STATEMENT OF THE PLAN, OBJECT, AND EFFECTS OF THE WESLEYAN MISSIONS IN THE WEST INDIES.

REPORTS OF THE SOCIETY for 1818 to 1823, inclusive.

Every person who subscribes to the Wesleyan Missionary Society *one penny or upwards weekly*, is entitled to one of the Quarterly Papers; and all who collect for the Society to the amount of *one shilling or more weekly* are entitled to the Monthly Missionary Notices and the Annual Report.

"All persons who collect to the amount of one shilling and upwards weekly, or five shillings and upwards monthly, for this Institution, or for any of its Auxiliaries, Branches, or Associations, shall be entitled to receive a copy of each Annual Report and of each Number of the *Missionary Notices*."

Persons who are not Collectors, and who wish to possess the *Monthly Notices*, may obtain them at 2*d.* each Number.

PROCEEDINGS

OF

The Annual Meeting of the Society,

ON MONDAY, MAY 5th, 1823,

IN THE NEW CHAPEL, CITY-ROAD, LONDON;

JOSEPH BUTTERWORTH, ESQ., M.P., IN THE CHAIR.

THE Report of the General Committee having been read, the following Resolutions were proposed, and unanimously adopted:—

Moved by the REV. JOSEPH HUGHES, A.M. one of the Secretaries of the British and Foreign Bible Society; seconded by JOHN BACON, ESQ. of London:

- I. That the Report now read be adopted, and printed under the direction of the Committee.

Moved by the RIGHT HON. SIR GEORGE HENRY ROSE, M.P.; seconded by WILLIAM WILBERFORCE, ESQ. M.P.:

- II. That this Meeting solemnly recognises afresh the claims which the unenlightened millions of the heathen world have upon the piety and benevolence of the whole Christian Church; and is also deeply sensible of the necessity and importance of that portion of the Missionary labours of this Society, which is devoted to the moral improvement of the British Colonies, and especially of the Slave Population of the West Indies.

Moved by JAMES STEPHEN, ESQ., Master in Chancery; seconded by WILLIAM WILKINS, ESQ., M.P.:

- III. That this Meeting, encouraged by the effects produced wherever Christianity has been faithfully preached, and its Institutions of piety and mercy established; and deeply affected with the moral wretchedness of a great part of mankind, offers its grateful acknowledgments to Almighty God, for the success which he has been pleased, already to vouchsafe to the exertions of the Society, and solemnly pledges itself to renew its exertions in providing the means of a more extensive ministration of the Gospel of CHRIST to the religious wants of the human race.

Moved by the REV. ROBERT NEWTON, of Manchester; seconded by the REV. JOHN ARUNDEL, one of the Secretaries of the London Missionary Society:

- IV. That this Meeting solemnly recognizing that great principle of our holy religion, that the success of all human endeavours in extending the kingdom of CHRIST in the world depends wholly on the Divine blessing, and considering particularly the great moral difficulties which are opposed, in all pagan countries, to the progress of the truth, earnestly recommends to all the Members and Friends of this Society, and of its Auxiliary and Branch So-

cieties, in every part of the world, to be more than ever abundant in supplications for the special blessing of Heaven, and the promised outpouring of the HOLY SPIRIT on Missionaries themselves, and on the heathen world in which they labour.

Moved by ROBERT H. MARTEN, ESQ., *of London*; *seconded by the* REV. T. H. SQUANCE, *late Missionary in India*:

V. That the thanks of this Meeting be given to the AUXILIARY and Branch Societies throughout the kingdom; to the Auxiliary Societies which have been recently established on several Foreign Stations; to those LADIES, who in different places, have employed their zeal and influence to increase the Funds of the Institution; to the JUVENILE SOCIETIES, in which the feeling and energy of our youth are consecrated to this sacred service; and to the Subscribers and other friends to the Wesleyan Missionary Fund, both at home and abroad; by whose liberality the means of supplying the moral wants of our fellow-men have been greatly augmented.

Moved by the REV. ADAM CLARKE, LL.D.; *seconded by* LANCELOT HASLOPE, ESQ., *of London*:

VI. That the thanks of this Meeting be given to JOSEPH BUTTERWORTH, ESQ., M.P., and the REV. GEORGE MORLEY, the General Treasurers, for their diligent attention to the duties of their office during the past year; and that the Society very cordially requests a continuance of their services.

Moved by BENJAMIN SHAW, ESQ., *of London*; *seconded by the* REV. ROBT. WOOD, *of Liverpool*:

VII. That the thanks of this Meeting be given to the Members of the COMMITTEE, for their attention to the affairs of the Society during the past year.

Moved by the REV. RICHARD REECE, *of Bath*; *seconded by* MR. G. OSBORN, *of Rochester*:

VIII. That the thanks of this Meeting be given to the REV. JABEZ BUNTING, the REV. JOSEPH TAYLOR, and the REV. RICHARD WATSON, the General Secretaries, for their services during the year; and to those MINISTERS, who in their several Circuits and elsewhere, have zealously advocated and promoted the plans of the Society.

Moved by W. MARRIOTT, ESQ., *of London*; *seconded by* JOHN J. BUTTRESS, ESQ., *of ditto*.

IX. That the thanks of the Meeting are particularly due to JOSEPH BUTTERWORTH, ESQ. M.P., for his attention to the business of the day.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

WESLEYAN-METHODIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

I. THIS Institution shall be designated THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

II. The object of this Society is to excite and combine, on a plan more systematic and efficient than has heretofore been accomplished, the exertions of the Societies and Congregations of the Wesleyan-Methodists (and of others, who are friends to the conversion of the Heathen World, and to the preaching of the Gospel generally, in Foreign Lands,) in the support and enlargement of the Foreign Missions, which were first established by the REV. JOHN WESLEY, A.M., the REV. THOMAS COKE, LL.D., and others; and which are now, or shall be from year to year, carried on under the sanction and direction of the Conference of the People called Methodists.

III. Every person subscribing annually the sum of One Guinea, and upwards, and every benefactor presenting a donation of Ten Pounds, and upwards, shall be deemed a Member of this Society, and entitled, as such, to a copy of the General Annual Report.

IV. All Methodist Missionary Societies which have already been formed, and those which it is intended to form as soon as it shall be found practicable, for the several Districts in this Kingdom into which the Methodist Connexion is divided, shall be entitled, "Methodist Missionary Auxiliary Societies," for the Districts in which they have been, or may be formed.

All Methodist Missionary Societies already formed, or hereafter to be formed, in the particular *Circuits* of any District, shall be entitled, "Methodist Missionary Branch Societies" for the *Circuit*, or

(where there are, or shall be, more than one such Society in the same Circuit,) for the *City, Town, or Village*, in which they are, or shall be, established.—And the formation of *Ladies' Branch Associations*, and of *Juvenile Branch Societies*, in connexion with the Auxiliary Societies of the several Districts, is also earnestly recommended, wherever separate institutions of that nature are likely to be advantageous.

V. The Monies raised in any Circuit for the Methodist Missions, by Branch Societies, or other Local Associations, and all other Monies, in whatsoever way collected, for the same object, shall be regularly paid, once in every quarter or oftener, into the hands of the Treasurer of the Auxiliary Society for the District in which the said Circuit is situated, with the deduction only of such sum as may have been disbursed for the incidental and local expenses of the Branch Society.—And the Treasurer of every District Auxiliary Society shall remit to the Treasurer or Treasurers of the General Society in London, once in every quarter, or oftener, all sums so received by him from the various Circuits in his District, deducting only the necessary incidental expenses incurred by the Auxiliary Society.

VI. The Secretaries of every Branch Society, or other Local Association, shall forward annually to the Secretaries of the Auxiliary Society for their District, an Alphabetical List of all the Benefactors and Subscribers during the preceding twelve months, with an account of their respective contributions: stating at the same time what portion of the sums so received has been detained for local expenses, and what portion has been paid

in to the Treasurer for the District:— and the Secretaries of every District Auxiliary Society shall also forward annually to the Secretaries of the General Society in London, a similar List of the Benefactors and Subscribers in all the Circuits of their District, and an abstract of the accounts of the Auxiliary Society, showing its gross receipts, its local payments, and its remittances to the General Treasurers.

VII. All Benefactors of Ten Pounds, and upwards, and all Subscribers of one Guinea, and upwards, annually, to any of the Auxiliary or Branch Societies, or other Local Associations, in connexion with this Institution, shall be deemed, in right of such Benefaction or Subscription, Members of the General Society.

VIII. All persons who collect to the amount of one Shilling, and upwards, weekly, or Five Shillings, and upwards, monthly, for this Institution, or for any of its Auxiliaries, Branches, or Associations, shall also be Members of the General Society, and entitled to receive a copy of each Annual Report, and of each number of the Methodist Missionary Notices.

IX. An Annual Public Meeting of the Members and Friends of this Society, connected with such Religious Services as may be deemed expedient, shall be held in London, on the first Monday in May, unless that day shall fall on the 6th or 7th of May, in which case the Meeting shall be held for that year on the 29th or 30th of April.

X. A General Committee shall be appointed by the Conference, to whom shall be intrusted (in the intervals of the Annual Assemblies of that Body,) the superintendence of the Collection and Disbursement of all Monies raised for the Foreign Missions which are now, or may hereafter, be carried on under its sanction, and by the Preachers in connexion with it, and also the *General Management* of those Missions, according to the Rules hereinafter provided. This Committee shall consist of the President and Secretary of the Conference for the time being, and of forty-eight other Members ;

at least one-third of whom (eight Travelling Preachers, and eight other Members of the Methodist Society,) shall be selected from the Country Circuits: the rest shall be resident in or near London, where meetings of the Committee shall be held once a month or oftener, for the transaction of business. Those of the Methodist Ministers who are Annual Subscribers to the Missions of one Guinea, and one Treasurer, Secretary, or other principal Member from every Auxiliary District Society, who may be in London occasionally, shall be entitled to meet and vote with the Committee.

XI. The London Members of the General Committee shall consist of Sixteen of the Methodist Ministers stationed for the time being in or near London, and of Sixteen Gentlemen, Members of the Methodist Society, not Travelling Preachers. Four out of the last-mentioned Sixteen shall go out annually by rotation. This rotation, during the first three years, shall be effected by ballot of the Committee, after which it will proceed in regular course. Four of the Country Members (two Preachers, and two others,) shall also be changed annually.

XII. One or more General Treasurers, who shall be entitled to sit and vote with the Committee, during the year of their continuance in office, shall be annually appointed.

XIII. Three of the Methodist Ministers, stationed in or near London, shall be appointed to conduct the Official Correspondence of the Missions, and to perform the other duties of *Secretaries*. One of the Secretaries shall always reside, during the period of his remaining in that office, at the Wesleyan Mission-House, and be expected to devote himself, on the week-days in general, to the service of the Missions exclusively; being subject, however, to all the General Rules of the Connexion, respecting a regular change of station.

XIV. As all the Missionaries supported by the Funds of this Society are to be Preachers in connexion with, and under the direction of the Methodist Conference, and have generally a claim to be

received as such into the Connexion at home, on their return from Foreign Stations, the Selection of Missionaries shall be made in the following way: *viz.*

1. Every Candidate must, in the first instance, be recommended by the Superintendent of the Circuit in which he resides; be approved by the Quarterly Meeting of that Circuit; and be examined and approved also, either by the Annual District Meeting, or, at least, by three other Superintendents in the neighbourhood.

2. The list of Candidates for Missionary services, who shall be thus recommended by their several Superintendents, Quarterly Meetings, and District Meetings, &c., shall be annually laid before the Conference; and such a number of those who are deemed most eligible, as are likely to be wanted in the course of the ensuing twelve months, shall be sent for to the Conference, and examined by a Special Committee, in reference to their Missionary views and qualifications. In cases where it may be found inexpedient for them to attend the Conference, they shall be examined by as many of the Preachers of the London District as can conveniently assemble for that purpose.

3. Those Candidates who shall be approved by the Special Committee at the Conference, or by the Preachers of the London District as before mentioned, shall be entered on the List of Received Missionaries, and be subject to the call of the General Committee for such stations as may need supply or reinforcement.

4. When Preachers, already engaged as such in the Connexion at Home, offer themselves for Foreign service, they shall be personally examined in reference to that subject, by a special Committee at the Conference; or, if that be impracticable, by as many of the Preachers of the London District as can conveniently assemble for the purpose; and shall, if approved, be also placed on the list of Received Missionaries.

5. If it shall at any time appear, to a majority of the General Committee in London, that there are reasons why any

Preacher called out from the said List of Received Missionaries, and proposed for a Foreign Station, should not proceed upon that service, they shall have a right to suspend his appointment as a Missionary, until the ensuing Conference shall especially consider and determine on his case.

6. If in the intervals of the Annual Meetings of the Conference, the List of Received Missionaries shall be exhausted, and more Missionaries shall be urgently wanted,—or, if an immediate supply shall be needed for some Station of peculiar difficulty, or requiring peculiar qualifications,—the General Committee shall be at liberty to employ such persons as they deem suitable. Provided always, That such persons shall have been previously recommended by their respective Superintendents, by the Quarterly Meetings of the Circuits in which they reside, and either by the District Meetings, or by three other neighbouring Superintendents,—and also previously examined and approved by as many of the Preachers of the London District as can conveniently assemble, who shall be considered on such occasions, as exercising, on behalf of the Conference, the same functions which would, in ordinary cases, belong to the Special Committee appointed during the sittings of the Conference, according to the 2d and 4th Articles of this Rule: Provided also, That this right, of the Committee to employ Missionaries not entered on the Annual List, shall be exercised only in case of pressing necessity, and not without the consent of the President of the Conference for the time being.

XV. The Plan for stationing the Missionaries supported by this Society, shall be annually drawn up by the Secretaries, laid before the General Committee in London, and, if approved by them, recommended to the Conference.

XVI. The Trial of Missionaries, who may at any time be accused of misconduct, or of having deviated from the Doctrines and discipline of the Connexion, shall in all ordinary cases be left with the Foreign District Meetings to

which such Missionaries may at the time belong, according to the General Rules and Usages of the Methodist Conference. But the Conference shall have, as heretofore, the right of recalling any Missionary, whether put on his trial by a Foreign District Meeting or not, whenever there shall appear to them to be reason for such recal. And, in the intervals of the sittings of the Conference, the General Committee in London shall possess a similar power of recal, and of putting any Missionary, so recalled by them, upon his trial before the ensuing Conference; or, in case of necessity for immediate decision, before the Preachers of the London District.

XVII. For the satisfaction of the numerous Country Friends of this Society, on whose continued co-operation so much depends, and many of whom are in the habit attending the Annual Meetings of the Conference, it is agreed, that a Special Meeting of the General Committee shall be held, once a year, at the place where the Conference is held, at nine o'clock in the morning of the Friday preceding the last Monday in July. To this Meeting the Conference shall from year to year, invite Nine Preachers, and Nine other Members of the Methodist Society, resident in the neighbourhood, who are not Travelling Preachers, together with the Treasurers and Secretaries of the different Auxiliary and Branch Societies in the vicinity, and such other leading Country Friends of the Methodist Missions as can conveniently attend. The persons thus assembled, in conjunction with those regular Members of the General Committee who can be present, shall review the Minutes of the Financial Business transacted during the preceding year, and

examine the General Accounts of the State and Expenditure of every Mission. Any suggestions for the improvement or extension of the Missionary Concerns of the Connexion, which this Special Meeting may deem it expedient to recommend, shall be minuted by the Secretaries, and promptly considered by the Conference, or at the subsequent regular Meetings of the General Committee in London.

XVIII. It is earnestly recommended to the Members of this Society, and of the Auxiliary Societies, and other Local Associations, in connexion with it, to consider it as an indispensable part of their daily Christian duty, to pray to Almighty God for a blessing upon its desigus, and upon those of all similar Societies of other denominations, engaged in the propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ; under the full conviction, that unless He "prevent us in all our doings with His most gracious favour, and further us with His continual help;" we cannot reasonably hope for a succession of persons of proper spirit and qualifications for the office of Missionaries, nor expect their labours to be crowned with the desired success. And it is further hoped that, with the same view, all the Members and Friends of this Society will sanction, in their several neighbourhoods, by their presence and influence, the Monthly Missionary Prayer-Meetings, which should be held in every Chapel in the Methodist Connexion, according to the Recommendation of the Conference, published in their Minutes for 1815; at which Meetings Extracts from the Missionary Notices, containing recent intelligence from the Foreign Stations, may be read, and united supplications offered up for the salvation of the World.

INSTRUCTIONS TO MISSIONARIES.

The following is an Extract from the Standing Instructions of the Committee to all who are sent out as Missionaries, relative to their conduct on Foreign Stations:—

“ V. WE cannot omit, without neglecting our duty, to warn you against meddling with political parties, or secular disputes. You are teachers of Religion; and that alone should be kept in view. It is, however, a part of your duty as Ministers, to enforce, by precept and example, a cheerful obedience to lawful authority. You know that the venerable WESLEY was always distinguished by his love to his country, by his conscientious loyalty, and by his attachment to that illustrious family which has so long filled the throne of Great Britain. You know that your Brethren at home are actuated by the same principles, and walk by the same rule; and we have confidence in you that you will preserve the same character of religious regard to good order and submission ‘to the powers that be’—in which we glory. Our motto is, ‘Fear God, and honour the King;’ and we recollect who hath said, ‘Put them in mind to be subject to principalities and powers, to obey magistrates, to be ready to every good work.’

“ VI. You will, on a foreign station, find yourselves in circumstances very different from those in which you are at home, with regard to those who are in authority under our gracious Sovereign. It is probable you will frequently come under their immediate notice and observation. We are, however, persuaded, that while you demean yourselves as you ought, you will be generally favoured with their protection. On your arrival at your stations, you will be instructed what steps to take in order to obtain the protection of the local governments: and we trust that your subsequent good behaviour towards governors, and *all* who are in authority, will be such as shall secure to you the enjoyment of liberty to instruct and promote the salvation of those to whom you are sent.

“ VII. Those of you who are appointed to the West-India Colonies, being placed in stations of considerable delicacy, and which require, from the state of society there, a peculiar circumspection and prudence on the one hand, and of zeal, diligence, and patient perseverance, on the other; you are required to attend to the following directions, as specially applicable to your mission there:—

“ 1. Your particular designation is to endeavour the religious instruction and conversion of the ignorant, pagan, and neglected black and coloured population of the island, or station, to which you may be appointed; and of all others who may be willing to hear you.

“ 2. Where Societies are already formed, you are required to watch over them with the fidelity of those who must give up their account to Him who hath purchased them with his blood, and in whose Providence they are placed under your care. Your labours must be constantly directed to improve them in the knowledge of Christianity, and to enforce upon them the experience and practice of its doctrines and duties, without intermingling doubtful controversies in your administrations, being mainly anxious, that those over whom you have pastoral care, should clearly understand the principal doctrines of the Scriptures, feel their renovating influence upon their hearts, and

become 'holy in all manner of conversation and godliness.' And in order to this, we recommend that your sermons should consist chiefly of clear expositions of the most important truths of Holy Writ, enforced with affection and fervour on the consciences and conduct of them that hear you; that you frequently and familiarly explain portions of the Scriptures; and that, as extensively as you possibly can, you introduce the method of teaching children, and the less instructed of the adult slaves and others, by the excellent catechisms with which you are furnished.

"3. It is enforced upon you, that you continue no person a member of your Societies, whose 'conversation is not as becometh the Gospel of CHRIST.' That any member of Society who may relapse into his former habits, and become a polygamist, an adulterer, or an unclean person; who shall be idle and disorderly; disobedient to his owner (if a slave;) who shall steal, or be in any other way immoral or irreligious; shall be put away, after due admonition, and proper attempts to reclaim him from the 'error of his way.'

"4. Before you receive any person into Society, you shall be satisfied of his desire to become acquainted with the religion of Christ, and to obey it; and if he has not previously been under Christian instruction, nor baptized, you are, before his admission as a member, diligently to teach him the Christian faith, and the obligations which he takes upon himself by baptism; so as to be assured of his having obtained such knowledge of the principles of religion, and such belief of them as to warrant you to administer to him that ordinance. Beside this, no person is to be admitted into Society, without being placed first on trial, for such time as shall be sufficient to prove whether his conduct has been reformed, and that he has wholly renounced all those vices to which he may have been before addicted.

"5. You are to consider the children of the negroes and coloured people of your Societies and Congregations as a part of your charge; and it is recommended to you, wherever it is practicable and prudent, to establish Sunday or other Schools for their instruction. It is to be considered by you as a very important part of your duty as a Missionary, to catechise them as often as you conveniently can, at stated periods; and to give your utmost aid to their being brought up in Christian knowledge, and in industrious and moral habits.

"6. As in the Colonies in which you are called to labour, a great proportion of the inhabitants are in a state of slavery, the Committee most strongly call to your recollection, what was so fully stated to you when you were accepted as a Missionary to the West Indies, that your only business is to promote the moral and religious improvement of the slaves to whom you may have access, without in the least degree, in public or private, interfering with their civil condition. On all persons in the state of slaves, you are diligently and explicitly to enforce the same exhortations which the Apostles of our Lord administered to the slaves of ancient nations, when by their ministry they embraced Christianity: Eph. vi. 5—8, 'Servants, be obedient to them that are your masters according to the flesh, with fear and trembling, in singleness of your heart, as unto Christ; not with eye-service, as men-pleasers; but as the servants of Christ, doing the will of God from the heart; with good will doing service, as to the Lord, and not to men: knowing that whatsoever good thing any man doeth, the same shall he receive of the Lord, whether he be bond or free.' Col. iii. 22—25, 'Servants obey in all things your masters according to the flesh: not with eye-service, as men-pleasers, but in singleness of heart, fearing God: and whatsoever ye do, do it heartily as to the Lord, and not unto men: knowing, that of the Lord ye shall receive the reward of the inheritance; for ye serve the LORD CHRIST. But he that

doeth wrong shall receive for the wrong which he hath done: and there is no respect of persons.'

" 7. You are directed to avail yourselves of every opportunity to extend your labours among the slaves of the islands where you may be stationed; but you are in no case to visit the slaves of any plantation without the permission of the owner or manager; nor are the times which you may appoint for their religious services to interfere with their owners' employ; nor are you to suffer any protracted meetings in the evening, not even at negro burials, on any account whatever. In all these cases you are to meet even unreasonable prejudices, and attempt to disarm suspicions, however groundless, so far as you can do it consistently with your duties as faithful and laborious Ministers of the Gospel.

" 8. As many of the negroes live in a state of polygamy, or in a promiscuous intercourse of the sexes, your particular exertions are to be directed to the discountenancing and correcting these vices, by pointing out their evil, both in public and in private, and by maintaining the strictest discipline in the Societies. No man, living in a state of polygamy, is to be admitted a member, or even on trial, who will not consent to live with one woman as his wife, to whom you shall join him in matrimony, or ascertain that this rite has been performed by some other minister; and the same rule is to be applied, in the same manner, to a woman proposing to become a member of Society. No female, living in a state of concubinage with any person, is to be admitted into Society so long as she continues in that sin.

" 9. The Committee caution you against engaging in any of the civil disputes or local politics of the Colony to which you may be appointed, either verbally, or by correspondence with any person at home, or in the Colonies. The whole period of your temporary residence in the West Indies is to be filled up with the proper work of your mission. You are not to become parties in any civil quarrel; but are to 'please all men for good to edification;' intent upon the solemn work of your office, and upon that eternal state, in the views of which the Committee trust you will ever think and act.

" 10. In cases of opposition to your ministry, which may arise on the part of individuals, or of any of the colonial legislatures, a meek and patient spirit and conduct are recommended to you. You will in particular guard against all angry and resentful speeches, and in no case attempt to inflame your Societies and hearers with resentment against your persecutors or opposers. Your business, in such cases, after every prudent means of obtaining relief has failed in your own hands, is with the Committee at home; who will immediately take such steps as may secure to you that protection, from a mild and tolerant Government, which they hope your peaceable and pious conduct, your labours and successes, will ever merit for you.

" 11. The instructions under this and under the former heads, (V.—VII.) are to be read over annually, at the meeting of every District Committee, by the Chairman; who is to inquire whether they have been observed on the part of the Brethren; and the answer shall be reported in the District Minutes regularly, and with them transmitted to the Committee in London. Every Superintendent is not only charged with the observance of them himself, but is responsible, as far as may be, for their observance by the Brethren under his direction, or for an immediate report to the District, or to the Managing Committee in London, in any case in which they may have been violated.

" N. B. The Directions to the West India Missionaries are also to be considered as strictly obligatory on all others, as far as they are applicable to the circumstances of their respective stations.

" VIII. It is *peremptorily required* of every Missionary in our Connexion

to keep a Journal, and to send home frequently such copious abstracts of it as may give a full and particular account of his labours, success, and prospects. He is also required to give such details of a religious kind as may be generally interesting to the friends of missions at home; particularly accounts of conversions. Only we recommend to you not to allow yourselves, under the influence of religious joy, to give any *high colouring* of facts: but always write such accounts as you would not dislike to see return in print to the place where the facts reported may have occurred.

“IX. It is a positive rule amongst the Wesleyan Methodists, that no Travelling Preacher shall ‘follow a trade.’ You are to consider this rule as binding upon you, and all foreign Missionaries in our Connexion. We wish you to be at the remotest distance from all temptations to a secular or mercenary temper. ‘No man that warreth entangleth himself with the affairs of this life, that he may please him who hath called him to be a soldier.’ Independently of the moral and religious considerations which enforce this principle, we here take occasion to remind you, that all your time and energies should be the more sacredly devoted to the duties of your mission, because the Committee feel themselves fully pledged to pay an affectionate attention to all your wants, and to afford them every reasonable and necessary supply. And this pledge, they doubt not, the generosity of the friends of Missions will, from time to time, enable them to redeem, so long as you continue to regulate your expenses by as much of conscientious regard to *economy* as may be found to consist with your health and comfort, and with the real demands of the work of God.”

FORM OF A BEQUEST TO THE WESLEYAN-METHODIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

JOHN WESLEY, A.M., the REV. THOS. COKE, LL.D., and others, and now carried on under the direction of the Conference of the People called Methodists; and for which the receipt of such Treasurer or Treasurers shall be a sufficient discharge.

☞ Those Benevolent Friends who may have bequeathed to the Wesleyan-Methodist Missionary Society, Legacies payable out of the late Five per Cent. THE GIBRALTAR MISSION.

Mr. Crocombe.

