ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill in the County of Grafton qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 13, 1962, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following matters:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Cemetery Commissioners, and any other town officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, one Highway Agent, one or more Auditors, One Library trustee for the term of three years, one Cemetery Commissioner for the term of five years and one for one year, one Trustee of trust funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary Town officers.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to contribute funds for the construction of Class V highways, as provided in Chapter 188, Part 13, Laws of 1945, and to raise and appropriate the sum required for this purpose.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the Town, as recommended by the Finance Committee in its budget report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for the purpose so determined, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue interest-bearing Notes or Orders to provide for the current year's expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks by mail, or at the time they examine the taxable property.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Collector's deeds.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to appoint or elect a budget Committee to supervise the appropriations of the Town, and to recommend to the next Annual Town Meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

Article 10. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations—hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you—

1. Follow the warden's directions.
2. Secure the required burning permit.
3. Keep your fires under control.
4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
5. See that your children are properly cautioned

HAVERHILL LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

Report of Librarian

The year of 1961 has been one of progress in the Haverhill Public Library. We now have an annual circulation of more than 6,700 books and magazines. Much attention has been given to reference work. New up-to-date reference material has been purchased; also added was a new Compton's encyclopedia. Students are being encouraged to use the library for reference as well as for required reading in English and Latin. Our library has been active in the newly-formed Grafton Cooperative which meets bi-monthly. The highlight of the year was the awarding of the Dorothy Canfield Fisher memorial fund to this group. This was presented by Gov. Powell at a luncheon in Concord last April. The librarian and several friends of the library attended this function.

In March the 4-H Club held its exhibit in the library and in April an historic Civil War desk was on display. The desk was made for and used by Capt. Leroy Bell and was given to the library by his grandniece.

In June the librarian was invited to speak to the Lend-a-Hand Club on recent books and to recommend books for summer reading. During July and August a story hour was held each Wed. morning. The librarian was assisted in this by Mrs. Hazel Underhill and Mrs. Ruth Fogarty. Other summer activities included a Children's Museum under the direction of Mrs. Susan Bruckner and a puppet show which was given partly to raise much needed funds and partly to provide children of all ages with wholesome entertainment of a classical nature.

The library building has been put into good condition for public use and its facilities have been greatly increased. However there are still needs to be met; mainly in reference material. We appeal to all library-minded members of the community to cooperate with the librarian and the library trustees so that our library may continue to grow in usefulness to the people it serves.

WOODSVILLE FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

Report of the Trustees

During the early months of the year the Library was completely redecorated, both stacks and walls being changed from dark to light color, draperies made for the windows, an extra lighting fixture installed, and the floor refinished. The Library is now much more attractive in appearance and more functional as well.

After the work was completed a delayed celebration of National Library Week was observed with Open House which was attended both by many local persons, as well as representatives from neighboring libraries and from the State Library in Concord.

Of great benefit has been the work of the Library Service Committees from the Cohase Lioness Club and the Woodsville Progressive Club, working jointly under the chairmanship of Mrs. Guy Kelley, Jr. They, with the trustees, served as hostess committee for the Open House, and throughout the year have made the public more conscious of the library by book exhibits and posters. They also assisted during Children's Book Week, decorated the Library at Christmas, and spent an evening mending books.

The Grafton co-operative book purchasing group met here once during the year, as did a group of librarians, to discuss, with representatives from the State Library, the findings of the Governor's Committee which made a survey of N. H. libraries.

A story hour for young children was held during summer vacation, with films shown, and a reading club conducted for older children. The basement room, which was made useable by the work of members of Mt. Gardner Grange three years ago, has been used by the Kindergarten since the graded school burned a year ago. An art class is meeting there weekly at present, and the Coin Club has also used it.

The library has continued to serve both the adult public and the school children. 17,821 books were circulated during the past year, including 1,368 borrowed from the Bookmobile. The public is urged to make full use of our facilities. The Librarian will obtain from the State Library material desired which we do not have here.

