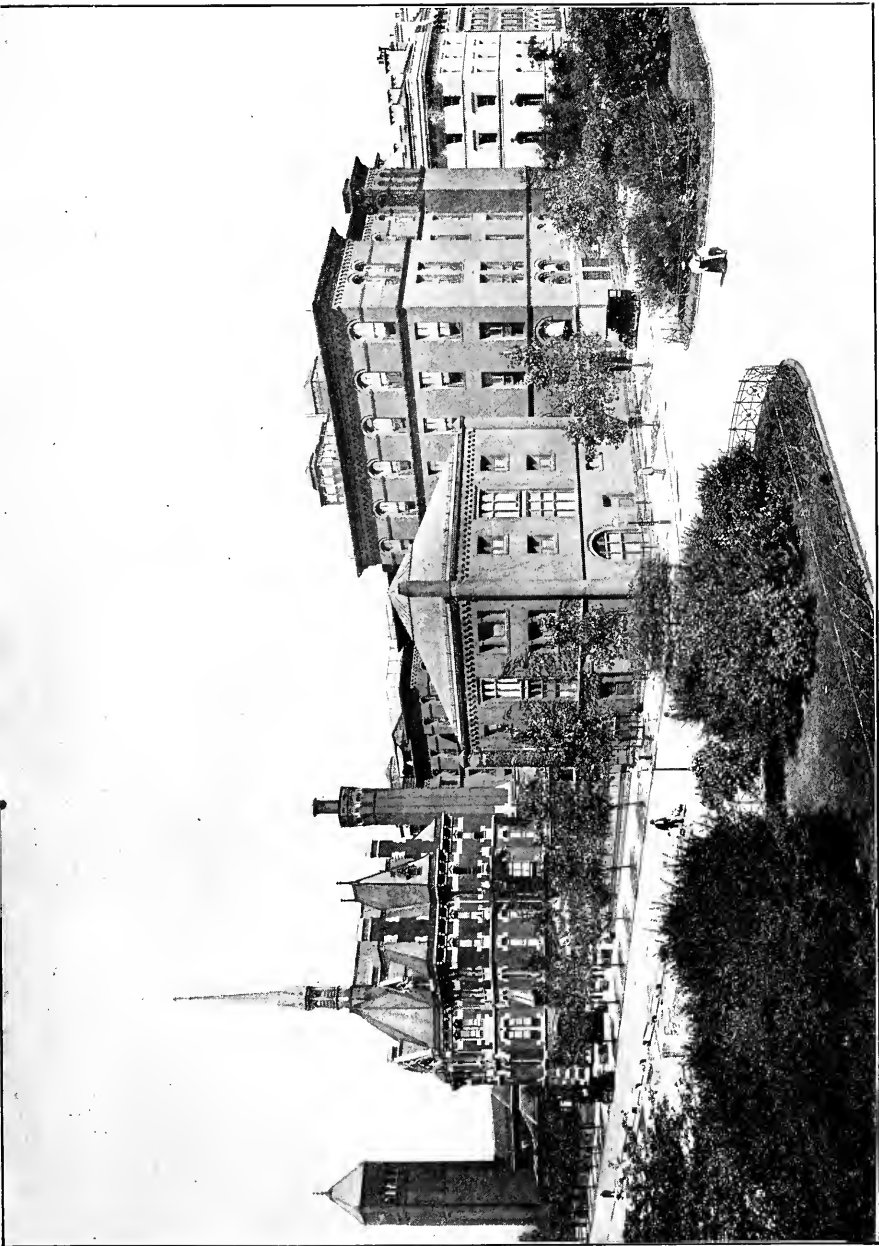

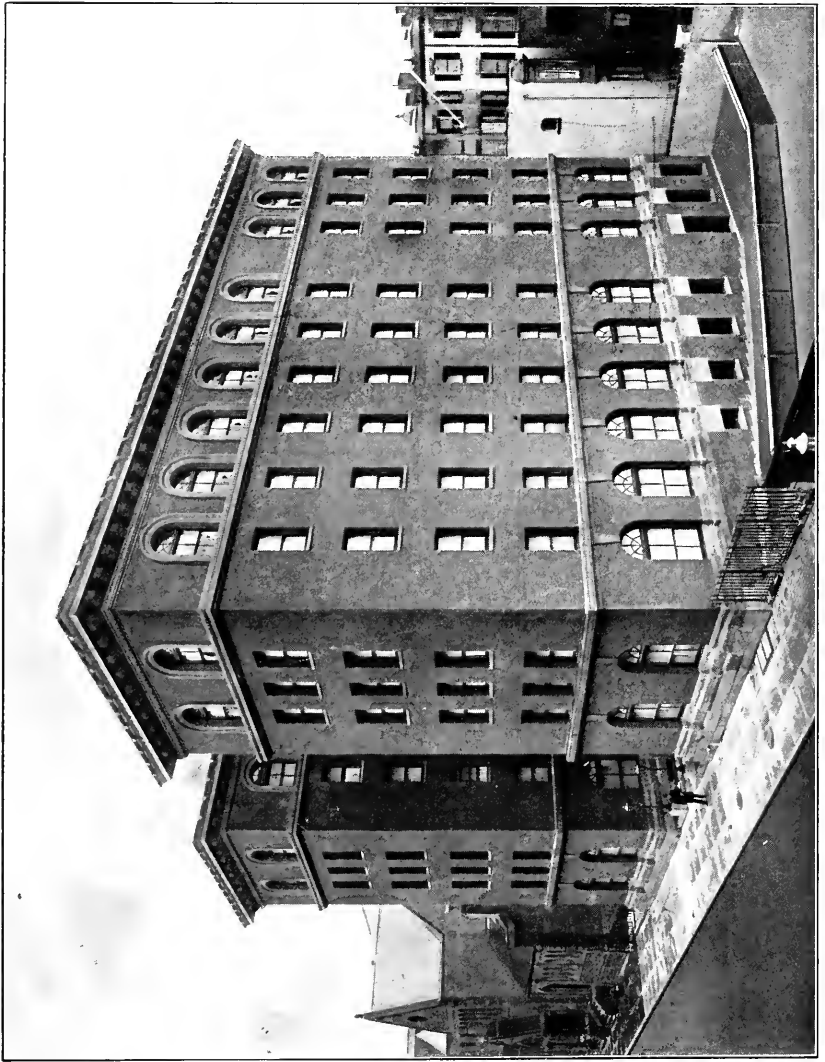

IN MEMORIAM.

J. CLEVELAND CADY

Manager, 1876-1887. 1896-1919.

Died April 17, 1919.

In the death of J. Cleveland Cady the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital has lost its senior member, whose service as Manager covered the periods 1876-1887; 1896-1919.

Mr. Cady was the architect of most of the present Hospital buildings.

Throughout his long connection of thirty-four years with the Hospital, Mr. Cady attended the meetings of the Board of Managers with regularity, and took a deep personal interest in the conduct of the Hospital.

His unfailing courtesy and his kindly nature endeared him to his fellow managers by whom he will be greatly missed.

TO THE SOCIETY, TO THE CHURCHES WHICH IT REPRESENTS, AND TO THE PUBLIC:

In October, 1918, when so many members of our Medical and Nursing Staffs were absent on war service, the influenza epidemic suddenly came upon us creating a situation as grave as the Presbyterian Hospital has ever faced. In this crisis the Medical Wards were temporarily placed at the disposal of the patients suffering from this disease—some 850 in all—while in the emergency, medical cases were admitted to the Surgical Wards.

To the Acting Director of the Medical Service, Dr. W. W. Palmer, and his assistants, to the entire Staff of Physicians and Nurses, and to the Acting Superintendent, Mr. James U. Norris, the warmest thanks of the Board of Managers is extended for their complete devotion to duty during this period, and for the supreme efforts they put forth to save life.

We record with deep sorrow the death of one of our House Physicians, Dr. John R. Perkins, who fell a victim to the dread disease.

Ninety of our nurses contracted the influenza.

We have heartily welcomed back to the Hospital the Nurses, Physicians and Surgeons who gave such valuable service to their country during the war.

It has now become possible to organize the Hospital upon a peace basis and to relieve the heavy strain under which our reduced staff had for so long been working.

At no time in the history of the Hospital has the service in every department been so efficient or so well ordered.

It is gratifying to note the inauguration of a carefully considered system affecting the admission and work of the Interne Surgical Staff.

The X-Ray Department has been greatly improved.

Ward Laboratories have been established.

We have every reason to continue to be proud of our Record Room.

On the Medical side, it has now become possible to organize work for Clinical investigation in the Biological and Chemical Laboratories.

We have adopted the eight-hour day for student nurses. The new schedule provides for a fifty-two hour week for day nurses and a fifty-six hour week for night nurses. We believe this plan will be of benefit to the students. We have extended the work of the Training School for Nurses to include courses in Public Health.

The operation of the Presbyterian Hospital, if it is to continue to give the kind of service expected of it, calls for additional funds. By referring to the Report of the Treasurer it will be seen how much money is needed to meet the growing deficit.

Dr. W. W. Palmer, who acted as Director of the Medical Service in the absence of Dr. Warfield T. Longcope, has resigned to assume the duties of Associate Professor of Medicine at Johns Hopkins. We were exceedingly sorry to have him leave us.

The Hospital has suffered a very real loss in the death of Dr. Edwin B. Cragin, Special Consultant in Gynecology, who served in this capacity from 1909 until the time of his death in 1918. His advice as a consultant was frequently sought for both Hospital and Dispensary patients and his ready co-operation and kindly interest greatly valued by our staff.

Two members of the Board of Managers have died during the past year: Mr. J. Cleveland Cady and Mr. Arthur P. Sturges. The services of Mr. Cady covered a period of 34 years, while Mr. Sturges had been a Manager for 20 years.

PURPOSES FOR WHICH INCOME OR PRINCIPAL OF RESERVE FUNDS
IS USED.

ENDOWED BED FUND, GENERAL ENDOWMENT FUND, PERRY McDONOUGH COLLINS ENDOWMENT FUND, FISKE FUND, EDWIN BANCROFT FOOTE FUND, MORRIS K. AND MARIA DE WITT JESUP FUND, MARGARETTE A. JONES FUND, JOHN STEWART KENNEDY FUND, SIDMAN TRUST FUND, FUND IN MEMORY JOHN T. TERRY, THE ISAAC E. VALENTINE MEMORIAL FUND AND MOSES WEINMAN FUND. The income from investments held in these funds is applied toward the current expenses of the Hospital.

GENERAL FUND ACCOUNT. Unrestricted legacies received since 1911 have been credited to this account. It is intended to use the income of this fund to partly meet the current expenses of the Hospital and to draw on the principal, when necessary, to meet capital expenditures not otherwise provided for.

THE MRS. FREDERIC BAKER PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT FUND. The income from investments held in this fund is used to supply books, periodicals, and instruments for use in the Pathological Laboratory and the principal of this fund may also be used for this purpose.

CHARLES K. BRIDDON GOLD MEDAL FUND. The income from investments held in this fund provides the Dr. C. K. Briddon Gold Medal which is competed for every two years by members of the alumni of The Presbyterian Hospital, who write essays requiring original research.

DORTIC MEMORIAL FUND. The principal of this fund up to the original amount of \$100,000.00 may be applied for the purpose of the erection and maintenance of a Convalescent Home in connection with the Hospital. Accumulated income may be used for the maintenance of Presbyterian Hospital patients in some approved Convalescent Home or Homes.

MRS. DAVID DOWS FUND. The income from investments held in this fund is used to purchase scientific instruments for use in the Hospital for the study or cure of disease.

MARGARET E. DOWS FUND. The income from investments held in this fund is applied toward the current expenses of the School of Nursing.

EAST RIVER HOMES FUND. This fund is to meet the expenses of tubercular work in connection with patients in the district assigned to this Hospital by the Board of Health.

FUND FOR EDUCATIONAL AND SCIENTIFIC WORK. The income from this fund is to be used toward the support of the scientific and educational work connected with the Hospital, in accordance with the agreement made April 28, 1911, between The Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York and Columbia University.

FLOWER FUND. This fund is used to meet the cost of filling and maintaining flower boxes throughout the Hospital.

THE KATIE GEITZ FUND. This fund is to meet expenses of the Diet Kitchen established for the benefit of tubercular patients and children in our district.

THE HARRIMAN FUND FOR SURGICAL RESEARCH. This fund is used to pay expenses of surgical research workers at The Presbyterian Hospital doing pneumonia research work.

HILL TOP CAMP FUND. This fund is for the support of a camp at Hawthorne, N. Y., to which are sent the children of tubercular patients of the Out-Patient Department Clinic.

HOLIDAY CHEER FUND. This fund is used to provide decorations, entertainments, presents or other holiday cheer throughout the Hospital to patients, staff, nurses and employes.

HOUSE STAFF ENTERTAINMENT FUND. This fund is used to provide recreation, entertainment, etc., for members of the House Staff.

HOUSE STAFF LIBRARY FUND. This fund is used to provide medical periodicals and books for the House Staff Library.

DR. FRANCIS P. KINNICUTT MEMORIAL FUND. This fund is to defray the cost of a Medical Ward in the new Presbyterian Hospital Buildings, which it is expected will be erected in the near future. The income from this fund is added to the principal.

NURSES' CHEER FUND. This fund is used to provide entertainment and recreation for Nurses.

PATIENTS' CHEER FUND. This fund is used to provide occupational work and instruction, games, etc., for Patients.

PATIENTS' RELIEF FUND. This fund is used to meet expenses account special relief for patients, which expenses are not directly chargeable to the Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt Fund for Visiting Nursing.

PERSONAL INJURY LIABILITY INSURANCE FUND. This fund is used to pay approved claims against the Hospital for personal injuries to employes or to the public, sustained by them while on the Hospital premises and for which the Hospital may be liable.

ROOM J TRUST FUND. The income from investments held in this fund is used to provide delicacies and extra nursing for patients occupying Room "J."

FUND IN MEMORY CLARA ALSOP RUSSELL. This fund is to be used to purchase apparatus for the study and treatment of patients suffering from heart trouble.

SARAH SANFORD FUND. This fund is used to provide temporary relief, apparatus and transportation for convalescents.

SCHOOL OF NURSING ENDOWMENT FUND. The income from investments held in this fund is used to maintain the educational work of the School of Nursing.

SCHOOL OF NURSING LIBRARY FUND. This fund is used to provide periodicals and books for the School of Nursing Library.

SCHOOL OF NURSING SCHOLARSHIP FUND. This fund is used to provide scholarships for students in the School of Nursing, and traveling scholarships for graduates of the School.

H. SMITH PERIODICAL FUND. This fund is used to provide periodicals for the wards of the Hospital.

GEORGE H. F. SCHRADER FUND, TOMPKINS FUND AND WALL FUND. The income from each of these funds is paid to a beneficiary during the latter's life, and thereafter becomes the property of the Hospital.

STAFF EDUCATIONAL FUND. This fund is used for the purpose of enabling members of the surgical staff to visit other surgical clinics to familiarize themselves with the most modern surgical practice in other institutions.

THE MRS. W. K. VANDERBILT FUND FOR VISITING NURSING. This fund provides the salary of one instructor, one social service worker, the maintenance and equipment of three student nurses, one clerical secretary, administration of the Department and relief for Out-Patient Department patients. It also provides for loans to needy patients for surgical appliances, etc.

CHARLES S. WARD FUND. The income from this fund is added to the principal and set aside for the purpose of making up any deficiency which may exist by reason of administration expenses, etc., in a trust fund of \$10,000 bequeathed to the Hospital by the late Charles S. Ward to endow in perpetuity two beds in the Hospital, one in memory of himself and one in memory of his friend, Sophia L. Kinman, deceased, which trust fund is subject to the life estate of a nephew.

FRANCES SWAN WELLES FUND. One-half of the income from investments held in this fund is used to brighten and cheer the lives of trained nurses employed from time to time in the Hospital, and the other half of the income is used to brighten and cheer the lives of patients in the general wards of the Hospital.

The Salaries of Operating Room Nurses and Operating Room Orderlies are distributed in proportion to the numbers of Private Room Surgical Patients and Ward Surgical Patients treated.

METHOD OF FIGURING COST OF DIFFERENT BRANCHES OF SERVICE:

The method in use at the Presbyterian Hospital of figuring the total cost of care for Ward Patients, Private Room Patients, Out-Patient Department Patients or Patients visited in their homes is to charge each branch of the service with salaries and wages of all persons employed exclusively in, and all supplies and repairs directly chargeable to each service, and to prorate the other operating expenses which contribute to the cost of the different branches of service in such proportion as the Superintendent and his Assistants may consider most fair after careful consideration of the local conditions, which, etc., of course, subject to change from time to time. In determining the relative proportion of Administration Expenses, Professional Care of Patients, Housekeeping, Kitchen, etc., not including the amounts directly chargeable to Out-Patient Department and Visiting Nursing, the percentage charged to Ward Patients and to Private Room Patients is based upon the number of days treatment furnished in each service, modified by well known factors, the most important of which is the fact that a private room patient requires more professional care than necessary for ward patients. In determining the cost of General House and Property Expenses among the different branches of the service is based upon the relative cubic contents of those parts of the buildings occupied by each of the five services mentioned.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

September 30, 1919.

TO THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE PRESBYTERIAN HOSPITAL.

GENTLEMEN:—The Fifty-first Annual Report of the Superintendent of the Hospital for the year ending September 30th, 1919, is herewith respectfully submitted.

Twenty thousand seven hundred and sixty-eight persons have experienced the benefits of the Hospital during the year. The departments contributing this service and the number treated in each were as follows:

There were treated in the beds of the wards and private rooms of the Hospital 4,734 persons. The daily average has been 218. Of the patients in the wards 32.8% were too poor to pay for treatment and were therefore treated free of charge.

There were treated in the Out-Patient Department 13,384 persons, and the daily average visits made were 237.

Our Visiting Nurses cared for 2,650 persons, making 23,246 visits.

In the Roentgen Ray Department 12,120 plates and films were taken of 5,777 patients from the Hospital and Out-Patient Department.

Your Superintendent returned to duty May nineteenth, after about one year's military service.

The return of the Columbia University-Presbyterian Hospital Unit in February brought back to us many of our former nurses and staff.

During the epidemic of influenza in the Fall and Winter about eight hundred and fifty cases were cared for by the Hospital, all the medical wards being turned over for this purpose. This necessitated the curtailing of admissions for other diseases, only emergency cases being admitted to the surgical wards.

A Department of Occupational Therapy was started May 1st, 1919, and has developed into a valuable service. Patients who are able to use their hands are kept occupied and their minds diverted from their troubles.

Additions and improvements made during the year include the following:

The increased number of members of the House Staff, due to the shortening of the service from a two-year to a one-year system

necessitated more living rooms and the Superintendent's former quarters were used for this purpose. This arrangement of rooms, together with the changing of the reception room on the private corridor added three additional private rooms to our service.

Small laboratories established on the ward floors for the use of the House Staff in making routine ward examinations have been a great convenience, keeping physicians near their patients when formerly they had to spend some hours of the day in a comparatively distant laboratory.

In the Radiotherapeutic Department one hundred additional milligrams of radium were purchased at a cost of ten thousand dollars.

The canvas roofing on the medical roof ward was replaced by a metal roof, and an electric elevator was established in the surgical building in place of the old hydraulic elevator, which had been worn out after about twenty-five years' service.

The diet kitchen has been doubled in size in order to take care of metabolism work formerly done upon the wards.

A vacuum ash hoist system has been installed which has improved the conditions in our old engine and boiler room and helped materially in keeping our employees more satisfied with the working conditions.

The Hospital Bureau of Standards and Supplies has continued its useful work and helped us in many trying situations brought about by war and post war conditions.

I wish to record my appreciation of the continued support of our Board of Managers and the loyalty and good work of the Acting Superintendent and his associates; and of the officials and employees of the Hospital during a difficult and trying year.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF MEDICAL SERVICE.

September 30, 1919.

TO THE BOARD OF MANAGERS, PRESBYTERIAN HOSPITAL.

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit the following report from the Medical Service.

During the last year a great number of changes have taken place in the personnel of the hospital staff, particularly by reason of the fact that a number of its members who were in active military service have returned to duty; and, unfortunately, other members of the staff have resigned to accept appointments elsewhere. The Medical Director returned for duty in February, 1919. During the winter and spring of 1919 Doctors Lamb, Bovaird, Draper, Neergaard, McAlpin, Martin, Smith and Terry resumed their work on the hospital staff upon release from military service. Dr. Ralph A. Kinsella, at the expiration of his army service, accepted an appointment in St. Louis and his temporary resignation was therefore accepted permanently. Dr. William S. Ladd has resigned to accept an appointment at the Johns Hopkins Medical School in Baltimore, and Dr. Dana W. Atchley, Assisting Visiting Physician, has accepted a similar appointment. We regret very much the loss of these active young assistants from the staff. The most serious loss to the staff during the year came with the resignation of Dr. Walter W. Palmer, who left New York to accept the important position of Associate Professor of Medicine at the Johns Hopkins Medical School. It is with the profoundest regret that I record his resignation. The value of the services that Dr. Palmer, as well as Dr. Ladd and Dr. Atchley, rendered during the period of the war and the emergency of the frightful epidemic of influenza in the autumn of 1918 cannot be overestimated.

These various changes in the staff have necessitated some alterations in the organization of the medical service. Up to the present time no one has been appointed to fill Dr. Palmer's position as Attending Physician to the Presbyterian Hospital. In the other grades, however, a number of appointments have been made, notably Drs. Louis Bauman and George M. Mackenzie as Assistant Visiting Physicians; and Drs. Bertram J. Sanger, Franklin A. Stevens and Clarence P. Thomas, as Assistant Physicians. In July, 1918, Dr. Lee H. Ferguson was appointed by the Board of Managers as Resident Physician to the medical service, and in the autumn of 1919 Drs. Randolph West and Harold C. Stuart were appointed Assistant

Resident Physicians. This permanent resident staff has already done a great deal to bring about a unity of work and purpose in the medical service, and to improve to a very material degree the more accurate treatment and care of the patients on the medical service.

The visiting staff is now so organized that four members are assigned to duty in each ward. The attending physician, or senior associate physician, acts in a supervisory capacity over this group, and it is intended that throughout the year each group will be responsible for the routine duties which the medical service in the ward demands. This will allow of uninterrupted service which will continue without break, irrespective of any vacations which any members of the staff may be allowed.

To the Out-Patient Department have been added the following named assistants: Drs. Henry T. Chickering, Herbert N. Vermilye, J. G. Hopkins, Frank McLean, William H. Leake and Thayer Smith. During the year several new classes in medicine have been started. Twice a week there is a syphilis clinic under the direction of Dr. Hopkins; on two other days clinics for asthmatics and hay fever patients are held under the direction of Dr. Mackenzie.

Dr. Albert R. Lamb has been requested to act as First Assistant to the Medical Director and will share in the executive duties required in carrying out the work of the medical service.

With the cessation of the war and the return of a number of the members of the staff, it has been possible to organize work for clinical investigation in the biological and chemical laboratories. Dr. Mackenzie, together with Dr. Stevens, is in charge of the Biological Laboratory. Dr. Bauman has general charge of the Chemical Laboratory. To this department has been added Dr. Sanger, who, under the immediate supervision of Dr. Geyelin, will conduct calorimetric determinations of the total metabolism of certain groups of patients, a procedure which has been found of great value in the diagnosis of certain diseases and in the proper control of their treatment. The services of Miss Hun have been secured to assist in the work with the calorimeter which has been purchased by Columbia University and will be used at the Presbyterian Hospital.

Dr. Thomas is assigned to duty with Dr. Hart and Dr. Strong in the electrocardiograph room.

The fourth year students are under the direct supervision of Dr. Strong, who is assisted by Drs. Bauman, Geyelin, Mackenzie and Thomas. Instruction to third year students is under the immediate supervision of Dr. George Draper, with whom are working various members of the visiting and dispensary staff.

During his term as Acting Director of the Medical Service, Dr. Palmer started to assemble a manual for the medical service, comprising numerous details concerning the procedure and department of the house staff, instructions as to the keeping of hospital records

and standard methods of laboratory work, which has been found of such great benefit in the practical routine of the hospital that it is at present being enlarged and re-edited, in the hopes that, when completed, it may be printed in much the same form as the hospital pharmacopoeia and the diet lists, when it will be accepted as a standard for the work of the hospital.

The Janeway Memorial Library has been increased during the year by numerous volumes, making a total of 4,843 on the shelves.

In the autumn of 1919 reprints of the publications of members of the staff which have appeared during the past three years were mailed to a large number of physicians, libraries and medical schools.

It is impossible to close this report without expressing my sincere personal gratitude to the members of the staff who, often under great personal sacrifice, remained at the hospital during the period of the war and the epidemic of influenza to carry out the important work of the institution. Their services were of inestimable value, and their untiring and faithful devotion cannot be too highly appreciated and praised. I am,

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF SURGICAL SERVICE.

September 30, 1919.

TO THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE PRESBYTERIAN HOSPITAL IN
THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to present the Annual Report of the Surgical Service.

With the return of the members of our staff who went overseas the service is again adequately manned to carry forward the ambitious plans which were formulated two years ago, by which it was hoped to place the Presbyterian Service second to none.

The method by which the members of the entire interne staff enter service simultaneously has proven a success. Under this arrangement each patient is referred by the Director to one of the Attending Staff for his personal attention and care, and a member of the interne staff acts as his assistant, performing all the necessary things incident to his treatment under the guidance and direct supervision of the Attending. This results in a more intimate knowledge of the details of each case on the part of the interne to a greater degree than was possible under the old system of a graded house staff, where the work was divided, certain examinations being delegated to individual members. It requires a man more rich in experience than a young interne to be able to correlate disjointed facts in a case. Such a man we have in the Attending Staff. The plan would work more smoothly and efficiently, however, if a resident could be appointed to correlate the work of the Service, and I believe the time has come when this appointment should be made. This system was not introduced owing to the uncertain condition which existed in regard to the affiliations of the hospital, but I trust that within the next year circumstances may develop by which we may realize the fullest benefit of the complete system.

It would be of material advantage, however, if it were possible to establish a term of service for the internes of fifteen months, having each member spend the first three months in the bacteriological laboratory, familiarizing himself with laboratory methods and the rudiments of bacteriological technic. At present this unfamiliarity results at times in a loss of valuable data. Such a service would materially improve the efficiency of our work in this field. Adequate space for such a training could be found in the laboratory now used for student teaching, which is not used to its full capacity during the summer months, when it would be our plan to have this training given to the interne staff.

The places on the Attending Staff for men who served overseas were kept open for them on their return, but it became necessary

to have substitutes take their places during their absence. It would have been obviously unjust to have dropped these men, whose devotion to the hospital has been great, and the readjustment, although difficult, has been accomplished with the least degree of injustice to any member of the staff.

The technical work of the Service has been placed on a definite time schedule, by which all operations, except emergency cases, are performed in the morning, thus giving the nursing staff ample time to prepare for the work of the following day. The dressing of wounds in the wards is carried on in the afternoons, thus allowing the nursing staff sufficient time to carry out properly their part of caring for the patients. This has been rendered possible by a change in the visiting hours for patients' friends; a most satisfactory arrangement having been arrived at by having an hour during which friends may visit the wards each day. This frequent and shorter time is better for the patients, as they are not so fatigued as they were wont to be after a two-hour period thrice a week as formerly.

The work of the follow-up clinic has assumed large proportions, but the increased benefits which the patients receive more than justifies the liberality so generously shown by the hospital in furnishing the funds necessary for this work. The value to the hospital in obtaining a collection of records unequalled by any institution cannot be overestimated, and I hope in the next surgical report, now preparing, to be able to present for your consideration a series of reports which will more than justify the great outlay which has been put into this department of our work.

A new edition of *The Terminology of Disease*, as used by the hospital, has been published, and it is hoped this will aid other institutions in obtaining the degree of efficiency in the keeping of records which we enjoy. The work of the record room and our system of tabulating interval results has not only proven of great value to the patients but has also been of use to the Attending Staff.

The X-Ray department, which during the war suffered greatly from our inability to obtain necessary equipment and adequately trained technicians, is now on a better basis than it has ever been. This department is indeed an expensive one, but its value is beyond question. Many of the examinations carried out give negative results, it is true, but this fact alone is of value in arriving at a correct diagnosis and so indirectly to a proper therapeutic procedure. We still lack certain features in order to bring this department up to the high standard set by the rest of the hospital. The attending roentgenologist spends many hours a day at the hospital and is available at all times, and in this position we have Dr. Imboden, a man whose skill and knowledge is of the highest. The department, however, still lacks space for a normal, healthy development, and it is hoped, by a rearrangement of the rooms, to place this work on a high

plane. If the same liberal spirit which has been shown in developing other branches of the hospital work is extended here, this department can be brought up to a standard commensurate to its importance.

The department of radiotherapeutics has cared for a larger number of patients and a sufficient period of time has now elapsed for us to see the good results from this treatment and amply demonstrates the wisdom of the hospital in the large financial outlay necessitated in the equipment of this department. Uterine hemorrhage and inoperable carcinoma, in addition to tubercular involvement of the lymph glands, have been the conditions upon which most stress has been laid. In addition, the treatment of cancer cases which have been operated on, notably carcinoma of the female mammary gland, has been carried on as a prophylactic procedure.

I wish again, this year, to emphasize the help which we have received from the volunteer aids in the surgical dispensary. The latter has increased in size, due very largely to the high character of the work carried on by the staff in this class of cases.

A department of occupational therapy has been begun during the year. Although established for only a short period, it has amply justified its usefulness, and as we learn more of its possibilities this should develop into an aid in the treatment of disease.

The establishment of laboratories on the ward floors, where certain routine clinical pathological examinations can be made, has added greatly to the efficient management of the service, as it renders it possible for members of the interne staff to keep in more constant touch with their patients than could be done when they were compelled to spend considerable time in a laboratory far removed from the wards.

A report on the activities of the record room, in which the details of our record system was given in great completeness, has been published, and the requests for copies demonstrate the large demand for just such a description.

I feel we have in the Attending Staff of the Surgical Service a group of men who are proud of the hospital and its achievements and who are devoting their time and energies for its betterment and have its welfare at heart.

REPORT OF THE RADIOTHERAPEUTIC DEPARTMENT.

The work which led up to the establishment of this department began in 1914 by the treatment of certain gynecological cases in the present fluoroscopic room, starting with the kind assistance of the late Dr. Caldwell. The equipment consisted at first of an odd assemblage of apparatus for X-Ray treatment, which soon gave way to a good high power apparatus, and when a definite space was set apart for the giving of these treatments, there was installed a thoroughly modern and efficient X-Ray plant. In 1917, 100 milligrams of radium were purchased by one of the staff, and after its usefulness had been demonstrated, was sold to the hospital. Early this year an additional 100 milligrams of radium were purchased, bringing our present total up to 200 milligrams. For two years an ultra-violet ray machine has been in operation. The present X-Ray work is carried on in a room surrounded by masonry, and on one side by a lead wall from ceiling to floor, so that the rays cannot affect the technician, who has been employed during the past year.

During the year 1,519 X-Ray treatments have been given to 272 patients, and 130 radium treatments have been given to 101 patients. These have included several types. Greatest efforts have been directed toward the treatment of certain gynecological diseases; to the treatment of chronic inflammation (particularly tuberculosis of the lymph glands); to patients who have been operated upon for cancer of the breast; to Hodgkins disease; to certain diseases of the blood, and then to a large group of unfortunates on whom the method has more or less palliative effect, when operation seems inadvisable.

The success of the treatment has varied with the type of case. The gynecological cases have been eminently satisfactory. Tuberculous lymph glands are now being treated by a surgeon, who uses all methods of treatment, and includes X-Ray as one of the important agents, and seems to be progressing in a more satisfactory manner than before this idea was carried out. Those suffering from diseases of the blood and Hodgkin's disease are greatly benefited and their lives prolonged for considerable periods.

The work is carried out as part of the surgical department in the belief that a skilled technician can manage the actual giving of X-Ray as well as, or better than, a doctor, and that the handling of radium should be a surgical procedure in the types of cases in which it is being used in our clinic. The treatment involves, besides the application of the agent indicated, a careful control of this treatment

by blood counts. The work is progressing satisfactorily. It is a pleasure to note that most of the members of the staff have been interested in the study of the nature of the action of these agents, and in the study of the indications for their application, and have learned the dosage for the various conditions to such an extent that the necessity of a radiotherapeutic specialist has seemed less and less apparent.

The equipment of the radiotherapeutic department is now satisfactory except in unimportant details. The needs are of more technical assistants, and secondly, more beds in the hospital, which could be properly devoted to such of these cases as require bed treatment. The number of patients receiving treatment is limited only by the facilities for giving it. At present the X-Ray can only be given for half the day because the rest of the technician's time must be spent in counting blood and performing clerical duties.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF PATHOLOGICAL SERVICE.

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor of submitting the following as a report of the Pathological Service of the Hospital for the year ending September 30, 1919.

The staff of the department has been more or less depleted owing to war conditions, but with the return of peace we are now able to resume work with an adequate force. The work has been greatly facilitated by the return of Dr. Alwin M. Pappenheimer, who was on active military service in France. Dr. Henry E. Meleney, who has just returned from the service, succeeds Dr. A. A. Eggstein as Resident Pathologist, whose resignation became effective July 15th. Dr. Robert F. E. Stier has been appointed to the staff as Assistant Resident Pathologist. The following is the list of the Pathological Staff:

It will be noticed that during 1919 there were 140 more deaths in the hospital than the preceding year, which is explained by the influenza epidemic. The depletion of the House Staff and the difficulty experienced in obtaining autopsies on influenza cases account for the lower percentage of autopsies received. For the first time, the percentage of autopsies performed on deaths from the Surgical Division has been higher than that of the Medical Division.

BACTERIOLOGICAL LABORATORY.

There have been a considerable number of changes in the personnel and manner of organization of the Bacteriological Laboratory during the past year. This has been necessary owing to the readjustments required as members of the regular staff returned from service with the army. The laboratory was efficiently supervised by Mrs. Miriam Olmstead-Lipman until August of this year, when, to our regret, owing to family duties, Mrs. Lipman was forced to resign. We were able to secure in her place Dr. Frederick Barnes Humphreys, who had just returned from federal service in France. Dr. Humphreys has introduced a number of changes in the organization of the laboratory which we think will prove for the benefit of the hospital in the coming year.

A change has been made in the management of Surgical Pathology, necessitated by the resignation of Mrs. Coley. This work is now being done by a member of the Bacteriological Staff directly under Dr. Humphrey's supervision.

An attempt has been recently made to obtain better co-ordination between the Laboratory and the Clinical Staffs by a meeting held with the Directors of the Medical and Surgical Clinics and their Assistants. It is believed that by closer contact with these two groups in the future a more satisfactory interchange of views, a more systematic delivery of specimens and return of reports can be worked out. With the aid of the Directors of the Medical and Surgical Services, an attempt will be made to instruct Junior Members of these Staffs in bacteriological methods and to utilize the Laboratory facilities more definitely for the education of Junior Members of the House Staff. One of the purposes of the recent conferences has been to reduce the large amount of routine in order that the more highly trained members of the Laboratory Staff might take an intensive interest in the really difficult cases and be enabled to spend more of their time in research and in re-enforcing the research activities of the Clinical personnel.

At the present time the most trying need of the Laboratory is lack of space, a condition which promises to be somewhat relieved by the generous offer of the Director of the Surgical Service to allow space in the surgical part of the hospital for the bacteriological work on surgical conditions.

SURGICAL PATHOLOGICAL LABORATORY.

The work of the Surgical Pathological Laboratory has been carried out during the past year along the lines indicated in the last two yearly reports. The policy of having the surgical internes and members of the surgical attending staff examine and describe the specimens has been continued; their reports being subject to the criticism and revision of the attending surgical pathologists. By this method a relatively large number of clinicians have been given the opportunity to increase their knowledge of the pathology of surgical processes, an essential factor in producing the efficient surgeon.

The material in the laboratory is made useful for the instruction of medical students of the College of Physicians and Surgeons in two ways: 1—The clinical clerks examine the specimens, and slides made from them, of cases which they have followed in the wards; and, 2—Portions of specimens of some point of peculiar surgical significance are brought over to the surgical laboratories of the College, where they are especially prepared for demonstration to students.

At the Tuesday evening meetings of the surgical attending staff, those cases in which the surgical pathologist's diagnosis does not coincide with the operating surgeon's ante and post-operation diagnosis are reported and discussed. An attempt is made to account for the error in order that the surgeons may improve their efficiency and diagnostic skill. This practice, initiated two years ago, has been found of sufficient value to make it a permanent feature of these meetings.

In addition to the individual reports on each specimen of tissue brought to the laboratory, copies of which are incorporated in the patients' histories, and in the records of the laboratory, the work of compilation of statistics of many surgical processes based on the hospital records and the "follow-up" system has been continued. It is needless to say that its value is enhanced with each passing year.

Miss Goode, the laboratory's technician, in addition to her other duties, has been making the Dakin's solution for the operating room and wards during the past year. This solution has to be freshly prepared and titrated every twenty-four hours, or it is worthless.

The degree of usefulness to which the laboratory has attained is due to a very large extent to the co-operation of the members of the house and attending staff, who have, from time to time, participated in its endeavors, and to the faithful efforts of the secretary, Miss Charleson, and the technician, Miss Goode. The surgical pathologists desire to express their appreciation of their service at this time.

GENTLEMEN:—The report of the Out-Patient Department for the year ending September 30th, 1919, is herewith submitted. There have been 9,778 new patients admitted to the benefits of the Out-Patient Department, which, together with 3,608 former patients, makes a total of 13,386 patients treated. Of these, 4,772 patients were treated in more than one clinic, making a total of 18,158 cases treated during the year. 67,818 visits were made, 60,027 of which were paid for.

REPORT OF THE OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

BOARD OF MANAGERS, PRESBYTERIAN HOSPITAL IN THE CITY OF

GENTLEMEN:—The following is a report of the Out-Patient Department for the current year, ending September 30, 1919.

The number of cases treated during the year, in all branches, is 18,156. These patients made, in all, 67,818 visits. This represents a substantial increase over the numbers for the previous year.

The detailed report for the Surgical and Medical services is considered separately and follows:

SURGICAL DISPENSARY.

In the Surgical Out-Patient Department during the past year there have been a number of modifications, tending to promote the efficiency of the service and increase the thoroughness with which the individual case is worked up. The return to civil life of a large number of reliable physicians has rendered possible the reorganization of the Dispensary along the lines hitherto deemed essential, but not possible, by reason of the shortage of trained men.

The payment of salaries to the duly appointed physicians at the Out-Patient Department has tended to promote the ease with which these positions could be filled and afforded an incentive to greater attendance.

It has further been recognized that in order to attract men of high calibre to carry on this work it is necessary to provide an inspiration greater than the mere opportunities of experience and service to mankind. There must be some promise of growth, some vision of future progress, that will serve as a goal toward which it

will be worth while to struggle. In order for a man to find this kind of inspiration in his work, he must be impressed with three things: First, that the utmost is expected of him; secondly, that unlimited facilities will be provided to this end; thirdly, that there exists the chance for recognition in proportion to his achievement. To establish the reality of these ideals and to work toward the ideal diagnostic clinic, the following new features have been introduced in the Surgical Dispensary:

I.—Department of Diagnosis.

Hitherto all new cases have gone through the regular channels along with chronic conditions, post-operatives and daily dressings. This has meant that they could not be worked up as thoroughly as is desirable, because the man in charge of the general room was too busy with routine. At present all new cases must pass first through the rooms for diagnosis, each in charge of a man whose sole function it is to see that each case has an adequate history and physical examination, complete clinical and pathological data and a correct diagnosis. An accurate diagnosis having been established, the case may then be referred to its proper department for treatment. While this plan is just at its inception, it has already proven of great value and the chances that some important pathological condition may pass through the clinic unrecognized are greatly diminished.

II.—Case Analysis and Follow-Up File.

In connection with the department of diagnosis is the above file for keeping a record of the more interesting and instructive cases and following their progress in a manner similar to that employed with In-Patients. This work, which is being carried out by the volunteer aides, is expected to be of great value in teaching, in group analysis, in research and in checking up the accuracy of diagnosis. Obviously this is a task of some magnitude, but it is hoped that with the addition of a number of new aides this work may be properly carried out.

III.—Research.

Every effort is being made to stimulate research. Realizing the enormous amount of material passing through the clinic, it is to be regretted that so little of a constructive nature has in the past been turned out. Each member of the staff has been urged to select a certain group of cases for study and to settle upon some problem in connection with this group.

IV.—Bacteriology.

Realizing the enormous problems which present themselves in the field of bacteriology, an experienced bacteriologist has been secured who will attend regularly at the Surgical Dispensary and work in conjunction with the members of the staff upon such problems as require research.

V.—Staff Meetings.

Regular monthly meetings of the Surgical Out-Patient Department staff have been begun, with the object of stimulating interest in and keeping us in touch with the latest advances in surgical subjects. At each meeting a paper is read by a member of the staff on some subject upon which he has been working. Such a paper may comprise an analysis of existing literature or deal with individual work. A critical discussion follows, in which all members are urged to take part.

VI.—Rotation of the Services.

It has been deemed desirable to vary the routine of the members of the staff by shifting them to a different department of the Dispensary at intervals of from three to six months. This, it was thought, would make the work more interesting.

VII.—Volunteer Aides.

Started as a war-time emergency, these have become a necessary part of the daily administration and now constitute a permanent feature of the up-to-date clinic. The supply, unfortunately, tends to dwindle about the time the summer vacations start, but this we hope to overcome by adopting a relay system. Under this plan the individual aide would not be called upon to give more than three weeks or a month of her time during the summer, and yet the clinic would remain supplied.

VIII.—Accident Ward.

The assignment of attending surgeons to supervision of the Accident Ward work has been a decided stimulus to the work done there and has proven valuable and interesting to the internes.

IX.

On the whole, the Surgical Out-Patient Department may be said to be in a very satisfactory condition and the outlook for the future is favorable.

MEDICAL DISPENSARY.

With the cessation of the war and the consequent release of medical men, an effort is being made not only to restore the Medical Dispensary to its pre-war basis, but to make a real advance in the routine treatment of dispensary patients and to carry on organized research along special lines.

We are in a position to obtain the men necessary for the work, so that the crying need now is for more room. The time has come when our present quarters are obviously inadequate, and it is impossible for the constantly increasing staff to care for the patients, carry on research and teach the students in the cramped space at our command. We cannot mark time. We must either expand or the men will lose interest and the clinics suffer from consequent retrogression.

Since the last report the department for the treatment of diseases of the skin and of syphilis has been reopened and is filling admirably a long felt want. A new department has been opened for the study of asthma and clinical anaphylaxis. Its growth has been rapid and its results gratifying.

The aides still render their invaluable assistance, and although with the addition of more medical men to the staff the character of their work has been modified, they have made themselves indispensable and have become, we trust, a permanent institution.

The Follow-Up continues to be of inestimable value, both in providing teaching material and in affording opportunity to follow groups of cases over long periods of time. Its value has been enhanced by a new arrangement whereby each ward has a separate day of the week on which its discharged patients are referred back to the Follow-Up in the dispensary. On this day the cases are seen in the Out-Patient Department by the same Attendants who cared for them while they were in the wards. This redounds to the advantage of patients and doctors alike.

A table is appended showing, as usual, the number of patients treated and the visits made in the various departments.

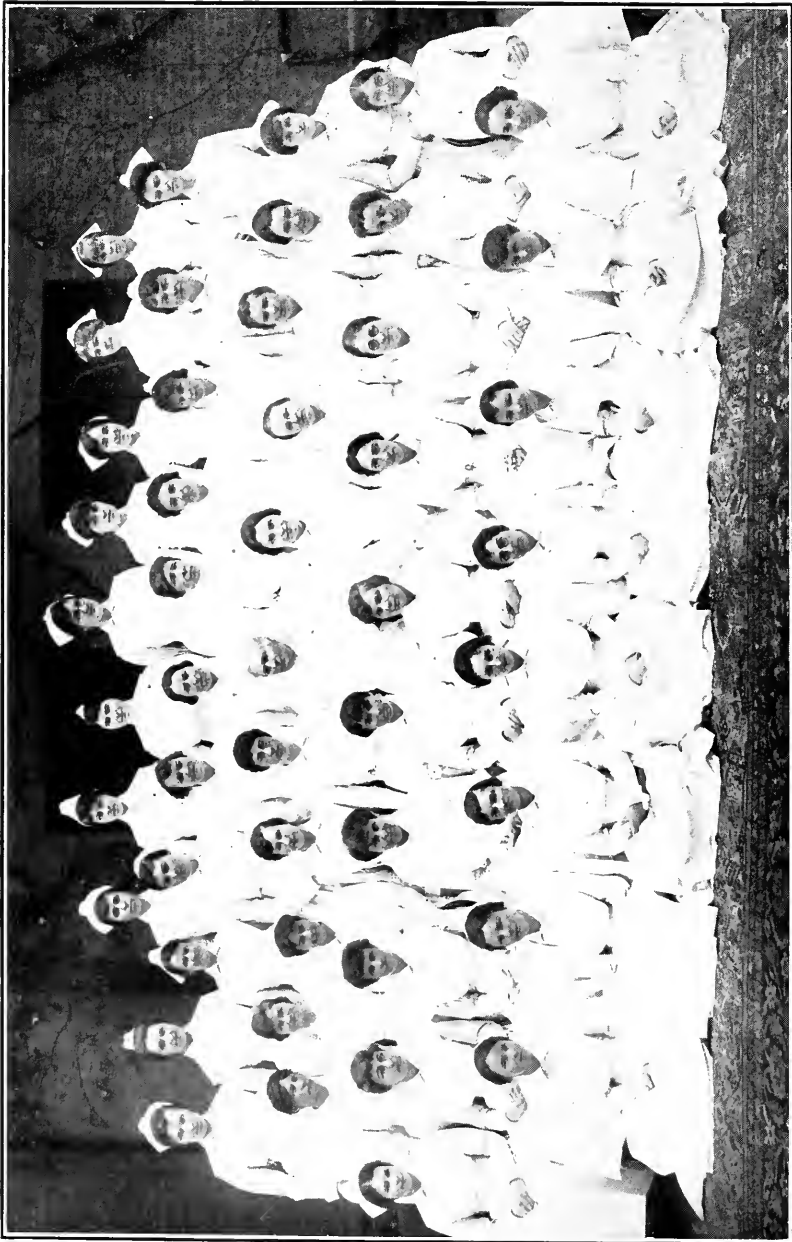

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE SCHOOL OF NURSING.

TO THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE PRESBYTERIAN HOSPITAL IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to present the twenty-seventh annual report of the School of Nursing.

The epidemic of influenza, which made such deadly inroads upon our city last autumn, crowded our Hospital far beyond its limit and kept the nursing staff working at high pressure. Suspension of all classes and instruction became necessary and every effort was made to save the lives of the patients entrusted to our care. Despite every precaution, ninety of our number were attacked by the disease; fortunately, but one fatality resulting—that of a probationer recently arrived. I cannot speak too highly of the esprit de corps and the supreme devotion of the Nursing Staff, the Students and Probationers, during those trying months. The threads of theory were again taken up early in the new year and the curriculum has been brought up to date.

Our Nation is at last awake to the alarming condition of public health and the immediate necessity of providing a remedy. At the Canne Convention, where representatives of many nations sat in earnest conference upon this subject, Dr. William Welsh stated that the trained public health nurse was one of the most important factors in a successful campaign against disease. In response to this appeal, the effort of the past year has been directed especially toward extension of the School work to include preparation for this important branch of nursing. The Henry Street Nurses' Settlement offers our students a four-month course, including lectures at Teachers' College (with credit) and field work in the congested districts of the city. This, in conjunction with our own Social Service Department, enables us to train thirty students each year for public health work.

Evidence that our School does not fully meet the widespread need for graduates to fill important posts in this and other countries is seen by our inability to fill even a third of the positions offering. One of the Southern States is asking for ten Public Health Supervisors to cover the districts of the State. Surely no higher privilege could come to an individual or a group of individuals than that of providing endowment for the enlargement of this important educational measure.

The affiliation with Teachers' College, Columbia University, continues to attract the women who have completed two years of college work. When the adjustment of this course has been perfected it will become invaluable to students unable to give the longer period for training.

