TOWN WARRANT

Cheshire, ss.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, 1943, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, Auditors, Town Treasurer, Road Agent, Collectors of Taxes, Trustees of Public Funds, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, Fence Viewers, and all other necessary officers.
- Art. 2. To raise money for the support of the town poor, for town library, for cemeteries, to build and repair highways and bridges, and for such other current expenses as may accrue.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to raise money on notes of the town for current expenses, in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$891.27 for Class V roads, the State to contribute \$3,565.09.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000 for the support of the Community Hospital of Walpole, Inc.

- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$360 to the Monadnock District Association.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400 for eradicating White Pine Blister Rust.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will authorize its selectmen to administer and dispose of and deed any real estate acquired by the town by tax collectors' deeds.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to accept such funds as have been left it during the past year.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to expend a sum not to exceed \$300 for clerk hire, and raise money therefor.
- Art. 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TOWN LIBRARY

Statistics for the year show a circulation of 8,543 books, of which 1,164 were non fiction, 2,543 were junior books and 701 magazines; 184 books were loaned to us by the State Library and N. H. Public Library Commission. During the months of Oct. Nov. and Dec., the N. H. Congregational-Christian Conference has sent us books so that persons participating in "Adventures in Reading" would find books from their list in the town library.

The number of books purchased were 250. We have bought for the North Walpole Library 164 books from April, '42 to Feb., '43. Their circulation last year was 6,214.

The committee thanks the following for the gift of books, (48 in number), Mrs. Harry Van Demark, Miss Juna Oakes, Mrs. W. G. Reynolds, Mrs. Theodore Harris, the Misses Jennison, Mr. John Bellows, The Walpole Reading Club, Mrs. Thorndyke Endicott and Mrs. Clifford Bellows. We also are indebted to Mrs. Endicott for several portfolios of pictures.

Victrola records have been obtained from the State Library when requested, also a very fine exhibit of pictures of the Elizabethan period for the High School English classes.

There was a Christmas Book Exhibit of children's books loaned by the N. H. Public Library Commission.

A Christmas story hour and tree for which the committee expresses appreciation to Mrs. Lawrence Jeffrey and the Woodwards.

From January to May a story hour was held weekly on Thursdays by the librarian for all children up to 10 years of age.

To stimulate Victory Gardening among our residents a series of posters with planting dates was exhibited and a collection of books on gardening were placed on a table for reference.

During the past year a large number of pamphlets on Civilian Defense were sent to us by the government as well as the Congressional Record.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Walpole:

I hereby submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

The school at North Walpole was reorganized on an elementary school basis with grades 1-8. All North Walpole pupils above grade 8 were assigned to the Bellows Falls High school. Mr. Joseph Dube, who has served as a teacher in the North Walpole school, was promoted to the position of Principal. Mr. Dube is well fitted by experience and special training for his new duties. Six new teachers were elected to fill vacancies on the Walpole teaching staff:— Miss Myrtie Rollins at Number 14, Miss Charlotte Marsh at Drewsville, and Miss Charlotte Reed at Walpole primary are all recent graduates of the four year curriculum of Keene Teachers College. Miss Virginia Beardsley, the new teacher in grades 2-3, is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College. She had several years of teaching experience before coming to Walpole. Miss Anna Schmoyer, teacher be-English and French at Walpole High School, is a graduate of Bates College. She has had special training at Middlebury French School. Miss Harriett Robinson was elected to teach the music in all schools. She is a graduate of Boston University, School of Music.

Instruction in the schools is being accomplished in accordance with the standards for the State. Standard achievement tests are given each year and reports are required relative to the work completed in all grades.

Our testing program is principally diagnostic in nature. The purpose is to diagnose difficulties and weaknesses which may occur in the fundamentals. The results are used as a guide to instruction and as a basis for remedial work. In each school a program of remedial work is developed as the needs of the pupils are indicated by the results of the tests. Attention is given to individual as well as to group needs.

