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SELECTMEN'S REPORT

To the Citizens of the Town of Goffstown:

Another year has passed and we believe that it has been one of progress.

Six rooms have been added to the elementary school, but these rooms will alleviate our crowded condition for a short time only.

The new salt shed and loader are operating, which eliminates our salt handling problem. We are saving six dollars a ton, which means that if we use the same amount as last year—seven hundred ton—the saving would be Forty Two Hundred Dollars: a sum that will pay for the salt shed and equipment in a short time.

The sewer on High Street is completed and with the new road constructed this year, the residents of High Street should be pleased. You will notice a six-apartment building on High Street, owned by Dr. Benson, which was occupied immediately on completion.

We received our first retroactive payment of Twenty Nine Hundred and Twenty Eight Dollars from the State. We will receive this amount yearly for twenty years, due to legislation passed on Sewage Disposal installations.

The St. Anselms College project has been completed and the Town should be proud to have such an institution.

The painting of the inside of the Town Hall gives it a "new look", which should appeal to all concerned. The

hall is used practically every day by one organization or another.

We think that all of the people are aware of our rubbish disposal problem. Even with the hiring of bull-dozers at both dumps, we have kept within our budget—but what about the future? The Depot Street dump will be condemned soon due to the polluting of the river. The ravine at the Pinardville dump is fast filling in, to a point that the bull-dozing is quite a problem and this year the operator is asking for more money. We have made quite a study of this problem and think that a Sanitary Fill operation would be the solution.

We have received a letter from the Public Service Company allowing us the use of twenty acres of land, located in back of the old car barn in Pinardville, for a Sanitary-Fill operation. There will be no cost for the use of the land and the period of use is indefinite as long as the privilege is not abused.

The people must realize that burning dumps should be something of the past. Our present dumps could be opened at certain times for the dumping of brush and fill. We have had a survey made for pick-up service by the Truk-a-Way Corporation of Manchester. They will pick up rubbish for ten cents a container. These containers are adapted to their trucks and will cost the people Four Dollars each. We now face the problem of equipment for compacting the rubbish. We either could contract the job on a twice-a-week basis, or could purchase a piece of equipment which also could be used on

other projects. Regardless of the method used, we should put some money in the Capital Reserve Fund to be used at some future date for this purpose.

Our Bi-Centennial Committee, headed by Alfred W. Poore, Jr., has had many meetings to shape up a program starting July 30th through August 5, 1961. It will take a great deal of effort by many people to put such a program over, but it will be worth every bit of it. "Bill" should get all the co-operation necessary, and by doing so, the Town will be proud of its 200th Anniversary celebration.

The Zoning Committee, consisting of Lawrence Shirley, Chairman, David Prugh, Chief Advisor, and Albert Lamothe, J. Romeo LaRochelle, Nat Foss, Elmer Nickerson, Stanton Tefft and Charlotte Farley, has made great strides in shaping up a zoning program, which should aid and protect the town in many ways. This should have been done years ago, as our authority has been limited more or less by state laws.

There are many more projects to be considered in the near future—one is a building for the Fire and Police Departments, which could eliminate the radio base station at the Police Chief's home, the transmitter at the Fire Chief's home, and actually centralize the two Departments, providing more efficient service and saving money as well.

We should foster progress to build a better town and we feel that the people of Goffstown are unanimous in that desire.

1961 TOWN WARRANT STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Goffstown in the said County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 14th of March, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, except those who reside in the Fifth District Voting Precinct, who are notified to meet at the Fire Station in said Precinct at 10:30 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

(Polls close at 7:00 P.M. at the Central Polling Place and at 6:30 P.M. at the Fifth District.)

None of the articles in the warrant, except those relating to the election of officers and those covering questions on the ballot, shall be considered during the time that the polls are open.

- 1. To choose all Town Officers and Agents for the ensuing year, including a member of the Board of Selectmen for three years.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee in the amount of three hundred ten thousand one hundred forty nine dollars and forty three cents (\$310,149.43), and raise by taxes the sum of two hundred forty seven thousand two hundred eighty one dollars and nine cents (\$247,-281.09), (county tax not included).
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow at times such sums of money in anticipation of taxes as may be needed to meet the necessary running expenses of the Town.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by The Town through Tax Collector's deed or by gift.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for improvement of Class Five Roads, under Apportionment A, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Hundred Forty-eight Dollars and forty three cents (\$1,648.43) and the State to contribute Ten Thousand

Nine Hundred Eighty-nine Dollars and fifty-one cents (\$10,989.51). Also to accept State Aid, under Apportionment B, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-two Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$6,220.00), the State to contribute Sixty-two Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$6,220.00).

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Board of Fire Wardens to purchase four Scott Air Paks for use of the Fire Department and to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Hundred Dollars for payment of the same provided the Civil Defense will stand one half of the purchase price. Inserted by petition. Not recommended by Budget Committee.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the upkeep and operation of the skating rinks. Inserted by petition. Not recommended by the Budget Committee.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken on Article 15 of 1960 Warrant pertaining to the construction of sewage pre-treatment plant to be located at Karanikas & Sons on Depot Street, Goffstown, New Hampshire.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Provisions of (The Town Manager form of government) Chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes Annotated as provided in RSA 37:15 as amended by Chapter 152 of the Session Laws of 1957. Inserted by petition.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase a parcel of land in the rear of the Town Hall for parking of Town employees' cars. Inserted by petition. Not recommended by Budget Committee.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken at the 1914 Town Meeting whereby we adopted the Australian Ballot system and adopt in lieu thereof the non-partisan ballot system as provided in Chapter 59, Section 73 of the Revised Statutes Annotated. Inserted by petition.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept a gift, by deed, from Carl R. and Sally B. Farnham, of a forty foot wide strip, approximately 800 feet in length, to be known as Glen Wood Drive. Said Street to be bulldozed to grade by said Carl R. Farnham. Inserted by petition.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept a gift, by deed, from Robert Hall, of a forty foot wide strip, fifteen hundred feet, known as Westwood Drive. Said Street to be bulldozed to grade by said Hall. Inserted by petition.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Zoning Ordinances proposed by the Town Planning and Zoning Committee, a copy of which is included in each Town Report.
- 15. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees and to pass any vote relating thereto.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING 1960

Goffstown, N. H. March 8, 1960

At 10:00 A.M. Moderator David V. Prugh called the meeting to order and read Article One of the Warrant. Voted that the polls now be opened for voting: that Articles 17 and 21 be acted upon at the same time as the voting for Town Officers in the polls; that the balance of the Warrant be read and acted upon at seven o'clock in the afternoon; that the polls close at nine o'clock, and that our next Town Meeting be opened at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

ARTICLE 1. Polls opened and check lists posted, Town and Primary Ballots counted. Voting continued until 6:45 P.M. at which time a recess was declared to take up other articles in Warrant.

