TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Polls Open 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. To the inhabitants of the Town of Strafford in the County of Strafford in said state qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Strafford Elementary School in said Strafford on Tuesday, the Fourth day of March 1975 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Please Note: All Articles except No. 1 will be taken up at 8:00 p.m. Tuesday, March 4, 1975.

- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$4,500 for Public Welfare, including Old Age Assistance.
- 4. To see if the Town will accept Town Road Aid and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,042.49 to which the State will contribute \$6,949.96.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges (\$3,000 from Revenue Sharing)
- 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$800.00 for maintenance of the Bow Lake Fire Department.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for observance of Memorial Day.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Lakes Region Association.

- 9. To hear the report and see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,062.00 in support of the Rural District Health Council.
- 10. To hear the report and see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 as a donation to the Center Barnstead Fire Department for providing Ambulance Service to the Town of Strafford. (\$1,500.00 from Revenue Sharing)
- 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be expended by the Bow Lake Community Club to help defray the cost of the annual Fourth of July Fireworks Display.
- 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust Disease.
- 13. To see if the Town will establish a Recreation Commission as provided by State Statute to consist of five members, residents of the Town, to be appointed by the Selectmen. (By Petition)
- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 for the operation of the beaches at Bow Lake Dam for the 1975 season. (By Petition)
- 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be added to an existing appropriation of \$1,264.64 to create a recreation fund to be expended as the recreation commission may determine for capital, improvement at the Bow Lake Dam area, such as fencing, docking facilities and safety equipment; and to see if the Town will apply for Federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation matching funds for such expenditures. (By Petition)
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt Evans Mountain Road, so-called as a Scenic Road as provided by RSA 253: 16, 17 and 18. Evans Mountain Road is more particularly described as follows: Beginning at a point on its eastern end adjacent to the Kenneth Berry residence, thence running westerly beyond its intersection with Parson Hill Road so-called and continuing to the Barnstead-Strafford Town Line and its terminus. Total length approximately 1½ miles. (By Petition)

- 17. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to create a Capital Reserve Fund specifically for the purchase of a new fire truck and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for same.
- 18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 toward the cost of a Town Map.
- 19. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to hire a part-time assistant for routine office work, not to exceed \$800.00 for the year.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to accept the section of road, known as "Aspen Drive" in Whig Hills Development. This road is constructed to Town Road Specifications.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to pay \$3.00 per hour for all hourly labor.
- 22. (RSA 412:3) Will the Town vote authorize the selectmen to procure for the protection and benefit of the town and its officers such policies of insurance as the selectmen in their discretion shall determine against loss or expense by reason of claims made upon the town or its officers for damages on account of bodily injuries suffered by any person or on account of damage to or the destruction of property.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to join the Strafford Regional Planning Commission and the Strafford-Rockingham Regional Planning Council as authorized by RSA 36:46 and raise and appropriate \$965.00 as an assessment of same.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,500.00 for the operation of the Strafford Library. (\$825.00 from Revenue Sharing)

25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated:

- 26. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with the Selectmen of Northwood in regard to disposing of Strafford's solid waste at a proposed incineration plant at Northwood and activate a program if feasible.
- 27. To see if the Town will grant 2% discount on Taxes paid within thirty-five days of mailing of tax bill.
- 28. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.



TOWN CONSERVATION COMMISSION Strafford, New Hampshire

Mrs. Gail Barry and Mr. Spencer Smith were appointed by the selectmen to serve as members of the Commission.

The improvement-sanitation cutting of timber in the Town Forest has been completed. A self-guided trail system has been completed at the forest. A map and brochure are available to all wishing to use the trail system; these are available at both post offices and at the Hill Library. In addition to these activities, a field reclamation project has been started at the Town Forest property. We feel it is desireable to maintain the small amount of open space on this property and, also wish to preserve a field-type habitat for birds and small mammals. The work of clearing, mowing and brush chipping was done by Strafford volunteer citizens and by a Community Action Program group from Rockingham County.

In November the Commission visited and made a preliminary inventory of the resources of the McCabe Property as a first step toward development of a management plan for this parcel.

The Commission has made several investigations and recommendations concerning Dredge and Fill Permits.

