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



# ELIAS ASHMOLE, Efq;

Mr. Ahmole, was a Person who was so well known, and much esteemed in his own Time, and bore many publick Offices, which he acquitted with so much Honour to himself, and Justice to his Country, that it is something surprizing no Account (besides an Article in the Supplement to the Learned Mr. Collier's Historical Dictionary)

of him has been ever attempted: For many Years last past it has been expected, and indeed, as some say, promised, from the accurate Pen of a Prelate who makes no inconsiderable Figure in the Church of England, and owes his present Grandeur, and future Hopes, to the Generolity of Mr. Alhmole, who affifted and encouraged him by a liberal Education at School, and in the University, by which he was fitted for the Mitre, he now deservedly wears. This neglect is the more to be wonder'd at, when he has left so many Materials behind him in his own Musaum at Oxford, and elsewhere in private Hands, who would communicate to the Undertaker many Hints worthy his Knowledge. The Diary it self, printed about a Twelvemonth fince (though too much crowded with Trifles, altogether beneath the Notice of the Publick, nor ever defigned for them, however it has crept into the World) will be of great Use to such Biographer; but seeing nothing of this Sort has yet appeared, the Reader may take candidly the following Extracts from the Diary, and other Papers of Authority, to be depended on.

ELIAS ASHMOLE, Esq; was the only Son of Simon Ashmole, of the City of Litch-field,

field, Sadler, and Anne, the Daughter of Mr. Anthony Bowyer, of the City of Coventry in Warwickshire, Draper, born 23d of May, 1617. He was educated at a Grammar School in Litchfield, and having some Inclination to Musick, he was instructed in it, and placed as a Chorister in that Cathedral: This was his beginning, by the Interest of Mr. Thomas Pagit, second Son of James Pagit, sometimes Puisne Baron of the Exchequer, who married his Mother's Sister, who was, says Mr. Ashmole, \* the chief Instrument of my future Preferments, which I acknowledge with all Gratitude to his Memory. In June 1634. he loft his Father, of whom, though like a dutiful Son, he gives a good Character +, yet he freely tells us, Though he was an honest fair conditioned Man, and kind to others, yet through ill Husbandry he became a great Enemy to him/elf and poor Family. He was married young, at Twen. ty. Years of Age, to his first Wife, Eleanor, Daughter of Mr. Peter Mainwaring, of Smalwood in Cheshire, who he tells us ||, proved a vertuous good Wife, but foon left him a forrowful Widower on 5 Decemher, 1641. I to his own Grief, and the Grief

of all her Friends, and was buried at the West End of the South Ile, near the catrance into the Church of Afthary in Cheshire. Upon the News of her Death. which he heard not till some Days after, being absent at London, he declares, That: \* she was a virtuous, modest, careful and loving Wife; her Affection was exceeding great towards me, as was nine to her, which canfed us to live fo happely together. By her he had one Female Still born. Child, 19 May, 1640. In Michaelmas Term, 1639. he became a Solicitor in the High Court of Chancery, and + had indifferent good Practice, and being admitted of Clement's Inu, was fworn an Attorney in the Court of Common Pleas, 11 February, 1641. In 1644. he was made a Commissioner of the Excise, but was opposed in the Execution of his Office by Collonel Bagott, Governor of Litchfield, and was afterwards put into another Commission of the Excise at Worsester, 15 December, 1645. which Commission was again renewed, and Mr. Allmote continued, and elected Register to the aforefaid Commission, 27 April, 1646. On May 9, 1645. by Sir George: Wharton's Inderest,

then a Captain in Defence of the Royal Cause, he was entred one of the Four Gentlemen of the Ordnance in the Garrison at Owford, and on 12 March, 1646, was constituted a Captain in the Lord Ashley's Regiment. While he was thus firmly engaged in the King's desperatu Affairs at Oxford, and elsewhere, the additional Stroke of his Mother's Death happened in July, 1646. who died of the Plague at Litchfield, and of whom he has given an Account in the following Expreslions, \* She was a discreet, sober, providant Woman, and with great Patience em dured many Afflictions. Her Parents bad given her exceeding good Bresding, and sha was excellent at her Needle, which (my Father being improvident) stood han in great flead. She was competently read in Divimity, History, and Postry, and was continitally instilling into my Ears such religious and moral Precepts as my younger Tears were capable of. Nor did he ever fail to correcting Faults, always adding sorp Reproofs and good Lectures to boot. She was wash esteemed of by Persons of Nate, with whom the was acquainted. She lived in much Friendship among her Neighbours, and

left a good Name behind her: In fine, she was truly Religious and Virtuous. On October 16 he was elected a Brother of the Company of Free Masons, with Collonel Henry Mainwaring, of Kerthingham in Cheshire, at Warrington in Lancashire, a Favour effectived so singular by the Members, that Kings themselves have not difdain'd to enter themselves into this Society, the original Foundation of which is faid to be as high as the Reign of King Henry III, when the Pope granted a Bull, Patent, or Diploma, to a particular Company of Italian Majons and Architects to Eravel over all Europe to build Churches. From these is derived the Fraternity of Adopted Majons, Accepted Majons, or Free Majons, who are known to one another all over the World by certain Signals and watch Words known to them alone. They have several Lodges in different Countries for their Reception; and when any of them fall into Decay, the Brotherhood is to relieve him. The manner of their Adoption, or Admission, is very formal and folemn, and with the Administration of an Oath of Secrecy, which has had better Pate than all other Oaths, and has been eyer most religiously observed, nor has the World been yet able, by the inadvertency, surprize, or folly of any of its Members