At the last annual meeting of the N. H. Library Trustees Association the Librarian of the Woodsville Free Public

Library was one of two in the state cited for outstanding achievement in library service to their communities. The trustees are gratified that the work of our Librarian, Mrs. Mitchell, has been so deservedly recognized.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community Building in said district on the 19th day of March, 1962, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of agents, Auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose agents, Auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To choose a Library Trustee for the ensuing year.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for the support of the Woodsville Free Public Library.
11. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to convey to the Woodsville Free Public Library a tract of land thirty feet (30') in width southeasterly of the present boundary of the Library and Grammar School property.
12. To see what action the district wishes to take regarding the disposition of the land formerly used for the elementary school, excluding that portion considered in Article 11 above.

Mr. Albert Plante returned to Woodsville High School after a year's absence while doing advanced study at the University of Utah.

Mrs. Gladys Desrochers' resignation was accepted in June, after four years of successful instruction in the commercial courses. Not until early September was this vacancy filled by Mrs. Mary G. Watkins of Whitefield, N. H. Mrs. Watkins holds a B.Ed. degree from Plymouth Teachers College and has had over ten years of previous teaching experience.

Mr. Billington was replaced by Mr. William Ellithorpe, Jr., in the 7th and 8th grade social studies and English departments. Additional teachers were necessary, that two divisions be made of grades three and six. Miss Etta M. Bishop of Woodsville was employed to teach a division of grade six and Mrs. Jean Pike of Passumpsic, Vermont, to teach a division of grade three. Each holds a B.S. in Ed. degree from Lyndon Teachers College. Miss Bishop has additional credit at Michigan State University. Mr. Ellithorpe is a graduate of Keene Teachers College with a B.Ed. degree.

As this report is written, on the anniversary of the loss of the old elementary school building by fire, a summary of progress of the new construction is of interest.

First, however, I wish to again express sincere appreciation for the efforts of all parties who made possible the operation of the elementary system during the past and present school year. Particularly, for the use of the Court House, the Armory, and the Library last year and for the additional facilities of the Catholic Church basement for this year, in all, housing over 300 pupils annually.

Appreciation was publicly expressed on July 16, in various news publications, to the many individuals who cooperated so magnificently. In addition, this year the personnel of the N. H. National Guard unit, of the Woodsville Catholic Church, and of the library trustees are graciously thanked for allowing the school to use their facilities.

Mrs. Ruth Marshall is most cooperative in moving her home economics classes into a small high school classroom, that the fourth grade may use the home economics room in the shop building. Her teaching inconveniences are recognized and appreciated.

We are looking forward to moving equipment into the new building at the close of school in June.

Construction at this point is well ahead of schedule and a completion date of June 1st is anticipated, of course subject to bad weather problems. The building is now closed in sufficiently for workmen to continue work in very inclement weather. When completed, one of the most functional and attractive school buildings in New Hampshire will be available for the most valuable assets of Woodsville—the children.

A change of school custodian was necessary at Woods-

ville High School in January. Frederick Grenier was selected from a list of nine candidates to replace Mr. and Mrs. Francis Millette, who resigned because of Mr. Millette's ill health. I would like to publicly express my appreciation of Francis' cooperation and interest in his work, covering a period of ten years as a faithful worker, always mindful of the welfare of, not only his building duties, but also of the welfare of the faculty and students. We never had to give him orders—suggestions were all that were necessary—for the work to be well done.

With the changing years come new faces, new methods, and new accomplishments in school administration. "The '60's will be quite unlike the '20's."

* "Forty years" holds a different meaning for each of us, depending on our vantage point. In retrospect we, must concede the unreliability of memory, but we may also rationalize that the intervening years have brought important changes and significant improvements—both in the schools and in society as a whole.

In broad terms, the major changes in the schools during the past four decades have developed in a setting of great social and economic change. The automobile, a mobile population, high standards of material living, working mothers, television, and increased leisure are illustrative of new ingredients in the complex social recipe for rearing children.

Changes in the school's physical plant and equipment are evident from observation. The Rip Van Winkle school administrator of 1921 would marvel at the increased size of school buildings and space for work and play.

