








TOWN WARRANT.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Childs' Opera House in said town on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose three selectmen, town treasurer, tax collector, highway agent, town clerk, and chief of police for the ensuing year, trustee of the Fuller Public Library for the two ensuing years, a board of three trustees of trust funds, one for one year, one for two years, and one for three years; and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.
- ART. 2. To hear the reports of the selectmen, town clerk, town treasurer, tax collector, and highway agent to the town auditors, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees, or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the current expenses of the town and apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt, or pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the building and repairing of highways, bridges, and culverts.

- ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, not to exceed seventy-five dollars (\$75.00), for Senator Grimes Post, G. A. R., to be used Memorial Day.
- ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to continue the present laws in force prohibiting cattle and horses from running at large in the highways.
- ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise any money for the support of the Fuller Public Library, or pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
- ART. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00), for the support of band concerts the coming season, or pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. 10. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for the preparation and publication of the town history, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. 11. To see if the town will vote to accept the bequest of \$100.00 from the heirs of the late Rodney Smith, the income to be used to care for the family lot in Pine Hill cemetery.
- ART. 12. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to contract with the Hillsborough Electric Light & Power Company to light the streets for a period not to exceed five years, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed one hundred and fifty dollars to pay for extra labor in the removal of rubbish and ashes by the town teams within the thickly settled part of the town, at stated periods, or pass any vote relating thereto.

ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$300.00 to help pay for a district nurse, and that a committee of three be appointed to help the article into effect.

ART. 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN.

To the Citizens of Hillsborough:

On account of the heavy rains of last summer the keeping of the highways in repair for the year has been unusually expensive. It has been necessary to work some stretches of road several times during the season. The railroad tax dropped from \$664.05, in 1914, to \$257.23, in 1915. The sum of \$230.00 was paid for a horse to replace one that died. As favorable conditions in the lines indicated as prevailed in 1914 would have made the financial standing of the town more favorable to the extent of \$2,200.00. The highway agent resigned last month. As the interval before the March meeting was so short, no appointment to fill the vacancy has been made. The selectmen have had charge of the highway department since February 10.

The following recommendations have been made by the town auditors:

"All persons who have been paid any money by the town, or paid anything to the town, for work done during the past year, are requested to carefully scrutinize the accounts and see that such transactions are properly reported.

"All persons who may in the future have work done by the teams of the town highway department are earnestly requested to pay bills for same with checks made payable to the Town of Hillsborough.

"In order to obtain better efficiency in the highway department, the auditors would suggest that the office of highway agent be made appointive, instead of elective, that the highway agent may be directly responsible to the board of selectmen."

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

To the Inhabitants of Hillsborough:

The school board of the Town School District respectfully submits its annual report, with that of the treasurer and superintendent of schools.

The district maintained seven schools during the spring term, eight during the fall, and seven again in the winter. All of these schools, with faithful and conscientious teachers have done good work.

During the summer vacation the floors in all of the school-rooms, that were in use as schools, were painted; the walls, where necessary, were tinted a light green, and all of the ceilings were whitened. Some of the out-buildings were also painted inside.

The state law requires the school board to state in detail, in their annual report, the sums of money needed for the ensuing fiscal year for text-books and supplies, flags and appurtenances, and high school tuitions. In accordance with this requirement we will state that the district will need for the year 1916—17 the following sums:

For text-books and supplies	\$75.00

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

Members of the School Board:

I respectfully submit the following report concerning the schools of the Hillsborough Town District for the school year ending February 15, 1916.

As Miss Edythe M. Crooker did not wish to teach during the spring term on account of home necessities. Miss Ruth A. Peasley was transferred to the Upper Village school from the Concord End school, which has been closed ever since for lack of pupils. At the Merrill school, Miss Doris N. Rumrill succeeded Miss Julia A. Rice, who also felt the pressure of home duties. Beginning with the fall term, Mr. Bernard E. Annis took charge of the Flat school as a substitute, Miss Ruth A. Peasley succeeded Mr. Leon D. Davis at the Center school, Miss Edythe M. Crooker returned to the Upper Village school, Miss Gertrude Janowsky was transferred to the Merrill school, succeeding Miss Rumrill who is attending the Keene Normal School. Doris H. Miller accepted an offer to teach the Bear Hill school, and Miss Bernice A. Werden taught the Danforth school, which was opened for the fall term; and later, the Conn school, until that was closed at Christmas time on account of the small number of pupils.

