### FELLOW CITIZENS:

We seek your support on warrant articles relating to a new highway dump truck purchase, establishing a Capital Reserve fund for the replacement of the Crystal Lake/ Lockehaven Bridge and bonding authority up to \$99,000 needed to finance the bridge replacement.

This past year May Street reconstruction was completed, an improvement to the corner at the junction of Fuller Road and Shaker Boulevard was made, the South Main Street sidewalk was partially paved, as well as many other highway improvements.

The Planning Board is working on a Master Plan update which should be available in 1981.

A facilities plan amendment is now under way to investigate possible local sewerage solutions. We hope to have a proposed solution to discuss at Town Meeting in 1982.

In 1981 we hope to continue sidewalk improvements, reconstruct a portion of Shedd Street, insulate portions of Town Buildings for energy efficiency, make improvements, as possible, at the beach and in Town cemeteries.

We expect an Enfield Center Post Office to be built this summer.

We also hope citizens will become involved with our various committees to help find or implement solutions to questions or problems important to us as Townspeople and taxpayers.

### WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

GRAFTON S.S.

TOWN OF ENFIELD

To the inhabitants of the Town of Enfield qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Enfield Elementary School in said Town of Enfield on the Tenth day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Polls will open at ten A.M. and will not be closed before eight-thirty P.M. Articles in Warrant will be taken up beginning at seven P.M.

ARTICLE I. To choose by ballot to serve for five years: one member of the Board of Adjustment; to serve for three years: one Selectmen, one Treasurer, one Town Clerk, one Trustee of Trust Funds, one Library Trustee, one Fire Warden, two Recreation Commission members; to serve for two years: one Auditor; to serve for one year: one Auditor.

And also to bring in your ballots on the following questions: "Shall we adopt the new provisions of RSA 72:43b relative to expanded elderly, changing the basis of the exemption from the actual assessed valuation (55%) to the equalized assessed valuation (100%)?"

"Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 654:34a permitting applications for changes in party affiliation to be made with the Town Clerk?"

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, as provided under RSA Chapter 33.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or lease any or all parcels of real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed for non-payment of taxes, or any or all parcels not in public use; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute and deliver in the name of the Town suitable deeds or leases of such real estate. The Selectmen may sell any real estate acquired by a Tax Collector's deed to the person to whom the taxes were assessed, at private sale; but all other sales shall be by public sale, such public sale to be advertised by suitable public notice.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to receive in the name of the Town such gifts, advances, grants-in-aid, Federal Revenue Sharing Funds, HUD, EDA, EPA, FHA, BOR, or other Funds for any Town purposes as may be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any other Federal, State or Local agency or person.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve fund for Fire Truck replacement.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$10,000 and establish a Capital Reserve fund for the replacement of the Crystal Lake/Lockehaven Bridge.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$99,000 as the Town's share to construct a new Crystal Lake/Lockehaven bridge, or to act in any manner thereon; and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$99,000 on the credit of the Town; and to issue and sell bonds and/or notes in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act of the State of New Hampshire, and any amendments relating thereto; and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds and/or notes; determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds and/or notes, as shall be to the best interest of the Town.

ARTICLE 8 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Twenty-eight dollars and One cent (\$1,228.01) for Town Road Aid, and to receive the sum of Eight Thousand One Hundred Eighty Six dollars and Seventy-one cents (\$8,186.71) from the State. ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as revenue against Budget Appropriations in the amounts indicated; and further to authorize the Selectmen to make Pro-rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action thereon:

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will support the Selectmen, citizens and/or committees to investigate and promote orderly economic, commercial or industrial development in the Town to improve the tax base, services, and offer employment opportunity.

ARTICLE II. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate an amount not to exceed \$20,000 from the Water accounts for the purpose of a water study to determine conditions or future need of the water system.

ARTICLE 12. Pursuant to the petition of ten or more legal voters:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$598.00 as its share of the cost of supporting the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association, the only official State of N.H. non-profit vacation travel promotion organization for this area.

ARTICLE 13. Pursuant to the petition of ten or more legal voters:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to help support Headrest, Inc., in return for services to be rendered in 1981. ARTICLE 14. Pursuant to the petition of ten or more legal voters:

To see if the Town of Enfield will appropriate the sum of \$2,986.00 to the Opportunity Center, a non-profit cummunity based organization, in order to support its continued service to the residents of the Town of Enfield.

