TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Rye in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Rye on Tuesday the ninth day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to vote upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk. a Treasurer and a Highway Agent for the ensuing year and a Selectmen, a Cemetery Trustee, a Library Trustee, a Trustee of Trust Funds and to elect two members of the Budget Committee for the ensuing three years.
- Article 2. To choose all necessary officers for the Rye School District in accordance with the statutory procedure adopted by said District at its March 1962 annual meeting.

You are hereby further notified to adjourn to meet at the Rye Junior High School on the twentieth day of March, next, at seven o'clock in the evening to vote upon the following subjects:

- Article 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money from the Trustees of Trust Funds.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to allow five percent discount on all property taxes paid on or before October 1, 1971.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease Sawyer's Beach, so called, from the owners for another year.
- Article 7. On petition of the members of the Rye Conservation Commission, Hope Wright, Chairman, and 15 other registered voters of Rye, N. H., to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Conservation Fund which was established by vote at the 1970 Town Meeting.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) to com-

plete the baseball field at the Rye Recreation Area which work was commenced under Article 15 of the 1970 annual Town Warrant.

- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a four wheel combination tractor-plow and wing vehicle and to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-three thousand dollars (\$33,000) for the same by issuing town notes or bonds in accordance with RSA Chapter 33 the "Municipal Finance Act."
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) to augment the appropriation under Article 22 of the Warrant for the 1970 Town Meeting (\$500) to complete an engineering study of the water sources in the area of Greene and Herne gravel pits.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a three member unpaid committee known as the Refuse Disposal Planning Committee to meet with the Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Committee comprised of similar committees from area communities for the purpose of studying the advisability of establishing a Regional Refuse Disposal District under Chapter 53-B Revised Statutes Annotated and to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) as the Towns contribution to the Regional Committee.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand nine hundred forty-four dollars (\$3,944) as a contribution from the Town of Rye to the Portsmouth District Nursing Association.
- Article 13. On petition of Thomas F. Allen and 17 other registered voters: To see if the Town of Rye, New Hampshire will vote to direct the Selectmen to put out for competitive bid the contract to process the Town tax bills and compile the tax inventory on data processing equipment, bids to be in the hands of the Selectmen by June 30, 1971.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Town Ordinance to be known as the "Noise Ordinance."

"Noise Ordinance"

No person shall operate any vehicle on any way in the Town of Rye so as to make any loud, unusual or other unnecessary noise as hereinafter defined.

DEFINITIONS

- 1. VEHICLE. The word "vehicle," shall include bus, highway equipment, motorcycle, motor vehicle, semi-trailer, sidecar, tractor, trailer or other vehicle, all as defined by RSA 259:1.
- 2. WAY. The word "way," shall include crosswalk, intersecting way or other public highway, or other way, all as defined by RSA 259:1.
- 3. LOUD, UNUSUAL OR OTHER UNNECESSARY NOISE. The words "loud, unusual or other unnecessary noise," shall include any noise occasioned by any one or more of the following actions of the operator of any vehicle:
- a. Misuse of power exceeding tire traction limits in acceleration, sometime known as "laying down rubber" or "peeling rubber," or
- b. Misuse of braking power exceeding tire traction limits in deceleration where there is no emergency, or
- c. Rapid acceleration by means of quick upshifting of transmission gears with either a clutch and manual transmission or automatic transmission, or
- d. Rapid deceleration by means of quick downshifting of transmission gears with either a clutch and manual transmission or an automatic transmission, or
- e. Racing of engines by manipulation of the accelerator, gas petal, carburetor, or gear selection whether the vehicle is either in motion or standing still, or
- f. The blowing of any horn except as a warning signal or the use of any other noise making device whether the vehicle is either in motion or standing still.

PENALTY

Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be liable to a penalty of not more than fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each offense.

- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to enact the following Ordinance to be known as the "Dog Control Ordinance."
- Article 1. It shall be unlawful for the owner or keeper of a dog to permit a dog so owned or kept to run at large without being controlled by a leash, except upon his own property or while hunting under the direct control of his owner or keeper.

Article II. The police shall impound all dogs on public property in violation of Article I and upon written complaint of the owner of private property, the police may impound any dog unlawfully on said private property.

Article III. The police upon impounding any dog may make a formal complaint against the owner or keeper of the dog in the Municipal Court of Rye or may, upon a first violation only, return the dog to its owner with verbal warning.

Article IV. Any person violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$10 for each such offense.

