

A motion was made and carried at the March meeting, 1959, that authorized the retiring Moderator "to erect street and highway signs, choose his own assistants and be given full authority in the use of names based upon his findings and research." In compliance with this mandate, I am pleased to present the following report:

The report consists of a map and a glossary of the selected names. The individual descriptions include the name, the location with reference to the map, the date of authorization, and the reasons for the selection. The map designations refer to the intersection of the horizontal (E-W) and the vertical (N-S) axes at which the ends of the road are located. For example the Raymond road extends from 6F to 5L as indicated.

Many sources were used in the research; these included the History of Chester, by Benjamin Chase, text and map; the U.S.G.S. quadrangles for this region, and suggestions by many citizens to whom thanks are due.

GLOSSARY OF ROADS

ALLEN AVENUE: 5B; Cross street from Candia Road to Wellington Road.

BUNKER HILL ROAD: 11J-7G; 1755, from Chester Road (11J) to top of hill (8J), 1764, from (8J) to Chester Road (7G). The road and hill were named at a celebration commemorating the 50th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill.

CALEF ROAD: 11H-101; 1747; named for one of the earliest settlers at the Longmeadow.

CANDIA ROAD: 6B-2G; parts of this road were authorized at different times between 1801 and 1838. This is a part of highway 101.

CAT PATH: 8D-8C; 1792. This is an extension of the Spofford road to the Deetneck Bridge.

CHESTER ROAD: 11K-5B; 1738, from Chester line to Beaver pond; 1743 to the Village, the date of authorization for the shore road to Route 101 is not available. This is part of highway 121. The southern section was the first road established in the town.

CHESTER TURNPIKE: 8K-2G; 1805. This was a private toll road that became a public highway in 1838.

COLMAN ROAD: 6J-71; 1801, from the Bunker Hill Road to the Eaton Road; 1805, from there to the Tollgate Corner. Named with reference to the family that lived on the road for over 100 years.

COTTAGE AVENUE: 5C; Dead-end street near intersection of the Rail Road and Chester Road.

CROMBIE ROAD: 3E; from Hooksett Road to Oswego Bridge. Named for early settlers.

DEARBORN ROAD: 8J-3J; 1755, from Bunker Hill Road to Dearborn Mill site; 1762, from mill site to Candia line. The section from Milestone Corner (Brien's) to the town line was formerly known as the Murry Road. The location of this road as were many others in town was determined by the availability of water power.

DEERNECK LANE: 10 0; This is a private road leading from the Londonderry Turnpike to the cottages on the lake shore.

DEERNECK ROAD-See Spofford Road

DEPOT ROAD: 4E-2F; 1750 from Hooksetts Road to the mill site; 1763 extended to near the Candia Road. The name refers to the departed railroad depot.

EATON ROAD: 61-5F; 1801, from Colman Road toward "Kent Place". The remainder was authorized in 1819.

GARDNER ROAD: 9J-9K; 1803. This was part of a longer road that led from the Clark Place in Chester to the Bunker Hill Road.

GOSPEL PATH: 7J-5L; 1840. It was built to connect North Chester with the Dearborn saw mill. The name refers to its use in going to church.

HOOK ROAD: 3H; 1805. This road was built to connect the Turnpike with the Murry Mill. It was named for the first family to settle in that area.

HOOKSETT ROAD: 6F-1A; 1726. The primary location of the road is obscure, but it together with the Chester Road from the Village southward was the earliest road laid out in Auburn. The following quotation from Chase's history in which the author cites the original warrant states that certain men "were chosen a committee to go out and clear a sufficient cartway to Penny Cook, the nighest and and hest way they can from Haverhill" also "to search out a way from the place where Chester Meeting house stands to Penny Cook and mark the same."

HUNTING ROAD: 10G-9H; 1749. This road originally was a part of the present Spofford Road.

LONDONDERRY TURNPIKE (BYP 28): 6B-15F; 1806. It was authorized as a private toll road. In 1838 it became a public highway, a victim of the invention of the steam locomotive.

LOVERS LANE: 9H-7H; 1792. This is a connecting link between the Bunker Hill Road and Chester Road. The reasons for the name need no comment.