For Auditors—Voted that the clerk cast one ballot for Benjamin F. Greer, Frank W. Bartlett and Carl B. Pattee. One ballot cast and same were declared elected.

For Surveyors of Lumber and Corders of Wood—Benjamin F. Greer, Gerald Upton, Lawrence W. Shirley, Arthur F. Grant and Robert McDougall were nominated and elected on one ballot cast by the Clerk and so declared.

Voted that the Selectmen serve as fence viewers for the ensuing year.

For Cemetery Trustee for three years—Clinton O. Rising was nominated and elected on one ballot cast by the Clerk and declared elected.

For Fire Warden for three years—Hector Pellerin and Libert Sousa were nominated. Hector Pellerin received the largest number of votes by show of hands and was declared elected.

Voted that the reading of the balance of the Warrant be dispensed with.

ARTICLE 2. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Seventy Thousand Six Hundred Ninety-one Dollars and Fifty-seven Cents (\$270,691.57) less revenue, plus County Tax.

ARTICLE 3. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 4. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by Town through Tax Collector's deed or by gift.

ARTICLE 5. Voted to raise and appropriate One Thousand Six Hundred Fifty-six Dollars and Nineteen cents (\$1,656.19) for Class Five Roads under apportionment "A" and Sixty-two Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$6,220.00) under apportionment "B" and to accept State Aid in each case.

ARTICLE 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500.) for Grader capital reserve fund; Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1500.) for Payloader capital reserve fund and Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.) for sidewalk Plow capital reserve fund.

ARTICLE 7. Motion made and supported that this Article be dismissed. Motion was lost upon a show of hands for and against. Upon motion duly made and seconded voted to act favorably upon this article.

ARTICLE 8. Voted to act favorably upon this article to repair the Grandstand at the Barnard Playground.

ARTICLE 9. Voted to dismiss this Article relating to the purchase of land adjoining Barnard Playground.

ARTICLE 10. Voted to dismiss this Article relating to Band Concerts.

ARTICLE 11. Voted to act favorably on this Article and raise and appropriate \$1000. to defray expense of 200th Anniversary 1961.

ARTICLE 12. Voted to dismiss this Article relating to two fire stations.

ARTICLE 13. Voted to act favorably upon this Article and to accept the gift of land from Wilfred and Charles Perrault.

ARTICLE 14. A motion was made and supported that we act favorably upon this article. Voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 15. Voted to act favorably upon this article calling for a waste pre-treatment plant at the Karanikas Plant.

ARTICLE 16. Voted to act favorably upon this article to construct a salt shed.

ARTICLE 17. To see if Town will vote to continue the Town Manager Plan. This article voted for on the Australian ballot—result—Yes 524 No 581

ARTICLE 18. Voted on the question of adopting the Municipal Budget Law by ballot. Upon motion to adopt—total number of ballots cast 344—Yes 271 No 73

ARTICLE 19. Voted that the Budget Committee consist of twelve (12) members at large to be elected by the Town.

ARTICLE 20. Those nominated to serve on the Budget Committee were—for three-year term: Nathaniel F. Bigelow, Jr., Albert J. Lamothe, Charles S. Parsons and Albert A. Taggart; for two-year term: Roger Aubin, Roland Barnard, Francis L. Gaudreault, Robert Preston;

for one-year term: George Aimo, Rosario Lamy, Albert E. Lander and Albert F. Merrill. Moved that the above be elected and so voted

Upon motion duly made and supported, voted to elect the members to the Budget Committee on the Australian Ballot, beginning with the year 1961 and each year thereafter.

ARTICLE 22. Voted to accept the printed reports of the officers. It was suggested that the Moderator ascertain the opinion of those present relative to zoning. or the Planning Committee becoming more active.

A show of hands indicated that a large majority of those present favored such plan.

Moved that the Planning Committee be reactivated and so voted.

Voted to extend the time of closing the polls to 9:30 P.M.

REPORT OF THE BARNARD PLAYGROUND TRUSTEES

The 1960 season at Barnard Playground showed a marked improvement in activity.

The summer program, under the able direction of Norton Phelps, Jr. and Deborah Anslow was well received. The advent of Babe Ruth League baseball imposed new problems for the Trustees which I will bring up later in this report.

The new tennis court was completed within the appropriation and the Trustees repaired the backstop at no cost to the Town. The grandstand was replanked and some stringers replaced to insure the safety of all. Some fencing of the outfield and a new score board were erected by the members of the Town Team at no cost to the Town.

The Goffstown Police Association held their Carnival in July, and the D. A. Taggart Volunteers their Firemen's Muster over Labor Day.

Looking forward to the 1961 season, the Trustees feel that the grandstand should be painted, the seats oiled or painted, and the roof repaired and painted. This should be done to protect the property from the weather and save the building. A special appropriation would be required for this project.

