





THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg, in the County of Coos and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of Pittsburg on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at Ten O'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget and raise money for the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. Resolved that the foregoing vote shall remain in full force and effect as to future boards of Selectmen until it be rescinded or changed at some future Town Meeting.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell or rent any real estate or interest therein which the Town shall obtain by Tax Collector's Deed.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty dollars for care and improvement of Back Lake Beach.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road from Paul Clogston's House to the Hill Road.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to buy a new heater for the Library and raise money for the same.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Five Hundred Dollars to be laid out on the road between Perry Stream Bridge and the Blodgett turn. Also Five Hundred Dollars to resurface Beach Road.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Five Hundred dollars for Varney and Stearns Road.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise Five Hundred Dollars for graveling Day Road.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise One Hundred Dollars for advertising and publicity.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise Six Hundred Dollars to shingle and paint Town Buildings.
- 14. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
- 16. To choose a Delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

# Superintendent's Report

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Pittsburg School District:

## General

The future progress of our schools depends largely upon our present effort. What are we doing today, as a community, that has a bearing on what we hope our schools will be, a year from now? It is paramount that we know what we want and that we persist in seeking it, whether it be for ourselves or for the boys and girls of our schools.

There will never be a dearth of opportunity for young people with vision, faith and determination. Vision can be developed, likewise faith and determination. Ours is the task of instilling these concepts.

We can all take pride in our schools and share in the common purpose to make them better. Our schools symbolize the aspiration of our people and are the foundation of that equality of opportunity for which democracy stands.

## **Teachers**

The following changes were made in the teaching personnel of the district: Hilda Simonds of Middlebury College was selected to fill the vacancy as teacher of French and English; Marjorie Frizzell was elected to fill the Intermediate Room vacancy and Louise Ross accepted the Danforth Primary position. The latter were both graduated from Keene Normal School.

## **Enrollment and Attendance**

The total enrollment for the town shows a slight increase over the last report. There are now 158 in the schools. We have three tuition pupils from

Clarksville, three from Stewartstown and there are four from Pittsburg attending at West Stewartstown and Canaan.

The percentage of attendance, 97.98, for Indian Stream was especially commendable. The High School had the poorest record. Indian Stream likewise had the best record of tardinesses with only seven, while the High School had 53 and the Danforth Primary 62.

Due to the overcrowded condition at the Danforth it seemed wise to transport the seventh and eighth grades to the village, and redivide the remaining group with grades 1-2-3 in the lower room and the 4-5-6 upstairs.

# **Buildings and Equipment**

The buildings are for the most part in very good condition. During the past year; the High School building has been redecorated inside, bulletin boards added to the two lower roms, while at the Danforth School, both ceilings were lightened and numerous other repairs and improvements to the property have been made.

The Village Primary Room has been equipped with new pupil desks and a piano.

I hope that it will be possible to add another room of new furniture this year. The district may wish to consider the possibility of soundproofing the other side of the attic for Manual Training and the old unsanitary slate urinal in the boys' basement should be replaced by modern equipment.

# Health

The following report will give you some idea of the work that has been carried on by Ethel Sturgis, the school nurse.

Many physical defects have been corrected during the past year, but there are more that need attention.

Parents usually accept, without question, a surgeon's decision about the need of an emergency operation, but when a child has had repeated attacks of tonsillitis it is difficult to make them realize the necessity for an operation. A child with infected tonsils may have repeated attacks of ear disease, development of heart trouble, nervous symptons, fatigue, poor appetite, bad breath and occasional irregular fever.

Impaired vision greatly handicaps a child and oftimes he has to repeat his grade due to poor eyesight.

I hope an extra efffort will be made to help the children with defects to be more comfortable and happy by making corrections.

# Music

The Pittsburg, Colebrook Special and Columbia Districts are now being served by Helen Gamans as Music Supervisor. The following report will give you some idea of her work.

Music instruction in Pittsburg has been received by the children with much enthusiasm. In the High School a mixed glee club of thirty-two voices has been organized. This group presented a program of six songs at the Senior play. The orchestra has twentyone members, many of whom are beginners on their particular instruments. The string and brass sections have been rehearsing separately.

The lower grades have been doing much singing and reading of syllables, as well as participating in the rhythm band. In the Danforth and Indian Stream schools besides singing many familiar songs, and reading new ones, there has been teaching of theory and listening to good music on the phonograph. These children enjoy the rhythm band very much.

# Notes on the Budget

The total of the School Board's budget for 1938-39 is \$19415.00 as compared with \$18947.50 for 1937-38 which was increased by special appropriation to \$19,-447.50. The difference in the two former figures is largely accounted for by the inclusion of the Music Supervisor's Salary.

The estimated income for the year is \$320.00. It will therefore require that \$19,095.00 be raised by taxation if the budget is approved as presented. The district raised \$19,237.00 last year.

## Conclusion

I take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the members of the school board, parents, teachers and friends for the interest and support that they have given to the schools during the past year.



# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg in the County of Coos, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pittsburg on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget and appropriate money for same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars for repairs and improvements on Back Lake Beach.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise sufficient money to buy a new Tractor and plow and dispose of old ones.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road from Paul Clogston's house to the Hill Road.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the River Road from the George Hilliard turn to high water level at the Congdon place.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and twenty-five dollars to shingle the Library building.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars to buy the building and lot known as the Tabor and Brooks barn.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that part of the highway leading easterly from the village of Pittsburg, N. H., and commencing at a point on said highway on the easterly boundary of land owned by Ellen Johnson; thence continuing in said easterly direction along said highway to the high water level of New Pittsburg Reservoir, on the premises now, or formerly owned by George Hilliard of said Pittsburg. In event the Town votes to discontinue the aforesaid described highway, said vote shall not be affective until such time as the State of New Hampshire shall approve and accept the new highway now under construction being built in lieu of the highway proposed to be discontinued.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote, raise, and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars to build a new highway across the land of George Hilliard, starting from a point on the south side of New State Highway and running southeasterly a distance of one thousand feet across the old State Highway and running to land owned by John O'Neil.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
- 13. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

# Superintendent's Report

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Pittsburg School District:

#### General

The objective of all education is the provision of opportunities for continuus intellectual, physical, spiritual, and social growth on the part of the individual to the end that he may function more capably and more happily as a member of a cooperative democratic society.

Two important elements are included in this statement. One is the thought that the well-rounded growth of an individual is a basic aim of education. This is frequently contrasted with the traditional view of the function of education as the imparting of a body of information, or the mastery of certain specific skills.

The other stresses the social aspects of education determined by the character of the social order in which the individual lives. Our social order should not be lacking in the democratic respect for personality.

Energy, enterprise, and ambition will aways be most compelling factors of individual or social success.

#### **Buildings and Equipment**

The buildings are for the most part in very good condition. During the past year, a new Manual Training room has been finished off, new urinals placed in the boys' basement and new pupil desks in the Intermediate Room, of the High School building. Numerous other minor repairs and improvements have been made to the school property.

Projects worthy of consideration in the future are; new toilets for the Danforth, new wood shed for village, and new seats for Commercial Room.

#### Music

Pittsburg, Colebrook Special, Columbia and Clarksville Districts are now being served by Helen Gamans as Music Supervisor. Clarksville being newly added this year

The school music program this year, in the grades, consists of four divisions. Last year, stress was laid on learning to sing and using the voice freely. This year other musical interests have been added. One unit is devoted to learning the technicalities of reading and writing music, in all keys, including notes of all values. Another unit is spent on music appreciation, listening to various solo instruments and combinations; recognition by sound and by picture and classifying them into orchestral families. A third unit takes up folk dancing. The children respond to this with a great deal of pleasure. Singing familiar tunes and learning new ones is the content of the fourth unit.

\$4528.16

The Glee Club in Pittsburg presented an operetta last spring which was an invaluable musical experience to those participating. They are busy preparing for a like performance to be given early this spring.

Pittsburg Grammar and High Schools have orchestral groups both for beginners and for more advanced students. They have played at various school and social functions.

#### **Enrollment and Attendance**

The total enrollment for the town shows quite a substantial increase. There are now 171 enrolled as compared with 158, a year ago. We have four tuition pupils from Clarksville and two from Stewartstown. There are three from Hall Stream attending school at Canaan and West Stewartstown.

The Intermediate Room had the best percentage of attendance with 96.78, followed by Indian Stream with 96.33. Pittsburg Primary had the best tardiness

record with only 8. The High School had the poorest record of attendance 92.08 and the poorest tardiness record with 49.

#### Health

The health work has again been carried on under the direction of Ethel Sturgis, the school nurse. From the table below you will note the kinds of defects and the number of corrections secured.

During the past year the medical inspections have revealed a very definite improvement in health standards in our schools. The outstanding physical defects in most cases have been taken care of, in some instances defects frequently occur among children from birth, and need expert medical attention at the earliest possible moment.

A semi-annual physical examination beginning in infancy will prevent many handicaps in growth and development. Detection and correction of defects early in life will cause less serious damage. Free Clinics have been established throughout the state that child-may receive expert medical advice and treatment.

#### Notes on the Budget

The total School Board's budget for 1939-40 is \$19,767.50 as compared with \$19,415.00 for 1938-39.

Last year's budget of \$19,415.00 was increased by special appropriations to \$19,990.00. The budget less estimated income \$320.00 resulted in an appropriation of \$19,670.00 for the schools.

This year's budget \$19,767.50 less estimated income of \$400.00 means that the school board is asking that \$19,367.50 be raised. This is \$302.50 less than the last total appropriation.

