TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hinsdale qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall, on Tuesday the 9th day of March, 1948, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, polls not to close before 7 P. M., to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To elect all necessary town officers.

Article 2. To elect a delegate from Hinsdale to a State Convention to consider revising the Constitution of the State of New Hampshire.

Article 3. To elect delegates at large, alternate delegates at large, delegates and alternate delegates to the national conventions of the various political parties to be held to nominate party candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.

Article 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of ordinary town charges, for the maintenance of the fire department, for highways, for schools and for all other necessary expenses arising within the town.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to adopt the non-partisan ballot system for the election of town officers as provided for under Chapter 22, Laws of 1943 and amendments in place of the Australian ballot system.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to extend the sewer from Northfield Road up Snow Avenue to Stanley Dubriske's house and borrow on the credit of the town the sum of Ten Thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) (Engineers' estimate) for installing the extension or act in any manner thereon.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to extend the sewer from the Pelech farm to the Fostyck place on Northfield road and borrow on the credit of the town \$24,841.00 (Engineers' estimate) to install the extension or act in any manner thereon.

Article 8. To see what action the town will take in regard to supplying water for fire protection and domestic use for property on Brattleboro road.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to install a fire hydrant near the bend in Highland Avenue opposite the house of Lizzie Fisher, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise or appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$300.00 to straighten the road and lower the grade at the corner north of the residence of Glenn Covey on the ox-bow road, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to keep and maintain a road to Mountainside Farm.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise or borrow Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00) (Engineers' estimate) to extend the water line on Cottage street 700 feet to the Plain road and then north 300 feet on the Plain road or act in any manner thereon.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to extend the sewer to include the Langille corner lot property on the westerly end of Highland Avenue and borrow on the credit of the town \$14,640.00 (Engineers' estimate) to extend the same or act in any manner thereon.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 to purchase a new lowering device and grass mat to replace those at present in use at the cemetery or act in any manner thereon.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to continue the collection of rubbish and garbage for the ensuing year and appropriate the sum of \$1,320.00 for this purpose, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate or borrow the sum of \$1,000.00 to purchase a new automobile for the use of the Public Health nurse, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the payment of the sum of \$2,773.33, the balance between the purchase price of the new truck, sand spreader and snow plow and the amount received by the sale of the old truck and plow.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to sell the spring that formerly supplied the town hall with water, on land now owned by Mary Bolden, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to erect a permanent War Memorial on Jackwood Park, consisting of a field stone, with a bronze tablet thereon, bearing all the names of World War 2 veterans, also to remove the tablet of World War 1 from the town hall and place it with the new memorial on Jackwood Park. Also to take the present temporary honor roll and place it in Veterans' Hall and appoint a committee to carry out these projects or act in any manner thereon.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken under article one of the warrant at the Special Town Meeting held September 2nd, 1947 relative to deeding part of the playground to the School District, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to place a street light on the pole next to the Boston and Maine Railroad crossing on Depot Hill.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate or borrow a sum not exceeding \$5,000.00 for the purchase of a new fire truck, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$433.05 to which the State will contribute \$1,732.21 to be expended on Class 5 roads.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to allow the High School and Youth Organizations the use of the Town Hall Auditorium for basketball games and practice under supervision of the Playground Committee.

Article 25. Contingent on the passage of Article 24, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for necessary alterations and equipment to prepare the Auditorium for basketball use, to the approval of the Playground Committee, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Water and Sewer Commissioners to make a sewer charge of ten per cent of the water bill, to each sewer connection, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 27. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

As requested, we have studied the problems (1) of extension of the water distribution system and (2) of the extension of certain sewers, and submit our report herewith.

WATER SYSTEM EXTENSIONS

The water distribution problem relates (1) to supplying the northwesterly part of Hinsdale along Brattleboro Road, Plain Street and certain connecting streets, and, (2) to extensions beyond the southerly end of the existing system.

NORTHWESTERLY EXTENSION. The area in question is bounded by Brattleboro Road and Plain Street. It is limited on the north by the street on which Oak Grove Church is located, and extends about 4,000 ft. on Brattleboro Road beyond the Monument. It is believed to be advantageous to proceed first out Plain Street, to Plains School and Oak Grove Church, thence to the Monument and finally on Brattleboro Road.