ARTICLE 15. Pursuant to the petition of ten or more legal voters:

To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in spending by the State or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the State to five percent.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Budget and Raise and Appropriate the various sums recommended and posted by the Budget Committee or act thereon.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote that if the purpose or objects, hereinafter designated, for which appropriations for the year 1981 may have been made have not been fully accomplished during the fiscal year, the funds so appropriated or unexpended on the unfinished portion of such object, shall be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund, dedicated to the purpose or object of its conception, until such time as the Board of Selectmen, acting as agents of the Town shall have the opportunity or occasion for fulfilling or completion of the purpose for which said appropriation was created.

The specifically designated purposes are as follows: Acquisition of New Highway Equipment, Police Cruiser, Ambulance, Civil Defense, Removal and Planting of Trees, Water Department, Sidewalk Construction, New Highway Dump Truck, Town Parks Improvements, Sewerage Study, and Fire Truck. ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$22,000. under the Municipal Finance Act RSA Chapter 33 for the remaining cost of purchasing a New Dump Truck with the principal and interest of the Ioan to be repaid in 1982 and 1983.

ARTICLE 19. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or any other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

### REPORT OF BUDGET COMMITTEE

The Budget Committee attempted this year to make some improvements in the annual budget process. An organizational meeting was held in May and monthly meetings were held until it was necessary to meet more frequently in preparation of the 1981 budget. Uniform budget forms were adopted which department heads were encouraged to use.

The Committee feels the budget this year is strictly a maintenance budget with no frills. Salary increases, in most cases, have been modest, and only capital improvements or reserve funds that are considered necessary have been approved.

The Committee wished to emphasize that the recommendations that were made last year still have high priority.

- A Master Plan the planning board is urged to complete the Master Plan as soon as possible. This is the foundation for planning and will provide a valuable tool in determining the future orderly growth of the Town.
- Capital Improvement Program This would provide the Budget Committee information to respond to the needs of the present and the future monetary considerations.
- Personnel Plan The Committee is often faced with recommending pay increases ranging from 3% to 33%. To develope a more uniform pay and promotion policy, members of the Budget Committee, chaired by Rolf Knudson, have volunteered to develop wage and personnel policies for adoption by the Board of Selectmen.
- 4. Revised Accounting System While some changes may have been implemented, it is becoming increasingly more important to present the Town's financial statements in the form accepted by the accounting profession. The Town will benefit substantially whenever it is necessary to borrow money especially if it is necessary to sell bonds.

## REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT

Criminal incidents showed a decline in our community. In reportable crimes, only thefts showed a slight increase. It should be noted that 62% of the thefts were under \$100. Many were the theft of gasoline from vehicles, which because of rising costs, is becoming a sign of the times.

A substantial decrease was realized in acts of vandalism. A drop from 128 reported in the 10 month reporting period of 1979 to 58 incidents in this 12 month period. We feel that our strong position against drug abuse, which resulted in 11 drug related apprehensions during this period, compared with 2 during 1979, played a significant role in reducing vandalism. Officials at the Regional High School and the Village Elementary School have had a very positive effect on turning the drug abuse problem around. The development of drug education programs by the school, coupled with study groups have had a measureable impact. While much is yet to be done, we feel that we have turned the corner. This problem will remain our top priority for 1981.

We have made a concerted effort at energy conservation. By employing a measure of common sense, better patrol patterns, and proper vehicle maintenance, we managed to save 1,374 gallons of gasoline, while increasing patrol coverage.

Our efforts in striving to provide a community service continue. We welcome citizen concerns on Department or community matters. Please feel welcome to stop by the station to air any concern or call us on our 632-7501 line. This line does not pass to the dispatch center.

## REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest Fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

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## A N N U A L R E P O R T ENFIELD F.A.S.T. SQUAD

The year 1980 has been another busy year for the Enfield FAST (First Aid Stabilization Team) Squad. During 1980 the Squad answered 132 calls for assistance which is a 31% increase over the past two years. Presently we have 19 active members. Regular meetings have been held every third Wednesday throughout the year. Our meetings continue to consist of a business and training portion. In order to increase skills, members have attended the monthly EMS lectures and critique sessions at Mary Hitchcock Hospital. Seven of our members have completed portions of the Advanced Life Support program at Mary Hitchcock Hospital.