Getting back to the baseball situation, we have a problem that warrants the attention of the Town. The Little League age group is 10 through 12—Babe Ruth League 13 through 15—and the contemplated Legion Team 16 through 18. There are eight teams of fifteen players each in the Little League; four teams of fifteen players in the Babe Ruth League, and the proposed Legion Team would carry fifteen players for a total of 195 boys, exclusive of the Town Team of some twenty odd players. Our problem is one of scheduling the ball field on an equitable basis. The Little League has its own diamond and is no problem at present. The Babe Ruth League plays four nights a week: the Town Team uses the diamond two nights a week and Sunday afternoon, and the Legion Team would like the diamond one or two nights each week. No one wants Saturday or Sunday nights. So out of the five available nights we have eight potential users and this does not include make up games in case of rain. It would seem that the Town could use another ball field or at least a practice field to alleviate this situation.

Possible solutions to the problem would include: financial support to the Lions Club to be used for the completion of a ball field on their West Union Street site, or purchase of land adjacent to Barnard Playground, and an appropriation of funds to lay out a practice field.

The Trustees wish to thank the people of Goffstown for their interest and cooperation in the past, and sincerely hope that it will continue so we can best serve you.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Goffstown:

Public education is considered by many as the most important single function of government.

All considerations have always been with the welfare of our children first in mind. The School Board has and does subscribe to equal opportunities for all of our children.

ENROLLMENT

Goffstown, like many other communities, is faced with the challenge of providing adequate accommodations for its increasing number of school age children. The following charts of projected enrollments will show this pupil growth clearly.

The Engelhardt figures are more reliable and scientific, as they reflect the number of pupils moving in and out of our schools, plus the number of births, etc. The second chart simply starts with pupil enrollment in one year and then assumes that the same number of children will progress through the various grades. Obviously, this type of projection is not accurate.

It is interesting to note however, the high degree of similarity between both charts in regard to the total population figures.

This enrollment growth creates two problems. One is a long-range approach in view of the steady and progressive annual population growth, in terms of a long range building program in order to accommodate these pupils within the next few years, and the other problem is more immediate, as it is concerned with the distribution of pupils within certain grades and is directly concerned with the total number of pupils that a school can effectively house.

The chart below shows the number of rooms presently available and in use as of the fall of 1961:

A comparison of this chart with the expected enrollments indicates that even with 30 children to a room, we shall require additional classroom space in the elementary grades, 1-6, before the fall of 1963 and in grades 7-8 before the fall of 1964.

A high school's capacity, class organization and size is quite different from an elementary school. Dr. Engelhardt reported that the capacity of our high school was 280 students based on its eleven classrooms, gymnasium, shop, home economics room, library, and two other rooms making a total of seventeen pupil station rooms. Some subjects might be efficiently taught to large classes, as some new high schools are being constructed to handle a few classes of over a hundred pupils. Many classes, however, and particularly in mathematics, foreign languages, and science are more efficiently taught with small groups. Last year our high school had seventy-three different classes with an average of twenty-one students per class.

A glance at the enrollment charts indicates that this school will operate slightly above capacity for the coming school year, but that in the fall of 1962 and thereafter there will be more students enrolled than the rated capacity.

If this condition is to continue then we must either go on double sessions or seriously curtail the curriculum.

Faculty

The School Board is proud of its personnel, the heart of our school system. Its policy is to recruit the best and to retain the best within the limits of the salary schedule, which is not to be violated. The Board believes that all members of its staff must be paid according to the same standards, hence the single salary schedule by which its teachers are paid.

Our salary schedule for the coming year will meet the competition of other communities as it is too late to correct this situation when some of our best teachers have left. The strongest asset of our school system is its staff of teachers. We must always keep it strong.

Several of our staff members have had singular honors this year. Mr. Donald Simpson, Mr. Leon Cote, and Mr. Frank Mitchell were awarded National Science Foundation Scholarships; Mrs. Barbara Buffington was awarded a Granite Board Company Scholarship. Some have had educational articles and poems published and many teachers are enrolled in educational courses leading to advanced degrees.

Recent Achievements

Much has been accomplished during the past year. Very little could have been accomplished without the excellent cooperation of a competent staff of teachers, understanding parents, a School Board sympathetic to the needs of the school, and voting citizenry ever ready to help wherever and whenever needed.

This is the report of the third year of the school under the present Superintendent. Due to your appropriations each year for the past three years, we have been able to achieve much of the following:

Our High School's composite test score, on a national standardized achievement test program, given to hundreds of high schools throughout the country, was in the 90th percentile.

Improvement of teachers salaries and the establishment of a salary schedule, designed to retain our best teachers, excellent custodial, and cafeteria personnel.

Establishment of school libraries in the Maple Avenue School and in the High School. In this connection, we wish to thank the Mothers' Club for their excellent cooperation in devoting their time for a minimum of of five hours per week to assist in checking books in and out of the new elementary library.

The Bartlett School and Grasmere School Mothers' Clubs are also to be thanked for their participation and interest in the formation of their school libraries.

A circulating library system has been set up whereby the Maple Avenue School supplies reading books to the Bartlett and Grasmere Schools.

A systemized purchase of reference, supplemental books, maps and globes.

Establishment of a standardized, objective type testing program, consisting of an intelligence test given in grades ones, three, five, seven, and nine every year and an achievement test given annually in grades three through eight.

The acquisition of a Helping Teacher upon a Supervisory union basis.

A gradual introduction of regularly scheduled intramural athletic contests.

The utilization of well-informed citizens as aids to our instructional program discussing their particular professional or specialty areas, their travels, or special hobbies with our students.

Participation in the National Defense Education Act enabling us to have more instructional aids in the teaching of Mathematics and Science.

Goffstown may well be proud of the advancement and establishment of its science department. Our instructors designed, and built the fine, modern laboratory and we were able to purchase many items and equipment for the rooms efficient use. Our town received the largest reimbursement last year of any New Hampshire town in connection with this Act.

A part-time elementary guidance center has been established for the purpose of testing and assisting those children with adjustment problems.

The shop program has been improved so that we are able to offer two major and at least five minor areas of study. We believe that this program, more than any other, was responsible for the curtailment of our former large high school drop-out problem by more than 50%.

A Future Teachers of America program has been initiated whereby the young people from the Goffstown High School that are interested in teaching are able to visit the Elementary Schools and observe the various teaching methods. In many cases, these young people are permitted to assist the teacher in various phases of instruction. It is hoped that this will encourage the young people to enter the teaching profession.

