REPORT OF SELECTMEN

The Selectmen were faced with three important problems this year, the Town Dump, the maintenance of the Town roads in the face of constantly rising costs, and the value of land in Nelson.

Some years ago Professor Parke Struthers, Sr., made an agreement by which the Town might use some of his land as a Town dump. Several years ago his son, Dr. Albert Struthers, built a home in the vicinity of the dump. It was agreed that either party to the contract might terminate it by giving a month's notice. The Town received notice of termination in August; by September 5th Nelson was without a dump.

The Selectmen found that Harrisville would be willing to let all Nelson residents use the Harrisville dump, temporarily, for \$75.00 a month. Their kind offer the Selectmen accepted. The agreement was for a year -- or until the Nelson Selectmen found a suitable dump location in Nelson. No such place has been found. Unless our Harrisville neighbors can or will extend beyond September, 1972, our use of their dump, we shall be in a difficult position.

By 1975 all open dumps will be prohibited by State Law. The Selectmen are working steadily on this problem. If no dump in Nelson can be found by September, we must hope that Harrisville may be willing to continue our arrangement with them, or that we may be able to work out a similar arrangement with some other neighboring town.

The Selectmen have worked steadily with the Road Agent and the Town Road Equipment Committee to maintain the roads and to keep the costs within the budget voted at the 1971 Town Meeting. All costs, both of materials and of labor, have increased in the last two years so that the Town has to

pay more for gravel, salt, calcium chloride, repairs to the equipment, and hourly wages.

The T R A money this year was used to widen, ditch, and grade the Old Stoddard Road leading from the Village to the Nelson-Stoddard line.

Finally, the State Tax Commission has pointed out to the Selectmen on several occasions that the Town of Nelson is not at 100% valuation — as the Town voted to be at the 1968 Town Meeting — nor is it at 86% valuation — as the State said the Town was in 1970 — but only at 69%. The Selectmen have invited Mr. Lawton B. Chandler and his staff to come to Nelson to go over the five applications of Nelson owners who have applied to the State Tax Commission for a re-assessment and to the Town for an abatement.

The Town has been under some pressure from the State Tax Commission to increase the valuation of real estate; a pressure which up until now we have been able to resist. Many of us have read in the local newspapers in the last few months of some neighboring towns which have found this problem acute, just as we have in the face of the Commission's strongly expressed desire that we raise our valuation.

This year Miss Myra Hardy retired after many years of service in the Library. We owe her a great deal for the time and labor she has spent in improving the Library. She has been succeeded by Miss Katherine Upton.

The Selectmen would like to thank all the members of the committees who have worked so hard this year in carrying on the business of the Town.

NELSON TOWN WARRANT

TO THE INHABITANTS of the Town of Nelson, in the County of Cheshire, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED to meet in the Town Hall in said Nelson on Tuesday, the 7th day of March, at 7:00 of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following Articles:

ARTICLES OF A GENERAL NATURE

1. To choose necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$26,212.00 to defray Town charges for the year ensuing.
3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes for the year 1972.
4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction to any proper buyer any and all parcels of property conveyed to the Town by the Tax Collector or other deeds and to execute, acknowledge, and deliver appropriate deeds thereof.

ARTICLES IN SUPPORT OF VARIOUS OBLIGATIONS

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$332.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Elliot Community Hospital.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 to help defray necessary and proper expenses of Old Home Day; the sum of \$100.00 for the same purpose for Memorial Day; and the sum of \$150.00 for the care of the Town Common.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$212.00 for the support of the Monadnock Regional Association.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for the support of the Town Library.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for the maintenance of the Cemetery, this sum to be paid to the Secretary of the Cemetery Board on or before May 1, 1972.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 to support the work of the Munsonville Pre-School.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH PROTECTION

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Civil Defense purposes.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for the proper expenses of the Police Department.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum not to exceed \$663.00 for the purchase and installation of two new police radios.

