TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampstead on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March, next at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and to vote for the election of delegates at large, alternate delegates at large, district delegates, alternate district delegates to the National Convention of the Democratic and Republican party to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

To choose a candidate for the Constitutional Convention.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for running expenses of the Public Library for ensuing year.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 for the observance of Memorial Day and what method they will adopt to expend the same.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the cemeteries for the ensuing year.

6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town in anticipation of taxes.

7. To hear reports of Auditors and Committees, and to act thereon.

8. To see if the town will accept State Aid Construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate, or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$173.06. State's share \$692.23.

9. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$300.00 for Health Department, to be used for care of Public Dumps, and expense of Health Officer. Money to be expended on approval of Selectmen.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to finish grading the "Whicher Road" so called and tarring same.

12. To see if the town will vote to accept the road known as the "Ells Road".

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate:

1. In addition to the \$400.00 raised in 1947 to assure completion of water hole at West Hampstead four corners when possible to start said project.
2. For a water hole at the foot of Pickards hill.
3. For the exterior painting of the Fire House.

Recommended by the Board of Engineers.

14. To see what action the town will take in regard to a twelve o'clock P.M. curfew.

15. To see what action the town wishes to take in regards to spraying shade trees.

16. To see if the town will vote to adopt a Zoning Ordinance, a Building Code, and a Curfew Law, for the purpose of protecting residential property, to provide safety, reduce fire-hazards, and safeguard our citizens from disturbances at late hours.

To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee of five from the floor to serve without compensation. This committee to co-operate with the Board of Selectmen in the drafting of such ordinances.

To see if the town will vote to postpone this meeting for thirty days, when committee will submit a full set of ordinance rules to be voted on.

17. To see if the town will vote to accept any or all of camp roads providing camp owners wish us to do so.

18. To see if the town will vote to allow the use of town equipment on private property providing pay for same is turned over to Town Treasurer.

19. To see if town will vote to appoint a committee to work out details of the Two Hundredth Anniversary of Hampstead and bring in report of same at 1949 Town Meeting.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REMARKS BY SELECTMEN

Ref. Article 12

Last spring Mr. Ells agreed to give the town the right of way known as Ells' Road.

We considered the following facts, then hired the State to tar at a cost of \$314.96, the road less than 2/10 of a mile—of regulation width—ready for tar—probability of new permanent homes and the gateway to thousands of dollars worth of camp property.

We feel our action is a long range benefit to Hampstead and hope you will vote to accept the article.

Last Summer several taxpayers expressed fear as to the safety of our Town Hall. Mr. A. Clifford Hudson, head of the Board of Underwriters, made a careful inspection, passed the building, but recommended we should point up the walls and repair fire escape.

We felt as long as you had once expressed a desire to have the hall piped for water, the opportune time was when men and equipment were working on the school project.

These men completed the above three jobs for a total cost of \$290.88. We received the bill too late to be entered on 1947 business.

A whole new electric service was installed by Arthur Johnston. Fluorescent lights were put over all bookcases which is a great improvement as all books can now be readily found. New ceiling lights were installed in all the other rooms, twin lights are at either side of the front door, making a much more pleasant and well lighted entrance. One extra cellar light was put in, also new switches upstairs.

There have been new window shades installed at every window by Vaughn & Co.

The outside of the building has been newly painted without any cost to the library as we were very fortunate in getting it done through aid from the state.

We have been trying and are still trying to bring our library up to the qualifications of the State Board, and also to have a building the town can be proud of.

During the past year we lost our Treasurer, Mrs. Helen Swift, who moved to California. Evelyn Taylor is now taking over the Treasurer's duties, and we have appointed Mrs. Agnes Covell to fill the one vacancy.

The librarian of the branch library in East Hampstead resigned, and as the circulation was so low there that we decided not to open a branch as most of the East Hampstead people use the main library when they want books.

We are hoping for a bigger and better year at the library.

The past fiscal year has been one of many achievements at the Hampstead Public Library. The circulation of books has far exceeded that of any other year. Special effort on the part of the librarian was made to supply the High School with books needed for special study. Many books were borrowed from the State Library in Concord as well as from other libraries in this vicinity.

The Central School teachers are loaned new books monthly to supplement the required reading of the elementary grades.

During July and August, the library was successful in acquiring the services of a former school teacher, Mrs. Lester Houston, to supervise a succession of Story Hours. A total of 43 children registered and an average of 22 children attended each Story Hour. A party and marionette show was held at the final Story Hour. The aim of these story hours was to affiliate the younger child with the library. Also to let him know the library is there to help him intellectually as well as for entertainment.

