### Town Warrant

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brentwood in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Brentwood on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 4. To see if the Town will appropriate \$286.02 for Town Road Aid. The State will contribute \$1,144.09.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to decide on a site for the Tractor House and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for grading and erection of same. The lumber is all cut and stuck up.

- 6. To see what action the Town wishes to take relative to appointing a committee to invetigate the advisability of floating a Bond issue, to grade, drain and hard surface all dirt roads in the Town that might come under Class V. This committee to ascertain what roads would fall under this classification, and to obtain an estimate of the cost of construction of same, also the rate of interest on the Bond issue. Said committee to report its findings at the March 1950 Meeting. Dated at Brentwood, N. H., this tenth day of February 1949. By request.
- 7. By request of Cornelia R. Pike and 29 others, to see if Town will vote upon the petition to repair and hard surface that portion of the road from the corner of Route 1.11-A to the present hard surface road near the property of Paul Thyng, and to appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for this purpose.
- 5 8. By request of John J. Hallinan and 33 others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for the purpose of resurfacing and tarring the road from Woods corner to the old Knight place.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to request the State Tax Commission to make a complete reappraisal of the lands and buildings within the Town, to equalize valuations in accordance with the Law and to appropriate money for this purpose.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$8,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### Report of Fire Department

To the Board of Selectmen:

The successful control of brush and woods fires is highly dependent upon the cooperation of all townspeople in the prevention of these fires. To the end of enlisting this help, many wardens have asked us to assist them in preparing a brief statement which could be printed in the forthcoming Annual Town Reports. This statement appears below and your cooperation in seeing to its publication will be highly helpful.

### REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year has been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

# Superintendent's Report

January 21, 1949

To the School Board and Citizens of Brentwood:

It is with pleasure that I submit my second report as Superintendent of your schools.

The major problem facing all of us today is finding the money to give our children the type of education they deserve. All phases of education are costing more money and there seems little chance of a recession. Studies show that our elementary schools will have a large increase in enrollment during the next 8-10 years and we will feel this in the High Schools until 1960. Larger and better school facilities are needed badly. It is hoped that some form of State or Federal legislation will aid this situation financially in the near future. This item needs your active support so that the property tax will not continue to carry such a heavy burden.

During the summer vacation period the South Road School was closed and the Marshall's Corner school reopened. This change allows much more space for the children in grades 4-6.

### **GUIDANCE**

No school can have an efficient instructional program without knowing what it is accomplishing. It must know what is happening to boys and girls as well as what it is teaching them. The children in your schools are being given new type intelligence tests this year that measure both verbal and non-verbal. These tests will tell what a child is thinking as well as doing. Parents are urged to consult with teachers concerning their child's school progress.

The tests are being corrected and processed in the Superintendent's Office thus saving much valuable teacher time. Standardized Achievement tests will be given next year.

# REPAIRS

At the Crawley School the roof has been shingled, the floors sealed, poison ivy cut, flag pole fixed and interior painted.

At the Marshall's Corner School the interior has been repainted, blackboards and new window shades installed.

Water was tested and found satisfactory.

### **TEACHERS**

Miss Vera Favor of Tilton was elected teacher in grades 4-6 replacing Mrs. Drina Blanchette who left to accept a position in Milton. Miss Favor has a diploma from Plymouth and has attended Plymouth and Keene Summer Sessions. She has had twenty-four years teaching experience in N. H. and has has a teaching certificate.

# P. T. A.

Brentwood continues to have one of the most active organizations in this area. Monthly discussions have been of interest to all who attend. Much work has been done in a financial nature to aid the construction of a new school. The Brentwood PTA deserves your support and credit for the fine work they are doing.

# VISUAL AIDS

During the fall, I received a war surplus sound motion picture projector for use in your schools. This was obtained through the State Board of Education. This machine is for the use of Brentwood, Fremont and Sandown. To date six films have been shown to each school and films are planned for each month during the balance

of the school year. Pictures concern health, safety, conservation, science, geography and history. The use of motion pictures supplements textbooks and is a valuable aid in the process of education.

### AN INVITATION

The schools are yours! Why not visit them while in session? Teachers welcome visits of parents to class as well as to public assemblies. The home and the school should cooperatively work together for the development of your children. Parents should take a little time to acquaint themselves with school problems and get to know the teachers and accept them as friends. Greater public participation in school affairs is a crying need in this communty and deserves your support.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, teachers, pupils and citizens of the community for their hearty cooperation during the past year.

The annual health examination of eyes, ears, teeth, throats and skin was made during the early part of the school year. This examination was followed up with home calls for the correction of physical defects, and any other conditions which would result in having healthier and happier children.

The usual health program is being carried on with frequent visits to the schools, close contact with parents, teachers and pupils.

Our greatest need is dental work. It is impossible to

secure the services of a dentist for clinic work. This condition exists all through the State. Therefore I ask the parents to secure their own family dentist and get their children to him at least once a year.

I sincerely thank the School Board, teachers, parents, P. T. A. and many others for their continued cooperation.
