



VOTES ENACTED AT THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

HELD: WEDNESDAY, MARCH 6, 1963

Town Clerk's Office Wayland, Massachusetts

Roger P. Stokey, Moderator: --

Pursuant to the Warrant dated January 28, 1963, signed by Frank S. Tarr, George K. Lewis and Thomas Francis Linnehan, Selectmen, served and return of service given by Ernest H. Damon, Constable, the inhabitants of the Town of Wayland, qualified to vote in Town Meeting, met this day; and at 7:45 P. M. the Moderator called the meeting to order, declared a quorum to be present, and the meeting proceeded to transact the following business:

At the request of the Moderator, and upon a Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. Robert M. Morgan, it was

VOTED: Unanimously: To permit the Moderator to omit reading the Articles.

Upon Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was

VOTED: Unanimously: That consideration of Articles 1 and 2 be deferred until the meeting has acted upon and disposed of Articles 3 through 20.

- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to further amend the Town By-Law establishing the Wage and Salary Classification Plan, as amended, in any of the following respects:
- (a) Amend Article II, Section 1 of said Plan by changing any of the salary and wage rates specified in said section.

Amend Article II, Section 1 of said plan by adding the new position classifications of (1) Assistant Highway Superintendent and (2) Town Engineer, or any other new position classification (with salary or wage rates therefor), deleting any position classifications, or changing the designation or description of any position classifications.

(b) Amend Article VI, Section 1 to read as follows: "An hourly rated employee (other than a police or fire department call man) required to work between 7 P. M. and 7 A. M. or between 6 P. M. Saturday and 7 A. M. Monday, or between 7 A. M. and 7 P. M. on any regularly listed holiday, because of an emergency outside his regular working hours, shall be paid time and one-half for emergency overtime".

- (c) Amend Article V--B, Section 2 to read as follows: "Full time Police Department personnel assigned to duty on a holiday shall receive straight time pay for the hours actually worked in addition to other regular pay".
 - (d) Amend Article V--C, entitled "Sick Leave", as follows:
 - (i) By striking out from Section 2, the sentence "The maximum accumulation shall be 90 days".
 - (ii) By adding at the end of Section 2, the sentence "Employees who are absent on sick leave may be visited by a member of the Town Health Department at the discretion of the appropriate supervisor".
 - (iii) By striking out all of Section 3, reading as follows:

 "After three consecutive weeks' absence sick leave shall be paid at 80 per cent of the employee's regular pay".
- (e) By striking out all of Article III, and changing the numbering of the present Article III--A" to "Article III" and striking out from Article V, Section 1 the following sentence: "In putting the Plan into effect under Article III present Town employees will be given credit for prior years of service in their present positions".

or take any action relative to any of the foregoing proposed amendments.

Duly seconded, Mr. Warren T. Cronin offered the following MOTION: That Article II, Section 1, of the Town By-Laws establishing a Wage and Salary Classification Plan established March 3, 1954, as heretofore amended, be further amended by increasing by ten (10) per cent the annual salary rates for each of the Police Chief, Fire Chief, and Highway Superintendent, and by increasing by six (6) per cent every other annual and monthly salary rate (but excluding any salary rates for new positions that may be adopted by vote of this meeting), and by increasing each hourly wage rate by six (6) per cent with fractions of a cent leveled off to the nearest cent above, all such increases to be effective from January 1, 1963.

Upon Motion of Mr. Fern A. Taylor, duly seconded, To add the Water Superintendent to the list of those proposed to receive the 10 per cent raise, it was

VOTED: In the negative.

This vote having been doubted, there was a Standing, non-counted vote, which was again: In the negative.

Upon the Main Motion of Mr. Cronin, it was VOTED: In favor.

Duly seconded, Mr. Cronin offered the following MOTION: That Article II, Section 1, of the Town By-Law establishing a Wage and Salary Classification Plan established March 3, 1954, as heretofore amended, be further amended as follows:

(a) By adding the following new classifications and salary rates therefor:

- (b) By changing the designation "Second Man Water" to "Water Department Maintenance Man";
- (c) By adding "Back-Hoe" to the list of equipment included in the position category "Heavy Equipment Operator and Laborer".

Duly seconded, Mr. Hugh P. Taylor offered the following MOTION of AMENDMENT: To delete the provision for the Town Engineer's position.

Upon a Motion of Mr. George H. Robinson, duly seconded, "The previous question" the first Two votes were not unanimous, there being a single, "No". The Third vote was unanimously in favor.

Upon Mr. Taylor's Motion, it was VOTED: In the negative.

Upon the Main Motion of Mr. Cronin, it was VOTED: In favor.

Upon Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. Cronin, it was VOTED: That the Town By-Law establishing a Wage and Salary Classification Plan established March 3, 1954, as heretofore amended, be further amended as follows:

By changing Article VI, Section 1 to read as follows: "An hourly rated employee (other than a police or fire department call man)required to work between 7 P. M. and 7 A. M. or between 6 P. M. Saturday and 7 A. M. Monday, or between 7 A. M. and 7 P. M. on any regularly listed holiday, because of an emergency outside his

regular working hours, shall be paid time and one-half for emergency overtime."; said change to be effective January 1, 1963.

Upon Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. Cronin, it was VOTED: That the Town By-Law establishing a Wage and Salary Classification Plan established March 3, 1954, as heretofore amended, be further amended as follows:

By changing Article V-B, Section 2 to read as follows: "Full time Police Department personnel assigned to duty on a holiday shall receive straight time pay for the hours actually worked in addition to their regular pay."; said change to be effective from and including February 22, 1963.

Duly seconded, Mr. Cronin offered the following MOTION: That Article V-C, entitled "Sick Leave", of the Town By-Law establishing a Wage and Salary Classification Plan established March 3, 1954, as heretofore amended, be further amended as follows:

- (a) By striking out from Section 1, the sentence "The maximum accumulation shall be 90 days".
- (b) By adding at the end of Section 2, the sentence "Employees who are absent on sick leave may be visited by a member of the Town Health Department at the discretion of the appropriate supervisor".
- (c) By striking out all of Section 3, reading as follows: "After three consecutive weeks' absence sick leave shall be paid at 80 per cent of the employee's regular pay."

Upon Motion of Dr. John G. Freymann, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To delete paragraph (b) from the main Motion of Mr. Cronin, relating to visits by a member of the Town Health Department.

Upon the Main Motion of Mr. Cronin, subject to Dr. Freymann's Amendment, it was

VOTED: In favor.

Upon a Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. Cronin, it was VOTED: That the Town By-Law establishing a Wage and Salary Classification Plan established March 3, 1954, as heretofore amended, be further amended by striking out all of Article III and changing the numbering of the present "Article III-A" to "Article III" and striking out from Article V, Section 1 the following sentence: "In putting the Plan into effect under Article III present Town employees will be given credit for prior years of service in their present positions."

Article 4. To grant money for necessary Town purposes.

Duly seconded, Mr. Morgan offered the following

MOTION: That the report of the Finance Committee be accepted and its recommendations be adopted; that \$3,042,526.17 with the addition of \$5,000 for Snow Removal and no subtractions be granted, appropriated and assessed for the several purposes designated, making a total budget of \$3,047,526.17 and that the same be expended only for the purposes shown under the respective boards, committees and officers of the Town; and that

* All employees in the Town Office Building, other than elected officials and those of the Police and Fire Departments, come under the supervision of the Executive Secretary and that he be charged with the operation of both Town Office Buildings and their equipment;

The operation of the dump be under the supervision of the Highway Department;

The money from Dog Taxes be allocated in its entirety to the Library;

The Senior Public Health Nurse, Public Health Nurses #II, and Nursing Assistants be under the supervision of the Board of Health;

The funds provided for under Fire Department, Call Men--Night Duty, be used only under the following conditions: \$500.00 annually to Call Men who serve on the night shift, 6:00 P. M. to 7:00 A. M. fifty nights a year. This is done with a view to maintaining the number of men in the call department;

(The maker of the Motion, Mr. Morgan, omitted the detail between * and ** above, since it followed exactly the recommendations in the Finance Committee's Report on p. 34, accompanying the Warrant for this Meeting, by unanimous consent of the Meeting).

The appropriation under Highway Department for "Heavy Equipment -Special Account", Fire Department for "Purchase - Major Equipment", and Conservation Commission for "Conservation Fund" be maintained as funds against future purchases and not be expended without further direct vote of the Town;

*** The gifts to the Library, acceptance of which is provided for under Article 12, be made available for expenditures along with other amount appropriated by the Town under the budget for the general expenses of the Library;

The Town Collector continue to act as Collector for the Water Department, that he be directed to charge fees for demands on overdue water bills and that the sums so collected be credited by the Collector to the Water Department, and that all fees and penalties be turned over

to the Town as Town Income;

The appropriation for "Hydrant Rental" of \$10,000 for the Water Department, granted in the budget, be transferred to "Water Available Surplus";

The office of the Town Clerk be retained on a salary basis and that all fees from whatever source derived be turned over to the Town as Town Income;

The Assessor's Valuation Book printed in '61 continue to be made available, one to a taxpayer, upon his request and calling for it at the Town Office Building;

(Mr. Morgan also omitted to read the detail between *** and **** in the same manner as the previous omission).

In addition to the sum of \$1,500 included in the budget to meet the Town's share of "Chapter 90 - Maintenance" and \$6,700 to meet the Town's share of "Chapter 90 - New Construction", the sum of \$3,000 for "Chapter 90 - Maintenance" and \$20,100 for "Chapter 90 - New Construction" be transferred from "Unappropriated Available Funds" in the Treasury to meet the County's and State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursement from the County and State to be restored upon their receipt to "Unappropriated Available Funds" in the Treasury;

The Town Engineer be appointed by the Selectmen, after consultation with representatives of the Road Commissioners, Planning Board and Board of Assessors, and be under the supervision of the Selectmen; and that after appointment of a Town Engineer all amounts appropriated for engineering be applied for salary and expenses of the Town Engineer except to such extent as they may be needed to pay obligations incurred before such appointment.

The Moderator invited a perusal of the Finance Committee Budget at this point and offered an opportunity to questions and comments, as well as Motions of Amendment to various parts of the Budget, which were as follows:

Upon a Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. Garret F. Ziffer "To delete Item #33 on p. 37 for a Wage and Salary Consultant" it was VOTED: In the Negative.

Upon a Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. John R. McEnroy, "To reduce Item #53 on p. 38 (for the Conservation Fund) from \$12,000.00 to \$2,000.00" it was

VOTED: In the Negative.

Upon a Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. Michael W. Dix, "To delete Item #19 under Health on p. 41, provided for Mosquito Control" it was VOTED: In the Negative.

Upon a Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. McEnroy, "To delete Item #2 under Highway and to increase Item #3 under same to \$7,455.87" it was

VOTED: In the Negative.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That when this meeting is adjourned, it be adjourned to meet again at 7:45 P. M. on Monday, March 11, 1963, in the Field House, the new High School.

Duly seconded, Mr. Randall C. Redpath offered the following MOTION; To amend the main Motion, in reference to Item #9 on p. 49 (Unclassified - Insurance - General) by adding the words, "Provided that the purchase of all insurance by the Town of Wayland be by competitive bidding procedures."

This Motion was still under discussion, had not yet been voted upon, when:

Upon a Motion of Mr. McEnroy, duly seconded, "To adjourn the Meeting in accordance with the previous vote on Mr. Morgan's Motion -- until next Monday evening" it was

VOTED: First vote (voice) was in the Negative, and so declared by the Moderator.

The second vote (standing, uncounted vote) was very close; and the Moderator, therefore called for a

COUNTED Standing Vote: "Yes" 139 "No" 128

The Meeting was adjourned at 11:00 P. M.

Pursuant to the Warrant for the 1963 Annual Town Meeting, duly signed by the Selectmen, served and return of service given by a Constable, and a continuance being held in accordance with a vote taken at the March 6th session of said Annual Town Meeting, the inhabitants of the Town of Wayland qualified to vote in Town Meeting, met this day; and at 7:45 P. M. the Moderator called the meeting to order, declared a quorum to be present, and the meeting proceeded to transact the following business:

The Moderator re-read Mr. Redpath's Motion of Amendment, re: Providing that all insurance for the Town be based upon competitive bid.

Upon Motion of Mr. Robert M. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That Mr. Redpath's motion be amended by addition of: "if in the opinion of the Selectmen it is desirable, after a careful review of the fire insurance rating history of the Town, and after due consideration of all factors bearing on the matter fully taking into account the service to be rendered to the Town. "

The first vote (voice) was declared in doubt. The second vote (standing, uncounted) was in favor.

Upon Mr. Redpath's Motion (subject to the above), it was VOTED: First vote (voice) was declared in doubt. Second vote, a standing, uncounted vote, was declared in favor of the Motion.

Upon Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. Ralph S. Blanchard, To amend the paragraph in the Budget Motion, relating to a Town Engineer by inserting after the words "Town Engineer" the words, "who shall be a registered professional civil engineer, as well as a registered land surveyor" it was

VOTED: First vote (voice) declared in doubt. Second vote (standing, uncounted) declared in Negative was doubted by seven persons; and then there was a Standing COUNTED VOTE: "Yes" 180 "No" 239

Brooks Company, Civil Engineers, Newtonville, Wayland and West Acton, Mass." on file with the Town Clerk.
- (d) Bent Avenue Extension as described in the Order of Laying-out of the Board of Selectmen dated February 25, 1963, and as shown on a plan entitled "Plan and Profile of Bent Avenue Extension in Wayland, Mass., dated December 12, 1962, Everett M. Brooks Company, Civil Engineers, Newtonville, Wayland and West Acton, Mass." on file with the Town Clerk;

and that the Board of Selectmen be authorized to acquire all necessary land including drainage and slope easements as shown on said plans, by purchase, gift, eminent domain or otherwise; and that there be appropriated and assessed therefor the sum of \$1,000.00 for the acquisition of such land for the construction of such ways and for other costs in connection therewith; and that betterments be assessed under Chapter 80 of the General Laws in accordance with the Order of Laying-out.

Duly seconded, Mr. Blanchard offered a

MOTION: To delete the \$1,000.00 called for in Mr. Morgan's Motion, and substitute therefor the amount of \$25,000.00.

There being some question as to whether the course of the proposed Bent Avenue Extension would cause undue hardship to an abutter, who was away at this time, Mr. Redpath proposed a

MOTION: To defer action upon this portion of the Motion, until a later session of this meeting, in the hope that an engineer might clear up the problem.

The Town Counsel ruled Mr. Redpath's Motion out of order, pointing out that the description of a land-taking could not be altered after the Selectmen's Order of Laying-out had been properly filed in connection therewith; the description would have to be voted upon as it stood, either for or against.

The Moderator ruled the Motion out of order.

Upon a Motion of Mr. George H. Robinson, duly seconded, "The previous question". . . first three votes were not unanimous.

Upon COUNTED VOTE: "Yes" 335 "No" 24

Upon Mr. Blanchard"s Motion of Amendment, it was VOTED: In the Negative.

Upon Mr. Morgan's (Main) Motion, it was VOTED: First two votes were not unanimous; but then there was

COUNTED VOTE: "Yes" 210 "No" 87

a

The required 2/3rd vote was declared to have carried.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town accept the Laying-out as a public town way of Rolling Lane as described in the Order of Laying-out of the Board of Selectmen dated February 25, 1963, and as shown on a plan entitled "Plan and Profile of Rolling Lane in Wayland, Mass., dated December 12, 1962, Everett M. Brooks Company, Civil Engineers, Newtonville, Wayland and West Acton, Mass." on file with the Town Clerk; that the Board of Selectmen be authorized to acquire all necessary land including drainage and slope easements, as shown on said plan, by purchase, gift, eminent domain or otherwise; and that there be appropriated and assessed the sum of \$9,700 for the acquisition of such land, for the construction of such way and for other costs in connection therewith; and that betterments be assessed under Chapter 80 of the General Laws in accordance with the Order of Laying-out.

A question was raised as to the propriety of the meeting, in view of the fact that the Warrants had been distributed as late as they were.

The Town Counsel, Mr. Kilburn, ruled upon this, stating the opinion that, while some Warrants had been late, most had been delivered in plenty of time; that attested copies of the Warrant had been posted by a Constable of the Town, as required by Town By-Law, which would be sufficient to validate the actions of this Meeting.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to install Water Pipes and Hydrants in the ways known as (1) Bent Avenue, (2) George Street, (3) Cottage Street and (4) Bent Avenue Extension, or any portions thereof, and to appropriate and assess or transfer from Available Funds a sum of money for the expense of installation of pipes and hydrants, and other materials and other expenses thereof, with betterments to be assessed in accordance with Provisions of General Laws (Ter. Ed.) Chapter 40, Section 42 G through 421; or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Morgan offered the following

MOTION: That the Water Commissioners and the Board of Selectmen be authorized to install water pipes and hydrants in the ways known as (1) Bent Avenue, (2) George Street, (3) Cottage Street and (4) Bent Avenue Extension; and that there be appropriated the sum of \$19,000, \$14,000 to be raised and assessed and \$5,000 to be transferred from the amount previously set aside in the account, "Street Betterments - Construction - Bent Avenue", the entire sum to be expended for the installation of water pipes and hydrants and other materials and other expenses thereof, with betterments to be assessed in accordance with provisions of the General Laws (Ter. Ed.) Chapter 40, Section 42 G through 42 I.

Upon Motion of Mr. Frank A. Smith, "The Previous Question" the First Vote gave a scattering of No's--the Second VOTE: Unanimously in favor.

Upon Mr. Morgan's Motion, it was VOTED: In favor.

In accordance with a previous vote, the Meeting returned to Article I. To hear the reports of the Town Officers, Agents and Committees and act thereon.

Mr. John B. Wilson read the report of the School Building Committee, which: 1. Noted the virtual completion of the Claypit Hill School Addition, with \$30,000 in unused funds remaining, (recommended the transfer of such funds to Loker School addition); 2. Loker School Addition expected to be ready for use in September 1963;

3. Senior High School--while still some problems remain to be ironed out, it was pointed out with some gratification, that aggregate of extras on this sizable and complex project, had been only a little more than 2% of the original contract price. Projected plans for the future include probable need for additional class rooms by September, 1965, and recommendations in this connection are to be expected at the next Town Meeting. The Committee expressed appreciation of services of former Supt. Edward J. Anderson and Acting Supt. Richard Lavin, and welcomed the new Supt., R. Bruce McGill, each of whom had served in turn, as Secretary to the Committee.

Upon a Motion of Mr. R. L. Franceschi, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To adjourn the Meeting, in accordance with a previous motion to Wednesday evening, March 13, 1963, at 7:45 P. M. in the High School Field House.

Pursuant to the Warrant for the 1963 Annual Town Meeting, duly signed by the Selectmen, served and return of service given by a Constable of the Town; and a continuance being held in accordance with vote taken at the March 11, 1963, session of said Annual Town Meeting, the inhabitants of the Town of Wayland qualified to vote in Town Meeting, met this day; and at 7:50 P. M. the Moderator called the meeting to order, declared a quorum to be present, and the meeting proceeded to transact the following business:

Article 1. (Continued)

Mr. Theodore R. Magoun pointed out that the report of the Recreation Advisory Committee was to be found in the Annual Town Report; and he then offered, duly seconded, the following

MOTION: That the Recreation Advisory Committee be continued in existence for further study. Upon this, it was

VOTED: In favor.

Mr. William C. Moyer, Chairman, read the Report of the Committee to Oppose Overhead High Tension Lines, which was placed on file with the Town Clerk, along with a copy of the corresponding report of the Sudbury Committee, which had worked in cooperation with the Wayland Committee; and with a copy of House Bill No. 781 which had been filed by Rep. James DeNormandie upon the petition of the Wayland Town Counsel.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Moyer, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That the Committee Opposing Overhead High Tension Lines be continued in existence for another year, and that it be instructed to submit a report at the next Annual Town Meeting.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Charles H. Peters, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That in the future, the School Building Committee's Annual Report be printed in the Town Report and that the reading of this Annual Report be dispensed with at the Annual Town Meeting.

Mr. Harvey C. Newton, Chairman, read the Report of the Wayland

Redevelopment Authority, which: Cited approval by the Federal Government on March 1, 1963, of its Planning and Survey Application; pointed out the outlook of the Board as aiming to conserve and improve the area in question, rather than attempting to tear down; stated that about one quarter of the \$122,929 now available for use by the Authority would be needed for the detailed study of the Dudley Pond Area; the remaining three-quarters to be kept for use when and if resulting plans were accepted by the Federal Government, the residents of the area, and the townspeople. It was expected that the Study would take about 6-8 months to complete.

A Motion of Mr. Clifford A. Goodnoh, "That it be the sense of the meeting, that the Report of the Redevelopment Authority not be included in the Town Report", it was

VOTED: In the Negative.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That the Committee on Town Government, the Beach Study Committee and the By-Pass Committee be continued for another year; and that their reports, appearing in the Annual Town Report, be accepted.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Magoun, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That the Annual Report of the Town for 1962 be received with thanks, by the Town.

Upon a Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. Richard Cormier:

"That it be the sense of the meeting that the Board of Selectmen consider preparing pre-printed letters which can be used by the taxpayers of Wayland to instruct their banks to pay to the Tax Collector of the Town of Wayland all property tax monies deposited in their tax account on March 31; the pre-printed letter should be complete and require only the following to be filled in by the taxpayer: (1) Name and address of bank; (2) Taxpayer's signature; The Town of Wayland will mail no later than April 1, 1963, for 1963, and no later than March 15 each year thereafter a letter of explanation with two (2) of these pre-printed letters to every taxpayer for his use in instructing his bank; and

Further, that the Town of Wayland authorize each property taxpayer paying his property tax in accordance with the foregoing to deduct a total of twenty-five cents (.25¢) from his final tax bill, to offset any potential bank charges for the added services."

This was, VOTED: In the Negative.

Another Motion of Mr. Cormier, "That the Town petition the Legislature to require the Town of Wayland to permit and provide for semiannual collection of taxes" was ruled out of order, as being "fatally vague". An attempt to rephrase such a motion was challenged by Mr. Ela, who pointed out that, since no committee had been appointed to report on this question, the entire matter would be out of order. This challenge was honored by the Moderator, who also ruled the matter out of order at this time.

Upon a Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. John W. Arnold, "That the meeting return to Article 3 (for the purpose of reconsidering the addition of the Water Superintendent to the list of those to receive a 10% raise)" it was

VOTED: In the Negative.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Garret F. Ziffer, duly seconded, by Mr. Morgan, "To take up Article 46 at this time" it was

VOTED: First vote (voice) was declared in doubt;

Second vote (standing, uncounted) showed a substantial number in favor, but the 2/3rd count was still unclear.

COUNTED VOTE: "Yes" 268 "No" 80

Article 46. To see what sum, if any, the Town will vote to transfer from available funds to meet any of the appropriations made under the foregoing articles.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To pass over the Article.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Public Town Way, the relocation of a portion of the road known as Cochituate Road, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen and as shown on plans on file with the Town Clerk; to authorize the Board of Selectmen to acquire the necessary land, including easements for drainage and slope, by purchase, gift, eminent domain or otherwise; to appropriate and assessa sum of money for the acquisition of such land or any portion thereof and for other costs in connection therewith; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. William A. Loker, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town dispense with the reading of the Order of Laying-out of the Board of Selectmen, in connection with this article.

Duly seconded, Mr. Loker offered the following

MOTION: That the Town accept the Laying-out as a public Town way the relocation of a portion of Cochituate Road as described in the Order of Laying-out of the Board of Selectmen dated February 25, 1963, and as shown on a plan entitled "Relocation of a Section of Route 126 in Wayland, Mass., dated December 28, 1962, MacCarthy Engineering Service, Inc., 200 West Central Street in Natick, Mass.", on file with the Town Clerk; that the Board of Selectmen be authorized to acquire the necessary land, including easements for drainage and slope, as shown on said plan, by purchase, gift, eminent domain or otherwise; and that there be appropriated and assessed the sum of \$3,000 for the acquisition of such land, for the construction of such way and for other costs in connection therewith.

MOTION: That the Town accept the Laying- Out as a public Town way, the relocation of Loker Street as described in the Order of Laying-Out of the Board of Selectmen dated February 25, 1963, and as shown on a plan entitled "Plan, Profile and Taking Plan of a Part of Loker Street, Wayland, Massachusetts", dated January 26, 1962, by Everett M. Brooks Co., Civil Engineers, Newtonville, Wayland and W. Acton, Mass., onfile with the Town Clerk; that the Board of Selectmen be authorized to acquire the necessary land, including easements for drainage and slope, as shown on said plan, by purchase, gift, eminent domain or otherwise; and that there be appropriated and assessed the sum of \$1,000. for the acquisition of such land, for the construction of such way, and for other costs in connection therewith.

Upon Motion of Mr. Loker, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town dispense with the reading of the Order of Laying-Out of the Board of Selectmen, in connection with this article.

Upon Motion of Mr. Loker, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town accept as public Town ways Squirrel Hill Road (from Station 0 + 0 to Station 9 + 0), Sears Road (from Station 24 + 43.93 to Station 42 + 50), and Cole Road Extension (from Station 0 + 0 to Station 2 + 50), as described in the Orders of Laying-Out of the Board of Selectmen dated February 25, 1963, and as shown on plans described in the article and on file with the Town Clerk; that the Board of Selectmen be authorized to acquire any necessary land, including easements for drainage, by purchase, gift, eminent domain or otherwise, and that the sum of \$30. be appropriated and assessed for the acquisition of such land and easements and for other costs in connection therewith, without any appropriation of money

for construction of said roads under the Betterment Act, or otherwise.

Article 27. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Road Commissioners to remove all obstructions to and otherwise improve the free flow of water in Snake Brook from Commonwealth Road to the North Main Street bridge; to transfer, appropriate or borrow money to pay for the same; or otherwise act thereon.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Francis A. Fisher, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That this Article be passed over.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the use of Voting Machines at all Primaries and Elections held in the Town of Wayland; to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the rental and/or purchase of the required number of such machines; to determine how such sum of money shall be raised; or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Ela offered the following

MOTION: That a committee of three, consisting of one Selectman, one member of the School Committee, each to be designated by their respective boards, and the Town Clerk, be set up and authorized to investigate and make recommendations to the next Town Meeting as to the feasibility of the purchase and use of voting machines at all elections; that they be directed to investigate the advisability of dividing the Town into three or more precincts, and that they be further directed to investigate proper storage facilities for such equipment, that there be appropriated and assessed \$500. for the use of the Committee in preparing necessary plans, and that there be appropriated and assessed \$10,000 for ultimate purchase and/or rental of machines, such funds not to be expended without further vote of the Town.

At the request of the Moderator, the clause, "that they be directed to investigate the advisability of dividing the Town into three or more precincts" was deleted from the Motion, because it went beyond the scope of the Article.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Laurence S. Fordham, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To amend Mr. Ela's Motion by

- 1. Increasing the membership of the Committee to five (5), to include two (2) members at large, to be appointed by the Moderator; and
- 2. Adding the words, "and advisability" after the word "feasibility"... of the purchase and use, etc...

Upon Motion of Mr. Howard C. Weeks, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To delete the appropriation of \$10,000.00 from the Motion.

Upon Motion of Mr. Ziffer, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To delete the appropriation of \$500.00 from the Motion.

Upon the Main Motion of Mr. Ela, as amended, it was VOTED: In favor.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase, take by eminent domain, gift and/or other means, on behalf of the Town of Wayland, water easements through and over certain land as follows:

- (1) As shown on a Plan, now on file with the Town Clerk, entitled "Plan of Land in Wayland, Mass., (showing Town of Wayland Water Easement)" by Everett M. Brooks Co., C. E. dated August 18, 1962;
- (2) As shown on a Plan, now on file with the Town Clerk, entitled "Plan of Land in Wayland, Mass., (showing Town of Wayland Water Easement)" by Everett M. Brooks Co., C. E. dated August 20, 1962;
- (3) As shown on a Plan, now on file with the Town Clerk, entitled "Plan of Land in Wayland, Mass., (showing Town of Wayland Water Easement)" by Everett M. Brooks Co., C. E. dated August 21, 1962;

together with the right to enter upon such premises and construct and maintain pipes, hydrants, and ditches, and appurtenant structures therein, and to raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Ela, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen and the Water Commissioners to acquire by purchase, eminent domain, gift and/or otherwise; water easements through and over certain parcels of land as described in the article, together with the right to enter upon such premises and construct and maintain pipes, hydrants and ditches, and appurtenant structures therein, and that there be appropriated and assessed therefor the sum of \$30.00.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the purchase, take by eminent domain, gift, or otherwise, of an easement for existing water main through and over certain parcels of land shown as Easement for Existing Water Main on Plan of Land in Wayland, Mass., dated December 14, 1962, by Everett M. Brooks Co., Civil Engineers, situated on Northerly side of Old Connecticut Path as shown on said Plan and bounded and described as follows:

Commencing at a point 259.06 feet along a curve with a radius of 2068.36 feet in a Southwesterly direction from the point of tangency of said curve, with segment of said Northerly side line of said Old Connecticut Path, which segment runs SOUTH 51° 11' 50" West; thence running by said Northerly side line of Old Connecticut Path along said curve with a radius 2068.36 feet, a distance of 218 feet; thence running NORTH 54° 04' 13" East over land of Josephine L. Upon Motion of Mr. Ela, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously; That the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen and the Water Commissioners to acquire by purchase, take by eminent domain, gift, or otherwise, an easement for existing watermain through and over certain parcels of land shown as Easement for Existing Water Main on Plan of Land in Wayland, Mass., dated December 14, 1962, by Everett M. Brooks Co., Civil Engineers, situated on the Northerly side of Old Connecticut Path as shown on said Plan and bounded and described as set forth in the article, together with the right to enter upon such premises and construct and maintain pipes, hydrants, and ditches, and appurtenant structures therein, and that there be appropriated and assessed therefor the sum of \$10.00.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the purchase, take by eminent domain, gift, or otherwise, of a drainage easement through and over a certain parcel of land shown as "Drain Easement" on Plan of Land in Wayland, Mass., dated December 14, 1962, by Everett M. Brooks Co., Civil Engineers, bounded and described as follows:

Commencing at the intersection of the Southerly side line of Old Connecticut Path and Easterly side line of said drain easement, thence running SOUTH 47° 05' 40" East, 220.09 feet; thence running SOUTH 42° 54' 20" West, 30 feet; thence running NORTH 47° 05' 40" West, 230.31 feet to the Southerly side line of Old Connecticut Path; thence running NORTHEASTERLY by said Southerly side line, 31.69 feet, to the point of beginning, excepting so much thereof as is owned by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Weston Aqueduct, shown on said plan; together with the right to enter upon said premises and lay and maintain pipes, sewers, drains and manholes, therein, and to raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon Motion of Mr. Ela, duly seconded, it was

VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to acquire by purchase, eminent domain, gift, or otherwise, a drainage easement through and over a certain parcel of land shown as "Drain Easement" on Plan of Land in Wayland, Mass., dated December 14, 1962, by Everett M. Brooks Co., Civil Engineers, and bounded and described as set forth in the article, together with the right to enter upon said premises and lay and maintain pipes, sewers, drains and manholes, therein, and that there be raised, appropriated and assessed therefor the sum of \$10.00.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the purchase, take by eminent domain, gift, or otherwise, of a drainage easement through and over a certain parcel of land shown as "Drain Easement" on Plan of Land in Wayland, Mass., dated December 14, 1962, by Everett M. Brooks Co., Civil Engineers, bounded and described as follows:

Commencing at the intersection of the westerly side line of easement and northerly side of Old Connecticut Path, thence running NORTH 47° 05' 40" West, 7.09 feet; thence running NORTH 43° 02' 40" West, 119.23 feet; thence running NORTH 46° 57' 20" East, 30 feet; thence running SOUTH 43° 02' 40" East, 118.17 feet; thence running SOUTH 47° 05' 40" East, 16.52 feet to the Northerly side line of Old Connecticut Path; thence running SOUTHWESTERLY by said Northerly side line of Old Connecticut Path 31.78 feet to the point of beginning; together with the right to enter upon said premises and lay and maintain pipes, sewers, drains and manholes, therein, and to raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon Motion of Mr. Ela, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to acquire by purchase, eminent domain, gift, or otherwise, a drainage easement through and over a certain parcel of land shown as "Drain Easement" on Plan of Land in Wayland, Mass., dated December 14, 1962, by Everett M. Brooks Co., Civil Engineers, and bounded and described as set forth in the article, together with the right to enter upon said premises and lay and maintain pipes, sewers, drains and manholes, therein, and that there be raised and appropriated and assessed therefor the sum of \$10.00.

Article 33. To see whether the Town will transfer to the jurisdiction of the Conservation Commission the parcel of Town-owned land having an area of about 1.4 acres located on the Easterly side of Sherman's Bridge Road at the Sudbury River.

Upon Motion of Mr. Henry J. Muller, duly seconded, it was

VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town transfer to the jurisdiction of the Conservation Commission the parcel of Town-owned land having an area of about 1.4 acres located on the Easterly side of Sherman's Bridge Road at the Sudbury River, now or formerly of Helen M. Stevenson.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the transfer from Tax Title Possessions to the Town of Wayland for School Purposes, the area on Plate 47 D designated Town of Wayland located on the northeast side of the prospective Junior High School site and containing 15,046 square feet, more or less; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon Motion of Mr. Muller, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town authorize the transfer from Tax Title Possession account to the Town of Wayland for School Purposes, the area on Plate 47 D designated Town of Wayland located on the northeast side of the prospective Junior High School site and containing 15,046 square feet, more or less.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the transfer from Tax Title Possession Account to the Town of Wayland, for Conservation purposes, the area on Plates 24 and 25 of the Town Atlas designated as Town of Wayland, located on the northeasterly and southeasterly corners of Lee and Wheelock Roads and along the north side of the brook; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon Motion of Mr. Muller, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town authorize the transfer from Tax Title Possessions account to the Town of Wayland, for Conservation purposes, the area on Plates 24 and 25 of the Town Atlas designated as Town of Wayland, located on the northeasterly and southeasterly corners of Lee and Wheelock Roads and along the north side of the brook.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to abandon its ten (10) foot slope easement in land on the easterly side of Old Connecticut Path, extending from the High School entrance road to Davelin Road as shown on a Plan entitled "Plan of Land in Wayland, Mass. by Mac-Carthy Engineering Service dated May 27, 1961"; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon Motion of Mr. Muller, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That the article be passed over.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to reconvey to John C. Coady and Sarah E. Coady, Lots 865-866-867 and 868 Cedar Crest Road, with condition in deed reconveyance conditional on first option to repurchase by the Town based on arbitration, one picked by the Town and one by John C. and Sarah E. Coady; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Frank W. Kilburn, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Board of Selectmen, with the approval of the Town Counsel, be authorized to reconvey, for the sum of \$1.00 to John C. Coady and Sarah E. Coady, Lots 865-866-867 and 868 Cedar Crest Road, with the condition in the deed that there be reserved an option to repurchase the property by the Town at a price to be arrived at by arbitration, the arbitration board to be made up of one chosen by the Town and one by John C. and Sarah E. Coady, and a third by the two so designated.

