TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Center Harbor in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Center Harbor on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Highways and Bridges.
- 4 To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money for Town purposes, in anticipation of taxes.
- 5 To see if the Town will vote to raise money to defray expenses of Memorial Day, and if so, how much.
- 6 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$905.50 to defray expenses of S⁺reet Lights in Center Harbor Village.
- 7 To see if the Town will vote to raise money for aid to Laconia Hospital, and if so, how much.

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- 8 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$2,000 for Welfare Work.
- 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000 for maintenance of the Fire Department.
- 10 To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid Assistance for Class V roads, the Town to raise \$205.84, the State to contribute \$823.34.
- 11 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 which is 1/100 of 1 percent of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association, for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural resources of the Town in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 12 To see if the Town will vote to raise money for Band Concerts, and if so, how much.
- 13 To see if the Town will vote to raise money for Oil to be applied to the roads, and if so, how much.
- 14 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$250 for maintenance of the Town Dump.
- 15 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100 for cleaning and care of the sidewalks and roadsides.
- 16 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300 for maintenance of the Wharf and Fountain.
- 17 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$400 for eradication of White Pine Blister Rust in conjunction with the State Blister Rust Plan.
- 18 To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500 for New Equipment.

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- 19 To hear the report of the committee in regards to termination of the lease of the wooden garages on Town Wharf land and to see what action the Town wishes to take on this matter.
- 20 To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road running from the Daniel Webster Highway to the Canney Road running by the Town House Cabins. (By Request)
- 21 To see if the Town will choose an agent or agents to care for the Fountain at Center Harbor Village.
- 22 To see if the Town will choose a committee to take care of the Wharf and make regulations for same.
- 23 To see if the Town will choose an agent or agents to care for the cemeteries throughout the Town.
- 24 To choose agents or committees in relation to any article in the Warrant and hear any reports of any heretofore chosen.
- 25 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.




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How Taxes Were Spent in 1950

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDENS

Each year 200,000 forest fires annually burn over 36 million acres of the forest land of this great nation. This area is roughly the size of our New England states. Tens of thousand of man-hours costing over \$40 million are used in combating these fires. They destroy valuable mature timber and new growth, and leave desolation and often death in their wake. With the large deficit in rainfall the past four to five years the need for extreme caution is great.

Every brush, grass or forest fire that you have in your town has its effect on you in several ways; such as increased taxes, loss of mature timber, marring of the landscape and spoiling the recreation value of our countryside. It is safe to say that approximately 97 percent of the fires occurring in this state are man-caused and because all man-caused fires are preventable, remember—only YOU can prevent forest fires.

Our forest fire organization is doing a grand job in keeping our fires small, but the public in general is becoming increasingly careless in discarding matches and eigarettes. Another form of carelessness is the neglect to secure the required permit from the town fire warden to burn brush or use an incinerator in or near woodlands. It is YOU and YOU alone who can help correct this shameful waste of our natural resources by:

- 1. Seeing that your incinerator is tight and is sitting on clean ground.
- 2. Always clean a space about any open fire to prevent its speading.
- 3. Never burn in dry windy weather.

4. In all cases a written permit is required from your town Fire Warden.

It is with your cooperation that this shameful waste of timber and money can be stopped.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Center Harbor, qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House, in said District on the 13th day of March, 1951, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents. Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of said District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenues and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised in taxes by the town.

- 9. To see what action the District may take with reference to joining with other nearby districts to form a cooperative school district, as provided by law.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Any teacher who had children whose fathers were overseas during the last war knows how real this increased obligation can be. If children have to be evacuated from large cities, the schools in evacuation centers will face staggering problems. If the program for civil defense goes into full operation, schools will play a large part in it. And the basic responsibility of passing on our culture from one generation to another remains a responsibility which is even more grave in times like these.

As the schools grow in importance, so does the work of citizen committees. What the citizens of a community think about its schools and about what the schools should do is of prime importance. In a real sense the school program is finally determined as much by what the people think as it is by their financial support. Furthermore, public understanding of the purposes of educational programs and public participation in the development of these programs is essential to the best type of public education.

In Center Harbor the PTA is one important means of bringing about understanding and cooperation between the citizens and the schools.

Improvement of Teachers In Service

It is encouraging to note the interest shown by teachers in improving their methods and keeping up to date in educational work. Another workshop, this time on the teaching of reading, was held in Meredith in November and attended by all teachers of high and elementary schools within the union. As a result of the study at this workshop many teachers are adapting their work to the needs of the individual and making use of up to date materials for teaching the sounds of the letters and the understanding of the meaning of sentences. At the time this report is written, plans are under way for an extension course on "Music in the Modern School" to be given by Dean Warren S. Freeman of Boston University College of Music. Both of our teachers have enrolled as members in this course which is scheduled to begin in Meredith on February 5th and close sometime in May.

