### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

In the field of municipal activity during 1952 the town has made steady though not spectacular progress. In the face of constantly increasing pressure from inflation it has been possible, fortunately, to hold increases in town expenses, with their corresponding affect on the tax rate, to modest proportions, without curtailing any of the services performed by the town. The budget for 1953 entails only slight increases over the amounts spent in 1952, and in some instances reductions have been possible.

During the year there have been several changes in the administrative personnel of the town. William R. Burt resigned as Assessor and Sherman T. Pike was appointed to the vacancy. Mrs. Ruth Churchill resigned as clerk to the town officers and was replaced by Mrs. Beda Langevin. This position becomes more important as the volume of office work continues to expand, and we feel confident that Mrs. Langevin will maintain the extremely high standard of work set by Mrs. Churchill. Another change was in the Nursing Service, where Mrs. Dorothy Morehouse replaced Miss Julia Burnett. Under Mrs. Morehouse's direction this service promises to reach a very high standard of value to the community. And last, but by no means least, 1952 marked the end of a long and distinguished career in town office, that of Fred O. Bicknell, who has retired as Tax Collector. Fred's first service to the town was in 1897, as Auditor, and has continued through the years in the capacity of Selectman and Tax Collector. No one has a greater knowledge of the town and its affairs, nor who loves, and is beloved by, the town in greater degree. We salute a gentleman who has served long, faithfully and well, hoping for and expecting the benefits of his wise advice in the years to come.

### TOWN HALL

The interior of the Hall was painted, upstairs and down, by a group of volunteers inspired and directed by Will Pierson. Unfortunately that group was small, and we are forced to conclude that the town prefers to have this kind of work done by regular contractors, rather than by the "bee" method. Since there remains a great deal to be done to the hall woodwork, we are including in the budget an item to cover it.

Increased use of the Hall has resulted in a greater work load on the custodian, and a raise in salary was granted during the year.

### HIGHWAYS

The main project this year was supposed to have been a section of permanent improvement to the South River Road under Chapter 90, but it did

not turn out that way. This road requires a great deal of blasting on the ledges adjacent to the Boston and Maine Railroad, with the consequent risk of serious damage to tracks, wires and other installations belonging to it. As yet no satisfactory method of meeting these risks has been determined, and at the State's request the project was postponed and the balance in the account is being carried forward to 1953. The main reason for postponement was the State's desire that the North River Road be widened this year. An outright grant of approximately \$15,000 was received for this work, which is apparently being done in order to provide an adequate detour for traffic when Scott's Bridge is replaced. However, with the carryover of the 1952 appropriation plus a regular appropriation in 1953, it should be possible to make substantial progress on South River Road next year.

In addition to the regular maintenance of town roads, several projects of a more permanent nature were accomplished. Florida Bridge was replanked and a steel deck installed on the east half of the bridge. The town of Rowe divides with us the expense of maintaining this half. Approximately 3000 feet of permanent improvement to Legate Hill Road was completed. A large culvert was set on the Heath Road, just north of Bissell Bridge, and the road straightened at that point. The North River Bridge was painted, and the authorized repairs to town sidewalks were made. A complete report of the work done and money spent on each road in town is contained elsewhere in this report.

Luckily there was practically no snow during November and December, for the snow appropriation had been almost exhausted earlier in the year. More sanding is being done, when the weather requires it, and sanding is considerably more expensive than snow plowing. During the early winter the road crew was often called upon to put in extremely long hours, and they are to be commended for faithful and efficient work under difficult conditions. In keeping with the practice in neighboring towns, rates of pay were again raised during the year, and we believe them to be well deserved.

Likewise, the hourly rates on town-owned equipment, which are credited to the machinery earnings fund, have been increased slightly. In accordance with a universal trend, more and more work is being done by machinery and less and less by hand. This means that equipment wears faster, and in our opinion the hourly rates should more nearly reflect the actual costs of using equipment. We look forward to the time when machinery earnings will be sufficiently large not only to cover machinery operating expenses, but also to cover the cost of replacing equipment as it becomes necessary. Because towns in this area are now frequently trading work, using their own equipment in each others town, it will probably become necessary to establish a uniform hourly rate for machinery use in the several towns; this may require an upward revision in the rates now prevailing here.

The Oliver front end loader authorized at the last town meeting has been obtained and is working out extremely satisfactorily. It permits substantial savings in gas shovel hire, provides much greater flexibility with consequent economy in road work and will be particularly valuable in the stock-piling of sand for winter use.

It is our recommendation that the Mack truck be traded in during 1953, and funds for this purpose are being requested.

During the year the town acquired a very nice carved wood sign for the Bissell Bridge. This was provided through the generosity of Mr. Peter Myal, who made it, and the Charlemont Lions Club, to both of whom the town's gracious thanks are due.

With regard to the street signs in town, the story is not so pleasant. During the year 35 signs of various kinds have disappeared or been destroyed, apparently as the result of sheer vandalism. This represents a financial loss of at least \$350, and the citizens are urged to cooperate in the prevention of this needless waste.

### WELFARE

Activities in this department are covered by the report of the Western Franklin Welfare District. However, it should be noted that for the first time a decrease in the appropriation for Old Age Assistance is possible in 1953. This reflects the fact that Social Security payments are beginning to ease the load of interim assistance.

### BOARD OF HEALTH

Congratulations are due the townspeople for the marked improvement shown this year in their use of the town dump. Dumping of rubbish has been done much more carefully, and it has not been necessary to move the bulldozer up there at frequent intervals to push waste material out of the highway.

While the work of the Board of Health cannot be said to be onerous, the volume is increasing. In our opinion the town by-laws should be amended to provide for a regularly elected Board to carry on the work. State regulations in this field are rapidly increasing and the Selectmen are unable to give the time and thought which the matter requires. At the present time, the Board's most important duty is to represent the town on the Western Franklin Public Health District, whose report is to be found elsewhere in this publication.

### **MISCELLANEOUS**

The most exciting event of the year was the celebration of Yankee Doodle Days in August. This was a three day series of events sponsored by

the Lions Club which included the participation of every organization in town. In spite of one day of foul weather, the events were a tremendous success and most organizations made a nice profit on their operations. Attendance exceeded the most optimistic hopes, and it was a matter of particular satisfaction to again see the Fairgrounds buzzing with activity and swarming with people. It is much to be hoped that this event will become an annual one, and we are requesting a small appropriation for refurbishing the Fairgrounds in case they again become the center of this celebration.

We are more concerned each year with the ravages of the Dutch Elm Disease and the possible consequence to the town if the disease really strikes here. We are therefore again suggesting that a committee be appointed to work with the Tree Warden in making a survey and determining the best method of meeting the problem.

It is a pleasure to report that the town is in excellent financial health, and we look forward to continued civic progress in the years ahead.

The total number of books circulated from the Library this year was 9,200 — adult fiction, 4,732, non-fiction, 726; juvenile fiction, 1542, non-fiction, 125 — this number includes magazines — books circulated from the library, those loaned from the Greenfield Bookmobile, and those from the Conway Federation.

The total number of books loaned from the Bookmobile to the Schools and homes in the town, (other than at the Library) was 2,452 — adult fiction 1,306, non-fiction 183, juvenile fiction 791, non-fiction 172.

Number of books circulated from the Conway Federation was 1,013, 603 adult and 410 juvenile — these, from January through August. We are feeling keenly the loss of the service which we have had for the past two years from the Federation. We hope we will be able to have the new project go through, for the expanded regional Library service which has been presented to the Library commissioners.

The library hours are, Wednesday from 2 till 5, Saturdays from 2 to 5, from 7 to 9. Books are loaned for two weeks, subject to renewal, fines will be charged at the rate of a penny a day. Please note the "Date due" slip at the back of the books — it will help the records very much, if a prompt return is made.

During 1952, this Public Health District Committee has made further study of its work, cooperating with the duties of the Public Health Nurse. The citizens of these four towns have also learned what to expect of the committee and of the nursing service. September brought to a close, by resignation, the service of Miss Julia Burnett, R.N. and the beginning of service of Miss Dorothy Morehouse, R.N. To fulfill the duties of any office before a well-defined program has been set up is always difficult, so the District appreciates the patience of Miss Burnett, who served us well during this formative stage. This committee was fortunate in securing Miss Morehouse who is an experienced Public Health Nurse. We are well satisfied with her work and trust our people are enjoying her labors among us.

Mrs. Harry Purinton, Mrs. Frederick Burrington, and Mrs. Floyd Veber served as dental committee. Further dental work has been done this year by Dr. Goodell of Shelburne Falls. This includes 3 cleanings, 4 extractions, 57 fillings and 6 x-rays. This dental care was given ten children from three families and transportation was provided by the nurse.

This committee appreciates the generous financial aid given by organizations. It has enabled us to continue to give special care where needed. Thanks also go to Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Pitman for their aid in the dental care of one child and their offer of further assistance in providing transportation.

There has been a good response to the District's program of distributing Vitamin A and D capsules through the schools during the winter. These capsules of the best quality obtainable are sold at replacement cost.

Under the law the District is administered by the Boards of Health of the member towns. An advisory committee consisting of two other interested citizens of each town one of whom represents the school committee enlarges the group. We appreciate the faithful attendance and constructive efforts of this committee especially Mrs. Purinton, Mrs. Burrington, Mrs. Veber and Mr. W. P. Stafford.

The budget for 1953 and the Treasurer's report follow this report.

Your continued interest and support are essential. Your criticisms and suggestions for improvement will be welcomed as we are cooperating in maintaining a high standard of health in our district.

### Report of the Western Franklin Welfare District

The year 1952 brought several administrative changes in the Welfare District. One was caused by the admission of Rowe on March 1st. The District membership now consists of five towns.

The other changes were all necessitated by changes in the General Laws which were, or became, effective during the year. On Nov. 1st, 1951 a new category of aid was established, known as Disability Assistance. This required a reclassification of welfare cases, three of which were transferred to the new classification.

On January 1st it became legally necessary to take liens on real estate owned by recipients of Old Age Assistance. Fifteen liens were placed in accordance with this provision.

Also on January 1st a new legal minimum grant for Old Age Assistance cases was established, necessitating a complete examination of all cases in order to meet the requirement. Similarly, all cases receiving Old Age and Survivors Insurance were re-examined on October 1st to conform with a new schedule of payments.

The District presently services 15 cases of Old Age and Survivors Insurance, 2 cases receiving Railroad Pensions, and one each of Postmasters Pension, Industrial Pension and Federal Soldiers Benefits.

### VETERAN'S AFFAIRS

To the Western Franklin Veterans' District Committee:

Herewith is my seventh annual report as Director of Veterans' Services and Veterans' Agent for the Towns of the Western Franklin District.

The interest shown by the attendance of Committee members at monthly meetings have been very encouraging and helpful and is greatly appreciated.

