Voted, to accept the article. Unanimous vote.

Art. 5 To see what action the town will take in respect to electing three members of the finance Committee, and one member of the Highway Advisory Committee for the ensuing three years.

Voted, that nominations for the Finance Committee be made from the floor. The following nominations were made. The ballot vote for each is recorded herewith.

The Town Clerk was instructed to cast one ballot for the three successful nominees. It was voted that the moderator appoint one member to the Highway Advisory committee for the ensuing three years. The moderator appointed Paul St. Pierre.

Art. 6 To see what action the town will take in respect to electing three members of the Recreation Committee for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Visiting Nurse Association. (By petition. No stand taken by the Finance Committee.)

2. That after the original committee is appointed that new members be elected by the town if not contrary to state law.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to accept a proposed road at Sunset Terrace off Springfield Road. (by petition)

Voted, to accept the article with the following amendment: "That it must meet specifaicaions set up by the Town Planning Board."

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow \$14,000.00 to be turned over to the Water Department. This money is for the purpose of installing a new well at North Charlestown and is to be repaid by the Water Department over a ten year period.

Voted, to accept the article. Unanimous vote.

Art. 14 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Voted, that all owners of spayed dogs registered for the first time must show veterinary's spaying certificate.

Voted, that the Town dump be kept open from 8:00 A. M. to 6:00 P. M. every Saturday and Sunday.

Believing that the Water Department and all others involved acted in good faith in times of severe hardship in the Town, it was moved and voted that this meeting go on record as approving such action.

### The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Charlestown, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Charlestown on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects. Polls are to be open from 10 o'clock in the forenoon until the close of the business session. The business session is to open at 7:00 P. M.

Art. 1 To choose the necessary town officers for their respective terms.

Art. 2. To consider the budget. To raise such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the maintenance of the poor, laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges, street lighting and for the necessary charges arising within the Town.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow on notes on the credit of the Town such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 4. To see what action the Town will take in respect to electing three members of the finance committee, and one member of the highway advisory committee for the ensuing three years.

Art. 5. To see what action the Town will take in respect to electing three members of the recreation committee for the ensuing year.

Art.6. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum up to \$14,500.00 for a new front end loader, and to trade in the old loader as part payment. Approved by Highway Advisory Committee and the Finance Committee.

Art. 7. To see what action the Town will take in regards to the Town Highway Department continuing or discontinuing the services of tarring driveways and hauling gravel for citizens of the Town.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote a sum of \$300.00 to be used for renovating the Selectmen's office.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Visiting Nurse Association. (by petition)

Art. 10 To see if the Town will vote to accept the offer of the Connecticut River National Bank of their present building and land located on Summer Street in Charlestown, New Hampshire, to be used for medical purposes as specified by the Bank. (by petition)

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum up to \$15,000.00 toward the remodeling of the bank building for medical purposes, this sum to be used in conjunction with monies to be raised by solicitation, and to authorize the selectmen to work with elected trustees of the medical building to engage an architect and a contractor for the remodeling of the building. (By petition)

Art. 12. To see what action the Town will take to elect a board of trustees to form a non-profit corporation to administer the affairs of the medical center, to make agreements with the physicians, and to administer fund-raising; one of the trustees to be elected for three years, one to be elected for two years, and one to be elected for one year, and thereafter one each year for a three-year term; one selectman to serve as an ex-officio member; and the trustees to elect their own chairman. (By petition)

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for architectural services to prepare preliminary plans for additions or alterations to the Silsby Free Public Library to provide needed additional floor space. (By petition)

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light near the residence of Arthur J. Town in South Charlestown. (By petition)

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to deed Mr. Allen Swift a piece of land belonging to the Water Department in exchange for a piece of land that Mr. Swift deeded to the Water Department near the town well site. (By Water Commissioners)

Art. 16. To see what action the Town will take to widen to thirty-two (32) feet the access road to the new Elementary School from Paris Avenue to the school site for the safety of school children. (By petition)

Art. 17. To see what action the Town will take to complete the layout and hard surfacing of Main Street sidewalks from the dry bridge to the Lower Landing Road on the west side, and from the Simonds house to the new elementary school entrance on the east side for the convenience and safety of school children. (By petition)

Art. 18. To see if the Town will appropriate \$1,000.00 to use as a 10% matching fund with 90% Federal money if available at the discretion of the Selectmen for fire trails, parks or highway beautification. (By petition)

Art. 19. To see what action the Town will take to return the position of Road Agent to an elective status. (By petition)

Art. 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER 1965

In the past year there has been a total of fourteen water samples sent to the State Department of Health and Sanitation, from Charlestown and North Charlestown drinking supplies. All have been returned as satisfactory.

