SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Last year we stood at the "crossroads", this year we seem to be more on the threshhold - the threshhold of substantial improvement. If the budget for 1985 is approved at the Annual Town Meeting, a reduction of \$1.50 per thousand should be realized in the Town's portion of your tax bill. In addition 1985 will bring the retirement of our bonded indebtedness incurred by the property revaluation. Financially we are prospering.

The highway department is becoming more efficient and effective also. The loader and sanders we purchased have enhanced our ability to respond to severe weather occurrences which beset out Town with regularity. New tools and maintenance equipment have been purchased which reduce the maintenance time required and the resultant loss of efficiency due to equipment down time. Looking forward to 1985 we have leased on a lease purchase agreement an Oshkosh all wheel drive truck fitted for snow plowing. This vehicle has already proven invaluable in keeping our roads open.

The fire department has emerged from the traumatic events of summer stronger and better than ever. Over 34 fire fighters are ready to respond to emergency fire and rescue situations. There is an article for consideration to create a permanent Board of Fire Wards. The temporary board we appointed has been effective in providing thoughtful management buffering the sometimes heated relationship that characterized the Selectmen's efforts to manage the department. We expect further growth to continue.

The roadside bay of the old Town Garage has been used for a salt shed. Salt trucks dumping at the front have structurally damaged this end of the building. We propose relocating salt storage to the vicinity of the new town garage and constructing a safe storage area there. This is a low cost item which can be completed from the budgeted highway monies.

The Town Hall needs painting as does the Library. We have included articles to raise and appropriate \$3500. for this purpose.

Replacing the sills under the front of the Town Hall and the dry-rotted beams above still need to be done. The \$10,000. appropriation voted for this purpose has been carried over as an unexpended liability to complete this repair. A request for bids has been published and the work should proceed without delay.

The police department has its new cruiser. With it, and the communications equipment gleaned from Government surplus, Chief Kelley continues to exercise quiet and competent control over his department's activities.

Solid Waste Disposal is a cloud on the horizon. We cannot continue using the Hillsboro landfill facility indefinitely: One proposal is that we create a transfer /compacting station and truck solid waste to the Concord incinerator. This seems a good proposal, and the operating costs should not increase substantially. However, there will be a site acquisition cost, a site preparation cost, and the cost of needed shelters and equipment. Exactly how extensive this will be is not known at this time. We are asking for \$1000.to begin the site acquisition process. An article to join the Concord Cooperative in Solid Waste Disposal is included in the warrant. This seems the direction in which we should proceed.

The Selectmen's office has purchased a computer which handles most of the town records and which will be expanded in the future to include other pertinent information as the needs of our citizens increasingly dictate.

1984 certainly has not been a year without challenge and turmoil, but viewed in retrospect, it has been a good year - a year of positive growth - leaving us on the threshold of continued improvement in our town government.

The Selectmen wish to thank all of the individuals who served on committees, attended meetings, or who privately counseled us. Without the wisdom, advice, practical knowledge, experience and guidance of these dedicated individuals we Selectmen could not have done as well.

TOWN OF DEERING State of New Hampshire TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Deering in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, GREETINGS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Deering on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at 10:00 A.M. in the morning to act upon the following subjects;

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Polls will open at 10:00 A.M. in the morning and will remain open until 6:00 P.M. (The polls may be continued to be open following the above hour by vote of the meeting, but may not be closed before the hour of 6:00 P.M. - RSA 39:2).

Additionally, pursuant to RSA 39:2a you are hereby notified that Article 2 through 28 will be taken up at 7:30 P.M.

(All articles hereinafter are submitted by the Selectmen unless otherwise noted).