Due to the return of Korea veterans, Rehabilitation requests have increased during the past year. Our records show a total of 813 requests for 1952.

Fifty-five boys have registered at this office for Selective Service during the past year. Assistance in completing the Questionnaire have been given in many cases. Photostatic copies of the Report of Separation of returned veterans were furnished to the office of the Selective Service Board to complete their records whenever needed.

Able advice and assistance has been furnished by the Veterans' Administration Contact Representative, Edward A. O'Neil, in processing a number of pension applications and other related claims for Federal benefits.

Twelve new applications for Veterans' Benefits were processed during the year, and there are at present sixteen active cases on the books. The total for the District for Benefits administered under the provisions of Chapter 115, of the General Laws, as amended, is \$13,173.46 to date. Higher costs of food and rent have been responsible for the increase in payments.

The cost of operating the Veterans' Service Office was \$3,972.16 for 1952, with receipts of \$13.50 paid to the Treasurer for commercial photostat work done, making a net cost of \$3,959.11.

### Report Of The East Charlemont School Survey Committee

To the Citizens of Charlemont, Greetings:

Your Survey Committee appointed by action taken at the 1952 Town Meeting, herewith reports the results of its study.

The committee recommends that the East Charlemont School be preserved as a priceless heritage of the town.

The committee is of the opinion that a program should be eventually evolved whereby the building would serve as a community meeting place for civic and social purposes of a non-commercial nature and at the same time preserve its original significance as a rural educational landmark.

The committee make the following recommendations:

- 1. That a Board of Trustees of a continuing nature be appointed with the responsibility and the authority for preserving the building for future generations in a condition as near as possible as it was when last used for school purposes.
- 2. That the school be preserved as a modest rural educational museum and at the same time be available for such community gatherings as comply with rules and regulations which the Board of Trustees may from time to time adopt.
- 3. That the program for the future of the school be sufficiently simplified so as to be self-continuing during those periods in the future, which are sure to come, when interest in the project may lag. The basic plan should be a long term plan with permanency its basic objective.
- 4. That a Board of Trustees, consisting of five members, at least two of which shall reside in East Charlemont, to serve a term of five years, appointed by the moderator, be authorized at this town meeting.

In its effort to reach sound conclusions your committee endeavored to restore the schoolroom to an authentic reproduction of its last year of service. It was then open to the public for the three afternoons of Yankee Doodle Days. Results of the experiment were gratifying. An average of about 60 persons visited the school each afternoon and proved beyond a doubt the interest of the community and of the travelling public in the enterprise.

Your committee wishes to acknowledge its appreciation to the following for labor and time generously contributed in restoring the school: To Charlemont Lions Club for restoring the stone wall around the school house; to the Clark Brothers for repairing and painting the flag pole and donating a flag rope and for other repair jobs; to Carol Adams for painting the school house door and window sashes and for taking care of the flag each day; to Robert Dunlop for an attractive portable roadside sign inviting strangers to stop and visit; to Kenneth Henderson for use of truck in transporting antique school furniture; to the ladies of East Charlemont for scrubbing and cleaning the classroom; to Mrs. Mary Carpenter for use of original decorations and for arranging the classroom for visitors and to the League of Former One-Room School Teachers for serving as hostess during Yankee Doodle Days. The committee also wishes to acknowledge the

gift of an old-fashioned school slate from Charles O. Dean of Springfield and a number of old textbooks from out of town friends.

Your Survey Committee has operated this year with no financial outlay for any purpose. All services and materials were freely donated by citizens and organizations. We are of the opinion that the project can be carried on successfully with little expense to the taxpayers, once certain repairs are taken care of.

A new roof is needed over the open shed. This should be taken care of soon and the shed should be made available to the highway department for storage space for town machinery. An estimate of \$100 has been given as the probable cost of a new roof.

The main brick building needs several slates and some repairs to the entry way, which will cost an estimated \$25.

Electric lights should be restored to the building if it is to be used for evening gatherings. The building is already wired. Two articles will appear in the warrant to cover these items.

## Report of the Superintendent Of Schools

To the Members of the School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of Charlemont.

I hereby submit my fifth annual report:

*Personnel*: We have been fortunate during the past years in that only one teacher resigned from our staff of regular teachers.

Miss Mary Hughes of Turners Falls was appointed to teach commercial studies in place of Mr. Wright, who resigned to accept a position at Arms Academy. Miss Hughes holds a degree from New York University, and has had many years experience as a teacher, and in business.

Mrs. Jacqueline Hooper, music teacher, resigned in January, and we were without the services of a music teacher until September, when we were fortunate to secure the services of Mrs. Janet N. Wetterwald. Mrs. Wetterwald has been enthusiastically received by teachers and pupils and the interest in music has risen greatly.

Mr. Charles L. Warner, Principal, will be with us until the close of school in June, and on August first takes over the superintendency now held by Mr. David J. Malcolm. We wish Mr. Warner success in his new position and we wish Mr. Malcolm many years of happiness in his wellearned retirement.

Again this year it is a pleasure to report that many of the teachers have taken professional courses which increase their educational knowledge and make them more valuable to the school and the community.

In the spring, the elementary teachers attended a fifteen hour art workshop sponsored by the Binney-Smith Company, and at the same time the High School teachers held meetings in which they evaluated the program of Charlemont High School and talked of ways in which it might be improved. The excellent reports written by the teachers, wherein they report their observations on the day set aside for them to visit in other schools, indicate that many benefits are derived from such visits.

Texts and Supplies: New Texts and reference books have been purchased only after their careful examination by the teachers, superintendent, and school committee members. New texts have been purchased only when it has been found necessary to replace worn-out or obsolete ones.

A new encyclopedia was purchased for the high school and should fill in a large gap in our available reference material.

School Building: The purchase of thirty-five new pupil units, and four new teachers' desks practically complete a six year program of replacing old, worn-out, uncomfortable furniture with bright, movable, comfortable units.

A large new library table for the "library corner" has filled a long recognized need.

The task of cleaning the floors has been greatly expedited by having all movable furniture, and Mr. Turner is now able to perform his work with much more ease and thoroughness.

Cafeteria: Mrs. Maynard continues to render excellent service and it is largely due to her careful planning that we are still able to serve a meal for 20¢ while just about all other school cafeterias in this area are now charging 25¢, and at that, in many cases, the salaries of the personnel are paid for out of appropriated funds. Because of the increased business, Mrs. Max Falandes has been employed as a part-time worker in the cafeteria.

The purchase of a large double oven gas range has helped greatly in enabling the staff to serve an even better meal.

You will note that in the requested appropriation for 1953, a new section, "Vocational Tuition and Transportation" appears. Under the state law, towns which do not in their own schools provide vocational instruction, must pay the tuition and transportation costs of residents of the Town who wish to pursue such an educational program in another town, and the state reimburses 50% of the costs to the paying town. Until recently, this has been an almost negligible item, but now with four pupils enrolled in vo-

cational courses, the possibility of more next September, and in increased tuition charges, this item has grown to be quite a sum of money, and has caused a sizable increase in the budget.

A law passed by the Massachusetts Legislature of 1952, requires that each local tax bill show what part of the tax is being spent on the local schools. I wish to assure you that at all times our aim is to keep this tax as low as it is possible, and to still maintain a school comfortable, well staffed, and well supplied, all of which should help to develop an environment which is conducive to learning.

Again this year I wish to express my thanks to all those who have aided me in the administration of the Charlemont School.

I feel that through cooperative planning and teamwork on the part of all concerned, our system has made educational progress, and even greater progress can be made by our continual effort and working together.

#### REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL CHARLEMONT CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL

Mr. Thomas L. Warren Superintendent of Schools Charlemont, Massachusetts Dear Mr. Warren:

Herewith may I submit my annual report as Principal of Charlemont High School.

During the past year, with the cooperation of the School Committee and yourself, we have been able to revise our Social Studies Program for grades 5 through 8. By purchasing the Follett Unified Social Studies Series, which handles the geography and history of any area at the same time, we have been able to keep the pupils working at their own level of achievement and thus accomplish what amounts to individual teaching of the children in this field. This, as you know, is considered most worthwhile by educators everywhere. It is hoped that a similar program of revision and coordination may take place in the English and Mathematics fields to the benefit of all levels.

The marking systems in use in the upper grades and high school have been revised to attempt to show more clearly to the

parent what level of achievement and effort his child was following. There has, of course, been some criticism of those used by tradition to receiving high marks. Careful study showed that the teachers needed a revision among themselves of what should constitute high, average and low grades. Since these standards have been coordinated we have found a better quality of work being produced among the students.

Recognizing that little original research was being done by our better students we remedied that by making such research a requisite for a superior mark. This then has thrown the responsibility for work assigned upon the student who desires greater learning. It is not the responsibility of the teacher to search out the student for work not turned in. Responsibility in these small details make a pattern of responsibility for later life.

One of the needed changes which took place this year was the inclusion in the curriculum of a course in Speech and Debate. This class meets three days a week and has as its prime purpose the development of a more orderly and vocally persuasive high school graduate. It would seem advisable to consider its continuance and expansion for another year.

Our high school cafeteria continues to be a success under the able direction of Mrs. Earl Maynard with the assistance of Mrs. Max Falandes. A new Garland gas range of the small restaurant type has added to the efficiency of cafeteria operation.

Music under the direction of Mrs. Janet Wetterwald has become a vital part of our curriculum. It is a pleasure to hear the students at all grade levels eagerly greet the music instructor, waiting for her leadership. An ambitious program has been laid out for Spring when the high school will present the Gilbert and Sullivan Operetta "H. M. S. Pinafore."

In addition to Mrs. Wetterwald, the only other change in the faculty was the inclusion of Miss Mary Hughes to take over the Commercial Department. Her high standards of work required continue to keep this department one of skills highly desired in a competitive field.

The children of the lower six grades have again the privilege of training their artistic abilities under Miss Florence Williams.

The remedial speech class and lip reading instruction is this year being given by Mrs. Harold Langevin on a union basis.

Improvement of the lower floor of the high school has resulted in the construction by the school committee of a Remedial Reading room. This has given much needed privacy to Mrs. Hazel Richmond's program. Such privacy guarantees much greater success in the teaching of these highly technical fields.

Charlemont parents should take pride in the offerings which are available outside of regular classroom instruction. Through these programs we are attempting to meet the talents of all children and develop them to their fullest.

This year we have been able to work closely with two of our young veterans in a program of intensified study. Leslie Dunlop, a graduate of C. H. S. has taken four months of training in review for entrance examinations at the University of Massachusetts. David Feder is attempting to work off credits toward acceptance at the University also. Both boys have given up four months work to make this attempt. Their example should show those who have left school and those who frequently debate leaving school that continued training is essential to many good fields of occupation. Too many in the past have left school and then stated later "If I had only finished I would have a better chance." We wish these boys success in their endeavor.

