THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE [L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, as recommended by the Budget.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes paid on or before the first Saturday of August next.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to buy liability insurance on town labor and pay the same out of the Highway Department.

6. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a small pump for the Center Barnstead Fire Co., \$335.00, and appropriate money for the same; and authorize the Selectmen to sell old pump and apply the same towards the purchase of the new one.

7. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a

medium size grader using grader fund and authorize the Selectmen to borrow the balance.

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following:

I give and bequeath to the Town of Barnstead, New Hampshire, the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) in trust, however, for the following purposes: the interest, income and profit of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to be used annually for the perpetual care of the Hollis and Milo Bunker lots in Parade Cemetery; and the interest, income and profit of the other One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to be used annually for the perpetual care of the Aurilla and Albert Pitman lots in Pitman Cemetery.

Provided further, that if any one year all of the interest should not be needed for the care of said Bunker and Pitman lots, then whatever balance remains is to be used for other lots in said two cemeteries where no bequest has been made for the care of lots; provided, however, that should I attend to this matter during my lifetime, this bequest is to become void.

9. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

FOREST FIRE REPORT

TEAM WORK WILL DO THE JOB

Team work has won victories from time immemorial—for families, towns, cities, states and nations. Team work is the highest form and most democratic example of cooperation. - MUST secure the required permit from your local forest fire warden before burning.
- MUST use necessary precautions while burning or smoking in or near woodlands.

(B) REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

During the past half century of turmoil and change, the values of our American educational system have been apparent to all thinking citizens. Leaders of the past and present have expressed their faith in a public school system. Presidents Washington, Lincoln, Roosevelt, and now Eisenhower have made statements of its prominence among the important institutions of the free American society.

Perhaps some foreign leaders have recognized its possibilities more fully than we. They continue to use it as a device to twist minds, spread untruths, and promote isms that benefit the few at the expense of the many.

In our democracy, the ideals of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness are brought closer to realization by means of the free public school. As we govern ourselves, better conditions for all of our peoples depends upon a constantly improving citizenry. Our schools are generally recognized as the best means to promote this improvement, and are deserving of continued public belief and confidence.

Though occasional weaknesses are observed, and slurs are cast, our free public schools continue to survive political and economic emergencies, and wars. We constantly seek to improve as new methods are devised, and new needs of the children are demonstrated.

TEACHERS

Mrs. Marguerite Alden and Mrs. Dorothy Cotton continue as our teachers at the Parade School. These ladies are producing successful results with your boys and girls. Both have years of experience and have little difficulty with crowded rooms and multiple grades. Mr. Clarence Merryfield, who commutes from Concord, is serving his first year as principal and teacher of grades 7 and 8 at the Center School. Mrs. Elizabeth Golden, after many years out of teaching, has returned to the profession and is our teacher for the first three grades at the Center School. Our teachers are performing their duties faithfully. I hope the community will show its continued confidence in them by helping them solve the usual problems of boys and girls, in a friendly and understanding way and by paying them salaries commensurate with the difficulties of their positions.

IMPROVEMENTS AND REPAIRS

Your School Board found it necessary last spring, as an emergency measure, to replace the heating system at the Center School. No additional taxes are required since there was a sufficient balance for this installation. With its completion we now have good heating plants at both schools.

It was evident that the entrances at the Center School needed repair. Consequently, during the summer months a thorough job was done by completing a porch roof and new steps. In addition one room was painted and all rooms were thoroughly cleaned for the opening of school.

The water system at the Center School continues to cause a lot of trouble. The supply is inadequate. In spite of the many hours voluntarily given by one of the school board members, this school has been frequently out of water. The only answer seems to be an artesian well. A special article in the school warrant for March gives the voters of the school district the opportunity to make a decision on this improvement. It is badly needed.

With the continual addition of electrical units and

consumption, the wiring systems in both schools need some improvement. Some expenditures should be made for a minimum of re-wiring to secure better lighting and reduce the fire hazard.

PARENT TEACHERS ASSOCIATION

The Parent Teachers Association continues to have regular meetings. This group has the interest of the boys and girls at heart and can do much to support improved education and good feeling.

INSURANCE

The School Board and the Superintendent recommend a large increase in insurance coverage. For the first year the increase premiums will be \$288. In following years this original amount will be somewhat reduced since our policies can be on a three-year basis. The fire hazard is always greater in wooden buildings. If a fire does destroy our school property when it is reasonably well insured, the district would receive enough to make a good beginning on replacement.

FUTURE PLANS

If the present trends continue, it looks as if we can expect an elementary school enrollment of 150 pupils or more in the near future. At the present time, our school rooms are filled to capacity. Each pupil has less classroom space than is desirable and far less teacher time than is ideal. In the very near future we shall probably need at least one additional classroom. Interested parents and groups are already showing concern over this need. Without too much delay, we should determine together the best way to solve this problem within the financial ability of your community.

FINANCES

For the school years 1951-1952 and 1952-1953 the proposed school budgets have remained about equal.

Increased operating costs, higher tuition rates, improvements, and additional high school pupils are the reasons for your School Board's request for a larger school budget for 1953-1954. Estimated tuitions are nearly \$3,000 over the present year. Your present teachers are receiving considerably less than the state average for the current year and are deserving of a reasonable increase in salary. If an adequate water supply is to be provided at the Center School, additional money will have to be provided. We recommend raising some of the necessary amount for the well and borrowing the balance.

