

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton Falls in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hampton Falls on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at three o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what action the Town wishes to take in setting the wages for the Highway Department. (By Russell P. Merrill Jr. and ten others).
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to adjust compensation of the town officers.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,397.05 to defray the estimated operating expenses of the Hampton Falls Volunteer Fire Department. (By Russell P. Merrill Jr. Vice President and eleven others).
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$220.94 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$1,472.93.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, for the advancement of the Town through publicity and promotional services of the Seacoast Regional Association a sum not exceeding one-hundredth of one percent of assessed valuation, the sum of \$156.00.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for a Police Radio, the State to contribute an equal amount.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 to start reconstruction of Curtis Road.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 toward the control of the Dutch Elm Disease.
- 11. To see whether the Town will vote to pass an ordinance prohibiting hunting within the Town of Hampton Falls, except in cases where express permission of the property owner has been obtained inn writing. Penalty \$50.00.
- 12. To provide funds in the amount of \$150.00 for construction of signs and authorize the selectmen to install said signs on the major roads entering the Town informing the general public of this ordinance.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept "Merrill Road" as a permanent Town road, Merrill Road being a 40 ft. right of way running north east from Depot Road, a distance of approximately 550 ft. and with a 26 ft. gravel road. (by Russell P. Merrill and ten others).
- 14. To see if the Town wishes to take any action in regard to Andrews Bridge on Kensington Road and raise and appropriate the sum of \$9000.00. the State to contribute an equal amount to cover the estimated cost of reconstruction.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Brush removal.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to give the selectmen authority to sell any property acquired by tax sale.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote the selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

18. To see if the Town will vote to transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

School Report

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Hampton Falls qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 8th day of March, 1957, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, of Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.
- 10. To see if the District will vote to participate with such other School Districts in Supervisory Union No. 21 as may also so vote in the formation of a special class for children of intellectually retarded development, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred One and 65/100 Dollars (\$401.65) for the share of the expense of the Hampton Falls School District therein.
- 11. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation of \$55,075.08 for 1956-1957, a sum of \$3,200.00 to make a total appropriation for 1956-1957 of \$58,275.08, and to authorize the application against this appropriation of \$1,700.00 already received or to be received on account of Federal Aid, the balance of \$1,500.0 to be made available to the School District by the Selectmen prior to July 1, 1957, in order to meet anticipated obligations caused by the need for an additional teacher and additional expenses for tuition and transportation.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Hampton Falls School District:

It is a pleasure to submit my first annual report as superintendent of schools. I was conscious that I was assuming a heavy responsibility when I accepted the superintendency of Union No. 21. This school union is one of the largest and most vigorous school organizations in New England. It was apparent to me that if one were to meet the demands of administrative duties in this union, it would be necessary that full cooperation be given by all school personnel and by the citizens of the school districts. I am happy to be able to say that since I took office on December 1, 1956 such has been the case.

My predecessor, Roy W. Gillmore, during October and November gave me the full benefit of his twenty-six years of experience in this Union. Your School Board has offered me unstinted assistance and support. I trust that the people of the district appreciate the sacrifices of time and energy made by the members of the Board. The Union Office staff has worked and continues to work beyond regular requirements to meet the needs of the school. Miss Edith Hammond, my Executive Assistant, renders invaluable help in freeing me from many administrative problems. Mr. Sherman A. Lovering, the Helping Teacher, continues to carry an increasing responsibility for efficiency in instruction.

Enrollments in Hampton Falls are such that we can continue next year without altering our grade organization. Adequate instruction can be offered by the principal and teachers under the present arrangement. When the time comes to enlarge the school, ample space is available for construction.

The budget for next year is conservative. Annual salary increments are provided or; and, in addition, sufficient funds are included to make replacements if any prove to be needed. The program in Music and Art which are of great value to children will be continued.

Better provision for nursing service is required. Mrs. Mansourian is now working in five school districts with a pupil enrollment of almost 1300. This is an impossible load and far above state standards which call for a pupil load between 500 and 700 for a school nurse. During the coming year her work will be confined to North Hampton and Rye. A new qualified school nurse will be hired for Hampton Falls, South Hampton and Seabrook.

An unavoidable increase in tuition costs causes a major increase in the budget. Higher charges in Exeter and Hampton reflect the increased costs of education in this rapidly growing area of the state. It should be noted, however, that Junior High charges in Hampton are reduced for the coming year. This helps to offset the increase in high school costs.

A special Warrant Article will be offered to provide funds for the establishment of a special class for children with learning handicaps. This class will be located in the North Hampton Elementary School since space can be provided there at least for next year and since this is a location central with respect to the seven school districts of the union. Hampton Falls would share in the support of this class and would be entitled to send a number of pupils proportionate to its share.

In all districts we have pupils who need the special curriculum and special instruction that can be furnished in such classes. More than one such class is needed in a union of this size. I look forward to recommending a second class for the following year so that children can be served in two locations. It seemed wise to begin with one class and, after a year's experience, to expand to two classes later.

It must be clearly understood that this recommendation stands as a local decision. We have agreed to participate in a state study of the best ways of organizing such classes within school unions. This study will deal largely with identification of pupils needing the instruction and organization and administration of the class. Funds for this study will be provided by the Huntley Spaulding Fund. With the assistance of Mr. Lovering I will supervise the personnel conducting the study.

The important point is that the class will not be established for purposes of the state study. Children need such classes and this instruction is routinely provided in other school systems. Whether or not the state study existed I would propose that such a class or classes be a part of our school system.

The unanimous decision of the Special District meeting of January 18, 1957 to join your neighbors in Hampton, North Hampton and Seabrook in petitioning the State Board of Education for permission to form a cooperative secondary school district was a wise first step. As you know, the State Board voted to grant this permission. The organization meeting for the purpose of forming the district, electing a school committee, and adopting a budget sufficient to secure architectural services and provide for administrative costs will take place in late March.

A high school supported by a cooperative district would seem to be the most efficient and economical solution to the problem we face in educating our high school youth. I feel we can establish a school which will offer a superior kind of program. I am sure too, that experience will show that the interests of each district can be adequately protected within the framework of the new cooperative district.

In conclusion, may I again extend to the School Board and the citizens of the District my appreciation for the kind welcome you have given me and for your generous cooperation. During the next year it is my hope to be able to extend my services to the district.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

As school nurse, I have visited the Lincoln Akerman School one morning each school week.

Routine check ups are done on every pupil. These consist of weighing and measuring, checking tonsils, teeth, hair, skin and posture each year.

Vision testing is done annually on all children with the Snellen "E" chart.

Hearing tests are done every two years. During the past year two pupils were found to have hearing problems which I'm happy to say have been corrected.

Dr. Bailey, school physician, examined eighty-three pupils and a few minor defects were found and were reported to parents.

Polio clinics were held last June and again in December. At the time of the last clinic, the age range for the Salk vaccine was six months through 19 years. A total of ninety-two persons were given shots at the clinics, thirty-three in June and fifty-nine in December. Many thanks to all who aided me in preparing for and assisting at these clinics.

Home contacts are made when necessary. A total of 55 were made during last year.