THE importance of this station, from its connexion with Spain, continues to develop itself. Not only have an additional number of copies of the Scriptures and useful Tracts been distributed of late, but a spirit of religious inquiry has led many Spaniards to the Mission Chapel there, and to hold private conversations with Mr. CROSCOMBE on religious subjects; and the result has been, that several of them have been brought to a saving acquaintance with the truth, and will we trust in their turn, be the instruments of good to others.

“ *Gibraltar*,” says Mr. CROSCOMBE, “ is the great depôt for the Spanish Scriptures and Tracts, and you will be happy to learn that we have sold many hundred copies of the former during the last year.

“ It is an important fact, that many of the Spaniards begin to suspect that they have been misled; this has naturally resulted from their reading the Holy Scriptures and other religious books. They willingly receive Tracts from us, and as willingly converse with us on the subject of religion. We have a small Benevolent Society established in this Garrison, one of whose principal objects it is to assist and relieve sick and distressed foreigners. Our visitors have pursued their labours with activity: in several instances it is believed that those whom they have visited have been made the happy subjects of real conversion to God. Some have died happy in the Lord, and others show in their life the genuine fruits of true repentance. Mr. QUIRILL, one of the principal visitors, has often been solicited by Spaniards to read the Scriptures and offer up prayers to God in Spanish *statedly* in his own house, allowing all who wished to come and join with him.—There is here a Sunday School of eighty children in a state of great activity.”

In May last Mr. CROSCOMBE writes:

“ Our friends are still persevering in the active support of the pious and benevolent institutions which are formed among us. On Sunday the 16th March, being the first Anniversary of the establishment of our Sunday School, the children were all brought to the Chapel both afternoon and evening, and presented a most interesting sight to the congregation. Their number is eighty, and a collection of thirty dollars was made for the support of the School.

“ Bibles, Testaments, Prayer Books, and other publications of a smaller value, were distributed to the children, according to their several merits,

with a suitable address on their delivery. The interest excited both among the children and congregation was very apparent.

“ Several of our friends are actively employed in visiting the sick, especially foreigners, as opportunities afford; and I have had the happiness to witness the good effects of these visits.”

From *Malta*, where we have a Society composed partly of pious Soldiers, and partly of Maltese brought to God by their instrumentality, we have a pressing request for the labours of a Missionary: and it is the intention of the Committee shortly to make that appointment.

The Committee have for some time contemplated the establishment of a Mission in Palestine; and it has recently been resolved to send out two persons of suitable qualifications. Jerusalem is designed to be the scene of their labours, and they will be directed not merely to visit it, but, should God grant them an open door for exertion, to remain there, with a view to the establishment of a permanent Mission. To the lively interests of the friends of Missions, the Committee need not commend this enterprise;—the hope of giving back a portion of evangelical light to the country which witnessed its dawn, and its meridian splendour, cannot but awaken their ardour, and command co-operation. But they commend it to their earnest *prayers*, that the best means of making known a long-rejected Saviour may be pointed out to the agents employed; that Mahometan hostility, Jewish unbelief, and Christian superstition may be removed by Him whose Spirit commands all hearts; that Jerusalem may again witness its disciples “*in an upper room,*” its Pentecostal effusion of the *grace*, if not of the *gifts* of the Spirit, and its thousands “*pricked in their hearts,*” and asking “*what shall we do?*” Mr. Cook, of the French Mission, is about to proceed immediately to Palestine, and, should the opening be found favourable, he will be followed by others.

REPORT

OF

THE COMMITTEE

OF THE

WESLEYAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

1823.

THE Committee again meet the Society and its Friends on this interesting occasion, with sentiments of the deepest gratitude to Almighty God for the success which he has deigned to bestow upon their labours; and for those prospects of the enlargement of the kingdom of Christ, which in so many directions present themselves to the hope and the zeal of all Missionary Societies. Additional proofs are afforded year by year, that no labour in this great work is in vain, when it is “*labour in the Lord.*”

In briefly reviewing the state of the different Missions under the direction of the Wesleyan Missionary Society, the Committee take them in the usual order.

THE FRENCH MISSION.

IN FRANCE, stability, and some degree of increase characterize the state of the Societies; and from the South, where Messrs. COOK and DE JERSEY are stationed, the accounts continue to state, with satisfaction, the attention which is paid to the ministry of the Word, and the desire of instruction which is manifested by the inhabitants of many of the villages.

Mr. COOK writes from *Nismes*, 17th Feb. 1823.

“ The good work of God is going on in this neighbourhood. In two parishes I have had some pleasing proofs that the preaching of the Gospel has not been in vain. In one of these, the death of a young person, who departed this life on the second of this month, and who had experienced the power of the Gospel of Christ in such a way as few, if any, of her neighbours had any idea of, seems to have excited astonishment, and to have given rise to much inquiry.

“ At *Caveirac*, some of my catechumens appear to be awakened: they pray much in private, and begin to exhort their parents and neighbours to seek the salvation of their souls. This year I proposed to my young hearers to give me the money they usually spent in dancing, &c. during the Carnival, for the Missions: several of them have done so. I have received twenty francs for that purpose; and several young females of the most respectable families, have declared their resolution to abandon their follies, and to seek the Saviour.”

The following are Extracts from the Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Missionaries in *France*, held April 12, 1823.

“ In *Beauville* and *Pèriere*, the members of the Society continue to walk worthy of their profession; but the hearers in general, do not appear to be sensible of the religious privileges they have so long enjoyed.”

“ In *Cherbourg*, the congregations continue good; and two persons have lately been brought to the knowledge of Christ, and have joined the Society.”

“ At *Mer*, in October last, the new Church was opened for Divine service, and the number of hearers has considerably increased since that period. The brethren of the district have witnessed the formation of Bible, Missionary and Tract Societies since their arrival here to hold their annual meeting; and have been gratified by what they have seen of the willingness of the people to subscribe.”

“ The Prefect of this department has given Brother DE KERPEZDRON several testimonies of his approbation, acknowledging the great improvement which has taken place in the morals of the people committed to his care. Weekly evening preaching has been established every Thursday, and a Missionary prayer meeting every month.”

South of France. “ Though the brethren in this part of the Mission are not without their difficulties, yet their prospects are more encouraging than those of the other brethren, because the Protestant population is more numerous than in the other circuits. Besides the four parishes under the pastoral care of Brother COOK, the brethren hold regular private meetings on the week days, in eight neighbouring parishes, in most of which several persons appear to be awakened, and some converted to God.”

“ The Protestant Lancasterian School at *Mer*, under the direction of Brother KERPEZDRON, continues to flourish, and to excite much interest throughout the whole department.”

“ In the *South of France*, a Sunday School for Girls has been recently opened at *Caveirac*, and between fifty and sixty attend.”

a host shall we meet with in the day of the *Lord*, who, from the four winds of heaven, will stand up to glorify the *Saviour*; and be acknowledged by him!"

The last Report of the state of the Schools in Ceylon, which now afford instruction to nearly 4000 children, is exceedingly encouraging, and presents a view of numerous and systematic Institutions, most of which are in a state of efficiency, for the communication not only of the elements of knowledge, but of *direct Christian Instruction*; to which, not only has no resistance been offered by the heathen native parents, but even they themselves have cheerfully co-operated in the erection of School Rooms, and in encouraging the attendance of their children.

This Report is too copious to be inserted; but a few extracts, which show the moral and religious influence of these Schools, will be read with pleasure.

Colpetty School.—"The number of children is not quite so large as formerly; but scarcely a child remains, who was there at its first establishment: the boys first admitted have gone out into active life, and on passing through the streets, and travelling along the roads, we are often gratified in recognizing the faces of our old scholars now grown up and become creditable young men, employed in respectable situations. On meeting us they seldom fail to assure us of their sense of obligation by the significant *native salam*. In this way the native population is becoming enlightened and moralized to a degree which will greatly open the way of subsequent labourers."

New Bazar School.—"This School is literally crowded with children, notwithstanding the numbers who have left it, and are now spread through the country in different departments of active life. Three languages are daily taught, with the addition also of writing and accounts;—and the general improvement of the children is almost incredible. Sir RICHARD OTTLEY lately honoured this School with a visit, for the purpose of examining the children. There were present on the occasion one hundred and ten boys, and thirty-three girls; and so much was Sir Richard interested in witnessing this large assembly of children, that he kindly stayed until the whole had been examined. About fifty-seven boys and two girls read the English Scriptures well, and about sixty boys and two girls read the Singhalese, and a still larger number showed their copies in English and Singhalese, written both on paper, slates, and the native *ola*."

"From a paper laid before one of the Schoolmaster's Meetings by the Master it appears that one hundred and eighty-five boys, and forty-eight girls, have gone from this School since its establishment, to occupy different stations in life; most of whom had been taught to read the word

of God, either in English or Singhalese. Many of these continue also to maintain the serious impressions which they received while at School, and give satisfactory proofs of genuine piety. At the last quarter-day held in Colombo, a class paper was exhibited by one of the leaders for the examination of the meeting, when it was inquired if the names in it were not Scholars in the New Bazar School. The leader replied that they were formerly, but most of them had left School, had gone out to different trades but continued to meet in class; and it was truly gratifying to observe with what regularity they had attended, and given their humble pittance towards the support of the cause of God. By the blessing of God, upon our cause in this place, there can be no doubt of this School proving a general blessing to this part of the Pettah of Colombo."

Checkoo Street.—"There are at present 110 Scholars in this School, consisting of all castes and religious professions. *Protestants, Roman Catholics, Mahommedans, Gentoos, and Budhists*, who all sit down together, learn the same lessons, are subject to the same modes of discipline, and are cultivating the same moral habits, and it is hoped are imbibing the same hallowing principles. A short time since, when Sir RICHARD OTTLEY visited this, as he has done the other Schools, lessons, both in reading and writing, were brought for his examination in four different languages—the English, Portuguese, Tamul, and Singhalese. This, in the end, must prove greatly advantageous, inasmuch as so many different channels are opened through which instruction will flow to those who speak these different tongues."

Slave Island School.—"The constant scenes of wickedness with which this School is surrounded are truly deplorable, and it is matter of surprise that the children have been kept together for so great a length of time; for it is somewhat remarkable that most of the boys now in the School have been in it from the commencement; and they are a credit to the establishment. One interesting consideration connected with this School is, that a number of well-informed, decent, steady Christian youths, are there rising up, as the witnesses of Jesus and his Gospel, from among a vast population of Heathens and Mahommedans who are now living in every kind of vice."

Kallebowilla School.—"There are at present 32 fine boys in this School, who have been brought out of the greatest barbarism into a state of decency and regularity. The principal part of them can now read the word of God in their own language in the most correct manner, and many of them have got on so well in English as to be able to read the New Testament; in addition to which, they are daily committing to memory catechisms and prayers, with portions of the Scripture."

Moretto School.—"From some of the latest Reports, it appears that the number of the children is increasing, though many retire from it for the purpose of going into trade, or learning some mechanical art. At a late examination, when those that read the Singhalese Scriptures were called up for examination, every boy rose from his seat; and to determine the best readers was found a most difficult task. The reading of the whole School was truly admirable. Their proficiency in writing on slates, paper, and native *ola*, and in the knowledge of the catechism, and the sacred

THE growing stability, and increasing influence of this Mission is a subject of great thankfulness. In no part of the world, purely heathen, has a greater work been effected in the same space of time ; and the combination of Ministerial labours, religious Societies, Schools, Catechists, and native Assistants, into one system, directing its energies to one end, and receiving its impulse from the same common centre, promises not merely the perpetuation, but the regular enlargement of the whole work, in every station in that island. One of the most encouraging circumstances in that Mission is the increasing number of native youths of good talents, able to speak in two or three, and in some instances, four languages, trained up under the care of the Missionaries, and giving satisfactory proofs of a real change of heart, who are now employed in various departments of the Mission. Five of them are already very acceptably and usefully engaged as Assistant Missionaries in the different stations ; a more considerable number fill the office of Assistant Superintendents of Schools, each of whom is appointed to a district, and, under the direction of the Superintendent Missionary, takes the oversight of the Schoolmasters, visits the Schools, performs divine service, and reads and explains the word of God. It is thus that a much larger portion of the country is filled by the sound of the Gospel ; and that the numerous Schools have the advantage of regular superintendency, and religious instruction. In this work too of spiritual and incessant labour, they are preparing for a higher

office; should he whose prerogative it is to send forth labourers, call them into his vineyard. *This* great object may therefore be considered as, by the blessing of God, secured in the Ceylon Mission—that, under the pious care and nurture of qualified European Missionaries, sent out from time to time, a *native* Ministry can now be continued and enlarged, for the diffusion of the truth of the Gospel into every part of that interesting island, and the supply of instruction to the inhabitants of the Southern part of India.

Discouragements, arising from that extreme apathy to spiritual things which characterizes the minds of most heathens, and from the deep depravity of their habits, are inseparable from such Missions as those of Ceylon and India; and they will remain to try the faith and persevering patience of all true Missionaries, until the great work of preparation shall have been accomplished, and those richer effusions of the Holy Spirit are poured forth, for which the prayers of the faithful are more earnestly than ever addressed to the throne of Grace. The brethren in Ceylon have however reaped the first fruits. Of the genuine conversion of the majority of those who compose their small, but increasing Societies, they have encouraging evidence; and to them, in many cases, that highest reward of Missionary labour has been graciously bestowed. They have witnessed the steadfastness of their converts amidst reproaches, persecutions, and loss of friends and interest; and they have heard from their lips, when in the last stage of this mortal existence, those words of joy and triumph, which never before were pronounced in a land of heathens, and never, till the Gospel reached their ears, cheered the sinking heart in its last struggle, and softened the pang of separation.

“ I have heard,” says Mr. Fox, “ in this country, both in the Singha-
lese and Portuguese languages, as artless and satisfactory sentiments of
Christian experience, as I ever heard in the English language; and
I have seen the coloured face beaming with smiles, while the last au-
dible sound *Yeysus Wahansey*, (Jesus my Saviour,) passed the dying
lips.

“ From the devil-worshippers of Ceylon, some have joined themselves
to the *Lord*, in a perpetual covenant. From the worship of *Budhu*
many have been brought, and not a few of them are admitted to the pre-
sence of the *Lamb*. Among the holy train are some Hindoos, and Ma-
hommedans, and one Parsee, or worshipper of the sun and fire. What

would otherwise never meet, and acquaintances and friendships are formed on Christian principles; and we doubt not they generally consider it a great privilege and honour to see themselves incorporated into a Christian family of such extent. We have often remarked with much delight, when hearing the natives pray, with what affectionate interest they bring the whole SOCIETY, as they term our Mission, before the throne of grace."

"At *Pantura*," says Mr. M'KENNY, "we have a class of twelve, and their general steadiness is very pleasing; they have made considerable progress in religious improvement, and are gaining a strong sense of their moral obligations. When inquiring lately into their state, a complaint was made against one of them in a serious manner, for having been prevailed upon *once* to offer flowers at a temple. This was regarded by the others as so formidable a crime, that they entreated that he should be expelled from the Society. To discover among them a feeling so jealous for the honour of God, affords no small degree of consolation to my mind; for I doubt not but that their prejudices will soon be as strong against idolatry as they ever were in favour of it.

"In erecting the Chapel here, I have had great assistance from the boys of the School; they manifested much zeal for the erection, not only bringing others to give gratuitous work, but labouring hard with their own hands, notwithstanding many of them are the children of parents in very respectable circumstances. They often stimulated each other to exertion by saying, *This is God's work, this is God's house*. The delightful sensations I have felt in witnessing so many of them labouring diligently to complete this place, without any temporal advantage in prospect, I cannot attempt to describe. O that the Lord may cause his blessing to rest upon them, and make them pillars in his house to go out no more for ever.

"Our prospects, generally speaking, are promising in this circuit, but in some places they are very encouraging; this is particularly the case at *Pantura*. Our new Chapel there has been so far completed as to allow of our having the immediate use of it, and on Sunday last, it was solemnly set apart for the sacred service and worship of God. About eleven o'clock, A. M. the place was well filled with a respectable native congregation, and a crowd of people surrounded the door and windows, who could not possibly gain admittance. Brother CLOUGH read the morning service in Singhalese in a very impressive manner, and preached an excellent and very appropriate sermon in the same language, from John, iv. 24. "*God is a Spirit: and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth.*" The people heard with much attention, and were evidently interested in the whole service. After the sermon a collection was made in aid of the erection, which amounted to a sum which will be nearly sufficient to enable us to finish the place, so as to provide comfortable lodgings for the brethren of the Station, and accommodations for the English Schoolmaster, which will save the expense of house-rent. Sir RICHARD OTTLEY, according to his wonted kindness to our Mission, favoured us with his presence, accompanied by the Rev. S. LAMBRICK, Church Missionary, and after the

service addressed the people for a few minutes, expressing the high satisfaction he felt at seeing so many coming to hear the word of God, and assuring them it was his wish to encourage them to the utmost of his power. The conduct of our excellent friend cannot fail of having a most beneficial effect on the minds of the people; it would appear from my last letter that Sir Richard subscribed 100 dollars towards this house of mercy."

The following are Extracts of the latest letters from the different Mission Stations in *Ceylon*.

Colombo. Mr. Fox writes:

"Among our own countrymen there is a blessed work in the fort: our members are truly devoted to God, and frequently a careless sinner is brought to a knowledge of himself and of God. Our native members continue faithful, and among them there are several very worthy characters; but the native congregations are very fluctuating. Although we should think it wrong to entertain despondency in reference to the adult population, we have no encouragement to be very sanguine. Such stocks and stones cannot be conceived of out of ASIA. Nothing but an assurance that for *these* the Saviour died could animate the mind under so many painful disappointments: the heartfelt satisfaction I enjoy in seeing so many promising youths rising up amongst us, does, however, far overbalance any painful sensations I am often forced to feel; and I regard the work in which I am engaged of all others the most noble.

"The translation and printing proceed as usual; the latter is advanced to about the 40th Chapter of Isaiah: the whole it is hoped will be finished in August next. The work would have been retarded by the departure of Br. Clough had not Brother Gogerly, whose attainments in Singalese are very respectable, filled up the vacancy thus occasioned in the Board of Translators."

Negombo. Mr. ALLEN writes:

"On Christmas day, our Schools assembled in the Chapel, and their coming together afforded, as usual, an ocular proof, that Christianity has its votaries even in Ceylon. The children from our different Schools, delight to meet each other in the *Maha palia*, or principal place of worship. The same day I had an opportunity of renewing the Society's tickets, when most of them were present, and have no doubt that they were mutually benefited by the relation of each other's experience, and by the various advices which were administered to them on that occasion.

"I spent the greatest part of last week at *Tempalla*, a name you may frequently have met with in the School Reports. I went thither designing to acquaint myself more fully with the place and the people, and to ascertain, as far as possible, the true state of our Schools and classes in that and the adjoining villages. After a walk round the neighbourhood, I was struck with the excellent situation of our *Tempalla* chapel. It stands on an eminence at an almost equal distance from three villages; and though but a small place, it has a very prepossessing appearance from different parts of the adjacent country. It is looked upon by all the inhabitants, as a

Scriptures, large portions of which they had committed to memory, were equally satisfactory. Most of the elder boys gave evident marks of a sense of piety, and the master has met about ten of them in a class for nearly two years. The rules of the Society have been given to them, and by them they regulate their lives and conduct."

Nagalgam School.—"There are now 66 children on the list; the regularity of their attendance, the propriety of their conduct, while at School, and the improvement made, are not surpassed, if equalled, by the children of any School we have under our care. On a late examination, almost every scholar read with fluency and propriety the *new translation* of the Scriptures; and on being questioned whether they understood what they read, they immediately turned the verses as they read them into the style they are accustomed daily to speak."

"Some of them can repeat by heart almost whole Gospels or Epistles. The introduction of English being of recent date, little can be said of their improvement therein; their eagerness and zeal to excel in English is extreme, and a short time will doubtless mark their proficiency in this also. A circumstance will illustrate their love to the School.—The School-house is on the edge of the large Mutwal River; close to this a small river empties itself into the large one, and divides the School parish into two equal parts, so that one half of the children had to come over the bridge to the School. Lately the Government laid a tax upon the bridge which the children were unable to pay, and the apprehension was, that they would be deprived of the opportunity of attending; and for them to row themselves over the river would be contrary to the orders of Government. However it is a fact, that such was their anxiety to attend the School that the eldest boys tied their School-books to a little bundle on their heads, and swam across the river twice a day to get to the School."

"The advantages which the Nagalgam School has, in a spiritual point of view, are very great. The character of the excellent young man, the Singalese Teacher, has already been given in former Reports, and it is only necessary now to remark, that he continues a steady member of Society, and is earnestly and sincerely seeking the salvation of his soul; living therefore under such impressions, it is natural to suppose he will infuse the same principles along with his instructions into the minds of the children. The English Teacher has been connected with the Mission in different capacities for several years; he is now an Assistant Superintendent of Schools, and a local Preacher. By the united efforts of these two young men, in and about the village of Nagalgam, much good has been done."

"Many of the inhabitants manifest a serious concern for their souls, and it is very encouraging to the preachers on the Station to see how the little chapel is filled with attentive hearers every Sabbath day. To witness a more extensive influence of the power of Divine grace on the souls of the people, awakening them to the sense of their sinfulness and danger, is what we now wait for, and we expect that some of these little sequestered spots will be the places where it will please God eminently to pour out his Spirit upon the people."

Kornegalle School.—"Has become a most interesting Station, connected with our Mission Establishment: several of the sons of native

Kandian Chiefs have now become regular scholars, submitting to every plan of teaching adopted in all our other Schools, and we have the great pleasure also of seeing several *adult* Kandian pupils; one is learning to read with the assistance of glasses, whose long white flowing beard makes him an interesting contrast to the youthful assembly around him. We earnestly hope to see a blessed result from this encouraging commencement."

Other equally interesting extracts might be given from the Report, would our limits allow; but those just read open prospects of a very delightful nature. For can it be that all this light and truth, infused into the youthful memory, and insinuating itself into the early and opening judgment, should be communicated in vain? That is impossible; it will be its lowest, though yet glorious effect, to bring idolatry into discredit, and to purge the mind from superstitions to which only the most ignorant are subject, and which at once pollute the passions, and spread gloom and wretchedness through the breast. But happy as this result will be; gratifying as it is to humanity, as well as to piety, that idols should be forsaken, and their deluded votaries exalted to a state of judgment and feeling more worthy of the human understanding; we may look still higher. Of the youth thus taught a considerable number have become members of a Christian Society, and show that they have received the grace of God in truth. The rest are prepared by their knowledge of the Scriptures to hear with profit "the word of Life," as explained and enforced by his Servants; and from them it is probable that the future increase of the Societies already formed may be expected.

"It is remarkable," say the Missionaries, in their Report, "to witness, that wherever one of the Schools has been established for any length of time, how much the whole neighbourhood becomes attached to us and our work. This attachment must weaken their fondness for heathenism; and that it has had this happy effect already, we often have the pleasure to witness. Many instances might be selected of courage and perseverance on the part of our people, in resisting the efforts made by heathens to draw them into the superstitious practices of the country. These are by no means solitary cases; they occur wherever we have made our little establishments. The different classes of people, both parents and children, thus united with us, begin to feel that they are not outcasts. We bring them together into the same place of worship, from different quarters, as often as it is practicable; and on the Christian festivals all the people belonging to one of our circuits are generally collected at the principal place on the Station, when appropriate services are performed. Such meetings create uncommon interest; they bring numbers together who

as their love of sin and hatred of the pure commandments of Christianity which impede our progress; and to what shall we look for help? Nothing less than to the almighty energy of God's Eternal Spirit; and this will be granted.

“ A few evenings ago I had some pleasing indications of the progress of truth, when opening a small place for public worship built by the Modeliar on his own premises. It strikes me that if this plan were generally adopted much good would be done, as many would go to such a place who never go to a regular chapel; and this particularly applies to females. It was truly gratifying to see 12 or 14 of the wives of the most respectable inhabitants present on the above occasion; my mind could not help reverting to those humble scenes which we have so often witnessed at home in the peasant's cottage, where every voice has joined in the homely yet acceptable melody of grateful hearts.”

Jaffna. It is reported in the District minutes that,—

“ The opening of the New Chapel at Jaffna was a most pleasing and interesting event. The inhabitants of the place had watched the progress of the building with much interest. When informed of the time appointed for its dedication, they were employed two days previously in fitting up their pews with mats and cushions. Chairs were sent from every part of the town, and sometime before the service commenced every pew was filled with chairs; the pews being formed to admit them when necessary. All the American Missionaries with most of their families, and also the Church Missionaries, were present. The congregation was large and respectable: Brother OSBORNE commenced the service with the 542d Hymn, and then read prayers; Brother FOX preached an appropriate Sermon from Psalm 72, ver. xix. Brother CARVER concluded with prayer.

“ The collection amounted to 200 rix-dollars. This collection we considered large, as the people had so very handsomely subscribed to the building; and we had no strangers to assist us with their contributions. After the service a company of upwards of thirty of our kind friends repaired to the Mission house and partook of a little refreshment which was provided for the occasion. The Evening Service was commenced by singing the 316th Hymn. Brother NEWSTEAD preached from Psalm 68, verse xviii. Brother POOR, one of the American Missionaries, concluded with prayer. The collection, 30 rix-dollars. Thus closed a day which will be long remembered in Jaffna. The following evening Brother NEWSTEAD preached in Portuguese; the Chapel was completely filled with the descendants of Europeans, who, with much satisfaction called the building “ *Nossa novo Igreja,*” *Our New Church.* The New Chapel at *Trincomalee* might have been opened before the District Meeting, but the dreadful rains during the monsoon cut off all hopes of the Brethren travelling by land or water, on that side of the Island. Brother BOTT being at Jaffna sometime before the meeting, and Brother CARVER, being left alone, thought it most prudent to wait a little longer till some of the brethren could assist in opening the Chapel.”

CONTINENTAL INDIA.

Madras Messrs. Lynch, Stead, and England.

The following are Extracts from our latest advices.

Madras. Mr. HOOLE writes :

“ Our English congregations continue much the same. A few of the Society have been removed to other parts of the country, where, I trust, they will be useful: one is gone back into the world; a backslider, who had long and deeply fallen, is happily restored; and four or five new members have been added.

“ The native congregations, except those united in Society, are uncertain in their attendance; but of late I have had larger congregations than ever. There is an increase of two or three only in the class; but I think those who are thus united are profiting by that means, and growing up into Christ. Three or four of them were removed, near two years ago, to Ellichpoor, two months' journey to the north, where they have continued faithful, and meet together weekly. One of them arrived here a few days ago, with his master, and brought with him two adults, whom he had instructed, for baptism.