The short-time course for college women (nine months credit) gives an opportunity for specializing. The ranks of constructive workers to undertake reconstruction and to enter the war against conditions which bring about disease, vice and wretchedness are not filled; we look to the women who have had the privilege of higher education and the opportunity of studying the causes at first hand to make a valuable contribution to this work. The Vassar Group received last autumn from the Training Camp is doing excellent work and upholding their traditions.

The Managers recently voted for the adoption of the eight-hour day for student nurses. The new schedule went into effect on October 6th. This provides for a fifty-two-hour week for day nurses and a fifty-six-hour week for night nurses. The fifty-two-hour week includes eight hours daily for five days and six hours for the remaining two days, giving a free half day on Sunday and on one other day during the week. It is expected that the shorter hours will result in more efficient service and improvement in the health of the students.

The Commencement Exercises of the Class of 1919 were held in Florence Nightingale Hall on May 15th. Forty-four members of the Class received diplomas, four of whom had been transferred from Class '20, being the first students received on the college credit basis. These students have taken full advantage of their opportunities for preparation and should meet the public need for service of the highest order.

The address to the Class was delivered by Dr. Walter B. James, who made an earnest appeal for maintenance of the highest ethical standards. In presenting the diplomas, Mr. William Sloane, President of the Board of Managers, gave a warm welcome to the members of the Class. Mr. Eugene Délano, a member of the School of Nursing Committee, presented the School Pins, after which a delightful reception was given the Class by the Managers. The Class flowers were the gift of Mr. Sloane.

Since the close of the war a group of eight of our Alumnae have joined the American Commission for Relief in the Near East and are now working in isolated places in Armenia and Syria. Another group of seven have gone with the Red Cross to Siberia; others have taken up work in France, Serbia and Turkey.

The married graduates displayed a fine spirit of sacrifice during the epidemic which swept over our country with such fatal results. Not only in this city, but in many other cities throughout the country these women left their homes to give unstintingly of their professional services to the sufferers from this dread disease. Numbers of our graduates engaged in institutional and private work also gave heroic service. The lives of two of our Alumnae were sacrificed in combatting this disease—Jean Georgiana Hayman, '08, and Mrs. Clarence Thomas, *nee* Edith Irene Doolittle, '17. Miss Hayman had won a high place in the hearts of her many friends and co-workers, by whom she will be keenly missed. Her untiring devotion, loyalty and the high order of her professional ability had given her a distinctive place in hospital circles. Mrs. Thomas, whose death occurred in October, is sincerely missed by a large circle of friends, to whom her many charming qualities of character had endeared her.

It is with much sorrow that we record the death of Margaret Eliza Baker, '04, following a severe operation. Many will miss Miss Baker's cheering presence, for she always radiated an atmosphere of good will. In her work overseas she gave valuable service to our country; her memory will always live in the hearts of those who came under her care.

The Visiting Nursing and Social Service Department has completed its sixteenth year. This Department is sustained by a liberal gift from Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt. The Staff consists of an Instructor, four Graduate Nurses, three Student Nurses and a Social Service Secretary.

Training in Public Health and Social Service Work has been given to twenty students. The Probationers, upon entering the School, make "rounds" in the homes of patients with the Instructor, who explains the purpose and value of Hospital Social Service. This gives them a broad and sympathetic outlook on the needs of their patients and secures their interest and co-operation during the three years of training.

In addition to this, work in the Department of Tuberculosis, Follow-Up, Convalescence, Fresh Air and Relief is carried on by the Staff.

The constant use of the motor car has increased our ability for larger service in the Department, in multiplying home visits by the "follow-up" nurses, in carrying sick patients to and from the Hospital and in taking convalescents to the railway stations en route to convalescent homes.

During the influenza epidemic the Visiting Nurses, in addition to their hospital work, answered all calls in the neighborhood and gave devoted service.

The Katie Geitz Kitchen in the East River Homes has been enlarged and is becoming a distinct health factor in the neighborhood. From one hundred to one hundred and twenty-five quarts of milk are dispensed daily, one hundred portions of food sold at five cents a portion, and hot soup at two cents a cup supplied to from seventy to ninety children of the Fresh Air Schools on the roof of the building.

Hill Top Camp at Hawthorne, New York, designed to give children of tuberculous parents and suitable cardiac patients a month's stay in the country, had its ninth successful summer. Ninety-one children derived great benefit from the fresh air, rest and discipline maintained there. We are greatly indebted to the Scully-Walton Ambulance Company who kindly arranged to transport the children to the Grand Central Station. The necessary funds to maintain the camp were raised through one dollar subscriptions, obtained by appeals to residents of the district in which the Hospital is situated.

Miss Emily Tuckerman of Stockbridge, Massachusetts, again took six little girls for the entire summer. These lucky children live in a charming cottage under the care of a practical nurse. Those chosen were especially in need of fresh air and country environment, all being from five to twenty-nine pounds under weight. Their physical improvement was wonderful. The greatest benefit, however, was derived from the deep personal interest shown in each member of the group by Miss Tuckerman herself.

On December twenty-third the Dispensary was crowded with over three hundred happy children and their mothers, who had come for the Christmas Tree and Entertainment. We are deeply grateful to our old friends who have always helped at Christmas time and to the clerical aides in the Out-Patient Department who also gave substantial help, thus showing an interest in the poor families under our care. Ice cream and cake was provided by Mrs. A. Carter, who for a number of years has remembered the children in this delightful way. Over three hundred and fifty-five gifts were distributed by the Department, including three hundred and twenty-five stockings. Gifts were also taken by student nurses to the homes of patients for whom they were caring.

One hundred and twenty-five dinners from the Vanderbilt Fund and five from Mr. Vincent Astor, through Bellevue Hospital Social Service, brought Christmas cheer of a very practical nature to many of our families.

To Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt, Sr., who although absent in France, is sending daily forty quarts of milk, we are deeply indebted for this most useful gift. We are most grateful also to Mrs.

Ogden Mills for her generous donation of four hundred dollars, and to the Walker-Gordon Laboratory who continue to send us a daily supply of from four to forty quarts. This milk is used principally for babies, under-nourished children and tuberculous patients, many of whom would otherwise be without this nourishment. We sincerely appreciate the splendid co-operation of the many convalescent homes and charitable agencies with our work. The House Staff and Out-Patient Staffs have been most cordial in support of the work. They are always ready to co-operate in constructive work, either in the Hospital or in the homes of the patients.

A cordial invitation is extended to graduates of any school of nursing needing hospital care, to use "The Eliza DeWitt Memorial Room," endowed by Mrs. Morris K. Jesup in memory of her mother. This private room, constantly in use, is highly appreciated by nurses overtaken by illness.

Mr. Lewis Cass Ledyard has made a generous contribution of two thousand five hundred dollars to the Endowment Fund of the School of Nursing, which we wish to acknowledge with grateful thanks. We hope this much needed fund will grow into a substantial sum for the improvement of the educational facilities of the School.

We also wish to acknowledge another liberal gift of seven hundred dollars from Mr. Fred L. Lavanburg to form a relief fund for the nurses who have served in the great war.

The "Week-end Camp," with maintenance, which has been given for the last seven years by Mr. and Mrs. J. Kennedy Tod, is much appreciated by the nursing Staff, over eighty of whom have enjoyed the sea air amidst delightful surroundings.

To the many kind friends who have so generously remembered our Nursing Staff by providing delightful outings, tickets for the opera, theatre, etc., we extend our warm and grateful thanks.

I wish to express my appreciation of the loyalty and co-operation rendered by the Attending Staff, the House Staff and Nursing Staff, and to thank your Board and the School of Nursing Committee for their unflinching support in our work.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE ALUMNAE ASSOCIATION OF THE SCHOOL OF NURSING OF THE PRESBYTERIAN HOSPITAL IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK

September 30, 1919.

TO THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE PRESBYTERIAN HOSPITAL IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK:

Gentlemen:

I have the honor of presenting to you the report of the Alumnae Association of the School of Nursing for the year ending September 30th, the fifth report to appear in the Annual Report of the Hospital.

The great event of the year was the return, in February, of our Overseas Unit. It is fitting that in this report special note should be made that the Chief Nurse, Mrs. Janet B. Christie, brought her Unit home in excellent condition, and intact, save for one member, who, it will be recalled, made the supreme sacrifice in January of the first year in France.

The Pension Fund has reached the \$100,000 mark this year, through a gift of \$25,000, presented at the Graduating Exercises for the Class of 1919, by Mr. William Sloane, whose never-failing interest in the affairs of the graduates of the school is deeply appreciated.

The epidemic of influenza invaded the ranks of the Association and brought to a tragic end the life of Miss Jean Hayman of the Class of 1908, for many years identified so closely with the work of the Training School, and known to many who were interested in the Hospital. Mrs. Edith Doolittle Thomas, Class 1917, also fell a victim of the disease. Miss Margaret E. Baker, 1904, a member of the Unit, died after her return to her home in Canada, following an operation for appendicitis.

Many of our members are still "in service," at home and abroad, doing reconstruction and relief work, but with so many of our nurses at home, and our nursing activities returning to a more normal course, it will be possible for us to resume work on the Pension Fund. The Fund should be at work, and plans for its operation, and its increase are ahead of us. We trust that our administration of this Fund will justify the faith that has been expressed by those who have helped and who shall help to build it up.

It is a privilege to use this opportunity to thank the Managers for the kindness and consideration shown to the members of this Association on all occasions.

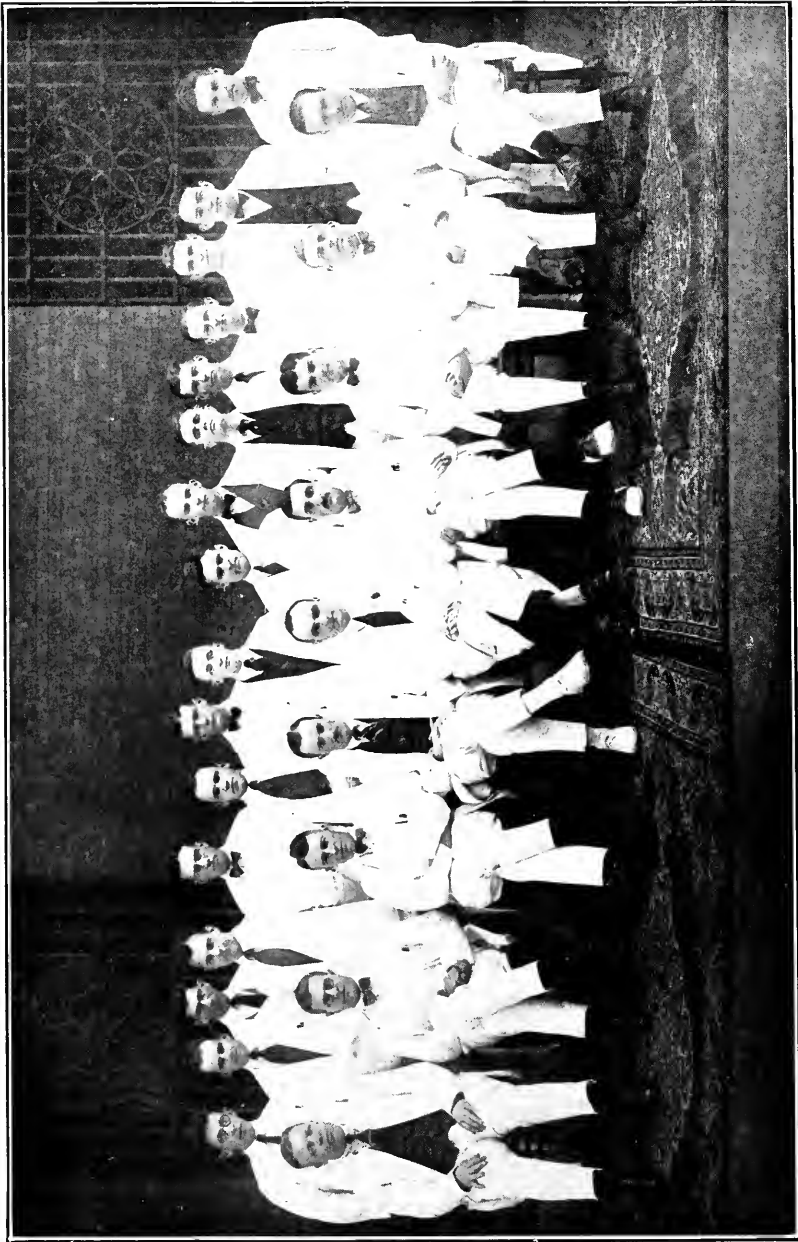

CHARTER

AN ACT

TO FOUND A PRESBYTERIAN HOSPITAL IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Passed February 28, 1868.—Chapter 15.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. James Lenox, John Taylor Johnston, Robert L. Stuart, Morris K. Jesup, Marshall S. Bidwell, and their associates, as hereinafter named, shall constitute a body corporate, with power to establish, maintain, and conduct a Hospital in the City of New York, which shall be known and designated as "THE PRESBYTERIAN HOSPITAL IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK."

SECTION 2. The property and concerns of said Corporation shall be vested in and managed by a Board of thirty-two Managers (by act of March 28, 1868, increased to thirty-six Managers), to be constituted as provided for in the following section.

SECTION 3. James Brown, Marshall S. Bidwell, William A. Booth, Aaron B. Belknap, William E. Dodge, James Donaldson, John C. Green, Winthrop S. Gilman, Robert M. Hartley, Richard Irvin, Edward S. Jaffray, Thomas Jeremiah, Morris K. Jesup, John Taylor Johnston, James Lenox, David Olyphant, William Paton, Thomas C. M. Paton, Joseph Stuart, Robert L. Stuart, Thomas U. Smith, Jonathan Sturges, Otis D. Swan, Charles N. Talbot, Willard Parker, M.D., John R. Ford, Henry M. Taber, Alexander Van Rensselaer, William M. Vermilye, Washington R. Vermilye, A. R. Wetmore, and A. Robertson Walsh, thirty-two in number, shall constitute a part of the Board of Managers. To these thirty-two Managers, the Rev. William M. Paxton, D.D., as Minister of the First Presbyterian Church; the Rev. William Adams, D.D., as Minister of the Madison Square Presbyterian Church; the Rev. Thomas Dewitt, D.D., as Senior Minister of the Collegiate Church of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church, and the Rev. John N. McLeod, D.D., as Minister of the First Reformed Presbyterian Church, all in the City of New York, and their successors in office for the time being, shall, by virtue of their respective offices, be associated as members of the Board of Managers.

SECTION 4. As soon as practicable after the passage of this Act, the said Board shall organize, and by lot divide the thirty-two Managers into four classes of eight each, and the places of the said classes shall be vacant respectively on the second Wednesday in April, one, two, three, and four years thereafter, so that eight Managers shall be elected by the said Board of Managers annually, by ballot, to hold their seats for four years.

SECTION 5. The Board of Managers shall have power to fill all vacancies that may occur in the said Board, to enact By-Laws, and to appoint all such agents, assistants, and attendants as may be proper to carry out the purposes of the said Corporation. Among these shall be included a Superintendent and a Chaplain or both a Superintendent and a Chaplain; but these positions shall be held only by Presbyterians.

SECTION 6. Not less than eleven Managers shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of electing Officers, making or changing By-Laws, or for holding any special meeting; but for all other purposes, and at stated meetings, seven shall be a quorum.

SECTION 7. The said Corporation are authorized to take by purchase, devise, or otherwise, and may hold, transfer, and convey, for the purposes of said Hospital, all the real and personal property of which it may become possessed, in so far as the same is in accordance with the general laws of this State, and not otherwise, and which said property shall be exempt from taxation, and shall be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of law relating to charitable institutions.

SECTION 8. This Corporation shall possess the general powers, and be subject to the provisions, restrictions, and liabilities contained in the 3d Title of the 18th Chapter of Part First of the Revised Statutes.

SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect immediately.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.

TITLE.

The name by which this Society shall be known shall be, "THE PRESBYTERIAN HOSPITAL IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK."

ARTICLE II.

OBJECT.

The object of the Society is the establishment, support and management of an Institution for the purpose of affording medical and surgical aid and nursing to sick or disabled persons of every creed, nationality, and color. The public religious services in the Hospital shall be in conformity with the doctrine and forms of the Presbyterian or Reformed Church.

ARTICLE III.

THE SOCIETY.

The Society shall consist of Life Members, who shall respectively be approved by a majority of members of the Board of Managers present at a stated meeting, and who shall have been nominated at a previous stated meeting by a Standing Committee appointed for that purpose by the Board.

ARTICLE IV.

ENDOWED BEDS.

The Board of Managers may fix amounts which when paid shall entitle the donor to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge, subject, however, to such rules and regulations for the admission, treatment, and discharge of patients as are now, or shall be hereafter, prescribed by said Board.

Where such nomination is accorded during life, or in perpetuity, the amount paid therefor shall be kept invested in income-producing securities until the privilege may lapse by the death of the donor or otherwise.

ARTICLE V.

PROPERTY.

All the property of the Society shall be applied to advance the general objects of the Society, except where it has been otherwise specially directed by the donor or testator.

ARTICLE VI.

GOVERNMENT.

The affairs of the Society shall be under the direction of a Board of thirty-six Managers, thirty-two of whom shall be divided into four classes of eight each; and the places of the said classes shall be vacant respectively on the second Wednesday of April, at the end of one, two, three and four years thereafter, so that Eight Managers shall be elected by the said Board annually, by ballot, to hold their seats for four years. To these thirty-two Managers, the Minister of the First Presbyterian Church, the Minister of the Madison Square Presbyterian Church, the Senior Minister of the Collegiate Church of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church, and the Minister of the First Reformed Presbyterian Church, all in the City of New York, by virtue of their respective offices, for the time being shall be added as members of the Board of Managers. The officers of the Society shall consist of a President, a Vice-President, a Treasurer, a Corresponding Secretary, and a Recording Secretary, who shall be selected annually by the said Board of Managers, from their own number, and shall also be Officers of the said Board. The said Officers and Managers, together, shall form a Board, to be denominated the "Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York," not less than eleven of whom shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of electing Officers, making or changing By-Laws, or for holding any special meeting; but seven shall be a quorum, for all other purposes, and for stated meetings. The Board of Managers shall at all times be fully authorized to execute all powers of the Society, over all the estate and property of the Society. To it shall be committed the care of the funds of the Institution; authority to make By-Laws, Rules, and Regulations, and to alter and amend the same; to fill vacancies in their own body, choose the Officers of the Society, appoint agents, assistants, and attendants, and generally to transact the entire business of the Society.

ARTICLE VII.

MEETINGS OF THE BOARD.

The Board of Managers shall hold stated meetings on the second Tuesday of April, June, August, October, December, and February, and may hold adjourned meetings when necessary. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the President, or, in case of his absence or inability to act, by the Vice-President, or on the written requisition of five members of the Board of Managers; but when special meetings are called, the time and place of meeting, and the subject proposed to be considered, shall be notified to the members at least two days previous to the meeting; and no other subject shall be discussed or acted upon at such meetings.

ARTICLE VIII.

ANNUAL MEETING.

A meeting of the members of the Society shall be held annually on such day between the 15th of October and 1st of January as the Board of Managers may appoint. It shall be the duty of the Board of Managers to make the necessary arrangements for this meeting; to present to the members a report of the proceedings of the previous years; to exhibit a statement of the funds and property of the Society; and also to give information of any matters relating to the objects of the Society which may be of interest or importance.

At the stated meeting of the Board in April eight members shall be chosen by ballot from among the members of the Society to supply the places of the class of managers whose term of service is about to expire. These eight members, together with those composing the three other classes, and the four *ex-officio* members of the Board, shall constitute the Board of Managers for the ensuing year, and shall continue in office until their successors are elected. In case of failure to make such elections on the appointed day, a special meeting of the Board shall be called for that purpose.

ARTICLE IX.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

Amendments to the Constitution shall be proposed in writing at a regular meeting of the Board of Managers, and may be acted on at the next regular meeting of the Board, or at a special meeting called for that purpose; and shall be adopted only on a concurrence of a majority of the members present, but the affirmative vote must not be less than eleven.

BY-LAWS

OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS.

I.—RULES AND REGULATIONS.

The Board of Managers shall prescribe rules and regulations respecting the management of the affairs of the Hospital. Such rules and regulations shall not be inconsistent with these By-Laws, and may be amended at any meeting of the Board of Managers by a majority of those present.

II.—PRESIDENT.

The President shall preside at the meetings of the Board. He shall appoint all special Committees, unless otherwise ordered, and shall perform such other duties as may be required by the Constitution and By-Laws. He shall also be ex-officio, a member of all committees.

III.—VICE-PRESIDENT.

In the event of a vacancy of the office of President, or during his absence or inability to act, his duties and powers shall devolve upon the Vice-President. Should he also be unable to act, a President pro tem shall be chosen by the Board.

IV.—TREASURER.

The Treasurer shall be charged with the custody of all papers and documents relating to the property of the Corporation, other than such as are mentioned in By-Law V., of all moneys belonging thereto, and of the seal. He shall keep an account in the name of the Corporation with an institution approved by the Board, and shall deposit therein all moneys immediately upon receiving them. He shall cause to be kept such accounts as may be necessary to show the receipts, expenditures, and financial condition of the Institution, or as may be required by the Finance Committee. These accounts shall be open at all suitable times to the inspection of the Managers. He shall pay no moneys without proper order, as is elsewhere provided.

V.—SAFE-KEEPING OF SECURITIES

All bonds, stocks, and other invested securities and evidences of value shall be kept in a safe in the vault of a Safe Deposit Company to be taken in the name of the Hospital. Access to the safe containing the securities shall only be had by the Treasurer when accompanied by a member of the Finance Committee, or in the absence of the Treasurer by any two mem-

bers of the Finance Committee. A record shall be made of each visit to the vault in a book provided for that purpose, stating over the signature of the visitors all changes made in the contents of the safe, and when no changes are made, the object of the visit.

VI.—SECRETARY.

The Secretary shall be the Recording and Corresponding Secretary and shall keep the minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Managers, and preserve such records and papers as do not pertain to the office of Treasurer. He shall also be ex-officio a member of the Executive Committee and shall keep minutes of said Committee. He shall notify members of all meetings of the Board of Managers at least two days before the meeting. He shall notify members of their appointment on Committees, and generally perform such duties as usually pertain to the office.

He shall have charge of the correspondence of the Board, and shall prepare the Annual Report of the Managers and attend to its publication.

VII.—COMMITTEES.

At the meeting in April, after filling the vacancies about to occur in their Board, the Managers shall elect an Executive Committee of eight members, a dispensary Committee of five members, a Training-School Committee of three or more members, a House Committee of three or more members, a Finance Committee of five members, of which the Treasurer shall be one, a Committee on nominations of five members, of which the Secretary shall be one, and an Auditing Committee of two members. The members appointed on these Committees shall hold office for one year from the second Wednesday in April next ensuing, unless otherwise ordered by the Board, and shall keep minutes of their proceedings, which shall be submitted to the Board at its stated meetings. The Board shall also appoint two of its members for each month of the year, who shall serve as an Inspecting Committee. If any manager thus appointed shall be unable to attend during the time allotted to him, it shall be his duty to procure some other manager to attend in his stead.

VIII.—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee shall consist of the eight Managers chosen as provided in By-Law VIII, to whom shall be added the two Managers serving as the Inspecting Committee, and the members of the Dispensary, Training School and House Committees.

1. The Committee shall meet on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month and may hold special meetings when necessary, or when called by the Chairman or two members of the Committee. Three shall constitute a quorum.

2. The Executive Committee shall give such orders and establish such rules and regulations as they shall deem necessary for the better carrying

into effect the object of this Institution, provided such rules and regulations be not inconsistent with those established by the Board of Managers.

3. All questions relating to the admission, rejection and discharge of patients shall be decided by the Executive Committee, in conformity with the directions of the Board of Managers.

4. In case the House Physician, House Surgeon, or any of their assistants, or any other officer or employee shall neglect any of the duties prescribed to them, or refuse to comply with any reasonable request of the Executive Committee or Superintendent, the Superintendent may suspend the offender, and he shall at once report his action to the Executive Committee.

5. The Executive Committee shall have general charge of all property within the precincts of the Hospital, and shall see that proper economy is observed in the administration of all its affairs, having due regard to the welfare of its beneficiaries. It shall audit and examine the accounts of the Superintendent; and authorize such repairs and disbursements as may from time to time be necessary, and shall draw drafts upon the Treasurer therefor; such drafts, except for the monthly pay-roll and supplies, shall not exceed \$1,000 without authority of the Board therefor; shall be signed by the Chairman and Secretary for the time being of the Committee; and shall be a sufficient voucher for the Treasurer.

IX.—OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT COMMITTEE.

The Out-Patient Department Committee shall consist of five Managers. It shall have the general care and oversight of the Out-Patient Department, and shall meet on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month.

X.—SCHOOL OF NURSING COMMITTEE.

The School of Nursing Committee shall consist of three or more Managers, who shall have the general care and oversight of the School of Nursing.

XI.—HOUSE COMMITTEE.

The House Committee shall consist of three or more Managers, and shall direct and control the purchasing of all food, fuel, equipment and repair supplies, and have general supervision of the equipment, maintenance and repair of real estate and buildings.

XII.—FINANCE COMMITTEE.

1. The Finance Committee shall consist of five Managers—one of whom shall be the Treasurer. Three shall constitute a quorum.

2. It shall be their duty to adopt proper means to augment the financial resources of the Institution, to direct and counsel the Treasurer in the investment, care and management of the finances, and to prescribe

such form of accounts and reports as are deemed necessary. All proposed investments must receive the approval of the Board of Managers or the Executive Committee.

XIII.—NOMINATING COMMITTEE.

1. The Nominating Committee shall consist of five Managers, of whom the Secretary shall be one. Three shall constitute a quorum.

2. In the case of a vacancy occurring in the Board of Managers they shall recommend to the Board the name of a Life Member to fill such vacancy, and to them shall be referred the names of all persons suggested for such position or for Life Membership; but no report of the Committee shall be acted upon until the next subsequent meeting of the Board, except with unanimous consent.

3. All persons nominated for positions on the House Staff shall be referred to this Committee. The names of such as shall be favorably considered by the Committee shall be by them reported to the Board of Managers.

XIV.—INSPECTING COMMITTEE.

1. The Inspecting Committee shall inspect all the Hospital buildings, visit the wards, service rooms, and laboratories and shall examine as to the cleanliness and order of all parts of the hospital and grounds.

2. They shall enter their report in a book, which book shall be laid before the Executive Committee at its meetings.

XV.—AUDITING COMMITTEE.

The Auditing Committee shall shortly after the close of each fiscal year examine and check the bonds, stocks, mortgages or other securities or evidences of value owned by the Hospital and shall also have the accounts of the Treasurer and Superintendent for the last fiscal year examined and checked by certified public accountants. The Committee shall thereafter report to the Board the result of such accounting with its recommendations.

XVI.—MEDICAL BOARD AND THE MEDICAL, SURGICAL AND LABORATORY SERVICE.

1. The Board of Managers shall appoint annually—

(a) A Director of the Surgical Service, a Director of the Medical Service, and a Director of the Pathological Service; these shall together constitute the Medical Board.

(b) As many Visiting Physicians and Surgeons, and Associate Visiting Physicians and Surgeons, as the service of the Hospital may require, a Visiting Physician to the Roentgen Ray Department, a visiting Bacteriologist, a Visiting Chemist, an Out-Patient Department Staff, and such other department chiefs and assistants as the various services of the Hospital may require.

(c) As many Assistant Physicians and Surgeons and special Consulting Physicians and Surgeons as the service of the Hospital may require.

(d) A House Staff, consisting of as many members as the service of the Hospital may require, and at such times and for such terms of service as shall seem best to meet the needs of the Hospital.

(e) A Registrar of the Out-Patient Department.

2. These appointments shall be made at some time prior to July 1st in each year. The appointees unless a different term be fixed by the Board shall hold office for one year and thereafter until further action of the Board.

XVII.—EXECUTIVE STAFF.

The Board of Managers shall appoint a Superintendent and such Assistants as the Board may deem necessary for the service of the Hospital, whose services shall continue during the pleasure of the Board.

The Board of Managers shall appoint a Director of the School of Nursing, and such Assistants as may be necessary for such service, and such appointees shall hold office during the pleasure of the Board.

XVIII.—ENDOWED BEDS.

1. A gift of \$7,500 shall entitle the donor and his successors to nominate, from time to time, an adult patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge.

2. A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor to a like privilege for the children's ward.

3. A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor, during life, to nominate, from time to time, a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge. In the case of a corporation or association the privilege shall expire in fifteen years.

4. Any person or corporation being the donor of a \$5,000 bed may increase their donation to \$7,500, in which case they shall become thenceforth entitled to the privilege that attaches to an original donation of that amount.

5. All endowed bed privileges are subject to the Rules and Regulations governing the admission, treatment and discharge of patients.

6. Contributions to the endowment fund of free beds, as above provided for, may be made by instalments, when the donor shall, in writing, so notify the Treasurer at the time of each payment. So long as the instalments so paid in shall not equal the sums required under the preceding sections, the amount received shall constitute a portion of the general endowment fund, the income of which shall be used for the payment of the current expenses of the Hospital, and no privileges shall accrue to the donor.

7. The Board of Managers shall have power in their discretion to make, under special and exceptional circumstances, such other arrangements (temporary or permanent) as to endowed beds as they may deem best calculated to promote the objects for which the Hospital was established and is now being maintained.

8. Certificates of the right to nominate patients to use and occupy beds free of charge shall be issued in such form as the Board of Managers may prescribe, and shall be signed by the President or Vice-President and Treasurer, who shall also affix the seal of the Corporation.

XIX.—APPROPRIATIONS OF MONEY.

Except in the cases provided for in Section 5 of By-law VIII. and Section 2 of By-Law XII, all appropriations of money shall be made by resolution of the Board of Managers. Orders for the amounts thus appropriated shall be drawn on the Treasurer by the President or presiding officer of the meeting, and be countersigned by the Secretary or Secretary pro tem, and when properly endorsed shall be sufficient voucher for the Treasurer.

XX.—COMPLAINTS, SUSPENSIONS, OR DISCHARGES.

If any officer, physician, or surgeon shall become unfit to execute his office, or shall conduct himself contrary to any of the Rules of the Hospital or refuse or neglect to execute the same, the Executive Committee, or any member of the Board of Managers may submit against him a complaint in writing, at a meeting duly called, and thereupon a notice of the said complaint shall be given to the person complained of, and a time shall be appointed (not less than six days after service of said notice) for the person complained of to make his defence before the Board of Managers; and the Board, having examined into the truth of the complaint, and heard the defence of the party accused, if any shall be made, may, with the concurrence and approbation of a majority of the Managers present, suspend or discharge the officer, physician, or surgeon complained of.

XXI.—ORDER OF BUSINESS.

The order of business shall be as follows:

1. The meeting shall be opened with prayer.
2. The roll shall be called, and the attending members noted.
3. The minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read, corrected if necessary, and approved.
4. Treasurer's Reports.
5. Reports of the Committees shall be called for, and order taken thereon.
6. Communications to the Board shall be received and considered.
7. Unfinished business.
8. New business.

XXII.—ALTERATIONS OR ADDITIONS.

Any amendment to the By-Laws shall be proposed in writing at a regular meeting of the Board of Managers, and may be acted on at the next regular meeting of the Board, or at a special meeting called for that purpose. It shall be adopted only on an affirmative vote of a majority of those present. A copy of any proposed amendment shall be mailed to each member of the Board at least three days prior to the next meeting.

RULES AS TO THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1. All ward patients are required to pay \$3.00 per day for board or such smaller sums as may be determined by the circumstances of the case, of which the Managers shall be the sole judges. Patients from New York City (Manhattan and Bronx), who are unable to pay are admitted free. Patients from out of town requiring operative treatment not obtainable at their homes may be admitted free if unable to pay. Other patients from out of town will not usually be admitted free, but this rule shall not apply to patients recommended for admission by members of the Board of Managers or by any of the Directors of Service.

2. Patients suffering from severe accident or serious illness will be admitted at any hour of the day or night. Other patients will be admitted between 9 A. M. and 5 P. M. If able, they must apply in person at the office of the Hospital, when they will be examined by a member of the House Staff or Surgeon on duty, and admitted by the Superintendent, subject to approval by the Executive Committee. If unable to apply in person, they shall be visited and examined by such Physician as may be appointed by the Executive Committee.

3. Patients may be admitted by the Superintendent on the recommendation of any Manager, after examination as to suitability by a member of the House Staff, or on the recommendation of any Physician or Surgeon of the Hospital.

4. No patient suffering from any readily communicable disease shall be admitted, nor any whose case does not require the special benefits of the Hospital; nor shall any patient be admitted whose case is judged to be incurable, unless there be urgent symptoms which, in the opinion of the Attending Physician or Surgeon, are capable of being relieved. There shall be no uterine nor vaginal examination made except in the presence of a nurse.

5. No patient suffering from erysipelas shall be admitted to either the Medical or Surgical Division of the Hospital.

6. There shall be recorded in the office daily the number of vacant beds.

7. Application for the admission of patients living out of the city must be accompanied by a certificate of some reputable physician, stating the nature and probable duration of the disease.

RULES FOR VISITORS.

1. Visitors will be admitted to the wards daily from 1 to 2 P. M., and on Sundays from 1 to 3 P. M., also on Tuesday and Friday evenings between 6 and 8 one visitor will be permitted, providing only one comes in the afternoon, and at no other time, except by special permission from the Superintendent.

2. Not more than two visitors will be admitted to see any patient on the same day.

3. Parents only (no children, relatives or friends) will be permitted to visit in the children's ward and for one-half hour only each visit.

Patients reported as seriously ill by the Physician or Surgeon will be permitted to see members of the family at any time.

4. Only fruit, jelly, and ice-cream can be brought for patients. Such packages must be left with the door clerk, and, if approved by the Physician, will be sent to the patients.

5. Visitors must observe perfect order and propriety while in the Hospital; must confine their visits to their immediate friends; must not stop or loiter in the halls, offices, or on stairways, and must leave the building promptly at the end of visiting hours.

Any violations of these rules may subject the offender to exclusion from the premises.

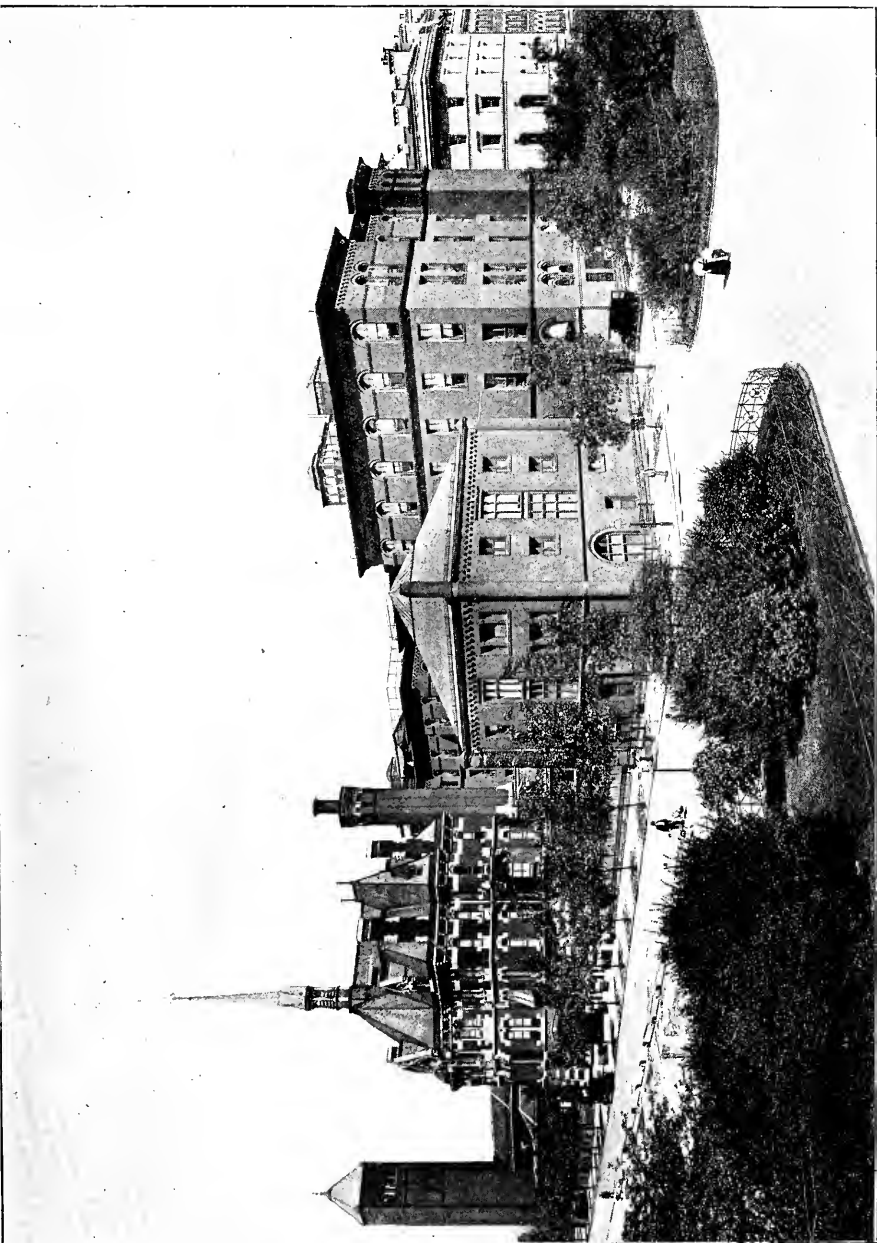

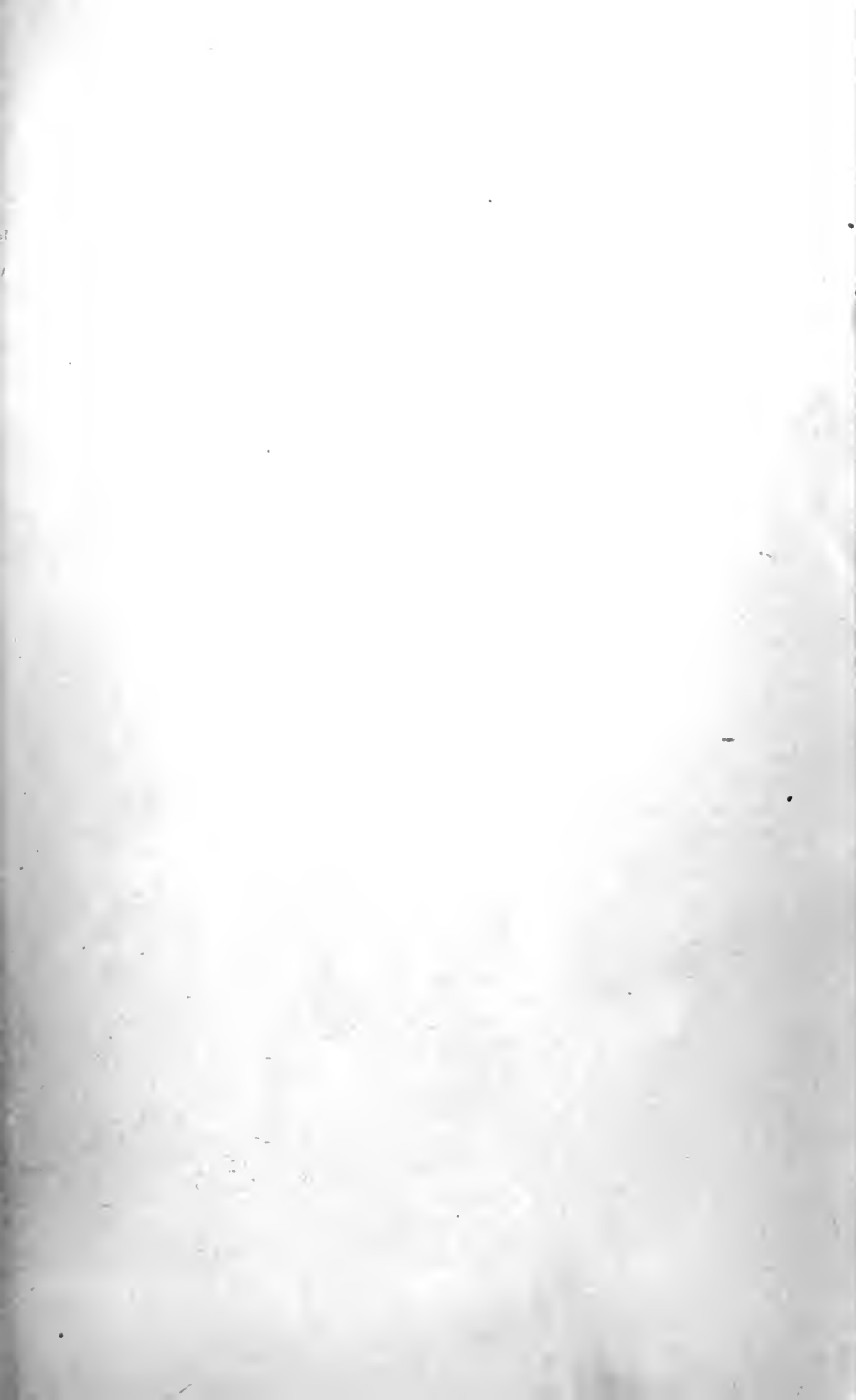

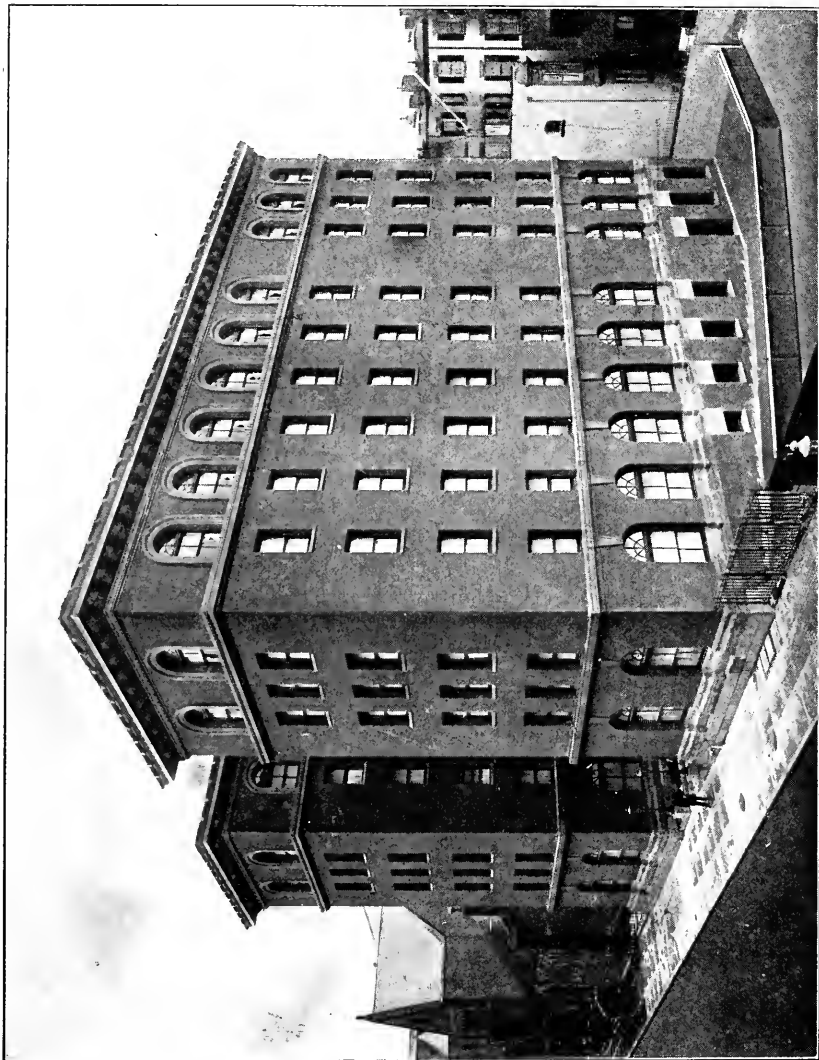






General View of the Hospital from Park Ave.

It is impossible to estimate at their full value the services rendered by Mr. Thorne as Treasurer of the Hospital. He did not consider that his duties were limited merely to the custodianship of the funds of the Hospital, but devoted much time and effort in personal supervision of all the financial affairs of the institution, and exercised great vigilance over the expenditures of the Hospital.

The standardization of hospital accounting systems of leading hospitals throughout the country was devised by Mr. Thorne. He was also the founder of the Hospital Bureau of Standards and Supplies, which has proved an important factor in reducing the cost of administration.

The Board of Managers hereby records its profound sense of the serious loss which it has sustained in the death of one who loved the Hospital and gave so much of himself to it, and its deep realization of personal loss in the death of a devoted friend and adviser; and directs that this memorial be spread upon its minutes and a copy sent to Mr. Thorne's family.

Mr. Delano brought to the Board of Managers a cultivated mind and a magnetic and lovable personality.

Though conservative by nature, he approved of every forward step taken by the Board better to relieve suffering, and to increase the facilities for the study of disease.

The interest which he took in the Training School for Nurses meant much to that branch of the Hospital service.

He was most conscientious in the performance of his every duty as a Manager, even when in recent years it involved great physical effort on his part.

TO THE SOCIETY, TO THE CHURCHES WHICH IT REPRESENTS, AND TO THE PUBLIC:

This Annual Report, it will be noticed, is for the calendar year 1920; the fiscal year of the Presbyterian Hospital having been changed to correspond with the calendar year. All comparative figures are for the same period.

Since the last report was issued, quite a number of structural changes have been made to meet some pressing needs in the Dispensary, the Bacteriological Laboratory and the X-Ray Department; and a thorough overhauling of the machinery in the Hospital and Nurses' Home has been made. A Basal Metabolism Laboratory and a very complete Dental Clinic have been established, and modern baking machines installed.

In the Medical and Surgical services, the year has witnessed steady progress, not only in better organization but in further study of problems of clinical medicine, with most satisfactory results.

The Hospital has treated nearly thirty thousand people in the past twelve months.

Our Training School for Nurses graduated last May a Class numbering fifty-eight. We have been glad to welcome, for short periods of observation, nurses from Europe, desiring to study American methods of nursing. The new demands arising in the broadening field of nursing are requiring additional facilities which we are endeavoring to supply.

The property on the East River, between 67th and 68th Streets, purchased a dozen years ago for a new Hospital site, has been sold; the Managers having concluded that it was both inadequate and unsuitable for such a purpose.

The legacy of five hundred thousand dollars from the Estate of Mrs. Russell Sage has been paid during the past year.

To the Volunteer Aides who have proved so helpful in our Out-Patient Service, we would extend our hearty thanks.

The entire Hospital Staff has worked together with most commendable devotion and in complete harmony.

The death, on February sixth, 1920, of our Treasurer, Mr. W. V. S. Thorne, was a very heavy blow to the Presbyterian Hospital. For twenty-two years he had devoted time and energy to the work of his office and had rendered to the Private Hospitals in this City a most valuable service by his establishing the Bureau of Hospital Standards and Supplies, and by devising a uniform method of Hospital Accounting.

In Mr. Eugene Delano's death the Presbyterian Hospital sustained the loss of another constant friend and a most devoted Manager.

The Resolutions adopted by the Board of Managers, regarding their two associates, are printed elsewhere in this report.

Purposes for Which Income or Principal of Reserve Funds Is Used

Endowed Bed Fund, General Endowment Fund, Perry McDonough Collins Endowment Fund, Fiske Fund, Edwin Bancroft Foote Fund, Morris K. and Maria De Witt Jesup Fund, Margarett A. Jones Fund, John Stewart Kennedy Fund, Russell and Margaret Olivia Sage Memorial Fund, Sidman Trust Fund, Fund in Memory of John T. Terry, The Isaac E. Valentine Memorial Fund and Moses Weinman Fund. The income from these funds is applied toward the current expenses of the Hospital.

General Fund. Unrestricted legacies received since 1911 have been credited to this fund. It is intended to use the income of this fund to partly meet the current expenses of the Hospital and to draw on the principal, when necessary, to meet expenditures not otherwise provided for.

The Mrs. Frederic Baker Pathological Department Fund. To supply books, periodicals, and instruments for use in the Pathological Laboratory.

Charles K. Briddon Gold Medal Fund. The income from this fund provides the Dr. C. K. Briddon Gold Medal competed for every two years by members of the Alumni of the Presbyterian Hospital, who write essays requiring original research.

Cardiac Clinic Fund. For the treatment of cardiac cases by the Out-Patient Department.