NOTE: Because of the change-over by Fire Mutual Aid to State-wide coverage, our present radios are not adequate. By 1975 our present equipment will be obsolete. The Federal Government will pay 75% of the cost; the Town 25%.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,425.00 for the purchase of 500 feet of 4 inch fire hose.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the rental of the dump.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH ROADS

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$13,635.18 for the maintenance and repair of roads and bridges, of which sum \$5,000.00 shall be for summer work and \$8,635.18 for winter work.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$6,500.00 for general highway expenses, repairs, and supplies.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$509.16 as its share of TRA construction costs, the State's being \$3,394.42.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by vote of the Town for purchase of road equipment and upon recommendation by the Town Road Equipment Committee.

NOTE: The Committee consists of the Selectmen, the Road Agent, the three other persons: Messrs. Barry Tolman, Claude Hutchins, and Frank E. Upton, Jr.

21. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue and deed the right of way of the road leading from Blueberry Lane to Miss Helen P. Burns's house to Miss Helen P. Burns.

22. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund a sum not to exceed \$12,000.00 for the purchase of one conventional dump truck with snow plow attachment, the present truck to be used in trade.

ARTICLES OF A SPECIAL NATURE

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00, said sum to be held in a Special Reserve Fund for the ultimate replacement of the Town's present dump arrangements, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by vote of the Town for new dump facilities.

NOTE: While the vote of this Article applies only to the year it is adopted, it is intended that a similar Article be inserted in each of the next three Annual Warrants.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$25.00 for the proper expenses of the Nelson Board of Adjustment.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$55.00 for the proper expenses of the Nelson Conservation Commission.

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$925.00 toward the cost of making a soil study of the Town together with maps and overlays.

NOTE: This multiple-purpose study will identify areas of the Town suitable for building, for sanitary land-fill, for preservation of open spaces; also provide land-owners with studies required when land is divided. Study to be conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Commission, at a total cost of \$5,200.00, of which sum the U.S.D.A. will pay \$2,600.00 and \$1,675.00 as sought under a matching program from the Ford Foundation.

27. To see if the Town will vote to designate certain Town roads as "Scenic Roads" as authorized under RSA 253 (amended). Roads to be so designated may be voted on as a package or separately and include: (1) Lead Mine and Hardy, (2) Center Pond, (3) Old Stoddard, (4) City Hill, (5) Dixon Hill and all roads in the Tolman Pond area, and (6) all roads at present closed, subject to gates and bars.

NOTE: RSA 253 provides protection for roadside trees and stone walls. It permits use by the Town of TRA funds for maintenance and repair of such roads without imposing former State restrictions and specifications.

28. To see if the Town will vote to establish an Historic District Commission under New Hampshire RSA 31:89, the members thereof to be appointed by the Selectmen.

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the proper expenses of the Historic District Committee.

30. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurses Association.

31. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

32. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the regional planning commission, now organized and named the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. This Commission will have membership of at least two municipalities and will have jurisdiction over the planning region delineated by the Office of State Planning. The objective of the Commission will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects within, and which extend beyond the boundaries of a particular town. The Commission will have only the authority conferred

on it by Chapter 36:45-53, and will be an advisory commission to local governments in the region. Members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with State Law. Two representatives will be appointed from Nelson.

33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$216.24 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. These funds will be used for financing the staff, operation expenses, planning studies, technical assistance and other programs of the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal Funds available for planning purposes.

34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Planning Board to approve or disapprove at its discretion new subdivisions, and plats thereof showing streets or the widening thereof or parks. Upon the adoption of such ordinance, it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Registry of Deeds of Cheshire County a certificate or notice showing that said Planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of such authorization as provided in Section 19 and Sections 19 through 29 inclusive and Section 34, Chapter 36.

35. To see if the Town will take the sense of the qualified voters as to whether the amendments of the Constitution prepared by the 1971 session of the General Court shall be approved.

36. To transact any other business or discuss other Warrant proposals as they may legally be brought before the meeting.

ARTICLE 2. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26,347.00 to defray Town charges for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 3. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes for the year 1971.

ARTICLE 4. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction to any proper buyer any and all parcels of property conveyed to the Town by the Tax Collector or other deeds and to execute, acknowledge, and deliver appropriate deeds thereof.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to have the second Tuesday in January as the permanent date for the Town Caucus.

Motion was made and seconded that the Article be adopted as amended. Motion prevailed.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to repeal the Nelson Land Use Plan Ordinance as adopted by the Town on March 10, 1970 inserted by petition.

