#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sanbornton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sanbornton on Tuesday the ninth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to choose one road agent instead of two for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the decoration of soldiers' graves and the proper observance of Memorial Day.
- 5. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through the Tax Collector's deeds.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for the Laconia Hospital.
- 7. To see what action the town will take in regard to discount of early payment of taxes.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid for construction of Class II road, known as the Turnpike or lower bay road and raise and appropriate or set aside for

said purpose the sum of \$1,249.50 or will accept State aid for construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate, or set aside for said purpose, the sum of \$820.05.

- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400 toward white pine blister rust.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums and amounts as necessary to defray town charges in anticipation of taxes.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for expenses of Old Home Day, by request.
- .... 12. To see what action the Town will take in regard to installing street lights in different localities of said Town by request
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from so called Dugway Road to Curtis Tilton place by request.
- 14. To see if the town will vote in favor of taking over Winnisquam Park road so called by petition.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$83.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region by request.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# SCHOOL DISTRICT OF SANBORNTON REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Sanbornton:

Five schools have been in operation this year, the same as last. Two new teachers are employed. At the "Brook School" Mr. James Whittemore, a graduate of Keene Normal School succeeds Miss Annie Piecuch, resigned to continue her education at Boston University. At the Square Mrs. MacAskill, an excellent experienced teacher, succeeded Miss Pauline Roby, who was elected to a position in Keene. You will notice we now have two men teachers in the Sanbornton schools, and both are very popular in their respective districts, and deservedly so, for the good work they are doing.

## GRADED SCHOOL

In the Sanbornton Bay district, the experiment being tried of dividing the Bay and Meadow schools into two graded schools, made possible by the cooperation of the two teachers there in transporting the pupils, is proving to be very successful. It demonstrates, in part, some of the advantages a consolidated school system would offer. The Bay school has the primary grades, one to four; the Meadow, the grammar grades, five to seven.

### GRADUATION

For the first time in many years graduating exercises were held at the close of the school year in June. Certificates of graduation were given to 7th and 8th grade pupils completing their Sanbornton school life. The affair was well received and should be made an annual event until such time as Sanbornton has a high school.

## COST OF EDUCATION

The per capita cost of the elementary schools of the

town for the year ending June 30, 1936 was \$67.42, not including elementary tuition paid. The average cost in the state as a whole was \$65.69, plus general costs of \$6.20, making the average of state \$71.89.

There were fifty-six towns with per capita cost less and one hundred eighty-six towns with cost more.

The range of costs in the state was from \$44.66 to \$296.30. The amount paid for current costs of education for every \$1,000 of equalized valuation in Sanbornton was \$12.02. One hundred four towns paid more; 136 towns less. The range in the state was from \$2.26 to \$29.77.

The average tuition cost for the past five years has been \$2,987.90 per year. In the school year 1934-35 the tuition cost was \$4,539.88. For the current year 1936-37, the School Board has asked for \$3,900. This tuition expense would pay for three high school teachers in a Sanbornton High School, probably all that ever would be needed.

The average cost of transportation for five years was \$2,616.73 per year.

The average paid teachers per year for the past five years has been \$3,901.29. The largest amount was in 1931-32, with five schools, \$4,717.50. The smallest amount in 1933-34 with four schools, \$3,333.00.

In the past ten years the amount of money paid by the town to the school district has never exceeded \$9,550 but once, 1928, when it was \$10,146.03.

In eight years of the ten the amount paid has been less than \$9,300.00

Transportation and tuition ten years ago cost \$614.30. For the year ending June 30, 1935 \$6,077.88.

Teachers were paid for the year 1925-26 \$3,758.15. For the year 1934-35 they were paid \$4,200.91.

The per pupil cost ten years ago was \$94.00. In 1934-35 it was \$72.62.

# EQUIPMENT

The Sanbornton schools are well equipped for the ordinary work of schools. Every child has books. Supplementary reading along lines of Health, Geography, Nature, History, Civics, Government, Travel, Adventure and Character building, are quite adequate. It is unfortunate that more school material cannot be secured designed to so interest rural pupils in their country environment that more will desire to remain there and accept the challenge of the opportunity for improving rural life by developing themselves into leaders. While it is true that the automobile has brought the rural community nearer the city attractions and that scientific farming is proving attractive to the rural youth, it is equally true that even now too many are leaving the farms for the false lure of city life with its possibilities of accumulating wealth. Experience of years alone will teach these that the truest-hearted people, the most abundant life, the best type of citizenship, is developed in rural communities.

It is the problem of the home, the school, the church and community as a whole to demonstrate to the younger generation that the country is a better place to live in than the city. The cooperation of all these agencies is needed; no single agency can do it alone.

The schools will have a large part in making rural life a more abundant life, by adopting a curriculum that is adaptable to rural environment, regardless of the old traditional education practices.
