THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

The Polls Will Be Open From 11:00 A. M. to 6:00 P. M. To the Inhabitants of the Town of Springfield in the County of Sullivan in said State, gualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Springfield on Tuesday, the Second day of March, next at eleven of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and to determine by ballot, with use of check list, what action the Town shall take with respect to the following Articles 2, 3, 4 & 5.
- To see if the Town will vote to raise \$25,000.00 for a new fire truck. \$5,000.00 to come from current year appropriation and the balance through the issue of notes. Ballot YES or NO.
- To see if the Town will vote to permit the use of the Springfield Municipal Building for the purpose of a public kindergarten in conjunction with the Town of Grantham and raise the additional moneys for that purpose. (\$1,500.00 under Town Office) (\$1,380.00 Town Hall and Other Buildings) (\$400.00 Insurance). Ballot YES or NO.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

No person, firm or corporation shall erect any addition, new building, structure, mobile home, trailer or school bus used as a structure, within the Town of Springfield without first obtaining a permit from the Board of Selectmen or other designated person. Permit shall be issued within seven days from date of application, at a cost of \$1.00. Any person, firm, or corporation violating the provision of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of \$1.00 each day of neglect to obtain such a permit. This ordinance shall be effective April 1, 1976. Ballot YES or NO.

5. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

No person, firm or corporation shall construct a new driveway, entrance way, or replace an existing culvert from any town road without first obtaining a permit from the Board of Selectmen or other designated person. Permit shall be issued within fifteen days from date of application, at a cost of \$1.00. Any person, firm, or corporation violating the provision of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of \$1.00 each day of neglect to obtain such a permit. This ordinance shall be effective April 1, 1976. Ballot YES or NO.

There will be a discussion in the forenoon for further enlightenment relative to voting on Articles 2 through 5.

- You are further notified to meet at the Springfield Town Hall in Springfield at 1:00 P. M. on Tuesday, March 2nd, to act upon the following articles:
- 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee with the exceptions of Capital Outlays being voted on by ballots in Articles 2 and 3.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on notes of the Town in anticipation of taxes.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to allow a one and one-half percent discount on taxes paid within thirty days after tax mailing date.
- 10. To see what the Town will vote to do about additional equipment and the continuance of a capital reserve fund for the purpose of purchasing new (or used) equipment for the Highway Dept., when and if necessary.
- 11. To see what the Town will vote to do about additional equipment and the continuance of a capital reserve fund for the purpose of purchasing new (or used) equipment for the Fire Dept., when and if necessary.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw funds from capital reserve for the purpose of purchasing new (or used) equipment for the Fire Dept., or Highway Dept., when and if necessary.
- 13. To see if the Town will approve the continuance of the survey of Town Forests and the sale of timber.

- To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of ninetythree (\$93.00) as its share of the cost of publicizing and promoting the natural attractions of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as a set-off against the following Debt Service incurred for priority expenditures since January 1, 1972—

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Police Cruiser from the budget appropriation of the Police Dept.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to make the Planning Board members subject to elective office starting in 1977.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a recreational area in Town, cost not to exceed the moneys allotted to the Bicentennial Committee by the Town and moneys they can raise.

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

For the Board of Selectmen the year 1975 has sped by very rapidly, as is true for most people, always leaving you wondering why you haven't accomplished as much as you'd like.

The year saw us receive \$7,289.00 in revenue sharing funds which, along with carry-over money, gave \$8,000.00 to help defray many expenses, such as \$2,000.00 on the town buildings, \$1,000.00 each to the police and fire departments, \$2,000.00 toward the town dump and \$2,000.00 on debt service. Again in 1976 we expect revenue sharing help of about \$8,000.00.

During the past summer we had repairs and painting done on our Memorial Building and our Buildings Committee has plans for this year.

The town picked up about \$410,000.00 in valuation from the acceptance of the Eastman Pond lots; this came to about \$11,000.00 in taxes. We can expect the valuation in this area of the town to continue to grow at a faster rate than most areas of town.

In July, we started using the Newport Dump facilities. Although not as convenient, it seemed to be our best alternative, since the Newport site has state approval with good life expectancy.

In a winter such as we are presently having, we thank God for the power sander the highway department received last winter.

Bob Bristol Associates took the bid to do the town's tax map for the money raised last year. The map should be completed by April 1, 1977. During the current year, Bristol Associates will hold a hearing to clarify areas of town they have trouble locating and to get approval of what they have done.

We've received the state accepted bid for the bridge at Washburn Corner. Our 25% share is \$11,900.00, a saving over estimates at last town meeting of \$29,300.00. This will be our second experience with exceptionally good financial results on state bridge contracts. We also want to thank the Eldeens for their cooperation on the easements permitting the town to go ahead with the project. We again would like to include a tax schedule of recent years.

This schedule speaks for itself. We send the county \$.30, the town spends \$.77, and the school district takes \$1.63 of every \$2.70 raised in taxes.

The proposed budget for 1976 as submitted by the Budget Committee represents a tax rate of around \$2.60 per \$100.00 if all budget receipts we estimated are correct.

