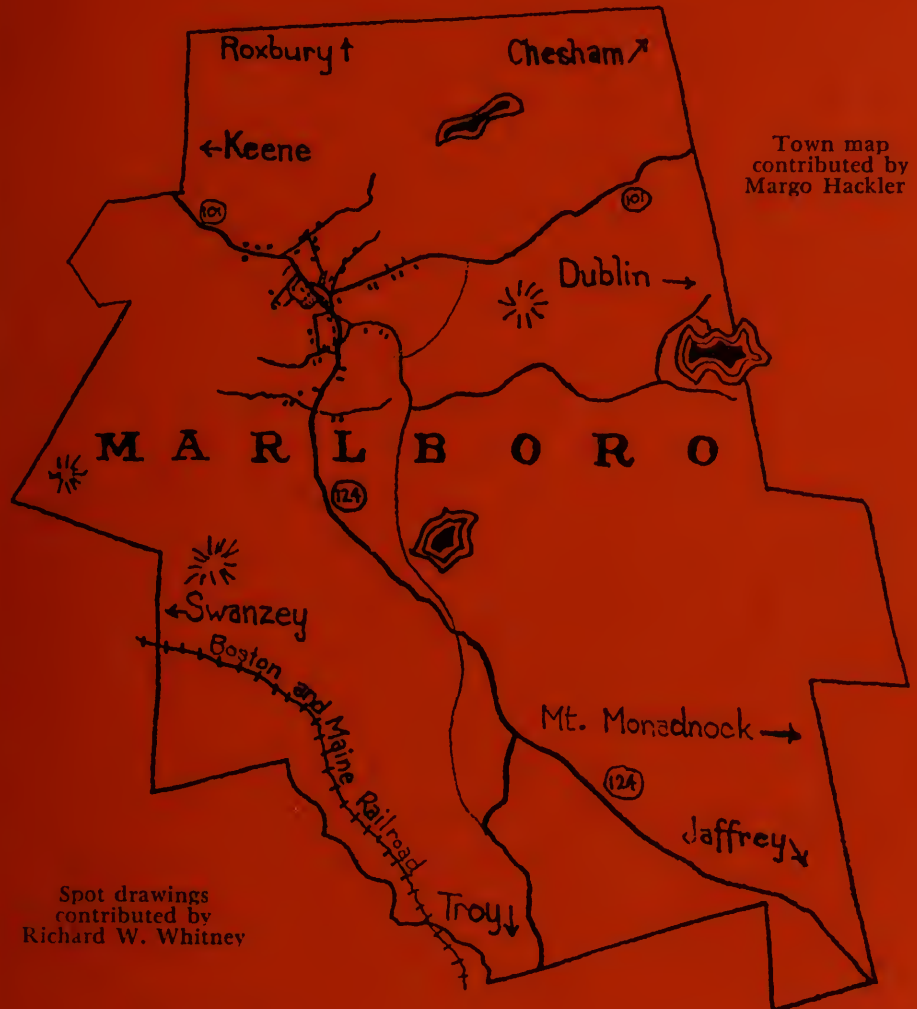

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SELECTMEN'S FOREWORD

In a continuing effort to keep up with our rapidly changing world, the Board of Selectmen, in conjunction with the Planning Board, the Community Planning Consultants and a number of committees, have spent a considerable amount of time in an intensive investigation, study and analysis of many of the areas that effect the citizens of Marlborough, the services they must receive and their impact on our community life. In this foreword we would like to share with you the findings of our studies, the important priorities that we feel must receive attention and our ideas in meeting these priorities, all in an effort to maintain balance and growth for our community.

During the past year the Town absorbed the loss of the final third of the valuation of the old Power House. Also, by abiding with the legislation passed in the last session of the Legislature, we granted \$75,750 of Exemptions For the Elderly to those property owners who qualified. The net valuation for computing the tax rate was \$7,108,500 and based upon operating costs of the past year this set the tax rate at \$5.38 per \$100 valuation. This Board feels that the tax base has leveled off and feels this base should now start to show a yearly growth.

This Board has felt for some time that steps should be taken to improve the street lighting in our Town. We strongly feel that safety and security for all the citizens of the Town could be improved if better, more modern and more powerful street lights were located in the necessary locations. We therefore appointed a committee to study the street lighting problem and enthusiastically support their findings and recommendations.

During 1970 the State of New Hampshire conducted a survey of traffic conditions on Route 101. This survey shows that in excess of 5,000 vehicles pass through the Main Street of Marlborough on an average day. We have become increasingly concerned with that portion of the Main Street in the area of the intersection of Canada Street and we have therefore, through our representative to the Legislature, the district State Highway Superintendent and the Governor, brought attention to the removal of the old Bouvier Block, relocation of the main highway and thereby partially eliminating the bad curve that has existed. It is our understanding that the State has set aside funds for this project and we are hopeful that it can be started this year.

The Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency has sponsored a new and vastly improved communications network that will enable local Police departments, the State Police headquarters in Concord and the County Sheriff's to be in radio contact with each other at all times. Real-

izing the necessity to become a part of this network, the Board of Selectmen have made application to the Federal and State Governments for their grants and the local Police Department should have new radios installed by early summer. These radios cost about \$1200 each, but the Town's share of the cost will be only \$272 each. The Town will then sell the radios we now have in use and should easily get in excess of the \$272 cost for the new radios from the sale of the older radios.

Work on Phase II of the Comprehensive Plan is continuing and the Selectmen are very interested in this particular part of Town planning because an updating of the zoning ordinances is included in this phase. We feel there are many thin areas in our present zoning ordinances and that all the citizens of the Town can be best served if more clearly defined ordinances can be enacted that will eliminate misunderstanding and prejudice.