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town By-Law relating to Zoning, as amended, by repealing that portion of the By-Law as found in Section IX, Sub paragraph (e) starting with the words on line four "is hereby subdivided" and ending with line thirty-seven "not less than two hundred and ten feet on a street line," and substituting in its place the following:

"as shown defined and bounded on a second map accompanying this by-law entitled "Town of Wayland, Amendment to Zoning Map of 1934, March 1939," dated and approved February 27, 1939, the Wayland Planning Board, as revised March 13, 1939, by said Board and on file with the Town Clerk; and the second map and the explanatory matter thereon, as so revised, shall be laid out so that any building lot shall contain a minimum of 20,000 sq. ft., with a 120 ft. frontage on any street line;" or take any action relative thereto.

Upon Motion of Mr. Robert H. Charnock, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That the article be passed over.

Article 39. To see if the Town will vote to re-zone the land on both sides of the State Road East to a depth of three hundred (300) feet on each side from Cochituate Road East to the Weston-Wayland Town Line, from single-family residence and in part Roadside Business, to Business A.

Upon Motion of Mr. L. William Bertelsen, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That the article be passed over.

Article 40. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-

Law by adding a new sub-paragraph 1. after Section V (q) as follows:

Removal of sod, loam, sand, gravel, or quarried stone from within a subdivision, the plan of which has been approved by the Planning Board and duly recorded in Middlesex South District Registry of Deeds, shall be permitted when and to the extent that such is necessary for the lawful construction or alteration of a way shown on said plan, or for the lawful installation of utilities or drain pipes or drain structures in said subdivision, provided that the quantity of sod, loam, sand, gravel, or quarried stone so removed shall not exceed that in place in the particular space to be occupied by such way, utilities, drain pipes or drain structures, and subject to any requirements made by the Planning Board endorsed or referred to on the plan of such subdivision.

Duly seconded, Mr. Charnock offered the following MOTION: That the Zoning By-law be amended by adding a new sub-paragraph 1. after Section V (q), as per the language of the article.

Mr. Charnock then presented the Report of the Planning Board with Recommendations, in connection with this Article, a copy of which was placed on file with the Town Clerk.

Upon Mr. Charnock's Motion, it was
VOTED: First vote gave a scattering "No"
Second vote was unanimously in favor of the Motion.

Article 41. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Code as amended in any or all of the following respects; or take any action relative thereto:

- 1. By deleting the title "Inspection of Buildings" Section 6 Chapter 1 and inserting as the new title of Section 6, of Chapter 1 "Inspection of Buildings and Structures".
- 2. By inserting the words "And Structures" after the word "Buildings" in the first line of sub-section (a) of Section 6 of Chapter 1.
- 3. By deleting the following sub-sections under Chapter II-definitions:

BUILDING: Any structure built for the support, shelter, or enclosure of persons, animals, chattels, or property of any kind.

STRUCTURE: The combination of materials, other than a building, the term "structure" shall be construed where the context allows, as though followed by the words "or part thereof." Any questions

as to the application of the word "structure" within this code shall be as interpreted by the Inspector, subject to appeal.

FOUNDATION: That portion of an exterior or party wall below the finished first floor level.

And inserting under "DEFINITIONS", Chapter II, as follows:

BUILDING: A combination of materials, portable or fixed, having a roof to form a structure for the shelter for persons, animals or property. For the purpose of this definition "roof" shall include an awning or any similar covering whether or not permanent in nature. The word "BUILDING" shall not include such frameworks and tents as are used exclusively for outdoor carnivals, lawn parties or other similar activities, the word "BUILDING" shall be construed where the context requires as though followed by the words "or parts thereof".

STRUCTURE: A combination of materials assembled at a fixed location to give support or shelter; such as but not limited to a building, framework, reviewing stand, platform, tank, tunnel, tower, swimming pool or the like. The word "STRUCTURE" shall be construed where the context allows as though followed by the words "or parts thereof".

FOUNDATION: That portion of a building or structure of which the sole or chief purpose or use is to transmit the weight of the building or structure to the earth, such as that portion of an exterior or party wall below the finished first floor level.

- 4. By inserting a new sub-section (g) under Section 6, of Chapter 1 as follows:
 - (g) Every excavation and every structure in the process of construction or alteration shall be properly guarded and protected by the person responsible therefor, so as to prevent it from becoming dangerous to life and limb and to the neighborhood;

or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Ela offered the following MOTION: That the Town amend the Building Code in all of the respects set forth in the article.

Upon Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. Blanchard, it was VOTED: To amend Mr. Ela's Motion and the proposed Building Code changes, by the deletion of the sentence under the new definition of "BUILDING": "For the purpose of this definition "roof" shall include an awning or any similar covering whether or not permanent in nature."

Upon the Main Motion of Mr. Ela, it was
VOTED: The first vote gave a scattering of "No's".

The second vote was unanimously in favor of the Motion,
as amended.

Article 42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Water Department to petition the Massachusetts General Court for authority to sell water to inhabitants of the Town of Natick; or do or act.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Kilburn, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That the Town authorize the Water Department to petition the Massachusetts General Court for authority to sell water to inhabitants of the Town of Natick.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Mendler, duly seconded, "That the Town return to Article 10 for the purpose of limiting the previous vote under that Article, so that no money shall be spent for construction on Old Connecticut Path beyond the point where it crosses Rice Road." It was

VOTED: In the Negative.

Article 43. To see if the Town will vote for the appointment of a committee to study means of protecting and preserving buildings, sites and districts of historic interest in the Town.

Duly seconded, Mr. Charnock offered the following:

MOTION: That the Board of Selectmen is hereby requested to establish an historic district study committee in accordance with Section 4 of Chapter 40 C of the Massachusetts General Laws, such committee to consist of not less than five members and to include one member chosen from two nominated by the Wayland Historical Society, one member of the Planning Board, designated by such Board, and three members at large; such committee to make an investigation and report to a subsequent Town Meeting, and not later than the next annual Town Meeting with respect to a proposed historic district for the Wayland Center area, all under and in accordance with said Chapter 40C.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Blanchard, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To amend Mr. Charnock's Motion by deleting the words, "a subsequent Town Meeting and not later than"

Upon the Main Motion of Mr. Charnock, as amended, it was VOTED: In favor.

At this point, the Town Counsel, Mr. Kilburn, offered the following STATEMENT:

During the discussion of Old Connecticut Path, (in connection with Mr. Mendler's Motion to return to Article 10), I think there was one statement made, which should be clarified at this time. It was stated that the money could not be spent beyond Rice Road, because there had been no lay-out plan and nothing else would be done prior to the next Town Meeting. I do feel, however, . . . that I should bring it to the attention of the Town, that it is possible to lay out, through the County Commissioners, (and it is they, who do lay out a Chapter 90 project, not the Board of Selectmen), . . . the area beyond Rice Road. . .; they could lay out the area beyond Rice Road. . . with the necessary public hearings, etc. The takings could be made by the County Commissioners, and in that event . . . (and I don't say that there is any intention that it is to be done), but if this were to be done, then, I believe, the money could be spent on Old Connecticut Path beyond Rice Road.

Mr. Mendler then requested a revote on his previous Motion to return to Article 10. The Moderator offered to entertain a Motion to this effect. Mr. Fordham requested assurance of the Finance Committee that the project would not go beyond Rice Road. Upon Mr. Morgan's comment that, "In view of what has been said here, the Finance Committee would be very foolish to go beyond Rice Road (with this project)", both Mr. Mendler and Mr. Fordham were persuaded to drop the matter and did not renew the Motion to return to Article 10.

Article 44. To see whether the Town will vote to add to the Town By-Laws a provision to the effect that any Town Board, officer or department may sell or otherwise dispose of any personal property belonging to the Town under its or his control, having a value of not more than \$200.00 in each instance, with the approval of the Selectmen and the Finance Committee.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Wells, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town amend its By-Laws by adding thereto a new Article as follows:

DISPOSAL OF SURPLUS PROPERTY

"Any Town board, officer or department may sell or otherwise dispose of any personal property belonging to the Town under its or his control, having a value of not more than \$200 in each instance, with the approval of the Selectmen and the Finance Committee".

Article 45. To see whether the Town will vote to add to the Town By-Laws a provision authorizing the Selectmen to license collectors of junk and trash, and prohibiting the collection of junk and trash within the Town for hire without such a license.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Wells, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That the Town amend its By-Laws by adding thereto a new Article as follows:

"The Board of Selectmen shall have the authority to license suitable persons to be collectors of junk and trash, such licenses to be revocable at the pleasure of said Board and to contain such regulations as said Board shall determine. No person shall collect junk or trash within the Town for hire without such a license."

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept various conveyances, gifts, and devises to the Town; or take any action relative thereto.

By unanimous consent of the Meeting, a reading of the detailed description of the eleven (11) drainage easements granted to the Town and accepted in this Motion, were omitted by Mr. Kilburn in making the following Motion. He did indicate who the donors were, and the general location of each.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Kilburn, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town accept with thanks the following gifts:

Unless authorized by the Board of Selectmen, not more than one unregistered and ungaraged motor vehicle shall be placed or permitted to remain on any lot in a single residence district, and no unregistered and unsightly motor vehicle shall be placed or permitted to remain in the front yard of any such lot. Any person so placing a motor vehicle and, if placed or allowed to remain with his or her knowledge or consent, the owner or owners of the motor vehicle and of the lot, shall each be punishable by a fine of not more than twenty dollars for each offense."

"Section 7. Whoever destroys, defaces or removes any notice or document posted pursuant to law, shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars for each offense."

Duly seconded, Mr. Fisher offered the following MOTION: That the Town By-Laws be amended by adding two new sections to be designated as Section 6 and Section 7 under Article 6, to read (by unanimous consent of the Meeting, Mr. Fisher omitted to read the wording since it followed exactly the wording as proposed by the Warrant).

Duly seconded, Mr. Henry G. Pærson offered a Motion of AMENDMENT: To delete the words, "and no unregistered and

unsightly motor vehicle shall be placed, etc. in the front yard of any such lot."

- 2. Instrument of dedication to public use executed by Wayland Real Estate Company dated July 28, 1950, recorded with Middlesex South District Deeds, Book 7620, Page 9, relating to a parcel of about 4.4 acres of land adjoining the Town standpipe site on Reeve Hill.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and transfer to Maturing Debt, Principal (School Notes \$50,000 due in January, 1964) a sum of money from School Construction, Claypit Hill Addition; and an additional sum of money from Available Funds (Excess and Deficiency); or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Allan R. Upon a Motion of Mr. Kilburn, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town abandon the taking of land of Clara Lupien, 1.3 acres, as voted under Article 16 at the Annual Town Meeting in 1960.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase, take by eminent domain, gift, or otherwise, on behalf of the Town of Wayland, a certain parcel of land for Recreational purposes, shown on a plan entitled "Plot Plan of Land in Wayland, Mass. dated Oct. 23, 1963, by Everett M. Brooks Co., Civil Engineers" bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the easterly sideline of Rice Road at land of Lupien as shown on above-mentioned plan, thence

Northerly one hundred (100) feet, thence Southeasterly five hundred ninety (590) feet, thence Westerly by no dim. to the point of beginning. Contains 0.6 acres more or less; and will raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, a sum of money therefor; or take any action relative thereto.

By unanimous consent of the Meeting, the Moderator omitted to read this Article.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Mr. Frank S. Tarr was re-elected to the Board of Selectmen at the Annual Town Election on March 4, 1963.

The Board organized for the year with Mr. Thomas Francis Linnehan as Chairman, Mr. George K. Lewis as Clerk, and Mr. Frank S. Tarr, as Third Member.

The Selectmen met regularly on the first and third Monday evenings of each month, and held in addition other meetings during weekdays and weekends with State and County officials, with members of Boards of adjacent towns, or with members of other Boards in Wayland on matters of common concern.

Mr. Linnehan served on the Town Government Committee, Mr. Lewis on the Committee on Code Enforcement, and on two special committees to study the replacement of War Memorials and on the feasibility of Historic Districts, and Mr. Tarr on committees to study the use of voting machines and the problem of drainage in the Winter Street area, as well as the Bypass Committee.

During the year, the Selectmen made the regular appointments of Town officials not elected by ballot and to other non-elected boards. Vacancies on several Town Boards were filled during the year. The Selectmen wish to express here their special recognition of many devoted years of service of Alfred Damon to his town in building a first-class water supply system. In addition, the Selectmen wish to express the Town's appreciation to the following for many hours of unpaid work in the Town's behalf: Mrs. Helen C. Morgan, a Library Trustee; Mr. Fern A. Taylor on the Water Board and as an Assessor; Mr. Thomas McGrath on the Personnel Board; Mr. Charles Cochrane on the Zoning Board of Appeals; and Mr. Charles Peters as a Highway Commissioner.

Other regular activities of the Board included the drawing of jurors, the disbursement of income from the Charitable Funds, the issuance of licenses, the approval of all bills incurred by other Town departments, the acceptance of Town roads, and the initiation of Betterments. The Board also acted in several cases of private complaints or disputes of a local nature.

The Selectmen have taken another step in their program of Highway Safety in obtaining professional services to place legal speed limits on Route 126 and a portion of Route 27. This program will be continued in 1964.

The Selectmen see as a major concern over the next several years, the continued changes required in those aspects of Town public responsibility that come with substantial population increases. The creation of full-time professional Fire and Police Departments, the reconstruction of Town roads, the eventual solution of rubbish disposal, major questions on the use of now vacant land, adequate public recreation facilities, a concern for Wayland youth, and the conservation of Wayland's aesthetic beauty, are some of the problems that must be faced in 1964, and in subsequent years. Communication and co-operation among the many Town boards and committees is essential to any progress in these areas.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TOWN GOVERNMENT

This Committee was originally set up to constantly review the operations of Town government, and from time to time make recommendations with respect to changes which might be needed to meet changing conditions. The following matters on which the Committee has previously reported call for further comment.

Cemetery - Tree - Moth Consolidation

The previously recommended consolidation of these three departments is now completed, with the Cemetery Commissioners having jurisdiction. For the first time, in 1964, the combined departments will be operated under a single budget.

Engineering Services

The recommendation for the employment of a Town Engineer having been approved by the Town, the Selectmen are currently screening a number of applicants with the expectation of making an appointment in the near future.

Public Works Department

A further step for the gradual consolidation of all Public Works' functions was accomplished during the year, with the appropriation of funds for the erecting of an addition to the Highway Garage, making possible the centralizing of garage facilities for the Cemetery, Moth, Tree and Park Departments.

Public Safety Department

The combining of the Fire and Police Departments under one administrative head continues, in the opinion of the Committee, to be a goal towards which the Town should be working, having in mind that a single communications center serving all departments probably should eventually be agreed upon. The Committee will make a thorough investigation of the problems involved and it hopes to come up with a firm recommendation sometime during the year.

Asst. Collector, Asst. Treasurer, Asst. Accountant

Continuous proper administration of the primary financial functions of the Town, as represented in the offices of the Collector, Treasurer and Accountant, would seem to indicate a need for the developing of an assistant, first, in the combined operations. Such a person should be available to cover sickness, vacations, or other absences, or in other words, a general back-up for these departments. In view of the rapid expansion of the work in these departments, the Committee plans to study the problem.

Real Estate Purchases and Sales

The Town is steadily acquiring real property under a number of different circumstances, either through liens, tax titles, or purchases, and for various purposes, such as condemnation, highway, water, park or schools, and in turn the Town is from time to time disposing of property, in a number of different ways. The Finance Committee has brought to the attention of the Committee on Town Government that there is currently a need for a complete review of the Town's holdings. This should include a study of the disposition which should be made of certain pieces of property, looking to the best interests of the Town and the future development of the areas in which the property is located. The Committee on Town Government, therefore, feels that it would be appropriate to set up an Advisory Committee to make the study and work directly with the Selectmen and the Town Counsel, the Committee to consist of the Town Treasurer, one member of the Planning Board, a Park Commissioner, a member of the Conservation Commission, and one member of the Finance Committee.

REPORT OF THE WAYLAND PLANNING BOARD

During 1963 the Board held regular meetings on the first and third Mondays. Allen H. Morgan was re-elected to a five-year term in the Annual Town Election.

SUBDIVISION CONTROL:

In 1963 the Board approved the following new subdivisions:

Subdivision activity appears to continue in the 1960's at a somewhat slower rate than the late 1950's.

One additional subdivision is under consideration at the close of 1963 which would itself produce about two-thirds the average number of new lots per year for the last 3 years. This one in particular presents the use of marginal building land requiring large amounts of

earth removal. The development of marginal lands is expected to continue producing drainage and septic tank problems as the demand for house lots in Wayland and the increase in land values continue.

The Board has been fortunate in most subdivisions recently approved to obtain grants of conservation easements to the Town through the Conservation Commission which put certain wet areas and areas of value as preserved wild areas out of the possibility of use for building or septic tank use. We appreciate the generosity of developers who make such grants and urge the continued consideration of such action by developers in the future. Such action enhances the beauty of the Town, and tends to alleviate drainage and sewerage disposal problems.

The Board cannot stress too strongly the urgent need for an early appointment of a Town Engineer. The job description as approved by the last Annual Town Meeting provides for this person to be an administrative assistant to the Planning Board in matters of subdivision control. This work includes, among other things, the policing of work of developers, checking on adherence to the Board's Subdivision Regulations, and determining completion of various phases of work. This service has been performed by the Highway Superintendent at the direction of the Road Commissioners in the past. The burden of work in the Highway Department has forced less attention to subdivision matters and the Planning Board must have assistance in 1964 to ensure that certain developers comply with requirements. The situation is such that the Board expects to take legal action to force compliance. The Town Engineer is needed to determine accurately the remaining work in these cases, and to improve supervision of subdivision construction.

ZONING:

The Board recommends no changes at this time in the Land Use Zones now in existence. It reiterates its recommendations for the eventual use of "Sand Hill" for commercial or business purposes when the Route 20 location problem is resolved.

EXISTING TOWN ROADS--ENGINEERING:

The Board for many years has directed engineering of existing town roads for the purpose of requiring some of the older undeveloped roads to equal layout requirements in the Board's Subdivision Regulations. The Board does this well in advance of likely time of subdivision so that there will be no doubt of subdividers being required to follow current layouts. It is hoped that a plan for Rice Road, laid out in such a manner, will be accepted as a Town Road at the 1964 Annual Town Meeting.

In 1964 the Board will complete similar work on Glezen Lane, east of Concord Road, this work having been started in 1963. In addition, such work will be done in 1964 on Hazelbrook Road. This will

complete the major requirements for such work on the large undeveloped areas, for the most part all on that side of the Town east of Route 126.

After 1964 our priority list for such work in the order of necessity is:

Glezen Lane, west of Concord Road Waltham Road Plain Road River Road Pelham Island Road

It is not contemplated that reconstruction of the above roads by the Town by undertaken except in instances where traffic hazzards exist in which case provisions for such improvements is incorporated in the plans prepared by the Board.

CHAPTER 90 ROADS:

The continuation of the Chapter 90 Road Construction and maintenance program is of financial benefit to the Town in that the construction cost to the Town is 1/4 of the total cost, and maintenance cost to the Town is 1/3 the total cost. The work is done in cooperation with the county engineers and generally occurs on roads that are "through traffic" roads.

The current Chapter 90 work involves reconstruction of Old Connecticut Path. It is understood that immediate attention may be paid by the County Engineers to an improvement in the very dangerous situation at the intersection of Old Connecticut Path, Route 27, and Route 126. It is recommended that this be accomplished before continuing with the remainder of Old Connecticut Path.

Sherman's Bridge Road should be the next road in priority for Chapter 90 work. The traffic load is now too great for the existing road. In addition, it appears vital that the Water Department install pumps for use of the new well field off Oxbow Road as soon as possible. Water consumption in a six day period in June, 1963, was perilously close to the maximum supply from the two other existing well fields. To connect the Oxbow Road well field to the system involves installation of new large mains through Oxbow Road and Sherman's Bridge Road to Concord Road. This should be done at the same time that Chapter 90 construction of Sherman's Bridge Road is done. The connection of this new well field to the Town system will provide a supply of water to handle the town's needs for many years.

The next road in priority for Chapter 90 work is Stonebridge Road.

BETTERMENT PROGRAM:

For many years the construction of utilities and surfacing of roads under the Betterment Program has included a priority list of roads where abutters have requested construction. The priority list has been established generally by the Finance Committee and the Road Commissioners. This program should be continued at a rate determined economically feasible by the Finance Committee.

Betterment for road construction is assessed to abutters when the improvement serves only the abutters. Where the improvement is more of the nature of being an improvement serving the Town as a whole, construction is then done outside the Betterment Program wholly at the Town's expense. Under the Betterment Program, the cost is shared equally by the Town and the abutters.

EXISTING TOWN ROADS--RECONSTRUCTION:

Certain roads have been surfaced or otherwise reconstructed completely at the Town's expense rather than on a basis of sharing the cost with abutters as in the Betterment Program. Most recently School Street has been reconstructed in this manner. It is recommended that this program continue at a rate economically feasible in the opinion of the Finance Committee, and that in certain areas of the Town, this work should be coordinated with the Betterment Program. The Planning Board in 1964 plans to study such a coordinated program.

MAJOR HIGHWAYS:

Although the Post Road Bypass around Wayland Center is still an uncertainty, the Board is still of the opinion it has held for many years, that the route of such a Bypass should be roughly from Ten Acres on the east, north of Sandy Burr Golf Course, to the Post Road west of the railroad crossing near the entrance to the Raytheon Laboratory.

In 1963 the Legislature established the Boston Regional Planning Project, which includes many cities and towns surrounding Boston of which Wayland is one. The agency seeks to coordinate planning for the area, particularly in the fields of highways and transportation. It points out Federal Government requirements for continued area planning where Federal grants of money are involved in certain major highways.

The relocation of Route 20 as the "Post Road Bypass" around Wayland Center would fall into this category.

The exact route of such a bypass appears a number of times in reports and on plans prepared by the Board in the past as

following the general route described above, and conforms to general recommendations in the past of the State Department of Public Works.

OTHER PLANNING:

The Board considers this report, and past annual reports, together with the special report on Planning for Wayland issued in October 1962, as a continuing Planning Recommendation Report to the Town, and expects future annual reports to be such an updating and continuation.

Since the people of the area did not want us to proceed, it was our decision to abandon this project and submit the question of dissolution of the Authority to the next Annual Town Meeting, as required by law, instead of tabling urban renewal as proposed by the two minority members.

A radar machine has been purchased with the objective in mind of more precise control of traffic flow. A new unmarked cruiser has been requested so that the radar equipment may be used less conspicuously and thus more efficiently.

A new style badge has been introduced for all members of the department.

Four additional policemen have been requested in order that the citizens may be more adequately protected.

Over twenty thousand dollars worth of personal belongings have been recovered and returned to the owners. In addition, eighteen unclaimed bicycles are available to the owners.

Again I am asking for the installation of traffic lights at the following junctions:

- 1. Routes 27 and 126
- 2. Memorial Square
- 3. Oak Street and Commonwealth Road

This latter proposal requires first, the initial approval of the State Department of Public Works.

I extend my thanks to the various department heads, the patrolmen, sergeants, and the Auxiliary Police, and citizens of the Town. It is by the combined harmonious efforts of all, that the Department is able to grow and operate efficiently.

An analysis of the alarms answered in 1963 not only reflects the result of the long dry spells of the Spring and Fall seasons but also once again it is indicative of the residential growth.

Fires other than in buildings and brush increased by 100% over 1962.

Rescue, First Aid, Emergency Calls and Investigations (principally to the home) were up 26% over 1962.

During the extended hazardous dry periods of 1963 it was necessary to place a ban on all outside burning and place mobile fire patrols into operation. The cooperation of the citizens of Wayland during this critical period was excellent and helped greatly our efforts to hold the fire threat in check.

Fire Prevention activities by this Department included the inspection of municipal buildings, nursing homes, business places, and multiple family dwellings. Single family dwellings were inspected, on request, and recommendations were made regarding hazards and family escape plans.

Fire Prevention films and instructions were presented by Department personnel to various groups, clubs and organizations.

Open house was held during Fire Prevention Week at both fire stations. Special displays of equipment and apparatus were explained and demonstrated.

Special projects by high school students and Boy Scouts were counseled by members of the department.

Periodic fire drills were held at all public schools, with the cooperation of the School Department.

The inspections of oil burner and liquified petroleum gas installations were conducted on a continuous basis throughout the year.

During the year this Department actively participated in the work of the Code Enforcement Committee. Twenty unsafe or hazardous structures were razed this year under the Code Enforcement Program and many hazardous conditions were corrected.

The Department training program was carried out in a series of sessions held in the Spring and the Fall of the year. In addition, full time members of the Department attended seminars and conferences conducted by the Massachusetts Institute of Fire Department Instructors, the International Municipal Signal Association, the Fire Apparatus Maintenance Association and the International Association of Fire Chiefs.

The municipal fire alarm system was extended by the Department

on Stonebridge Road, Overlook Road and Riverview Circle.

The alarm system was also extended by the installations made by subdivision contractors on Alden Road, Brewster Road, Oxbow Road, Holiday Road, Keith Road, Hickory Hill Road, Morrill Drive, Rice Spring Lane, Aqueduct Road, Gregory Lane and Linn Lane.

Another step in the long range program for the purchase and replacement of apparatus was completed this year with the acquisition of a 750 G. P. M. pumping engine approved at the annual town meeting in March 1963. The apparatus furnished by the American LaFrance Company of Elimira, New York, was delivered on September 16, 1963. The apparatus and equipment was inspected and tested and Department personnel received instructions on the operation and maintenance of the apparatus from the American LaFrance field engineer who remained here for three days for this purpose as per contract.

The underwriters acceptance tests were conducted on September 18, 1963, and the records of the tests forwarded to the New England Fire Rating Association office in Boston, Mass., on September 19, 1963. The apparatus was accepted on the same date and placed in service at Fire Headquarters (Station #1) September 20, 1963.

The first step of a long range plan to gradually provide eight additional full time personnel was approved at the annual town meeting in March 1963, and three men were added to the permanent force on May 1, 1963.

The availability of call or part time firefighters continues to be critical as the changing character of the community tends to diminish their number.

Therefore, the 1964 budget request includes an amount which would allow for step number two of the long range plan which provides for three men to be added to the Department on May 1, 1964.

The Fire Department at the present time is in what must be considered its formulative years from the standpoint of permanent personnel. We are endeavoring to build a capable, efficient and progressive Department. The standards we wish to attain cannot be reached without capable, competent people.

In view of the above, we must consider the various factors that confront us as we plan our development.

Fire departments need more highly educated personnel. As our day to day living changes, we must stop and consider how the great developments in science, chemistry, industry and transportation are

presenting new problems and responsibilities to the Fire Service.

One common problem faces all communities in the country: How to maintain adequate fire protection in the face of increasing hazards and mounting costs. Today's unprecedented economy is reflected in all our lives. Our expanding population has been accompanied by new housing, more commerce and many new hazards. All this has brought increased protection problems to municipal officers.

Community leaders and municipal officials in particular must realize that the fire service is an integral part of our economy. It protects capital investment, jobs and lives. Although a service, it parallels business and industry in all aspects of management and production. Yet its rate of compensation to personnel generally, is much lower. This should not be.

Today's fire department is a more complex organization of men and equipment, rigorous training, house and building inspections and careful planning. Firefighting is only one of its many responsibilities. In fact, the firefighting division of the modern fire department is only one of seven major divisions. The others are recruitment and training, fire prevention, operations planning, administration, maintenance and repair, and public relations.

The fire service is striving constantly to maintain an efficiency of operation which has characterized it over the years and which today is helping to meet the challenge of the times.

I wish to extend my thanks and appreciation to the members of the Department, and to all persons who in any way have cooperated and assisted in its operation and development.

REPORT OF THE MOTH SUPERINTENDENT

The roadside trees were sprayed for the control of the Dutch Elm Disease, as well as sprays applied for control of other destructive insects, which defoliate our trees. There were four well-timed sprays applied this year, and we refrained from entirely using the product known as D. D. T. and used other spray material, which gave us a satisfactory control.

The Poison Ivy spraying program was also carried out at all strategic locations, such as school grounds, or play areas, near fire hydrants, or alarm boxes, and other areas where ivy was seen.

The removal of confirmed Dutch Elm Disease trees was completed, and much sanitation work was performed in accordance with the state recommendations.

DOG CLINIC

A total of 80 dogs were inoculated and protected against rabies. A Clinic was conducted under the direction of Dr. Paul R. Granholm of Weston, Mass.

DENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM

School Year 1962-1963

A total of 271 children were seen at the dental clinic during the last school year. Of this number, 52 were pre-school children, and 229 were school children, 614 visits were made to the dental clinic.

A topical flouride program has been outlined to be initiated in the dental clinic in the Fall. The Wayland Dental advisory committee participated in the mouth guard program for the school year.

Because of the many demands for dental care, the Board of Health deemed it necessary to limit the clinic to pre-school and elementary school children. This policy was effective September, 1963.

SANITARY ENGINEER'S REPORT

Board of Health Wayland, Massachusetts

Gentlemen:

The following is a report on my activities for your Board for the calendar year 1963.

SEWAGE DISPOSAL

During the calendar year 1963, one hundred and twenty-eight (128) permits were issued by your Health Agent for the construction or alteration of sewage disposal systems, after the preliminary and other inspections and recommendations were made to your Board. A total of more than six hundred (600) inspections were made to insure effective design and construction of these systems, and to advise builders and home owners concerning the proper installation, operation, and maintenance of these new or existing facilities.

RESTAURANT SANITATION

During 1963, the practice of making unannounced inspections of eating places was continued, with several joint inspections made with the Board of Health agent. While most eating establishments

continued to operate in a satisfactory manner, there were several instances in which immediate corrective action was required of the owners.

MILK INSPECTIONS

A total of six hundred and nineteen (619) samples of milk and cream were collected during the year by your Health Agent from the dairies and other licensed outlets selling milk and cream in Wayland. These samples were examined in the laboratory for total bacterial count, coliform bacteria, and phosphatase, with results reported to the dairies concerned, as required by law. As a result of these examinations, several instances of faulty milk handling were detected, and your Health Agent took immediate steps to have corrective action taken by the dairies concerned.

LAKE COCHITUATE BATHING BEACH

During the summer bathing season, weekly samples were collected and examined in the laboratory to provide for a check on the water quality in the bathing area.

During the year a total of 1,531 visits were made in behalf of patients who needed care. Seventy-three different individuals were the recipients of these nursing visits. The type of care they received included surgical dressings, bed baths, hypodermic injections and simple exercises. The diagnoses of these patients covered a variety of illnesses such as, pernicious anemia, intestinal obstruction, arthritis, cancer, multiple sclerosis and cardiovascular disease.

A total of forty maternity patients received 125 visits. The guidance given to an expectant mother encompasses such areas as the process of reproduction and the development of the baby, proper diet, preparation for the new baby, and planning for hospitalization. After the mother and baby return home, the nurse visits to help the mother in the necessary adjustments for the care of the baby, and for her own health.

A total of 1919 health guidance visits were made to a total of 559

individuals. Health guidance to well individuals is directed towards helping the family to prevent illness and to promote optimum health. Guidance given to mothers of young children is concerned with preparing the mother for various stages of the child's growth and development in each age period.

Other health guidance visits were concerned with counseling the parent or patient about specific problems such as helping a mother to establish routines for a child with cerebral palsy, discussing insulin administration and diet plans for a child with diabetes mellitus, interpreting the findings and recommendations of a school physical examination and giving help and supervision to a mother with a new premature infant.

There were forty-one well child conferences during the year. A total of 181 children attending these sessions. The nurses were involved in scheduling appointments for these sessions, interviewing the mother, assisting the physician and interpreting the findings and recommendations of the physician.

Last spring a course in Disaster Nursing was offered to registered nurses residing in the Town. A total of 30 registered nurses attended the series of ten - 3 hour classes which were conducted by the senior public health nurse.

The nurses continued to assist at clinics, participate on professional committees, and meet with various allied professional groups in relation to particular problems, and to cooperate in the development of health programs.

Three undergraduate students and two graduate students from Boston University School of Nursing and one graduate student from Boston College School of Nursing had field experience at this agency during the year.

Last June a new mirse was added to our staff. This brought our complement of staff nurses up to five. The Parmenter Health Center plans to add another nurse in 1964 and thus enable us to provide more comprehensive services to the Town.

Once again we wish to extend our sincere appreciation and thanks to all the competent volunteers who have assisted us throughout the year.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE SCHOOL YEAR 1962-1963

SCHOOL PHYSICIAN CHARLOTTE A. STEWART, M. D.

A total of 393 teacher-nurse conferences were held during the school year. Most of these conferences were in behalf of students with particular health problems. There were 240 conferences with principals. These conferences were concerned with: the overall health program in the school, plans for specific health service activities such as vision and hearing schedules, and specific problems of an individual student related to the school program.

There was a total of 45 conferences with students, and 49 with parents at school. A total of 71 conferences were held with guidance personnel, and a total of 136 with other personnel.

A total of 2,981 students received hearing tests. Of this number, 70 students were referred for medical evaluation. 38 of these students followed through on these referrals. Of the 120 children who were referred for visual evaluation, 83 followed through. Many reports from the physicians are not returned until the following school year. Therefore, these are not included in the above statistics.