Motion was made and seconded to pass over Article 6.

Article was passed over.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to approve amendments to the Nelson Land Use Plan as proposed and endorsed by the Nelson Planning Board and as discussed and modified at the two mandatory public hearings.

AMENDMENT #1 SECTION 1: last paragraph, delete words "all are untouched by the Plan." Substitute "as presently conducted, are untouched by the Plan." Add sentence "New construction requires a permit, subject to general and district regulations." Add final paragraph "In granting permits in any district of the Town, the Board of Adjustment, aside from observing its own regulations, should remind applicants of the existence of State laws governing relevant subjects outside the jurisdiction of the Board and should suggest sources of information concerning such State requirements. These are laws covering (but not limited to) subjects such as the use of wetlands, soil siting requirements, health, sanitation, pollution of air and water, safety and nuisance."

AMENDMENT #2 SECTION VII: delete definition of "mobile homes, trailers, campers and the like." Substitute the following definitions: "(1) Mobile home: a manufactured dwelling unit, designed for long-term and continuous occupancy which is, or may be, equipped with wheel or wheels or placed on carrying devices for transporting the unit, whether by motive power or other, regardless of removal of wheels or carrying devices or the placing of the unit on a foundation or the construction of accessory buildings. (2) Recreational vehicle: a camp-car, motor home, travel trailer, with or without motive power, designed for human habitation for recreational or short-term occupancy. (3) Pre-fabricated dwelling: (sometimes referred to as modular) unlike a mobile home, is not designed for travel but is transported to the building site either assembled or in the form of panels or sections ready for assembly or erection on a prepared foundation and connection to utilities. A pre-fabricated dwelling is often pre-planned for expansion through the addition of like or compatible units — so that before or after expansion it remains at all times an architectural unit. The Nelson Land Use Plan in no way obstructs the erection or expansion of pre-fabricated dwellings, thus defined, in any district of the Town."

ARTICLE 7. SECTION VIII: district 1, paragraph 4, delete "Duly registered camping trailers, campers, travel trailers and mobile homes." Substitute "Recreational vehicles,

as described in SECTION VII." District 2, paragraph 5, delete "duly registered campers, trailers, mobile homes." Substitute "Recreational vehicles as described in SECTION VII." District 3, paragraph 3, delete "Except, too, that here." Substitute "in District 3."

AMENDMENT #3 SECTION IX: Add final paragraph "No building permit in any district will be granted unless written application is accompanied by a sketch showing distances from boundaries, highways, shorefront, or from any line from which a set-back is required. The Board may demand and shall receive other pertinent information. Once granted, a permit is valid for a period of six months. If construction is delayed for a greater period of time, application for a new permit is required."

ARTICLE 8. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$344.00 as the Town's fair share of the operating costs of the Elliot Community Hospital.

ARTICLE 9. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to help defray necessary and proper expenses of Old Home Day; the sum of \$75.00 for the same purpose for Memorial Day; and the sum of \$150.00 for the care of the Town Common.

ARTICLE 10. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$212.00 for the support of the Monadnock Regional Association.

ARTICLE 11. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the support of the Town Library.

ARTICLE 12. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the maintenance of the Cemetery, this sum to be paid to the Secretary of the Cemetery Board on or before May 1, '71.

ARTICLE 13. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to support the work of the Munsonville Pre-School.

ARTICLE 14. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Civil Defense purposes.

ARTICLE 15. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the proper expenses of the Police Department.

ARTICLE 16. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65.00 to be used in conjunction with State and Federal funds for control of White Pine blister within the confines of the Town.

ARTICLE 17. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the maintenance of the Fire Department.

ARTICLE 18. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$544.00 for the purchase and installation of two, new police radios.

ARTICLE 19. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the maintenance and upkeep of the dump.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$20,000.00 for the maintenance and repair of roads and bridges, of which sum \$8,500.00 shall be for summer work and \$11,500.00 for winter work.

Amendment: Add that the Selectmen shall not authorize expenditures above this amount.