Safety Patrols have been reactivated with Police Chief Earl Dubois as advisor with teachers as directors in the various schools. Teacher committees have been formed and utilized in order to study and evaluate books and to make specific recommendations to the Superintendent for their purchases. The present school curriculum has been studied and some very definite recommendations and evaluations have been made. This year the teachers of arithmetic have met several times a month and are preparing study guides, on a Supervisory School Union basis, grade by grade.

A few specific teachers, due to their specialized training and background, have been appointed, at no increase in salary, coordinators or advisors in special areas as; library work, audio visual aids, elementary science, etc.

The acquisition of new and excellent instructional educational materials has enabled us to enrich our curriculum in several areas.

The curriculum has been strengthened through the emphasis of work adapted to the individual child, in light of his strengths and weaknesses. A team learning situation has been established in some grades in the Maple Avenue Elementary School in an effort to create a more efficient learning situation for our pupils.

OUR NEEDS

Our most serious need is for more classroom space for the high school, plus more rooms for the elementary grades within two or three years. This problem may be solved in two different ways, a long range or a short range approach. The long range approach starts with the assumption that a new high school may be built somewhere in town and that the present building would be utilized as an elementary school. Preliminary estimates indicate that this arrangement might answer our total building needs until late in this decade.

The long range approach is not new. It was introduced a number of years ago when the High School addition was contemplated and reintroduced last year. Both introductions received defeat when brought to a vote of the people of Goffstown.

The short range approach would consist of additions to be added to our various school buildings whenever needed. It may or may not include the construction of a new high school.

Whichever technique is accepted, it is to be hoped that it will be the better plan and will better answer the needs of all of our pupils.

The instruction, and appreciation of music and art should be encouraged to the fullest.

Our music supervisor works with each class in the elementary schools once a week and the majority of time is spent in vocal music. We offer no formal or established art program, but expect each individual teacher to do the best she or he can in this subject.

To correct these situations, we would have to budget both time and money, probably upon the Supervisory Union basis. The school union has seriously considered these proposals for the past year and it is to be hoped that both situations may be corrected by the addition of full time music and art supervisors in the near future.

One of the characteristics of an outstanding school is the attention given to adapting the level and caliber of teaching to the individual child, in order to make that teaching more meaningful and effective for each pupil. We have made a start in this direction and it is hoped that as our classes return to a smaller and more efficient size, we might add more curriculum enrichment for the majority and definite acceleration for the gifted. The school union is now considering the feasibility of establishing a special class for the mentally retarded. This addition will provide for these children and satisfy their educational and personal needs and will also provide us with the opportunity of allowing us to better realize our teaching and curriculum objectives in their former classrooms.

I wish to again take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation to the Goffstown School Board, for their continued guidance, kindness, and support, to all school personnel and those thoughtful and cooperative citizens for their continued cooperation and support of our public schools.

1960 SCHOOL WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Goffstown qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the High School in said district of Goffstown on the 11th day of March 1961 at 12 noon and to cast ballots from that hour until at least 7:15 o'clock in the evening of said day for candidates for the following district officers:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose 2 Members of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

You are also notified to meet at the same place at 7:15 o'clock in the evening of the same day, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 3. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 4. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation

of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 5. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.
- 6. To see if the district will vote to appropriate any funds received from tuition for so-called state wards toward payment of general expenses of the year 1960-61.
- 7. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money, not to exceed the sum of \$3000.00, to repair the roof and parapet of the Bartlett School.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to direct and authorize the School Board to purchase options, at their discretion, when available on property located close to or adjoining existing school areas. Monies necessary for these options or the ultimate purchase of any properties shall have the approval of the Budget Committee. (Inserted by petition)
- 9. To see if the School District of Goffstown will vote to transport only those pupils to and from school that the District is legally required to transport; this to become effective September 1962. RSA Ch. 189: 6 and 7 . . . "The district shall furnish transportation to all

pupils below the ninth grade who live more than two miles from the school to which they are assigned . . . and to all pupils under the age of fourteen years in grades above the eighth." (The above article has been included for the purpose of assisting the School Board to more efficiently prepare next year's school budget.)

10. To see if the school district will vote to transport all those pupils residing in the territory covered by the present school board transportation policy, provided that those pupils whom the district is not legally required to transport will be requested to pay a nominal fare of ten cents per pupil per day. (Inserted by petition)

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

"I move that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$398,193.96 for the support of Schools, for the Salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of Statutory obligations of the districts, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State foundation Aid Fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town."

Voted in the affirmative.

Art. 9

Voted to act favorable on this article.

Art. 10

Voted to act favorable on this article.

Art. 11

Voted to act favorable on this article, and to use the

Town Checklist for future elections, and School Meetings.

Art. 12

A. Kenneth Hambleton explained regarding the "Non-Partisan" ballot system and moved we adopt this article. Motion was seconded. Motion was lost on voice vote. Show of hands was called for. 107 Voted "Yes"—102 "No". Motion was carried, and it was voted to adopt the article.

Art. 13

Voted to act favorable on this article, and that the boundaries of the Pinardville district be the same as used by the Town.

Art. 14

Voted to take up Article 15 prior to Article 14.

Art. 15

Chairman, Carl M. Hecker, of the School Board presented a motion to this Article.

Amendment to Article 15.

"I move to amend Article 15 to read as follows:—To see if the District will vote to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$127,500.00, including all sums available from State and Federal sources, for the purpose of adding a six (6) class-room addition to the Elementary School on Maple Ave., and to see if the District will direct and authorize the School Board to hire an Architect or Architectural firm to prepare plans and specifications for this six (6) class room addition, and to then proceed with building, including the

actual construction, the furnishing and equipping, and other fees and items necessary for the completion of said six (6) class-room addition, and to further direct and authorize the School Board to raise such a sum through the issuance of not exceeding \$127,500.00 in serial notes or bonds, under, and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter #33, Revised Statutes Annotated as commended, to issue and negotiate such notes or bonds, and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale, and delivery of such votes or bonds as shall be in the best interest of the Goffstown School District".