Article 16. (a) To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget submitted by the Budget Committee and pass any vote in relation thereto, and

(b) To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Selectmen's Report

To the Inhabitants of Rye, New Hampshire:

The past year has been a rather significant period for the Town. As a result of action taken at last Town Meeting, the Town is presently undergoing reevaluation by the State Tax Commission. Hopefully, this will alleviate the problem of inequities that persist in the smaller communities.

Shortly after Town Meeting, the entire police force with one exception, resigned without prior notice. Thanks to the help of a great many people, the Town was able to continue police protection during this crisis and we now have a full time police force again, consisting of a chief and four officers, the latest officer being hired within the last two months. The Selectmen extend special thanks to City Marshal Stanton Remick of Portsmouth and the Portsmouth Police Officers who assisted our department during this period.

The new bridge at Rye Harbor is well under construction and should be completed shortly after the ground thaws. The Selectmen are requesting an additional appropriation this year to cover costs which have run slightly in excess of previous estimates.

In accordance with Article 8 of last years Warrant as amended, the Selectmen have attempted to contact the supposed owner of A, B, C, D, E, and F Streets. To date, the only response has been a statement by Mrs. Brown's son that he would discuss the situation with his mother. There is presently litigation in Rockingham County Superior Court concerning ownership of these streets.

Negotiations are presently underway with the attorney for Mrs. Lavina Havey concerning the possibility of purchase of her land off Washington Road. The Selectmen have had the property appraised but at this report the parties are quite far apart. Hopefully, some firm recommendation can be presented at the 1971 Town

Meeting.

The Selectmen retained the firm of McKenna Associates of Portsmouth to investigate the possibility of a water source in the "Herne" and "Greene" pits near the dump. No old drill holes were found and the engineers recommend a further more detailed study. The Selectmen are requesting \$4,000.00 for this purpose, although, it was recently learned that some studies in that area were conducted for the Rye Water District and perhaps they will prove of value.

This years audit of the Town books was performed by Cushman Colby and Stephen Henneberry, C.P.A.'s. The change was brought about because of the Budget Committees questioning the accuracy of the books at last years Town Meeting. An interim investigation was performed by Natheniel Bigelow, C.P.A.'s at a cost of \$1,000.00. The cost of this years audit will approximate 5 times the cost of last years audit.

No list of assessed valuations was published as was voted at last years meeting because no funds were appropriated. As soon as the new assessments are completed by the Tax Commission, a complete list will be published.

As usual, the Rye Ambulance Corps deserves the thanks of the Town for another year of excellent service.

The Memorial Day observance was again a success and we wish to thank all those who participated.

In my opinion, the accompanying balance sheets and related statements of operations present fairly the financial position of the various funds for the Town of Rye, New Hampshire at December 31, 1970, with the exception noted above, and the results of their operations for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applicable to governmental entities.

TOWN OF RYE NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 1970

- NOTE 1: The CAPITAL RESERVE FUND balance per the December 31, 1969 annual report was estimated to be \$1,430.20.

 The balance has been restated to the actual amount for inclusion in the comparative balance sheet at December 31, 1970. The bank account representing the FUND is in the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds.
- NOTE 2: NOTES PAYABLE per the December 31, 1969 annual report were stated at \$58,275.00. Additional notes payable of \$29,000.00 pertaining to bridge construction were determined to be also outstanding at that date and the balance has been restated at \$87,275.00. Current portion of NOTES PAYABLE amounted to \$10,800.00 at December 31, 1970.
- NOTE 3: FUND BALANCE (DEBT) was stated at \$9,732.99 per the December 31, 1969 annual report. The affect of Notes 1 and 2 have been reflected in the reinstated amount of \$38,762.99.
- NOTE 4: RECEIPTS AND REIMBURSEMENTS as shown on the STATEMENT OF APPROPRIATIONS AND EXPENDITURES are used to increase the TOTAL AMOUNT AVAILABLE. This is not an accepted accounting procedure, however, the practice is generally recognized by municipalities.
- NOTE 5: The detail of investments shown as part of the SUMMARY OF TRUST FUND PRINCIPAL, INCOME AND INVEST-MENTS at December 31, 1969 was printed in error and does not pertain to the Town of Rye, New Hampshire.

Highway Agent's Report

To the Citizens of Rye:

The demands for service has greatly increased in the past few years. The demand for leveling and paving instead of oiling and sanding seems to be the foremost demand of the people.

The cost of leveling and paving all our roads would be about two hundred and seventy-five to three hundred thousand dollars. Oiling and sanding costs between fifteen and sixteen hundred dollars per mile. This past year we leveled and paved one half mile on Central and Causeway Roads, also about one mile of leveling on South Road.