Cheney Fund. To carry out certain investigations bearing upon glands of internal secretion.

Dental Department Fund. For the support of the Dental Department.

Dortic Memorial Fund. The principal of this fund may be applied to the erection and maintenance of a Convalescent Home in connection with the Hospital. Accumulated income may be used for the maintenance of Presbyterian Hospital patients in some approved Convalescent Home or Homes.

Mrs. David Dows Fund. The income from this fund is used to purchase scientific instruments for use in the Hospital for the study and cure of disease.

Margaret E. Dows Fund. The income from this fund is applied toward the current expenses of the School of Nursing.

East River Homes Fund. To meet the expenses of tubercular work in connection with patients in the district assigned to this Hospital by the Board of Health.

Fund for Educational and Scientific Work. The income from this fund is used for the support of the educational and scientific work of the Hospital, in accordance with the agreement between the Hospital and Columbia University.

Flower Fund. To meet the cost of filling and maintaining flower boxes throughout the Hospital.

The Katie Geitz Fund. To meet expenses of the Diet Kitchen established for the benefit of tubercular patients and children in our district.

The Harriman Fund for Surgical Research. To pay expenses of surgical research workers at the Presbyterian Hospital doing pneumonia research work.

Hill Top Camp Fund. For the support of a camp at Hawthorne, N. Y., to which are sent the children of tubercular patients of the Out-Patient Department Clinic.

Holiday Cheer Fund. To provide decorations, entertainments, presents or other holiday cheer throughout the Hospital to patients, staff, nurses and employees.

House Staff Entertainment Fund. To provide recreation, entertainment, etc., for members of the House Staff.

House Staff Library Fund. To provide medical periodicals and books for the House Staff Library.

Howland Fund. To defray the expenses of treatment and research work on certain forms of epilepsy.

Dr. Francis P. Kinnicutt Memorial Fund. To defray the cost of a Medical Ward in the new Presbyterian Hospital Buildings, when erected. The income is added to the principal.

Nurses' Cheer Fund. To provide entertainment and recreation for Nurses.

Patients' Cheer Fund. To provide occupational work and instruction, games, etc., for patients.

Patients' Relief Fund. To meet expenses account special relief for patients, not directly chargeable to the Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt Fund for Visiting Nursing.

Personal Injury Liability Insurance Fund. To pay approved claims against the Hospital for personal injuries sustained by employees while on the Hospital premises for which the Hospital is liable.

Room J. Trust Fund. The income from this fund is used to provide delicacies and extra nursing for patients occupying Room "J."

Fund in Memory Clara Alsop Russell. To purchase apparatus for the study and treatment of patients suffering from heart trouble.

Sarah Sanford Fund. To provide temporary relief, apparatus and transportation for convalescents.

School of Nursing Endowment Fund. The income from this fund is used to maintain the educational work of the School of Nursing.

School of Nursing Library Fund. To provide periodicals and books for the School of Nursing Library.

School of Nursing Scholarship Fund. To provide scholarships for students in the School of Nursing, and traveling scholarships for graduates of the School.

H. Smith Periodical Fund. To provide periodicals for the wards of the Hospital.

George H. F. Schrader Fund, Tompkins Fund and Wall Fund. The income from each of these funds is paid to a beneficiary during life, and thereafter becomes the property of the Hospital.

Staff Educational Fund. To enable members of the surgical staff to visit other surgical clinics to familiarize themselves with the most modern surgical practice in other institutions.

The Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt Fund for Visiting Nursing and Relief. Provides the salary of one instructor, one social service worker, the maintenance and equipment of three student nurses, one clerical secretary, and administration of the Department. It also provides relief for Out-Patient Department patients, and loans to needy patients for surgical appliances, etc.

Charles S. Ward Fund and its accumulated income is held to make up any deficiency which may occur by reason of administration expenses, etc., in a trust fund of \$10,000 bequeathed to the Hospital by the late Charles S. Ward to endow in perpetuity two beds in the Hospital, one in memory of his friend, Sophia L. Kinman, and one in memory of himself, which trust fund is subject to the life estate of a nephew.

Frances Swan Welles Fund. One-half of the income from this fund is used to brighten and cheer the lives of trained nurses employed from time to time in the Hospital, and the other half to brighten and cheer the lives of patients in the general wards of the Hospital.

The Salaries of Operating Room Nurses and Operating Room Technicians are distributed in proportion to the numbers of Private Room Surgical Patients and Ward Surgical Patients treated.

METHOD OF FIGURING COST OF DIFFERENT BRANCHES OF SERVICE:

The method in use at the Presbyterian Hospital of figuring the total cost of caring for Ward Patients, Private Room Patients, Out-Patient Department Patients or Patients visited in their homes is to charge each branch of the service with salaries and wages of all persons employed exclusively by, and all supplies and repairs directly chargeable to, such service, and to prorate the other operating expenses available to this cost on the ground of relative service in each proportion as the Superintendent and his Assistants may consider most fair after careful consideration of the local conditions, which, of course, subject to change from time to time. In determining the relative proportions of Administration Expenses, Professional Care of Patients, Housekeeping, Kitchen, etc., not including the amounts directly chargeable to Out-Patient Department and Visiting Nursing, the percentage charged to Ward Patients and to Private Room Patients is based upon the number of days' treatment furnished to each service, counted by weeks, or, in some instances, the fact that a private room patient occupies a ward bed for a week when the important fact that the food and the preparation of it costs very much more than that of the ward patient. The distribution of the cost of General House and Property Expenses among the different branches of the service is based upon the relative cubic contents of these parts of the building occupied by each of the five service divisions.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

December 31, 1920.

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital.

Gentlemen:—The Fifty-second Annual Report of the Superintendent of the Hospital for the fifteen months ending December 31, 1920, is herewith respectfully submitted.

Twenty-nine thousand three hundred and ninety-two persons have experienced the benefits of the Hospital during the year. The departments contributing this service and the number treated in each were as follows:

There were treated in the beds of the wards and private rooms of the Hospital 5,560 persons. The daily average has been 230. Of the patients in the wards 27.7% were treated free of charge.

There were treated in the Out-Patient Department 18,910 persons, and the daily average visits made were 300.

Our Visiting Nurses cared for 4,922 persons, making 28,986 visits.

In the Roentgen Ray Department 18,471 plates and films were taken of 8,434 patients from the Hospital and Out-Patient Department.

The Department of Massage and Medical Gymnastics, under the able direction of Mr. Carl S. Hall, has increased in value and has given 6,857 treatments.

Structural changes during the year have been as follows:

A mezzanine floor covering about one-third of the upper part of the Pathological Laboratory adds greatly to the efficiency of that department.

The Bacteriological Laboratory has been increased about one-third, giving accommodation to more workers.

The nurses' demonstration room has been moved into new quarters in the annex of the Children's Ward, thereby giving room for the establishment of a basal metabolism laboratory, which, we believe, has added much to the accuracy of diagnoses and treatment.

The X-Ray Department has been enlarged by two rooms, one for exhibition of plates, and one for urological X-ray work.

The approach from the nurses' demonstration room to the X-ray laboratory has been roofed over to make it possible to reach the demonstration room without passing through the Children's Ward.

About fifteen hundred square feet of floor space has been added to the Dispensary by filling in the areaway between the north wall of the Dispensary and the south wall of the Pathological Laboratory.

An X-ray developing room has been built in the basement of the Dispensary for the use of our newly organized Dental Department.

Following are the more important changes in equipment:

A double telephone switchboard was made necessary by the greatly increased number of calls.

New elevator machinery was installed in the nurses' home. the old controller having worn out after nearly twenty years of service.

Many changes replacing worn-out machinery were necessary in the engine room. The engines and pumps had a complete overhauling, new connections made for the high-pressure tanks of the hydraulic elevators, and extensive repairs made to burned out boiler flues.

Much reconstruction work, made necessary by the wearing out of the old machinery and recent developments in X-ray technique, has been accomplished in the X-Ray Department. The electric current as developed by our engine room is not efficient for modern X-ray work; therefore, connection has been established with the Edison current.

An entirely new outfit of modern baking machines has been added to the Massage Department, replacing worn-out equipment. It is expected that the new baking machines will eventually pay for their cost in the saving of current effected.

We have added to the protection of life and property by establishing regular fire drills under the direction of an expert.

The Hospital has attracted several students of administrative work, who have stayed from several days to three months in observation and study through the Superintendent's office. One of these, a hospital superintendent from South America, spent over three months studying our methods of executive work.

Many new developments and items of special interest, instituted or continued throughout the year, are mentioned in the reports of the heads of departments, to which your attention is especially invited.

Mr. James U. Norris, Assistant Superintendent, resigned on January 15, 1920, after three years' efficient and loyal service, to accept the superintendency of the Woman's Hospital. Miss Ruth T. Dean was made Assistant Superintendent upon that date.

The advice and co-operation of the Board of Managers, and the helpfulness of those associated in the daily routine of hospital work, is greatly appreciated, and has made possible the year's accomplishments.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF MEDICAL SERVICE

December 31, 1920.

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital.

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to submit the following report from the Medical Service.

In the Fall of 1919, the reconstruction of the Medical Staff which was necessary after the changes incidental to the return of many of the members from military service, was completed, and the routine work of the Hospital has been conducted, since then, with only one important interruption; namely, the epidemic of influenza in January and February, 1920.

Reports of the recurrence of the epidemic in one or two cities gave warning of a return of the disease in New York, and, consequently, every possible preparation was made to meet this emergency, should it arrive. These preparations were scarcely completed when patients with influenza applied in great numbers for admission to the Hospital. All four medical wards were reserved exclusively for influenza patients. These wards were cubicled, and all the attending physicians and the members of the nursing staff who worked in them were gowned and masked. The severity of the epidemic was such that it was necessary to have practically the entire attending staff on duty at the time. Later in the epidemic, two surgical wards were used for convalescent patients.

The appointment of a resident on the medical service, a few years ago, has added greatly to the efficiency of the routine work in the wards, and, with the adoption of the present plan of a fifteen months' service for medical and surgical house officers, it was necessary to appoint two assistant resident physicians to work under the direction of the resident. For the first time in several years, appointments on the house staff were open to graduates in Medicine of other schools than Columbia, and, early in 1920, graduates from the Harvard Medical School, the Johns Hopkins Medical School, University of Virginia and Washington University Medical School in St. Louis, as well as the Columbia Medical School, were appointed to serve for fifteen months on the Medical Service. This has undoubtedly created an atmosphere in the wards of the hospital which is highly conducive to the best interests of the patients.

The continuing increase in the numbers of patients applying for treatment in the Dispensary, and the enlargement of the medical staff in the Out-Patient Department, have been the cause of so much crowding in the space devoted to them in the Dispensary that it seemed essential to enlarge the building by the addition of several rooms. This addition was therefore constructed early in 1920 and has increased the floor space of the Dispensary considerably. These extra rooms are well lighted and provided with running water and

are now in full operation, and relieve considerably the previous congestion. Instruction to the Third Year Students is given as usual on four afternoons a week throughout the teaching year, in the Dispensary of the Hospital.

Several investigations in problems in clinical medicine have been in progress. For these investigations the laboratories of chemistry and metabolism, biology and electrocardiography have been constantly utilized. With the installation of the calorimeter, it has been possible to diagnose with more accuracy and study with more care, cases of Hyperthyroidism and Graves' Disease. A group of attending physicians, in combination with the surgeons, are now studying intensively the best methods of treatment for these patients. Through the kindness of Mr. Charles P. Howland, the sum of \$5,000 has been donated for investigations in epilepsy. This investigation is under the direct charge of Dr. H. Rawle Geyelin. Unfortunately, the space in the Chemical Laboratory of the Hospital is so limited that part of the work which is being undertaken by a chemist has necessarily been transferred to the laboratory of Clinical Pathology at the College of Physicians and Surgeons. Another donation of \$5,000 has quite recently come from the Misses Cheney, through Dr. Draper. This fund is to be devoted to the study of diseases of the endocrine glands, and will be carried out partly in the wards of the Hospital and partly in the Dispensary. Through the efforts of Dr. T. Stuart Hart, there has been obtained a salary for an extra nurse who will devote her time to the cardiac clinic, which will be of great assistance in building up this part of the hospital work.

The Janeway Memorial Library has been increased by many volumes, namely, 702 books, and a very valuable collection of books, donated by Mrs. Henry Dakin from the library of Dr. Christian A. Herter.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF SURGICAL SERVICE

December 31, 1920.

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Gentlemen:—During the past year the Surgical Service has continued its reorganization from conditions necessitated by the war. The policy of making changes slowly, which was determined upon, has resulted in less disturbance than a revolutionary method would have done.

The readjustment of services among the various Attendings, although entailing hardships on certain members, has greatly improved the administration of work, and has resulted in the more efficient care of the patients. With the large personnel demanding opportunity for the use of the operating rooms, it has become necessary to rearrange the schedule in this department, and the problem has been successfully solved by dividing the attending staff into two groups, one operating during the morning hours, the other during afternoons. This entailed a complete change in the schedule of hours for duty of the nursing staff. This rearrangement has been effected without great disturbance, largely on account of the cordial and sympathetic co-operation of Miss Maxwell. With this change we hope that it will be possible to give an adequate operating room training to all our pupil nurses.

After a year's experience with a continuous service for members of the house staff it has become evident that the plan does not result in the best care of patients, due to the very active service at the Presbyterian and the large proportion of cases of an acute nature. Although in principle it is the most rational way of training a house staff, it requires too large a personnel and a service extending over more than a year. On this account we have returned to a rotating service, and hope with a resident staff to obviate the evils which were evident in that system.

We have been able during the past year to place our system of admitting patients on the basis which we hoped for prior to the war. This held up our plans, but now we feel that the system is based on correct principles. We have established a diagnosis section in the Out-Patient Department. This is in charge of the attending staff each morning, and here the patients applying for admission are given as complete an examination as possible, in order to arrive at a correct diagnosis, so that on their admission to the wards there will be no unnecessary delay in carrying out the appropriate treatment. This saves the patient many days hospital care and has enabled the Hospital to increase the number of people served by it. The plan is still in an experimental stage, and we find difficulties which were not anticipated. There are a certain number of people

who, when they come to the Hospital seeking advice, consider they are ill enough to be admitted immediately and who have made all arrangements at their homes for the care of their family. These people resent somewhat this preliminary investigation, and we have had to abrogate our rule, and make exception and admit them immediately. It will require a certain amount of education of the public in order to have them appreciate its many advantages. We have lost track of a certain number of cases after they have been worked up, and we hope to be able through the social service and follow-up department to ascertain the causes which have resulted in this failure of a certain group to return. The work which has been done on these cases has not been entirely lost, however, because, during the study of their condition, they have served as valuable material for teaching the fourth year students who do a larger part of the work in the clinic, and have been quite a necessary part of our working force. I doubt whether we could successfully carry on the work without them. Miss Lee, the head of the voluntary aides, has also contributed largely toward its success. Her constant attendance and faithful, intelligent service have been of most material aid in keeping the records available and in correlating the laboratory data with the arrival of the cases on their return.

We have felt the need of a urological department in the clinic to aid in the study of these cases, and with Dr. Squiers' co-operation we hope to be able to establish such a class. The lack of facilities alone has prevented our having such a group, as Dr. Squier and his assistants are prepared to carry forward the plan as soon as space can be provided.

During the year, it was possible to send to the meeting of the American Medical Association at New Orleans a demonstration of our system of keeping records. Friends of the Hospital most generously provided the necessary funds. Dr. Grace was in charge, and Mrs. Forsythe, whose intelligent management of the Record Room has been so valuable, accompanied him. Great interest was evinced by the members who attended the meeting, and we feel it proved of great educational value.

The service has derived material aid from the work of the Dental Department. The routine cleansing of the teeth prior to operation, we are convinced, has lessened post-operative complications from the administration of a general anesthetic.

The patients have continued to enjoy the privileges offered by Occupational Therapy, and the benefits from this activity of the Hospital are increasingly evident among the post-operative cases. During the convalescence from an operation, when the patient is not really ill, but simply awaiting the result of wound healing, this form of therapy has, we believe, materially aided in the administration of the service.

During the year, we have been compelled to curtail much of our activity in investigating surgical problems, and have confined our work wholly to the care of the service. This has been necessitated from the lack of funds, because of the great increase in costs of maintenance, which has used up the income from the Fund for Educational and Scientific Work. It is hoped that soon we may be able to re-establish this work, which is so valuable a stimulus to the members of the staff.

REPORT OF THE RADIOTHERAPEUTIC DEPARTMENT

December 31, 1920.

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital.

Gentlemen:—I have the honor of submitting the following report of the Radiotherapeutic Department for the year ending December 31, 1920.

The important event has been the coming of Doctor Witherbee to assume charge of the X-ray work, which has grown to such proportions that it requires the special attention of one man. The work with radium has also greatly increased, having been used almost entirely on surgical cases.

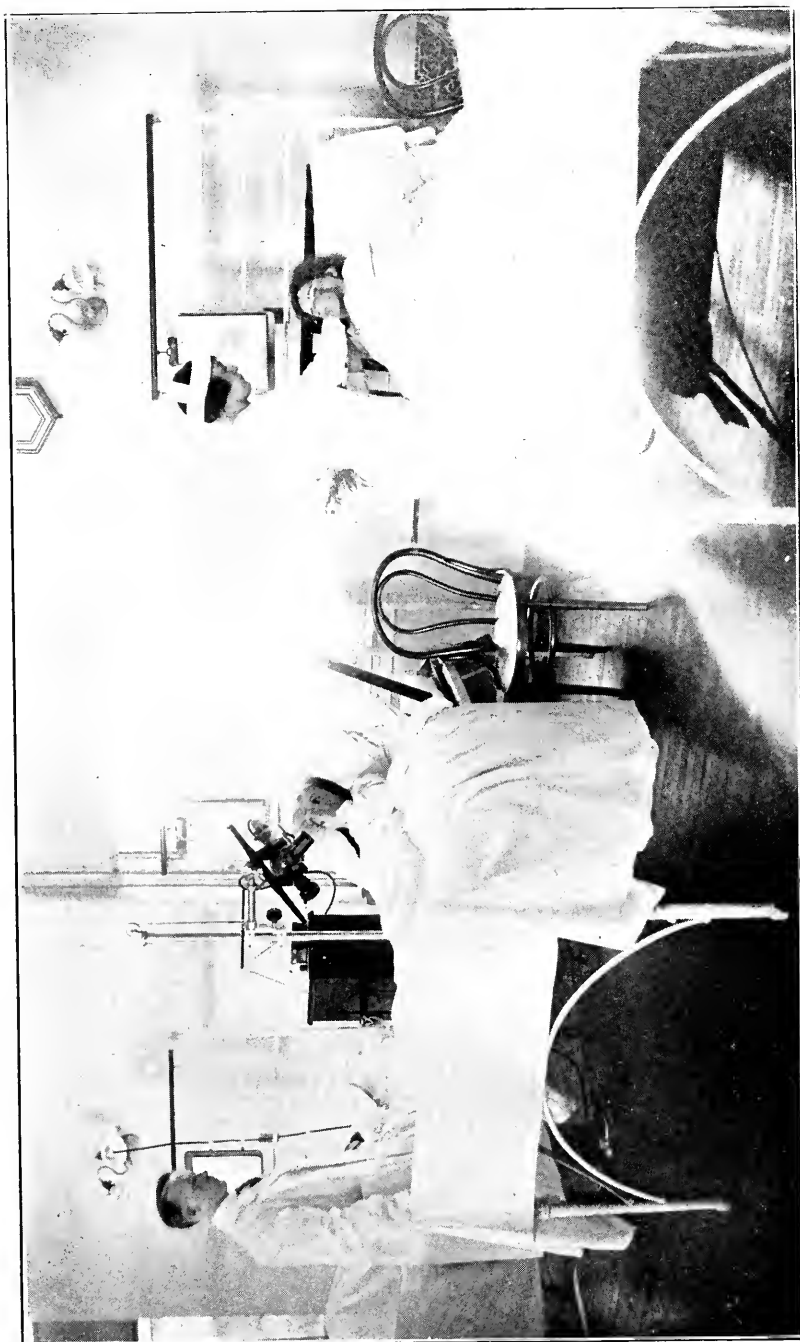
The statistics show that there have been 2,383 treatments on 262 patients during the year. From the medical standpoint, the number of cases treated has been of less interest than the type of cases treated and the degree of improvement accomplished. The cases of Leukemia are constantly improved. The post-operative treatment of carcinoma of the breast continues to be satisfactory. Whatever doubts we may have had with regard to its efficiency have been dispelled. We may now safely state that known carcinomatous tissue, which has been left in at the time of operation, has failed to grow. Under Doctor Hanford's direction, the position of X-ray in the treatment of tuberculous glands has been very carefully studied. The material has been collected for publication and will reveal many instructive facts. One new activity has been the treatment of enlarged tonsils, being a continuation of the work begun by Doctor William P. Witherbee and others.

Radium has found its greatest usage in gynecological diseases, particularly in benign and malignant tumors of the uterus and in uterine hemorrhage. The constantly good results in the benign conditions, and the extraordinary palliative results in the malignant growths, have more than justified the purchase of the radium. Our main difficulty is to provide beds for radium cases without unduly crowding out patients needing other surgical treatment.

The needs of the department are limited only at present by the possibilities of expansion. The demand for X-ray treatment has been constantly greater than we can supply with present facilities, and will probably continue to be until these facilities are greatly increased.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF DENTAL SERVICE

December 31, 1920.

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Gentlemen:—It is with pleasure that I present the following, our first report of the Dental Service.

On April 8th of the current year, a joint conference was held by a committee consisting of representatives of the Board of Managers and Medical Board of the Hospital and the Medical and Dental Schools of Columbia University. At this conference it was unanimously decided that, inasmuch as oral and dental infections were a large factor in many of the general systemic disturbances, a dental service was essential for correct diagnosis and as an aid in subsequent treatment.

Through the active co-operation of a number of the Board of Managers, sufficient funds were collected to make possible the organization and establishment of the work, which is at the present time being carried on at the Hospital. The staff consists of eight dental surgeons, four of whom are in attendance from 2:00 to 4:30 P. M. each day, one in the medical ward, one in the surgical ward, and two in the infirmary or Out-Patient Department. They serve in alternation, each one being on duty three days per week. There are two oral hygienists on full time and one radiographer on full time. There are four oral surgeons, one in service daily, and four visiting dental and oral surgeons.

The service was made operative on a part-time basis during July and August, and began on a full schedule on September 1st, and we feel that, while at present the service is very satisfactory, it will require several months further experience to develop it to the maximum efficiency.

I wish to express on behalf of the dental staff its deep appreciation of the co-operation received from the Board of Managers and the Executive Officers of the Hospital.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

December 31, 1920.

*To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of
New York.*

Gentlemen:—The report of the Department of Occupational Therapy for the year ending December 31, 1920, is herewith submitted.

Seven hundred and sixty-eight patients have been taught occupations.

The following articles have been made:

The patients either pay a small amount to partly cover cost of material, or else they make two articles, leaving one to be sold. In this way a small fund accrues, averaging about \$10.00 per month. This is spent for dyes, thread, needles and such small necessities. The cost of materials is about \$350.00.

During the past year, Miss Eleanor Brown, Mrs. Sinclair Hamilton and Miss Laura Peaseley gave most valuable assistance. Miss Helen MacArthur and Miss Elizabeth Armstrong substituted during the summer months. Miss Ruth Adler has been acting as assistant since September 15th, and the work is growing rapidly.

Almost all the patients tell us how much they enjoy their work, and are most appreciative. Several have said that they would have "gone crazy" if they had nothing to do. Others say it takes their minds off themselves, and makes them feel better and happier. Of course, this is the main object. As soon as patients feel convalescent, they continually ask for something to do. Often, when they are too ill to work, they ask us to be sure and come to them as soon as they are better.

Basketry seems to be the best all-round occupation, as it is very adaptable and can be either a very simple or a most difficult process, requiring greater or less mental application. The product is almost always satisfactory to the patient, as well as useful and attractive, with a real market value. The occupations listed above are by no means all, as one of the fascinating things about teaching Occupational Therapy is that the teacher has to be constantly thinking up new forms of occupation to meet special conditions.

It is undoubtedly better for the patients to be occupied with something that gives them pleasure and makes them happy rather than to spend their time discussing and comparing experiences, doctors and treatments.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF PATHOLOGICAL SERVICE

December 31, 1920.

To the Board of Managers of The Presbyterian Hospital:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor of submitting the following as a report of the Pathological Service of the Hospital for the fifteen months ending December 31, 1920.

The work of the Medical Pathological Laboratory has been devoted to the performance of autopsies, the study of special conditions found in pathological tissues, and the teaching of Gross Pathology to the second year medical students.

A larger number of autopsies than ever before in the history of the Hospital were performed during the year, owing to the interested efforts of the House Staff in securing permission from relatives.

The interest of the Attending and House Staffs in autopsies has also been increased by holding weekly demonstrations of pathological material in connection with the Medical Staff Rounds. The following table shows the increase in number and percentage of autopsies over the previous two years.

The increase of routine work occasioned by the greater number of autopsies made it necessary to take on an extra technician during the winter. The work was also made easier by two voluntary workers, Miss Mildred Sawyer and Miss May Chinn, who served very regularly from January to May, cutting and staining sections. During the summer vacation, the following seven students of the former second year class of the College of Physicians and Surgeons assisted with the routine laboratory work and worked on individual problems in the laboratory: Miss R. C. Boyer, and Messrs. H. Linsky, S. F. Livingston, G. F. Machacek, C. B. Rabin, E. Rubin and E. N. Whitcomb.

It is expected that during the coming year members of the Medical House Staff will have definite periods of service in the Medical Pathology Laboratory, and thus increase the co-ordination of the two services.

BACTERIOLOGICAL LABORATORY

There have been no fundamental changes in the organization of the Bacteriological Division during the past year. It is hoped, however, that, as the laboratories of the Clinical Divisions improve in equipment and facilities, it may be possible, gradually, to turn over to them some parts of the routine bacteriological work, especially that of more particularly clinical application, so that the bacteriological personnel can concentrate upon the more technically difficult problems, and participate in research. A move in this direction has already been made, and is being encouraged by the Clinical Divisions interested. During the summer, a change in the organization of the laboratory became necessary because of the necessity for paying somewhat higher salaries, and because laboratory supplies and everything else connected with the management of laboratories had increased in cost, without corresponding increase in available funds. The reduction of personnel made necessary thereby will, we believe, have no serious results upon the efficiency of the work done, since a new arrangement has been made whereby younger members of the Clinical Staffs will spend a part of their service in the laboratory doing bacteriological work under the direction of Dr. Humphreys. This arrangement has other advantages, in that, by bringing about a rotation of clinical internes through the laboratory, it will contribute materially to smooth co-operation of laboratory and ward, when these men return to the ward services.

It is with great regret that the laboratory parts with Miss Cooper, who for several years has been an extremely efficient and diligent member of the staff. Miss Cooper's extensive training and research ability will be seriously missed upon her departure. Although the routine of the laboratory has been fairly heavy, Dr. Humphreys has been engaged for some time in careful studies of anaerobic bacilli, in which he has made considerable progress, and in which the promise of important results is now apparent.

The greatest need of the laboratory in the past has been increased space. This has now been to a great extent remedied by partitioning off the northern portion of the animal house, and the breaking through an intercommunicating door to the older room. It is calculated that this, which will almost double the area of the laboratory, will afford, when properly equipped, desk space for at least six additional internes, students or volunteers, and greatly aid the scientific and educational efforts of the department.

The Pharmacist compounded 104,222 prescriptions; 66,518 dressings were applied by surgeons. The table of occupations will give a very good idea as to the class of people seeking charitable relief. The receipts from treatments given amounted to \$19,043.99. The daily average number of patients was 300.

This work could not have been successfully accomplished without the co-operation of the clerks and volunteer aides, to whom I wish to express my sincere appreciation.

REPORT OF THE OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT

December 31, 1920.

Board of Managers, Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Gentlemen:—The following is a report of the Out-Patient Department for the fifteen months ending December 31, 1920:

SURGICAL DISPENSARY

I—Personnel.

The present staff assumed charge of the Surgical Out-Patient Department, September 1, 1920. To the two attending surgeons then on duty there have been added four others, bringing the staff up to a number almost adequate to handle the work. During the present year, all members of the staff have been rated as "Instructors in Surgery," and as such have received a small salary. This has been very valuable as a financial and moral stimulus to persuade young men of the proper training and ideals to take up out-patient work. With industrial positions offering large pay for short hours, the Out-Patient Department has to look sharply to its treatment of younger men if it is to secure the services of those who are desirable. These men will accept out-patient positions for a number of reasons, among which may be stated:

- 1—If the position offers definite advancement to work inside the hospital.
- 2—If it offers a certain salary which is not altogether nominal.
- 3—If it offers an instructorship in the Medical School.
- 4—If the facilities for work are unusually attractive.

We have been able in a measure to fulfill some of these conditions, but the question of adequate salaries for the Out-Patient Department workers is vital.

II—Diagnostic Clinic.

The addition of six new rooms has made possible the realization of an ideal toward which the Surgical Out-Patient Department has been struggling for some time. The Diagnostic Clinic began to function as such in October, 1920. All new surgical patients who are possible candidates for admission to hospital, or who have unusual or rare conditions, are sent directly to the Diagnostic Clinic, where a complete history is taken and a complete physical examination is made. All necessary laboratory or radiographic work is then obtained, and an effort is made to arrive at a correct diagnosis. These studies made, the patient is referred to the attending surgeon on duty in the Out-Patient Department on the day on which the patient is told to return. He then refers the patient to the Hospital for admission or for whatever care seems most desirable. This has been found to save the patient bed days in the Hospital, and also to decrease the number of patients admitted or subsequently not operated upon. This Diagnostic Clinic, as an integral part of the Out-Patient Department, serves to bind it to the In-Patient Department in a way which has heretofore been impossible. This new department, still in its infancy, gives great promise for the future.

III—Accident Ward.

The need of closer liaison between this department and the rest of the Surgical Out-Patient Department is paramount. It has unfortunately been impossible to assign an attending surgeon to regular duty there. Such an assignment will be accomplished in the near future, it is hoped, and should prove of inestimable help to the resident staff. It will insure a greater uniformity in the treatment accorded to patients.

IV—Aides.

The volunteer aides continue to render invaluable service. It is quite fitting that a tribute to their loyalty and support in the routine work of the Surgical Out-Patient Department be recorded at this time.

Less than five months have elapsed since the present staff took charge of the Surgical Out-Patient Department. It is too short a time to hope to achieve even a small measure of the success which, we believe, lies ahead. We are slowly proceeding toward a very definite goal in the development of the Surgical Dispensary.

MEDICAL DISPENSARY

The matter of greatest moment which has happened to the Dispensary during the past year has been the building of an addition, situated at the north of the old Dispensary, utilizing the intervening space between it and the passageway to the Pathological Laboratory. By this, six new rooms have been obtained, and help to fill a crying need for more space. This relieves the crowding that was neither sanitary nor decent and has greatly enhanced the efficiency of the clinic.

With this added space it has become possible to establish classes for special groups of cases, a system whereby the patients can be studied to much better advantage, by men particularly interested in their complaint and especially qualified in that branch of medicine.

The class for skin and syphilis continues to do excellent work, and has reached the size where further expansion is impossible without more room and more assistants.

Selected cases in clinical anaphylaxis are still being studied to great advantage.

A class for the study and prevention of heart disease has finally been started and, through the efforts of Dr. T. Stuart Hart, a salaried graduate nurse has been provided to devote full time and care to the following up of such cases.

Special classes have also been formed for the study of metabolic diseases and endocrinology.

In addition to these special classes, the teaching of students and the routine work go on as usual. All this work requires a large staff, and we are still obliged to turn away cases because we have neither the facilities nor the men to care for them. We believe the time is not far distant when the hospitals will realize the necessity of a definite scheme of promotion and the paying of salaries, if their out-patient departments are to be sufficiently manned.

The number of aides has decreased materially, but those who still come, even though the work is shorn of its War halo, have shown a spirit of real service and have been of invaluable assistance, not only in the clinical work, but in their human sympathy with the patients.

In conclusion, it is only fair to add that the work, much of which is often little better than drudgery, could never be accomplished but for the cheerful co-operation and loyal support of the medical and clerical staff. The Physician-in-Chief wishes publicly to express his appreciation of this unfailing *esprit de corps*.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE SCHOOL OF NURSING

December 31, 1920.

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to present the twenty-eighth annual report of the School of Nursing from September 30, 1919, to December 31, 1920.

The Commencement Exercises of the Class of 1920 were held on May 13th in the Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church. The exercises were opened with prayer by Henry Sloane Coffin, D. D. A powerful address of rare significance and beauty was made by Rev. John Kelman, D.D., O. B. E. Mr. William Sloane, the President, in presenting the diplomas, welcomed the class cordially into their new field of opportunity. The School pin, the gift of Mr. Moreau Delano, was presented each member by Mr. James R. Sheffield, a member of the committee. The class flowers were presented by Mr. William Sloane. The reception for the class was given by the Managers.

The class was the largest (fifty-eight in number) ever graduated in the history of the School. This was in part due to the transfer to the class of the short term college students, twenty-one in number. The death of Hesseltine Hampton Church, attacked with fatal meningitis during her senior year, was a distinct loss to the school and a great sorrow to her classmates, with whom she had formed warm friendships.

The foremost duty imposed upon our students has always been "Care of the Patient." We are here to minister not only to the diseased body but also to the diseased or distressed mind. Here the "social" or "home troubles" of our patients are attended to, relieving the distress of a mother who has left behind her young baby, or a father who has left a houseful of children uncared for. Our graduates carry with them, into the communities where they settle, the human element combined with technical knowledge, qualities which prepare them for earnest work of a high type.

The affiliation of the School with Teachers College, Columbia, has proved satisfactory. The first student has completed the course, receiving the diploma of the School and the degree of B. S. from Columbia. Fourteen affiliating students are now in the School, and others are entering the new class just forming.

A four months' course in Public Health offered by the Henry Street Settlement, has prepared twelve of our students for work in this important field.

The short term course for college women (nine months' credit) gives opportunity for specializing. There are now eighteen college graduates in the School.

The eight-hour day in force through the year is working out well. Results of higher efficiency are hoped for.

Student Government has been established, and is found to be of distinct value in developing self-reliance, in keeping up the spirit of unity, and maintaining the standards of the School.

Nurses from other countries preparing for work in France and Belgium have received in this Hospital, instruction and opportunities for observation of American methods in nursing.

One hundred and twenty-five applications for graduates of this School to fill institutional positions, public health and industrial openings have been received. The demand for industrial nursing is increasing rapidly. The hospitals should be liberal in opening the doors of the schools of nursing for at least a six months' course for students wishing to specialize in this particular field. Corporations would no doubt aid in allowing classes to visit the plants, and, if approached, might be liberal in subsidizing the schools for such a course, in order to provide nurses for their own plants.

Inquiries received throughout the year for information regarding admission to the School of Nursing numbered one thousand, two hundred and seventy-one.

Applications from graduates of other schools desirous of entering this Hospital for added experience, numbered one hundred and sixty-six. Thirty-five of these have taken advantage of the experience offered in ward work. These graduates were taken to make up the shortage due to the exodus of students at the time of the armistice.

A number of the Alumnae remain in foreign service. Those at home are diligently at work to increase the Pension Fund.

It is with deep regret we are called upon to mention three of the Alumnae who have passed on to the other life. Mrs. Walter Oliver, *née* Claudia Marie O'Neill, Class '09, who gave devoted service with the Unit in France, died August 31st, after a lingering illness. Faithful to the end, she gave her life for the cause, and will be greatly missed by numberless friends. Margaret Hamilton, Class '97, died at her home at St. Johns, New Brunswick, during the summer. She had given devoted service for a number of years in the private nursing ranks, and had since given her life to church work. Mrs. Frank Dingwall Fearman, *née* Louise Neff Courtright, Class '08, died on July 27th at her home in Canada. Possessing a charming personality, she had surrounded herself with hosts of friends who will miss her genial companionship and helpful influence.

The seventeenth year of the Visiting Nursing and Social Service Department, liberally supported by Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt, Sr., has been completed.

Twenty-five students have been given experience in public health and social service work. The Probationers attend a lecture on Hospital Social Service given by the instructor, and afterwards make "rounds" in the homes of the patients. This gives them a broad and sympathetic outlook on the needs of their patients, and secures their interest and co-operation during the years of training.

In addition to this, the work in the departments of Tuberculosis, Follow-up, Convalescence, Fresh Air and Relief has been done by an instructor, four graduate nurses and a clerical secretary. Through the interest of one of our doctors, we have very recently been able to engage a nurse for the social service work in connection with our Cardiac Clinics.

The Katie Geitz Diet Kitchen in the East River Homes has been successfully run by our matron and her assistant. In addition to dispensing milk and cooked food daily, during the winter months, hot soup was sold to the children of the Fresh Air Schools on the roof of the building, and an average of twenty of these children, whose mothers were working, came daily to the kitchen for a warm lunch at noon.

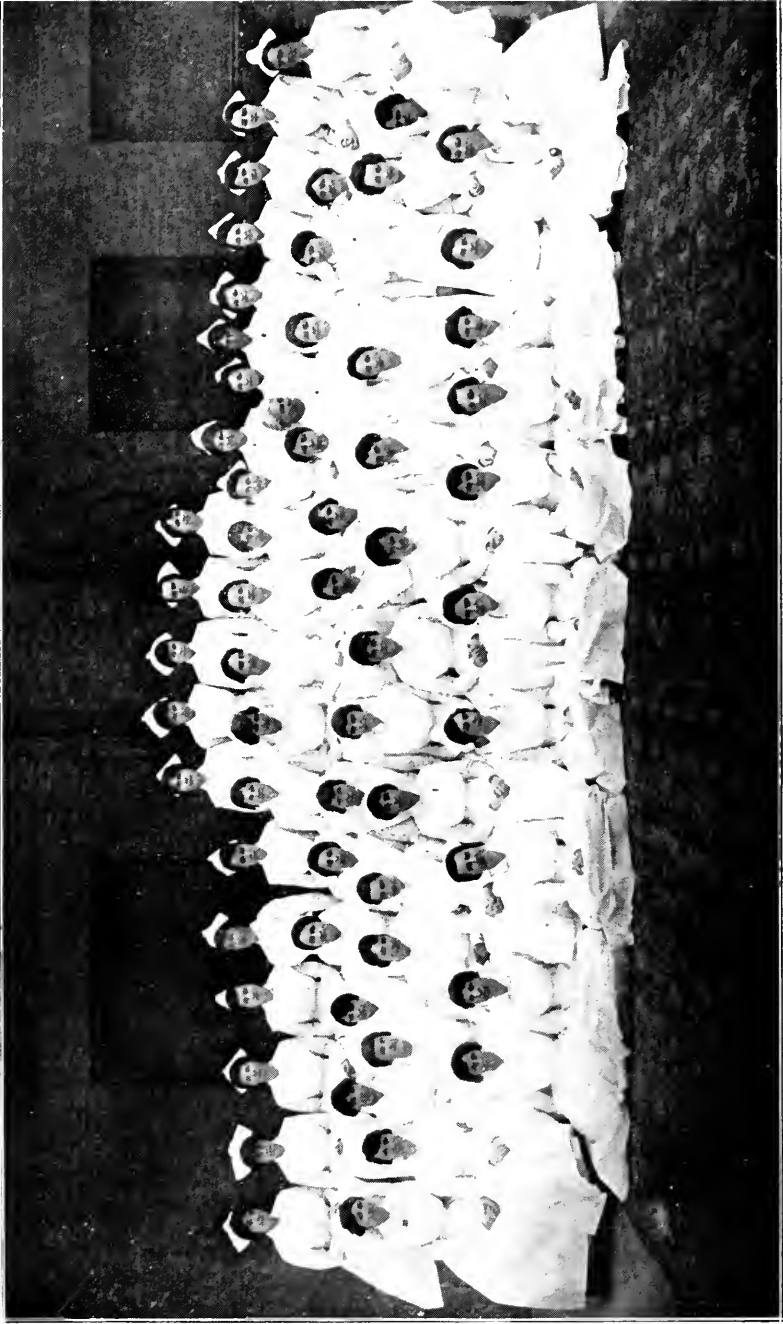

The tenth year of Hill Top Camp at Hawthorne, N. Y., designed to give children of tuberculosis parents and suitable cardiacs three weeks in the country, had a successful summer. One hundred and four children had the benefit of happy, healthful surroundings, with wholesome discipline and training under the devoted care of the nurse in charge and her assistant. The Scully-Walton Ambulance Company again kindly arranged to transport the children to the Grand Central Station. This great assistance was very much appreciated. A number of these children are now attending the Open Air Schools of the Department of Health and the Department of Education, and all remain under our care during the year. The funds necessary for the summer work were obtained by the friends of the Camp, from proceeds of the performance of the delightful play, "Shavings."

The Christmas party was immensely enjoyed by nearly three hundred young friends of the Social Service Department. Included in the afternoon's entertainment was an amusing and profitable talk on personal health and hygiene. The children also enjoyed the delightful music and Christmas carols, the delicious refreshments, a glimpse of their old friend Santa Claus, and a beautiful tree, past which they marched to receive their gifts.

The Social Service Department Santa Claus visited the sick children on the wards, and the "shut-ins" at home were all remembered on Christmas Eve with gifts distributed by the student nurses. All this was made possible by the many generous gifts received from our old and new friends at Christmas time.

Thirty-eight dinners from the Vanderbilt Fund, and fifteen from Mr. Vincent Astor, through Bellevue Social Service, brought Christmas cheer to our poorest families.

We are deeply indebted to Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt, Sr., through whose thoughtfulness we have had the benefit of forty quarts of milk daily at the Diet Kitchen for the past year. To the late Mrs. Ogden Mills, who gave a liberal donation of four hundred dollars for milk, we are also indebted, and to the Walker Gordon Laboratory, who continue to send us daily from four to forty quarts. Owing to the high price of milk, these gifts have helped to restore to health many of our sick and under-nourished patients.

We gratefully acknowledge our indebtedness for co-operation of the many convalescent homes and charitable agencies, especially to Burke Foundation which, during the influenza epidemic, made special efforts to give convalescence and care to all our patients.

The House Staff and Out-Patient Staff have shown their interest in their ready co-operation with all branches of the department.

A cordial invitation is extended to graduates of any school of nursing needing hospital care to use "The Eliza DeWitt Memorial Room," endowed by Mrs. Morris K. Jessup in memory of her mother. This private room, constantly in use, is highly appreciated by nurses overtaken by illness.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Kennedy Tod have, for the past eight years, given the use of a "Week-End Camp" at Innis Arden for use of the Nursing Staff. Sea air, sea bathing and quiet recreation have been thoroughly enjoyed, and our grateful thanks are offered for their continued kindness.

To the friends who provide delightful entertainment for our students with theatre or opera tickets, we offer our united thanks.

I wish to record my appreciation of the unfailing support and co-operation given by the Attending Staff, the House Staff, and Nursing Staff through a difficult year.

May I also thank the Board of Managers and the School of Nursing Committee for their continued support.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE ALUMNAE ASSO-
CIATION OF THE PRESBYTERIAN HOSPITAL
TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES IN THE
CITY OF NEW YORK

December 31, 1920.

*To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of
New York.*

The sixth report of the Alumnae Association of the Presbyterian Hospital Training School for Nurses, to appear in the Annual Report of the Hospital, and which I have the honor of presenting to you, is for the past fifteen months ending December 31, 1920.

Probably one of our most momentous decisions was that made at the Annual Meeting of the Association on May 14, 1920, to adopt a so-called Restricted Plan of operation for the Pension Fund, to be tried out for five years. At the expiration of three years the Association is to set in motion measures to provide for the continuation of the pensions at the termination of the five year period, trusting that our experience will make us better able to form a permanent plan of operation for this fund. An opportunity of joining the Association has been given all graduates of the Training School for Nurses, in order that they may participate in the Pension Fund, which, under the present plan of operation, will pay not more than three hundred dollars yearly to all members in good standing having reached the age of sixty years. As pensions will automatically become due, all members are privileged to return same to the principal of the fund which we aim to systematically increase by the appropriation each year of seven dollars per member (the dues of the Association having been raised a sufficient amount to permit this), and by the efforts of our members, with the generous assistance of our friends, some of whom have given such substantial evidence of their interest.

It will be seen from the Treasurer's Report that we have made several appropriations to further matters of interest to our profession and to assist in the endowment of the library at the Florence Nightingale Training School for Nurses of the Protestant Hospital in Bordeaux, France, in memory of one of our late members, Miss Amabel Roberts.

The complete revision of our Constitution and By-Laws, to conform with certain new requirements of the National and State Nurses' Associations, has just been completed, and proceedings are now under way to change the name of this Association, so that it will agree with the present title of the School, which name will then read THE ALUMNAE ASSOCIATION OF THE SCHOOL OF NURSING OF THE PRESBYTERIAN HOSPITAL IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

It is with pleasure that we report the growth of our organization by the addition of about fifty-eight new members, giving us a total membership of four hundred forty-seven members, and, with the deepest regret, that we record the death of two of our members, Mrs. Oliver (Claudia O'Neill) and Mrs. Frank Cowell (Gertrude E. Davis).

Our Association has sustained a great loss in the death of Mr. William V. S. Thorne, whose advice in financial matters was invaluable to us, and whose influence is greatly missed.

We are still well represented by members doing reconstruction and relief work abroad, though the majority of our members are at home now, which, we hope, will enable us to resume our previous activities and assume additional ones with renewed vigor.

On behalf of this Association I wish to express our appreciation for your continued support and consideration.

CHARTER

AN ACT

To Found a Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Passed February 28, 1868—Chapter 15.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. James Lenox, John Taylor Johnston, Robert L. Stuart, Morris K. Jesup, Marshall S. Bidwell, and their associates, as hereinafter named, shall constitute a body corporate, with power to establish, maintain, and conduct a Hospital in the City of New York, which shall be known and designated as "The Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York."

Section 2. The property and concerns of said Corporation shall be vested in and managed by a Board of thirty-two Managers (by act of March 28, 1868, increased to thirty-six Managers), to be constituted as provided for in the following section.

Section 3. James Brown, Marshall S. Bidwell, William A. Booth, Aaron B. Belknap, William E. Dodge, James Donaldson, John C. Green, Winthrop S. Gilman, Robert M. Hartley, Richard Irvin, Edward S. Jaffray, Thomas Jeremiah, Morris K. Jesup, John Taylor Johnston, James Lenox, David Olyphant, William Paton, Thomas C. M. Paton, Joseph Stuart, Robert L. Stuart, Thomas U. Smith, Jonathan Sturges, Otis D. Swan, Charles N. Talbot, Willard Parker, M. D., John R. Ford, Henry M. Taber, Alexander Van Rensselaer, William M. Vermilye, Washington R. Vermilye, A. R. Wetmore, and A. Robertson Walsh, thirty-two in number, shall constitute a part of the Board of Managers. To these thirty-two Managers, the Rev. William M. Paxton, D.D., as Minister of the First Presbyterian Church; the Rev. William Adams, D. D., as Minister of the Madison Square Presbyterian Church; the Rev. Thomas Dewitt, D. D., as Senior Minister of the Collegiate Church of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church, and the Rev. John N. McLeod, D.D., as Minister of the First Reformed Presbyterian Church, all in the City of New York, and their successors in office for the time being, shall, by virtue of their respective offices, be associated as members of the Board of Managers.

Section 4. As soon as practicable after the passage of this Act, the said Board shall organize, and by lot divide the thirty-two Managers into four classes of eight each, and the places of the said classes shall be vacant respectively on the second Wednesday in April, one, two, three, and four years thereafter, so that eight Managers shall be elected by the said Board of Managers annually, by ballot, to hold their seats for four years.

Section 5. The Board of Managers shall have power to fill all vacancies that may occur in the said Board, to enact By-Laws, and to appoint all such agents, assistants, and attendants as may be proper to carry out the purposes of the said Corporation. Among these shall be included a Superintendent and a Chaplain or both a Superintendent and a Chaplain; but these positions shall be held only by Presbyterians.

Section 6. Not less than eleven Managers shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of electing Officers, making or changing By-Laws, or for holding any special meeting; but for all other purposes, and at stated meetings, seven shall be a quorum.

