#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, 1934, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following matters:

Article 1. To choose a town clerk.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the selectmen, treasurer, cemetery commissioners, and any other town officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To choose one selectman for the term of three years, a town treasurer, one or more highway agents, one or more auditors, one library trustee for the term of three years, one cemetery commissioner for the term of five years, one trustee of trust funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary town officers.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money required to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the town and payment of statutory obligations of the town, as recommended by the finance committee in its budget report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for the purposes so determined, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one hundred dollars for Old Home Day observance.

Article 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor in said town to whom relief has been denied by the emergency relief administration, the moneys so to be raised and appropriated to be expended under the

authority and direction of the selectmen, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

- Article 7. To see if the town will vote for a discount of four per cent for the prepayment of real estate and personal property taxes if paid on or before July 1, 1934.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to issue interest bearing orders or notes to provide for the current year expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine the taxable property.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to appoint a budget committee to supervise the appropriations of the town and to recommend to the next annual meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to grant permits to druggists for the sale of liquor in this town for medicinal, scientific and mechanical purposes, under the provisions of chapter 144 of the Public Laws.
- Article 13. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under the provisions of Chapter 99 of the session laws of 1933.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to restrict the number of sessions held by the supervisors of check lists to those required by statute, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 15. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

#### REPORT OF SELECTMEN

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Haverhill:

We submit our report for the year ending January 31, 1934. Upon the following pages will be found the detailed statements.

During December 1932 we received collector's deeds on property amounting to \$7,059.91 and during the past year we have collected on these deeds by the sale of this property \$6,207.18. The difference between these figures plus the amount deeded in 1933 amounts to \$8,530.93 or the amount as shown on the financial statement under "Deeded Previous Years."

There is always a question regarding the large amount paid the collector in the item of Town Officers' Expenses, amounting this year to \$822.19. We wish to explain that \$629.19 of this amount is returned to the Town in the collection of costs on previous years' taxes redeemed.

We have been requested to insert Article 11 in the warrant and as an explanation we are quoting the law in regard to this article.

Chapter 24
Supervisors of the Check-List
Section 6
Sessions for Correction

They shall be in session for the correction of the check-list, at some suitable place in town, two days at

least before the day of the election, one of which shall be the day next preceding that of election, and upon which all hearings shall be closed. If the town has more than six hundred legal voters the first session shall be upon the Tuesday next preceding the day of election, and shall be adjourned to such subsequent day or days as will permit all claims to be heard and decided. Notice of the day, hour and place of each session shall be given upon the posted check-lists.

The amount necessary to balance the Budget this year is \$4,143.89 less than last year.

Town highway maintenance is being cut again this year and much credit is due Harold P. Blake, Road Agent, for his efficient handling of these funds.

Article No. 11 to restrict the number of sessions held by the Supervisors of the Check List prior to elections should receive favorable action.

Our present arrangement is a custom of stage coach days. We believe the two days required by law to be sufficient. If your budget of the future is to show much decrease from present amount, it will have to be accomplished by each division giving more careful attention to the small items of expense. We believe these would aggregate a substantial amount.

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Woodsville:

I am pleased to present my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools.

During the year 1932-1933 the enrollment for the elementary grades was 285, for the high school, 202, making a total of 487. Of these pupils 21 in the grades and 94 in the high school were non-residents. The percentage of attendance was 95.50; cases of tardiness, 263; school visits made by members of the board, 5; by the superintendent, 278; by citizens 515.

Elementary Grades: Helen A. Franklin, grade six; Marion F. Smith, grade five; Marjorie E. Deming, grade four; Muriel Ellingwood, grade three; Mildred E. Emery, grade two; Florence Lang, grade one; Lottie M. B. Underhill, school nurse; Earl Whittier and William Fillian, janitors.

For the most part the buildings and equipment are in good shape. The typewriting room and the laboratory were both enlarged this last summer, and have been found much improved. There is need of another chemistry work table. This could be made by local carpenters and plumbers at a small cost. Double roll window shades would be a great help in controlling the light in some of the rooms in the grade building.