The enrollment in September was unusually large, the pupils being distributed by schools and grades as indicated by the table given below. An examination of these figures shows that a large proportion of the pupils are in the lower grades. This fact, in turn, leads to the thought that the number of scholars is likely to increase rather than to decrease for a few years unless some of the larger

families should move out of the school district.

In my last report, I made a brief reference to the pupils who are attending high school. The records show that fifteen persons from the town district have been graduated from the Hillsborough High School during the past four years. The records also show that the average age at entrance of these graduates and of those now in high school who may fairly be said to have received their preparation in the schools of the town district to be thirteen years and ten months. As the average September age of the freshman pupils for the four years beginning with 1911, was fourteen years and eight months, the inference would be that as far as the fundamentals of education are concerned, the pupil is fully as well off in a rural school as in a village school. Furthermore, the records of these pupils in high school compare favorably with those of pupils from larger schools. At this point, I am moved to state my belief that high school success depends not only upon previous preparation, but also to a large extent upon native ability, earnestness of purpose, and a certain maturity of mind.

As an aid in the work, I have purchased a plan book for each teacher which is spaced in such a manner as to provide a place to put down the work for each day for days in advance. I have also furnished each teacher with a list of various occupations that may be assigned for busy work, and also with a list of selections to be memorized.

It is an item of satisfaction to be able to say that the money appropriated at the last school meeting made it possible to have a total of thirty weeks for the school year ending last June, and twenty-one weeks since. A spring term of eleven weeks will give us a school year thirty-two weeks in length, which is as short a year as we ought to

figure on in order to meet all state requirements with a safe margin.

To the Inhabitants of the Special School District in the Town of Ilillsborough, qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the schoolhouse in said district on Monday, the twenty-seventh day of March, 1916, at seven of the clock in the afternoon, to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.

- 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary in addition to the amount required by law, for the support of schools, repairs on buildings, and any other necessary charges arising within said district.
- 7. To choose auditors, agents or committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Again we would submit to you the reports of the heads of the various departments together with the report of the treasurer.

Some changes were made in the teaching force this year, which are included in the report of the Superintendent.

At a suggestion of the late Rev. Mr. Wallace a vote was passed last year that the Board be instructed to investigate the question of a night school and report at the next meeting. The Board instructed the truant officer when he took the school census to make certain inquiries as to the probable number who would attend. Through the kindness of Mr. George W. Lincoln, however, a night school was opened about the middle of January and continued one month under the instruction of Misses Eva Brown, Eva Ash and Elinor Chadwick, superintended by Principal McGaw. This was continued a second month under the generosity of the Hillsboro Woolen Mill Co., and a third month by the Contoocook Mill Corporation with no expense to the district, and a more definite report can be submitted at the annual meeting.

We would also call your attention to an article in the warrant in reference to lighting the school building. The precinct officers generously allowed the use of precinct hall for the night schools, but this cannot be used indefinitely if a night school is to be run.

The subject of an additional course in the high school will be brought up and it is hoped there will be a full and free discussion of the question.

The amount required for text books and supplies for the coming year will be \$500.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

Members of the Board of Education:

I respectfully submit the following report concerning the schools of the Special School District for the year ending February fifteenth, nineteen hundred sixteen.

For two years previous to the close of the school year last June, we had no changes in the regular teaching force. This continuity in service on the part of the teachers gave to the schools a steadiness in aims and purposes, a greater efficiency, and a valuable momentum to assist in tiding over inevitable changes. The resignations that came last summer were from Misses Bernice M. Haves, Addie M. Bucksey and Mary L. Ennis, all of whom received offers of desirable positions in Massachusetts schools. The persons elected to succeed these teachers were Miss Margaret S. Norton of Salisbury, Connecticut, a graduate of Wellesley College in the class of 1915; Miss Hallie A. Buckley of Berlin, New Hampshire, a graduate of Bay Path Institute, Springfield, Massachusetts; and Miss Ruby E. Heath of Lunenburg, Massachusetts, a graduate of the Fitchburg Normal School. The two last named came to us with some teaching experience to their credit. At Christmas time. Miss Heath asked for a release from her contract that she might accept an attractive offer in Massachusetts. After the release was granted, Mrs. Cora L. Scruton accepted the offer of the opportunity to return to her former position in the primary room. At this point, I wish to call attention to an extract from the "Code of Ethics" adopted at the last meeting of the New Hampshire Teachers' Association. The quotation reads as follows: "It is unprofessional for teachers to resign during the period for which they are engaged. They may rightly ask to be released,

by giving notice of not less than four weeks, but must in case of refusal abide by their contract."