This brings us to the nation's bicentennial. We'd like to point out that Springfield has an active Bicentennial Committee chaired by Cheryl Patten, with some great ideas for the town's participation in these festive activities Get out and give them your support!

Thanks to Joe and Mildred Davis, we're expecting another excellent Town Report. It's also beyond our ability to thank them enough for their financial advice during the year.

Arnold has decided that he will not run again for Selectman. All we can say is that it has been a privilege for all town officials that have worked with him for the last six years. Thanks Putt.

In conclusion, we would like to thank our secretary, Sue Dargie, for kind cooperation and assistance for the past year.

CEMETERY COMMISSION REPORT

The cemetery was kept mowed, raked and trimmed back to all outer boundaries of the cemetery during 1975. Thirty-one (31) loads of brush and cuttings were taken out.

The old map of the old cemetery dated 1930 was copied with the idea in mind of bringing it up to date. On the "old map" there were a lot of blank spaces and grave stones have been uncovered and identified. Interments after 1930 were not recorded on this map and an up-to-date layout is planned for the future.

The Selectmen were approached regarding the entrance road to the new section of the cemetery. The Commission feels very strongly about a paved road into the new cemetery, as difficulty has been experienced in getting in and out of this section. There have been occasions when the hearse could not make it, and the casket had to be removed and carried down (or trucked down) into the cemetery to the grave site. After the meetings at the cemetery with the Selectmen, we were informed that no funds were available this year (1975) and would be considered in 1976 for this project. We think this a bad situation that should be corrected as soon as possible. A budget request has been made for the year 1976 in the amount of \$750.00 for "Hot Topping" of this entrance to the new cemetery.

Also, we are asking for \$175.00 for a new 20" small lawn mower as the present mower is at the end of its rope and beyond further repair.

There were 3 interments and no lots sold this year, 1975.

LAND USE AND ZONING COMMITTEE

The New London Hospital will be furnished with a copy of the map. This will provide important information for ambulance services, etc.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Upon the recommendation of town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. No open fires can be authorized between 9 a. m. and 5 p. m., unless it is raining, without the additional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden. Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forests and Lands, through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildfire suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifty percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous wildfire prevention program within his town or city.

The following is an excerpt from an editorial appearing in the Argus-Champion December 30, 1975:

HAIL TO SPRINGFIELD

The Springfield Volunteer Fire Department deserves credit, and some careless newsmen deserve a rebuke.

When the Yankee Barn Homes building in Grantham burned December 22, fire fighters from Springfield joined those from Grantham in fighting the blaze.

By sunup the next day, a radio news announcer was telling his listeners that the fire was fought by firemen from Grantham and Springfield, VERMONT. His mistake was picked up by others and by that night television reporters were still trying to convince us that fire fighters from Springfield, VERMONT, some 35 miles away, traveled to Grantham. It apparently never occurred to anybody to ask why, when there were a dozen fire companies much closer to the fire.

The answer to that simple question would have been that Springfield, NEW HAMPSHIRE, is closer to Grantham than any other fire department.

The mere fact that Springfield, VERMONT, has more inhabitants than Springfield, NEW HAMPSHIRE, is no measure of its character or quality. Otherwise Springfield, VIRGINIA, would be better than Springfield, VERMONT . . . and Springfield MASSA-CHUSETTS, would be better than any other Springfield.

Let the word go out to all newsmen that there is a Springfield in New Hampshire, and it is populated by good citizens with uncommon common sense, independence, intelligence, and readiness to help their neighbors.

Nurse's Report-December 31, 1975

Community health nursing is more than nursing in a setting other than the hospital. It's a unique blend of nursing and medical services woven together to best serve the people in their usual environment of home, school and work. The agency staff has been reorganized and increased to include I full-time RN, 3 part-time RNs, I physical therapist, I occupational therapist, I speech therapist and 2 homemaker-home health aides. Expanded services include use of food bank and emergency fund, increased TB testing and follow-up, and the homemaker-home health aide program.

Towns served: Andover, Bradford, Danbury, New London, Springfield, Sutton, Warner and Wilmot.

Services provided: Skilled nursing care Occupational therapy Physical therapy Spech therapy Homemaker-Home health aides (designed to meet the needs of the elderly population. Assists with personal care, meal planning, light housework, etc., under supervision of R.N.)

Referrals: Received from various sources: patient, family, friend, hospital, physician, welfare, police, churches and other organizations. Anyone can make a referral.

All referrals are welcomed and highly confidential.

Fee: These services are provided regardless of ability to pay. The KVNA is supported through town appropriations, fees collected, Medicare, insurances and contributions.

Total visits: 1,032 Total mileage: 11,904

Visits to your town: 54

Your town resident population 6/30/75 was 326, assessed at \$1.25 per capita \$407.50.

Skilled nursing care visits—498 (includes care of catheters, colostomies, dressings, blood pressure check, injections, etc.) Therapy visits—62.

Nursing intervention and prevention visits—375 (includes preventive testing, health guidance and support, counseling, teaching). No charge to patient.

Future Goals: I. To increase patient visits per town.