The principle that learning is affected by one's attitude toward learning and the atmosphere in which it takes place now extends to school construction. Children and human nature have changed very little during the last 40 years.

Recognizing the educational lag and the wide diversity in class room procedures, let us list some general trends in the classroom:

1. Recognition that children learn and are not "taught" in the usual meaning of the word has altered classroom procedures. Learning is an individual matter.
2. Learning is best achieved, whenever possible, through problem solving, use of children's interest, and actual situations in which knowledge is functional.
3. The importance of understanding individual children

to provide better educational opportunities for them has captured the thinking of modern teachers.

4. Schools use standardized tests, record the results, analyze the data, and apply the findings in guiding children to an extent undreamed of 40 years ago.
5. Use of increased amounts and kinds of instructional materials of multilevel difficulty. Provision for individual differences through a variety of purposeful activities based on units, problem solving, and research. Identification of and provision for groups of children such as the gifted and the retarded.

The over-all picture in respect to both school organization and classroom procedures has been one of development and improvement.

If we could view the future in a crystal ball, the educators work would be much easier. That is not possible. But we do know that the next 40 years will bring accelerating change far beyond the scope of the years from 1921 to 1961. The past and the present give us our vantage point for the challenge of the persistent future. *Nat. Elem. Prin.

The dedicated efforts of the members of the school board, the efficiency of the teaching staff of each school and the loyal efforts of the building committee members, supported by the citizens, continue to make my duties as superintendent most pleasant.

The reports of Principal Mullen, Principal McKelvey, and of Muriel LaMott, R.N., follow.

The fall of 1961 saw two faculty changes at Woodsville High School: Mrs. Mary Watkins replaced Mrs. Gladys Desrochers, and Mr. Albert Plante returned from a year's study at the University of Utah to replace Mr. John Bartlett.

Our school enrollment continues to climb, and indications

point to a larger student body in the ensuing years. Space for this enrollment is very adequate for the present.

Mrs. Rebecca Ansley directed and presented *Our Town* on November 2, 1962. The play was well-attended and received by the many regional parents attending.

Under the direction of Mrs. Alice Castello the Glee Club has grown in strength and popularity during the last two years. Approximately one-half of the student body constitutes our school chorus. The Special Chorus participated in the North Country Concert and All State Auditions at Lebanon, N. H.

Special lectures in the Humanities have been initiated this year in the hope of enriching our College Preparatory Curriculum. This venture has been planned jointly by the English and Music Departments. Field trips to cultural centers of New England have been planned and are being carried out.

In athletics, Woodsville finished third in the White Mountain League Soccer season of 1961. Woodsville was invited to the state soccer tournament where we were defeated in the quarter final round. In basketball, 1960-1961, Mr. Donald Evans guided the Engineers to a 16-3 seasonal record and an opening round loss in the N.H.I.A.A. Basketball Tournament. The baseball team under Mr. John Bagonzi finished third in the W.M.L. Baseball Season with a record of 9-3.

The G. Hampton McGaw Prize Speaking Contest was presented at the Community Building on March 15, 1961 under the direction of Mrs. Virginia Kendall and Mrs. Rebecca Ansley.

On April 16, 17, 18, 1962, Woodsville High School will be evaluated by a group of educators from the New England Secondary Schools and Colleges. Membership in this organization is restricted to those schools of high academic standing.

WOODSVILLE GRADED SCHOOL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herein my annual report of Woodsville Graded School for the year ending December 31, 1961.

The enrollment for the school year 1961-62 has reached 323 as of the writing of this report. The enrollment by grades is as follows: Kindergarten—38, Grade 1—40, Grade 2—33, Grade 3—45, Grade 4—31, Grade 5—33, Grade 6—43, Grade 7—28 and Grade 8—32. Because of the large numbers in grades 3 and 6 these grades were split into separate classrooms.