Section 7. The said Corporation are authorized to take by purchase, devise, or otherwise, and may hold, transfer, and convey, for the purposes of said Hospital, all the real and personal property of which it may become possessed, in so far as the same is in accordance with the general laws of this State, and not otherwise, and which said property shall be exempt from taxation, and shall be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of law relating to charitable institutions.

Section 8. This Corporation shall possess the general powers, and be subject to the provisions, restrictions and liabilities contained in the 3d Title of the 18th Chapter of Part First of the Revised Statutes.

Section 9. This Act shall take effect immediately.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.

Title.

The name by which this Society shall be known shall be, "The Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York."

ARTICLE II.

Object.

The object of the Society is the establishment, support and management of an Institution for the purpose of affording medical and surgical aid and nursing to sick or disabled persons of every creed, nationality, and color. The public religious services in the Hospital shall be in conformity with the doctrine and forms of the Presbyterian or Reformed Church.

ARTICLE III.

The Society.

The Society shall consist of Life Members, who shall respectively be approved by a majority of members of the Board of Managers present at a stated meeting, and who shall have been nominated at a previous stated meeting by a Standing Committee appointed for that purpose by the Board.

ARTICLE IV.

Endowed Beds.

The Board of Managers may fix amounts which when paid shall entitle the donor to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge, subject, however, to such rules and regulations for the admission, treatment, and discharge of patients as are now, or shall be hereafter, prescribed by said Board.

Where such nomination is accorded during life, or in perpetuity, the amount paid therefor shall be kept invested in income-producing securities until the privilege may lapse by the death of the donor or otherwise.

ARTICLE V.

Property.

All the property of the Society shall be applied to advance the general objects of the Society, except where it has been otherwise specially directed by the donor or testator.

ARTICLE VI.

Government.

The affairs of the Society shall be under the direction of a Board of thirty-six Managers, thirty-two of whom shall be divided into four classes of eight each; and the places of the said classes shall be vacant respectively on the second Wednesday of April, at the end of one, two, three and four years thereafter, so that Eight Managers shall be elected by the said Board annually, by ballot, to hold their seats for four years. To these thirty-two Managers, the Minister of the First Presbyterian Church, the Minister of the Madison Square Presbyterian Church, the Senior Minister of the Collegiate Church of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church, and the Minister of the First Reformed Presbyterian Church, all in the City of New York, by virtue of their respective offices, for the time being shall be added as members of the Board of Managers. The officers of the Society shall consist of a President, a Vice-President, a Treasurer, a Corresponding Secretary and a Recording Secretary, who shall be selected annually by the said Board of Managers, from their own number, and shall also be Officers of the said Board. The said Officers and Managers, together, shall form a Board, to be denominated the "Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York," not less than eleven of whom shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of electing Officers, making or changing By-Laws, or for holding any special meeting; but seven shall be a quorum for all other purposes, and for stated meetings. The Board of Managers shall at all times be fully authorized to execute all powers of the Society, over all the estate and property of the Society. To it shall be committed the care of the funds of the Institution; authority to make By-Laws, Rules and Regulations, and to alter and amend the same; to fill vacancies in their own body, choose the Officers of the Society, appoint agents, assistants and attendants, and generally to transact the entire business of the Society.

ARTICLE VII.

Meetings of the Board.

The Board of Managers shall hold stated meetings on the second Tuesday of April, June, August, October, December and February, and may hold adjourned meetings when necessary. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the President, or, in case of his absence or inability to act, by the Vice-President, or on the written requisition of five members of the Board of Managers; but when special meetings are called, the time and place of meeting, and the subject proposed to be considered, shall be notified to the members at least two days previous to the meeting; and no other subject shall be discussed or acted upon at such meetings.

ARTICLE VIII.

Annual Meeting.

A meeting of the members of the Society shall be held annually on such day between the 15th of October and 1st of January as the Board of Managers may appoint. It shall be the duty of the Board of Managers to make the necessary arrangements for this meeting; to present to the members a report of the proceedings of the previous years; to exhibit a statement of the funds and property of the Society; and also to give information of any matters relating to the objects of the Society which may be of interest or importance.

At the stated meeting of the Board in April eight members shall be chosen by ballot from among the members of the Society to supply the places of the class of managers whose term of service is about to expire. These eight members, together with those composing the three other classes, and the four *ex-officio* members of the Board, shall constitute the Board of Managers for the ensuing year, and shall continue in office until their successors are elected. In case of failure to make such elections on the appointed day, a special meeting of the Board shall be called for that purpose.

ARTICLE IX.

Amendments to the Constitution.

Amendments to the Constitution shall be proposed in writing at a regular meeting of the Board of Managers, and may be acted on at the next regular meeting of the Board, or at a special meeting called for that purpose; and shall be adopted only on a concurrence of a majority of the members present, but the affirmative vote must not be less than eleven.

BY-LAWS

OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS.

I.—*Rules and Regulations.*

The Board of Managers shall prescribe rules and regulations respecting the management of the affairs of the Hospital. Such rules and regulations shall not be inconsistent with these By-Laws, and may be amended at any meeting of the Board of Managers by a majority of those present.

II.—*President.*

The President shall preside at the meetings of the Board. He shall appoint all special Committees, unless otherwise ordered, and shall perform such other duties as may be required by the Constitution and By-Laws. He shall also be *ex-officio*, a member of all committees.

III.—*Vice-President.*

In the event of a vacancy of the office of President, or during his absence or inability to act, his duties and powers shall devolve upon the Vice-President. Should he also be unable to act, a President *pro tem.* shall be chosen by the Board.

IV.—*Treasurer.*

The Treasurer shall be charged with the custody of all papers and documents relating to the property of the Corporation, other than such as are mentioned in By-Law V., of all moneys belonging thereto, and of the seal. He shall keep an account in the name of the Corporation with an institution approved by the Board, and shall deposit therein all moneys immediately upon receiving them. He shall cause to be kept such accounts as may be necessary to show the receipts, expenditures, and financial condition of the Institution, or as may be required by the Finance Committee. These accounts shall be open at all suitable times to the inspection of the Managers. He shall pay no moneys without proper order, as is elsewhere provided.

V.—*Safe Keeping of Securities.*

All bonds, stocks, and other invested securities and evidences of value shall be kept in a safe in the vault of a Safe Deposit Company to be taken in the name of the Hospital. Access to the safe containing the securities shall only be had by the Treasurer when accompanied by a member of the Finance Committee, or in the absence of the Treasurer by any two members of the Finance Committee. A record shall be made of each visit to the vault in a book provided for that purpose, stating over the signature of the visitors all changes made in the contents of the safe, and when no changes are made, the object of the visit.

VI.—*Secretary.*

The Secretary shall be the Recording and Corresponding Secretary and shall keep the minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Managers, and preserve such records and papers as do not pertain to the office of Treasurer. He shall also be ex-officio a member of the Executive Committee and shall keep minutes of said Committee. He shall notify members of all meetings of the Board of Managers at least two days before the meeting. He shall notify members of their appointment on Committees, and generally perform such duties as usually pertain to the office.

He shall have charge of the correspondence of the Board, and shall prepare the Annual Report of the Managers and attend to its publication.

VII.—*Committees.*

At the meeting in April, after filling the vacancies about to occur in their Board, the Managers shall elect an Executive Committee of eight members, a Dispensary Committee of five members, a Training-School Committee of three or more members, a House Committee of three or more members, a Finance Committee of five members, of which the Treasurer shall be one, a Committee on nominations of five members, of which the Secretary shall be one, and an Auditing Committee of two members. The members appointed on these Committees shall hold office for one year from the second Wednesday in April next ensuing, unless otherwise ordered by the Board, and shall keep minutes of their proceedings, which shall be submitted to the Board at its stated meetings. The Board shall also appoint two of its members for each month of the year, who shall serve as an Inspecting Committee. If any manager thus appointed shall be unable to attend during the time allotted to him, it shall be his duty to procure some other manager to attend in his stead.

VIII.—*Executive Committee.*

The Executive Committee shall consist of the eight Managers chosen as provided in By-Law VIII, to whom shall be added the two Managers serving as the Inspecting Committee, and the members of the Dispensary, Training School and House Committees.

1. The Committee shall meet on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month and may hold special meetings when necessary, or when called by the Chairman or two members of the Committee. Three shall constitute a quorum.

2. The Executive Committee shall give orders and establish such rules and regulations as they shall deem necessary for the better carrying into effect the object of this Institution, provided such rules and regulations be not inconsistent with those established by the Board of Managers.

3. All questions relating to the admission, rejection and discharge of patients shall be decided by the Executive Committee, in conformity with the directions of the Board of Managers.

4. In case the House Physician, House Surgeon, or any of their assistants, or any other officer or employee shall neglect any of the duties prescribed to them, or refuse to comply with any reasonable request of the Executive Committee or Superintendent, the Superintendent may suspend the offender, and he shall at once report his action to the Executive Committee.

5. The Executive Committee shall have general charge of all property within the precincts of the Hospital, and shall see that proper economy is observed in the administration of all its affairs, having due regard to the welfare of its beneficiaries. It shall audit and examine the accounts of the Superintendent; and authorize such repairs and disbursements as may from time to time be necessary, and shall draw drafts upon the Treasurer therefor; such drafts, except for the monthly pay-roll and supplies, shall not exceed \$1,000 without authority of the Board therefor; shall be signed by the Chairman and Secretary for the time being of the Committee; and shall be a sufficient voucher for the Treasurer.

IX.—*Out-Patient Department Committee.*

The Out-Patient Department Committee shall consist of five Managers. It shall have the general care and oversight of the Out-Patient Department, and shall meet on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month.

X.—*School of Nursing Committee.*

The School of Nursing Committee shall consist of three or more Managers, who shall have the general care and oversight of the School of Nursing.

XI.—*House Committee.*

The House Committee shall consist of three or more Managers, and shall direct and control the purchasing of all food, fuel, equipment and repair supplies, and have general supervision of the equipment, maintenance and repair of real estate and buildings.

XII.—*Finance Committee.*

1. The Finance Committee shall consist of five Managers—one of whom shall be the Treasurer. Three shall constitute a quorum.

2. It shall be their duty to adopt proper means to augment the financial resources of the Institution, to direct and counsel the Treasurer in the investment, care and management of the finances, and to prescribe such form of accounts and reports as are deemed necessary. All proposed investments must receive the approval of the Board of Managers or the Executive Committee.

XIII.—*Nominating Committee.*

1. The Nominating Committee shall consist of five Managers, of whom the Secretary shall be one. Three shall constitute a quorum.

2. In the case of a vacancy occurring in the Board of Managers they shall recommend to the Board the name of a Life Member to fill such vacancy, and to them shall be referred the names of all persons suggested for such position

or for Life Membership; but no report of the Committee shall be acted upon until the next subsequent meeting of the Board, except with unanimous consent.

3. All persons nominated for positions on the House Staff shall be referred to this Committee. The names of such as shall be favorably considered by the Committee shall be by them reported to the Board of Managers.

XIV.—*Inspecting Committee.*

1. The Inspecting Committee shall inspect all the Hospital buildings, visit the wards, service rooms, and laboratories and shall examine as to the cleanliness and order of all parts of the Hospital and grounds.

2. They shall enter their report in a book, which book shall be laid before the Executive Committee at its meetings.

XV.—*Auditing Committee.*

The Auditing Committee shall shortly after the close of each fiscal year examine and check the bonds, stocks, mortgages or other securities or evidences of value owned by the Hospital and shall also have the accounts of the Treasurer and Superintendent for the last fiscal year examined and checked by certified public accountants. The Committee shall thereafter report to the Board the result of such accounting with its recommendations.

XVI.—*Medical Board and the Medical, Surgical and Laboratory Service.*

1. The Board of Managers shall appoint annually—

(a) A Director of the Surgical Service, a Director of the Medical Service, and a Director of the Pathological Service; these shall together constitute the Medical Board.

(b) As many Visiting Physicians and Surgeons, and Associate Visiting Physicians and Surgeons, as the service of the Hospital may require, a Visiting Physician to the Roentgen Ray Department, a Visiting Bacteriologist, a Visiting Chemist, an Out-Patient Department Staff, and such other department chiefs and assistants as the various services of the Hospital may require.

(c) As many Assistant Physicians and Surgeons and special Consulting Physicians and Surgeons as the service of the Hospital may require.

(d) A House Staff, consisting of as many members as the service of the Hospital may require, and at such times and for such terms of service as shall seem best to meet the needs of the Hospital.

(e) A Registrar of the Out-Patient Department.

2. These appointments shall be made at some time prior to July 1st in each year. The appointees unless a different term be fixed by the Board shall hold office for one year and thereafter until further action of the Board.

XVII.—*Executive Staff.*

The Board of Managers shall appoint a Superintendent and such Assistants as the Board may deem necessary for the service of the Hospital, whose services shall continue during the pleasure of the Board.

The Board of Managers shall appoint a Director of the School of Nursing and such Assistants as may be necessary for such service, and such appointees shall hold office during the pleasure of the Board.

XVIII.—*Endowed Beds.*

1. A gift of \$7,500 shall entitle the donor and his successors to nominate, from time to time, an adult patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge.

2. A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor to a like privilege for the children's ward.

3. A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor, during life, to nominate, from time to time, a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge. In the case of a corporation or association the privilege shall expire in fifteen years.

4. Any person or corporation being the donor of a \$5,000 bed may increase their donation to \$7,500, in which case they shall become thenceforth entitled to the privilege that attaches to an original donation of that amount.

5. All endowed bed privileges are subject to the Rules and Regulations governing the admission, treatment and discharge of patients.

6. Contributions to the endowment fund of free beds, as above provided for, may be made by instalments, when the donor shall, in writing, so notify the Treasurer at the time of each payment. So long as the instalments so paid in shall not equal the sums required under the preceding sections, the amount received shall constitute a portion of the general endowment fund, the income of which shall be used for the payment of the current expenses of the Hospital, and no privileges shall accrue to the donor.

7. The Board of Managers shall have power in their discretion to make, under special and exceptional circumstances, such other arrangements (temporary or permanent) as to endowed beds as they may deem best calculated to promote the objects for which the Hospital was established and is now being maintained.

8. Certificates of the right to nominate patients to use and occupy beds free of charge shall be issued in such form as the Board of Managers may prescribe, and shall be signed by the President or Vice-President and Treasurer, who shall also affix the seal of the Corporation.

XIX.—*Appropriations of Money.*

Except in the cases provided for in Section 5 of By-Law VIII. and Section 2 of By-Law XII, all appropriations of money shall be made by resolution of the Board of Managers. Orders for the amounts thus appropriated shall be drawn on the Treasurer by the President or presiding officer of the meeting, and be countersigned by the Secretary or Secretary pro tem., and when properly endorsed shall be sufficient voucher for the Treasurer.

XX.—Complaints, Suspensions, or Discharges.

If any officer, physician, or surgeon shall become unfit to execute his office, or shall conduct himself contrary to any of the Rules of the Hospital, or refuse or neglect to execute the same, the Executive Committee, or any member of the Board of Managers may submit against him a complaint in writing, at a meeting duly called, and thereupon a notice of the said complaint shall be given to the person complained of, and a time shall be appointed (not less than six days after service of said notice) for the person complained of to make his defence before the Board of Managers; and the Board, having examined into the truth of the complaint, and heard the defence of the party accused, if any shall be made, may, with the concurrence and approbation of a majority of the Managers present, suspend or discharge the officer, physician, or surgeon complained of.

XXI.—Order of Business.

The order of business shall be as follows:

1. The meeting shall be opened with prayer.
2. The roll shall be called, and the attending members noted.
3. The minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read, corrected if necessary, and approved.
4. Treasurer's Reports.
5. Reports of the Committees shall be called for, and order taken thereon.
6. Communications to the Board shall be received and considered.
7. Unfinished business.
8. New business.

XXII.—Alterations or Additions.

Any amendment to the By-Laws shall be proposed in writing at a regular meeting of the Board of Managers, and may be acted on at the next regular meeting of the Board, or at a special meeting called for that purpose. It shall be adopted only on an affirmative vote of a majority of those present. A copy of any proposed amendment shall be mailed to each member of the Board at least three days prior to the next meeting.

Revised, April 9, 1918.

RULES AS TO THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1. All ward patients are required to pay \$3.00 per day for board or such smaller sums as may be determined by the circumstances of the case, of which the Managers shall be the sole judges. Patients from New York City (Manhattan and Bronx), who are unable to pay are admitted free. Patients from out of town requiring operative treatment not obtainable at their homes may be admitted free if unable to pay. Other patients from out of town will not usually be admitted free, but this rule shall not apply to patients recommended for admission by members of the Board of Managers or by any of the Directors of Service.

2. Patients suffering from severe accident or serious illness will be admitted at any hour of the day or night. Other patients will be admitted between 9 A. M. and 5 P.M. If able, they must apply in person at the office of the Hospital, when they will be examined by a member of the House Staff or Surgeon on duty, and admitted by the Superintendent, subject to approval by the Executive Committee. If unable to apply in person, they shall be visited and examined by such Physician as may be appointed by the Executive Committee.

3. Patients may be admitted by the Superintendent on the recommendation of any Manager, after examination as to suitability by a member of the House Staff, or on the recommendation of any Physician or Surgeon of the Hospital.

4. No patient suffering from any readily communicable disease shall be admitted, nor any whose case does not require the special benefits of the Hospital; nor shall any patient be admitted whose case is judged to be incurable, unless there be urgent symptoms which, in the opinion of the Attending Physician or Surgeon, are capable of being relieved. There shall be no uterine nor vaginal examination made except in the presence of a nurse.

5. No patient suffering from erysipelas shall be admitted to either the Medical or Surgical Division of the Hospital.

6. There shall be recorded in the office daily the number of vacant beds.

7. Application for the admission of patients living out of the city must be accompanied by a certificate of some reputable physician, stating the nature and probable duration of the disease.

RULES FOR VISITORS.

1. Visitors will be admitted to the wards daily from 1 to 2 P. M., and on Sundays from 1 to 3 P. M., also on Tuesday and Friday evenings between 6 and 8 one visitor will be permitted, providing only one comes in the afternoon, and at no other time, except by special permission from the Superintendent.

2. Not more than two visitors will be admitted to see any patient on the same day.

3. Parents only (no children, relatives or friends) will be permitted to visit in the children's ward and for one-half hour only each visit.

4. Patients reported as seriously ill by the Physician or Surgeon will be permitted to see members of the family at any time.

5. Only fruit, jelly and ice-cream can be brought for patients. Such packages must be left with the door clerk, and, if approved by the Physician, will be sent to the patients.

6. Visitors must observe perfect order and propriety while in the Hospital; must confine their visits to their immediate friends; must not stop or loiter in the halls, offices, or on stairways, and must leave the building promptly at the end of visiting hours.

Any violations of these rules may subject the offender to exclusion from the premises.

THE FIFTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
BOARD OF MANAGERS
OF
THE PRESBYTERIAN HOSPITAL
IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK

For the year ending December 31, 1921.

The past year has been perhaps the most eventful one in the history of the Presbyterian Hospital. In February last an agreement was consummated between the Hospital and Columbia University providing for the permanent affiliation of the two institutions, the exact purport and intent of which is perhaps best expressed in the language of the Agreement itself, which is as follows:

“THIS AGREEMENT made this tenth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-one, between The Trustees of Columbia University in the City of New York, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York (hereinafter called the University), a party of the first part, and the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Hospital), party of the second part.

For the purpose of establishing a permanent alliance between the University and the Hospital (a) to secure the best obtainable treatment of the sick and injured and (b) to provide for medical education and research of the highest type it is mutually covenanted and agreed as follows:

ARTICLE I

The University and the Hospital is each to continue its independent existence and control. Nothing in this agreement is to be construed to affect any function of either the University or the Hospital not expressly covered by its terms.

ARTICLE II

The proposed new buildings of the Medical School of the University and the Hospital are to be built upon an agreed site. There shall be a division of the site between the University and the Hospital, and each is to acquire the portion assigned to it in such division at its own cost and expense. The portion assigned to the University is to be conveyed to, and be owned and maintained by, the University; and the portion assigned to the Hospital is to be conveyed to, and be owned and maintained by, the Hospital.

The parties are within four months from the time this agreement goes into effect to proceed with the preparation of plans for the new building and the construction of the buildings in accordance with the plans adopted and continue such construction with due diligence to the completion of the buildings.

ARTICLE III

The professional staffs of the Hospital are to consist of professors and other members of the staff of the Medical School of the University who are to be appointed by the Hospital on the nomination of the University.

ARTICLE IV

In order that the permanent alliance of the University and the Hospital shall be maintained and effectively administered, an Administrative Board is to be appointed to consist of three Managers of the Hospital and three Trustees of the University, with the Dean of the Medical School acting in an advisory capacity without voting power. The first Board shall consist of Edward S. Harkness, Henry W. deForest and William Sloane representing the Hospital, and John G. Milburn, Walter B. James and William Barclay Parsons, representing the University. In case of a vacancy by death, resignation or other cause, it is to be filled by the body that made the appointment; but the appointments made by the Hospital shall be subject to the approval of the University and those made by the University shall be subject to the approval of the Hospital.

ARTICLE V

The powers of the Administrative Board are to be as follows :

1—A list of the members of the professional staffs of the University, who are nominated by the University to constitute the professional staffs of the Hospital, is to be submitted annually by the University to the Administrative Board for its approval before its presentation to the Hospital for its action under Article III.

2—To consider any objection made to any member of the professional staffs of the Hospital, and to report thereon with their recommendations to the University and the Hospital.

3—To examine and consider plans for the new Hospital and new Medical School Buildings and to report thereon to the University and the Hospital with their recommendations.

4—Subject to the approval of the Trustees of the University and the Board of Managers of the Hospital, to determine from time to time the facilities and equipment for instruction and research in the Hospital; to apportion between the University and the Hospital any joint or common outlay or expenditure for construction, equipment or operation that may be found necessary by the mutual

action of the University and the Hospital; and to exercise such other powers as may be conferred upon it from time to time by the authority of the Trustees of the University and the Board of Managers of the Hospital acting concurrently.

ARTICLE VI

This Agreement is to continue in full force and effect until terminated by the mutual consent of the parties."

Coincident with the execution of this agreement a tract of about twenty-two acres of land bounded by Broadway, 168th Street, the Hudson River and 165th Street was donated to the Hospital and the University by Mr. Edward S. Harkness and large gifts made to the University by the Rockefeller and Carnegie Foundations and the General Education Board, thus insuring the carrying out of the long discussed plan of establishing a medical and hospital center in the City of New York on a larger and more efficient scale than exists in any other city in the world.

In view of the importance of the undertaking it is plain that a considerable period of time will be required for the completion of the plans and the erection of the new hospital and medical school buildings.

Meanwhile we have provided, during the past year, quite extensive laboratory facilities at the present Hospital that were very greatly needed. We have transferred the case histories to what was formerly the corridor giving access from the Administration to the Surgical buildings, and have improved the service in the Out-Patient Department with the co-operation of the Dispensary Development Committee.

Careful study is now being given to other hospital problems which we hope to solve before moving to the new buildings.

The resignation of the Director of the Training School for Nurses, Miss Anna C. Maxwell, was presented in May. Miss Maxwell had been its guiding spirit for so many years that it is hard to think it possible that she no longer presides over the School. It was only natural, however, that Miss Maxwell should have asked to be relieved from the onerous duties of her office while still able to devote her great knowledge to the science of nursing, derived from her long experience, to the advantage of her profession generally. Miss Maxwell will always remain a member of the Presbyterian Hospital family. Her place is now being most ably filled by Miss Helen Young, a graduate of the Class of 1912 and Instructor in the School since her graduation.

The change in the personnel of the Hospital Staff, made necessary by the adoption of the "full time" plan, severed ties that bound many surgeons and physicians to the Presbyterian Hospital. The

Managers of the Hospital are very grateful to those who so long and so faithfully cared for the sick and injured within our walls. They were sorry to part with them and they hope that every one of them will retain his attachment to the Presbyterian Hospital, notwithstanding the fact that he is no longer connected with it professionally.

To the new members of our Staff, those who are giving all their time and energy to the care of patients, and the study of disease, we give a most cordial welcome.

To all the members of the Medical Staff, old and new, to the Superintendent and the loyal members of his staff, and to all others whose faithful performance of duty has enabled the institution to do its work, the Board of Managers hereby expresses its grateful appreciation.

To fully understand all that has been accomplished in the Hospital during the year 1921, it will be necessary to study the various reports that follow. They will be found to be most interesting and instructive.

Purposes for Which Income or Principal of Reserve Funds Is Used

Endowed Bed Fund, General Endowment Fund, Perry McDonough Collins Endowment Fund, Fiske Fund, Edwin Bancroft Foote Fund; Morris K. and Maria De Witt Jesup Fund, Margarette A. Jones Fund, John Stewart Kennedy Fund, Russell and Margaret Olivia Sage Memorial Fund, Sidman Trust Fund, Fund in Memory of John T. Terry, The Isaac E. Valentine Memorial Fund and Moses Weinman Fund. The income from these funds is applied toward the current expenses of the Hospital.

General Fund. Unrestricted legacies received since 1911 have been credited to this fund. It is intended to use the income of this fund to partly meet the current expenses of the Hospital and to draw on the principal, when necessary, to meet expenditures not otherwise provided for.

The Mrs. Frederic Baker Pathological Department Fund. To supply books, periodicals, and instruments for use in the Pathological Laboratory.

Charles K. Briddon Gold Medal Fund. The income from this fund provides the Dr. C. K. Briddon Gold Medal competed for every two years by members of the Alumni of the Presbyterian Hospital, who write essays requiring original research.

Cardiac Clinic Fund. For the treatment of cardiac cases by the Out-Patient Department.

Cheney Fund. To carry out certain investigations bearing upon glands of internal secretion.

Dental Department Fund. For the support of the Dental Department.

Dortic Memorial Fund. The principal of this fund may be applied to the erection and maintenance of a Convalescent Home in connection with the Hospital. Accumulated income may be used for the maintenance of Presbyterian Hospital patients in some approved Convalescent Home or Homes.

Mrs. David Dows Fund. The income from this fund is used to purchase scientific instruments for use in the Hospital for the study and cure of disease.

Margaret E. Dows Fund. The income from this fund is applied toward the current expenses of the School of Nursing.

East River Homes Fund. To meet the expenses of tubercular work in connection with patients in the district assigned to this Hospital by the Board of Health.

Fund for Educational and Scientific Work. The income from this fund is used for the support of the educational and scientific

work of the Hospital, in accordance with the agreement between the Hospital and Columbia University.

The Katie Geitz Fund. To meet expenses of the Diet Kitchen established for the benefit of tubercular patients and children in our district.

Hill Top Camp Fund. For the support of a camp at Hawthorne, N. Y., to which are sent the children of tubercular patients of the Out-Patient Department Clinic.

Holiday Cheer Fund. To provide decorations, entertainments, presents or other holiday cheer throughout the Hospital to patients, staff, nurses and employees.

House Staff Entertainment Fund. To provide recreation, entertainment, etc., for members of the House Staff.

Howland Fund. To defray the expenses of treatment and research work on certain forms of epilepsy.

Dr. Francis P. Kinnicutt Memorial Fund. To defray the cost of a Medical Ward in the new Presbyterian Hospital Buildings, when erected. The income is added to the principal.

Nurses' Cheer Fund. To provide entertainment and recreation for Nurses.

Patients' Cheer Fund. To provide occupational work and instruction, games, etc., for patients.

Patients' Relief Fund. To meet expenses account special relief for patients, not directly chargeable to the Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt Fund for Visiting Nursing.

Personal Injury Liability Insurance Fund. To pay approved claims against the Hospital for personal injuries sustained by employees while on the Hospital premises for which the Hospital is liable.

Room J. Trust Fund. The income from this fund is used to provide delicacies and extra nursing for patients occupying Room "J."

Sarah Sanford Fund. To provide temporary relief, apparatus and transportation for convalescents.

School of Nursing Endowment Fund. The income from this fund is used to maintain the educational work of the School of Nursing.

School of Nursing Library Fund. To provide periodicals and books for the School of Nursing Library.

School of Nursing Scholarship Fund. To provide scholarships for students in the School of Nursing, and traveling scholarships for graduates of the School.

H. Smith Periodical Fund. To provide periodicals for the wards of the Hospital.

George H. F. Schrader Fund, Tompkins Fund and Wall Fund. The income from each of these funds is paid to a beneficiary during life, and thereafter becomes the property of the Hospital.

The Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt Fund for Visiting Nursing and Relief. Provides the salary of one instructor, one social service worker, the maintenance and equipment of three student nurses, one clerical secretary, and administration of the Department. It also provides relief for Out-Patient Department patients, and loans to needy patients for surgical appliances, etc.

Frances Swan Welles Fund. One-half of the income from this fund is used to brighten and cheer the lives of trained nurses employed from time to time in the Hospital, and the other half to brighten and cheer the lives of patients in the general wards of the Hospital.

A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor to a like privilege for the children's ward.

A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor, during life, to nominate, from time to time, a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge. If the donor be a corporation or association, the privilege to nominate shall expire in fifteen years unless the privilege be extended by the Board of Managers, but shall in no event continue for a greater period than twenty-five years.

Any person or corporation being the donor of a \$5,000 bed may increase their donation to \$10,000, in which case they shall become thenceforth entitled to the privilege that attaches to an original donation of that amount.

The Salaries of Operating Room Nurses and Operating Room Orderlies are distributed in proportion to the numbers of Private Room Surgical Patients and Ward Surgical Patients treated.
METHOD OF FIGURING COST OF DIFFERENT BRANCHES OF SERVICE:

The method in use at the Presbyterian Hospital of figuring the total cost of caring for Ward Patients, Private Room Patients, Out-Patient Department Patients or Patients visited in their homes is to charge each branch of the service with salaries and wages of all persons employed exclusively in, and all supplies and repairs directly chargeable to such service, and to provide the other operating expenses which contribute to the different branches of service in such proportion as the Superintendent and his Assistants may consider most fair after careful consideration of the local conditions, which are, of course, subject to change from time to time. In determining the relative proportion of Administration Expenses, Ward Patients and to Private Room Patients is based upon the amount of treatment furnished in each service, modified by well-known facts; for instance, the fact that a private room patient requires more professional care than necessary if he were located in a ward; also, the important fact that his food and the preparation of it costs very much more than that of the ward patient. The distribution of the cost of General House and Property Expenses among the different branches of the service is based upon the relative cubic contents of those parts of the buildings occupied by each of the five services mentioned.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

December 31, 1921

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Gentlemen:—The Fifty-third Annual Report of the Superintendent of the Hospital for the year ending December 31st, 1921, is herewith respectfully submitted.

Twenty-two thousand seven hundred and thirty-eight persons have experienced the benefits of the Hospital during the year. The departments contributing this service and the number treated in each were as follows :

There were treated in the beds of the wards and private rooms of the Hospital 4213 persons. The daily average has been 215. Of the patients in the wards, 26.5% were treated free of charge.

There were treated in the Out-Patient Department 14,493 persons, and the daily average visits made were 313.

Our Visiting Nurses cared for 4,032 persons, making 21,343 visits.

In the Radiotherapy Department 3,227 treatments were given to 454 patients.

In the Roentgen Ray Department 16,313 plates and films were taken of 7,873 patients from the Hospital and Out-Patient Department.

The Department of Massage and Medical Gymnastics has given 6,210 treatments.

In comparing these figures with other years, the following facts should be considered as contributing toward the reduction of totals :

1. Since July 1st five private rooms were converted into offices for the use of the full time surgical staff. These rooms were restored to their regular use the latter part of December.
2. The admittance of gynecological cases was discontinued as a general policy, thereby lessening the usually overcrowded condition on the women's surgical wards.
3. All wards were painted during the summer, compelling restriction in admissions.
4. The general health of the City was unusually good during the latter half of the year and Hospital admissions throughout the City have been less.

Structural changes and redistribution of space during the year have resulted in greatly increased facilities for laboratory research, for routine service and research in problems of metabolism and nutrition,

and in office accommodation for the professional staff. The Roentgen Ray Department has been enlarged and a new organization agreed upon. The Record Room has been moved to better and more accessible quarters, utilizing space formerly used as a passageway. A considerable enlargement of the Janeway Library has been accomplished.

The Dental Department has justified its need, enlarged its activities, and, working in close co-operation and in harmony with other hospital departments, has become an accepted and established part of our daily service to the sick.

All of the above mentioned changes are recorded in detail in the reports of heads of departments elsewhere in this report.

The Hospital Bureau has increased its service to members, adding to its prestige by an enlarged membership and developing much greater activity in purchasing power.

The Hospital still continues to attract students of administrative work and of working methods in different departments. Many have been with us during the year, spending from a few days to two months in the record room, metabolism department, laboratories, nursing department and superintendent's office.

In the mechanical department, many repairs and much replacement have been necessary, in order to carry on our work with an old and constantly wearing equipment.

The establishment of luncheon service for the Attending Staff, in the Board of Managers' Room, has been a helpful influence and has saved many hours of time.

The School of Nursing is apparently recovered from the harassments of war and post-war conditions, and a steady and serious interest is manifested in the work of its students.

Dr. Longcope's return to private practice has deprived us of the pleasure of his daily presence. We are constantly reminded in many ways of Miss Maxwell's absence from the Hospital. We miss the stimulus of her personality, though the influence of her goodness and the strength of her ideals remain.

I again wish to thank all our Hospital friends, the Board of Managers, the Professional Staff and all our associates in service for the help, co-operation and interest which have made possible the satisfactory fulfillment of our obligations.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF MEDICAL SERVICE

December 31, 1921

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to submit the following report from the Medical Service.

The past year has brought many changes, both in personnel and organization, in the Medical Service, due to the affiliation of the Hospital with the College of Physicians and Surgeons. In the organization of the Department of Medicine on the university basis, several men on the staff now devote their entire time to the work of the Hospital, teaching and research. The work of reorganization has gone forward most satisfactorily because of the very excellent department which my predecessor, Dr. Warfield T. Longscope, has built up. To provide laboratory facilities for the full time men, extensive changes have been made by adding floor space and rearrangement, so as to increase the capacity of the laboratories. In Chemistry, the space has been increased 300%, the research facilities increased 800%, while the budget for operation has increased only 98%. On the Biological division, the space has been increased 200%, the research facilities increased 100%, while the budget was increased only 21%. The new construction, in order to accomplish the above, was pushed forward with quite surprising rapidity, so that the laboratories were in nearly full operation by November, although the work was not started until July. In arranging the laboratories, provision was made for proper space for the clinical clerks. Previously, there has been a small room with desk space for only three students. Now, each clinical clerk has his own desk space, with adequate apparatus.

Notwithstanding the considerable increase in the laboratory space, all is being used to its full capacity. Several excellent men have applied for positions on the staff, but have been refused for lack of room in the laboratories. There are now on the Medical Staff 18 men actively engaged in the investigation of clinical problems, through chemical, bacteriological and biological channels. The special fund of \$5,000, donated last year by Mr. Charles P. Howland, for the study of Epilepsy, under the direction of Dr. Geyelin, has been continued this year through the Commission on Epilepsy. The Misses Cheney have continued the fund of \$5,000 per annum for the study of diseases of the endocrine glands under the direction of Dr. Draper. Through the kindness of the Board of Managers, Dr. Walter B. James and Mr. Cleveland H. Dodge, it has been possible to send Dr. George Harrop, the Medical Resident, on the expedition to Peru, headed by Dr. Joseph Barcroft, of England, to study the Physiological Effects of High Altitudes. On going to the town of Cerro de Pasco, situated at an altitude of 14,200 feet above sea

level, the Commission was able to study the physiology of respiration under low oxygen pressures. By means of a special technique, which Dr. Harrop had acquired in Copenhagen, it was possible to study the rate of diffusion of oxygen through the lungs, and observations of considerable value were made, indicating that it is possible to select persons who will be able to tolerate life at high altitudes. Furthermore, the use of this method on this expedition has suggested important work in respiratory and circulatory diseases, in life at ordinary altitudes. The expedition was an unusually successful one, and the results of their observations should prove of great importance in normal and pathological physiology.

Under the direction of Dr. Geyelin and Dr. Ladd, the Metabolism Service has been reorganized, and Miss Amalia Lautz placed in charge as Chief Dietitian. Additional space has been secured, and by rearrangement it is now possible to supply twelve carefully prepared diets for patients with metabolic diseases, under special observation and investigation. Also, additional diets to eighteen patients on both Medical and Surgical Services, who need special routine treatment. It is believed that the organization of the metabolic and special diabetic work of the Hospital on this basis is an important step forward.

Progress in co-ordinating the Out-Patient and Ward services has been made by having the men devoting their entire time to the Hospital, work both in the Out-Patient Department and in the Wards. The special clinics (Metabolic, Thyroid, Asthma, and Cardiac) are growing in size and importance. The Dispensary Development Committee has been of service by supplying funds and by suggestions for improving and making more efficient the work of the general Out-Patient Department. It is expected that the aid of this Committee will be of increasing value to the Out-Patient Department.

A discharge clinic has been established, which has been of great service already, and should prove of increasing value as it becomes better organized. The object of this clinic is to insure proper supervision of the discharge of patients from the Medical Wards. It provides that the Attending Physician shall be responsible for the final note and diagnosis; the completeness of the records; the follow up arrangements; the supplying of information to the patient or member of family; necessary instruction for after care; sending a copy of the final note to the patient's physician, if the patient so desires, and arranging any necessary social service supervision.

Through the kindness of Dr. Samuel Lambert the original Cammann sethescope has been given to the Janeway Library. Mr. D. M. Cammann has given to this collection of stethoscopes a solid wooden stethometer which belonged to his father.

The much needed additional space has been provided for the Janeway Memorial Library, which has greatly enhanced its value as

a place for reading and study. The Surgical Library has been added, so that now the medical and surgical library facilities are brought together, a matter of considerable convenience to both staffs. The Library now contains 7,200 volumes, 1,100 of which were added last year.

It is the desire of the Director of the Medical Service to express his warm appreciation of the support and advice of the Board of Managers, also deep gratitude for the co-operation and patience of the Medical Staff during a rather difficult and trying period of change and reorganization.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF SURGICAL SERVICE

December 31, 1921.

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Gentlemen:—I have the honor of submitting to you the following report from the Surgical Service:

With the agreement between the Managers of the Hospital and the Trustees of Columbia University came the necessity of reorganizing the Surgical Service so that it would function on the University basis. Had it not been for the generous spirit and broad-minded view of former members of the Attending Surgical Staff and the hearty co-operation of your Board, the Hospital administrative, nursing and interne staff, this reorganization would have been extremely difficult.

It is a great pleasure to acknowledge the benefits of the far-sighted policy and constructive changes effected by my predecessor, Dr. Adrian V. S. Lambert. Our system of records, developed to its present nation-wide recognition under Dr. Lambert's supervision, is but one of the factors of present success and promise in our plans for the new hospital, for which he is responsible.

The new plan of organization, based in a measure upon a University budget, called for a smaller group of surgeons, inasmuch as their entire time was to be spent in the Hospital. This made necessary the readjustment of the schedule and the conduct of the service, and, although, in a project hitherto untried in many ways, hard and fast lines cannot be drawn, it is gratifying to record the co-operation of everyone in the schedule of early ward and dressing rounds, morning work in the Operating Room, Diagnosis and Follow-Up Clinics. This has made it possible for more time in the afternoon for teaching and investigative work outside of the wards. The organization of Discharge Rounds has proved of great value, in placing the patients in the right attitude to the Hospital and bringing us into a better relation with the family or referring physicians. It has improved our Follow-Up results.

The moving of the Record Room to the East Corridor has proved of inestimable value to Staff members and to the medical students. This is the nearest approach to our ideal of having the Record Room, in the Clinic that could be accomplished. This move left vacant the space on the second surgical floor. The installation in this space of offices for the Surgical Attendings has been greatly appreciated. The private rooms, temporarily assigned for this purpose, will revert to their former use.

The development of the diagnosis section in the morning clinic, which was begun last year, has progressed and has been greatly assisted by the Dispensary Development Committee. We feel there

should be more co-operation between the several services of the Hospital in this diagnosis section because of its prime importance in the developme of the future Clinic. We have this year added a member of the Urological and Oto-Laryngogical staff for consultation in the diagnosis section. The referring of all fracture cases to a room in the Out-Patient Department after receiving emergency treatment, as had been done for other traumatic and minor surgical cases, has proved of great benefit both to patients and to the members of the house staff, and has consolidated all the Out-Patient Surgery under the supervision of the Chief of Clinic.

The return to a rotating twenty months' service for members of the house staff has remedied the unavoidable faults of the continuous service maintained during the war period.

In submitting this report, it is a pleasure to record the unfailing spirit of co-operation in the hospital. This has done more than all else to make it possible for the Surgical Staff to assume new responsibilities and to meet new problems.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE PATHOLOGICAL SERVICE

December 31, 1921.

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Gentlemen:—I beg to submit herewith the report of the Pathological Department of the Hospital for the year ending December 31st, 1921.

As in previous years, the work of the Medical Pathology Laboratory has been devoted to the performance of autopsies, with the histological studies of tissues obtained therefrom, and to the teaching of gross and microscopic pathology to the second and third year medical students of Columbia University. Pathological conferences have been held weekly in conjunction with Grand Rounds for the Staff. At these conferences, the material from cases coming to autopsy is presented and discussed by both clinicians and pathologists.

During the year from July 1920 to July 1921, there were 328 deaths in the Hospital, and 98 autopsies were obtained, a percentage of 29.8. There has been a decrease in the number of autopsies obtained, as compared with the previous year. However, the variety of the conditions found, in a measure, compensates for this decrease.

During the summer, the following second year medical students worked in the laboratory: Messrs. J. Bailin, O. Jones, S. Lambert, Jr., R. Schullinger and S. R. Snow, Jr. Each of these students has prepared a report of an interesting and unusual case, which will be published soon.

The course in Pathology for the nurses has been conducted by Dr. VonGlahn.

In January 1921, Dr. John Minor was appointed Assistant Resident Pathologist, which position he held until July 1921. Upon his resignation, he was succeeded by Dr. H. Kingsley Blake.

Studies in tuberculosis have been pursued during the year by Dr. VonGlahn, with the assistance of Dr. Minor and Dr. Blake.

A complete photographic outfit has been added to the equipment of the laboratory.

There have been no important changes in organization or personnel during the year.

During the year the plan of assigning internes to work in the Laboratory for periods of two months each was introduced, and this has resulted in a much greater smoothness of co-operation between wards, operating room and laboratory. Also, this Laboratory has undertaken to prepare media, glassware, etc., for the medical bacteriological research laboratories. The efficiency of this arrangement cannot yet be discussed, since these laboratories have scarcely started to work.

Since both of these arrangements make for more breakage and a larger amount of work on the part of the technicians, it may be well, in recasting the budget for the coming year, to take these matters into consideration. The chief research going on in the laboratory has been upon anaerobic surgical infections, especially work carried out by Dr. Humphreys on the gas bacillus group which, however, is not yet sufficiently completed to be published. During the year, a room was added to the Laboratory, an arrangement made possible

by partitioning the north end of the former animal room and cutting a door through to the Bacteriological Laboratory. This has made it considerably easier for the staff to work, and has made possible the arrangement with internes indicated above.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF DENTAL SERVICE

December 31, 1921.

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Gentlemen:—It gives me pleasure to submit the following report covering the activities of the Dental Service for the year 1921.

Early in the year, the taking of X-rays for each patient admitted to the Hospital was established as routine practice, and the dental diagnosis and history is attached to the case history of the patient. This procedure has been of much benefit to the patient in a large percentage of cases handled. After the X-Rays are obtained, each patient receives a prophylactic treatment, thus cleaning up the oral cavity as much as possible, and then the necessary extractions are performed and fillings inserted.

Lectures have been given to the Training School nurses on Tooth Development and Dental Hygiene, and the system of semi-annual prophylactic treatment and dental examinations for the nurses has been established.

Co-operation between the Wards and the Dental Clinic has resulted in a large increase in the number of ward patients receiving dental treatment.

Increasing demands upon our X-Ray Department made it necessary to fit up a special Dental X-Ray room which has facilitated the progress of the work in this department materially.

The clinic has been fitted with new overhead illuminators throughout, thus effecting a much needed improvement.

Three new dental chairs have been installed.

In addition to this the dental engines have been put into good condition and new instruments and appliances have been added as needed, and, speaking in general terms, the Dental Clinic is now in better running order than ever before.

The appended statistics show the volume of work accomplished for the year of 1921.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

December 31, 1921.

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Gentlemen:—The report of the Department of Occupational Therapy for the year ending December 31st, 1921, is herewith submitted.

Six hundred and seventy-two patients have been taught occupations.

The following crafts have been taught and the following articles made:

The patients usually take their work home, after paying a small sum that partly covers the cost of the material. Articles left are sold. Thus a small fund is kept on hand for the purchase of smaller supplies (paint, dye, thread, etc.) In the past five months, this fund has grown to such an extent that we have been able to turn in \$50 to the general Hospital fund from which larger supplies, (reed, trays for bases, etc.), are purchased. Since the cost of these materials is

about \$400 a year, the Department is not yet self supporting. We feel, however, that a start in this direction has been made.

During the year, Miss Margaret Hewlett, Miss Philadelphia Beard, Miss Dorothy Wolfinger and Miss Elsie Gunner were sent to this Department for their practice teaching. In the Spring, Miss Alida Carter resigned, and, on June 1st, Miss Elizabeth Armstrong took up the work with Miss Margaret Hewlett as assistant.

On November fifteenth, Occupational Therapy was introduced into the Tuesday night Cardiac Clinic. The vocational side of the work is emphasized here. These patients, physically unable to undertake steady employment, many of them needing money and consequently depressed, are taught a craft, and given materials to work on at home. From the sale price of these articles, the cost of the material is taken out for the Hospital Fund, the remaining sum going to the patients. With proper equipment, there is no doubt that this work could become self-supporting in a comparatively short time.

There is no out-patient work done in connection with this Department, but some of the patients are continuing the crafts, learned in the Hospital, at home. One woman, by making and selling dolls and tatted work, is earning for an artificial leg.

In a general hospital, where most of the cases are so transient, results are possibly not so obvious as in tuberculosis sanitariums or asylums for the insane, where the patients are confined for a longer time. The methods used, however, and the reactions on the part of the patients are the same. Two cases of hysteria and four of depression have been helped more speedily toward normality by Occupational Therapy. Also, several patients whose limbs have become weakened through inactivity have been sent to us for treatment—one man modelled in clay to help the muscles of his hand. New self-confidence was gained by three men who had undergone arm amputations, when they discovered that they could make baskets with one hand. One of these men had lost his right arm. A rather unique application of Occupational Therapy is illustrated in the case of a man who had undergone a leg amputation. Under the direction of the doctor, this patient made a reed basket support, later cast in plaster, for his artificial leg.

In other cases, the results are not so apparent, perhaps, but Occupational Therapy bridges over the period between the inactivity caused by illness and the resuming of duties will not be so abrupt. And in all cases, the minds of the patients are filled with baskets instead of blues and the general conditions thereby immeasurably improved.

Gentlemen:—The report of the Out-Patient Department for the year ending December 31st, 1921, is herewith submitted. There have been 11,302 new patients admitted to the benefits of the Out-Patient Department, which, together with 3,191 former patients, makes a total of 14,493 different patients treated. A total of 23,898 cases were treated during the year, of which 9,405 were transferred to one or more clinics. 89,101 visits were made, 11,911 of which were free. The daily average number of patients was 313.

REPORT OF THE OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT

December 31, 1921.

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Gentlemen:—The following is a report of the Out-Patient Department for the twelve months ending December 31st, 1921.

SURGICAL OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT

In the report submitted a year ago, the inauguration of a Surgical Diagnostic Clinic was announced, and the need of a closer liaison between the Accident Ward and the Out-Patient Department was emphasized. The Surgeon-in-Chief wishes to call particular attention to the progress along these two lines.

The most important development in the Surgical Out-Patient Department has been the growth of the Diagnostic Clinic, a growth

which is not merely represented by numbers, but a growth in experience and vision in future possibilities. The number of patients seen in the Diagnostic Clinic during the past twelve months was 1,457; 521 of these patients have been admitted to the hospital. During the month of October, 48% of the total admissions to the surgical service came through the Diagnostic Clinic. This figure was twice as great as during the first month of the year. The average throughout the year has been 30%. We feel that we are paving the way to a condition where all admissions will be through the Out-Patient Department, including the Emergency Ward cases, which now pass through the Emergency Ward, a unit geographically isolated from the Out-Patient Department.