Three methods of supply suggest themselves, as follows:

I (a) A booster pumping station on Plain Street not far from Brattleboro Road, and a tank or standpipe at

- a suitable location midway or further along the length of pipe in Plain Street.
- I (b) A similar pump at the filter plant, pumping over the intervening ridge to a similar storage tank.
- II Utilization of the head now available in the supply main from the filter plant just above the pressure reducing valve by carrying a new pipe from Chesterfield Road up the slope to the road running parallel to Chesterfield Road and thence to Highland Avenue where by a suitable revision of gates the 8-in. Highland Avenue pipe could be used as a high-service line, and then extended to and along Plain Street. A storage tank would be necessary out Plain Street as in the other alternatives.

BOOSTER PUMPING PROJECTS I (a) and I (b). The pump of Project I (a) would require a smaller motor and would involve less operating cost than that of Project I (b) because of the high ridge over which the latter must force the water. Furthermore, about a mile of the pipe involved in Project I (b) would be across country and therefore unproductive, whereas the pipe of Project I (a) would be available to prospective customers throughout its length. It is concluded that Project I (a) is the better of the two booster pumping plans.

It is estimated that the construction cost of a booster pumping station would be about \$12,000. The cost of pipe and standpipe are discussed in a later section.

GRAVITY PROJECT II. This plan would avoid pumping; would make water available along the easterly extension of Highland Avenue which is a very sightly location for development; and would utilize about 2,000 ft. of existing pipe on Highland Avenue incidentally raising the pressure along this street. The estimated construction cost of modification of existing gating of the Highland Avenue pipe and of new pipe from Chesterfield Road to Highland Avenue is about \$19,000.

This is comparable with the estimate for Project I (a). Pipe to and beyond Plain Street, and storage tank, are common to both projects.

PIPE AND STORAGE. Pipe lines to serve the northwesterly part of town are long and, because of the high elevation of much of the area, must be relatively large in order to provide adequate fire flow without undue friction loss. Basing the system on the head available by gravity under Project II, which is also about what would be used for the booster pumping scheme, it is found that the top of the Plain Street storage tank would be at about El. 540, and that the pipe in Plain Street and on the cross streets as far as the corner by the Monument should be 10 inches in order to assure a reasonable fire-flow with not less than 20 lb. residual pressure (Underwriters' criterion). The ordinary static pressure along Plain Street would be on the order of 50 lb. The pipe in Brattleboro Road could be reduced to 8 in, because of its lower elevation. From two to three fire streams would be available everywhere along the proposed mains.

The standpipe should have a capacity of at least 200,000 gal. to satisfy fire requirements. The diameter and height of the tank would depend upon the elevation of the site which can presumably be selected advantageously on the hillside rising to the east along Plain Street. A tentative location has been assumed near the highest point on Plain Street about 8,000 ft. from Brattleboro road. The estimated cost of the tank and appurtenances is \$18,000.

The estimated cost of the distribution pipe to serve the area in question under either project is tabulated below in sections arranged in a suggested order of construction.

There would remain about 11,500 ft. in Brattleboro Road between the end of the existing pipe and the last section of pipe proposed in the above schedule. Since extensive housing development along the bottom-land traversed by this section of road seems unlikely in the near future, this stretch has not been included in the present program. If built, it would involve an additional expenditure on the order of \$86,400.

In all pipe estimates, cast iron pipe has been used. Some saving would result from the use of cement-asbestos pipe, but current uncertainty about delivery of this type of pipe leads to the conclusion that it is not practicable for any sections planned for early construction.

SUMMARY OF COSTS OF NORTHWESTERLY PRO-JECTS. The two most advantageous plans are summarized as to cost in the following tabulation. All estimates in this report include allowances for contingencies and engineering.

The difference in cost lies in the method of supply. The booster pumping plan is less in first cost, but involves certain costs for power and maintenance which depend upon the extent to which pumping is required. As has already been pointed out, the gravity plan would make water available along the easterly extension of Highland Avenue and might stimulate development there.

The choice lies with your committee as a matter of policy.

SOUTHERLY EXTENSIONS. From the outset, it has been planned that eventually a loop would be provided out Depot Street and down to join the Northfield Road main, with a storage tank on the hillside southeast of the end of Depot

Street. This calls for 8-in. pipe and involves about 700 ft. extension in Depot Street, about 1,900 ft. from Northfield Road to meet it, and about 600 ft. to a point on the hillside where the ground is at El. 420, the same as that of the present standpipe. The total length of pipe involved is about 3,200 ft., the estimated cost of which is \$23,000.