Our winter problems have been greatly increased by people plowing snow from their driveways into the road. In many cases this has narrowed the roads and we have no machine large enough to push these piles off the traveled part of the road. Some push snow into the road after we have plowed, causing hazards to the ones who travel these roads. There is no doubt in my mind about the ones

doing this being responsible for any damage in case of accidents caused by these hazards.

We have a great number of trees in town that should be taken down. Most of these trees have to be topped out and this means hiring men who are trained in this type of work with special equipment. It will mean a larger amount will have to be raised for care of trees.

The present method of dumping seems to be working out quite well. There are still some problems that arise from time to time. While we were able to get gravel for cover this year, it is quite possible we may have to buy fill before another year ends. The amount of material being dumped in our dump has increased considerable since the surrounding towns have tightened their restrictions. I think we should do the same as our neighboring town and require a car sticker and pass for dump use.

Any contractor who is hauling material from a job he is on shall use the pass belonging to the person he is working for or they will not be permitted to dump. In this way, you will be able to know where he is hauling from.

The brush dump, so called, was started some years ago to take care of brush and cut up trees, old lumber and refuse from remodeling of old or building of new houses. As there is no attendant our residents dump anything they feel like there. Some even dump their garbage because it is nearer than the rubbish dump. If this continues, it may be necessary to limit the open days to one or two days a week or whenever the town can afford to have a man to attend it.

Frank R. Wilson, Jr., was appointed Assistant Fire Chief April 27, 1970.

The Department has held many training sessions, with a great amount of interest shown by the members. There was a house at 329 Sagamore Road that was burned down for Fire Training purposes on March 1. 1970. The men were shown different nozzle settings. hose layouts, pump operation, and exposure protection for the surrounding properties. The men got a lot out of this on-the-job training, so called. There were six men that attended the annual Fire School held at Fitzwilliam, N. H., sponsored by the Fire Chief' Club of N. H. Four men attended the Bomb Search and Evacuation course held at the Durham Fire Station. We have been able to have the New Hampshire Fire Training Service come in and hold a Pump course. This was held once a week for six weeks with a total of twenty hours of training with our own equipment. We have engaged the New Hampshire Fire Training Service to start a Basic Fire Fighters Course January 11, 1971 at the Fire Station.

There was a written examination for the position of 2nd Assistant Fire Chief, the man to come from the

call department. The examination was open to anyone who wanted to take it, both in the department and any outside, as well. There were only four men who took the written examination and all four men passed it. This made all four eligible for the oral examination. The oral examination was given by three instructors of the New Hampshire Fire Training Service.

There was a committee of three appointed to check into the possibility of increasing the benefits of the insurance policy that the Town now has on the call firemen in case an injury occurs while fighting a fire. Unfortunately this increased coverage did not go into effect until November 23, 1970 at which time the Rye Firemen's Relief Association voted to pay \$54.60 to cover the increased coverage until the policy expires at which time it is hoped the Town will pick up the increase price in their budget for 1971. Formerly, in case of injury, the man would receive the sum of \$25.00 per week if unable to work. Under the new coverage he will receive \$65.00 per week and with Workmen's Compensation, we feel that this would be a more realistic figure at today's prices. I might add that the increase for this insurance is \$1.00 per month per man. We are talking only \$165.00 increase. This amounts to double the cost for nearly three times the coverage.

It was unfortunate that we had a man injured at a Fire on November 1, 1970 and this coverage was not available to him.

Here is a list of calls this Department has answered this year: seven flooded oil burners, one truck fire, three calls to check out smoke, twelve building fires, six car fires, two clothes dryers, fourteen grass and brush fires, one motorcycle, one rubbish dump, three calls to wash down gasoline, one call each for tree and electrical fire. One call each to the following under the Mutual Aid System: Stratham, Greenland, North Hampton and New Castle.

Rye has received Mutual Aid assistance from Ports-

mouth four times, North Hampton three times, Hampton Beach one and Stratham one.

There were 349 Burning permits issued, 96 permits issued for back yard Barbecue fires and 287 Beach Fires permits issued.

The Fire Department Auxiliary has purchased material for the draperies in the station and had Mr. Robert Barber make the draperies. A job well done.

A Turkey Raffle is held each year to support the children's annual Christmas party. Tickets may be bought at the Station in November of each year for the turkey raffle.

The Christmas party for the children was a real success this year. There were Floats in the parade and we had three prizes for the three best floats in the parade. They were awarded to Humpty Dumpty School 1st prize, Portsmouth Fire Department 2nd Prize and the Rye Darning Needle Club 3rd Prize. There were a little more than 250 children on hand at the town hall to be greeted by Santa.