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of the Town Officers, Agents, Committees and Auditors for the year 1984.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrown money in anticipation of taxes and raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,500. for payment of interest expense, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to auction property taken by Tax Collector's Deeds, in accordance with the provisions of RSA 80:42.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$827. for the Contoocook Valley Counseling Center or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500. for the support of the Hillsboro Park Board, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3270. for the support of the Hillsboro Youth Services Director or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400. for the current operating expenses of the Planning Board; \$400. for the current operating expenses of the Zoning Board of Adjustment and \$400. for the current operating expenses of the Conservation Commission, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000. for costs of investigating the possible acquisition of land to be used as a Solid Waste Disposal Transfer Station, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen on behalf of the Town to enter into a cooperative agreement, pursuant to RSA Chapter 53-A, for the purpose of joining together towns and cities in a joint and and cooperative effort for the disposal of solid waste in a manner which will meet federal and state regulations and for the economical and efficient recovery of energy from said solid waste disposal. The Cooperative to be formed under the cooperative agreement will be designated the "Concord Regional Solid Waste/Resource Recovery Cooperative". A copy of the current draft of the proposed cooperative agreement is posted with the warrant and is available at the town offices during normal business hours. The Board of Selectmen is speciffically authorized on behalf of the Town (a) to execute and deliver the cooperative agreement (with such changes therein from the posted agreement as the Board of Selectmen shall approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the Board of Selectmen's execution thereof) and such other instruments, documents, and agreements as the Board of Selectmen may deem necessary or desirable in furtherance of the purposes of the cooperative agreement; (b) to cause to be performed all obligations which may from time to time be required pursuant to the terms of the cooperative agreement; and (c) to take action relative thereto.

And to authorize the Treasurer to pay each Selectman \$1,500. per year and to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the year 1985, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000. for structural repairs and renovations of the Town Hall and authorize the withdrawal of \$4,516.74 for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000, for the painting of the Town Hall and the sum of \$500. for the painting of the library, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an Ordinance for the Town of Deering as follows:

DEERING FIRE DEPARTMENT ORDINANCE

Preamble

Whereas, the Town of Deering is desirous of adopting an Ordinance relative to fire protection in the Town of Deering and establishing guidelines and regulations for the administration of the Town of Deering Fire Department, be it therefore ordained by the Town of Deering duly assembled at its Annual Meeting as follows:

Section I. Establishment of Fire Wards

The fire wards of the Town of Deering shall constitute a Board of Fire Wards. There shall be five (5) fire wards, all of whom shall be residents of the Town of Deering, to be appointed as follows:

- A. The Board of Selectmen shall appoint one of its own as an ex-officio member for a term of one-year during his term of office.
 - B. The fire chief, during his term of office.
- C. Three members of the general public to be appointed by the Selectmen within thirty (30) days after the Annual Town Meeting who shall serve staggered terms of three (3) years, respectively. At the first appointment one member shall be appointed for a one-year term, one member appointed for a two-year term, and one member appointed for three-year term. No member of the Deering Fire Department other than the fire chief shall be eligible for appointment to serve as a fire ward.

Section II. Fire Chief, Appointment, Duties and Powers

- A. The fire chief shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen for a term of one (1) year, and said appointee shall be technically qualified by training, education or experience.
- B. The fire chief shall have, unless otherwise directed herein, the organizational and administrative control of the fire department and shall supervise and direct the necessary officers for training, fire prevention and suppression of fires at the scene of any fire or other emergency.
- C. The fire chief shall be responsible for the implementation of policies and other directions of the Board of Fire Wards.
- D. The fire chief shall have the authority to inspect all buildings, structures, or other places within the Town except the interior of a private dwelling, where any combustible material, including waste paper, rags, shavings, waste, leather, rubber, crates, boxes, barrels, rubbish or other combustible material that is or may become dangerous as a fire menace to such buildings, structures or other places has been allowed to accumulate or where such chief or his designated representative has reason to believe that such material of a combustible nature has accumulated or is likely to accumulate.

E. The fire chief may be removed during his term of office only for just cause and after hearing with reasonable notice in writing of the charges against him.

Section III. Fire Wards, Duties and Powers

- A. The fire wards shall choose from their own membership a Chairman and a Clerk. The Board shall prepare a proposed budget for the fire department each year to be submitted to the Board of Selectmen.
- B. The fire wards shall appoint firefighters and officers and shall grant such promotions as may be appropriate.
- C. The fire wards shall prepare, adopt and amend from time to time Rules and Regulations of the Fire Department and shall further set the policies of the Fire Department.
- D. The fire wards, shall have the authority and control of all fire engines and apparatus designed or used for the extinguishment of fire in the Town.

Section IV. Adoption of R.S.A. 154

To the extent that the provisions of R.S.A. 154 are not inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance, the Town of Deering does hereby adopt the provisions of R.S.A. 154. The provisions of R.S.A. 154:5 are specifically not adopted by the Town of Deering.

To the extent provided by the statutes of the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Deering hereby agrees to indemnify and save harmless the Fire Chief, the Fire Wards and the members of the Deering Fire Department from any claims made against them as a result of their performance of their official duties and while acting within the scope of their authority.