- 2. To offer immunization clinics every 2 months.
- To grow in the area of maternal-child health through well-child conferences and prenatal classes.
- 4. To develop mental health follow-up care.
- 5. To further coordination between school nurse and KVNA.

We thank you for your support through appropriations, contributions and also donations of food, clothing and medical equipment.

People are the purpose for which community health nursing exists. It is only through **your** action as patients, health workers, taxpayers, legislators, family members, and citizens that we can continue to provide high quality professional services.

YOUR REPRESENTATIVE REPORTS

February 6, 1976

To: The Town of Springfield, N. H.

From: George I. Wiggins, Representative, District 8

Last year I had given you a report of what had happened in the Legislature through February.

We had a normal three day week through March with committee days on Wednesdays and House Actions on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

The third week in April it was made public that for the next two weeks there was to be testimony only in favor, none against. This, I protested, unsuccessfully. Bringing these bills to the House Floor without proper time for hearings resulted in the passage of some very bad laws.

In my last report, I told of the younger Representatives and their ideas to create change regardless of the financial costs. Their ideas seem indicative of the philosophy being taught in schools and colleges today.

We have to be fiscally prudent and keep close tabs on our retirement funds. As of now, we are \$2,000,000 behind. The Bonded Debt of the State is getting to be quite large. All this; and state employees' wage rates have to be kept in balance.

We have had several bills in the name of consumer legislation. By study of the contents, it shows that for the most part they will hurt the consumer rather than help him or her. We should spend quite a bit of time reviewing laws on the books to see what is contradictory and what can be repealed.

The lessons New York City has presented show how fiscally foolish political groups can get and that they will give anything to anybody as long as they can stay in power.

Let us hope that people will return to being fiscally responsible and spend within the limits of their own incomes.

UPPER VALLEY-LAKE SUNAPEE COUNCIL REPORT

While each town or city has its own pressing problems, it does not exist in a vacuum. Many of its neighbors face some of these same problems. Or a neighbor's solutions may cause it problems. This is where a regional planning program can help, working with and for local communities to seek solutions to these common problems. That is the continuing mission of the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council.

The Council operates on an annual budget of about \$100,000. It is under the direction of a 47 member board of directors composed of two directors from each of its 31 member communities plus 3 directors-at-large. Since these directors are appointed by the member communities—the Selectmen or City Councilors—and set the policies and programs to be administered by the staff, there is complete local control of the Council's activities.

Yet, the membership dues from local communities (Springfield's share for the coming year, figured on a per capita basis will be just \$224.00) account for only 30 percent of the Council's total revenue. The remainder, 70 percent, comes from various state and federal sources; sources available to the Council because of its status as a comprehensive regional planning agency recognized by the federal government and the states of New Hampshire and Vermont. In other words, these added sources of revenue have increased the Council's income and thus its ability to serve its members at a two-to-one ratio of service to local dollars spent.

In addition to large scale regional studies and projects which benefited Springfield and all the area towns, the Council's technical services program has provided direct aid to Springfield. Council representatives have furnished assistance to the Land Use Committee, the Planning Board, and the Selectmen. Mr. Ward, of the Council, has indicated to these town bodies that he is on call for further help whenever they need professional planning services.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Conservation Commission met regularly in the Town Office Building at 7:30 P. M. the first Tuesday of the month during the past year. Special meetings were also held. They included a work party with the Fire Department to install a protective guard rail at the fire pond near Philbrick Hill entrance. Several meetings were held with the Dutchman's Pond Association to explain to its members the need to obtain an access road to draw lumber from Royal Arch and Society Hill lots. At the same time access will be provided to Dutchman's Pond. On October 2nd a public meeting was held in which representatives of the U.S.D.A. Soil Conservation Service presented an explanation of the Springfield Soil Survey Map. A fire water hole has been installed on Messer Hill Road with a cooperative agreement made with the Fire Department to install the dry hydrant in the Spring. Many thanks go to Leon Geil, District Engineer of Sullivan County Conservation District who assisted in obtaining federal funds and in preparing an easement agreement with the property owner. A petition has been sent to the Highway Commission requesting a right of way to public water at Dutchman's Pond. The New England Forestry Association has been authorized to negotiate a contract for selective cutting of the timber on the Royal Arch and Society Hill lots. The Conservation Commission has also inquired into the possibility of obtaining a federal grant from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation.

CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

This past year has seen a major change in the State Civil Defense Surplus and Excess Property Program. We have met several times with Federal, State and Local CD personnel on this matter, and now most of the excess property requests go through the Governor's office. We have had requests from the Fire Department, Police Department, Highway Committee and Road Agent for property. These requests have been sent to Concord, and the possibility of matching funds is being studied. We co-sponsored the CPR course given to members of the

We co-sponsored the CPR course given to members of the Fire Department and are trying to set up a First Aid course. This coming year our main objective is the Rescue Squad and a CB radio net with Concord. The Rescue Squad is small, but determined; and with our support, can be a good one.

We will continue our training through State and Federal workshops, seminars and home study courses; and it is our hope that during 1976 more people will become interested and active in the Civil Defense Program.