During the past year it has become more and more evident to this Board that consideration must be given to the purchase of a new truck for the Highway Department. At present we are using a 1963 Ford truck that has performed quite well but like all pieces of equipment it is wearing out very rapidly. The highway department was forced to spend considerable money on repairs during the past year and after a good inspection of this vehicle it is obvious that should we keep it we will spend a great deal more for repairs. Feeling that they are not qualified to purchase equipment of this type, the Board of Selectmen appointed a committee of five well qualified men who have worked with machinery of this nature most of their lives to work in conjunction with the Road Agent and assemble a list of specifications that may be put out for bid. We embrace their ideas and their requirements for a truck and hope the citizens of the Town will give careful consideration to their work.

Since this Town first came into being it has been the custom for the citizens of Marlborough to elect by ballot the majority of the Town Officers. For many years this was probably the best way of choosing the proper people for a given office and responsibility. But down through the years times have changed and the responsibility of each office has changed as well. The Board of Selectmen have become convinced that two Town Offices that are now filled by ballot should not continue to be so. We refer to the Road Agent and the Chief of Police, and our reasons for believing that these two offices should be appointed offices are many. An article covering this matter will appear in the Town Warrant and we will discuss our reasoning for our position on this issue at Town Meeting.

The Selectmen have for some time been aware of the fact that the Town must take steps to acquire land for Town use. These uses include locations for additional water supplies, recreation areas and parks or playgrounds and for other uses that may be in the best interest of the Community. Therefore, this board would like to have and to hear comments relative to the feasibility of establishing a Conservation District. We are in the process of getting detailed information as to how this Conservation

District could benefit the Town and hope to be in a position to discuss it in length at Town Meeting.

One of the unpleasant tasks that come before this Board concerns those citizens of the Town who demand and use services rendered by the Town and after these services have been rendered, refuse to pay for them. At present the Town has hundreds of dollars of unpaid water bills on the books. The Road Agent has done work for individuals in the Town and about \$575 in outstanding bills remain unpaid even though some of this work was done from six months to a year ago. While this Board does not wish to take punitive action against such delinquents, it feels it must defend the best interests of the Community where its interest appears and we will therefore, if necessary, take legal action to collect these long past due accounts as well as establish a policy of payment in advance for work done by the Highway Department.

In 1976 the Town of Marlborough will celebrate its 200th birthday. We feel this is an important matter; one that should be given considerable study and thought, and we would therefore, like to have the Town's support in appointing a Bicentennial Committee and an appropriation of funds suitable for the occasion. We are certain that all the citizens of Marlborough are proud of their Town and feel this occasion will be the perfect time and place to prove it.

The Board of Selectmen will continue to work with all Town Officers, elected and appointed committees, both in Marlborough and the surrounding Towns, in an effort to surmount the many problems that face every municipality in our fast moving society. We want to take this opportunity to thank all the Town Officers, the committees and other interested citizens who contributed to the community's interest in the past year. We are constantly looking for new and innovating ways to meet our problems and in this regard we welcome any idea, any constructive criticism or any suggestion from anyone that might help with the growth of our community.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Marlborough in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Marlborough High School Auditorium in said Marlborough on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March, next at one of the clock in the afternoon, business meeting to be held at seven-thirty in the evening, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sums of money the Town will raise and appropriate for highway operations: — Summer and Winter Maintenance and General expense; or to act in any manner relating thereto.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the application of liquid asphalt to the highways or act in any manner relating thereto.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of sidewalks or act in any manner relating thereto.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$825.64, the State to contribute \$5,504.27, for Class V road construction, apportionment A.
7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting and to accept the recommendations of the Electric Light Study Committee or act in any manner relating thereto.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs, water storage and equipment of the Fire Department or act in any manner relating thereto.
9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$530 for the Monadnock Region Association to continue its efforts in areas of

solid waste disposal, planning, pesticides, legislation, state parks, youth work and by other means call attention to the protection of the natural resources of the Town, plus its other advantages, along with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region, or act in any manner relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$501 to support the services of the Community Mental Health Clinic of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service, said services operating under the provisions of the Community Mental Health Services Act of New Hampshire, with State grant-in-aid. Local request for financial support is based on a .30 per capita formula.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support and operating costs of the Elliot Community Hospital or act in any manner relating thereto.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the District Nursing Association or act in any manner relating thereto.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the eradication of White Pine Blister Rust or act in any manner relating thereto.

14. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the School Patrol Officer or act in any manner relating thereto.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for hydrant rental or act in any manner relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3300 to pay Note No. 2 on the John Deere Loader or act in any manner relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for retirement of Note No. 3 at the Keene National Bank for moving hydrants and water mains.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to retire Note No. 3 at the Ashuelot National Bank for the Grader.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to retire Note No. 3 at the Keene National Bank for the Fire Truck.

20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operating costs of the Frost Free Library or act in any manner relating thereto.

21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day or act in any manner relating thereto.

22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense or act in any manner relating thereto.

23. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the game of Beano or act in any manner relating thereto.

24. To see if the Town will vote to accept funds for perpetual care of cemetery lots or act in any manner relating thereto.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 to be used by the Recreation Commission, or act in any manner relating thereto.

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,400 for the purpose of running an eight week Summer Playground program, or act in any manner relating thereto.

27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Bicentennial Celebration in 1976 and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Bicentennial Committee.

28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new truck for the Highway Department or act in any manner relating thereto.

29. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of sidewalks or act in manner relating thereto.

30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as the Town's share for the purchase of two police radios as outlined in the Federal Crime Commission Bill.

31. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the further construction of Ryan Road, or act in any manner relating thereto.

32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint the Chief of Police, or act in any manner relating thereto.

33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint the Highway Agent, or act in any manner relating thereto.

34. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the regional planning commission, now organized and named the Ashuelot Valley Regional Planning Commission. This Commission will have membership of at least two municipalities and will have jurisdiction over the planning region delineated by the Office of State Planning. The objective of the Commission will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects within, and which extend beyond, the boundaries of a particular town. The Commission will have only the authority conferred on it by Chapter 36:45-53, Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and will be an advisory commission to local governments in the region. Members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with State law. Two representatives will be appointed from Marlborough.

35. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,000 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Ashuelot Valley Regional Planning Commission. These funds will be used for financing the staff, operation expenses, planning studies, technical assistance and other programs of the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purposes.

36. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to fund a Conservation Commission and authorize the Board of Selectmen to establish said Commission or act in any manner relating thereto.

37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Marlborough Fire Company to construct an addition to the rear of the present Municipal Building.

38. Proposed that the Town of Marlborough donate the sum of \$200 to the Monadnock Region Humane Society, which services the community of Marlborough in many ways and is supported almost entirely by donation.

39. To see if the Town will vote to install a blinking traffic light at the intersection of Pleasant Street and Route 124 and raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for same or act in any manner relating thereto.

40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to use some of the accrued funds of The Charles C. Ward Town Fund to purchase a calculator for the use of Town Officers or act in any manner relating thereto.

41. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collectors Deeds and Gifts.

43. To hear reports of Town agents, Auditors and Committees.

44. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting

As indicated by the Activity Record shown above, the Police Department had a busy year in 1970. Most of our attention during the past year was directed to a concerted effort to slow down the speed of traffic on the two main arteries that go through our Town,

namely Route 101 and Route 12; attempt to give better coverage to the outlying areas of Town in an effort to eliminate some of the breaking and entering; and surveillance of certain subjects for the purpose of stopping acts of malicious destruction of property. We have been reasonably successful in accomplishing two of our goals, namely a reduction in traffic speed and cutting down on the damage to property. Only time will tell if our constant checks on business and residential properties will cut down on the breaking and entering. The rural area of Marlborough is extensive and keeping a close check on all the summer residences and rural homes is a time-consuming and costly operation. The citizens of Town could play a vital role in our effort to determine who is using our rural roads, both during the day and at night. If you see a vehicle you do not recognize or that is not familiar to you, write down the registration number and give it to a member of the department. Knowledge as to who is abroad on our back roads is absolutely necessary if we are to solve these crimes.

During this past year the department purchased additional clothing and equipment for all the members of the staff. At present we are reasonably well equipped with the exception of necessary lights and these will be purchased in the near future. The change over to a new radio frequency will allow us to do better work by being able to call Concord for motor vehicle registration and license information. These radios will not require any outlay of funds on the part of the Town as we will be able to sell our present radios for more than the new ones will cost. In the near future the department will also apply for proper insurance for all members of the force, giving them the protection they certainly deserve. No one should be asked to risk his life protecting other persons and their property without being properly insured.

Some of the members of the force are attending classes being held weekly at the Keene Police Department. This instruction includes first aid, law, criminal investigation and other important subjects. We are fortunate this law enforcement education is available to the members of our force without cost to the Town.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Cheshire County Sheriff's Department, the New Hampshire State Police and Chief Albion Metcalf of the Keene Police Department as well as all the members of the Keene Department for their much appreciated help and cooperation during the past year. We are greatly depend-

ent on the facilities of the Keene Police Dept. and the Keene District Court and are grateful for the considerations they have extended to us.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank all the citizens of Marlborough for their cooperation, support and interest during the past year. The effectiveness of any Police Department is always reflected in the kinds of understanding and cooperation it receives from the people it serves. For the past twenty-two years it has been my privilege to serve as the Chief of Police of our Town and during those years my work has been made much more pleasant and easy by the wonderful support and cooperation I have received. I have decided not to seek reelection again this year. My reasons for this decision are first that a younger man should be given an opportunity to take over the responsibility of managing the department; second, my age makes it a bit more difficult for me to do the things that are necessary in a position of such responsibility. I will remain on the force doing the traffic control work, working the funerals and taking care of special events as they may arise. With your continued cooperation we can all help make our Town a better place in which to live and work and I would like to ask your help in giving my successor the same wonderful cooperation that you have given me.

THE REPORT OF FIRE WARDS

It was a very busy year for the M. F. D. answering 36 alarms which was 33% more calls than in 1969. Among these were 4 General alarms, 13 Still alarms, 3 Resuscitator calls, 2 Brush fire calls, and 14 Mutual Aid calls which was an unusually large amount of calls. These mutual aid calls were as follows: Keene, 2; Surry, 1; Swanzey Center, 4; Dublin, 3; Harrisville, 4. We received mutual aid once for the Home Store fire. We wish to thank all townspeople, local and state police for their help in fighting this fire.

We had several activities sponsored by the Fire Company this year. Among these were Fire Inspection Day, which included a poster contest on fire prevention with Smokey The Bear awarding the prizes. Close to 100 children attended with their parents. Also a Halloween Party which included rides on the fire truck, refreshments, movies and a visit by Ding-a-Ling the clown was enjoyed by all. This was well attended by approximately 100 children with parents. The party was co-sponsored by the Fire Department and Recreation Department.

Also included has been the flooding of the skating rink several times.

We wish to thank the selectmen, townspeople, local and state police, and members of the fire company for their fine cooperation during the past year.

MARLBOROUGH COMMUNITY NURSING ASSOCIATION**Annual Report — 1970**

During the year of 1970, the visiting nurse made a total of 582 calls, 182 of these calls were for Medicare patients. Some of these patients she visits on a weekly or semi-weekly basis, and since the latter part of November she has one patient she visits twice a day. As of the last of October, we do not have any Medicare patients.

During the year the association was reimbursed for \$554.00 from Medicare, and we also received a check for \$729.00 for 1969 settlement. The nurse has made a total of \$373.90 in collections.