In this report, my last for Charlemont High School, I wish to thank publicly all connected with the schools here for the privilege of working closely with them. In the fall, I shall miss the many challenging associations I have enjoyed these past two years.

May the Charlemont Schools continue in a spirit of fundamental progress for years to come.

#### Report of the School And District Nurse

This past year the community health activities in Charlemont continued, with visits to the school and the homes to aid in the promotion of health, the correction of defects, the prevention of disease and the care of the sick.

In September there was a change of the District nurse. Miss Julia Burnett R. N. resigned and Miss Dorothy Morehouse R. N. was appointed to the position.

The annual Well-Child Conference was held in August. Dr. M. B. Low gave 29 Charlemont children a fine physical examination. Defects found when the child is small will give a chance for correction, usually before the child enters school. Immunization for Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus was started and the nurse completed the series later.

The Greenfield Health Camp is a wonderful place to start an under nourished child on the road to good health. Six children from this area, 3 from Charlemont went last summer. With good food, rest and lots of fun they returned, improved in health and in better condition for the winter months ahead.

Following is a report of the health activities since I became your district nurse in September.

The physical examinations by Samuel Galbo, the new school physician, found the children in general in good health, 96 without defects. This did not include teeth. Poor feet were outstanding with 14 children having flat feet, 8 with pronations and 7 with weak arches. Posture was poor, too. A number of children were noticed with drooping shoulders, crowding the chest area. Besides encouragement at school to "sit tall" a kindly word at home might help to correct this easy relaxed habit, that gives poor posture. Vitamin A and D capsules were available again this winter. These do help to keep a child in better health.

The hearing of the school children was tested by Mrs. Beda Langevin. Three children had marked hearing loss and are attending lip reading classes. This may prove to be very helpful in later years. One child was taken to an ear specialist for examination. Prompt examination by an ear specialist for any child found with a hearing loss may prevent progressive deafness or save what hearing the child has now.

Speech correction classes were held at the school for children who had difficulty in speaking, with 8 attending.

Miss Genevive Ely, State Dental Hygienist, checked the school children's teeth. Only 22 had teeth in good condition, all others needed attention. For healthy mouths these defects should be corrected. Many children have been taken to the dentist under the Dental Program. Much needed care was given to teeth that otherwise would have been neglected.

The Mass. Vision Test was given in the school this fall. Slips were sent home with 31 children to notify the parents of defective vision and the need for further examination. Constant eye strain can undermine a child's health. Six children with very poor vision were taken to an optometrist for examination and glasses.

Sickness in the school was high this fall with many cases of Chicken Pox. Nineteen home visits were made at this time, taking suspicious cases home and checking the health of others. Many little preschoolers also had the disease.

Home visits were made to aid in the care of the sick, to give hypodermic injections and in the Health Service, visits to infants, preschoolers and the older folks to help in maintaining health.

Herewith is submitted the annual report of the town Finance Committee.

Your committee is pleased to report that the year has been a healthy one financially for the taxpayers of Charlemont.

With a very few minor exceptions no accounts have been overdrawn. No special town meetings for the purpose of transferring funds from one account to another have been necessary during the year.

The General Town Budget, as prepared by the Selectmen, and approved by this committee, is substantially lower than a year ago. The school budget is somewhat larger than a year ago, but with rising costs of commodities and services, is not out of line with other communities.

The Finance Committee recommends the following:

For support of schools, \$53,762.00 as proposed by the school committee.

For the General Town Budget the following amounts as proposed by the Board of Selectmen, and itemized in the Town Warrant:

#### February 4, 1952

#### Article 2. Voted to raise the following appropriations:



Article 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of five members, to be known as Trustees of the East Charlemont School, whose full term shall be for five years, at least two of the membership to be residents of East Charlemont, said Board of Trustees to be given the responsibility and the authority of preserving the East Charlemont Brick Schoolhouse as a historical landmark for future generations, subject to bylaws of the Town of Charlemont and rules and regulations and laws of the Commonwealth; the original appointments to be for varying number of years until all appointments shall be for a term of five years, with one term expiring each year; or take any action thereon.



# SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Without question the most significant event of the year was the establishment of a regional school district with Hawley, on January 13, 1953. The Hawlemont Regional School District is the first elementary regional district in Massachusetts, and represents the culmination of six years of concentrated effort to improve school facilities in the two Towns involved. In accordance with the vote of the last annual meeting, a site for the new building was sold to the District and the deed has been delivered. As everyone knows, ground was broken for the building in late Fall. It is earnestly to be hoped that the possibilities of tremendous future benefits, both educational and financial, will be fully realized.

The year's highway program has been successfully carried out under the able direction of Paul Heist. In 1953 the many difficulties in connection with blasting operations on South River Road were overcome, and substantial progress was made on the road. All of our Chapter 90 construction allotment was spent there, and it will require many more years, at \$8000 a year, before the road is completed to the Buckland line.

Another section of Legate Hill Road was reconstructed, and a start made on the West end of Harris Mountain Road. Thanks to the generosity of Mr. Daniel Wheeler, who granted permission to use part of his property, real progress has been made in widening and straightening a portion of the road. A large drainage project on West Hawley Road has been completed, the bridge to Roy Hicks' has been replaced with a large diameter pipe and numerous small improvement projects undertaken in addition to the customary maintenance work.

During mud season in the Spring all town roads were again posted against heavy traffic. While this may create temporary hardship for truckers, it prevents excessive damage when the roads are tender, and we expect to continue the policy in the future.

Attractive road signs, carved by Peter Myal, have been placed on all town roads and have done much to add interest to the Town and provoke comment.

The Mack truck was replaced with a new International, which is giving excellent service. Town equipment is in good condition and we hope to keep it so, not only by careful maintenance, but by a sound policy of replacement. We plan to trade in the pickup truck next year for a larger dump truck, capable of use for gravelling, sanding or plowing snow rather than being limited to the minor work of which the pickup is capable. Funds are being requested for this purpose from the Road

Machinery Fund which is now large enough to provide not only the usual maintenance costs of equipment, but also can provide for outlay for new equipment.

The Board has been giving serious consideration to the need of a building to house town equipment, and is of the opinion that such a building should be erected. We would like to obtain the opinion of the town on this subject at the annual meeting, after which a definite course of action can be determined.

A continuation of the Town Hall painting program was carried on during the year and further redecorating is planned for 1954, completing the walls and woodwork on both sides of the upper hallway. We would also like to instal additional storage space for town records somewhere in the building, and for these two purposes the sum of \$200 is being requested.

The second annual Yankee Doodle Days, sponsored by the Lions Club, were a great success and provided a tidy profit for all participating organizations. The Fairgrounds were once again the center of activities and justified the considerable expense which was involved in widening and improving the road thereto. On November 11th a work bee was held with the Lions Club working on the grandstand and four others, Paul Heist, Edward Stafford, George Boullie, and Will Pierson working on the grounds themselves, removing stumps, stones and debris and generally improving the terrain.

The Town provided a float for the parade celebrating Greenfield's 200th Anniversary in June, thanks largely to the time and effort put into it by Merle Clark. The float received much favorable comment and publicity, and thanks are due to those who made it possible.

Activities of the Board of Health were about normal. The usual well-child conference was held, as reported elsewhere. It became necessary to condemn one dwelling house as unfit for human habitation, and it appears that the owner is unwilling or not ready to rehabilitate the property. Unfortunately it is located on the main street and detracts from the attractiveness of the village.

It is becoming increasingly apparent that something will have to be done, in the not too distant future, about sewage disposal in the village. This, together with the lack of an adequate water system, represent the two greatest needs of the Town at the present time. Townspeople should realize that it will not be possible to postpone action on these matters indefinitely.

Needless to report, the gypsy moth problem became acute in 1953 and promises to be more so next year. For the first time part of the Town appropriation was pooled with the County and a few other towns and a

limited spraying program undertaken. While this represented hardly a drop in the bucket, it did help stimulate a concerted and widespread attack on the pest, which it is hoped will be adopted on a State-wide basis in 1954. For this reason a larger appropriation will be requested.

Late in the year, a "community" system of television reception was started in Town by a private individual without proper authorization. This has apparently worked out reasonably well for those connected to it, and interfered materially with others who use their own TV antenna. The matter is presently being investigated by our Town Counsel and the attorney for the owner of the system in the hope that something satisfactory will be worked out.

To those of us who are adminstering town affairs, and who probably can't see the trees for the woods, things seem to be moving along reasonably well. To those of you who have a better perspective and can see the need of improvement, may we please have the benefit of your suggestions?

# Report of the Finance Committee

To the Citizens of Charlemont,

Greetings:-

Herewith is submitted the annual report of the town Finance Committee.

Your committee, during the year, approved the transfer of funds from the Reserve Account to such demanding accounts as Bonding Town Officers, Soldiers Relief, and Workmen's Compensation, all unavoidable. They also approved a transfer of \$35 to the Christmas Party Account. This latter transfer, while small, was made without the entire approval of the committee. It would seem that any

such account could and should have been kept within the appropriation made at the annual Town Meeting.

During the spring months a careful and intensive study of the estimated cost to the Town of Charlemont for operating the Hawlemont Regional School was made at the request of one of the tax payers on one hand and the School Superintendent on the other. A full report was made thereon.

The committee, with Kendrick and Pitman present, sat with the School Committee and again with the Board of Selectmen in consultation over the 1954 Town Budget. We have submitted our budget for publication in the Town Report and assume full responsibility therefore. We believe that this is the first time that the Finance Committee has, as provided in the Town By-Laws, drawn up the budget instead of the Selectmen. We have felt that, in view of the coming expenses for the Regional School, only absolutely necessary expenses should be included, and that the appropriations for the same should be kept to the irreducible minimums. The budget, then, calls for something between \$4000 and \$5000 less than last year exclusive of any amount that may be requisitioned for the Hawlemont School. Whatever that amount may come to it should be easily possible to pay it out of available unappropriated funds. tax rate for 1954, providing that income from the State as will be shown on the Cherry Sheet is equal to that of last year, should be close to \$3.00 less than in 1953, or around \$35.

Finally we would mention that the appropriation for Swimming Classes that has been on the budget for the last few years was eliminated. Your committee, after a careful study of the laws relating to the Powers and Duties of Towns, can find no authority for such appropriation and, believing it illegal, have omitted it.

Because your committee has been unable to get in touch with George Ringchrist for the last six months, and because it is known that he is not at present residing in town the committee has declared a vacancy on said committee.

# REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

During the past year the Fire Department responded to 23 Town calls and 7 out-of-town calls.

As part of the Yankee Doodle Days, the Department sponsored a square dance in Bissell Bridge.