A 200,000-gal. standpipe, with foundation and appurtenances is estimated to cost \$18,000, bringing the total for the proposed southerly extensions to \$41,000.

SEWER EXTENSIONS

The extensions of sewers which have been proposed have been studied on the basis of our recent surveys and are shown in detail on the accompanying drawings. These include plans and profiles for an extension of the Northfield Road sewer about 2,000 ft. to the foot of the road which leads up to Depot Street; for a sewer in Cottage Street about 890 ft. long; and in Stebbins Street about 300 ft. long.

We trust you will find in the foregoing pages the information which your committee requires in considering the feasibility of extensions of water and sewerage facilities which have been proposed.

We have your letter of December 26, 1947 relative to the feasibility of carrying a pipe westerly from the filter plant across the ridge to Plain Rd., locating a standpipe on top of the ridge and supplying a so-called "high service" area on both sides of the ridge, including about 30 houses along Chesterfield Rd. as well as the 70 or more on Plain Rd., Brattleboro Rd., and intervening streets.

BASIC DATA. The scaled distance on the U.S.G.S. map in a "bee-line" from the filter plant to Plain Rd. is about 4,400 ft., erossing the ridge at the saddle which is at about el. 770.

A standpipe in the saddle of the ridge would have its high water level at about el. 800. Pumps installed near the filter plant would lift the water about 250 ft.

The ordinary pressure along Plain Rd. would be about 170 lb., and that along Brattleboro Rd. well over 200 lb. If the system were operated without pressure reducing valves on the main pipe coming down the hill from the tank, 8-in. pipe could be used throughout and still give fire flows comparable with those available under the plan suggested in our report of December 11, 1947.

Pressures much in excess of 100 lb. are unsuitable for most domestic fixtures. If reducing valves were used on the mains, the advantage of smaller mains during fire flow would be lost. It may be practicable, however, to leave it to each user to install a small pressure reducing valve on his own service, putting upon him the responsibility of maintaining it to protect his fixtures.

COST ESTIMATES. The higher pressure requires heavier pipe,—Class 250 instead of Class 150, with consequent increase in cost. The net difference or saving in cost, in place, between 8-in. Class 250 and 10-in. Class 150 is estimated to be about

\$0.80 per ft. For estimating purposes, including all allowances, it would be reasonable to use \$7.60 per ft. for 8-in. Class 250 pipe in place, and \$8.40 per foot for 10-in. Class 150 pipe. These unit prices would apply where pipes are in streets or other accessible locations.

In the rough country over the ridge from the filter plant to Plain Rd. costs will be much increased because of difficulties in transporting pipe and handling construction equipment. It is suggested that at least \$15 per ft. be used for 8-in. pipe in this stretch of about 4,400 ft.

The cost of the standpipe would be affected by the difficulties of hauling materials and equipment to the top of the ridge. It would be prudent to increase the former estimate of \$18,000 to \$20,000 for this reason.

Pumping station construction cost would not be much affected. The motors would be about twice the capacity of those required for Project I (a). This would be reflected mainly in power cost which, as you suggest, could be figured into the water rate.

RISING PRICES. The Engineering News-Record Construction Cost Index shows a continuing tendency to rise, and indications of further wage demands and rises in the cost of iron point to the wisdom of making generous allowances for cost increases during 1948 when setting up amounts for appropriations in the Town Meeting Warrant. Some evidence points to an allowance of from 15 to 20 percent on the prices being bid by contractors for work which will run into next summer.

EFFECT ON FILTER PLANT. The addition of 30 houses east of the ridge and 73 houses west of it, a total of 103 houses or perhaps 400 persons may increase total water consumption by from 20,000 to 40,000 gal. per day. We have no figures as to present consumption as indicated by the master meter at the filter plant, nor data as to the number of hours per day it is necessary to operate the plant to supply present demand. However, it is not unlikely that the added proposed load will bring the total demand close to the nominal capacity of the plant. This should be looked into with a view to the possible need for

increasing plant capacity as was anticipated in the original design.