“ In consequence of our having had, during the past year, neither interpreter nor native assistant, except during the time Brother STEAD was with us, all the Tamul work, as well as part of the English, has fallen upon me, and, in consequence, our exertions to extend the Mission have been comparatively few. We have, however, tried several new places, and at different times have erected the standard of the Cross in the open air, and called on the heathen to flock to it. The most favourable opening is at St. Thomè, a large and populous village about a mile from our house: besides the natives, who are numerous, and many of them very respectable, there is a good number of the descendants of the Portuguese, who settled there more than two hundred years ago. It is the residence of a Romish Bishop, and contains a cathedral and several churches, the rich endowments of which support a considerable number of Priests; but from any one of them a sermon is never expected. The people are buried in ignorance and vice.

“ A poor fisherman, a member of the native Class, who cannot even read, was the means of this opening: he invited a few of his neighbours to hear the Scriptures read, with prayer, one evening in the week at his hut. The number increased, and he erected a pandal for their accommodation. At the same time, or a little before, he often pressed a respectable gentleman to attend our English preaching at Royapettah, who still attends public worship. This gentleman soon invited us to use one of his houses as a chapel. An extract from my journal will show the time and manner of our commencement.’

real blessing to the place, and those who have never entered it consider its erection as the most happy event their village has ever witnessed. The following circumstance will sufficiently account for those friendly sentiments towards your Christian establishment in these jungles. The piece of ground granted to Brother Newstead for the use of the Mission at *Tempalla*, was known all over the country as the haunt of devils and departed spirits: each of the inhabitants had some fearful tale to tell respecting it: one had been terrified with strange and frightful appearances; another had heard indescribably dreadful noises, a third had been pursued by one of the phantoms in a monstrous form, through the whole extent of the premises; some had been pelted with stones and sand; and others had seen the trees furiously shaken at them as they passed along the dreary path. These *stories* are not to be wondered at, as the dreaded spot teems with human remains, having been long the repository of the dead: but it is not a little remarkable, that, no sooner was the foundation of the chapel laid, than the *ghosts* and *devils* disappeared,—the noises ceased,—travellers passed unmolested,—and people now traverse this solitary region in all hours of the night, who formerly trembled to approach it after sunset. This is not the only place which has been exorcised by the residence of a Missionary or the erection of a Christian place of worship: and these imaginary conquests of the evil one and his agents, operating on the superstitious feelings of the natives, give them a bias towards Christianity, and prepare the way for the complete overthrow of idolatry and sin. The country about *Tempalla* has the appearance of an interminable wood, and from the chapel no human habitations are describable; but as we penetrate the surrounding recesses, one hut after another makes its appearance.

“Through the whole course of last year, I had abundant reason to be satisfied with most of the agents of the Mission on this station; and in particular, *Lutersy*, the assistant Superintendent of Schools, and *Manuel Fernando*, the Chilaw Schoolmaster, are highly to be commended for their steady deportment and prompt attention to every part of their duty.”

Kornegalle. Mr. NEWSTEAD reports:

“The last quarter has, I think, produced more pleasing instances of real good than any preceding one: for our work, having obtained a permanent footing, and having been noticed in a manner most favourable to its interests by Government, is now beginning more fully to approve itself to the Kandian people, who are naturally of a calculating and cautious turn, and therefore not very hasty in forming their opinion. To enumerate the *instances* in which I have seen their prejudices removed, is not necessary; it is sufficient to observe, that the result of the whole is a very evident impression in favour of our establishment, which, they are assured, designs their everlasting good. Several native chiefs of different ranks, have lately come from considerable distances, voluntarily bringing their sons to place under our instructions.

“It is a circumstance which has been a real support to me, to see the constant attendance, every Sabbath, of two entire village Schools, all of

Kandian children, without objection attending the ordinances of Christian worship; it has excited my surprise almost as much as my gratitude; and their frequently being accompanied by their parents and friends, has rendered our native congregation far less fluctuating and uncertain than the English. The latter continues, of course, extremely small; not from neglect, but because of their number; yet we have still found the relief of one English service amidst the native ones. A blessing generally attends our other means of grace also; the class, though so small, is yet, I am assured, a part of the true Church of God, and I humbly hope it will ere long have a most happy addition in a *real* convert from heathenism in our Schoolmaster, who, as far as human judgment can decide, is diligently seeking pardon and peace through the Lord Jesus. Had I time to transcribe some of the interesting conversations I have had with him, I am persuaded it would gratify the minds of the Committee; but I rather wish to defer further observations till his sincerity (of which I have no doubt) shall have been further ascertained. The Kornegalle School begins to revive, and we have the promise of many additions. It is gratifying to see several returned, whom sickness only had driven away, with less loss in what they had learned than could have been expected. Two village Schools will be regularly opened in a few days, the Bungaloes having been completed, and all things in a fair train for permanent usefulness."

Matura. Mr. HUME writes:

"There are upon this station *four* classes, one at the Mission House, composed of Dutch and Singhalese; one at Wingampitta, (a place buried in the jungle,) composed purely of natives who have been collected since we have been on the station; another at the Mission house, of Singhalese women; and one at Belligam, partly of school boys and partly of adults; this last has been collected by our assistant Cornelius. In reference to these classes there is one remark which is applicable to every Singhalese class on the Island, without any exception: they are not *experienced Christians*, met to converse together on the operations of the grace of God upon their hearts, and for the encouraging of each other to work out their salvation with fear and trembling; they are a few poor ignorant creatures, just emerging from the most lamentable ignorance and superstition, and desirous of being further informed on religious subjects.

"My spare time has as usual been filled up in fitting myself for being further useful to the heathen by paying particular attention to the language in which I have to address them, and in acquiring a knowledge of their literature and mythology."

Batticaloa. With respect to this insulated Station, Mr. ROBERTS writes:

"It may be truly said, that Christianity on this Station has become much more the subject of consideration and respect: that it is true, and superior to every other system, numbers acknowledge and believe. Would to God that we could add, and *obey*. It is not so much their prejudices

“ August 22, 1822. Wednesday.—In addition to our numerous services, we commenced another at St. Thomè this evening, in a house belonging to a gentleman who kindly offered it for that purpose. At a few hours' notice a large assembly, of all descriptions and colours, was collected. Mr. LYNCH commenced with prayer, and addressed them about a quarter of an hour in English. I then followed, in Tamul; and taking up some of the principal thoughts he had expressed, enlarged upon them with freedom, and concluded with prayer, in the same language. May this be the opening of a wide and effectual door in that place !”

“ Since that time we have not failed to hold a service there every week, generally in the same order as the above; first English, and then Tamul, and have sometimes given them an extra service on the Sunday, when the house has been well filled. The congregation is regular; and many of them, who never came near us before, now attend the preaching at Royapettah. It has been proposed to buy the house we have thus occupied: a little more than 400 pagodas, or 1400 rupees, is the reduced price at which the proprietor proposes to sell it to us. The poor fisherman solicits subscriptions from his neighbours. Some of the poorest, as well as of the respectable, have subscribed; and the last time I saw the list, the amount was upwards of 500 rupees: we hope to raise the whole.”

“ Our Schools, four in number, are still in a low state, owing, in part, to the poverty of the people, which leads them, as soon as the children are able to do any thing, to take them from school; and, in part, to our steadily pursuing the prescribed plan of employing none but Christian masters.”

Negapatam. Mr. MOWATT has succeeded Mr. CLOSE on this Station, and states,

“ For some time after my arrival, I was of opinion that I had been removed from a more important station, to one less important; for nothing like an opening among the natives here presented itself. However, circumstances have taken a most favourable turn, so as to surprise myself, and others who have resided longer at Negapatam. This town is proverbial on the coast for its deceit and wickedness. The inhabitants surpass in idolatrous ceremonies any I have yet seen in India, while at the same time they exceed in every unholy temper and deceit. My Moonshee, who is a heathen, in describing them to me said, ‘ By the number of their ceremonies, and the attention they pay to them, you would conceive them to be a most religious people; but their mind is full of deceit, one man cannot trust another, for they never speak all the truth. They are half wicked at Madras, but wholly wicked here.’ Yet even here we hope to do good. I have been introduced to some of the more respectable inhabitants, and several are in the habit of calling upon me. These frequently of their own accord propose subjects of conversation relative to religion, which gives me an opportunity of showing them their errors, and what is the truth. This I endeavour to do in the mildest manner, so as not to excite their prejudices; and I believe several of them are getting more correct views of Christianity. If I mistake not, Brother CLOSE had considerable difficulty in establishing a School at Negapatam. I am

happy to say, that the prejudices of the people are giving way, and that the whole of the boys in that School, who can read, now learn our catechisms and read our books. We have also been agreeably surprised to find that, at a village about three miles distant, the inhabitants were all willing that we should establish a School among them, into which we might introduce books on Christianity. Their solicitude to have a School among them was so great, that it was some time before we could bring ourselves to think them sincere in their professions. We have taken the School, consisting of twenty-seven children, under our care, and trust we have here the opening to future usefulness. I have commenced Tamul preaching in the house on Wednesday evenings, which has been attended much better than we expected; but we have not always been able to command a congregation, in consequence of the rains, which have been rather heavy this season."

"I feel much pleasure in stating the progress of that department of the work which peculiarly falls upon Brother KATTS, I mean the Portuguese. The seed sown in *Negapatam*, by Brother SQUANCE, is not destroyed: on the contrary it springs up, and is bearing fruit. We have a class of about twenty persons, decendants of the Dutch and Portuguese, some of whom, I believe, enjoy real piety. The whole of the European inhabitants regularly attend the English preaching, and I trust good will ultimately be affected."

Seringapatam. Since the following was written, Mr. HOOLE has been regularly appointed to this Station.

"This is my second visit to *Seringapatam*. The protestant Christians resident here have built a convenient place of worship capable of accommodating about 100 persons. As you have been informed by Brother CLOSE, they are exceedingly desirous of a Missionary from our Society, and have earnestly entreated us to give them some help. I accordingly paid them a visit about five months ago, and formed a class of about fifteen members, who continued to meet till the illness and death of their leader, a respectable European, by which they are left still more destitute, and have a stronger demand on us for assistance.

"This neighbourhood, which is not so unhealthy as is generally supposed, presents a noble field for Missionary exertion, and if two or three brethren were stationed at Bangalore it might be taken into the Circuit and have a regular supply. I am now preaching twice every Lord's day, and on the evenings of other days am engaged either in Tamul or English—The people hear the word with much eagerness and attention, many of the deluded native Catholics attend the Tamul services; some of them have requested admission to the protestant Church, and two heathens are going through a course of instruction preparative to Baptism.

"*Mysore*, the capital of the kingdom, is about seven miles distant. The Honourable the British Resident at that court sent for me a few days ago, and introduced me to the Rajah; it was a particular day appointed by him to receive the compliments of the British on the occasion of his late marriage to a fourth wife. I shall not attempt to describe the pomp of the procession formed by his elephant, carriages, and palanquin bearers,

&c. sent to convey us to his palace. We were graciously received by his Highness, and after partaking of an elegant entertainment furnished at his expense, we retired early with the same attendance."

THE SOUTH SEA MISSIONS.

New South Wales.—The accounts of the progress of this important Mission continue to be satisfactory, and we trust that having overcome its first difficulties, it will be the means of spreading the influence of Christianity with increasing success, in a population which so greatly needs religious care.

The Annual Report of the New South Wales District Meeting, gives the following view of the state of the Mission :

"The moral condition of by far the greater part of our population, is that of ten-fold darkness : for, unlike the benighted heathen, they have sinned against light and knowledge ; and have wilfully ' *chosen* darkness rather than light.' While this awful condition, by aggravating their guilt and danger, renders them pre-eminently the objects of Christian commiseration, it also throws mountainous obstacles in the way of the religious improvement, and demands from the Missionary the most strenuous and persevering exertion.

"But we derive abundant consolation from a firm conviction that we are in the path of sacred duty, that our labours have not hitherto been in vain, and that if we only continue faithful in our high vocation, the word of God shall break through every barrier, and eventually have free course and be glorified—for the promise is sure, ' My word shall not return unto me void, but shall accomplish the thing whereunto I have sent it.' We are also greatly encouraged by the remarkable, but undisputed fact, that the native youth of the Colony, are, in general, but little contaminated by the evil examples which every where surrounds them. It would naturally be apprehended, that they would be very early initiated in vicious practices, ' growing with their growth, and strengthening with their strength ;' but how pleasing and almost incredible, is it to relate, that they are, on the contrary, for the most part, characterized by temperance, industry, and an aptitude to receive instruction. Of the rising generation we indulge great and well-founded hopes. From them, it is rationally expected, many a ' lively stone,' will be brought to the spiritual temple ; many a ' hewer of wood, and drawer of water,' be raised up for the service of the sanctuary ;

many who shall be zealous co-workers with the ministers of Christ, in spreading the savour of godliness through the land; and, perhaps, not a few who shall assist in filling up the important spheres of usefulness presented by the countless islands of the Southern ocean. We now proceed to give you a sketch of the work in each of our stations:—

“*I. Sydney.*—In this flourishing town the Mission is steadily advancing.

“*The Congregations* continue to be, in general, large, respectable, and attentive. That of the Sunday evening in Macquarie-street Chapel, is by far the best we have in the Colony.

“*The Classes.* From the removal of some, and the instability of a few, the Classes have not this year improved in number, but they have advanced, ‘in the knowledge and love of our Lord Jesus Christ.’

“*The Sunday Schools* are still in active operation. The children on the books have seldom, if ever, been more in number than at present; and the proportion of those who regularly attend is rarely exceeded in institutions of the kind. The improvement of the children affords no ground of complaint, especially when there is a great want of suitable books, and a deficiency of proper teachers. Did some of our numerous friends who have lately emigrated to these shores, know how useful they might make themselves at Sydney, it is likely they would not every one resolve, as they have done, to take up their residence at Van Dieman’s Land.

“*The Auxiliary Missionary Society.* The activity and liberality of our friends in forwarding the object of this Institution, demand our warmest and most grateful acknowledgments. In the course of the last quarter we closed our second year’s accounts, when the aggregate of Donations and Subscriptions for the year, was found to be 256*l.* 2*s.* 9 $\frac{3}{4}$ *d.*

“*Preaching to Seamen.* We have now to communicate a most interesting circumstance—the contemplated establishment of a *Floating Chapel* in the harbour of Port Jackson. A few months ago, Brother CARVOSO published in the Sydney Gazette an Appeal to the Christian Public in behalf of the religious instruction of Seamen, who regularly or occasionally visit our Port: pointing out the lamentable want of accommodation for them in the public worship of Almighty God, and proposing a general Subscription for the purchase of a Floating Chapel. This communication was shortly followed by two others, on the same subject, from one of the Clergy, and from Captain WRANGLES, of the brig Anne, from Scarborough. The latter gentleman accompanied with his Letter a Subscription of 20*l.* from himself and his ship’s company. A generous impulse was by these means extensively awakened. Subscription lists were opened, and very liberally filled up, and the sum contributed in Donations and Annual Subscriptions, now amounts to about 200*l.* JOHN PIPER, Esq. J. P. the naval officer, kindly offered his valuable personal assistance in interesting the commanders of vessels; and Captain SIDDINS, of the brig Lynx, most handsomely fitted up his vessel for the purposes of a temporary Chapel, on board of which Divine service was regularly commenced, for the first time, in the spacious harbour of Port Jackson, on Sunday 17th November, when Brother ERSKINE preached

to a goodly number of sailors, from Amos iv. 12. ; and he and Brother CARVOSSO, alternately, have continued ever since, at eleven o'clock on the Sunday forenoon, to administer on the briny element 'the good word of life.' A Public Meeting, attended by some of the Clergy, and many of the Captains, was lately convened for the purpose of making arrangements for the permanent establishment of this truly useful word ; and there is now every prospect of obtaining a Floating Chapel.

" *Grose Farm*.—This is an agricultural establishment belonging to Government, three miles from town, where is a considerable number of prisoners of the crown, to whom the Sydney Preacher and the Exhorters deliver the word of God every Sabbath morning. Though no Society has hitherto been formed, we have reason to hope our labours have not been unproductive of good impressions.

" *Longbottom*.—This station, eight miles from Sydney, is in every respect similar to Grose Farm, and the same observations may be applied.

" *Botany Bay*.—At this renowned place is a Cloth Manufactory, the property of S. LORD, Esq. where we, every Sunday morning, assisted by the Exhorters, preach to a congregation consisting chiefly of prisoners. A few boys employed in the manufactory are instructed on the Lord's Day, by two or three of the more serious men. As yet, we have not been encouraged by much visible usefulness.

" Our labours in these out-stations are most essentially aided by the co-operation of our invaluable friends the Exhorters, Messrs. SCOTT, HYNDES, HOWE, and FORBES. We feel it our duty to make honourable mention of their zealous and disinterested devotedness to the work of God.

" II. *Windsor*.—This is the principal town in the extensive district of Hawkesbury, containing a population of nearly 2000 souls, and abounding with almost every species of immorality, over which the Gospel has hitherto gained but few decided conquests. So long and so deep has been the slumber of indifference to the momentous concerns of religion, that the most zealous of human efforts, if not accompanied by the more than ordinary aid of the Divine Spirit, must be quite insufficient to arouse the people to a just sense of their eternal interests. But even here the good seed has not been sown in vain ; for though much has fallen 'upon the rock of unbelief,' and much has been 'choked with cares and riches, and pleasures of this life ;' yet some has been received into 'honest and good hearts, which having heard the word, keep it, and bring forth fruit with patience :' and, in a region so sterile, the least appearance of fruitfulness cheers the heart of the toiling labourer.

" The Sunday School was, for some time, hopefully carried on by Sister CARVOSSO ; but, as it depended almost entirely on her personal exertions, a long and severe indisposition, with which she was afflicted, occasioned its suspension. Brother and Sister MANSFIELD were about to commence it, when the ill health of the latter compelled their removal : but we hope the Brother who may take this circuit will be enabled to begin anew this important work.

" The Branch Missionary Society continues to meet with very liberal support.

“ *Richmond*.—This is a thriving town, beautifully situate on the banks of the river, where we preach every Thursday evening, in a room used both as a National School and as a Church. The congregations are usually good, and their deep attention creates a hope that we shall ere long be able to form a Society, which has hitherto been impracticable.

“ *Castlereagh*.—Here we have a neat Chapel, an encouraging congregation, a small Class, a Sunday School, and a Branch Missionary Society. The members walk worthy of their profession, and a few have found peace with God. The friends are liberal in their contributions to the cause of Missions.

“ *Nepean*.—We preach here, for the present, in the house of Mr. HENRY STOCKFISH, who has kindly given a piece of ground for the erection of a Chapel, which is now nearly finished. It will be a comfortable building, and will, we hope, attract a greater number of hearers than have hitherto attended. We have a small class, whose members are sincerely seeking the salvation of their souls.

“ *Emu Plains*.—This is an extensive and beautiful estate belonging to Government, on which is a rustic village of convicts, containing, at times, four or five hundred souls. We preach sometimes in a large Tobacco-warehouse, and sometimes in the open air. The profound attention with which these unhappy men listen to the word of God, is highly gratifying.

“ *Pitt Town*.—At this place we preach once a week in the School-house, to a serious and steady congregation, and one of our Windsor members, Mr. HOLDSWORTH, visits them every other Sunday, and reads the Liturgy and delivers an exhortation.

“ *Wilberforce*.—Our labours in this town resemble, in every respect, those in Pitt Town, except that we preach every alternate Sunday and Tuesday. One of our Members having recently taken up his abode in the township, leads us to hope good may be done by the establishment of Prayer Meetings.

“ *Portland Head*.—Several serious Presbyterian emigrants reside in this settlement, and have erected a handsome stone Chapel, in which we preach every other Sunday. The congregation is serious, and much resembles that of an English village. A Sunday School is laudably conducted, but it is not connected with the Mission. On the whole, the Windsor circuit affords the *promise* of extensive good; but this can be realized by nothing less than an extraordinary degree of patient, toilsome, and prayerful exertion.

“ III. *The Parramatta Station*.—In point of seniority, this is our third circuit; but in population and prosperity, it ranks next to Sydney. The habits of society are here much less discouraging than in many other parts of the country: there is a higher tone of morality, and greater order and fidelity in the discharge of social duties; and the influences of religion have a more unobstructed spread; and the prospects of extensive usefulness are brighter and less remote.

“ *Parramatta*.—The population of this town is about 4000. The tranquillity which usually pervades its streets, together with its general aspect, much reminds us of many of the rural villages in our native land.

Its superiority, in good order and religious feeling, over most of the other townships, may be traced principally to the combined influence of the Rev. SAMUEL MARSDEN'S pastoral diligence, and of the local exertions of some of the Missionaries who retired from Otaheite.

“ Our congregations are very encouraging. The chapel is neat, commodious, and well finished; and our Mission stands indebted for its erection to the honourable zeal of our late esteemed colleague, Mr. LAWRY, who expended upon it more than 300*l.* out of his private purse.

“ The Classes are three in number, and are under the care of judicious leaders.

“ The Sunday School is peaceably and prosperously carried on, the misunderstanding which impeded its formation having, we believe, entirely subsided. The number of children has increased during the year; and some of them have made a proficiency in scriptural knowledge which, in similar institutions in England, is rarely equalled, and perhaps never excelled.

“ The Branch Missionary Society has lost none of its friends, nor has the ardour of their zeal and liberality at all abated. The Ladies' Branch is supported with exemplary vigour, and we doubt not they will be found, at the approaching Anniversary, to have prosecuted their noble work with increased activity, and with undiminished success.

“ The town of Parramatta is divided by a river, on the north side of which, though populous, no public means of grace have hitherto existed; not from any negligence on the part of the resident Missionary, or of the members, but from the total lack of any serious person whose dwelling we might use, and of any other building eligible for our purpose.

“ *Liverpool*.—This is a neat and rapidly improving town, which some predict will in time be second only to Sydney. We preach here once a week in the public School-room, and sometimes have very pleasing congregations. The excellent chaplain, the Rev. Mr. CARTWRIGHT, receives us with the cordiality of a Christian brother, and sincerely rejoices in our co-operation.

“ *Kissing Point*.—The work of God in this place, during the present year, has prospered beyond our most sanguine expectations. The district is extensive, but its population, though numerous, is so scattered as to render it at first extremely difficult to collect a congregation, and the prospect of raising a Society was very doubtful. But the Lord has poured out his Holy Spirit upon the people; and, chiefly through the instrumentality of Brother WALKER, excited in many an earnest desire to ‘flee from the wrath to come.’ Our little chapel, which was built about sixteen months ago, has of late been frequently crowded with serious and attentive hearers, on many of whom the word preached has made deep and saving impressions.

“ The change in their external character is strikingly conspicuous: idleness, dishonesty, drunkenness, sabbath-breaking—crimes to which the greater part of them were addicted—are now succeeded by an industrious, temperate, and unblemished deportment. Some of them possess useful gifts, which are not suffered to lie unimproved, but are actively exerted in conducting public prayer-meetings, and a most hopeful Sunday

School. May this gracious work continue to flourish, until it shall have spread over the whole district!

“ *Barren Ridges*.—At this place, immersed in the deep solitude of a vast forest, reside the gang of Government sawyers, who were formerly stationed at Pennant Hills, and who are all prisoners of the crown. We preach to them every sabbath morning, in a neat chapel erected by Government; and our labours have not been wholly unaccompanied by marks of usefulness, a few of them having acknowledged that the spirit of conviction has penetrated their minds.”

“ In closing our Report of this part of the District, it would be unjust to omit acknowledging, in the most grateful terms, the decided patronage and support with which we have uniformly been honoured by his Excellency Sir THOMAS BRISBANE the Governor of these Territories. In his reply to the address we presented on his assuming the administration, his Excellency was pleased to express his cordial approbation of our Mission, and most kindly to promise his protection and encouragement.

“ We trust we shall ever manifest our gratitude for his Excellency's numerous and important indulgences, by cherishing in ourselves a loyal and practical attachment to our gracious Sovereign and his government, and by our humble but zealous endeavours to promote in this remote corner of his empire, the knowledge of those Holy Oracles which, while they are ‘ able to make men wise to salvation,’ also ‘ put them in mind to be subject to principalities and powers, to obey magistrates, to be ready to every good work.’ ”

The Mission to the aboriginal inhabitants has somewhat suffered in consequence of the delicate state of Mr. WALKER's health. He has, however, employed all his strength in visiting them at their temporary settlements, gaining their confidence, and giving them the elements of instruction.

The following is the latest account received from him. It is dated Parramatta, April 29th, 1823.

“ I have sustained a very serious loss since I last wrote. Two of the most promising native youths I have met with, are gone into the eternal world. This was a sore trial. One was the son of the renowned BEN-IN-LONG, (whom I baptized, at his own very earnest request, and from a serious conviction of his fitness to be outwardly initiated into the Church of God,) THOMAS WALKER COKE. He learned to read the bible in about three months; his attention to class and prayer-meetings, was very great and encouraging. In one instance to my knowledge, (and the practice, I think, was frequent,) he collected the young natives of his own tribe, to whom he gave an exhortation, which he concluded with prayer.

“ The name of the other boy was JEMMY. He was not less promising for piety; but had not equal powers of mind. As soon, almost, as he fell sick, he went into the bush, and in a few weeks died,

“ These providential occurrences have greatly impeded the prosperity

of the work of God among the poor blacks; for they are so superstitious, that they believe the place where one has died, to be equally fatal to themselves; and they so fret as to be disordered, and often die in consequence. Being under this influence, and we having had many severe afflictions to corroborate their superstition, they fled from the Mission-house; the fear that hath torment adding wings to their flight. At present I am left with two boys; and, being in a rapid state of recovery, must go out to collect more children. One soul, however, I am happy to believe, has, out of this degraded class of human beings, by the blessing of God upon this Mission, been admitted to his glory."

Van Dieman's Land.—This Mission, though recently established, appears to have established itself with promise of great ultimate benefit to an increasing population, which greatly needs religious care and assistance. The Committee, impressed with the importance of this Station, have resolved upon the appointment of a second Missionary, with instructions to attempt the benefit also of the native tribes, whose character and wretchedness are quite as low and degraded as those of New South Wales.

Mr. HORTON's last Report of the Mission in this colony is as follows:—

"Nearly two years have now elapsed since I entered upon my work in this colony, during which time I have sincerely endeavoured to make full proof of my ministry, and to accomplish the designs of the committee in establishing this Mission.

"From his Honour Lieut. Governor SORELL, who is a very intelligent, discriminating, and able man, I have invariably received the utmost attention and kindness. He has always readily afforded me every facility in prosecuting my work.