During the year the nurse has spent a total of 109 hours at the school on routine visits. In March she gave T.B. tests to the first, fourth, seventh, and eleventh grade pupils. A rubella clinic for Marlborough and Chesham was held in December, and 91 children were vaccinated at this time.

The nurse assisted Dr. Almquist with physicals for the cheerleaders and the athletic teams.

The present rate of reimbursement from the school district is \$1.50 per child.

The commission has met monthly on the second Tuesday.

We have continued our effort to improve and use the facilities at the ball flat. With the special appropriation of last year we were able to erect a metal tool shed and a shelter to be used by skaters. A skating rink was made last year and again this year thanks to the cooperation of our Fire Department. Lights at the ball flat have made it possible to use the rink at night. There was some work done on the diamonds by the commission and fathers of Little Leaguers. The horseshoe court will be put in after the wire fence is installed between the Wilcox property and the ball flat. We have observed that the ball flat facilities are being enjoyed by many.

The Phys. Ed. program didn't materialize last winter because we couldn't find an available instructor at the time the gym was free. Due to lack of funds we will not have a program this year.

The summer swimming program was again co-sponsored with Red Cross. 96 children signed up. Daily participation was 70. We are grateful to Mrs. Joseph Patnode for her willingness to be our local director. We wish to thank all who helped chaperone for without their assistance we could not have had the swimming program.

The commission financed the Halloween party which was sponsored by the Fire Department.

We have agreed to cooperate with any local group interested in working on the possibilities of a municipal swimming pool.

We would like to run a summer playground program. We have an experienced director and assistant who are interested. We will have more definite plans at town meeting.

We have experienced a busy but fruitful year. We have made a gain on our immediate needs, thanks to town support, however, the list is long and will need your continued interest.

Your volunteer ambulance squad went into active service on July 14, 1970. Seventeen (17) calls have been made from then through December 31, 1970. Five (5) calls were standby for fires in Harrisville and Marlborough. Twelve (12) emergency calls were made to transport patients to or from hospitals. We also participated in the Elliot Community Hospital Disaster Drill, in conjunction with other area ambulance squads.

The generosity of those who contributed to the Ambulance Fund, either in direct or memorial gifts, has been gratifying. These directly aid maintenance of the vehicle and renewal of supplies. The purchase of additional equipment for meeting a broader scope of emergencies is provided through your contributions, which we appreciate.

Service, at present, is part time: 6:00 P.M. to 6:00 A.M. on weekdays. Twenty-four (24) hour service on weekends and holidays. This reflects a need for more trained volunteer personnel. We do sponsor Red Cross Standard and Advanced First Aid training. Anyone interested in the courses may contact the Fire Chief in either town.

Regular meetings are held on the 1st Wednesday of each month at 7:30 P.M. at the Municipal Building, Marlborough. This includes a brief business meeting and program of drill and instruction.

NOTES

- a. The Manchester Savings Bank united with the Manchester Trust Company on October 31, 1970 and is now called the Manchester Bank. It is wholly owned by the Manchester Corporation, a holding company. Depositors in the Manchester Savings Bank on July 31, 1968 automatically become shareholders in the Manchester Corporation. Our larger accounts received Voting Trust Certificate Shares in the Manchester Corporation at no cost to us. At the time we received them, they had a value of approximately \$35 per share. We have added them to our holdings. Smaller accounts received fractional share scrip certificates which we sold on the market and the proceeds were added to the principal of each account. In line with previous practice, we are not showing any dollar value on shares of the Voting Trust retained.
- b. The American Telephone and Telegraph Company issued rights to buy additional stock in May. We sold our rights on the market and the proceeds were added to the principal of the various Hemenway funds involved, in the Peterborough Savings Bank.
- c. The First Pennsylvania Corporation split its stock on the basis of two shares for each share previously owned. We held 43 shares and this increased our holdings to 86 shares.
- d. Last year \$8.66 was withdrawn from the Bertha I. and Fred D. Hemenway Cemetery Fund (Pt) in Peterborough Savings Bank to buy a fractional share of First Pennsylvania Corporation stock to round out our holdings to even shares due to a rights offering by the Corporation. At the beginning of this year our records show 43 shares of First Pennsylvania Corporation stock owned + \$8.66. Actually, we owned 43 shares of stock and the \$8.66 is included in the value of the 43 shares. Previous practice has been not to show any dollar value for shares held by the trustees. This entry is simply a bookkeeping transaction to absorb the \$8.66 into the shares of stock owned.
- e. New funds received during the year were as follows:
 - \$200.00 Eino Hakala Estate Cemetery Fund by John Hakala for perpetual care of Lot #67 in Pine Grove Cemetery.
 - \$150.00 Fred R. Clark Cemetery Fund for perpetual care of Lot #115 in Pine Grove Cemetery.
 - \$250.00 Robert C. Derby—Oliver F. Derby Cemetery Fund for perpetual care of Lot #123 in Pine Grove Cemetery.
 - \$100.00 Maurice and Kathryn Miller Cemetery Fund for perpetual care of Lot #117 in Pine Grove Cemetery.
 - \$100.00 Addition to the existing Clark Hill Cemetery Fund.
- f. During 1970 Arthur H. Parker sold his cemetery lot back to the Cemetery Committee. On December 31, the principal and earned income in the Arthur H. Parker Cemetery Fund was paid to his widow when the trustees books were closed.
- g. In 1924 Mrs. Emma Wheeler (Frost) Hale, only surviving daughter of Rufus S. Frost, gave \$1000 to be added to her father's fund, thereby making a total of \$6000 in the fund. This gift has never been acknowledged in any previous trustee's report. The income from this fund goes toward the support of Frost Free Library.
- h. The trustees are required to be bonded separately under the jurisdiction of the Probate Court to handle the Maria Kimball Education Fund and the John Kimball Children's Health Fund. They are also required to file annual reports with the court on the management of the funds. Notice of the filing of these reports is required to be published in the local newspaper. Bond expense is \$45.00 per fund each year and the cost of publishing notices this year for the current report and for prior years which had not been filed was \$18.00 per fund.