NEAL AVENUE AND NEAL STREET: 5B; Cross streets from Candia Road to Wellington Road.

NUTT ROAD: 13H-12F; 1840. Named in honor of John and William Nutt who were the first settlers in the area.

PINGREY HILL ROAD: 15J-13H; 1740 - 1747. named for early settlers.

PRESCOTT LANE: 3F-2F, from Candia Road to Depot Road. Named for early families in the vicinity.

RATTLESNAKE HILL ROAD: 11H-12C; 1748. The location was changed from time to time until 1792 when it was established in its present position.

RAYMOND ROAD: 6F-5L; In 1846 the section from the Village to the Milestone Corner (Brien's) was authorized; the remainder in 1867. The western part has been known as the Meadow Road, the eastern part as the Birch Road.

READING STREET: 5B; Cross street between Candia Road and Wellington Road.

SENTER ROAD: 15G-13H; 1760. Chase's History refers to it by this name.

SILVER HILL ROAD: 13H-12J; 1756 named for the nearby hill.

SPOFFORD ROAD: 9D-13H; 1747 from McKinley's Corner to No. 4 School corner. The western end was authorized in 1749. Named in honor of an early settler.

STEAM-MILL ROAD: 15F-14G; 1849. The name refers to the first mill in this region that was powered by steam. It was built by a stock company in 1847.

TOWER HILL ROAD: 3E-2E; 1822. The name is obvious.

WELLINGTON ROAD: 5B. This is a section of the Manchester highway. It was once known as the Bald Hill Road.

WILSON'S CROSSING ROAD: 9H-15F. Sections were authorized at different times, its purpose was to connect the southwest part of Auburn with Londonderry and the Rail Road.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindfull that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

- 1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush:
 - a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
 - b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 PM
 - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands. Yours never to enjoy.

Davis, said stone bound also being the northeasterly corner of land of Charles Martin: thence N. 87°E. by land of said Davis eighty-nine and thirty-five one hundreths (89.35) feet to an iron fence at land of the State of New Hampshire; thence N. 6° 20' W. by said iron fence along land of the state eleven hundred (1100) feet to corner of iron fence; thence N. 62^{0} 45' W. by said iron fence one hundred seventy (170) feet. more or less, to a bound on the town line of the towns above mentioned. Fourth: To see if the Town will vote to incur debt for Temporary Loans in anticipation of taxes.

Fifth: To see if the Town will vote to accept such Trust funds as may have come in during the year and Trust Funds as have not been previously accepted.

Sixth: To see if the Town will vote to use the income of the H. B. Burnham Fund for Schools or Library.

Subject: Annual Report

The report of the Superintendent of Schools will not follow the same format as in previous years but instead will give information about the regulations of the State Board of Education which spell out the powers and duties of School Boards and Superintendents.

REGULATIONS OF THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Powers And Duties Of School Boards

- 1. The school boards shall determine the salary and term of employment of all teachers and shall elect them upon nomination by the superintendent. If they reject any nomination they shall require the superintendent to make further nominations.
- 2. They shall employ janitors and other employees required for the proper operation of the schools, determine their salaries and terms of employment and prescribe their duties.
 - 3. They shall authorize all purchases.
- 4. They shall make suitable provision for the accommodation of pupils in approved schoolhouses and for proper transportation and shall provide that all schoolhouses and outbuildings are kept in a clean and proper condition.
- 5. They shall seasonably prepare a budget of school expenditures and before September of each year make suitable assignment of the school money to the various needs of the schools. In state aided districts accounts shall be kept as the State Board shall require and shall be open at all times to the inspection of the superintendent or any other officer of the State Board.
- 6. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business at least once in two months and shall require the attendance of the superintendent. The secretary shall keep a written record of each meeting.
- 7. They shall exercise all powers and perform all duties vested in and imposed upon the school board by law or regulations of the State Board which are not committed to the superintendent or by them expressly delegated to him.
- 8. They shall, upon recommendation of the superintendent and in accordance with the regulations of the State Board, deter-

mine the subjects of instruction for each of the several grades and the school time to be devoted to each subject.