"The same disposition, I am happy to say, has generally been manifested towards me, by the subordinate officers of the Government, and the influential inhabitants of the colony. Indeed, I may say that the inhabitants of the colony in general, of every rank, are favourably disposed towards us. Many of them are deeply conscious of their former deplorable and wretched condition, and hail as a visitation of mercy the appointment of additional Ministers among them.

"My present plan of labour is to preach twice on the Lord's day in the chapel, at eleven o'clock in the morning, and at six o'clock in the evening and once during the week—on the Wednesday evening. We hold public prayer-meetings on Monday and Friday evenings. Besides these engagements, I visit every week the Gaol, Hospital, Penitentiary, and Soldiers' Barracks, where I preach or exhort, and distribute religious tracts. Whilst Brother TURNER was here, we were enabled alternately to visit nine country settlements once a fortnight, and three or four others occasionally.

"Our system of School instruction has been considerably enlarged and improved. I have just been preparing our Second Annual Report, a copy

of which I will send you with this letter, if we get it printed in time. Lest, however, we should not, I will observe that our Sunday School in Hobart-Town has, during the last year, been regularly organized, and the number of scholars at least doubled; that we have established a School in the Penitentiary, and held meetings three evenings in the week, for the benefit of the men and boys therein confined, of whom about fifty have been more or less instructed since its commencement, and twenty-five now regularly attend; and we have also recently begun a Sabbath-School at Kangaroo-Point; attended by about eleven children. In this settlement, which lies on the other side of the river, opposite to Hobart-Town, no other School exists. Several of the children were consequently growing up in heathen ignorance. These Schools are entirely supported by a local subscription which amounted last year to 37*l.* 2*s.* 6*d.* We endeavoured to establish an Adult Evening School in the chapel, and a girls' School for instruction in plain needlework, but our efforts have proved abortive.

“ Among the great number of persons who have emigrated from England to this colony, there are fifteen or sixteen members of our Society, and four or five pious persons who have been members of dissenting churches. Several of these have settled, or are about to settle, in various parts of the interior.

“ I am very happy to say, that a few persons have been truly converted to God, and brought to the enjoyment of his saving grace. Others are convinced of sin, and earnestly seeking salvation by faith in Christ; and the deep seriousness with which our congregations generally listen to the word of God, furnishes ground to hope that the hearts of many are impressed with divine things.

“ Our labours in the Soldiers' Barracks have been the means of rescuing several from the power of Satan unto God, who are now joined with us in religious fellowship. In the Penitentiary and Hospital we have not laboured in vain. I have not the means of ascertaining the effect of our visits to the Gaol, but I am confident they are productive of good. We generally find in confinement sixty or seventy, and sometimes more, of the most depraved of the population. Amongst these some are under sentence of transportation to Macquarie-Harbour, a place to which incorrigible offenders are banished. My heart is always much affected whilst speaking to these unhappy men, and I have no doubt theirs are sometimes under a powerful and gracious influence. A few weeks ago four men were executed for sheep-stealing. These, and several others under sentence of death, but afterwards reprieved, were visited for several weeks by Brother TURNER and myself, as well as Mr. BEDFORD. They received our visits with thankfulness, and I have very little doubt that the men who were executed were truly penitent.”

New Zealand.—The accounts which were some time ago received from this country, though of a painful kind, were such as might be expected from a people savage and warlike in their habits, and uncontrolled either by laws and government, or by the

moral restraints of religion. They exhibited the country as agitated by the ferocious ambition of a few chiefs, and the cannibal inhabitants as glutting themselves with the blood of their fellow men. In this state of things the ministers of peace were little regarded; and their refusing to barter muskets and powder with the natives, at once exposed them to their displeasure, and made them suffer some inconveniences. Mr. LEIGH, in consequence of this unsettled state of affairs, and some delay having occurred in the arrival of Messrs. TURNER and WHITE, who had been sent out to join him, remained for a considerable time at one of the settlements of the Church Missionary Society; frequently visiting the natives in the neighbouring villages, and employing himself, with Mrs. LEIGH, in instructing the young people.

From letters recently received we learn that Mr. WHITE had arrived, and that the place of their future and permanent labours had been fixed. This is near the river Thames. The Island was more pacific, and the hopes of the brethren were sanguine.

The Friendly Islands.—It was not intended by the Committee that the Mission to Tongataboo should be commenced until that in New Zealand had acquired some maturity. Various circumstances have however occurred to interfere with the course of exertion and enterprize which had been previously proposed, and the Committee trust they have been in the order of Providence to effect the good desired in the best time, and the most effectual manner. In consequence of these changes, the Mission at Tongataboo has been already commenced by Mr. LAWRY, who sailed from New South Wales in July, 1822, for that Island, accompanied by some mechanics, members of the Society at Sydney. The Committee have since heard of Mr. LAWRY's safe arrival, and from the circumstances mentioned in his letters, there is good reason to hope that, by the Divine blessing, Christianity may be effectually introduced into a cluster of islands, which are of great importance as a Mission Station, both as to their population, and their relation to other islands in the same part of the world, still more populous.

The following are Extracts from Mr. LAWRY's Journal:—

“ August 16th, 1822.—After a tempestuous voyage of two months, having spent a fortnight at New Zealand, we anchored before Tonga,

and the ship was soon surrounded by hundreds of natives. This morning, WILLIAM SINGLETON, an Englishman, who had been resident on these islands since the cutting off of the Port-au-Prince, sixteen years ago, came on board. From him we learned that there is no war at present in the Friendly Islands, save at Eooa. A few minutes after SINGLETON came PALAU, one of the principal Chiefs of the island.

“ We informed PALAU that we intended to live at Tonga, and teach the people the true religion, whereby they would become wiser and better, but that we intended to proceed to Wavow and Amoa, before we finally fixed upon the island on which we should reside. SINGLETON interpreted. PALAU appeared very anxious for us to establish ourselves with him, and not think of going to any other island or place. He said that HATA, the Chief of Aheefoo, was next to him in point of power on the Tonga island; but, though he was a very good man, and would no doubt be glad if we would come and live with him, yet he had not many people, nor any land to give us, nor should we be so safe in case of war.

17th.—This morning I landed on the island of Tonga, accompanied by PALAU and SINGLETON. A very great concourse of Indians were assembled on the beach. As the landing place was bad, a very tall native waded to the boat, and took me ashore on his back. A multitude swarmed round me, but the Chief gave orders for them to form themselves into a ring: his commands were promptly obeyed, and he took his seat on one side, and desired me to come to him.

“ 22d.—I landed seven sheep, seven cows, and a bull, at Mooa, the place of PALAU’s residence. The poor natives were much amazed to see them.

“ 24th.—I am much pleased with the conduct of PALAU, and two other Chiefs, his relations. I hope our way is begining to open, by Divine Providence, for the erection of the standard of the cross at this beautiful place. We must be near a harbour, and this is the only one in the island. There are also three Hoofangas at Mooa: these are a sort of consecrated ground, into which if any man enter, he is safe from all outrage. They are the Tonga cities of refuge.

“ 27th.—I went ashore at Mafanga, accompanied by Mrs. LAWRY. My object was to meet all the Chiefs, and open to them the business upon which we were come to Tonga. Seven were present. The people, consisting of a vast crowd, the number of which I could not guess, took us into the Hoofangas, where we were introduced into a house, which consisted of a roof standing upon pillars, and floored with mats. The Chiefs came to us, and the people formed themselves into a circle outside. I presented to the Chiefs twenty chisels, and two axes, which they said was the greatest favour ever done them. The King of Britain was sending them presents: and there never was such a thing before.

“ I fully explained my object to them, and the good-will which my brethren in England bore towards them; and then proposed many questions. Their answers were very satisfactory. The substance of them was, that they would be very kind to us, and send thousands of their children to School; and added, ‘ We will come ourselves, and learn something from the white people.’ When we were coming away they detained us to partake of two large hogs, and a basket of yams, expressing great sorrow that they had nothing better to give us; ‘ if they had known it a

few days sooner they would have killed fifty hogs for us.' The old Chiefs stripped off their tappas and gave us; these were their best garments. And on their way to the boat they said to SINGLETON, with tears in their eyes, '*We had almost died before we had seen any thing.*'

" November 28.—I asked MOLAINS, an aged Chief, how old he was. He gravely replied, '*Baha mano,*' *About a thousand years.* I questioned SINGLETON upon this extraordinary reply, supposing I had misunderstood his answer; but he assured me that was his real meaning. There is scarcely a man on Tonga but thinks he has lived hundreds of years.

" I observed that the belief of these people in the doctrine of transmigration is carried to a very great extent; most of the departed spirits retire into human beings, but some of them go into rats, or rather field-mice, lizards, birds, &c. Many of them have doubts about their creed, and even inquire into ours. I comfort myself by the hope that Almighty God will cause these islanders, ere long, to be given to his Son for an inheritance.

" 29th.—At the Cava ring this morning several speeches were delivered prejudicial to our peace. An old Mataboolee named MAFE MALANGA said that the white people were come as spies, and would soon be followed by others from England, who would take away the island from them. 'See,' said he, 'these people are always praying to their Atuas, as the other Missionaries were, and what was the consequence of their praying? Why, the wars broke out, and all the old chiefs were killed.'

" November 30.—The natives are become boisterous, and somewhat to be dreaded. They have just now taken away the pit-saw from GEORGE and MACANOE, and ill used them also. SINGLETON and I went to the saw-pit, and endeavoured to reason with the men; but they made no reply, only by such signs to each other as SINGLETON understood to signify, '*Make ready; let us put an end to these Papalangee.*' The Chief being from home, we had no remedy, and were glad to get off before acts of violence were committed. 'Why do the heathen rage, and the people imagine a vain thing.'

" December 9th.—PALAU, the Chief, is now returned from his journey, to whom we have related the danger to which we have been exposed, by the savage wantonness of several natives. His anger was kindled upon hearing our relation, and the offenders took shelter in the Hoofanga, to beg pardon of the gods; this saved them from being killed at once; but still they have not escaped punishment, for the Chief has commanded them to depart his *abey*, or home. Thus, thank God, our fears of being murdered by the savages are again removed.

" 15th, Lord's Day.—We held service in the morning. In the afternoon we saw a child's finger cut off as a sacrifice to the god of war. I reasoned with them on the folly of this act; to which the Chiefs replied, 'that, as they had been fighting at the island of Eooa, the god was angry with them, and this was done to appease him.'

" These islands, of which there are 188 in number, including the Harpies and Wavow, are generally very low, not exceeding from ten to twenty feet above the sea. Eooa and Wavow are exceptions. They are all

skirted round by a reef of coral rocks, and have a beautiful appearance from the sea, being almost covered with trees, the most plentiful of which is the cocoa-nut. The open ground bears fine grass, with here and there a tuft of trees, which gives it the appearance of a fine lawn. The roads are from six to eight feet wide, and generally arched over by trees. There are, however, no rivers nor streams; though water may generally be procured by digging from six to ten feet, but it is not of a good quality."

MISSIONS IN WESTERN AFRICA.

Sierra Leone Messrs. Piggott, and Harte.

St. Mary's Messrs. Morgan and Hawkins.

Sierra Leone.—A painful dispensation of Providence has deprived this Mission of both its Ministers, and in rapid succession. Mr. LANE had been in a delicate state of health for some time; and Mr. HUDDLESTONE, after having enjoyed tolerable health for three years, was taken off, when on the point of returning home, by the yellow fever, which a few months ago proved so fatal to the inhabitants.

In a letter dated April 20th, 1823, Mr. HUDDLESTONE reports the death of Mr. LANE.

"I cannot describe the grief and poignant sorrow which Mrs. H. and myself feel at the death of our respected and much-loved Brother. The Society have mingled their tears with ours; and during his sickness, and at his funeral, our members manifested their love for him, as a friend and brother, and as a Minister of Christ. I may add, that as far as he was known by the principal inhabitants of Sierra Leone, and St. Mary's on the Gambia, he was particularly respected.

"On Thursday morning, the 17th, a general invitation to attend the funeral of Mr. LANE was given to our members and friends in Free-Town, Congo-Town, and Portuguese-Town. His Honour the Chief Justice, the Rev. S. FLOOD, first Colonial Chaplain, GEORGE NICOL, Esq., and other Europeans, met at the Mission-house: to these were added a numerous assembly of other friends. The corpse was carried from the Mission-house to our new Chapel, where the Rev. S. FLOOD kindly read the funeral service. Afterwards it was removed to the Colonial Burial-ground, and I committed him to the grave.

"The state of Brother LANE's mind, previous to his death, appears to have been ripe for beholding and enjoying his glorified Redeemer. Having left all to follow and serve Christ, he had received, and was enjoying, 'an hundred fold,' when his Lord came, in an hour when he thought not, to add to it 'eternal life.' The day but one before he died, I had particular conversation with him upon this subject: he conversed in

a most affectionate, peaceful, and contented disposition of mind. The same day Mrs. H. said to him, 'It is desirable that you should get better.' He replied, 'I have no particular desire either to die or to live.' A friend having visited him the day before he died, in answer to some questions, Mr. LANE said, 'I think the Lord is going to cut my work short.' When the same friend was about to leave him, Mr. LANE said, 'Brother, we must remember to do what the Apostle advises, 'Pray one for another.' With Mrs. H. he frequently had, during his sickness, spiritual and edifying conversation."

Mr. HUDDLESTONE died July 20, and from his Widow we have the following particulars :

"On Sunday the 13th, he read prayers, and preached. On the following day the fever returned with greater violence. Dr. B., our friends, and myself, again resumed our exertions to save his valuable life ; but I was soon convinced of the fatal truth, that our exertions could not save him, unless the Lord moved out of his ordinary way to help us, as it was evident, from the colour of his skin, that his complaint was that dreadful disease which had of late proved so fatal to the lives of Europeans at Free-Town, the yellow fever. He had much bodily suffering, but patience had its perfect work in him. He was resigned to the will of God, and at every interval of ease he cried, 'O, how good the Lord is, how gently he deals with me ; praise him for his mercies !' On the 18th he inquired of me if I thought he should recover. I told him faithfully that I wished him to be aware of his state, and that I had reason to believe we soon should part. He then said, he had not a doubt of his acceptance with God, through the blood of his Saviour ; that his prospect of heaven was comforting : 'Yes,' added he, 'I shall be carried by angels into glory : I have no wish to live but to preach to the people, and take care of you ; but the Lord will do all things well.' He then gave himself up to prayer and praise ; and to every question relative to the state of his mind, his answers were satisfactory. He charged me to tell the Committee that he had exerted every nerve in the cause of the Mission ; and that he was dying happy in the faith."

From the members of the Society the Committee have received a pleasing testimony to the character and usefulness of the excellent men who have thus laid down their lives in the work of God ; and a pressing entreaty to have Ministers sent out to them. The Maroon chapel at Free-Town, which will contain 600 persons, is now occupied ; and the new chapel at Portuguese-Town, to which his Excellency the Governor has kindly presented two donations, is also finished.* The Mission was in a rising and very

* Besides the general patronage which has been constantly given to the Mission by Sir Charles M'Carthy, and several instances of liberality for its

promising state, when the painful visitations above mentioned took place. Messrs. PIGGOTT and HARTE, are about to sail for this Station; and the stay of Missionaries there is now limited to two years.

St. Mary's.—Mr. MORGAN continues at St. Mary's. The Mission at Mandanaree was suspended, on account of his ill state of health; and though now recovered, the work at St. Mary's fully occupies his attention. There he has a native Congregation, a Society of twenty-four Negroes, and a School. The Committee are about to send out an additional Missionary to his assistance, when a station up the Gambia, which has been established by the local government, will be occupied in preference to Mandanaree.

MISSIONS IN SOUTHERN AFRICA.

The Mission in Cape Town is thus noticed in a recent communication from Mr. B. SHAW:

“Thousands of the inhabitants of this town are in a state of slavery; and with such we have to do. With much labour we have succeeded in the erection of a place of worship for them, without any expense to the Committee, in which both children and adults are regularly taught. Our English congregation is comparatively small: they have one sermon a week only.

“Our Dutch congregation has service twice a week; it consists of slaves, free persons of colour, the children of the school, and a few Christians. Hitherto we have seen but little fruit of our labour; yet we hope that the good seed will one day spring up, and yield a plentiful harvest. Some of the rising generation indeed promise fair, though few of them have parents who can speak to them of the importance of religion; yet many have formed so strong an attachment to us, and to the means of grace, that to prevent their attendance at the School and Meeting,

encouragement, it ought to have been stated in a late Report, that Mr. Davies, late one of the Society's Missionaries there, had a liberal annual allowance from him, in consideration of his labours among the negroes; by which the general Mission Fund was in that proportion saved

would be considered as one of the greatest punishments. I am glad to find that the different Churches in England are more than ever convinced of the necessity of an outpouring of the SPIRIT OF GOD upon the heathen world, and that they appear to be praying for it, and expecting it. May their prayers be answered !

“ Our School consists of the greatest possible variety ; here are the aged learning to spell with spectacles, and babes who can just walk ; here are children of Heathens, Mahometans, and Christians ; faces of every colour, and countenances of every expression ; some slaves as white as Europeans ; some free, as black as jet. Amongst all this variety, however, we have but one who is learning the English language.”

From *Khamies Berg*, in *Little Namacqualand*, no recent detailed accounts have been received ; but, with the exception of great damage done to the chapel and other buildings, by the great hurricane, the Station is in a state of increasing prosperity, both as to the temporal condition of the natives (who in this respect are reaping the advantages of Christianity), and to their moral and religious improvement. This Station, the first occupied by our Mission, has not only a considerable Society connected with it, but has furnished *two pious Hottentot Assistant Missionaries*, from one family, to assist in spreading the Gospel in Southern Africa. One has been employed with Mr. ARCHBELL, among the Great Namacquas, and the other is usefully employed in the neighbourhood of Khamies Berg.

The exceedingly disturbed state of the Great Namacqualand country, in consequence of the wars in which the different tribes have been engaged, and the roaming habits of the people generally, have led Mr. SHAW and the brethren to resolve upon forming a settlement on a bay on the western coast. The place they have fixed upon is Woolwich Bay, about the twenty-second degree of south latitude, a situation which appears to be of importance both from its neighbourhood to the Great Namacquas and the Damaras, and from the circumstance that it is strongly probable that an intercourse is carried on by traffic among the natives, quite across the Continent, to the Portuguese settlements on the eastern side. The arrival of another Missionary is waited for in order to the commencement of this enterprise.

The *Albany* Mission has been reinforced by Mr. YOUNG, so that here are three Missionaries on this Station. The intention of

thus increasing the number of Missionaries was to afford Mr. W. SHAW the opportunity of accomplishing his earnest wishes in so extending the range of Missionary Stations to the neighbouring settlements, as to afford to the numerous Hottentots resident within them the means of instruction; and also to commence a Mission among the Caffres. In reference to the latter, the brethren recently took a journey into Caffre land, and had an interview with the King. They found the country populous, and the people well acquainted both with the character and objects of Missionaries, and well disposed to receive them. More recently this new Mission has been commenced, and thus the progress of the Gospel up the populous Eastern Coast of Africa will be advanced by another important step.

The following is Mr. W. SHAW's last communication, dated Graham's Town, Albany, August 28, 1823.

“ With the view of arranging with the Caffre Chiefs, and of selecting a situation for our first Missionary station in Caffreland, I took a journey into that country, the latter end of July, and returned in the beginning of this month. Of the particulars of my journey you shall hear shortly, by means of my detailed journal for that period, and which I will transcribe as soon as I can obtain a little leisure; but I am anxious to send this off, that you may be acquainted with the general result. Through the good hand of God upon me, my life was not only preserved while travelling on horseback among barbarous and savage men, and wild beasts; but my health also, notwithstanding my generally sleeping on the ground, in the open air, and experiencing very heavy rains during the journey. These, however, are comparatively small mercies, to the more important particular of having, through the blessing of God, succeeded in my object far beyond my most sanguine expectations. I travelled through the country, from the residence of the Government Missionaries, which is in the neighbourhood of King Gaika, toward the coast where the district of Caffreland, under the immediate jurisdiction of the Chief or King Pato, is situated; and in which district I was desirous of selecting a spot for the station, should the Chief prove favourably disposed. Pato is son and heir of old Congo, who was killed some years ago in a war with the Colonists. The eldest son of Congo, who bears his name, was for several years Regent of this country, during the minority of his younger brother Pato, who, in consequence of his being the son of old Congo's Tambookie wife, is, by the established law of succession, the proper heir to the authority; and having come of age, he lately assumed his power; as a proof of which, we noticed hung up in his cattle-kraal, an elephant's tail, the ensign of royalty in Caffreland. I am happy to inform you, that not only Pato, but all his brothers, in-

cluding Congo, the late Regent, and also a number of his inferior Captains and Counsellors, assembled on the occasion, acceded with evident pleasure to the proposal of our commencing a Mission amongst them; and they have given the best proof of their friendly disposition, by allowing me to take possession of a place for the station, which lies between the immediate residence of Pato and that of his elder brother Congo. I might, no doubt, have found other spots better adapted, in some respects, for a Missionary village, than that for which I asked Pato, and which he so freely gave me; but the laws and government of the Caffre nation, in many things, are so peculiar, that I discovered that for the King and principal headmen to live immediately upon the station, would be a decided and great advantage to the Mission. The place itself, however, is not objectionable; on the contrary, those by whom I was accompanied (the Rev. Mr. THOMSON of Chumie, Mr. SHEPSTONE, and the interpreter,) all pronounced it an extremely fine one. We saw as many kraals, or villages, within two miles of the place, as must contain a population of at least a thousand souls; and this number will doubtless be increased from other parts, as soon as the Mission is established. The scenery around the place is pretty; there is a very sufficient supply of water; abundance of grass; and, from what we could learn, good timber at no great distance: it has also the advantage of proximity to the sea, being not more than ten miles from the mouth of the river Kalumna, where there is abundance of fish."

Still higher up the Eastern Coast of Africa a large tract of land has been ceded to the British Government, near Delagoa-Bay. One of the stipulations of the natives was, that they should be furnished with Christian teachers; and Captain OWEN, the officer who conducted the negotiation, being about to sail from the Cape to his new settlement, took with him Mr. THRELFALL, who is now employed there. Mr. WHITWORTH, late Missionary to the West Indies, has been appointed to take charge of this Station, and has lately sailed. This station derives additional importance from its being nearly opposite to St. Augustin's Bay, on the South West coast of MADAGASCAR; a part of that island not yet visited by any Missionaries, but to which the Committee have just appointed *two*. This new Mission will be commenced as soon as arrangements can be made in South Africa, to send two experienced Missionaries for this service, whose places will be immediately supplied from home. A regular communication may probably be opened between these stations, which will be beneficial to each.

We have been favoured from good authority, with an account of

the population of the countries in the neighbourhood of Delagoa Bay.

“*Inyack* extends from the cape and island of that name, to the southward on the coast to the river. The natives are a naked, timid race: they have no religion whatever, yet use circumcision, and are under the influence of witchcraft. Their King is tributary to the King of Mapoota. The population is about ten thousand inhabitants. *Mapoota* is bounded on the north by Delagoa-Bay. The people are a warlike and admirable race of Caffres: in manners they resemble those of *Inyack*, and like them have no religion. Mapoota contains 20,000 inhabitants. The people of *Temby* are tractable and industrious. *Temby* and *Panyelly* have 25,000 inhabitants at least. Mapoota and Panyelly are tributary to *Temby*; so that the last is the principal state, and it is to the dominions of the King of *Temby* that the Mission has been sent.”

From Messrs. HODGSON and BROADBENT, who, with their wives, had been for some time travelling in the extensive country of the Boschuanas, in order to fix upon the most suitable place for a Mission settlement, no intelligence was for some time received, and the Committee had become very anxious respecting their safety, on account of the disturbed state of the Boschuana country, which had been invaded by a powerful predatory party from the North. We have at length received letters from them, which are of a very gratifying nature, both as they state their personal safety, and the commencement of a Missionary establishment in a part of the country which promises to open the door to the diffusion of Christianity among a numerous people. The new stations in South Africa, to which Providence has lately directed the Brethren, appear, without design, to have brought a very extensive and populous part of the eastern country within the range of Missionary operations. The Caffre Mission, which has been entered upon by Mr. W. SHAW; the Boschuana Mission, commenced by Messrs. HODGSON and BROADBENT; and the Delagoa-Bay Mission, where Mr. THRELFALL is now employed, and to which Mr. WHITWORTH has just sailed, will form three important points, at a great distance from the operations of other Missionary Societies, from which, should the divine blessing attend the work, a chain of Mission Stations may be in future drawn, so as to bring the numerous tribes of this large portion of the Continent from the eastern coast, considerably in the interior, into the fold of CHRIST.

The following are extracts from the communications recently received from the Boschwana Mission. In a joint letter, dated July 1st, 1823, from Maquasse, Messrs. HODGSON and BROADBENT write :—

“ It will give you pleasure, while it is to us a cause of much rejoicing, that the LORD has enabled us to form a Missionary Station, which, after three months' experience, promises to be a permanent one; and with a chief and people, by whom we were received with open arms, and whose conduct uniformly denotes a desire for our continued residence among them. The *Maquasse* Mountains, in the neighbourhood of which we reside, and which give the name to this Boschwana town, are situated, we believe, about three degrees east of the junction of the Craddock, and one day's journey north of the Great or Yellow River. Our houses stand near a small fountain; and the cattle, we are informed, will always have a supply of water from two small rivers near us, and abundance of grass from an extensive plain, by which the mountains are surrounded. The air is most salubrious, and the soil evidently capable of improvement by cultivation. In respect to situation, we are where we wish. SIBBUNEL, the name of the chief with whom we are, is the person mentioned by Mr. CAMPBELL, vol. ii. p. 357, whose former residence was Kwattaba, or, as Mr. C. names it, Yattaba, from which he retired upon the approach of a Commando out of the North. At present, he and his people are here in temporary houses; but we have the most solemn assurances that their permanent ones will be built here, as soon as the country is relieved from the confusion in which it yet remains, from the terror excited by the operations of their enemies. SIBBUNEL is of considerable consequence among the different tribes around us, and, from the attentions shown by the small parties who have occasionally visited him, apparently respected. Though a heathen, he is shrewd and sensible; rules his people with authority; possesses abundance of cattle; and shows friendship for us, and confidence in us, on all occasions. We cannot give a correct estimate of the people attached to him, as they are scattered at the different cattle-posts; but on one occasion we found his village to consist of 500 houses. The population around us is, as far as we have seen and heard, considerable; and several villages may be visited on horseback; and all, from whom inquiries have been made, state the population east of us, to be immense. We are, thank God, in the Boschwana country, amongst those whose language is spoken by many tribes, and where a door is opened to a large field of usefulness for missionary exertion, among an interesting people, who will, when the Gospel prevails amongst them, greatly excite the interest of the religious world. The people are absolute heathens; and though some of them admit the existence of both a good and a bad Being, superior to themselves, yet they candidly confess that they know nothing relative to the soul, or a future state of existence: but the Gospel has not the rubbish of idolatry to remove before its foundation can be laid, for we have not seen the smallest vestige of religious worship amongst them.”

