### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Selectmen wish to thank all departments and committees for their cooperation during the year 1965. Through this cooperation of all concerned, we have still been able to maintain a reasonable tax structure.

This past year we moved our office into a room at the High School, giving us more adequate facilities. This same room is also being used once a month for holding District Court sessions. We wish to extend our thanks to Judge Anderacht for making this possible.

Several improvements were made in town property last year, including painting and re-roofing the Library, re-roofing the High School, and probably the most noticeable was rebuilding the dam at Shop Pond so that we can now hold back the overflow from Sunset Lake; thus eliminating a major eyesore in the center of town.

We would like to take a look into the future for what lies ahead. With the completion of major highways, Hampstead is rapidly becoming very accessible to expanding manufacturing centers all around us. Our more rapid growth is a fair indication of the trend to work in the city but live in the country. It can be expected that the impact of this trend will further focus on such communities as ours. Super highways serve to extend the radius of accessibility of a residential community in terms of the time it takes to drive by car from home to work and return, rather than the actual mileage traveled.

This situation can only mean an expanding school population at both the grade school and high school levels. Regardless of what we may do as a town to plan, it can be expected that the trend of school and municipal costs will continue upward. The choice which the town has in its planning is how best to strike a balance between the growth of its combined school and municipal costs on one hand and the proportionate growth in taxable property on the other. Because of the unique and desirable characteristics of our town, it can be expected that population growth may well out-pace the growth of the tax base, unless we do something about it. Leaving the matter as it is will not give us adequate protection in order to maintain orderly growth and a favorable tax base.

Hampstead has been endowed with valuable lake property which has yielded a high percentage of our tax receipts. However, this area has been extensively developed and is rapidly reaching the saturation point. Just ten years ago, approximately forty-five percent of our valuation was in non-resident real estate. Today this figure has dropped to close to thirty-three percent. The Planning Board has recognized this problem and will be presenting for your consideration at a special town meeting, changes in our Zoning Regulations that

could help in the future to more adequately meet the financial needs of the town. Your suggestions and criticism of these and other town problems are welcomed in order to more fully keep Hampstead the town that we are all proud to call our Home.

# ANNUAL REPORT - FIRE DEPARTMENT

This past year your fire department responded to 39 fire calls, of which 4 were Electrical, 4 were Auto, 12 were Grass or Brush, 3 were Chimney and 3 were dwelling fires: the remainder were miscellaneous calls. We also responded 3 times to calls from the Police Department to assist in searching for lost children.

This past year 18 men attended the Fire Schol at Fitzwilliam, N.H. We feel the men benefitted greatly from this experience, as did the persons and property of which they were taught more effective and efficient methods of protecting. This we hope will become an

annual affair for this department. Members of the Volunteer Fire Department are each year unselfishly giving more and more of their time to training, so we would like to take this opportunity to thank each and every one of them for their help in making this Department as efficient as it is today.

We have purchased a new chassis to carry our 1600 gal. tank and all of our rescue equipment, with this addition it makes this truck one of our most effective pieces of equipment. We also installed chain link fences around 2 more of our water holes; this leaves just 1 more to do. The dam at Wash Pond has been rebuilt and includes 60' of 15" pipe out into the pond, this will enable us to get water even in the dryest of seasons. This also benefits the people who own property on the Pond because with the dam rebuilt, the water level can now be controlled.

The Association this past year had one of our trucks painted and lettered, purchased the lights we had at both fire houses during the Holiday Season, and are in the process now of putting a new kitchen in the Central Station.

We would like to express our thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Robert Vautier for the land on Emerson Avenue that they donated for our water hole, and also to Homesites, Inc. for the land that they donated in Orchard Park for a water hole.

We hope you all enjoy a fire free 1966!

# REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that vist us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much drier than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

### WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

- 1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush:
  - a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
  - b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 P.M.
  - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands. Yours never to enjoy.

We wish to thank you all for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season. Also, the quick responses of the Hampstead Fire Department which saved the town a good many dollars by their fast effort in putting out the woods fires. Special thanks to the deputy wardens for their cooperation.

### REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

As Chief of the Hampstead Police Department, I am pleased to submit to the residents of the town the annual report of activities for the year 1965. This year has, as in the past few years, seen a tremendous increase in police activity. This tremendous increase is commensurate with any fast expanding community such as ours.

The department investigated a total of 43 auto accidents during the year resulting in 1 fatality, 16 personal injuries and excessive property damage.

We are pleased to have been instrumental in bringing about the alterations that have been completed at the intersection of Route 111 and Stage Road. It was indeed unfortunate that it necessitated five fatalities at that location before enough influential pressure could be brought to bear to prove that death on "Death Row" was

not inevitable. Time may prove that our interpretation of the ills and the cure for these ills were wrong, but one fact remains though, since these alterations were completed this department has not been called to cover a single auto accident at this location.

In March the first special session of the Plaistow District Court with Justice Daniel Andernacht was held at the High School Building. This session was brought about specifically at our request becaus of the difficulty that was encountered by our officers to attend regularly scheduled sessions at Plaistow. We wish to stress that all scheduled court sessions are open to the public except for isolated cases and the residents are invited to attend at any time to view the police department in action.

New laws pertaining to dogs have been enacted by the legislature. This law raises the fine for delinquent dog licenses from fifty cents to one dollar. This fine being due on June 1st instead of July 1st, as it has been in the past. Residents are again urged to comply with this law, to maintain better control of their pets and to have more consideration for their neighbors. At present it is the opinion of the office that little or none of this so-called consideration is at hand. It is suggested that the annual trip to the Town Clerk's office to register their motor vehicles is a good time to obtain dog licenses.

We have on record a total of 78 court cases during the year with our officers as complainants. A major portion of these appearances resulted in findings of guilty. The officers of this department can be complimented for their preparation and presentation of these cases. One only has to know the rudiments of law to realize today that to bring about guilty findings in court necessitates leaving no stone unturned in the case preparation.

We are asking consideration of the voters at the forthcoming town meeting to approve a special article in the warrant to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 to equip the department with a reliable means of radio communication. At present Hampstead is the only community in this general area that is not so equipped. We honestly feel that to provide such equipment will enable us to better serve the people of the town, to allow us to respond to calls more promptly and to bring about a more expeditious handling of emergencies.

Sincere thanks go to my officers for their cooperation and will-ingness to serve the town. The calibre of officers that I have under my direction is of the highest order. Never once have I seen them perform their duties in a manner that was other than commendable. Thanks also is extended to the town officers for their never ending willingness to assist where it is necessary.

### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

The Book Consultant, Mrs. Rachel Sanborn, assisted by Mrs. Marjorie Kirkness, Chairman of the Trustees, have just finished weeding out the books that have yellowed by age, those in small print which are hard to read, and those that are not up-to-date.

We are changing over to centralized cataloging and service and Mrs. Marjorie Kirkness, who has just taken a course in cataloging, is working on this new system. Mrs. Sanborn comes for a day to help whenever she can.

Last year we had 1,196 non-fiction, 1,752 fiction and 1,359 children's books in circulation.

Friends of the Library have been very successful with the Holly Hock Shop and much credit is due to those who work there, and to Mrs. Ada Sakash who was the instigator of the shop. I wish to acknowledge my thanks to the Friends of the Library for their generosity in the money they gave us to be used for classics and magazines. They also have made arrangements for two more book cases and a new magazine rack.

We have subscribed to the Reader's Guide which is very beneficial to the High School students. It tells in the Guide in what magazine most any subject can be found and for this purpose we have subscribed for To-days Health, American Review and Science American.

In April, National Library Week was observed by having a twoday Art Exhibit put on by the Friends of the Library, with Mrs. Ada Sakash as Chairman and it was most successful.