Physical examinations by private physicians continued to increase. Of the 1,049 students who had physical examinations, 952 or ninety-one per cent were examined by private physicians and ninety-seven or nine per cent were examined by the school physician.

A total of 204 students in grades one through eight received diphtheria-tetanus booster inoculations by the school physician.

825 students received tuberculin skin tests. Five children had positive reactions. Follow-through was completed, and they are all under medical supervision.

A total of 2,187 visits were made to the Junior High School health room, 1,933 students reported to the Senior High School Health room.

A comprehensive report describing school health services was mailed to each resident at the beginning of the year.

NEW REGULATIONS ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF HEALTH

SWIMMING POOLS:

A permit must be obtained for any type pool by the owner of the property.

Contractors who build pools must also be LICENSED.

WET LAND REGULATION: Any lot having standing water on it may not be filled in order to allow for 100% expansion of the sanitary system.

Contractors using two or more personnel on any building, must have suitable toilet facilities on the job site.

A new type of application for DISPOSAL WORKS CONSTRUCTION PERMIT has been adopted. These forms are to be filled out by the owner or his authorized representative. They are available at the office and must be in duplicate.

OTHER CLINICS:

611 individuals attended the chest x-ray program held in the Fall.

The Type II oral polio clinic was held for the first time last winter. 6,720 residents availed themselves of the vaccine. 703 residents attended the Type I makeup clinic and 668 attended the Type III make-up clinic in the Spring.

OFFICE HOURS:

The Board of Health holds office hours at the Parmenter Health Center on Monday through Thursday, from 5:00 to 7:00 P. M. Licenses and permits are issued at this time.

MOSQUITO CONTROL IN WAYLAND IN 1963

The 1963 Mosquito Control Program was modified somewhat in order to reduce the applications of DDT in the western part of the district. Pre-season DDT dusting by hand was made with lighter applications than usual. Helicopter dusting of the larger swamps was cancelled completely as a pre-season control and those areas were sprayed with Malathion after mosquito larvae appeared in late April and May. Results were generally inferior to the pre-season method.

No DDT was used in the eastern part of the district and relatively small amounts in the middle part of the district. Migration of mosquitoes into the westerly areas was severe in late May and June. A considerable amount of helicopter and truck fogging with Malathion was done against these, but the weather was too often unfavorable for best results. The eastern half of the district did not have this problem. The summer program was carried out principally with Malathion although Dieldrin and Baytex were used for spraying catch basins. In general, the eastern part of the district had an unusually successful season. The western part was hard hit by the spring migration, but it improved afterwards.

Drainage maintenance was done mainly in the spring and fall and is generally somewhat behind schedule. New drainage was undertaken in Cambridge, Lexington, Newton, Weston, Wellesley, Wayland and Sudbury.

Mosquito Control Halted in Lincoln: The Town of Lincoln asked to be included in the East Middlesex Mosquito Control Project in 1954. It was accepted and a routine mosquito control program was carried out for several years. Since that time a number of people who are opposed to mosquito control, instigated an active campaign which resulted first, in curtailment of the program, and finally, last spring, in a complete halt of mosquito control work.

Similar anti-mosquito control efforts are increasing in most of the other towns and cities in the Project, and also in the other mosquito control districts in the State.

PESTICIDE BOARD REGULATIONS: The new State Pesticide Board has announced that examinations for licenses to apply pesticides will be held in February and March. The regulations established by this Board would seem to require that all East Middlesex Mosquito Control Project field personnel possess licenses if they are to continue in the mosquito control program. Accordingly, a series of short "school" sessions is being undertaken to familiarize Project personnel with knowledge of hazard and safety precautions involved in the use of pesticides. These sessions are held during bad weather when outside

work is impractical.

Building: The attempt to acquire a new building is continuing. At present the Building Committee is negotiating with the Weston Selectmen. Detailed plans of the proposed building were prepared. The advantages of the Project building on Town Land or the Town putting up a building to be leased to the Project, are being weighed.

The special funds provided for the building program are held in a separate account and are not used in the mosquito control budget.

Equipment: Because of the need for making funds available for possible building, the usual vehicle replacement schedule was postponed in 1963. However, new vehicles will have to be obtained soon. A new light weight aluminum boat was purchased this year. It replaced an old wooden punt that was beyond repair. There are tentative plans to purchase another truck fogging unit for use against adult mosquito infestations particularly during the period of spring migration. It would be a quiet running unit as compared to our Dynafog that could be operated during the pre-dawn hours when there is the least traffic. The new developments in insecticides, the many new subdivisions being built, and the increasing difficulty in obtaining helicopter service, making fogging more useful. However, if there is a considerable increase in the number of anti-mosquito control people, the use of a second fogging unit might be impractical. More information on public reaction is needed before this decision to purchase is made.

FINANCIAL: The monthly reports show the current activities and financial position of the mosquito control program in each city and town. In the December report as many as possible of the discounts and various other changes are brought up to date. There is more detailed information in the individual reports to each city and town which are made at the end of the year. A consolidated summary of expenditures as allocated in 1963 is presented here:

REPORT OF THE BYPASS COMMITTEE

Every year since 1948, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, through its Department of Public Works, has promised the Town of Wayland, the construction of a bypass that would extend south of the present Route 20.

The bypass would begin just west of the former Ten Acres, Inc. run fairly parallel, with the existing Route 20, pass over Routes 27 and 126 at the foot of Sandy Burr hill, and join Route 20 again, somewhere west of Wayland's Raytheon Laboratory.

Annually the D. P. W. has been changing its thinking, relative to the construction of the bypass. Several years ago, they suggested we wait until the Massachusetts Turnpike was finished, and opened, and then see if this new turnpike would relieve some of the traffic congestion in Wayland.

The Massachusetts Turnpike was finally opened and used, but it had very little or no effect on the Wayland traffic.

A more recent request was made for Wayland to wait for the completion of the Massachusetts Turnpike Extension into Boston. The completion of this extension is several years away.

We, the Wayland Bypass Committee, are convinced, that the final opening and use of this extension will offer absolutely no relief to our problem.

Wayland's traffic problem is strictly a local one. The majority of people living in towns surrounding Wayland, find it necessary to travel through our Town to get to their place of business.

Only recently we were informed that the D. P. W. was considering the construction of a new road from the Outer Belt Highway--495-- to a point somewhere along Route 128.

If and when this should be built, the Committee still feels the North-South traffic would still remain a major problem.

It is the intention of the Committee to continue their negotiations with the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for some sort of relief. However, we also feel that a complete review of the Town's problem should be made by a joint meeting of the Selectmen, Road Commissioners, and the Finance Committee.

The Committee will continue to make reports to the Town, either at Town Meetings or through the local press.

REPORT OF THE ROAD COMMISSIONERS

Again, as in 1961 and 1962, the Highway Department continued the program to complete various projects authorized in previous years and also to undertake new projects as per the current years' schedule.

The following projects were completed, or nearly completed as follows:

1. BETTERMENTS:

Rolling Lane resurfacing, including granite curbing at the intersection of Old Connecticut Path,

2. DRAINAGE:

The drainage on School Street has been completed. A storm drainage system on Parkland Drive was completed and connected to the drain in West Plain Street. Several drainage projects were completed to eliminate storm water problems. Concrete pipe for the dual culvert was purchased for Pinebrook Road, which has been a troublesome flooding problem for many years. Due to the cold weather conditions, it was impossible to construct the culvert this year. However, work will be done early in 1964.

3. CHAPTER 90 WORK:

(a) Reconstruction of Old Connecticut Path was continued from the M. D. C. Aqueduct westerly to Rice Road. Storm drainage was installed, the base course of bituminous pavement was placed, stone walls rebuilt and post and rail fences have been replaced. Drainage easements were obtained in conjunction with this year's construction and for future construction of this road in 1964, and the following years until completion, which will include a new interchange at the Five Paths or Cochituate Road. This Board has worked very closely with the State and County Engineers and the other Wayland Boards to keep Old Connecticut Path's layout, trees, walls, etc., as near as possible to its original state of rural scenic beauty.

(b) MAINTENANCE:

Main Street, Cochituate Road, Concord Road and Commonwealth Road were resurfaced with an armour coat of asphalt and crushed trap rock in lieu of bituminous concrete in order to protect the greatest length of road within the appropriation.

4. SIDEWALKS:

Construction of a sidewalk on East Plain Street by Highway Department forces is continuing and additional funds have been requested for this and future sidewalk projects.

5. CARE OF DUMP:

An additional 100' section of chain link fence was installed which included metal screening, straightening and repairing of the original fence which had been damaged. Due to the serious drougl conditions which brought on the fire ban, burning was discontinued during this emergency period and expensive and space consuming sanitary fill method was used. In 1964, the Board proposes to step up the rodent control program which was initiated in 1962.

6. RECONSTRUCTION OF EXISTING TOWN ROADS:

The final section of School Street from Loker Street to Main Street was completed including storm drainage, and base and finished courses of bituminous concrete. The Department has continued the street oiling maintenance program, road sweeping operations, roadside cleanup and brush control and general maintenance along with the ice control and snow removal program. Inspections of road and drainage construction by sub-developers were made and reports were sent to the Planning Board.

Many meetings were held with the Personnel Board in regard to the hiring of a new Highway Superintendent.

The Road Commissioners obtained bids for two new dump trucks, an all wheel drive pickup truck, two snow plows and a new tractor front end shovel loader, the latter being purchased from the special account set up for replacement or purchasing of capital equipment in the Highway Department.

The Road Commissioners again wish to thank all Highway Department employees for their cooperation and diligence during the past year on all phases of our program. Our special thanks go to Mr. George Bowers and Mr. John McEwen who so efficiently handled the plowing of snow, sanding of streets and various other operations during the absence of Mr. Potvin.

We also appreciate the cooperation given us by all Town officials, Boards, and citizens on matters of mutual interest which makes Wayland

a very desirable Town in which to live.

THE CITIZEN'S ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Citizen's Advisory Committee, appointed by the Selectmen of the Town of Wayland, reports that their observations regarding Urban Renewal Activity in Wayland, concur with the results of a survey conducted by Mr. Harvey C. Newton, Chairman of the Wayland Redevelopment Authority, which indicated, almost unanimously, that property owners within the intended Urban Renewal Project Area, were not in accord with any renewal plan. Our own observations and personal interviews with these and other taxpayers and voters of the Town of Wayland, indicated strongly that Urban Renewal Activity was not wanted in the Town of Wayland.

The Selectmen of the Town of Wayland and the Condemnation Committee have, for years, been conducting a community improvement program and intend to continue this program. This type of community improvement, though not as dynamic as an Urban Renewal Program, is less apt to produce social and economic disturbances, yet in the long run should produce the same results.

The Citizen's Advisory Committee is in accord with the desire of the Wayland Redevelopment Authority to dissolve itself in a proper legal manner for the purpose of abandoning Urban Renewal Activity within the boundaries of the Town of Wayland, and does hereby advise that this desire be executed.

1963 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

During the last decade we have seen many of the newer ideas in teaching introduced in Wayland; ability grouping, team teaching, modern physics and mathematics, the use of language laboratories and advanced placement courses. We have seen our teacher salary schedule become competitive with the top 10% of the town in Massachusetts and all of our schools are now staffed with full time administrators and teacher aides. We have seen our school population increase from 1231 ten years ago to 3149 today and with the completion of our Senior High School, we have added the last major unit currently contemplated for housing Wayland students. We have also seen our per pupil cost reach \$520. It is obvious that we need a period of consolidation during which we can evaluate the innovations to make certain they are doing what they are supposed to do-give us excellence in education with an individualized program at a minimum cost to the town.

We believe that in the choice of Mr. R. Bruce McGill as Superintendent, we have found a man who is able to achieve this objective. One of Mr. McGill's first duties was to assist the Committee in the selection of the principal of our Senior High School. Our mutual choice was Mr. Raymond Hettler who came to us from Huntington, New York where he had experience both as assistant high school principal and junior high school principal. He has a B. A. and an M. A. from the University of Denver where he majored in history. The School Committee has a high regard for the professional abilities of both Mr. McGill and Mr. Hettler and we believe that parents, students, and staff share our confidence in them.

While we lost almost no teachers last year for other than unavoidable personal reasons, we had some difficulty in hiring the kind of teacher for whom we were looking. This problem will become more acute in the next few years because of the shortage of skilled teachers. As a result, we are making some revisions in our salary schedule particularly in the middle and upper brackets. These revisions are in line with the recommendation of our Teacher's Salary Committee although they differ in the timing of the increments.

Although the cost of our teaching staff will probably continue to rise, it appears that a leveling-off period is in sight for our school population. Present projections indicate that the number of elementary pupils has stabilized and that in about six to seven years the secondary school population will also level-off. By keeping the sixth grades in the elementary schools, the Junior High will be large enough for the next decade but some major repairs will be required. The elementary space needed for the sixth grades will be provided by the Happy Hollow addition for which the Town voted planning money last December. Space for about 500 more pupils will be needed eventually in the High School. Our administration is currently working on plans for a Senior High School addition to be ready in the fall of 1966. A second addition either to the High School or to the Junior High will be needed later in the decade. If this addition is

to the Junior High the ninth grade would be moved to the Junior High School.

Because the town has paid for recent school additions without long term borrowing the amount of the tax rate resulting from the capital cost of school buildings has been steadily falling both because of the reduction in principal and interest as the debt is paid off and because of the rise in assessed valuation. The figure in 1963 is \$7.22. We do not expect that the secondary school additions mentioned will cause the effect of this long term debt on the tax rate to exceed this figure.

The School Committee wishes to thank the Town and the parents for their enthusiastic support and commends the school administration, the teaching staff, the custodial, secretarial and cafeterial workers for their hard work. We also wish to express our appreciation to the other town departments which do so much to help the schools.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee:

In this, the sixty-seventh Annual Report of the Superintendent of the Wayland Public Schools, the Superintendent wishes to outline some of the education developments in the schools during the past year.

Curriculum committees are organized in all departments and consist of team leaders, chairman, and principals. These committees are responsible for writing courses of study to cover all subjects in grades one through twelve. Such work is done to insure that students of all schools receive the same basic preparation as they move through the grades, and that the transition to various levels of demand are made as smoothly as possible. English composition, English grammar, foreign language, science, mathematics, social studies, music, art, and physical education courses have either been written or are in the process of being written.

Workshops have been designed to help these committees in their building of course studies. Such workshops have also been used to up-date teachers on the latest developments in reading, mathematics, biology, and testing. We consider the workshops an important element for the in-service preparation of the professional staff and the program for these training periods will continue to be expanded.

Ten teacher candidates were interviewed for every one invited to join the faculty. Notices of vacancies are sent to some sixty placement offices in all parts of the country. A preliminary screening takes place by reviewing credentials, after which candidates are interviewed by at least two administrators, and often by the appropriate team leader or chairman. The final two candidates for each position are then observed while teaching, and a final decision made after a personal conference is held with a person who best knows the candidate's work. Since the quality of instruction which students receive is directly attributable to the caliber of the teaching, the importance of the recruiting program cannot be overstressed.

A comprehensive testing program that reaches all academic areas from grades 1-12 has been instituted. The Wayland Schools have become affiliated with the Educational Records Bureau of New York, a non-profit test organization, which acts as an advisor on testing practices and analyzes test results so that comparisons with other top school systems can be made.

The Wayland Schools have also joined the National Registration Office of Chicago, a non-profit institution, which follows secondary school graduates through the first year of college and compares grades, subject-by-subject, with the grades made by the students in the same secondary school subjects. These results, coupled with testing data, aid any system in evaluating the work being done in the

schools and indicate areas that require study and improvement.

As a further step in evaluating the total program, the Junior High School and High School are preparing for a visiting team from the New England Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges during the Spring of 1965. Such an evaluation studies and reports on all courses taught in the school, student activity program, library and audio-visual, guidance services, health services, school plant, and school staff and administration. Since notifying the New England Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges of our intent, several of our teachers, and the two principals, have participated on teams evaluating other schools, and have had the advantage of observing and learning of the operation of other school systems, both public and private.

The reading program is undergoing a careful study which will carry into next year when a reading coordinator responsible for the overall program of reading will aid the existing staff.

A conference is being scheduled, by the counselors of the Junior High School and High School, with each student, and the parents, in grades eight, eleven and twelve. These individual conferences give an opportunity for an exchange of information between the school and home that will include a review of the pupil's grades, test data, personal information, along with both immediate and long-range educational planning.

As a means of grounding students in reading, mathematics, and English as completely as possible before entering the High School, selected pupils in the Junior High School will receive three additional periods per week of small-group instruction in reading and/or English, and mathematics. The plan behind such groups is not to provide instruction just in content covered by the regular class, but to also diagnose those parts of the student's background that require direction and build an individual program to meet his needs.

The emphasis on English will continue into the High School where pupils will meet five periods per week rather than the present four. The five periods will consist of one large-group, three mediumgroups, and one small-group period per week; thus the strong features of the variable groupings can be coupled with increased instructional time in the classroom.

Foreign languages will meet five periods per week in small-medium groups. Large groups will be scheduled only as lessons of a sufficiently general nature warrant them. Oral-aural methods of teaching the romance languages will be extended.

A new science program consisting of geology and oceanography will be introduced in grade nine, biology will be moved to the tenth grade, chemistry to eleven, and physics to the twelfth. The shift is being made to provide for more mathematics training and the advantages

of more maturity prior to the scheduling of the senior sciences. Students headed for advanced placement will take an accelerated program beginning with BSCS (Biological Sciences Curriculum Study) biology in grade nine.

If a school system is to provide the community with educational unity of high quality, that system must have a prevailing direction to its development. Studies are underway in virtually all areas to see where we now are, where we want to be, and how we get there. Our position can perhaps be best characterized as a reaching out for the most promising of the newer concepts in education and a solid rooting of them in the best of that which is traditional.

REPORT OF WAYLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS, ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee:

It is with pleasure that I herewith submit my fourth annual report since joining the Wayland Public Schools in September, 1959.

Inherent in the school department operations has been the necessity of providing for the increased enrollments that are prevalent each September. In 1963, 177 more pupils enrolled in the school system, contributing to a total enrollment of 3,147 in grades 1 to 12. It is further expected that this enrollment figure will rise to an estimated 3303 by September of 1964. Encouraging, however, is the fact that enrollment increases are now averaging approximately 5% as compared to previous increases of 13% and 14%.

During the past year, the Loker Elementary 8 room school addition was completed and operating as of September 1963. Plans were also started on a similar 8 room addition to the Happy Hollow Elementary School to be ready for September 1965.

The School Department was administered under a budget encumberance system for the first time in 1963 and enabled better controls of the various accounts.

In preparations of the 1964 School Budget, per capita norms were utilized initially in the school system for purposes of equalization and consistency as it relates to amounts of money spent per pupil in the various schools. Per capita norms pertain to allocating a specific amount of money for a pupil in the various instructional areas of textbooks, art, music, physical education, etc. Norms are established from a study of past history and a review of comparable school districts and their expenditures.

In 1963, school libraries were examined closely and organized to become more effective in the educational program. In the elementary schools, library aides were employed on a part time basis to improve library operations at this level. Through the cooperation of the full time librarians at the high school and junior high the school libraries are being reviewed through meetings, evaluations and studies of other libraries to become more effective as carriers of knowledge.

The audio-visual program in the Wayland Public Schools in 1963 operated as separate instructional service centers in each of the various schools. Through scheduled meetings and planned agendas, studies were initiated into making better uses of our audio-visual personnel, equipment and techniques. As part of this study there will be an examination of the role of audio-visual as it relates to library.

The non-instructional staff including the school secretaries, school custodians, cafeteria personnel and school bus drivers all

contributed as in the past in making the best climate possible by which the educational program could progress.

The school budget which necessitates the translating of the educational program into an estimate of expenditures requires also the forecasting of plans for the future.

In 1964 materials, technology and space, as it relates to the educational program, will be examined. Each school building will be provided with improved instructional resource facilities consisting of at least a library and audio-visual center. Audio-Visual will be coordinated system-wide by reassignment of the audio-visual person presently at the high school so that his services will be available to all schools.

Further study will be made into the relatively new fields of Educational Television and programmed instruction and to include a vigorous program of evaluation in its use.

Within the school buildings, space will be examined for maximum use through minor renovations and partitioning. In 1964 space requirements and educational specifications will be drawn up for an addition to the high school due in 1966. Concepts of space will permit and encourage flexibility and provide for a changing educational curriculum.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARY

1963 was a busy year for the Wayland Library and the Cochituate Branch. Although there were no important changes in the physical plant, much time was spent in discussing improvements. To obtain an objective and professional opinion of what is needed in Wayland as it is now, two surveys will be conducted; one by the Massachusetts Division of Library Extension, and another by a professional survey team. One change which we hope to bring about in the coming year is an automatic charging system, to eliminate the errors which occur with the present system.

During the past year we have noticed a greatly increased adult use of the Cochituate Branch. This has been very gratifying. 1963 was the first full year of an increased effort to keep a frequently changing collection of recent adult books from the main library at the Branch, as well as the permanent additions to its own book stock. This brings new life and variety to the shelves of fiction and other popular categories. Also this year we have assigned a new card number to every Cochituate registrant who visited either library. This was for the purpose of having a single series of numbers, rather than two with a duplication through 2200, and further possibilities for charging errors.

Again during 1963 we continued the program of visits to all the first and second grades in the school system who desired it. Two very successful story hours were held at the Main Library; one in Book Week, and one the Saturday after Christmas. We are happy to find that it is possible to have a good attendance at a story hour on Saturday mornings. Thus encouraged we shall try to develop a more regular program.

As always, we are grateful to the many groups and individuals who have contributed books and periodicals. Also we wish to thank the Garden Club for its faithful provision of floral arrangements through the season, and for its Christmas decorations. These have been beautiful in their individual ways and have lent a touch of grace to the library.

REPORT OF THE WATER COMMISSIONERS

This year was marked by the death of one Commissioner and the resignation of another.

Mr. Alfred C. Damon passed away in August, 1963, having served as Water Commissioner for the Town from 1924 to 1963. His dedication and foresight are readily apparent in the history of the Department over the last forty years. Years in which we saw and, in large measure, directed its growth from less than 500 takers to over 3,000 and a budget of less than \$3,000.00 to over \$100,000.00.

Mr. Fern A. Taylor, who served as Commissioner for nineteen years, resigned to accept a position in the Department.

Mr. Robert Hanlon was appointed to fill out his term.

The record breaking dry weather of the summer of 1963 caused the Department to place a mild ban on the use of water for the first time since 1956.

No new wells or pumps have been added to the system since 1955, but the average daily use of water has increased from 704,000 gallons per day in 1956, to 1,100,000 gallons per day in 1963. So that even though our storage capacity was increased in 1958, under an unusual demand of almost 3,000,000 gallons per day for more than a week, as occurred the last week in June, we could not pump enough water during the night to restore the water that was used during the day. The ban, which was only on the watering of lawns on alternate days, was designed to give us a respite in which we could fill our storage capacity. We felt that this type of ban would cause the least inconvenience, and yet it gave us the margin necessary to keep our storage adequate for an emergency.

There was never a shortage of water in the wells and our facilities are adequate for all ordinary requirements. We are, however, advancing the plans to put the new well field in operation.

The change was made to cycle billing in July. Under this system all meters will be read and billed three times per year as usual, however in different months, so that reading and billing is spaced over the entire year, eliminating the jam that occurred when all 3200 meters were read and bills sent out the same month.

The new garage is under construction and will be in use this year.

The contract for the control of erosion of the Bank at the Town Beach has been completed. Henceforth, only normal maintenance of the Bank is anticipated.

Preliminary master plans for Beach Improvement and Expansion have been completed, and reviewed by various interested groups. Detailed plans for the Beach expansion are in progress.

The Beach again enjoyed a record attendance, and has maintained its excellent safety record. The Commissioners wish to express their gratitude to the Lifeguards for their alertness in converting two near tragedies, to lives saved, during the past season.

The Commissioners have secured the plot description of the two temporary Playgrounds at two still unused School sites, eliminating the obstacles preventing consummation of the tasks.

The Commissioners wish to thank the residents of the Town, the assisting committees, the Officers and the Park Department personnel, for their support and cooperation. They wish also to express thanks for the volunteer efforts of individuals and groups that executed its Recreation Program; and the landscaping at the Junior High School.

WAY-CO RECREATION PROGRAM

The Way-Co Recreation Program, begun modestly some eleven years ago with baseball for about thirty-five boys at the Cochituate Field, has grown along with the town expansion in other areas.

Thanks to the efforts of many sincere volunteers, our baseball program now enjoys activities on five of the athletic fields in a progressive program beginning in mid-April through Labor Day, with an enrollment of more than 450 boys managed and directed by sixty adult leaders.

Since 1958, Way-Co has sponsored Volleyball for adult groups at the Loker School throughout the fall and winter months as well as a basketball program for boys at the same school.

This fall, Way-Co has expanded into the area of football for boys under the Pop Warner program which emphasizes all the fun of the game with due safety consideration. Plans include a gradual growth of this activity to include more boys each year.

With the introduction of hockey as an inter-scholastic sport at the High School, Way-Co will pioneer a development program utilizing outdoor facilities both at Cochituate Field and the Mill Pond. An attempt was made last winter in this area which resulted in more than thirty-five days and nights of skating and hockey.

Way-Co also acts as a clearing house for field uses throughout the town which permits maximum use of the facilities, especially the lighted field at Cochituate.

Looking ahead, Way-Co anticipates introducing tennis, field hockey and archery for girls, a softball league for men, and a summer track program for both boys and girls. All activities are planned with emphasis on mass participation to provide diversified recreation according to desire and need.

Way-Co is successful only because of a well-organized cooperative program sponsored by the Wayland Park Department and supervised by a group of interested volunteers, giving their time and talents throughout the year. The Town supports the program with a modest appropriation at the annual town meeting all of which is used for supplies and equipment since no salaries are paid to Way-Co personnel. Though the program has expanded each year, the budget has remained constant since 1959. As the number of activities and participants increase, so should the budget provide necessary support in the same efficient procedure.

No report of Way-Co could be complete without recognition of its truly remarkable cooperative function. From the Town Meeting itself, the Finance Committee, the Park Department, and its personnel, the Town Counsel, the Police Department, the Fire Department, the Highway Department, and the School Department, all are called upon and all respond willingly to support this program.

This 1963 Report of Way-Co is submitted to keep the town informed as to recreation being offered its citizens. In conjunction with an excellent summer swimming program offered by the Park Department, and the American Red Cross as well as the numerous fine activities sponsored by the Wayland Junior Town House, Way-Co acts to present its program, not in competition to but rather as a complement to these other agencies. Requests to provide for new interests are always welcome as well as an active part in the direction of Way-Co itself.

In submitting this report, I would personally offer a vote of thanks to all who have contributed to another successful year with a special bouquet to the following for efforts which so often go unnoted:

REPOR'T OF THE RECREATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE--1963

Increased thought has been given to the establishment of a paid post as Recreation Director for the Town. Responsibilities of the Director would range from co-ordination of existing recreation at the activation of the position, to the implementation of additional recreation, particularly in the late teenage and senior citizen categories. It is difficult, with Wayland's growth pattern, to at once set down the specifications for such a post, knowing that changes of the future would necessitate financial changes. However, it is safe to say that preliminary studies do indicate that the cost to the Town would range from 50¢ per thousand on the tax rate the first year, to probably about \$4.00 per thousand on the rate within three years if Town support for the program was forthcoming.

Whenever a new position is created, it brings with it additional taxes to support it and these are a continuing additional cost to the citizen. Thus another year of study, minimum, is desired before such a proposal might be brought before the Town for consideration. It might well be, with rising school costs, with the indicated need of adequate rubbish collection, additional Highway Department personnel, etc., that the Town would not wish to incur the then still additional taxes for a Recreation Director and Staff. This is not an easy decision to make either now, or in the future, without careful additional research and thought.

The Recreation Advisory Committee is delighted with the expansion of the Wayco Program to include football and hockey, and points out to the Town the value of dedicated volunteers to conduct recreation as seen in the benefits to many of this program, as well as Town House, the Church, Fraternal and Service groups programs. Skating on the Cochituate playground these past two winters has been well received as it was years ago.

Finally we would commend to the Town, the School Department's Community Use of School Buildings policy, which makes possible many recreational opportunities now offered in the Town by providing the facilities in which to hold them.





THE HEARD HOUSE

The Heard House pictured on the cover stands in the center of Wayland between the Library and the Town Building. It was built in its present form about 1800 by Silas Grout, a descendant of John Grout, one of the Town's earliest settlers. Experts on early architecture have found evidence that the house incorporated an earlier, smaller house built before 1740. Silas Grout was a blacksmith and had his shop nearby.

In the mid-nineteenth century it was used as a double house occupied by Newell Heard whose wife was Jerusha Grout and by William Grout who ran the flour mill at the Mill Pond, and his sister Susan. In 1878 the house was moved to a location on the west side of Old Sudbury Road just south of The Raytheon Company entrance to make way for a turreted, Victorian Wayland Town Hall built that year. At its Old Sudbury Road location the house was occupied for over seventy-five years by members of the Heard family, the last occupant being Miss Blanche Heard who lived there until 1955.

In 1954 the house and the land on which it stood were acquired by The Raytheon Manufacturing Company. In 1956, due to the efforts of Mr. J. Sidney Stone, Raytheon gave the house to The Wayland Historical Society and it became the Society's head-quarters and meeting place. When the Town Hall, which was built in 1878, was torn down in 1958, plans were made and funds raised to return the house to its original site. This move was finally accomplished in 1962. The house is open to the public on stated days throughout the year, and contains many articles, pictures, and documents relating to the history of the Town.

This information was very kindly given by Mrs. George I. Emery and Mrs. Kenneth E. Morrell of The Wayland Historical Society.

Pursuant to the Warrant dated January 27, 1964, signed by Thomas Francis Linnehan, George K. Lewis and Frank S. Tarr, Selectmen, served and return of service given by Ernest H. Damon, Constable of the Town, the inhabitants of the Town of Wayland qualified to vote in Town Meeting met this day; and at 7:45 P. M. the Moderator called the meeting to order, declared a quorum to be present and the meeting proceeded to transact the following business:

At the request of the Moderator, and upon a Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. Robert M. Morgan, it was

VOTED: Unanimously: To permit the Moderator to omit reading the Articles.

Upon Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That consideration of Article 1 and 2 be deferred until the meeting has acted upon and disposed of Articles 3 through 20.

- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to further amend the Town By-Law establishing the Wage and Salary Classification Plan, as amended, in any of the following respects:
- (a) Amend Article II, Section 1, of said Plan by changing any of the salary and wage rates or designations or descriptions of any position classification specified in said section.
- (b) Amend Article III, Section 1, by changing the specified number of hours for the regular work week for any positions.
- (c) Amend Article V, Section 1, by inserting an additional sentence following the first sentence thereof, as follows:

"After each of his first two years of service in a job classification (but beginning after the next payroll period), an hourly employee shall be eligible for the step increase shown in the Schedule of Salary and Wage Rates."

(d) Amend Article I, Section 1, to read as follows:

"There shall be a Personnel Board of five members

appointed by the Selectmen, who shall have power to fill vacancies. The term of appointment shall be five years except where the appointment is to fill a vacancy, and then it shall be to fill the unexpired term. No member of the Personnel Board shall be an employee of the Town or hold Town office. Members of the Personnel Board shall serve without compensation."

(e) Amend Article V-C, Section 1, to read as follows:

"Each permanent employee shall accumulate sick leave at the rate of one day a month. Sick leave is for the protection of employees against loss of pay because of illness and shall not be taken into account in figuring termination pay."

(f) Amend the introductory portion of Article VIII, Section 1, to read as follows:

"No provision of this Plan shall apply to the official duties of any elected Town officer, to any employee of the School Committee, unless brought under the Plan by the Personnel Board upon the request of the School Committee, nor to any of the following work or positions while performed on a part-time basis."

(g) Amend Article IV by striking out Section 5 thereof reading as follows:

"SECTION 5. Where an employee is to be hired or transferred to a skilled or semi-skilled hourly rated job on a trial basis, the employing agency may, with the approval of the Personnel Board, hire him at a rate ten cents below the rate fixed by Article II, for a period not exceeding 120 days."

and substituting therefor the following:

"SECTION 5. Any employee who is promoted to a higher job classification will receive at least one periodic step increase under the classification at the time of promotion."

or take any action relative to any of the foregoing proposed amendments.

Upon Motion of Mr. Warren T. Cronin, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: Article II, Section 1, of the Town By-Laws establishing a Wage and Salary Classification Plan established March 3, 1954, as heretofore amended, be further amended by striking out the entire Schedule of Salaries and Wage Rates for Classified Positions contained therein, and substituting therefor the following such Schedule, all compensation rates therein to be effective from January 1, 1964.

By unanimous consent of the Meeting, Mr. Cronin was permitted to omit reading the detail of the foregoing schedule, since it read exactly as printed on pages 51-53 of the Finance Committee's Report.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Cronin, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That Article II, Section 1, of the Town By-Laws establishing a Wage and Salary Classification Plan established March 3, 1954, as most recently amended by vote of this meeting, be further amended by increasing each salary and wage rate by one and one-half (1-1/2) percent, with annual salary rates rounded out to the nearest full dollar and with monthly salary rates and hourly wage rates rounded out to the nearest full cent; all such increases to be effective as of January 1, 1964.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Cronin, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town By-Laws establishing a Wage and Salary Classification Plan established March 3, 1954, as heretofore amended, be further amended as follows:

- (a) By changing the second sentence of Article III, Section 1, to read as follows: "The regular work week for Firemen shall be 56 hours."
- (b) By inserting an additional sentence following the first sentence of Article V, Section 1, as follows:

"After each of his first two years of service in a job classification (but beginning after the next payroll period), an hourly employee shall be eligible for the step increase shown in the Schedule of Salary and Wage Rates."

By unanimous consent of the Meeting, Mr. Cronin omitted reading the detail contained in items "(a) - (c)", in offering the following Motion, since the language followed exactly that of the Warrant.