The Red Sleigh that Santa rode in the parade was donated by Mr. Willard H. Drake to the Fire Department for future years. Many many thanks to Mr. Drake for the sleigh.

Mr. Robert Barber covered the seat to the sleigh to match the red paint. Many many thanks for a job well done.

Report of the Fire Wards

During 1970, the Fire Wards held nine regular meetings open to all Rye Firemen and any other interested persons. The Fire Wards also held nine executive meetings with the Fire Chief and 1st Assistant Fire Chief present.

This year some re-organization has taken place in the department. In April, the Fire Wards, upon the recommendation of the Fire Chief, appointed Frank Wilson, Jr., as 1st Assistant Fire Chief. Competitive examinations were held and these were conducted by an impartial panel of out-of-town firemen for the position of 2nd Assistant Fire Chief. As a result of the examination and upon the recommendation of the Fire Chief, Mr. George Moynahan was appointed 2nd Assistant Fire Chief.

The Fire Chief and Fire Wards have presented to the Selectmen the operating budget for 1971. In general it is about 10% higher than for 1970, but in these days of continually rising prices the Fire Wards feel that it is justified considering the protection that it provides.

The Fire Wards wish to commend Fire Chief Richard Eaton on the training sessions that he has provided for the instruction of the firemen. We feel that it is a decided step in the right direction in up-dating our Fire Department and in providing better protection for the Town.

The Fire Wards wish to call your attention that the TELEPHONE LINE 964-5521 should *Never* be used for business purposes. It is for emergencies ONLY — *FIRE POLICE* — or *AMBULANCE*—. For any other purpose call 964-5523 or 964-6775.

Forest Fire Warden's Report

This will be my last report as your forest fire warden. I started years ago as a fireman in the Old Rye Beach Precinct Department and have taken great pride in helping our present department grow into a very efficient group. After having held all the offices in our department and my present one for twenty-five years, I find it difficult to give up an activity I have been interested in for so long. However, I feel it is in the best interests of the Town that younger interested men take over.

I am very grateful for the many courtesies shown me over the years by the people of Rye and the Department.

The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet in part because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by debris burning, children and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture—to bring about this change we make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow a permit to burn must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning such burning is restricted by regulation to prior to 9:00 A. M., and after 5:00 P. M., with the following exceptions:

Commercial or Industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but ony with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.

2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children, keep matches out of reach of children, this action will help to prevent fires and may save

a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?

3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help," and invites you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.

Planning Board

Several changes in the membership of the Planning Board occurred in 1970. Mr. Charles Tallman took over the chairmanship from Mr. Leon Valley whose term expired. Mr. Melville Clarke resigned to devote more time to his duties as Fish and Game Commissioner. Mr. Henry Rabchenuk and Mr. Frank Ciolek were appointed to replace them, Mr. Ciolek assuming the duties of Clerk of the Board.

Following a public hearing in February, the revisions in the Subdivision Regulations were finalized and the 1970 printing issued in March. This brings our town subdivision regulations into accord with recent changes in State statutes and provides a good complement to the 1969 Zoning Ordinance.

During the year the Planning Board was asked to

consider fifteen subdivision proposals. Of these, four were approved after formal hearings. A fifth was rejected. A sixth fell within the jurisdiction of the Rye Beach Precinct Planning Board and was granted by them. A seventh was signed off by the Selectmen when Town Counsel judged that the Planning Board had insufficient evidence to successfully contest a threatened suit to validate a 1963 plan submission. This developer is being advised that non-conforming lots of record in this subdivision must be handled so as to meet the requirements of the 1969 Rye Zoning Ordinance.

With each succeeding year, the value of having good minutes of all Planning Board meetings becomes more evident. They serve as prime arbiter of actions taken in the event cases are reopened in future years. Their preservation in a central filing facility is essential.

Members of the Planning Board attended two public hearings held by the Tidal Wetlands Study Commission of the State. Setting policies of land use where wetlands are involved will be one of the more important questions facing the Planning Board in the next year or two.

I thank the members of the Planning Board for the hard work they have put in this year. Much has been learned which will contribute to smoother processing of future subdivision applications.

Report of the Board of Adjustment

The Board of Adjustment consist of five members: Ernest E. Tucker, Philip C. Hoyt, William E. Ashley, Nancy L. Rand, and George C. Jones, appointed by the Selectmen for five years each. This Board is established to act on certain requests officially submitted and referred to

them. The major duties of the Board are to hold public hearings and take action on appeals for variances from the terms of the zoning ordinance or decisions of the Building Inspector.