Voted was by Ballot. Whole number of ballots cast 242. Necessary for choice 162. "Yes" 225—"No" 16. Blank 1. Amendment was adopted.

Motion was now made to accept Article 15 as amended. Vote was by Ballot. Whole number of votes cast 229. Necessary for choice 163. "Yes" 219—"No" 8. 2 Blanks.

Vote was in the affirmative, and the Article as amended was adopted.

A rising vote of thanks was given Mr. Robert Merrill for his effort in having this article inserted in the Warrant.

Art. 14

Voted to dismiss this Article.

Art. 16

A rising vote of thanks was given Theresa Zeludancz and Armand Florand for their services as members of the School Board. Supt. of Schools, Mr. Minnich spoke regarding the School Meeting being held in the afternoon or in the evening. Motion was made and supported that we have a show of hands. Those who favored a night meeting, and those who favored an after-noon meeting simply to give the School Board an idea as to the wish of the voters. The majority was in favor of a night meeting.

No further business, it was voted to adjourn at 3:45 P.M.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the examination and audit of the accounts of the Goffstown School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1960, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1959 and June 30, 1960, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$35,111.38 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1960.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1960, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a revenue Surplus of \$7,847.69. less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$687.07, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$7,160.62.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1960, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1960, is included in Exhibit F. Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit G)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1960, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit G.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Goffstown School District for their assistance during the course of the audit.

PLANNING AND ZONING

To The People Of Goffstown: Introduction

Your Planning Board is pleased to transmit herewith for your consideration a Proposed Zoning Ordinance for the Town of Goffstown. During the past year and after twenty-three board meetings and three hearings we have arrived at an ordinance we feel will be in the best interest of the people of Goffstown.

Purpose

Goffstown has grown some 22% since 1950. Continued growth of this nature brings with it problems. The purpose of this ordinance is to protect and preserve the physical appearance of our Town, and to encourage an orderly and attractive pattern of development in Goffstown. The Planning Board proposes this ordinance as a legal means of accomplishing this purpose. It is based on an analysis of existing uses of land in Town at this time and a desirable future land use pattern. It can serve to protect the investments our citizens have in their homes and businesses today.

Districts

Five zoning districts are proposed on the basis of our land use study:

- A. (RA) Residential—A
- B. (RB) Residential—B
- C. (A) Agricultural

- D. (C) Commercial
- E. (I) Industrial

Uses allowed in each of these districts are clearly defined in the ordinance and the district boundary lines are shown on the proposed zoning map. If the ordinance is adopted, subsequent changes in either the ordinance or the map can be made in the form of amendments. Amendments can be authorized by a majority vote of any regular or special Town Meeting through the same legal process as required for passage of this ordinance.

Administration and Enforcement

Issuance of permits, general administration and enforcement of the zoning ordinance are the duties of the Board of Selectmen. Any person that is refused a permit may appeal to the Board of Adjustment for relief. The Board of Adjustment is a quasi-judicial body of five townspeople whose consideration is three-fold:

- 1. To hear and decide appeals where it is alleged there is error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination made by any administrative official in the enforcement hereof or of any ordinance adopted pursuant thereto.
- 2. To hear and decide special exceptions to the terms of the ordinance upon which such board is required to pass under such ordinance.
- 3. To authorize upon appeal in specific cases such variance from the terms of the ordinance as will not be contrary to the public interest, where, owing to

special conditions a literal enforcement of the provisions will result in unnecessary hardship and so that the spirit of the ordinance shall be observed and substantial justice done.

PROPOSED ZONING ORDINANCE

Approved by the Goffstown Planning Board February 14, 1961

ARTICLE I.

Pursuant to authority conferred by Chapter 31, Sections 60-89, Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, 1955, as amended, and for the purpose of promoting the general welfare and development of the Town of Goffstown, the following ordinance is enacted by the voters of the Town of Goffstown in Town Meeting convened.

ARTICLE II. Establishments of Districts

For the purpose of this ordinance the Town of Goffstown is divided into the following districts as shown on the official map filed with the Town Clerk, dated January 26, 1961, which map is made part of this ordinance:

- A. (RA) Residential—A
- B. (RB) Residential-B
- C. (A) Agricultural
- D. (C) Commercial
- E. (I) Industrial

ARTICLE III.

General Provisions

- A. Existing Uses. Nothing in this ordinance shall be constructed to prevent the continuance of any existing use of land or buildings.
- B. Junk Yards. No junk yards or place for the storage of discarded machinery vehicles, or other scrap materials shall be maintained in any district, except that after public hearing in which evidence on both sides is heard, the Board of Adjustment shall have authority to decide whether a permit for such use shall be granted, which shall conform with RSA 267.
- C. Trailers and Mobile Homes.
 - 1. The use of land for the accommodation of trailers and/or mobile homes is prohibited, except as provided below in this Article. However, any property owner or lessee may accommodate one trailer of a non-paying guest for a period not exceeding thirty (30) days in any one year.
 - 2. The above applies only to trailers and/or mobilehomes utilized for residential purposes, and is not intended to cover single trailers and/or mobile homes owned by residents and stored or parked during periods of non-use on the premises of the owner.
 - 3. Except as provided in sections 1 and 2 immediately above, no trailers or mobile homes shall

- be permitted except in trailer parks, as provided in section 4 next hereafter.
- 4. In the Agricultural District, the Board of Adjustment after public hearing may permit the use of land for trailer park sites and temporary use of a trailer or mobile home, the size of the lot per trailer to be determined by the Board, provided that such use will conform with the sanitary protection requirements listed under Section G of this article.
- D. Fire Ruins. No owner or occupant of land in any district shall permit fire or other ruins to be left within 200 feet of any street or highway, but within six months shall remove or refill the same to clear ground level, or shall repair, rebuild or replace said structure.
- E. Nuisances. Any use that may be obnoxious or injurious by reason of production, emission of odor, dust, smoke, refuse matter, fumes, noise, vibration, or similar conditions or that is dangerous to the comfort, peace, enjoyment, health or safety of the community or tending to its disturbance or annoyance is prohibited.