In order to more fully meet our obligations for the war time training of our young people, the following high school program changes will be made during the second half of the school year. These changes are in accordance with the recommendations of the Federal Education and War Departments:

- 1. A local unit of the High School Victory Corps will be organized. This is a national organization under the direction of Eddie Rickenbacker. Its purpose is to emphasize activities offering an opportunity for war time service and to focus interest on those high school subjects and activities which are important for pre-service training.
- 2. A program of physical fitness through physical education will be given for all juniors and seniors. This course will require one period each day with instruction based upon individual needs as shown by a thorough physical examination.
- 3. A semester course in Principles of Aeronautics will be offered as a pre-induction course for juniors and seniors. All boys of pre-induction age will be urged to take this course.

The general recommendations of the war department place emphasis on the importance of continuing the basic courses in mathematics, science, and English. These subjects are fundamental to advanced instruction in the technical phases of specialized activities and should not be supplanted by attempted specialized training offered without sufficient background. However, it is important that more boys and girls should be advised to elect the elementary courses in mathematics and science.

During the past year the schools in the supervisory union have engaged in many activities associated with the conduct of the war. The teachers, in addition to their regular duties, have directed salvage drives, promoted the sale of war savings stamps and bonds, participated in various phases of civilian defense, and have conducted rationing registrations. This added responsibility has required many extra hours of study, planning, and work. How-

ever, it has been accepted by the teachers as a patriotic duty and as an opportuinty to serve the people in the communities where they are teaching.

Practically all of the schools took an active part in the salvage drive. War Savings stamps were on sale in most of the schools. A summary of reports received from all schools in the union showed that over one hundred tons of scrap were collected by the pupils and several thousand dollar's worth of stamps and bonds were purchased.

Teachers and janitors have been especially economical in the use of school supplies. Although we have not as yet been out of stock on any items, it is evident that certain materials now in stock cannot be replaced or at least cannot be purchased within the limits of reasonable economy. As we approach this situation we must expect to restrict our needs to essential materials which we shall undoubtedly be able to purchase in limited quantities.

Sixty-one pupils from North Walpole were attending Bellows Falls High School during the fall term.

Events of recent date have made us especially mindful of the safety of pupils while in the school buildings. In all of our schools the need for regular fire and air raid drills has been emphasized. Regardless of the size of building and the number of pupils enrolled, these drills should

be conducted at regular intervals during the year. School buildings have been under constant surveillance for fire hazards, availability of exits, and location, supply and condition of fire fighting equipment. However, not enough attention has been given to the safety of pupils and adults during special programs held either in the school rooms or in other public buildings. In the interest of public safety, I recommend that the same precautions now taken to assure the safety of pupils while in attendance a school be extended to school activities, programs, and entertainments held in the school building or at the town hall.

The shortage of teachers which became increasingly apparent during the summer months has developed into a very serious problem. The schools in the supervisory union opened for the fall term with nineteen new teachers. This represents a forty-one percent turnover. Fortunately, all vacancies were filled by qualified permanent teachers when school began in September. The situation is further complicated in rural areas by the rationing of gasoline and tires and the difficulty of locating desirable boarding places. Because of the very limited supply, the situation next year will be even more serious. Although we cannot hope to compete with the financial inducements offered by defense industries and larger districts, we are fortunate that teachers as a group are professionally minded and prefer teaching to other work. Also many teachers prefer to work in smaller towns if conditions can be made at all suitable. However, there is a limit to the sacrifices which they can be expected to make in view of the opportunities offered elsewhre.

In cooperation with the Foods for Victory program, high school pupils were excused from school to assist with the harvesting of crops. This program was conducted in accordance with plans outlined by the State Department of Education. Because of the serious shortage of farm labor, the schools will undoubtedly be called upon to render service on a greater scale during the coming Spring and Fall. This valuable service should be continued, but it should be conducted with as little as possible interference

with the organization of the regular school and class activities. I believe that closer cooperation of the farmers and the school on the basis of the following recommendations would result in benefit to both:

- 1. That farmers shall ask for the assistance of school pupils during school days only after all possible sources of adult labor have been exhausted.
- 2. That pupils should be excused for farm work only in cases when delay would result in serious loss.
- 3. That pupils excused from school should be employed on the basis of a farm day and not during school hours only. Also that pupils employed during the week should be expected to work on Saturdays of the week employed.
- 4. That only those pupils should be excused who are doing satisfactory school work.
- 5. That pupils shall not be excused promiscuously and that continued absence for farm work be justified by demonstrated farm work accomplishment.
- 6. That class instruction during the periods of greatest farm needs be organized in such a manner as to permit absences for this purpose without making up lessons missed.
- 7. That the headmaster devise a plan for measuring pupil activity in terms of farm labor hours and accomplishment as a basis for justifying continued absence with credit.