Through the efforts of the Health Officer and with the cooperation of the Selectmen and the National Fish and Wildlife Service, a rodent extermination program was inaugurated at the town dump. The program was highly successful and removed a very virulent source of disease and contamination. This program will be carried out on an annual basis.

The usual duties of the Health Officer have been carried out this year, with a noticeable drop in the number of complaints. We hope this indicates a greater amount of effort on the public to maintain adequate sewer disposal systems.

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### T. R. A. REPORT FOR 1965

We cut 30 trees and removed stumps. Removed about ½ mile of stone wall, installed 2 culverts 15" in diameter, blasted about 500 yds. of ledge, put in between 1 foot to 4 feet of gravel deep and 24 feet wide to the amount of 6,640 yards. We also put on Farmer's Mix 20 ft. wide. We completed 1 mile of road.

### CHARLESTOWN HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT FOR 1965

It is again time to report the activity of the highway department for 1965.

The year starts with cold and storms, although there was not much snow. We were kept busy most of the winter fighting freezing rain. Many hours were spent plowing, salting and sanding highways, school yards and cemetery roads. The new G.M.C. truck and the four wheel drive Oshkosh which the Town purchased has been a great aid to the highway department. The Oshkosh is used exclusively for plowing snow.

The spring and summer work consists of grading the dirt roads, cleaning ditches of leaves and graveling roads. About two thousand yards of gravel was used on the town roads, more gravel was used on Town Road Aid which is in another report. Because of the dry season the tarred roads broke up more than usual, so more cold patch was used, which was an added expense. We installed new culverts on Breakneck Hill, also on the Causeway. Extensions were added to the culvert at the swimming pool road which will be the road to the new school. We tarred the Causeway, North Hemlock, South Hemlock roads, the street from Main Street to the Boat Landing, sealed last year's T.R.A. road. Also, we tarred many driveways, cut about three miles of brush, mowed all the road sides. The T.R.A. work took about two and a half months to complete.

Then the fall work consists of regrading all the dirt roads, putting up snow fence, getting equipment ready for winter. The snow begins to fall and the winter maintenance starts all over again.

We again look forward to serving the citizens of Charlestown in the year 1966.

### WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

There was a main extension of 234 ft. of 6" cement lined cast iron pipe in North Charlestown. A new 6" cement lined cast iron main extension on Lovers Lane area

of 1300 ft. was made. A new main extension of 140 ft. of 2" cement lined cast iron pipe in the Brackett development was made. 825 ft. of 2" plastic was laid on South Main St. to replace old 1" iron pipe. All pipe for main extensions is paid for by the land owners or developers.

There were 14 new services made and 6 old services replaced.

We had one major break due to new highway construction.

The Charlestown village reservoir was cleaned. Due to drought we were unable to drain and clean the reservoir in North Charlestown.

The well in North Charlestown did not get put in this year. There was some more testing done in the area to satisfy the land owners on the location of well. This was done and a 10" well, 225 ft. deep, was put in. The well would not produce the gallons per minute that had been guaranteed, so it was pulled out.

The farm that the well site was on was sold. So we negotiated with the new owners to let us put the well in the original site that would produce us 500 gallons per minute as of this writing. This has been done and the well is being put in. We should be able to have it in operation this spring.

The well that was developed for the town operated very satisfactorily. It has pumped 150 gallons per minute from the day it was turned on. It really did not get extremely low last summer even with the dry spell. At no time was this town really low on water.

After 14 years as Superintendent of the Water & Sewer Departments, I would like to thank all the people of Charlestown and North Charlestown for their help and understanding.

As my term expires this March, and being out of town every day, I do not feel as I can give the time and effort that this job requires. This is why I am not a candidate this year.

At present, those needing the services of the Visiting Nurse should contact Mrs. Howard Washburn.

Anyone needing crutches, sick-room equipment, etc. may contact the Visiting Nurse or Mrs. Albert Burbank, who have a list of such things that are available from various sources in town, either on a loan or rental basis.