Two CPR courses were sponsored by the Squad during the year. Medical service was provided for the July 4th Carnival at Huse Park. Squad members assisted with CPR instruction at the State Police Academy classes at LaSalette. An Advanced Red Cross First Aid Course was offered early in the year. During the year our equipment was moved into the new bay addition at the fire station. Vial of Life packets were again made available to all Enfield citizens. These packets are still available at Whitney Hall along with telephone stickers and Medic Alert literature.

In the fall of the year a district wide disaster drill was held in Enfield involving a school bus accident. Personnel from district ambulance services, rescue squads, police departments, and Mary Hitchcock Hospital participated in the very successful exercise. The squad sponsored a defensive driving course in the fall of 1980. An EMT refresher course was held in November. We would like to thank the Field family for allowing the squad to enjoy a family outing on the shores of Mascoma Lake. Again this year the Enfield FAST Squad would like to thank the many Enfield citizens who have supported our activities with their generous contributions. Anyone interested in squad membership is asked to speak to any one of the squad officers.

## ENFIELD PUBLIC LIBRARY

One of the highlights of 1980 was an exhibit of black and white photographs by Doug and Ruth Johnson in recognition of National Library Week. Both area landmarks and well known New England scenes were represented by this excellent display. Acceptance was so rewarding that plans have been made to continue with a similiar exhibit in 1981.

A series of story hours was provided for pre-schoolers and both sessions of kindergarten. Additionally, the School/Library Program is entering its 5th successful year.

Many new volumes were added to the libraries' collection. Replacement of the World Book and Americana with new editions has completed the updating of our encyclopedia collection. Many other volumes were borrowed from the Bookmobile, which came periodically during the year.

As Librarian, I participated in a computer programming course to become familiar with this advancing technology. Although it is doubtful that our library will become directly involved with computers in the near future it is important to be aware of the resources available to public libraries through this media.

Additionally I attended several other professional meetings and workshops pertinent to library administration. In July I was appointed as a Delegate to the Qualifications Review Board, which is part of the Statewide Library Development Program.

Appreciative acknowledgement is extended to all who donated time, books and materials to the library this year. A special note of thanks is made to the Friends of the Library for their many volunteer hours of assistance with the children and the Bookmobile.

The library administration extends a warm welcome to all those that visit the library and utilize its facilities.

Marjorie A. Carr, Librarian Mascoma Home Health Services, formerly known as Mascoma Area Health Council will this year start its 13th year of service to the Mascoma Valley towns of Canaan, Enfield, Grafton, Dorchester and Orange.

The services are funded in part by the towns that are served and this guarantees that home health services, visiting nurse, physical therapist, home health aide and the recently added service, occupational therapy, will be available to all residents of that town. Participation also allows for disease prevention programs, well child clinics, dental clinics and blood pressure screenings.

The agency is a certified agency under the Medicare program and all towns which it contracts with will have at least one representative on the Board of Directors,

so each town will have a decision in the policy making.

Anyone can request services - you need not wait for your doctor to refer. A nurse or therapist will make an evaluation visit to determine if services can be helpful, further visits will be made under physicians orders.

The agency serves all ages - all economic groups with a goal of preventing or shortening institutionalization, promoting rehabilitation to patients maximum and return to independence.

Some examples of services possible are: treatments, dressing, injections, teaching families the care of a patient, evaluation of status care of the acutely iil, chronically and terminally ill. Some of the most common conditions seen are cardiac disease, cancer, stroke, neurological diseases, diabetes, respiratory disease and orthopedic problems.

The services of a pediatric nurse practitioner are available to young familles and a newborn visit is made by the nurse if new parents so desire it.

The office and clinic space of the agency is located on Prospect St. in Enfield, the phone number 632-7234. We are always happy to answer questions by phone or if you would care to stop at the office, show you the facility and tell you more about the work we do.

#### REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMITTEE

The Recreation Commission's program for 1980-1981 saw expansion, reinstatement and continuation of activities. We continued to operate the beach for instructional and recreational swimming. The playground program at Huse Park was, as in the past, sponsored by the commission. This year instruction was provided in craft and group sport activities. To culminate this program a bus trip to Mt. Kearsarge was undertaken.