A Scenic Roads Committee has been appointed by the Commission to work with the selectmen and report back to the Town Meeting. The formation of this committee was directed by vote of the last Town Meeting.

RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL, INC. ANNUAL REPORT

January 1, 1974 - December 31, 1974

The Rural District Health Council has experienced another year of growth and reorganization in 1974. The continued success of this program lies in the dedication of the agency personnel, and the capable professional staff assures the availability of quality care.

Skilled nursing service is still the major part of the program, and as more people become aware of the value of home care, demands for the service increase. These services are provided by Mrs. Barbara Drew, R.N. of Farmington, Mrs. Myrtle Walsh, R.N. of Milton and Mrs. Lucy Myers, R.N., B.S. of Deerfield. Mrs. Evelyn Therrien, R.N. of Barrington has also been working on a part-time basis. Mrs. Kathleen Hansen, RPT of Epping continues to provide physical therapy when ordered.

Mrs. Ardala Houle, R.N. of Rochester has been the Agency Coordinator and Clinic Supervisor. In this capacity she is the liason between the Rural District Health Council, area hospitals and other community health agencies. She is also the leader of the clinic team.

As a result of the increased interest and services in the Maternal and Child Health Program, Miss Arlene Thorne, R.N. of Strafford is now employed full time as the agency Maternal and Child Health nurse, ensuring more continuity of care in this specialty. Mrs. Bernadette Cameron, R.N. of Deerfield, a new member of our staff, has been organizing prenatal and parenting discussions which are conducted at each clinic. The Rural District Health Council works in cooperation with the N. H. State Department of Public Health in offering Well Child clinics for children from 0-6 years. Again this year, through the cooperation of the N. H. Bureau of Dental Public Health, a dental clinic was held for the children from 3-6 years who are enrolled in the Well Child Program. The agency has also worked cooperatively with the school nurses in the member towns to assure that the immunizations of all students are updated. The Rural District Health Council is an active participant in the Maternal and Infant Care program of the Strafford County Prenatal and Family Planning Association. The agency also works closely with the Exeter Area Family Planning Association. As a result of these changes, a more comprehensive program is now being offered by the Council.

Early in the year, the Rural District Health Council was approached by the Senior Citizen group in Farmington requesting an ongoing screening for its members. As a result, two times each month, agency nurses are present at the Senior Citizen Meeting Room in the Farmington Town Hall to check blood pressure, pulse, respiration, height, weight, urine and hemoglobin, and to do nutrition counseling. This has been greatly appreciated by the participating members. A similar program is being initiated in Northwood through the cooperation of the Northwood Plus 55 Club.

During October and November, successful Adult Screening clinics were held in Farmington and Northwood in cooperation with the Special Services of the Department of Public Health, local organizations, American Cancer Society, Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center, and Health professionals. These were open to any area person wishing to attend.

The office procedures of the Rural District Health Council are ably handled by Mrs. Norma Davis, Bookkeeper, and Mrs. Eleanor Eaton, Secretary, both of Farmington.

The Rural District Health Council is supported by the funds contributed by the member towns at an annual rate of \$1.00 per capita, state grants and fees for service. Anyone interested in the program or needing service is asked to contact the office in Farmington, P. O. Box 563, 6 South Main Street, Telephone 755-2989.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Report to Towns

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 Forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

The information given is the Fifth Annual Report of the Strafford Police Department. 1974 was a good year. There were less calls because of the weekly patrol done by this department. This year, with the help of the State Police and this department, there have been six subjects apprehended for breaking into residences in this town, for which they have paid their penalties.

We purchased a portable radio which can be installed in a car and used as a two way radio. This also can be used as a single unit which gives the coverage need if you have to leave your vehicle for any length of time.

Last year the officers and myself attended a part-time school. which was held in Portsmouth, put on by the Police Standards Council and Training which was eight weeks. This year it will be held from March 3, 1975 until June 2, 1975.

This Department has appointed a Highway Safety Committee to be sent in to the State.