Upon Motion of Mr. Cronin, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town By-Laws establishing a Wage and Salary Classification Plan established March 3, 1954, as heretofore amended, be further amended as follows:

(a) By changing Article I, Section 1, to read as follows:

"There shall be a Personnel Board of five members appointed by the Selectmen, who shall have power to fill vancancies. The term of appointment shall be five years except where the appointment is to fill a vacancy, and then it shall be to fill the unexpired term. No member of the Personnel Board shall be an employee of the Town or hold Town office. Members of the Personnel Board shall serve without compensation."

(b) By changing Article V-C, Section 1, to read as follows:

"Each permanent employee shall accumulate sick leave at the rate of one day a month. Sick leave is for the protection of employees against loss of pay because of illness and shall not be taken into account in figuring termination pay."

(c) By changing the introductory portion of Article VIII, Section 1, to read as follows:

"No provision of this Plan shall apply to the official duties of any elected Town officer, to any employee of the School Committee, unless brought under the Plan by the Personnel Board upon request of the School Committee, nor to any of the following work or positions while performed on a part-time basis."

(d) By changing Article IV, Section 5, to read as follows:

"SECTION 5. Any employee who is promoted to a higher job classification will receive at least one periodic step increase under the classification at the time of promotion."

Article 4. To grant money for necessary Town purposes.

Duly seconded, Mr. Morgan offered the following MOTION: That the Report of the Finance Committee be accepted and its recommendations be adopted; that \$3,278,802.65 with the addition of

\$150 for Highway Department -- Salaries, Clerk \$1,500 for Park Department -- Beach Expansion and with the subtraction of

\$500 from Health Department -- Mosquito Control

be granted, appropriated and assessed for the several purposes designed, making a total budget of \$3,279,952.65, and that the same be expended only for the purposes shown under the respective boards, committees and officers of the Town; and that

All employees in the Town Office Building, other than elected officials and those of the Police and Fire Departments, come under the supervision of the Executive Secretary and that he be charged with the operation of both Town Office Buildings and their equipment;

The operation of the dumps be under the supervision of the Highway Department;

The money from Dog Taxes be allocated in its entirety to the Library;

The Senior Public Health Nurse, Public Health Nurse No. II, and Nursing Assistants be under the supervision of the Board of Health;

The funds provided for under Fire Department, Call Men--Night Duty, be used only under the following condition: \$500.00 annually to Call Men who serve on the night shift, 6:00 P. M. to 7:00 A. M. fifty nights a year. This is done with a view to maintaining the number of men in the Call Department;

The appropriation under Highway Department for "Heavy Equipment -- Special Account" and Fire Department for "Purchase--Major Equipment," be maintained as funds against future purchases and not be expended without further direct vote of the Town;

The Town Collector continue to act as Collector for the Water Department, that he be directed to charge fees for demands on overdue water bills and that the sums so collected be credited by the Collector to the Water Department, and that all fees and penalties be turned over to the Town as Town Income;

The appropriation for "Hydrant Rental" of \$10,000 for the Water Department granted in the budget, be transferred to "Water Available Surplus";

In addition to the sum of \$1,500 included in the budget to meet the Town's share of "Chapter 90--Maintenance" and \$6,700 to meet the Town's share of "Chapter 90--New Construction", the sum of \$3,000 for "Chapter 90--Maintenance" and \$20,100 for "Chapter 90--New Construction" be transferred from "Unappropriated Available Funds" in the Treasury to meet the County's and State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursement from the County and State to be restored upon their receipt to "Unappropriated Available Funds" in the Treasury;

The office of Town Clerk be retained on a salary basis and that all fees from whatever source derived be turned over to the Town as Town Income;

The balance of \$4,883.94 remaining in the Chapter 718, Acts of 1956 Account be used in the year 1964 by the Highway Department for the final surfacing of Loker Street from Commonwealth Road East to Alden Road;

All fees, wages or payments made to the Tree Warden, from whatever source, be turned over to the Town as Town Income, effective July 1, 1964;

The Assessor's Valuation Book to be printed in 1964 be made

available, one to a taxpayer, upon his request, and calling for it at the Town Office Building; and further that

The appropriation under the Conservation Commission for "Conservation Fund" be maintained as a fund against future purchases and not be expended without further direct vote of the Town; and that

The Town Engineer be appointed by the Selectmen, after consultation with representatives of the Road Commissioners, Planning Board and Board of Assessors, and be under the supervision of the Selectmen; and that after appointment of a Town Engineer all amounts appropriated for engineering be applied for salary and expenses of the Town Engineer except to such extent as they may be needed to pay obligations incurred before such appointment.

Upon Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To amend the Annual Budget, under "Recreation--PARK DEPARTMENT--Lake Cochituate Beach" Items 11, 12 and 13, as follows:

To add \$600 to Item 11, giving a total appropriation of \$7,400 for Life Guards; to add \$200 to Item 12, giving a total appropriation of \$1,400 for Matrons; to add \$200 to Item 13, giving a total appropriation of \$1,400 for Beach Police; the total addition to the Park Department budget being \$1,000 so that the beach could be available for use during the month of June.

Upon the Main (Budget) Motion of Mr. Morgan, it was VOTED: Unanimously: In favor (subject to the above Amendment).

VOTED: In the Negative.

Upon Motion, duly seconded, of Mrs. Pauline L. Leland (Mrs. Lester E.) as follows:

That the Town appoint a committee to study and report to the town, not later than the next annual town meeting, its recommendations on presenting to the town meeting plans of land which it is proposed that the town acquire, abandon, or rezone; the committee to be composed of five (5) persons, chosen as follows: One representative from each of the four civic organizations in Wayland; The League of Women Voters, The Taxpayers Association, The Civic Association, The P. T. A. Council and the fifth member to be the originator of the Article, Mr. Paul E. Kohler. The civic organization representatives to be designated by their respective organizations.

it was

VOTED: In the Negative.

Article 13. To see if the Town will provide that, beginning in 1965, the Selectmen shall annually appoint any or all of the following:

- (1) two or more fence viewers,
- (2) one or more field drivers,
- (3) one or more measurers of wood and bark,
- (4) one or more measurers of lumber,
- (5) one or more constables;

or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. James D. Wells offered the following MOTION: That, beginning in 1965, the Selectmen annually appoint the following:

- (1) two or more fence viewers,
- (2) one or more field drivers,
- (3) one or more measurers of wood and bark,
- (4) one or more measurers of lumber,
- (5) one or more constables.

Upon Motion of Amendment of Mr. John W. Arnold, duly seconded, it was

VOTED: To delete sections (1) - (4) from the foregoing Motion, leaving only "(5) one or more Constables" to be appointed by the Selectmen.

Upon the Main Motion of Mr. Wells, as amended by Mr. Arnold's Motion, it was

VOTED: Unanimously: In favor.

Article 14. To see if the voters of the Town will vote to amend the Town By-Laws to provide that one (1) Selectman shall be elected from each voting district by the voters of that district, and that a Selectman-at-Large be elected by the voters of all of the voting districts of the Town; or take any other action relative thereto.

Upon Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To pass over the Article.

A General Motion of Mr. John F. Regan "To Return to Article 4", (offered in response to the Moderator's pausing, at this point, to remind the Meeting of his agreement, given at the previous session, to return to Article 4 for the sole purpose of hearing an explanation in regard to the removal of certain trees on Route 30 in Cochituate) was not accepted by the Moderator in this form, at this time. However, in compliance with his own agreement, and upon unanimous consent of the Meeting, the Meeting did return to Article 4, for the sole purpose of hearing a statement by Mr. Walter A. Cheslak, in regard to the trees in question.

To summarize Mr. Cheslak's explanation: After the various hurricanes and other storms, these trees had required considerable pruning. Later a severe internal rotting was discovered in each of the trees, requiring removal of the trees. In each case, the abutting property owners were notified that such action was necessary and about to be done. It was done without expense to the Town, or to the abutting owner. The Cemetery Department plans to replace the trees this coming spring, with trees properly spaced to fill the gaps left by the trees removed.

Upon Mr. McEnroy's Amendment, it was VOTED: First vote was declared in doubt; the second vote, a standing, uncounted vote, was also declared in doubt.

COUNTED VOTE: "Yes" 148 "No" 183

Mr. McEnroy's Amendment having been declared in the Negative; the VOTE upon Mr. Morgan's (Main) Motion was far from unanimous;

COUNTED VOTE: "Yes" 158 "No" 201

Mr. Redpath, duly seconded, offered a MOTION: To adjourn the meeting until next Wednesday at 7:45 P.M.

Before taking the vote upon this Motion, the Moderator pointed out that Article 27 had not been disposed of. Thereupon, Mr. Redpath asked to withdraw his Motion; but there was objection. Upon Mr. Redpath's

MOTION, it was VOTED: In the Negative.

Duly seconded, Mr. Morgan offered a MOTION: To acquire the property described under Item 1 (Article 27): and to appropriate and assess therefor the sum of \$1.500.

Upon a Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. McEnroy. To adjourn the Meeting until next Wednesday evening, it was

VOTED: In the Negative.

Upon a Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. McEnroy: The Previous Question, it was

VOTED: First two votes were not unanimous.

The third vote was unanimously in favor.

Upon Mr. Morgan's Motion, it was VOTED: In the Negative.

A Motion of Mr. Garrett F. Ziffer: To pass over the Article was ruled out of order in this form, at this time, since there had been so much discussion and action upon the merits of the questions raised by the Article.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Ela, duly seconded, it was WOTED: (First vote being in doubt; there was a standing, uncounted vote); To adjourn the Meeting to Monday evening at 7:45 at the same place.

This vote took place at 10:55 P. M., when the Meeting was declared adjourned.

Finlay offered the following MOTION: That the sum of \$275,000 be raised and appropriated for the preparation of plans and specifications and for constructing and originally equipping an addition to the Happy Hollow Grade School; that, to meet said appropriation, the sum of \$100,000 be transferred from the Stabilization Fund, \$75,000 be transferred from available funds "Excess and Deficiency", and that the Treasurer, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized and directed to issue notes of the Town aggregating not more than \$100,000 in principal amount, under the authority of Chapter 645 of the Acts of 1948, as amended, said notes to be issued and sold in accordance with the applicable provisions of Chapter 44 of the General Laws, as amended, and such notes to be payable in not more than one year from the date thereof; provided, however, that any matching Stabilization Fund payments received from the Commonwealth under Section 9 of Chapter 645 of the Acts of 1948, as amended by Chapter 377 of the Acts of 1961, shall be applied to the cost of the project, and that the total authorized borrowing shall be reduced by any such matching Stabilization Fund payments; that the committee originally appointed in accordance with the vote under Article 19 in the Warrant for the Annual Town Meeting held in March 1947 be authorized and directed to enter into all necessary contracts and agreements for the architectural and engineering work, construction, equipping, furnishing and site work of said building.

Mr. Finlay, Chairman, then presented the Report of the School Building Committee relating to this Article.

Upon Mr. Finlay's Motion, it was VOTED: (First two votes gave scattering "No's"); the third vote, a standing, uncounted vote, was unanimously: In favor of the Motion.

Article 35. Upon Mr. Bertelsen's Motion, it was VOTED: In favor.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Laws by deleting Section V, Sub-Section (g) and inserting in place thereof the following:

"(g) Sanitariums or Hospitals, not for the insane or feebleminded, or Nursing Homes for the care of the sick or aged, or Funeral Homes, provided a special permit is granted by the Board of Appeals in accordance with procedure provided in Sub-Section (r) and only under such conditions as the Board of Appeals may impose, and provided that no building be within thirty (30) feet of any lot line,"

or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Charles W. Brennan offered the following MOTION: That the Town amend the Zoning By-Laws by deleting Section V, Sub-Section (g) and inserting in place thereof the following;

(g) Sanitariums or Hospitals, not for the insane or feebleminded, or Nursing Homes for the care of the sick or aged, or Funeral Homes, provided a special permit is granted by the Board of Appeals in accordance with procedure provided in Sub-Section (r) and only under such conditions as the Board of Appeals may impose, and provided that no building be within thirty (30) feet of any lot line.

Mr. Bertelsen presented the Report of the Planning Board with Recommendations of that Board in relation to this Article. The Planning Board recommended that the Motion be defeated, as being not in the long range best interests of the residential character of the Town.

An amendment proposed by Mr. Garret F. Ziffer, "To limit such By-Law to the personal convenience of Mr. John Bryant" was ruled out of order by the Moderator, since the General Laws require uniformity of application in any By-Law.

A proposal of a "Sense of the Meeting" Motion, to assist and guide the Zoning Board, in this connection, was also ruled out of order, as not coming within the scope of the Article.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Frank A. Smith, duly seconded: "The

Previous Question", it was

VOTED: In favor.

Upon the Main Motion, it was

VOTED: The first vote was declared in the Negative; was challenged by seven (7) voters; and so there was a

COUNTED VOTE: "Yes" 251 "No" 175

The required 2/3 of this total being 284, the vote was declared not to have carried.

Before Article 36 had been disposed of, a Motion, duly seconded,: to adjourn the Meeting, was

VOTED: In the negative.

After Article 36 had been disposed of, and upon a Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. McEnroy: To adjourn to Wednesday Evening at 7:45; it was

VOTED: In the negative.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town Zoning By-Laws by deleting Sub-Section (b) of Section V and inserting thereof the following:

"The Office or studio of a physician, surgeon, dentist, architect, teacher, artist, musician, engineer, lawyer, or member of any other recognized profession, or real estate broker, or insurance agent, residing on the premises, provided that site plan approval under Section XA is obtained and that not more than three persons are regularly engaged in the activity, and provided there is no display of advertising except for a small professional name-plate";

or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Bertelsen offered the following MOTION: That Section V (b) of the Zoning By-Laws be deleted and a new Section V (b) be added as follows:

"The office of a doctor, dentist or other member of a recognized profession, a teacher or musician or real estate or insurance agent residing on the premises, provided that site plan approval under Section XA is obtained

and that not more than three persons are regularly engaged in the activity and provided there is no display of advertising except for a small professional name-plate".

Mr. Bertelsen presented the Report of the Planning Board with Recommendations of that Board, in relation to this Article. The Planning Board recommended approval of the Motion, which did not propose to change the uses permitted, but rather to limit the definitions of limitation in regard to the number of persons involved in such activities.

During the discussion under this Motion, a MOTION: To reconsider Article 36, was ruled out of order, since a Motion was before the Meeting at this time.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Clifford A. Goodnoh, duly seconded, "The Previous Question" it was

VOTED: Unanimously: In favor.

Upon the Main Motion, it was VOTED: The Vote was not unanimous; and so there was a COUNTED VOTE:

"Yes" 194 "No" 102

The required 2/3 vote was declared NOT to have carried.

Article 38. To see whether the Town will vote to amend Sub-Section (a) of Section XA of the Zoning By-Laws by inserting the words "Single Residence" after the phrase "In a" at the beginning of the first sentence thereof; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Bertelsen, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: To pass over the Article.

Article 39. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town By-Laws by adding a provision to require all dogs located within the Town of Wayland to be confined and/or on a leash, and not permitted to roam during the period from March 1 to November 1 of each and every year; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Wells, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To pass over the Article.

Article 40. To see if the Town will vote to amend its traffic rules and regulations to include a provision to the effect that all bicycle

traffic within the Town at all times shall be limited to the right hand side of the road; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Charles R. Thomas, duly seconded, "That the traffic rules and regulations of the Town be hereby amended by inserting a new section as follows:

"Article X -- Bicycles

Section 1. All bicycle traffic within the Town at all times shall be limited to the right hand side of the road," it was

VOTED: In the negative.

Article 41. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 17 of its Building Code by deleting the present section and inserting in place thereof the following:

"Section 17. - Every floor resting directly on the ground below curb level shall be constructed of portland cement concrete not less than three inches thick laid on not less than four inches of sand or gravel, or constructed in some other approved manner to guard against dampness from below such floor,";

or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Francis A. Fisher, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Building Code be amended by deleting Section 17 and inserting in place thereof the following:

"Section 17. Every floor resting directly on the ground below curb level shall be constructed of portland cement concrete, not less than three inches thick laid on not less than four inches of sand or gravel, or constructed in some other approved manner to guard against dampness from below such floor."

Article 42. To see what sum, if any, the Town will vote to transfer from available funds to meet any of the appropriations made under the foregoing articles.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was

Upon a Motion, duly seconded, at 11:50 P. M., it was VOTED: Unanimously: To adjourn the Meeting.

Ela, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town appropriate the sum of \$50,000 for the construction of a new well and well house off Oxbow Road, for the purchase and installation of pumping equipment and appurtenances, and for engineering in connection therewith, the work to be carried out under the supervision of the Water Commissioners with the approval of the Selectmen, and that the sum appropriated therefor be transferred from Available Funds, "Water - Available Surplus".

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to acquire by purchase, gift, eminent domain or otherwise, for highway purposes, land for the relocation of a portion of the road known as Rice Road, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, between Station 122 + 00 to Old Connecticut Path, as shown on a plan on file with the Town Clerk entitled "Complete Layout Plan and Profile showing Relocation of Rice Road in Wayland, Mass." dated December 28, 1962, by MacCarthy Engineering Service, Inc., Natick, Mass., to authorize the Board of Selectmen to acquire easements for drainage and slope, by purchase, gift, eminent domain, or otherwise; and to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the acquisition of such land or any portions thereof; without any appropriation of money for construction of said road under the Betterment Act or otherwise; or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Francis A. Fisher offered the following MOTION: That the Town vote to acquire for Highway purposes by eminent domain the land from Station 122 + 00 to Old Connecticut Path, shown on a plan entitled "Complete Layout Plan and Profile showing Relocation of Rice Road in Wayland, Mass." dated December 28, 1962, by MacCarthy Engineering Service, Inc., Natick, Mass. and bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the Southerly sideline of Old Connecticut Path 210.95 feet Westerly along a curve to the right of radius 897.30 feet of a concrete monument on the Southerly side of Old Connecticut Path, thence

Southwesterly on a curve to the left with a radius of 49.26 feet a distance of sixty-eight and 04/100 (68.04) feet, thence

S 05 41 55 E one hundred fourteen and 68/100 (114.68) feet, thence

Southeasterly along a curve to the left with a radius of 404.02 feet a distance of two hundred forty-eight and 93/100 (248.93) feet, thence

S 41 00 00 E one hundred forty-two and 36/100 (142.36) feet, thence

N 49 00 00 W fifty (50,00) feet through centerline station 122 + 00, thence

N 41 00 00 W one hundred forty-two and 36/100 (142.36) feet, thence

Northerly on a curve to the right with a radius of 454.02 feet a distance of two hundred seventy-nine and 74/100 (279.74) feet, thence

N 05 41 55 W ninety-seven (97.00) feet, thence

Northwesterly on a curve to the left with a radius of 50.00 feet a distance of seventy-eight and 54/100 (78.54) feet, thence

S 84 18 05 W twenty-nine (29.00) feet to a Middlesex County

Easterly on a curve to the left with a radius of 897.30 feet a distance of one hundred seventy (170.00) feet to the point of beginning;

and that there be raised and appropriated the sum of \$500.00 for the acquisition of such land.

The Moderator ruled OUT OF ORDER a Motion of Sonia T. Arsove (Mrs. Melvin W. Arsove), proposing that easements also be provided for a bicycle path and walk-way, because the wording did not come within that of the Article: As the Town Counsel indicated, in concurring with the Moderator, because this Article (#3) dealt only with land takings, without reference to specifications, Mrs. Arsove's Motion would be more appropriate at such later time as the specifications and order (s) of laying-out for this location might come before the Town. The proposal could be construed as coming within "highway purposes".

Upon Mr. Fisher's Motion, it was VOTED: Unanimously: In favor.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for preparation of plans and specifications and for the construction of an addition to the Wayland High School, and for originally equipping and furnishing said addition; to determine whether the money shall be provided for by appropriation from Available Funds, by taxation and/or by borrowing; or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Allan R. Finlay offered the following MOTION: That the sum of \$625,000 be appropriated for constructing, originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Senior High School and for alterations to the existing school, that to meet this appropriation the sum of \$225,000 be transferred from available funds "Excess and Deficiency," of which amount not more than \$25,000 is to be used for alterations and equipment in the existing building not

included in the cost of the addition, that the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen is authorized to issue \$400,000 bonds or notes of the Town under Chapter 645 of the Acts of 1948 as amended, payable within twenty years from their dates, that the committee originally appointed in accordance with the vote under Article 19 in the Warrant for the Annual Town Meeting held in March 1947 shall take all action necessary to carry out the project, and that the \$400,000 to be raised by borrowing shall be expended only for constructing, originally equipping and furnishing the addition.

Mr. Finlay then read the Report of the Wayland School Building Committee relating to this Article.

Upon Mr. Finlay's Motion, the first two votes gave scattering "No's"; and so there was a standing

COUNTED VOTE: "Yes" 252 "No" 15

The required 2/3 vote was declared to have carried in favor of the Motion.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to amend the By-Laws of the Town of Wayland by inserting as Section 6 under Article 6 - Police Regulations - the following:

Section 6. No person other than an officer of the law acting in the performance of his legal duty shall enter upon the premises of any person with the intention of peeping into a dwelling or spying upon any person therein, and each offense shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$20.00.

or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Herbert Odell, Jr. offered the following MOTION: That the Town By-Laws be amended by inserting under Article 6 - Police Regulations - a new section to read as follows:

Section 6. No person other than an officer of the law acting in the performance of his legal duty shall enter upon the premises of any person with the intention of peeping into a dwelling or spying upon any person therein, and each offense shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$20.00.

Upon a Motion, duly seconded: To delete "other than an officer of the law acting in the performance of his legal duty" from the proposed By-Law, it was

VOTED: In the Negative.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Henry G. Pearson, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To delete the words, "Other than an officer of the law acting in the performance of his legal duty" and to add at the end of the proposed By-Law, "Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit a police officer in the performing of his legal duties."

Upon the Main Motion of Mr. Odell, as amended, it was VOTED: Unanimously: In favor.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Laws by striking out Paragraph (c) of Section V and inserting in its place a new Paragraph (c) of Section V as follows:

"Customary home occupation such as dressmaking, millinery, the letting of rooms, the sale of antiques, all conducted by resident owner only, provided there is no display or advertising visible from outside except for an announcement card or sign of not more than two square feet area, and provided that a permit is obtained from the Board of Appeals in accordance with Section V (r)." "No dwelling so used shall be reconstructed or enlarged for such purposes unless specifically permitted under provisions of Paragraph (r)"; or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Robert H. Charnock offered the following MOTION: That the Town Zoning By-Laws be amended by striking out Paragraph (c) of Section V and inserting in its place a new Paragraph (c) of Section V as follows:

"Customary home occupation such as dressmaking, millinery, the letting of rooms, the sale of antiques, all conducted by resident owner only, provided there is no display or advertising visible from outside except for an announcement card or sign of not more than two square feet area, and provided that a permit is obtained from the Board of Appeals in accordance with Section V (r). Unless authorized by the Board of Selectmen, not more than one unregistered and ungaraged motor vehicle shall be placed or permitted to remain on any lot in a single residence district, and no unregistered and unsightly motor vehicle shall be placed or permitted to remain in the front yard of any such lot. Any person so placing a motor vehicle and, if placed or allowed to remain with his or her knowledge or consent, the owner or owners of the motor vehicle and of the lot, shall each be punishable by a fine of not more than Twenty Dollars for each offense;

or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Charnock offered the following MOTION: That the Zoning By-Laws be amended by adding under Section V, Sub-Section (m 1.) as follows:

(m l.) Unless authorized by the Board of Selectmen, not more than one unregistered and ungaraged motor vehicle shall be placed or permitted to remain on any lot in a single residence district, and no unregistered and unsightly motor vehicle shall be placed or permitted to remain in the front yard of any such lot. Any person so placing a motor vehicle and, if placed or allowed to remain with his or her knowledge or consent, the owner or owners of the motor vehicle and of the lot, shall each be punishable by a fine of not more than Twenty Dollars for each offense.

Mr. Charnock then read the Report of the Planning Board in connection with this Article.

Brooks Co., Civil Engineers, and recorded with

Middlesex South District Registry of Deeds as Plan #84 of 1957 in Book 8895, Page 112 and in the South Registry District of Middlesex County in Book 584, Page 194, Certificate #90944; and that there be appropriated and transferred from Available Surplus (Excess & Deficiency) therefor, the sum of one dollar.

Brooks Co., Civil Engineers, and recorded with Middlesex South District Registry of Deeds as Plan #84 of 1957 in Book 8895, Page 112 and in the South Registry District of Middlesex County in Book 584, Page 194, Certificate #90944.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to expend a sum of money from the Conservation Fund under Clause 51 of Section 5 of Chapter 40 of the Massachusetts General Laws for the purchase of a parcel of land having an area of about 4.8 acres now or formerly owned by Gregory Cooper at the intersection of Concord Road and Claypit Hill Road; or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Edward C. Mendler, Jr. offered the following

MOTION: That the Conservation Commission be authorized to expend the sum of \$8,000.00 from the Conservation Fund under Clause 51 of Section 5 of Chapter 40 of the Massachusetts General Laws for the purchase of the parcel of vacant land having an area of about 4.8 acres at the intersection of Concord Road and Claypit Hill Road, shown on a plan entitled "Plan of Land in Wayland, Mass., Concord Road and Claypit Hill Road", now or formerly owned by Gregory Cooper, by the Wayland Engineering Department dated October 15, 1964, on file with the Town Clerk, such purchase to be subject to approval of legal aspects of the transaction by the Town Counsel.

COUNTED VOTE: "Yes" 204 "No" 33

The required 2/3 vote was declared to have carried in favor of the Motion.

Upon the Main Motion, of Mr. Mendler, it was VOTED: The first vote having been far from unanimous, there was

COUNTED VOTE: "Yes" 207 "No" 29

The required 2/3 vote was declared to have carried in favor of this vote.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept various conveyances, gifts, and devises to the Town; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Kilburn, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: To accept with thanks the gift as provided under the will of the estate of Austin Hale, to be used for your activities in the Town of Wayland.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To adjourn the Meeting at 10:15 P. M.

SUMMARY

The proposed measure provides that henceforth appointments in the executive branch of the government shall not require the advice and consent of the Governor's Council. Exceptions to this provision include appointments to the Youth Service Board, Industrial Accident Board, Commission of the Department of Public Utilities, Parole Board and Appellate Tax Board, which appointments shall continue to require Council action. However, should the Council fail to act upon such appointments within thirty calendar days, then the person involved shall be deemed to have been lawfully appointed. Any appointment in the executive branch by an officer other than the Governor which heretofore required Council approval shall henceforth require approval by the Governor.

Removals from office shall no longer require the advice and consent of the Council, except in the case of the Youth Service Board, which removals must still receive Council approval. As in the case of appointments still requiring Council approval, such recommended removal from the Youth Service Board must be acted upon by the Council within thirty calendar days; otherwise the proposed removal shall become effective as if approval had been given. In the case of any appointment which heretofore required Council approval the Governor may, within fifteen days of the making of the appointment, remove the person appointed without cause.

The Council shall no longer be required to approve the fixing of any compensation for services rendered in the executive department. And henceforth there need be no approval by the Council of actions or agreements by executive officers, including but not limited to borrowings and loans, investments, leases, licenses, purchases and conveyances, and contracts, and also including the promulgation of rules and regulations.

Nothwithstanding the foregoing, the Governor shall at all times remain free to seek the advice and consent of the Council upon any matter.

Under the Act, effective as of January 1, 1964, each member of the General Court shall receive seventy-eight hundred dollars for each regular annual session, the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive the

same amount as additional compensation, and the floor leaders of each of the major political parties in the Senate and House, the Chairman of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means and the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of that committee of the House, shall each receive thirty-nine hundred dollars as additional compensation, to be paid as provided in the Act. After the same date the annual expense allowance is to be six hundred dollars for each member and the travel allowance is to be eight cents per mile with a stated minimum and an alternative, and a member chosen to fill a vacancy or who resigns during a session is to be entitled to per diem compensation at the rate for each regular annual session and to the allowances for travel and other expenses for the time of his membership.

It is also provided that in addition to the compensation for the 1963 annual session the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House shall be paid thirty-nine hundred dollars, the floor leaders of each major political party in the Senate and House, the Chairman of the Senate Committee on Ways and Means and Chairman and Vice-Chairman of that committee of the House, shall be paid twenty-nine hundred and twenty-five dollars and each other member shall be paid nineteen hundred and fifty dollars. Each member shall also be entitled to an additional expense allowance of two hundred dollars for the calendar year 1963 and the travel allowance shall be at the rate of eight cents per mile with a stated minimum and an alternative for the balance of the calendar year 1963.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Mr. Thomas Francis Linnehan was re-elected to the Board of Selectmen at the Annual Town Election on March 2, 1964.

The Board organized for the year with Mr. George K. Lewis as Chairman, Mr. Frank S. Tarr as Clerk, and Mr. Thomas Francis Linnehan, as Third Member.

The Selectmen met regularly on the first and third Monday evenings of each month, and held in addition numerous other meetings during weekdays and weekends with State and County Officials, with members of Boards of adjacent towns, or with members of other Boards in Wayland on matters of common concern.

Mr. Linnehan served on the Town Government Committee, Mr. Lewis on the Committee on Code Enforcement, and on two special committees to study the replacement of War Memorials and on the feasibility of Historic Districts, and Mr. Tarr on committees to study the use of voting machines and the Ad Hoc Committee, to study the long-range development of the southwesterly end of Dudley Pond. Mr. Lewis is the Wayland member of the Advisory Board of the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority.

During the year, the Selectmen made the regular appointments of Town officials not elected by ballot and to other non-elected boards. Vacancies on several Town Boards were filled during the year. The Selectmen wish to express here their recognition of the many years of service by Patrolman Thomas F. Murray before his enforced retirement from the Police Force.

The Selectmen want to pay special tribute to the devoted service of another Patrolman, George Rousseau, who died during the past year. Mr. Rousseau was a fine officer and will long be remembered as a member of the force. We must also note the passing of Mr. William Scotland, a distinguished Wayland citizen who served his Town in many capacities, including Selectman.

Other regular activities of the Board included the drawing of jurors, the disbursement of income from the Charitable Funds, the issuance of licenses, the approval of all bills incurred by other Town departments, the acceptance of Town roads, and the initiation of Betterments. The Board also acted in several cases of private complaints or disputes of a local nature.

Each year the pressure of work upon the Selectmen increases, making greater demands upon evening and weekend time. Fortunately,

the Executive Secretary, Mr. Taylor, has been able to take care of many routine matters and answer the ever-increasing number of calls during the day at the Town Building. The Selectmen want to acknowledge Mr. Taylor's efficient and courteous service in their behalf.

REPORT OF THE WAYLAND PLANNING BOARD

SUBDIVISION CONTROL

A slowdown of development activity is readily apparent in the following table showing the first five years of the decade and the subdivisions approved in each year.

There are, however, large numbers of lots in the planning stage by developers and land owners according to preliminary plans shown the Board in 1964. Of particular significance is land in the extreme north of the town on Oxbow Road where three large tracts of land have been shown on plans that would create as many as 100 new lots. These would appear to be on land that does not present the problems arising out of marginal land for building purposes.

In this connection, the Board has felt concern for some years in regard to the need for avoiding sewerage disposal problems that marginal land can cause. Also in 1964, very dry weather for the first time in years, pointed out the advantage that Wayland enjoys in its public water supply. Unlike many areas not served by the Metropolitan District Water System, Wayland's local supply was not affected by the drought.

In view of public water supply shortage being an ever increasing problem, chronic in some areas, and acute in others, as in 1964, the Board feels that every measure possible should be taken to preserve our own sources. Accordingly, the following resolution was adopted by the Board during 1964:

RESOLUTION: That it is the sense of the Wayland Planning Board that steps be taken by the Town to preserve the sources of ground water that might originate in the brooks, streams, rivers, ponds, swamps and wet areas in the Town, in order to ensure their contribution to the water table that supplies water to the Town.

In view of the drought for a long period of time in 1964, in the Northeast part of the United States and the long time reduction of the water table in other areas of the United States by reason of increased water consumption, it is important for communities, such as Wayland, that depends on local ground water for supply for any use in the Town, to prevent encroachment on any surface water area. Accordingly, the Wayland Planning Board deems it fit to state that brooks, streams, rivers, ponds, swamps and other areas that are wet at any time during the year, be guarded and protected against filling or other ex-

ploitation that would impair their water supply, flood control, or other functions that would prohibit or interrupt the normal course of water at any time.

Further, in connection with subdivision control, the appointment of the Town Engineer in 1964 was a great boon to the Board. Many functions, formerly performed by Board Members, are now performed on a professional full time basis.

Already one benefit has been achieved in the area of policing the construction of new roads by subdividers. Inadequate and incomplete construction on seven roads has been determined in detail by the Engineer, resulting in action being underway by the Town Counsel to foreclose on bonds held by the Town to secure proper compliance to construction specifications.

ZONING:

The Board has recently begun an investigation into the feasibility of Cluster Zoning in the Single Residence Districts.

The merits of such zoning are that residential land can be layed out into lots of varying shape, area, and frontage in order to use buildable land more efficiently. This can remove non-buildable land from use, preserve open space and wet lands, and lessen the length of roads and utilities that the Town would eventually have to maintain.

The demerits of Cluster Zoning are the potential abuses of the original planning of such areas in the future, by the use of previously set aside, open space for development, defeating the original purpose, with a net result of smaller lot zoning.

The Board has as yet reached no conclusions as to how Cluster Zoning could be included in the Zoning By-Law.

ENGINEERING, RECONSTRUCTION, AND LAYOUT OF EXISTING

TOWN ROADS:

The Board has essentially completed the layout of Existing Town Roads along which large open areas exist. This work will require future developers of new roads off of these old roads, to reflect the old roads in subdivision planning, at the same dimensions as we require on new roads. We recommend that no reconstruction of these old roads be undertaken by the Town, except for certain bad curves. Some of these curves could be made safe, if the Town approves certain articles in the Warrant for the 1965 Annual Meeting, authorizing reconstruction.

In regard to Chapter 90 Reconstruction, we feel that every effort should be made to provide construction for safe vehicular traffic without undue cost to the Town, without excessive removal of natural features, and without creating new hazards by reason of encouraging higher speeds.

The Betterment Construction Program should remain on a priority

list established by the Selectmen and the Finance Committee, and at the request of abutters to roads to be considered.