POWERS AND DUTIES OF SUPERINTENDENTS

- 1. The superintendent of schools of each union shall be nominated by the joint board of the union and employed by the State Board of Education. He shall give his entire time to the performance of the duties prescribed by law and by the regulation of the State Board. Assistant superintendents shall be employed in the same manner and shall devote their entire time to the performance of the duties delegated to them.
- 2. He shall enforce or cause to be enforced the rules of the school board, the regulations of the State Board and all laws relating to the school attendance and employment of children and illiterates. He shall report to the proper officers violations of the laws of the state or of the regulations of the State Board relating to the administration of the public or private schools or affecting the welfare of children.
- 3. He shall direct and supervise the work of all teachers and janitors and shall have all powers necessary to make such direction effective.
- 4. He shall nominate all teachers in accordance with the law and the regulations of the State Board, subject to such rules governing salary, term of employment, etc., as the school board shall determine.
- 5. He shall select and purchase textbooks and all other scholastic apparatus and supplies in accordance with the regulations of the school board and the State Board and see that the same are suitably distributed to the schools, accurately accounted for and economically used.
- 6. He shall keep such records and make reports of his doings, the condition of the schools and the financial standing of the districts as shall be required by the school board or the regulations of the State Board.
- 7. He shall remove any teacher or other employee of the district found by him to be immoral or incompetent, or who shall not conform to the regulations legally prescribed by the State Board of Education, or by the school board.
- 8. He shall provide for temporary vacancies in the teaching force and shall have authority to secure fuel or other supplies immediately needed for the operation of the schools, if the school board shall fail to provide them.

9. He shall admit in accordance with the laws of the state and the regulations of the State Board pupils to school attendance. He shall assign them to such classes and grades as he finds their preparation warrants, shall advance them in accordance with their capacity and attainments and shall recommend to the school board their graduation when they have completed the program adopted for the school.

JOB ANALYSIS

A job analysis sheet for the Superintendent of Schools and the Assistant Superintendent of Schools has been worked out and presented to the Supervisory Union School Board. This job analysis attempts to define the duties of each school administrator and is printed here for public knowledge.

The Superintendent is responsible to see that all policies of the school districts are carried out, that funds are spent as budgeted and that he exerts the leadership necessary so that the educational system will meet high standards and the needs of all the pupils.

All principals and other personnel are answerable to him. It is his responsibility to see that the schools are administered satisfactorily. His position is primarily a decision-making one. The principals, office personnel as well as various other personnel come to him for answers that are usually not spelled out and he must assume the responsibility for the decision.

Trouble-shooting is another of his concerns. If someone needs to be corrected, reprimanded, warned or even dismissed, he must make the decision and take action.

He attends all Board meetings. He decides mainly what should go on the Agenda. He helps gather information necessary to discuss agenda items and probably one of the jobs that takes much of his time is the follow-up of the business conducted at the various board meetings. Much time is consumed in following-up telephone requests from board members and others.

A major responsibility is the recruitment of teachers and principals. This is almost a six-month job. This year approximately forty-two teachers and two principals were hired and there were several candidates interviewed for each position.

Probably the most important responsibility is the preparation and development of the budgets and at budget time there is time for little else. The superintendent gathers various statistics and makes projections on future enrollments. He is involved with school construction and planning, and attends meetings with building committees and architects.

He is the liason between the State Department and the school districts and is responsible to see that school laws are upheld.

In the area of public relations, he has many responsibilities—dealing with the press, Parent Teacher Associations, town officials, budget committees, etc., and is the official representative of the school districts and Union on many occasions.

He supervises and helps set up all bids. He is involved with transportation and cafeteria problems. He works in the area of supervision of operation and maintenance of the school plants and summer maintenance programs, as well as contacts with custodians and tradespeople as they work in the area of repair and maintenance. He meets with salesmen in certain areas.

He attends school district meetings, and although not an active participant, is ready with various information that he has compiled.

He should attend Superintendents' Conventions or Conferences, to learn what is new in education as it relates to the curriculum and teaching techniques and also observes what is new in the maintenance field. He should at least peruse if not study state and local legislation, activities and programs that now or will in the future effect the educational program.