Another piece of equipment was purchased this fall. A Myer's high pressure pump with a 600 gallon tank, which will step up the efficiency of the Department in fighting building or grass fires, especially where water is hard to get at.

During the year 1953 improvements were made at Memorial Park by removing brush and stumps over a large area so the land can be moved with machine.

The road leading to the Park was graded and made wider which proved of great value during Yankee Doodle Days.

Among the activities held at the Park were many programs during the three Yankee Doodle Days: the joint pic-

nic of Odd Fellows and Rebekahs from Shelburne Falls and Charlemont and the Sportsmen's Club trapshoots and use of rifle range.

The Commission recommend that a larger appropriation be made for Park improvement on account of needed repair to the ell at rear of grand-stand to help preserve the main structure.

We wish to thank each and every loyal citizen who gave free labor in making improvements to the Park.

# REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

The Library will be greatly benefitted by the expanded Regional Library services offered through the Greenfield Regional Center. Through the efforts of the Franklin-Hampshire Rural Libraries Association, of which the local Librarian and Trustees are a part, the state appropriation for this unit was greatly increased this year. Services were added similar in scope to those furnished by the Western Massachusetts Libraries Association which was financed through a Marshall Field grant, terminating in September, 1952. By reason of this expansion in service, Marshall Field permitted the residue of the gift, including books and equipment valued at approximately \$17,000, to be transferred to the Regional Center.

The question of the disposition of the Tyler building and funds is still before us. A situation, adopted only as a temporary expedient, still exists and, as yet, no satisfactory solution has been found. This is to be the project for the coming year.

Full details regarding disbursement of the Library and Tyler Memorial funds will be found under Selectmen's and Treasurer's reports.

# REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

Total circulation was 9869 which includes books loaned from the Library and those from the Bookmobile — fiction and magazines 8996, non-fiction 873.

Books purchased 136; a few of the top-notchers — O Rugged Land of Gold, by Martha Martin, a true story of her winter alone in Alaska, her husband lost in a storm, and her hard battle to keep herself alive after being injured in a landslide; Only Parent, by Louise Dickinson Rich; the reprint of Boy Captive of Old Deerfield; the History of Hawley; The Sea of Glory - the magnificent story of the four chaplains of different faiths who went down on the Dorchester which was sunk by an enemy torpedo — after giving their life jackets to four shipmates; the two books by our Charlemont writer - Guys on Ice and Halibut Schooner, the first a saga of GIs in World War 2, a handful of GIs sent to guard one of the Pribilof Islands off Alaska against the Japs; the second book concerns a season of winter fishing in Alaska, of the author, one of a 6 man crew on a 60 foot fishing boat — hardships of winter fishing with lively accounts of uproarious situations; Labrador Nurse, by B. J. Banfil, with the background of the Grenfel Mission in Labrador, gives a stirring account of her heroic devotion to the needs of mankind in the far North; Seven Steeples by Margaret Hendrichsen, her story of her work as a pastor of seven churches in Maine; The Unconquered by Ben Ames Williams, continuing the story of Don and Lucy Page which was told in Williams' earlier book, House Divided, Page a Northerner with faith in the New South — an authentic picture of the post-Civil war in the south.

We ask greater care in returning books on time; Library hours, Wednesday from 2 to 5 — Saturdays, 2 to 5, 7 to 9.

# REPORT OF TOWN HISTORIAN

Mayhew, and a splendid reproduction of the old Academy Building which was destroyed by fire. I am, and have been for many years, an officer in the First Congregational Church of Charlemont, and have in my possession all of the facts pertinent to that organization. I have tried to get these facts into some form so that someone can get them together. Progress is slow, but I have met with considerable help from books, cemeteries and libraries. I wish to thank the Taxpayers for this position, and believe that in the course of time I will be of much help in obtaining the needed material.


The following information about Grove Academy is reported by Fred O. Bicknell, most of it taken from an early report by Belle M. Mayhew.

The Academy was built in 1839 on what is now known as Academy Hill. Land was donated by three men, Messrs. Hastings, Rodman and Dickinson. The first term of school was held in that same year, taught by Roland S. Howes of Ashfield who was assisted by David Hawkes of Charlemont.

One evening in 1868 the building was destroyed by fire, and the same evening a tannery opposite the Misses Maxwells and a shop belonging to Eugene Field, on the East side of the road near Bissell Bridge, were burned by an incendiary.

The Academy was apparently not used all of the time between 1839 and 1868, but was used for school purposes for several years, and after for town meetings and as a meeting-place for the Cattle Show.



# REPORT OF TREE WARDEN

During the year 1953 a survey was made of elm trees in the Village of Charlemont in regards to the Dutch Elm Disease.

While it was felt that several trees which were scouted were infected, a negative report from the University of Massachusetts Shade Tree Laboratory was received.

It has been recommended by entomologists that a careful check be kept of all elm trees in regards to what is known as bark rot, which is the first visible means of detecting the Dutch Elm Disease.

It will be deeply appreciated by all interested in this work if landowners and other persons detecting elm trees in a state of decay will kindly notify the Selectmen or local Tree Warden who will be glad to have samples taken and examined.

In this manner it is hoped that a check will be kept on our elm trees with a view to stamping out this disease.

Several dead trees along highways of the town have been removed this past year.

At the present time there are no funds set aside solely for this work, but it is hoped that this condition will be corrected.

# VETERAN'S AFFAIRS

Board of Selectmen Town of Charlemont Charlemont, Mass.

Herewith is my eighth annual report as Director of Veterans' Services and Veterans' Agent for the Towns of the Western Franklin District.

The continued interest of Committee members in the District affairs is greatly appreciated and is very helpful.

With the assistance of Gerard M. Fritz, County Treasurer, who attended our last meeting, the Contributory Retirement System has been accepted for the District.

The Massachusetts Bonus for Veterans during the period of the Korean emergency became effective June 25, 1953, and 119 applications were processed after the first of July to the end of 1953.

The total number of requests for assistance was 858 for 1953. Forty-nine boys were registered for Selective Service, and assistance was given to several on Selective Service questionnaires. Photostat machine work was done on Tuesday of each week, and a total of 1,410 prints were made during the year.

A total of 24 applications for Veteran's Benefits were processed during the year, eight new cases, and at present there are fourteen active cases on the books. A total of \$11,481.06 was administered for the district under the provisions of Chapter 115 of the General Laws, as amended.

Eighteen applications for pensions have been prepared and forwarded with the cooperation and assistance of Mr. Edward O'Neil, Contact Representative of the Veterans Administration. The benefits received from these pensions have helped to reduce the financial burden to the Towns.

The advice and cooperation of the Contact Representative at this office on alternate Wednesday afternoons during the year have been very helpful.

The cost of operating the Veterans' Service Office for 1953 was \$4,142.58, with receipts of \$8.00 paid to the Treasurer for commercial photostat work done, making a net cost of \$4,134.58.

# Trustees Of East Charlemont School

To the Citizens of the Town of Charlemont, Greetings:

Herewith is submitted the first annual report of the Trustees of the East Charlemont School.

This report will be brief and will deal largely with the back-ground history of the movement to preserve this fine old building.

Action taken at the 1953 Town Meeting provided for the adoption of a town by-law which would permit the appointment of a committee of five members to be known as the Board of Trustees of the East Charlemont School. The exact wording of this vote will be found recorded in minutes of that meeting.

On June 8, 1953, the town received official approval of the by-law from the office of Attorney General George Fingold. On June 30, 1953, Town Moderator Horace E. Warfield appointed the following committee to serve until the 1954 annual town meeting: David J. Malcolm, Mrs. Emma Fisk, and Mrs. Mabel V. Sears, all of Charlemont, and Laurence A. Clark and Stanton C. Kendrick of East Charlemont.

Your Trustees have held one meeting to discuss problems of organization and policies in an informal way. No definite actions of any sort were taken, it being the consensus of the Trustees that the permanent Board soon to be appointed should be free from any previous commitments.

Your Trustees have made no expenditures during the year, but a much needed roof was installed on the school shed under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen from funds appropriated for that purpose. The school was open for three afternoons during Yankee Doodle Days and entertained many out-of-town visitors. We recommend an appropriation of \$25.00 for the year 1954.

Your Trustees are of the opinion that the duties of the Board will include much long range planning in order that the true value of this historical heritage may be a continuing inspiration to future generations. Its preservation and development should be a civic enterprise supported by private individuals and organizations throughout the town. The program will be slow in unfolding, but the future is worthwhile. Suggestions will be welcome from all sources.

# Hawlemont Regional School District Report

Following the establishment of a regional school district by vote of the citizens of the Towns of Charlemont and Hawley, three members of the school committee of each town were appointed to serve as members of the regional school district committee. They elected W. Payson Stafford to serve as chairman and Gertrude L. Ogden, secretary. F. Dean Carter was appointed treasurer and Thomas L. Warren, Union School Superintendent, was appointed to serve as superintendent for the regional school district. Two men from each town were chosen to act as advisors, without voting power. They are Winston Healy, Dr. Charles Streeter, F. Dean Carter and Harold White.

All members of the committee visited several new school buildings to learn modern school requirements.

Mr. Karl S. Putnam who drew plans for the Charlemont committee introduced Mr. Warren H. Ashley of Hartford, Conn., who was engaged to draw plans for a six-room elementary school with cafeteria and gymnasium.

Merchants' National Bank of Boston with Shelburne Falls National Bank cooperating, was chosen to handle business for the committee.

Mr. Joseph T. Bartlett of Greenfield was chosen to serve as legal counsel.

The contract for the new school was awarded to O. D. Purington Co., Inc. of Providence, R.I., low bidder, and construction was begun in November. The building is to be completed not later than December 1954.

\$325,000 bonds were sold in November to finance the new building. During construction, the building will be insured against loss or damage from any cause.

The committee has met in regular and special meetings 24 times, besides being represented twice, by Superintendent Warren and several members, in the office of Mr. John Marshall of the School Building Assistance Commission, in Boston, for conferences on procedure.

# Report of the Superintendent Of Schools

To the Members of the School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of Charlemont.

I hereby submit my sixth annual report.

I believe that the action taken by the voters of the towns of Charlemont and Hawley whereby they approved of the building of a regional elementary school was the outstanding event of the year. The provision for the housing of the elementary pupils in surroundings which will be more conducive to better health and better atmosphere for learning is well worth the sacrifice which all will have to make to pay for the building.

The members of the regional school district committee and their appointed advisors are deserving of great commendation for their devotion to their arduous task of planning for the construction of the new school building. Throughout the year they have given unstintingly of their time and energy, as anyone may well realize by reading the report of the Regional School District which appears elsewhere in this report.

The reopening of school in September occurred with a new principal and three other new teachers in the high school. This represented an 80% change, the greatest in many years. However, the new principal and teachers with the kindly advice and assistance of the veteran teachers in the building have carried out their assignments in a very satisfactory manner.