In an effort to make winter more bearable, a movie program was instituted. This was a series of seven films which were shown on Saturdays. We attempted to secure movies that would be of interest to different age groups.

The facilities at Huse Park received attention also. We extended the electrical system to accommodate heavier equipment. Horse shoe pits were reinstated and a third court added. This third court was regulation size for women.

Expansion activities indluded assisting in the formulation of and active participation in an instructional soccer program on Saturday mornings. There were six sessions of this in the fall for grades three through six.

In an effort to include older participation, the Enfield gym was opened from 2 - 4 p.m. on Sundays. This was to give adults 18 and over an opportunity to play basketball and volleyball.

Groundwork was laid for public skating at the "frog pond" on lower Main Street. A light was installed to make night skating possible and support in flooding the area was provided by the fire department.

Our biggest venture was to provide the town with its own July 4th celebration. We had over 20 individuals and organizations reserve spaces for this celebration. The commission sponsored a horse shoe tournament, a foul shooting contest and a pie eating contest. Our final event was the climbing of a greased pole in quest of a \$20 bill. Our sincere thank you is extended to all of those who provided concessions for this event.

New equipment was purchased for various programs. These purchases included two soccer bails, two volleybalis and a volleyball net, horse shoes and a croquet set. Materials for the summer playground crafts were purchased also.

We wish to thank the many people who helped us have a successful year. This appreciation is extended to those that helped run the programs as well as those who participated in them.

Special appreciation is felt for Sayward Shepard who gave many hours of behind the scenes assistance.

In an effort to communicate more directly with the taxpaying citizens of Grafton County, we, the Grafton County Commissioners, are writing to you through your individual town or municipal reports.

Due to inflated Nursing Home expenses with somewhat reduced revenues and rapidly increasing costs of welfare reimbursements to the State, our budget year ended very close to the line, with a \$3,620 surplus. Because of the Delegation's decision to use a two-year surplus in one budget year to allow citizens a reduced county tax in FY 1980, the 1981 fiscal year budget resulted in a heavier tax factor making up that decrease as well as offsetting reduced revenues and allowing for standard budget increases.

As with towns, the county welfare assistance programs are increasing and becoming more involved, especially with the current energy crunch and rapidly inflating economy. We also foresee a possible decrease in Federal and State contributions to social service programs which could have considerable impact on local budgets.

The sewage disposal system has progressed slightly, with planning completed and ready to go out for bid. If all goes well, we may be able to submit a final report next year.

The Commissioners worked closely with the Nursing Home Employee Council to set up a wage/benefit package more compatible to the State program for Glencliff employees. The Commissioners hope to work out a job description/ wage scale plan for courthouse employees in the near future.

Grafton County is gradually converting from a bookkeeping machine system to a computerized system for all county accounts. Payroll was converted effective January 1, 1980, and vendor payment and receipt programs were recently added. Patient accounts and purchase order programs will be added later. The system is too new for comprehensive comments, but we anticipate constructive changes in the overall accounting and reporting system.

The Commissioners hold their regular meeting every Monday (except holidays) at 9:30 a.m. in the Commissioners' Office of the Grafton County Courthouse, followed by a second meeting at the Grafton County Nursing Home Complex at 1:00 p.m., which regularly includes visits to farm and jail facilities. Public and press are welcome, and, in fact, are encouraged to attend the meetings.

A number of reasons contributed to the large increase in expenditures:

- a. layoffs not covered by unemployment compensation
- b. poor job market
- c. high cost of fuel and electricity
- d. the lateness with which Federal funds for fuel assistance became available
- e. single parent families getting no support aid until the State assumes responsibility
- f. last, but by no means least, the Town's responsibility of assuming Foster Care expenses

To date the latter amounts to 1,033.33 for 1980 with an anticipated cost of 450/month through the 1980-81 school year and possibly longer.

Credits: ie. repayment by responsible Towns and Grafton County increased substantially this year. Twenty-five per cent of the monies received were due to placement of Welfare Liens on real property of persons receiving General Assistance. The Town received these monies when the properties were sold. However, this type of credit is the exception rather than the rule.

Because of the above, the proposed appropriation seems to be in line with anticipated expenditures.
