

### SCHOOL REPORT.

Repairs have been made on school-houses in divisions 1, 4, 5, and 7,—1, 4, and 7 having been painted, and No. 5, shingled. The work of shingling No. 1 having been partly done, the part remaining will be finished in the spring.

The necessity of shingling the latter was not discovered until the beginning of the summer term of school. For this reason the appropriation for repairs on school-houses may be slightly overdrawn.

A moderate outlay will be required for repairs the coming year. It will be necessary to shingle in part the school-houses in divisions 3 and 4.

The dilapitated condition of the fence around the school-house in No. 5 is a source of annoyance to the owner of the adjacent pasture land. A new fence is needed to take place of the old one.

Divisions 1, 2, 4, 6, and 7, had two terms of school each, while Number three had only one in the fall. A brief notice of the schools in divisions 4 and 5 is in place.

The summer term in No. 4 began under the usual favorable circumstances, but it soon became apparent that there was a lack of order and discipline in the government of the school.

Frequent and repeated visits, accompanied by suggestions and admonitions to the teacher and reprimands to the scholars, did not stay the tide of disorganization, and the term was closed at the end of four weeks as unprofitable and worthless.

The fall term under the charge of an experienced and competent teacher continued thirteen weeks, ending with highly satisfactory results.

The summer term in No. 5, interrupted a few days after its commencement by the necessary change of teachers, was prosperously brought to a close.

The closing examination was satisfactory, although interrupted by the whooping-cough among the scholars. The fall term of twelve weeks was highly successful. The summer term in division 7 was discontinued from a paucity of scholars.

The schools in the remaining divisions have been uniformly successful, and the teachers faithful in their work.

In order to more clearly define the duties of the teachers and the obligations of scholars, we adopted a set of by-laws and regulations for the government of the schools, printed on cards which were posted in every school-room at the beginning of the fall terms. They were cheerfully complied with, and will remain in force the coming year. Whatever may be the opinion on the changes and innovations made in the school laws during the last five years, the free text-book law meets with universal approval not only among the people of our own town, but as far as our intercourse extends among those of other towns.

The annual expenditure for books for several years to come will be very light, since the schools are now well supplied and any surplus that may arise in one division can be transferred to another where more may be required.

The contracts for these books, and the prices which are very low, cannot be changed by the publishers for five years, as the same are recorded on the town books.
