REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board of Hampton Falls:

I hereby submit to you my second annual report as superintendent of your public schools.

We are working for improvement. A more regular daily attendance is resulting and an increasing disposition of pupils to conform to standards that lead to character and improvement in scholarship. "Do it Right" and "Better Scholarship" are ideals set for the year's work. Attainment seems slow but the persistent effort of teachers supported by intelligent cooperation of parents will in time bring the results desired.

The transfer of seventh and eight grade pupils from the East school to Hampton is serving a double advantage. It reduces the school from an eight-to a six-grade system, thereby affording more attention to the lower grates. It also provides greater opportunities for the seventh and eight grade pupils in a well organized junior high school.

The attendance this year numbers forty-four pupils in the three local schools, plus twenty-one attending junior high school and thirteen attending high school, a total of seventy-eight pupils. Assuming a total expenditure of \$5,800 for the current year the average cost per pupil amounts to \$74.35. Since high school charges are included this is a low average, but higher than it would be provided the attendance in the local schools were larger; i. e., for the same total expense double the membership could be cared for in each school with an attending decrease in average cost. But this is the price Hampton Falls is paying because of its small and scattered population. The present distribution of pupils indicates that the peak of high school attendance has been reached. Consequently the cost of tuition and tansportation will be no higher and is likely to decrease.

The usual medical inspection was completed in January conducted by Dr. Coleman, assisted by the Hampton school nurse. The following cases were found and reported:

Ten treatments have been made since the last inspection in the spring of 1923.

The interior of the East school has been painted and a few minor repairs made in the North and South buildings. I would suggest the advisability of a definite policy by which some needed repairs or improvements shall be made each year. Such a plan costs no more in the end and serious deterioration is prevented.

The work in music undertaken this year has been successful. I trust it will soon become a permanent part of the school program.

In a Union the size of ours close supervision of class room work is quite impossible. A superintendent's work of necessity becomes executive rather than supervisory. His best service lies in the assistance he can render to School Board, in the transmission of aims and encouragement to teachers, and in providing adequate material for good school work. School visits merely for their own sake mean little and often lead to waste of time. Monthly bulletins to teachers have been issued throughout the year. The assistance of an efficient clerk

in the office has rendered relief from much of the necessary routine and provided more time for the larger affairs. An average of four evenings a week have been devoted to Board meetings, parent-teacher meetings in and out of the Union, and to various civic and community activities. For further data I refer you to the tables following.