#### **Teachers**

When schools opened in September several new teachers reported for duties in town. Richard Martin, University of New Hampshire, filled the position as Headmaster; Doris Hamlin, Keene Normal School, became the teacher of English and French, in the High School; Ruth Kingsbury, Keene Normal School, filled the vacancy in the Intermediate Room, and Kathryn Driscoll, Plymouth Normal School, the Upper Room at the Danforth School. All had had previous teaching experience.

Later, in November, Louise Ross resigned and her position in the Danforth Primary was filled by Venus Mallis, a Plymouth Normal School graduate.

#### Conclusion

I wish to thank the school board, teachers, parents and friends for their generous support and hearty cooperation in all school activities, during the past year.

We can all take pride in our schools and share in the common purpose to make them better.

### Superintendent's Report

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Pittsburg School District:

### General

Public Education in America today faces a task and a responsibility of proportions probably never surpassed. The schools have found the demands made upon them greatly increased both in volume and scope. As never before, public education is being looked to as the means of qualifying whole generations for the difficult business of living in a highly complex culture.

Heavy though the demands and problems may be, the schools have, and will continue to face them squarely just so long as they are able to secure the cooperation, support and good will of the people in the communities which they serve.

It is important to our society that the schools continue to provide an education and a fund of knowledge which will not only be worth while in itself but will also tend to make more intelligent, more constructive and more responsible men and women. It is paramount that the schools in cooperation with many other factors produce individuals capable of becoming effective citizens and efficient workers.

### Notes on the Budget

The total School Board's budget for 1940-41 is \$19,794.50 as compared with \$19,767.50 for last year. The 1939-40 budget was increased by special appropriation to \$20,267.50.

This year's budget of \$19,794.50 is decreased by an esimated income of \$320.00 which means that the school board is asking for an appropriation of \$19,-

474.50. This is \$107.00 more than the requested appropriation last year but is \$393.00 less than the actual appropriation for that year.

### Teachers

When school opened in September several new teachers reported for duty in town. Clarence Rowe, Plymouth Normal School, filled the position as Commercial teacher; Ruth Bixby, Amherst College, became the teacher of French and English; Helen Hayden was added to the high school staff and is carrying two courses in music in addition to the other music work of the town; Kathryn Driscoll, Plymouth Normal School was transferred from the Danforth Intermediate to the Village Intermediate; Velma Gray was transferred from Indian Stream to the Danforth Intermediate and Alma Chappell was selected for the vacancy in the Danforth Primary.

### Music

The music teacher, Helen Hayden, who last year served four towns is this year, under a reorganized schedule, giving full time to Pittsburg and Clarksville.

Music in the High School includes two new courses. Music Appreciation and History is offered to Freshmen and Sophomores, and Music Theory is open to Juniors and Seniors. In the Music Appreciation class the lives of composers are studied, different kinds of musical composition, and the instruments in the symphony orchestra.

Music Theory includes the rudiments of music, beginning with the fundamentals of music reading, writing, and listenting, through the more difficult study of keys, intervals, chord structure and rhythms.

The Glee Club is financing a set of drums for the orchestra, which will add to that group considerably. The money was earned through performances of the past two years.

From grades one through six the music period is devoted to singing, rhythm play, dancing, toy orchestra, note and syllable reading and writing, and music appreciation.

Health

The results of recent physical examinations of school children are quite good, however, there are some corrections that should be made without delay. Vision, tonsils and teeth are the chief offenders and should be corrected, otherwise they may create very serious problems.

The child that has any of the above mentioned physical defects is greatly handicapped at home as well as at school and is unable to do his best work. Ultimately the results appear in his school record.

Dental clinics will be arranged within a short time and parents will have an opportunity to give their children the dental care that is needed at a very reasonble rate.

The statistical report given below summarizes the work of Ethel Sturgis, the School Nurse, for the past year.

Buildings and Equipment

The buildings are for the most part in very good condition. During the past year the Danforth school

was completely redecorated inside and new toilets were provided in the basement. No repairs were made on the Indian Stream School as it was not in use this year. The usual minor repairs and improvements were made at the village school. Due to the increased enrollment twelve new arm chairs were provided for the Home Economics room and the purchasing of new seats for the Commercial room was delayed.

### Enrollment and Attendance

The total enrollment at the present time is approximately the same as a year ago. During the past few months there has been a decrease in the enrollment at the Village and quite a substantial increase in the enrollment at the Danforth School. We have five tuition pupils from Clarksville and one from Stewartstown. There are two from Hall Stream attending school at Canaan High School.

Percentages of attendance on the whole were somewhat lower than common. The best record was made by the Danforth primary with a percentage of 95.92 and was closely followed by the Pittsburg Primary with 95.59 and the Junior High School with 95.05. The Indian Stream School reported no tardinesses during the entire school year. The high school had the poorest tardiness record with 85.

### Conclusion

Our schools symbolize the aspiration of our peoples and are the foundation of that equality of opportunity for which democracy stands.

I take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the members of the school board, parents, teachers and friends for the interest they have shown in the schools and for their loyal support during the past year.