Since the introduction of commercial subjects in the fall of 1908, there has been but little change in the chara cter of the work as far as the subjects offered are concerned. The time has now come when we may well consider whether we cannot improve our high school in that respect. common with many others, I feel that we are not meeting the situation as fully as we might; that is, we could offer studies that would be of greater benefit to many of our pupils than those that appear in the curricula as they now stand. The principal subjects that I have in mind are agriculture and household arts. These are new arrivals in the high school field, but they have been received with such enthusiasm, and the work has been developed and or-Sanized so rapidly and well that I feel warranted in saying that it has found a place for itself, and its value is fairly well established.

It is really surprising that within a very short time agricultural subjects have been introduced in one-fourth of the high schools in the state, and that domestic arts subjects are now being taught in fifty of the ninety New Hampshire high schools. Both of the subjects just mentioned are taught in the high school of the neighboring town of Antrim. Their popularity in this school is attested by the fact that very few pupils have elected the Latin curriculum since the introduction of these twentieth century topics. Their evident connection with life and its necessities apparently appeals to the young people.

In order that there may be no misunderstanding, I feel that I ought to say that a girl electing household arts would devote about one-fourth of her time to that work and the remaining three-fourths to English, French, history, possibly some science, and it may be a little mathe-

matics, although the latter topic is entirely left out of the curriculum in some schools. The boy electing agriculture would give perhaps five-sixteenths of his time to that work, and the balance of the time to English, French, mathematics, science, and some history. So that along with the vocational work there would be the so-called cultural to broaden his vision and to give him something to think about besides the mere pursuit of dollars and cents.

The most serious practical difficulty in the way of beginning the work spoken of above seems to be the lack of suitable rooms. A satisfactory solution of his problem may yet be found. Some money would be needed for equipment. Probably two or three hundred dollars would purchase tools and kitchen utensils enough to begin with; at least. And further, a slight additional appropriation would be needed to cover the expense of laboratory material.

There is another phase of school work to which I wish to call your attention. The unexpectedly large attendance at the evening school maintained the past winter at private expense raises the question as to whether it would not be well to make this a regular part of our school system, and whether money thus invested would not yield a bountiful harvest in patriotism, and in the elimination of "hyphenated" Americans.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Herewith I offer my fifth annual report concerning the Hillsboro High School.

The registration to date numbers 68 pupils, 26 boys and 42 girls. By classes there are 16 Seniors, 11 Juniors, 19 Sophomores, 22 Freshmen.

The routine daily work of the school has continued in program and method similar to last year. Classes in Spelling and in Declamation for all pupils have been introduced. The Class of 1915 presented to the school a large flag and a set of pictures for the main hall as a graduation gift, thus establishing a custom which it is hoped will become permanent.

The school is at present represented by its graduates in three colleges, two normal schools, and several other schools; there are in all eleven persons thus continuing their education.

Last year's graduating class numbered fifteen. Of these graduates, five are continuing studies, one is teaching, one is a stenographer in a lawyer's office, three found employment in varied mercantile service, and five are occupied with pursuits on the farm or in the household.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The following report of the Music Department of the Hillsboro schools is respectfully submitted:

At the end of June, 1915, each grade had covered the material necessary for that grade and in some cases exceeded the amount, with careful attention to expression and tone quality.

By using new material just published we are able to start the second grade in singing from books at an earlier date. They are now using Dann's "Second Year Music." In Grade I, oral and blackboard work is done. Grade III is more advanced than ever before and uses Dann's "Third Year Music."

It would be hard to choose between Grades 4, 5 and 6 which one does the best work. Grade V sings two part music with splendid tone quality. It is indeed a pleasure to hear the three part work in Grades VI and VII.

All parents or those interested in school music should visit the regular classes, where they would get a better idea of the method of instruction and of work done than from a public exhibition.

The VIIth and VIIIth Grades are studying bass clef, with the intention of preparing the boys more thoroughly than ever for advanced chorus work in high school. An improvement in high school music would be to have some member of the faculty give instruction in chorus singing during the week, thereby making it possible to finish selections in a more thorough manner. I would like also to have arranged a system for credit for music in the high

school, and classes in theory, appreciation, and music history for those who feel that they cannot sing. All of our music this year has been for three parts on account of the lack of tenor voices. A large number of the students are practicing on an operetta to be given in public later in the year. On one occasion this term we had an informal musicale at cherus period, at which several pupils gave instrumental and vocal solos and quotations were read from musical magazines. We hope to have other events of this kind later on.