Section V. Effective Date

This Ordinance shall take effect on April 1. 1985.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000. for the Fire Department,or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,500. for the Police Department and the sum of \$200. for Civil Defense, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000. for the purchase of Highway Equipment and authorize the withdrawal of \$10,000. for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,600. for the improvement of Reservoir Road, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums of money for Highway Purposes:

Maintenance and General Expenses of the Highway Department \$ 138,914.

Road Sealing

14,000.

(State Share Highway Block Grant Aid \$53,904.61), or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000. for the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250. for the support of the Hillsboro Rescue Squad and the sum of \$250. for the support of the Weare Rescue Squad, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the transfer of the North School House Lot, so called, bordered by land of Peter Soukas, Thelma Copadis, Ann Watson and Thomas Copadis, located on the south-west corner of Peter Woods Hill Road and Glen Road, to said Peter Soukas, Thelma Copadis, Ann Watson and Thomas Copadis upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen see fit, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amounts indicated, and, further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or to take any other action relating thereto.

Road Maintenance

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to discontinue a short portion at the mouth of the Old Deering Road at its intersection with the East Deering Road and relocate the Old Deering Road to lie along side the barn at the C. Spencer Cake property. The petitionier, C. Spencer Cake, et al, shall agree to be responsible for all costs, liability and damages which may be assessed against the Town of Deering or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to trade, sell or otherwise dispose of any surplus Town property, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept or purchase on behalf of the Town any Federal or State surplus fire, police or highway equipment, or to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 28. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting.

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT

Upon completing my first full year working for the Townspeople of Deering I am pleased to report a substantial amount of progress.

First on my list of improvements, the following roads were partially or fully graveled -

Skye Farm Road Old County Road Extension

Old Henniker Road Clement Hill Road

Dickie Hill Road Gove Road

Camp Road Bartlett Hill Road Sodom Hill Second N. H. Turnpike Fisher Road Farrell Hill Road

Secondly we installed many new and improved some existing culverts. Many habitual trouble spots have thus been eliminated, and with proper maintenance the expense of installing new culverts will be kept to a minimum.

A two mile section of Old County Road was ditched, shimmed and sealed. Dickie Hill Road was also ditched and due to the effects of winter frost heaving required shimming and sealing.

The winter of 1983-84 was an extremely icy one but due to the vote of the Townpeople, we were able to stay ahead of the storms with the newly acquired equipment.

Our plans for 1985 include the continued gravelling of Class V roads and a special article for the ditching, shimming and sealing of Reservoir Road to the intersection of Old County Road (considered to be the road that most needs repair). In addition to this some of the much needed repairs will be made to the southeasterly end of East Deering Road. (Shimming and sealing).

We are leasing a 1973 all wheel drive plow truck on a trial basis with the option to buy upon taxpayer approval in 1986.

This past summer we acquired the State's status reports on all bridges in Deering together with a list of necessary repairs. Some of the repairs have already been done and by spreading the work over a two year period all bridges on Class V roads will be brought up to a satisfactory state of repair.

We appreciate the support and cooperation from the townspeople this past year and look forward to a productive 1985.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT REPORT

On April 19, 1984, a special town meeting was held and the voters adopted the provisions of RSA 674:24-29 entitled "Emergency Temporary Zoning and Planning Ordinance", otherwise referred to as Interim Zoning.

The Board of Selectmen shall act as administrative officer charged with enforcement and may issue building or use permits if clearly promoted by law.

This ordinance will remain in effect for two annual meetings.

The general purpose of a zoning ordinance is designed:

- a. To lessen congestion on the streets;
- b. To secure safety from fires;
- c. To promote health and general welfare;
- d. To provide adequate light and air;
- e. To prevent the overcrowding of land;
- f. To avoid undue concentration of population;
- g. To facilitate the adequate provision of transportation, solid waste facilities, water, sewerage, schools, parks; and
- h. To assure proper use of natural resources and other public requirements.

The general power of a zoning ordinance is designed to regulate and restrict:

- a. The heights and size of buildings;
- b. Lot sizes;
- c. The density of population; and
- d. The location and use of buildings.

During 1984, the Zoning Board has reviewed three applications for zoning variances. All were approved by a unanimous vote.

The second year of Interim Zoning will include support to the Planning Board on preparation of a permanent zoning ordinance. Monthly meetings will be held on the third Thursday of each month at 7:00 P.M. We invite anyone with an interest to join us.

