



THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town's Meeting House in said Henniker on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

The articles in the warrant will be taken up at 10:00 o'clock a. m., and the polls will be closed at 6:00 p. m.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
- 3. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds and other committees.

- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of highways and bridges.
- 5. To see what action the town will take in regard to the Public Health Nursing Association, raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate, to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, in addition to that required by law, for the support of Tucker Free Library.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the Fire Department, or take any action relative thereto.
- 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, for the purpose of defraying the cost and expense during the ensuing year of providing and maintaining hydrant service for the extinguishing of fires.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to reinsure the town buildings and town trucks.
- 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.

- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward paying its indebtedness or take any action relative thereto.
- 13. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 14. To see what action the town will vote to take to prevent the spread of White Pine Blister Rust, raise money for the same or take any action relative thereto.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside the sum of \$1,025.67.
- 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for observance of Old Home Day or take any action relative thereto.
- 17. To see what action the town will take in regard to relaying a new main water pipe from the pumping station corner east to end of line near J. K. Wadleigh's, raise or appropriate money for same, or take any action relative thereto.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase a town grader or other road equipment, raise or appropriate money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.
- 19. To see what action the town will take relative to Flood Control in the Upper Contoocook Valley.

20. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

The above tabulation shows that about six more half-sessions were lost this year than during the previous year. This was due to the hurricane and stormy days during the winter. The average membership was about fifteen less than that of the previous year and the percent of attendance much better. The tardiness per pupil has also decreased, but is still higher than it should be. The number of pupils registered was 296. Of these four were elementary tuition pupils, and three high school tuition pupils. This makes the number of pupils residing in the district and attending public schools 289. This is 19 less than last year.

At Christmas time 1939 the high school facilities for visual education were greatly improved by the presentation of a 16 mm moving picture machine with sound projector and recording attachment by the Cogswell Benevolent Trust. This also opens the way to a course in music appreciation which can be started as soon as the necessary graphophone records can be secured. In behalf of the pupils and teachers we wish to thank those responsible for this great gift to the school. It makes possible much improvement in our visual and musical education.

At the Central building there is need of new toilets, and lowering the black boards in the rooms for grades I and II. The piano in this building is in great need of repairs. As a good second-hand instrument can be purchased for about \$35.00, it would probably be more economical to buy one of these than to repair the old one. The stage and seats in the hall in this building should also be repaired. For most occasions when an assembly of the elementary pupils is necessary this hall could be used to better advan-

tage than the gymnasium in the high school building. It is nearly always warm, costs less to heat and is much better adapted to elementary school use. In connection with this topic we would suggest that we believe the cost of heating the high school gymnasium could be reduced considerably by the installation of a modern fan or blower system.

In general satisfactory progress was made in all departments of school work. We wish to express our appreciation of the cooperation of the board, teachers and parents in making this possible.