F. Signs.

- 1. Town and state highway directional and regulatory signs, and historic signs shall be permitted in any district.
- 2. In Residential—A (RA) district, and in Residential—B (RB) there shall be permitted one sign

- per lot no larger than four square feet in area indicating the name of the occupant or use of the premises, and not over two signs of similar size for the prospective rental or sale of the property.
- 3. In the Industrial District, in the Commercial District, and in the Agricultural District, the owner or occupant may install a sign on the premises not exceeding 20 feet in area.
- 4. No sign shall be placed in such a position to endanger traffic on a street by obscuring a clear view or by confusion with official street signs or signals. Every sign shall be maintained in good condition and repair at all times. No neon, tubular gas, or privately owned flashing electric sign shall be allowed other than in the Industrial and Commercial Districts.
- 5. All signs in violation of this section III, F, shall be removed within five years of the passage of this ordinance.

G. Sanitary Protection.

- 1. No privy, cesspool, septic tank, or sewage disposal area, shall be constructed or maintained less than 75 feet from the edge of a public water body or from a well.
- 2. No waste waters or sewage shall be permitted to run free into a public water body or be discharged in any way that may be offensive or detrimental to the health of others. All such

waste shall be conveyed away underground through use of an accepted sanitary system or in such a way that it will not be offensive or detrimental to health.

H. Off-Street Parking Requirements.

- 1. The following parking spaces shall be provided and satisfactorily maintained by the owner of the property, for each building which, after the date when this ordinance becomes effective, is erected or enlarged for use for any of the following purposes:
 - a. Dwelling—at least one space for each dwelling unit.
 - Auditorium, church, theater, or other place of public assembly at least one parking space for each five seats of maximum seating capacity.
 - c. Stores—at least one parking space to each 100 square feet of store floor area.
 - d. Office buildings—at least one parking space for each 300 square feet of office floor area.
 - e. Industrial and manufacturing establishments
 —at least one parking space for each 400 square feet of floor area.
- 2. All parking spaces provided pursuant to this section shall be on the same lot with the building or on a lot within 500 feet of the building. Reasonable and appropriate off-street parking requirements for structures and land uses which

do not fall within the categories listed above shall be determined in each case by the Board of Adjustment.

I. Lot of Record. Where a lot in separate ownership at the time of passage of this ordinance does not conform to the area and width requirements of the zone in which it is located, such lot may be occupied by any use permitted in that zone provided it conforms to side and rear yard requirements, subject to the approval of the Board of Adjustment after public hearing.

ARTICLE IV District Regulations

Except as herein provided, no building or land shall hereafter be used, constructed, or altered unless in conformity with the regulations herein specified for the zoning district in which it is located.

A. Residential District—A (RA)

- 1. Permitted uses.
 - a. One-family dwellings and/or two-family dwellings.
 - b. Multi-family dwellings, subject to the approval of the Board of Adjustment in accordance with the provisions of Article VI, B 2 and/or 3.
 - c. Churches and other similar places of worship.
 - d. Parks, playgrounds or community centers of a non-profit nature, hospitals, nursing homes, schools, public and private.

e. Home Occupations.

Residences may be used to house such uses by the owner or tenant as offices for doctor, engineer, architect, lawyer, real estate and insurance, or other recognized trade or profession. or such occupation as hair-dressing, dressmaking, manufacturing of craft products for sale, or manufacture of food products, except that the number of persons employed at any one location shall not exceed four at any one time in addition to the owner or tenant, and provided further that such use shall be conducted entirely within the dwelling or accessory building which is clearly incidental to the use of the dwelling for dwelling purposes and does not change the character thereof. Goods sold at retail shall be those manufactured or assembled on the premises.

2. Area Requirements.

- a. The minimum lot area per dwelling unit shall be 10,000 square feet, with an added area of 1,000 square feet for an additional dwelling unit.
- b. Every lot shall have a minimum width of 100 feet, with an added 10 feet for an additional dwelling unit.

3. Yard Requirements.

a. There shall be a front yard on each lot which shall not be less than 25 feet in depth from the front lot line, and a rear yard of not less than 15 feet in depth from the rear yard line. Accessory buildings may occupy not more than 25% of the required rear yard.

- b. On each interior lot, side yards shall be provided in an aggregate minimum width of 30 feet with a minimum of 10 feet for any one side yard.
- c. On corner lots no building shall be erected within 25 feet of either lot line adjoining the street.
- d. On any lot, a private detached garage may be erected and maintained within the rear quarter of the lot if not closer to the side lot line than 10 feet.

B. Residential District—B (RB)

1. Permitted uses.

The same uses shall be permitted as in Section IV A (1) of Residential District—A (RA).

2. Area Requirements.

- a. The minimum lot area per dwelling unit shall be 5,000 square feet, with an added area of 1,000 square feet for an additional dwelling unit.
- b. Every lot shall have a minimum width of 50 feet, with an added 10 feet for an additional dwelling unit.
- c. Any single family dwelling erected upon a single lot as plotted on any of the plans recorded in the Hillsborough County Registry

of Deeds shall not be considered a violation of this section.

3. Yard Requirements.

- a. There shall be a front yard on each lot which shall not be less than 20 feet from any front lot line.
- b. No building shall be erected within 5 feet of the side lot line.