A meeting of the teachers of the Walpole and Alstead high schools was held at the Vilas High School on Wednesday, December 2. This meeting was called to discuss methods and means for adapting the high school organization and teaching content to meet the present and future needs. Reports were given on the obligations of the high school in the present situation, the requirements of the new physical education program, and suggestions for adapting teaching methods and subject content during the emergency caused by the war. Other problems presented and left for further discussion later were High School Victory

Corps, the Foods for Victory Program, and pre-induction instruction.

HEALTH

A great deal is said these days about the importance of health education. The nation was shocked to find so many people below ordinary health standards when men were called into service. Wartime is no time to neglect health, in fact the war is proving a powerful stimulus to the improvement of health.

A health program depends upon many things; good health habits such as adequate and proper diet, sufficient rest, and understanding the laws of hygiene; proper medical care, with regular physical examinations and periodic dental checkups; the correction of physical defects; the provision of suitable housing. All of these are the responsibility of every individual and every agency in the community. The contribution of the school in this field may be almost unlimited.

It is the right of every child to be helped to learn the fundamental rules of health. Our schools should place more emphasis on good health habits, a study of nutrition for all pupils, physical education, and the importance of regular physical examination with remedial follow up.

Health inspection showed the following defects:

455 pupils were inspected.

13 pupils showed defective vision—uncorrected.

304 pupils were in need of dental care.

11 pupils were unvaccinated—without proper excuse.

42 pupils were advised to have throat and nose examination by a physician.

Dental clinics were held March 2nd to 4th, 12th and 13th, 1942, April 27th, 30th, 1942 and May 5th to 8th, 1942. Work done as follows:

67 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.

 - 14 pupils were given the patch test for tuberculosis.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

The following improvements and repairs were made at the various schools during the year:

Walpole Village School:

The blackboards were painted and the desk tops varnished in all rooms as needed. The plaster walls in the junior high school rooms were painted. The walls and ceilings in the grade 2-3 room were painted. The science laboratory bench tops were painted with acid proof paint. An electric sewing machine and a dining table were added to the equipment in the home economics rooms. These were secured from the State N Y A equipment and were provided without expense to the district. The chairs and tables in the home economics kitchen were painted.

Hooper School Building:

All wood floors, chairs, and tables were varnished. A new garage door of the lift type was installed on the shop.

North Walpole:

John Kilburn building:

Two double wall plugs for clocks.

Girls' basement: new concrete floor, new seats, new draining and paint job.

Boys' basement: painted new drain on water storage tank; Grade VI room completely redecorated; Grade VII sidewalls painted. All blackboards were painted. Repairs and changing radiators, new seats, valves, and nipples. New screens were made for all basement windows. A new stock room 15 ft. x 12 ft. with shelves and table was built. Elisha Keep building:

Repairs were made on the air shaft. New screens were made for all basement windows. All blackboards were painted. Concrete platform was constructed in the boys' basement. The water from the drinking fountains was repiped. Frames were built to permit packing return boiler pipes in both basements.

The blackboards were painted, desk tops varnished and tops of fence posts were painted. Other repairs of a minor nature were attended to as needed.

MUSIC AND ACTIVITIES

This year the music supervisor is able to visit all the schools in the district at least once a week. Between visits the work is carried on by the grade teacher.

The children are introduced to music through the singing of many rote songs, by singing games and by rhythmic activities. Thus their interest is aroused and they learn to use their singing voice. Gradually attention is called to the musical aspects of the song and eventually to notation and problems of music reading. By the time the seventh grade is reached most of the problems of music reading have been met and mastered. Victrola records give further experience in hearing difficult rhythms and in becoming familiar with famous compositions.