The only new equipment purchased this year, other than current supplies, was a stethoscope and a blood pressure gauge, to replace those that were second-hand when acquired by the Association several years ago and were now worn out and unreliable.

May we remind everyone that under the amended by-laws, all registered voters in town are entitled to participate and vote at the annual meeting of the Association, which is held on the second Wednesday in January.

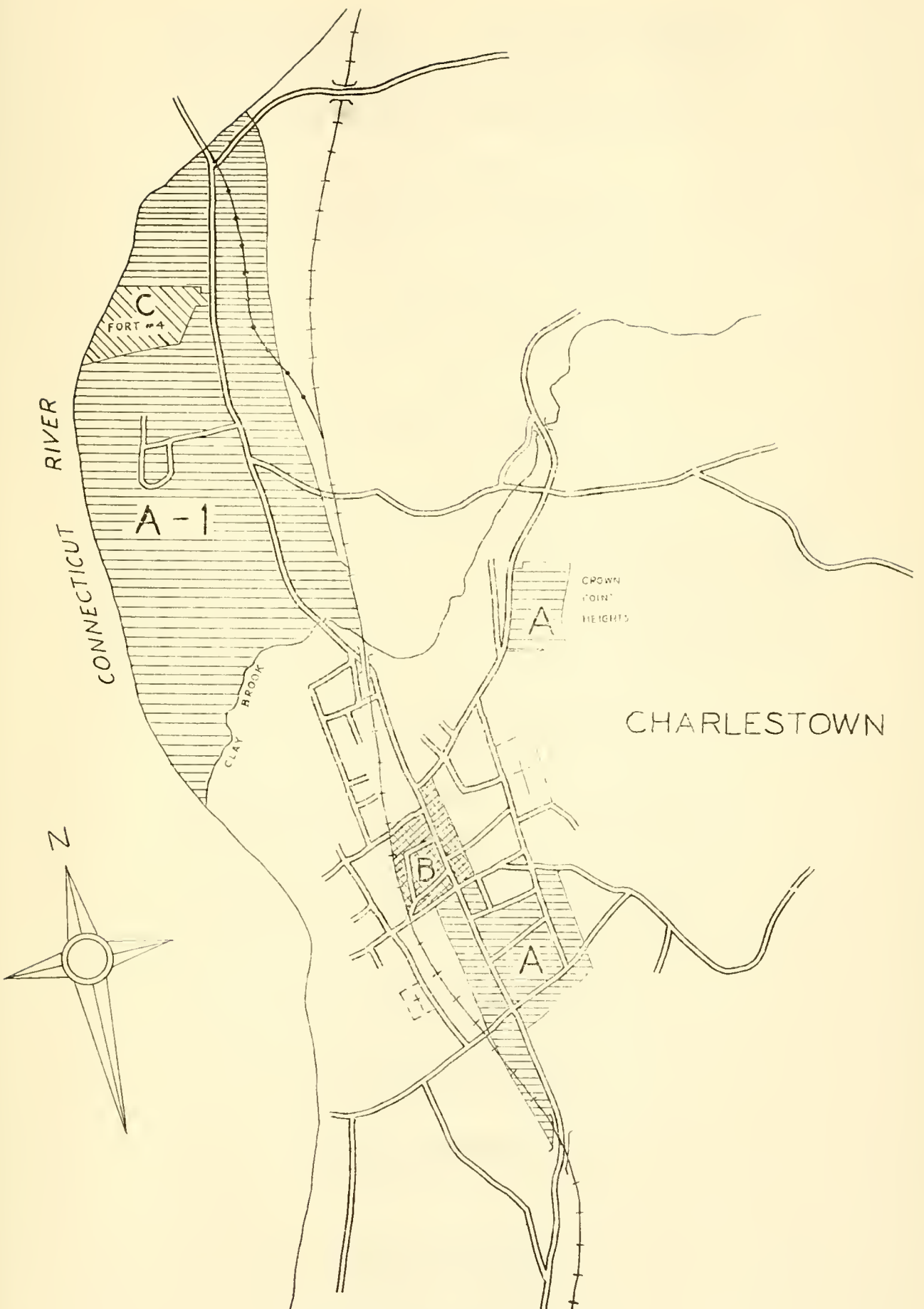
A total number of meetings held is 15.

## ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

It is with pleasure that I herewith submit to the School Board and the Citizens of Charlestown my first report as Assistant Superintendent of Schools in Supervisory Union No. 60.

### TEACHING PERSONNEL

The spring and summer were good for Charlestown. As the school year 1964-'65 drew to a close, it was found that there might be only a few changes in personnel for school opening in September.

This prediction was borne out as only three teachers left the system and had to be replaced. A fourth teacher was hired as the result of a new position.

Mr. Norman Cain was appointed instructor in industrial arts at the high school. He succeeded Mr. Robert Ambrose. Mr. Cain graduated from Keene State College with a B. Ed. degree in June of 1965.

Mrs. Christine Holmes was appointed supervisor of music instruction to replace Mr. William Brys. Mrs. Holmes graduated from the University of New Hampshire with a B. A. degree and formerly taught in Massachusetts - the most recent, in Chelmsford, Mass.

Mrs. Ellen Christie was chosen to replace Mrs. Monetta Baldwin in the teaching of Latin and English in the high school. Mrs. Christie is a graduate Keene Teachers College and has taught at Groveton and Concord (N.H.) High Schools.

When Mr. Mosher became the supervising principal of Holden, Stucco and No. Charlestown schools in September of 1965, Mr. Kenneth Grant was hired to take Mr. Mosher's sixth grade class at the Holden School.

Mr. Grant graduated from Plymouth Teachers College in June of 1960. He was the former principal and 5th and 6th grade teacher of the Acworth Elementary School.

## CHARLESTOWN HIGH SCHOOL

### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The most exiting occurrence of the school year 1964-65 was, of course, the vote in favor of the bond issue for the new Fall Mountain Regional School District. This means the beginning of a new era in education within the district, and both students and faculty have been looking forward to the change with great interest. It means that 1965-66 will be the last year for Charlestown High School as well as for Alstead and Walpole High Schools. It means the end of the old rivalries in sports that have meant so much to the students and the people of Charlestown. It marks the beginning of a broader and richer educational experience for all our students, an experience that will prepare them for the more complex and competitive world in which they must live. We here at the school, students and faculty alike, are anxious to get on with the organization of the new district. We know there will be difficulties, unforeseen problems will have to be solved, but the rewards to our youth will be so great that we are anticipating with pleasure the turbulent period of change through which all human progress must pass.

We are very proud that a member of last year's Junior Class, Dean Bascom, was selected to attend the St. Paul's School Advanced Studies Program last summer. Dean took the Course in "Concepts of Math" and did very well.

The Dramatic Club, under the direction of Mrs. Monetta Baldwin produced "All Shook Up" a three act play about life on the campus of B. U. The Dramatics Club also sponsored the interclass one-act play competition and produced the one-act play for the interschool competition with Walpole and Vilas.

In the Mathematics Department, Mrs. Daisy Hronek again had the honor of being chosen to attend the seven week Summer Institute in Mathematics at the University of Vermont which was sponsored by the National Science and Mathematics Foundation.

Members of the Advanced Mathematics and Algebra 2 classes participated in the 1964-65 Annual National Mathematics Examination sponsored by the Mathematics Association of America and the Society of Actuaries, Thomas Herzig, a Senior, was the high scorer for our school.

The Junior Industrial Management Institute at the University of New Hampshire was attended by Charles Child, Clyde Hunt, John Royce, Sharon Auger, George Fedelski, Carleton Fisk, Fred Poisson and Carol Wharem. Mr. Philip Clay and Mr. Donald Purinton were the faculty advisors. Lunch and a banquet dinner were served to the students who came from all over the state to learn first hand some of the problems faced by American Business Management. Our local business concerns sponsor this annual trip to Durham.

Charlestown High School was represented at Girls State this year by Janice Smith and Donna Dupre. These annual meetings, sponsored by the Mothers Club, V.F.W. Auxiliary and Professional Women's

Clubs provide an opportunity for our Junior girls to discuss problems that concern them, with other girls from the state.

Charles Child was chosen to attend Boys State, sponsored by the American Legion.

Our representatives at the Model United Nations held at Plymouth State College were John Royce and Lindsay Freese. The two day trip to Plymouth is sponsored by the Charlestown Rotary Club and provides our students with some excellent experiences in the detailed workings of the United Nations.