The public reception to the new teachers soon after the opening of school was highly successful, and it would be well if it were to become an annual affair. It serves to establish a healthy parent-teacher relationship early in the year. In this regard I urge all parents to become acquainted with their children's teachers in order that by working together they may better promote the pupil welfare.

Since the school personnel chart presents the statistics on teachers who have resigned or been appointed there seems no need to repeat the facts here. One has but to read the papers to become aware of the difficulty of procuring teachers, and I feel that we have been quite fortunate in our selections.

Many of the teachers have continued the practice of taking extension courses which have served to keep them aware of the latest methods and developments in education. The quality of the instruction has been enhanced by this in-service training program. In connection with this program, the annual teachers visiting day and the annual county teachers convention have also proven to be of great value.

No educational program can function without the proper tools of instruction, therefore, we have continued to change textbooks, add new or replace old equipment whenever it was deemed necessary, but only after a careful survey of the same. In order to more properly train our commercial students we have purchased an electric adding machine and four new typewriters which replaced four which were quite old.

A new liquid duplicator which will benefit teachers and pupils was also a major purchase.

The school roof which has been a continual source of trouble due to leakage during stormy weather has once more been repaired, and we feel that this time the leaks have really been eliminated.

Adult Education: Throughout the nation there has developed a large scale "return to school" on the part of adults by means of evening classes. This year we have had such a thing happen in Charlemont with the instigation of an adult typing class of 12 pupils under the direction of Miss Mackler. The pupils use the school equipment and pay a small fee which is used to compensate the instructor. This adult program could be expanded into other areas of learning such as agriculture, current affairs, government, etc., if there is a need or desire for such classes.

As in past years every effort has been made to keep costs down and yet provide the instruction and equipment which are necessary for the adequate education of the youth of our community. It is gratifying to continue to receive

many fine reports on the excellent progress being made by many of our graduates in institutions of higher learning, in the armed services, and in business or industry. Charlemont can but do its utmost to furnish the best possible facilities for education, however, the ultimate amount of success attained by our graduates depends on their own individual initiative, energy, capability and effort.

The continued cooperation of the members of the Board of Selectmen and of Mr. Lawrence S. Tinney, town hall custodian, in allowing us to use Goodnow Hall for the various school affairs and athletic contests is greatly appreciated.

Doctor Samuel J. Galbo has given a very complete physical examination to each pupil in the school, and I wish to commend most highly Miss Dorothy Morehouse, school nurse, for the zeal and energy with which she carries out her duties.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the school committee members, teachers, parents, and pupils for their cooperation and support throughout the year.

#### REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL CHARLEMONT CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL

Dear Mr. Warren:

It is my privilege to submit herewith my first annual school report.

The enrollment at the opening of school in September was 163 of which 71 were enrolled in the high school.

The program of studies has undergone some alterations since last year. The addition of a combined course of commercial law and consumer economics as well as a course in world history has broadened and enriched the program of elective subjects. Another significant change has been the division of all of the 7th and 8th grade combined courses. The individual attention provided these grades, as a result, is most desirable at these levels.

A demand for a more reliable evalution of the wide range of student accomplishment brought about the adoption of a new marking system and new report cards. The new system has proven to be very satisfactory for all concerned. Although the student grades are not as high as they have been in the past I feel that they are indicative of the students performance.

The cafeteria is feeding a larger number of pupils than it has in the past. This would indicate that more people realize what a fine hot lunch program we have, thanks to the capabilities of Mrs. Maynard. We are indeed fortunate in this respect.

The senior class play, "Hillbilly Wedding", under the direction of Mrs. Lois McHaffie was presented in November and was a complete success. The entire group is to be congratulated.

Two Christmas programs were presented in December. One was the annual elementary school presentation in conjunction with the Christmas Tree sponsored by the Town. The other program was two one-act plays produced by the 7th and 8th grades capably directed by Mrs. McHaffie.

I firmly believe that the school program is progressing and improving as I had hoped it would. The new members of the staff have worked in well and the old members have been completely cooperative for which I would like to express my thanks.

If time permits, I would like to look forward to an expansion of our guidance and testing programs in the near future.

## Report of the School And District Nurse

This past year the activities of the district nurse for the towns of Charlemont, Hawley, Heath and Rowe were continued with a generalized public health program — making school and home visits of a wide variety, to help folks keep well and to care for those who were sick.

As the result of the school physical examination by Dr. Samuel J. Galbo, school physician, one outstanding defect was dental caries, noted in many of the children. For good dental health there is a need for personal care, professional care and an adequate diet. A large number of children also had weak arches. Shoes that give good support to the feet will greatly prevent this marked defect.

A T.B. patch test was given to all pupils of the first and third years of the High School, to learn if any had been exposed to Tuberculosis. All were negative.

It is gratifying to know that in the vision tests given in all the schools this fall there were far less children with defective vision. This was due to the fact that about all the pupils with poor vision last spring were checked by an eye specialist. Many new glasses appeared which meant relief from eye strain.

In all the schools hearing tests were given by Mrs. Beda Langevin. Marked hearing loss was found in one child from Charlemont, 2 from Hawley and 2 from Rowe. Highly specialized in this work and with a sensitive machine, she is able to easily discover early cases of defective hearing. We are indeed fortunate to have her test in this school union. Her lip reading classes do benefit greatly children who do not hear the soft sounds that normal ears pick up. The largest group of children we have ever had are attending her speech classes. The majority are from the lower grades. This is corrective work, in cases of faulty pronunciation of sounds or to help in cases of physical impairment.

The children are weighed and measured spring and fall. Home visits are made to those not making the average gain. How the pupils at the Pudding Hollow school in Hawley gained! The supplementary school lunch program that the mothers so kindly arranged certainly was a great benefit to the health of every child. A continuation of this program is urgently needed.

All workers in the Charlemont school lunch room have had a chest x-ray and all were negative to Tuberculosis.

A modified Red Cross Home Nursing course was given to the senior high school girls last spring. They learned useful ways of caring for the sick in the home.

The children in the schools were occasionally checked for cleanliness and care of the teeth, hoping to encourage them to have good personal hygiene. Dental films are shown as a part of our health educational program.

The annual Well Child Conferences were held in August. Dr. Merritt B. Low was the examining physician. Mrs. George Coombs gave helpful suggestions to the mothers in nutrition. Mrs. Robert McIntosh and Mrs. Arthur Flynn, dental hygienists, examined the children's teeth and discussed the value of dental attention. We were pleased to have a very large attendance. The conference was held 3 days in Charlemont with 74 attending — Hawley, one day, attendance 29; Heath, one day, attendance 28 and Rowe, one day, with 26 attending. Next year we plan for more conference days as this year the daily quota was a bit too high.

The purpose of a Well Child Conference is to "keep the well child well and to promote his best state of health now and for the future." The children all had a fine physical examination. The physician's conference with the mother included all aspects of the child's health and any abnormal conditions were to be referred to the family doctor for care.

Visits were made to new borns, infant and preschool children to be of help to the mother in maintaining good health of the child.

The children had a wonderful time at the Greenfield Health Camp last July. Three went from Charlemont and one each from Hawley, Heath and Rowe. Everything here is carefully planned to give better health to a child who may be a bit under par — good food, extra rest and a happy time.

Under the dental clinic, during the past year dental service was given to 13 children who were greatly in need of dental care. This service included a total of 50 fillings, 23 extractions and 27 x-rays.

Article 8. Voted to transfer from the Tyler Library Trust Fund Income Account the sum of \$180.00 for maintenance and repair of the Tyler Library, the unexpended amount to be returned to the Tyler Library Account.

Article 9. Voted to amend the town by-laws by adding 7A and 7B to Section 7 of Chapter 111 as follows:

Section 7A. The Selectmen shall act as the Board of Public Welfare.

Section 7B. The Selectmen shall act as the Board of Health.

Article 10. Voted to appoint a Committee to work with the Tree Warden in making an investigation of the status of Dutch Elm Disease in Charlemont and preparing recommendations for dealing with the disease for submission to the Selectmen.

Article 11. Voted to amend the town by-laws by adding Section 13 to Chapter 111 as follows:

Section 13. There shall be a committee to be known as the Board of Trustees of the East Charlemont School. consisting of five members, at least two of which shall be residents of East Charlemont. The duties of this Board shall be to preserve the East Charlemont Brick School House as an historical landmark for future generations. Immediately after the effective date of this by-law the Moderator shall appoint five persons to this Board who shall serve until the Annual Meeting of 1954. At the Annual Meeting of 1954 the Moderator shall appoint five persons to this Board, one to serve for one year, one to serve for two years, one to serve for three years, one to serve for four years, and one to serve for five years. Thereafter the Moderator shall annually, at the Annual Meeting, appoint one member to this Board who shall serve for a term of five years.

Article 12. Voted the sum of \$50.00 for repairs and electric light at the East Charlemont School, said sum to be expended at the discretion of the Board of Trustees of the East Charlemont School.

Article 13. Voted the sum of \$100.00 for repairs on the East Charlemont School shed, said sum to be expended at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen for the purpose of providing suitable storage space for Town equipment in East Charlemont.

Article 14. In view of the establishment of a Regional School District on January 13, 1953,

Section 1. Voted to transfer from available funds in the Treasury the sum of \$800.00 to the fund created for the school purposes under a vote passed on February 7, 1949 under Article 13 of the annual town meeting warrant of that date.

Section 2. Voted to rescind in its entirety the vote taken under Article 13 of the annual town meeting warrant of February 7, 1949, said vote having been passed as follows:

Voted to amend that vote cast under Article 3 of the warrant for a special Town Meeting held July 13, 1948

so that as amended said vote will read "voted to raise and appropriate \$150,000.00 for the construction of an addition to the Village School and originally equipping and furnishing said addition, and for the remodelling of the existing building. The Building Committee appointed at the Annual Town Meeting in 1948 is hereby authorized to enter contracts and do all necessary things for the completion of the work authorized by this vote.

It being the intent of this Article to restore to the sources from whence they came the amounts of money set aside for the school building purposes, and to revoke the authority granted to make a loan of \$130,000.00 for school purposes.

Section 3. Voted to establish a fund of \$19,750.00 to provide, to the extent thereof, during the year 1953, for the payment of Charlemont's share of the expenses of the Charlemont - Hawley Regional School District, or any corporate name which may be adopted by said Regional School District, said fund to be provided by the transfer to it of the sum of \$12,720.15 from the town's Post War Rehabilitation Fund so-called, and by the transfer to it of the sum of \$7,029.85 from available funds in the treasury.

Article 15. Voted to accept Section 6A of Chapter 40 of the General Laws and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 to be spent in conjunction with the Mohawk Trail Association for the purpose of advertising the town's resources.