Though music study calls for hard work, it's value is lost unless the final result is enjoyment of the music itself. The girls and boys of the district show a marked interest in their music program.

The elementary grades at Walpole and at North Walpole each presented an operetta at Christmas time. "The Magic Christmas Bell" was presented by the grades in Walpole while the kindergarten and first three grades at North Walpole presented "The Toys That Had to Wait." Christmas programs were given at No. 14 school and in Drewsville.

The high school devotes two periods a week to vocal music. One period is for chorus which most everyone has elected. The other period is for the glee club which is more specialized than the chorus period.

I wish to express appreciation for the support and cooperation which I have received during the year from members of the School Board, headmasters, teachers, parents and pupils.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER WALPOLE HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Charles D. Dalzell, Superintendent of Schools, Walpole, N. H.

I herewith submit my annual report as Headmaster of Walpole High School.

The total enrollment has shown a slight increase over last year. This trend has been continuous for the past several years. The number of withdrawals is surprisingly low when one considers the great demand and possibilities for remunerative employment. Only three pupils withdrew due to lack of interest. Three secured employment, four transferred to other schools and two boys entered the armed forces. This is indicative of the fact that most pupils realize the value and necessity of a high school education.

Our tardiness record is very high. This cannot be interpreted as a failure on the part of the pupils and parents to cooperate. In all except fifteen cases our tardiness has been caused by inability of the busses to complete their trip on time.

The attendance record is very commendable, especially in the senior high school. Most pupils are very regular in attendance and the majority of absences are caused by a few cases of chronic absence. Non-resident enrollment has increased thirty-three percent over last year. This increase has come from our neighboring town of Westmoreland.

We still have very few visits from parents and other citizens. Visitors are always welcome and we wish more people would familiarize themselves with the daily work of the schools.

SCHOLARSHIP

The number and percentage of failures for the school year has been very low. All members of the faculty are available at the close of the school day for interviews with parents and pupils.

A study group is maintained, during the noon hour, for pupils needing and desiring assistance.

Notices of low scholarship grades are being sent home at the warning periods and at the close of each semester. By this we hope to keep parents, as well as pupils, informed.

The reports from the various post secondary institutions on the work done by our graduates has been generally satisfactory. Excellent reports on the progress of our graduates has been received from the New Hampshire Teachers Colleges. All pupils entering the University of New Hampshire stood high enough in competitive examinations to be excused from first year English.

A complete testing program has been continued including drill in the fundamentals of spelling, handwriting, place geography and arithmetic.

We attempt to present our work in a manner that will reach the level of all pupils. Practically all teachers plan and present their work by the unit method. This makes allowance for individual differences and grants each pupil an opportunity to make systematic and efficient progress.

ORGANIZATION

Cognizant of the fact that activities requiring travel must be curtailed yet realizing the value of a well rounded activity program, we have endeavored to provide a diversified schedule offering development and enjoyment for all. The fall outing and various sports days were omitted from the activities calendar for the present school year.

Our assembly programs have embodied phases of the work of the various classes with excellent visiting talent. The latter programs are sponsored by the Blue and White Club. Talks relating to defense, the work being carried on by the armed forces, book reviews, music, and inspirational messages have been included.

Music, dramatics and our school socials have been continued as in the past. The sound motion picture projector combined with a microphone is available for entertainment and study in these branches as well as the subject matter field.

The interscholastic basketball program for boys has been curtailed to cooperate in the war effort. All out of town games have been played with three nearby schools. The girls interclub league has continued as usual. Some very interesting games have been played with the alumni and alumnae. Good sportsmanship has been very evident in these contests showing that they have a real place in our program.

COOPERATION IN THE WAR EFFORT

Realizing the patriotic duty of every individual connected with the schools to contribute in the war effort many activities have been added to bring about this goal.

Fire and air raid drills have been held at various intervals as preventative and protective measures. During these drills all parts of the buildings are manned by teachers and student air raid wardens. All pupils are assigned to designated air raid shelters where heat, water and toilet facilities are available. The practice fire drills have shown that the entire student body can be evacuated in less than one minute.