The Board meets monthly, normally the second Tuesday of each month, at the Town Hall. The Board may hold special meetings if it is considered necessary. When a request for a variance is received by the Board, an announcement of the public hearing is made. The request is published in the Portsmouth Herald and posted at a public building. A copy of the proposed hearing announcement is sent to property abutters in order to notify them of the request for a variance and the date and place of the hearing.

After the Board has taken action the applicant is so notified and a copy of the minutes of the meeting and the action taken is submitted to the Building Inspector and the Selectmen. Copies of all Board Meeting minutes are maintained in the office of the Fire Station. These are available for review by interested townspeople.

Protection and restoration of the environment in which we live is of vital interest to all of us. Members of conservation organizations, the Civic League and a few interested citizens have attended the Board of Adjustment meetings and made their thoughts known.

Their views to granting variances to the Town Zoning Ordinance has been helpful to Board members.

It is hoped that more citizens will take an active part in these meetings.

During the year 1971, Building Inspectors office hours will be Thursday evenings from 7:30 P. M., to 9:30 P. M., or by appointment, until further notice.

Librarian's Report

It was with a feeling of sadness that the present Librarian assumed her duties last January. The community lost so much when Helen H. Trefethen passed away.

We have tried to maintain the past standards of the library to the best of our ability. The hours the library is open have remained the same, but due to an increase in population, a change will be made in order that we may better serve the needs of the community by being open more hours during the week.

Our total circulation for 1970 was 29,860. Of this number 8,237 were juvenile, 7,220 adult non-fiction, 13,781 adult fiction, 622 recordings, and 873 borrowed from the Bookmobile.

The Librarian attended UNH extension courses for two weeks in July. This was sponsored by a scholarship from the Rye Tuesday Club. The Assistant Librarian attended an extension course this past fall for 11 sessions. Both Librarians attended council and book meetings in Derry, Bedford, several towns in the southeast district, and a convention at Wentworth By-the-Sea. Several of these sessions were attended by the Library Trustees.

Special events during 1970 included a puppet show sponsored by the Friends of the Library with 100 young-sters present, a summer reading program, a party held for the children in August, and a story hour every other Monday for children 4-7 in charge of Mrs. Gwen Tambling.

Exhibits this year included a display of handiwork by the 4H girls, a gem collection belonging to Mrs. Janson, jugs owned by Mrs. Cameron, and baskets and pitchers from Mrs. Grunert. Any person interested in lending a collection to be displayed in the Library, should contact the Librarian.

The State Consultant, Mrs. Rachel Sanborn, has been most helpful and has visited Rye several times to help with various problems.

The Friends of the Library have been very active in many ways. They have helped the Staff by mending books under the direction of Mrs. Tallman, raised money by food sales, held a kitchen shower for the recreation room, and sponsored programs.

The trustees met fifteen times this year. Meetings are usually the first Monday of every month, but due to extra business more meetings were held. These meetings are always open to the public.

The new conference room downstairs was dedicated in June in memory of Helen H. Trefethen, Librarian from 1954 through 1969, and is used by town groups for meetings. This year meetings have been held regularly by the Conservation Committee, Friends of the Library, Arts and Crafts, a bookbinding class sponsored by the state, town planning committee, the Junior Women, Fish, Wetland Committees, Lions Club Board and the Ambulance Corps. The trustees hope that the room will be utilized more and more by town groups. Arrangements for using the conference room are made with the Librarian.

The Trustees appreciate the generosity of the many groups and individuals who assisted in establishing and outfitting the Helen H. Trefethen Room — patrons of the Library, Lions Club, the Trefethen family, Friends of the Library, Extension Group, and the monies given to the Carl Howe Memorial Fund which were donated to the room by the family of Mr. Howe. With the excellent equipment, the room can be of use to many town groups for meetings. The room is provided with an audio visual projection unit for 16 mm motion picture film, and a combination filmstrip and 2x2 inch slide projector. A small stove-refrigerator unit has been installed to aid in providing light refreshments.

Two much needed items have been purchased for the Library— a cabinet for pamphlets, and a new shelf divider for the Children's Room.

We are grateful to the many kind friends who have contributed to the library needs with books, magazines, money and time.

Mrs. Cameron, Assistant Librarian, has assumed a big responsibility this year and has been a strong right arm for the Librarian to lean on. Mrs. Philbrick is now assistant also, and is always there with a smile whenever she is needed. Special thanks to the Trustees for sharing, without a murmur, the trials of the first year of this Librarian. A good Board of Trustees makes for a good

Library.