By law the position is described as having the following duties and responsibilities:

He shall enforce or cause to be enforced the rules of the school board, the regulations of the State Board and all laws relating to the school attendance and employment of children and illiterates. He shall report to the proper officers violations of the laws of the State or of the regulations of the State Board relating to the administration of the public or private schools or affecting the welfare of children.

He shall direct and supervise the work of all Principals, Teachers and Janitors and shall have all powers necessary to make such direction effective.

He shall recommend teachers in accordance with the law and regulations of the State Board, Local Board.

He shall select and purchase textbooks and all other scholastic apparatus and supplies in accordance with the regulations of the School Board and the State Board and see that the same are suitably distributed to the schools, accurately accounted for and economically used.

He shall keep such records and make such reports of his doings, the conditions of the schools and the financial standing of the districts as shall be required by the school board or the regulations of the State Board.

He shall recommend removal of any teacher or other employee of the district found by him to be immoral or incompetent or who shall not conform to the regulations legally prescribed by the State Board of Education, or by the school board.

He shall provide for temporary vacancies in the teaching force and shall have authority to secure fuel or other supplies immediately needed for the operation of the schools, if the school board shall fail to provide them.

He shall admit in accordance with the laws of the State and the regulations of the State Board pupils to school attendance. He shall help assign them to such classes and grades as he finds their preparation warrants, shall advance them in accordance with their capacity and attainments and shall help to recommend to the school board their graduation when they have completed the program adopted for the school.

He shall prepare an annual report for the school district.

He shall supervise the program for alterations and repairs to the school plant.

He shall direct the instruction, supervision and discipline for all pupils.

Job Analysis - Assistant Superintendent

Responsible for improving and up-dating the curriculum and Teacher supervision. Emphasis is on Junior High, liason with all High schools serving our pupils, responsible for custodians, custodial time schedules, custodial supplies, in-service training of custodians, meeting with salesmen.

Breakdown of Responsibilities:

Supervision: Supervision of teachers (Emphasis on Junior High)

Curriculum — Available to assist teachers with problems concerning grouping, selection of texts, continuity of program, etc.

Employment of Teachers – Assists the Superintendent in interviewing and evaluating each candidate for positions in Union 10. In absence of Superintendent, carry out interviews and procedure to select teachers.

 $Book \ Requisitions - Assist \ Superintendent \ and \ Principals \\ with \ budget \ requests.$

Principals' Meetings – Responsible for agenda, conducting of meeting, follow-up arrangements, etc.

Responsible for group meetings to discuss items of interest, problems and programs with teacher-principal groups—particularly at Junior High level; also will give assistance to group meetings at other teaching levels.

Attend School Board meetings.

Assist in Budget preparations.

Prepare specifications, bids, oversee requisitions and purchase all custodial and operational supplies.

Prepare budget recommendations for this department.

Act as liason between custodial staff and superintendent or board.

Receive and take care of all calls relating to Operation of all Plants.

It is my pleasure to present my third annual report to the Citizens of Auburn, for the year ending June 30, 1965.

The faculty at your school has again undergone changes as is natural for most schools of this size. Provisions are being made by your school board for an additional class in the town hall for the school year 1965-66.

I feel that I should again mention some of the areas that need attention and how also some progress is being made. Last year's needs we listed as follows:

- 1. Physical Education
- 2. Guidance
- 3. Library
- 4. Languages
- 5. Eighth Grade Algebra
- 6. Shop and Home Economics

In the area of physical education we can see a considerable breakthrough as soon as the multi-purpose room is completed. This will not represent a complete program but will be a great improvement.

Guidance will not change in emphasis to any great extent, however the testing program will be changed to make more accurate and valid the results.

Library, we are very happy to say, will be the area of greatest improvement. This is made possible by the new building and freeing of the old kitchen area for a reading room. The school board and building committee are to be commended for this educational improvement.

The area of language, math, shop and home economics are not to be changed at this time. They must be considered priority items in the near future.