Pupils in all grades have made regular purchases of war bonds and stamps. These are offered for sale each week in all home rooms. A total of \$1,725 was invested, from the opening of school in September to January first, by the Walpole Village pupils. This is certainly a most

commendable achievement for a student body of approximately two hundred and sixty.

Every home contributed one hundred percent to the Junior Red Cross fund. Part of this income remains with the local chapter and is used for various needs. Contributions were also made to the Tuberculosis fund and the March of Dimes collection.

The new course in aeronautics, offered to Juniors and Seniors for the second semester, met with eager response and enthusiasm. All boys and several girls have elected this subject. Many are taking it in addition to their regular classes.

Our school aided materially in the harvesting of crops in the towns comprising the patronage area of the school. The boys and girls of the senior high school worked a total of two hundred and eleven work days assisting the farmers in the "Food for Freedom" program.

The schools in general and the agricultural classes in particular instituted, and carried through to completion, a "Victory Scrap Drive" that netted approximately thirty tons of valuable metal and rubber. We are very grateful to all who contributed to the success of this project.

Our work in the various subjects, especially in the social studies and mathematics, is closely correlated with the vital and necessary phases of present day events and procedures.

HOME ECONOMICS

This year twenty nine girls are enrolled in the Home Economics curriculum.

The Junior and Senior girls in the course "The Family and Its Members" are studying home nursing, first aid, child care, home membership, and community relationships. Sixty hours of home project work enables the girls to gain actual experience in practicing many of the things they have learned. The Community Hospital cooperated with the school in making available facilities for bed making, with and without a patient, in the unit of work in home nursing.

The Freshmen and Sophomore girls are studying Foods and Nutrition. Special emphasis is being placed on war time recipes, substitutes and food buying. Nutrition also assumes an important place in the year's work.

This class carries on the hot lunch program during the winter months. One hot dish is served to all who desire a hot nutritious food to supplement their lunch. This is served at a minimum cost. It is encouraging to note the increasing number of older pupils who recognize the value of this hot dish and avail themselves of the opportunity to secure it.

Considerable home canning was done during the fall to prepare girls for this increasingly important phase of food planning and conservation.

The Home Economics girls joined with the agricultural classes in sponsoring the Annual School Fair.

AGRICULTURE

The beginning of the new school year found the agricultural boys faced with curtailment of various activities relating to their course. With good grace, but manifest disappointment, they accepted the fact that there would be no interschalstic judging contest at the University of New Hampshire, no Cheshire County Fair and very few field trips to enliven their agricultural interests. The registration of seven freshmen brought the enrollment of the younger group of prospective farmers to nineteen, while the older was represented by nine boys. From this older the two senior members have since withdrawn, one to enlist in the Navy and the other to engage in war work.

Seeming to sense the new importance of farm youth, the boys aided many farmers with the fall harvest, and picked, stored and graded approximately two hundred and forty bushels of McIntosh and a third as many Delicious and Baldwin apples from the Hooper Orchard.

In conjunction with the Home Economics department and cooperation of the rest of the school the agricultural boys sponsored the eighteenth annual school fair. Attendance, curtailed by travel restrictions, exceeded expectations and displayed the real interest of the townspeople in this affair.

When further scrap drives were called for, the pupils with the aid of the agricultural truck, responded with much time, effort and patriotic enthusiasm, which together with the cooperation of the townspeople accounted for the tons of material gathered.

During the fall, Donald Wood, a member of the Hooper Chapter of Future Farmers of America, was chosen to act as a state chapter delegate to the National Convention in Kansas City. After a week's trip he reported that the organization, although not represented by the usual number of delegates as in the past, was carrying on its important work.

Regular agricultural practice follows the four year plan, coupled with a supervised farm program based on the opportunity the individual has to put these practices to work. Stress in the present emergency must be put on quick tournover of farm products. Nineteen forty two was a season of bumper crops. It is unlikely that the nineteen forty-three growing season will be as favorable, yet goals are already set which demand a considerable increase in the production of marketable goods, plus extra products for home consumption. With this in mind, it is desirable that all boys who have an opportunity to do so, carry on gardening as a supervised practice farm program even though it is supplementary to the regular program already planned. Further-more it is the wish of the department to give assistance whenever possible to anyone, within its patronage area, striving to meet production demands.