The Police Department has been most co-operative in collecting long overdue books from borrowers, and the Staff and Trustees appreciate their efforts.

The trustees feel that this has been a good year, and they are pleased with the work of Marguerite Leach, Lorraine Cameron and Helen Philbrick.

Rye Ambulance Corps, Inc.

As president of the Volunteer Ambulance Corps, I present this report to the people of the Town of Rye.

The Town of Rye has a new Cadillac Ambulance, bought in February 1970, with the help of donations from interested citizens. It is completely equipped with everything needed for most emergencies plus added features for more advanced use. It is serviced entirely by volunteers,

who are trained in Advanced Red Cross First Aid for the handling of patients, also in ambulance maintenance and equipment. Each volunteer serves a twelve hour shift each week, but many have to do more to keep the service operating twenty-four hours a day. IT NEEDS YOUR HELP. If you are 21 years old and willing to sacrifice some time to help others, please contact the President of the Corps.

Membership is \$3.00 per year and entitles you and your family to complete ambulance service as ordered by your Doctor. Membership provides service from Rye to any hospital or nursing home within 50 miles. Service to a hospital or nursing home in the Metropalitan Boston, Manchester, Concord or Portland areas is by special request and at \$1.00 per mile surcharge over the 50 mile limit. Non-members will be furnished service at a minimum charge of \$10.00 per call or \$1.00 per mile, whichever is greater.

The Corps meets every Wednesday at 8:00 P. M., at the Fire Station. Red Cross training is given twice a year, the Standard Course in September and the Advanced Course in January. The public is always invited to come as often as it wishes, but to get a certificate one must attend regularly and complete the course.

This year, in order to buy radio intercoms for the members to have in their homes or cars to expedite the service to the Town, we held a barn sale and the Rye Players are helping by putting on a Three Act play on January 15th and 16th. The Corps wishes to thank all sponsors, clubs, and businesses who gave their time and money to make this possible. The Corps, also, wishes to express many thanks to the Lions Club for their very generous offer of help for this project.

This year we had 185 calls for service, there were 126 to the Portsmouth Hospital, 21 to other local area hospitals or Nursing homes and 24 to more distant cities also 14 trips that were cancelled after the ambulance was

under way.

Rye Recreation Commission

This is the fourth year of an organized summer program at the Recreation Area. The total number of children registered this year was 219. The total attendance for 1970 was 1,839, compared to 1,090 in the year 1967. The total four year attendance from 1967 through 1970 was 5,664.

We were fortunate to have Mr. Wayne Elliott as program director again this year. His assistants were Miss Nancy May, games and athletics, Miss Donna Adams, arts and crafts and general assistant was Miss Nancy Hamilton. During part of the program, Miss Susan Briggs, 4-H summer representative, operating out of the Rockingham County Building in Exeter taught a nature study program. She was employed by the Co-operative Extension Service, Dept. of Agriculture out of the University of N.H., and her services were free to the Recreation Area.

The summer program included basketball, badminton, horse shoes, bocce, baseball, relay races, and other competitive sports. Award plaques and cups were given

at the end of the program for these activities. A nature study class, arts and crafts, with special weekly events were held. Two events per week were held such as paper plane contest, frisbee contest, treasure and nature hunts, wood sculpture contest for modern art, original hat, costume, and coloring contests.

The new assistants attended a recreational workshop in Manchester sponsored by the State of New Hampshire for recreational personnel on a statewide basis.

We appreciate the contribution of \$20.00 by the Rye Grange and for the continuing interest of the Rye Junior Women's Club of their contribution of \$300.00 towards an equipment shelter for the sports field, and for the \$700.00 which is held in trust for the development of an all purpose court.

The Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts have continued to use the area for their activities, besides other organizations. The Boy Scouts are using the area on their monthly camp-outs and they are clearing and preparing the Boy Scout area.

A tremendous amount of work has been done on the new playing field. There is yet a great deal of work to be done in order to complete this project properly. The Commission would like the support of the voters of the Town in helping them to complete this project for the children of Rye.

This was the best year at the Rye Recreation Area since the program was started four years ago. Let us continue to go forward.

Rye Conservation Commission

Since March, 1970, the Conservation Commission has been laying the groundwork for marshland acquisition. A Conservation Fund was established by vote at the 1970 Town Meeting and \$5,000,00 appropriated for the purpose of this acquisition. We are eligible and have qualified for matching funds from the Spaulding Potter Charitable Funds, administered by the Society for The Protection of New Hampshire Forests. We are documenting our methods of acquisition and sharing our knowledge with other interested seacoast commissions.