The Post Road By-Pass is not to be considered as a possibility for some years to come. In the Board's contacts with the Department of Public Works, the Metropolitan Planning Council and the Boston Regional Planning Project, it appears that this matter is not yet of sufficient importance to the Federal Highway Program and area road construction by the State in general, and will not be, until the Inter State Highway Program is further along, allowing the use of Federal Funds for intra-state construction. The Federal Highway Program for Inter State Construction is not scheduled for completion until along 1972.

In regard to the By-Pass and Regional Planning, Wayland is in the "Route 20" group of suburban cities and towns along Route 20 from Marlboro to Boston as a part of the Metropolitan Planning Council.

OTHER ROAD ENGINEERING:

The Board has, in 1964, begun a study of road layout of some roads in the area of Dudley Pond, with a view toward improvement of access and elimination of at least one safety problem where fire protection at present, could not be adequate.

Sketch plans have been made during the year, and plans made in past years have been considered, for elimination of a hair-pin turn on Lake Shore Drive on the Westerly side of the pond. Plans reflect the use of narrow and varying widths of roads in order to minimize the necessity to purchase land and still make the necessary safety improvements. This work has been done in consultation with the Selectmen, the Finance Committee, the Town Engineer, and the Fire Chief, and will eventually be useful for planning any betterment work in the area that might be requested by abutters.

POPULATION AND PROJECTIONS:

In the Board's special report on Planning, issued in October, 1962, a population projection was made as shown in the following table, along with the actual figures to date:

Reliability of the projections and new estimates can be considered only after a greater elapse of time. The projections made in 1962,

showed a population estimate of 14,850 in 1970, and 18,620 in 1980. It is felt that present zoning would eventually result in a population of approximately 20,000.

The acquisition of equipment was the first order of business which was followed by the layout of the roads that come under the Bettermer Act, these being Trinity Place, White Road, and Bent Avenue. Road boundary markers were set on White Road and Trinity Place, while the setting of those on Bent Avenue will be done as the construction is completed.

The policing of subdivisions under the direction of the Planning Board was done with reports on their present condition being submitted, and the actual construction being inspected. Attendance at Planning Board Meetings as temporary clerk and advisor, was anothe of the functions of the department.

The preparation of plans for different boards and committees has been, and will continue, to be a major item in the Engineering Depart ment's schedule.

Thanks are hereby extended to all those people who have helped to make the department's first year, one of accomplishment.

REPORT OF THE ROAD COMMISSIONERS

The following projects, several of which were carried over from 1963, were completed:

1. BETTERMENTS:

Trinity Place and White Road reconstruction was completed. Bent Avenue construction was begun and included storm drainage placing of the gravel sub base. The unsuitable material which was removed was used as fill in a low area to allow for construction next year of the connection between Bent Avenue and Lake Shore Drive. A new water main was installed in Bent Ave., (Cottage St., George St.) under the direction of the Water Commissioners. Work on the overall project, including Bent Ave., Cottage and George Streets, will continue during 1965.

2. CHAPTER 90 WORK:

- (a) CONSTRUCTION: The surface coarse of bituminous concrete pavement was placed on Old Connecticut Path between Route 20 and Rice Road. The side slopes on this portion of the road were also completed. Reconstruction of the remainder of Old Connecticut Path will be held in abeyance until further studies are completed by the State and County Engineers and the Town's Chapter 90 Study Committee.
- (b) MAINTENANCE: Old Connecticut Path was resurfaced with bituminous concrete from Maiden Lane to Five Paths. The additional appropriation by the Town in the 1964 budget allowed for resurfacing of approximately one mile of road this year. The normal State-County-Town appropriation is sufficient to resurface approximately one half-mile of road per year. The Board recommends that an additional appropriation by the Town be included for the next several years in order to resurface as much Chapter 90 road as possible to preclude major reconstruction projects under Chapter 90 due to lack of maintenance funds.

3. DRAINAGE:

The culverts on Pinebrook Road were completed including head-walls and reconstruction of road pavement in the immediate vicinity of the culverts. Several additional drainage projects were completed to eliminate local storm water problems.

4. SIDEWALKS:

The sidewalk construction was completed along East Plain Street and Commonwealth Road from Dunster Street to Loker Street. Additional funds have been requested to continue this program into 1965.

5. RECONSTRUCTION OF EXISTING TOWN ROADS:

Under Chapter 718 of the General Laws, the surface coarse of bituminous concrete was placed on a portion of Loker Street off Commonwealth Road.

The first phase of the reconstruction of a portion of Stonebridge Road at the M. D. C. Aqueduct was completed. Additional funds have been requested to complete this project during 1965.

Together with these major projects, the oiling program, road sweeping operations and roadside cleanup programs were continued.

Bids were obtained by the Board for a snow blower, a road sweeper and a superintendent's vehicle. The road sweeper was purchased from the special account set up for replacement of capital equipment in the Highway Department. The snow blower and superintendent's vehicle were purchased from the respective appropriations.

Bids were obtained and a contract was awarded for construction of the addition to the Highway Department Garage.

Mr. Albert Abruzzese was appointed as Highway Department Superintendent.

The Road Commissioners wish to thank all Highway Department employees for their cooperation and diligence during the past year.

We also appreciate the cooperation given to the department by all Town Officials, Boards, and citizens on matters of mutual interest to the Town.

The number of alarms in 1964 decreased considerably in comparison with 1963, although we once again experienced extended periods of dry weather. Rescue, first aid, emergency calls and investigations, principally to the home, once again were high on the list and reflect the residential growth.

During the long dry spells this year it was necessary to place a ban on all outside burning and place mobile fire patrols in operation. Citizen cooperation contributed greatly to our success in keeping the fire threat in check. The awareness of our people to the dangers of

outside fires is evidenced by the fact that the department issued a record number of burning permits during the days of the year that it was safe to allow burning.

Fire prevention activities by this department included the periodic inspections of all municipal buildings, nursing homes, commercial and industrial buildings, churches and multiple family dwellings. Single family dwellings were inspected on request and recommendations were made regarding hazards and family escape plans.

Periodic fire drills were held at all public schools with the cooperation of the school department.

During the year this department actively participated in the work of the Code Enforcement Committee.

The regular department training program was conducted in twenty sessions held in the spring and fall of the year. Two training sessions were also held jointly with two of our mutual aid departments, Weston and Sudbury. Four members of the department have successfully completed a training course in scuba diving providing the department with the neucleus of an under water search and recovery team. In addition, full time members of the department attended seminars and conferences conducted by the Massachusetts Institute of Fire Department Instructors, the International Municipal Signal Association, the Fire Apparatus Maintenance Association, the Boston Fire Department and the International Association of Fire Chiefs.

Preparations were made this year for the installation of a fire alarm signal and communications cable between the Headquarters Station in Wayland Center and Station #2 in Cochituate.

The municipal fire alarm system was extended by the installattions made by subdivision contractors on Hobbs Road, Alden Road, Cabot Road, Forty Acres Drive, Highland Circle and Lake Shore Drive.

The second step of a long range plan designed to gradually provide additional full time personnel to the Department was approved at the annual Town Meeting in March 1964, and three men were added to the permanent force on May 1, 1964.

The availability of call or part-time firefighters is still a critical problem as the changing character of the community continues to diminish their number. Therefore, the 1965 budget request includes an amount which would allow for step number three of the long range personnel plan which provides for two men to be added to the Department on May 1, 1965.

This Department is approaching the final stages of two major long range programs established five years ago. These programs were designed to provide personnel and apparatus on a gradual basis in the development of a modern progressive Fire Department.

During 1965 we recommend a review of the current planning, a study of future needs and the projection of new long range plans that will continue to keep the development of the Fire Department in step with the needs and the growth of the community.

I wish to extend my thanks and appreciation to the members of the Department, and to all persons who in any way have cooperated and assisted in our operations and development.

- The Massachusetts Department of Public Health has adopted minimum codes for swimming pools and the Board of Health of the Town of Wayland has adopted these in their entirety.
- The Board voted that all contractors pumping out cesspools or sanitary systems would, as of January 1, 1965, be licensed at a fee of \$5.00 per year.
- The Communicable Disease Regulations revised by the State Department of Public Health in 1964 were adopted by the Board of Health.

DOG CLINIC:

A rabies clinic was conducted under the direction of Dr. Paul R. Granholm of Weston. A total of 282 dogs were inoculated at a cost of \$1.00 per dog. This was the most successful rabies clinic in

our history. We cannot stress too strongly the need for dogs to have rabies shots every two years in order to minimize the danger of rabies infection.

DENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM School Year 1963 - 1964

Dentist -- Thomas G. Leonard, DDS

A total of 49 pre-school children and 181 elementary school children received dental care at the Board of Health Dental Clinic.

This year, all children received a topical application of flouride.

Children in grades 1, 3 and 5, were screened by the dental hygienist. Of the 903 children screened, 177 were referred for dental treatment. In order to prevent dental injury, mouth guards were fitted to all football and hockey players.

Other Programs:

Joint programs of Board of Health and Parmenter Health Center.

<u>Chest X-Ray Program--of the 483 X-rayed, 476 were negative.</u>
The other seven were referred for further follow up.

Glaucoma Screening Program -- of the 116 residents screened, eleven were referred for further follow up.

The Board of Health and the Parmenter Health Center are planning a Diabetes Screening Program as well as continuing Glaucoma detection and Chest X-Ray Programs for 1965.

The Board of Health has office hours Monday through Thursday from 5:00 P. M. to 7:00 P. M. at the Parmenter Health Center. At this time, permits and licenses are issued.

SANITARY ENGINEER'S REPORT

Board of Health Wayland, Massachusetts

Gentlemen:

The following is a report of my activities for your Board for the calendar year 1964. . . .

SEWAGE DISPOSAL

During the calendar year 1964, one hundred and twenty-five (125) permits were issued by your Health Agent, for the construction or alteration of sewage disposal systems, after the preliminary and other inspections and recommendations were made to your Board. A total of more than six hundred and twenty (620) inspections were made to insure effective design and construction of these systems, and to advise builders and home owners concerning the proper installation, operation, and maintenance of these new or existing facilities.

RESTAURANT SANITATION

Unannounced inspections of eating establishments were made on several occasions during the year, with the Board of Health Agent. Continued efforts in upgrading some of the eating establishments will be necessary during the coming year in order that they may continue to operate in a satisfactory manner.

MILK INSPECTIONS

A total of four hundred and forty-three (443) samples of milk and cream were collected during the year by your Health Agent from the dairies and other licensed outlets selling milk and cream in Wayland. These samples were examined in the laboratory for total bacterial count, coliform bacteria, and phosphatase, with results reported to the dairies concerned, as required by law. Unsatisfactory results were immediately followed up by your Board of Health Agent, so that corrective action could be taken wherever necessary.

LAKE COCHITUATE BATHING BEACH

During the summer bathing season, weekly samples were collected and examined in the laboratory to provide for a check on the water quality in the bathing area.

The Wayland Public Health Nursing Service has been most fortunate in being able to attract well qualified health nurses to its staff whereas throughout the state the problem of nursing personnel shortage plagues many agencies. Poor salary and employment practices have caused many of the more recent nursing graduates to seek employment in other parts of the country, where salaries are more commensurate with professional qualifications and experience.

At present, this problem does not exist in Wayland. Because of the farsightedness of the various community boards, the nursing service has been provided with sound personnel policies, a more adequate salary schedule, and a sufficient staff. Therefore, we have been able to provide the community with many nursing services that other communities have had to curtail because of limited staff.

This year, the Parmenter Health Center Board of Trustees voted to provide for another public health nursing position in its budget. At present, the Board of Health employs the Senior Public Health Nurse, three staff nurses, and two nurses' aides. The Parmenter Health Center employs the Director and two public health staff nurses.

All of the nurses have a Baccalaureate Degree from an approved university school of nursing, which provides a course of study in public health nursing. Two nurses have masters degree in nursing. All of the nurses, with the exception of one, have had previous experience in public health nursing, prior to their employment in Wayland.

Each nurse is responsible for providing school nursing in one of the six schools in town. The four nurses who cover the elementary schools and their respective districts, provide public health nursing within these districts. The Senior Public Health Nurse covers the Senior High School, and participates in some of the supervisory aspects of the program, and also provides public health nursing to certain selected families. The nurse who covers the Junior High School, also provides public health nursing service to selected families and assists in other aspects of the total program.

A total of 4,383 home visits was made during the year. Home visits are classified according to three programs, namely, Maternity, Health Promotion, and Disease Control. Visits made to maternity patients include guidance and nursing care to the expectant mother, and to the mother and baby following delivery. Disease Control includes visits concerned with the treatment and control of a diagnosed disease or disability whether or not physical care is provided. Health Promotion includes all visits made to apparently well individuals, for the purpose of guiding them in healthful living in order to prevent disease and

promote health. Most of the visits made in this category were concerned with preparing mothers of young children for various stages of the child's growth and development. Many of the school followup visits were in this classification, however, a large percentage of these visits were made for the purpose of referring the child for medical evaluation.

In addition to participation in the home visit activities of the agency, the school health program, and well baby clinic, the nurses were involved in the glaucoma detection program, inspection of nursing homes; the chest x-ray clinic, and the tuberculin testing program. Many conferences were held with allied professional groups in behalf of individuals, and families, and also in behalf of the overall health programs.

Meetings were held with state consultants to work out a program for inspection of nursery schools and private kindergartens. The State Department of Public Health authorized the Board of Health to license these agencies beginning in 1965.

As part of the staff education program, the Senior Public Health Nurse conducted bimonthly sessions in maternal and child health. Three sessions were held with the State Department of Public Health District Nutritionist regarding family nutrition and budgeting. In addition to the Wayland Public Health Nursing Staff, the public health nurses from Sudbury and Weston attended the above-mentioned programs.

During the year, three students from Boston University School of Nursing, received their public health nursing field experience. Each student came to the agency for a two-month period.

We continue to enjoy the multiple services given to us by so many willing volunteers. Their competent assistance has been greatly appreciated.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

During the past year, the school physician and public health nurses met with school personnel to review and revise the first aid policies; these were approved by the Board of Health, the Medical Advisory Committee, and the School Committee.

In order to better facilitate emergency care of students, a "Medical Emergency Card" was developed.

Periodic meetings were held with the school physician, school personnel, and the Board of Health to discuss various aspects and needs of the school health program. Plans are under way to develop school personnel health policies.

A total of 544 children in grade one and nine received tuberculin skin tests. There were no positive reactions.

Vision and hearing tests were given to every student. One hundred eighty-nine (189) students failed the vision test. Of this number, one hundred twenty-seven (127) were then seen by an eye specialist. Ninety-eight (98) students failed the hearing test. Of this number, forty-nine (49) were seen by an ear specialist.

Private physical examinations continue to increase. Of the 1,442 students having a physical examination, 1,328 or 93% of the students were examined by private physicians.

During the Spring, preschool vision and hearing tests were conducted at the Health Center as part of the total preschool registration program.

MOSQUITO CONTROL IN WAYLAND IN 1964

Mosquito control followed the usual schedule in Wayland in 1964 except that preseason DDT dusting was abandoned shortly after it commenced in February. This change was made because of reports that DDT contamination was discovered in fish in several ponds and rivers in Massachusetts. The main attack against sources of the Spring Brood of Aedes mosquitoes was delayed until larvae were well developed in May. Then hand spraying and helicopter spraying was done with short lasting insecticides. There was so little mosquito breeding at this time in the deeply flooded Sudbury River meadows, that no spraying was done except near the dump and on Pelham Island. When the period of mosquito migration was at its height, the Project hired helicopter spraying and fogging, and operated its own trucks on night time fogging schedules. When the Mansonia mosquito season was at its height in July, helicopter service was unavailable, and the Project did the best it could with truck fogging. The Mill Pond swamp is a major source of these and many other mosquitoes. A special report will be made on this situation.

Routine ditch clearing was maintained and a short extension of a new ditch made in the Woodridge swamp. Work was begun on clearing Hayward Brook, below Route 20.

THE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WELFARE

This has been our first year of operation under the "No Settlement" Law. The Town now provides 100% of the funds necessary with a delayed reimbursement of 20% by the State. The "No Settlement" Law has proved very satisfactory, in that it eliminates the necessity of the time involved procedure of establishing Settlement, and Old and Ancient Law.

The Medical Assistance for the Aged program fluctuates due to the increasing liberal legislative changes, and variations in the case load.

Reference is also made to the sharp increase in the Disability Assistance in 1964 due to required, extensive, treatment no one could foresee.

We cannot predict what changes in our Legislature will be forthcoming, but the trend of our present administration indicates that there will be a continuing broadening of the welfare programs.

One cannot tell what the future portends.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARY

1964 was a year of reappraisal for the Wayland Library. The survey by Humphrey and McNiff was completed and a preliminary report was presented in May. Some changes in policy and administration were made by the Board of Trustees. At the time that this report was written, the surveyor's final report had not been received.

Use of the library and the number of borrowers shows a large increase for the year. For the first time, the total circulation of the Main Library and Cochituate Branch has exceeded 100,000. In order to cope with this larger circulation, we are about to begin using an automatic charging system. New cards are being issued and the new system will begin operation on February 1st.

There have been some additions to the furnishings of the Main Library, including a large round rug in the Reading Room and carpeting on the stairs and outer edge of the balcony. These have reduced noise considerably as well as adding a decorative touch and reducing floor maintenance. In September a Docustat machine was installed for the use of the library patrons. This furnishes photographic copies of library or personal materials which anyone may wish to duplicate. It has been greatly appreciated and much used since it was installed.

At the time of school opening in September, a major change was made in hours of service at the Main Library. It is now open five evenings, Monday through Friday, from 7:00 to 9:00 P. M. and every day Monday through Saturday, from 10:00 A. M. to 6:00 P. M. By this change, 10 hours were added to the weekly schedule.

We have continued the program of visits to the first and second grades of the elementary schools by the Children's Librarian. Several story hours were held during the year with excellent attendance. The most memorable of these was the one in Book Week when more than 40 children arrived for the occasion. Greater cooperation is developing between the library and the elementary schools in the area of advance notice to the library on class assignments.

Mrs. Frederic Newton joined the staff of the Cochituate Branch in March. Mrs. Jane Coffin of Lincoln, a graduate of Simmons Library School, began work in the Main Library in September.

Many gifts of books and periodicals were received during the year. Among others, the Wayland Garden Club presented Exotica 3, a botanical reference book, and the Ski Club gave us 4 books on skiing. The Garden Club provided floral arrangements and holiday decorations most faithfully.

REPORT OF THE PARK DEPARTMENT

The Board of Park Commissioners has continued in its effort to improve and maintain park and town properties, under its jurisdiction, through its labor force and competitive contract effort.

The Millpond area has been improved through the efforts of the Wayland Kiwanians, who have given so generously of their time.

The Commissioners have completed the contract for the two playground areas at two unused school sites.

The first phase of the Beach Expansion Program has been completed, and will provide one-third more beach area. Plans are being prepared to continue with the second phase of the program which will consist of organizing the beach parking area to accommodate more cars in a more orderly manner, and to provide docks to make the beach more appealing.

The beach again enjoyed good attendance in spite of the inclement weather. The total registration for the beach was 5,600. The total donations contributed during registration were \$2,755.00. During the five excellent beach days, the traffic at the beach included over 3,400 bathers and 400 cars per day. On an average day, the traffic consisted of 400 bathers and 150 cars.

The Commissioners wish to express their gratitude to the beach personnel for maintaining our excellent safety record. The Commissioners wish to thank the residents of the Town, the assisting committees, the officers, and the Park Department personnel for their support and cooperation. They wish also to express thanks for the volunteer effort of individuals and groups that executed its recreational program.

WAY-CO RECREATION PROGRAM

The Way-Co Recreation Program, which was started about twelve years ago with only a handful of youngsters who wanted to play baseball and which has since grown into a tremendous program, lost its enthusiastic, energetic and dedicated Commissioner last June. The untimely passing of Jack Arnold struck a sad note in the hearts of all who knew him, especially those who worked with him in the Way-Co Recreation Program. His foresight and devotedness will be remembered and valued by both the youngsters who participated in the activities, and by the men and women who have volunteered their efforts in order to keep this a successful and progressive program.

During 1964, Way-Co added tennis and men's softball to its regular list of activities which include boys' baseball, basketball, hockey, Pop Warner football, and men and women's volleyball. Five teams participated in the softball program which was held under the lights at the Cochituate Field during the summer, and more are expected this coming year with heightened interest in all outdoor sports during the good weather.

Participation and interest more than fulfilled our expectations as tennis was introduced this year under the able direction of Del Kendall. The program provided instruction, practice and competition for all junior and senior high school players who applied. In addition, tournaments and classes for adults were held due to many requests. Next year, the program will be similar but with more opportunity for adults than was originally planned. However, emphasis will continue to be on the youngsters.

Sixty junior high and forty senior high boys and girls participated in six weeks of spring practice, climaxed by tournaments. An experimental adult class proved highly successful as well as fall tournaments for thirty-two men and twenty-four women.

Thirty experienced men and women tennis players helped as instructors and tournament officials. Without the help of this group, it would not be possible to operate our large tennis program. Some of our better young players entered open tennis tournaments throughout the state. All in all, it is a highly successful enterprise.

The Way-Co football team, known as the Chargers, had a complement of about sixty-five boys. The group was broken into two main bodies--division being by weight and age for the safety of the boys. Players were supplied with good protective gear and all surrounding towns who participated in games with the Way-Co Chargers observed the Pop Warner rules. Stress was made on physical fitness and conditioning for this contact sport, and it is reassuring to note that there

were no major injuries the entire season.

Approximately five hundred enthusiastic boys were enrolled in the Junior Division and Nipper baseball programs which took place from April through August and ended with a cook-out for the All Stars and uniformed teams from both Wayland and Cochituate held at the Cochituate Field. Both baseball and football teams had excellent scoring records throughout their respective seasons.

Due to the rather warm weather during the 1963-1964 hockey season, participation in that sport was rather slow. However, the 1964-1965 season is expecting an enrollment of about seventy-five boys--future star players for the Wayland High School team. Both the Cochituate Rink and the Mill Pond will be used for the instruction and actual play of the game.

The success of Way-Co depends largely on the group of interested volunteers who give their time and efforts throughout the year. The program is supported by the Town and sponsored and aided by the Park Department. It is a cooperative function and is constantly increased by participants and new activities. In submitting this report, I would like to thank all who are now acting as a Board of Directors and who have put so much time and effort into this program--namely Gordon Fellows, Hal Barnett, Chuck Moody, John Williams, Bill Morris, Del Kendall and George Owens and many others who have contributed so much to make this program the success that it is.

Research this year concerning the establishment of a paid post as Recreation Director for the Town, has led us to the firm conclusion that Wayland has not yet reached either the population growth factor necessary for support of such a move, nor the complexity of facilities necessitating same. Rather, we would offer two alternatives, both workable, and hope that the ensuing year will see the finalization of one of them.

Recreation in the Town has grown primarily on a volunteer operated basis with the cooperation of Park, School, Highway Departments, and the Board of Selectmen. It has reached the point where the expansion of the Park Department to five members with responsibilities for Park and Recreation would be one solution; or the creation of a three member Town Recreation Commission would be the other solution. Initially, such Recreation Commission would stand for election at the March Town Election on a staggered basis, so that eventually one term would expire each year with a three year term of office the resulting stable method of operation.

Lincoln's immortal Gettysburg Address was well delivered at the four cemeteries by Jennifer Kagan, Jeffrey Plate, Scott Rossborough and Herbert Ross.

Bills covering the cost of flowers, flags, grave markers, wreaths, tonic and sandwiches for parade participants have been submitted to you, the total of which is considerably less than the appropriation of \$800.00. The savings are due to the services of the High School Band without charge.

The Committee expresses the gratitude of the Town to the participating organizations, the clergy, the schools and the High School Band for their part in the services.

Criticism has been voiced to the Committee for the failure of the parade routes to include all four cemeteries. The limited parade route is dictated by the inability of the youngsters of the High School Band to stand a longer route. Commercial bands are not readily available.

We recommend to next year's Committee that the parade form at

the Water Department roadway at Baldwin's Pond, just beyond the North Cemetery on Sudbury Road; that it march to the North Cemetery for services, thence march to the South Cemetery for services; that it then proceed by bus to Cochituate, there to march to St. Zephrin's Cemetery and Lakeview Cemetery for services. This route is no longer than the past routes to two cemeteries and return.

Your Committee hopes that no future Committee will accede to the constant attempts to commercialize Memorial Day, and to make it just another day off. Too many thousand honored military dead around the world, from Bunker Hill to Korea to Viet Nam, forbid such forgetfulness. This day commemorates a debt beyond the ordinary means of payment.

REPORT OF THE WATER COMMISSIONERS

During 1964 we have experienced one of the longest dry spells on record. The water table not only in Wayland, but over a large part of New England, went to record lows.

The Water Department is feeling the pinch caused by increasing demands on its facilities and in addition, we are starting this year with the water level in our wells at a low point not usually reached until mid-summer.

There will be days this summer in which the demands for water to sprinkle lawns will be far greater than our pumping capacity.

A new well and pump voted at the Special Town Meeting last year, cannot be in service in time to help.

We do not wish to put over-all bans on lawn watering, since the pinch will only be of short duration on certain days.

The townspeople can help us and themselves in two ways:

1. TAKE SPECIAL CARE NOT TO WASTE WATER.

It is generally accepted that one inch of water per weekin two applications is an excellent program of lawn watering. This means that 1,000 gallons of water applied to 3,000 square feet of lawn twice a week is adequate. The average sprinkler will put out 1,000 gallons in about three hours. When you use more water than this, or put it on the lawn so fast or so poorly directed that it runs down the street, you are really wasting water.

2. DO NOT WATER LAWNS BETWEEN FOUR AND NINE P. M. ON WEEK DAYS, OR BETWEEN NOON AND NINE P.M. ON SATURDAYS AND SUNDAYS.

These are the hours during which consumption can be from five to seven times our pumping capacity, and as a result, can draw our water storage tanks down to the danger point.

We realize that this is the most popular and convenient hours for most people to water lawns, and probably some people would have no other opportunity, however, if enough people would water at different hours, it would spread the demand over more of the day, and enable us to keep a reserve in storage for emergencies. If these two steps are followed by enough people, and if the weather man will cooperate, we may not have to put any ban on hoses this year.

REPORT OF THE MOTH SUPERINTENDENT

The roadside trees were sprayed for control of the Dutch Elm Disease as well as sprays applied for control of other destructive insects which defoliate our trees. Very little D. D. T. was applied this past year, as we are using other material that is much less toxic. In the year 1965, we will use a product known as Methoxychlor, which is nearly twenty-five times less toxic than D. D. T. to birds or other wildlife.

The Poison Ivy Spraying Program was continued and spraying was done at all locations where it was seen.

The removal of confirmed Dutch Elm diseased trees was completed and sanitation work was performed in accordance with the state recommendations.

REPORT OF THE BYPASS COMMITTEE

In early January 1965, the Chairman of the Wayland Bypass Committee, met with the officials of the Massachusetts Department of Public Works, at their District #4 Headquarters, located on Route 2, Arlington, Mass.

The meeting was held in the office of Mr. Roy Livingston, Assistant Engineer of District #4.

A review of the 1965 and 1966 Department of Public Works Engineering and Construction Budget, indicated that no further engineering work would be performed until other surveys in this immediate area are completed.

Some thought is now being given to the possibility of a new bypass, starting at Route 128 and terminating somewhere near the Route 20 and Marlboro line. This route, if ever constructed, would circumvent Weston, Wayland, and Sudbury.

The land damages caused by land-taking for this route, would be borne entirely by the Towns involved, which would be prohibitive.

The Bypass Committee will continue to explore any course that would help relieve the traffic congestion in Wayland.

REPORT OF THE TREE WARDEN

During the year 1964 all of the roadside trees in the entire town were checked and dead branches that overhung the roadways were removed as well as several trees which had become rotted or weak, creating a potential hazard in a windstorm or other severe weather condition.

The tree planting program continued and thirty maple trees were set out in areas where they were most needed.

It would be greatly appreciated if property owners having trees near the roadway would examine them for dead wood or rotted cavities on the trunk, and would remove or repair such trees. An ice, snow, or windstorm could cause a tree or portion of a tree to fall upon the highway and constitute serious damage or traffic hazard.

Throughout the past decade the School Committees and Administrations have been concerned primarily with the areas of reorganization and modernization of teaching methods and curricula on the one hand and, on the other, of caring for the rapidly increasing school population. This was emphasized and detailed in the report of the Committee for 1963. During the past year the attention of the Committee and the Administration has begun to turn away from the problems associated with rapid growth and toward opportunities for improvement in the detail and depth of education, which are associated with a stabilizing system.

The year has seen the beginning of the construction of the needed 200 pupil addition to the Happy Hollow Elementary School and the authorization by the town of \$625,000 to plan and build a 400 pupil addition to the Wayland High School. With the complete retention of the Sixth Grade in the Elementary School beginning in the fall of 1965, the school population projections indicate that under existing zoning by-laws and general laws of the Commonwealth the need of the town for classroom space will be met for a minimum of five years and, quite likely, for much longer. Indeed, these projections suggest that within five years the population in the elementary grades may decline sufficiently, so that sufficient classroom space will be available in the town for housing a public kindergarten. With this in mind, and at the request of the Council of the Parent-Teachers' Association, a Kindergarten Study Committee was appointed by the School Committee to bring in recommendations on certain aspects of the problem of the establishment of a kindergarten program in Wayland. On the basis of a careful study, this group will propose the establishment of a six weeks summer kindergarten program as an interim program pending the existence of sufficient classroom space in the town for a full kindergarten program.

In an area related to the stabilizing school system, an attempt has been made to project the school operating costs for the next decade. The School Committee feels that it is most important that coordinated, advanced planning in this area be undertaken as soon as possible. Meetings with the various Town committees and boards have been planned in order that the School Committee may have the benefit of their views and that all interested groups are well-informed on foreseeable fiscal requirements of the school system.

The action of the General Court in raising the minimum salaries for teachers to \$5,000 per annum has necessitated a somewhat greater increase in salaries for the coming year than had been anticipated. The salary scale established for Wayland for the coming year maintains our competitive position relative to adjacent school systems. We have been most pleased with the caliber and

training of teachers who have accepted contracts with the Wayland school system during this past year, and we look forward with confidence to the continuation of the trend of acquisition of teachers of experience whose major training has been in academic subjects. Indeed, it is the policy of the Committee to establish conditions which favor not only the acquisition but the retention of teachers of outstanding experience, training, and ability and, further, that increasing weight be given to the depth of academic training achieved by our teachers. This policy will undoubtedly tend to increase the median teacher's salary, but we shall be more than repaid by the increase in the quality of teaching.

The approaching stabilization in the size of the physical plant and student population has led to moves to systematize the process of building the school budget through a process of the establishment of per capita norms for expenditures in the areas of supplies related to teaching, custodial supplies, and custodial staffing. It is hoped that this program can be extended further in the coming years. In addition, a regular program of replacement and maintenance of the school buildings will be initiated soon, beginning first in the older buildings, the Junior High School and the Cochituate School.

The School Committee wishes to thank the Town, the parents and those citizens who have given so generously of their time to serve on various committees established by the School Committee for their deep interest and enthusiastic support. We are also deeply appreciative of the energy and initiative of the Administration and the teaching staff, and we commend the custodial, secretarial, and cafeteria workers for their diligent attention to detail. We should also like to thank other departments of the town for their friendly cooperation and generous help to the school system.

In this, the sixty-eighth Annual Report of the Superintendent of the Wayland Public Schools, the Superintendent wishes to review some of the changes affected in the schools during the last year, along with mention of various projects currently underway.

A committee consisting of teachers and administrators formulated a statement on the philosophy of the Wayland Public Schools. The philosophy was discussed at length with the School Committee and adopted as a formal guide to programs as they are instituted in the schools. The philosophy is reproduced here for general information.

"The purpose of the Wayland Schools is to provide an education that will develop the individual's intellectual capacities by furnishing him with the basic skills for learning, and by fostering in him a spirit of inquiry.

The school can help the student become an effective member of society with superior standards by developing in him the ability to think critically, logically, and creatively.

We endeavor to instill in each student an understanding of the American heritage, and his rights and responsibilities as a citizen in our democracy."

The reading program curriculum for the elementary schools has been moving from a single text approach to one based on multi-text use.

The basic program now being written will rest upon the acquisition of a sequential series of reading skills that will allow for a maximum level of individual accomplishment and less regard for the student's grade placement.

The program in remedial reading has been expanded to include students who read poorly for whatever reason. The reading teacher position at the High School is being changed from three to five days per week in order to provide for the expansion. During the summer of 1965 a reading program will be developed which can be used in selected classes at the High School.

All elementary teachers are attending a modern mathematics content course which will carry through for the full school year. The small-group work done with some students at the Junior High School in mathematics is a continuation of the strengthening of the program at the elementary level. Large-group mathematics classes have been discontinued at the High School and replaced with

a medium size class. Next year an additional period per week of mathematics is to be taught with a resulting schedule of four regular size classes and one small-group class per week. Various levels or tracks are available which will make it possible to schedule students all the way from General Mathematics in Grade 9 to the Calculus in Grade 12.

Work continues on the courses being taken by the non-collegebound pupil in order to better equip these young people for the responsibilities of the world of work. It is hoped that the workstudy program will continue its development and acceptance.

Moving to the non-academic areas, it is heartening to state that all elementary pupils will have art and music once a week next year. Physical education is also scheduled one period per week until Grade 6 is reached at which time students take gym twice-a-week.

One guidance counselor to serve the four elementary schools will aid teachers, principals, and parents with pupils experiencing personal or academic difficulties. Though it is a minimum staffing in this area, the benefits to be derived from the addition should become apparent at once to those working with children requiring such specialized attention.

With the completion of the Happy Hollow addition by the Fall of 1965, all elementary schools will have suitable library space. Library aide time has been increased next year to provide coverage in the elementary schools for five hours on each of four school days. The Junior High School and High School have full-time school librarians. We wish to continue the growth of the libraries to about 6,000 volumes in each elementary school, 10,000 volumes at the Junior High School, and 15,000-20,000 volumes at the High School.

The education program in the community is the result of a total Town enterprise and commitment. Excellence in the schools is possible only through the kind of support and interest which the residents continue to show in their schools.