The time saved for the patient by a thorough examination in the Out-Patient Department, prior to the admission, has not been as great as had been anticipated. These patients remain in the hospital an average of one day less than those coming through the Emergency Ward. It might be well to study more carefully the types of cases admitted from both portals, to learn why more time is not saved by prior complete examinations with all laboratory and radiographic data. We feel that much has been accomplished in this department, but that more remains to be done.

Towards accomplishing the much needed liaison between the Out-Patient Department and the Emergency Ward, two steps have been taken, namely, removal of fractures from the Emergency Ward to the Out-Patient Department, and the training of the House Staff in surgical dressings in the Out-Patient Department prior to their work in the Emergency Ward.

The transfer of routine fracture treatment from the Emergency Ward to the Out-Patient Department has been accomplished quite recently. During the clinic hours all fractures are seen in the Out-Patient Department. It has been found much more satisfactory, from the standpoint of treatment, and of teaching, to have the fracture cases segregated. Very careful and accurate records and follow-up results are being obtained. This youngest department of the Surgical Out-Patient Department promises exceedingly well.

Since July 1st, a junior House Officer, from the surgical service has been working in a dressing room of the Out-Patient Department for a two months' period. He does routine dressings and is made familiar with the common Out-Patient Department surgical conditions. This is accomplished under supervision, with consultation always available. His next tour of duty following this type of work, carries him to the Emergency Ward where he is able to meet his work with considerable familiarity, having served an apprenticeship in Out-Patient Department methods and procedure. We feel that this training will prove exceedingly valuable.

The Committee on Dispensary Development from the Rockefeller Foundation saw fit, during the year, to choose the Out-Patient Department of this hospital for a demonstration Out-Patient Department. That Committee has expressed its willingness to provide large funds to aid in the efficient handling of the patients. Their suggestions have been welcome and usually of great value. The Out-Patient Department has functioned more efficiently since the appointment of a Dispensary Executive responsible to the Superintendent. The admission of patients and keeping and distribution of records have been vastly improved during the past year. The surgical Out-Patient Department is further indebted to the committee for the services of a clinic secretary in the Diagnostic Clinic, another in Oral Surgery and a stenographer. These workers have aided materially in increasing the efficiency of the surgical Out-Patient Department. We have still further problems at hand, which we hope to solve with the aid of this committee.

There has been an increasing spirit of co-operation between the Medical and Surgical Out-Patient Department. It is hoped that this may be followed up by an arrangement of hours when a medical consultant may be present at the surgical clinic and vice versa. Plans are under consideration whereby certain types of cases may be studied jointly by both the physicians and the surgeons. These are but steps toward the ideal medical and surgical clinics, held simultaneously.

The Chief of the Clinic wishes to thank the Head Nurse for the high standard of nursing that has been maintained in the surgical Out-Patient Department.

The surgical Out-Patient Department is at present adequately and efficiently manned by a corps of five attending surgeons in addition to the chief, each of whom holds the position of instructor in the Department of Surgery.

The Surgeon-in-Chief desires to express his deep appreciation of the splendid, conscientious work of his associates. Their efforts have made possible the results achieved.

MEDICAL OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT

The Medical Out-Patient Department is still hampered by lack of room, but, in spite of the limited quarters, we have been able to take care of more new cases than in the past few years, without relaxing in any way our standards.

The greatest changes during the past year have resulted from the agreement between the Board of Managers of the Hospital and the

Dispensary Development Committee, whereby funds have been provided by the Development Committee and suggestions have been made with a view to enlarging the scope and improving the executive management of the Out-Patient Department. The Development Committee have generously supplied money for the purchase of supplies and equipment and have paid the salaries of four additional members of the clerical force. They have likewise furnished clerical assistance in the form of Clinic Secretaries in the Dental Department and in the Men's and Women's Medical. The last named have supplanted the Volunteer Aides. A few of the volunteer workers still come as individuals and continue to render invaluable assistance, but their organization as such has been discontinued. The Development Committee also studied the routine management of the Clinic and suggested certain changes, particularly with reference to the admitting of patients. Some of these changes have been instituted, others have been tried and discarded as not practicable.

As an outgrowth of the above agreement, a new office has been created—that of Dispensary Executive. This office has been efficiently filled by Miss Elsie Jameson, whose efforts and co-operation have relieved the Surgical and Medical Chiefs of many of the details of administration unrelated to the care of patients. The Dispensary Executive is directly responsible to the Hospital Superintendent.

The various sub-clinics of the Medical Out-Patient Department have progressed and are constantly growing—the two largest of these are the sections for dermatology and syphilology, and for cardiacs. The cardiac class has grown especially and in addition to its two afternoon sessions, has a large evening class, one evening a week. At the evening sessions, occupational therapy has been introduced, and it is hoped to expand this phase in the near future. The value of the cardiac class in furnishing teaching material cannot be over-estimated.

A new clinical laboratory has been installed, so that now most of the routine clinical pathology of the Out-Patient Department is done in the Out-Patient Department—a much more efficient system than the old one.

The Medical Staff has been augmented by the addition of a member of the House Staff working daily in the Out-Patient Department (each of the two House Physicians working three days a week), and by several of the Assistant Attendings, who are working both in the Wards and in the Out-Patient Department. This is a step toward the goal of a united staff carrying on all the work whether the patient is ambulatory or a bed case, and is a real advance.

The Physician-in-Chief desires again to express publicly his appreciation of the faithful and unremitting efforts of his able assistants, without whose co-operation the work could not go on.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE SCHOOL OF NURSING

December 31, 1921.

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to present the twenty-ninth annual report of the School of Nursing for the year ending December 31st, 1921.

Many changes have taken place in the School Office Staff since the writing of the last report.

The resignation of Anna C. Maxwell, founder, and for twenty-nine years, Director of the School, was accepted April 12th, 1921, and took effect July 1st, 1921. This would be an irreparable loss, did we not feel that she is still with us in spirit and that we always can be sure of her counsel and support. Miss Maxwell's influence in nursing reaches far beyond the School which she founded—in fact, far beyond the limits of her own country. Our School should be the expression of her ideals, and I am earnestly asking your co-operation in upholding these ideals.

Janet B. Christie, Class '98, Assistant Director since 1904, resigned July 1921. Elspeth A. Gould, Class '09, Second Assistant since 1911, resigned July 1921. Alice A. Keith, Dietitian since 1909, resigned in July 1921.

The Metabolism Department is undergoing a re-organization with a view to an increase in the specialized work. This necessitates an increase in the nursing staff.

Nineteen hundred and twenty-one marked the beginning of the new arrangements for the affiliating course leading to the B. S. degree of Columbia University and the diploma of the School. Under the new arrangement, the students enter Teachers' College, Columbia University, for two years. During this time, in addition to the academic work, they cover the subjects of the preliminary instruction. The third and fourth years are spent at the Presbyterian Hospital, during which period, they receive their instruction in the care of patients, etc. The last year is spent at Teachers' College, the student choosing a program emphasizing the branch of nursing in which she wishes to specialize. This arrangement is superior to the former one, in that the student will not be required to go back and forth to Columbia, thus being able to give undivided attention to one branch of the work at a time.

In October of this year, the Pension Fund of the Alumnae began to function, the first quarter being due in January 1922.

The report of the Visiting Nursing and Social Service Department which heretofore has been incorporated in this report, will be found under a separate heading.

The Commencement Exercises of the Class of 1921 were held on May 19th in the Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church. The address to the graduating class was delivered by Rev. Harry Emerson Fosdick, D. D. The Alumnae made a special effort to be present as most of them had heard of Miss Maxwell's resignation. It was estimated that three hundred Alumnae were in the procession—a most gratifying tribute to the retiring Director.

There has been a marked improvement in the number of applicants since the last report.

Also do we wish to express our gratitude to the friends of the School who provide delightful entertainment for our students with theatre and opera tickets.

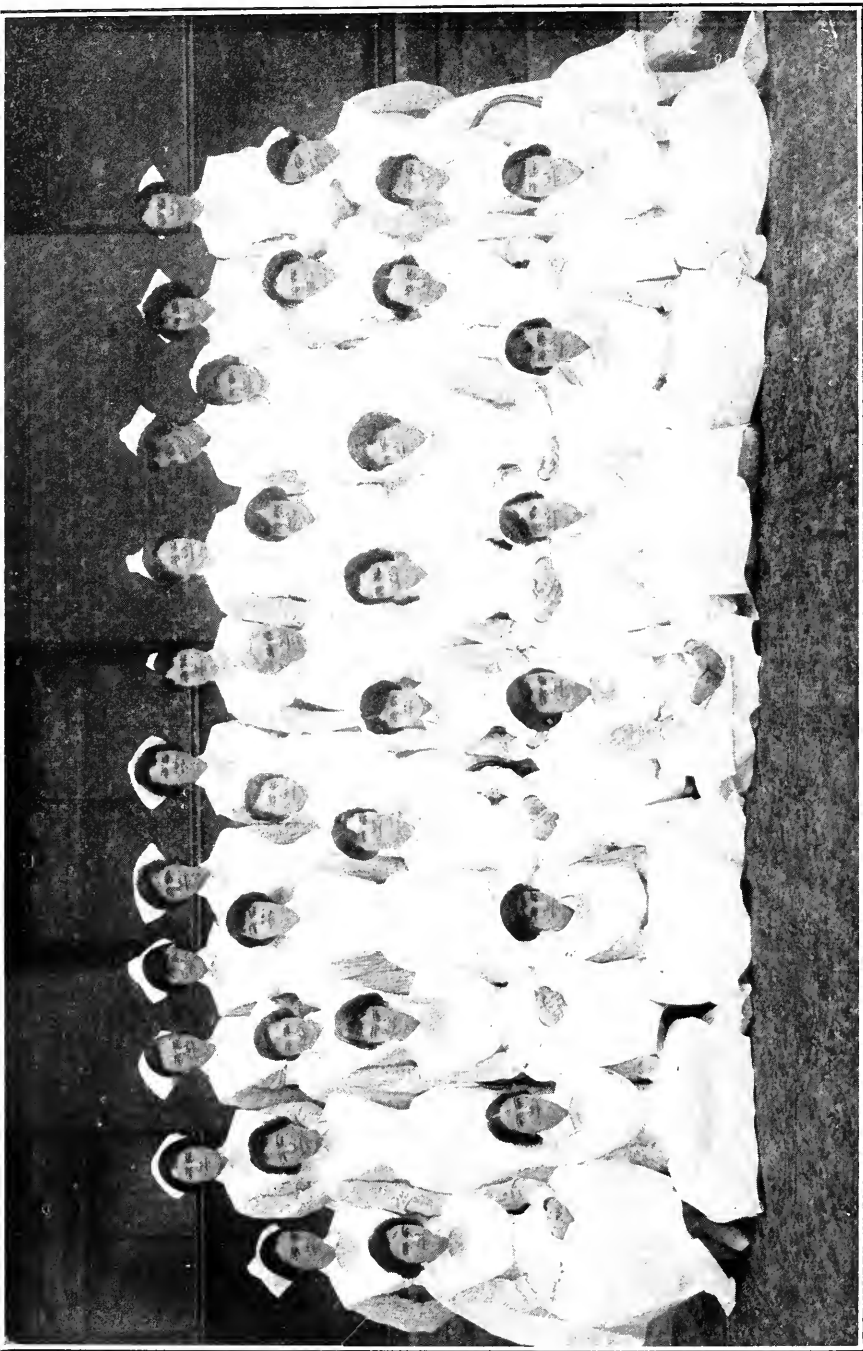
During a year of changes, as this has been, the support and co-operation of the Attending Staff, the House Staff, and the Nursing Staff, have been deeply appreciated.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE AND VISITING NURSING DEPARTMENT

December 31, 1921.

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen:—The Social Service and Visiting Nursing Department has completed its eighteenth year. Eight students in their senior year have received a short training in Visiting Nursing by caring for former hospital patients living within the vicinity of the Hospital and in need of nursing care in their homes.

The probationers at the conclusion of six months in the School attend a lecture on Hospital Social Service given by the Director and afterwards go with the nurses to the homes of ex-ward patients. This gives them a broad, sympathetic outlook and secures their interest and co-operation during the years of training.

Social Service work has been carried on in the following clinics, viz, Tuberculosis, Cardiac, Surgical and Medical Follow-Up and in the Hospital wards and Out-Patient Department.

On account of the large amount of social service necessary in connection with the Tuberculosis Clinic, a second Social Worker was appointed—her work has been almost entirely preventive, with the “contacts” or children exposed to tuberculosis.

Through the interest and co-operation of the Association of Tuberculosis Clinics, an offer to start a Health Class for under-nourished and underweight children, under the supervision of one of their staff specially trained for this work, was gladly accepted. There being no available place in the Hospital, the use of a large room in the Church House of the Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church was given for the purpose.

Knowing of the great need of the preventive work among the children of the Out-Patient Department, it is earnestly hoped that the way may be provided for other classes to be held in connection with both the Tuberculosis and the Orthopoedic Clinics.

We realize that the Hospital's obligations and responsibility to its patients require that they should receive an adequate social service care as they are receiving medical and surgical attention, as a disturbed social condition is often the direct cause of the need of hospital treatment. This intensive social service and preventive care for the Out-Patient Department patients have not been given as completely as the need calls for, due to the lack of a sufficient number of Social Workers to cover the field.

The Katie Geitz Diet Kitchen, an important branch of the Department, has increased its activities through the past year. Opened for the purpose of dispensing milk to our tuberculosis patients and sick children, also cooked food in the neighborhood, the

greater part of the work now, brought about by the apparent need, is in catering to the school children in the Open Air classes on the roof of the East River Home and the near-by Public Schools. Hot milk supplied through the Board of Education and soup paid for by the pupils have been sent daily to the roof schools. In addition to this, at the noon hour, an average of fifty children, many of whose mothers are working, come to the Diet Kitchen for a simple, warm lunch for five cents. The lack of space makes it difficult to accommodate the eager applicants, but the Hospitals is filling a great need not yet undertaken by any other agency in the neighborhood.

The greater part of the Fresh Air Work accomplished by the Department was by means of our Camp at Hawthorne, New York. One hundred and eight children, cardiacs and specially selected underweight children of tuberculosis parents, were cared for during the eleven weeks it was open. Besides the benefit derived from fresh air, good food, etc., the children were constantly under the supervision of a graduate kindergartner. The Scully-Walton Ambulance Company again very kindly arranged to transport the children to the Grand Central Station.

A number of these children attend the Open Air Schools of the Board of Education and all remain under our care during the year. The funds necessary for this work are obtained each year through the personal interest of Dr. and Mrs. Herbert S. Carter and friends.

The Christmas season was a happy one in the Department, made possible by the many generous gifts and services from our old and new friends. Through them three hundred and seventy patients of the Out-Patient Department received from one to three gifts apiece. Included among this number were stockings for the ward children and stockings and gifts for our "shut-ins" at home. Three hundred of our young friends greatly enjoyed the Christmas Party given in the Dispensary, and we feel sure that, while saluting and

swearing allegiance to their Country's Flag, they also included the Presbyterian Hospital.

Thirty-four dinners from our Christmas Fund and ten through Bellevue Hospital Social Service, the gift of Mr. Vincent Astor, brought Christmas of a practical nature to our poorest families.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE ALUMNAE ASSOCIATION OF THE SCHOOL OF NURSING OF THE PRESBYTERIAN HOSPITAL IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Gentlemen:—The seventh report of the Alumnae Association of the School of Nursing of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York to appear in the Annual Report of the Hospital, and which I have the honor of presenting to you, is for the year ending December 31, 1921.

Without doubt, the most indelible incident of the year was Alumnae Day, May 20, 1921, which certainly will never be forgotten by those of us who were fortunate enough to be able to attend. This occasion was an epoch in the history of the Association as it just preceded the severance of Miss Maxwell's connection with the School of Nursing as its Director, in which capacity she had always inspired her nurses to do their very best and had so endeared herself to them as to make it impossible for them adequately to express their feelings for her. Every class which has graduated from this School was represented by as many of its members as could possibly get there, and after luncheon we all gathered round Miss Maxwell to listen to the tributes of the various classes expressed in the form of some anecdote or incident which was related to their associations. This opportunity was taken to present Miss Maxwell with a handsomely bound and illuminated copy of a resolution as well as a gift contributed by her graduates as a slight expression of their esteem.

At the Annual Meeting which was held immediately succeeding the above related incidents, it was determined to have a portrait painted of Miss Maxwell, which we hope may be placed in the Nurses' Home.

The tentative plan for operating the Pension Fund became effective this year with its accompanying increase in dues, which has stimulated more interest and comment than any discussions which were held previous to the adoption of this tentative plan. Criticisms regarding the present plan are being offered, which, we hope, will result in a plan for administering this Fund, which will prove more satisfactory. Each member of the Association has been requested to contribute \$50 towards increasing the principle of the Pension Fund, this amount to be procured by any suitable means. Members are responding most encouragingly and bending their efforts towards earning their contributions. Upon October first eight members became eligible for pensions, the first payments of which are to be made early in the coming year.

The many letters received from our members scattered throughout this and foreign countries seems to indicate that we are most creditably represented wherever nurses are to be found.

Our organization was increased to 551 members by the addition of thirty new members during the year, but the death of Miss Mary Anna Johnson on February 1, 1921, which we record with the deepest regret, leaves a total of 550 members.

The Treasurer's Report shows that several large expenditures were made during the year, so that our finances in the General fund are more depleted than usual.

The proceedings to change the name of the Association were completed and the name is now as printed in the first paragraph, in accordance with an order of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, so our name now agrees with the present title of the School of Nursing.

On behalf of this Association I wish to express our appreciation for your continued interest and assistance.

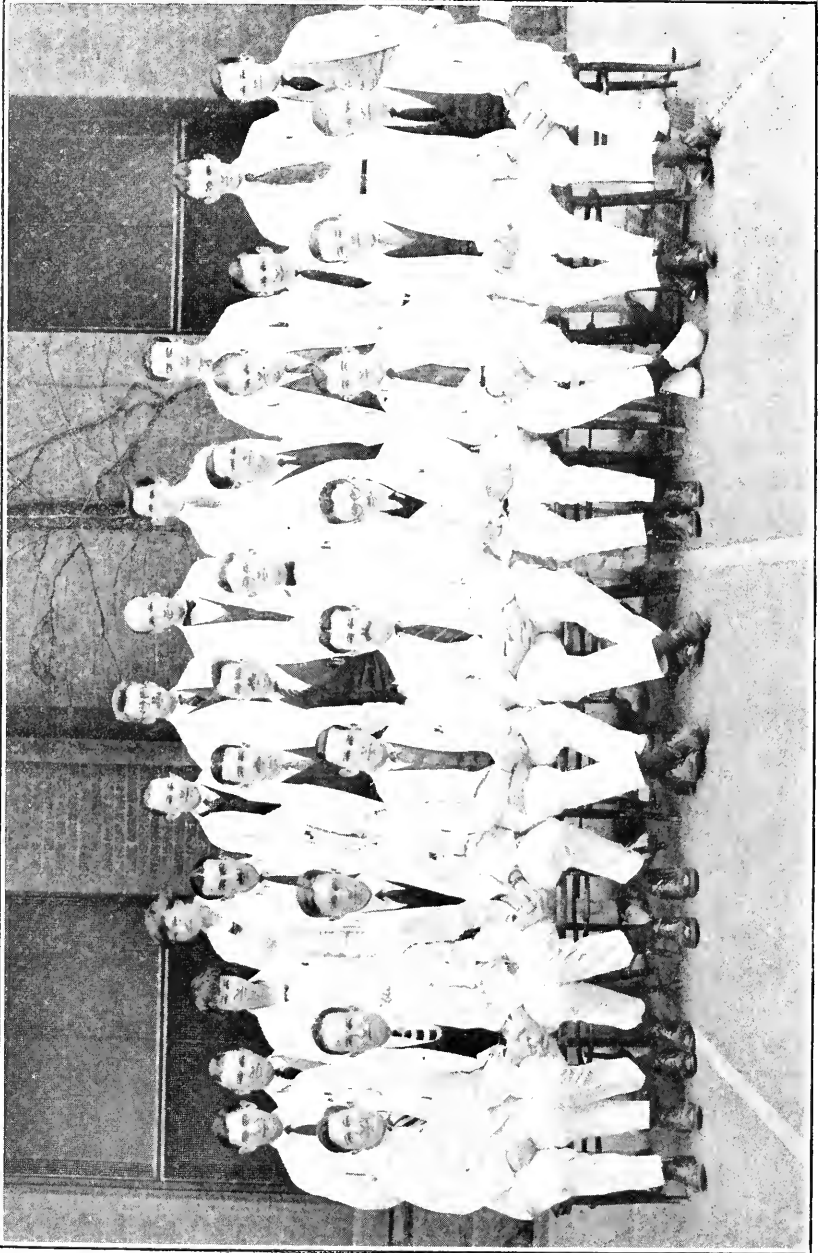

CHARTER

AN ACT

To Found a Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York.

Passed February 28, 1868—Chapter 15.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. James Lenox, John Taylor Johnston, Robert L. Stuart, Morris K. Jesup, Marshall S. Bidwell, and their associates, as hereinafter named, shall constitute a body corporate, with power to establish, maintain, and conduct a Hospital in the City of New York, which shall be known and designated as "The Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York."

Section 2. The property and concerns of said Corporation shall be vested in and managed by a Board of thirty-two Managers (by act of March 28, 1868, increased to thirty-six Managers), to be constituted as provided for in the following section.

Section 3. James Brown, Marshall S. Bidwell, William A. Booth, Aaron B. Belknap, William E. Dodge, James Donaldson, John C. Green, Winthrop S. Gilman, Robert M. Hartley, Richard Irvin, Edward S. Jaffray, Thomas Jeremiah, Morris K. Jesup, John Taylor Johnson, James Lenox, David Olyphant, William Paton, Thomas C. M. Paton, Joseph Stuart, Robert L. Stuart, Thomas U. Smith, Jonathan Sturges, Otis D. Swan, Charles N. Talbot, Willard Parker M. D., John R. Ford, Henry M. Taber, Alexander Van Rensselaer, William M. Vermilye, Washington R. Vermilye, A. R. Wetmore, and A. Robertson Walsh, thirty-two in number, shall constitute a part of the Board of Managers. To these thirty-two Managers, the Rev. William M. Paxton, D. D., as Minister of the First Presbyterian Church; the Rev. William Adams, D. D., as Minister of the Madison Square Presbyterian Church; the Rev. Thomas Dewitt, D. D., as Senior Minister of the Collegiate Church of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church, and the Rev. John N. McLeod, D. D., as Minister of the First Reformed Presbyterian Church, all in the City of New York, and their successors in office for the time being, shall, by virtue of their respective offices, be associated as members of the Board of Managers.

Section 4. As soon as practicable after the passage of this Act, the said Board shall organize, and by lot divide the thirty-two Managers into four classes of eight each, and the places of the said classes shall be vacant respectively on the second Wednesday in April, one, two, three, and four years thereafter, so that eight Managers shall be elected by the said Board of Managers annually, by ballot, to hold their seats for four years.

Section 5. The Board of Managers shall have power to fill all vacancies that may occur in the said Board, to enact By-Laws, and to appoint all such agents, assistants, and attendants as may be proper to carry out the purposes of the said Corporation. Among these shall be included a Superintendent and a Chaplain or both a Superintendent and a Chaplain; but these positions shall be held only by Presbyterians.

Section 6. Not less than eleven Managers shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of electing Officers, making or changing By-Laws, or for holding any special meeting; but for all other purposes, and at stated meetings, seven shall be a quorum.

Section 7. The said Corporation are authorized to take by purchase, devise, or otherwise, and may hold, transfer, and convey, for the purposes of said Hospital, all the real and personal property of which it may become possessed, in so far as the same is in accordance with the general laws of this State, and not otherwise, and which said property shall be exempt from taxation, and shall be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of law relating to charitable institutions.

Section 8. This Corporation shall possess the general powers, and be subject to the provisions, restrictions and liabilities contained in the 3d Title of the 18th Chapter of Part First of the Revised Statutes.

Section 9. This Act shall take effect immediately.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.

Title.

The name by which this Society shall be known shall be, "The Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York."

ARTICLE II.

Object.

The object of the Society is the establishment, support and management of an Institution for the purpose of affording medical and surgical aid and nursing to sick or disabled persons of every creed, nationality, and color. The public religious services in the Hospital shall be in conformity with the doctrine and forms of the Presbyterian or Reformed Church.

ARTICLE III.

The Society.

The Society shall consist of Life Members, who shall respectively be approved by a majority of members of the Board of Managers present at a stated meeting, and who shall have been nominated at a previous stated meeting by a Standing Committee appointed for that purpose by the Board.

ARTICLE IV.

Endowed Beds.

The Board of Managers may fix amounts which when paid shall entitle the donor to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge, subject, however, to such rules and regulations for the admission, treatment, and discharge of patients as are now, or shall be hereafter, prescribed by said Board.

Where such nomination is accorded during life, or in perpetuity, the amount paid therefor shall be kept invested in income-producing securities until the privilege may lapse by the death of the donor or otherwise.

ARTICLE V.

Property.

All the property of the Society shall be applied to advance the general objects of the Society, except where it has been otherwise specially directed by the donor or testator.

ARTICLE VI.

Government.

The affairs of the Society shall be under the direction of a Board of thirty-six Managers, thirty-two of whom shall be divided into four classes of eight each; and the places of the said classes shall be vacant respectively on the second Wednesday of April, at the end of one, two, three and four years thereafter, so that Eight Managers shall be elected by the said Board annually, by ballot, to hold their seats for four years. To these thirty-two Managers, the Minister of the First Presbyterian Church, the Minister of the Madison Square Presbyterian Church, the Senior Minister of the Collegiate Church of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church, and the Minister of the First Reformed Presbyterian Church, all in the City of New York, by virtue of their respective offices, for the time being shall be added as members of the Board of Managers. The officers of the Society shall consist of a President, a Vice-President, a Treasurer, a Corresponding Secretary and a Recording Secretary, who shall be selected annually by the said Board of Managers, from their own number, and shall also be Officers of the said Board. The said Officers and Managers, together, shall form a Board, to be denominated the "Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York," not less than eleven of whom shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of electing Officers, making or changing By-Laws, or for holding any special meeting; but seven shall be a quorum for all other purposes, and for stated meetings. The Board of Managers shall at all times be fully authorized to execute all powers of the Society, over all the estate and property of the Society. To it shall be committed the care of the funds of the Institution; authority to make By-Laws, Rules and Regulations, and to alter and amend the same; to fill vacancies in their own body, choose the Officers of the Society, appoint agents, assistants and attendants, and generally to transact the entire business of the Society.

Article VII.

Meetings of the Board.

The Board of Managers shall hold stated meetings on the second Tuesday of each month excepting the months of July, August and September, and may hold adjourned meetings when necessary. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the President, or, in case of his absence or inability to act, by the Vice-President, or on written requisition of five members of the Board of Managers; but when special meetings are called, the time and place of meeting, and the subject proposed to be considered, shall be notified to the members at least two days previous to the meeting; and no other subject shall be discussed or acted upon at such meetings.

ARTICLE VIII.

Annual Meeting.

A meeting of the members of the Society shall be held annually on such day after the expiration of the fiscal year as the Board of Managers may appoint. It shall be the duty of the Board of Managers to make the necessary arrangements for this meeting; to present to the members a report of the proceedings of the previous years; to exhibit a statement of the funds and property of the Society; and also to give information of any matters relating to the objects of the Society which may be of interest or importance.

At the stated meeting of the Board in April eight members shall be chosen by ballot from among the members of the Society to supply the places of the class of managers whose term of service is about to expire. These eight members, together with those composing the three other classes, and the four *ex-officio* members of the Board, shall constitute the Board of Managers for the ensuing year and shall continue in office until their successors are elected. In case of failure to make such elections on the appointed day, a special meeting of the Board shall be called for that purpose.

ARTICLE IX.

Amendments to the Constitution.

Amendments to the Constitution shall be proposed in writing at a regular meeting of the Board of Managers, and may be acted on at the next regular meeting of the Board, or at a special meeting called for that purpose; and shall be adopted only on a concurrence of a majority of the members present, but the affirmative vote must not be less than eleven.

BY-LAWS

OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS.

I.—*Rules and Regulations.*

The Board of Managers shall prescribe rules and regulations respecting the management of the affairs of the Hospital. Such rules and regulations shall not be inconsistent with these By-Laws, and may be amended at any meeting of the Board of Managers by a majority of those present.

II.—*President.*

The President shall preside at the meetings of the Board. He shall appoint all special Committees, unless otherwise ordered, and shall perform such other duties as may be required by the Constitution and By-Laws. He shall also be ex-officio, a member of all committees.

III.—*Vice-President.*

In the event of a vacancy of the office of President, or during his absence or inability to act, his duties and powers shall devolve upon the Vice-President. Should he also be unable to act, a President pro-tem. shall be chosen by the Board.

IV.—*Treasurer.*

The Treasurer shall be charged with the custody of all papers and documents relating to the property of the Corporation, other than such as are mentioned in By-Law V., of all moneys belonging thereto, and of the seal. He shall keep an account in the name of the Corporation with an institution approved by the Board, and shall deposit therein all moneys immediately upon receiving them. He shall cause to be kept such accounts as may be necessary to show the receipts, expenditures, and financial condition of the Institution, or as may be required by the Finance Committee. These accounts shall be open at all suitable times to the inspection of the Managers. He shall pay no moneys without proper order, as is elsewhere provided.

V.—*Safe Keeping of Securities.*

All bonds, stocks and other invested securities and evidences of value, shall be deposited for safe-keeping with a trust company approved by the Board to be held in the name of the Hospital and subject to the joint written order of the Treasurer and a member of the Finance Committee, or, in the absence of the Treasurer, of two members of the Finance Committee, all cash collections being subject to the order of the Treasurer as elsewhere provided.

VI.—*Secretary.*

The Secretary shall be the Recording and Corresponding Secretary and shall keep the minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Managers, and preserve such records and papers as do not pertain to the office of Treasurer. He shall also be ex-officio a member of the Executive Committee and shall keep minutes of said Committee. He shall notify members of all meetings of the Board of Managers at least two days before the meeting. He shall notify members of their appointment on Committees, and generally perform such duties as usually pertain to the office.

He shall have charge of the correspondence of the Board, and shall prepare the Annual Report of the Managers and attend to its publication.

VII.—*Committees.*

At the meeting in April, after filling the vacancies about to occur in their Board, the Managers shall elect an Executive Committee of eight members, a Dispensary Committee of five members, a Training School Committee of three or more members, a House Committee of three or more members, a Finance Committee of five members, of which the Treasurer shall be one, a committee on nominations of five members, of which the Secretary shall be one, and an Auditing Committee of two members. The members appointed on these Committees shall hold office for one year from the second Wednesday in April next ensuing, unless otherwise ordered by the Board, and shall keep minutes of their proceedings, which shall be submitted to the Board at its stated meetings. The Board shall also appoint two of its members for each month of the year, who shall serve as an Inspecting Committee. If any manager thus appointed shall be unable to attend during the time allotted to him, it shall be his duty to procure some other manager to attend in his stead.

VIII.—*Executive Committee.*

The Executive Committee shall consist of the eight Managers chosen as provided in By-Law VII, to whom shall be added the two Managers serving as the Inspecting Committee, and the members of the Dispensary, Training School and House Committees.

1. The Committee shall meet on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month and may hold special meetings when necessary, or when called by the Chairman or two members of the Committee. Three shall constitute a quorum.

2. The Executive Committee shall give orders and establish such rules and regulations as they shall deem necessary for the better carrying into effect the object of this Institution, provided such rules and regulations be not inconsistent with those established by the Board of Managers.

3. All questions relating to the admission, rejection and discharge of patients shall be decided by the Executive Committee, in conformity with the directions of the Board of Managers.

4. In case the House Physician, House Surgeon, or any of their assistants, or any other officer or employee shall neglect any of the duties prescribed to them, or refuse to comply with any reasonable request of the Executive Committee or Superintendent, the Superintendent may suspend the offender, and he shall at once report his action to the Executive Committee.

5. The Executive Committee shall have general charge of all property within the precincts of the Hospital, and shall see that proper economy is observed in the administration of all its affairs, having due regard to the welfare of its beneficiaries. It shall audit and examine the accounts of the Superintendent; and authorize such repairs and disbursements as may from time to time be necessary, and shall draw drafts upon the Treasurer therefor; such drafts, except for the monthly pay-roll and supplies, shall not exceed \$1,000 without authority of the Board therefor; shall be signed by the Chairman and Secretary for the time being of the Committee; and shall be a sufficient voucher for the Treasurer.

IX.—*Out-Patient Department Committee.*

The Out-Patient Department Committee shall consist of five Managers. It shall have the general care and oversight of the Out-Patient Department, and shall meet on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month.

X.—*School of Nursing Committee.*

The School of Nursing Committee shall consist of three or more Managers, who shall have the general care and oversight of the School of Nursing.

XI.—*House Committee.*

The House Committee shall consist of three or more Managers, and shall direct and control the purchasing of all food, fuel, equipment and repair supplies, and have general supervision of the equipment, maintenance and repair of real estate and buildings.

XII.—*Finance Committee.*

1. The Finance Committee shall consist of five Managers—one of whom shall be the Treasurer. Three shall constitute a quorum.

2. It shall be their duty to adopt proper means to augment the financial resources of the Institution, to direct and counsel the Treasurer in the investment, care and management of the finances, and to prescribe such form of accounts and reports as are deemed necessary. All proposed investments must receive the approval of the Board of Managers or the Executive Committee.

XIII.—*Nominating Committee.*

1. The Nominating Committee shall consist of five Managers, of whom the Secretary shall be one. Three shall constitute a quorum.

2. In the case of a vacancy occurring in the Board of Managers they shall recommend to the Board the name of a Life Member to fill such vacancy, and to them shall be referred the names of all persons suggested for such position or for Life Membership; but no report of the Committee shall be acted upon until the next subsequent meeting of the Board, except with unanimous consent.

3. All persons nominated for positions on the House Staff shall be referred to this Committee. The names of such as shall be favorably considered by the Committee shall be by them reported to the Board of Managers.

XIV.—*Inspecting Committee.*

1. The Inspecting Committee shall inspect all the Hospital buildings, visit the wards, service rooms, and laboratories and shall examine as to the cleanliness and order of all parts of the Hospital and grounds.

2. They shall enter their report in a book, which book shall be laid before the Executive Committee at its meetings.

XV.—*Auditing Committee.*

The Auditing Committee shall shortly after the close of each fiscal year examine and check the bonds, stocks, mortgages or other securities or evidences of value owned by the Hospital and shall also have the accounts of the Treasurer and Superintendent for the last fiscal year examined and checked by certified public accountants. The Committee shall thereafter report to the Board the result of such accounting with its recommendations.

XVI.—*Medical Board and the Medical, Surgical and Laboratory Service.*

1. The Board of Managers shall appoint annually—

(a) A Director of the Surgical Service, a Director of the Medical Service, and a Director of the Pathological Service; these shall together constitute the Medical Board.

(b) As many Visiting Physicians and Surgeons, and Associate Visiting Physicians and Surgeons, as the service of the Hospital may require, a Visiting Physician to the Roentgen Ray Department, a Visiting Bacteriologist, a Visiting Chemist, an Out-Patient Department Staff, and such other department chiefs and assistants as the various services of the Hospital may require.

(c) As many Assistant Physicians and Surgeons and special Consulting Physicians and Surgeons as the service of the Hospital may require.

(d) A House Staff, consisting of as many members as the service of the Hospital may require, and at such times and for such terms of service as shall seem best to meet the needs of the Hospital.

(e) A Register of the Out-Patient Department.

2. These appointments shall be made at some time prior to July 1st in each year. The appointees unless a different term be fixed by the Board shall hold office for one year and thereafter until further action of the Board.

XVII.—*Executive Staff.*

The Board of Managers shall appoint a Superintendent and such Assistants as the Board may deem necessary for the service of the Hospital, whose services shall continue during the pleasure of the Board.

The Board of Managers shall appoint a Director of the School of Nursing and such Assistants as may be necessary for such service, and such appointees shall hold office during the pleasure of the Board.

XVIII.—*Endowed Beds.*

1. A gift of \$10,000 shall entitle the donor and his successors to nominate, from time to time, an adult patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge.

2. A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor to a like privilege for the children's ward.

3. A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor, during life, to nominate, from time to time, a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge. If the donor be a corporation or association the privilege to nominate shall expire in fifteen years unless the privilege be extended by the Board of Managers, but shall in no event continue for a greater period than twenty-five years.

4. Any person or corporation being the donor of a \$5,000 bed may increase their donation to \$10,000, in which case they shall become henceforth entitled to the privilege that attaches to an original donation of that amount.

5. All endowed bed privileges are subject to the Rules and Regulations governing the admission, treatment and discharge of patients.

6. Contributions to the endowment fund of free beds, as above provided for, may be made by instalments, when the donor shall, in writing, so notify the Treasurer at the time of each payment. So long as the instalments so paid in shall not equal the sums required under the preceding sections, the amount received shall constitute a portion of the general endowment fund, the income of which shall be used for the payment of the current expenses of the Hospital, and no privileges shall accrue to the donor.

7. The Board of Managers shall have power in their discretion to make, under special and exceptional circumstances, such other arrangements (temporary or permanent) as to endowed beds as they may deem best calculated to promote the objects for which the Hospital was established and is now being maintained.

8. Certificates of the right to nominate patients to use and occupy beds free of charge shall be issued in such form as the Board of Managers may

prescribe, and shall be signed by the President or Vice-President and Treasurer, who shall also affix the seal of the Corporation.

XIX.—*Appropriations of Money.*

Except in the cases provided for in Section 5 of By-Law VIII, and Section 2 of By-Law XII, all appropriations of money shall be made by resolution of the Board of Managers. Orders for the amounts thus appropriated shall be drawn on the Treasurer by the President or presiding officer of the meeting, and be countersigned by the Secretary or Secretary pro tem., and when properly endorsed shall be sufficient voucher for the Treasurer.

XX.—*Complaints, Suspensions, or Discharges.*

If any officer, physician, or surgeon shall become unfit to execute his office, or shall conduct himself contrary to any of the Rules of the Hospital, or refuse or neglect to execute the same, the Executive Committee, or any member of the Board of Managers may submit against him a complaint in writing, at a meeting duly called, and thereupon a notice of the said complaint shall be given to the person complained of, and a time shall be appointed (not less than six days after service of said notice) for the person complained of to make his defence before the Board of Managers; and the Board, having examined into the truth of the complaint, and heard the defense of the party accused, if any shall be made, may, with the concurrence and approbation of a majority of the Managers present, suspend or discharge the officer, physician, or surgeon complained of.

XXI.—*Order of Business.*

The order of business shall be as follows:

1. The meeting shall be opened with prayer.
2. The roll shall be called, and the attending members noted.
3. The minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read, corrected if necessary, and approved.
4. Treasurer's Reports.
5. Reports of the Committee shall be called for, and order taken thereon.
6. Communications to the Board shall be received and considered.
7. Unfinished business.
8. New business.

XXII.—*Alterations or Additions.*

Any amendment to the By-Laws shall be proposed in writing at a regular meeting of the Board of Managers, and may be acted on at the next regular meeting of the Board, or at a special meeting called for that purpose. It shall be adopted only on an affirmative vote of a majority of those present. A copy of any proposed amendment shall be mailed to each member of the Board at least three days prior to the next meeting.

Revised, June 14, 1921.

RULES AS TO THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

1. All ward patients are required to pay \$3.00 per day for board or such smaller sums as may be determined by the circumstances of the case, of which the Managers shall be the sole judges. Patients from New York City (Manhattan and Bronx), who are unable to pay are admitted free. Patients from out of town requiring operative treatment not obtainable at their homes may be admitted free if unable to pay. Other patients from out of town will not usually be admitted free, but this rule shall not apply to patients recommended for admission by members of the Board of Managers or by any of the Directors of Service.

2. Patients suffering from severe accident or serious illness will be admitted at any hour of the day or night. Other patients will be admitted between 9 A. M. and 5 P. M. If able, they must apply in person at the office of the Hospital, when they will be examined by a member of the House Staff or Surgeon on duty, and admitted by the Superintendent, subject to approval by the Executive Committee. If unable to apply in person, they shall be visited and examined by such Physician as may be appointed by the Executive Committee.

3. Patients may be admitted by the Superintendent on the recommendation of any Manager, after examination as to suitability by a member of the House Staff, or on the recommendation of any Physician or Surgeon of the Hospital.

4. No patient suffering from any readily communicable disease shall be admitted, nor any whose case does not require the special benefits of the Hospital; nor shall any patient be admitted whose case is judged to be incurable, unless there be urgent symptoms which, in the opinion of the Attending Physician or Surgeon, are capable of being relieved. There shall be no uterine nor vaginal examination made except in the presence of a nurse.

5. No patient suffering from erysipelas shall be admitted to either the Medical or Surgical Division of the Hospital.

6. There shall be recorded in the office daily the number of vacant beds.

7. Application for the admission of patients living out of the city must be accompanied by a certificate of some reputable physician, stating the nature and probable duration of the disease.

RULES FOR VISITORS.

1. Visitors are allowed in the Wards for Adults, Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday, from 1 to 2 P. M.; Tuesday and Friday from 6 to 8 P. M.; and Sunday from 1 to 3 P. M. Visitors may not come at any other time, unless under exceptional circumstances.

2. *No more than two Visitors will be admitted to see any Patient on one Day.*

3. Only fruit, jelly and ice cream may be brought for patients. Such packages must be left with the door clerk, and, if approved by the Physician, will be sent to the Patients.

4. In the Children's Ward, parents only are allowed. No other relatives, children or friends are permitted in this Ward. Parents are allowed on Tuesday and Friday Evenings from 6 to 7 P. M., Sunday from 2 to 3 P. M., and may remain one half hour only. No packages of any kind may be carried to the Children's Ward.

5. Visitors must observe perfect order and propriety while in the Hospital; must confine their visits to their immediate friends; must not stop or loiter in the halls, offices, or on the stairways, and must leave the building promptly at the end of visiting hours.

Any violations of these rules may subject the offender to exclusion from the premises.

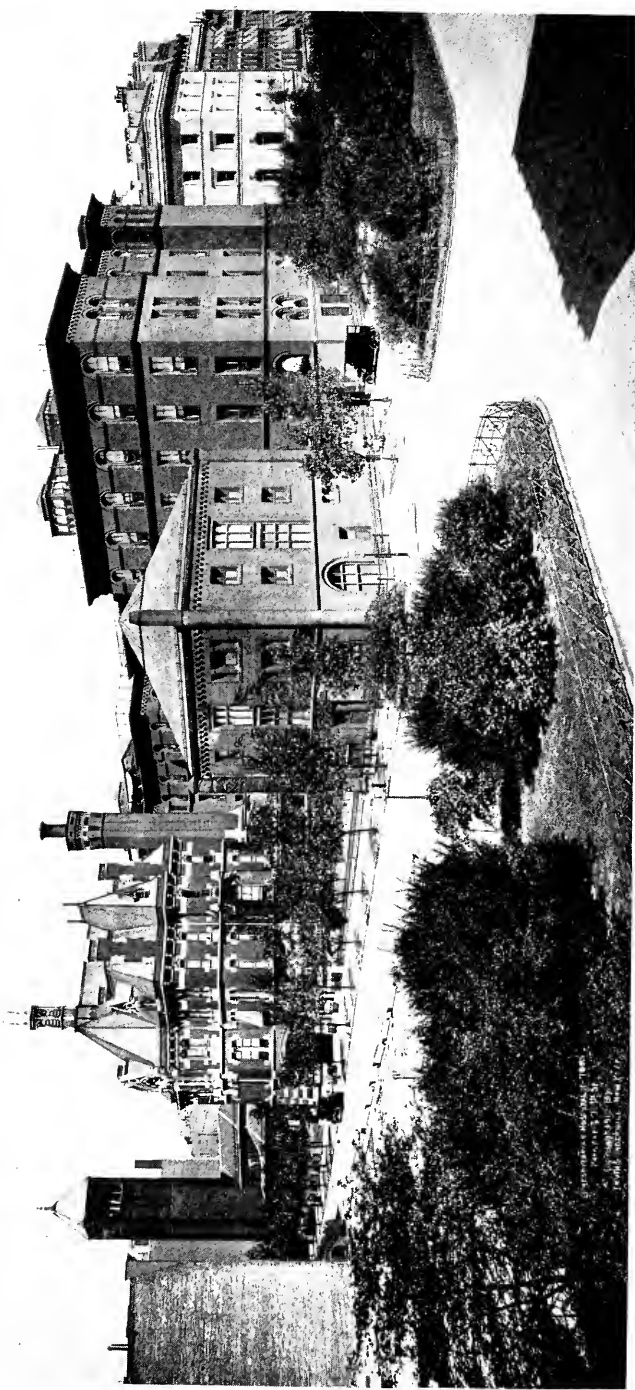

A TRIBUTE TO WILLIAM SLOANE

MANAGER 1901-1922

PRESIDENT 1916-1922

Died in Service, August 11, 1922

William Sloane was really selected as a possible president of the Presbyterian Hospital before he became a member of its Board of Managers in 1901. Mr. John S. Kennedy, with Scotch foresight, scanned the horizon for someone of the younger generation who could succeed himself and Mr. Frederick Sturges when they were constrained to give up administrative burdens and chose William Sloane. Of course, neither Mr. Sloane nor many of his future associates on the Board knew of this at the time, nor am I aware that either he or many of them knew it later on. William Sloane fulfilled Mr. Kennedy's expectation by accepting the presidency after Mr. Sturges' retirement in 1916. He had previously been elected vice-president.

William Sloane was a member of our Building Committee which, after Mr. Kennedy's death, in consultation with Dr. William G. Thompson, Dr. Walter B. James and Dr. Joseph A. Blake, took up the future policy of the Hospital and determined to associate it with a medical school, so as to form a center for medical education in the City of New York. The Committee unanimously recommended this new policy, which has since been carried out by affiliation between the Hospital and Columbia University. This was a revolutionary step in the policy of New York hospitals at the time. It has later on been very generally adopted by private hospitals in those centers of population where such affiliations seemed possible. That Mr. Sloane enthusiastically joined in adopting this policy at the time illustrates his breadth of view and his initiative. He was president of the Hospital during the years which intervened between its first affiliation with Columbia University and the consummation of this policy in 1921. He took an active part in all the conferences between Columbia University and the Managers of the Hospital which finally led to this affiliation on satisfactory basis. It must have been a great satisfaction for him to have finished this particular part of his varied public service before his death. His interest in the Hospital was constant and characteristically conscientious.

He was an active member of different committees before he became president, when he became ex-officio a member of all committees.

The Presbyterian Hospital was only one of many public causes to which Mr. Sloane devoted himself. That it was one of those in which he was most interested we know, not only by reason of his faithful service, but because of the generous legacy which he left to it by his will.

From this description of his activities in public service and in business one might suppose that his life was entirely centered on such matters. This was not so. He was singularly genial and companionable. He was a friend among friends. He made friends of all those with whom he was associated

in public or business life. He was eminently lovable and much beloved. He had no enemy in the world. No one coming into intercourse with him could fail to wish him well. Though cut off in his prime, a victim like many others of the Great War, he had lived a full life of extraordinary usefulness and has left a lasting heritage of inspiration to those who come after him and upon whom it falls to enter into his labors.

Mr. Sloane, from the very beginning of his career, both by choice and by inheritance, was a leader in public service, not because he sought leadership, but because leadership was forced upon him. He was one of the founders of the Young People's Association of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, which revolutionized the religious and social activities of that church in his father's time, when it was then the leading Presbyterian Church of the city. He followed the footsteps of his uncles, generous benefactors of Yale University, by choosing Yale for his university career. He was a deacon of the College Church, an office which he also held in the Fifth Avenue Church. During his university course he was a natural leader in his class, both in religious and social activities, a rare conjunction. It was illustrated in his having been elected president of the University Young Men's Christian Association and by his having received the highest social honor of the University in being elected Chairman of the Junior Promenade Committee.

Soon after he entered business life as the associate and later the successor of his father in the business of W. and J. Sloane, established by his grandfather, he naturally became drawn into the larger work of the Young Men's Christian Association and was a member of its International Committee and Chairman of its Army and Navy Committee. With the coming of the Great War, his experience made him a natural selection for Chairman of the National War Work Council of the Young Men's Christian Association, and during the war he gave up his business and devoted himself almost exclusively to the absorbing work of this great institution, going abroad for a period of service in France and handling at home the delicate relations between the Association and the different departments of the Government, Army and Navy. This exhausting work to which he devoted himself with his customary conscientiousness, left him at the end of the war an exhausted man. While he seemed to recover and while he resumed many of his customary activities he never was well again. Indeed, he gave his life for his country quite as certainly as if he had met death on the battlefield.