# SELECTMEN'S REPORT

As 1954 draws to a close it finds us with the Hawlemont Regional School completed. We think as a whole the tax payers are glad that we have this school. With the new gymnasium for the children to use in the cold weather it would seem that the building was well worthwhile.

The highway program was again carried out under the good management of Paul Heist. In 1953 we thought we had difficulties in blasting ledge on South River Road but the landslide this year with the mud was not far behind. This year, the same as last, all of our Chapter 90 allotment was spent on South River Road. The only difference is that the State allowed \$4000, more, making \$12,000 in all. It looks like slow work but eventually we hope to complete new construction to the Buckland line.

Again another section of road on Legate Hill was widened and graveled, ready for tar next year. Also a section on Harris Mountain Road was started; unfortunately we were unable to finish but we expect to complete the job to the top of the mountain next year.

We also started to widen a section on Slaunwhite's Hill. Due to finding more ledge than we expected, we did not finish that either. That, too, should be completed this coming year.

We have put up Guard Rails in several dangerous places and we need a lot more. As in the past the usual maintenance was kept up.

It has been our policy in the past to post roads with a weight limit in the spring. We expect to continue with that policy.

The rcd pick-up was traded in toward a new International Dump Truck which is working out good. It comes in handy when we need an extra dump truck. Equipment is all in good shape. We don't have to have any new this year. We have bought a new one-way plow so now we have three trucks that can plow snow.

In last year's Selectmen's report we had an article in regard to construction of a machinery shed. We have looked into the cost of a new building (which we need very badly) and find that if we have one built by a contractor, it would run into so much money that the town couldn't afford to build one. But we have an idea to put before the people; that is, if we buy a building spot, and do it by degrees by the Town Highway help. We could do it at a cost we could stand, paying for the same out of machinery earnings. This explains the article in the Town Meeting Warrant.

The woodwork in the Town Hall was scraped and refinished, a hard job well done, due to the perseverance of Homer Tanner and son. Also some cupboards were built very reasonably by Fred Warner to use for storage of records.

The third annual Yankee Doodle Days sponsored by the Lions Club was a greater success than ever before. All of the organizations made money who participated. The Fairgrounds made it possible for such activities. It's a beautiful spot and much money could be spent on the grounds to improve them. A good job was done by the Odd Fellows and Lions Club on the grandstand straightening and also reconditioning of the kitchen.

The Board of Health activities were normal with the exception of a question of typhoid, which will be explained more fully in the nurse's report. In the past we have taken care of the dump out of the Board of Health account. The dump has gotten to be quite a headache. So we are asking for a separate allotment to take care of this next year. If people who use the dump would put rubbish over the bank instead of in the road, it would help a lot. Also if the papers were burned and not left at the dump to blow around, it would not be such an eyesore.

The gypsy moth spray program, most of the people think, was quite a success.

# REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

To Members of the Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Charlemont, Greetings:

Herewith is submitted the sixth annual report of the town Finance Committee.

We would first point out that Charlemont, what with financing and operating a new regional school, has reached the limit of its ability to support other than routine projects. The direct tax per capita, that is the total tax divided by every person in Charlemont, will have risen in 1955 to approximately \$82.00. To evaluate what this means, it need only be compared with other Massachusetts towns such as Conway, which last year reached \$70.00; Ashfield at \$63.00 and Buckland at \$68.00. Further afield the per capita tax in Orange was \$58.00; Amherst \$52.00 and Palmer \$42.00. A mere ten years ago Charlemont's tax per person was \$44.00.

With these facts in mind, both the budget of the Selectmen and the budget of the School Committee have been carefully and economically prepared.

The outstanding financial problem facing the citizens of Charlemont for the next few years will center in adjustments encountered in changing from a traditional educational program to a modern educational program based on a Regional School curriculum.

Regional elementary schools in Massachusetts are in a pioneering stage of development. Consequently the School Committee and the Superintendent of Schools have no precedents to follow, but must explore their way as each new situation develops.

It will be necessary for citizens of Charlemont to have patience while new problems are being solved and it will be equally necessary for the School Committee to have wisdom to discern between the actual needs of the new curriculum and between services and equipment which can be delayed until the initial impact of the costs of the new Regional School building upon the economy of the town has passed its peak.

Charlemont is now a part of a Regional School District with a fine modern school building rapidly coming into service. Utilizing the possibilities of the new building to its full capacity will require a fine sense of values and much hard work on the part of the Regional Committee and the Superintendent of Schools. The Finance Committee cannot urge too strongly the co-operation of citizens of both Hawley and Charlemont with the Regional Committee in this matter.

The Finance Committee recommends the following:

For the General Town Budget, \$55,757.85 as proposed by the selectmen and itemized in various articles of the Town Warrant.

For support of Town Schools, \$34,856.00 as proposed by the School Committee.

We call attention to the fact that an appropriation of \$34,856.00 for the support of town schools does not constitute the entire cost of schools for the children of Charlemont. The \$34,856.00 covers only the cost of all transportation and most of the cost of maintaining the high school.

The town has already been assessed \$29,715.25 as its share of expenses for operating the Regional School. Adding these two items together, the total costs of maintaining schools for 1955 will require an estimated \$64,571.25.

If we include \$15,711.12 which is Charlemont's share of Interest and Principal due on the new building, our total bill for education in all its aspects during 1955 will come to \$80,282.37.

However, there is a much brighter side to the picture than these figures would indicate. The town may conservatively expect to receive during 1955 from State Reimbursements and from other out-of-town resources considerably more than half of this amount. Data for an exact estimate of this anticipated reimbursement is not available at this time.

In closing this brief report, we wish to commend a fine spirit of community interest found in every department of the town. Citizens and town officials are united to dissolve a burdensome, but very much worthwhile situation.

# REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

During the past year the Fire Department responded to 17 town calls and 4 out-of-town calls.

The Department's new high pressure pump was placed in full use this year, and it proved its value in fighting grass and house fires. This piece of equipment created a great interest to surrounding towns, especially after the work it performed at the Hawks' fire. We were called upon by interested persons to give demonstrations with this piece of equipment.

During the winter months the Department held a Red Cross First Aid Class open to the public.

Last summer the Department took charge of the swimming class for our children. 65 children benefitted by this project.

During the months of July and August the Department sponsored a Little League Baseball Team with Mr. W. L. Tilley in charge. As many as 30 youngsters between 8 and 13 years of age took part.

As part of the Yankee Doodle Days, the Department sponsored a square dance in Bissell Bridge.

We cordially invite anyone who is interested to attend our regular meetings the second Monday of each month. We are always open to suggestions that may be of benefit to the Department.

# REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

The number of books available at the library has been greatly increased by its affiliation with the Greenfield Regional Library Center and the circulation per capita is satisfactory.

However, the trustees have long been aware that the physical features of our library are entirely inadequate. Therefore, at our invitation, Miss Alice Cahill of the Massachusetts Division of Library Extension and Mr. Charles de Grasse, Greenfield Regional Librarian, met with us to discuss conditions and suggest improvements. The report submitted by them was not flattering and does little to bolster our civic pride.

Here are some of the salient facts:

- (a) The main room presents a cluttered appearance due to lack of space.
- (b) The children's room is poorly lighted and provides neither inducement nor facilities for them to linger and look at the books available.
- (c) It is doubtful if one door serving three adjoining rooms would comply with fire regulations.
- (d) The seating accommodations consist of 9 chairs, most of them bottomless. The reading tables are crude and in poor condition. It is suggested that civic-minded citizens might have in their attics furniture that might be refinished and converted to library use.
- (e) Charlemont Public Library has a per capita income of 58 cents which is 92 cents below the \$1.50 that is considered an absolute minimum for limited library service. Yet a public library is considered to be second only to the public school as an educational institution.

We ask that you consider these facts. Our library should be every good citizen's business and the trustees would welcome suggestions for improvement of our status in this important educational field.

Details of disbursement of Library and Tyler Memorial funds are listed under Selectmen's and Treasurer's reports.

# REPORT OF THE TOWN HISTORIAN

In the year 1888 a paper by J. L. Wade and Company, Shelburne Falls, Mass., gives much information about Charlemont as of 1888. I came to Charlemont this same year, and have personally known many of the names mentioned. Considerable difference of opinion in regard to the names of the Streets has come up for discussion. It appears from this document which is printed by J. L. Wade Company that what we now call EAST MAIN STREET was in 1888 called ELM STREET, and High Street was part of it.

I have also discovered that one Newton G. Warner, who was the grandfather of Allen Warner of Greenfield, and the party who cares for the Village Cemetery in such a splendid way, he apparently, as per copies

of deeds enclosed with this report, had much to do with the history of Charlemont from 1849 up to the time of his death.

I have also made a list of Selectmen, Assessors, School Committee, Town Clerk, Treasurer, and Collector of Taxes for the last one hundred years.

The work of getting facts and figures which I have, has been interesting. I have received help from various sources, but sometimes I find that the person who has valuable information to give does not show much interest. I have spent much time looking up the Cemeteries in town, and have obtained from information to be found on the grave stones much help. I would like to have someone tell me where I can find the facts about the original Leavitt and Village Cemeteries. I have copies of two deeds having to do with the East Charlemont Cemetery, furnished me by Mrs. Amy Kendrick of East Charlemont, but they appear to be for additional land, one from a party living west of the original cemetery and the other from a party on east side of the old cemetery. I have talked with a Mr. Kendrick living in Greenfield and the person who has been doing such a fine job in caring for this East Charlemont Cemetery.

I have found out that in studying the past of the people who were here in Charlemont in 1888, many came from different towns, quite a good many from the town of Savoy, Emmett F. Haskins, Charles Haskins, Eddie Phelps, Frank B. Ford, Herbert T. Ford, Harvey Polly, Austin Polly, Philo Tower, Mrs. Marcus Mayhew, Dr. Charles Bowker, Dr. M. A. Bowen, C. S. Carpenter.

Have had some inquiries from different individuals, and people have called at the house to talk with me. I enjoy these visits, and do wish there were more people who would take the time to stop, look and listen to the past.

Herewith is submitted the second annual report of the Trustees of the East Charlemont Schoolhouse

Your Trustees have pursued a program of open-minded caution during the year. We have welcomed opportunities whereby the East Charlemont Schoolhouse might be of immediate service to the inhabitants of the town and we have explored suggestions for a long range program.

We have had two immediate objectives in mind. The first is to keep the building in a good state of repairs and the second is to do so at a minimum expense to taxpayers.

From time to time, as specific needs arise, we plan to call upon various individuals and organizations to assist us in establishing the schoolhouse as a historical shrine, dedicated to the preservation of traditions and artifices of Charlemont. The suggestion has been made that, among other functions, the school house a collection of old textbooks, teaching aids and furnishings such as were used in country schools of the last century.

