#### TO THE RESIDENTS OF BETHLEHEM:

In submitting this financial report to you, we wish to draw your attention to several facts.

The town debt has been increased \$1,597.88. Against this increase, the Selectmen purchased the Bethlehem Amusement property for \$2,000 in order to protect other town property. The September hurricane and flood ruined the water line and highways. Immediately the Selectmen contacted W. P. A. officials in Manchester and Berlin and arranged for a repair project in Bethlehem. In doing this practically all labor cost was paid by the government, and all trucks, materials, etc., was paid by the town, amounting to \$4,329.38 on highways alone for their part, besides expending approximately \$1,000 of highway money for necessary emergency work before the project started.

Had these extra expenditures not been forced upon us the town debt would have been decreased by the amount of \$3,731.50.



# Superintendent's Report

To the School Board:

I herewith present the following report relative to your schools:

The school registers show that the total enrollment this year to the last of January is as follows:

The enrollment to date this year is practically the same as last year somewhat smaller than for the years immediately preceding. Of the 194 registered this year only 158 are now in school. Some of these 36 non-members will return in the spring. The cost per pupil shown on another page is reckoned on the average membership. This cost is somewhat greater than in most schools of the same size because the membership is greatly increased in the fall and the spring, and equipment and books must be provided for all pupils.

#### MEDICAL INSPECTION AND REMEDIAL WORK

During the present school year Miss Bryant has arranged for all pupils having dental defects to have the opportunity of treatment. Pupils having vision defects, whose parents have been unable to pay for glasses, have been given the opportunity for examination and have been furnished glasses. Not all of the pupils with listed vision defects need glasses. A throat clinic will be held next summer. The smaller number of pupils ten per cent underweight is an encouraging indication of the progress in health work. A hot cup of cocoa or soup is being furnished during the winter months this year as in former years—at cost to those who can afford to pay for same, free to those underweight pupils who cannot afford to pay for it. No Federal funds for milk or lunches are now available.

For the past two years the town of Bethlehem has appropriated \$300.00 and the school district \$150.00 for the district nursing association. This money has been part of the fund that has maintained a district nurse in Littleton and Bethlehem. Miss Bryant has been very active in conducting the health work in school. She gives considerable time to the families in Bethlehem in addition to the school work. Her efforts extend to a study of the needs for food and clothing and medicine, and to ways of procuring those needs in all homes to which she is called. No one except the families helped realizes the full scope of her activities. The money necessary for carrying out her program has been donated by interested organizations and individuals in both towns. The service is very much needed.

During the past five years considerable revision has been made in the high school program of studies. The program now includes four units (year courses) in English, four in science, four units in mathematics, five units in social science, four in commerce, and two each in Latin and French. The outline of the new English program recommended by the State Board of Education is being quite closely followed. The program in social science is now being revised by a committee of the Educational Council working with the office of the State Board of Education. An outline for a program in safety education in all grades has been recently printed by the State Board of Education. This program is in the hands of all teachers. Safety is taught largely in connection with other subjects. A new series of safety readers has been purchased for the first six grades this year.

Recommended outlines for instruction in arts and crafts will soon be published by the State Board. You might wisely consider offering one or two year's courses in crafts, selecting from the suggested program such units of work as seem most useful to the pupils in Bethlehem. These courses are: weaving, hooked and braided rugs, art metal, jewelry, block printing, woodcarving, pottery. These courses would probably be much less expensive to introduce than courses in woodworking and perhaps less expensive than courses in home economics. Any accredited high school teacher who takes an intensive course in arts and crafts at summer school will be permitted to teach this subject.

A much larger percentage of the total enrollment is in high school than a decade ago. To meet the needs of these pupils some courses of vocational or avocational nature should be given.

Miss Smith resigned a short time before school was scheduled to open in September. Miss Mary L. Hogan of Watertown, Mass., a graduate of Regis College, was selected to teach English, Latin and French. Miss Hogan was highly recommended by Regis College. Miss Edith C. Linton of Antrim, N. H., one of the highest ranking students in class work and in practice teaching in last year's class at Plymouth Normal School was selected to teach junior high school subjects and mathematics in the high school. Both of these young ladies are doing good work. They have been very helpful in the extra-curricular activities of the high school. No other changes have occurred in the teaching staff.