I feel that the interested effort of the teachers is bringing the music as a whole up to a high standard.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MANUAL ARTS.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The following report of the Department of the Manual Arts is respectfully submitted:

The work in the grades in the Hillsborough school is a continuation of the work of previous years and includes courses in the following subjects: Nature drawing, color, design, paper and card board construction, paper cutting, representation, illustration and construction drawing. The courses aim to develop in children the power to express their ideas in graphic form, to think constructively, to work neatly and accurately, and to appreciate beauty.

There has been a noticeable improvement in the quality of the work over that of last year.

The work in drawing in the high school takes the form of a course in mechanical drawing for Freshman and Sophomore boys, and a course in design and sewing for Freshman and Sophomore girls.

The success of drawing depends more than anything else on the attitude that the teacher herself takes toward the subject. The assistance and earnest co-operation of the teachers is largely responsible for the interest in this work that prevails in the grades.



TOWN WARRANT.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Childs' Opera House in said town on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose three selectmen, town treasurer, tax collector, highway agent, town clerk and chief of police for the ensuing year, trustee of the Fuller Public Library for the two ensuing years, one trustee of trust funds for the three ensuing years; and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.
- ART. 2. To hear the reports of the selectmen, town clerk, tax collector, town treasurer and highway agent to the auditors, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees, or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the current expenses of the town and apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

- ART. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the building and repairing of highways, bridges and culverts.
- ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, not to exceed seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) for Senator Grimes Post, G. A. R., to be used Memorial Day.
- ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to continue the present laws in force, prohibiting cattle and horses from running at large in the highways.
- ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise any money for the support of the Fuller Public Library, or pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the amount of money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
- ART. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the support of band concerts the coming season.
- ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to increase the pay of the chief of police, or take any action relating thereto.
- ART. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise any money for the purpose of observing "Old Home Day" or pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. 12. To see if the town will vote to accept the bequest of \$200.00 from the late Sarah M. Dodge, the income to be used for the care of the two Dodge burial lots.
- ART. 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to buy or lease a suitable lot of land to be used for dumping purposes.

- ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to aid the District Nurse Association, or pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to increase the pay of the highway agent.
- ART. 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN.

To the Citizens of Hillsborough:

At the annual town meeting one year ago, it was voted to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to defray the expense of writing and publishing the town history. One thousand dollars has been hired for this purpose. It was not intended that this borrowed money should add to the permanent indebtedness of the town. As soon as the history is published the money received from the sale of books can be used to pay off these notes. For this reason the copy already prepared has been used as an asset to the extent of one thousand dollars in showing the financial standing of the town. The money raised and used in connection with the town history, previous to this year, has not been considered, as such money has nothing to do with an increase, or decrease, during the last twelve months, of the town's indebtedness.

REPORT OF THE FIRE COMMISSIONERS.

Report of the Board of Fire Commissioners for the year ending February 15, 1917, and of fire alarms for year ending December 31, 1916:

There were two bell alarms, twenty-nine still alarms, one brush fire and one out-of-town call on the fire department.

Number of chemicals used, 50. Number of feet of hose used, 450. Damage in precinct, \$715.00. Insurance paid, \$715.00.

The storage battery system was installed early in the fall, to run the fire alarm, and when properly adjusted will undoubtedly give satisfactory results.

Long stretches of sewer pipe had to be relaid and this condition will probably prevail to a larger extent in years to come.

The street sprinkling is exceeding the appropriation, due to higher wage scale, and this will need to be adjusted.

We have thought best to change the style of our report, to show more clearly the expense from year to year of the various departments of the precinct. The sinking fund, with its excessive detail, is a thing of the past, and the serial notes of 1910 are in process of payment by \$2,000 per year.

During the past season 400 feet of 2-inch galvanized iron pipe was laid on Hunt Avenue, off West Main Street, at a cost of \$210.05, which has been charged to "extensions" and made a part of the cost of the water-works.

In accordance with the policy of the water commissioners, fourteen meters have been installed on some of the larger consumers, with the intention of charging such users meter rates when rates have been determined by a trial of meters in summer and winter. The cost of same complete was \$566.52, which item has been charged to "meter account," entering into the cost of the works.

Plans were made last year to relay the pipe on Henniker Street and material was purchased for same, but the commissioners were unable to secure laborers. It is expected that this work will be completed this coming summer.