The present school year, with its many added duties, has been a difficult one yet the problems have been met and will continue to be because of the splendid cooperation of pupils, faculty and townspeople. May I take this opportunity to thank all who have contributed to make our school a successful one.

ATTENDANCE

Our attendance record although rather high could be improved upon, while the tardiness record is poor. In order to remedy this condition I would recommend that the parents cooperate with the school in seeing that their children attend and get to school on time.

The averages for attendance are: Grade 8, 95.27; Grade 7, 95.89; Grade 6, 94.17; Grade 5, 95.99; Grade 4, 97.25; Grade 3, 95.38; Grade 2, 96.37; Grade 1, 96.01; Kindergarten, 94.06.

The tardiness record is: Grade 8, 19; Grade 7, 11; Grade 6, 24; Grade 5, 21; Grade 4, 10; Grade 3, 7; Grade 2, 9; Grade 1, 23; Kindergarten, 19; Total, 143.

SCHOLARSHIP

This year intelligence tests were given to a cross-section of the school, taking in grades three, five and seven. The results were quite satisfactory and they have been recorded on the permanent record cards of the school. I hope to finish this work in another year so that the school will have the intelligence quotient of all the pupils in the school. Tests have also been given in order to diagnose deficiencies in the fundamentals and to suggest necessary remedial work.

A few changes have been affected in the schedules of the different grades. All the subjects pertaining to English have been combined and placed into one period called the "English Activity Period." The social studies, History and Geography, were also grouped, that is, made to follow one another. These changes allow for a flexible program and both teachers and pupils benefit, as it gives the teacher opportunity to stress things that need to be stressed and better enables a teacher to provide for the diverse interests and abilities of the pupils.

Departmental work was introduced in grades seven and eight. This gives the pupils a chance to experience this type of teaching before they enter high school.

ORGANIZATION

The school safety patrol has been continued this year. This work is taken care of as a school project by the boys and girls of grades seven and eight. They are to be commended for the fine work that they are doing.

In order to give all the pupils some sort of extra-curricula activity, organized play was begun in the Fall of the year. The boys played soccer and touch football, while the girls played games under the supervision of the grade teachers. This activity will be started again in the Spring. Lack of heated space facilities has limited our winter program to occasional intramural basketball games when the weather permitted. The pupils of the school are especially to be commended for the fine spirit that they have shown toward the war effort. A scrap drive was conducted in the Fall, which proved to be very successful, amounting to 122.7 pounds per pupil. In the buying of war stamps the school at the beginning of the year set a goal of \$900.00 and we are now well over the half way mark.

Our assembly programs are conducted by the pupils of grades seven and eight every Friday with the English teacher acting as adviser. The pupils thus have a chance to show their skill in organizing and all of them participate several times in the course of the year.

The school has made two public presentations so far this year and has also held an exhibit of the regular daily school work of the two upper grades. In November two one-act plays were presented by grades seven and eight. The plays were well given and won many expressions of praise from the people who attended. Credit is also due to Miss Mulcahy who directed the plays. At Christmas time the primary grades presented an operetta, and intermediate grades a one-act play. Both of these plays were well received by those in attendance. The teachers of the grades and our music teacher, Miss Robinson, deserve special mention for the fine work that they did in preparing the pupils.

Another operetta, "Paints and Patches" will be presented in the Spring by the upper grades. An exhibit of the school work by grades one to seven and the kindergarten will also be held at the same time.

A boys' and girls' glee club has been organized this year under the direction of Miss Robinson. They meet on the average of once a week for a full period. In November they rendered several delightful numbers between the two plays.

Due to the efforts of Miss Mulcahy, the English teacher, the pupils are again helped in meeting their reading requirements by books from the State Public Library.

I wish to thank the members of the School Board, Superintendent, teachers, parents, and pupils for their cooperation in making the school year a pleasant and successful one.