ARTICLE 23. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from this fund except by vote of the Town for purchase of road equipment and upon recommendation by the Town Road Equipment Committee.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to establish a permanent Three-Man Highway Committee to work with the Selectmen and the Road Agent on all matters pertaining to highways. Each member to serve a term of three years with the exception of the year this Article is passed when one will be elected for one year, one for two years, and one for three years.

Motion was made to pass over this Article. Motion lost.

Motion was made and seconded Article 24 be accepted as read. Motion prevailed.

24a. Motion was made and seconded that Barry Tolman, Claude Hutchins, and Frank E. Upton, Jr. serve on this Committee, and draw straws among themselves for the one, two or three year terms. Motion prevailed.

ARTICLE 25. It was voted to close, subject to gates and bars, the road leading from Blueberry Lane to Miss Helen P. Burns's house.

ARTICLE 26. It was voted to pass over Article 26 to raise the sum of \$1,000.00, said sum to be held in a Special Reserve Fund for ultimate replacement of the Town's present dump facilities, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by vote of the Town for new dump facilities.

ARTICLE 27. It was voted to pass over Article 27 to raise the sum of \$100.00 for the proper expenses of the Nelson Planning Board.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the proper expenses of the Nelson Board of Adjustment.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$10.00 as a trust fund from Parke H. Struthers, Jr. the interest therefrom to be used for the perpetual care of lots in the Cemetery.

Amendment: To add the word "his" lot.

Motion made and seconded to accept Article as amended. Motion prevailed.

ARTICLE 35. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association.

ARTICLE 36. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

ARTICLE 37. Motion made by Barry Tolman for the Town to require that revenue from machinery rental and sale of equipment be returned to the equipment Capital Reserve Fund, not to include revenue from the plowing of driveways, or costs of operator and operating expenses.

Motion seconded and prevailed.

The Moderator advised that the Article would have no legal binding.

A suggestion was made to turn over dog license money to the Humane Society.

A suggestion was made that in the future we have a printed ballot, with polls opening at 4 P.M. Moderator advised that for such action there would have to be an Article in the warrant. A majority of the meeting were in favor of this.

Meeting adjourned at 12:30 A.M.

NELSON COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION

Membership in the Association is well above 200 and represents some 160 families, resident and non-resident.

Eight meetings were held in the calendar year 1971. Attendance has been good. Subject matter has been varied, ranging from Mr. Geoge Kingsbury's presentation of early plans for a study of the Granite Lake basin to an "Ecology Show" offered by the children of the Munsonville school.

In addition to the above, other Association meetings in 1971 included (speakers and subjects): Mrs. Arthur Iselin, describing the plan which led to the introduction of ecology courses at the Munsonville school; Mr. James Bolle lecturing and playing records on the subject "Music — country, rock and other"; Mr. Newton Tolman and Mrs. Katherine Gilbert, lecturing and performing on "Folk music, its history and evolution"; Mr. Ralph Page (at the Association's annual meeting in Old Home Week), speaking on "Nelson Tales my Mother Told Me"; and finally, two speakers, the Hon. John R. Bradshaw and the Hon. C. Robertson Trowbridge, who together discussed the East-West Highway as proposed by the New England Regional Commission. Members present were polled for reactions which were heavily opposed to such a highway. Subsequently, the results of the poll were forwarded to Governor Peterson.

REPORT OF NELSON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Commission's membership was increased to seven by the Selectmen's appointment of Arnold G. Miner and Charles Tatham III to serve until 1974.

Work has been continued on collection of survey and soil study maps; water from Silver Lake sampled for study of developing algae (the Health Officer took frequent samples of Granite Lake), and cooperation with the Granite Lake Basin Study continued. In-depth studies have been made of alternatives to the dump (now closed) for disposal of solid waste.

The Commission mounted environmental exhibits and ran two films during Old Home Day, with the assistance of high school sophomore, Charles Mattamores, whom the Commission sent to Bear Brook State Park conservation camp in July.

The funds voted by the Town in 1971, augmented by a gift from the Nelson Community Association, were used together with a \$1,600 grant from the U. S. Office of Education to carry on weekly classes in the Munsonville School on environmental education. The natural history of Nelson, conservation practices, and the building of a nature trail were among the projects undertaken under the supervision of dedicated volunteers: Cornelia Iselin, Gail Tatham and Karen Tolman who gave unstintingly of their time and services throughout the school year. So well have the classes gone that Assistant Superintendent Edward White wishes to incorporate them into the curriculum and has asked the Commission to continue to provide volunteer assistance.