With respect to the Albany Mission, Mr. W. SHAW, writes :—

“ The Graham’s-Town Chapel, which is a neat and substantial stone building, was opened on the 10th of November last. I preached in the morning ; Mr. KAY in the afternoon, in Dutch ; and Mr. THRELFALL in the evening. Mr. BARKER, the London Society’s Missionary, assisted in the services, and preached on the next evening. I cannot describe what I felt while sitting in the pulpit, and beholding before me Europeans and Africans in a mixed group, in a chapel which had cost me no common pains and perplexity in erecting, owing to a variety of circumstances, which I could neither foresee nor control. When I considered how God had blessed, in the short space of about two years, our small and obscure beginning in Graham’s-Town, I indeed ‘ thanked God, and took courage.’ It was mentioned at the opening, as a motive for those present to give something more than on any common occasion, that this chapel is the first substantial building ever erected for the worship of God in the whole of the important and rising district of Albany. I feel the more sincere gratitude to those friends who, by affording their pecuniary aid, enabled us to effect this important and new thing in Graham’s-Town. A few individuals whose names I would mention, but that they love to do good in private, rendered us the most praiseworthy assistance. The chapel has been well attended ever since it was opened : all the pews are let, and more are erecting, to give additional accommodation to the persons not yet provided with seats. I hope much good will be done in that chapel to those who attend.

“ We commenced a Sunday-School in Graham’s-Town immediately after the chapel was opened, in which there are about sixty scholars. We need very much a building for a school-house and chapel, for the Hottentots of Graham’s-Town, to be erected near the barracks. A great and good work might be expected to be done among them if this were effected ; but we cannot expect much unless we have such a place. About 500 rix-dollars have been subscribed, principally by the Hottentots themselves, towards this object ; but we cannot enter upon it until we receive your reply to our request in the annual minutes sent home two months ago, for a grant of 50*l.* to aid us in carrying our plan into execution.

“ The Salem Chapel was opened on the 31st December, when Brother THRELFALL preached, and we held a watch-night. On the 1st of January Mr. BARKER, of Theopolis, preached, and Mr. KAY in the evening. Every one was affected with the consideration that a Christian congregation was now assembled, in a commodious and substantial place of worship, where, less than three years ago, the silence of the desert was undisturbed by the exercise of divine worship. I hope this chapel will prove a blessing to future generations. It has cost me a great deal of trouble, as I had personally to superintend the building in its progress : but the poor people have helped as far as their peculiar circumstances and poverty would allow. At one end of the building a school-room is partitioned off : we have fitted it up with desks, &c., in a convenient manner, and through the medium of H. RIVERS, Esq., our Landdrost, the Governor has appointed Mr. MATTHEWS (mentioned in a former letter) to be schoolmaster to the settlers at Salem and

its neighbourhood, with a salary from the Colonial Government; the only instance of the kind as yet in Albany. Thus our people will have the benefit of a free Day-school, as well as a Sunday-school, for their children.

“As it respects the Hottentot congregation at Graham’s Town, it is as full of promise as those on any of our stations in South Africa. It has continued to improve in number and regularity for some time past, although my opportunities of attending to it have necessarily been few and interrupted. I have, at length, the satisfaction of reporting to you, that I have formed a Society among them.

“They speak in a most gratifying manner of their views and feelings, in reference to the great affairs of eternity. You would be highly pleased could you hear the sweet harmony with which these poor Hottentots sing the praises of God, and see the eagerness with which they hear the word.”

WEST INDIAN MISSIONS.

In every part of the West Indies the opportunity of extending the Mission so as to bring a still greater number of the black and coloured population under instruction both in the towns and on estates, is almost as favourable as could be wished; and nothing is wanting but the means of sending out more labourers still more widely to scatter the seed of truth, order and happiness, and, by the blessing of God, to make a more effectual impression upon the remaining paganism and immorality of these important dependancies of the British empire.

For the success which has accompanied the labours of his servants who have succeeded each other in the toil of negro instruction, the Committee desire to offer their grateful acknowledgments to Almighty God, and to express their admiration of the patience, zeal, prudence and self denial of those excellent men who have made so many sacrifices for this benevolent object. In almost every British Colony in that quarter the work has been *begun*; Christian Societies have been raised up from amongst the most degraded, and the most neglected of men; Sunday Schools have in many islands been established, and, in some instances, upon a large scale; places of worship erected, which the negroes regard as peculiarly their own, and to which they flock to engage in those holy services which, in their effects, afford them comfort in their toils, and

cheering and hallowing hopes beyond the grave; and a *system*, so to speak, of religious operation has been put into activity which, by God's blessing, is bringing with every year a still greater number of those ignorant Africans into the light of our divine religion, and into its "*way of peace*."

The number of Missionaries now employed in the West Indies is fifty; the number of persons in our Society, 19 out of 20 of whom are slaves, is 26,171; and the number of children under regular instruction is upwards of 6000, exclusive of those, who though not taught in Schools, are regularly catechised by the Missionaries and others at the several Stations.

Cheering, however, as are these sacred triumphs of the holy zeal of Missionaries abroad; and of the noiseless liberality of Christians at home; beautiful as are those moral scenes in which the negroe's *house of prayer*, and his now sanctified *home* of quiet and religious enjoyment, form the leading objects; exhilarating to the best feelings of the heart as the reflection must be, that in those islands where formerly all was harsh dominion on one part, and gloomy subjection on the other, and where misery only found solace in wild riot and disgusting gratification, so many thousands are now partakers with us "of the common salvation," and are following to a better state the thousands who have already passed through death, cheered with the light and hope and faith of that Christianity which would *to this hour* have been still unknown to them but for Missionary Agents, and Missionary Societies; the British Colonies still present themselves before us as parts of our empire which call for deep commiseration, and a sympathy still more active and efficient. The vast majority of the black and coloured population are still "*as sheep having no shepherd*," sealed up in African darkness, debased at once by superstition and vice, without the sanctities of marriage, unameliorated by firm and lasting domestic relations, and doomed to the wretchedness of a state of uncorrected, and even of *unreproved* vice. But affecting as this condition of so numerous a class of our fellow beings, and fellow subjects is, it is not *hopeless*. The facts just stated are sufficiently in proof, that their case may be reached, and not only mitigated, but remedied, by the piety and charity of the British public. The

capacity of the negroes to be instructed, once so strenuously denied, and their docility, and willingness to learn the Gospel, have been fully established; for in no part of the world has the heart of man poured forth a gratitude more prompt and copious to those who have preached unto them the words of life, and by no people have those words of hope and promise been more joyfully received. Vices once thought invincible, and especially polygamy, have given place to the moralizing influence of Religion; so that the Mission can exhibit Societies, in some places of between two and three thousand negroes, living in the same neighbourhood, from which this evil has been completely banished, and where the benefits of the institution of marriage have displayed themselves in well ordered and peaceful families, most eminently demonstrating the connexion of religion with personal morals, social felicity, and the good order of Society.

For the constant enlargement of so great a work, a pledge is given both in the increasing concern for the religious welfare of the negroes by many West Indian proprietors themselves, and by the growing interest which is felt at home for a race of men, to whom, from its former neglect, the country owes so much. As to the former, the Committee are happy to state, that not a cold permission, as formerly, has of late been given by many proprietors to allow the Missionaries to visit their estates, but the good offices of Missionaries have been solicited; and that not only on the ground of the interest which every proprietor must have in the improved moral condition of his people, but, in some instances, the Committee are happy to add, from a *conscientious regard to duty*, and a *pious concern* for their moral and eternal happiness. From the growth of such sentiments at home and abroad, the best hopes may be formed that many obstacles to the improvement of the slaves of our Colonies will be removed, and that by the application of more copious means, and more numerous instruments, they will at length exhibit a population as much *cared for*, and as well *instructed*, as it has been *neglected* and *benighted*.

In the course of the last year, great excitement was produced by the agitation of measures in Parliament respecting the Slave population of the West Indies; and the unhappy insurrection

in the colony of Demerara, exposed us, through various unfounded reports, to temporary reflections and slanders. These have all been removed by the facts which we were able to give to the world, of the peaceable conduct of our Missionaries and Societies there; and though under the influence of mistaken views, and some false representations, a riot was produced in Barbadoes, which issued in the demolition of our Mission Chapel, in Bridge Town, by a lawless mob; yet the Committee regard this as the ebullition of the moment, and rejoice in knowing that the great cause of enlightening and moralizing the slaves of the West Indies, by means of religious instruction, is daily gaining new friends among those whose connexion with those colonies is the most intimate and influential. The particulars as to the events alluded to, so far as our Missions are concerned, will be found a few pages onward, under the heads of *Barbadoes* and *Demerara*.

The cause of the religious instruction of the slave population of the West India Colonies, has, during the last year, been ably advocated in a pamphlet, entitled, "A Letter on the Means and Importance of Converting the Slaves in the West Indies to Christianity, by the Right Hon. Sir GEORGE HENRY ROSE;" and the impression produced by his statements, and the force of his truly Christian appeals to the best feelings and the most sacred principles, in behalf of the adoption of general and comprehensive measures for their moral improvement, promise to awaken a concern more lively and more extensive than has ever yet been cherished for the attainment of an object so essentially connected with the peace and welfare of the Colonies themselves; and with the present and everlasting interests of *eight hundred thousand* of our fellow-creatures. For the liberal manner in which the labours of the Wesleyan Missionaries are mentioned among others, the Committee offer their thanks to this benevolent and able advocate of the diffusion of Christian knowledge and Christian principles, as the basis of all morality and civil happiness. They trust that the effect of the diffusion of such sentiments as this excellent pamphlet contains, and of the obligations which it so convincingly establishes, will be to excite those Societies which are already engaged in the work to increase the number of their agents, and to labour in it with

renewed zeal. The field is so wide and so uncultivated, as to call for the co-operation of all to bring it under moral culture; and the Committee may pledge themselves in behalf of the Wesleyan Missionary Society, that every new opening for the extension of this benefit, will to the utmost of their power, be promptly and efficiently embraced.*

FROM the Jamaica minutes we have the gratifying intelligence that the increase of the Societies there during the last year was upwards of 800 members, making the whole number in Society in that island 8500, being an increase [during the last ten years of near 7000 persons, almost exclusively negroes and people of colour. The progress of the work of God in this island, has, therefore, been most encouraging. A new Chapel is building in Kingston, which is intended to seat 2500 persons; and in the manner in which this

* Some objections have been started in two or three publications, to the calculations in Sir G. H. ROSE's pamphlet, of the number of slaves and people of colour already benefitted by Christian instruction, as being too high. The object of the benevolent writer was clearly, not to hide the lamentable moral condition of these classes in the least, but to encourage exertion, by showing that the work was hopeful, and that by the application of even limited means, much good had been effected. As to other Societies, we believe the number to be rather below the fact than above it; and as to our own Society, we know it to be so. They are calculations which the Committee never published, because our method has been to report only our numbers in Society, exclusive of our congregations, and the number of children under instruction.

large undertaking has been encouraged by many of the respectable inhabitants, a pleasing proof is afforded of the progress of sentiments friendly to the religious instruction of the negro population, several persons of influence having subscribed liberally to its erection. The objections against regular Sunday Schools for the children of the negroes, are more powerful in Jamaica than in many other parts of the West Indies, which accounts for the small number of those Institutions connected with our Mission there. The number, we are however happy to add, is increasing.

The following are Extracts from the Reports of the state of the different Mission Stations on the Minutes of the last District Meeting.

Kingston.—"On account of the New Chapel being in the course of erection on the site of a former one, we have had only one Chapel in this city these six months, and a considerable number of our people have been nearly excluded from public worship on the sabbath day. We have, however, endeavoured as much as possible to meet their case by prayer meetings, and private instructions, that all might have their portion of religious care. The openings which we have had in the neighbourhood at Stoney Hill, and Port Royal, are very promising. The places in which we hold service, are filled with attentive hearers of all ranks. Our whole increase on this Station this year is 303 members; and when our new Chapel shall be opened, we doubt not but that the work in this place will abundantly increase. We are also glad to have it in our power to state, that in this city the holy sabbath has received more sanction lately than before, the Magistrates having taken an active part in preventing all trading on that day. Number in Society 3990—Port Royal, 32."

Grateful Hill.—"The present prospects of this Station are very encouraging; much religious concern has lately been manifested by the negroes, and though many of them reside at a great distance from the Chapel, yet such is their desire to be instructed, that they make the most extraordinary exertions to attend our services.

"Many of the neighbouring gentlemen, both Overseers and Proprietors, are becoming better acquainted with our doctrines, discipline, and objects, and regard our labours as calculated to promote the good both of servants and masters.

"The increasing seriousness of our hearers, and the earnest inquiries which many have made after instruction, inspire the hope that the Lord will give his blessing to the instituted means of grace, which are increasingly attended, and that great good will be done. Number in Society, 479."

Spanish Town.—"In this town and its vicinity, genuine religion has made as yet but partial progress. Hundreds, yea thousands of the slaves,

are living without God in the world. We are happy, however, to state, that there are in this community many who form a truly pleasing contrast. A disposition to hear the word of God has been excited to a considerable extent, so that the places of divine worship are in general well attended. In the Established Church there is a congregation of about six hundred, consisting of white, coloured, and black, who hear with great attention. In the Baptist Chapel from 200 to 250, regularly attend, and in our own from 400 to 500. Of these many have received the word of God in truth, and are walking worthy of their profession. Their experience is deep, and scriptural; and their deportment sober, godly, and righteous. Number in Society 259."

Morant Bay.—"Here the Chapel is generally well filled, particularly on the Sunday mornings, chiefly by the slaves from the estates in the neighbourhood of the Bay. There is also an increasing zeal manifested by both leaders and people, so that on the whole our prospects are pleasing. Number in Society 1733."

Bath.—"Our congregations are large on Sundays, and indeed too large for our present Chapel, which though new and scarcely paid for, ought to be at least twice its size. Our negro hearers are willing to be instructed. The white gentlemen cheerfully acknowledge the change which has been wrought on the negroes in Society. In consequence of an increase of leaders the Society is in a great measure brought into a very good state of discipline and regularity; so that our present circumstances afford encouragement to hope for future success. Number in Society 1642."

Manchioneal.—"We are happy to state that our new Chapel is already too small for us, so much so, that it would not be more than sufficient to accommodate the congregation comfortably, although it were nearly one half larger. This ardent desire to hear the word of God reminds us that 'The fields are already white unto the harvest.' Much has already been done both among the slaves and free people of colour, and we have also the most cheering prospects of greater good in this very important Station. The number in Society is included in the Bath return."

Montego Bay Circuit.—"Of the spiritual state of the Society in this Circuit there is every reason to speak well. The negro portion of the Society, who, from their peculiar situation, require the most sedulous attention, have shown a marked concern for the 'things belonging to their peace,'—so that if attachment to the means of grace, and *love to Christ, obedience, truth, and fidelity* in their station, be considered proofs of a change of heart, over *these* we may rejoice as the fruit of our labours.

"The congregations on the Lord's Day are large and deeply attentive. The Magistrates and leading persons in the parish are friendly to our exertions. Number in Society 235."

Extract of a letter from Mr. RATCLIFFE, dated Montego Bay, August 8th, 1823.

"Since my last communication, I have been invited to preach on another estate in the parish, called the Spring, which has 290 negroes. Not long ago, six or seven of them applied to the Attorney to be instructed i

religion: they said to him, ‘ Massa, we bin baptized, but it no make we better; make Minister come and teach we about JESUS.’ He heard this with astonishment; and the last time I was at Barrett-Hall, told me, and requested I would come and preach to them. Yesterday being my day for Blue-hole, I rode to Spring, preached to them for the first time, at one o’clock, and proceeded to Blue-hole, and preached at seven.

“The Committee will perceive, that I have three estates under my care, which have on them nearly 1000 negroes, besides the extending work of the town. Can they hesitate a moment in allowing a second Missionary for this Circuit under these circumstances? In addition to all this, persons of all ranks possess a most friendly disposition towards our cause and Missionaries. My time is now nearly up on the north side; but I assure you, the prospect of doing good to the negroes is such, that my heart would almost break with grief, if I could for a moment suppose, that you would not immediately send more help to this by far the most healthy and beautiful part of Jamaica, covered, as it is, with so large a population.”

St. Ann’s Circuit.—“This infant Circuit offers considerable promise of ultimate success. The congregations are regular. The Society though small, has steadily persevered through much reproach, and has received an increase during the year, especially in the country; and their general uniform and Christian deportment show how much they have profited by the Gospel. Number in Society 125.”

“The total number of members in Society in Jamaica, is 8495.”

ANTIGUA.—“The last year has been to the members of our Society a year of trial; but whilst we have been called upon to sympathize with them in their great distress, we have rejoiced in their resignation to the painful dispensations of Divine Providence.

“We have received on trial, as candidates for Society, in the course of the year, as follows; *St. John’s*, 164, *Parham*, including *Zion Hill*, 480, and *English Harbour*, including *Lyon’s* and *Willoughby Bay*, 229.

“We have witnessed an attention to the preaching of the word, which

could only arise from a love of the truth, and a desire to partake of its benefits. Our Sacramental seasons have uniformly been solemn, and well attended. On these occasions we estimate that on an average five hundred persons join with us at St. John's, one hundred and fifty at English Harbour, two hundred at Lyon's, fifty or sixty at Willoughby Bay, from fifty to sixty at Zion Hill, and three hundred at Parham. There is one circumstance connected with the religious state of our Societies, which when viewed prospectively is calculated to excite much hope:—the number of young persons united to us, whose minds are already well stored with religious truth. Their regular attendance on religious ordinances, their renunciation of the ensnaring follies of youth, and their truly Christian lives, afford us great satisfaction. Thus whole families are growing up in the fear of the Lord, and the effect upon posterity cannot be estimated. In the course of the past year many of our oldest members have been removed to a better world. Number in Society, 4560."

DOMINICA. Rosseau.—"The Society is remarkable for steadiness, and for regular attendance on the means of grace. Several have died during the past year, most of whom we have reason to believe died in the Lord. Much inconvenience has arisen from the loss of the Chapel formerly occupied by the Society, but this will soon be remedied by the opening of a commodious one now erecting."

St. Joseph's.—"The congregation has been increasing during the year, and the members of Society appear to be growing in knowledge, and in grace. Free access is afforded to the Missionaries to all the estates in the neighbourhood, and the accounts given by some of the managers respecting the conduct of those negroes who are members of the Society, are very satisfactory"

"*Prince Rupert's* is apparently a productive field of labour, but owing to the unhealthiness of the place it cannot be made the regular residence of a Missionary, and its distance renders it impracticable to visit it as often as it is desirable. The congregations are usually good, and the marked attention and tears of the hearers, show that the word is not lost upon them. Several have been added to the Society in the course of the year. The windward part of the island affords a considerable field for Missionary exertions."

In a letter dated May 29th, Mr. CATTS observes :

"It affords me much pleasure to state that our new chapel at Rosseau was opened on Lord's Day, the 11th inst. To us it was an occasion of no small interest; and, I believe, our friends in general partook in our joy. The Right Hon. the Earl of HUNTINGDON, with his usual condescension, did us the honour of attending the forenoon service. His Lordship was accompanied by his daughter, Lady SELINA HASTINGS, and several most respectable Ladies and Gentlemen, amongst whom were the Chief Judge, the Hon. A. GLOSTER, and the Attorney General the Hon. W. BLANE. The time was solemn as well as joyful, and, I trust, will be remembered with good effect. In the group of worshippers, I could not but observe the negroes, whose sable faces, bathed with the

tears of gratitude, formed a striking contrast to those countenances whose sparkling eyes expressed unfeigned delight. The collection amounted to 60*l.* currency, which makes the contributions towards the chapel, in all, nearly 1000*l.* currency, about half of the whole cost of erection and purchase of land. The congregation, since the opening, has been good, and promises to continue so, especially on Sabbath evenings.

“ Mr. LAING’s estates continue to be visited regularly by Brother HARRISON, and afford considerable encouragement. Several of the negroes have lately joined the Society; and many, who have been members for some time, walk worthy of their high vocation. The children are regularly catechised on the different estates, when the Missionary pays his preaching visits. The number in Society in Dominica, is 438.

MONTserrat.—“ The congregations are serious and attentive. Their attendance has been regular throughout the year, except for a short time in the wet season when sickness prevailed. Since Christmas the chapel has been more crowded with slaves from the neighbouring estates. Many of the inhabitants, particularly in town, have remarked that ‘ they never recollected a less riotous, and more Christian-like observance of the Christmas holidays.’ On the estate belonging to the Chief Judge there are upwards of forty who have generally attended service, and been catechized, whose morals are evidently improved, notwithstanding the disadvantages under which we have laboured. At *Friths* we have seen some good. On three other estates to which we have had access lately (viz. Stratham’s, Paradise, and Symons’s) where the proprietors and managers give suitable encouragement, there are promising appearances. On the north, where we have a School, chiefly owing to the distance, and the want of a place devoted to religious purposes, little has been effected towards establishing a congregation, or forming a Society; but when the room now erecting is finished, much more good may be expected in that long desolate and uninstructed part of the country, where there many free families, and several estates not far distant.”

In July last, Mr. HYDE writes :

“ Within the last six weeks a great door and effectual has been opened of the Lord for preaching the Gospel to the slave population of this island. Not less than two thousand slaves, on ten or twelve estates, have in this short time been placed under my religious care; which, with what I had access to before, gives me more than half the negroes in the island, and that too in different directions. This is a circumstance which calls for great thankfulness.

“ The Hon. THOMAS HILL, Chief Judge, &c. &c., at whose house his Excellency Sir B. D’URBAN resided, when in the island, as I noticed in my last letter, took the lead in this late movement towards the religious instruction of the slaves, and in a very handsome manner threw open to me at once six estates, and engaged to give me every encouragement; having, as he observed, fully considered the subject, and satisfied himself that it could not but prove beneficial to the ignorant to be instructed in principles of Christianity. Mr. H. was followed by THOS. S. WARNER,

Esq., recently from Antigua, who having witnessed the good effects of our labours in that island, in a polite and ready manner, on my application to him, immediately gave me access to four estates under his direction. CHARLES VENN, Esq., a few days ago, received from the proprietor of the estate of which he is the Attorney, who resides in England, authority to employ the Wesleyan Missionary, for the instruction of his slaves. Mr. V. has accordingly given me every encouragement. You will no doubt recollect that previous to these favourable circumstances, I had access to the estates of the Hon. W. D. FURLONG, speaker of the House, M. W. BLAKE, Esq., and WALTER SHOT, Esq. Other gentlemen, it is hoped, will now follow examples so influential, and the whole of the slave-population be favoured with an opportunity of hearing the word of God, and of being instructed in the principles of religion.

“ On the 6th of June we formed, in the chapel, a Society denominated ‘The Montserrat Religious Tract and Benevolent Society.’ Since I have been in the island, in my visits to the poor, I have witnessed many cases of distress. These circumstances suggested to me the propriety of forming this Society. The design met with the approbation of all present, and the Society, Committee, &c., were formed immediately. Fourteen or fifteen visitors and distributors of Religious Tracts gave their names before we left the chapel, and the design is likely fully to succeed. May God give it his blessing, and cause it to yield spiritual and temporal relief to thousands.

“ In August last a Public Meeting was held to form an auxiliary Wesleyan Missionary Society in this island; his Honour the President in the chair. The Resolutions were moved and seconded by several gentlemen of the island, and members of the House of Assembly, and a liberal collection was made on the occasion. Number in Society, 49.

“ NEVIS.—The people in general are desirous of instruction, but we have had many discouragements. In the country especially, our work languishes, but we are hoping for better days. A year of unexampled poverty and want, even of the commonest food, in which many have died of hunger, and a general straitness of circumstances, distressing to all ranks, must be regarded as one cause of the low state of our poor country people. Number in Society, 961.

“ ST. CHRISTOPHER’S, BASSETERRE.—Our congregations are in general large, and considerable attention is paid to the ministry of the word. Perhaps the proportion of established Christians in this town is equal to that in any Society in these islands.

“ *Old Road.*—In this place there has been an evident improvement during the year in the piety and number of the members of Society; and notwithstanding many things exist in the town and its vicinity which may be regarded as discouraging, yet there are many animating considerations to stimulate our exertions.

“ *Sandy Point.*—The state of our Society here is not the most flattering, nor yet quite discouraging. The religion of many is very superficial, and they frequently relapse, in spite of the most affectionate entreaties, earnest warnings, and vigilant oversight; yet, in the midst of these there

is a considerable number who show a depth of piety and a holiness of character which honour their profession, and no Christian need be ashamed to call them brethren.

“ *Deep Bay.*—Our Society in this place is, generally speaking, not in the most prosperous state, though there have been but few instances of gross irregularity during the last year.

“ *Nichola Town.*—The good spirit so apparent in this Society during the last year, has continued to the present; and we feel comforted in the prospect of much good resulting from our labours in this place. Could we obtain a settlement in the neighbourhood, so as to afford this Society that pastoral attention it requires, it would no doubt rank among the first country Societies in these islands.

“ *Cayon.*—There appears a degree of carelessness among the people, which frequently gives us pain. We are, however, happy to say that very few have been dismissed for improper conduct during the year. This circumstance, in connexion with the deep and serious piety of many, affords us encouragement.

“ *Palmetto Point.*—Here we have much cause for rejoicing. God has prospered his work in this place greatly in the course of the year. The congregation consists wholly of slaves from the adjoining estates. Scarcely any of them are able to read, and there is a great want of proper persons to fulfil any duty in the absence of the preacher; but they give us much satisfaction.

The following are Extracts from the more recent communications of the Missionaries :

“ Our Chapel at Basseterre, we are happy to state, is at present rising with considerable rapidity; the walls being already six feet above the surface, nor shall we stay our hand, until we ‘bring forth the headstone thereof with shoutings,’ unless obstructed for want of means. We affectionately commend to your immediate attention this important concern, and request an early communication of the result of our application for assistance.