We traveled eight thousand miles this year on our new patrol system. The patrol was set up April 1, 1974 to provide the town with a better and more complete coverage. On the patrol we check camps, vacant homes, businesses, and the town buildings, as well as enforcing traffic laws. The patrol provided equal time for each officer and proved beneficial in the apprehension of a person involved in a burglary of a home in Strafford.

This year I would like to have the residents of the town or camp owners call this department if they see a vehicle they think does not belong in the area. This will help keep the breaks down. It would be a help in the near future to have a cruiser in town. The officers can be reached at the following numbers: 664-2837, 664-2225, - 742-4968, - 664-9378. Regulations Governing the Use of Town Beaches and Recreational Areas Within the Town of Strafford

- 1. Subject to such regulations as have been lawfully imposed thereon by the State of New Hampshire, regulating the use of Bow Lake and the Dam area in the town of Strafford the use thereon by the Public shall be subject to this regulation.
- 2. Said beaches and areas shall be open to public use each day from Sunrise to 10 p.m., and shall not be open at any other time, excepting in the case of emergency.
- 3. Any person throwing or depositing upon the beaches or approach thereto any material of glass, paper, scrap metal or refuse of any nature shall be subject to the provision of RSA-A:83.

- 4. No person shall disrobe for the purpose of bathing, or otherwise at the beach in a place or manner exposing them to Public view.
- 5. No person shall build a fire on any beach or unauthorized recreational area without first obtaining permission to do so from the Fire Chief or other authorized person, and being so authorized, shall not leave the fire unextinguished upon leaving the beach or area.
- 6. No person shall participate in any obscene or abusive behavior on any beach or recreational area which shall interfere with the use and enjoyment thereof by the Public.
- 7. No parking of any vehicle shall be permitted on any street adjacent to the Dam or beaches or any area where no parking signs are posted.

STRAFFORD FIRE DEPARTMENT January 1, 1974 — December 31, 1974

The Strafford Fire Department had a fairly busy year with the same number of calls as last year. There were a total of 21 calls which the department answered with the breakdown as follows:

We had the same number of calls as in 1973 but the number of calls in the different categories changed somewhat drastically.

There were no structural fires in 1973 but 6 in 1974.

Six courtesy calls were made including: pumping out wells, filling swimming pools, and the spring burning of fields. Although no charge is made in regard to such calls, donations are gratefully accepted.

One of the biggest accomplishments of the year was the merging of the Crown Point and Center Strafford Departments. Both departments were town owned, functioned separately and therefore not to the town's best advantage.

The 1942 Dodge was retired this year as it was no longer safe to use as an emergency vehicle.

We acquired two 300 gpm portable pumps which were mounted on our two tank trucks. Currently the department is in the process of painting and fixing up the tankers. These two trucks are in fairly good shape, yet a commercially built professional fire truck is desperately needed.

In the coming year we hope to join a mutual aid group. This will give us an opportunity to gain more experience by assisting area towns and cities and having them assist us.

Six department men took part in two area fire schools— one in Laconia and one in Fitzwilliam. An average of 700-1000 men

from New England were trained at these schools each year. 1974 was the fifth consecutive year Strafford men have attended.

More Volunteers are needed. Anyone interested may contact Loren Pierce. It is also hoped that townspeople will feel free to drop in any time with suggestions or a helping hand.

In the ensuing year department members will try to contact everyone in town to be sure they have the department's emergency number. To report a fire call 664-9320.

The fire phone price is more than last year, since we feel quite strongly that we need two more phones so as to give better coverage. This would insure that someone would answer the phone when we receive a call.

REPORT OF SPECIAL STUDY COMMITTEE

The first meeting of the Town of Strafford Development Study Committee was held on May 22, 1974 at the Strafford Town Hall. This committee was duly appointed by the Town Moderator, Russell C. Shilliber, upon a Motion made, and seconded and voted upon in the affirmative at the Annual Town Meeting of March 1974.

After much discussion at the first meeting, the members of the committee realized that their individual concerns about growth and other potential problems in the town may not necessarily be the concerns of the townspeople. The suggestion of a survey seemed appropriate, and it was hoped that from this survey the committee would be better guided in its functions. With the cooperation of the Cooperative Extension Service, which supplied the paper at no cost to the town, and with the experience of Dan Ellison, Community Resource and Development Agent, as well as input from the committee itself, a Community Self-Survey was formulated. The self-survey, or pre-survey as it has been called, contained five general questions. It was distributed in late summer of 1974.