To equalize the Story Hours which were held primarily for children between the ages of 2 to 10, a Reading Contest was held for the Intermediate Group. Prizes were given to the children reading the greater number of Library books during July and August.

The East Hampstead Branch of the Hampstead Public Library was discontinued with the resignation of Mrs. Mary B. Darbe. A note of appreciation for 40 years of continuous service was sent with a gift to Mrs. Darbe. This branch was used very little and a new system is being tried whereby anyone desiring books in East Hampstead and unable to get to the Library, upon notification to the Librarian by telephone or mail, will be delivered the requested books.

Many noticeable repairs have been made at the Library. To mention a few—there are new shades and screens for all the windows. Broken or cracked glass in the windows was replaced and all windows were reinforced. The front steps were repaired and the exterior of the building was given a much needed coat of paint. New fluorescent lighting was installed throughout and this is a great aid in the efficiency of the library.

The library is greatly in need of new books, not only for reference work, but many new novels, western, and mystery books are in demand. This is largely due to the ever-increasing registering of new borrowers.

REPORT OF THE HAMPSTEAD FIRE DEPARTMENT

The past year has not been as good as the two previous years.

We had a total of 24 calls, seven of these were for property damage. The Winthrop Inn was the greatest loss. One camp at Angle Pond was a total loss.

Also part losses to the homes of John McNeil, Mrs. Bennette in East Hampstead, Mr. Brooks, Levi Duston and Chief True's.

The rest of the calls were for chimney and grass fires, none of these serious ones.

Also the forest fire which started on the West Road and threatened the lower part of town.

Outside help was called to protect property. Those coming to our aid were Haverhill, Groveland and Amesbury, Mass., Exeter, Newton Junction, Derry, Danville, Fremont, Kingston, Plaistow, Chester, Salem and Atkinson, N. H.

We also had three calls to Sandown, two to Atkinson and one to Kingston.

In the past year the H. V. F. D. A. has installed an oil burner in the furnace, also running water in the fire house.

FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurance in eastern United States history. Lact of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and towns crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where

necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.

13. To see what sum the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of maple trees on the front lawn of the High School, and the replanting of the same.

14. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the purpose of repair of the sewage system at Central School.

15. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hampstead:

I hereby submit my first annual report. This report will include supplementary staff reports from the Headmaster of the High School, the Supervisor of Music Instruction, the Supervisor of Art Instruction, and the Director of Health Services. The report will cover statistical information concerning the school year beginning July 1, 1946 and ending June 30, 1947, with additional information concerning the status of the schools from July 1, 1947 to Dec. 31, 1947.

I. General Information:

The total school enrollment reached an all-time high of 157 pupils registered for 1946-47. During the school year 1947-48, the trend upward is expected with a beginning enrollment of 145.

We have been very fortunate in having a small turnover in our teaching staff. Miss Helen Cassily, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, and with experience in Hillsboro, and as an extension worker with the Department of Agriculture, has taken over duties as a teacher of Science, Social Studies, Home Economics, and directs the girls' activity program which includes Basketball and Softball. Mrs. Lora Sinskie, with wide teaching experience in Connecticut and more recently Sandown, has been added to the staff of the Central School, as a teacher of Grades 5-6, thus relieving the over-large load carried by the teachers last year.

Miss Dorothea Martin, a graduate of the Massachusetts School of Art, and with two years of experience in the Hampton and Durham schools, has been added to the Union Staff as Supervisor of Art Instruction.

The Good Citizenship Medal was awarded to Marjorie Covell and she is to be congratulated for her evident proficiency in this area.

II. Curriculum:

a. General. I have found that the curriculum offered at the Central School is sufficient, and if followed should assure reason-

able proficiency in the "3 R's", adequate preparation for those who will go on to the secondary school, as well as an integrated program in health and science. Opportunity to develop citizenship habits, and social responsibility is interwoven in the program.

The High School Program of Studies is of necessity limited, though I have found that if followed it will adequately prepare those pupils who are desirous of entering post-secondary schools of the college level, and nurse's training. Instruction in the Commerce field will give preliminary training in this area. Our courses in the common cultural field, such as Mechanic Arts, Agriculture, and the Distributive Trades, because of space, number, and funds, cannot be offered. This area will be more adequately covered in the Headmaster's report.

b. Testing Program. A minimum testing program is in operation wherein each pupil during his school tenure is tested to determine "his ability to learn from books" and paralleling this, achievement tests are given in grades four to nine inclusive, to determine how far he has gone in "his learning from books". The test results are used in part as a starting point from which the teacher may aid the pupils in overcoming their subject difficulties.

c. Music. We are fortunate in having an excellent music instruction program, which includes voice instruction, and music appreciation with extra curricular work in presentations for public consumption.