“ We gratefully acknowledge, through this medium, the great kindness of JOHN IRVING, Esq. of Bristol, for obtaining at the cheapest rate, (much below our expectations) and of the best quality, a large quantity of *lime* for our new Chapel, for having it carefully put up in excellent casks, and faithfully shipped, free of any charges on his own account, and at half the regular freight:—likewise for his handsome subscription, with that of his friend, in aid of our design.

“ Our Stations are at present arranged as follows:—Mr. OKE is with Mr. MORGAN in Basseterre, the time of the latter being wholly employed during the weekdays, in superintending the masons, &c. at the Chapel; Mr. DAVIES is at Sandy Point, and Mr. MAGGS at Old Road.

“ Anticipating from you all the aid you can possibly render us under our present circumstances, and importunately imploring the richest benedictions of Heaven on your consultations and exertions, we leave the

case of our Chapel in your hands. We feel great pleasure in announcing that our Schools have (as we anticipated in a former communication) flourished considerably of late. Three additional ones have been opened, viz. at Cayon, Half-Way-Tree, and Palmetto Point, in which we have not less than 300 children and adults, who are regularly taught every Sabbath.

“The statement of monies received during the last quarter in behalf of the Chapel, will evince that the inhabitants of this depressed Colony are ready to come to our assistance according to their best ability. Yea, we bear them record, ‘that beyond their power,’ they have in several instances afforded us their help, and our expectations have been more than realized.—You will observe that our congregational Missionary Collection, which we made in the month of May, is comparatively large, besides which we have obtained a few private Subscriptions, for which we are indebted to the Ladies whose names are connected with the amount. We have for several weeks introduced to our places of worship, with unexpected success, small *Boxes*, on the system of JOASH, King of Judah, for the benefit of our New Chapel, and the Missionary cause in general.—On the day of our Quarterly Meeting their contents were presented, when we were highly delighted to witness that the mites cast into this newly-opened treasury, amounted together to £20. and upwards. Number in Society 2544.”

EUSTATIUS.—“The religious state of the members of our Society (with a few exceptions) is of an encouraging nature, and proves, that the Gospel of our Lord and Saviour has not been preached in this island in vain. Number in Society, 227.

ST. BARTHOLOMEW.—“On the destruction of the Mission-house and Chapel by the late hurricane, the Swedish Church was freely granted us by the Governor and the Swedish Minister. Our congregations are good. In the last year there have been added to the Society 114 new members, among whom there are twenty-three whites. The spirit of hearing and inquiry after Divine Truth, seems to spread through the community. Number in Society, 395.”

ST. MARTIN’S.—“The Society is in a good state; the members are regular in their attendance on the means of grace: thirty-one have been added to our number during the year, all of whom we have reason to believe are endeavouring ‘to work out their salvation with fear and trembling.’ The congregations in the country are good, but no Society has yet been formed at Cole Bay, from the want of a proper place to meet in, but it is probable that a class may be formed immediately at Simpson’s Bay, in consequence of two members of Society removing from St. Bartholomew to reside there. Number in Society, 148.”

ANGUILLA.—“The Society in this island is not so large as it was two years ago. This has been occasioned by the emigrations to St. Bartholomew. The Chapel (the pews and benches of which have been put up this year) is tolerably well attended on the Sabbath Day; the people hear with attention, and could they have the regular labour of a Missionary, the work would soon prosper. Number in Society, 172.”

TORTOLA.—“ The religious state of the Societies in Tortola, and the Virgin Islands, is generally good. The congregations continue both large and respectable, and deep attention is paid to the truths delivered. In the course of the year we have added 300 to the Society, the number of which is 2077.”

The following is an Extract from a recent Letter :

“ On the 18th August 1823, a Missionary Society was formed here, at a Public Meeting. The Chapel at Road Town was crowded at an early hour; Dr. G. H. VAN BURIN took the Chair, and several Gentlemen of the island assisted. A liberal collection closed the service. ‘ Many of the country negroes,’ says Mr. GILGRASS ‘ came with the notion that the last packet had brought the news of their freedom, which had been withheld, or at least that they were to be exempted from labouring for their masters three days in every week. This led me to undeceive them, and to enforce the precepts of the New Testament, as to the duties of servants to their masters. The best feeling pervaded the meeting.’ ”

ST. VINCENT'S DISTRICT.

ST. VINCENT'S.—“ We are happy to say, that on the whole, an encouraging degree of success has attended our labours; the sacred ordinances of God's house have been, in many happy instances, channels of grace and consolation. Our numbers appear with the small decrease of six. This decrease may be accounted for, by the great number, who during the year have gone into the eternal world—more than 100 of our people who were among the last year's returns are now ‘ where the weary are at rest.’ ”

“ Our Societies in general are in as good a state of *discipline* as can reasonably be expected under the peculiarities of their situation and circumstances, and their *piety* evidently takes deep root.

“ In the course of the year we made application to the public for the liquidation of the debt on this Mission, and scarcely an individual was waited on in vain; many gave liberally. We gladly embrace the present opportunity of giving expression and publicity to the grateful sense we have of the generous and friendly manner in which the respectable part of the community contributed to our cause. We especially instance his Excellency Sir CHARLES BRISBANE, the Governor; The Honourable the Members of His Majesty's Council, the members of the Assembly, and His Honour Chief Justice WYLLEY. A list of subscribers will be sent home when complete. The amount of the subscriptions is 650*l.* cur-

rency, of which 550*l.* have been already received. This has exceeded our most enlarged expectations, and been highly encouraging to us in the prosecution of our humble efforts. The general liberality of the public we cannot but consider as a most convincing proof that whatever *prejudice formerly* existed in the public mind, has *now* expired.

“ We have had, during the year, calls to openings of extended usefulness, but have been unable to enter them for want of a sufficient number of effective Missionaries. With four Missionaries on this Station, one or two other places might be successfully visited. Number in Society, 2904.”

GRENADA.—“ In *St. George's* on the Sunday evenings, the chapel is in general very full, and we are frequently much gratified by the deep attention to the divine word which evidently pervades the minds of the audience. We have had several deaths in the Society during the past year. For these our friends we sorrow not, ‘as those without hope;’ we have good reason to believe they have joined the Church triumphant above, and are now in the presence of their God and Saviour. There we hope to meet them again, where no earthly concerns, no circumstances of condition, nor death, shall ever prevent us from uniting together all our ‘nobler powers’ in the ceaseless praises of him ‘who hath loved us, and washed us from our sins in his own blood.’ We have been necessitated to expel some from among us, principally for insubordination to our discipline, a few only for immorality; over these we mourn, and hope they may soon discover their folly, and be brought once more into the fold.

“ With respect to the country part of our Mission, near *St. George's* it is rather discouraging, except on Clarke's Court estate, where our hopes have in a great measure been realized. On this estate we have 34 negroes in Society, or as candidates for admittance, with most of whom we have reason to be satisfied. As it relates to several other estates we hardly have hope of success, such is the ignorance, darkness and depravity of the people, and such their unwillingness to hear instruction; especially at those hours when only they have an opportunity of attending. However, we have persevered in visiting them, though often with much fatigue of body, added to no ordinary anxiety and distress of mind for their salvation. On the windward side of the island good is doing, though even there it falls short of our wishes. The Mission has the countenance of persons in power, generally, nor are they unwilling to contribute to its support. A small house has been rented in Grenville which we have converted into a neat chapel capable of holding 140 persons. The whole of the expense of fitting it up, and the rent for the time we have occupied it, up to the end of the year, have been collected principally among the white people in the neighbouring estates; and we can hardly doubt that considerable good will ultimately, if not shortly, be the result of our endeavours.

“ The little Society there is increased to nineteen, who all appear to be influenced by at least a sincere desire to be instructed. Nearly half of these belong to Paradise, one of the two estates we attend at the request of the Honourable J. BERKELY; the others are principally free people of Grenville.”

More recently, Mr. Goy states ;

“ Lately I went as far as Santeurs, intending to cross the channel to Isle Rhonde. Not being able to obtain a passage, I proceeded a little further to Mount Craven estate, to wait till the next morning. After dinner the manager asked me to preach to the negroes, when they returned from the field in the evening. I was glad to embrace such an opportunity ; and they were accordingly assembled in the hospital. It seemed strange to them to be addressed on the subject of religion. There are in this (St. Patrick's) quarter 4000 slaves, who have never heard a Gospel discourse, nor been taught in any way the things which belong to their present and eternal happiness. Number in Society, 330.”

TRINIDAD.—“ One great difficulty in the way of being useful to the negro population on this Station was, the strong objection of the negroes to marriage ; but we persevered until, in many instances, morality triumphed over degrading vice. On one estate only, twelve couple have been joined together. The barrier being thus broken down, we hope that many will follow these examples, and that the tone of moral character and feeling will be greatly raised. In the town of *Port of Spain*; our congregations are large and respectable, and would be much larger if we had accomodation ; but though a spirit of inquiry is excited, and a desire to hear the Gospel is awakened in this land of superstition and darkness, we have at present unhappily no room.

“ In the country parts little is done as yet, nor can more be effected until we obtain additional help ; but when that shall come, we will most gladly use every effort to be more extensively useful. Number in Society, 145.”

BARBADOES.—“ Our members are most of them increasing in a knowledge of Divine things, which is chiefly owing to a love of the Scriptures, and a daily searching of the Sacred Oracles. They bear reproach, but it is solely the reproach of Christ ; the world condemns them, because their lives condemn the world ; many affirm that they are too strict and too religious, but no man ‘ can convince them of sin.’ From the general state of the Society, the largeness, and serious attention of the congregations, and from that measure of Divine influence, which it is known several young persons have received under the ministry of the word, we are warranted to expect with confidence a gradual and steady increase of members in the coming year. Number in Society, 75.”

Such was the Report of this Mission from the District Meeting ; but we regret to have to put on record a most shameful and unprovoked outrage, the issue of which was the destruction of the Mission Chapel and dwelling-house, and the suspension, for a time, of the Mission. Directions have, however, been sent out by the Committee, for the rebuilding of the premises as soon as practicable.

The real causes which led to this outrage, were, the excitement

produced in the Colonies by the late discussions in Parliament, respecting the Slave population; and the mistaken notion that the Wesleyan Missionaries were political agents in correspondence with persons at home, on the various subjects agitated. This idea seems to have led to an examination of our publications in search of Mr. SHREWSBURY's letters to the Committee; and one written by him in conjunction with the late Mr. LARCUM more than three years before, and which had been in a printed form in the Colony for near three years, was brought forward as containing malicious representations of the character of the Colony. Many false reports were spread as to its contents, by those who had never seen it; and garbled extracts from it were published in one of the island newspapers. The news of the insurrection in Demerara followed, with the unfounded statement that Methodist Missionaries were implicated in the affair; and the public ferment being further excited by the artful malignity and activity of bad men, a mob was collected, and, without any opposition, proceeded to the work of destruction and completed it. The Committee having in separate publications stated the particulars of this affair, need not here enter into the persecutions of their excellent Missionary Mr. SHREWSBURY, and the destruction of the Mission premises; and with respect to the letter which was made the ostensible cause of the riot, they have only to repeat what they stated in one of their publications on the subject, that "it was totally misrepresented. It was said to contain reflections upon the white inhabitants of 'the poorer classes,' whereas it will be seen, that all that Mr. SHREWSBURY states concerning these Whites of 'the poorer classes,' is, that they 'were extremely ignorant,' clearly meaning, ignorant of religious truth. He takes no farther notice of the Whites of *any class*, except to compliment several respectable gentlemen and clergymen, for their attention to the instruction of the slaves, or their friendly disposition to their moral improvement. His observations relate, as the Letter plainly shows, to the *free and slave coloured and black population*. Upon Mr. SHREWSBURY's showing his Letter to different gentlemen of the island, they were satisfied; and but for the report from Demerara, nothing would have followed but a repetition of the personal insults which

our Missionaries have been in the habit of receiving, from persons calling themselves respectable in Barbadoes; and that disturbance of their congregations by the gross ill-behaviour of persons of the same class, which had been frequently experienced long before the late excitement was produced; and indeed almost ever since the establishment of the Mission. These things are *peculiar to Barbadoes*. In every other island our Missionaries are treated with respect, and our congregations worship in peace. If any ask what motive led the Committee to publish such a letter as that of Mr. SHREWSBURY'S? We answer,—that as the Committee never wish to intrude upon the labours of the clergy, or of the ministers of other denominations in any place; but to send their Missionaries to those parts of the world where the people specially need religious instruction, and are destitute of it: so such statements as Mr. SHREWSBURY'S letter contains, show to the friends of our Missions that we are not spending their subscriptions for party purposes; and tend to awaken a proper sympathy in the behalf of the thousands of our fellow-creatures, who are living without the knowledge and corrective moral influence of Christianity. Our Mission in Barbadoes had never been prosperous, because it never had been much encouraged in that colony. A new and enlarged Chapel was however built about four years ago, in the hope that it might effect a greater benefit; and two of our most valuable Missionaries were appointed, with the expectation that access might be obtained to the slaves in the country. Mr. SHREWSBURY had been in several of the islands, and every where was highly respected by the planters. This was a sort of new era in our Barbadoes Mission, which had been languishing for years; and as the Mission was recommencing, Mr. SHREWSBURY'S Letter was written to the Committee to show the necessity of supporting it with vigour in so wide a field of usefulness as the neglected slaves and coloured people of Barbadoes presented. The tone of the Letter has nothing in it sarcastic, nothing reproachful; it is written in the sympathizing spirit of a Christian minister, who lamented the condition of his fellow-creatures, and wished every moral means to be used for their benefit. The object of the Committee in publishing it, was to produce the same pious sympathy among the friends of religion, whose libera-

lity supplies the means of instruction to the slaves in the West Indies. Had it been the intention of the Committee to draw an unfavourable picture of the morals of Barbadoes, they had the means of doing it, in terms and particulars not used by Mr. SHREWSBURY, and especially of the unmanly behaviour of 'respectable persons' at our Chapel from year to year: but the Committee have never dealt in reproach, nor will this outrage provoke them to it."

Small as our Society is in this colony, and limited as is its influence, we may state it as a proof of singular liberality in the cause of Missions, that the Missionary Society organized there, contributed during the last year, to our General Fund, near 100*l.* sterling; 50*l.* of which have been remitted since the destruction of the Chapel, and the suppression of their assemblies.

DEMERARA.—"Our members who live in the town, are in general attentive to the classes, and many of them furnish us with satisfactory marks of a growth in grace, and in the knowledge of Divine things, showing by their lives that they have not believed in vain. Death has removed many of them from this to another world. The accounts we have received of the last hours of some of these, have been truly encouraging. A new chapel in George Town, 60 feet by 50, is nearly finished, to the aid of which we have had liberal subscriptions."

"At *Mahaica*.—Both the internal and external aspect of this Mission is promising. The congregations are large and attentive. The Missionary here has directed his attention particularly to the improvement both of the adult and juvenile part of his charge in Christian knowledge by catechetical teaching. An opening for teaching the slaves has taken place at a very small village (*Makaicong*) about fourteen miles distant from *Mahaica*: two visits to this place have been made, at both of which Brother CHEESEWRIGHT was favourably received, and preached to attentive hearers. Number in Society, 1216."

On the news of the unhappy insurrection which recently occurred in this colony, the Committee met the indiscriminate charges made against Missionaries, as having excited the revolt, by publishing the instructions under which the Society's Missionaries are required to act, and expressing their confidence that neither of their Missionaries in that colony, (Messrs. Mortier and Cheesewright) had acted contrary to them. They expressed the hope also, that the slaves in Society would be found to have conducted themselves becoming their Christian profession. On the receipt of the first letter from Mr. Mortier, after the insurrection, we learned that not

only was he and his colleague free from all imputation, but that only two negro members of our Society had been suspected. Mr. Mortier, at that time, expressed his belief of their innocence. A second letter from that Missionary, dated Sept. 17, 1823, communicated the gratifying intelligence that these two persons, who were servants of the Governor, had been liberated upon full conviction of their entire innocence; that *not one* of the members of our large Society, of twelve hundred and sixteen persons, chiefly slaves, had been in the least concerned in the revolt; and that the slaves of an estate under the care of Mr. CHEESEWRIGHT had not only refused to join the rebels, but had conducted their master to a vessel, by which he reached George Town in safety.

The following Extracts from Mr. MORTIER's Letter will show that our Societies there have done credit to the faithful instructions of the Missionaries who have laboured among them.

“ An estate upon which Mr. CHEESEWRIGHT, my colleague, preaches, called Dochfour, about six miles on this side Mahaica, made a noble stand against the rebels. The negroes declared they should not approach their master, (Mr. REID, one of the Governor's Aides-de-camp.) They took him off the plantation, and conveyed him to the mouth of Mahaica Creek, after passing through much mud and water, where a schooner was lying, and on board of which they succeeded in getting their master, who arrived in town that afternoon. This account I had from one of our members who came to town by the same vessel with Mr. REID. Another gang, on whose plantation Mr. CHEESEWRIGHT catechises the children, came to the manager, and laid down their cutlasses, with which they cut down the sugar-caness, and told him, that that was to show him, they had no design to join the rebels. The name of this estate is Spring Hall, belonging to the Honourable Dr. AUSTIN. This gentleman is a friend to the religious instruction of his negroes. He, with his Lady and family, left the colony for England about two months ago.

“ There is only one plantation up the East coast, upon which we have any members, that I know of, and I am happy to be able to state, that *that* plantation remained in peace. One circumstance I cannot pass over in silence. One of the members of our Society in Mahaica was returning from town to Mahaica, and was stopped by a party of the rebels, who commanded him to join them, or they would kill him. They knew him, and told him that his master (who is Commander of the Mahaica militia) had killed so many of their people already, that he must join them. The poor man said he could not do it. They then forced him down to the main party, and said he must eat with them; he refused. At last they came upon him with their guns levelled, threatening to kill him, saying, he only wanted to carry news to his master. But the poor young

man pleaded for his liberation, on the ground of having some medicine in his pocket for the Parson, (meaning Mr. CHEESEWRIGHT.) They thought this a pretence, but when he showed it, and a note directed to Mr. C., they let him go. Mr. C. had been, and then was exceedingly ill. But, had not the young man been able to show the medicine, no doubt they would have forced him to join them. This was the case with several slaves, who, when they saw an opportunity, left them, and came to the town to the Governor.

“ This morning, I hear that the Governor’s two servants, the only members of our Society who have been in confinement on suspicion, are set at liberty, without a spot of guilt being attached to them in this affair. These young men have been in our Society for eight years; they are brothers; I had no doubt of their innocence. *Not one* of our people has been found in the revolt.”

TOBAGO.—From this Station Messrs. NELSON and STEPHENSON write July 3, 1823 :

“ We are happy to inform you, that our way is gradually opening before us, and that our prospects are encouraging. The tide of public opinion seems to be generally turning in favour of affording moral and religious instruction to the negro population. The Missionary character is better appreciated, and Missionary effort is regarded as more important than it has hitherto been. There seems also a spirit of hearing excited among the negroes, which indicates ‘ a people,’ in some measure, ‘ prepared for the Lord,’ and we gladly regard it as an omen of future success, and anticipate, though somewhat distant, when all these abject sons and daughters of HAM shall rejoice in the blessings of SHEM, and become the sons and daughters of the LORD GOD ALMIGHTY.

“ We have now the promise of the erection of two chapels in the country, one to leeward, and the other to windward of the island,—the former on Les Cateaux estate, where there are nearly five hundred negroes, and several hundreds more in the vicinity. Mr. GORDON, a respectable gentleman, the manager and attorney for this estate, last week issued orders for the immediate erection of the chapel. We have visited this estate for about three months, and our congregations are crowded and attentive. Mrs. G. has also very laudably begun to instruct the children, who are numerous, in their catechism and prayers, and we doubt not but much good will soon be apparent here.

The other chapel, which we confidently expect to see speedily reared, is to be erected in some central spot between five estates, which are peopled by nearly 1000 negroes. On these also, the word preached has been diligently attended. A Mr. HOMEWARD, a friendly, pious man, residing on one of the estates, kindly interests himself in our cause, and is zealously anxious to promote it. The benefits resulting from the erection of these chapels will be many. We shall then perform in one day what is now the work of five; and, of course, we shall be able to extend our field of operation. Our discipline will be introduced among the people,

the good done will be ascertained, and the seed sown preserved from the ravages of an ever-vigilant enemy.

“Lately we have obtained access to *seven* more estates, making in all eleven, on each of which we preach once a fortnight, with the exception of two, which we visit only once a month. The negroes attend our services with much apparent pleasure; and we are ready at times to imagine, that the ‘Lord is preparing the people for himself.’ On most of the estates the attendance of negroes is numerous, considering that we are yet only commencing our labours amongst them. Their ignorance, however, of divine things, is great and deplorable; and the work of instruction and reformation amongst them must be a work of time and much patient labour. Many are the difficulties which oppose the progress of the Gospel; difficulties so great, that had they to be overcome solely by human effort, and were we left to ourselves to accomplish it, we should at once despair of seeing the work effected. But the Lord is on our side; and, accommodating the language of inspiration to the greatest of these difficulties, we say, ‘Who art thou, O great mountain, before Zerubbabel? thou shalt become a plain: and he shall bring forth the head-stone thereof, with shoutings, crying, Grace, grace unto it.’ Number in Society, 50.”

NEW PROVIDENCE.—“Our congregations are large and attentive. Many have finished their Christian course with joy; others have entered the field, and bid fair to win the prize. After deaths, removals, and unprofitable members put away from us, we have an increase of sixteen members, and eight on trial. Our prospects are good, and we enjoy every religious privilege we can wish.

ELEUTHERA.—“At *Rock Sound*, our Societies and congregations are steadfast and flourishing.”

“At *Tarpum Bay*, the work has been for some time unpromising; but the means of grace are now better attended. Many appear to be incited to diligence, and a small addition has been made to the last year's number.

“At *Savannah Sound*, the Society consists chiefly of black and coloured members, who have generally done credit to their religious profession.

“At *Palmetto Point*, we have every encouragement. *Governor's Harbour* has been visited a few times of late, and promises good could more time be devoted to it.”

HARBOUR ISLAND CIRCUIT.—“In *Harbour Island*, 89 members

have been added to Society since *last*; but, in consequence of removals and deaths, the standing number is only 60 above *last* year's return: several are on trial, who are well reported of.

"At *Cove*, religion has made but little prosperity during the past year.

"At *Spanish Wells*, the work of God has a more promising appearance than for some time past; the ordinances are more regularly attended, and the people appear more zealous. They have repaired their chapel.

"At *Bluff*, the Society appears to be growing in grace, and a few have been added through the year.

"*Bogue*.—This is a small settlement of black people, among whom a class has been formed for several years. In this class, at March last, there were only six members, now there are sixteen."

ABACO CIRCUIT.—"We have here to struggle with great difficulties. The sea-faring life, which the people generally follow, and their practice of wrecking, are great obstacles. We warn them against these evils, and are often virulently opposed in return.

TURK'S ISLAND.—"The Society here consists of 38 members, whites and blacks, which are divided into four classes. For depth of piety and liberality in supporting the cause of God, the members of this Society are peculiarly praiseworthy. The blacks, considering their former great ignorance and vice, advance fast in Christian knowledge, and express their views of religious subjects with great propriety and feeling. A considerable moral change has taken place in the community since the establishment of this Mission."

BERMUDA.—"The District Minutes contain no Report of this station, owing to Mr. Dunbar being absent from the meeting. A respectable member of the Society there, however, writes, under the date of June 20, 1823: 'I never knew the Society so prosperous; and from our openings for usefulness we much need, and earnestly ask, a second Missionary.' The Sunday School is in a good state, and the Bermuda Missionary Society raised the last year no less, for the General Fund, than 136*l.* sterling. The number in Society in the Bahamas and Bermuda, is 1304."

REPUBLIC OF HAYTI.—The Society here is under the care of Messrs. PRESSOIR and ST. DENIS, natives; the latter of whom is expected in England, and will probably be appointed the Minister of this persecuted and interesting Society. Their number has increased to 90; and after having been wholly prevented for a time from assembling together, and suffered imprisonment, they have renewed their meetings, and courageously exposed themselves to the hostility of their persecutors. They had not, at the last accounts, been forcibly dispersed, though, as the extracts from the affecting accounts below will show, they had frequently been insulted by the rabble. The persecution is wholly to be traced to

Catholic bigotry, excited by the priests. The Committee have voted them the sum of 50*l.* to encourage their own exertions in erecting a place of worship; and some benevolent friends have it in contemplation to give and to solicit a separate subscription, to enable them to complete this pious work, and to show their sympathy with a people, who exhibit so much of the spirit of primitive Christianity, amidst the distresses and reproaches to which they are exposed. The Committee have also voted them a grant of French Bibles, and other books, the proceeds of which are to be appropriated to their intended Chapel. The following extracts of letters will show the persecutions and exercises, and the patience and perseverance of this Society, throughout the year. The translation is nearly literal.

From Mr. ST. DENIS, dated Port-au-Prince, April 2, 1823 :

“ On Sunday, Feb. 2d, at nine o'clock in the morning, our assembly was held at Belair. J. C. PRESPOIR, who conducted it, published service for five o'clock in the evening, and read the letter which Mr. BROWN left us, saying, that the directions it contained should be followed, with the exception of catechising, which, for want of a place, we cannot do. During the morning service, several stones were thrown. In the evening we had an exhortation from Matt. x. 32, 33.

Feb. 4th.—“ Whilst we were singing, a shower of stones was thrown, but no one received any injury, thank God.

7th.—“ Brother PRESPOIR sent me the following note :—

“ ‘ My dear Brother, I write this, that you may prepare for this evening's service : try to be there at the proper time to edify the Church of CHRIST. You will find a Homily, read one half of it, and afterwards a chapter from the Bible. I am very feeble, and know not if I can get out this evening, but I commend myself to God. - Fear neither men, nor their words; take up your cross; follow the Lord; feed his sheep. The Lord grant you his Holy Spirit, that you may be a wise son and faithful servant to the end. Love the Brethren, and never separate yourself from them; they are the children of God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, and our Father, who believe that he hath raised him from the dead. May Christ be with thee, and with his Church. Amen!

“ ‘ Your Brother, especially in the New Birth, J. C. PRESPOIR.’

“ That evening we had a small assembly of thirty-two persons. A plan had been laid for apprehending us, which was put into execution. I went as soon as I could to Belair, where was our meeting. A sister called me aside, and said, she was informed that we were to be arrested that evening. Although I received this intelligence, I did not delay calling on the name of the Lord, intending to tell the congregation of what I had heard, but I forgot, till it was too late to do it.