Hampstead has joined the State Wide Library Development Program. The goal of this program is to make complete library service conveniently available to all, wherever they may live. By buying our books through the State we get quite a discount. The towns that join this program receive a \$100.00 grant annually to be used to improve its reference collection. Book selection meetings are held in

different town libraries every few weeks where the Book Consultant brings carefully selected books for both old and young. We held one in Hampstead. Mrs. Rachel Sanborn, State Consultant and Mrs. Charlotte Hutton who is on the Bookmobile, give very interesting book reviews on the new books at these meetings.

In Sept. about 75 friends of the Library gathered from all over the State at the Highway Hotel in Concord and voted to form an organization known as Friends of the N.H. Libraries.

The annual Friends of the Library banquet, was held this year at the Chanticleer in Derry and it was very well attended.

To the following donors of books and magazines, I express my sincere thanks. Miss Shirley Ayer, Mr. James Bolton, Mrs. James Burtner, Mr. Laurence Cornwell, Mr. Thomas Fraser, Dr. William Hart, Mrs. Clinton Kirkness, Mrs. Alfred Martel, Mr. Everett Thomas, Mr. Clarence Webster, Mrs. Donald Piehl, Mr. Damrin Richie, Mrs. Marion Shedd, Mrs. Gordon Brough, Miss Barbara Taylor and Mrs. Jessie Dunnet.

I wish to express my gratitude to Mr. Allen Pomeroy who looks after our magazine subscriptions and gets them at a great reduction.

Through the kindness of Mrs. Clinton Kirkness and Mrs. William Conway, I have attended two book buying meetings, one workshop in Hampton, a workshop in Nashua on book mending and a Friends of the Library meeting in Concord. At the meeting in Hampton, Mrs. Eleanor Smith of Brooklyn Public Library talked on Modern Fiction, its Precepts, Pressures, and Problems. I have enjoyed these meetings and feel they were worthwhile.

To the Trustees, I extend my appreciation for their help and guidance.

The Library is open every Tuesday and Saturday from 2 P.M. to 7 P.M. and Wednesday from 7 P.M. to 9 P.M. Closed on holidays.

No further report of progress can be made at this time, nor any recommendation as to which of various possibilities would most likely be in the best interests of the voters, the taxpayers, or the future high-school students.

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hampstead:

I am presenting my Tenth Annual Report as Superintendent of Schools in Hampstead. Reports from the Principal and Supervisors will discuss more in detail the activities of the school. Statistical reports are listed separately.

### Personnel

Five teachers joined the Central School staff this current year. They were: Mrs. Beverly Eichhorn, Grade 1, a graduate of Bangor Theological Seminary. Mrs. Angela Caulfield, Grade 2, a graduate of Merrimack College, with teaching experience in Methuen, Mass. Miss Carolyn Currier, Grade 3, a graduate of Keene State College, with teaching experience in Andover, N.H. Miss Arlene McGrath, Grade 4, a graduate of Plymouth State College. Bernard Bartnicki, Grades 7 and 8, a graduate of North Adams State College, with teaching experience in Tilton, New Hampshire.

If teachers' salaries becomes a point of discussion, I would like to bring out two points: First is the fact that we are forced to hire each year many beginning teachers, because we do not have a sufficient number of experienced teachers applying. This fact makes it necessary that we attempt to stay in line with beginning teachers' salaries in the area. Secondly, I wish to say only that gradual increases in beginning salaries have less an impact than a larger increase in any one year.

All teachers have continued membership in local, state and national professional organizations. Seven teachers have taken professional courses during this past year.

### Recognition

"Are good things happening in our schools?" The question is asked and answered in the affirmative by the New Hampshire Council for Better Schools in its second annual recognition of leading practices being carried on in our public schools.

At a recent Achievement Awards Program in Concord, thirteen projects in eleven school districts were honored as outstanding examples of noteworthy accomplishment. They were chosen from an imposing list of more than forty instances of significant projects which illustrate what our schools are doing.

Supervisory Union No. 55 was honored in two instances for producing an effective set of curriculum guidelines and for its comprehensive teachers' guide and handbook.

### Federal Aid to Improve Our Curriculum

The Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965 allots \$2.3 million to New Hampshire under five titles. Hampstead has the opportunity to benefit under three of these titles.