III. Teachers and Professional Advancement and Personnel:

Hampstead is fortunate in having a staff who by and large are interested in their own professional advancement and who in the main are interested in boys and girls. Mr. Greenlaw, Mrs. Reynolds, and Miss Emerson attended summer schools this summer. During this school year a Citizenship Workshop was organized. Under the direction of the State Board of Education, the Elementary school teachers met for three days, discussing new trends in education, working on their own personal teaching problems, and examining new materials for classroom use. We here at Hampstead reap much of the benefit from this desire for professional improvement on the part of the teachers. It is contemplated that a three-week session of professional study will be held this summer for the benefit of the teachers.

Mr. Mariner Crosby, the school custodian, tendered his resignation to become effective December 31, 1947. Mr. Roland Emerson has been added to the staff and I believe we can look forward to efficient operation in this very important area.

IV. School and Community Activities:

We are fortunate to have such a close liaison between the school and community. Through the efforts of an active Parent-Teacher Association, a modified hot lunch program seems near. The Parent-Teacher Association also supplies the schools with current magazines and first aid equipment. The Greater Hampstead Civic Club has given active support to the school activity program, and has been ever ready to aid in any worthy school cause.

V. School Maintenance and Repair:

This has been an unusual year for necessary maintenance and repair of our schools.

Following a plan, the School Board made extensive repairs in the form of painting the interior of the High School, making provision for landscaping the front of the Central School, and treating the floors in one classroom, the teachers' room, and the hallway with a hard-finish product to insure its maintenance.

It became necessary this fall to install a new water system for the Central School, as the well which previously supplied this school was condemned. By making certain adjustments to the system supplying the High School, it was possible to use this system to supply both schools.

The following is an account of monies spent in this area:

By curtailing on planned expenditures the School Board has been able to absorb part of the expense of the water system installation to the extent of making it necessary to ask for a deficiency appropriation in the amount of \$850.00, instead of the anticipated \$1,800.00. I believe this is commendable action on the part of the Board.

VI. Recommendations and Conclusions :

This section of the report might well be called "Planning for the Future". In no way should it be implied that these recommendations are "musts", but merely a suggested program upon which, you the public, must decide.

a. Teacher Status. In order to maintain an adequate and efficient staff of teachers, salary increases seem necessary. The unending rise in the cost of living throughout the nation makes this of paramount importance.

b. Curriculum. I believe that if replacements in the High School become necessary it might be desirable to obtain personnel who could handle a modified Arts and Crafts program in the Annex. A definite program of education social and vocational guidance seems desirable.

c. Health and Physical Education. When space and funds are available, and with the help of local organizations, plans should be made looking toward the establishment of a yearly dental clinic, as well as provision for physical examinations.

When funds are made available, and with the help of community organizations it would seem advisable to look toward an early establishment of a full hot lunch program, using federal funds to defray part of the expense involved. This presupposes adequately equipping and staffing a kitchen in the Central School.

d. Textbooks and Scholars' Supplies: As a result of the increased appropriation for textbooks and scholars' supplies, it has been possible to replace in part many of our outworn and outdated books. We must keep in mind, however, that the replacement of texts is a continuing process, and I recommend a policy in this area, that will be continuous, thus making it unnecessary in the future, to appropriate unusual amounts for this purpose.

Along with other commodities, the price of books, paper, etc.,

has increased from 10% to 25% over last year, making it necessary to increase in part appropriations in these areas.

e. Maintenance and Repair. In order that the general maintenance be placed on a practical basis I recommend that a plan of operation to cover a period of years be instituted, so that the Central School classrooms will be painted and the general structure be refinished. It seems advisable to make some general additions to the present structure which because of the lack of funds and material, were impossible of realization at the time of its construction. It might be desirable to confer with the architects and have them survey the situation.

I recommend that a continuing policy of equipment replacement be instituted, so that by small replacements periodically, the overall plant will be in efficient operation.

f. State Aid. Due to the increase in the enrollment in the schools of New Hampshire, we must anticipate a decrease of from four to five dollars State Aid on all pupils enrolled in our schools. Therefore, the principle of underestimating the income received from outside sources should be viewed with care.

g. Extra Curricular and Activity Program. Organized athletics, and playground activities play an important part in the molding of character, and aid in the social adjustment and physical development of the child. In schools of small enrollments it is difficult to administer an athletic activity program on a pay as you go basis. I therefore recommend that certain sums be set aside for the partial aid of our athletic activity program and a sum for the institution of limited outdoor playground equipment.

h. Planning for the Future. While there are different points of view concerning the early growth of school attendance, all observers are agreed that by 1950 in the United States, we shall have a record enrollment particularly in the elementary schools.