Gifts suitable for such a collection will be appreciated. However, until such times as better protection for valuable articles can be devised, we suggest that gifts of special value be delayed until a later date.

Electric lights were connected at the school during the year which are expected to cost the town about \$1.00 per month. A series of meetings of the East Charlemont Farmers Club were held during the winter, the club furnishing its own heat. Organizations wishing to use the building are encouraged to do so by making arrangements in advance with Stanton Kendrick or with Lawrence Clark.

We wish to thank the Patrick J. Coyne Post of the American Legion for a gift of an outdoor flag which is being displayed on all suitable occasions. We also express appreciation to individuals and organizations who are generously assisting us in developing a worthwhile program whereby future generations may enjoy this fine old landmark.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of Charlemont.

The outstanding community project for Charlemont and Hawley for the year was the construction and occupancy of the Hawlemont School, the first regional elementary school in this state. By this accomplishment you have provided your children with educational surroundings comparable with the best. The people of the Hawlemont Regional School District may well be proud of this endeavor and are to be congratulated. Among the many favorable facilities in the new building that may be mentioned are: single grades and smaller classes per teacher, adequate room for exhibits, demonstrations, and the pupil work display, the attractive, spacious, well lighted and equipped cafeteria and a much needed auditorium and gymnasium, which will be enjoyed and used by the citizens and children of both towns.

It is an apparent fact that the new school will result in an increase in the school budget. This year, we propose a total school budget for the high school and the Charlemont share of the Hawlemont school, not including the debt and interest on the latter building, which is an increase of \$12,143.25 more than the regular school appropriation of last year.

Community progress cannot be acquired without financial stress and at this time it may be heartening to the taxpayer to realize that during the ensuing years the financial burdens on the new school might be lessened. The insurance cost for this year on the new building is expected to be approximately \$1,320 but this figure will decrease to approximately \$440 per year thereafter. If an amendment to the regional agreement is accepted by both towns whereby the District, instead of the individual Towns pay the transportation cost, it will result in an additional \$5 per

child reimbursement from the state which also means that the state will reimburse the District 100% on this item. At the present time there are 63 Charlemont children and 49 Hawley children who are being transported to the regional school. After five years the annual installment on the debt of the new building will decrease from an annual payment of \$20,000 to \$15,000 per year and the interest payment also will decrease each year. It must also be noted that the total reimbursement from the state will be increased by an additional 15% each year for the regional school.

It may be of interest to you to know that in accordance with the Regional agreement, the first eight grades comprise the regional school, though physically the seventh and eighth grades are in the high school. This arrangement results in Charlemont paying the full salaries of three teachers in the high school, and the custodian and a portion of the salaries of the principal, the seven regional teachers and the custodian in the new building. However, in further accordance with the regional agreement, the high school pupils have access to the cafeteria, auditorium and gymnasium. At the time the original plans were drafted, as well as at the present time, the above mentioned agreements seem fair because both towns gain by the use of the new facilities. As time progresses, because no agreement is perfect, it is recommended that through cooperative effort and understanding for the common good of the school and communities that differences that may occur be solved in a manner whereby the whole may benefit. Unity is vital!

After giving much study to the operating costs of the High School in comparison to similar towns of under 5,000 population with high schools, I wish to propose that a study be made concerning the possibilities of decreasing our school budget by combining with Shelburne in their proposed Regional High School District, either as a member or on a tuition basis. The results of this study may in future years be of greatest importance not only to the taxpayer but to our educational progress.

In fairness I must call to your attention that the High School is in dire need of repairs. The boys' lavatory is in a deplorable condition and though money was allotted for the correction of these availing conditions, it was urged by the Finance Committee, due to the prevailing costs of the regional school, to postpone action for one year on all repairs. However, it must be understood that in the interim the untoward conditions are increasing and it is inevitable that money will have to be expended for this purpose if the building is to remain as our high school.

The high school faculty for the first time in years has remained constant which is encouraging, as it requires time for a teacher to become acclimated that he or she may give a full capacity of teaching efficiency. We welcome to the staff of the Regional School, Mrs. B. Constance Pollard, Mrs. Winifred Looney, and Mrs. Hazel Richmond, the transferred teachers from the Charlemont system, Mrs. Estella Carter, Mrs. Thelma Purinton, Mrs. Gladys Clark, and Mrs. Ruth Law, and special supervisors, Mrs. Janet Wetterwald, Mrs. Jeannette Rich and Mrs. Beda Langevin. It is pleasing to report that most of the teachers have taken courses during the past year.

We are fortunate that pupil furniture, text books, laboratory supplies and office practice equipment are adequate and that no large sum need be expended for same this year.

Mrs. Earl Maynard, manager of the cafeteria is serving approximately 180 meals daily. This program with its new facilities is offering an opportunity to the pupils to have a nourishing meal and Mrs. Maynard is to be commended for her effort in serving an excellent meal at minimum cost.

Dorothy Morehouse, R. N. has again this year not only accomplished the basic health program but through her constant effort, the program is growing and she is to be congratulated for her achievements.

The citizens, pupils and teachers may be appreciative of the continuous efforts of Mr. Will Turner and Mr. Charles Purinton in keeping the buildings clean. Cleanliness should be basically an essential aim of all schools as it definitely influences health standards within the community and home.

The Hawlemont Regional School Committee wishes to express appreciation for the generous gifts of ophthalmic glasses for deserving children and the bleachers for the new gymnasium, given by the Charlemont Lions Club, and the electric basketball scoreboard, purchased by the graduating classes of 1953 and 1954.

I wish to thank at this time the members of the school committee for their cooperation and the many people in Charlemont who are interested in the welfare of the schools and of the young people in the community. It is with sincere pleasure that this report is presented.

## REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

Herewith may I submit my second annual report.

The enrollment at the opening of school in September was 219 which includes 51 high school and 168 elementary students. The break-down is as follows:

Last June a class of seven students graduated. Three entered the armed services and two are furthering their education.

There have been many significant changes with the addition of the new regional elementary school. The plant and staff now serving the elementary

school is to be envied by many larger communities. The program which is being developed promises to be one of which the citizens may be proud and will include all avenues of development for the "whole" child!

One significant benefit of a new building which could possibly go unrecognized is the increase in space and facilities for the high school.

There is no further need of holding classes in the basement rooms. The laboratory is now on the first floor and includes three new tables with intervening sinks and an instructor's demonstration table. This is a tremendous step toward adequately preparing students for living in a scientific age.

There has been an increase in number and a decrease in size of the homerooms which is desirable for closer contact and guidance of the individual by the faculty.

The main room on the second floor which is not ideally suited for academic instruction is now being used for library study, audio-visual work, art, music, and other extra-curricula activities.

The commercial room which had been necessarily small in the past was enlarged and, with the addition of new equipment, now provides excellent tacilities for those whose interests lie in this field!

All of the aforementioned changes as well as the gymnasium and auditorium facilities offered in the new building provides our town with a secondary school plant which is fairly complete at a time when there is a great deal of talk and pressure in educational circles for an accrediting agency for colleges and secondary schools.

The course of studies in the high school has been enriched with the addition of courses in Advanced Math, Junior Business Training, and Office Practice. The latter includes a period of time for students enrolled to actually work in the principal's office under realistic conditions which promises to do a great deal for those who may go into commercial work after graduation.

A new schedule arrangement has been operating this year which has offered advantages which were lacking before. By placing an activity period at the end of the day, it has been possible for the students to have their extra-curricula activities, makeup work, and additional assistance in subjects without interrupting their regularly scheduled classes!

The new cafeteria operating in two lunch shifts continues to provide a fine hot lunch, despite an increase in number of almost 60%, which is a credit to Mrs. Maynard and her staff.

Although many improvements have been made there is still much to be done. Probably the most important of which is the landscaping and improving the grounds as well as badly needed maintainence and repairs of the high school building.

In conclusion, may I express my sincere appreciation to you, the school committee, the faculty, the students, and all others for the assistance and support that has been so generously accorded me.

# HAWLEMONT REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT REPORT

Planning by the School Committee was not terminated by the awarding of the contract for the Regional School. The committee has met in regular and special sessions 27 times during the year, and because of the urgency of some matters, decisions were also made by telephone. The members have given much time to inspection of the building during construction and many conferences with the architect and contractor were held. It seemed advisable to make some changes in the original plans for financial reasons.

New furniture and furnishings have been chosen carefully. We were fortunate to be able to use much of the furniture from the Charlemont elementary rooms and the Hawley Schools, the latter being refinished. Adequate amounts of books and supplies were obtained to supplement those on hand.

The original plan of having eight grades in the six rooms in the Regional School seemed impractical as any plan for double grades would result in an excessive number of pupils per teacher. The Charlemont members preferred to continue departmental instruction and offered to include the seventh and eighth grade pupils from Hawley in the "Junior High School". This arrangement comprising Hawlemont Regional School, resulted in the first six grades, with six teachers in the new Regional School, the seventh and eighth grades and one teacher in the High School

The superintendent's, principal's and school nurse's offices are in the new building.

With no precedent to follow, the school committee found the making of the school budget difficult and time consuming.

The Committee hoped that the facilities of the auditorium, gymnasium and cafeteria would be available for use by the citizens of the Hawlemont District without charge. The new operating budget does not provide funds to cover expenses of heat, light and janitor service beyond school activities. For the present, it seems necessary to charge a fee of \$2.00 per hour, this amount has estimated to cover the cost of heat and light, and janitor service to be paid by the organization using the new facilities.

The Hawlemont Regional School District Committee acknowledges with appreciation gifts of bleachers for the gymnasium and eye glasses for deserving children from the Charlemont Lions Club, and of a score board from the graduating classes of 1953 and 1954 of the Charlemont High School. The committee also appreciates the time, effort and advice given generously by the Superintendent and the advisory members; namely, F. # REPORT OF THE SCHOOL AND DISTRICT NURSE

The public health nursing program of Charlemont, Hawley, Heath and Rowe continued this year with its aim to promote health, prevent disease and deformity and care for the sick.

School physical examinations were given by Dr. Samuel J. Galbo, school physician. Except for some minor defects and the need for dental care, the children were found to be in quite good health. The well being of children depends greatly on nutrition. "A good breakfast is the foundation for a good day."

Films were shown in the schools to interest the pupils in nutrition and encourage better dental care. Vitamin A and D capsules were available to all school children and may be obtained throughout the school year. They help toward better health during the season of colds and lowered resistance to disease.

The fine Health Room in the new Hawlemont School was prepared for health services and emergencies. When a child does not feel well or has a fresh cut or abrasion attention is given. Sick children or those having suspicious contagious conditions are taken home. It has been found that in keeping a child home from school, and in bed, when symptoms of a cold are noticeable that complications may be prevented. Such an individual or a coughing child can easily spread a cold to other pupils in the school room.