The school fire of Jan. 12, 1961 with the complete loss of building and equipment caused a tremendously difficult situation. The starting of school with the loss of only six days was a truly remarkable feat. To name all of those responsible for aiding us to start school so quickly would be impossible, but I do want them all to know how much the staff of the Graded School appreciates the great amount of work they put in. I want to thank the officials of the Court House, Woodsville Library, St. Joseph's Church and Woodsville High School for their aid in housing some grades. At the State Armory, where the majority of the pupils are housed, I want to thank Captain E. B. Mann and Sergeant Roland Clough for their constant cooperation.

Three new teachers joined the Graded School Staff this year. They are Mrs. Jean Pike in grade 3, Miss Etta May Bishop in grade 6 and Mr. William Ellithorpe, English and Social Studies in grades 7 and 8.

A large number of parents visited the school during American Education Week to talk with the teachers and view the emergency facilities provided since the fire.

Stanford Achievement Tests were given to grades 1-8 and Otis Intelligence Tests were given to grades 3 and 6. Aptitude and intelligence tests were administered to grade 8 by the University of New Hampshire Testing Service.

The Junior High School Chorus presented a program of Christmas Music at the Woodsville Hospital and at the County Farm.

Boys and girls basketball teams played a regular schedule of games with nearby schools with the boys team taking part in a junior high school tournament at Bradford, Vt. A trophy was presented to the Graded School by the officials

of the Bradford tournament to replace the two trophies previously won by the Woodsville team and which were lost in the fire.

I wish to thank Superintendent of Schools Phil Bennett, the School Board, the teaching staff and the many others who helped make this past year an educational one for the children of the Graded School.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMITTEE

The 1961 Woodsville Recreation Program increased its total participants from 1960 and is showing a constant improvement in activities and enrollment.

Recreation during the summer started on July 6 and ended on August 11, 1960. A total of 194 students were enrolled with the average daily attendance exceeding 160. An outing at the Fish and Game Club sponsored by members of the Fish and Game Club supplemented the hikes to Hall's Lake and the program culminated with a swimming meet and field day in which members demonstrated skills learned during the summer.

The Woodsville Little League Baseball program continued to serve as a training ground for young ball players and an active farm league satisfied the needs of the 8 and 9 year old age group. More than 60 boys were registered in this program.

A Babe Ruth Team was organized again this year and participated in the Triangle League.

In the fall Little League Soccer was again very successful and with coaches from the high school furnishing the instruction, players between the ages of 9-13 developed a better understanding of the techniques and rules of soccer.

The 1961 Youth Center commenced on October 21, 1961 and has been particularly well attended. Enrollment among registered members is over 200 and average attendance usually exceeds 125. Formal dances have been added this year and seem to be well received by students.

Afternoon activities include: tumbling, wrestling, basketball and table tennis. An appreciable number of members attend regularly.

Little League Basketball commenced on January 8 and volunteer coaches from the high school basketball team and the adult community has made this league one of the most vigorous basketball programs in the vicinity. A total of 61 boys are in the program and it is still continuing as a self-supporting entity.

Skiing on Sunday afternoons continues to be a favorite among younger members as well as adult. With the changing of Little League basketball to Monday evenings, trips to Mittersill Ski Slope are participated in by an even greater number than the previous year.

The Woodsville Recreation Program is in large part a self-supporting program and in order to develop and im-

prove those areas which are subsidized, it is recommended that a larger budget be incorporated.

It is anticipated that a Babe Ruth Baseball League within the community will be conducted and that a summer basketball league for junior high school and senior high school age students will be undertaken.

Facilities and equipment are sorely needed as well as operating finances for various leagues.

Many thanks to all the volunteer assistants who have contributed their time and talents for the development of the youth of Woodsville.

SCHOOL WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the school district in the Town of Haverhill qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the North Haverhill School Auditorium in said district on the 20th day of March, 1962, at 8 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose agents, Auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$240.00 for the support of a dental clinic for the ensuing year.