Under Title I Hampstead will combine with Timberlane Regional School District and together they will receive \$14,139.92. They plan to emphasize three areas: first grade readiness, middle grade remedial reading expansion, and a multiple vocations program for the potential drop-out and the special education child fourteen years old and older.

Under Title II Hampstead, along with the other school districts in Union No. 55, plus the parochial school in Salem, will receive \$8,573.40 for School Library resources.

A project for Rockingham County was approved under Title III for mental health services under the Derry project. Hampstead will be eligible for any services under this project if developed, and for which they may have a need.

Titles IV and V will be used for educational research and training on a state level and to strengthen state departments of education.

The Hampstead-Timberlane School districts will be combined to benefit from another Federal Program called "Headstart." The office of Economic Opportunity sponsors this program for pre-school children from low income families who plan to enter school in September 1966. This program will take place next summer and one class of approximately fifteen children will be housed in either Hampstead or Plaistow for Timberlane-Hampstead children who may be eligible.

It is hoped that Hampstead can benefit from the expansion of Title III of the National Defense Act. This matching grant program, first enacted in 1958, gets major credit for the improved school programs in science, mathematics, foreign languages, guidance and counseling. Last fall, the NDEA amendment added history, civics, geography, English and reading as local program eligible to receive matching-basis grants. The catch here is that the State Department of Education must have specialists in these fields to process the requested projects, and the legislature deleted these items from the Department's budget. It is hoped that they can get these people now, through the Elementary and Secondary Act.

There has been a lot of controversy over whether or not local school districts should accept federal aid because of a possible loss of local control.

We have benefited from federal aid in the past with only a minimum of control. This control, however, is to assure the Government that we meet certain standards and use the money for which it was appropriated; such as, for the poverty stricken, for impacted areas, for certain subject areas, for enrichment, for federal lunch programs and for vocational needs, among others. I see no harm in this type of aid.

If history repeats itself, the federal aid program will be extended and increased, and more money will probably be available to help in the area of curriculum.

The United States Commissioner of Education, last fall in Honolulu, speaking to the Council of Chief State School Officers, listed the new national objectives which, I believe, are worth repeating: 1. To raise the quality of education in our schools everywhere. 2. To bring quality of educational opportunity to everychild. 3. To provide vocational and technical training that is geared to the economy and technology of today and tomorrow. 4. To make college and university study possible for all young people who can benefit by it. 5. To bring our educational resources to bear directly on problems in our communities.

The Union is doing some research in the area of ungraded classes for the primary grades. If we can improve the reading level of the pupils with this program, then we should strongly consider it. An elementary school is judged by the reading level of its pupils.

### Housing

The Housing problem appears solved for the present. We have at least sixteen classrooms available in the Central School to house two grade ones up to two grade eights. Until we start having three sections of each grade, we are not in trouble. This could start coming, however, in three years.

Up to the writing of this report, no word has been received from the committee appointed to study secondary school needs.

It is your responsibility to study all the facts presented by the committee and weigh them and support what appears best for the children, within the abilities of the town to pay.

### **Appreciations**

Appreciation is expressed for the continued support and cooperation of the Parent-Teachers' Association, the Civic Club, and all other organizations. I wish to thank the School' Board, my staff, principals, teachers, pupils, school custodians and secretaries for their cooperation in working at all times for a better educational program.

### REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, and Citizens of Hampstead:

I am pleased to submit my third annual report as Supervising Principal of the Hampstead Central School.

On March first, the first floor of the new addition was occupied. Pupils of grades 6, 7, and 8, previously housed in the high school building, were transferred to the new section.

Work to finish the second floor of the new building was completed during the summer, and this section was occupied in September. Presently, grades five through eight, are located in the new building, and grades one through four are housed in the other section of the building.

In 1965, enrollment figures continued to rise. In December, we had 326 pupils enrolled at the Central School. A summary of the enrollment figures appears elsewhere in this report.

We had two classes of each grade in all except grades five and eight, which were single classes. Our staff numbered twenty-two people. Among these were fourteen classroom teachers, one remedial reading teacher, two music supervisors, one nurse, one speech therapist, one secretary, and two custodians.