Vision testing was done in the schools. Retesting pupils who failed the test proved the need for examination by an eye specialist. Parents of these pupils were notified.

"How much have I gained?" This question I often hear at weighing and measuring time in the schools. It is a fine thing to have them becoming health conscious. Gain in weight is greatest in the schools with a hot lunch program.

All pupils were negative to the T. B. patch test given to the first and third year pupils in the Charlemont High School.

Hearing tests were given in the schools by Mrs. Beda Langevin. A new technique in testing by using a new model audiometer resulted in a more thorough individual test for all children in the school union. Only one child was found this fall with a marked hearing loss. Classes were given in lip reading and the correction of defective speech.

Communicable diseases were few, with none spreading through the schools. At one time we were concerned with a contact to a possible ty-

phoid fever case. Precautions were taken at home and in the school. All went well, but it was best to be on the safe side.

A modified Red Cross Home Nursing course was given to the Junior and Senior High School girls. Nursing care for the sick and helpless patient in the home was demonstrated and practiced in the class room.

The annual Well Child Conferences were held in July. Dr. M. B. Low examined each child and discussed with the mother the child's special needs or correction of abnormal conditions, referring to the family doctor for care. Mrs. George Coombs was the nutritionist. Essential foods for the health of the child and family were suggested to the mothers. Mrs. Robert Mc-Intosh, Jr., the dental hygienist, examined the children's teeth and talked with the parents about correction of defects. A well balanced diet, with plenty of so-called protective foods, will help greatly to build sound teeth. The number attending the conferences were: Charlemont 97 — Hawley 27 — Heath 24 and Rowe 19.

Home visits were made to the parents of infants and preschoolers to talk about the child's health — to discuss diet, rest and to encourage medical supervision.

To the Greenfield Health Camp went children from the 4 Towns — 3 boys and 3 girls. Here they have excellent care, good food and extra rest. Health is the main factor but they have a fine time as well.

There were 7 children taken for dental care through the Dental Clinic. This service included a total of 34 fillings, 7 extractions and 17 x-rays.

Article 10. Voted to appropriate from available funds \$14,960.63 to meet the Town's share of the 1954 expense of the Hawlemont Regional School District.

Voted to accept the following motion with amendment as follows: MOVED: That the Selectmen, with the advice of the Town Counsel, are hereby authorized to investigate the possibilities of the town being permitted to obtain the benefits of the devise and bequests under the will of Fred L. Tyler without necessitating the establishment

and maintenance of a free library in the Tyler residence, and if after such investigation they shall determine that there is reasonable probability that the town may, through appropriate proceedings in the courts, obtain such benefits without the necessity of maintaining a free library in the Tyler residence, then the Selectmen are authorized on behalf of the town to institute such proceedings and take all proper steps in connection therewith, otherwise the Selectmen shall report the result of their investigation to a subsequent town meeting.

AMENDMENT: Made and seconded that the Tyler residence shall not be sold without giving the town a chance to vote no on the question, and opportunity to consider using the property as a residence for School Officials or Doctor.

Article 12. Voted to accept the motion that the Selectmen be authorized to investigate the question of constructing a town shed with particular reference to site and cost of construction, and report their findings at a subsequent meeting.

### REPORT OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

**OCTOBER 5, 1954** 

Article 1. Voted to recommend for the purpose of providing the town's apportioned share of the operatingmaintenance budget and the town's share of amounts required for payment of debt and interest of Hawlemont Regional School District for the period up to and including Dec. 31, 1954, that the town transfer \$5,500.00 from the 1954 appropriation of the School Department to the Regional School District and in addition thereto to transfer \$800.00 from the Reserve Account to the Regional School District and authorize the Town Treasurer to borrow \$3,000.00 in anticipation of revenues because of schools under Chapter 70 of the General Law due in 1954 and pay such sums to the Regional School District; and in addition to the above, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,326.50 making a total of \$10,626.50 as certified by the Hawlemont Regional School Committee as the town's apportioned share of said costs.

Article 2. Voted to pass over the article to transfer from the 1954 appropriation for Water Holes to the Fire Department account \$500.00.

Article 3. Voted to transfer from the 1954 appropriation for Old Age Assistance (Town Account):

The sum of \$700.00 to Welfare. The sum of \$500.00 to Disability Assistance.

### REPORT OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

OCTOBER 26, 1954

Article 1. Voted to rescind the vote passed under Article 1 at the Special Town Meeting held on October 5, 1954.

Article 2. Voted to provide the town's apportioned share of the operating-maintenance budget and the town's share of amounts required for payment of debt and interest of Hawlemont Regional School District for the period up to and including December 31, 1954, to transfer to said District the sum of \$5,500.00 from the annual 1954 appropriation for the school department, as recommended by the Finance Committee and in accordance with Section 33B of Chapter 44 of the General Laws as amended, and in addition thereto to appropriate from available funds the sum of \$5,126.50 for transfer to said District, making a total of \$10,126.50 as certified by the Hawlemont Regional School Committee as the town's apportioned share of said costs.

### VETERANS' AFFAIRS

Ten years have now elapsed and an unforeseen war has been fought since the Selectmen of ten towns met to organize the Western Franklin Veterans' Service District in December 1944.

Our work in the office has increased during the past years, especially in the many different types of assistance requested. The total number given assistance in 1954 was 881, among them 34 registered for Selective Service. Applications for Medical and Hospital care 39, and Pensions 16, were included. Photostatic work has been done every Tuesday with a total of 1,305 prints made during the year.

The benefits applied for under Chapter 115, the old "Soldiers' Relief" law as now amended, have also increased due to unemployment. In this department we now have 20 active cases. During the past year we have aided 28 needy families, the Town concerned paying a total of \$17,304.02 for benefits. This includes maintenance for the applicant and family with Medical and Hospital care as needed.

Our files now contain records of 1,516 veterans, of whom 224 are from the Korean War. Much work remains to be done on the permanent copies of military and naval records, indicating a need for more clerical assistance.

The cooperation of the members of the District Committee has been most helpful in solving difficult problems. Close contact with the Veterans Administration thru Mr. O'Neil and with the Veterans' Service Department of the Town of Greenfield has continued over the years and has proved the value of mutual aid in our work.

The cost of operating the Veterans' Service Office during the past year was \$4,266.90. This expense is divided among the ten Towns in proportion to the assessed value of each. The budget set up by the Committee for 1955 as certified to the Town Treasurers is \$4,900.00.

# Twenty Year Trends in Town Expenses

NOTE: In order to economize on the cost of the town report, only Table 2 is being printed here. The others will be posted during the annual meeting, when anyone interested can compare them with this analysis.

The tables which follow have been prepared in the hope that they will be of value to townspeople who are interested in the trends of the town's fiscal affairs, over a period of twenty years. For this purpose, town expenses have been divided into five categories, schools, highways, public assistance, public health and "all other" expense. Because everyone is familiar with the converse of the proposition that "figures don't lie", it is perhaps true that no one but a trained economist should attempt to draw conclusions from the tables. However, it seems apparent that some conclusions can safely be drawn, and you are, of course, perfectly free to draw your own.

#### Valuation And The Tax Rate

Table 1. As everyone knows, the tax rate is the product of two factors, the total valuation and the town's expenses, more specifically that portion of the town's expense which must be provided for by local taxation. This table shows the affect which valuation has on the rate, the most striking point being the sharp drop in the rate caused by the revaluation in 1948. Inasmuch as the valuation was relatively stable before 1948, and has showed only a slight tendency to rise since then, it would seem that changes in the tax rate have been due to fluctuations in the amounts of money spent.


#### Town Expense And The Tax Levy

Table 2. This table shows the total expenses of the town, commencing with an average of \$73,000 for the years 1935-1940 and reaching a peak in 1953 of \$181,000, an increase of 148%. It also shows that the total tax levy, or amount of money raised locally for town expenses, has increased from an average of \$30,000 for the years 1935-1940 to a peak of \$62,000 in 1954, an increase of 106%. It is apparent, therefore, that the difference of 42% must have been provided from other sources. As a matter of fact, the other sources have been the State and Federal govern-

ments in the public assistance program, and the State in the cases of schools and highways.

The dotted line in this table is the Consumer's Price Index, with a 1935-1939 base of 100, and a peak of 1954 of 192. Because this index of the price level, or the cost of living, so closely parallels the curve of town expenses, it would seem to indicate that the increase in expense has been no greater than that required to keep pace with the higher price level which has prevailed, rather than being caused by an increased program of town services. The one important increase in town service which has occurred during this period, the Regional School, is just beginning to make itself felt in the town fiscal picture.

In connection with the tax levy, it will cause no surprise to those of us who pay excise tax on automobiles, to note that receipts from motor vehicle excise tax have risen from \$679 in 1935 to \$8,117 in 1953.



#### Schools, Public Assistance And Public Health

Table 3. This table is unique in that it shows that Public Assistance is the only category of town expense which shows a decreasing trend. This decrease is almost entirely in Old Age Assistance, and is due to the fact that social security and expanded pension programs are gradually reducing the burden of Old Age Assistance expense. It is a trend which should continue, barring major economic upheaval.

Public Health expense in Charlemont is relatively small, and has always been so, although it too has approximately doubled in the 20 year period.

In the case of school expense our analysis seems to indicate that most of the rise is due to two factors. Expense more than doubled in the five post-war years, due mostly to the sharp increase in the price level, but partly to the fact that the school department had more ground to make up than some other departments in salary levels and in program. The rise since 1953 is due to increases involved in the Regional School. There is considerable basis for hope that school expenses will level out at or near the 1955 peak.

#### Highways And "All Other" Expense

Table 4. This table shows that highway expenses have failed to increase as much as increases in the general price level would have seemed to make necessary. If the two bridges built in the last ten years were averaged into highway expense they would make the total expense show the amount of increase which would normally be expected. Without these two major capital outlays, however, it seems apparent that we are not quite keeping up. This conclusion is also borne out by inspection of the highway program as it actually operates.

"All other" expenses have risen, as would be expected, to a level approximately double that of twenty years ago. Here again it is apparent that most of the rise occurred during, and because of the post-war period of inflation.

#### TAX EXEMPT PROPERTY

As a matter of interest, there follows a list of tax exempt property, as of 1954.



Under the law which provides for exemptions for veterans who are at least 10% disabled, or hold the Purple Heart, there are ten cases in which the full \$2000 exemption has been granted, and two cases with exemptions of \$1500 each. This is about average for all the years since the law has been in effect, and amounts to \$920 in tax abatements at the 1954 rate.

Under the law providing for \$2000 exemptions for widows, over 70 years of age and owning less than \$3000 of real property, there has averaged to be three cases in recent years, amounting to \$240 at the 1954 tax rate.














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