REPORT OF THE DEERING FIRE DEPARTMENT 1984

The new Deering Fire Department was brought into being in September when the Board of Selectmen created the Board of Fire Wards and named William Edes to be Fire Chief. The Fire Wards moved quickly to appoint enough members to effectively protect the town and man the necessary equipment; most of the members of the previous fire department have returned to serve again. The Board of Fire Wards has the mission to operate the fire department, with inputs from the firemen, the Board of Selectmen, and the residents of the Town of Deering. To accomplish this, the Board is comprised of the Fire Chief; a member of the Board of Selectmen; and three members representing the general public. The members as of the end of 1984 are William Edes, Fire Chief; Peter Beane, Selectman; and Ray Farrell, Herb Frederick, and John Van der Linde.

The Fire Wards exist to separate political considerations from the operation of the necessary protection service that the fire department is intended to provide. And it seems to be working; fire department morale is high, the department is responding well to calls for fire or rescue service, the fire department equipment has been upgraded, and the 1985 budget submitted in December showed a reduction from the levels of the past several years while providing for the coming year's anticipated needs.

Our Fire Department is a source of pride for the town. We have 34 firefighters. A very good percentage of the members are state certified fire fighters and many more are involved in furthering their training. The Rescue Squad, under the direction of

Gordon Sherman has 18 members, 9 of which are Emergency Medical Technicians. The department responded to 8 in-town fire calls and nine rescue calls from its inception to the end of 1984.

Our town is growing. Looking ahead, we can see that adjustments will have to be made to accommodate this growth. Good planning is essential to the town in the months and years ahead in the fire department as in all other areas of town governmental services. Your inputs are valuable; be sure to communicate them to the Selectmen, the Planning Board, and the Board of Fire Wards.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

Article 9. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400. for the current operating expenses of the Planning Board and the sum of \$400. for the current operating expenses of the Conservation Commission.

Article 10. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250. for the support of the Hillsboro Rescue Squad and the sum of \$150. for the Weare Rescue.

Article 11. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$325. for the Contoocook Valley Counseling Center.

Article 12. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the \$500. for the support of the Hillsboro Park Board.

Article 13. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3270. for the support of the Hillsboro Youth Services Director.

Article 15. It was voted to authorize and direct the Selectmen to review the considerations which may be involved in participating with the City of Concord Solid Waste Resource Recovery Project, to enter into discussions and negotiations regarding the project, and to report back to the Town as to their findings and recommendations. A decision by the Town to participate or not to participate in the project will be deferred to a special Town Meeting in the Fall of 1984, or the regular Town Meeting in March of 1985.

Article 16. It was voted as amended to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000. for structural repairs and renovations of the Town Hall.

Article 17. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,700. for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser and to authorize withdrawal of \$10,527.63 plus interest, from the Police Capital Reserve Fund.

Article 18. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,500. for the Police Department and the sum of \$200. for Civil Detense.

Article 19. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$29,551.13 for the purchase of an International Payloader and the sum of \$10,450. for the purchase of two

hydraulic spreaders and authorize the withdrawal of \$18,872. for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

Article 20. It was voted as amended to raise and appropriate the following sums of money for Highway Purposes:

Maintenance and General Expenses \$ 137,713.

2. Road Sealing 14,000.

(State Share Highway Block Grant Aid \$47,606.17)

Article 21. Negative vote on \$10,000. for Highway Capital Reserve.

Article 22. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000. for the Fire Department.

Article 23. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000. for the purchase of equipment for the Fire Department.

Article 24. Negative vote on purchase of the used Police Cruiser for the use of the Fire Department.

Article 25. This article to adopt the National Fire Protection Associations Life Safety Code 101 was dismissed.

Article 26. This article to withdraw from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund money for Town Officers Expenses and Road Maintenance was withdrawn.

Article 27. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to use the unexpended balance of \$8,207.37 revaluation funds to purchase a computer system and issuance of a property appraisal booklet for the year 1984.

Article 28. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$78.68 for Town Road Aid.

It was voted to authorize the Board of Article 29. Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

Article 30. It was voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept or purchase on behalf of the Town any Federal or State surplus Fire or Highway equipment.

It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to Article 31. trade, sell or otherwise dispose of any surplus Town Property.

Atticle 32. A standing ovation was given to George F. Wolf, Gladys Snow and Clara Rich for their many years of service to the Town.