This seems an appropriate place to ask the help of all the citizens in reducing the number of school drop-outs. Honest and sincere parental advice can be the most persuasive approach to keeping our young people in school.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the people of Auburn, the School Board, Mr. Dolph and members of the faculty and staff for making this another successful and progressive year.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the School Board and the Superintendent of Schools:

The Auburn Village School opened on September 9, 1964 with an enrollment of two hundred seventy-eight students. The first grade enrollment within one week exceeded the State limitation of forty pupils per grade by three. This situation necessitated the procurement of an additional teacher and classroom. We are grateful that the Town Hall was made available to provide a solution to our problem of space. At the termination of the school year in June of 1965 the enrollment consisted of two hundred eighty-nine pupils.

In this first report as Principal of the Auburn Village School I would like to express my thanks to the teachers for their individual and combined contributions to the improvement of the curriculum and for their cooperation throughout the school year.

THE CURRICULUM. Modern mathematics now encompasses the first three grades. Keeping pace with change three teachers earned credits in mathematics, having completed a Modern Mathematics Course sponsored by the University of New Hampshire. This greatly enhances the teaching value of the staff which in turn is reflected upon the pupils, our prime concern.

The reading program has been enriched further by the addition of the latest textbooks for the seventh and eighth grades.

The fourth grade pupils benefited by participation in a special reading program.

TV plays an important role in the classroom. Through channel 11 and the University of New Hampshire improved programs are channeled into the classroom.

THE PHYSICAL PLANT. New furniture purchased for the Village School was transferred to the Town Hall to accommodate the additional grade. The old chairs and desks of the fifth grade were replaced by a modern style which added a more attractive appearance to this room and at the same time made it more conducive to learning.

Several rooms were in need of paint and repairs. This was accomplished during the summer months.

Meetings by the Building Committee and School Board, planing for the future, were numerous.

By an overwhelming vote of five to one the citizens of Auburn voted to add six classrooms and a multi-purpose room to the present school.

During the second semester the outmoded seventh grade desks and chairs were replaced by sturdy, modern, and attractive furniture. The purchase of this much needed furniture was greatly appreciated both by pupils and teachers.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION. This program was well received by the pupils. Participation both by girls and boys was excellent and enthusiasm ran high. Physical conditioning through calisthenics was painful to unused muscles but in a short period of time, the exercises, less complaints, functioned smoothly.

The organization of a basketball team was somewhat of a problem due to the lack of facilities for practice sessions. Despite this shortcoming weekly drills were held at the Hood Memorial Junior High gymnasium in Derry, thanks to Mr. Donald Day, the principal.

Softball for the girls and baseball for the boys were Spring activities. The girls' team, under the tutelage of Miss Jean Sweeney, lost but one game—a very successful season.

The boys' team, coached by Mr. Raymond Gradual, won half of their scheduled games. With the exception of two graduates the team is intact for the coming year.

CONCLUSION: The Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Robert W. Dolph, and the Assistant Superintendent, Mr. Ira. Stickney, provided welcomed guidance at all times. A difficult and trying year was made much easier through their unending time and effort in the minutest of numerous problems.

In addition to Mr. Dolph and Mr. Stickney, I would also like to thank and express appreciation to the members of the School Board, whose interest, foresight, and knowledge of school problems is most commendable; to Mrs. Rae Sives, our nurse-teacher; to the cafeteria personnel, to the bus drivers, the custodian, and the P.T.A.

Also Mrs. Kelley, music supervisor, who devoted much of her time to the preparation of graduation exercises for the eighth graders. Her efforts were rewarded by a most commendable graduation held at the Town Hall.

It is the hope of all who are in anyway associated with the Auburn Village School that our curriculum will continue to improve and maintain a pace abreast of modern demands.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

Tuberculin testing was done in grades 1, 3, 5 and 8. The newer and more accurate Heaf test was used, replacing the formerly used patch. This test is speedy and painless and the children do not mind it at all. 138 children and teachers were tested with 10 later receiving chest X-Rays.

All children received vision tests during the year. Of the 276 tested 19 were referred for examination; 14 received treatment. A new vision tester and audiometer (for testing hearing) were purchased by the school district for use in the Auburn school.

Pupils in grades 1, 3, 5 and 8 received hearing examinations. Also, all children with previously known hearing difficulties were tested. Five pupils were referred to their own doctor; 4 received treatment.

The pre-school registration clinic was held on May 26, with 24 children registering.