Efforts to produce proposals for conservation of open space and unusual natural or man-made areas in the Town have been frustrated by lack of a soil study map. Funds for this are being sought this year from the Town to be augmented by a Ford Foundation grant (and matching U.S.D.A. funds).

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Nelson qualified to vote in District affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Munsonville School in said District on the 3rd day of March, 1972, at 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon to bring in your votes for the election of the school district officers. The polls will be opened not later than 7:00 p.m., nor closed earlier than 9:00 p.m.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary school district officers :

A moderator for the ensuing year.

A clerk for the ensuing year.

A member of the school board for the ensuing three years.

A treasurer from July 1, 1972, for the ensuing year.

An auditor for the ensuing year.

You are hereby further notified to meet at the Munsonville School in said District on March 3, 1972, at 8:00 p.m. to act upon the following subjects :

ARTICLE 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the District will vote to accept the provisions of Title I, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the District under said Federal Act and any amendments thereto for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board with the further power and authority vested with said school board to cooperate with

other school districts and/or supervisory unions. Further, to see if the District will authorize the school board to make applications for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

NOTE: P.L. 89-10, Title I, provides money for educationally deprived children with total grants based on a formula involving the amount of federal dollars available and the number of pupils appropriately identified. Approximately \$743.00 appears to be available to this school district. Permission has to be voted through this article before the money may be obtained and spent.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,749.00 to install a fire alarm system as provided by Granite State Alarm, Inc., said system to have State Fire Underwriters' approval and to include automatic heat detectors, pull stations, evacuation alarms, building temperature devices and connection of all warning devices to Southwestern New Hampshire Fire Mutual Aid for twenty-four hour protection. Further to see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$528.00 for the first annual operating cost of the system.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to enter into tuition contracts for the school year 1972-1973 with the Union School District of Keene at a rate not to exceed Nine Hundred Seventy-Six (\$976.00) Dollars per pupil for junior high instruction, or with other approved junior high schools.

ARTICLE 7. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the

salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

ARTICLE 8. (By Petition) To see if the District will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 35 of the Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire for the purpose of the construction, reconstruction of buildings and/or purchase of equipment, and/or the acquisition of land for school purposes, said fund to be held in custody by the Trustees of Trust Funds of the Town of Nelson.

ARTICLE 9. (By Petition) To see what action the District will take in accordance with R.S.A. 35 to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,700.00, to be deposited in the capital reserve fund established for "the purpose of the construction, reconstruction of buildings and/or the acquisition of land for school purposes."

ARTICLE 10. (By Petition) To see if the District will vote to establish a Building Committee composed of not more than seven members, four appointed by the Moderator, and three to be the members of the School Board.

ARTICLE 11. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

ARTICLE 12. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING

March 5, 1971

The meeting was called to order at 4:00 P.M. by the Moderator, Raymond Huber, in the Munsonville School House.

Having read the School Warrant through Article I, the Moderator opened the polls for persons wishing to vote for the officers listed by non-partisan ballot as required by law. The Moderator announced that the polls would remain open until 9:00 P.M. and that Article II would be taken up at 7:00 P.M.

At 7:00 P.M. the Warrant was read by the Moderator and the Articles were acted upon as follows:

Mrs. Mildred Huber introduced Mr. Day, Superintendent of Schools, Mr. White, Assistant Superintendent, Mr. Champagne, Educational Consultant, and Mr. Cass, Business Manager for the Supervisory Union. Mrs. Huber made a Motion that these guests be allowed to speak. The Motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article II Motion was made and seconded to pass over reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto. Motion prevailed.