The following is the projected enrollment increase in our schools based on statistics compiled by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, with the proviso that Hampstead will follow the national population trend:

It is evident that there will be in the near future a marked increase in the school age population in the United States, and the situation calls for planning along practical lines in order that adequate provision be made for the education of these children. We are fortunate to have the Central School plant which should take care of these increases, though for a time, it would be crowded. The figures show no unusual jump in the High School areas, which, in my opinion would justify any planning for the future.

i. Conclusion. I wish to take this opportunity to express admiration and respect for Mr. Nelson, our former Superintendent, who through twenty-three years of earnest and upright administration has made teachers, boys and girls, men and women, better because of his untiring efforts for progress.

I also wish to express my sincere appreciation for the cooperation of the headmaster, principal, and the teaching staff, and for the guidance and ever ready aid of the School Board and citizenry. It is only by this team-spirit that the needs of all the children of all the people of Hampstead can be realized.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

To the Superintendent and the School Board:

I hereby submit the annual report for Hampstead High School.

The program of studies for the school offers work in four curricula: Classical, General, Commercial and Home Economics. Courses of study of one curriculum may be elective in another.

There have been several improvements made in the building and equipment. Painting and repairs have added to the attractiveness of the school. A set of Encyclopedia Britannica has been added to our reference books, as well as new text books for some classes. The Parent-Teacher Association is providing subscriptions to a number of magazines for the school. A microscope and other supplies have been added to the science laboratory.

Extra-curricular activities have demanded much of the time and energy of pupils and teachers. An operetta, "The Belle of Barcelona," directed by Mrs. Thompson is under production as well as preliminary plans for a freshmen play under the direction of Miss Hadley. The juniors and seniors expect to stage a play in May.

The majority of pupils have participated in athletics. There has been a great deal of interest shown in basketball by both boys and girls as well as baseball and softball. The program for the girls is under the direction of Miss Cassily. We have been able to equip and maintain baseball and basketball for boys and girls. This has been due to the support of the community. Many in-

dividuals have contributed time and equipment in building the baseball field, transporting teams and supporting them at games. The Greater Hampstead Civic Club contributed funds to equip the baseball and basketball teams.

As in the past each school receives as many routine visits as possible, plus the additional visits necessary to accomplish specified work.

One pupil received examination by Ophthalmologist and glasses, financed by Sight Conservation Program.

Eye health program in our schools is very important. Modern educational procedures depend largely on the use of sight. It is therefore necessary for all of those concerned with the welfare of the child to know as early as possible what his eye condition is. Since eyes change with growth, and accidents do occur during vacation periods, of which the pupil and parent may both be unaware, periodic examinations are necessary through the school year.

Ideally, every child should have a thorough medical examination, including an eye examination, before he enters school.

Miss Constance Martin, R.N., staff worker of the Tuberculosis Association aided in giving the Vollmer Test for tuberculosis, May 9-13, 1947. At the High School and Central School 29 pupils were tested. All pupils reacted "Negative."

Salem schools are anticipating a gift of an Audiometer, a special scientific device for measuring the hearing loss. I am looking forward to using this Audiometer and giving each pupil a hearing test this coming spring.

No child can learn unless he hears and understands what he hears. Many children suffer from a qualitative hearing loss or hidden defects that no one realizes. Bright children may be stigmatized as "backward" or "lazy" when actually they are struggling under a burden of defective hearing. It has been found that the majority of hard of hearing can be given auricular care he needs for correction if found in time.

Every pupil was weighed and measured several times during the school year, and records kept on charts provided. Gain in weight is the best single sign of good nutrition in a child. Healthy, well nourished children differ in many respects, according to age, sex, and race and family from which they come. They vary in body shape and size, even at the same age; some will be tall and slender, some short and stocky. The gain to be expected over any period depends upon such factors as these, as well as the child's health throughout the period.

Everyday factors favorable to growth are long hours of sleep, play and exercise in open air, and a diet that includes a generous amount of milk, fruit, and vegetables.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the School Committee, Mr. Grandy, and teachers, and all with whom I have worked, for without their interest and cooperation my work would have been quite futile.