The results of the pre-survey served as the basis for the preparation of the final survey. Literally hundreds of man-hours were spent in the correlation of the final survey; the committee feels it to be comprehensive and worthy of use by others in the town, including civic groups, by the School Board, Fire Department, Selectmen, Planning Board, Conservation Commission and others. We wish to thank those people who spent considerable time and at their own expense helped to distribute and collect both the presurvey and the final survey. Their efforts were appreciated.

With the work of the surveys behind us, the Committee intends to appoint sub-committees to work in specific areas of concern to the townspeople. Over 50 people expressed interest in helping, and it is hoped that many of these same people will be working on the sub-committees. As an introduction, members of the committee are the following: Cal Schroeder, Chairman; Bob Perry, Secretary; Neil Mooers, Gil Fistere, Chris Bozak, JoAnne Brown and Jim Foss. We hope the town recognizes the need for the continuation of the study committee for another year so that the results of the surveys may be followed through.

REPORT OF THE SCENIC ROADS COMMITTEE

After studying RSA 253:17 & 18 and reviewing questionnaires, the Committee feels that roads classified under the above statute would be feasible in the Town of Strafford. Our conclusion is based on the recommendation that the initiative to declare roads scenic should come from the residents of that road rather than from any official municipal body.

The purpose of the statute is to enable towns to preserve what they might feel is important in their environment. One possible advantage allows circumventing construction requirements on monies received from the State for TRA. For example, if a road is declared scenic the town may forego the width requirement, making it possible to get more miles of improvement for the same amount of money. We also feel that it gives citizens more opportunity to take an active part in deciding the town's future.

The Committee recognizes, however, that there may be potential problems in road maintenance. It is felt that these problems can be foreseen and hearings conducted to resolve any discrepancies between the limitations of the law and what must be done to practically serve road maintenance. In reviewing returned questionnaires, problems seem to exist where there are misunderstandings of what the law actually sets out.

As mentioned above, planning seems to be the most effective way of resolving potential problems, and as such, puts an additional administrative burden upon the existing municipal government. The positive aspects of the law, may outweigh any foreseen difficulties.

The Committee met several times, once with the Selectmen. We familiarized ourselves with the statute and its provisions and debated its merits. All the towns with designated scenic roads (44) were contacted by questionnaire and about 50% responded. This information is incorporated in the body of this report.

The School Board and the District are commended for their continued interest and support of the Strafford School System. The recently constructed addition is an excellent example of the solution to a problem recognized by the district. Unfortunately, although a woman's work is reputed never to be done, neither is a school board's. It may be remembered that in the District Report for 1970, the status of the Strafford Elementary School and the Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools was considered at length. It is felt that it would be fitting to make a report on the progress which has been made since that time, and indicate what additional steps need to be taken.

- 1. The pupil-teacher ratio for grades 1 and 2 shall be 25 to 1 or less.
 - a) Now 29 to 1 and 24 to 1. However, Grade 1 has a readiness program which it did not have in the earlier report.
- 2. The pupil-teacher ratio for Grades 3 8 shall be 30 to 1 or less.
 - a) Double grades prevented this from being reached, but the addition makes this possible now.
- 3. A broad and well balanced curriculum is offered.
 - a) Since 1970, the art program has been added, and the physical education program has been developed.
- 4. Library services. Schools of Strafford's size need 1,000 square feet of library space and there must be access to 6,000 books.
 - a) There is now sufficient library space. The collection of books is being advocated on a yearly basis.

- 5. Guidance Services shall be provided to all pupils.
 - a) There is no guidance service at present.
- 6. Special Education services shall be provided to all children who differ from average to a significant degree in intellectual, emotional, or physical characteristics.
 - a) This standard is being met with the Joint Special Education-Learning Disabilities Project. The District is also assigning pupils to special programs outside of the District.
- 7. In schools with an enrollment of 150-300 pupils, the principal shall have at least one half time scheduled for the supervision of instruction and other administrative responsibilities.
 - a) This standard is not being fully met.