Some of the more interesting trips sponsored by the school this year were: The U. S. History Class to Sturbridge Village, Sturbridge, Mass. Miss LaFrank, Mr. Clay and Mr. Purinton accompanied the students. English students to Stratford, Conn. to the American Shakespeare Festival--Miss LaFrank and Mr. Purinton. Contemporary Problems, Economics and U. S. History classes to Dartmouth for the League of Women Voters Symposium on Eastern Europe--Mr. Clay and Mr. Purinton. U. S. History class to Boston to the Museum of Fine Arts and to walk the Freedom Trail. Students were accompanied by Miss LaFrank and Mr. Purinton.

I would like to thank Miss Arnold and the Foundation for the support given the school during the school year. Mr. Arthur Schraeder, a folk singer, who sings at Sturbridge Village gave three assemblies at the high school last Spring, one for each age group. The Foundation paid the cost of these assemblies so that the youngsters could hear authentic folk songs from different periods of American History. Two classes of United States History students from Vilas High School came over by bus to hear Mr. Schraeder and they enjoyed him as much as our own students did. Two of last years Seniors, Thomas Herzig and Gary Cameron were granted college scholarships by the Foundation.

I would also like to thank the people and organizations of Charlestown for the support that they gave to the drive for the Student Loan Fund.

#### ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT REPORT

The 1964 Soccer Team coached by Kenneth Morris finished its season with a 3-6-3 mark. Leading the offensive departments were veterans and Captains William Royce and Carleton Fisk, while the outstanding defensive leader was Robert Putnam. Clyde Hunt and Thomas Herzig joined Fisk and Putnam as the only seniors playing their last game at Charlestown High School.

The Forts' basketball team finished its season with a fine 21-2 over all record, bowing out in the semi-finals of the State Tournament to Class M Champion Hopkinton 72-70 at Portsmouth. The fans at this game were treated to one of the finest all-around individual performances by a Fort player in the school history. Carleton "Pudgy" Fisk received a standing ovation from the packed house for his 40 point, 32 rebound effort against the taller Hopkinton team. Captain Robert Putnam, Thomas Herzig, Clyde Hunt and Daryl Royce all contributed fine efforts in their last game for Charlestown.

The newly-formed Fort Gymnastic Team put on its first public exhibition in April. It presented a program of tumbling, balancing, vaulting and apparatus routines, finishing with six colorful tableaux depicting various historical and religious themes. The program was the culmination of three months of preparation by the team which is to be congratulated for its excellent performance.

The baseball team enjoyed another fine year compiling an over-all record of 11 to 6, finishing its season with a 4-3 loss to Mascoma in the State Division three play-off games. Carleton Fisk lead the Forts both in pitching and hitting, but the majority of the team will be returning in 1966 for another shot at the State title.

Two students of the Class of 1965 entered the University of New Hampshire, two entered Northeastern University, one entered the University of New Mexico, one entered Keene State College, two entered the Thompson School at U. N. H., one entered the N. H. Technical School at Concord, N. H., one girl entered the Concord Hospital for nurses training. One student entered Burdett College of Business, one entered Northeastern School of Aeronautics, one entered the Manchester College of Accounting, two entered schools for training as hairdressers. One entered the armed services. One student is enrolled in the extension school at Keene State. Seven girls and eight boys employed.

### HOLDEN SCHOOL

#### Report of the Principal

This year the fifth and sixth grades of the Farwell School have been transported to the Holden School. This relieved the overcrowded conditions at Farwell. Because of the relatively small number of students in the two rooms at Farwell, remedial reading was dropped and

the extra day of remedial work is much more beneficial at the Holden School where the need is much greater.

Also this year, the Farwell School has been brought into the film program. Available and pertinent films along with the projector are transported to the Farwell School one day a week.

The Science textbook revision is now complete in the two upper grades and grade four will receive their new texts next fall. It is apparent that a great many changes in curriculum will occur in the next few years. Teacher groups are already at work in many fields.

We wish to thank the P. T. A. for the following:

Math aids were added this year to grades 5 and 6. This continuing program has in the last three years equipped all six grades with valuable supplementary materials in the field of math.

A tape recorder was purchased a year ago and is in use in remedial reading groups and music classes as well as being available for regular classroom work.

Two new sets of rhythm band instruments were purchased this year. They were very much in evidence at the Christmas program. This equipment will help to establish a base for a more complete music and rhythmic program, which will be available to the lower grades through the facilities that will be offered in the new elementary building.