REPORT OF THE MARLBOROUGH PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board was gratified to have the Town vote to adopt subdivision regulations at the 1970 Town Meeting. After a year of study and several meetings the Subdivision Regulations were written. These regulations were adopted on August 18, 1970 at a public hearing which explained their content.

We have been working all year on new zoning ordinances being written by Community Planning Services of Boston under the Government 701 plan. They should be completed soon.

William Malcolm of Hanover has been retained by the State to comprise a housing report required by the Government as part of our Comprehensive Plan.

On June 9, 1970 we held a meeting to present our Comprehensive Plan to the Town and to allow people to discuss Town problems and ask questions. Many of the 75 people attending suggested this be an annual affair where "gripes" can be expressed, questions asked, suggestions made and the air be cleared of misunderstandings that may arise.

In the months to follow we will have meetings on the completed Comprehensive Plan and our new Zoning Ordinances. We hope you will become familiar with the Plan and come to question anything you may not understand.

We would like to form a Beautification-Conservation Committee. If anyone would be interested in being on the Committee please contact any board member.

The board is appreciative of the help received from Robert Allen and Ted Kelsey of the U. S. Government Soil Conservation Service and Michael Blake, Assistant State Planner.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

Enrollment

There has been a significant increase in enrollment in the last two years. This has come about mainly in the elementary school, and from families moving into the community rather than from the birth rate of the community itself. This has been partially offset by the fact that the birth rate for the first grade children who were born in Marlborough during the last two years has been low. Beginning in 1972, and holding fairly constant for several years, the first grade enrollment of children who were born in Marlborough will be back to an average of 30-35. If we continue to have the elementary school in-migration that we have experienced over the last two years, we can expect to have a continued significant increase in elementary school enrollment.

School Staff — Grades 1-12

Mrs. Eleanor Johnson replaced Mrs. Janice Coates in the primary grades. Mrs. Johnson is a graduate of Keene State College, and had previously taught in Marlborough.

In the Junior-Senior High School we have three new faculty members. Mr. Jeffrey McLynch has replaced Mr. Daniel Manning in Mathematics. Mr. McLynch is a 1970 graduate of Keene State College. Mr. James Lincoln has replaced Mr. Robert Anderson in Physical Education and Varsity Sports. Mr. Lincoln is a 1970 graduate of Plymouth State College. Mr. Joseph Puleo has replaced Mr. Ernst Ketel in Science. Mr. Puleo is a 1970 graduate of the University of New Hampshire.

Program and Curriculum Grades 1-12

The major emphasis in the Junior-Senior High School has been in the Vocational-Occupational area. We have increased the amount of time and effort in Guidance. The important task here is to help students to know themselves better, and then, to relate this knowledge to the various families of occupations. The purpose of education is to assist people in adjusting to the changing demands of life in its various aspects such as intellectual, social, and vocational. It is Education's responsibility to diagnose the needs of the individual, and as much as is humanly possible meet those individual needs. Students have invariably not given serious thought to the vocational aspect as it is difficult for someone at that age to pinpoint an exact choice. However, this difficulty should not discourage students from giving serious consideration to their life's work, nor should it discourage adults from assisting them in every possible manner.

In line with this reasoning, we have added the following courses to the curriculum:

- Bookkeeping II
- Shorthand II
- Clerical Office Practice
- General Business
- Electronics
- Orientation to the World of Work

We have also inaugurated a Work Study Program. These students take their academic work in the morning, and leave school shortly after noon. The on-the-job and school activities of the students are being coordinated by Mr. James Huntley.

The concept of ability grouping and leveling has been extended so that it now includes the areas of Reading, Language Arts and Mathematics in Grades 1 - 6. Many of the students now spend their day with more than one teacher. This gives us more than one viewpoint of a student's ability and progress.

The student's day is broken down into two sections. The skill area (Reading, Language Arts, and Mathematics) and the self-contained unit (Social Sciences, Science, Music, Penmanship, etc.). Class enrollment in the former is determined according to ability, and in the latter according to random selection.

We have expanded the Programmed Reading so that all of the First Grade children are now involved in this approach. We have also added Programmed Reading in the Second Grade as well as the Fifth Grade as we believe Second and Fifth Graders have skill needs that can be met better with the Programmed approach than the Lippincott.

We have a Future Teachers of America Organization in the secondary school, and we are looking forward to developing increased interest in the Educational Profession as well as to receiving individualized help for many of our elementary school pupils.

We have had positive results ever since the Individualized Program originally began with Reading several years ago. One of the more important, if not the most important result, is the sense of comfort, achievement and *success* that the student receives from this type of approach. With further study on our part, we hope to continue this movement toward Individualized Education.

We have added volumes to the elementary school library, and hope to add more volumes as well as make further improvements this summer. The library has proven to be an excellent addition to the Reading Program, and the books are receiving heavy circulation.

Once again, we would like to commend the Monadnock Children's Service Center for its excellent assistance in the diagnosis and prescription of educational programs for individual students.

The School Plant

The major changes in this area have been in the secondary school. We have painted all of the corridors, both ceilings and walls, nine classrooms and the kitchen off the gymnasium. We have also repaired the heating system so that it is now more efficient and uniform throughout the building.

In the elementary school, we replaced the front doors and the emergency panic bars to these doors. As this building had received

a considerable amount of attention the previous year, we did not become involved in any other projects.

We hope to maintain this emphasis on painting with the idea of completing both buildings. Once this goal is attained, we will be able to set up a painting schedule.

A considerable amount of equipment and material has been purchased for the elementary program as well as the secondary program.