Several new programs of study were introduced. A new language series was begun in grades two through six. Also, new English and Literature programs were instituted in the junior high grades. A new program in Science was begun in grades four through eight. The new Scott Foresman reading series was extended to grade four and the Greater Cleveland Mathematics program was extended to grade seven.

Educational field trips were held for all grades. The trips were designed, where possible, to relate to material presented in the classrooms.

A Specialty Fair was again held in May at the gymnasium. Grades four through eight participated. Over one hundred projects were on display. All participants received award ribbons.

The athletic program consisted of interscholastic participation in basketball and baseball for boys, and basketball and softball for girls.

Eighth grade graduation exercises were held at the Hampstead Congregational Church on June 23rd. Parents, relatives, and friends greeted the graduates immediately following the program. Nineteen pupils received diplomas. Mr. Wendell V. Davis, Superintendent of Schools, was the featured speaker. Mr. David Morris, Chairman of the Hampstead School Board, also spoke.

National Education Week was observed during the week of November eighth through twelfth. Open House was observed and the Book Fair was held during National Education Week. The fair was again sponsored by the Hampstead P.T.A., and was directed by Mrs. Mary Smith.

Pupils from grades five through eight participated in the annual National Spelling Bee sponsored by the Manchester Union Leader. In the area of testing, a new form of the Stanford Achievement Test was administered to pupils of grades two through eight.

Other standardized tests given during the year were: Metropolitan Readiness Tests and SRA Mental Ability Tests in grade one; Otis Mental Ability Tests, given in grades two, four, and six; and Orleans Algebra Prognosis Test, grade eight. In addition, basic reading tests were given to all pupils as well as various individual diagnostic tests.

The annual New England Reading Conference was held at the Sheraton Boston, Boston, Massachusetts. Miss Freda Clark and Mr. Richard Grey attended.

School children were transported by Mr. Frank Howard of Hampstead. Milk was purchased from the Wason-MacDonald Company, of Haverhill, Massachusetts.

Physical examinations were administered by Dr. Raymond E. Moore and Dr. William R. Hart, assisted by school nurse-teacher, Mrs. Wanda Scholl, R.N. Details of the health program appear in Mrs. Scholl's report.

The speech therapy program continued. Mr. Vincent Raciti, speech therapist, again conducted the program.

The school library has grown to over fourteen hundred volumes. The Dewey Decimal System of classification was instituted.

Appreciation is extended to the many individuals and organizations for their assistance with the school library.

Again, I would like to offer thanks to the Hampstead P.T.A. for their continued interest in our children.

### REPORT OF THE REMEDIAL READING TEACHER

September 1964 - June 1965

Most children travel easily the road to success in reading. They have no major difficulties, although their rate of learning varies from time to time. If motivation and interest are high, they go ahead quickly. When other interests and activities claim their attention, they may lag behind. However, they have no difficulty in catching up, or forging ahead.

Unfortunately, there are other children who do not learn to read so easily. In every classroom, there are some who cannot keep up with their classmates. For some reason or another, they have met various roadblocks which have retarded their progress. Because of this, there are two types of reading activities carried on in our classrooms, today, classed as developmental and remedial. The pupil's remain in the same room for developmental instruction but are segregated from their classmates for remedial instruction.

A pupil needs remedial instruction when he cannot participate profitably in classroom learning activities which involve the use of textbooks. Then he comes to my room, for help; where, in a small group of four—sometimes five—he is taught the necessary reading skills more rapidly than he could learn them in a large classroom where the teacher must continue to give some of her time to other pupils who read respectably well. Because a remedial reader is a retarded reader, to some extent, he must learn skills faster, to try to keep up to his grade level. These are the phonetic and structural

analysis skills. I drive directly and rapidly to develop them and depend heavily upon drill for their mastery.