Article III Motion was made by Mr. Bradley Pratt that the Article be accepted as read: To see if the District will favor an A.R.E.A. Plan for Grades Seven and Eight. Note: An unofficial-poll to determine the opinion of the District. Motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article IV Motion was made by Mr. Bernie Pierce that the Article be accepted as read: To see if the District will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,850.00 to provide the

part-time services of a "resource teacher," together with the necessary instructional materials and to authorize the Board to effectuate the purposes of this article. Note: The anticipated total \$1,850.00; state and federal revenue \$1,100.00; net from taxes \$750.00. Motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article V Motion was made by Mr. Bernie Pierce that the Article be accepted as read: To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to enter into tuition contracts for the school year 1971-1972 with the Union School District of Keene at a rate not to exceed Nine Hundred Fifty-One Dollars (\$951.00) per pupil for junior high instruction, or with other approved junior high schools. Motion was second and prevailed.

Article VI Motion was made by Mr. Donald Bennett that the Article be accepted as read: To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency. Motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article VII Motion was made by Mrs. Mildred Huber that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$58,495.00 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. Motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article VIII Motion was made by Mr. Bernie Pierce to pass over the Article: To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. Motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article IX Other Business:

Motion was made by Mrs. Cornelia Iselin that the School Board appoint an informal committee of five, including a chairman, and call that committee together from time to time to review matters pertinent to the school budget.

Amendment: Mr. Clyde Hutchins moved that the School Board appoint Mrs. Iselin as chairman of said committee. Amendment was seconded and adopted.

Motion, as amended, was seconded and prevailed.

At this time a vote of thanks was given to Mrs. Dorothy French for her years of service as School Board member and flowers were presented to her by the Officers of the Supervisory Union.

A motion was made by Mr. Bernie Pierce to adjourn the meeting. The motion was seconded and prevailed.

ADMINISTRATORS' REPORT

1971-1972

Progress: We are reporting briefly some of the major events during the five years our six districts have been together as a supervisory union. It is the continuing goal of the State to bring together districts in a geographic area which have similar economic, social, and educational interests. The union was enlarged following a decision by the State Board of Education that Chesterfield, Harrisville, Keene, Marlborough, and Westmoreland would work together as an administrative unit. It has worked effectively for boys and girls from July, 1967.

There has been much progress in improving educational programs in the elementary grades. We endeavor to maintain similar programs in all schools, first to provide for the needs of the boys and girls, second to prepare them for the secondary programs they will enter. New books and educational materials have been purchased in nearly all subjects and much progress has been made in using audiovisual devices. Our libraries have grown in numbers of books and our pupils have responded by greatly increasing the quantity and variety of their reading. Teachers and principals of all districts are striving to constantly improve curricula offerings and administrative procedures.

Though some progress has been made, our weakness is recognized in the limited provision of the so-called special areas of art, music, physical education, guidance, and education of the handicapped. The largest district, Keene, has been increasing these services, but it too falls short of a desirable level. It is a common shortcoming of the schools of New Hampshire, and may have to await a more ample provision of state funds.

We think that great progress has been made in the secondary schools of Marlborough and Keene. Marlborough High

School has become a good little high school, and Keene High School maintains a high level of quality. Courses in both have been updated, new materials purchased, and new methods adopted. We are making steady strides towards providing more vocational educational opportunities. Though Keene High and Keene Junior High are crowded with pupils, annually some worthwhile changes are made.

Maintenance: Most of our buildings are in fine condition when age and original building limitations are considered. Improved custodial care and steady progress in lighting, heating, roofing and grounds upkeep have been accomplished. We firmly believe that our properties should be kept at a high level of efficiency, cleanliness and appearance. There is more to be done, but we have reached the point where the level of expenditure will not have to be increased, except to keep up with inflation. Now, we are proposing special articles in the "town" budgets to provide alarm systems to make more certain that fire losses of large size will be avoided.

A.R.E.A. Plans: Since 1966 five of our districts have operated successfully within the Keene Authorized Regional Enrollment Plan. This plan insures that all of the districts are guaranteed by Keene of a place for high school education, and Keene can plan on the entire enrollment of the sending districts. Although the tuition costs have advanced considerably in the six-year period, they compare on the low side with New Hampshire and Vermont high schools which offer equal programs. This has made possible a good working relationship with opportunity for the sending districts to constructively criticize and the receiving district to strive constantly to improve its program. Legally, and in fact, Keene High School is the high school of the five districts.