10. To see what sum of money the district will vote to appropriate and to raise by borrowing or otherwise, not to exceed \$100,000, for the purpose of constructing an addition to Haverhill Academy, to consist of four classrooms to house the science laboratory, the home economics room, the business education room, the social studies room, and two lavatories, equipping and furnishing same.*
11. Resolve that the Haverhill School District petition the State Board of Education to become a member of a Cooperative School District for grades nine through twelve which may include, in addition to this district, the school districts of Bath, Woodsville, Monroe, Piermont, and Warren.**
12. To see if the district will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to expenses.
13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

1961-1962

All members of the teaching staff of both the elementary and secondary schools returned for the 1961-1962 school year with one exception. Mrs. Rufous Ansley, Sr., resigned in June to accept a position in New York State.

Mrs. Florence Woods, of Bath, N. H., was employed to replace Mrs. Ansley as instructor in advanced science and mathematics. Mrs. Woods received her B.A. degree from Mount Holyoke College and a M.A. degree from Columbia Teachers College. Her teaching experience has been in public schools at Hackensack, N. J., in John B. Stetson University, and in Simmons College.

The wide range of abilities of the students enrolled at the Academy in September made it advisable to employ a teacher for certain classes of the non-college students. Miss Doreen Tyler, a former graduate of Haverhill Academy, was employed as such an instructor. Miss Tyler received a B.Ed. degree from Plymouth Teachers College and had a half year of teaching at Penacook High School.

The special classes and the tuitioning of three students to a comprehensive high school, upon the request of the parents, have materially benefited the students so served.

As these services were not anticipated in the 1961 budget, an over-expenditure in the items of teachers' salaries and of tuition, amounting to approximately forty-five hundred dollars, became necessary.

Income received from the Haverhill Academy Trustee's investment fund has been applied, in part, toward the salary of the additional teacher and to costs of physical improvements made to the academy building. Fluorescent fixtures were installed in the typing room, also in room 2 and in the principal's office.

The school lunch operators, Mrs. Sawyer and Mrs. Lang, with their helpers, serve lunches which rate with the best of the programs in the state. The fine cooperation of the building custodians assist greatly by their building programs of cleanliness and sanitation in their respective buildings. These services, too often taken for granted, are important assets in today's schools.

The continued professional integrity of the teaching staff of each school, the support of the school board, and the interest of the citizens is appreciated.

I wish to take this opportunity to pay special tribute to retiring Principal Friend Jenkins and to his esteemed wife

and co-worker. The successful administration of any institution for a continuous period of 38 years, by one administrator, is an outstanding accomplishment, and particularly so when it is an institution of learning.

Not only in the community, but state-wide, has Friend Jenkins been acknowledged for his contribution in the field of education.

A part of Haverhill Academy will be lost upon the retirement of Friend and Ruth Jenkins. Neither will they be the same without the Academy. Each is a part of the other, after so many pleasant as well as trying years of association. Hundreds of minds have been influenced by the guidance of Friend and Ruth Jenkins. Their lives reflect well R. W. Robertson's Aim of a Teacher: "The true aim of everyone who aspires to be a teacher should be, not to impart his own opinions, but to kindle minds."

May these two dedicated people have many happy and healthy years of well-earned retirement.

Of the number of pupils in (3) above who transferred to another school, *three* did so under the provisions of the bill relating to "Comprehensive High School" which requires a school district that does not maintain a comprehensive high school to pay the tuition of pupils who elect to transfer in order to secure the advantages of the more diversified offerings.

The fact that only *three* transferred under the provisions of this bill, does not necessarily indicate that there is very little demand on the part of our pupils for the courses offered by a Comprehensive High School that we do not offer. Perhaps a better indication of the extent of the demand for

industrial and *fine arts* courses by our pupils can be gained from the results of a survey taken in May when our pupils were asked to indicate on their 1961-62 registration cards if they would elect *shop* and/or *agricultural* courses if and when these courses were offered. *Sixteen* expressed a desire for shop courses and six for agricultural courses.

If the *twenty-two* who expressed a desire for the industrial arts courses, not now offered, had transferred to other schools, the tuition costs would have been approximately eight thousand dollars. Such costs would have to be met by additional appropriations or by a reduction in the quality of the offerings in our present program. If the latter situation should develop, then the provisions of the bill would most certainly defeat themselves.