To the School Committee:

It is with pleasure that I herewith submit my fifth annual report since joining the Wayland Public Schools in September, 1959. In planning for building and budgets, it is necessary as a first step to forecast the numbers of pupils expected in the years ahead. The "ten year enrollment projection", as it is commonly called, is updated annually on the first of October and then it becomes the underlying factor in determining the needs for major school building units or school additions. It also serves as the starting point in a three month process in establishing the School Budget for the subsequent year.

A large entering first grade in September of 1965 will cause enrollment increases to rise again reaching 5.4% or 174 new pupils. It is expected in years to follow, that the percentage increase will gradually decrease (see enrollment projections).

In 1964, norms were established and operated as a method of controlling costs by correlating expenditures to enrollments. The 1965 School Budget will provide a second year of experience in the use of norms in the various instructional areas with further plans for expansion to other areas in the School Budget.

In 1965 the expenditure section will be distinctly different from any previous year in order to comply with the following State recommendations:

- To provide proper recording of financial transaction
- Accounts will provide data which can be used in comparing costs with other districts
- Accounts will provide financial data that can be used in determining the cost of educational programs and other items of educational data

Equal to the task of building and administrating a School Budget is the important phase of budget analysis. Translating the educational program into a financial plan requires also that a follow-up study be made to determine if the educational plan has been realized and whether the Budget has been adequate for reaching those educational goals.

The need for funds and facilities develops from the local community through increased enrollments and the specific needs of the community. Every effort has been made to keep the cost consistent with sound economy - without dictating educational shortcomings for our children. At the local level, cities and towns have been burdened with almost the total cost of education. The state and federal levels, however, are indicating that additional funds

will be made available.

Wayland has been in the unique position to have received maximum state aid in the construction of new school buildings.

Although renovations of buildings have not received state aid, there has been some effort made in the improvement of the older school buildings in Wayland; such as, the Cochituate library and cafeteria renovations. There is now the need for more in-depth examination of our older buildings toward a plant modernization program for the Wayland Junior High and the Cochituate School buildings. There is increased evidence which points to reimbursements from the State becoming available in this area.

The Audio Visual Department of the schools, which was centralized in 1964, and with representation from each of the six schools has progressed with continued improvements being made in some of the following areas:

- 1. Standardization of equipment and supplies
- 2. Better purchasing through central storage
- 3. Greater exchange of equipment and films among schools

There are many services non-educational by school definition but which are necessary and essential to all school systems.

The cafeteria operation financed through federal aid and lunch receipts and under the direction of Mrs. Dorothy Bowers has served more than 270,000 meals during 1964 in the six school cafeterias.

In 1964, a new three year contract was signed for 15 school buses to provide school transportation totaling over 125,000 miles annually. On a daily basis approximately 2,300 children are being transported to and from school.

School buildings which are valued at over 7 million dollars are being maintained daily by the custodial staff.

The School Department again appreciated the cooperation and assistance of other town departments and also the Parmenter Health Center during the past year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TOWN GOVERNMENT

This Committee carries on a continuing study of the operations of the Town's government. Improvements recommended and adopted in past years, include the following:

- 1. The formation of a Code Enforcement Committee to coordinate the enforcement work of the Health, Fire, Building and other departments. Such Committees are now being formed in Boston and other cities and towns.
- 2. The consolidation of the Cemetery, Tree, and Moth Departments.
- 3. Centralization of garage facilities for various town departments, a step towards the desirable objective of consolidating the various public works functions of the Town.
- 4. The employment of a Town Surveyor.

During the past year, the Committee has continued its study of two items discussed in last year's report.

Real Estate Advisory Committee:

Another area which requires coordination of the work of a number of Town Officers and Departments is real estate. When questions arise as to whether land owned by the Town should be disposed of, or should be held and allocated to one Town purpose or another, or when the acquisition of land appears desirable, all officials and departments which may be concerned should be consulted and should work together. Furthermore, comprehensive planning is essential in certain areas, and in such planing, the various officials and departments should confer and coordinate their plans. The Committee accordingly met with all of the various officials and departments concerned, to explore the problem and to develop the most effective and efficient machinery. Informal meetings were also held to consider specific problems currently requiring decisions. An article has been placed in the Warrant for the Annual Town Meeting calling for the creation of a permanent Real Estate Advisory Committee.

Public Safety Department:

For a number of years, the Committee has favored the eventual combining of the Fire and Police Departments under one administrative head, in order to make possible a combined

communications center, and other improvements and economies in service. At an appropriate time, this Committee proposes to submit to the Town for its consideration, an article which would make provision for such a change.

DEFINITIONS

- SURPLUS REVENUE The amount by which the cash, accounts receivable and other assets exceed the liabilities and reserves.
- EXCESS AND DEFICIENCY (E and D) Same as SURPLUS REVENUE
- FREE CASH Surplus Revenue less outstanding taxes.
- OVERLAY Amount raised by the Assessors to create a fund to cover abatements.
- RESERVE FUND Amount transferred from Overlay Surplus and/or appropriated for emergency or unforseen purposes, controlled exclusively by the Finance Committee.
- AVAILABLE FUNDS Free Cash, reserves and unexpended balances available for appropriation.
- CHAPTER 90 General Laws which provide for contributions by the State and County for construction and maintenance of certain Town ways, usually roads leading from one main road to another.
- MATCHING FUNDS Amounts made available by special State and Federal Acts to supplement local appropriations for specific projects.
- CHERRY SHEET Details of State and County charges and reimbursements used in determining the Tax Rate. Known as "Cherry Sheet" due to the color of paper used.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Mr. George K. Lewis was re-elected to the Board of Selectmen at the Annual Town Election on March 1, 1965.

The Board organized for the year with Mr. Frank S. Tarr as Chairman; Mr. George K. Lewis, Clerk; and Mr. Thomas Francis Linnehan, as Third Member.

The Selectmen met regularly on the first and third Monday evenings of each month, and held in addition, numerous other meetings during weekdays and weekends with State and County Officials, with members of Boards of adjacent towns, or with members of other Boards in Wayland on matters of common concern.

Mr. Tarr served on the Committee to study the use of Voting Machines, the Route 20 Bypass Committee, and is a member of the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority. Mr. Lewis served on the Committee on Code Enforcement, and on two special committees to study the replacement of War Memorials, and on the Historic Districts Committee. Mr. Linnehan served on the Town Government Committee.

During the year, the Selectmen made the regular appointments of Town Officials not elected by ballot, and to other non-elected boards.

Last year, two distinguished former members of this Board died in Wayland. Mr. William A. Loker and Mr. John W. Leavitt. Both of these gentlemen served the Town long and well. For many years, while Wayland was a small town, and then during its rapid post-World War II growth, Messrs. Loker and Leavitt gave guidance to the townspeople in their public life. Their record includes not only service as Selectmen, but serving on other important Town boards and committees. Mr. Loker came to represent the Yankee sense of thrift, and wise disposition of resources. His voice could often be heard pertinently questioning a town expenditure that others had somehow overlooked. Mr. Leavitt seemed to many of us, to stand for integrity. His quiet dignity and firmness, set a tone for town government and public behavior that many of us have hoped to follow.

The past success and future prospect of our unique system of town government, rests upon men of the stature and devotion of men and women like these two Wayland citizens.

Other regular activities of the Board included the drawing of jurors, the disbursement of income from the Charitable Funds, the issuance of licenses, the approval of all bills incurred by other Town departments, and the acceptance of Town roads, and the initiation of Better-

ments. The Board also acted in several cases of private complaints or disputes of a local nature.

The general powers and responsibilities of Selectmen in this Commonwealth are quite ill-defined if measured by statute and act. The Selectmen, in one sense, over-view the entire operation of the Town, respecting, of course, the autonomy and statutory responsibility of many other elected Town Boards and Officials.

Frequently, however, the Selectmen call matters of general town concern to the attention of other Boards where we feel problems have arisen or may be imminent. In the same manner, the Selectmen frequently act as coordinators of the town programs. In this respect, the Board's Executive Secretary, Mr. Norman E. Taylor, helps immeasurably. This year we would like, in addition, to recognize the silent service of Neva Jones.

The Selectmen wish to close on a note of cautious optimism. The Town is, in general, in good shape. Our need for public facilities and equipment is largely met for some time; we are well staffed with experienced and devoted personnel. Our finances, while not as rich and secure as one could always desire, are in sound hands. We have handled our unprecedented "population explosion" about as successfully as any similar community in Massachusetts. We should, therefore, take time every now and then, to look beyond the petty problems and immediate chores of today, and take stock of the long-term picture. We have a pretty fine Town.

VOTES ENACTED AT THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

HELD: WEDNESDAY, MARCH 3, 1965

Town Clerk's Office Wayland, Massachusetts

Roger P. Stokey, Moderator: --

Pursuant to the Warrant dated January 30th, 1965, signed by George K. Lewis, Frank S. Tarr and Thomas F. Linnehan, Selectmen, served and return of service given by Ernest H. Damon, Constable, the inhabitants of the Town of Wayland, qualified to vote in Town Meeting, met this day; and at 7:49 P. M. the Moderator called the meeting to order, declared a quorum to be present, and the meeting proceeded to transact the following business:

Upon a Motion of Mr. Robert M. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That the Moderator omit the reading of the Articles.

The first vote (voice) was not unanimous.

The second vote, a rising uncounted vote gave a single "No" vote.

The third vote was unanimously in favor of the motion.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That consideration of Articles 1 and 2 be deferred until the meeting has acted upon and disposed of Articles 3 through 26.

- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to further amend the Town Bylaw establishing the Wage and Salary Classification Plan, as amended, in any of the following respects; and establish the effective dates for any changes by such amendments:
 - (a) Amend Article II, Section 1 of said Plan by changing any of the salary and wage rates or designations or descriptions of any position classifications specified in said section or adding thereto.
 - (b) Amend Article III, Section 1, by changing the specified number of hours for the regular work week for any positions.
 - (c) Amend Article III, Section 2, to read as follows:

"Any salaried employee required to work overtime in any week shall be given compensatory time off, if practicable, and as soon as practicable. If it is impossible to allow compensatory time off without unduly interfering with the work of the department, the employee shall be compensated for overtime work at an hourly rate based on the annual rate of the employee's salary, except that firefighters, employed on an annual salary basis, and also serving as a 'Call Firefighter', shall be paid when employed as a 'Call Firefighter' at the Call Firefighter's hourly rate of pay. When serving a full day or night shift, Firefighters shall be paid at the 'Call Firefighter--full Day or Night Shift' rate of pay.''

(d) Add Article III, Section 5, to read as follows:

"Section 5. Police Officers who are requested to appear in Court during off-hours will be compensated at their regular straight-time pay, less Court fee, for actual time spent making such appearances, including travel and waiting time."

(e) Amend Article V-B, Section 2, to read as follows:

"Full time Police and Fire Department personnel assigned to duty on a holiday shall receive straight-time pay for the hours actually worked in addition to their regular pay,"

(f) Amend Article V-C, Section 1, to read as follows:

"Each permanent employee shall accumulate sick leave at the rate of one day a month. Sick leave will not be accumulated by an employee for any calendar month in which he is absent due to illness or leave of absence for more than 20 consecutive working days. Sick leave is for the protection of employees against loss of pay because of illness and shall not be taken into account in figuring termination pay."

(g) Amend Article V-C, Section 2, to read as follows:

"If on sick leave, an employee may be compensated at his regular rate of pay for absences of not more than three (3) consecutive working days, provided the employing agency is satisfied that the absence was caused by the employee's illness. Sick leave with pay will be allowed for more than three (3) consecutive working days only upon submission of a doctor's certificate satisfactory to the employing agency, which certificate will be filed with the Town Accountant. Such payment for sick leave may not exceed the employee's accrued sick leave benefit."

(h) Add Article V-D, entitled "Leave of Absence," Section 1 of which is to read as follows: "SECTION 1. Any employee may apply for a leave of absence without pay. The application must be approved by both the employing agency and the Personnel Board and will be granted only under unusual conditions. If a leave of absence is granted, no provision of this plan will apply, and seniority will not accrue during this absence."

or take any action relative to any of the foregoing proposed amendments.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Thomas D. Monaco, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That Article II, Section 1 of the Town Bylaw establishing a Wage and Salary Classification Plan, as heretofore amended, be further amended by substituting for the present "Schedule of Salaries & Wage Rates for Classified Positions" the proposed basic "Schedule of Salaries & Wage Rates for Classified Positions 1965", as shown in the printed Finance Committee Report, following the Budget figures, with the following changes:

(1) Change the line for Police Sergeant to read as follows:

"Police Sergeant (44 Hrs.) \$6,250 6,430 6,600 6,780 6,960 7,130"

(2) Change the line for Police Patrolman to read as follows:

"Patrolman (44 Hrs.) \$5,430 5,600 5,760 5,920 6,090 6,250"

these changes to be effective beginning with the first pay period following final adjournment of this Town Meeting.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Monaco, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That Article III, Section 1 of the Town Bylaw establishing a Wage and Salary Classification Plan, as heretofore amended, be further amended by striking out the second and third sentences and substituting therefor the following two sentences:

"The regular work week for Fire Department personnel shall be 56 hours and for Police Department personnel shall be 44 hours. The regular work week for all other Town Employees shall be 40 hours."

Upon a Motion of Mr. Monaco, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That Article III, Section 2, of the Town Bylaw establishing a Wage & Salary Classification Plan, as heretofore amended, be further amended by striking out the entire section and substituting therefor a new section to read as follows:

"SECTION 2. Any salaried employee required to work overtime in any week shall be given compensatory time off, if practicable, and as soon as practicable. If it is impossible to allow compensatory time off without unduly interfering with the work of the department, the employee shall be compensated for overtime work at an hourly rate based on the annual rate of the employee's salary, except that a firefighter, employed on an annual salary basis, and also serving as a "Call Firefighter", shall be paid when employed as a "Call Firefighter" at the Call Firefighter's hourly rate of pay. When serving an extra full day or night shift, a Firefighter shall be paid at the "Call Firefighter-full Day or Night Shift" rate of pay.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Roy Fine, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That Article III of the Town Bylaw establishing a Wage & Salary Classification Plan, as heretofore amended, be further amended by adding a new section to read as follows:

"SECTION 5. Police Officers who are requested to appear in Court during off-hours will be compensated at their regular straight-time pay, less Court fee, for actual time spent making such appearances, including travel and waiting time at Court, on approval of the overtime by the Police Chief."

Upon a Motion of Mr. Edwin T. Marston, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That Article V-B, Section 2, of the Town Bylaw establishing a Wage & Salary Classification Plan, as heretofore amended, be further amended by striking out the entire section and substituting therefor a new section to read as follows:

"SECTION 2. Full-time Police and Fire Department personnel assigned to duty on a holiday shall receive straight-time pay for the hours actually worked in addition to their regular pay."

Upon a Motion of Mr. John J. Pratt, Jr., duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That Article V-C, Section 1, of the Town Bylaw establishing a Wage & Salary Classification Plan, as heretofore amended, be further amended by striking out the entire section and substituting therefor a new section to read as follows:

"SECTION 1. Each permanent employee shall accumulate sick leave at the rate of one day a month. Sick leave will not be accumulated by an employee for any calendar month in which he is absent due to illness or leave of absence for more than 20 consecutive working days. Sick leave is for the protection of employees against loss of pay because of illness and shall not be taken into account in figuring termination pay.";

and that Article V-C, Section 2, of said Bylaw, as heretofore amended, be further amended by striking out the entire section and substituting therefor a new section to read as follows:

"SECTION 2. If on sick leave, an employee may be compensated at his regular rate of pay for absences of not more than three (3) consecutive working days, provided the employing agency is satisfied that the absence was caused by the employee's illness. Sick leave with pay will be allowed for more than three (3) consecutive working days only upon submission of a doctor's certificate satisfactory to the employing agency, which certificate will be filed with the Town Accountant. Such payment for sick leave may not exceed the employee's accrued sick leave benefit."

Upon a Motion of Mr. Edwin T. Marston, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town Bylaw establishing a Wage & Salary Classification Plan, as heretofore amended, be further amended, by adding a new Section, Article V-D, entitled "Leave of Absence", Section 1 of which is to read as follows:

ARTICLE V-D

LEAVE OF ABSENCE

"SECTION 1. Any employee may apply for a leave of absence without pay. The application must be approved by both the employing agency and the Personnel Board and will be granted only under unusual conditions. If a leave of absence is granted, no provision of this plan will apply, and seniority will not accrue during this absence."

Article 4. To grant money for necessary Town purposes.

Duly seconded, Mr. Morgan offered the following MOTION: That the report of the Finance Committee be accepted and its recommendations be adopted; that \$3,512,720.90, with the addition of \$614.98 for Police Department - Police Sergeants (making a total of \$13,588.70 and with the addition of \$3,299.44 for Police Department - Patrolmen (making a total of \$79,030.00) be granted, appropriated and assessed for the several purposes, designated, making a total budget of \$3,516,635.32 and that the same be expended only for the purposes shown under the respective boards, committees and officers of the Town; and that

All employees in the Town Office Building, other than elected officials and those of the Police and Fire Departments, come under the supervision of the Executive Secretary and that he be charged with

the operation of both Town Office Buildings and their equipment;

The operation of the dumps be under the supervision of the Highway Department;

The money from Dog Taxes be allocated in its entirety to the Library;

The Senior Public Health Nurse, Public Health Nurses No. II, and Nursing Assistants be under the supervision of the Board of Health;

The appropriation under Highway Department for "Heavy Equipment--Special Account" and Fire Department for "Purchase--Major Equipment," be maintained as funds against future purchases and not be expended without further direct vote of the Town:

The Town Collector continue to act as Collector for the Water Department, that he be directed to charge fees for demands on overdue water bills and that the sums so collected be credited by the Collector to the Water Department, and that all fees and penalties be turned over to the Town as Town Income;

The appropriation for "Hydrant Rental" of \$10,000 for the Water Department granted in the budget, be transferred to "Water Available Surplus";

In addition to the sum of \$1,500 included in the budget to meet the Town's share of "Chapter 90 - Maintenance" and \$6,700 to meet the Town's share of "Chapter 90 - New Construction", the sum of \$3,000 for "Chapter 90 - Maintenance" and \$20,100 for "Chapter 90 - New Construction" be transferred from "Unappropriated Available Funds" in the Treasury to meet the County's and State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursement from the County and State to be restored upon their receipt to "Unappropriated Available Funds" in the Treasury;

The office of Town Clerk be retained on a salary basis and that all fees from whatever source derived be turned over to the Town as Town Income;

All fees, wages or payments made to the Tree Warden, from whatever source, be turned over to the Town as Town Income.

To meet the appropriations under Welfare Department, \$4,000 for Clerk, \$1,500 for Administration Expense and \$1,600 for New Car, it is recommended that there be transferred \$5,600 from "Federal Grants Aid--Aid to Dependent Children--Administration" and \$1,500 from "Federal Grants Aid--Medical Assistance to Aged --Administration."

portion between the ********since it followed exactly the wording printed in the Finance Committee's report and distributed with the Warrant, starting at paragraph 3 on page 31 and including paragraphs one and three on page 32 of said Report.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Ziffer, duly seconded: To delete \$4,240.00 under Item 4 - Highway Dept. (p. 39) providing for a Mechanic, it was

VOTED: In the negative.

Duly seconded, Mr. Morgan offered a Motion: Of the appropriation of \$5,000 for sidewalk construction (Highway Dept. Item #28, p. 42) there shall be applied to sidewalk construction on Main Street such amount as was previously voted and not spent. This was withdrawn by unanimous consent of the meeting, pending a conference between the Finance Committee and Mrs. Francis J. Hartin (Florence M.) who initially had raised a question in this connection.

Duly seconded, Mrs. Richard E. Robinson (Barbara D.) offered a MOTION: To delete \$7,000.00 provided for Mosquito Control (Item #19 under Board of Health (p. 39) and to appoint a Committee to study this question.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Frederic H. Newton, duly seconded, "The Previous Question" it was

VOTED: First two votes gave scattering "No's" Third vote was unanimously in favor.

Upon Mrs. Robinson's Motion, it was VOTED: In the negative.

Duly seconded, Mr. Robert H. Charnock offered a MOTION: That the Board of Health be instructed to study the Mosquito Control question and report to the next Annual Town Meeting in this connection.

Pratt, having qualified himself as a professional entimologist, and as a widely recognized expert on such matters, expressed a heavy doubt as to the legal right of any town to remove from the market any commercially distributed commodities, as were here involved, and which had been passed upon and approved for sale by the Federal Food and Drug Administration.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That when this meeting adjourns, it adjourn to Monday evening, March 8, 1965, at 7:45 P. M. at this location; and that if subsequent meetings be required, they be held on Wednesdays and Mondays until the Warrant has been disposed of.

Duly seconded, Mr. Lyle B. Martin offered the following MOTION: That the Finance Committee Budget, as shown on Page 46 of the Report of the Finance Committee for 1965, be amended by inserting as an additional item after the summary of the School Department budget, "Kindergarten Operation - Salaries, Supplies and Transportation - \$6,050."

Upon a Motion of Mr. McEnroy, duly seconded: To adjourn the Meeting until March 8th it was

VOTED: In the negative.

The first vote was questioned by Mr. McEnroy.

The second vote, a rising, uncounted vote was also declared in the negative; but was not questioned.

Upon a Motion duly seconded, of Mr. Newton, it was VOTED: "The Previous Question"

Upon Mr. Martin's Motion, the first vote was in doubt. The second vote, a rising, uncounted vote, was declared in favor. Seven persons having doubted this vote, there was a

COUNTED VOTE: "Yes" 173 "No" 130

Upon a Motion of Mr. McEnroy, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To adjourn the meeting to next Monday at 7:45 P. M.

First vote was declared in doubt.

The second vote, a rising, uncounted vote was declared in favor.

Roger P. Stokey, Moderator: --

Pursuant to the Warrant for the 1965 Annual Town Meeting, duly signed by the Selectmen, served and return of service given by a Constable of the Town, and a continuance being held in accordance with a vote taken at the March 3, 1965, session of said Annual Town Meeting, the inhabitants of the Town of Wayland qualified to vote in Town Meeting, met this day; and at 7:48 P. M. the Moderator called the meeting to order, declared a quorum to be present, and the meeting proceeded to transact the following business:

Article 4.; And the consideration of the Budget had been still open and under discussion at the close of the previous session.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Laurence S. Fordham, duly seconded, it was VOTED: (1) That the summer kindergarten program be permitted to go into effect on a trial basis for one year only;

- (2) That the School Committee study and evaluate the program and report back to the Town at the next Annual Town Meeting as to whether the Committee's objective, of providing a meaningful kindergarten experience for children who otherwise would not have attended kindergarten, is being accomplished; and
- (3) That if the Committee thinks that the program should be continued, it is the sense of the Town that a separate article should be inserted for consideration at the next annual town meeting so that the matter can be considered again by the town independently of the regular school budget.

Mr. John B. Higley offered a Motion: To decrease Item #34 on page 38 by \$700 and increase Item #30 by \$700.

The Moderator requested Mr. Higley, for the sake of clarity of understanding, to divide this Motion.

Duly seconded, Mr. Higley offered a Motion: To decrease Item #34 on page 38 by \$700.

Mr. Robert M. Morgan asked permission to amend this Motion by changing the amount of the decrease; but the Moderator requested that such a Motion be deferred until Mr. Higley's Motion had been voted upon.

Mr. Higley's Motion was VOTED: In the negative.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To reduce Item 34 on Page 38 by \$1,000 leaving the appropriation at \$4,000; and to instruct the Selectmen to submit this position to the Personnel/Wage Board for Study.

Upon a Motion, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To delete Item 5 on Page 49 (\$600.00) for the Veterans of Foreign Wars Headquarters).

Mr. Carl E. Pearson offered to make a Motion relating to the formation of a new Sidewalk Study Committee. The Moderator, because no appropriation was involved in the Motion, and to assure clarity of understanding, requested that such Motion be deferred until after a vote had been taken upon the Main (Budget) Motion.

Upon the Main (Budget) Motion, as previously amended, it was VOTED: Unanimously: In favor.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Pearson, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town establish a committee of five (5) to consist of one member of the Planning Board, one member of the Road Commission, one member of the School Committee, one member of the Finance Committee, each to be designated by their respective boards or committees, and a fifth member at large to be appointed by the four so designated; that the committee be charged with making an evaluation of the rate of progress, and associated cost, of the proposed sidewalk program, as reported to the town meeting of 1962; and with making a study and recommendations with respect to:

- (1) appropriate revisions of that program, and plans for making it more effective and vigorous;
- (2) the feasibility of extending that program so as to include a footpath, and possibly a bicycle path, alongside the more heavily traveled main roads in Wayland;

and that such Committee report to the next Annual Town Meeting.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town, as provided by General Laws (Tercentenary Edition) Chapter 41, Section 108, and set the effective date of such salary and compensation.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Roger E. Ela, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town, as voted under Article 4, the effective date of such salary and compensation to be from January 1, 1965.

Article 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1965, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than a year, in accordance with Section 4, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Herbert O'Dell, Jr., duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1965, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than a year, in accordance with Section 4, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell, or otherwise dispose of the following:

- (1) The Police Department's present two 1964 Chevrolet Station Wagons;
- (2) The Highway Department's present 1947 Farm All Tractor Loader, the 1956 International Tractor Loader, and the 1956 Diamond T Chassis and Dump Body;
- (3) The Welfare Department's present 1960 Chevrolet Sedan;
- (4) The Park Department's present 1958 International Pick-up Truck;
- (5) The Water Department's present 1962 1/2-ton Ford Pick-up, in connection with the purchase of new equipment by the respective departments; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Ela, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell or otherwise dispose of the property described in the Article, in each instance in the manner described.

Article 8. To see if the Town will appropriate sums of money for the Water Department, determine whether the money shall be provided for by appropriation from available funds in the Treasury, by taxation and/or by borrowing; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Ela, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That the Town appropriate the sum of \$118,819.31 for the following purposes and that to meet the appropriation, the sum be taken

(1) Water Coupon Notes, Bonds and Registered Notes maturing in 1965 - Payment of Principal	\$11,500.00

Upon a Motion of Mr. Odell, it was

VOTED: That there be appropriated the sum of \$7,000.00 for the purchase of a new tractor back hoe for the use of the Highway Department, and that to meet such appropriation there be transferred from "Highway Department - Heavy Equipment" special account, the sum of \$7,000.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and assess a sum of money for the reconstruction and improvement of Chapter 90 Roads, said money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be allotted by the State or County, or both, for this purpose, the work to be done under the supervision of the Road Commissioners; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Ela, duly seconded, it was

VOTED: That the Town appropriate and assess the sum of \$6,700 for the reconstruction and improvement of Cochituate Road, said money to be used in conjunction with whatever money may be extended by the County or State, or both for this purpose, the work to be done under the

supervision of the Road Commissioners, with the limitation that no more than \$1.00 of the Town money be expended for each \$1.00 of County money and \$2.00 of State money.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept various conveyances, gifts, and devises to the Town; or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Frank W. Kilburn offered the following MOTION: That the Town accept with thanks the following gifts:

- From Phyllis E. Campbell, a portion of a parcel of land shown on Plate 47C of the Town Atlas as land of Ethel J. Dudley - 42,900 sq. ft. - located on Southwesterly side of the extension of Bent Avenue;
- 2. From Ethel J. Dudley, a parcel of land shown on Plate 47C of the Town Atlas, as land of Ethel J. Dudley 4,530 sq. ft. more or less located on the Southerly side of Bent Avenue at the corner of Cottage Road, and otherwise described as Lots #90 #91;
- 3. From Mary R. Goodnoh, a parcel of land shown as "Parcel A to be deeded to the Town of Wayland for Highway Purposes" on a plan entitled, "Plan of Land in Wayland, Mass. Owned by Mary R. Goodnoh, February 25, 1965, Survey by MacCarthy Engineering Service, Inc., Natick, Mass., Nashoba Survey Co., Inc., Marlborough" Mass." containing approximately 2,000 sq. ft. located at the corner of Pond Drive and a Right of Way;
- 4. From Braintree Lakeview Realty Company, Inc., a certain parcel of land situated in Wayland, Mass., on the Southerly side of Simpson Road, containing 14,000 sq. ft. of land more or less, as shown on a plan entitled, "Lakeshore Acres at Wayland, Mass., subdivision of land in Wayland, Mass., June 15, 1953, revised July 22, 1953, Bradford Saivetz, C. E., Quincy, Mass." and further described as follows:

While Mr. and Mrs. Wilson conferred with the Town Counsel about the wording of their desired amendment, the meeting proceeded to

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the transfer of all or any part of funds remaining in the account of "Chapter 90 Construction - Old Connecticut Path 1964" to Chapter 90 Construction - Cochituate Road 1965"; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Ela, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That there be transferred the sum of \$10,000 from "Chapter 90 Construction - Old Connecticut Path 1964" to Chapter 90 Construction - Cochituate Road 1965".

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Bylaws to provide for a permanent committee to be known as the Real Estate Advisory Committee; or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Morgan offered the following MOTION: That the Town Bylaws be amended to provide for a permanent Committee to be known as the Real Estate Advisory Committee,

"ARTICLE 16. REAL ESTATE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

"There shall be a permanent committee of six called the Real Estate Advisory Committee, consisting of one member of the Planning Board, one Park Commissioner, one Highway Commissioner, one member of the Conservation Commission, one member of the Finance Committee, each to be designated by their respective committees, boards or commissions, and the Town Treasurer, ex-officio. It shall be the duty and the responsibility of the Committee to carry on a continuing study as to retention or disposition, for various purposes, of land in Town ownership, Tax Title Possession, or Tax Title. The Committee shall consult with any department which may be concerned with a particular parcel or area of study. The responsibility of the Committee shall be limited to that of making recommendations to the Selectmen, or any department having authority to make disposition."

Upon a Motion, duly seconded, of Mr. Clifford A. Goodnoh, it was VOTED: To amend Mr. Morgan's Motion as follows: "That the Committee consist of nine (9) members; that the Selectmen appoint three (3) members-at-large, who shall hold no other Town office, and who shall serve at the pleasure of the Selectmen".

Upon Mr. Morgan's Motion (subject to Mr. Goodnoh's Amendment) it was

VOTED: In favor.

Because the Town Counsel still was holding conference with Mr. and Mrs. Wilson re: Article 11, Item #4, the Meeting agreed unanimously to defer action under Articles 14 and 15 until Article 11 had been disposed of.

Then Mr. Morgan offered a Motion to postpone action under Articles 16 and 17 until after disposal of Articles 14 and 15; but then he offered a SUBSTITUTE MOTION: To postpone Articles 11, 14-17 until after Article #35.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Arbuckle, duly seconded, "The Previous Question" -- it was

VOTED: First vote gave a scattering "No".

Second vote was unanimously in favor.

Upon Mr. Morgan's Motion, it was VOTED: In the negative.

Article 11. The conference of the Town Counsel with Mr. and Mrs. Wilson having arrived at a stalemate, Mrs. Wilson had decided not to withdraw her previous Motion to delete Item 4 from Article 11 (Mr. Kilburn's Motion). Upon Mrs. Wilson's Motion, it was

VOTED: In the negative. This vote having been challenged, there

was a rising, uncounted vote; again declared in the negative.

Mr. Wilson's Motion: That parcel #4 be accepted only if reserved for use of residents of the area was again ruled out of order by the Town Counsel and the Moderator.

Upon the Main Motion, it was VOTED: Unanimously: In favor.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Public Town Way the road known as Mansion Road, as shown on a plan on file with the Town Clerk entitled, "Plan of Mansion Road in Wayland, Mass. as Laid Out by the Board of Selectmen January 1965, Wayland Engineering Department"; to authorize the Board of Selectmen to acquire the necessary land or interests therein for laying out and/or construction of said road, including easements for drainage and slope, by purchase, gift, eminent domain or otherwise; to appropriate and assess a sum of money for the acquisiton of such land or interests therein and for other costs in connection therewith, and for construction of said road and drainage and other installations in connection therewith; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Town dispense with the reading of the Order of Laying-out of the Board of Selectmen, in connection with this Article.

Duly seconded, Mr. Morgan offered the following

Mr. William C. Moyer, Chairman, presented the Report of the Committee Opposing Overhead High Tension Lines, and filed a copy of the Report with the Town Clerk.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Moyer, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To accept the Report and to continue the Committee for another year, and to instruct it to report to the next Annual Town Meeting.

Mr. Theodore R. Magoun pointed out that the Report of the Recreational Advisory Committee would be found in the Town Report.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Magoun, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To accept the report of the Recreational Advisory Committee and to continue the Committee for another year.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To accept the Reports of all Committees contained in the Annual Town Report.

Upon a Motion of Mr. John B. Gregory, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That the Moderator appoint a Committee to Study Methods of Insect, Vegetation Control, and the use of synthetic detergents with particular attention to long-term effects on health, contamination of the water supply and stream pollution, and to report back to the Town on or before the next Annual Town Meeting; the committee to consist of the Superintendent of the Cemetery, Tree & Moth Departments, one member each from the Board of Health, the Water Commissioners and the Conservation Commission to be selected by their respective boards and three members-at-large to be named by the Moderator.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Magoun, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That the Committee to Study Voting Machines and Voting Precincts be continued for another year.

Mr. George K. Lewis started to report for the Historical District Study Committee, but was persuaded to postpone the remainder of the report until Article 36, which related to his Report.

Mr. Laurence S. Fordham summarized the Report of the Committee to Study the Chapter 90 Road Program, pointing out that copies of the full report were available at the door, and on the Moderator's platform; a copy of the Report was also filed with the Town Clerk.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Hanns J. Wetzstein, duly seconded, it was VOTED: That it is the sense of this meeting that the license of the Dudley Chateau Club, Inc. to sell alcoholic beverages should not be renewed by the Board of Selectmen, or should be renewed only upon such terms and subject to such conditions as will assure (1) that the Dudley Chateau Club, Inc. is operated as a non-profit organization in accordance with the requirements of law, (2) that there is no change

of use, or increase in capacity in conformity with zoning regulations applicable to non-conforming use, and (3) that there is no greater activity at the club, and no greater interference with residential uses in the area, under the present management than there has been under the former management.