There are three ways in which children are found eligible for remedial reading groups:

- 1. In September, all second grade pupils are given Lyons-Carnahan grade placement tests. Those who score not more than six months below grade level, and have average intelligence, need remedial reading.
- 2. The Individual Cumulative Record cards of Basal Reading Tests are scrutinized. Those pupils scoring low in phonetic or structural analysis skills come to me for help. Upon reaching grade level when tested at a later date, they are released, and other pupils are added to the group.
- 3. During the year, consultations with classroom teachers add more pupils to the groups. When admitted after regular classes have begun, the teacher makes out a given application form to show the pupil's weaknesses. To determine just what is causing the weakness, I, then, give these tests:
  - 1. Lyons-Carnahan Diagnostic Reading Tests
  - 2. Durrell--Sullivan Analysis of Reading Difficulties

This year is the first time that Grade One has been a part of the Remedial Reading Program. Only the repeaters were admitted. There were four pupils and they were very retarded, having an avrage of only four sight words. Every device known was used to help them. In June, the tests results proved that our experiment was a success, because:

- 1. all four pupils had made a gain of one year, or more
- 2. two pupils had reached grade level

To supplement the Scott Foresman Basil Phonics Program, I used the Phono Visual Program. I found it quite useful with the very slow readers in grades two and three, also. It has helped to establish a firm foundation in hearing and recognizing the consonant sounds and digraphs. It carries over, very well, in teaching initial and final consonant substitution. This skill, when used with the known sight words, gives the pupil a bigger vocabulary.

Among the books, charts and devices that I use with the remedial groups, are:

- 1. Ginn Readers (for oral reading)
- 2. Readers Digest Skill Builders (for oral reading)
- 3. Betts Readers
- 4. Houghton-Mifflin Readers
- 5. Lyons-Carnahan "Phonics We Use"
- 6. Tachistoscope

- 7. Merrill Skill Texts
- 8. All Dolch Aids
- 9. Phonics Charts
- 10. Consonant, Blend and Vowel Wheel's

To help in determining whether a pupil is working up to his capacity and ability, the following tests were given:

Durrell Capacity Tests	22

During the school year, to help the teachers group pupils in all of the second grades as well as those pupils in the other grades who entered late from other schools, the following tests were given:

Durrell-Sullivan	5
Iowa Silent Reading Tests	15

It has been — and still is — the policy in Union No. 55 to test every child in the remedial reading program as follows:

- 1. September Lyons Carnahan Developmental Tests
- 2. January Metropolitan Reading Achievement Tests
- 3. June Durrell-Sullivan

A cumulative record folder for each child in the remedial reading program is kept in my file. All test marks are recorded on a permanent record card. This, also, is in my file.

Of tremendous value to me has been the time allotted to me, on Thursdays, for class visitation. Once each month, I visit the classroom, to observe my remedial pupils perform in a reading class, under normal classroom conditions. Often, I have discovered that some skills would have to be retaught, and many times much drill was needed. When I feel that the skill has been learned, I re-visit the classroom, to check.

During this past year, most of the pupil's have made marked progress in the remedial groups. The home room teachers report that the work in the classroom has improved, accordingly. Quite often, a teacher, in conferring with Mr. Grey about a remedial pupil, will ask for a test to see if moving him to a higher group is advisable. I am always glad when that test record is "High." In several instances, the pupils have been moved to a higher reading group. Of the 55 pupils who were enrolled in the remedial groups, this year, the following very satisfactory gains were made:

79% made a gain of one year or more 49% reached their grade level

Aside from the fact that I thoroughly enjoy working with children under any condition, and in any grade, the above results make my work as Remedial Teacher so rewarding, and worth while. And I have only just begun to probe its depths.

One teacher cannot even hope to run a remedial program, alone. So, I am most grateful to my principal, Mr. Grey, and to a faculty of very cooperative teachers who always find time to discuss with me the problems of those children we are trying to help.

### REPORT OF SPEECH THERAPIST

As speech therapist in the Town of Hampstead, I hereby submit my first annual report.