During the District Meetings of March and April, 1970, seven districts voted a study committee to work together as a Planning Board. The charge is to determine the advantages and disadvantages of extending the A.R.E.A. plan or to develop a new plan for at least grades seven and eight. The pupils of **grades seven and eight** of Harrisville, Nelson, Marlow, and Stoddard have been attending Keene Junior High School for

several years. The districts of Chesterfield, Marlborough, and Westmoreland were sufficiently interested to vote to share the study. Though several meetings have been held, progress has been slow, due in part to Keene's problem of building. The Keene District will probably bring the question of a new school for the intermediate grades to the District for decision again in March, 1972.

A tentative, new A.R.E.A. plan is being written. It may not involve all of the districts as this is local prerogative. If a plan is acceptable to some of the districts and the State Board, it can begin existence in September, 1974. We have another year for work and decision. Such an arrangement can provide stability and better education for all the districts while securing for them state funds and incentive aid.

Finances: "What happens when an irresistible force meets an immovable object?" This old riddle comes close to illustrating the predicament in New Hampshire. For years and years the districts of our little state have voted their tax money for schools, bearing almost the complete burden. Your school leadership has been frustrated and discouraged because decisions must be made on the basis of "what will they cost" rather than "what is their value for children." State support seems to have hit bottom. Whereas the state funding in the United States averages 47% of public school costs, New Hampshire sharing was actually cut in half, down to 4%. This is in face of the usual inflation rate of six percent. Real estate is not equal in the districts and is not rapidly expandable to meet increasing costs. There seems to be agreement that education needs to keep up with the times, but the source of funds remains practically static.

As our Business Manager writes: "Our budgets proposed for 1972-1973 are largely 'maintenance' budgets, supporting those services and educational conditions which presently exist." Even so, costs advance due to conditions beyond local control: gas tax, oil costs, electricity, telephone rates, rentals, retirement changes, and all supplies and books. We simply cannot hold the line without cutting services. It is natural to expect personnel to seek compensation increases to at least

equal the increased costs of living. We do sincerely hope that more can be provided from State funds to insure greater equity and additional dollars.

Career Education: You will be hearing more about a proposal called C.O.E.D. It means: Complete Occupational Education Development. It will involve all of our districts and will be supported for at least three years with federal money.

Perhaps a good way to end this report is to look into the future with the new U. S. Commissioner of Education, Sidney P. Marland, as he envisions the following:

“The term ‘career education’ means to me basically a point of view, a concept — a concept that says three things: First, that career education will be part of the curriculum for all students, not just some. Second, that it will continue throughout a youngster’s stay in school, from the first grade through senior high and beyond, if he so elects. And third, that every student leaving school possesses the skills necessary to give him a start in making a livelihood for himself and his family, even if he leaves before completing high school.”

In conclusion, we do hope that the financial problems of the moment will not cloud our vision of what good education has meant and must mean to the future of our boys and girls, and the very future of our beloved nation.

REPORT OF THE MUNSONVILLE PRE-SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

For the Year 1970-1971

The Munsonville Pre-School was granted its license to operate for the school year 1970-1971 and began classes October 5. Classes were held Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. The Pre-School observes the same vacations and days off as the Munsonville School. Classes concluded with the graduation June 9.

The Pre-School holds classes in the Munsonville Methodist Church, paying the church for a share of the heat and electricity.

Tuition was kept as low as possible in order to make Pre-School available to all Nelson Pre-School age children: \$2.00 per month for four year olds who attended once a week and \$5.00 per month for five year olds who attended three times a week. Children from Stoddard and Sullivan have been accepted, when space allowed, to add additional tuition income.

In order to meet expenses it was necessary for the Association to supplement the tuition through money raising projects held throughout the year, and it gratefully accepted private donations and the \$100.00 voted by the Town at Town Meeting. This money is used to improve classroom supplies and for operating expenses which include the teacher's salary, heating, electricity and general expenses.

Report of the Forest Fire Warden and District Chief LEST WE FORGET — IT CAN HAPPEN HERE

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellar-holes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947 nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand — a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them DEAD OUT when leaving.
4. MOST IMPORTANT — Instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year — 1971 — was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.