“ We had time to sing a hymn, read a chapter, and a Homily, but

whilst singing the second hymn, the noise of the soldiers was so great in approaching our house of prayer, that we were obliged to cease singing. Wishing, however, to continue our meeting, an officer of the police said, 'In the name of the law, leave off that prayer!' Then we left off. Not finding J. C. PRESPOIR, they made me pass for his second. We were taken to General THOMAS's, who pretended to be ignorant of the matter. Colonel VICTOR pretended to be ignorant also. When we reached the house of the *Juge de Paix*, we were ordered to halt for a moment. Col. VICTOR knocked at his door; the *Juge de Paix* asked who we were, and was answered, 'A band of Methodists.' The *Juge de Paix* said, 'Ha! ha! take them to the gaol.' Col. VICTOR replied, 'Yes!' We were led to prison, and each of our names were taken. The Sisters were put in the Debtors' place, and the men were shut up in close confinement.

"The next morning, the person who keeps the keys of the prison under the gaoler, told us that the *Juge de Paix* would not allow our door to be opened; but the gaoler went and spoke to him respecting it, and our door was opened about nine o'clock. A moment after, the *Juge de Paix* came to visit us, and addressing himself to me in anger, I wished to reply; but he would not listen to me; but began to blaspheme religion, despising the Lord. He withdrew in anger, without being able to do any thing with us. A moment after he left us, we were taken into the Debtors' prison, near to the Sisters, in a separate chamber. We were four men. One of the men pleased me much by his conversation, and the way in which he answered several questions that I proposed to him.

8th.—"Several persons came to visit us. Some were for us, and others against us. I sent the following letter to J. C. PRESPOIR.

" 'We were put in close confinement where you were kept the former time, but now we are taken into the Debtors' place: but we are ready to wish we had been left where we were, on account of the noise made here. Pray for us, that we may not give way. We are mildly dealt with. Bless the Lord! I salute you in the name of all. Take courage; the Lord be with you.

" 'Your servant in Christ,
" 'B. ST. DENIS.'

"J. C. PRESPOIR replied,

" 'Dear ST. DENIS,—I have just received your note, and give thanks to God for his kindness towards his own. I am astonished, ST. DENIS, that I am not yet in prison: but I believe it is a wise dispensation of Providence. Yet I know not, if I shall not be in to-day, or some day soon. I suffer in my flesh for sin, how much rather would I suffer for righteousness. I say, 'Lord, thy will be done;' I pray for you, and the Church, my kindred in Christ. Let the reproach of Christ be your joy. The more we rejoice to bear our cross, the lighter it is. Be crucified to the world like St. Paul, and free from care; give yourself entirely to the Lord. Lovest thou the Lord? feed his sheep. May the Lord Jesus grant you his grace to bear testimony to him boldly. Tread under your feet all the world says, or shall say of you. Tell the friends not to fear man. The hairs of your head are numbered. Courage! Christ is our head. O, my friends, this is your assurance, you are in the way to heaven.

" 'I have not time to say more. The Lord be with you all by his

Spirit! Fight courageously, your victory is certain. All our afflictions in Christ are blessings: Glory, power, empire, honour, to the only true God. Courage! Courage, my friends, only a few steps remain between us and our celestial country.

“ ‘ The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of the Father, and the communion of the Holy Spirit, be with you. Amen!

“ ‘ Salute my friends; assure them of my constancy. My prayers are to Christ.

“ ‘ Your Brother, J. C. PRESSOIR.’ ”

The following, from Mr. PRESSOIR, gives the account of their liberation. It is dated Port-au-Prince, April 23, 1823 :

“ Since the month of January our assemblies began to be public. Such as were so disposed met together; their hands feeble, and knees stiffened, from being so long bowed down. The demon of persecution could not long bear our re-union without efforts to destroy it; but God, who watches over his own, has still preserved us to the glory of his name. Being ill, I requested ST. DENIS to read the word of God to the congregation; and it appears that Almighty God designed to leave me on my bed, that I might not be taken with the others. I waited till after the hour when prayer should have been over, but saw no one. That instant my little boy came running as fast as he could, saying, ‘ We were assembled, the guard came to take us, and I escaped to let you know it.’ I was immediately inspired with courage. I rose, called together my mother, grandmother, &c., and read several passages of Scripture to comfort them, and prepare them for the persecution that was coming upon us. I hid my books, letters, &c. and expected they would come to take us. This was the 7th of February. I would not run into prison of my own accord, but having waited and finding nothing was said to us, I went to see my brethren and sisters. I found there were thirty-two, and ST. DENIS preparing to write to the President, which he did, and I carried this letter to his Excellency, by which we requested him to cause us to be judged and punished if we were found guilty by the law. When I arrived under the piazza of the palace, I asked an officer on duty if I could see the President, who answered, Yes. I entered the hall, where I found the President seated, and surrounded by a circle, as well of officers as civilians. After saluting them, I presented the letter to the President, who asked me from whence it came. I replied, ‘ From the Methodists who are in prison.’ His good humour was immediately changed. ‘ Methodists,’ said he, ‘ I did not know that.’ Colonel VICTOR, who was present, thinking perhaps that through fear I would wish to conceal myself, addressed himself to the President, saying, ‘ President, this is a Methodist,’ as if the President did not know it. Immediately the President replied, ‘ You are fanatics.’ ‘ Pardon me, President, we are not.’ ‘ Why, you have changed your religion.’ ‘ If I have changed my religion, President, it is the Government which has made me do it.’ ‘ How is that?’ said he. ‘ It was the late President who sent for the Missionaries. I heard the letter read, and saw the late President’s signature: this is what I can tell you.’ ‘ Enough, enough,’ said he, ‘ I will send an answer.’ I went to the prison, and waited till it was late; but hearing nothing, and being ill of the

fever, I returned to my mother's. The next day orders were given for the brethren and sisters to appear before the Chief Judge. A dollar was demanded of each on leaving prison, and they were conducted by a single sergeant. On their arrival, the Chief Judge forbade them, in the name of the President, to assemble together again. 'No one can hinder you from worshipping God as you please; but let every one abide at home, for as often as you are found assembled, you shall be put in prison; and if you unhappily persist, I have received orders to disperse you every where.' Several wished to reply, but he refused to listen, saying, 'It is not from me; it is not my fault; these orders are given me.' All our brethren and sisters went out, animated with a holy zeal, determining not to abandon their assemblies. The next day we were assembled. After an exhortation we sung a hymn, which being finished, we kneeled down to pray: a shower of stones came as if they would have demolished the house, and have stoned us like Stephen. With one accord we commended ourselves to our faithful Creator, and continued in prayer till they had ceased. On Friday, in the same week, Mrs. AUGUSTINE offered us her house to meet in, on condition that we would not sing. We met on the Sunday following. After a discourse which I delivered, I said, 'My brethren and sisters, I take your opinion; judge, is it proper that we should sing a hymn to God, or not? I will not do it of myself, for I do not wish to expose you in any thing.' Madame AUGUSTINE trembling said, with several others, 'It is right we should sing a hymn to the Lord: sing, Brother.' Then we sang, and we continue to do so. Almighty God is with us; blessed be his name. Amen. Some have been turned aside, but I need not represent to you the conduct of those weak ones, who have been under the power of fear three years. What courage is necessary on such occasions! He who has not for his sole end the glory of God, cannot continue without sin; he is exposed, as Aaron was, to make a golden calf to satisfy the inconstancy of the inconstant. I thank God that he has given me courage to go from house to house to converse with the people on God's word.

"We have succeeded, by the grace of God, in re-establishing the classes. There are now six, consisting some of thirteen, and others of fourteen members. There is an assembly on Sunday morning. Two classes meet during the day, two on Monday, and two on Thursday: and I propose, according as I have begun, to visit each once a fortnight, to help them to continue in the Lord. We have assemblies also on Sunday, Tuesday, and Friday evenings. Stones are sometimes thrown; and some strangers attend now and then. On Saturday our brethren and sisters came down from the mountains, to be present at the Sunday worship, and return on Monday very early; and it is in this poor people that we see Jesus Christ in the greatest fulness. We continue our assemblies in the house of Mrs. AUGUSTINE.

"Lately the Lord has put a thought into my mind, and, after consulting two or three of my brethren, we have decided on collecting for building a house, which shall be dedicated to the Lord for his people to meet in. All our brethren and sisters are glad at the undertaking. And we have already made three collections. The collection is made once a fortnight:

all of good-will give what they can. I believe the Lord will finish this work for the glory of his name. We cannot, at present, teach the Catechism to children, because Mrs. AUGUSTINE'S is a family-house; and we must, apparently, make the collection a long time before we have sufficient to purchase ground and materials, or a house already built. Our collection is very small, for we are all poor in this world; but the Lord will provide. No one would let a house to us: and rents are high, and our means small. O Lord, help us for thy glory! O God, grant us pastors to feed us. O good Shepherd, send thy servants to collect thy sheep, that they may be of one fold.

“ Salute for me all the saints, and especially the pastors. Let them take courage, and seek the dispersed of the house of Israel, and the poor among the Gentiles, and bring them to the good Shepherd, who is the door of the fold.”

The following is an extract of a letter from Mr. PRESSOIR, dated July 31, 1823 :

“ Since the Lord has granted us the favour of meeting together again, we have continued our assemblies without intermission, although forbidden to do this under pain of prison and exile. The only interruption we meet with is bad words, and a few stones now and then; and I am become so marked, that I cannot go out without people crying after me, ‘ Methodist! Parson!’ with a contemptuous sneer, and a thousand other things not fit to write; but which serve only to strengthen my faith in the promises of Him who is faithful. Till last Sunday some foolish young women came to revile us; and on Tuesday evening, whilst reading, stones were thrown, and whilst we were at prayer a great number rushed in, armed with sabres, sticks, and, if I mistake not, with stones, crying out, ‘ In the name of the law,’ as if they had been authorized by the heads of the people to arrest us. This band consisted of boys, led on to commit disorders by a set of idle, good-for-nothing persons, of the worst class, who had armed themselves with sabres, and were disguised with old cocked hats; trying thus to show their bravery over those who would make no resistance. But the hairs of our head are all numbered; nor have they been permitted to hurt any of us to the present. It would be useless for us to ask or hope for the protection of the law; and we are thus led to place all our confidence in God, who can and will deliver us in his time. And if the Lord is for me, of whom should I be afraid? He that spared not his own Son, but delivered him up for me, will he not with him freely give me all things? I have already experienced that all my sufferings for his name are great blessings to me. All my care is about his Church; and what wisdom does it require to conduct so many persons of such different dispositions. I feel new wants daily.”

MISSION SCHOOLS IN THE WEST INDIES.

JAMAICA DISTRICT.—The Schools connected with our Mission are not numerous in this Island; but a commencement has been

made and in some places with prospect of good. The following are the Reports from the District Meeting.

Kingston.—“ Mr. YOUNG has a class of 23 boys, who are regularly instructed by him, some of whom have become very serious. Amongst them he has a few Jewish children, who manifest a great desire to be instructed in the principles of Christianity. Mrs. YOUNG has a class of 46 girls, and Mrs. HORNE another of 31, who are regularly met and instructed by them; and we are happy to say that the seed which they have sown is already springing up, for many of them have become very seriously disposed, and have been admitted as members in our Society.”

Grateful Hill.—“ In the Sunday School here, it has required considerable exertions to keep up the attendance of the few whose situations would allow them to attend; but at present there is a good prospect; a spirit of emulation is excited among them; they are storing their memories with selections from the Sacred Scriptures, and from hymns; and we carefully endeavour to instil into their minds, by catechetical instructions and familiar remarks, the first principles of religion.”

Montego Bay.—“ The number of children under instruction is 83; several of the larger girls in Mrs. RATCLIFFE's class have become very serious, and *four* have joined the Society whose simplicity and devout attention to the means of grace give considerable promise; and if we reflect on the powerful influence of examples of female virtue in a community like ours, the sum of moral good which, under the blessing of God, we are led to anticipate by the early care and instruction of females, can scarcely be overrated, and this circumstance will be gratifying to our friends at home. The persevering attention of the children of our Sunday School, has excited considerable emulation amongst some of the adult members of our Society, who manifest a strong desire to learn to read; and a few, who are considerably advanced in age, are already able to read several hymns and the easier parts of the New Testament. It is a novel scene in Montego Bay, to behold some of our scholars sitting, in the cool of the evening, at the doors of their friends, teaching adults the alphabet, or the first rudiments of reading and spelling.

“ The Committee beg to state, that in addition to the children taught in the Town School, from thirty to forty negro children are regularly catechised and instructed on Blue-hole estate, before divine service for the adults commences. These children are capable of answering questions with the greatest readiness on every essential doctrine of the New Testament, and they sing the praises of the Redeemer in the most simple and affecting manner.”

St. Ann's.—“ A Sunday School has been commenced here, which is likely to be very useful. The number of children is 30.”

ANTIGUA DISTRICT.—“ *Antigua.*—In the Chapel and Point Schools, 565 children are instructed. The report of the Committee of these Schools, published in Antigua, states: ‘ The method of instruction pursued in the Schools admits of little variation. Great pains have been taken to explain to the children the essential doctrines of our holy religion. Bene-

ficial results have been manifest in many instances; good feelings have been excited, and good desires kindled, the effects of which, your Committee humbly hope, will hereafter appear to the praise and glory of God. During the past year, three children, who were instructed in the Schools, have been deservedly appointed to the office of teachers. A whole class of girls, consisting of thirteen, and several boys, have been dismissed from the Schools with credit.

“ In the Parham Sunday School Institution, 600 children are taught. The Report of the Committee states: ‘ We feel assured that it will afford you great happiness to hear that the Parham Sunday School, throughout the year, has been in general well attended; that many of the children have made considerable progress, and a greater spirit of attention and subordination has manifested itself through the whole. About twenty of the eldest, since our last annual meeting, have been admitted into Society, after passing through due examination and trial. Several of the girls, also, have had those principles of virtue rooted and fixed within them, which have led them to abhor those illicit connexions which are so prevalent, have been religiously married, and are now living in credit to themselves and to the School. Your Committee have great pleasure in stating, that the principles already implanted in the minds of some of the children have unfolded themselves, in several instances, in a conduct which has afforded the greatest satisfaction to gentlemen residing on estates. One instance deserves particular notice, because of its being so contrary to general custom. During the time of reaping corn on one of the estates, nearly all the Negroes in the great gang were detected with corn concealed about their persons; but, on examining the younger ones who were employed on the same occasion, not more than one was found to have transgressed the command, “ Thou shalt not steal.” This circumstance struck the manager with peculiar force, and it was ascribed to the influence of religious education imparted at the Sunday School, as most of the children were scholars. It has also afforded your Committee great satisfaction to witness a disposition in the children to have a Bible or a Testament as soon as they can read it. This desire has been so strong throughout the past year, that there has been quite a demand for them. Several, by a liberal grant of the “ British and Foreign Bible Society” through the “ Antigua Auxiliary,” have been given to the children as rewards; but, in addition to this, many have been sold at a cheap rate, and the money transmitted to the “ Antigua Auxiliary Bible Society,” which has never failed to furnish the required supply.’

“ At English Harbour, there is an adult School of 50, which is thus mentioned by the Committee: ‘ The Committee have, during the past year, witnessed with no common degree of pleasure and gratitude, the lively interest which several generous friends in English Harbour have taken in the Institution, and the liberal manner in which they have contributed to promote its success. They have now fifty scholars under tuition, some of whom have, during the past year, made rapid improvements. This, your Committee are persuaded, will appear to all their friends, when they inform them that, during the last year, some of the scholars who began with the alphabet, can now read the Testament.’ ”

Dominica —“ In the School at Roseau, there are 150 scholars. The attendance of the children is good, and the improving behaviour in general whilst at School, and the persevering steadfastness of many in reading the books of the Sunday School Library, are good indications that those who are engaged in this work shall not labour altogether in vain. The advantages which they derive from the religious instructions imparted to them have already been evinced in several instances. Two of the girls have been added this year to the Society, who promise fair to be the future ornaments of the school, and useful members of the Church of God.”

Montserrat.—“ There are here three Schools and 253 children. The Committee report, that the labour of instruction by the Teachers has been continued with unwearied diligence, and not without some proofs of a pleasing kind, among the children, that their endeavours have been attended with success. Many have been removed to higher classes, and many have been rewarded with hymn-books and tracts, for their diligence and good behaviour. A considerable number have learnt and repeated the whole of St. John's Gospel and St. Matthew's, and several have got partly through that of St. Mark. Many of them are perfect in the Church Catechism; and most, even of the lesser ones, can now answer the questions in the first set of Catechisms for Children.”

Nevis.—“ In this Island there are three Schools and 124 children. The Committee of the Sunday School Society here state, the children have made progress in a knowledge of the letters, and some read the Sacred Volume. A few repeat portions of the Scripture, and most of them have learnt the catechisms and instructions for children. A growing attachment to the School is discovered by several of the children, and it is pleasing to observe a considerable improvement in the general behaviour of most of them, both in School and abroad.”

St. Christopher.—“ Here also there is a Wesleyan Sunday School Institution, which reports four Schools and 722 children. The Committee, in a printed Report, observe: ‘ They feel peculiar pleasure in being enabled to state, that the Institution is realizing, in all respects, the important objects which had been anticipated; and that the salutary regulations by which it is governed, while they hold forth the prospect of much good, oppose, at the same time, a barrier to much evil: ‘ Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it.’ The Committee rejoice to see that the views of the Institution meet with the countenance and approbation of the higher orders of the community.’”

St. Eustatius.—“ The number of children, which was formerly from 80 to 100, is now reduced to 40 to 50. This neglect and inattention, it is to be lamented, proceeds from the little regard that parents and relations pay either to the moral and religious instruction of their children. Although our number is small, yet the improvements are equal to our exertions: more than half our number read well; five boys and the same number of girls have been dismissed, with tickets of approbation for their regular attendance, improvement in learning, and good behaviour; they continue to attend on the Sabbath afternoon, to repeat a task from the Scriptures.”

St. Bartholomew.—"In this place the rising generation is numerous, and very ignorant; and though no objection is made to the communication of religious instruction to the slave population, yet, from the indifference of the parents and the idle and insubordinate habits of the children themselves, we have not had so regular and so well conducted

School as we have wished. From 80 to 100 children, male and female, attend, who have made some improvements, and seem well disposed. We have lately obtained a new set of regular and attentive teachers, most of whom are of respectability. Many of the children who can read, have committed to memory large portions of the Holy Scriptures, to whom we give (by way of encouragement) religious Tracts and copies of Dr. Watts's Hymns for Children, which they get by heart, and take great delight in singing."

St. Martin.—"The Committee of the Wesleyan Sunday School Institution for this Island state: 'It affords the Committee much satisfaction to announce, that many of the children who were admitted into the School, without a knowledge of the alphabet, are now able to read with facility; all who are able to read have committed some part of the Sacred Book to memory, and continue to apply themselves to the Divine Oracles, the blessed influence of which has been experienced by some of their parents. In addition to the School held on the Sunday, two mornings in the week, from six to eight o'clock, (Tuesday and Friday,) are set apart for the instruction and catechising of the children, when they repeat the portions of the Scriptures which they have committed to memory. The others are taught to read at the same time, and afterwards are all assembled together and catechised.'"

Tortola.—"The Schools are three; the number of children, 330. In Road Town School we have 66 boys and 134 girls, who are taught to read and spell, and are catechised four times a week. They are taught on Sabbaths, from four till six P. M.; also on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday mornings, from six to eight o'clock. They have made considerable progress in the difficult parts of learning; many read well, and can repeat by heart many portions, and some whole chapters, of the Scriptures. The first class of boys and the first class of the girls can repeat the Church Catechism and Dr. Watts's First Catechism, in both prose and verse."

ST. VINCENT'S DISTRICT.—"*St. Vincent's.* In St. Vincent's, there are three schools, and 231 children. Our Schools are not in so flourishing a state as is desirable, but they are not altogether ineffective; many children, otherwise 'Wild as the untaught Indian's brood,' are by these means brought under a degree of subordination and discipline, and taught to read the words of inspiration, whereby they may be saved. The sacred precepts of Christianity are inculcated and enforced upon them, and they learn the duties of their stations, and to fear and love God. Besides the instructions thus communicated to the children resident in the towns, we regularly catechise those of the neighbouring estates, who attend at our chapels for that purpose. The number of negro children thus taught the first principles of our holy religion, is about 500.

“We are happy to state, that, among the encouraging results of our Sunday Schools and catechetical instructions, several, who were thus taught the truth as it is in Jesus, have felt its power on their hearts and joined the Society. These, we trust, will be among the most intelligent, pious, and steady of our members.”

Grenada.—“Three Schools, and 249 children. We feel very much the importance of instilling into the tender minds of the rising generation, those truths which are necessary to form them for usefulness in the present world, and which may, with the blessing of God, be the means of leading them to consider the things which make for their eternal happiness and peace. We esteem Sunday Schools as conducive to this end, and we regret that numerous duties on this station prevent us from paying that attention to our Sunday School Institution, which its importance so justly demands; and the more so, as we know that without the almost constant attendance of the Missionary, in the West Indies especially, he can hardly hope for success. We have, however, in general, here, been pretty well supplied with teachers, who, with the aid of the officiating preacher, (who always attends as much as he possibly can) have succeeded in a tolerable degree in this department of our Mission.

“In *St. George's* particularly, our School is decent and orderly, and has been as successful as we could reasonably expect. But our teachers are subject to change, through unavoidable circumstances connected with their condition in life, and we are sorry to say that, during the last year, we have suffered considerably through a want of suitable male teachers. We have one hundred and seventy-four children in the School at *St. George's*, and forty-five in that at *Gaugave*. The children improve, and are not indisposed to listen, in the interval of their lessons, to the instructions given them on the subject of religion. A few, we believe, have been divinely wrought upon, and meet weekly in a class.

“At *Grenville*, on the windward station, we have attempted to form a School, but it is so very recent, that we are not able at present to say much respecting it. We continue to catechise the negro children on the estates in our regular attendance in the country, but there is an indisposition generally in the planters, to their being taught to read. Yet some of the children afford us pleasure in the improvement they make in their catechetical instructions, while they seem to be little benefited by our exertions, owing to their not being so frequently and regularly instructed.”

Tobago.—“Our Sunday School in this island, has, during the past year, dwindled almost to nothing; and all attempts to endeavour to induce the children to attend, have proved abortive. This falling away, chiefly, is to be attributed to the almost total inattention of parents to the best interests of their children, who are suffered to grow up in entire ignorance concerning the sacred obligations of the Sabbath and religious truth. But, though our efforts in favour of the rising generation have chiefly failed in town, the case has proved otherwise in the country. Notwithstanding, the partial success which has attended our endeavours to improve the moral condition of adult slaves, and the encouraging conviction

of their being within the reach of that great promise and command 'Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature,' yet such is their almost invincible ignorance, (particularly that of the native Africans) that our hopes of doing extensive good are principally centred in the rising generation. Accordingly, the instruction of the children on those estates where we preach, has been considered and attended to as one of the grand branches in the main design of our Mission to the negroes. It is true, we have not the means of teaching them to read. Instruction therefore by catechism is the only means we have in our power to employ. And happy we are to say, that in this department of Missionary labour, we have met with more than looked-for success; nearly a hundred negro children can repeat, with considerable exactness, the whole of the Catechism, the Apostle's Creed, and the Lord's Prayer. Besides which, a number of them have committed to memory the Ten Commandments, and portions of several hymns. It is with heartfelt satisfaction, we state that nearly the whole of this has been accomplished by the zealous exertions of two gentlemen, who have perseveringly and effectually co-operated with us, by daily catechising the children belonging to the estates on which they respectively reside. A more recent account states the revival of the School in Scarborough, which may now be stated at 90 children."

Barbadoes.—"At this station there is a Sunday School connected with the Mission. In this School there are one hundred and ninety-five children. The superintendence of the School solely devolves upon the Missionary, and forms a very laborious, and highly-important part of his duty. To him it belongs to catechise the children, or occasionally, to deliver a suitable address; to stir up the teachers to constant diligence, to meet them regularly once a month, and in conjunction with the teachers, to receive or exclude from the School, as circumstances may require. A vigilant superintendence is indispensably necessary to secure attention to their several duties, on the part of both teachers and children. In point of morals, the children of Barbadoes are sunk extremely low; scarcely one child in a hundred throughout the town, is preserved from the common vices of swearing, and profaning the day of the Lord; soon as the children speak they blaspheme. The Sunday School *checks* and *counteracts* these evils, in a considerable degree, in those children who are committed to our care; but after all the pains we have taken to instruct them in the first principles of Christianity, and impress their minds with the great importance of everlasting things, it is to be feared that the majority of them are extremely ignorant, and perhaps sometimes immoral and wicked in their practices. Alas! how can it be otherwise, when sin is systematically practised before their eyes from day to day; when often what they hear, and much that they are taught at home, tend to increase that love of evil which is naturally strong in every human heart. An attempt has been made to bring all the children regularly to the house of God, for which purpose the Missionary made private application to the parents or owner of nearly every child; but the effort was generally unsuccessful, so that only about one-fifth of the children attend on the Sabbath morning to hear the word of God. Upon the whole we desire

to be thankful, and to remember always, that great difficulties require great perseverance, and incessant believing prayer."

Demarara.—"Our Sunday School, though in its infancy, wears an encouraging aspect. In this pleasing and important part of our Missionary duty, we have, however, been a little incommoded during the time our chapel has been erecting. Our morning meetings with the children have been necessarily relinquished for a time, but as we hope to open our chapel soon, we shall then resume this pleasing employment; and from the improvement made by many of the children during the short period they were so met, we anticipate abundant fruit from our endeavours. The Sunday teaching has not been interrupted, as one of our friends kindly granted us the use of a room for that purpose. Four white young gentlemen, from Europe, attend as regular teachers, and appear to feel very great interest in the School; a few other persons have lent us their aid, and we trust we shall have to report very favourable things of this School. Many of the children have learnt the catechisms, and several of Watts's Hymns, and also a part of St. Matthew's Gospel. A considerable number of them attend the public service, and behave well in the house of God."

BAHAMAS DISTRICT.—*New Providence*, 3 schools, 205 children; *Eleuthera*, 3 schools, 182 children; *Harbour Island*, 5 schools, 177 children; *Abaco*, 3 schools, 90 children. These schools are in a state of useful activity.