We believe we have answered the various questions raised in your letter. We have used punched paper so that you may bind this letter in the back of our report. Wishing you the compliments of the season, we remain

TO THE CITIZENS OF HINSDALE

Your Committee, after studying the three proposed methods submitted by the engineers Metcalf and Eddy, for supplying North Hinsdale with water, recommend method 1 (B), with one exception: that the standpipe be placed on the ridge between the Plain Road and the Chesterfield Road, thereby being able to supply the houses on Chesterfield Road as well as the houses of North Hinsdale. In doing so, we have eliminated from the North Part System the extension of the Highland Avenue 8-inch pipe of 700 feet to Plain Road and the 7,000 feet of 10-inch pipe on the Plain Road to the Pritz farm. In place of it, we have substituted 4.400 feet from the filter house across the ridge to the Plain Road. This would bring the cost of the North Hinsdale extension to \$329,600 instead of the \$325,000 submitted by the engineers. This will make North Hinsdale and the houses on Chesterfield Road a separate distribution system. This will call for slightly higher water rates due to operational expenses.

The 11,500 feet left on the Brattleboro Road will cost \$86,400. This section could be extended from our present system at the top of Sand Hill over as far as Dodge's at the top of Liscolm Hill.

The standpipe and extensions to the south of the town \$41,000.

The extension of 528 feet on Stebbins Street to the Plain Road and 2,900 feet on the Plain Road to Donzey's would cost \$24,681.

Due to changes the entire cost of everything estimated by the engineers will increase about \$30,000.

There are no figures submitted for the distribution system on the Chesterfield Road or any extensions on the Northfield Road.

The Committee recommends consideration of the following:

- 1. The extensions of 528 feet on Stebbins Street and 2,900 feet on Plain Road to Donzey's at a total cost of \$24,681.
- 2. Sewer on Northfield Road, Cottage Street and Stebbins Street at a cost of \$32,900.

Further, the Committee recommends that, due to the high cost of labor and material that all other extensions not be considered at this time.

The Committee also recommends that anyone connected with the sewer pay a sewer charge of 10 per cent of their water rate.

There is a slight increase in circulation this year, as well as a lowering in the percent of fiction read. This, no doubt, is caused, to some extent, by the increased use of the library by the schools. By opening at 2:30 on Thursday afternoon, the first bus load of children from the Grade School are able to borrow books for themselves and members of their families. The High School students are allowed to come into the library at 2:45 to obtain their books and return to the school before closing time.

Each year the library is used more by the schools and the children of today read better and more mature books than those of the same age read twenty or more years ago.

We have more adult readers each year but, with a few exceptions, they borrow fewer books. The reading room is used primarily by students at present. We hope to purchase more of the reference books which have been out of print during the war years. These books are very expensive and not all can be purchased in one year, but with the rental funds to take care of light fiction we hope to obtain some of those most in demand.

We were deeply saddened by the untimely death of Mr. Ernest Adams. He had served faithfully on the board of trustees for fifteen years, giving of his time and helpful advice whenever called upon to do so. Mr. Reginald Gove was appointed to complete his term.

PLAYGROUND REPORT

The use of our new children's pool added a great attraction to the playground this year. The pool was constructed last year, but was not used until this year because the water was not connected until after the swimming season was over. The pool was inspected by the Director of Sanitary Engineering of the state of N. H. and found to be satisfactory in every respect.

A supervised daily program was carried on for nine weeks during the summer by Mrs. Rosetta Lowe. Arts and Crafts, all types of outdoor games, and swimming twice during the day were scheduled. The children would meet at the High School in the morning and march to the playground in "The Rope Brigade" along with their supervisor. Many children would bring their lunch and stay all day. At the close of the day they marched back to the school and then dismissed to go to their respective homes. An attendance record was kept, 1,566 children attended during the A. M., and 2,224 in the P. M. dur-

ing the nine weeks supervised period. At the close of the summer the children were given a party by the playground.

Our new toilets were put in this year which added a great deal to the sanitary conditions at the playground. Repairs were made to the field house roof and underpinning this summer.

Labor Day Festival was a success even if the weather man gave us a cool day. We showed a profit of \$358.45 which is deposited in the bank along with \$46.00 that was received for the use of the playground. This money will be used next season for new equipment.

Financial conditions did not allow us to carry on a supervised winter program. We hope that in years to come such a program may be carried out.