A new motion picture screen, now makes it possible for both the filmstrip and the motion picture projectors to be in use at the same time. This may not seem of much value until one realizes that three buildings and 400 students are involved in the first six grades alone.

Once again the major P. T. A. contribution has been the library book program. Over the years a total of 885 books has been added to the school. The library facilities that will be available in the new elementary buildings next year will allow for maximum circulation of these books. This will increase the value of these books immeasurably.

The following are a few of the changes that are reasonably definite at this time: There will be no split grades; limited departmentalization of grades 5 through 8; supervisors in art, music and physical education in grades K through 8:

Parents and teachers alike are deeply concerned over the changes that will continue to take place. Only through continued co-operation between school and the community can our common goal of better education for our young people be achieved.

### SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Charlestown I herewith submit my annual report as School Nurse.

It has been a busy and interesting year. Our usual testing programs were carried out.

Six hundred and eighty-six vision tests were completed. Thirty-three defects were found and thirty children were seen by the family eye doctor and corrections made as needed. Four hundred and seventy-four hearing tests were done, followed by thirteen audiograms (full scale hearing tests). It was necessary for one of our children to be fitted with a hearing aid. It has made a great difference in this child and she is most happy with it. Children were weighed and measured and noticeable abnormalities reported to parents. The need for better dental care persists.

Pupils participating in the athletic programs were given physical examinations by Dr. Lanzer of Claremont. There were no serious problems.

A program of Tuberculin Testing was carried out with the New Hampshire State Department of Health and the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association as sponsors. The Heaf test was done. It is felt that this test is probably more accurate than the Patch Test. Seven children reacted to this test and chest X-rays were negative.

We seemed to have a larger than usual number of communicable diseases during this past year. There were several cases of Whooping Cough and Chicken Pox as well as Mumps.

A series of three Immunizations Clinics sponsored by the New Hampshire State Department of Health was started in September. Sabin Oral Vaccine, Triple Toxoid (Diphtheria, Tetanus and Whooping Cough) and Small Pox Vaccinations were made available. There will be one more Clinic session during the winter in order to complete the series of three. More than six hundred persons attended the first Clinic. Adults also were included in order that they might receive Sabin Vaccine. The community response to this series of clinics was fine. Peace Corps Workers from the Experiment in International Living assisted with the publicity and ground work for these Clinics. Members of the P. T. A. and Nurses in the community gave of their time to make the Clinics possible. I would like to take this opportunity to thank them publicly.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank all of you for your support and interest in the School Health Program.

Miss Ahern questioned on whose authority it could be ruled out.

The Moderator stated the Moderator has the authority to make all rulings at a meeting, unless over-ruled by the meeting.

A motion was made by Patricia Ahern, seconded by Chandler Mosher, to instruct the School Board to use \$100.00 to employ the

Municipal Auditing Division of the State Tax Commission to audit the financial records of the District for the past 10 years and make a certified report of this audit to be published in the Town Report, School Division.

This is reply to your inquiry by telephone relative to an audit by this Division of the accounts of the Charlestown School District.

From our conversation relative thereto, it is my understanding that the School District at the annual meeting of March 1965 voted to have the accounts audited for the last ten years and made an appropriation of \$100.00 for this purpose.

It is my feeling that an audit covering a ten year period would serve no practical purpose and that the expense to the District would be excessive. Therefore, it is my suggestion that the audit be limited to the last fiscal year of 1964-65. The approximate expense to the District of a one year audit by this Division would probably be at least \$200.00.

After you have taken up this matter with the School Board, I will be glad to have you advise me of their decision relative thereto.

**SCOPE OF AUDIT**

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

## FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1964 and June 30, 1965, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$17,652.45 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1965.

### Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

### Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1965 are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of \$6,051.32, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$398.87, resulted in a budget surplus of \$5,652.45.

### Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1965, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1965, is indicated in Exhibit F.

### School Lunch Program Account: (Exhibit G)

A statement of the School Lunch Program account for the fiscal year is included in Exhibit G.

### Statement of School District Tax Account: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the School District Tax account with the Town of Charlestown for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1965, is presented in Exhibit H. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1965, the School District had received from the Town the total of the 1964-65 School Tax in the amount of \$185,961.69.

### Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1965, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

## GENERAL COMMENTS