Wetland Conservancy Regulations.
Section XC

- (a) The purpose of this section is to promote the health, safety, convenience and welfare of the inhabitants of the Town, and specifically to preserve the ground water table upon which the Town depends for water supply, to control the flow from water sources and brooks and streams which are tributary to water courses within the Flood Plain District, to protect against pollution, to inform and counsel the inhabitants with respect to lands which are, because of water conditions, not suitable for building, leaching or other uses, to preserve open spaces, and preserve and increase the amenities of the Town. In a Conservancy Area any use otherwise permitted by this Bylaw shall be permitted except that (i) no building or structure shall be erected, constructed, placed, altered, enlarged or extended, and no dumping or excavating shall be done in a Conservancy Area; and (ii) no channeling, filling, damming, diverting or ditching of any brook, pond, swamp, or other permanent or seasonal water course shall be done in a Conservancy Area unless a permit therefor has been issued by the Conservation Commission after a hearing with due notice given. Said permit shall state the conditions under which such channeling, filling, damming, diverting and/or ditching may be done in a Conservancy Area.
- (b) Any person desiring a permit to channel, fill, dam, divert and/or ditch any brook, pond, swamp or other permanent or seasonal water course in a Conservancy Area shall submit an application to the Town Clerk who shall trasmit it forthwith to the Conservation Commission. The application shall be accompanied by plans of the proposed work and of the premises on which it is to be done.
- (c) The Commission shall issue a permit under this section if it finds that the proposed channeling, filling, damming, diverting or ditching will improve, or will not materially derogate from, the existing condition of such brook, pond, or swamp. The Commission shall be deemed to have issued the permit applied for if it shall allow forty-five (45) days to elapse after receipt of an application without

acting thereon.

- (d) The provisions of this Section XC are applicable to Conservancy Areas in whatever District situated, and nothing herein contained shall limit the applicability of other provisions of the Zoning Bylaws.
- (e) The area and frontage of any lot for the purpose of ascertaining the minimum required shall include such parts thereof as lie within a Conservancy Area.
- (f) The provisions of Section IV of the Zoning Bylaws shall be applicable to existing buildings, structures and uses in a Conservancy Area; and nothing in this Section XC shall be deemed to prohibit the maintenance or repair of any dam or other water diversion system existing at the time of designation of the site thereof as a Conservancy Area, nor to prohibit the restoration or reconstruction of such dam or system to the extent reasonably necessary to maintain or restore a then existing pond, watercourse or waterfall;

or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. A. H. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To pass over Article 34.

By unanimous consent of the Meeting, Mr. Lewis omitted to read the detailed description, but a large map of the area in question was shown on a screen).

Mr. Lewis then presented the Report of the Historic District Study Committee, established under Article 43 of the 1963 Annual Town Meeting, relating to this Article.

Mr. Bertelsen then read the Report of the Planning Board with its recommendations, in regard to this Article. Upon Mr. Bertelsen's Motion, it was

Signs and Exterior Lighting

Section XII

Only those signs and exterior lighting as pertain to buildings, structures, or uses permitted in this Bylaw, and on the same premises, are permitted. Yard requirements as otherwise specified in this Bylaw shall apply to signs and exterior lighting fixtures and structures. Signs in districts other than residence districts may not exceed forty square feet in area, and fifteen feet in height, including supporting structures and light sources. Signs attached to buildings may not rise above the front roof line of the building to which attached. Signs must be fixed in position so as not to rotate or oscillate.

Exterior lighting and lighting of signs shall be continuous illumination, not flashing, blinking, or varying in color. Exterior lighting fixtures shall be designed and placed so that the light source shall be completely shielded or diffused so as not to produce glare at any point along the exterior lines of ways adjacent to such premises or at premises in a residential district. Illumination of athletic fields, golf courses and tennis courts is permitted when a special permit is issued by the Board of Appeals under the provisions of Section V (r).

or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Charnock offered the following MOTION: That the Zoning Bylaws be amended by striking out Section (3-c) of Section VI and inserting a new Section XII - Signs and Exterior Lighting as follows:

(By unanimous consent of the Meeting, Mr. Charnock omitted to read the text of the proposed amendment, since it followed exactly the language printed in the Warrant).

Mr. Charnock then read the Report of the Planning Board, with the recommendations of that Board, in regard to this Article.

Duly seconded, there was a

MOTION: To delete the word "completely" from the fourth line of the second paragraph of Mr. Charnock's wording, and to insert the word "substantial" between "produce" and "glare" in the same line.

The second Motion was still under discussion, when a MOTION: To adjourn the Meeting - was not seconded; and then a MOTION: To refer the matter to the Committee, for revision of the wording was restated by the Moderator: To Table the Motion under Article 40 and return it to the Planning Board for further Study. Upon this Motion, it was

VOTED: In favor.

The First vote gave a scattering "No"
The Second vote was unanimous in favor of the Motion.

Article 43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the transfer from Available Funds "Excess and Deficiency Account" to a "Stabilization Fund," a sum of money; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. R. M. Morgan, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That there be transferred from Available Funds "Excess and Deficiency Account" to "Stabilization Fund," the sum of \$100,000.

Before proceeding to Article 44, the Moderator thanked all persons who had contributed to the smooth operation of the Meeting.

Upon the Main Motion, as amended by Mr. Morgan, it was VOTED: The first vote being close, there was a COUNTED VOTE: "Yes" 143 "No" 57

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to increase the size of the Committee on Town Government from five to seven members by adding two members-at-large; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Frederic H. Newton, duly seconded, "To pass over the Article", it was

VOTED: In the Negative.

Duly seconded, Mr. Ernest T. White offered the following MOTION: That the Committee on Town Government be increased from five to seven members by adding two members-at-large, chosen in the same manner as the present at-large members.

Upon a Motion of Mr. John R. McEnroy, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To amend Mr. White's Motion by substituting, "to be chosen by the Board of Selectmen" in place of: "Chosen in the same manner as the present at-large members".

Upon the Main Motion, as amended by Mr. McEnroy's Motion, it was

VOTED: Unanimously: In favor.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Committee on Town Government to study, and report at the 1966 Annual Town Meeting, on the advisability of establishing a Town Recreational Commission to be responsible to plan and operate a program of recreation in the Town; or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Frederick G. Perry, Jr., duly seconded, "To amend the original Motion, so that this Committee should so report to the 1967 Annual Town Meeting, rather than 1966", it was VOTED: In the Negative.

Upon the Main Motion, as originally given, it was VOTED: Unanimously: In favor:

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Law by striking out paragraph (3-c) of Section VI and inserting a new Section XII - Signs and Exterior Lighting - as follows:

Signs and Exterior Lighting

SECTION XII

Only those signs and exterior lighting as pertain to buildings, structures, or uses permitted in this Bylaw, and on the same premises, are permitted. Yard requirements as otherwise specified in this Bylaw shall apply to signs and exterior lighting fixtures and structures. Signs in districts other than residence districts may not exceed forty square feet in area, and fifteen feet in height, including supporting structures and light sources. Signs attached to buildings may not rise above the front roof line of the building to which attached. Signs must be fixed in position so as not to rotate or oscillate.

Exterior lighting and lighting of signs shall be continuous illumination, not flashing, blinking, or varying in color. Exterior lighting fixtures shall be designed and placed so that the light source shall be completely shielded or diffused so as not to produce glare at any point along the exterior lines of ways adjacent to such premises or at premises in a residential district. Illumination of athletic fields, golf courses and tennis courts is permitted when a special permit is issued by the Board of Appeals under the provisions of Section V (r). The provisions of this section do not apply to the seasonal display of lights for the purpose of the celebration of holidays;

or take any action relative thereto.

Duly seconded, Mr. Robert H. Charnock offered the following MOTION: That the Zoning Bylaws be amended by striking out paragraph (3-c) of Section VI and inserting a new Section XII -- Signs and Exterior Lighting -- as follows:

(Mr. Charnock, by unanimous consent of the Meeting, omitted to read the text of the proposed Bylaw change, since it read exactly as printed in the Warrant).

Mr. Charnock then presented the Report of the Planning Board in relation to both Articles 13 and 14, with recommendations in favor

of both Articles.

Upon Mr. Charnock's Motion, it was VOTED: Unanimously: In favor.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Bylaws by adding the following sentence to paragraph (a) of Section XA:

"Signs and exterior lighting, except for the seasonal display of lights for the purpose of the celebration of holidays, must be included in all site plans";

or take any action relative thereto.

Upon a Motion of Mr. Charnock, duly seconded, it was VOTED: Unanimously: That the Zoning Bylaws be amended by adding the following sentence to paragraph (a) of Section XA:

"Signs and exterior lighting, except for the seasonal display of lights for the purpose of the celebration of holidays, must be included in all site plans."

Upon a Motion, duly seconded, it was VOTED: To adjourn the Meeting, at 10:25 P.M.

REPORT OF THE PERSONNEL BOARD

Following the adjournment of the Town Meeting in 1965, the Wayland Personnel Board completed its development of standard position descriptions for employees of the Town, including compensation rates. These studies were made with the cooperation of a Personnel Management Consultant, whose contract was approved by the Selectmen, the Finance Committee and Personnel Board.

This year's studies, as in the past, included comparisons with most Eastern Massachusetts towns whose population and tax base were comparable to Wayland's, all adjacent towns to Wayland, a general statewide study, and study of comparable industrial positions in the area. Meetings were held with department heads and/or Commissioners of each department and their recommendations were also considered. These evaluations, together with the findings of our Personnel Consultant, formed the basis for the recommended changes to the Wage and Salary Classification Plan. These recommendations were based on long and exhaustive studies and were concurred in, by the Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee.

Each Article in the Wage and Salary Classification Plan is reviewed annually to assure fair and equitable treatment of Town employees and, upon vote of the Town Meeting, new articles have been added as needed to the Plan.

In addition, recommendations outside the scope of responsibility of the Personnel Board have been made to the Finance Committee and the Selectmen, concerning matters which indirectly affect compensation and working conditions.

It is our considered opinion, that these adjustments will continue our policy of providing equitable salaries, and maintaining a competitive position with other towns.

The Personnel Board, with the assistance of the Personnel Consultant, has completed the task begun two years ago to equate all jobs under its jurisdiction. This has resulted in a plan that requires only minimal, annual services of the Consultant, and enables the Personnel Board to work efficiently at keeping the Plan current at small cost to the Town. This year's recommendations were based on a general increase of approximately 4%, including cost of living. In addition, the following positions were evaluated on an individual basis: Executive Secretary; Public Health Nursing Supervisor; Police Chief; Fire Chief; Building & Wiring Inspector; Call Firefighter; Library Assistant (P. T.); Library Page (P. T.); and Highway, Water, Cemetery and Park Superintendents. In general, the Board felt that a greater spread between department heads and other department employees was necessary.

At the request of the 1965 Annual Town Meeting, the Board studied the salary of the Plumbing and Gas Inspector and found it to be in line with current practice.

A major change in the Plan recommended this year, was to reduce the number of years to reach maximum salary, from five years to three years in three equal steps. This change was recommended by several Town Departments, and was studied by the Board, and found to be in line with present trends of other towns.

It was recommended that these changes would be effective beginning with the first pay period following final adjournment of the 1966 Town Meeting. The total 1966 cost for these rate changes was estimated to be \$29,000 which added approximately \$1 to the tax rate.

Also recommended were additions and minor changes in classifications and position descriptions to more closely correlate job titles with job descriptions.

The Board is planning to publish an Employees' Handbook which will contain pertinent information on current personnel policies and practices of the Town, for distribution to Town employees and citizens.

The Board feels that it is currently up to date on present personnel policies and practices and plans, to focus its attention in 1966 to establishing the basis for long-range planning for personnel practices for the Town of Wayland.

A significant amount of land available for new lots is in the Oxbow Road area and in the Stonebridge Road area. In this connection the Board in 1965, related the situation to the School Building Committee for study in regard to planning school building needs.

ZONING AND CONSERVATION:

During the year, the Board has been concerned with two matters involving residence districts; one is the problem of laying out highly irregular lot shapes in order to qualify lots for frontage and area, and the other a general study of conservation of natural features of land.

In the first instance, the present bylaw allows considerable freedom to developers to create irregular shapes of lots, even to the extent of creating very narrow strips (e.g. one foot) along a road to qualify frontage. This sort of development has created some situations after sale of lots, where owners find that driveways in effect may have to cross other's front yards, or that what appears to be wholly someone's front yard, actually belongs to someone else. Although we, in no way, desire uniform rectangular shaped lots, we feel that some correction of the situation is needed, and accordingly two articles have been inserted in the Warrant for the 1966 Annual Town Meeting. One requires that the frontage width of the lot be maintained to a depth of 40 feet from the street line; and as an alternate choice, in another article, it is proposed that the required frontage be greatly reduced, if the area of the lot were doubled.

Secondly, we are involved with the Conservation Commission in preparing a general Conservation Plan. During the year, we participated in establishing a Conservation Advisory Committee, which in turn resulted in the Conservation Commission setting up several committees of townspeople to study many aspects of conservation needs, to report to the Conservation Commission, and to allow the preparation of a plan on a professional basis. In this connection, the services of Mr. Charles Downe have been engaged. Mr. Downe

is an eminent professional in the Planning Field, and has prepared Planning Reports for many communities in Massachusetts. His work in Wayland will be unique, in that it involves matters to be decided in considerable detail by townspeople. We feel this will result in a plan best reflecting the views of the Town. We place great emphasis on the 1965 Report of the Conservation Commission in this matter.

ENGINEERING, RECONSTRUCTION, AND LAYOUT OF ROADS:

In 1965 the Board completed a plan for the reconstruction of a small portion of Lake Shore Drive east of Simpson Road, and south of Beech Road, to eliminate a bad hairpin turn, and provide a greatly needed second access to a large portion of land on the west side of Dudley Pond. It is hoped that action of the 1966 Annual Town meeting, will approve the necessary land acquisitions.

It is hoped that the Chapter 90 program in 1966 will extend the improvement of Cochituate Road in the area of Sandy Burr Golf Course and St. Anne's Church, correcting some serious traffic hazards. To be considered later in the program, is a new Chapter 90 road between the High School Land and Stonebridge Road, joining Stonebridge Road just west of where the M.D.C. Aqueduct crosses Stonebridge Road. This would completely avoid any need for reconstructing Stonebridge Road from the Aqueduct running east to Old Connecticut Path where widening would be injurious to property values. The proposed new road would require no land takings, since it could be placed entirely on Town Land, and would lessen the burden of increasing through traffic on Stonebridge Road.

The construction of a Route 20 By-Pass is still very much in doubt and has been made more so by the possibility of the construction, somewhere in or near Wayland, of Interstate Route 290 by the State. During 1965, the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen has met with a committee composed of representatives of Watertown, Waltham, Weston, and Sudbury, on general problems relating to Route 20, our proposed By-Pass, and Route 290. The Planning Board has concluded from information received from that committee's work, that Route 290 is to be constructed as a radial route to the Boston area, from Route 495 near Marlboro, to Route 128 in the Waltham area. We feel that the By-Pass around Wayland will remain low on the State's priority list, since it is not likely to be a part of the Federally reimbursed Interstate Highway Program, whereas Route 290 would be a part of that program.

In this connection, we have twice reported to the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, that a proposal to run a By-Pass or Route 290 along the Boston & Maine Railroad tracks through Wayland, would be objectionable, in the possible destruction of the major part of the present Town Center. Inconvenience to the townspeople resulting from such a location of a limited access highway, plus loss of property and esthetic values would be enormous.

SAND HILL AREA:

The Board for years has held that the Sand Hill Area, west of the river, on Route 20, and adjacent to Sudbury, should be developed for commercial purposes. The poor prospects, mentioned above, for resolving the question of the Route 20 By-Pass, leads the Board to proceed with recommendations as to how this area may best be developed, particularly that part north of the present Route 20. The location of the unsightly Wayland Dump is also involved in the general problem. In this connection, the Board has taken two steps:

- (1) We pursued the acquisition from the Boston Edison Co. of additional land for the dump, so as to allow greater screening of the site, to prevent contamination of the marshes and river, and to allow for a change to a land fill method of disposal at the dump.
- (2) We hope to engage in a professional study of the commercial land use possibilities of this area, together with the Sudbury Planning Board. This study will provide information describing how a regional incinerator might be advantageous to both Towns. It will also provide information for possible Zoning changes for the area, to achieve the most attractive and most valuable commercial use of the area.

POPULATION AND PROJECTIONS:

In the Board's Special Report on Planning, issued in October 1962, a population projection was made as shown in the following table, along with actual figures to date:

Although population is running slightly behind the estimates, the reason may well be the slowdown of subdivision activity prior to 1965. It would, therefore, seem that population growth would accelerate in 1967, or 1968, due to increased subdivision activity

in 1965.

We estimate that under present zoning, the maximum population will be about 20,000.

REPORT OF THE TOWN SURVEYOR

The following is a schedule of items that have been done for 20 different sections of roads that were under construction this past year:

Review of Subdivision Plans.
Reports to Planning Board.
Estimates of road construction for establishment of bonds.
Supervision of construction.
Inspection for release of bonds.
Attendance at Planning Board Meetings, and the walking of subdivisions.

Also accomplished this year, was the review of the 1954 Rules and Regulations of the Planning Board.

The program to complete bounding of our roads, got off to a start with 37 points set for the location of concrete markers in the spring. The Town has about 350 bounds to be set, on roads that have been layed out but have not been bounded. Other bounds needed to be set are those that are missing on county road layouts, which the county will replace upon petition. A number of Town line bounds were found to be missing when the Selectmen perambulated the bounds on their five year interval this year, which will have to be replaced.

The acquisition of some 1400 plans from the Registry of Deeds was made during the year. The plans include all the plans made of land in the Town of Wayland that have been filed in the Middlesex Registry of Deeds, South District, Cambridge, Mass., from 1931 to the present time.

Plans for the Annual and Special Town Meetings resulted in the preparation of 20 plans for different land transfers and road layouts, which are accomplished by a procedure of research, survey, computations, drafting and reproduction. Metes and bounds descriptions are made up for each parcel, along with a transparency to be shown at Town Meeting.

Liason between engineering firms, county engineers, state engineers, the M. D. C., the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service, in connection with their recent acquisitions, the different departments and committees of the Town Government, and the residents of the Town, has been another of the major efforts of this department over the past year.

Thanks are given to all that have helped this department to do its job this past year.

REPORT OF THE TREE WARDEN

During the year 1965 all of the roadside trees in the entire town were checked and dead branches that overhung the roadways were removed as well as several trees which had become rotted or weak, creating a potential hazard in a windstorm or other severe weather condition.

The tree planting program continued and thirty-five maple trees were set out in areas where they were most needed.

It would be greatly appreciated if property owners having trees near the roadway, would examine them for dead wood or rotted cavities on the trunk, and would remove or repair such trees. An ice, snow, or windstorm could cause a tree or portion of a tree, to fall upon the highway and constitute serious damage or traffic hazard.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION--1965

The Conservation Commission met throughout the year on the second and fourth Mondays of each month. Mr. G. Prentiss Richardson replaced Mr. Joseph H. Carroll as the Water Department representative.

Continuing its earlier efforts, the Commission focused attention on ways and means of protecting the Town's brooks. In consequence, it proposed two Articles for the Annual Town Meeting, on wetland conservancy regulations. A public hearing and several meetings in watershed areas were held. Because certain legal questions arose requiring rewriting of the proposals, they were passed over at the request of the Commission.

The Town Meeting did approve the purchase of approximately 1.3 acres (57, 148 sq.feet) of land, formerly belonging to Ronald S. Campbell, and bordering on the Picard tract earlier acquired.

It appeared to the Commission that the problems related to brooks protection, could not be separated from other equally pressing conservation problems, and that a comprehensive plan was needed to determine priorities and means of implementing a town wide program.

Accordingly, an Advisory Committee was created to assist the Commission in drawing up an outline of objectives and a program of action. Such a committee, composed of B. Allen Benjamin, John T. Howard, Dunbar Holmes, Mrs. Charles R. Thomas, Robert H. Charnock, James D. Wells, Henry H. Kolm, George K. Lewis and Mrs. Herbert Lipton, met in April and May to complete this consulting task.

A variety of sub-committees was also established to assist on specific aspects of the planning process. Mrs. Luther Davis agreed to serve as project coordinator, and Mrs. L. Thomas Linden wrote several feature stories for local papers, describing the work of the Conservation Commission and its sub-committees.

In the Snake Brook Reservoir--Hamlen Woods Area, Kenneth A. Moon undertook to prepare a questionnaire to residents and ascertain attitudes toward reservation use. An open meeting was held to review questionnaire results with the Commission, and to agree on further steps to ensure proper management of the reservation.

A planning consultant, Mr. Charles Downe, was hired to aid the Commission in assembling and evaluating the work of the subcommittees, and to provide clerical and technical information as needed. At a Special Town Meeting in December, the sum of \$5,500 was voted for such planning consultant expenses. A conservation master plan report is scheduled to be ready for presentation to the Town in 1966.

The Commission conferred with the Selectmen, Board of Health and Planning Board relative to the Hatch Act, a state law governing certain actions in inland wetland areas, so that a unified approach toward its application would exist on a local level. A statement and questionnaire to guide town officials and applicants, has been prepared by the Commission. Cooperation with other town bodies on matters of mutual concern has been sought.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

From a National standpoint, 1965 will be recorded as one of the worst fire years in history. The continued record drought contributed much to the overall losses. In Wayland, however, we are fortunate to be able to report that with the cooperation of the citizenry, we were able to keep the fire threat in check, and record an extremely low fire loss, despite the general hazardous conditions. Fire bans were necessary many times during the year, and mobile patrols were assigned in the effort to maintain maximum control.

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The Department itself, suffered a great loss on January 9, 1965, with the passing of Lieutenant Albert Lawrence, a dedicated firefighter with 34 years service with the Department.

On May 5, 1965, firefighter Ralph D. Shanley was severely burned when he became trapped during firefighting operations, involving a two and one-half story frame dwelling on Pemberton Road. Firefighter Shanley was hospitalized for several weeks.

On May 10, 1965, firefighter Robert G. Whelchel was cited for his courageous action during this same operation for his efforts in rescuing his fellow firefighter Shanley from the second floor of the building where he had been overcome. Firefighter Whelchel was also burned as he carried out the rescue operation, and was hospitalized for a short period of time.

During the year, the Department actively participated in the work of the Code Enforcement Committee.

Fire prevention activities by this department, included the periodic inspection of all municipal buildings, nursing homes, commercial and industrial buildings, churches, and multiple family dwellings. Single family dwellings were inspected on request, and recommendations were made regarding hazards and family escape plans.

Periodic fire drills were held at all public schools with the cooperation of the School Department.

The regular department training program was conducted in the spring and fall. In addition, full time and part-time members of the department attended seminars and conferences, conducted by the Massachusetts Institute of Fire Department Instructors, the Fire Apparatus Maintenance Association, the Boston Fire Department, and the International Association of Fire Chiefs.

One man completed the training course for divers, and was assigned to the Department Underwater Search and Recovery Team. This unit now numbers five members. Acting Captain Ronald E. Profit, a member of the diving team, has been assigned the responsibility of commanding this unit, which was established in 1964. The team trains on a continuous basis through the year. The divers actively participated in recovery operations twice during the past summer. The first operation took them into 45 feet of water at Lake Cochituate, to assist the Framingham Fire Department in the recovery of a drowning victim.

The municipal fire alarm system was extended this year by the Department, a distance of 5,800 feet on the north end of Rice Road. The alarm system was also extended by the installations made by sub-

division contractors on Joyce Road, Wayside Road, Bigelow Road, Old Weston Road, Ripley Lane and Jericho Lane.

On May 1, 1965, two men were added to the regular force.

During the summer and early fall, meetings were held with the Board of Selectmen to review current planning and study future needs. New long range plans, designed to continue the development of a modern progressive Fire Department, were discussed and projected.

I wish to extend my thanks and appreciation to the members of the Department, and to all persons who in any way, have cooperated and assisted in our operations and development.

In 1964 the State enacted new laws governing nursery schools. These laws made it extremely difficult for the owners of existing schools to make the necessary changes to have their premises qualify. However, these changes were made, and the two schools that are privately operated, as well as the places of public assembly,

where nursery classes are held, now qualify to the new requirements.

In 1965 the State enacted new laws governing nursing homes. One of the three nursing homes in the Town qualified, the second made the necessary corrections, and the third did not obtain the necessary approval by the State, so an alteration permit could not be issued by this department. Therefore, the nursing home was closed for noncompliance with the law.

On March 29, 1965, an amendment was added after Section 117 B of Chapter 131 of the General Laws pertaining to the protection of flood plains which states: "No person shall remove, fill or dredge any banks, flat, marsh, meadow or swamp bordering on any inland waters without first filing written notice of his intentions with the Board of Selectmen". Copies of this law and filing procedure details may be obtained in this office.

At the March 1965 Town Meeting, an Historic District was created and a portion of Cochituate Road in the Village Center of Wayland was placed into it. An Historic District Commission was organized to handle this phase of Town Government, and the Building Department has cooperated fully with this new commission on related problems.

Forty-nine Zoning Variances were prepared and presented to the Zoning Board of Appeals for decision.

Inspections were made in public buildings, which consisted of the check-up on structural strength, electric wiring, over-fusing, sticking exit doors, exit lights, emergency lighting systems, etc.

Fees collected from Wiring and Building Permits and Zoning Applications, during 1965, amounted to \$4,850.30, and have been turned over to the Town Collector.

The Building Department takes this opportunity to thank the Town Officials and citizens, who have helped in the affairs of this office in the past year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

The Board of Health submits the following report for the year ending December 31, 1965:

The Board of Health is concerned about the apparent spread of rabies into New England from the Canadian provinces of Ontario and Quebec. Rabies is a fatal viral infection of the nervous system transmitted in the saliva of rabid animals. The reservoir for rabies is in the bat population. Bats have been known to infect the following animals: cats, skunks, dogs, squirrels, raccoons, bobcats, coyotes, etc. In a recent ten-month period Ontario reported 1,040 cases of animal rabies, and Quebec, 181. Maine had three recent cases. Massachusetts had its first known animal rabies of bat origin in 1961. Since then there have been nine more cases.

In 1965, two hundred and twenty-five dogs were inoculated at our annual clinic at a cost of \$1.00 per dog.

Your Agent wishes to report that due to the quality check on milk dealers and their outlets, we have had only two cases this year where it was necessary to warn the dealer, thus assuring Wayland residents of the highest possible grade of milk.

It is the policy of the Board of Health to investigate any and all complaints. Letters in writing are answered in kind, and remain confidential.

The Board of Health is working with the Board of Selectmen, on a plan leading to a cessation of burning, and in improvement in the appearance of the dump.

The Board of Health formulates its policies in conjunction with the State Department of Public Health, and its Medical and Dental Advisory Board made up of physicians practicing in the town.

NEW REGULATION ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF HEALTH:

Application for a license to conduct a day care service for children, shall be made annually in writing upon the form provided by the Board of Health.

A total of 458 persons attended the Chest X-ray Clinic, and 126 persons attended the Glaucoma Detection Clinic.

The Board of Health holds office hours at the Parmenter Health Center on Monday through Thursday from 5 - 7 P.M. Licenses and permits are issued at this time.

SANITARY ENGINEER'S REPORT

Board of Health Wayland, Massachusetts

Gentlemen:

The following is a report of my activities for your Board for the calendar year 1965....

SEWAGE DISPOSAL

During the calendar year 1965, one hundred and nine (109) permits were issued by your Health Agent, for the construction or alteration of sewage disposal systems, after preliminary and other inspections and recommendations were made to your Board. A total of more than six hundred inspections were made to insure effective design and construction of these systems, and to advise builders and home owners concerning the proper installation, operation, and maintenance of these new or existing facilities.

RESTAURANT SANITATION

The practice of making unannounced inspections of eating establishments was continued during 1965. The new regulations concerning the minimum sanitation standards for food service establishments were published by the State Department of Public Health in early 1965. This new Section of the State Sanitary Code will be quite helpful in bringing about more effective control in maintaining or establishing proper sanitary conditions in the eating establishments in the town.

MILK INSPECTIONS

A total of three hundred and fifty-four (354) samples of milk and cream were collected during the year by your Board of Health Agent from the dairies and other licensed outlets selling milk and cream in Wayland. These samples were examined in the laboratory for total bacterial count, coliform bacteria, and phosphatase, with results reported to the dairies concerned, as required by law. Unsatisfactory results were followed up by your Board of Health Agent, immediately, so that corrective action could be taken wherever necessary.

LAKE COCHITUATE BATHING BEACH

Weekly samples were collected during the summer bathing season, and examined in the laboratory, to provide for a check on the water quality in the bathing area.

This past year was one in which there was much staff change for the Wayland Public Health Nursing Service. Staff members who had been with the agency for some time, left for the following reasons: To take a position as an Assistant Professor in maternal and child health, at a University School of Nursing; to take a position as a Public Health Nursing Supervisor in a city Health Department; to enter a Graduate Program at a local university.

Because of the inexperience of the new staff nurses, it was necessary to assign the Senior Public Health Nurse to many more supervisory activities. Late in the fall, the Parmenter Health Center employed a part-time registered nurse to assist with the home nursing visits.

This year, the Board of Health was authorized by the State Department of Public Health, to license private kindergartens and nursery schools in town. The Senior Public Health Nurse was assigned the task of coordinating this program. Meetings were held with the various representatives from the State and local agencies, to set up guide lines that would facilitate inspection, and to ascertain the responsibilities of each person involved in the licensing procedures.

A total of 2,057 visits were made to patients with a specific disease. Of this number, 298 visits were made in behalf of pre-school children, and the remaining 1,684 visits were made to patients over twenty years of age. A total of 1,458 visits were made to fifty-nine patients, who required part-time bedside nursing care.

Of the 1,390 visits made for the purpose of health promotion, 747 visits were made in behalf of the school age child, 166 visits in behalf of infants, and 303 visits in behalf of the pre-school child. Many of the visits in this category which were made in behalf of the school age child, were concerned with such things as follow-up of vision or hearing failure, following of a school adjustment problem, and investigation of other health problems that may require medical evaluation.

There were 300 telephone calls made in lieu of home visits. One hundred and seventy-five of these calls were concerned with school health problems.

Many conferences were held with representatives from other agencies in behalf of patients as well as program planning.

There was a total of forty-two well child conferences held during the year. One hundred and ninety-nine children made a total of 407 visits to these conferences. The nurses' activities in these conferences include scheduling appointments, interviewing the mother, assisting the doctor, arranging for transportation, and interpreting the doctor's findings, and recommendations. This past fall, a mental health team from the Greater Framingham Mental Health Association was added to our clinic staff. More information about this service will be forthcoming.

All of the nurses participated in the glaucoma detection clinic, chest x-ray clinic, and the pre-school registration program. Some of the nursing staff served on committees of the professional nursing and public health organizations in the state.

Once again, we wish to extend to our loyal volunteers sincere appreciation of the extensive help they have given to us in our many programs.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

FOR THE SCHOOL YEAR 1964-1965

SCHOOL PHYSICIAN Dr. Freddie N. Peterson

Approximately sixty percent of public health nursing time was concerned with the school health program and the school age child. A total of 1,045 home visits was made in behalf of the school age child.

Routine physical examinations are required upon entering school and every three years thereafter. Annual physical examinations are required of all students participating in competitive athletics. The Board of Health and its Medical Advisory Committee believe that these examinations should be done by the family physician as he is familiar

with the child's total health. For those who are unable to go privately, physical examinations are provided at the Parmenter Health Center after school hours and by appointment.

Of the 1,185 children who received routine physical examinations, 1,119 were examined by their private physicians, and 66 by a school physician. We hope this trend continues. The low number of requests for school physicals, has enabled us to provide these children with a more comprehensive physical examination and with more health counseling by the physician.

A total of 321 students received physical examinations for athletic clearance. Of this number 301 students were examined by their own physician, whereas only 20 were examined by a school physician.

A total of 426 students in grades one and nine received tuberculin skin tests. There were no positive reactions.

Vision and hearing tests are given to each child annually as required by law. Of the 216 children who failed the vision test, 154 were seen by an eye specialist. Of the 104 children who failed the hearing test, 51 were seen by a physician. All parents of children who failed either the vision or hearing tests were notified, however, referral for medical evaluation is not always made. A child is not referred if he is presently under the care of a specialist, and if he has an irremediable defect as previously ascertained by a physician.

DENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM

School Year 1964-1965

A total of 222 children, attended the Board of Health Dental Clinic. The demands upon the dental clinic have been extensive. An application was sent out to all parents who had children attending the clinic, and it was necessary to limit the clinic to those with the greatest financial need. A dental screening of all children who attended the clinic was made in August, in order to set up appointments by dental need.

Children in grades one, three and five were screened by the dental hygienist. Of the 977 screened, 157 were referred to their own dentists.

Mouth guards were fitted to all football and hockey players. They are to be used in all practices, as well as games. It is the responsibility of the coaches that this be enforced.

Dr. Thomas Leonard submitted his resignation to the Board of Health, and Dr. George Bailey was appointed in August 1965. We wish to extend our sincere appreciation of Dr. Leonard's invaluable services.

MOSOUITO CONTROL IN WAYLAND IN 1965

Very little pre-season dusting was done this year in Wayland. In the spring time, the Sudbury River marshes were not flooded deeply as has been the case for many years, and conditions looked favorable for heavy mosquito production. Fortunately, nothing serious happened. The Project spent more than a hundred man-hours searching the meadows, and found very few places producing larvae. As usual there was considerable mosquito production in adjacent wet lands.

Malathion and Baytex were the principal materials used against larvae. Adult mosquito infestations were sprayed with Malathion or fogged with this material or Dibrom. Catchbasins were sprayed with Baytex.

Drainage work was done near Springhill Road, off Concord Road on Murphy's land, near the Wayland Hills Development, and off Stone-bridge Road.

REPORT OF THE ROAD COMMISSIONERS

The following projects, several of which were carried over from 1964, were completed, or nearly so:

1. BETTERMENTS:

Construction of Lee Road completed.

Bent, Cottage and George Streets were substantially completed, with the final course of bituminous concrete and grading to be done during 1966.

Mansion Road and a portion of Lake Shore Drive reconstruction, including drainage and curbing, were substantially completed with final bituminous concrete and fencing to be done during 1966.