Thus the problem is still with us. Namely, "Comprehensive High School" vs "High School." It should be kept in mind that as far as offerings are concerned, we are not at present very far removed from the "Comprehensive" type of high school.

The State Department of Education, in its "Summary of Programs of Study" lists us as a medium size High School offering:

Twenty-three units in the academic field.

Ten and a half units in the industrial arts field.

No units in the fine arts field.

The requirements for a Comprehensive High School are as follows:

Twenty units in the academic field.

Fourteen units in the industrial arts field.

Three units in the fine arts field.

Therefore, our most acute problem is not one of lack of offerings but one of lack of facilities.

REPORT TO HEALTH OFFICER

For Year Ending December 31, 1961

Three polio, vaccination clinics were held in the Woodsville schools in cooperation with the school nurse. 301 students received the polio shots.

In Haverhill's only immunization clinics were held this year. This was done to conserve the doctor's time. We gave at these clinics—

144—polio shots

16—smallpox vaccinations

11—triple shots of whooping cough, diphtheria and tetanus.

171—total shots.

These clinics were sponsored by the Lend-A-Hand Club and the V.F.W. Aux. They were conducted by the N. H. S. Dep't. of Health in cooperation with local physicians.

Home visits were made to infants and preschools and adults for counseling and assistance with health problems.

A full time public health nurse for Haverhill township would be a great help to your citizens. It could also relieve your very busy doctors of many home visits and so conserve their time and energy for more acute cases.

PROGRAM OF THE WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION

The White Mountains Region Association as a voluntary non-profit organization, receives support from the communities of the Region, the state and from individual members so that a program of cooperative promotion and development of northern New Hampshire may be carried on.

The Association publishes and distributes six different folders a year advertising the many advantages of the Region. It receives and carefully answers about 6,000 letters per year from people interested in a vacation in the North Country. The value of this single service cannot be over-emphasized. Recent surveys have shown that the tourists attracted by this mailing service have spent many hundreds of thousands of dollars in the Region. The Association sponsors the annual fall foliage tours, and represents the Region at national travel shows.

Through its board of directors, it is able to speak for the Region's needs at state and national hearings and at important meetings within the Region. It maintains a news release service to local newspapers to help inform the citizens of the North Country of worth-while activities and economic trends.

This winter the Association is running a cooperative ad program with the chambers of commerce in the ski areas to promote skiing in the White Mountains. It cooperates with private promotional groups, local chambers of commerce, and with the state promotional agencies. It promotes the sale of real estate through the mailing of real-estate purchase bulletins to real estate brokers. It conducts labor surveys for groups interested in industrial development, maintains an award program for the 4-H Clubs, and promotes agriculture within the Region.

In uninterrupted service since 1938, it has helped establish the White Mountains Region as a vacation center as fine as any in the world and contributed in many other ways to the economic betterment of all forty-six communities in northern New Hampshire.

Gentlemen:

Prior to their working, the location of pine and control areas are plotted on a town map. The acreage worked and number of currant and gooseberry bushes (known as Ribes) destroyed are recorded on permanent forms. From such basic data, supplemented by periodic field examinations, decisions can be reached as to when future work is required. Special checks are made on land disturbed (logging operations and blowdown) in five year intervals since soil disturbances of this type result in re-growth of Ribes.

White pine is a prolific seeder. It thrives readily on a variety of soils resulting in excellent, natural reproduction following logging or other disturbances. Unfortunately, ground disturbances also encourage Ribes re-growth. Thus, if both hosts (pine and Ribes) develop together, new areas of infection are bound to occur. Since white pine areas make up 50 per cent of the forest area of the state, the need for protecting these younger stands from blister rust should be evident to all far-sighted citizens.

Control of the rust is moving forward at an encouraging rate. We are pleased to report that the disease in 96 per cent of the white pine areas is now under control. We are looking forward to the time when this status will prevail in all white pine areas to the end that control may be maintained with minimum appropriations from all participating agencies—federal, state and town.