For several years standard intelligence tests have been given in grades one, four, seven, nine and twelve. A general achievement test has been given near the close of the school year in grades four to eight inclusive. Reading tests have been given in the first grade, and tests in reading, spelling and arithmetic in the second and third grades. In the high school standard tests selected by the teachers have been given in certain subjects. The intelligence test given the senior class, and tests in two subjects also given the seniors have been under the direction of the State Board of Education. The results of these tests are available for the use of the teachers at all times. They should be helpful in judging ability and achievement. They do not tell the whole story of any pupil's progress. This year silent reading tests have been given to pupils in grades four to nine inclusive. These tests have been studied for pupils' weaknesses and some remedial work has been attempted. Another form of the same test will be given later and progress noted.

During the past year swings and teeter boards have been purchased for the playground. A unit heater has been placed in the unused room in the basement and some play equipment has been purchased for this room. The office, teachers' room, and some classrooms have been painted and other minor repairs have been made.

Mrs. Alice Glessner and Mrs. Frances G. Lee have given several pictures to the school. Mr. Alvin Ivie has given a large bronze tablet with Lincoln's Gettysburg Address. Mrs. D. A. McKinley has given a copy of the Declaration of Independence.

The budget you have approved for the next school year, July 1, 1939 to June 30, 1940, is \$28,580.00. If this budget is not exceeded it will be the smallest expenditure since 1932. The present school year will close with an estimated balance of \$900.00 - \$1,000.00. The receipts from the Federal Forest Reserve fund will probably be less next year than in most previous years. A district appropriation of \$27,500.00 will be necessary to balance the budget. This is somewhat less than has been appropriated in recent years.

The school district bonds are now reduced to \$65,000.00. The building has been maintained in good condition, and considerable equipment has been added since its dedication. The present program of financing includes the payment of \$5,000.00 on the bond issue and interest on same each year. It also provides that the payments for insurance, equipment and repairs shall be about the same each year. Without definite curtailment of the present program of instruction further reduction in the appropriation will not be possible for several years, probably not until the bonds are retired. The request for this year is smaller than usual, in fact, because of the expected balance. It represents a small tax on the equalized valuation of the district in comparison with other school districts. The expenditure last year was \$8.11 on the equalized valuation. Only 11 districts in the state spent less and 230 spent more.

I appreciate keenly your interest in all school problems and your cooperation in my efforts for the improvement of the schools.

# Headmaster's Report

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my annual report and summary of work. The total enrollment of the present year is 49. There are 10 seniors, 17 juniors, 10 sophomores, 9 freshmen and 3 post-graduates.

The percent of attendance to date is above the state median. The number of tardiness per pupil is lower than last year for the same period of time.

The health of the pupils in the school is very good. Pupils, however, who are suffering from bad colds should remain at home, thereby lessening the possibility of infecting others and endangering their own health. Pupils are carefully watched to prevent the spread of contagion or infection.

Each teacher has charge of some extra-curricular activity in the school. These activities, which are carefully supervised, play an important part in a child's mental and physical development. These activities include basketball for both boys and girls, baseball, golf, winter sports, dramatics, prize speaking and school socials. This year several boys and girls are competing in the state wide contest in one-act play production. Each play written is to be produced by pupils of the high school. The high school is to be represented by one play in the state wide contest.

The winner of the prize speaking contest will compete in the state finals at Durham. One or more scholarship teams will participate in state wide examinations held at Plymouth. To prevent too many school programs near the close of the year the senior class play was given during the fall term. The response of the large number who attended indicated that it came up to the high standard maintained in the past. A large number appreciated the Christmas program. The annual Pop Concert will be presented later. Knowing that people appreciate fine performances we will do our best not to disappoint them.

The Activities Association which was organized last year is proving very successful. Without such an organization it would be impossible to properly finance the activities of the school.

Our program of studies includes courses in French, Latin, English, Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics, Physiography, Economics, Sociology, and three history courses. The commercial course is adapted to give pupils an elementary training in the field of business. The program of studies has enough college preparatory subjects so that pupils who have applied themselves diligently in high school may enter college or other post secondary school with reasonable expectation of success. In addition to various tests already given, reading tests were given to grades five through nine. Much of a child's difficulty in school is due to reading difficulties. Each case was carefully diagnosed and those with reading difficulties were given special help. The results have already more than justified the work done in this line. Although we are somewhat handicapped for lack of time we hope to extend this work in other studies.

I am gratified to report that almost all of the boys and girls are taking their work more seriously. The teachers are continually trying to impress on them the value of work well done. We do not feel, however, that all work is well done. Even higher standards should be placed before them as a real challenge to good work. Hot lunches are served during the winter months at a minimum charge. Those who cannot afford to pay are not deprived of this lunch.

In closing I wish to thank you for your valuable help to the teachers and to me. I also wish to express my appreciation to the school board, the teachers, Mr. Norman, and citizens for their hearty cooperation throughout the school year.