A Map Study Committee within the Commission, including Louise Tallman, Tom Binmore, Ralph Brown, and Richard Carey, have programmed the work involved and the following has been accomplished: Maps of Rye's marshland area studied. James Hayden of USDA Soil Conservation Service attended meetings to explain wetlands mapping. Commission voted to obtain aerial photo maps of Rye on which the technicians indicate the fresh and salt wetlands. A comprehensive study and mapping of Rye wetlands is thus available. The Commission next studied town property maps, contacted owners who attended our meetings to learn more about the program. To date we have under consideration offers from seven marsh owners to turn over their acres to us. This would be done in various ways. By outright gift, easement, purchase, etc. Negotiations are neaaring finalization for us to purchase some 30 odd acres of marshland. For continuing marsh acquisition more funds are of course needed and we hope that our article in this years warrant will meet with a favorable vote. There is much more work to be done by us, which takes time. However, we thought the Town would like to know of some of the things involved in this program.

A newly organized "New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions" has been established. It will act as a coordinator of all New Hampshire commissions, assist them in an advisory capacity, among other benefits.

Richard Carey, has taken over our "tote road project." Please contact him if any questions in this regard.

We have enjoyed many guests and speakers at our meetings this year and are encouraged by their interest and enthusiasm. Also, we have attended many hearings and meetings relative to conservation issues.

Near the end of February we are sponsoring an open meeting, setting forth a study in ecology given by two professors from the University of New Hampshire, which they will illustrate by exhibit and slides. Louise Tallman is planning this and the event should be of great interest to those concerned about our natural resources.

Many thanks to the Selectmen and Planning Board for their help and cooperation and to each commission member for their hard work and support.

Report of Cemetery Trustees

To the Citizens of Rye:

The new addition to our cemetery has progressed rapidly in the last three years. There is now about six acres of land which is kept mowed with a lawn mower. About one third of this has been laid out into cemetery lots and is mapped and marked. This year we will be ready to sell lots in this area.

Nothing in this new area will be allowed above ground level. All markers will be flush with the ground, so that after mowing no trimming will be needed. This is being done in most new cemeteries to save on labor.

The Town has given us \$1,000.00 a year for the past three years and we have brought this new section to a point where we now have lots to sell. However, there is need of much more work to bring it to real use. A road and turning area is needed. Whether we build the road all the way in one year or part of the way with a turn around, that will have to be ripped out later, will depend upon the money the Town is willing to give us this coming year.

The trustees have given a lot of thought to the amount of flowers and plants the lot owners put on their lots. We appreciate the thoughts and feelings that is behind these flowers, but, feel that one nice box, urn or vase would serve the same purpose and be much neater. The exception being Memorial season and burials. We are not making any regulation to this effect at this time, but wish the people would try it for one year.

The many people who go regularly to the cemetery and have watched the men mowing, must realize the time it takes to move so many plants and flowers to one side and then stop again and return them where they were. This costs the cemetery many hours of labor that could be used otherwise.

The above suggestions are not intended to hurt anyones feelings but to show our concern for the looks and well being of the cemetery. Your cooperation will be greatly appreciated.

Report of Trustees of Trust Funds

The total income of \$1,814.94 received from the Library Trust Funds was paid to the Library Trustees for the purchase of books during 1970. All library funds are invested in one common fund. A percentage of ownership is maintained so that the principal amount of each fund can be identified.

A total of 20 new cemetery perpetual care funds were added during 1970. Since the total cemetery funds are becoming more numerous each year, the auditor has suggested that more efficiency could be obtained by using computerized bookkeeping methods. This change will be made during 1971. This additional service will eliminate many long hours of operating adding machines and looking for errors. This new system will also allow us the advantages of investing with ease by using common funds.

In the miscellaneous fund category there are four additions that should be noted.

- 1. An additional \$4,000.00 was added to the Town Capital Reserve Fund.
- 2. The Rye Junior Women established a Rye Recreation All Purpose Fund totaling \$700.00.
- 3. The Rye Junior Women established a Rye Recreation Fund called the Little League Equipment & Shelter Fund by a gift of \$300.00.
- 4. The Rye Grange donated \$20.00 which was added to the existing Rye Recreation Commission Fund.

A total of \$268.22 was paid out for medical supplies that are kept at the Isles of Shoals. This is in accordance with the bequest established by the Daniel Austin Fund dated 12-25-1856. This fund has been dormant for many years.

