SCHOOL REPORT, TOWN DISTRICT.

The teaching in our schools during the past year has been, for the most part, that of young and inexperienced teachers. In several cases the spring term was a first attempt.

A good degree of success seems to have been attained throughout the town, and in several of the schools much teaching ability was displayed.

Earnest, faithful work from teacher and pupils cannot fail to bring large results, and this we have seen in nearly all the schools.

The work of the teacher would be much easier and the results more satisfactory if each school-room could be supplied with more maps and books of reference.

A generous appropriation was devoted last year to a display of patriotism, and flags now wave over all our school-houses. May not an equal sum be granted this year for the purchase of appliances which would be helpful in the real work of the schoolroom?

The trustees of the Academy fund secured the services of Mr. Geo. C. Barton, a senior in Dartmouth college, as teacher of the high school.

He proved to be an efficient and faithful teacher. This term of twelve weeks each year is a very important addition to the school work of the year for our older pupils.

We hope the district will continue to give an appropriation for this school.

PENACOOK SCHOOL DISTRICT.

To the Citizens of Penacook School District:

In submitting the sixth annual report, the Board of Education take pleasure in attesting to the general success of our schools during the past year. While the same have not attained to that degree of excellence that might be desired or expected, we believe that the progress made compares favorably with that of any preceding year during the existence of the board. One of the principal elements that go to make up a successful school is good discipline, and in this particular we think that at no time have the schools maintained a higher standard than during the past year.

There has been better order in the school-room, and more quiet and orderly conduct about the grounds. One pernicious habit that has been noticed in the first grade upon former visits, that of promiscuous whispering, has been nearly, if not quite, eradicated.

While the schools appear orderly and studious, there seems to be an absence of that vigor and determination which is indispensably necessary to attain a high degree of success. There appears, upon the part of too many, an indifference to the opportunities presented. In no walk or business of life can only a moderate degree of success be obtained without earnest, constant, and vigorous effort, and in nothing is this truer than in the pursuit of an education. If there were manifested more confidence and energy upon the part of the scholars, particularly in the grammar school where most is expected, the appearance of the schools would be much more pleasing and satisfactory.

The fault of speaking in a low tone of voice and in a constrained manner has long existed in this school, and this, upon topics that the scholar has mastered, shows that it is a result of habit, and not from ignorance of the subject. We have frequently spoken of this, and believe that there has been an improvement.

In these criticisms we would not be understood as underrating the value of our schools. The fact that those of our scholars who go to other institutions of learning take high rank is conclusive evidence that our schools compare favorably with others. We believe that we have good schools. The attendance during the past year has been fair. That many families have removed from the district the unusually large number of empty tenements shows, consequently the number of scholars has been reduced; but with the return of business in the spring, we anticipate the usual number of scholars.

Through the efforts of a truant officer we have endeavored to secure a fuller and more constant attendance. In some instances children were found either in want of suitable clothing, or the mite they earned in the factory or shop was necessary to the maintenance of the family. This is a wrong that should be corrected. With two or three exceptions, the attendance has been very constant. We would caution parents against permitting their children to remain away from school, even for a single day, except upon the most urgent need, as it works a great injury not only to the child but to all the members of the class.

The recent law, requiring the district to furnish text-books and other supplies free for the use of the scholar, has entailed upon the board much additional labor. In purchasing new text-books we have endeavored to select those best adapted for school work—with what degree of success remains to be seen. The appropriation of \$150 was hardly adequate to furnish all the books needed, but a small annual sum will be sufficient to meet the demand from time to time, and to relieve the parents of this burden. The children and teachers are to be complimented upon the care taken of these books, as, with few exceptions, they have been kept very neatly.

If the resources of the district permitted, it would be pleasant and profitable to have special instruction in either penmanship, elocution, or music, as might be thought best. Possibly the district, relieved from its indebtedness, will provide means for its execution.

Believing that a constant change of teachers is injurious to the success of the schools, as much valuable time is lost in the teacher's learning the ability and temperament of the scholars and in adapting them to his ways and methods, we have been fortunate in retaining the same corps of teachers as last year,—Mr. Bert E. Holland as principal, Miss Susie A. Hall in the intermediate, and Miss Georgia A. Chandler in the primary school.