The speech and hearing program in the Hampstead Central School was initiated on a full-time basis in September, 1964. In order that no one was overlooked and an effective program maintained, each student was given a speech evaluation. Any new student who entered the system during the year was also tested. Records were kept of all who experienced difficulty whether mild, moderate or severe. Tests revealed that twenty percent of the students from grades one through eight had speech problems of varying degrees.

Classes were divided into two classifications: those who required individual instruction, and those whose needs could be met in a group. They were grouped according to age, grade level and type of problem. In order for the speech program to be effective, groups were limited to three. Sessions were conducted on a half-hour basis once a week.

Therapy included work with the following types of problems: articulation disorders including substitutions, distortions and omission of sounds; delayed speech, "baby talk," etc.; defects of rhythm such as stuttering; and hearing problems. From seventy to eighty-five percent of children with speech difficulties, articulation is most prevalent.

Parents play a very important part in correcting speech. Their help and cooperation are the final answers in this attempt. Without them, the program cannot reach an effective ending. The goal in therapy is normal speech — during normal conversation at all times.

### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL HEALTH PROGRAM

I am presenting herewith my second annual report as school nurse-teacher in Hampstead.

As generally accepted, the school health program occupies an important place in the total educational effort of schools. The school meets this responsibility by making available to all students, experiences that will result in their having sound health knowledge, attitudes, and skills.

Pre-school registration is held in May each year. It becomes the task of the school nurse to acquaint herself with all incoming pupils and their parents. Attention is given to all aspects of pupil health whether it be emotional problems, dental problems, or physical disabilities. Contacts at registration and throughout their school career will minimize a problem if not solve it.

Cursory examinations are done at the beginning of the school year and after each vacation period for the protection of the pupils. This includes inspection of glands, throat, teeth, head and extremities. The yearly medical examination for all students in grades 1, 3, 5, and 7, and those new to the school, is usually held in October and November by the school physicians assisted by the school nurse-teacher. Parents are notified of all defects and a successful "follow-up" program is carried out.

A tuberculin skin testing clinic is held every other year. Grades 1, 5, 6, 7, 8, and school personnel are tested. All positive reactors to this test are immediately notified and further urged to have their chest x-rayed.

Screening tests are those measures employed by the health services to "point out" those school children who appear to be in need of further attention. The most effective screening tests have been for vision, hearing and the appraisal of physical growth by weighing and measuring of boys and girls. All pupils are screened annually and the results recorded. Any deviation from the norm can be easily noted and steps taken to correct it. In addition, grade five pupils are tested for color perception.

School health services include procedures for the proper and prompt emergency care of those who become injured or ill while at school. Ideally, only medical personnel should render emergency care. There are times, however, when only the teacher is available. It is the school nurse's responsibility to see that each teacher have some knowledge of these first aid procedures. She must also keep a well stocked first aid cabinet at all times.

Keeping records becomes an important part of the health program. Health records are cumulative throughout the school life of the child. All pertinent information regarding the child from the family physician, hospitals, and clinics are contained herein. Also,

information on the preventive services (immunizations), screening tests (vision and hearing), and data on growth and development of the pupil (height and weight) and particular findings of the school medical examiner are noted in these records.

In addition, the school nurse-teacher acts as a valuable resource person for both teachers and pupils when instructing in the field of health. Special programs are conducted in the classroom by the nurse-teacher on "personal hygiene," "smoking," "grooming and beauty," and whenever needed in a related subject. The health program thus provides the boys and girls with accurate health knowledge.

Finally, to the parents and friends of Hampstead Central School, I wish to say thank you for your cooperation. It has indeed been a pleasure being a member of this grand group.

### REPORT OF PROGRESS OF MUSIC EDUCATION

September 1964 — June 1965

Last year's music program in grades one through six was my responsibility as of February 1, 1965, to June 20, 1965. Until that time, my employment was on half-time basis covering grades one, two and three.

The first half of the year's musical achievement was demonstrated in a Christmas concert involving all towns in the Union. It was observed that the "flutophone" is a very effective method to induce musical growth and provide general impetus in as painless and as rewarding a manner as possible.

Last year was a successful one in that the major goals of music were met as we are endeavoring to meet them now.

Grades 5 - 8