As can be seen by the reader, the District has made good progress toward meeting the minimum standards. It is hoped that the full implementation of minimum standards will be completed within equally short time.

BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Architect, Irving W. Hersey Associates of Durham, New Hampshire, working with the Building Committee completed the design of the four room addition and sewage disposal system in late February 1974. Bids were opened on March 14, 1974. Seven bids for the addition and sewage disposal system were received with a low bid of \$149,900 and a high bid of \$169,440.

The low bid (to which a 6% Architect's fee would be added) greatly exceeded the \$146,000 authorized at the Special District Meeting on November 29, 1973. All bids were rejected. The design was reviewed for possible changes. The Committee agreed that a saving might be realized if the addition and sewage disposal system were advertised under separate contracts. The building design was modified, the sewage disposal system deleted and negotiations conducted with a Rochester, New Hampshire Contractor, Frank L. Knights, Inc. On April 22, 1974, a contract for the addition only was signed with Mr. Knights for \$126,600. (Prior to executing the Contract an Informational Meeting was held and the risks of escalating costs and overruns explained. The mood of the Town was "GO".)

In recognition of the \$10,000 from Revenue Sharing funds that was voted to be used for the building program at the Town Meeting in March 1974, the School Board signed notes with the Rochester National Bank for \$136,000.

Construction proceeded slowly, delayed by the same shortages of equipment and material that have plagued the construction industry during the last two years.

The addition was finally occupied in late November, and at the time of this report, is essentially finished with only minor work and hardware items remaining to be completed.

The sewage disposal system was originally designed with a requirement for pumping necessitated by the Terrain of the School District land. Because of this, construction, operation and maintenance costs would have been high. The Committee agreed that prior to committing the design to construction the availability of adjacent and lower land should be investigated.

Subsequent negotiation resulted in the acquisition of an additional 2.2 acres of abutting land that permitted a redesign of the septic system utilizing a conventional gravity fed leach field.

Bids for this design were opened on October 2, 1974. One Bid was received and reluctantly rejected for three reasons: (1) there was only one bid; (2) land transactions had not been completed on the schedule anticipated; (3) the lateness of the season.

The Committee will re-advertise early this spring and expects completion of the work by June.

A formal accounting of the Building Fund as of June 30, 1974 is presented elsewhere in the School District Report. The following informal accounting (as of January 25) is made for informational purposes:

HEALTH SERVICES 1973–1974

Routine student inspections, vision and hearing screening, observation of defects and notices to parents are completed as early in the school year as possible and repeated whenever necessary.

Once again the S.A.Y. sponsored our fall prophylaxis clinic, with Mrs. Anne Huckins, the hygienist in charge. Funds donated by S.A.Y. and the Bow Lake Community Club were matched by Dr. Peter Low, who provided much needed dental follow-up care for four of our students.

The *Idea Exchange Night*, with parents of pre-school first graders, was so well received last year it was repeated and gave all who attended the opportunity to become better acquainted with curriculum, testing, health services and personnel.

Our Health education program continues to grow, using new materials, films, film-strips and speakers whenever possible. Instruction continues to be provided in the areas of nutrition, dental and personal hygiene, safety, first-aid, venereal diseases, drugs, smoking and alcohol. Dr. Robeit Andelman spoke to the Jr. High group on drugs, alcohol and tobacco this year, followed by a question and answer period.

Something new was added, when a *Baby Sitting Workshop* was offered to sixth grade boys and girls. Those who wanted to, attended four sessions, covering parent and sitter responsibility, first aid, safe surroundings and hazards of the home. A wallet size certificate and a booklet was given to each of the twenty-four girls and boys who completed the course.

Due to the state law, which requires immunizations be completed prior to school entry, and the fine work of the local Rural Health, Well Child Clinic, in-coming students are better protected, than in previous years. Therefore the spring clinic at school shall be discontinued until such time as it might be needed. We thank Dr. Robert Andelman, who directed this year's immunizations: DT - 24, Polio -11.

My sincere appreciation to parents, school staff. S.A.Y., Community Club, Dr. Peter Low, and Dr. Robert Andelman, for their dedication to the health of our students.