State Sharing of School Costs

The question of state funds for schools is again before the legislature of New Hampshire. Some plan must soon be devised which will provide state money to help with the education of all the children in the state, and in this way be of indirect benefit to the real estate owner who is required under the present law to pay the whole bill.

As requested by the 1949 legislature, the state board has worked out a formula providing for equalization of school opportunity. Their report is necessarily limited to the problem of equalization—providing funds for districts with a large school population and low taxable valuation.

By the time of our annual district meeting, amendments to the proposed state aid bill will doubtless have been drafted which will provide some allotment of state aid funds to all districts regardless of valuation or population. Such an amendment would be of help to Center Harbor, which is not classified as a district in need of funds under the state board's original equalization formula.

Cooperative School Districts

At the 1950 district meeting some mention was made of a cooperative school district to be made up of Center Harbor, Meredith, and possibly other districts for the purpose of maintaining a high school. The question actually came before the meeting for a vote and sentiment was expressed in favor of such a plan if the details could be worked out. Meredith at its annual school meeting in 1950 also voted in favor of forming or joining a cooperative school district.

In this report I wish to make the suggestion that Center Harbor consider combining with Meredith to form a cooperative district on the elementary level also. We have a considerable number of pupils living in the Town House area who would find it easier to get to school in Meredith than to drive over to Center Harbor. Those pupils in our present two-room building who are eurolled in the 7th and 8th grades could be better served by attending the junior high school than by remaining in their present small classes. If Center Harbor and Meredith were one cooperative district, it would be possible to re-arrange pupils to serve their best interests.

The probable cost of such an arrangement should be carefully studied. Experience shows that the smaller schools are usually more expensive to maintain. Costs of instruction and maintenance in the two districts concerned, for the school year 1949-50, are compared as follows:

Center Harbor	(grades	1	to	8)	\$253.68	per	pupil
Meredith	(grades	1	to	8)	\$168.80	per	pupil

At the present time. Meredith would find it impossible to take in any considerable number of pupils from other districts because their rooms are so crowded. It seems necessary, however, for Meredith to build additional elassrooms in the near future to take care of extra enrollment which is expected in the primary grades. If Center Harbor wishes to take advantage of these new facilities for any of their pupils, now is the time to act in the matter.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

Since the school year is from September 1 to June 30, a report in the middle of the year is not too satisfactory.

Perhaps it would be well to explain the routine necessary in covering several towns. In September, routine inspections are made, including checking on vaccination of all new-comers. Health records are re-arranged according to new grades and new lists of names of those now attending are made, copied from the teachers' registers. Then the complete rounds of all schools are made for weighing and measuring and during this contact it is usually a good time to give individual instruction in health habits.

At the beginning of this year, the nurse attempted to set up a schedule of regular visits to each town, but because it is necessary to take doctors' appointments when convenient to them, whether it be for physical examinations in the schools, dental or eye clinics, or other services, a nurse's schedule has to be quite flexible. In Center Harbor the physical examination has not been completed at the time this report is written. Dr. Walker has again agreed to do this work, probably during February.

My time for the use of the Maico (which is the instrument used for ear-testing) came early in this school year and all present were done when the rounds were made. It is possible that later in the year my district will have a chance to have the machine for re-checking. With few exceptions, the hearing loss cases found, are traceable to wax in the ears or enlarged tonsils and correctable.

The next will be the vision testing which will probably come within the next few weeks or whenever the electric machine is available, as several nurses use this equipment.

Dental defects top the list as shown by physical examination. With the shortage of dentists in the locality, it is almost impossible to keep up with fillings and extractions, to say nothing of cleanings. But most parents persevere and do get the work completed. Through the generosity of the local Red Cross group, a dental clinic has been arranged for.

Some sort of corrective posture work in the schools is quite obviously needed. The orthopedic clinic is available for extreme cases, but the majority of posture defects (which includes flat feet) could better be done by regular daily exercises. In one town when there was a rather large number of children found with flat feet, it was possible to arrange a visit from the physical therapist connected with the State Department of Health to visit the school and instruct the children individually in corrective exercises.

In checking through the school health records, we have found a considerable number of children who have not received immunization against diptheria, whooping cough and tetanus. This is usually done during the child's first year, as is the smallpox vaccination, with a booster dose given before entering school, available through the family physician or to all children up to 8 years of age through the State Health Clinics held in all towns, annually.

It seems as if a considerable amount of time is used transporting children long distances rather than in doing actual work of school nursing, though in some cases it IS important for the nurse to accompany the child. In all cases, except rare emergency, one or the other parent should take part in the effort.