We have continued and added to the activity period :

- Drama Workshop
- School Newspaper
- Creative Writing & Public Speaking
- Electrical Club
- Art Club
- Knitting Club
- Chess Club
- Girls' Woodworking Club
- Boys' Chef Club
- Leaders Club
- Cheerleading
- Student Council

In addition to the activities that take place, there are numerous social, cultural and fund raising activities that are sponsored after school by the various classes and activity groups. These are under the direction of faculty advisors. At the present time, Marlborough belongs to the Granite State League, and has athletic teams in Soccer, Basketball and Baseball. The school is also represented by the girls in Basketball and Softball.

As a result of a great deal of hard work by both Coaches and Athletes, our success has improved considerably within recent months. The baseball team had a record of 10 victories and 9 defeats, and missed a position in the tournament by hundredths of a percentage point. This was accomplished with a light hitting team that stressed pitching and defense. The Soccer team had a record of 3 victories, 9 defeats and 1 tie. The record is not indicative, however, of the team's performance for the boys were in every game until the very end. In fact, most of the defeats were by the margin of one goal and four of the games went into double overtime.

The boys basketball team presently has a record of seven victories and three defeats and the girls basketball team has a record of three victories and three defeats. Both appear to be headed toward successful seasons. The most impressive aspect of this extracurricular activity, however, has been the enthusiasm of the students and the number who actively participate. We would like to commend the Cheerleading squad and its advisor for their fine efforts in helping to maintain this enthusiasm.

It is extremely encouraging to people in the educational profession to see the intense effort that people in Marlborough are making to support the education of their children.

We are most concerned with meeting individual needs on the elementary level where a good beginning is of such vital importance to the child's future educational program. We hope to maintain and improve the program, we feel that it is necessary to include a Special Education Resource Room in the Marlborough Curriculum. In every community in the United States there are children who can learn, but who must have more "teacher time" and special training if they are to succeed. Many of these children merely slip through school as very poor students. Others drop out because of frustration and inability to perform at all. In the long run, this is a tremendous drain, because in many instances these children become non-contributing adults in that society must support them. The greatest tragedy is the enjoyment and personal satisfaction that these people never derive from life.

I realize the sacrifice that I am asking people to make and can only add that I wish we had more state and federal support. I would like to take this occasion to personally thank all of the citizens of Marlborough for their support. I would also like to extend my thanks to the School Board, Administration, Staff and Students for their sincere and dedicated support.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

We would like to begin our report this year by raising several questions of educational theory:

1. Is it our job to provide equal educational opportunities for each child, or should we provide education for the needs of the individual child?
2. Is our accountability for the educational success of each child a measurement of his success against a set of achievement standards, or an evaluation of his own personal progress towards self-fulfillment and adjustment to his social environment?
3. Does freedom mean permissiveness?
4. Can one learn self-discipline by living in an autocratic environment?
5. Do children learn best in the usual building boxes (classrooms), or in a variety of large and small groups?
6. Is it enough to teach the skills of reading, writing, and arithmetic, and convey a fund of knowledge achieved by the adult world?
7. Do our children really need library and guidance services, and opportunities in art, music, physical and health education as recommended by the new Elementary Minimum Standards?
8. Does the school have a task to perform separate from the home and community, or should we all be engaged in the joint task of education?
9. How can we prevent our children from using alcohol and drugs when it is the prevailing habit of many older people whose lives are everyday examples?
10. Does the school district have a responsibility for early childhood education, and for providing something extra for those children who start with many disadvantages?
11. Why should the school provide facilities and services for lunches?
12. Should a school system provide a strong college preparatory program and neglect vocational education?
13. Must we limit our educational opportunities for children because of the lack of dollars in a nation where TV and two-car families are the rule, and cosmetic and alcohol sales go higher and higher?

14. Should the responsibility of the public school system be to pass on the skills and knowledge of past achievement, or does it have a real obligation to help society move successfully into the future?

These are questions currently debated in colleges, by school faculties, and undoubtedly in the homes of our towns. Sooner or later, they will be removed from the realm of theoretical conversation. People in our communities are interested in the stake of our pupils, and are responsible for the quality of education offered. In the next decade, many of these issues will be settled. But, we must deal with practicalities of 1970, 1971, and 1972.

The new supervisory union organization is working well. An organization chart is included in the annual report. A large increase in the budget of the union is primarily to activate a new data processing system. Greater educational and administrative service is promised when we become skilled in translating its potential into reality.

We think that your Planning Committee, with John Mitchell's leadership, has made good progress. They have completed the elementary portion of the study, and are now reviewing the secondary curriculum. Some of the suggestions will be implemented soon. Others require expensive outlays for personnel and buildings. The new New Hampshire Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools has been considered. The District must develop a plan by September, 1972, and add services by 1975, if the elementary schools are to be approved.

The recommendations of the study by the New England Association for Secondary Schools and Colleges have been carefully considered by your faculty and Board. Unless a district has much wealth, it is impossible for a small high school to provide the breadth and depth in curriculum that the Association feels desirable. Practical steps have been taken to bring improvements. Our principal writes of significant changes in his report.

The majority of our faculty members has remained with us, and continue to serve us effectively. We have fine leadership from our principal, Mr. Croteau. We were able to employ four new staff members to replace those who left June, 1970. They are demonstrating their competence in our school: Mrs. Eleanor Johnson, elementary; Mr. James Lincoln, physical education and coaching; Mr. Jeffrey McLynch, math; Mr. Joseph Puleo, science. Marlborough is to be congratulated for providing an equitable salary schedule that is reasonably competitive with districts of its size. We feel that the new supervisory union organization is providing more direct service and help to your principal and teachers in the classroom.