We invite all you people to come up and bring your lunch, use the picnic tables and fireplace, relax and enjoy yourselves. You will find plenty of recreation at the playground. We are very proud to have such a wonderful playground; developments and improvements are being made each year. We also wish to thank all of you for helping us to make our playground a success.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER OF THE HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my first annual report as headmaster of the high school.

Several changes occurred in our faculty due to the resignations of Mrs. Isabel Belluscio, Miss Pauleta Hinchey, Miss Margaret Newman, and Mr. Carl Richmond; and the advancement of Mr. Chester C. Lees from headmaster to the superintendency of the school union.

The position held by Miss Newman who is now in Framingham, Massachusetts, has been filled by Miss J. Jeannette Steele. Miss Ann Kenneally replaced Miss Hinchey who is

teaching at Weylister Jr. College, Milford, Connecticut. Mr. Chester Minkler is now the music supervisor in place of Mr. Richmond who has a similar position in Watertown, Connecticut. Mr. Angelo Montrone and Mr. Anthony Abruzzese are teaching subjects previously taught by Mr. Lees, Mrs. Belluscio and myself. Mrs. Gertrude Stearns has been granted a leave of absence, effective January 23, 1948. Mrs. Stearns is to secure her master's degree at the University of Nebraska, and will finish writing a textbook on the teaching of English in small high schools. Mrs. Stearns will be replaced by Mrs. H. E. Russell of Keene, New Hampshire.

The border league sports are continuing with sustained interest and competition. Last spring the softball team placed second in the league, and the baseball season ended with our school tied for second place with Winchester. The volleyball team this fall finished in second place and the football team took border league honors. The need for paid impartial officials became apparent this fall when it became necessary for one of the border league football games to be cancelled because of unsportmanlike attitude of out-of-school youths. This condition probably developed because of conflicting decisions of officiating school coaches. We are hoping this situation is only temporary, and efforts are being made to alleviate this condition. Due to the lack of facilities for basketball, the boys played only a few basketball games. Interest is very high in this sport and efforts should be concentrated to secure a court in our town.

Special efforts are also being made to arouse enthusiasm to increase student attendance to school sport contests. Cheer leaders and the school band parading and playing contributed greatly to student participation in our extra curricular activities.

New and used war assets supplies and equipment are being secured for immediate and future use in our school. The supplies and equipment are procured mostly by donations. The only cost of these items is to defray transportation charges.

The Junior and Senior dances were held in the town hall. The Christmas concert was presented and plans are in progress for the spring concert. The band and chorus will be represented at the New England Music Festival, Hampton Beach, New Hampshire, New Hampshire All State Festival, Berlin, New Hampshire, and The New Hampshire State Music Festival at Plymouth, New Hampshire.

The Senior class will present a three-act play entitled "The Man Who Came to Dinner." Mrs. Gertrude Stearns is coaching the play. The Freshmen and Juniors are going to present three one-act plays in April. Mrs. Doris Smith and Miss Kenneally will coach the three plays. The Freshman social was held in the town hall. This party was open to students only. Similar class parties will be encouraged. The eighth grade is sponsoring a class social next month.

The Seniors are going on a class trip during the April vacation. The students will leave on Saturday morning and arrive in New York City at noon. During the afternoon they will visit the Statue of Liberty. At night they will attend a play. Sunday morning students will attend one of New York City's famous churches, Sunday afternoon these students will visit the R.C.A. building and at night will view the city from the Observation Tower. The following morning they will depart via buses for Washington. Special buses will take the students to visit the Capital building, the House and Senate chamber, Statuary Hall, Library of Congress, Arlington National Cemetery, and continue to Tidal Basin, Potomac Park, and will stop at beautiful Jefferson Memorial. A morning tour into Virginia will bring them into old Alexandria, to Mount Vernon, and the National Airport. Another stop will be at the magnificent Lincoln Memorial and to the Washington Monument. A visit will also be made at the Federal Bureau of Investigation and to the Bureau of Engraving and Printing. Students will go to the White House and see the famous East Room, State Dining room, and the Red and Blue rooms. The Smithsonian Museum and the Mellon Art Institute will also be visited. The trip will last six days.

Pupils were given a physical examination by Dr. Edmond Lachaine and Frances Sikoski.

Mr. William Kilhart, our school custodian, is to be commended for the efficient maintenance of our school buildings.