The expenditure for text-books and supplies this year has been more than for several years because of the introduction of new and more modern books in spelling and history. The speller has in its lists the words that are most likely to be used as determined by careful investigation, and has omitted many words whose chief mission in a spelling book was to occupy space and to cause intellectual weariness for the pupil. The histories were carefully written by a man who has spent all of his life in school work and who, therefore, had a good understanding of what would interest children in the grades for which the texts were intended.

On Friday, December first, the school board, teachers and superintendent met at the home of Mrs. D. M. Brown and discussed some of the features of the new state program of studies, which resulted in a better understanding of the topics presented.

The most important event of the year, however, occurred on June twenty-third at the Lower Village chapel, when, for the first time in the history of the Town District, those who had completed the work of the eight grades took part in graduating exercises and were awarded diplomas. The graduates were: Beatrice M. Card, Lester H. Farrar, Dorothy A. Hudson, Fred H. Matthews, James B. McClintock, and Clifton H. Smith. All of these entered high school in September. I regret to say that the last named was obliged to drop out after a few weeks. The others are still attending and are doing the required work in a satisfactory manner.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Herewith we submit the reports of the superintendent of schools and the treasurer.

The reports of the principal, supervisor of music and supervisor of manual arts are not included, as the heads of those departments have made reports to the superintendent which have been incorporated into his report.

At the last school meeting an appropriation was made for a night school, which opened about the middle of November. The attendance has not been what it was hoped for, and in fact much smaller than last year, several of those regularly attending having moved away. At the annual meeting the district will be asked to decide whether it is best to continue it.

In accordance with an appropriation last year, the building has been provided with electric lights.

The two new departments, agriculture and domestic arts, authorized at the last school meeting, were started this fall and are meeting with success.

The amount required for text-books and supplies for the coming year will be \$500.

In accordance with the recommendations made in my report of last year and endorsed by the votes of the school meeting, the curricula of the high school have been revised so as to include agricultural and domestic arts subjects. The problem of room for work in these new subjects has been solved temporarily, at least, by making use of the basement room underneath the front entrance for the manual training, and of the recitation room on the third floor for the work in domestic science. manual training room has been furnished with six benches, the necessary tools, and electric lights for use on dark days. The domestic science room has for equipment two sewing machines, two oil stoves, four small tables, and such dishes and utensils as are needed to carry on the activities of that department. Five boys have elected work in the agricultural curriculum, and twelve girls are taking domestic science subjects.

The evening school, provision for which was made at the last school meeting, has been in session since late in October. The attendance has not been as large as we expected, for which various reasons have been assigned, one being the removal from town of a number who were enrolled last winter. Unless there should be a decided increase in the non-English speaking population, it would seem hardly wise to make provision to continue the school next year.

The headmaster of the high school reports that the enrollment so far this year is fifty-nine pupils, twenty of whom are boys and thirty-nine girls. "By classes, there are twenty-five in the first year, twelve in the second, thirteen in the third, six in the fourth, and three graduates who returned for special courses." Twenty-two are tuition pupils.

"The graduating class of last year had sixteen members. Of these, three are at home, two are teaching, seven

are following mercantile pursuits, and four are continuing their studies in school or college."

"At the present time our high school has one graduate each in Brown University, the University of California, the University of Iowa, Boston University, and Lowell Normal School; two in New Hampshire College, and three in Keene Normal School."

The supervisor of music reports that, "The general outline of music work has been the same as during previous years. The aim is to cultivate good tone quality, accuracy of pitch, and to perform with intelligent appreciation music suitable for each grade." In addition to the regular work, a voluntary organization known as the Girls' Glee Club, composed of members of the high school, meets once a week after the chorus practice on Wednesdays. As to the place and value of music, she writes: "So much is said about training children to work that very little is done to teach them to use their leisure time to advantage. Surely nothing is more satisfactory than music for this, and as a social accomplishment it has no equal; therefore, its value as a study in the high school."

The supervisor of manual arts says: "The aim of the work is to help the child to get a larger view of life, to appreciate more thoroughly the work of the best artists, to see and love the beauty in his surroundings and to try to increase this beauty, and to prepare him better to decide upon his life work."

"In planning the course of study, much thought was given to those things which are practical and which will be a help to the child in his everyday life. This course includes the study of great artists and their work, of plant forms, still life, design, harmony, dress design, house decoration and furnishing, poster work which involves the principles of advertising arrangement, and a certain amount of handwork."

As it was decided not to publish the reports of the headmaster and of the supervisors this year, the principal items of public interest mentioned in their reports have been incorporated in the foregoing paragraphs.