Of all the men of his generation in New York upon whom the burden of public service had already fallen at the time of his death he was among the foremost who accepted that heritage. He was universally sought for office in the most important institutions of the city. He was a trustee of the New York Public Library, a director of the Union Theological Seminary, a trustee of Robert College of Constantinople, a trustee of the Provident Loan Society and a director of many business enterprises, not the least of which was his ancestral heritage of W. and J. Sloane, of which he was president from 1906 until the time of his death. His consent was sought last winter to become a trustee of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. His reply was illustrative. He recognized the honor; he recognized the opportunity, but he felt that he could not conscientiously enlarge the sphere of his public service.

THE year of 1922 will always be recalled with sorrow because of the unhappy death of Mr. William Sloane, who so faithfully and well served the Hospital as its President and who, in that service, endeared himself to all his associates. He did not find honor through the office that he held; rather did he confer honor upon it. His place cannot be filled.

In other ways the Hospital has progressed. Title to the property at 165th Street and Broadway, the gift of Mrs. Stephen V. Harkness and Mr. E. S. Harkness, has been vested, approximately one-half in the Presbyterian Hospital and one-half in Columbia University. The site comprises about twenty acres, bounded on the west by the North River, on the east by Broadway, on the north by 168th Street, and on the south by 165th Street. There a new building to accommodate the Hospital and the Medical School of Columbia University will be erected. It is anticipated that other hospitals may cooperate, and by moving to the Centre, aid in realizing our aspiration—a seat of medical science and learning as yet unsurpassed. Plans for construction are well under way and it is believed that another year will enable the report of very definite progress.

With a view to meeting the greatly enlarged activities which the new building will impose, certain changes have been made in organization, the principal of which has been the appointment of an Executive Vice-President. In addition, the Out-Patient Department has been established as an administrative unit and, on the recommendation of the Medical Board, a Superintendent thereof appointed.

The Hospital has been notified by the Trustees under the Deed of Gift of Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt and the late Mr. William K. Vanderbilt that the East River Homes are to be transferred to it. This exceptionally important and generous gift will be accepted with the utmost gratitude, and with a full sense of the additional responsibilities entailed thereby.

General Fund. Unrestricted legacies received since 1911 have been credited to this fund. It is intended to use the income of this fund to partly meet the current expenses of the Hospital and to draw on the principal, when necessary, to meet expenditures not otherwise provided for.

The Mrs. Frederic Baker Pathological Department Fund. To supply books, periodicals, and instruments for use in the Pathological Laboratory.

Charles K. Briddon Gold Medal Fund. The income from this fund provides the Dr. C. K. Briddon Gold Medal competed for every two years by members of the Alumni of the Presbyterian Hospital, who write essays requiring original research.

Cheney Fund. To carry out certain investigations bearing upon glands of internal secretion.

Dortic Memorial Fund. The principal of this fund may be applied to the erection and maintenance of a Convalescent Home in connection with the Hospital. Accumulated income may be used for the maintenance of Presbyterian Hospital patients in some approved Convalescent Home or Homes.

Mrs. David Dows Fund. The income from this fund is used to purchase scientific instruments for use in the Hospital for the study and cure of disease.

Margaret E. Dows Fund. The income from this fund is applied toward the current expenses of the School of Nursing.

East River Homes Fund. To meet the expenses of tubercular work in connection with patients in the district assigned to this Hospital by the Board of Health.

Fund for Educational and Scientific Work. The income from this fund is used for the support of the educational and scientific work of the Hospital, in accordance with the agreement between the Hospital and Columbia University.

The Katie Geitz Fund. To meet expenses of the Diet Kitchen established for the benefit of tubercular patients and children in our district.

Hill Top Camp Fund. For the support of a camp at Hawthorne, N. Y.,

to which are sent the children of tubercular patients of the Out-Patient Department Clinic.

Holiday Cheer Fund. To provide decorations, entertainments, presents or other holiday cheer throughout the Hospital to patients, staff, nurses and employees.

House Staff Entertainment Fund. To provide recreation, entertainment, etc., for members of the House Staff.

Howland Fund. To defray the expenses of treatment and research work on certain forms of epilepsy.

Dr. Francis P. Kinnicutt Memorial Fund. To defray the cost of a Medical Ward in the new Presbyterian Hospital Buildings, when erected. The income is added to the principal.

Nurses' Cheer Fund. To provide entertainment and recreation for Nurses.

Patients' Cheer Fund. To provide occupational work and instruction, games, etc., for patients.

Patients' Relief Fund. To provide special relief for patients.

Personal Injury Liability Insurance Fund. To pay approved claims for personal injuries sustained by employees while on the Hospital premises.

Room J Trust Fund. The income from this fund is used to provide delicacies and extra nursing for female patients occupying Room "J."

Sarah Sanford Fund. To provide temporary relief, apparatus and transportation for convalescents.

School of Nursing Endowment Fund. The income from this fund is used to maintain the educational work of the School of Nursing.

School of Nursing Library Fund. To provide periodicals and books for the School of Nursing library.

School of Nursing Scholarship Fund. To provide scholarships for students in the School of Nursing, and traveling scholarships for graduates of the School.

H. Smith Periodical Fund. To provide periodicals for the wards of the Hospital.

George H. F. Schrader Fund, and Wall Fund. The income from each of these funds is paid to a beneficiary during life, and thereafter becomes the property of the Hospital.

Frances Swan Welles Fund. One-half of the income from this fund is used to brighten and cheer the lives of trained nurses employed from time to time in the Hospital, and the other half to brighten and cheer the lives of patients in the general wards of the Hospital.

ENDOWED BEDS

A gift of \$10,000 shall entitle the donor and his successors to nominate, from time to time, an adult patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge.

A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor to a like privilege for the children's ward.

A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor, during life to nominate from time to time, a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge. If the donor be a corporation or association, the privilege to nominate shall expire in fifteen years unless the privilege be extended by the Board of Managers, but shall in no event continue for a greater period than twenty-five years.

Any person or corporation being the donor of a \$5,000 bed may increase their donation to \$10,000, in which case they shall become thenceforth entitled to the privilege that attaches to an original donation of that amount.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

December 31, 1922

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—The Fifty-fourth Annual Report of the Superintendent of the Hospital for the year ending December 31, 1922, is herewith respectfully submitted.

Twenty-five thousand one hundred and thirty six persons have experienced the benefits of the Hospital during the year. The departments contributing this service and the number treated in each were as follows:

There were treated in the beds of the wards and private rooms of the Hospital 4,305 persons. The daily average has been 225. Of the patients in the wards, 28.7% were treated free of charge.

There were treated in the Out-Patient Department 16,620 persons, and the daily average visits made were 340.

Our Visiting Nurses cared for 4,211 persons, making 19,942 visits.

In the Radiotherapy Department, 1,285 treatments were given to 586 patients.

In the Roentgen Ray Department 18,839 plates and films were taken of 8,531 patients from the Hospital and Out-Patient Department.

The Department of Massage and Medical Gymnastics has given 6,682 treatments.

No new construction of importance has been undertaken during the year. Many readjustments have been made, and as the year closes various changes in organization and methods are being put into effect with the purpose of establishing proper practices for proposed new buildings.

Detailed reports covering every phase of our Hospital service will be found elsewhere in these pages. They give interesting facts and figures showing the accomplishments of a loyal and enthusiastic personnel.

The Administrative Staff gives thanks to all our Hospital associates and to our many friends outside the Institution who have by their interest and support made our work possible and its results satisfactory.

The Salaries of Operating Room Nurses and Operating Room Orderlies are distributed in proportion to the numbers of Private Room Surgical Patients and Ward Surgical Patients treated.

METHOD OF FIGURING COST OF DIFFERENT BRANCHES OF SERVICE:

The method in use at the Presbyterian Hospital of figuring the total cost of caring for Ward Patients, Private Room Patients, Out-Patient Department Patients or Patients visited in their homes is to charge each branch of the service with salaries and wages of all persons employed exclusively in, and all supplies and repairs directly chargeable to such service, and to prorate the other operating expenses which contribute to the cost of the different branches of service in such proportion as the Superintendent and his Assistants may consider most fair after careful consideration of the local conditions, which are, of course, subject to change from time to time in determining the relative proportion of Administration Expenses, Professional Care of Patients, Housekeeping, Kitchen, Laundry, Out-Patient Department and Visiting Nursing, the percentage charged to Ward Patients and to Private Room Patients is based upon the number of days' treatment furnished in each service, modified by well-known facts; for instance, the fact that a private room patient requires more professional care than necessary if he were located in a ward, also, the important fact that his food and the preparation of it costs much more than that of the ward patient. The distribution of the cost of General House and Property Expenses among the different branches of the service is based upon the relative cubic contents of those parts of the buildings occupied by each of the five services mentioned.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE AND VISITING NURSING DEPARTMENT

December 31, 1922

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—The nineteenth year of the Social Service and Visiting Nursing Department has been completed. Seven students were given a short training in bedside nursing and social service work, by caring for former ward patients and those temporarily unable to come for treatment to the Out-Patient Department.

The probationers at the conclusion of six months in the School are given a talk on Hospital Social Service by the Director, and afterwards go with the social workers to homes of ex-ward patients. This has brought about not only a closer cooperation between the student nurses and the social workers but has secured for the students a more sympathetic outlook toward their patients during the years of training.

The activities of the Health Class in connection with the Tuberculosis Clinic have been very encouraging. A great deal of interest and enthusiasm was shown by the eighty children who were enrolled during the year, and also by fifty mothers, who visited the class from time to time, and who also benefited by the much needed advice given on health and hygiene.

The Cardiac Clinic, during the past year, has grown enormously, there being over five hundred patients enrolled at the present time, many more than one social worker can adequately care for. Over one hundred of these are children, for whom a separate clinic has recently been started, but without social service or follow-up care. As this is true also of the pediatric and asthma clinics, it is strongly felt that the opportunity and need of preventive and follow-up work in connection with these young lives is at least as important as that already being done with the adult and chronic patients.

Hill Top Camp at Hawthorne, N. Y., opened eleven years ago for underweight and undernourished children of the Out-Patient Department, had a successful summer. One hundred and fourteen children, the majority selected from the Tuberculosis Clinic, spent over three weeks each at the camp. Under the care of a trained nurse and kindergartner they gained, besides physical improvement, the knowledge of how to spend happy hours in a number of useful ways. We are indebted to Dr. and Mrs. Herbert S. Carter and their friends, for their personal interest in raising the necessary funds each year to maintain the camp.

Of the seven hundred and seventy-seven patients sent during the year to free Fresh Air and Convalescent Homes, the largest number were cared for by the following agencies, for whose splendid cooperation we are most grateful; Burke Foundation, Holiday Farm, Tribune Fresh Air Homes, Sea Cliff Home for Babies, Presbyterian Rest, Children's Aid Society, Sea View Sanatorium, Otisville Sanatorium, and also to the Scully-Walton Ambulance Company, for their help in transporting children to trains.

The work at the Katie Geitz Diet Kitchen continues the dispensing of milk to our tubercular and undernourished patients, and selling nourishing food at a nominal price, to the many school children in the Open Air Classes,

on the roof of the East River Homes and the nearby public schools. The gift, of from four to thirty quarts of milk, sent daily, by the Walker-Gordon Laboratory is most appreciated.

Forty-seven dinners to the poorest families were given by one of our Christmas friends, and twenty Vincent Astor dinners, through the kindness of Bellevue Social Service and Holiday Farm.

It is with deep appreciation that we acknowledge our indebtedness to Mrs. J. Gamble Rogers for her interest and untiring efforts each year in providing the much enjoyed music at the Christmas entertainment.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF NUTRITION

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—The report of the Department of Nutrition for the year ending December 31, 1922, is hereby submitted.

Until April first the dietitian's office and metabolism kitchens were under repair and reorganization, but carried on any necessary diet work temporarily assigned to the Department. After the summer diminution of cases, active work in the Department commenced October first.

Records beginning April first show the following:

Systematic visiting of patients receiving special diets has been inaugurated together with dietary instruction to outgoing diet patients, as requested by physicians. Ward rounds are made daily on all wards for collection of dietary prescriptions, with special ward rounds on metabolism service.

The Department has taken over the dietary instruction of patients in the medical out-patient metabolism clinic and under the direction of Dr. Bauman has taken over dietary instruction, direct supervision of clerical work and routine testing for the surgical out-patient metabolism clinic.

At the request of the School of Nursing, a complete lecture and laboratory outline consisting of eighteen lectures and laboratory periods in food and nutrition for use of student nurses was prepared.

At the commencement of the year it was found difficult to secure student dietitians with sufficient preliminary training necessary for metabolism work. A graded course for student dietitians was organized, and outlines of it sent to leading colleges and technical schools, with announcements inserted by request, in the *Modern Hospital and Journal of Home Economics*. The number of applications for the year was brought up to ninety-five. Seven future appointments, at the rate of one student per month, have been made and sixteen applications for possible future appointments are under active consideration.

The inability of the Department, due to crowded working space and geographical location, to meet all requests for special diets has been a source of

regret, but this increase in requests has registered the real need of nutritional service within the hospital. The department has endeavored to answer the many inquiries from other institutions for nutritional information, which again shows a very great and rapidly developing interest in this important phase of therapeutic care and metabolic research.

The Department wishes to express its appreciation of the cooperation of other departments of the Presbyterian Hospital in the year of its organization and commencement of activity.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

December 31, 1922

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—The report of the Department of Occupational Therapy for the year ending December 31, 1922, is herewith submitted:

Six hundred and ninety patients have been treated by this Department. The following crafts have been taught and the following articles made:

In the past year the Department has taken in four hundred and seven dollars, and has paid two hundred dollars into the Hospital Fund, after having paid out two hundred dollars for small supplies.

In February, Miss Elsie Gunner took the position as assistant to Miss Armstrong, Miss Hewlett having resigned. In July Miss Armstrong resigned and in September Miss Hewlett took up the work with Miss Gunner as assistant. In November Miss Mary Brooks volunteered her services to the Department for two days per week.

The Tuesday night Cardiac Clinic continued to fill special orders for large sewing trays, scrap baskets, etc., until summer. The patients, unable to undertake steady employment or any heavy work, are enabled by means of basketry and other crafts to obtain some funds through the sale of articles made to order and it is hoped that during the coming year, we shall be able to extend the work of the Cardiac Clinic through a greater number of crafts and through an increasingly large number of orders.

The work of the Department is necessarily stressed upon the occupational rather than the vocational side, inasmuch as most of the cases in a general hospital are transient. Therefore the value of the results is not so obvious as in other hospitals where the patients are treated for longer periods.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

Nevertheless, most interesting results have been obtained in the treatment of cases of depression, where the patients have been helped to a happier and more normal state through the use of color and design or through an awakened interest in beauty of form in reed or raffia baskets.

Two men whose use of their hands was much impaired through rheumatism were given clay to mould into beads. Later, when they had more nearly recovered the use of their fingers, they made several baskets. One woman, who was totally blind, became quite expert in simple reed basketry. Several patients lying flat on their backs have found that those hours passed quickly and pleasantly that were given to weaving with gay colored wools upon small, light weighted cardboard looms. In all cases the period of convalescence is passed much more cheerfully when the mind and fingers are occupied creating useful and beautiful articles.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF MEDICAL SERVICE

December 31, 1922

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to submit the following report from the Medical Service.

During the past year the Medical Department has been operating under the same type of organization as that begun in 1921. The main effort has been to perfect the plans begun at this time, and it is a pleasure to report considerable progress in this direction.

There have been but few changes in the staff. Doctor Henry Jackson, Jr., resigned in June, 1922, to take a position with Doctor Francis W. Peabody in the new clinic at the City Hospital in Boston. Doctor Augustus R. Felty resigned to take a position as Assistant Resident at Johns Hopkins Hospital with Doctor Longcope. Doctor Edward J. Bigwood has returned to Belgium to take a position in the reorganized medical school at Brussels. Doctor Shutai T. Woo has returned to China to accept a position on the staff of the new school organized under the auspices of the Rockefeller Foundation.

New members of the staff are Doctor Edgar G. Stillman and Doctor Robert L. Levy, who come here from the Rockefeller Hospital; Doctor Randolph West, Doctor Gerald Shibley, and Doctor Frank H. Peters, former members of the House Staff, have returned to the Service.

A special fund from the Commission on Epilepsy has been maintained during the past year. It has enabled Doctor Geyelin to continue his work on epilepsy, and has been of great importance to the work of the Hospital.

Another special fund, maintained through the kindness of the Misses Cheney, has made it possible for Doctor Draper to enlarge and extend the work in his Constitution Clinic, and has been the means of continuing valuable work. In addition, an anonymous gift of \$1,000 has been given for special work in diabetes.

A special effort has been made with the Dispensary Development Committee to improve the Out-Patient Department. Through the work of the Out-Patient Department Committee, consisting of Doctor Lamb as Chairman, Doctor Auchincloss, Doctor Neergaard and Doctor Cleveland, it is possible to report progress. The main effort has been to establish the appointment system throughout the Out-Patient Department, which should increase the efficiency of the medical service rendered, and relieve the congestion which has been so great a handicap in the past.

The special clinics mentioned in last year's report have been continued without interruption. Special work in the medical laboratories has been devoted to the study of nephritis, diabetes, epilepsy, hyperthyroidism, asthma, scarlet fever, the common cold, blood diseases, and heart disease.

There have been a number of volumes added to the Janeway Library during the past year. There are now 7,500 volumes in the Library; there are 108 subscriptions to journals; and during the past year 350 volumes have been added to the collection.

REPORT OF THE ROENTGEN RAY DEPARTMENT

December 31, 1922

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—The past year has brought many changes to the X-Ray Department, both in personnel and in equipment. Thanks to the generosity of the Board of Managers, new and much needed apparatus has been installed. The radiographic machines have been equipped with the Coolidge radiator type tubes which have a fine focus and which give radiograms of much greater detail. A plate changer has been installed to facilitate the making of stereoscopic films of the chest. The antiquated apparatus used to activate the fluoroscopes has been replaced by the latest model of generating outfit for fluoroscopic rooms. A fluoroscopic examination is no longer accompanied by a display of fireworks sufficient to convince even the stoutest-hearted youngster that certain dissolution is imminent. This outfit includes the first oil-immersed magnetic high-tension switch to be put out by the manufacturers which automatically throws the current from the upright to the horizontal fluoroscope or vice versa upon making contact with the proper foot switch. The Potter-Bucky Diaphragm is said to be the greatest advance in X-Ray technique since the invention of the Coolidge tube. This is an apparatus designed for the purpose of cutting out the secondary rays from the patient's body which cause fogging of the film when thick parts are taken. Our new Bucky Diaphragm table enables the technician to use this important mechanism accurately and conveniently and adds greatly to the comfort of the patient.

During the year 1922 the records show that 8,531 examinations were made in which 18,839 films were used.

The radiotherapy department has given 1,720 treatments to 347 patients. The treatment of skin conditions has been turned over to the Dermatological Clinic and has been put in charge of Dr. F. K. Bailey.

Because of numerous breakdowns and delays, it became necessary to remove the old X-Ray Therapy machine. In November the manufacturers replaced this with their latest model ten-inch spark gap apparatus.

These are a few of the changes which facilitated the work of the X-Ray Department. However, there is much yet to be done. We are hoping that the end of the coming year will find us equipped with other things which are needed to assist more efficiently in the diagnosis and treatment of disease.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF SURGICAL SERVICE

December 31, 1922

To the Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to present the annual report of the Surgical Service.

The past year has afforded us the opportunity to test out the organization and program which was started in 1921. It is a pleasure to report that the conscientious efforts of the Staff in maintaining the standards of the Surgical Service in the care of patients in the Presbyterian Hospital have been uniformly successful. In analyzing the result of the year's work, and in planning for the coming year, it is essential to keep in mind the bearing of the present organization and schedule on the plans for the new hospital. Both present and future must be considered in making any changes in our methods.

A sufficient test has been made of the morning schedule of early rounds from 8-9.30 followed by operating, diagnosis and follow-up work, leaving the afternoon free for teaching, clinical and laboratory investigation, to convince us of the wisdom of this plan of work. The maintenance of such a schedule is best adapted to a staff of the present size and points to the advisability of half the staff reversing morning and afternoon clinic and operating duties when the staff is enlarged.

With five Attending Surgeons spending their entire day in the Hospital, it has been found unnecessary to continue the services of Resident Surgeons. It would seem most desirable under the present organization to have two Fellows in Surgery work in the wards in clinical investigation and supervise the work of the Interne Staff in selected types of cases. The establishment of Fellowships in Surgery would solve the problem of providing a larger number of enthusiastic workers in the clinic and training of a selected group of young surgeons from whom the Attending Staff could be chosen as vacancies occurred.

Certain changes on the Attending Staff have been made during the past year. After a year and a half of work on the general surgical service, Dr. Penfield has been assigned to special work in neurological problems applied to surgery with Dr. Elsberg, consultant in neuro-surgery. His work will be both at the Presbyterian Hospital and in the Neurological Department of the College of Physicians and Surgeons. This is an example of interdepartmental work between surgery and other departments of the Medical School which is most desirable and we trust will increase before the new hospital is occupied.

Dr. van Beuren and Dr. Hanford have come on the Staff during the past six months. Dr. Hanford has been assigned the surgical work with the Children's Ward, and Dr. van Beuren is taking over Dr. Penfield's general work.

A problem which will continue to be difficult with our present limited bed capacity is the admission of patients having other than general surgical conditions. It is impossible, under our present ward capacity, to assign a definite number of beds for the special cases. The specialists acting as consultants in gynecology, oto-laryngology, oral surgery and neuro-surgery have

been most courteous in accommodating their work to the limitations made necessary by the general service. In the same way Dr. Squier has been greatly handicapped in his teaching facilities. The Director wishes to express his appreciation of the cooperation of all the consultants in this matter.

The plan followed last year of referring all gynecological patients to the Sloane Hospital has had to be abandoned because of the limited bed capacity of that institution. For this reason Dr. Corscaden is caring for a limited number of gynecological patients that are referred to the Surgical Service by the Medical Service and the friends of the Hospital. We trust this will provide some of the desired training in gynecological nursing for our Training School.

In the Out-Patient Department, there has been a great improvement in the work of the Fracture Clinic. This has been due to the special interest of Dr. Darrach, who has been coming for consultation twice a week and to Dr. Cleveland's daily supervision. The high standard of work in the morning Diagnosis Clinic has been maintained. This meeting ground of Attending from the In-Patient and Out-Patient Staff and Interne Staff and Clinical Clerks has demonstrated the great desirability of having both Medical and Surgical Staffs work together in a consultation clinic. It is earnestly hoped that this cooperation between the two services can be accomplished during the coming year, certainly before the new buildings are occupied.

Our Follow-Up System has now been in active operation for eight years. Interval results are now sufficiently long in so many cases that it is one of our most urgent duties to tabulate and analyze these results for comparison with results to be obtained in the future. This work is occupying the attention of the entire visiting staff. The results in the surgery of the stomach, biliary tract and of the breast and thyroid are a few of the subjects undergoing analysis. Investigative work in intestinal obstruction, both from the clinical and experimental standpoints, the effect of X-Ray on the pancreas and intestine in animals, and fluoroscopic and chemical studies of the stomach in patients with gall bladder disease are some of the subjects under investigation.

The Surgical Staff desires to express their appreciation of the unflinching cooperation of the medical, the laboratory and the radiotherapy departments. Of particular help in our work, and especially instructive to us have been the daily conference with Dr. Golden and Dr. Bauman.

REPORT OF THE PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT

December 31, 1922

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital:

Gentlemen—I have the honor of submitting herewith the report of the Pathological Department of the Hospital for the year ending December 31, 1922.

Weekly pathological conferences have been held in conjunction with the Grand Rounds for the staff of the Hospital. At these conferences there is a presentation of the material obtained at autopsy, at which time the case is reviewed clinically and the pathological changes, both gross and microscopic, are discussed.

Recently a change has been made in the method of presenting the cases. Heretofore, the material was presented from all cases occurring in the previous week. Under the present method this has been abandoned, and material is not presented until a group of similar conditions has been collected and the entire conference is given over to the study of related cases. This has served to emphasize the number of such cases, and to point out more clearly the essential features of the group from the clinical and pathological standpoints.

Since the installation of the photographic outfit, it has been possible to show at these conferences lantern slides of the important histological changes. The interest in these demonstrations has been considerably stimulated by the grouping of cases and the use of the lantern slides.

The lantern slide preparations for these conferences now total several hundred in number and form a valuable collection illustrating all the commoner pathological lesions, as well as many of the more unusual and rarer conditions. They are not infrequently borrowed for use by other departments, and are also used for the weekly clinical-pathological conferences for the fourth year medical students.

The addition of numerous photomicrographs to the autopsy records has greatly improved them.

Since July 1, the neurological pathology has been under the direction of Dr. Wilder G. Penfield and Dr. Hubert S. Howe. In order to take care of the increase in technical work entailed by this change, there has been added to the staff another technician, and special apparatus has been provided for this work.

There have been many changes in the personnel of the laboratory. Dr. H. K. Blake, Assistant Resident Pathologist, resigned in May because of ill health, and was succeeded by Dr. Horowitz who completed the unexpired appointment of Dr. Blake. Dr. Helen M. Scoville was appointed Assistant Resident Pathologist, and began her duties July 1, 1922; she resigned September first to enter practice. There has not been any Assistant Resident Pathologist appointed for the remainder of the year; Dr. F. B. Jennings, Jr., of the Pathological Department of Columbia University is now serving in that capacity.

Recently a plan was formulated and put into operation November 1, whereby members of the Medical Staff of the Hospital are enabled to obtain some experience in pathology. The medical interne assigned to duty in the Bacteriological Laboratory spends a portion of the time in the Pathological

Department and takes part in the routine work of the laboratory. It is to be regretted that the time allotted to each interne is only two months, but even in that short interval they gain a considerable insight into routine pathological methods.

The Director wishes to call attention to the valuable work done last year by Dr. W. C. Von Glahn, Resident Pathologist, in the reorganization of the various activities of the department. It would be difficult to overestimate the value of the changes enumerated above, all of which he has conceived and put into effect.

Appended is a table showing the number and variety of lesions demonstrated at autopsy during the year.

For the year ending June 30, 1922, there were 297 deaths in the Hospital, and 122 autopsies were obtained. In addition to these there were three autopsies done on individuals who died outside the Hospital, thus making a total of 125 autopsies performed during the year. The percentage of autopsies obtained on patients dying in the Hospital was 41. It will be seen by comparing the figures given in the table below that there has been an increase of 11 per cent in the number of autopsies obtained during the year as compared with the previous year.

During the scholastic year, groups of the second and third year medical students are present at the autopsies, at which time a demonstration of the gross morbid findings is given. Usually within a week the students who were present at the autopsy assemble again and the microscopic pathology is demonstrated to them from the sections, with the aid of an Edinger apparatus.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF DENTAL SERVICE

December 31, 1922

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—It gives me pleasure to submit the following report covering the activities of the Dental Service for the year of 1922.

The X-Ray Department through closer cooperation with the Diagnostic Clinic has been able to assist in clearing up oral infection in a large number of cases.

Lectures on Tooth Development and Oral Hygiene have been given to the Training School Nurses and the system of semi-annual dental examination and prophylactic treatment for the nurses is working out satisfactorily.

A new cabinet for oral surgery instruments has been placed in the clinic and a compressed air outfit is now being installed for the use of both oral surgeons and dental operators. This unit will fill a long felt want by making it possible to use both warm air and spray bottles.

The increasing demand upon the time of our dental hygienists has made it seem advisable to add to our force and in December a third hygienist was engaged which will enable us to cover this field more thoroughly.

Some changes in the personnel of the Dental Staff have been made for the good of the service and we are encouraged by the belief that the coming year will show a still further growth in the efficiency and volume of our work.

The appended statistics refer to the work accomplished by the Dental Service for the year of 1922.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE SCHOOL OF NURSING

December 31, 1922

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to present the thirtieth annual report of the School of Nursing for the year ending December 31, 1922.

The past year has been an unusually busy one in the School of Nursing, due chiefly to the large number of students enrolled. The most significant event touching the School has been the death of Mr. William Sloane, President of the Board of Managers, whose loss is most keenly felt by the alumnae and students.

Two subjects, Nursing in Mental Diseases, and Hygiene, have been added to the curriculum, as required by the New York State Board of Regents. Arrangements are being made to give the students the required instruction in these subjects. The decision of the Medical Board in again giving us the opportunity for a limited amount of gynecological nursing in the Hospital is more than appreciated by the teaching staff.

Dental Prophylaxis is now being offered to every student at regular intervals in the Dental Clinic. This privilege is of great value in maintaining the general health of the School.

The Commencement Exercises of the Class of 1922 were held on May 11, 1922, in the Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church. The address to the graduating class was delivered by Nicholas Murray Butler, Ph.D., Jur.D., LL.D., D.Litt. President, Columbia University. While our former Director, Anna Caroline Maxwell, was missed from the processional, a thrill of pleasure was felt by the Alumnae and School on seeing her in a place of honor beside the late Mr. Solane, on the platform. The graduating class was greatly pleased to receive their pins from Miss Maxwell.

In view of his subsequent illness and death, Mr. Sloane's speech seemed inspired, so full was it of explanation, courage and hope for the future.

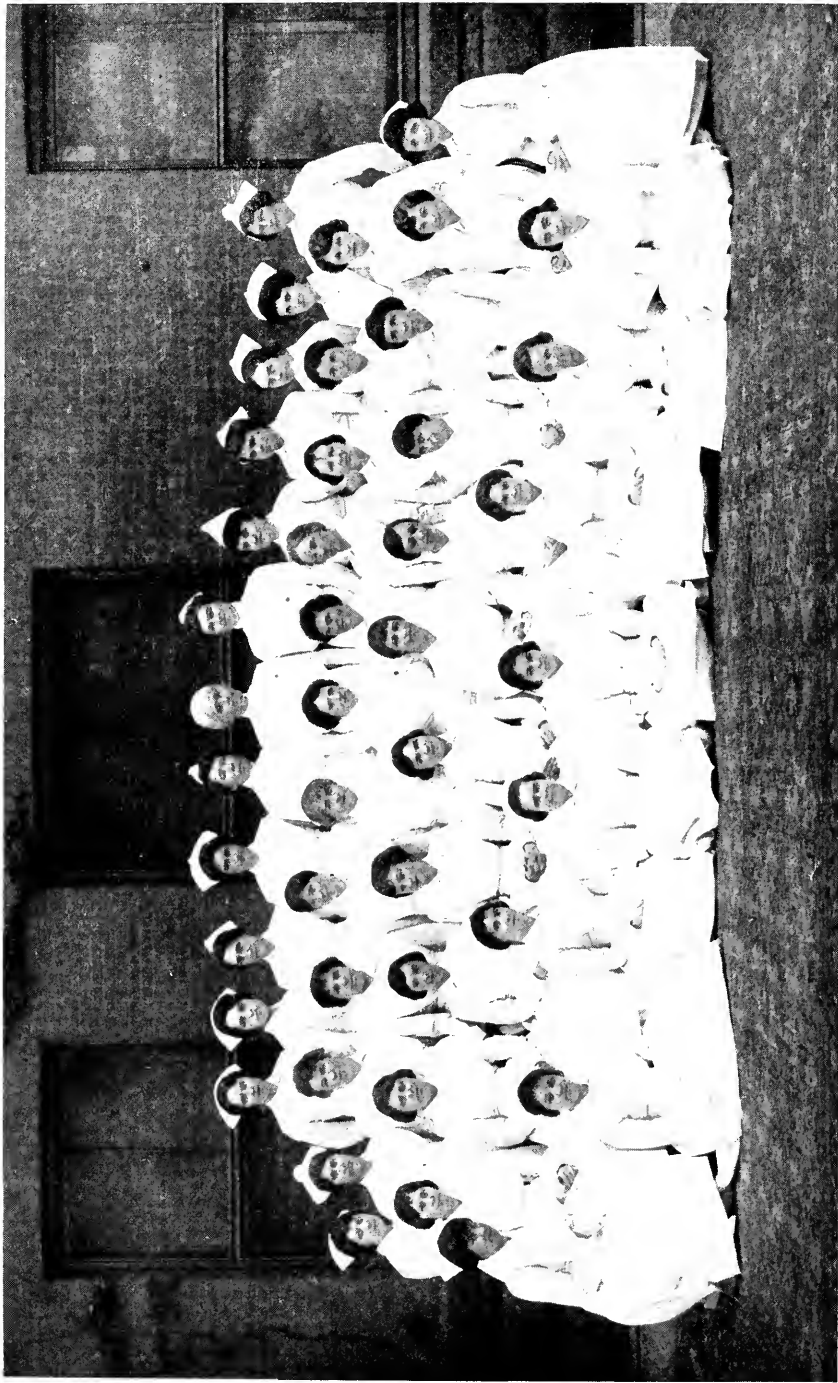
We also wish to express our gratitude to the friends of the School who provide delightful entertainment for our students with opera and theatre tickets.

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OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT

December 31, 1922

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital:

Gentlemen—The report of the Out-Patient Department for the year is respectfully submitted for your consideration. Our records show that during the past year there were 96,959 patient visits made to the various clinics. Of these there were 52,886 surgical and 44,073 medical visits. The foregoing figures include the visits to the Dental Department which numbered 9,541.

The average daily attendance was 322 patient visits. In the surgical clinics there was an average of 6 visits per patient and 5 visits for the medical clinics. There were 5,465 new individuals registered and treated during the past year. Of the total number of visits there were 20.1% which paid no fee.

Early in December the Board of Managers decided to place the Out-Patient Department of the Hospital under its own Superintendent and to separate the administrative function from that of the Hospital proper.

The improvements in the record system, the introduction of a method of patient appointments, and the other advances made during the year are well treated in the reports of the Chiefs of Clinics which are included in this report.

The detailed attendance to the Out-Patient Department by clinics is given on the following page.

REPORT OF OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT

December 31, 1922

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—The past year has been a particularly noteworthy one in the development of the Presbyterian Hospital Out-Patient Department. It is becoming realized more and more throughout the country that an Out-Patient Department should be, and is bound to become the mainspring of the modern hospital. Therefore, as we look forward to the plans of the New Presbyterian Hospital, it has become evident that it is of paramount importance to develop the present Out-Patient Department along lines which will fit it for the important role it must assume in the new plan.

With this in view early in the year, the Medical Board appointed a special Out-Patient Department Committee. This Committee consisted of:

Dr. A. R. Lamb, *Chairman*; Dr. Hugh Auchincloss, *Secretary*—both members of the Medical Board; Dr. C. H. Young, *Superintendent* of the Hospital, and the Surgical and Medical Chiefs of the Out-Patient Department.

The Committee has been greatly assisted in its work and its meetings regularly attended by Mr. Michael M. Davis, Jr., and Miss Janet Thornton, representing the Dispensary Development Committee.

This Out-Patient Department Committee has met nearly every week except through the summer months, and in addition to assisting in the routine matters of the Out-Patient Department has done constructive work along the following lines:

1. A tentative plan for an admission clinic was submitted to the Board of Managers, but due to expense and difficulty of new construction on the present site, it was deemed wiser to defer this for the present.

2. A complete report on the Social Service Department was drawn up showing the evolution and growth of this department and outlining a definite plan of reorganization and development along the lines of service, teaching and research. These recommendations have been approved by the Medical Board.

3. The details of an Appointment System were worked out and this system has already been put into effect. For some time new patients have been admitted by appointment, but under this new system the old patients as well are seen by appointment. The main advantages of an appointment system are:

(a) For the patient:

To reduce to a minimum the time spent in waiting. In time this will result in patients being able to come to the Out-Patient Department by taking only an hour or so off from work instead of a half day, and will do away with tremendous economic waste.

To obtain better treatment by receiving regular and continued supervision from the same doctor.

(b) For the doctor:

To regulate the daily amount of work to be done and to facilitate the provision of material for teaching.

(c) For the Administrative Department:

The lessening of congestion and the distribution of the peak load of admitting over a longer period of time.

The Appointment System as now in operation is capable of improvement. It can also be developed to cover refers and transfers between departments and to include the follow-up system. Even its short trial more than justifies its existence and we believe that it is a real advance and has come to stay.

4. On request of this committee, the Board of Managers has decided to close the Out-Patient Department on Saturday afternoon for a trial period. The object of this was to improve the service on the other five days. Heretofore the staff was never complete. Each member of the clerical staff had a morning off one week and an afternoon off the succeeding week. Each nurse and aide had one afternoon a week. The doctors had one afternoon each two weeks. This meant that at practically no session was the personnel complete. By combining all these absences on Saturday afternoon, the work is carried on at all other times by a complete staff. We believe that the improvement in the service rendered the patients as a whole more than compensates for the undoubted privation to a very few patients who can come only on Saturday afternoon.

5. This committee recommended through the Medical Board to the Board of Managers:

That an Out-Patient Department Executive be appointed to assume control of the administration, thus releasing the professional staff from all such details.

That there be a definite Out-Patient Department budget of which this Executive shall have charge and from which shall be defrayed all Out-Patient expenses.

Both of these recommendations have been carried out. In compliance with the former, on December 13, 1922, Dr. Frederick MacCurdy was officially appointed and assumed his duties as Superintendent of the Out-Patient Department responsible to the Board of Managers through the Executive Vice-President. We take this occasion to welcome Dr. MacCurdy and to assure him of our heartiest cooperation.

6. The committee has also instituted an improved method of keeping the statistics. We hope to perfect this system and simplify it. This change was necessitated by the discovery that there were many inaccuracies in the previous statistics.

7. Closer contact with the Board of Managers has been achieved and the Board has been kept more fully informed of the problems of the Out-Patient Department. A method has been devised whereby at the last meeting of each month two members of the Board of Managers sat with this committee

thus learning the problems at hand, affording the committee the benefit and of their advice.

The work accomplished by this committee is in a large measure due to the unceasing efforts of its chairman, Dr. Lamb, and to him especially the Surgical and Medical Chiefs owe a debt of gratitude.

During the past year, the Dispensary Development Committee has continued its affiliation with our Out-Patient Department. As stated above, two of its members, Mr. Davis and Miss Thornton, have served on the Out-Patient Department Committee where they have contributed many helpful suggestions. The committee has also contributed a generous amount of money to help in our problems. The main part of this has been expended on the Appointment System, the entire expense of which has been borne by the Dispensary Development Committee. To this end, they have furnished the services of Miss Mary K. Taylor who has been in charge of the volunteer and paid aides and has devoted her time with great success to the perfecting of the Appointment System. They have paid the salaries of all the paid aides, the cashier, the admitting clerk, the stenographer and the page, and have defrayed the expense of all the printing involved in the Appointment System. We are very grateful to them for their generous assistance.

The routine work of the clinics has gone on much as before. In the absence of room for growth our attention has been directed rather to the improvement of methods—which means the better care of the patients, and to the more complete working up of the cases before admission to the Hospital. This has saved the patients many bed days and has materially relieved the strain on the ward services. There have been some slight additions and changes which for lack of space we shall not enumerate.

In conclusion, we wish to thank publicly our entire personnel. At no time in our recollection has there existed such a fine spirit of cooperation or a better *esprit de corps*. First of all, we thank the professional staff. Without their unselfish efforts, the work could not go on. We are justly proud of a staff that combines sympathetic helpfulness with scientific skill. To Miss Marsh, the office executive, and her assistants, who often cheerfully work overtime without additional pay; to Miss Taylor and the aides—both paid and volunteer, who not only justify their existence but have proved themselves indispensable; to Miss Wood and her staff of nurses; to the Social Service; to the Pharmacy—in short, to all who work in the Out-Patient Department, we offer our unstinted thanks.

**REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE ALUMNAE ASSOCIATION

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—I have the honor of presenting to you the eighth report of the Alumnae Association of the School of Nursing of the Presbyterian Hospital which is to appear in the Annual Report of the Hospital and covers the year ending December 31, 1922.

The past year has been a comparatively uneventful one in the annals of the Association. The tentative plan for the operation of the Pension Fund has been in effect for one year, and has received loyal support from many alumnae. It has not, however, met with unanimous approval and it is evident from discussion and letters that we are still far from finding a feasible plan for the support of this fund. Nine members of the Association became eligible for the Pension Fund this year.

In July, through the generosity of your Board, gifts, and a small voluntary contribution from the alumnae, Miss Young was able to attend the convention of the three national nursing organizations at Seattle, as our delegate. Her report appeared in the October Quarterly.

The management of the Quarterly magazine has been placed in the hands of a joint board of editors. An attempt is being made to increase the amount of alumnae news, inasmuch as this seems to be the most popular section of the magazine.

The membership report of this organization to date shows a total of 550 enrollment.

The revised Constitution and By-Laws were placed in the hands of all members in September.

We cannot close the record of 1922 without mention of two events which have brought deep sorrow to all the members of the Alumnae Association. The death of William Sloane in August and that of Dr. John Thacher in November have deprived us of two staunch friends, whose advice and encouragement have meant much to us all in the past.

May I, in the behalf of this Association, thank you for your generous cooperation and unflinching interest in our welfare during the past year?

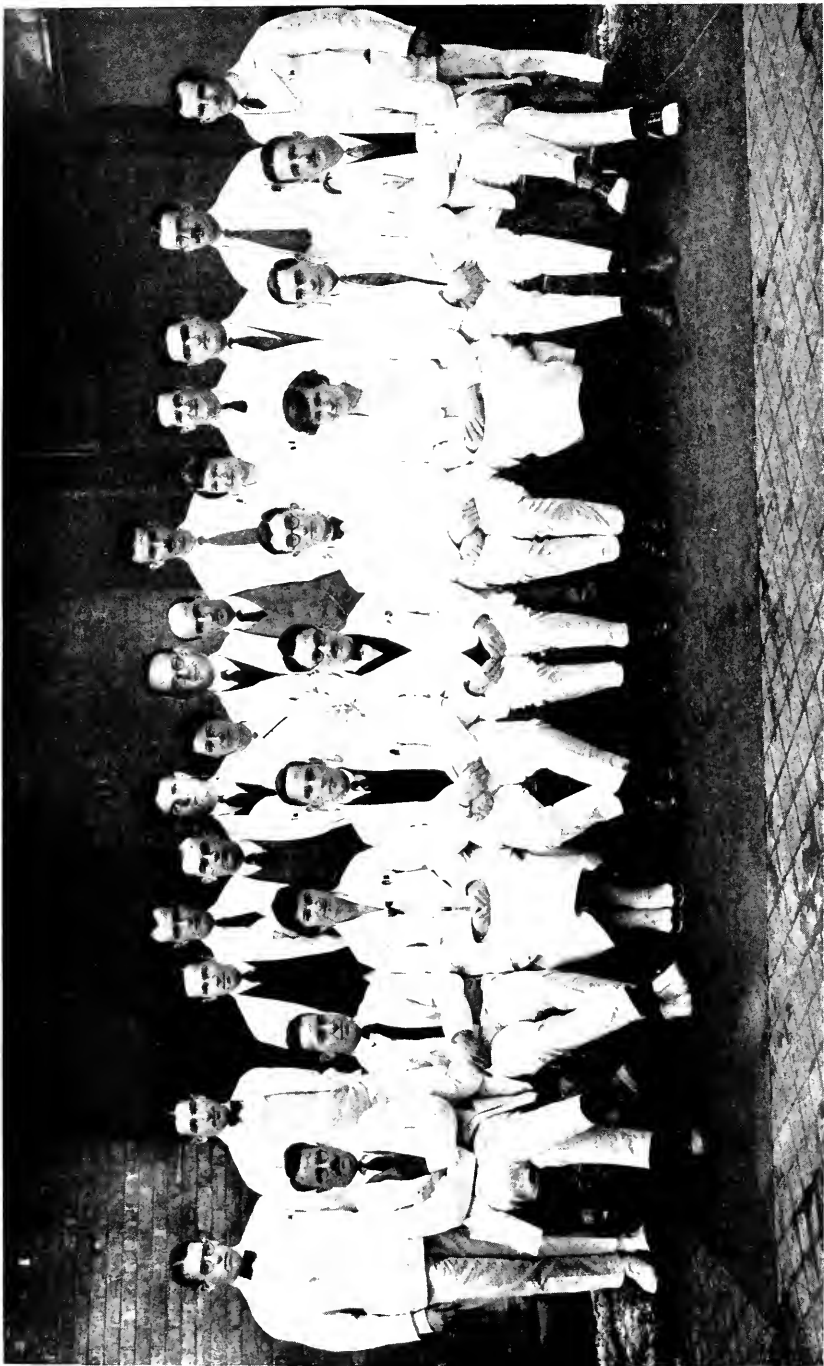

CHARTER

AN ACT

To Found a Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York

Passed February 28, 1868—Chapter 15

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. James Lenox, John Taylor Johnston, Robert L. Stuart, Morris K. Jesup, Marshall S. Bidwell, and their associates, as hereinafter named, shall constitute a body corporate, with power to establish, maintain, and conduct a Hospital in the City of New York, which shall be known and designated as "The Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York."

Section 2. The property and concerns of said Corporation shall be vested in and managed by a Board of thirty-two Managers (by act of March 28, 1868, increased to thirty-six Managers), to be constituted as provided for in the following section.

Section 3. James Brown, Marshall S. Bidwell, William A. Booth, Aaron B. Belknap, William E. Dodge, James Donaldson, John C. Green, Winthrop S. Gilman, Robert M. Hartley, Richard Irvin, Edward S. Jaffray, Thomas Jeremiah, Morris K. Jesup, John Taylor Johnson, James Lenox, David Olyphant, William Paton, Thomas C. M. Paton, Joseph Stuart, Robert L. Stuart, Thomas U. Smith, Jonathan Sturges, Otis D. Swan, Charles N. Talbot, Willard Parker, M.D., John R. Ford, Henry M. Taber, Alexander Van Rensselaer, William M. Vermilye, Washington R. Vermilye, A. R. Wetmore, and A. Robertson Walsh, thirty-two in number, shall constitute a part of the Board of Managers. To these thirty-two Managers, the Rev. William M. Paxton, D.D., as Minister of the First Presbyterian Church; the Rev. William Adams, D.D., as Minister of the Madison Square Presbyterian Church; the Rev. Thomas Dewitt, D.D., as Senior Minister of the Collegiate Church of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church, and the Rev. John N. McLeod, D.D., as Minister of the First Reformed Presbyterian Church, all in the City of New York, and their successors in office for the time being, shall, by virtue of their respective offices, be associated as members of the Board of Managers.

Section 4. As soon as practicable after the passage of this Act, the said Board shall organize, and by lot divide the thirty-two Managers into four classes of eight each, and the places of the said classes shall be vacant respectively on the second Wednesday in April, one, two three, and four years thereafter, so that eight Managers shall be elected by the said Board of Managers annually, by ballot, to hold their seats for four years.

Section 5. The Board of Managers shall have power to fill all vacancies that may occur in the said Board, to enact By-Laws, and to appoint all such agents, assistants, and attendants as may be proper to carry out the purposes of the said Corporation. Among these shall be included a Superintendent and a Chaplain or both a Superintendent and a Chaplain; but these positions shall be held only by Presbyterians.

CHARTER

Section 6. Not less than eleven Managers shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of electing Officers, making or changing By-Laws, or for holding any special meeting; but for all other purposes, and at stated meetings, seven shall be a quorum.

Section 7. The said Corporation are authorized to take by purchase, devise, or otherwise, and may hold, transfer, and convey, for the purposes of said Hospital, all the real and personal property of which it may become possessed, in so far as the same is in accordance with the general laws of this State, and not otherwise, and which said property shall be exempt from taxation, and shall be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of law relating to charitable institutions.

Section 8. This Corporation shall possess the general powers, and be subject to the provisions, restrictions and liabilities contained in the 3rd Title of the 18th Chapter of Part First of the Revised Statutes.

Section 9. This Act shall take effect immediately.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

TITLE

The name by which this Society shall be known shall be "The Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York."

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object of the Society is the establishment, support and management of an Institution for the purpose of affording medical and surgical aid and nursing to sick or disabled persons of every creed, nationality, and color. The public religious services in the Hospital shall be in conformity with the doctrine and forms of the Presbyterian or Reformed Church.