ST. JOHN'S.—"We are happy to state that our prospects of usefulness in this circuit, at present, are very encouraging. The number of hearers both in the town and the out coves, continues to increase, many of whom during the year have received benefit. On the first Monday of each succeeding month, we read Missionary intelligence, and unite with our friends in other parts of the world in intercession for the success of Christian Missions generally, and of our own in particular. Eventually we trust, an active Missionary spirit will be excited among us, which will show itself in pecuniary contributions to the general fund. One new place has been opened during the winter, which, though it lies at a considerable distance from the residence of the Missionary, and, by land, is scarcely accessible, except in the winter season, is a promising field of

labour. There are now five places in this circuit where we have preaching as often as circumstances will admit."

HARBOUR GRACE.—"In this circuit, we cannot help feeling that the field is already white to harvest; the number in Society, it is true, is small, and only stands the same as last year; but we are happy to state, that so pleasing a prospect of good being done has not been seen for many years past. Every part of the work of God here appears big with promise."

CARBONEAR.—"The state of religion in this circuit is hopeful. The people manifest, in general, attachment to those privileges with which they are favoured. Several of them, I have reason to believe, have made considerable progress in the Divine life, and I am not in any instance aware, but that the conduct of all is worthy of the Gospel. Our congregations are larger than I have ever known them. But an outpouring of the Spirit of God is necessary to large success. For this we daily pray, and hope the period is not far distant when this desirable event shall rejoice our hearts."

BLACK HEAD.—"Such is the distress of the times, and the poverty of the people, that clothes cannot be obtained so as to enable them to attend either the church or the class in the winter season. I am well acquainted with some who had not a shoe for some months, though the frost was intense, and the snow from one to five or six feet deep; but we hope as the spring is arrived, and the fish coming on our coasts, that the people will be put into the possession of the means of again attending the ordinances of religion. We have added a few to our Society the past year, all of whom promise well. Those who have raiment, generally attend on all the means of grace."

TRINITY.—"The congregations in this place are not so large as formerly, yet there has been an increase of members, and an increase of experimental religion. In English Harbour we have the greatest number of members."

ISLAND COVE and PERLICAN.—"In Perlican the Society stands firm. During the past year only one member has been lost, and several have gone to their reward. In Island Cove we cannot say so much, yet here is a spirit of hearing and much piety."

PORT DE GRAVE.—"The congregation is generally large, especially in the afternoon, and the hearers are attentive."

BRIGUS.—"The congregation continues to be large and attentive. The numbers in Society are 40; most of whom, we believe, are growing in grace. The Sunday Schools, which are three in number, have been well attended both by teachers and children, and at present are in a flourishing state."

BURIN.—"The residences of the inhabitants are very scattered, so that they are often prevented from attending the ordinances of Divine worship, though it is not uncommon for many of them to venture at the hazard of their lives. Another obstacle to the progress of the good work is, that the Burin harbour is so circumstanced, as to render it necessary for the greater part of the people to remove from it during the winter, for the purpose of getting fuel for that season; and many of them remove so far, as to render it impossible to visit them during their absence. By

reason of these removals, the congregations are very small in the winter ; but in the summer they are not only large, but the pleasing fruit of our labours among them is so evident as to extort from many, who but a short time ago were loading us with reproach and shame, an open acknowledgment of the good which has been wrought."

BONAVISTA.—"We have added nine new members, and I believe the whole Society is walking worthy of their vocation. Our congregations are large. Our prayer meetings are so crowded, that no single house in the harbour is sufficiently large to contain the people who attend them. Catalina is visited twice or thrice a quarter; we have here a Society of twenty-six members."

BIRD ISLAND COVE.—"Here we have a congregation of about forty persons, which is visited once a week."

The Report of the Newfoundland Schools in connexion with the Mission, is not come to hand. Last year, the number of Schools was 15, and of children, 858. We apprehend, that they have somewhat suffered from the great distress of the island, and the severity of the last season.

THE state of this Mission is favourably reported of in the District Minutes. The congregations in many of the places are large, and the Societies generally increasing. The brethren employed on several of the stations visit many very destitute settlements, and in every place the moral state of the people is such, as to demand all the exertions of the Christian Ministry and the influence of Religious Societies. The Sunday Schools connected with this Mission are thus reported from the District Meeting :—

QUEBEC.—"The number of children taught in the School here, is about 90. The teachers are generally attentive to their duty, and much good has been done."

MONTREAL.—“ We have one Sunday School of about 90 children, to which the most laudable attention is paid by some excellent young men and women, who take peculiar delight in teaching the children twice on the Lord’s day to read the Word of God.”

KINGSTON.—“ This station has one Sunday School, consisting of 60 children, who have made considerable progress in learning the Holy Scriptures, and I feel great pleasure in stating that there has been great improvement as it regards the attendance of the children on Public Worship.”

ST. ARMAND’S.—“ We have nine Sunday Schools on this Circuit, and upwards of 400 scholars. There are 50 teachers.”

MELBOURNE.—“ We have had to encounter many difficulties in the establishment of Sunday Schools, particularly from the want of suitable teachers, but have at length succeeded in getting two Schools of twenty children in each, which are very promising.”

STANSTEAD.—“ We have one Sunday School in this Circuit, containing 36 children; eight males and 28 females, and four teachers.”

SHELFORD.—“ We have three Sunday Schools, containing together, 72 boys and 73 girls. They read the Scriptures, and have committed to memory Watts’s Catechism and several of our Hymns.”

BINTONVILLE.—“ There are here four Sunday Schools, containing about 20 children each. The children are very attentive, and their progress has been encouraging.”

The following are Extracts from the Report in the District Minutes.

HALIFAX.—“ We have the satisfaction to state, that the Societies in this Circuit are, in general, in a good state; and are, it is believed, walking ‘in the fear of the Lord, and the comforts of the Holy Ghost.’ Some who had wandered from the fold of Christ have been reclaimed; and others have been united to the Society, who had been living without the forms of religion.

“ At St. Margaret’s Bay, a Society has been formed during the past year, consisting of 23 members, who are earnestly inquiring their way to Zion. A chapel is building 37 feet by 26, regularly settled on the conference plan, and it is hoped much good will be done. The Class at Cole Harbour is in a peaceful and steady state. Those at Samboro, Hammond Plain, and Windsor Road have been visited, but not so frequently as could be wished, because of their distance from town.”

LIVERPOOL.—“ The cause of religion in this Circuit, may be considered as prosperous, perhaps, as it has been of late years, notwithstanding the apparent falling off in the number of the members reported in the district accounts. Our Societies are improving. During the last year, the preacher has regularly visited every part of his Circuit, and his labours have been crowned with success. One Sunday School is kept up during the summer season. The inclemency of the winter, the poverty of the people, and the distance they generally live from the chapel, prevent our having one at that time.

“ The whole of the coast and villages have been visited for the distance of 40 miles and upwards, excepting one settlement occupied by other denominations.”

SHELBURNE.—“ It is a matter of thankfulness, that the good work of the Lord is prospering in every part of this extensive Circuit. During the last year, many have been brought to God. We have three chapels; and the congregations are large and very attentive, so that we may anticipate much prosperity. We have six other places at which we preach with hope of success. We have service from four to seven times per week, and every exertion is made to visit the town and settlements. The children of our people are attended to as far as the labour of the Circuit will admit.”

SHEFFIELD.—“ The places of public worship, on Sabbath-days, are tolerably well attended; and I have preached in general, five, and occasionally six times in the week, and the people have manifested serious attention.

“ There is one Sunday School in the Circuit, under the superintendence of the Missionary.”

CUMBERLAND.—“ Our congregations are increasing, and in all parts of the Circuit they are attentive; indeed, a spirit of serious inquiry evidently prevails. At Pedicodiack, our success has not been commensurate with our wishes; nor, indeed, with the labour which has been bestowed: but at this particular crisis it is, for many reasons, of great importance that a preacher should be sent to them as soon as possible.”

HORTON.—“ This Circuit is composed of two extensive townships, Horton and Cornwallis; in both of which regular towns are laid out, though not built; and the inhabitants are scattered far and wide, according to the quality of the ground, and eligibility of the situation. Our congregation assemble from a distance of ten or fifteen miles. The Society is small, but most of its members are spiritual, and much devoted to God; great harmony, peace, and love, prevail amongst them.”

ANNAPOLIS.—“ The cause of religion in this Circuit is, on the whole, in a somewhat prosperous state. The Societies generally adorn the doc-

trine of God our Saviour. During the last year, a few new members have been added. The classes are as regularly met as circumstances will admit; but, as many of the members are very much scattered, and as we have but few leaders, many of them can be met only when the preacher goes his regular rounds through the Circuit. I am sorry to say, that at present, we have no Sunday Schools, in consequence of the inhabitants living so widely apart."

MACCAN.—"The religious concerns of this Station, on the whole, are in a prosperous state. There is here no Sunday School, nor is it easy to establish any, while the families live at so remote a distance from each other; but I have catechized the children of our friends in my private visits. At Maccan, we have a chapel nearly completed, without debt."

"PARESBROUGH.—We have lately erected the frame of another chapel, and have made some preparation for finishing it. In this Circuit, the Missionary travels from Paresborough to Nassau, a distance of thirty miles; in the compass of which, there is no Minister except one Episcopal Clergyman. Our congregations are not large, but attentive and increasing."

FREDERICTON.—"The state of the Mission is promising; the congregations are good for the situation; our members are very steady, and I hope are growing in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. During the year, there has been a gradual increase. We have one Sunday School in Fredericton, which commenced in the month of June 1820. Early in September, of the same year, the number of children amounted to 90, and continued to be well attended until the beginning of winter, after which, there was a very considerable decrease. It is, nevertheless, probable that during the ensuing summer, there will be nearly as many children as at any former period. An appearance of seriousness has been manifested by some of the elder females, eight of whom I have formed into a class."

CITY ST. JOHN.—"During the past year, the congregations have been large and attentive. Our Society has increased in numbers, and in grace. We have lost six worthy members by death during the past year. They were severely afflicted, but endured the chastisements of their heavenly Father with patience and resignation. They all died in the Lord."

"A Sunday School Union Society has been formed in this city, which promises fair to be useful to the rising generation. The School under our care contains upwards of 100 scholars."

CHARLOTTE TOWN.—"In this Circuit, the congregations have increased both in town and country, during the past year. There are two Sunday Schools of 60 children."

BEDEQUE.—"In this Circuit, there are prospects of a very encouraging nature; the congregations are very serious, and attentive to the word of life; many of them appear to be the subjects of gracious impressions, and will, it is to be hoped, become ornaments to the church of Christ."

MURRAY HARBOUR.—"Here the Society is in a very peaceable and prosperous state. We have one chapel at the Harbour, and a frame of one erected at a place called Three Rivers, where the prospects are not

very pleasing at present. The congregations are, in each place, from 100 to 150. The population in these places, I cannot, at present, ascertain. A Sunday School was established this year, consisting of 15 children."

LUNENBURGH.—"This is a German settlement. The congregations on this Circuit are numerous and attentive, but generally, the people are very poor. The Societies are increasing in religious knowledge, and are alive to God. Mr. ORTH preaches diligently, and travels a large Circuit."

MISSIONS IN IRELAND.

THE Missionaries have, during the year, been pursuing their indefatigable course of exertion in many of the most necessitous parts of Ireland; and, in some places, with much encouragement. By their preaching in fairs, markets, and streets, as well as in the houses opened for them on their respective Missions, many have heard the great truths of Christianity plainly and affectionately stated; and much information on those subjects of religion, which apply at once to the heart and to the life, has been scattered abroad among a listening but dark population. The courage, labours, and sacrifices of the excellent men employed in this arduous office, are powerful reasons why their zeal for the moral benefit of their country should be warmly seconded; and this subject has, during the year, engaged the special attention of the Committee. They have resolved to increase the number of Missionaries from eleven to twenty-one, and so to arrange the circuits assigned to them, as to bring a greater extent of the most destitute and neglected parts of the country under regular cultivation; to establish schools in the most promising places, and place them under efficient and pious schoolmasters. In these measures the Irish Conference, and the Hibernian Auxiliary Missionary Society, have earnestly co-operated; and in order to carry the arrangement into effect, the Rev. VALENTINE WARD kindly undertook to visit the Mission Stations, in September and October last, and to make the necessary inquiries. His Report is very satisfactory as to the practicability of the general plan for rendering the Missions more efficient and extensive; and under his superintendence, at a second visit in the spring, it is hoped that every essential part of it will be brought into active operation.

In the meantime, the Missionaries have been employed as usual; and the following Extracts from the Letters of several of them, will show the labours in which they are engaged.

Extract of a Letter from Mr. OUSLEY, employed in the General Mission, dated July 1823 :—

“ This has been a year of many and great mercies. In the experience

of the past 24 years that I have been a missionary, I have not seen so blessed a prospect of doing good among the poor Irish as in this last; to our Lord and Saviour, who doth all the good that is done on the earth be the sole glory.

“ In the month of July, and the beginning of August, Brother FEELY and I visited the southern counties of Leinster, Carlow, Wexford, &c. &c. and preached much in the streets, markets, &c. in the open air, generally to vast crowds. In September we visited Longford, and the contiguous counties, and preached to many. In October, having sent Mr. FEELY to the county of Louth, I visited part of Kildare and Queen's county, and Tipperary, &c. In Dunow several persons were brought under good impressions. Some of them are very promising. In Nenagh, I preached to great numbers of Romanists on the Sabbath in the street, many of whom followed me to the chapel at seven. From Saturday till Monday morning, inclusive, I preached six times, of which twice were in the street, and about eight or ten appeared awakened, and joined the class on trial. We visited this tract again in January. In November and December we visited part of Ulster, and preached much in the markets where great numbers of Romanists heard us in every direction. I have visited that county at three several times, and preached in all the surrounding markets to listening multitudes, who appeared to devour the word. A young pilgrim had heard me, and was deeply affected. The market day after, when I came to preach, he sent to me to request an interview. I met him; his tears burst forth, and he told me of his many pilgrimages which he now saw were vain. I gave him suitable advice. So great was the desire of the Romanists for hearing, that though the rain ceased not on one market day I was there, yet when they saw me walking through the town with my umbrella up they flocked after me. My heart melted for them, and I stood on a chair and preached to them in the rain, under which they stood most patiently. The whole country appeared to be moved.

“ In New-Town-Butler, I spoke in the street on Conscience. An intelligent Romanist, among others, heard, and then followed us to the chapel. He also has quitted the mass, and has written his reasons for so doing. We preached through several other parts of Ulster. Many Papists heard with much apparent satisfaction. Some were awakened to a sense of religion. In Mayo, Belline, and its vicinity, I spent a blessed week; God was of a truth with us, many Romanists heard. I preached and stood answering questions for three full hours at once in the open market. In Sligo I preached four or five Sabbaths in the streets to vast crowds, who were duly attentive. The result was that several of them sought for Testaments.”

Extract of a Letter from Mr. FEELEY, employed on the General Mission, dated June 27, 1823 :—

“ I have travelled these two years past on the general mission, during which time the Lord has greatly encouraged me. Hundreds of Roman Catholics heard us with attention. Near Killysandra, where I preached

lately twice on one market day; and in Arva, in the open air, there is an uncommon spirit of inquiry manifesting itself among them."

Extract of a Letter from Mr. REILLY, employed on the Galway Mission, dated June 19, 1823:—

"When I commenced the labours of the Galway Mission last year, it was under very considerable discouragements: the uncommon length of the rides, which I was obliged to take through incessant rains, frequently brought me very low with sickness. Many cases of opposition existed; very few societies were organized, and there was scarcely any local help to assist in the good work, in the absence of the Missionary, whilst dark, and almost impenetrable, ignorance pervaded the country, with only here and there a few traces of Gospel light: yet, notwithstanding, there was some promise of success. Many indeed, of both Protestant and Roman Catholic inhabitants, had been brought together to hear God's word by my predecessors, and by Brother NOBLE (who occasionally laboured in conjunction with me); and now in this country, in several places, hundreds came to hear the Gospel of the blessed God.

"In the *town* of Galway there is now a congregation, the largest and most respectable that ever attended there, and the most ardent wishes are expressed by many of the inhabitants for regular service every LORD'S day; and if this could be effected, great good would certainly result from it; the operations of the Missionaries would become more regular, and the effects more solid and happy. From the western district of the county of Galway, known by the name of Curtamora, a very pressing call reached us, but to the present we have been unable to attend to it, on account of the wide and important field which we already occupy. But I trust that a Missionary will be appointed exclusively to that country. In one extensive and deeply necessitous district we have lately commenced our labours, and here a very promising field opens for moral culture. About six or eight miles from this we have lately obtained a footing, though most violently opposed by the priest, who uttered, repeatedly, several denunciations against us from his altar. We preach, notwithstanding, in the house of a Roman Catholic woman, and there is not one entire Protestant family in the village. In addition to this we have established a small Sunday School.

"In Castlereagh we have the walls of a chapel built. A considerable number of people attend, and of every description, so that a very encouraging prospect now presents itself. On the whole, after all the darkness and error which prevail, we are able to anticipate that even here, "The desert shall rejoice."

"Both Mr. NOBLE sometime ago obtained several hundred Tracts from a pious clergyman, and another gentleman of respectability. The circulation of these has been attended with much good."

Extract of a Letter from Mr. CAMPBELL, employed on the Killybeg's Mission, dated June 10, 1823:—

"In the course of the last year in travelling through the wild moun-

tains, dreary moors, and bad roads of the Killybeg's Mission, the LORD has often comforted me, and caused my cup to overflow with his goodness. In all our meetings the LORD has greatly blessed us. I have had as good congregations as could be expected in the country. Many of the Romanists came and heard with great attention and seriousness. What effect the word of GOD may have had on them, time will declare."

Extract of a Letter from MR. M'CORD, employed on the Tyrone Mission, dated June 27, 1823:—

"On this Mission there are eight societies or classes consisting of ninety persons. In each class some can rejoice in GOD their Saviour. There is a prospect of two new societies being raised, of from fifty to seventy persons. On the whole, the Mission is in a tolerable state. Two of the societies are contiguous to Loch Derg, one on each side of Derg river, on the north-east side of the lake. Hundreds of Catholics have heard the Gospel in Omagh market, from time to time. Also in New-Town-Stuart, and Castlederg, several have heard the truth at funerals. The Catholics in general hear the word of GOD in fairs, markets, streets, and funerals, with attention."

Extract of a Letter from Mr. BELL, employed on the County of Dublin Mission, dated Oct. 6, 1823:—

"I have lately taken new ground on this Mission, and I thank God that the prospect is not unfavourable. This County, and all around the Metropolis, presents a field of labour where it is especially necessary to proclaim the truth of the Gospel in the most public manner, in order to reach those who are sealed up in deep ignorance of the things of God. I have, therefore, preached much in the Irish language, in the streets, in various places, and have been heard with encouraging attention."

Numerous letters from the other Missionaries have been received, which detail similar exertions, and state the effects to be in many places very encouraging. Much Scriptural knowledge has by their means been widely dispersed through various parts of the most necessitous districts, and many ignorant and vicious persons have been mercifully reclaimed and brought to the effectual knowledge of Christ. When the new arrangements for the management of the Irish Missions, mentioned above, shall have been carried into effect, the operations of each Mission, with the state of Schools, which it is proposed to establish, will be stated in detail.

Making an increase in the Contributions for the Year, of £4082 4 9.

For this gratifying state of the funds of the Society, the Committee desire to make their grateful acknowledgments to Almighty God, by whose blessing alone all good counsels and benevolent projects are ripened to a successful issue, and to the friends of the Society, by whose continued and enlarged liberality and exertions an annually increasing sum has been raised in behalf of the WESLEYAN MISSIONS. Nor is the satisfaction which arises from the growing state of the Society's funds to be confined to the increase of the means by which the wants of heathen countries may be more abundantly supplied :—the effects produced upon the minds of those who have taken their share in this hallowed service is

equally important. It is among the most gratifying circumstances, connected with the operation of Missionary Societies, that by the institution of Branch Societies, in the various circuits, and in the several towns, and even villages of which they are composed, the interests and sympathies of the pious in the most obscure parts of our country are connected with the cause of God, in its widest range of operation. Thus is information, as to the state of the world, diffusing itself through the churches at home; and thus does the cause of Missions bring upon itself the consecration and blessing of more numerous prayers, at the same time that it receives increasing supplies for the extension of its operations.

To the Ministers, in many of the circuits, and to the different Committees, Secretaries, and Collectors, the Society has of late been increasingly indebted for the efficient extension of its plans. The result has proved, that the confidence which the Committee has often expressed in the liberal disposition of the religious public, has been fully justified, and even exceeded. The sums raised in many places, far from opulent, have been in their yearly amount a matter of joyful surprise, and they present no indications of decay. The spirit which has been excited has not, as some predicted, proved evanescent and transitory; it has taken up along with it, and is sustained by, *a solemn sense of duty*; and without interfering with the claims, or the interests of any domestic charity, the impression thus made has led the contributors to regard a regular contribution for the enlargement of the kingdom of Christ as a branch of their permanent charities. The many honourable examples, not of ready excitement only, but of a steady recognition of the *principles* of obligation and of privilege involved in the support of Missions, which now present themselves in every part of the country, are, we trust, exerting their influence upon other portions of the church, where the subject has not been so well considered, nor so deeply felt. The field at home is thus opening new tracts for the gathering in of the harvest of Christian charity, as the field abroad enlarges before the zealous labours of those who are ploughing up its furrows, and, for the first time, throwing into them the incorruptible seed of the word of God, which liveth and abideth for ever.

Animated by past success, and by the unequivocal proofs which have been afforded, wherever the experiment has been made, of the disposition which exists among pious and benevolent persons in every part of this country, to extend their aid to the miseries of the heathen world, we may again confidently commit the care of the Missionary Societies which already exist; and the work of forming new Branches, to the affectionate solicitude of the Ministers of the different circuits, and of the local Committees already formed. In those circuits where Branch Societies have been formed in all the villages which they comprehend, not only has an extraordinary and unexpected success attended the attempt, in the amount raised, and the pious zeal which has been put into activity; but the information which has been diffused, the sympathies which have been called forth, and the prayers which have been offered, have had the best religious effect upon those who have engaged in these local efforts; and we believe, because of the assurance which we have, that God answers the prayers which his own Spirit excites in the hearts of his people, upon the general work itself. We especially and affectionately urge it upon all our friends to use their best exertions, thus to diffuse the spirit of zeal for the Lord of Hosts, and of kind and melting compassion for the souls of all mankind, as widely as possible. One of our great objects, doubtless, ought now to be, to bring the church of Christ, through all its members, rich and poor, and wherever scattered abroad, to array itself on the Lord's side in this mighty contest with the powers of darkness; and by prayers and liberalities, and efforts of every kind, to urge on the holy triumphs of the cross of Christ.

To our active and indefatigable collectors throughout the kingdom, the cordial thanks of the Committee are especially due; and they offer them with full reliance upon their continued co-operation, in the name of Him, whose saving purposes and merciful designs to the children of men they have been the means of so largely promoting. The blessings of many a recovered pagan, in the West Indies, Asia, and Africa, daily descend upon them.

The Committee are happy to have so much reason to believe, that in proportion to this increase of exertion at home and

abroad, the spirit of prayer has been more largely poured forth; and that the great work is laid at the footstool of him whose blessing alone can give it prosperity, in humble confession of the total insufficiency of man. The public acknowledgment which has of late been made of the office of "*The Lord the Spirit*," and the necessity of his continual agency, has had its effect upon Missionaries abroad, whose letters and other communications, give pleasing proof that these are the sentiments which influence their minds; and show that they have been greatly comforted in their arduous and often discouraging labours, by the consideration that the difficulties of their work have been rightly estimated, and that the "thousands of Israel" in this land of privileges, are "*striving together with them in their prayers, day and night, making request with tears and with joy.*" The reasons for perseverance in this hallowed exercise remain unabated, and must continue in their full force, till the prayer taught us by our LORD, "*Thy kingdom come*," is accomplished in all its fulness: and fully it cannot be accomplished, even in this present world, until the joyful thrilling acclaim be heard in all lands, and is re-echoed from the heaven of heavens itself, "*The kingdoms of this world are become the kingdoms of our God and his CHRIST, and he shall reign for ever and ever.*" Subjects of prayer, of a particular kind, and all subservient to this grand object, are constantly pressing upon the attention of those whose minds are directed to the operation of Missions.—Suitable instruments, endowed with those peculiar qualifications for that variety of service, which is now required by operations so extended, are to be asked from the Lord of the harvest, whose sole prerogative it is to send forth labourers:—the assistant Missionaries which have been raised up from among the heathen, both in Africa and India, have a special claim upon our sympathy and intercessions, as the first fruits of a native ministry, from which, by the grace of CHRIST, so much is to be expected:—those of our brethren, who have gone beyond the protection of British power, (now in almost every Colony so well employed by the representatives of Majesty, both to defend and to sanction the self-denying and devoted servants of CHRIST,) demand our constant remembrance before

the throne of the heavenly grace. Living among savage and lawless tribes; capricious, sanguinary, and brutal, they claim, both for their personal protection, and their success among a people so rugged and unpromising, our daily prayers. And, above all, when the malice and subtlety of the great spirit of evil, the ruler of the darkness of this world, are considered; and that he is now the more *active*, and the more *various* in his assaults, as he can no longer keep his goods in peace, and knoweth that he hath but a short time; it is the more imperative upon us to be aware of his devices, to arm ourselves in this work with the whole armour of God, to feel our own dependance, and the dependance of all our endeavours upon God, and to pray with all prayer and supplication in the spirit, and to watch thereunto with all perseverance.

It is thus in humble and prayerful efforts, that we are assured of the divine co-operation. And shall not God hear his own elect, which cry day and night unto him? The history of the past, is the pledge of the future; for to no great effort made, and persevered in, in this spirit, was success ever denied. When once the whole church of CHRIST, under its different names, and united in common zeal and love, is aroused to justify its original and proper character, as the *light* of the whole world, the great result to which all our wishes and exertions tend, cannot be far off. Girded by his might who has given them the commission, the spiritual Israel will be able to go up and possess the whole land. Before communicated light, the darkness must flee away; and before weapons of celestial temper, wielded by those, the arms of whose hands are made strong by the hands of the God of JACOB, all opposition must be scattered. Mighty are they, through God, to pull down the strongest holds, and to abase every exalted and proud form of idolatry and superstition, which has defied our SAVIOUR, and deluded, oppressed, and ravaged his redeemed creatures. In the name of the LORD, then, let us lift up our banners, and on this sacred day consecrate ourselves to efforts which shall never relax, and to a contest which, spurning all compromise, shall fix our steady eye upon complete and universal victory through the blood of the Lamb, and by the word of his testimony. To him be glory in the church throughout all ages. Amen.