C. Agricultural District (A)

1. Permitted Uses:

- a. Any use permitted under Residential District—A (RA) shall be permitted in this district.
- b. Farm buildings located at least 100 feet from any Residential District boundary.
- c. General farming including horticulture, dairying, livestock and poultry raising, and other agricultural enterprises or uses, or the raising of animals for other purposes are permitted in this district.
- d. Roadside stands for the sale of farm products raised on the premises.
- e. Stables, riding academies, plant nurseries, greenhouses, veterinary hospitals, recreational areas including day camps.
- f. Processing the natural resources of the district, excluding sawmills.
- 2. Special Permitted Uses. Under the provisions of Article VI B, the Board of Adjustment may permit the following uses:

- a. Sawmills.
- b. Gravel removal, provided that any open area shall not be left in an unsafe condition.
- c. Gravel processing plants.
- d. Industry, providing it conforms to the requirements of the Industrial District, and provided it has direct access to a State Highway.
- e. Motel, inns, cabins or other transient lodgings, apartment houses, provided that, every individual cabin or rented space shall be supplied with its individual running-water and toilet facilities, and that no building shall be placed closer than 40 feet to the front lot line.
- f. Trailers and/or mobile homes according to Article III C (3).
- g. Any industry not specifically prohibited by this article may nevertheless be found to be a nuisance in accordance with Article III E.
- 3. Area Requirements.

The minium lot area per dwelling unit shall be one acre and every lot shall have a minimum width of 200 feet, except that if such lot is served by public sewerage or water supply the minimum area and yard requirements shall be the same as of Residential District A (RA).

4. Yard Requirements.

No building or other structure shall be erected nearer to any lot line than 25 feet, except that if such lot is served by public sewerage or water supply, it shall conform to the yard requirements of the Residential District—A (RA).

D. Commercial District (C)

- 1. Permitted Uses.
 - a Any use permitted in Residential District A (RA), (ART. IV, A) subject to all the provisions specified for such District.
 - b. Stores, shops, restaurants, and other retail establishments.
 - c. Personal service shops.
 - d. Banks, theatres, business and professional offices, halls, clubs, amusement centers, community services.
 - e. Greenhouses, florist shops, undertaking establishments.
 - f. Repair garages, filling stations, sales and service of automobiles.
 - g. Public parking areas.
 - h. Wholesale merchandise brokers, excluding wholesale storage.
 - i. Other uses which, in the opinion of the Board of Adjustment, are of the same general character as those listed as permitted uses and which will not be detrimental to the district.

 Light Industry and wholesale establishments under special permit from the Board of Adjustment.

2. Land Requirements.

a. No building shall be erected within 10 feet of the street line, or within 10 feet of the rear or side property lines, except that the set-back from the street may be less than 10 feet if in conformity to the set-back of adjoining properties.

E. Industrial District (I)

- 1. Permitted uses.
 - a. Except as provided in E 2 hereafter, manufacturing of all kinds, and storage facilities in connection therewith, provided such use compiles with the Nuisance requirements of Article III, E, of this ordinance.
 - b. Any use permitted in the Commercial District (C) as provided in Article IV, D, 1, of this ordinance, but without the special approval of the Board of Adjustment.
- 2. Prohibited Uses. No land, building or structure shall be used for any of the following purposes.
 - a. Manufacturing or preparation of acids, cement, lime, gypsum or plaster of paris.
 - b. Explosives, manufacture or storage in bulk quantities exceeding 25 pounds.

- Distillation of bones, fat rendering in manufacture or tallow or grease, fertilizer manufacture.
- d. Garbage, offal or dead animal reduction or dumping, excluding municipal incineration or sewerage disposal plants.
- e. Glue manufacture, petroleum refining, smelting of tin, copper, zinc, or iron ore.

F. Non-conforming Use.

A Non-conforming structure or use may be continued as it exists at the time of the passage of this ordinance, subject to the following provisions.

1. Changes.

- a. No non-conforming use shall be changed to another non-conforming use.
- b. Once changed to a conforming use, no building or land shall be permitted to revert to a non-conforming use.
- Restoration. No building damaged by fire or other causes to the extent of 75 per cent of its valuation as determined by the selectmen shall be repaired or rebuilt except in conformity with the regulations of this ordinance, provided that the Board of Adjustment may waive the area and yard requirements of the district in which the building is located.
- 3. Alteration. A non-conforming building may not be reconstructed or structurally altered during

- its life to an extent exceeding an aggregate cost 50 per cent of the value as determined by the selectmen, unless said building is changed to a conforming use.
- 4. Discontinuance. Whenever a non-conforming use has been discontinued for a period of one year, such use shall not thereafter be reestablished, and any future use shall conform with the provisions of this ordinance, excepting that in the case of the death, incapacitation or bankruptcy of an owner operator, the time limit shall be extended for a total period of three years.
- 5. Junk Yards. No junk yard or motor vehicle junk yard, may continue as a non-conforming use for more than one year after the effective date of this ordinance, except that a junk yard may continue as a non-conforming use if within that period it is completely screened from view of any public highway or adjacent property and is maintained thereafter in accordance with the standards provided by the Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, Chapter 267.

ARTICLE V

New Land Developments

The owner or owners of any plot of ground intended for development or subdivision into lots before building on the same shall file with the Board of Selectmen a plan or map of the proposed sub-division with reference to adjoining highways and shall obtain approval thereon. The Selectmen shall inspect the site of the proposed subdivision and require such roads or other areas for common use as will be eventually acceptable to the Town, and approve the same when satisfied that the plans are in harmony with the general welfare of the Town, and not detrimental to existing values, but this approval shall not be an acceptance of the streets by the Town. The selectman shall act within thirty days of the date of the original filing of such map or plan.

ARTICLE VI

Enforcement and Administration

A. Enforcement.

- 1. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, and the Board is hereby given power and authority, to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.
- 2. Before commencing work on the erection or substantial alteration of any building or structure the owner thereof shall first obtain a permit from the Board of Selectmen, to whom shall be submitted in writing any information the selectmen shall require to be filed before such permit is granted, for any of the following:
 - a. The erection and use of any new building or structure;

- b. The alteration, restoration, or moving of any building or structure or part thereof;
- c. A change in the nature or extent of the use any building or premises.
- 3. Upon any well founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall, on their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction or by other legal action. Any other person or persons aggrieved may take take action on their own initiative after failure of the Selectmen to act for 30 days after having been notified.
- 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$10.00 for each day such violation exists.