Annually, our Board strives to bring about some necessary improvements in buildings and maintenance. We now have two full-time custodians. Repair dollars have been stretched by services these

men render in addition to cleaning. Federal O.E.O. dollars provide summer employment for students. Our principal reports considerable progress in painting, repairs, and replacements. There will be additional forward steps if the new budget is supported.

Some of us are particularly interested and thrilled by the inter-scholastic records our teams are producing.

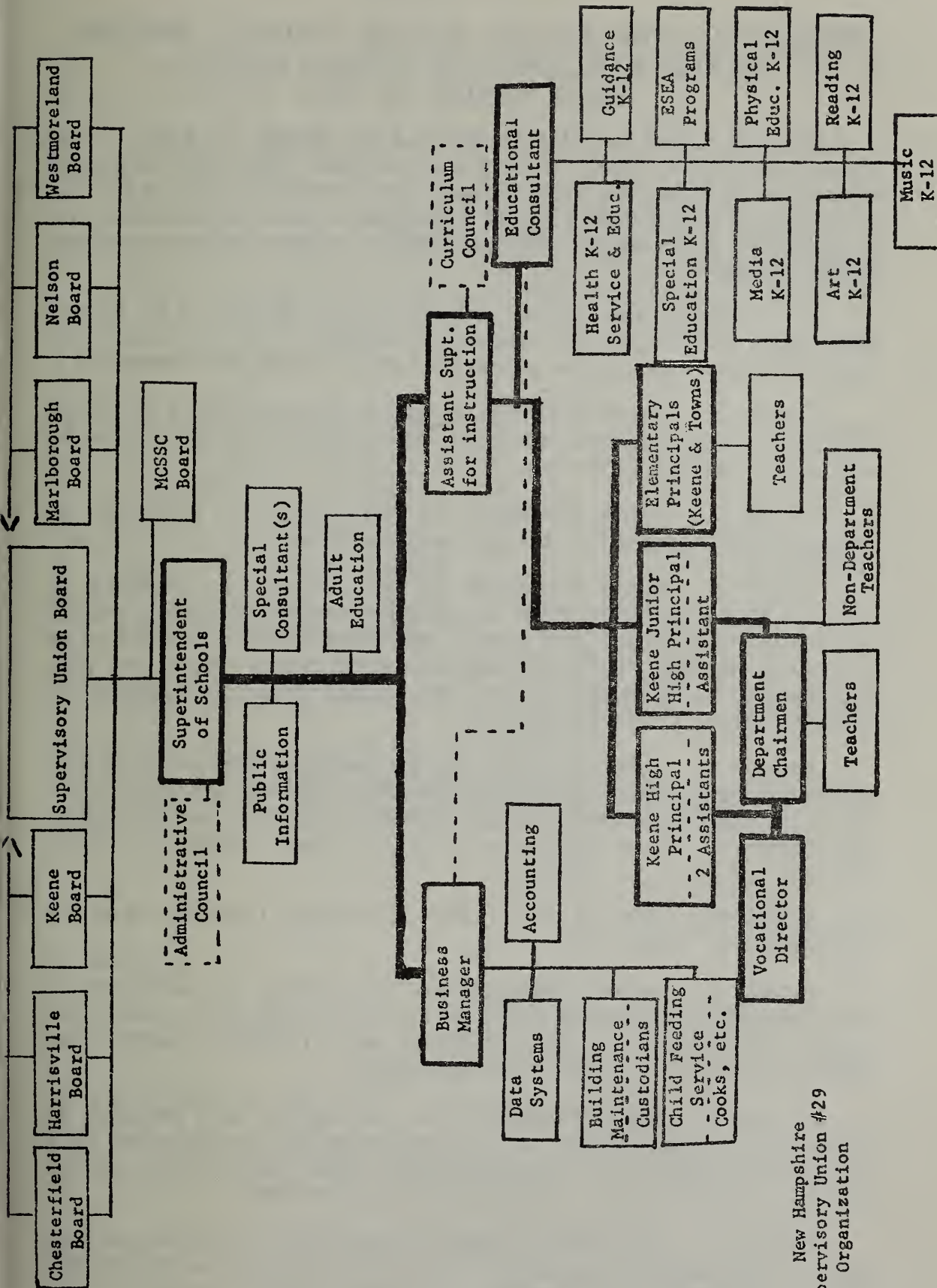
The special services of transportation, health, and lunch programs are functioning very well due to the conscientious performance of those involved. They are so necessary to the on-going operation of our school.

We were saddened by the death of our friend and associate, Alfred Lambert, just a few days before his well earned retirement was to begin. As a native of your town, his family is well known to you. For many years he devoted his talent and energies to the welfare of children. Many students have grown up to be fine citizens because of his efforts. The area is filled with former students who loved him. Like the flowers from his greenhouse, grown by his lovely wife and him, he brightened the lives of many, many people.

The most difficult hurdle that our District faces annually is to provide the funds for a quality school program. Many of you know that the equalized valuation for each child in Marlborough is about two-thirds of the average in New Hampshire. This means immediately that our town has to provide fifty percent more local tax dollars just to be "average" in outlay for each pupil. The New Hampshire Foundation Aid Program should fill this gap, but it is providing less than one-third of what the statutes say should be provided. Consequently, the taxpayers in your town must make an unusual effort. You have done so in the past. Our town produces boys and girls of as fine quality as in other communities. We cannot justify shortchanging them simply because Marlborough doesn't have the resources to "go it alone." We have endeavored to develop a conservative budget with growth areas only where they are most imperative.

I discern a high level of local pride and dedication which will lead you once again to provide good services and facilities for your boys and girls. We hope that in the near future our state will accept its responsibility, get off the bottom, and help us to move ahead. It is a pleasure to work with you and for you.

**MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING
OF THE MARLBOROUGH SCHOOL DISTRICT
HELD MARCH 14, 1970**

Meeting called to order at 10:00 A.M., March 14, 1970 by Assistant Moderator Elmer Grover and warrant read. The assistant moderator declared the meeting open under Article 1 calling for the election of a Moderator, a Clerk, a Member of the School Board for three years, a Treasurer and an Auditor under the Non-Partisan Ballot System.

The meeting was further called to order at 8:00 P.M. by the moderator to act upon the following subjects. The moderator declared the meeting open for action on Article 2 through 8 inclusive.

Article 2. Voted favorably on the motion of Richard E. Butler that the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen be accepted as printed in the annual town report.

Article 3. Voted favorably on the motion of Alphonse A. Despres that we refer this article back to article 1.

Article 4. Voted favorably on the motion of Frederick P. Harrsen that the district vote to authorize the School Board to make application for, accept, and spend, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.

Article 5. Voted favorably on the motion of Richard E. Butler that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$348,732.50 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

Voted favorably on the motion of William Cumings that the polls be closed (9:53 P.M.)

Article 6. Voted favorably on the motion of Alphonse A. Despres that the district authorize the School Board to participate in an Authorized Regional Enrollment Area (AREA) Study Committee as part of its overall planning effort.

Article 7. Voted favorably on the motion of Frederick P. Harrsen that the district vote to authorize the employment of a Teacher Consultant for New Hampshire Supervisory Union #29 as provided in RSA 186:11 XII and XXIV as amended.

Article 8. Mr. Richard Butler thanked all of the citizens who served in an advisory capacity to the School Study Committee and also to Assistant Superintendent of Schools Alfred Lambert for all the service he has given the Union and the District. A rising vote of thanks was extended Mr. Lambert who is retiring this year.

Mr. George Cass, Business Manager of the Union, thanked all of the townspeople who assisted during and after the fire in the elementary building.

No further business appearing under Article 8, the meeting returned to Article 1.

The ballots were examined and counted and the votes for the various candidates were tallied by the moderator, in the presence of the district clerk and other election officials. When the counting was completed, the results of the counts were declared and publicly announced by the moderator as follows:

SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

The Marlborough School Study Committee has been meeting regularly since November 1969.

We have thoroughly examined our present Educational Program and attempted to discover ways by which it can be strengthened and enriched.

The basis for our study have been: The State Board of Education's Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools, which are to be effected in 1972. The Report of the Visiting Committee from the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, (a copy of their report is available to you at this meeting). The responses to the Advisory Committee's Questionnaire. Information and advice furnished by the Marlborough School Board, Administration, Staff, Graduates and Students. The Supervisory Union #29 Administrative Offices and Staff who furnished statistics and data. Consultation with the Advisory Committee to assist us in an effective administration of our responsibilities and referral to substantive and responsible literature to broaden our perspective and develop our knowledge of subjects under consideration.

In order to reinforce our discussions we have attended classes in our schools and supplemented these with visits to Epping Elementary and High School, Epping, New Hampshire, the Special Education Class at Wheelock School, and the Open Classroom Concept at Jonathan Daniels Elementary School, both in Keene, New Hampshire.

A sincere effort has been made to compile an impartial and objective report of our educational program.

We have completed and compiled a report on the Elementary School Program and it includes many recommendations for your consideration.

Several of the Committee's recommendations have been implemented during the current school year. Some of them had been under previous consideration by the School Administration; others received our enthusiastic endorsement and were made available to the students without delay.

Among these additions to our Educational Program are the following:

Individual Instruction on Musical Instruments.

Purchase of Up-dated Science and Social Studies Text Books.

In-Service Education for the teachers to coordinate teaching methods with the material in the new text books.

Physical Education Classes on a once per week basis for all Elementary Students.

At the top of our list of priorities for the Elementary School, is the addition of a Special Education or Resource Room, to provide a more effective educational experience for children at the first four levels.

The School Board has included in this year's budget an item to provide funds for its implementation. We strongly urge the Citizens of Marlborough to support the Board and the Administration by voting for the expenditure of these funds. This will provide a very important and necessary addition to our program.

We have finished our examination of the Secondary Program and are presently analyzing our findings and compiling the report on this phase of our study.

As was the case during our study of the Elementary School Program we found the Administration and Staff conscientiously reinforcing our educational program. A prime example of this is the reactivation of The Future Teachers of America and the establishment of the National Honor Society, both activities strongly recommended and supported by this committee.

This Committee is impressed with the overall quality of our staff and the atmosphere of vitality and enthusiasm that prevails in our schools.

We hope to have our final report of the entire educational program complete and in print by early April, at which time we are planning a public meeting to provide an opportunity for open discussion and evaluation.

Early in our study it became evident that a more effective means of communicating school activities to the public was necessary. The administration is making effective use of the local newspapers and radio stations and the display of posters throughout the town is being utilized in an attempt to keep the public better informed.

The Committee would like to see two way communication established. We urge you to visit your schools, ask questions of the School Board, Principal and Teachers so that they can serve you more effectively. By doing so you will become acquainted with our educational program and the important role it plays in our community.

To establish better communications and to provide the public with the opportunity to play a more active role in the operation of their schools, this committee strongly urges that the Marlborough School Study Committee be perpetuated. New members could be added periodically to maintain a viable group and to stimulate an on-going community discussion of our educational needs.

Perhaps this recommendation is the most important contribution by this committee.

Grateful acknowledgement is extended to the School Board of Education, our Principal, Gerald Croteau, the Teachers and to the

Administration and Staff of Supervisory Union #29, for their patient, sympathetic and understanding cooperation.

Report of the Forest Fire Warden and District Chief

The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet in part because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by debris burning, children and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture — to bring about this change we make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow a permit to burn must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to prior to 9:00 A.M. and after 5:00 P.M. with the following exceptions:

Commercial or Industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but only with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.

2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children, keep matches out of reach of children, this action will help to prevent fires and may save a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?
3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help," and invites you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.