The sources of revenue for the school districts of New Hampshire continue to remain the same. The major source is the real estate tax. It is obvious that the amount of real estate to be taxed is not increasing as rapidly as the number of pupils to be educated. The proposed budget which seems to your School Boara and Superintendent to represent the minimum needs, will require approximately a 10% increase in school taxes provided other sources of revenue do not increase.

We need additional state aid. If the state legislature appropriates sufficient money to support the present state aid formula completely, your school district will receive almost \$7,000. If the state will share the increasing costs of education, your community can supply the balance without any great increase in taxes. Your cost for elementary pupils is probably the lowest of any district in Union, No. 49. I think the parents and townspeople will want to make sure that the quality of education is maintained at a high level.

PART V. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES AND SPECIAL REPORTS

(a) REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH WORK

To the Townspeople, School Board and Superintendent of Schools of Barnstead:

The following is my second annual report of the school health work of Barnstead.

During the year of 1952 we had four cases of the measles and four cases of scarlet fever. However, the common cold and the flu (or a more popular term—virus infection) have caused the majority of absent children.

Last spring Dr. George Quinn of Farmington examined 74 of the pupils. His report is as follows: "General health of children is good. As usual, dental caries is quite prominent. Also incidence of rheumatic fever state in insidious form is of significance."

The routine hearing tests were made during the year with the audiometer. The results were satisfactory as no child was found to have a serious impairment of hearing.

The eye examinations have been made with the Massachusetts vision testing machine. Parents have been notified where vision defects were found and corrections have already been made.

Through cooperation with New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association a TB patch test was completed satisfactorily before Christmas.

Dr. Carpenter, D.M.D., is having a dental clinic for school children of Barnstead and Pittsfield. This is made possible through the Red Cross, and matching funds from the State. However, the amount of money which we have will not cover all who need dental work. I am glad to find so many of the pupils conscious of the importance of dental hygiene.

Classroom visits and classroom inspections have been made whenever necessary, for routine health work or to give individual advice to pupils regarding personal hygiene.

As I am reporting to the people of Barnstead, I want to take the opportunity to mention that the water supply at the Center School is insufficient. The well is often dry and the students have to carry water for drinking, washing, and for flushing the toilets. The toilet facilities need improvement. The sinks and drinking bubblers should also be as sanitary and neat as possible.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to parents and teachers and all others who have assisted me with the School Health Program. I am always glad to see or hear from parents at any time regarding their children or pertaining to the health conditions of the school.

PART VII. WARRANT FOR SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Barnstead, N. H., qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on Friday, the thirteenth day of March, 1953, at 8:00 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers, heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the school district will approve the expenditure of not more than \$1,500 in excess of the 1952-1953 appropriation for tuition, transportation and repairs greater in cost than anticipated, such funds available from increased state aid, tuition, and balance remaining at the end of 51-52 school year.

10. To see what action the school district will take to dispose of the Beauty Hill School and to determine for what purpose the funds received will be used.

11. To see if the district will vote to drill an artesian well and to provide the necessary plumbing and equipment for an improved water supply at the Barnstead Center School. (Without recommendation by the Budget Committee)

12. If action on Article 11 is favorable, to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,500 for aforesaid purposes, \$500 to be raised by taxes, and to authorize the school board to issue serial notes in the name of and on the credit of the district for the balance of \$1,000, and to further authorize the school board to determine the rate of interest, and issue these notes so that five hundred dollars may be paid each year until payment is complete. (Without recommendation by the Budget Committee)

13. To see what action the district will take to increase the insurance coverage on the school buildings and contents. (Without recommendation by Budget Committee) 14. To see if the School District Meeting will vote to sanction and approve the formation of a committee, the duty of which shall be: To make a complete survey of the School System of the Town of Barnstead and to consider ways and means to improve the same. It shall be the duty of the committee to make a full report of its findings and conclusions at the next annual meeting of the School District, together with such recommendations for improvement as the committee may believe the Town of Barnstead could properly undertake.

The committee shall be made up of the following taxpayers of the Town of Barnstead:

- 1. The three members of the School Board.
- 2. One member of the Parent-Teachers Association. Said member to be elected, not appointed, to serve on the committee.
- 3. One member of the Barnstead Taxpayers Association. Said member to be elected, not appointed, to serve on the committee.
- 4. One member of the Board of Selectmen, to be appointed by the Chairman of said Board.
- 5. One member of the Budget Committee, to be appointed by the Chairman of said Budget Committee.

The chairman of the Board of Selectmen and the Chairman of the Budget Committee shall, within thirty days from the date of this District Meeting, certify in writing to the Chairman of the School Board, the member they have appointed to serve on this committee; and the Secretary of the Barnstead Taxpayers Association, and of the Parent-Teachers Association respectively, will certify in writing to the Chairman of the School Board, the name of the member elected to this committee.

Within forty-five days from the date of this District Meeting, the Chairman of the School Board shall call a meeting, to be held within the Town of Barnstead, of all those who have been certified to him as being members of this committee, and at said meeting the members present shall elect from their membership a chairman, vice chairman and clerk.

This committee shall serve without pay, as a public service to their fellow townsmen. (Article Petitioned by Alfred H. Equi)

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