The work of the schools seems to be progressing well. The graduates of the high school usually find themselves prepared to go on to higher schools and colleges where they make good records. The extracurricula activities described in Mr. McGaw's report, we feel are a worth while part of the high school. The lessons of good sportsmanship learned on the athletic field are valuable. The interest in music, dramatics, and writing provided in other activities broadens the pupils' horizon and furnishes opportunity for the development of special abilities.

The enterprise of the intermediate and junior high school grades in raising money and buying two pianos deserves our commendation.

It was a pleasure to have so many parents and friends visit the schools the two evening sessions and see the pupils doing their regular work.

We again wish to express our appreciation to the woman's clubs who have furnished milk and crackers for needy children, and to the other friends who have helped in transporting the athletic teams.

### REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I offer herewith my sixteenth annual report of the Woodsville High School, for the year ending January 26, 1934.

There have been registered one hundred sixty-eight pupils, of whom thirty-nine are counted as seniors, thirty-seven juniors, fifty-two second year, and forty first year. There have been seventy-four tuition pupils from twelve districts.

A list has been compiled recently of all pupils attending this school since August 31, 1896, on which date Mr. S. W. Robertson began his period of principalship. It appears that thirteen hundred and fifty-three pupils have entered during these thirty-eight years; five hundred and ninety-two have graduated; some four hundred have left for definite reasons, such as health, employment, and moving from town; some two hundred have dropped out for reasons unknown. It would be of value possibly to know in how far the school had failed to be of real service to those who left without definite cause.

The class of 1933 was the thirty-seventh to graduate. and had thirty-eight members: Blanche E. Adams, M. Karl Boemig, Carl W. Boothroyd, Charlotte E. Boothroyd, E. Drusilla Brown, Irving E. Brown, Roy R. Bullard, Lina J. Caravatti, Leslie R. Chamberlin, John B. Chapman, Eleanor R. Church, Hubert J. Eastman, Francis R. Ford, John Fullerton, Anselmo C. Garbati, Roger F. Gilman, Kenneth J. Harrison, Evelyn R. Hill, Oscar A. Johnson, Geraldine M. Keyser, Alice M. McLaughlin, John E. McNulty, Florence B. McQuesten, Roger E. Morse, Dorena M. Moulton, W. Henry Nelson, Esther K. Norris, William C. Petrie. Dorothy A. Pierce, Margaret K. Pierce, Oliver C. Prescott, Dorothy I. Ralston, Dantina E. Rosa, Maxwell H. Stewart, Roland G. Thayer, Genevieve M. Venturini, Guido Venturini, and Roderick P. Whittier.

Carl Boothroyd was rated first in scholarship, and Lina Caravatti was second. The Alumni Attainment award was given to Irving Brown, presentation being made by Dean Cochran '24. The Perley N. Klark music award for efficiency and service was made to Carl Boothroyd. Mrs. John Parker, a former teacher, offered special awards in memory of the late janitor William Burbank to be assigned to two graduates distinguished for unassuming faithfulness to duty, and

these were given to Roderick Whittier and Florence McQuesten. Supt. Janes gave an address on the values to be found in the various courses given in the school. The Class presented a gift of two trophy cabinets which have been placed in the study hall.

Baccalaureate, class day, and reception, all took place in the school auditorium, and we think this a good custom which ought to be continued.

Seven recent graduates are at Durham, seven at Burlington, and seven in normal schools; twenty others are at various post-secondary institutions. Several having completed college courses are now in professional schools.

Education week was recognized by an evening sestion to which some hundred visitors came to see the classes in action.

Forty juniors participated in public speaking, appearing on the platform in four groups. Mrs. G. H. McGaw did the coaching as one of her contributions to the interests of the community.