ARTICLE III

THE SOCIETY

The Society shall consist of Life Members, who shall respectively be approved by a majority of members of the Board of Managers present at a stated meeting, and who shall have been nominated at a previous stated meeting by a Standing Committee appointed for that purpose by the Board.

ARTICLE IV

ENDOWED BEDS

The Board of Managers may fix amounts which when paid shall entitle the donor to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge, subject, however, to such rules and regulations for the admission, treatment, and discharge of patients as are now, or shall be hereafter, prescribed by said Board.

Where such nomination is accorded during life, or in perpetuity, the amount paid therefor shall be kept invested in income-producing securities until the privilege may lapse by the death of the donor or otherwise.

ARTICLE V

PROPERTY

All the property of the Society shall be applied to advance the general objects of the Society, except where it has been otherwise specially directed by the donor or testator.

ARTICLE VI

GOVERNMENT

The affairs of the Society shall be under the direction of a Board of thirty-six Managers, thirty-two of whom shall be divided into four classes of eight each; and the places of the said classes shall be vacant respectively on the second Wednesday of April, at the end of one, two, three and four years thereafter, so that Eight Managers shall be elected by the said Board annually, by ballot, to hold their seats for

four years. To these thirty-two Managers, the Minister of the First Presbyterian Church, the Minister of the Madison Square Presbyterian Church, the Senior Minister of the Collegiate Church of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church, and the Minister of the First Reformed Presbyterian Church, all in the City of New York, by virtue of their respective offices, for the time being shall be added as members of the Board of Managers. The officers of the Society shall consist of a President, a Vice-President, a Treasurer, a Corresponding Secretary and a Recording Secretary, who shall be selected annually by the said Board of Managers, from their own number, and shall also be Officers of the said Board. The said Officers and Managers, together, shall form a Board, to be denominated the "Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York," not less than eleven of whom shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of electing Officers, making or changing By-Laws, or for holding any special meeting; but seven shall be a quorum for all other purposes, and for stated meetings. The Board of Managers shall at all times be fully authorized to execute all powers of the Society, over all the estate and property of the Society. To it shall be committed the care of the funds of the Institution; authority to make By-Laws, Rules and Regulations, and to alter and amend the same; to fill vacancies in their own body, choose the Officers of the Society, appoint agents, assistants and attendants, and generally to transact the entire business of the Society.

ARTICLE VII

MEETINGS OF THE BOARD

The Board of Managers shall hold stated meetings on the second Tuesday of each month excepting the months of July, August and September, and may hold adjourned meetings when necessary. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the President, or, in case of his absence or inability to act, by the Vice-President, or on written requisition of five members of the Board of Managers; but when special meetings are called, the time and place of meeting, and the subject proposed to be considered, shall be notified to the members at least two days previous to the meeting; and no other subject shall be discussed or acted upon at such meetings.

ARTICLE VIII

ANNUAL MEETING

A meeting of the members of the Society shall be held annually on such day after the expiration of the fiscal year as the Board of Managers may appoint. It shall be the duty of the Board of Managers to make the necessary arrangements for this meeting; to present to the members a report of the proceedings of the previous years; to exhibit a statement of the funds and property of the Society; and also to give information of any matters relating to the objects of the Society which may be of interest or importance.

At the stated meeting of the Board in April eight members shall be chosen by ballot from among the members of the Society to supply the places of the class of managers whose term of service is about to expire. These eight members, together with those composing the three other classes, and the four *ex-officio* members of the Board, shall constitute the Board of Managers for the ensuing year and shall continue in office until their successors are elected. In case of failure to make such elections on the appointed day, a special meeting of the Board shall be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE IX

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

Amendments to the Constitution shall be proposed in writing at a regular meeting of the Board of Managers, and may be acted on at the next regular meeting of the Board, or at a special meeting called for that purpose; and shall be adopted only on a concurrence of a majority of the members present, but the affirmative vote must not be less than eleven.

BY-LAWS

OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS

I—RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Board of Managers shall prescribe rules and regulations respecting the management of the affairs of the Hospital. Such rules and regulations shall not be inconsistent with these By-Laws, and may be amended at any meeting of the Board of Managers by a majority of those present.

II—PRESIDENT

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall appoint all special Committees, unless otherwise ordered, and shall perform such other duties as may be required by the Constitution and By-Laws. He shall also be *ex-officio*, a member of all committees.

III—VICE-PRESIDENT

In the event of a vacancy of the office of President, or during his absence or inability to act, his duties and powers shall devolve upon the Vice-President. Should he also be unable to act, a President pro-tem shall be chosen by the Board.

IV—TREASURER

The Treasurer shall be charged with the custody of all papers and documents relating to the property of the Corporation, other than such as are mentioned in By-Law V., of all moneys belonging thereto, and of the seal. He shall keep an account in the name of the Corporation with an institution approved by the Board, and shall deposit therein all moneys immediately upon receiving them. He shall cause to be kept such accounts as may be necessary to show the receipts, expenditures, and financial condition of the Institution, or as may be required by the Finance Committee. These accounts shall be open at all suitable times to the inspection of the Managers. He shall pay no moneys without proper order, as is elsewhere provided.

V—SAFE KEEPING OF SECURITIES

All bonds, stocks and other invested securities and evidences of value, shall be deposited for safe keeping with a trust company approved by the Board to be held in the name of the Hospital and subject to the joint written order of the Treasurer and a member of the Finance Committee, or, in the absence of the Treasurer, of two members of the Finance Committee, all cash collections being subject to the order of the Treasurer as elsewhere provided.

VI—SECRETARY

The Secretary shall be the Recording and Corresponding Secretary and shall keep the minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Managers, and preserve such records and papers as do not pertain to the office of Treasurer. He shall also be *ex-officio* a member of the Executive Committee and shall keep minutes of said Committee. He shall notify members of all meetings of the Board of Managers at least two days before the meeting. He shall notify members of their appointment on Committees, and generally perform such duties as usually pertain to the office.

BY-LAWS

He shall have charge of the correspondence of the Board, and shall prepare the Annual Report of the Managers and attend to its publication.

VII—COMMITTEES

At the meeting in April, after filling the vacancies about to occur in their Board, the Managers shall elect an Executive Committee of eight members, a Dispensary Committee of five members, a Training School Committee of three or more members, a House Committee of three or more members, a Finance Committee of five members, of which the Treasurer shall be one, a Committee on Nominations of five members, of which the Secretary shall be one, and an Auditing Committee of two members. The members appointed on these committees shall hold office for one year from the second Wednesday in April next ensuing, unless otherwise ordered by the Board, and shall keep minutes of their proceedings, which shall be submitted to the Board at its stated meetings. The Board shall also appoint two of its members for each month of the year, who shall serve as an Inspecting Committee. If any Manager thus appointed shall be unable to attend during the time allotted to him, it shall be his duty to procure some other Manager to attend in his stead.

VIII—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee shall consist of eight Managers chosen as provided in By-Law VII, to whom shall be added the two Managers serving as the Inspecting Committee, and the members of the Out-Patient Department, Training School and House Committees.

1. The Committee shall meet on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month and may hold special meetings when necessary, or when called by the Chairman or two members of the Committee. Three shall constitute a quorum.

2. The Executive Committee shall give orders and establish such rules and regulations as they shall deem necessary for the better carrying into effect the object of this Institution, provided such rules and regulations be not inconsistent with those established by the Board of Managers.

3. All questions relating to the admission, rejection and discharge of patients shall be decided by the Executive Committee, in conformity with the directions of the Board of Managers.

4. In case the House Physician, House Surgeon, or any of their assistants, or any other officer or employee shall neglect any of the duties prescribed to them, or refuse to comply with any reasonable request of the Executive Committee, or Superintendent, the Superintendent may suspend the offender, and he shall at once report his action to the Executive Committee.

5. The Executive Committee shall have general charge of all property within the precincts of the Hospital, and shall see that proper economy is observed in the administration of all its affairs, having due regard to the welfare of its beneficiaries. It shall audit and examine the accounts of the Superintendent; and authorize such repairs and disbursements as may from time to time be necessary, and shall draw drafts upon the Treasurer therefor; such drafts, except for the monthly pay-rolls and supplies, shall not exceed \$1,000 without authority of the Board therefor; shall be signed by the Chairman and Secretary for the time being of the Committee; and shall be a sufficient voucher for the Treasurer.

BY-LAWS

IX—OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT COMMITTEE

The Out-Patient Department Committee shall consist of five Managers. It shall have the general care and oversight of the Out-Patient Department, and shall meet on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month.

X—SCHOOL OF NURSING COMMITTEE

The School of Nursing Committee shall consist of three or more Managers, who shall have the general care and oversight of the School of Nursing.

XI—HOUSE COMMITTEE

The House Committee shall consist of three or more Managers, and shall direct and control the purchasing of all food, fuel, equipment and repair supplies, and have general supervision of the equipment, maintenance and repair of real estate and buildings.

XII—FINANCE COMMITTEE

1. The Finance Committee shall consist of five Managers—one of whom shall be the Treasurer. Three shall constitute a quorum.
2. They shall have authority in their discretion to sell bonds, stock and other invested securities and evidence of value belonging to the Society, and invest and re-invest the proceeds (together with any other funds of the Society available for investment) in such securities as they deem wise.

XIII—NOMINATING COMMITTEE

1. The Nominating Committee shall consist of five Managers, of whom the Secretary shall be one. Three shall constitute a quorum.
2. In the case of a vacancy occurring in the Board of Managers they shall recommend to the Board the name of a Life Member to fill such vacancy, and to them shall be referred the names of all persons suggested for such position or for Life Membership; but no report of the Committee shall be acted upon until the next subsequent meeting of the Board, except with unanimous consent.
3. All persons nominated for positions on the House Staff shall be referred to this Committee. The names of such as shall be favorably considered by the Committee shall be by them reported to the Board of Managers.

XIV—INSPECTING COMMITTEE

1. The Inspecting Committee shall inspect all the Hospital buildings, visit the wards, service rooms, and laboratories and shall examine as to the cleanliness and order of all parts of the Hospital and grounds.
2. They shall enter their report in a book, which book shall be laid before the Executive Committee at its meetings.

XV—AUDITING COMMITTEE

The Auditing Committee shall shortly after the close of each fiscal year examine and check the bonds, stocks, mortgages or other securities or evidences of value owned by the Hospital and shall also have the accounts of the Treasurer and Super-

intendent for the last fiscal year examined and checked by certified public accountants. The Committee shall thereafter report to the Board the result of such accounting with its recommendations.

XVI—MEDICAL BOARD AND THE MEDICAL, SURGICAL AND LABORATORY SERVICE

1. The Board of Managers shall appoint annually—

(a) A Director of the Surgical Service, a Director of the Medical Service, and a Director of the Pathological Service; these shall together constitute the Medical Board.

(b) As many Visiting Physicians and Surgeons, and Associate Visiting Physicians and Surgeons, as the service of the Hospital may require, a Visiting Physician to the Roentgen Ray Department, a Visiting Bacteriologist, a Visiting Chemist, an Out-Patient Department Staff, and such other department chiefs and assistants as the various services of the Hospital may require.

(c) As many Assistant Physicians and Surgeons and special Consulting Physicians and Surgeons as the service of the Hospital may require.

(d) A House Staff, consisting of as many members as the service of the Hospital may require, and at such times and for such terms of service as shall seem best to meet the needs of the Hospital.

(e) A Register of the Out-Patient Department.

2. These appointments shall be made at some time prior to July 1st in each year. The appointees unless a different term be fixed by the Board shall hold office for one year and thereafter until further action of the Board.

XVII—EXECUTIVE STAFF

The Board of Managers shall appoint a Superintendent and such Assistants as the Board may deem necessary for the service of the Hospital, whose services shall continue during the pleasure of the Board.

The Board of Managers shall appoint a Director of the School of Nursing and such Assistants as may be necessary for such service, and such appointees shall hold office during the pleasure of the Board.

XVIII—ENDOWED BEDS

1. A gift of \$10,000 shall entitle the donor and his successors to nominate, from time to time, an adult patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge.

2. A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor to a like privilege for the children's ward.

3. A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor, during life, to nominate from time to time, a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge. If the donor be a corporation or association the privilege to nominate shall expire in fifteen years unless the privilege be extended by the Board of Managers, but shall in no event continue for a greater period than twenty-five years.

4. Any person or corporation being the donor of a \$5,000 bed may increase their donation to \$10,000, in which case they shall become henceforth entitled to the privilege that attaches to an original donation of that amount.

BY-LAWS

5. All endowed bed privileges are subject to the Rules and Regulations governing the admission, treatment and discharge of patients.

6. Contributions to the endowment fund of free beds, as above provided for, may be made by instalments, when the donor shall, in writing, so notify the Treasurer at the time of each payment. So long as the instalments so paid in shall not equal the sums required under the preceding sections, the amount received shall constitute a portion of the general endowment fund, the income of which shall be used for the payment of the current expenses of the Hospital, and no privileges shall accrue to the donor.

7. The Board of Managers shall have power in their discretion to make, under special and exceptional circumstances, such other arrangements (temporary or permanent) as to endowed beds as they may deem best calculated to promote the objects for which the Hospital was established and is now being maintained.

8. Certificates of the right to nominate patients to use and occupy beds free of charge shall be issued in such form as the Board of Managers may prescribe, and shall be signed by the President or Vice-President and Treasurer, who shall also affix the seal of the Corporation.

XIX—APPROPRIATIONS OF MONEY

Except in the cases provided for in Section 5 of By-Law VIII, and Section 2 of By-Law XII, all appropriations of money shall be made by resolution of the Board of Managers. Orders for the amounts thus appropriated shall be drawn on the Treasurer by the President or presiding officer of the meeting, and be countersigned by the Secretary, or Secretary *pro tem.*, and when properly endorsed shall be sufficient voucher for the Treasurer.

XX—COMPLAINTS, SUSPENSIONS OR DISCHARGES

If any officer, physician or surgeon shall become unfit to execute his office, or shall conduct himself contrary to any of the Rules of the Hospital, or refuse or neglect to execute the same, the Executive Committee, or any member of the Board of Managers may submit against him a complaint in writing, at a meeting duly called, and thereupon a notice of the said complaint shall be given to the person complained of, and a time shall be appointed (not less than six days after service of said notice) for the person complained of to make his defense before the Board of Managers; and the Board, having examined into the truth of the complaint, and heard the defense of the party accused, if any shall be made, may, with the concurrence and approbation of a majority of the Managers present, suspend or discharge the officer, physician, or surgeon complained of.

XXI—ORDER OF BUSINESS

The order of business shall be as follows:

1. The meeting shall be opened with prayer.
2. The roll shall be called, and the attending members noted.
3. The minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read, corrected if necessary, and approved.

BY-LAWS

4. Treasurer's Reports.
5. Reports of the Committee shall be called for, and order taken thereon.
6. Communications to the Board shall be received and considered.
7. Unfinished business.
8. New business.

XXII—ALTERATIONS OR ADDITIONS

Any amendment to the By-Laws shall be proposed in writing at a regular meeting of the Board of Managers, and may be acted on at the next regular meeting of the Board, or at a special meeting called for that purpose. It shall be adopted only on an affirmative vote of a majority of those present. A copy of any proposed amendment shall be mailed to each member of the Board at least three days prior to the next meeting.

Revised, January 10, 1922.

RULES AS TO THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS

1. All ward patients are required to pay \$3.00 per day for board or such smaller sums as may be determined by the circumstances of the case, of which the Managers shall be the sole judges. Patients from New York City (Manhattan and Bronx), who are unable to pay are admitted free. Patients from out of town requiring operative treatment not obtainable at their homes may be admitted free if unable to pay. Other patients from out of town will not usually be admitted free, but this rule shall not apply to patients recommended for admission by members of the Board of Managers or by any of the Directors of Service.

2. Patients suffering from severe accident or serious illness will be admitted at any hour of the day or night. Other patients will be admitted between 9 A. M. and 5 P. M. If able, they must apply in person at the office of the Hospital, when they will be examined by a member of the House Staff or Surgeon on duty, and admitted by the Superintendent, subject to approval by the Executive Committee. If unable to apply in person, they shall be visited and examined by such Physician as may be appointed by the Executive Committee.

3. Patients may be admitted by the Superintendent on the recommendation of any Manager, after examination as to suitability by a member of the House Staff, or on the recommendation of any Physician or Surgeon of the Hospital.

4. No patient suffering from any readily communicable disease shall be admitted, nor any whose case does not require the special benefits of the Hospital; nor shall any patient be admitted whose case is judged to be incurable, unless there be urgent symptoms which, in the opinion of the Attending Physician or Surgeon, are capable of being relieved. There shall be no uterine nor vaginal examination made except in the presence of a nurse.

5. No patient suffering from erysipelas shall be admitted to either the Medical or Surgical Division of the Hospital.

6. There shall be recorded in the office daily the number of vacant beds.

7. Application for the admission of patients living out of the city must be accompanied by a certificate of some reputable physician, stating the nature and probable duration of the disease.

RULES FOR VISITORS

1. Visitors are allowed in the Wards for Adults, Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday, from 1 to 2 P. M.; Tuesday and Friday from 6 to 8 P. M.; and Sunday from 1 to 3 P. M. Visitors may not come at any other time, unless under exceptional circumstances.

2. *No more than two Visitors will be admitted to see any Patient on one Day.*

3. Only fruit, jelly and ice cream may be brought for patients. Such packages must be left with the door clerk, and, if approved by the Physician, will be sent to the Patients.

4. In the Children's Ward, parents only are allowed. No other relatives, children or friends are permitted in this Ward. Parents are allowed on Tuesday and Friday evenings from 6 to 7 P. M., Sunday from 2 to 3 P. M., and may remain one half hour only. No packages of any kind may be carried to the Children's Ward.

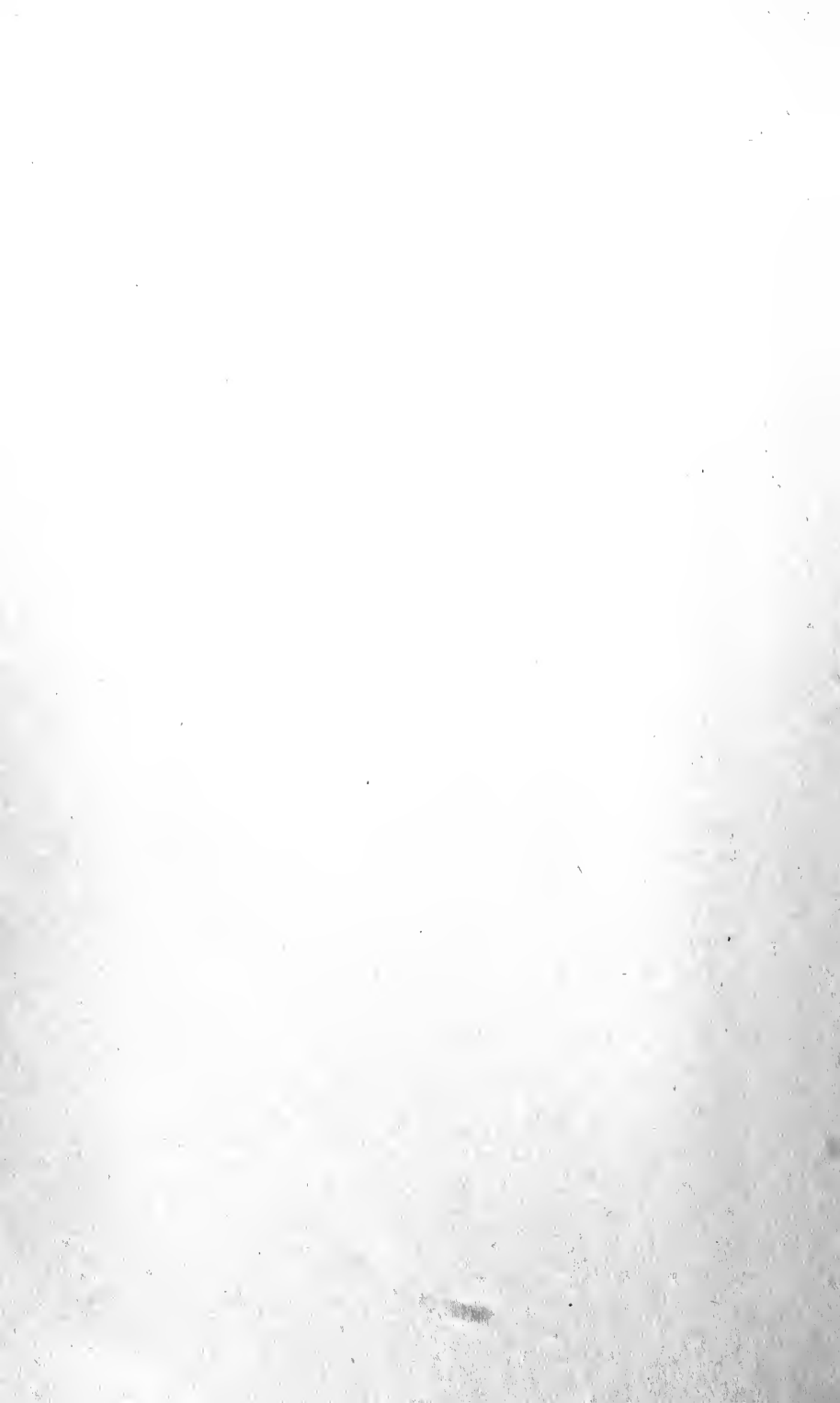
5. Visitors must observe perfect order and propriety while in the Hospital; must confine their visits to their immediate friends; must not stop or loiter in the halls, offices, or on the stairways, and must leave the building promptly at the end of visiting hours.

Any violations of these rules may subject the offender to exclusion from the premises.

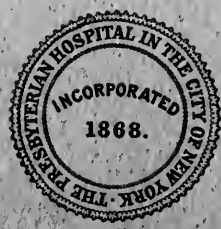

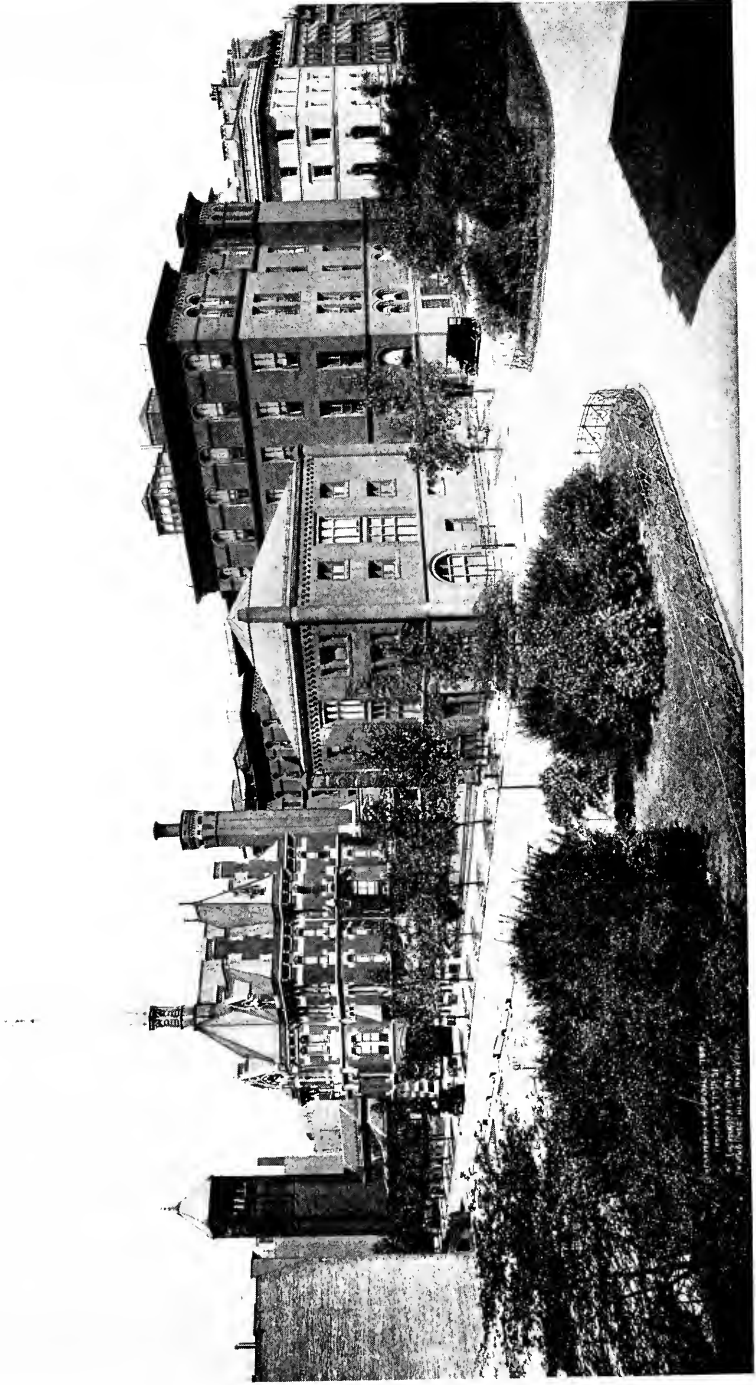

IN MEMORIAM

WILLIAM ALLEN BUTLER

MANAGER, 1909-1923

Died July 1, 1923

William Allen Butler died at his summer residence, Southampton, Long Island, on July first, 1923.

Mr. Butler became a member of the Board of Managers of the Hospital in 1909, and served continuously until his death. During the last few years he served on the Executive and Out-Patient Department Committees of the Board.

It is difficult to estimate at their full value the services rendered by Mr. Butler to the Hospital. He did not feel that his duties were limited merely to his official duties as a Manager, but devoted much time and attention to personal visits to the Hospital and to a supervision of its activities. The interests of the Hospital were very dear to him, and he was always available for counsel and advice with regard to its affairs.

The Board of Managers hereby records its profound sense of the serious loss which it has sustained in the death of one who loved the Hospital and who gave much of himself to it, together with its deep sense of personal grief in the death of a devoted friend and adviser.

THE Department Heads responsible for the actual operation of the Hospital during the year 1923 are deserving of high praise for the results accomplished as shown by their reports submitted herewith. Back of these results lies the great strength of the Institution, the spirit that made them possible.

Achievements of the Professional Staff are set forth with too great modesty in the reports of the Directors of the Services. Notable among them has been the development by Dr. Dochez of a scarlet fever serum, an event which bids fair to be epochal.

In other respects, milestones mark the year. We have been handicapped by the resignation of a superintendent who served the Hospital well for many years. His successor has brought a long training in business affairs to aid in the solution of our problems. Miss Helen Young, previously Acting Director of the School of Nursing, has been appointed Director, with the whole-hearted support and approval of everyone connected with the Hospital. We have added to the Staff, as head of the Department of Nutrition, an experienced dietitian, Miss Kate Daum, A.B., M.A., Ph.D. A General Stores Department has been organized and control of supplies concentrated therein. A purchasing agent has been appointed, who is also responsible for the operation of General Stores. A unit cost accounting system is in process of installation. A Social Service Committee has been organized and the extension of our Social Service Work is under way with the substantial and much appreciated financial and actual cooperation of the Dispensary Development Committee. With like cooperation the Out-patient Department has carried the appointment system to a successful outcome.

After mature consideration by members of the Professional Staff a modification in hospital relations was recommended, designed chiefly to establish direct business contact between private patients and members of the staff in cases where such contact had been through the hospital administration. The recommendations have been approved by the University and the Hospital, effective January 1, 1924.

The plan of the City of New York for the establishment of a park along Riverside Drive unfortunately will deprive the Medical Centre of some property and exclude direct access to the North River. However, by arrangement with the City, a strip substantially two hundred feet deep along the westerly side of Riverside Drive is reserved to us with the privilege to construct such buildings thereon as meet the approval of the Municipal Art Commission.

Most satisfactory progress has been made in plans for the new Medical Centre buildings. The final ground plan of the Hospital has been approved in principle by the Department Heads, subject to certain reservations as to details which are now being worked out. The day of completed final plans is not far distant and the Hospital expects to undertake the raising of at least \$4,000,000 to provide additional funds for initial construction purposes. The task is big, but the obstacles not insurmountable. We bespeak the whole-hearted cooperation of all of our friends.

It is with deep regret that I record the deaths of Mr. William Allen Butler, for many years a true and tried member of the Board of Managers, and of Dr. David Bovaird, graduated from the House Staff in 1894 and a member of the Visiting Staff from 1903 to 1923.

Purposes for Which Income or Principal of Reserve Funds Is Used

Endowed Bed Fund, General Endowment Fund, Perry McDonough Collins Endowment Fund, Fiske Fund, Alice Manderlick Flagler Fund, Edwin Bancroft Foote Fund, Morris K. and Maria De Witt Jesup Fund, Margarett A. Jones Fund, John Stewart Kennedy Fund, Russell and Margaret Olivia Sage Memorial Fund, Sidman Trust Fund, Fund in Memory of John T. Terry, The Isaac E. Valentine Memorial Fund and Moses Weinman Fund. The income from these funds is applied toward the current expenses of the Hospital.

General Fund. Unrestricted legacies received since 1911 have been credited to this fund. It is intended to use the income of this fund to partly meet the current expenses of the Hospital and to draw on the principal, when necessary, to meet expenditures not otherwise provided for.

The Mrs. Frederic Baker Pathological Department Fund. To supply books, periodicals, and instruments for use in the Pathological Laboratory.

Charles K. Briddon Gold Medal Fund. The income from this fund provides the Dr. C. K. Briddon Gold Medal competed for every two years by members of the Alumni of the Presbyterian Hospital, who write essays requiring original research.

Cheney Fund. To carry out certain investigations bearing upon glands of internal secretion.

Dortic Memorial Fund. The principal of this fund may be applied to the erection and maintenance of a Convalescent Home in connection with the Hospital. Accumulated income may be used for the maintenance of Presbyterian Hospital patients in some approved Convalescent Home.

Mrs. David Dows Fund. The income from this fund is used to purchase scientific instruments for use in the Hospital for the study and cure of disease.

Margaret E. Dows Fund. The income from this fund is applied toward the current expenses of the School of Nursing.

East River Homes Fund. To meet the expenses of tubercular work in connection with patients in the district assigned to this Hospital by the Board of Health.

Epilepsy Fund. To defray the expenses of treatment and research work on certain forms of epilepsy.

Fund for Educational and Scientific Work. The income from this fund is used for the support of the educational and scientific work of the Hospital, in accordance with the agreement between the Hospital and Columbia University.

Insulin Fund. For the treatment of patients in the Children's Ward.

The Katie Geitz Fund. To meet expenses of the Diet Kitchen established for the benefit of tubercular patients and children in our district.

Hill Top Camp Fund. For the support of a camp at Hawthorne, N. Y., to which are sent the children of tubercular patients of the Out-Patient Department Clinic.

Holiday Cheer Fund. To provide decorations, entertainments, presents or other holiday cheer throughout the Hospital to patients, staff, nurses and employees.

House Staff Entertainment Fund. To provide recreation, entertainment, etc., for members of the House Staff.

Dr. Francis P. Kinnicutt Memorial Fund. To defray the cost of a Medical Ward in the new Presbyterian Hospital Buildings, when erected. The income is added to the principal.

Patients' Relief Fund. To provide special relief for patients.

Personal Injury Liability Insurance Fund. To pay approved claims for personal injuries sustained by employees while on the Hospital premises.

Rockefeller Insulin Fund. To be used for the treatment of diabetic patients with and the study of the best methods of employing Insulin.

Room J Trust Fund. The income from this fund is used to provide delicacies and extra nursing for female patients occupying Room "J."

Sarah Sanford Fund. To provide temporary relief, apparatus and transportation for convalescents.

School of Nursing Endowment Fund. The income from this fund is used to maintain the educational work of the School of Nursing.

School of Nursing Library Fund. To provide periodicals and books for the School of Nursing library.

School of Nursing Scholarship Fund. To provide scholarships for students and traveling scholarships for graduates of the School of Nursing.

H. Smith Periodical Fund. To provide periodicals for the wards of the Hospital.

George H. F. Schrader Fund, and Wall Fund. The income from each of these funds is paid to a beneficiary during life, and thereafter becomes the property of the Hospital.

Social Service Fund. For special relief under direction of Social Service Committee.

Frances Swan Welles Fund. One-half of the income from this fund is used to brighten and cheer the lives of trained nurses employed from time to time in the Hospital, and the other half to brighten and cheer the lives of patients in the general wards of the Hospital.

A gift of \$10,000 shall entitle the donor and his successors to nominate, from time to time, an adult patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge.

A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor to a like privilege for the children's ward.

A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor, during life to nominate from time to time, a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge. If the donor be a corporation or association, the privilege to nominate shall expire in fifteen years unless the privilege be extended by the Board of Managers, but shall in no event continue for a greater period than twenty-five years.

Any person or corporation being the donor of a \$5,000 bed may increase their donation to \$10,000, in which case they shall become thenceforth entitled to the privilege that attaches to an original donation of that amount.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

December 31, 1923

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—The Fifty-fifth Report of the Superintendent of the Hospital for the year ending December 31, 1923 is herewith presented.

Twenty-seven thousand two hundred and ninety-seven persons have been benefited by the Hospital during the year. The departments contributing this service and the number treated in each will be found in detail in the reports. They may be summarized as follows:

Patients treated in the Hospital on wards or private rooms, 4,148 persons. Daily average 231 patients. Of the ward patients, 30.3% were treated free of charge.

There were treated in the Out-Patient Department 18,713 persons. Daily average visits made were 388.

Visiting nurses cared for 4,336 persons, making 18,969 visits.

In the Radiotherapy Department 2,050 treatments were given to 392 patients.

In the Roentgen Ray Department, 21,458 films were taken of 9,809 patients.

In the Dental Department, 11,891 visits were made and 14,553 dental films were taken of 2,188 patients.

The Department of Massage and Medical Gymnastics has given 7,694 treatments.

Structural changes have been made at the entrance of the Hospital. The arrangement of the Information Bureau has been improved and enlarged. The switchboard has been moved to the floor above, insuring privacy. An annunciator system for the professional staff has been installed.

New laundry equipment has been purchased. A new system for counting and sorting of all linen is now in operation.

The purchase of a new Dodge car to replace the old one was found necessary for the Social Service Department.

Main kitchen, pantries and dining rooms have been rearranged with additional new and modern equipment.

With the resignation of Miss Ruth T. Dean, Assistant Superintendent, Miss Mabel Davies was appointed Assistant to the Superintendent and the work of the Superintendent's Office rearranged. Mr. J. B. Kelly was appointed purchasing agent.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

All supplies are now inventoried and the main storerooms have been re-modeled. Steps have been taken to further sub-divide the accounting system which will permit of a closer analysis of costs. This move has entailed the employment of some additional assistance.

A large amount of painting and redecorating has been done throughout the Hospital and the Nurses' Home.

Fire protection, enclosing elevator shafts and a new elevator in the medical building have added materially to our expenditures.

The Administrative Staff wishes to express appreciation of the loyal support of the entire Hospital personnel and to thank the friends of the Presbyterian Hospital for their many kindnesses.

The Salaries of Operating Room Nurses and Operating Room Orderlies are distributed in proportion to the numbers of Private Room Surgical Patients and Ward Surgical Patients treated.

METHOD OF FIGURING COST OF DIFFERENT BRANCHES OF SERVICE.

The method in use at the Presbyterian Hospital of figuring the total cost of caring for Ward Patients, Private Room Patients, Out-Patient Department Patients or Patients visited in their homes is to charge each branch of the service with salaries and wages of all persons employed exclusively in, and all supplies and repairs directly chargeable to such service, and to prorate the other operating expenses which contribute to the cost of the different branches of service in such proportion as the Superintendent and his Assistants may consider most fair after careful consideration of the local conditions, which are, of course, subject to change from time to time. In determining the relative proportion of Administration Expenses, Professional Care of Patients, Housekeeping, Kitchen, etc., accounts directly chargeable to Out-Patient Department and Visiting Nursing, the percentage charged to Ward Patients and to Private Room Patients is based upon the number of day's treatment furnished in each service, modified by well-known facts; for instance, the fact that a private room patient requires more professional care than necessary if he were located in a ward also, the important fact that his food and the preparation of it costs very much more than that of the ward patient. The distribution of the cost of General House and Property Expenses among the different branches of the service is based upon the relative cubic contents of those parts of the buildings occupied by each of the five services mentioned.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE AND VISITING NURSING DEPARTMENT

December 31, 1923

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—The twentieth year of the Social Service and Visiting Nursing Department, started originally for the benefit of student nurses, through Miss Maxwell's vision of its future possibilities, and by the generosity of Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt, Sr., has been completed.

Recently on account of the character of the work of the department having changed somewhat, the present needs call for trained social workers.

However, six student nurses, during the year, were given a short training of two months each, in bedside nursing and social service. This is helpful to the doctors interested in having certain patients followed up and nursed at home until able to return. It also gives the student an intensive observation as to the possibilities in the field of Public Health.

The probationers at the conclusion of six months in the School are given a talk on Hospital Social Service by the Director and afterwards go with the social workers to homes of ex-ward patients. This has brought about not only a closer cooperation between the student nurses and the social workers but has secured for them a more sympathetic outlook toward their patients during the years of training.

Social service has been carried on in the wards of the Hospital and in the Tuberculosis and Cardiac Clinics. It is hoped that in the near future, by means of a larger staff, that intensive social service can be given to a greater number of patients.

A beginning has already been made in having every new patient seen at the time of admission by a social worker, her chief aim being to find and attend to any immediate social needs, and to reassure the patients at the time when they are putting themselves under the care of the Hospital.

Hill Top Camp at Hawthorne, New York, had a successful summer. One hundred and ten underweight children, exposed to tuberculosis in their families and under observation in the Tuberculosis Clinic, spent over three weeks each at the Camp. Under the care of a trained nurse and an assistant, and with special supervision given to diet, rest, and recreation, the total gain in weight was two hundred and twenty-eight pounds. The funds, whereby this important work can be done each year, were raised through the continued interest and efforts of Dr. and Mrs. Herbert S. Carter and friends.

The second year of the Health Class, held weekly at the Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church House has again proved an interesting and valuable addition to our preventive work. Many of the children were sent during the summer to Hill Top Camp. A short educational play was presented at the children's Christmas Party by members of the class.

REPORT OF SOCIAL SERVICE AND VISITING NURSING DEPARTMENT

The work of the Katie Geitz Kitchen has continued along the same lines, and the Kitchen is still proving its usefulness in several ways. Milk has been dispensed to our tubercular patients, nourishing lunches at seven cents each were provided for from thirty to fifty school children daily, and an average of twenty-six baths a week were taken by children of the Tuberculosis Clinic, in the two bathrooms connected with the Kitchen.

The gift of three thousand seven hundred and forty quarts of milk sent by the Walker-Gordon Laboratory is much appreciated. This has been an annual gift for the past nineteen years.

We are indebted to Burke Foundation, Holiday Farm, Tribune Fresh Air, Life Farm, Children's Aid Society, Otisville Sanatorium and a number of other Convalescent and Fresh Air Homes for their splendid cooperation and care of six hundred and fifty-three hospital patients; also to the Scully-Walton Ambulance Company for their help in transporting the Camp children to trains.

The cooperation of the personnel of all the departments of the Hospital has been most appreciated and helpful.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

December 31, 1923

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—The report of the Department of Occupational Therapy for the year ending December 31, 1923, is herewith submitted.

Five hundred and sixty patients have been treated by the Department and nine hundred and forty articles have been completed. A large number of the patients who have had Occupational Therapy have been in the Hospital three weeks or longer and have made several articles per patient. In several instances where the patient has been under treatment for diabetes as many as twelve or sixteen articles have been made. The Department has endeavored to turn out its articles so soundly constructed that little fault can be found with their durability at the same time maintaining a high standard of beauty. It has been interesting to note that patients returning to the Hospital for further treatment, having once had the opportunity to observe or to do craft work with the Department, usually request further Occupational Therapy. Patients themselves remark the increased cheerfulness of those patients who are happily occupied.

A start has been made toward regular work with the children in the Children's Ward, for we feel that there is a real need there for Occupational Therapy.

A young man from the Cardiac Clinic has been helping the Department to fill special orders for trays, scrap baskets, etc., in that way obtaining some small funds and some materials for his own use. Through the interest and kindness of many members of the Hospital personnel, a large number of orders have been placed with the Department. When these orders have been filled by the patients the Department has repaid the patient for time and workmanship in the way most satisfactory to the individual patient. Through the regular payments by patients for materials used by them and through filling special orders, the Department has been enabled to put two hundred and fifteen dollars into the Hospital Fund during the year.

Under the auspices of the State Board of Charities and the Department of Public Welfare, the Occupational Therapy Departments of a number of State and City Hospitals and Private Institutions including our own, cooperated in an exhibition and sale held in December. Much interest was manifested by persons interested in Hospitals in the fact that Occupational Therapy could be carried on so successfully in a General Hospital of the type of the Presbyterian and without a workshop.

To Miss Mary Brooke who has again volunteered her services for three days per week, we wish to express our gratitude for her assistance.

We wish to thank Miss Reed, who through the interest of Mrs. Jacobi, donated to the Department, a quantity of cretonne and chintz.

The Occupational Therapy Department wishes to express its appreciation of the interest and cooperation of the personnel of all the other Departments of the Hospital.

Gentlemen—I have the honor to submit the following report from the Medical Service:

It is a pleasure to report progress in the solution of the several problems which confront the Medical Department. For two years the services of Medicine and Surgery have been organized on the so-called full-time basis. While certain advantages result in the arrangement, there are several objections and difficulties made evident in operating under this plan. A committee made up of members of both the Medical and Surgical Staffs, after submitting a comprehensive and detailed report on the results of the full-time experiment to the Committee on Administration, recommended that the plan in effect the past two years be abandoned and that medicine and surgery should conduct their activities under the same privileges and restriction governing all departments of the University. These recommendations were approved by the Committee on Administration and the Faculty, and forwarded to the President of the University. Should these recommendations be approved it is believed that the advantages gained in the way of research and better teaching will be retained, and certain disadvantages arising from restrictions of the past two years will be removed. For the coming year, however, this presents the problem of readjustment.

Much time and thought by all members of the staff have been given to a consideration of the building plans for the new hospital and school. The problem presented in the new medical center project is unique and has introduced for discussion and determination several important policies. Considerable progress has been made.

One of the difficult problems of the Medical Department is the proper relation between dispensary and ward services. At the suggestion of Dr. Lamb, ward teams have been organized on the first division, comprised of men working both in the dispensary and in the ward. Dr. Lamb is in charge of the group on Ward IX and your director of the one on Ward VII. By this arrangement there will be a group of men having a continual in- and out-patient service, a scheme which should eliminate to a considerable degree the broken and disconnected work which has heretofore existed between dispensary and wards. At present the plan is in the experimental stage but already the many advantages expected of it have been demonstrated.

Progress in the development of the appointment system in the Out-Patient Department has been made. Furthermore, the committee of which Dr. Lamb is chairman has been concerned in the recommendation for reorganization of the Social Service Department and it is confidently expected that the medical service to the community will be rendered more effective by changes contemplated there.

The special funds, the one from the Committee on Epilepsy and the one given by the Misses Cheney, have been continued during the past year, permitting of the extension of the work on epilepsy and constitution. An anonymous gift of \$500 has been made to the Department for the purchase of Insulin for needy children. Through a generous grant from Mr. John D. Rocke-

feller, Jr., a sum of \$15,000 was given to the Hospital for the purpose of extending the use of Insulin and teaching physicians the use of this valuable remedy for diabetes. Over six hundred doctors took the course which was organized by Dr. Harrop and conducted during the summer months.

Progress has been made in the solution of the problem of caring for diseases of metabolism, in which research is being conducted within a general ward. Mrs. Bryan, who has been in charge of the special metabolic diet kitchen, has been of great assistance in this work.

Changes in the staff during the past year have been few. Dr. George Harrop has gone to the Peking Union Medical College at Peking as Associate Professor of Medicine. Dr. Halbert Louis Dunn has joined the staff to work with Dr. Draper in the constitution clinic. Dr. Arthur L. Washburn has been appointed to the Out-Patient Service.

The research work has been carried on in the Medical Laboratories in a variety of fields, including nephritis, diabetes, epilepsy, hyperthyroidism, asthma, scarlet fever, blood and heart diseases. Especially should be mentioned Dr. Dochez's work in scarlet fever. Dr. Dochez is more and more confident that he has identified the cause of scarlet fever and is rapidly pushing work toward an effective method for treatment.

The publications from the Department during the year 1923 numbered fourteen.

The Janeway Library contains 7,640 volumes, 140 of which were added during the past year. Two new subscriptions to journals have been added, making a total of 110. While the Janeway Library is an unusually good and generously endowed Hospital Library, there are many single volumes and new additions that we are unable to get because of a lack of funds.

Of greatest service and pleasure during the past year has been the close contact and cooperation of your Board with the Medical Department. It has made possible a most rapid and desirable progress.

REPORT OF THE ROENTGEN RAY DEPARTMENT

December 31, 1923

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—During the past year 9,809 examinations were made in the Radiographic Department, in which 21,458 films were used. This is an increase of approximately 1,300 examinations and 2,400 films over 1922. The record number of patients handled in one day was raised to sixty-four. The demand for fluoroscopic examinations, of the chest and especially of the gastro-intestinal tract has increased so that it has become necessary to consider means whereby a greater amount of work can be done. Equipment of the smaller radiographic room to do the same work which now can be done only in the larger room will help solve this problem and will undoubtedly be done in the very near future. A new stereoscope has replaced the old one. It is much better illuminated and is much improved mechanically making it possible to examine films with greater ease and speed.

The position of Resident Physician to the Roentgen-Ray Department was created this year by the Board of Managers. This follows a precedent set by some of the best teaching hospitals of the country. It provides an opportunity for the training for one year for a young man who desires to acquire special knowledge of Roentgenological work. As he will live in the hospital, he will be the means of bringing the X-Ray Department into more intimate contact with the other services and hospital activities. It is very desirable that such a man should have had a previous medical or surgical internship in some good hospital. We are glad to announce that the first incumbent of this position is one of our own house officers. Dr. C. C. McCoy, who finished his internship in the medical service in October, was appointed Resident Physician to the Roentgen-Ray Department for the year 1923-1924.

The use of the Roentgen-Ray in the treatment of disease has advanced rapidly in the past few years. The development of high voltage machines has provided a means for the more efficient application of this form of energy to deep-seated malignant disease. Although the actual value of this improvement had not been determined, and although it cannot be regarded as a "cure" for malignancy, yet the evidence was sufficient to cause the Medical Board to recommend that the Presbyterian Hospital take its share in the responsibility of determining the actual place of "high voltage" X-Rays in our therapeutic armamentarium, and that a machine be purchased. This was done and the machine is now in operation. It is capable of delivering a current of 280,000 volts and 30 milliamperes. Because of the limited capacity of the tubes now available, it is actually used at 200,000 volts and 4 milliamperes. Although it is too early yet to talk about results, it seems to be an improvement over the lower voltage machines in certain types of cases.

During 1923, 2,050 treatments were given to 392 patients. This increase in the number of treatments and patients over the preceding year does not measure the increase in the amount of work done. The substitution of thin copper filters for aluminum in the treatment of relatively superficial malignancy with the lower voltage current multiplies the time of treatment by two

and a half. This technique seems especially useful in carcinoma of the breast. The "high tension" treatments also require relatively long sittings. These changes considerably increase the average time per treatment, and keep the machine running practically all day. The results, however, seem to justify the time spent.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF SURGICAL SERVICE

December 31, 1923

To the Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to present the annual report of the Surgical Service.

Fewer changes in the work of the Surgical Service and in the personnel of the Staff have occurred than in the past two years. This has facilitated the standardization of the work in the Wards and in the Operating Room. With the introduction of certain changes in the bacteriological tests of the sterile goods and the technique of the Operating Room, in which Dr. Humphries of the Bacteriological Laboratory has been most cooperative, the monthly reports during the past year have been uniform in the finding of sterile cultures in the material that is used in the carrying out of operative procedures. Every month Dr. Humphries, without notice to the Operating Room as to the time of his appearance, comes to make his tests.

For several years the need for a better organized surgical service in the Children's Ward has been apparent. With the appointment of Dr. Hanford to care for the surgical patients in this ward there came the opportunity for improving the work among the children. During the month of November, Dr. Hanford spent some time in visiting The Children's Hospital in Toronto and has made several changes since his return. During the coming year it is planned to cooperate with Pediatrics Service in making an eight months' service for the Pediatric Interne, four months of which will be medical and four months surgical.