B. Board of Adjustment.

Within thirty days after the adoption of this Ordinance, and thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the Board of Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Adjustment of five members, conforming in duties and terms to the provisions of Chapter 31 of the Revised Statutes Annotated of 1955.

1. Adoption of Rules. The Board of Adjustment shall adopt rules to govern its proceedings in accordance with this Ordinance, and the pro-

- visions of said Chapter 31 of the Statutes, pertaining to zoning.
- 2. Special Exceptions. The Board of Adjustment may, after public hearing with notice to abutters by mail, in appropriate cases and subject to appropriate conditions and safeguards, grant a permit for a special exception. The Board, in acting on an application for a special exception, shall take into consideration the following conditions:
 - a. The specific site as an appropriate location for such use.
 - b. The use as developed will not adversely affect the neighborhood.
 - There will be no nuisance or serious hazard vehicles or pedestrians.
 - d. Adequate and appropriate facilities will be provided for the proper operation of the proposed use.
- 3. Variance. The Board of Adjustment may after public hearings with notice to abutters by mail, authorize a variance from the terms of the Ordinance only where the Board finds that all the following conditions apply:
 - a. There are special circumstances or conditions applying to the land or building for which the variance is sought (such as, but not

- limited to, the exceptional narrowness, shallowness or shape of the property in question, or exceptional topographical conditions), which are peculiar to such land or building; and the application of the requirements of the ordinance will deprive any reasonable owner of such property of a reasonable use of it and will impose upon such owner a hardship not shared by the owners of other property in the same district.
- b. The specific variance as granted is the minimum variance that will grant reasonable relief to the owner and is necessary for a reasonable use of the land or building.
- c. The granting of the variance will be in harmony with the general purposes and intent of this ordinance, and with the convenience, welfare, and character of the district within which it is proposed, and will not be injurious or otherwise detrimental to the public welfare.

ARTICLE VII

Definitions

In this ordinance, the following terms, unless a contrary meaning is specifically prescribed in the ordinance, shall have the following meanings:

- A. Accessory Building—a detached subordinate building located on the same lot, the use of which is incidental and subordinate to that of the main building or use of the land.
- B. Accessory Use—A land use located on the same lot which is incidental and subordinate to the main building or use of the land.
- C. Building—Any structure having a roof and intended for the shelter, housing or enclosure of persons, animals, or chattle.
- D. Dwelling—A building designed or used as the place of residence for one or more families.
- E. Dwelling Unit—A dwelling or portion thereof designed or used for one family.
- F. Family—One or more persons occupying a dwelling unit and living as a single non-profit housekeeping unit.
- G. Farm—Any parcel of land which is used in raising of agricultural products, livestock, poultry and dairy products, including necessary farm structures and storage of equipment used.
- H. Junk yard—A lot, land or structure, or part thereof, used primarily for the collecting, storage and sale of waste paper, rags, scrap metal or discarded material.

- Junk Yard, Motor Vehicle—Any business and any place of storage or deposit, whether in connection with another business or not. which has stored or deposited two or more unregistered motor vehicles which are no longer intended or in condition for legal use on the public highways, or used parts of motor vehicles or old iron, metal, glass, paper, cordage, or other waste or discarded or second-hand material which has been a part, or intended to be a part of any motor vehicle the sum of which parts, or material shall be equal in bulk to two or more motor vehicles. Motor vehicle junk yard shall also include any place of business or storage or deposit of motor vehicles purchased for the purpose of dismantling the vehicles for parts or for use of the metal for scrap where it is intended to burn material which are parts of a motor vehicle or cut up the parts thereof.
- J. Lot—A parcel of land occupied or capable of being occupied by one building or use and the buildings or uses accessory thereto, including such open spaces and yards as are required by this ordinance. A lot may or may not be the land shown or described as a lot on a recorded deed or plan.
- K. Lot of Record—Land designated as a separate and distinct parcel in a legally recorded deed

- and plan filed in the records of Hillsborough County, New Hampshire.
- L. Mobile home—means a home which is mobile, a unit similar to a trailer, equipped with running water and sanitary facilities, bath facilities and toilet.
- M. Non-Conforming Use—A structure or land lawfully occupied by a use that does not conform to the regulations of the district in which it is located.
- N. Sign—Any device for visual communication that is used for the purpose of bringing the subject thereof to the attention of the public, but not including any flag or insignia of any government or governmental agency, or of any civic, charitable, religious, patriotic, or fraternal organization.
- O. Street—A public or private thoroughfare which affords the principal means of access to abutting property.
- P. Street Line—The line separating a street from a lot.
- Q. Structure—Anything constructed or erected, the uses of which require location on the

- ground, or attachment to something having location on the ground.
- R. Trailer—means any vehicle or similar portable structure having no foundation other then wheels, jacks or skirting and having none of the following: running water, sanitary facilities, bath facilities and toilet.
- S. Trailer or Mobile Home Park—A tract of land where two or more trailers or mobile homes are parked or a tract of land which is used or intended for the purpose of supplying to the public parking spaces for two or more trailers or mobile homes.
- T. Yard—An unoccupied space open to the sky, on the same lot with a building or structure.
- U. Yard, Front—A yard extending the full width of the lot and situated between the street and the front line of the building.
- V. Yard, Rear—A yard extending the full width of the lot and situated between the main building and the rear lot line, except that not more than 25% of the area of a rear yard may be occupied by accessory building.
- W. Yard, Side—A yard extending from the front yard to the rear yard and situated between

the building and the side lot line. Any lot line not a rear line or a front line shall be deemed a side line.

ARTICLE VIII

Amendments.

This Ordinance and the boundaries of the districts shown on the Zoning Map may be amended at any Town Meeting in accordance with the provisions of the Enabling Act of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, Chapter 31, Section 64, providing such amendment is published in the warrant for such meeting, and has received a public hearing, which hearing has been advertised and given 15 days notice.

ARTICLE IX Saving Clause

The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provisions.

ARTICLE X When Effective

The effective date of this Ordinance or any amendments thereof shall be the date such Ordinance or amendment is adopted by vote of Town Meeting.