Several groups of pupils appeared on programs from the radio station in Waterbury, Vt., and on one occasion the history of the school was broadcast. \* \* \* The medal given by the Colonial Daughters for a superior patriotic essay was awarded to John Chapman. \* \* \* The Quill and Scroll society elected nine new members, and meets as a Chapter from time to time. \* \* \* The assemblies have been enlivened by numerous addresses on travel, local history, education, and inspirational topics. \* \* \* Several regular activities continue as before—the Cycle, football, field hockey, basket ball, base ball, band, orchestra, outing club sports, Junior promenade, one-act play composition, state scholarship day, celebration of national holidays, and participation in community projects. \* \* \* A prize in the state Fidac essay contest was won by Ruth Rouhan. \* \* \* Noon lunches were served during the winter; and a dinner was served for the local Rotary club. \* \* \* The Alumni association has presented a plaque upon which are placed the names of winners of the annual award; this hangs in the assembly hall. \* \* \* Details of many events are published in the local newspapers, and are preserved in the scrap books.

These days of readjustment in national life do lay a challenge to the school, and amid all the confusion of thinking let it stand clear that earnest preparation still has its reward. Dame Fortune continues to offer her gifts to those able to accept. Our study hall has often carried a saying of Lincoln's youthful years—"I will study and get ready, and maybe my chance will come."

# REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD OF HAVERHILL

We the undersigned, members of the Haverhill School Board, submit the following report:

Last year's appropriation of \$850.00 for minor repairs and expenses was so very small that our report on the subject must necessarily be short, especially since all bills for cleaning and equipment must be paid from this amount. Emergencies always arise during the year that cannot be foreseen, thus making it difficult to know what can be spent during the summer for permanent repairs. The wood work at North Haverhill was painted on the outside. The lighting in the main room at the High School, which has never been good, was improved by painting the ceiling and installing new fixtures. The chimney at East Haverhill repaired and a slight curvature in one side of the Pike building remedied.

We hoped to be able to paint the interior of Alumni Hall. We went so far as to ask for bids for the job, but there appeared to be insufficient money and a thorough washing of the walls and ceiling had to suffice. This cleaning was an improvement but painting must be provided in the near future to make the Hall respectable.

In calling the attention of the voters to the budget, it seems wise to remind them that these figures are the proposed expenditures for the period from July 1st, 1934 to June 30, 1935. It is difficult at any time to forecast what will be needed so far in the future. At this time the difficulty is far greater. It is predicted that the devalued dollar will produce a radical rise in prices. The accompanying figures are based on values of today. It may be impossible for the School Board to provide the necessities with the money which will be available. It will require the cooperation of parents, teachers and School Board to avoid a deficit.

The School Meeting of last year passed a vote excluding married teachers from teaching in the Town Schools, approximately 8% of the voters of the district favoring it. Two members of your School Board with no thought of being personal or arbitrary refused to be bound by this vote for several reasons. It was not a representative vote. It was illegal. It was an attempt to dictate to the Superintendent on a nomination which the law says he shall submit to the School Board for election. It disregarded entirely the fact that schools exist for the benefit of the pupil and not the teacher. There can be no justification for any action that denies those in authority the right to secure the best teachers that our money can provide. The last available figures from the State show that the average salary paid to Haverhill teachers was \$183. less than the State average for elementary teachers. This year, owing to the 10% cut in salaries we are paying nearly \$100. less than last year. This demonstrates that it is impossible to go into the market for teachers, on our present basis of payment and get anything better than below the average. As to the quality of the work that our teaching force is doing we have tangible proof in the results of the State Scholarship contests last spring, in which Haverhill Academy teams won first place in U.S. Constitutional History and second in English in competition with the best the State had to offer. Our present

teaching force is one of high efficiency and very low cost. These facts speak for themselves. Furthermore there is justification for the belief that our increase in tuition pupils is not a matter of chance, but a recognition by parents of adjacent towns that Haverhill provides educational opportunities second to none. We also take pleasure in reporting that we placed in positions two local normal graduates and that so far as we know no qualified Haverhill teacher is without a position.