The total number of visits to the Follow-Up Clinic during the past three years has shown a steady growth. In 1921 there were 3,347, in 1922 there were 3,774, in 1923 there were 3,909 visits by patients receiving ward treatment. The percentage of returns to the Surgical Follow-Up Clinic during the first six months of 1923 which was 85.5, is 8 per cent higher than shown by any previous record. An analysis of this period shows that of the 735 Surgical patients in the six months period 85.5 per cent came to the Hospital and were examined to determine the result of the treatment. In addition, another 8 per cent communicated with the Clinic or were reported on by relatives or physicians. No Follow-Up dates were given to 3 per cent of the patients. Definite information from 93.5 per cent of surgical patients is a record that very few hospitals, if any, have ever attained. Credit for this is very largely due to Miss Pinney who has spared no effort in bringing the Surgical Follow-Up Clinic up to its present standard.

At present as much time as possible is being spent by members of the staff in cooperating with the Hospital in the problems of the Social Service Department, the Admitting Unit and in the discussions of proposed plans for new Hospital buildings. Much more time and study will be required during the next two years in working out the problems of the new Medical Center. In this work the Surgical Staff is anxious to do its share.

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital:

Gentlemen—I beg to submit herewith the report of the Pathological Department for the year ending December 31, 1923.

The activities of the department have been carried out along the same plan as in the previous year, namely:

Weekly pathological conferences have been held for the visiting physicians and house staff, except during the summer months when the conferences were held semi-monthly. The change in the method of presentation of the material, that is, the grouping of the cases has made more forcible the characteristic clinical and pathological features. These conferences have been illustrated with lantern slides. The continued interest, and attendance at these conferences has been a source of gratification to the department.

Weekly clinical-pathological conferences for the fourth year students of the College of Physicians and Surgeons have been conducted as heretofore.

The assignment of the medical internes for work in the pathological laboratory for periods of two months has resulted in the stimulation of their interest in pathology and has accentuated the already close relationship existing between the clinical and pathological departments.

The illustration of the autopsy records with photomicrographs in conjunction with photographs of gross specimens has been continued over a sufficiently long period to make these records exceedingly valuable for teaching and reference.

The collection of lantern slides now numbers approximately 1,500. The equipment of the laboratory has been augmented by the purchase of four microscopes, and fireproof cabinets for the storage of records.

In February, 1923, Doctor Mark Stites was appointed Assistant Resident Pathologist and served in that capacity until July 1, 1923, and Doctor Frederick B. Jennings continued his duties in the department until that date also. Doctor Mark Butler was appointed Assistant Resident Pathologist for the year ending July 1, 1924. Doctor Herbert F. Wilshusen has been a volunteer assistant in the laboratory.

The department wishes to express its appreciation to Miss Ethel Mott for the untiring and skilful way in which she has performed the duties of secretary.

Attached is a table showing the number of autopsies performed during the period July 1, 1922 through December 31, 1923. In these eighteen months there were 494 deaths, and 197 autopsies were obtained. In addition, there were 3 autopsies performed on individuals who had formerly been patients in the Hospital but who died outside the institution, making a total of 200. The percentage of autopsies obtained on patients who died during this period is 39.8%.

Within a week after the autopsy these students assemble again, and the microscopic pathology is demonstrated to them.

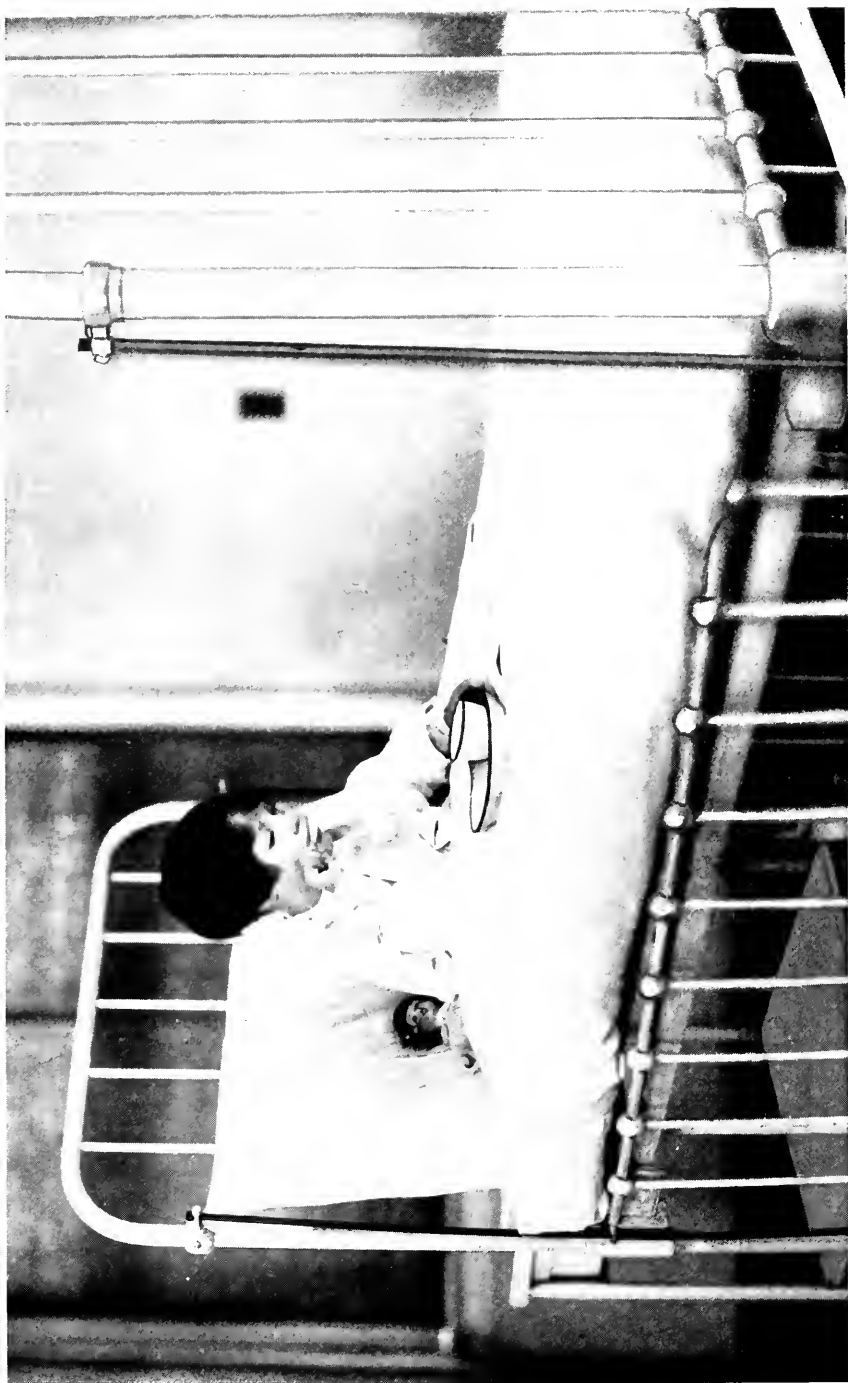

DENTAL HYGIENE AS CARRIED OUT IN THE CHILDREN'S WARD

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF DENTAL SERVICE

December 31, 1923

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—I am pleased to submit herewith the report of the activities of the Dental Service for the year of 1923.

In September new operating units of the "Ritter Tri Dent" type were installed beside each of the three dental chairs in the clinic room and met with the instant approval of the members of the staff.

These units include Ritter cord driven dental engines which are much more efficient and convenient than the old cable engines previously in use.

The increase in volume of dental X-Ray films over the figures shown for 1922 clearly indicates the growing importance of this work as a diagnostic factor in the treatment of hospital patients and seems to justify the purchase of the new dental X-Ray unit which was obtained last spring.

The Tuesday night clinic for the treatment of adult cardiac patients is functioning successfully and in collaboration with the Cardiac Clinic is accomplishing good work.

The activity of this clinic is confined to the eradication of foci infection which are of dental origin.

Last November a Tuesday night clinic for the treatment of pyorrhea cases was established and while this undertaking is still in the experimental stage the indications are that it will develop into a permanent and important feature of the Dental Service.

An important increase in the volume of work done in Oral Surgery indicates that this clinic is functioning normally and that patients needing the type of service rendered there are appreciating their opportunity.

The usual lectures on the development of the jaws and teeth and upon the importance of oral hygiene as a factor in the routine of the trained nurse were given to the pupils of the Training School for Nurses.

The appended statistics indicate the volume of work accomplished by the Dental Service during the year of 1923.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE SCHOOL OF NURSING

December 31, 1923

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to present the thirty-first annual report of the School of Nursing for the year ending December 31, 1923.

The past year has been an eventful, busy one for the School of Nursing. Nine hundred and fifty-two announcements, in response to inquiries concerning the school, were sent out during 1923. Sixty-seven students were received into the school.

The decision of the School Committee to grant the students fifteen days leave of absence on account of illness during the school term, is more than appreciated by the school.

At a recent meeting of the Board of Managers, it was decided that a standard rate of five dollars per hour, effective January 1, 1924, be fixed as recompense to all lecturers and instructors not on the School of Nursing staff.

The Preliminary Class has been moved from 47 East 66th Street to 5 East 73rd Street. This was necessary because of the cancelling of the lease on the 66th Street house on account of building. An office and study for the instructors has been established on the second floor of the Hall. This was done at the sacrifice of a room, but it seemed wise to take the preparation of lectures and correction of papers away from such a busy place as the school office.

The Assistant Director of the School of Nursing, Mabel Davies, '15, resigned July 1, 1923, on receiving the appointment of Assistant to the Superintendent of the Hospital to succeed Ruth T. Dean, '14. Dorothy S. Wood, '20, was appointed to succeed Miss Davies.

The Commencement Exercises of the Class of 1923 were held on May 10, 1923, in the Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church. The address to the graduating class was delivered by Wilfred T. Grenfell, C.M.G.

During the Great War the American Red Cross arranged with certain hospitals to give a limited experience in nursing procedures to a group of women known as Volunteer Nurses' Aides. The Presbyterian Hospital gave this experience to one hundred and fifty-four women and from this number several were recruited for service abroad with different units. Their common interest in their work and in each other encouraged the Volunteer Nurses' Aides of the Presbyterian Hospital to meet at regular intervals since the Armistice. A letter from Miss Rose Markley Riley, the secretary-treasurer, to Miss Maxwell, says that, as the efforts of keeping together seem impossible, it was decided to give up any attempt at regular meetings. On closing out their bank account, a small check representing the balance was sent to Miss Maxwell, with the request that it be used in any way she wished. It has since been applied to the Traveling Scholarship Fund. In the disbanding of the Volunteer Nurses, Aides, another group of women, called out during the emergency of the war, passes into history.

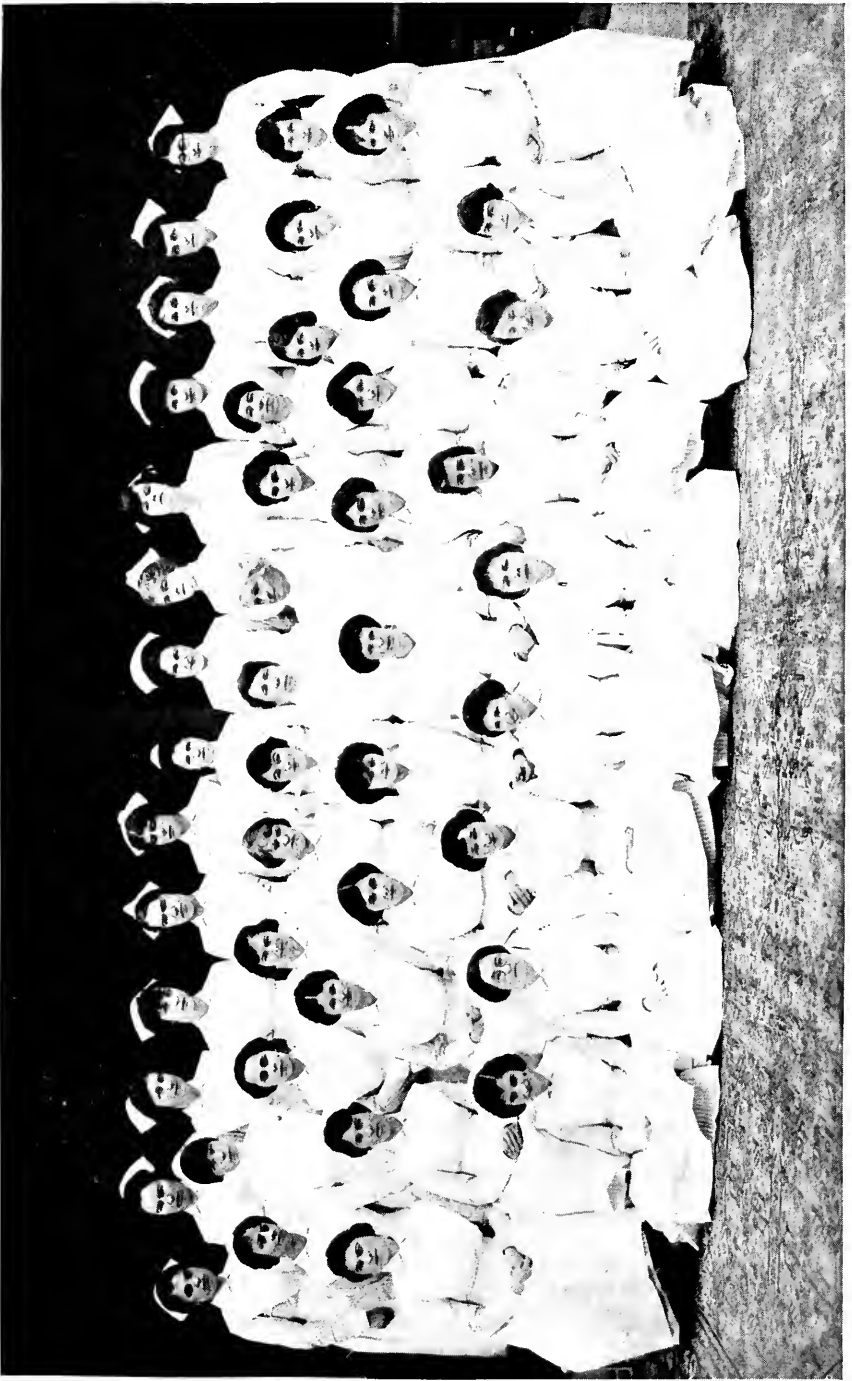

OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—The following is the report of the Out-Patient Department for the year ending December 31, 1923.

There has been much simplification of forms and procedure and unifying of function during the year. This has been conducive to a smoother and more effective routine and the promotion of good *esprit de corps*.

The total visits to all clinics for 1923 were 104,434, while those of 1922 were 96,959. There were 18,713 individuals who availed themselves of the service of our Out-Patient Department. We have therefore cared for 7,478 more visits in 1923 than during the previous year. This has been made possible through the sustained personal interest and application of our Staff, both Medical and Administrative, as we have had no increase in the number of workers.

Dr. Cleveland left us as Chief of Surgical Clinic on the first of June and we regretted to see him go. We herewith extend our welcome to Dr. Bull who has ably replaced him.

A new method of keeping statistics was adopted early in the year. The procedure was much simplified and has proven to be very flexible and accurate. The number of visits for each general service, the average daily attendance, and the visits per patient for the year are as follows:

The clerical routine which affects both the Out-Patient Department and the Emergency Ward has been better coordinated and the administrative details have been made more uniform.

On June 1, the admission fee was increased to fifty cents per visit. This has materially augmented our cash receipts and has in no way affected our attendance. A record has been made of all free cases and a more intelligent system of checking and handling fee remission installed.

As an aid to fee control and expediting of cash transactions a cash register was installed early in the year.

At the request of many of our medical men, a new Quartz Lamp for Actinotherapy, was installed and has proven of value especially in the Children's and Tubercular Service.

The pathological laboratory was changed from Room 1 to the balcony of the O. P. D. and this has given us much improved working conditions and additional teaching room.

The studies being made in cooperation with the Dispensary Development Committee have progressed very favorably. The appointment system

particularly has been carried experimentally and practically to a point where all agree that it has demonstrated its value. Followed over the period of one year and including all clinics, slightly over 75 per cent of all patients receiving appointments have kept their appointment on time, *i.e.*, within 15 minutes before or after the hour specified.

The reports of the Chiefs of Clinics are included below.

REPORT OF THE OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—The most noteworthy advance in the medical Out-Patient Department during the past year has been the starting of an in-and-out service whereby the same group of men, under one head, works both in the wards and in the Out-Patient Department, forming a continuous service. These men work in the Out-Patient Department, admit such cases as require bed treatment to the wards on their own service, follow them while in the Hospital, and after discharge, see them again in the follow-up in the Out-Patient Department. The whole group makes ward rounds on one morning each week, and the Attending Physician in charge of the group spends one afternoon a week in the Out-Patient Department to see cases in the follow-up and to act as a medical consultant. This scheme has removed the last barrier between the Out-Patient Department and the ward and is, we believe, the forerunner of a system which in a few years will be universal. Its advantages are obvious. It goes a long way towards removing the difficulty of obtaining men to work in the Out-Patient Department; it gives greater continuity of treatment to the patient; and reacts to the advantage of patients, house staff and attendings. We expect great things from the development of this project.

During the past year the Surgical Clinic has had opportunity to appreciate the benefits of the previous year's innovations—particularly the Appointment System. In fact without them the routine work could hardly have been handled with the smaller personnel.

Attention is now being directed to the Admitting Unit and its relation to the Surgical Diagnostic Clinic.

In other respects conditions prevail essentially the same as at the last report. The appointment system continues to be satisfactory and has now passed the stage of probation.

The entire personnel has continued to maintain its high standard of cheerful and efficient service.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE ALUMNAE ASSOCIATION
OF THE SCHOOL OF NURSING OF THE PRESBYTERIAN
HOSPITAL IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK

To the Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York:

Gentlemen—I have the honor of presenting to you the ninth report of the Alumnae Association of the School of Nursing of the Presbyterian Hospital which is to appear in the Annual Report of the Hospital, and covers the year ending December 31, 1923.

The most important action taken by the Association in the past year was the amendment of Article V of the By-Laws and the rescinding of a part of Article VI of the Restricted Plan for the Pension Fund. By this action, the annual membership dues are changed from ten to three dollars and the increase of seven dollars to the Pension Fund discontinued. This reduction in dues was made in response to a slight but evident falling off in membership on account of the high dues. It was not felt to be just to allow the Pension Fund to determine membership. Renewed memberships have proved the wisdom of this move, but we still face the problem of support for the Pension Fund, which must now depend upon voluntary contributions. Discussions of the "Restricted Plan" and a working basis for 1926 must be considered in 1924.

Of the ten members of the Association eligible for the pension, seven have received it this year.

Our membership enrollment to date is 575. We have lost, through death, the following loyal members of our Association:

Miss Marjorie Fernald Lewis, '08—died July, 1923.

Mrs. Harry H. Varner (Susan Chapman Peacock, '14)—died October, 1923.

Mrs. James B. Crane (Cherrie Morton French, '02)—died February, 1923.

Miss Young's appointment as Director of the School of Nursing was hailed with great rejoicing by those present at our annual meeting, as was also the recent announcement of her election as Secretary of the New York State League of Nursing Education.

In June the Association entertained the members of the New York County Registered Nurses Association, District No. 13, at their monthly meeting.

The Association has had the pleasure of coming in closer touch with the Hospital at two of the quarterly meetings through addresses from the president, Mr. Sage, and Miss Young and Dr. Geyelin. It was the strong desire expressed by many of those present that our connection with the Hospital might become closer in the coming year. We wish to respond as readily and helpfully to any request from your Board as you have responded to us in the past and I, as president of this Association, thank you for your cooperation and beg you to call upon us at any time.

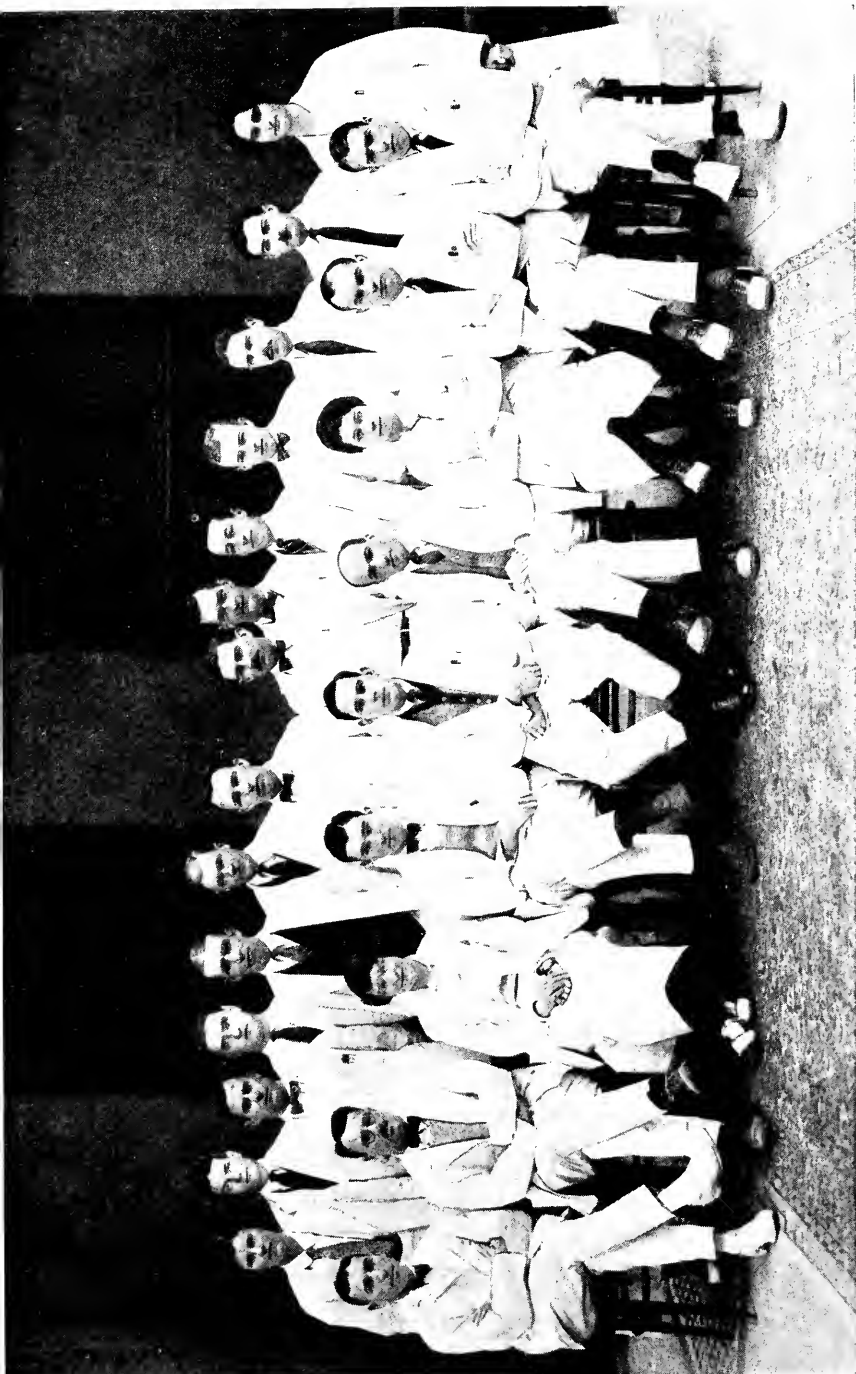

CHARTER

AN ACT

To Found a Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York

Passed February 28, 1868—Chapter 15

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. James Lenox, John Taylor Johnston, Robert L. Stuart, Morris K. Jesup, Marshall S. Bidwell, and their associates, as hereinafter named, shall constitute a body corporate, with power to establish, maintain, and conduct a Hospital in the City of New York, which shall be known and designated as "The Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York."

Section 2. The property and concerns of said Corporation shall be vested in and managed by a Board of thirty-two Managers (by act of March 28, 1868, increased to thirty-six Managers), to be constituted as provided for in the following section.

Section 3. James Brown, Marshall S. Bidwell, William A. Booth, Aaron B. Belknap, William E. Dodge, James Donaldson, John C. Green, Winthrop S. Gilman, Robert M. Hartley, Richard Irvin, Edward S. Jaffray, Thomas Jeremiah, Morris K. Jesup, John Taylor Johnson, James Lenox, David Olyphant, William Paton, Thomas C. M. Paton, Joseph Stuart, Robert L. Stuart, Thomas U. Smith, Jonathan Sturges, Otis D. Swan, Charles N. Talbot, Willard Parker, M.D., John R. Ford, Henry M. Taber, Alexander Van Rensselaer, William M. Vermilye, Washington R. Vermilye, A. R. Wetmore, and A. Robertson Walsh, thirty-two in number, shall constitute a part of the Board of Managers. To these thirty-two Managers, the Rev. William M. Paxton, D.D., as Minister of the First Presbyterian Church; the Rev. William Adams, D.D., as Minister of the Madison Square Presbyterian Church; the Rev. Thomas Dewitt, D.D., as Senior Minister of the Collegiate Church of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church, and the Rev. John N. McLeod, D.D., as Minister of the First Reformed Presbyterian Church, all in the City of New York, and their successors in office for the time being, shall, by virtue of their respective offices, be associated as members of the Board of Managers.

Section 4. As soon as practicable after the passage of this Act, the said Board shall organize, and by lot divide the thirty-two Managers into four classes of eight each, and the places of the said classes shall be vacant respectively on the second Wednesday in April, one, two three, and four years thereafter, so that eight Managers shall be elected by the said Board of Managers annually, by ballot, to hold their seats for four years.

Section 5. The Board of Managers shall have power to fill all vacancies that may occur in the said Board, to enact By-Laws, and to appoint all such agents, assistants, and attendants as may be proper to carry out the purposes of the said Corporation. Among these shall be included a Superintendent and a Chaplain or both a Superintendent and a Chaplain; but these positions shall be held only by Presbyterians.

CHARTER

Section 6. Not less than eleven Managers shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of electing Officers, making or changing By-Laws, or for holding any special meeting; but for all other purposes, and at stated meetings, seven shall be a quorum.

Section 7. The said Corporation is authorized to take by purchase, devise, or otherwise, and may hold, transfer, and convey, for the purposes of said Hospital, all the real and personal property of which it may become possessed, in so far as the same is in accordance with the general laws of this State, and not otherwise, and which said property shall be exempt from taxation, and shall be entitled to the benefit of the provisions of law relating to charitable institutions.

Section 8. This Corporation shall possess the general powers, and be subject to the provisions, restrictions and liabilities contained in the 3rd Title of the 18th Chapter of Part First of the Revised Statutes.

Section 9. This Act shall take effect immediately.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

TITLE

The name by which this Society shall be known shall be "The Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York."

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object of the Society is the establishment, support and management of an Institution for the purpose of affording medical and surgical aid and nursing to sick or disabled persons of every creed, nationality, and color. The public religious services in the Hospital shall be in conformity with the doctrine and forms of the Presbyterian or Reformed Church.

ARTICLE III

THE SOCIETY

The Society shall consist of Life Members, who shall respectively be approved by a majority of members of the Board of Managers present at a stated meeting, and who shall have been nominated at a previous stated meeting by a Standing Committee appointed for that purpose by the Board.

ARTICLE IV

ENDOWED BEDS

The Board of Managers may fix amounts which when paid shall entitle the donor to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge, subject, however, to such rules and regulations for the admission, treatment, and discharge of patients as are now, or shall be hereafter, prescribed by said Board.

Where such nomination is accorded during life, or in perpetuity, the amount paid therefor shall be kept invested in income-producing securities until the privilege may lapse by the death of the donor or otherwise.

ARTICLE V

PROPERTY

All the property of the Society shall be applied to advance the general objects of the Society, except where it has been otherwise specially directed by the donor or testator.

ARTICLE VI

GOVERNMENT

The affairs of the Society shall be under the direction of a Board of thirty-six Managers, thirty-two of whom shall be divided into four classes of eight each; and the places of the said classes shall be vacant respectively on the second Wednesday of April, at the end of one, two, three and four years thereafter, so that Eight Managers shall be elected by the said Board annually, by ballot, to hold their seats for

four years. To these thirty-two Managers, the Minister of the First Presbyterian Church, the Minister of the Madison Square Presbyterian Church, the Senior Minister of the Collegiate Church of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church, and the Minister of the First Reformed Presbyterian Church, all in the City of New York, by virtue of their respective offices, for the time being shall be added as members of the Board of Managers. The officers of the Society shall consist of a President, a Vice-President, a Treasurer, a Corresponding Secretary and a Recording Secretary, who shall be selected annually by the said Board of Managers, from their own number, and shall also be Officers of the said Board. The said Officers and Managers, together, shall form a Board, to be denominated the "Board of Managers of the Presbyterian Hospital in the City of New York," not less than eleven of whom shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of electing Officers, making or changing By-Laws, or for holding any special meeting; but seven shall be a quorum for all other purposes, and for stated meetings. The Board of Managers shall at all times be fully authorized to execute all powers of the Society, over all the estate and property of the Society. To it shall be committed the care of the funds of the Institution; authority to make By-Laws, Rules and Regulations, and to alter and amend the same; to fill vacancies in their own body, choose the Officers of the Society, appoint agents, assistants and attendants, and generally to transact the entire business of the Society.

ARTICLE VII

MEETINGS OF THE BOARD

The Board of Managers shall hold stated meetings on the second Tuesday of each month excepting the months of July, August and September, and may hold adjourned meetings when necessary. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the President, or, in case of his absence or inability to act, by the Vice-President, or on written requisition of five members of the Board of Managers; but when special meetings are called, the time and place of meeting, and the subject proposed to be considered, shall be notified to the members at least two days previous to the meeting; and no other subject shall be discussed or acted upon at such meetings.

ARTICLE VIII

ANNUAL MEETING

A meeting of the members of the Society shall be held annually on such day after the expiration of the fiscal year as the Board of Managers may appoint. It shall be the duty of the Board of Managers to make the necessary arrangements for this meeting; to present to the members a report of the proceedings of the previous years; to exhibit a statement of the funds and property of the Society; and also to give information of any matters relating to the objects of the Society which may be of interest or importance.

At the stated meeting of the Board in April eight members shall be chosen by ballot from among the members of the Society to supply the places of the class of managers whose term of service is about to expire. These eight members, together with those composing the three other classes, and the four *ex-officio* members of the Board, shall constitute the Board of Managers for the ensuing year and shall continue in office until their successors are elected. In case of failure to make such elections on the appointed day, a special meeting of the Board shall be called for that purpose.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE IX

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

Amendments to the Constitution shall be proposed in writing at a regular meeting of the Board of Managers, and may be acted on at the next regular meeting of the Board, or at a special meeting called for that purpose; and shall be adopted only on a concurrence of a majority of the members present, but the affirmative vote must not be less than eleven.

BY-LAWS

OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS

I—RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Board of Managers shall prescribe rules and regulations respecting the management of the affairs of the Hospital. Such rules and regulations shall not be inconsistent with these By-Laws, and may be amended at any meeting of the Board of Managers by a majority of those present.

II—PRESIDENT

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall appoint all special Committees, unless otherwise ordered, and shall perform such other duties as may be required by the Constitution and By-Laws. He shall also be *ex-officio*, a member of all committees.

III—VICE-PRESIDENT

In the event of a vacancy of the office of President, or during his absence or inability to act, his duties and powers shall devolve upon the Vice-President. Should he also be unable to act, a President pro-tem shall be chosen by the Board.

IV—TREASURER

The Treasurer shall be charged with the custody of all papers and documents relating to the property of the Corporation, other than such as are mentioned in By-Law V., of all moneys belonging thereto, and of the seal. He shall keep an account in the name of the Corporation with an institution approved by the Board, and shall deposit therein all moneys immediately upon receiving them. He shall cause to be kept such accounts as may be necessary to show the receipts, expenditures, and financial condition of the Institution, or as may be required by the Finance Committee. These accounts shall be open at all suitable times to the inspection of the Managers. He shall pay no moneys without proper order, as is elsewhere provided.

V—SAFE KEEPING OF SECURITIES

All bonds, stocks and other invested securities and evidences of value, shall be deposited for safe keeping with a trust company approved by the Board to be held in the name of the Hospital and subject to the joint written order of the Treasurer and a member of the Finance Committee, or, in the absence of the Treasurer, of two members of the Finance Committee, all cash collections being subject to the order of the Treasurer as elsewhere provided.

VI—SECRETARY

The Secretary shall be the Recording and Corresponding Secretary and shall keep the minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Managers, and preserve such records and papers as do not pertain to the office of Treasurer. He shall also be *ex-officio* a member of the Executive Committee and shall keep minutes of said Committee. He shall notify members of all meetings of the Board of Managers at least two days before the meeting. He shall notify members of their appointment on Committees, and generally perform such duties as usually pertain to the office.

BY-LAWS

He shall have charge of the correspondence of the Board, and shall prepare the Annual Report of the Managers and attend to its publication.

VII—COMMITTEES

At the meeting in April, after filling the vacancies about to occur in their Board, the Managers shall elect an Executive Committee of eight members, a Dispensary Committee of five members, a Training School Committee of three or more members, a House Committee of three or more members, a Finance Committee of five members, of which the Treasurer shall be one, a Committee on Nominations of five members, of which the Secretary shall be one, and an Auditing Committee of two members. The members appointed on these committees shall hold office for one year from the second Wednesday in April next ensuing, unless otherwise ordered by the Board, and shall keep minutes of their proceedings, which shall be submitted to the Board at its stated meetings. The Board shall also appoint two of its members for each month of the year, who shall serve as an Inspecting Committee. If any Manager thus appointed shall be unable to attend during the time allotted to him, it shall be his duty to procure some other Manager to attend in his stead.

VIII—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee shall consist of eight Managers chosen as provided in By-Law VII, to whom shall be added the two Managers serving as the Inspecting Committee, and the members of the Out-Patient Department, Training School and House Committees.

1. The Committee shall meet on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month and may hold special meetings when necessary, or when called by the Chairman or two members of the Committee. Three shall constitute a quorum.

2. The Executive Committee shall give orders and establish such rules and regulations as they shall deem necessary for the better carrying into effect the object of this Institution, provided such rules and regulations be not inconsistent with those established by the Board of Managers.

3. All questions relating to the admission, rejection and discharge of patients shall be decided by the Executive Committee, in conformity with the directions of the Board of Managers.

4. In case the House Physician, House Surgeon, or any of their assistants, or any other officer or employee shall neglect any of the duties prescribed to them, or refuse to comply with any reasonable request of the Executive Committee, or Superintendent, the Superintendent may suspend the offender, and he shall at once report his action to the Executive Committee.

5. The Executive Committee shall have general charge of all property within the precincts of the Hospital, and shall see that proper economy is observed in the administration of all its affairs, having due regard to the welfare of its beneficiaries. It shall audit and examine the accounts of the Superintendent; and authorize such repairs and disbursements as may from time to time be necessary, and shall draw drafts upon the Treasurer therefor; such drafts, except for the monthly pay-rolls and supplies, shall not exceed \$1,000 without authority of the Board therefor; shall be signed by the Chairman and Secretary for the time being of the Committee; and shall be a sufficient voucher for the Treasurer.

BY-LAWS

IX—OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT COMMITTEE

The Out-Patient Department Committee shall consist of five Managers. It shall have the general care and oversight of the Out-Patient Department, and shall meet on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month.

X—SCHOOL OF NURSING COMMITTEE

The School of Nursing Committee shall consist of three or more Managers, who shall have the general care and oversight of the School of Nursing.

XI—HOUSE COMMITTEE

The House Committee shall consist of three or more Managers, and shall direct and control the purchasing of all food, fuel, equipment and repair supplies, and have general supervision of the equipment, maintenance and repair of real estate and buildings.

XII—FINANCE COMMITTEE

1. The Finance Committee shall consist of five Managers—one of whom shall be the Treasurer. Three shall constitute a quorum.

2. They shall have authority in their discretion to sell bonds, stock and other invested securities and evidence of value belonging to the Society, and invest and re-invest the proceeds (together with any other funds of the Society available for investment) in such securities as they deem wise.

XIII—NOMINATING COMMITTEE

1. The Nominating Committee shall consist of five Managers, of whom the Secretary shall be one. Three shall constitute a quorum.

2. In the case of a vacancy occurring in the Board of Managers they shall recommend to the Board the name of a Life Member to fill such vacancy, and to them shall be referred the names of all persons suggested for such position or for Life Membership; but no report of the Committee shall be acted upon until the next subsequent meeting of the Board, except with unanimous consent.

3. All persons nominated for positions on the House Staff shall be referred to this Committee. The names of such as shall be favorably considered by the Committee shall be by them reported to the Board of Managers.

XIV—INSPECTING COMMITTEE

1. The Inspecting Committee shall inspect all the Hospital buildings, visit the wards, service rooms, and laboratories and shall examine as to the cleanliness and order of all parts of the Hospital and grounds.

2. They shall enter their report in a book, which book shall be laid before the Executive Committee at its meetings.

XV—AUDITING COMMITTEE

The Auditing Committee shall shortly after the close of each fiscal year examine and check the bonds, stocks, mortgages or other securities or evidences of value owned by the Hospital and shall also have the accounts of the Treasurer and Super-

intendent for the last fiscal year examined and checked by certified public accountants. The Committee shall thereafter report to the Board the result of such accounting with its recommendations.

XVI—MEDICAL BOARD AND THE MEDICAL, SURGICAL AND LABORATORY SERVICE

1. The Board of Managers shall appoint annually—

(a) A Director of the Surgical Service, a Director of the Medical Service, and a Director of the Pathological Service; these shall together constitute the Medical Board.

(b) As many Visiting Physicians and Surgeons, and Associate Visiting Physicians and Surgeons, as the service of the Hospital may require, a Visiting Physician to the Roentgen Ray Department, a Visiting Bacteriologist, a Visiting Chemist, an Out-Patient Department Staff, and such other department chiefs and assistants as the various services of the Hospital may require.

(c) As many Assistant Physicians and Surgeons and special Consulting Physicians and Surgeons as the service of the Hospital may require.

(d) A House Staff, consisting of as many members as the service of the Hospital may require, and at such times and for such terms of service as shall seem best to meet the needs of the Hospital.

(e) A Register of the Out-Patient Department.

2. These appointments shall be made at some time prior to July 1st in each year. The appointees unless a different term be fixed by the Board shall hold office for one year and thereafter until further action of the Board.

XVII—EXECUTIVE STAFF

The Board of Managers shall appoint a Superintendent and such Assistants as the Board may deem necessary for the service of the Hospital, whose services shall continue during the pleasure of the Board.

The Board of Managers shall appoint a Director of the School of Nursing and such Assistants as may be necessary for such service, and such appointees shall hold office during the pleasure of the Board.

XVIII—ENDOWED BEDS

1. A gift of \$10,000 shall entitle the donor and his successors to nominate, from time to time, an adult patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge.

2. A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor to a like privilege for the children's ward.

3. A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle the donor, during life, to nominate from time to time, a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge. If the donor be a corporation or association the privilege to nominate shall expire in fifteen years unless the privilege be extended by the Board of Managers, but shall in no event continue for a greater period than twenty-five years.

4. Any person or corporation being the donor of a \$5,000 bed may increase their donation to \$10,000, in which case they shall become henceforth entitled to the privilege that attaches to an original donation of that amount.

BY-LAWS

5. All endowed bed privileges are subject to the Rules and Regulations governing the admission, treatment and discharge of patients.

6. Contributions to the endowment fund of free beds, as above provided for, may be made by instalments, when the donor shall, in writing, so notify the Treasurer at the time of each payment. So long as the instalments so paid in shall not equal the sums required under the preceding sections, the amount received shall constitute a portion of the general endowment fund, the income of which shall be used for the payment of the current expenses of the Hospital, and no privileges shall accrue to the donor.

7. The Board of Managers shall have power in their discretion to make, under special and exceptional circumstances, such other arrangements (temporary or permanent) as to endowed beds as they may deem best calculated to promote the objects for which the Hospital was established and is now being maintained.

8. Certificates of the right to nominate patients to use and occupy beds free of charge shall be issued in such form as the Board of Managers may prescribe, and shall be signed by the President or Vice-President and Treasurer, who shall also affix the seal of the Corporation.

XIX—APPROPRIATIONS OF MONEY

Except in the cases provided for in Section 5 of By-Law VIII, and Section 2 of By-Law XII, all appropriations of money shall be made by resolution of the Board of Managers. Orders for the amounts thus appropriated shall be drawn on the Treasurer by the President or presiding officer of the meeting, and be countersigned by the Secretary, or Secretary *pro tem.*, and when properly endorsed shall be sufficient voucher for the Treasurer.

XX—COMPLAINTS, SUSPENSIONS OR DISCHARGES

If any officer, physician or surgeon shall become unfit to execute his office, or shall conduct himself contrary to any of the Rules of the Hospital, or refuse or neglect to execute the same, the Executive Committee, or any member of the Board of Managers may submit against him a complaint in writing, at a meeting duly called, and thereupon a notice of the said complaint shall be given to the person complained of, and a time shall be appointed (not less than six days after service of said notice) for the person complained of to make his defense before the Board of Managers; and the Board, having examined into the truth of the complaint, and heard the defense of the party accused, if any shall be made, may, with the concurrence and approbation of a majority of the Managers present, suspend or discharge the officer, physician, or surgeon complained of.

XXI—ORDER OF BUSINESS

The order of business shall be as follows:

1. The meeting shall be opened with prayer.
2. The roll shall be called, and the attending members noted.
3. The minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read, corrected if necessary, and approved.

BY-LAWS

4. Treasurer's Reports.
5. Reports of the Committee shall be called for, and action taken thereon.
6. Communications to the Board shall be received and considered.
7. Unfinished business.
8. New business.

XXII—ALTERATIONS OR ADDITIONS

Any amendment to the By-Laws shall be proposed in writing at a regular meeting of the Board of Managers, and may be acted on at the next regular meeting of the Board, or at a special meeting called for that purpose. It shall be adopted only on an affirmative vote of a majority of those present. A copy of any proposed amendment shall be mailed to each member of the Board at least three days prior to the next meeting.

RULES AS TO THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS

1. All ward patients are required to pay \$3.00 per day for board or such smaller sums as may be determined by the circumstances of the case, of which the Managers shall be the sole judges. Patients from New York City (Manhattan and Bronx), who are unable to pay are admitted free. Patients from out of town will not usually be admitted free but this rule shall not apply to patients recommended for admission by members of the Board of Managers or by any of the Directors of the Service.

2. Patients suffering from severe accident or serious illness will be admitted at any hour of the day or night. Other patients should apply to the Out-Patient Department for treatment or admission to the Hospital.

3. Patients may be admitted by the Superintendent on the recommendation of any Manager, after examination as to suitability by a member of the House Staff or on the recommendation of any Physician or Surgeon of the Hospital.

4. No patient suffering from any readily communicable disease shall be admitted, nor any whose case does not require the special benefits of the Hospital; nor shall any patient be admitted whose case is judged to be incurable, unless there be urgent symptoms which, in the opinion of the Attending Physician or Surgeon, are capable of being relieved. There shall be no uterine nor vaginal examination made except in the presence of a nurse.

5. No patient suffering from erysipelas shall be admitted to either the Medical or Surgical Division of the Hospital.

6. There shall be recorded in the office daily the number of vacant beds.

7. Application for the admission of patients living out of the city must be accompanied by a certificate of some reputable physician, stating the nature and probable duration of the disease.

RULES FOR VISITORS

1. Visitors are allowed in the Wards for Adults, Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday, from 1 to 2 P. M.; Tuesday and Friday from 6 to 8 P. M.; and Sunday from 1 to 3 P. M. Visitors may not come at any other time, unless under exceptional circumstances.

2. *No more than two Visitors will be admitted to see any Patient on one Day.*

3. Only fruit, jelly and ice cream may be brought for patients. Such packages must be left with the door clerk, and, if approved by the Physician, will be sent to the Patients.

4. In the Children's Ward, parents only are allowed. No other relatives, children or friends are permitted in this Ward. Parents are allowed on Tuesday and Friday evenings from 6 to 7 P. M., Sunday from 2 to 3 P. M., and may remain one half hour only. No packages of any kind may be carried to the Children's Ward.

5. Visitors must observe perfect order and propriety while in the Hospital; must confine their visits to their immediate friends; must not stop or loiter in the halls, offices, or on the stairways, and must leave the building promptly at the end of visiting hours.

Any violations of these rules may subject the offender to exclusion from the premises.

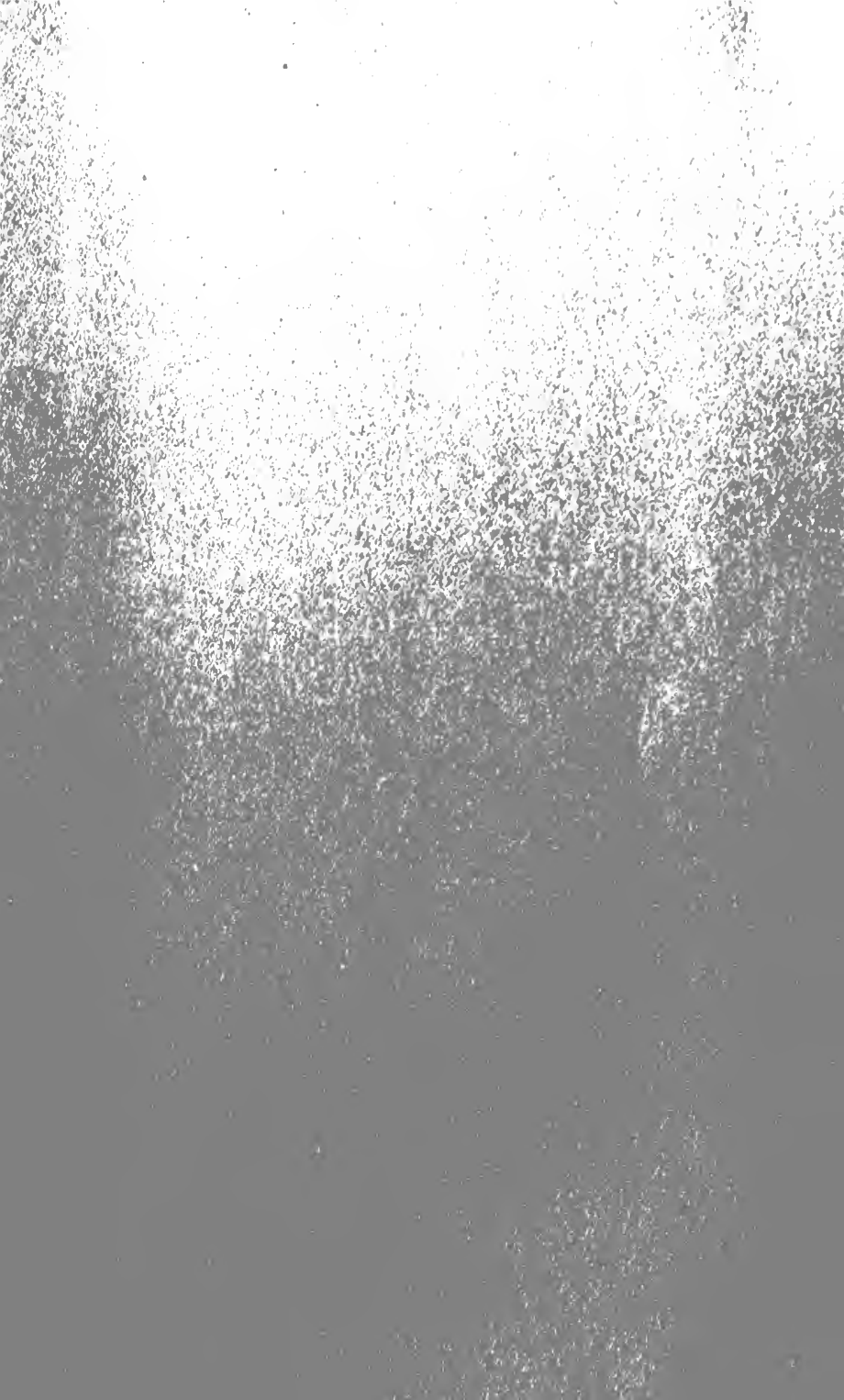