2. CHAPTER 90:

Route 126 "Sandy Burr" curve relocation is progressing and scheduled for substantial completion during 1966.

CHAPTER 90 MAINTENANCE:

Concord Road was resurfaced from the Library as far as Moore Road, and a new sidewalk and curbing installed in front of the Library. It is planned to resurface the rest of Concord Road to the Lincoln line during 1966.

3. DRAINAGE:

The twin culverts under Route 27 were installed and designed to carry three times the flow which would have been carried by the old culvert.

Storm drainage in Loker Street off School Street, was completed and this portion of Loker Street was rebuilt with a penetrated surface.

Several additional drainage projects were completed to eliminate local storm water problems.

4. SIDEWALKS:

The Main Street (Cochituate Road) sidewalk from Dudley Road was completed with bituminous concrete surface, curbing, and planting.

The second course of bituminous concrete was placed on the sidewalk along East Plain Street from Dunster Street to School Street.

A gravel sidewalk was constructed on Pequot Road from Juniper Lane to the Happy Hollow School.

Additional funds will be recommended by the newly formed Sidewalk Committee, to continue the sidewalk program into 1966 and beyond.

5. RECONSTRUCTION OF EXISTING TOWN ROADS:

Under Chapter 718 of the General Laws, the second and final phase of reconstruction of Stonebridge Road at the M.D.C. Aqueduct was completed.

Together with these major projects, the oiling, road sweeping, roadside clean-up and snow removal programs were expanded with a larger appropriation being requested in 1966.

The rodent control program at the dump was continued and a concerted effort made to eliminate the dumping of garbage, and dumping by unauthorized parties.

Bids were obtained by the Board for two new trucks, tractor back-hoe, pipe, tires, bituminous concrete, salt and other miscellaneous items which were purchased from their respective appropriations.

The Highway Department now has a full time mechanic and is building up a spare parts and tool inventory for his use. Significant savings are anticipated from an expanded preventive maintenance program.

Bids were obtained and a new fire detecting system was installed in the Highway Garage. This system will detect any significant temperature rise, and sound an alarm automatically at the Fire Department.

The new street sign maker was placed in operation, and many new signs were erected as part of a continuing program to identify all streets.

With deep regret, we record the untimely passing on September 27th, 1965, of Mr. Albert Abruzzese, our Highway Superintendent, who had joined the Department in 1964, and served it ably.

THE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WELFARE

Another year has passed, and the Board of Public Welfare is still faced with the problems of trying to foresee a budget for 1966 that will be adequate enough, so that a Special Town Meeting will not have to be called. The request for additional funds could be necessary, due to the increased liberality of our Federal and State Solons, and again the taxpayer is called upon to fill the bill.

The Board is deeply concerned by the increasing requirement for Aid to Families with Dependent Children, because of the absconding fathers, and the fact that they do not face up to their responsibilities. A change in the laws could alleviate this problem.

Medicare will be in effect July 1, 1966, but it will take at least two years before we will be able to evaluate the over-all picture.

May we conclude with the following --

We are cognizant of the fact that it is the taxpayer's money we spend. However, in all cases the expenditures are mandatory.

The Statistical Report has also been respectively submitted.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARY

Many changes occurred in the Wayland Library during the year 1965, indicating that the oldest public library in Massachusetts is still alive and growing. The first innovation was the issuing of new borrowers' cards and use of charging machines. Library patrons were very cooperative in carrying out this change. In a relatively short time, the majority of regular borrowers had received their new cards and the system was in operation. As we had hoped, errors have been reduced considerably by machine charging.

The final version of the Humphrey-McNiff Survey was received in April, and was studied by the Library Board members and the staff of the library. It has served as a guide, and also as a stimulus to planning for the future.

Most significant to the development of the library has been the increase in full-time staff. Mrs. John F. Campbell joined the staff as Assistant Librarian in May. Miss Edith Chauncey, formerly a part-time employee, became a full-time assistant in September. Thus the library which until 1960 had one full-time employee, now has five, in addition to the part-time personnel necessary to cover a much full-er schedule of hours of service to the public.

The Board of Trustees and staff members of the library have worked out a plan for better use of available space in the main library building, and work has begun on the first stage of the plan: enlargement of the children's room and a staff room for library workers.

During the year, Miss Connor, the Childrens' Librarian, went to the first and second grades of the elementary schools, participating in our school visit program. We wish to thank the principals and teachers of these schools for their cooperation, and for their continuing recognition of the need for closer relations between the schools and the public library.

Many individuals and groups have made gifts to the library during the year. The Garden Club presented The Shrub Identification Book in memory of Mrs. John Baldwin, a former library staff member and member of the Garden Club. The flower arrangements and other decorations on view at the library during the year, were also provided by the Garden Club.

REPORT OF THE PARK DEPARTMENT

The Board of Park Commissioners has continued in its effort to improve and maintain Park and Town properties, under its jurisdiction, through its labor force and competitive contract effort.

The Millpond area, through the generosity of the Wayland Kiwanians, has a new shelter.

The Commissioners have purchased two softball backstops for the two playground areas at the two unused school sites.

The second phase of the Beach Expansion Program has been completed with the purchase of docks and a diving platform. The popularity of the diving platform has directed our plans for a second platform to be installed this summer. The reorganization of the parking area was delayed due to the bids on construction exceeding the budget. The organization of the beach parking area will have first priority in the ensuing year.

The beach again enjoyed good attendance and the Commissioners received many favorable comments on its increased size. The total registration for the beach was 5,818. The total donations contributed during registration were \$2,791.65. On several capacity days, over 3,000 bathers attended the beach. On an average day, over 400 bathers enjoyed the beach. There were over 1700 cars registered, and on a busy day, the traffic at the beach was 400 cars per day.

The Wayland Chapter of the American Red Cross, which sponsors swimming lessons, reported that more than 900 youngsters enrolled for swimming lessons.

Plans for improving the Cochituate Ball Park and further expansion for the Beach, have been completed for presentation at the Annual Town Meeting.

The Commissioners wish to express their gratitude to the beach personnel for maintaining our excellent safety record. The Commissioners wish to thank the residents of the Town, the assisting committees, the officers, and the Park Department personnel for their support and cooperation. They wish also to express thanks for the volunteer effort of individuals and groups that executed its recreational program.

WAY-CO RECREATION PROGRAM

The Way-Co Recreation Program, which has been in existence for some thirteen years, has expanded to tremendous proportions during that time. It all began with a few young boys who were interested in playing organized baseball, and has now grown into a program which includes over seven different activities for children as well as adults. This is comprised of boys' baseball, basketball, hockey and Pop Warner football, men's softball, volleyball for both men and women, and tennis for everyone. All of these sports are extremely popular with the great number of participants who are active in the program.

The Way-Co Chargers football team had at least seventy-five boys participating in the 1965 season. These boys were divided into three groups this year, instead of two, as in previous years. Way-Co joined four other towns (Newton, Brookline, Needham and Auburndale) in forming a new division of Pop Warner football for boys under eighty pounds. This is in keeping with the principle of boys playing against competition of the same weight and age.

Way-Co bought fourteen new uniforms to replace the ones that have seen four seasons of wear, and also purchased safety equipment necessary to the sport. The past season ended with the Chargers winning ten games, tieing three, and losing only one, with a fourteen game schedule.

Approximately five hundred boys participated in the Junior Division and Nipper baseball programs which began the first of May and ended with a cookout at Cochituate Field the first of September. The boys participating throughout the season, showed a great deal of improvement, both in playing skills and in good sportmanship, which is the basic aim of all the sincere volunteers who donate their time and effort to helping these boys.

Men's softball and volleyball for men and women are becoming more and more popular throughout the years, and an expanded program here is expected during 1966. As outdoor hockey is largely dependent on the weather, the limited amount of ice available during the 1965 season, made it impossible to set up a regular hockey schedule. However, with the completion of the board construction around the rink at Cochituate Field during the year, and the erection of lights the first of next year, many more hours of skating should be available for all who are interested in both hockey and free skating.

Boy's basketball was well attended, as usual, with a terrific amount of interest on ${f t}$ he part of the younger set as well as the Junior

High and High School age boys. Tennis, whose participants include both youngsters and adults, was highly successful for the second straight year of this program. Classes were held for boys and girls as well as adults again this year, with tournaments highlighting the end of the instruction periods. A new league of four men's teams was formed and played a round of matches. This was enthusiastically received and more teams are expected to join this league in 1966. Many experienced men and women tennis players helped as officials and teachers, and also private courts were used as well as those at the High School, to further the complete success of this activity.

Way-Co is a cooperative program sponsored by the Wayland Park Department, and supervised by a group of interested volunteers who give their time and efforts during the course of the year, to keep this program successful. This is a town supported program, and this report is being submitted to keep the townspeople informed of the recreational activities offered to its citizens. New activities can be added to this group at any time, and any suggestions by interested parties are welcome.

In presenting this report, I would like to thank all of those who unselfishly gave their time and efforts throughout the past year, to make the Way-Co Recreation Program a completely successful enterprise.

REPORT OF THE WATER COMMISSIONERS

The year 1965 was marked by a continuation of the most serious drought ever recorded in this area, with a deficit of some twenty inches of rainfall. With water levels down at the start of 1965, due to the previous dry years, and coupled with the poor recharge into the well fields last spring, it became mandatory on July 14th, to impose a complete ban on the use of sprinklers, with hoses permitted only between 9:00 A. M. and Noon, when hand-held. As a result of the cooperation shown by nearly all of our customers, an estimated daily saving of from one to one and one-half million gallons was noted; safe levels were maintained in the well fields, and we were starting to regain some of our deficit at the close of the year.

Please note, however, that despite the watering ban, the Water Department pumped 432 million gallons of water in 1965--a new high.

The Department held Open House on May 15th at the Pumping Station at Baldwin's Pond. A good turnout of approximately 200 interested townspeople toured the Station to observe equipment and various other items on display. We noted that the visitors were almost all "new people" in town. Where were all of the "Old Timers"?

An engineering study and report on the Water Supply and Distribution System of the Town was made, and submitted to the Commissioners by Weston & Sampson, Consulting Engineers, in August. This study was an extension of previous studies made in 1947, and 1958, and their recommendations cover several changes and additions to the system. Some of these were presented for consideration at the December Special Town Meeting, and were voted affirmatively. The Engineers are preparing bidding documents for the proposed new turbine pumps at Baldwin's Pond, and the test well is now in, at the new well site off Riverview Circle.

The Campbell Road well site was further developed in 1965, and is presently awaiting only the installation of pumps. It is expected that this well will be in production in April of 1966, and adding some 600,000 gallons to our daily capacity.

With the increase in our pumping capacity, we expect to be in better condition in 1966, but we must get a better well field recharge this coming spring, in order to completely avoid a watering ban.

In the meantime, the Water Department is confident of its ability to supply sufficient water of high quality for all essential needs of the town.

REPORT OF THE SIDEWALK COMMITTEE

At the Annual Town Meeting in March, 1965, upon a Motion of Mr. Pearson, duly seconded, it was VOTED unanimously: That the Town establish a committee of five (5) to consist of one member of the Planning Board, one member of the Road Commission, one member of the School Committee, one member of the Finance Committee, each to be designated by their respective boards or committees, and a fifth member at large to be appointed by the four so designated; that the committee be charged with making an evaluation of the rate of progress; and associated cost, of the proposed sidewalk program, as reported to the town meeting of 1962; and with making a study and recommendations with respect to:

- (1) appropriate revisions of that program, and plans for making it more effective and vigorous;
- (2) the feasibility of extending that program so as to include a footpath, and possibly a bicycle path, alongside the more heavily traveled main roads in Wayland;

and that such a Committee report to the next Annual Town Meeting.

This committee has met, examined the existing, proposed, and suggested sidewalk locations in Wayland, held public hearings, and reached the following conclusions.

General Conclusions

First and most broadly, the committee and most of those with whom it has talked, feel that the character of Wayland along with its pattern of pedestrian, bicycle, and automobile traffic, has remained sufficiently rural so that a major program of sidewalk construction is not required. Certain types of roads, however, in specific areas do call for sidewalks. These specific needs are set forth below.

Secondly, the committee has found that an effort to reduce school transportation costs through the construction of sidewalks, appears to be impractical. Nearly all the areas in which the residential population is dense enough to warrant construction of sidewalks with this idea in mind, already have sidewalks. Further, when it becomes necessary to provide policewomen to assure children a safe crossing of busy streets (which sidewalks cannot do) the cost of the policewomen may more than offset the savings realized by the elimination of a bus. The committee therefore has not considered school transportation costs a factor in sidewalk planning.

Thirdly, it is true that bicycle paths along certain of the busier roads in town would help to provide access to after-school and other youth activities to children to whom automobile transportation is not always available. In this regard, the matter of providing safe bicycle paths

in certain areas has been given consideration by the committee. On the other hand, some Wayland citizens have made the point that bicycling can provide exercise and enjoyment even for adults. Primarily because of the high cost of sidewalk construction, the committee has not recommended the construction of sidewalks or bicycle paths from a purely recreational point of view. For the town as a whole, this would be an expensive type of recreational facility. In a town of Wayland's character, other forms of recreational expenditure can undoubtedly be found which would yield greater service per dollar of cost.

Fourth and finally, the relatively great cost of sidewalk construction has played a major part in the formulating of the committee's recommendations. The committee has concluded that construction of unpayed or graveled paths would be inadequate, particularly from a maintenance viewpoint. A black-topped path, with bituminous berm to separate it from the roadway where no natural separation exists, is considered a minimum standard of construction and costs approximately four dollars per running foot to build. (Bituminous berm should be white-painted where desirable from a safety viewpoint). Construction of a mile of such sidewalk would cost substantially over \$20,000 (without taking into consideration the costs required by any extensive cutting of ledge, filling, or retaining walls) and could therefore be responsible for a dollar or more of the town's tax rate during the year in which it is built. A higher quality sidewalk with somewhat lower annual maintenance costs, constructed of concrete with granite curbing, will cost in the neighborhood of nine dollars per running foot, or \$45,000 to \$50,000 per mile, exclusive of excessive cutting, filling, or retaining walls. Hence, the construction of very long sidewalks within the town would be prohibitively expensive unless undertaken over a considerable number of years.

Recommendations

The committee has identified certain categories of road which may be considered separately regarding the desirability of sidewalks along them;

- 1. Town Centers. In areas of the town where pedestrian traffic is dense, consideration of both convenience and safety enter into the planning of sidewalk construction. The two town centers fall into this category. With the completion in 1965 of the Main Street sidewalk to Bayfield Road, it appears that the only sidewalk yet to be constructed which lies in an area of reasonably heavy pedestrian traffic within one of the town centers, would run along the south side of Millbrook Road from the Town Building to Plain Road. Construction of this sidewalk was recommended by the 1961 Sidewalk Committee, but has not yet been undertaken. The present committee recommends its construction.
- 2. <u>Heavily Traveled Through-Routes</u>. In considering the numbered routes through the town, safe bicycle transportation for young people, plus the high cost of construction, were the committee's

major considerations. Routes 20 and 30 at present have sidewalks of some description along most of their lengths through areas of relatively dense population. (Route 20 is maintained entirely by the State. Any sidewalk construction or improvement along it would have to be done by the State Department of Public Works). The committee feels that it would be desirable to provide bicycle paths along portions of the north-south routes within the town. A complete program of sidewalk construction along these routes would involve some 9 miles of construction and might involve a cost approaching a quarter of a million dollars. It may be that the town will eventually wish to undertake such a project, but the present committee limits its recommendations to three specific areas along these roads.

The first recommendation is that the Chapter 90 construction presently underway in the Sandy Burr area, include a black-topped sidewalk with berm along its length on the west side of the road. This would extend the present sidewalk on Cochituate Road from approximately its present terminus, near the School Administration Building to Sandy Burr, at a modest cost. At present, a sidewalk extends along Route 126 southward beginning four tenths of a mile south of Five Paths intersection, and running as far as Pine Ridge Road near the Happy Hollow School. Eventual connection of this sidewalk with the Sandy Burr sidewalk would provide safe bicycle transportation for children from the northern part of town to the High School, Happy Hollow, and the youth facilities which Junior Town House proposes to construct adjacent to the High School. However, the committee recommends that no proposals be made regarding sidewalks in the Five Paths area until definite plans regarding reconstruction of this intersection have been formed. It is recommended that sidewalks be incorporated in these plans.

Second, to provide access from the southern center of town to the High School area, the 1961 sidewalk committee recommended construction of a walk along the east side of Route 126 from West Plain Street to the Pine Ridge end of the present sidewalk. (This would include a stretch of about 250 yards of sidewalk along the south side of West Plain Street at its intersection with Route 126). The present committee finds that this sidewalk presents substantial construction difficulties. The stretch of Route 126 between West Plain Street and Pine Ridge Road contains some sharp, blind curves, coupled with a very steep embankment. It appears that these conditions result in a high frequency of automobile accidents. The residents of the area have expressed an urgently felt need for highway improvement along this stretch. The committee feels that, as the road is presently constructed, the cost of sidewalk construction here would be excessively high. The committee does recommend that at the time the road is improved, this sidewalk be constructed.

The committee's third recommendation for the numbered routes is for the construction of a bicycle path along the east side of Route 126 from the end of the present sidewalk at Plain Road to Claypit Hill Road, providing safe bicycle transportation from the northern part of town to the Junior High School and Wayland Center. This stretch of road is heavily traveled by automobiles. A sidewalk is needed for the safety of pedestrians and cyclists. The extent to which this path is used will provide the basis for a later decision concerning its extension further along ConcordRoad.

The committee has been asked by several citizens to consider the possibility of connecting the two town centers by sidewalk. The committee recommends against such a project, which would involve extensive and very costly reconstruction of the right of way and which would not appear to have adequate justification in terms of potential use by either bicyclists or pedestrians.

- 3. Other connecting roads. The committee has received suggestions for the construction of sidewalks along a number of the longer roads in town other than the numbered routes, such as Glezen Lane, Draper Road, Pelham Island Road, Oxbow Road, Old Connecticut Path East, Plain Road and others. The committee does not feel that the construction of sidewalks along these roads would be appropriate under present circumstances of population density, potential use, and road condition. Many of these roads are among the older roads in town, are rather narrow and are particularly restricted during the winter when snow is piled up along them. If the town decides to apply any expenditures to these roads, the desirability of widening and straightening them should be considered before sidewalk construction. If road improvement work is undertaken here, provisions for sidewalks should be included, but sidewalk construction should be considered only as part of such improvement, not as an independent project. These roads carry much less automobile traffic than the numbered routes and are therefore somewhat less hazardous to bicycle travel.
- 4. Residential areas. Most of the citizens with whom the committee talked were firmly opposed to the construction of sidewalks through the newer residential areas. Suggestions were made for sidewalks along one or two residential access roads, but the committee feels that such sidewalks should be proposed, as desired, by residents as betterments rather than undertaken entirely by the town as a whole.
- 5. New roads. At present, the Planning Board is requiring developers to make provisions for future sidewalks along any proposed new streets. This practice has the strong endorsement of the Sidewalk Committee.

6. Construction recommended by the 1961 Sidewalk Committee. The previous Sidewalk Committee recommended construction along Main Street to Bayfield Road and along East Plain Street and Route 30 from Dunster Street to Loker Street. These projects have been completed. That committee also made recommendations concerning Millbrook Road, Plain Road from Millbrook to Claypit Hill Road, and Route 126 from West Plain Street to Pine Ridge Road. These proposals have been discussed in the present committee's recommendations above. The 1961 committee also recommended construction of sidewalks along Loker Street from Route 30 to the Loker Street School and along Maiden Lane from Route 126 to the Happy Hollow School. Both these sidewalks are immediately adjacent to schools; as well as relatively easy to construct, the present committee recommends their continued inclusion in sidewalk plans.

Sidewalk appropriations and expenditures since 1960 are shown in Table 1.

Priorities and Costs

(The following cost estimates are based on black-topped sidewalks with bituminous berm).

- 1. First priority: School access sidewalks:
 - a. Loker Street from Commonwealth Road to
 Loker School - - - - \$6,500.00
 - b. Maiden Lane from Old Connecticut Path to
 Happy Hollow School - - - - 2,800.00
- 2. Second priority: Town center sidewalks:
 - a. Millbrook Road from Town Building to Plain
 Road - - - - - 9,200.00
- 3. Third priority: Longer distance bicycle paths:
 - a. Concord Road from Plain Road to Claypit
 Hill Road - - - - 8,800.00
 - b. Cochituate Road from North of Trinity Place to "Sandy Burr" - - - - 3,900.00

TOTAL - - - \$ 31,200.00

- 4. Future consideration pending possible road reconstruction:
 - a. West Plain Street from Edgewood Road to Old Connecticut Path, thence North to Pine Ridge Road.
 - b. Cochituate Road from Sandy Burr to Five Paths, thence South on Old Connecticut Path to Davelin Road.

Any future reconstruction along East Plain Street - Route 30-should include adequate grade separation between the sidewalk and the traveled way.

(See map. The costs of these and other possible sidewalks, showing various types of construction, are given in Table II.)

In recent years, based on the recommendation of the 1961 Sidewalk Committee, the town has appropriated a sum of \$5,000 annually for sidewalk construction. The present committee recommends that the town increase this appropriation to \$7,500 annually to cover sidewalk construction under priorities one, two, and three above. The committee feels that earmarking of appropriations for specific sidewalk projects would act to the detriment of the sidewalk program as a whole. When unexpected construction difficulties are encountered or when legal problems arise in connection with, for example, land takings, earmarked funds cannot be used to complete a specific project or to further the program in other areas. The committee therefore recommends that the \$7,500 annual appropriation be applied generally to sidewalk construction.

The town would thus undertake a balanced program of construction involving on the one hand the completion of necessary shorter pedestrian sidewalks adjacent to schools and town centers, and at the same time, beginning to fill the needs of Wayland youngsters for safe bicycle transportation to and from their centers of activity. Under such a plan, both aspects of sidewalk construction as presently proposed by the committee should be completed in about four years. By that time, additional needs will have emerged which will form the basis for new proposals to the town.

In this connection, the committee recommends the continuance of a town Sidewalk Committee on a permanent basis; such a committee to have as its Chairman, a Highway Commissioner chosen by the Highway Commission, and having four additional members having staggered three-year terms appointed by the Board of Selectmen at their discretion. This committee should be directed to report to every second annual town meeting (beginning with the 1968 Town Meeting) on the progress of sidewalk construction programs voted by the town and on any new recommendations concerning sidewalks and bicycle paths which it may have formulated.

The committee thanks the citizens of Wayland for their participation in its efforts and their interest in seeing its work successfully completed.



REPORT OF THE BYPASS COMMITTEE

A release by the Department of Public Works to the Boston Evening Globe, during the first week in January 1966, reflected that once again, the now famous Route 20, Wayland Bypass, would not be assigned funds for its construction.

Demands now being made to the Department of Public Works by almost every city and town in the Commonwealth, is placing Wayland's Highway needs far down on the Department of Public Works' list.

Wayland has joined Sudbury, Weston, Waltham and Watertown in a combined effort to have the Department of Public Works consider allocating funds for traffic relief, on the Route 20 that runs through these communities.

This committee is known as the Route 20 Transportation Co-ordinating Committee. This Committee has held many meetings and they were held in Sudbury, Wayland, Waltham, Watertown, and in the Department of Public Works' office at 40 School Street, Boston, Mass.

Of the three towns, (Sudbury, Wayland and Weston) west of Route 128, Wayland has the greatest traffic problems, not only on Route 20, but also on Routes 27, 126 and 30.

The Wayland Bypass Committee will begin an extensive study of their own, and submit an alternate proposal to the Department of Public Works, and to the Town, before the next Town Meeting (Special, or Annual).

Bills totalling \$770.98 for flowers, flags, wreaths, tonic and sandwiches for parade participants were submitted. U pon notification by the Town Accountant that the appropriation of \$600.00 was overdrawn, we requested the Finance Committee for permission to transfer \$170.98 to this Committee's appropriation, and the request was granted. From 1958 to 1963 the annual appropriation was \$800.00. In 1964 and 1965 it was reduced to \$600.00, presumably because there was an unexpended balance when the High School Band replaced the out-of-town bands. We asked the Finance Committee to restore the appropriation to at least \$900.00 in 1966. In 1965 there was a bill for \$125.00 for buses for the band, and the cost of flowers and printing was higher than formerly.

The disbanding of the parade at the corner of Old Sudbury Road and Glezen Lane, to shorten the route so that all four cemeteries could be visited by the parade, caused traffic congestion which should not be repeated.

The Committee expresses its gratitude to the participating organizations, the clergy, the schools and the High School Band for their services.

In view of the current juvenile protests against this country's military policy, including the burning of draft cards, it is important that organizations which foster a spirit of loyalty and responsibility to our government, be given an opportunity to demonstrate, and their participation in the Memorial Day exercises affords this opportunity, in addition to its primary memorial purpose.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE -- 1965

A brief review of several projects, some dating from 1958, is suggested to the Town in the hope that funds may now be forthcoming for their completion.

Renovation of the Beach House to provide at least twenty dressing cubicles and more adequate toilet facilities along with additional equipment storage area, has reached the critical stage, and should be done. An "H" steel dock, with twenty-five yard crib, for instructional purposes and recreational use would clearly be in order.

Acquisition of lands in the Millbrook area to round out existing Town parcels, would insure a central park for Wayland. Additional acquisitions in the Pinebrook, Sherman Bridge, Riverview Circle, and Snakebrook areas, would assist protection of watershed, wildlife, and conservation in addition to providing long range recreational lands.

Further development of the hill adjacent to the High School for ski instructional purposes in basic techniques, seems a natural with the growth of skiing groups within the Town.

Abutters continue to enjoy the playground aspects of the North Wayland Elementary School Site, and the Cochituate Junior High School Site, but the Town as a whole has yet to fully recognize and utilize these spacious additional recreational areas.

Finally, with the success of the High School Tennis Courts, the time is fast approaching when additional courts should be considered for the Junior High School.

1965 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

It is with pleasure that the School Committee makes this its annual report to the town. However, we do have certain misgivings because so large and active an enterprise as our school system cannot adequately be covered in a few pages. The report is further complicated by the need to report current happenings to you and by the need to include material which might be of some benefit to future school committees or historians.

Accreditation

One of the first things to be recorded should be reevaluation of our entire high school by a team of teachers and administrators representing the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. This is a very close examination of everything that is the high school: course offerings, specific curricula, teachers' abilities and educational qualifications, administrators, school committee, extra curricular activities, and buildings, including fixed and movable equipment. We were pleased to have received an extremely favorable report from the evaluators and in December to have been finally granted full accreditation by the Association. Many recommendations were made to improve our system which will be instituted when and where appropriate. It should be pointed out that this review is carried out every ten years and that this was our first full-scale review.

Not the least of the values of this accreditation was the elaborate and time-consuming self-evaluation which was required before the visiting team would come here. The principal, department heads, supervisors and teachers worked many, many long and hard hours to prepare all of the necessary material. The entire staff performed exceptionally during this demanding period.

School Building

Because of the increasing number of students we seem constantly to be faced with new buildings. It is comforting therefore to record that the eight-room addition to the Happy Hollow School was completed during the summer and occupied in September.

Modifications were completed on the high school building in time for September; the cafeteria expansion is essentially complete and the 400 student addition is proceeding very well and will be ready for occupancy by March, although will not go into full-scale use until September.

For the future the older schools must be updated. Extensive work has been done at the Cochituate School and similar work must be done at the Junior High School. The latter will be an expensive project but major modifications are essential in order to give us a building in which to conduct the best Junior High program. The School Building Committee and the Finance Committee are aware of this impending major expense and reasonable financing looks possible.

Educational

As you are all aware, our schools have been faced with many problems. Much hard work has gone into providing classrooms and teachers just to keep up with the number of students. This might be thought enough. However, two other factors have made the task even more difficult. One is the need for expansion while at the same time continuing to improve the quality of education. The other is the need for modifications in class organization and in course curricula. In a dynamic search for the best, strengths appear and weaknesses are bound to show up. It is necessary to keep a very close check on the whole activity so that errors can be detected and corrected and so that strengths will be found and advantage taken of them. Great credit is due our superintendent for the outstanding manner in which he has been able to keep his finger on all phases and to recommend or take remedial action so as constantly to strengthen the whole system.

Particularly noteworthy have been his teacher evaluation and selection, and his coordination of subject matter and basic-skills teaching throughout all the grades.

Teachers and Administrators

Interested as we are in improving the quality of our education, teachers rank high in our considerations. We want better and better teachers when replacements or additions are necessary. However, we are not alone in this desire. This means there is increasing competition among towns and cities to obtain the better teachers. How does a town compete? The most obvious way is by better salary conditions. We have felt that our salary system should be among the best, and it has been for several years. The results are what we hoped, for we are attracting more and more outstanding teachers. It is an economic fact of life that if you want the best you must pay for it. This can, surely, be overdone if your goal is beyond what you can afford. However, the salaries we pay, we feel, reflect the town's wishes for the finest education within its ability to pay.

We wish to express our sincere appreciation to all of the members of the school system; those who keep the building in order, those who serve the food and those who keep the offices running smoothly. We wish also to thank the many town boards and offices without whose cooperation our task would be more difficult.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee:

In this, the sixty-ninth Annual Report of the Superintendent of Wayland Public Schools, the Superintendent wishes to inform you of some programs influencing the education of our children.

The Town Meeting of 1965 authorized the establishment of a Pre-School Summer Program for any child scheduled to enter school in September 1965. It was not intended or believed that the experience would be the equivalent of a full-year of kindergarten training, but it was a start toward making classes available which would help pupils prepare for first grade.

Out of 375 pupils entering grade one in September 1965, 120 were enrolled in the July-August program. 24 pupils entering last September had no formal kindergarten training either in a regular program or the summer program. Of the 120 pupils in the summer program, 57 had attended a regular kindergarten and 63 had no prior school experience.

Length of daily sessions: 8:30-11:30

6 teacher aides

The actual costs of the $1965\ \mathrm{summer}\ \mathrm{pre}\text{-first}$ grade program were as follows:

The teachers were unanimous in endorsing the values derived by pupils from the experience. The judgment of the staff, bolstered by testing results, indicates a significant growth in the student's ability to live and work in school. A questionnaire mailed to parents yielded the same results.

While the first year of the pre-school program was successful, and should be continued next year, we should not allow it to extend the time before a regular kindergarten is begun.

A self-supporting Summer School is planned for the High School in 1966. The courses offered will be in English, Social Studies, Mathematics, Driver Education (classroom), and Typing. Reading for both elementary and secondary school pupils will also be taught. While the nature of the program at its inception will be largely corrective, it is planned to have it enlarged and furnish course work of an enriching nature later.

The school libraries continue to show desirable growth in volumes accessioned, and regular reports from all schools indicate a steadily increased use of facilities by pupils. Full-time library aides will be found in each elementary school next year for the first time. The Junior High School library poses a serious problem because of its use as a cafeteria for one and one-half hours each day, thereby excluding its use for library purposes for approximately one-quarter of the school day.

Small group teaching in Reading, English, and Mathematics at the Junior High School is now in its second year and objective evidence points toward greater proficiency of pupils in these areas. Next year all students will have three periods of instruction in reading at the seventh and eighth grade levels. This course will be in addition to the regular English classes and will be designed to develop skills appropriate for various levels of achievement.

The ninth grade total program has been redesigned to build on that of grades 7-8 and prepare students for the transition from a Junior High School type of schedule to that of the upper years, grades 10, 11, and 12, with its program of variable sized groupings, periods of instruction per week, and number of teachers with whom a student studies.

Refinement of track programs in the academic discipline continues. The emphasis is on flexibility, in order to allow for movement from one track to another at the highest grade levels for which it is practical. For example, the modern language program is under study in grades 7-12 and will be undergoing substantial revision.

While courses of study have been completed for all subjects, the various departments set new goals each year with work toward an updating of materials and ideas used as a means of maintaining a dynamic curriculum.

Anything worthwhile that goes on in a school system can, in the final analysis, be traced to the teaching staff in the classroom, because it is here that the actual work with boys and girls takes place. The fact that 82 percent of the school budget is due to professional salaries is an indication

of the importance placed on the contribution made by the teachers. Our rate of turnover has been decreasing and we should hope to see it continue.

R. BRUCE MCGILL Superintendent of Schools To the School Committee:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report and the sixth annual report of the Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

A most important function of this office is the collection, preparation and presentation of data to the School Committee to aid in the formulation of the annual School Budget. A brief survey of the forthcoming budget indicates that rising costs are primarily related to a continued increase in student enrollment, a necessarily corresponding expansion of professional staff and academic or program offerings, and consequent expansion of the auxiliary services which support the educational program.

In Massachusetts, the brunt of school operating costs are borne by the various communities. However, it is important to note that State reimbursements for education somewhat reduce the total cost of school operations for communities. For example, in 1965, Wayland was reimbursed in the following amounts:

In addition, the School Department itself returns unexpended budget funds to the Town. In 1965, these returns to the Excess and Deficiency Fund will total \$28,947.96.

It should further be noted that the Town receives a 50% State reimbursement for the construction of new school buildings or additions to existing school buildings.

The preparation of a Budget Document represents four months of concentrated effort by the School Committee and administrative personnel. However, since the school budget is a financial reflection of the educational program desired by the community, it is important to constantly evaluate and analyze the budget so as to insure that it produces its desired educational effects.

During the past year, school building projects resulted in the September opening of the Happy Hollow School Addition and continuation of the plant modernization program in the Cochituate School. In the very near future, emphasis will need to be placed on improving the physical facilities of the Junior High School so that increasing enrollments in grades 7 and 8 can be accommodated, and so that refinements and/or expansion of program can better be accomplished.

The plan to centralize purchasing for the school system will continue to be refined and expanded during the coming year by virtue of the availability of a Head Custodian. A primary function of this position will be to conduct an initial audit of the custodial and general teaching supplies in each school followed by the development of a permanent inventory system designed to provide more economical purchasing procedures conducted through the central administrative office. In addition, the head custodian will establish better defined preventive maintenance and annual maintenance schedules.

The School Department fully appreciates the cooperation and assistance of other town departments in the process of discharging its duties during the past year.