As a School Board we are taking this opportunity to express our tribute to the memory of Dr. Fred C. Russell, who has served so long and faithfully for the best interests of our schools. Dr. Russell's ability and strength of character combined to make him an excellent public official, who could never be moved from the path of duty, as he saw it. It has been a pleasure as well as an inspiration to serve with him.

During the year 1932-1933 the enrollment in the elementary grades was 320, in the high school, 103, making a total of 423. The various buildings are in a good state of repair and fairly well equipped. The desks at Pike would be greatly improved if they could be done over. At Haverhill Academy there is need of a hot water supply in the kitchen. This could be done at a small cost by installing a boiler connected to one of the furnaces. In this way heat would be obtained without any added cost. The work in chemistry is handicapped by lack of equipment and suitable tables. A couple of long tables supplied with water taps and drainage troughs could be built by local help at a moderate figure.

The extra-curricula activities carried on at the Academy are especially to be commended. An enriched program is valuable in itself and goes far to stimulate interest and enthusiasm in all school work. The help in transportation and in other ways given by friends of the school has made possible many of these worthwhile activities.

I wish to express to Mrs. Herbert Smith the thanks of the district for her gift of a piano to the Pike school.

#### REPORT OF HEADMASTER

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herein my tenth annual report of Haverhill Academy and High School for the year ending January 31, 1934.

The total enrollment to date is 117. This exceeds last year's record enrollment by 14. The records show that the enrollment for the past nine years has been as follows: 1924-1925, 83; 1925-1926, 91; 1926-1927, 90; 1927-1928, 92; 1928-1929, 83; 1929-1930, 77; 1930-1931, 75; 1931-1932, 91; 1932-1933, 103. Of this year's enrollment 61 are girls and 56 are boys. There are 19 seniors, 26 juniors, 25 sophomores and 47 freshmen. Nineteen are tuition pupils.

The following pupils graduated in June: Katherine Applebee, Mary Carmichael, Daniel Carr, Lena Dargie, Hazel Dunkley, Barbara Jeffers, Charlotte Keith, Howard Kimball, John Lange, Rita Leonard, Glenn McKean, Eben Morrill, Martha Reed, Ralph Reed, Bert Robinson, Doris Ross, Madeline Shallow, Erville Smith, Charles Wheeler, Wilma White, Esther Winn.

First and second honors were won by Hazel Dunkley and Katherine Applebee respectively. Hazel Dunkley also won the John Dexter Locke Latin Prize. The Scholarship and Achievement Medal was won by Daniel Carr.

In the annual state tests given to all seniors in the state the class scored above both the standard and the state median in all three. Two teams, one in English grammar and one in American history, were sent to Plymouth Normal to compete in the annual Scholarship Day Contest. The team in American History won first place and the English Grammar team won second place. Nearly every high school in the state was represented by one or more teams.

There has been added to the extra-curricula activities this year a boys' glee club and a junior orchestra. There are about 60 pupils in the Boys' and Girls' Glee Clubs combined. The junior orchestra has 11 members and the senior orchestra nine. The girls' basketball team won 11 out of 12 games played during the 1932-1933 season and the boys won 7 out of 12. The baseball team tied Bradford for the cup in the newly formed baseball league. Each team lost but 2 games. Both teams lost one game each to Newbury and one game each to each other.

The annual Senior play was given on April 14. Several school parties, sponsored by the different classes, have been given during the year. The proceeds from the parties are used to buy music for the orchestras and glee clubs.

There has been added to the program of studies two new subjects, "Business Administration" and "Commercial Geography." Business Administration is offered in the senior year and is elective for all except those taking the Commerce course. Commercial Geography is offered in the junior year and will alternate with Modern History, which was previously offered in the sophomore year.

The willingness of the taxpayers of this community to raise the funds necessary to provide educational opportunities during the stress of this economic period is evidence that they realize the fact that the material losses due to the exigencies of such periods can be quickly and easily regained but that the educational losses of the children of this generation are gone forever.