Parents and interested citizens are invited to visit our school at any time.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hinsdale:

I have the honor to submit my first annual report.

Teachers: The opening of schools in September saw a 75% turnover in the faculty of Hinsdale High School, there being six changes in the eight positions. Mr. Leon D. Doyer was elected to the Headmastership of the school, filling the vacancy created by the resignation of Chester C. Lees who accepted the Superintendency of Union No. 25. Miss Ann F. Kenneally, a graduate of Boston University, is the new Commercial Teacher taking the place of Miss Pauleta Hinchey, who left to accept a position in Weylister Junior College, Milford,

Connecticut. Miss J. Jeannette Steele was elected to the Home Economics position replacing Miss Margaret Newman who is now teaching in Framingham, Massachusetts. Miss Steele is a graduate of the Unitersity of New Hampshire. Mr. Anthony A. Abruzzese, a graduate of Boston College, was elected as teacher of Science and Mathematics to fill the position caused by the resignation of Mrs. Isabel Belluscio, who is now teaching at Keene Teachers College. Mr. Chester E. Minkler, our new Music Supervisor, replaced Mr. Carl Richmond who accepted a position in Watertown, Connecticut. Mr. Minkler is a graduate of Boston University. The position in the school shop, partially vacated by the promotion of Mr. Doyer, was filled by the election of Mr. Angelo V. Montrone, a graduate of Keene Teachers College. Besides teaching shop, Mr. Montrone also teaches Mathematics and Science.

One additional member was added to the faculty of the Bridge Street School. Mrs. Mary D. Kerylow was elected to alleviate the situation caused by large enrollments in grades one and two. By teaching part of the first grade and part of the second grade, Mrs. Kerylow has relieved the first and second grade teachers so that they may now give more individual attention to the pupils in their classes.

Buildings and Grounds: The usual summer repairs and painting in both schools were done during the vacation period. The fire escape at the rear of the Bridge Street School has been reinforced and strengthened as a safety precaution. Old tile in a blocked drain at the high school building was dug up and replaced to prevent surface water from running into the school shop. An immediate improvement was the result.

A partition was built in the first grade room dividing it roughly in a two to one ratio. The new smaller room is used by Mrs. Kerylow for her class of first and second graders. The arrangement is not ideal, but is the best that could be done with the accommodations which are available to us.

The School Board is to be commended for keeping the Hinsdale School Buildings in as good physical condition as is humanly possible, and Mr. Kilhart keeps up their maintenance efficiently.

The townspeople of Hinsdale should continue to give considerable thought about the possibility of constructing a new grade school building. Our present facilities are entirely inadequate and will become increasingly more so as the enrollments continue to grow.

Instructional Activities: There has been, perhaps, less emphasis placed upon the tool subjects in our schools during the past fifteen or twenty years than there should have been. The curricula has expanded to an extent not known in a former generation. Progressive education has been in the forefront, and too often this has been at the expense of the fundamental tool subjects. However, the pendulum has at last begun to swing back and renewed attention is being given to the fundamentals.

Arithmetic tests have been given to all pupils in Union No. 25 in grades 3-8, to ascertain how we compare with other sections of the country. Some results were good, others not so gratifying. At least the pupils and teachers are arithmetic conscious and an immediate improvement should be the result.

Spelling, reading, and handwriting will be attacked in much the same way. It is highly essential that our pupils go forth from our schools able to figure, spell, read, and write respectably and effectively.

Health: In his address to the teachers of New Hampshire at the annual convention at Manchester, Superintendent of Schools Alexander Stoddard of Philadelphia reiterated over and over again the importance of a health program. In Hinsdale we have a rudimentary program which works satisfactorily as far as it goes. It is impossible to do much with physical education in our present school plant. When our present buildings are replaced by more modern structures, provision should be made for a full fledged physical education program.

In Hinsdale the annual physical examination of every pupil in the school system is carried on each fall by the school physician. Follow-up work throughout the year is done by the school nurse. More thorough inspection in most school systems is recommended by the health division of the State Department of Education.

A recommended purchase would be an individual audiometer with which to test the hearing of the children. The old watch test, or even the more improved group audiometer test, are not as reliable as the individual audiometer. It might be possible to buy one instrument for Union No. 25 and have all four towns contribute to the expense.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation to the teachers, pupils, and parents, to the School Board, and to the patrons of our schools for their cooperation.