The Dalton Fund provided for total expenditures totaling \$5,176.91 which was used for the beautification

of the Rye Central Cemetery.

The remaining trustees want to acknowledge the service of Ralph W. Eaton who is resigning at the beginning of 1971, since he and Mrs. Eaton have moved to Portsmouth. Mr. Eaton has provided a service to Rye for several terms as trustee.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Rye on Tuesday the tenth day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to vote upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, a Treasurer and a Highway Agent for the ensuing year and a Selectman, a Cemetery Trustee, a Library Trustee, a Trustee of Trust Funds and to elect two members of the Budget Committee for the ensuing three years.
- Article 2. To choose all necessary officers for the Rye School District in accordance with the statutory procedure adopted by said District at its March 1962 annual meeting.

You are hereby further notified to adjourn to meet at the Rye Junior High School on the fourteenth day of March, next, at seven o'clock in the evening to vote upon the following subjects:

- Article 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money from the Trustees of Trust Funds.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to allow five percent discount on all property taxes paid on or before October 1, 1970.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease Sawyer's Beach, so called, from the owners for another year.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to appoint a Deputy Tax Collector as provided in RSA: 41:38.

On petition of Rolean E. Taggersell and Article 9. 30 others: We, the undersigned registered voters of Rye, New Hampshire, do hereby petition the Selectmen of Rye to insert an article in the town warrant to be voted upon at the town meeting in March, 1970, to see if the town will vote to request the Selectmen and the Conservation Commission to exercise the powers vested in them by Revised Statutes Annotated 36-A:4 to initiate a program of acquiring land by gift, easements or otherwise except through condemnation, to conserve and properly utilize open spaces, in particular the salt marsh areas. Easements shall not necessarily include public access, but shall give the onservation Commission all management rights upon the land subject to easement. The valuation placed on such restricted lands for purposes of real estate taxation shall take into account and be limited by the limitation on future uses of such land where the value of such easement or gift is a legal income tax deduction subject to Internal Revenue Code B. Statutes and Rulings Section 170-Charitable, etc. Constitutions and Gifts.

On petition of Frances I. Holway and 13 Article 10. others: We, the undersigned registered voters of Rye, New Hampshire, do hereby petition the Selectmen to put an article in the warrant for the town meeting to be held in March, 1970 to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for a conservation fund which may be increased by grants, gifts or further appropriations to be used at the discretion of the Conservation Commission of Rye under the powers granted them by Charter 36A of the Revised Statues Annotated to acquire such lands and rights in land and water rights, or to defray the incidental expenses of acquiring such property, as may be necessary to conserve and properly utilize open spaces and other land and water areas within the town of Rye.

Article 11. On petition of William E. Ashley and 16 others: To see if the Town will vote to enact the following: Effective July 1, 1970, the Town of Rye shall not obligate or expend monies for legal services of any lawyer, law firm or lawyer pecuniarily associated with any lawyer or law firm which is engaged in providing legal services to the Rye School District.

Ashley and 15 others: To see if the town will vote to enact the following: Effective immediately, legal service for the Rye Budget Committee shall not be provided by any lawyer, law firm or lawyer pecuniarily associated with any lawyer or law firm engaged in providing legal services to either the Town of Rye or the Rye School District.
- Article 13. On petition of William E. Ashley and 16 others: To see if the Town will vote to require the biannual publication known as "Property Valuation" to be published and made available within 30 days after the first tax bills are mailed. Future publications shall list each individual parcel of real estate shown in the Tax Warrant. Additionally, each individual parcel shall reflect the map reference number as keyed to the assessors map, owner, area of parcel, land value, building value and total assessment.
- Article 14. On petition of Erick Sargent and 18 others: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25,000 to revaluate, for tax purposes, all property in the Town of Rye.
- Article 15. On petition of Susan S. Clark and 15 others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) to be used to clear and prepare, this year, a plot of ground in the Recreation Area suitable for a baseball diamond and/or allied activities.
- Article 16. On petition of George W. Steinhilber and 13 others: To see if the Town will vote to amend the present ordinance for the government of the Fire Dept. to read: Be it ordained by the voters of the Town of Rye in Town Meeting assembled that a department to be known as the Rye Fire Department is hereby created. Smith, to see if the Town will vote to discontinue the highway, if any, believed to have been called Ferry Road extending or leading from a Point on Pioneer Road near the Wright Farm barn Northeasterly to its Northerly terminus on Wentworth Road at the Northeasterly end of the Wentworth Fairways Golf Course.