Bers to dive into this Mystery, or make the least discovery. During the Rage of the Civil War our Author faithfully served his distressed Prince, and when his own Con-. cessions, and the Fury of the People had brought him to the fatal Scaffold, unwilling to be a fad Spectator of the almost daily Triumphs over oppressed Loyalty in this Metropolis, he retired into this County, where amidst the Pleasures of a rural Solitude he prepared some Things which have since seen the Light. Here well contented with this Obscurity he tells us. That \* it pleased God to put me in mind, that I was now (1647.) placed in the Condition I always defired, which was, that I might be enabled to live to my felf and Studies, without being forced to take pains for a Livelihood in the World: And feeing I am thus retired, according to my Heart's desire, I beseech God to bless me in my Retirement, and to profe per my Studies, that I may faithfully and diligently ferve him, and in all Things submit to his Will; and for the Peace and Happiness I enjoy (in the midst of bad Times) to render him all

humble Thanks, and for what I attain to in the Course of my Studies, to give him the Glory.' In the Year 1648. an Ritate at Bradfield, where he was Lord of the Manor, and elsewhere in this Counkv. was sequestred for his former active Loyalty, but by the Interest of some Friends among the godly, the Sequestration was taken off at Reading, 21 Nov. 3648. On Nov. 16. 1649. he was marnied to Mary, the fole Daughter of Sir William Forster, of Aldermarston, in this County, Baroner, the Widow of Sir Tho-.mas Maiswaving, Kt. late Recorder of the Corporation of Reading, and one of the Masters in the High Court of Chancery. In 1652. the Theatrum Chymicum Britannicum was published, the Pictures of which were engraved at Mr. Affimole's own House, by that eminent Artiff of his Profession, Mr. Vaughan. By the Interest of Sir Humpbrey Forster, who claimed a Right of Presentation to the Benefice of Bradfield, our Author met with many edifficulties from the Tryers, to whom he presented three different Persons to be admitted to this Living, the last of which the Committee, after some contest, conniv'd at. In his last Match some Matrimonial Jars happening, and his Wife fuing for separate Alimony. he tells us,

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That \* 1657. Octob. 8. the Cause between me and my Wife was heard, where Mr. Serjeant Maynard observed to the Court, that there were eight bundred Sheets of Deposi-tions on my Wife's Part, and not one Word proved against me of using her Ill, nor ever giving her a bad or provoking Word. Issue of this was, that the Lady was delivered to her Husband, and the Cause adjudged frivolous, and without Grounds. In 1657. he attended Mr. Dugdale in his Survey of the Pen Country, and was very affiftant to him in that excellent Undertaking, fo much for the Honour and Advantage of the Nation; and the Effects of this Journey were visible fometime after, in a large and judicious Account of those Marshy Countries. The same Year he traced the Roman Road from Weedon, by Antoninus termed Bennavenna, on Watling-street, to Litchfeld, of which he sent fome Account † to his inseparable Friend, Mr. Dugdale, in a Letter dated April 20. On Nov. 11. 1657. he was admitted a Member of the Middle Temple, and in May 1658. first began his Collection of Materials for the Work of the Garter.

Aug. 21. 1659. his Study was broke open by the Soldiers on pretence of fearthing for King Charles II. Decemb. 16. 1659. Mr. John Tredescant and his Wife sealed and delivered a Deed of Gift of all their Rarities then preserved at South Lambeth in Surrey. On June 18. 1660. The Church and State being restored to its antient Glory, Mr. Ashmole was introduced by Mr. Thomas Chifinch to kifs the King's Hand, with whom he discoursed some Hours the next Day, and then was constituted Windsor Herald, and his Patent figned on the 22d of the same Month, and took the common Oaths of his Office on Aug. 10., following. Soon after this he was appointed by the King to a Description of his Medals, and had them delivered into his Hands, and King Henry the VIIIth's Closet assigned for that purpose. At the same Time was also a Commission issued out for the Examination of that infamous Buffoon, and Trumpeter of Rebellion, Hugh Peters, concerning the disposal of the Pictures, Jewels, &c. belonging to the Royal Family, which were committed chiefly to his Care, and fold and dispersed over Europe, and are yet in the Closers of several Princes, who then connived at, nay encouraged, the Deprædations made on the Royal Exile, and enriched

riched their own Cabinets, with the invaluable Curiofities of England, at a very cheap Rate, which neither Generosity, Honour, nor Justice, has ever induced them to restore, though they well knew the invalidity of the Title upon which they purchased; but crowned Heads have as little regard to Honour or Justice, when they interfere with their Interest, as the vulgar, else, how shall we account for their courting the Usurper, conceding to the most unreasonable Demands, and facrificing all, even to the most sanguine Expectations he could entertain. This Commission was foon brought to a conclusion, by the Obstinacy, or Ignorance of their Criminal, who either would not, or was not able to give the defired fatisfaction: Thus was this Matter dropt, and every one left, if their own Consciences permitted, to enjoy without any mole-fration, the Plunder they had collected. Aug. 21. 1660. our Author presented to the King the Three Books he had published during the Usurpation, viz. Fasciculus Chymicus, Theatrum Britannicum, and The Way to Blis, which his Majesty received very graciously; and soon after, Sept. 3. signed a Warrant to him for the Comptrollership of the Excise. Nov. 2. 1660. he was called to the Bar, in the [B 2] Mid-

Middle Temple Hall, and admitted to it on the 7th following. Jan. 15. 1661. he was admitted one of the Bellows of the Royal Society, and on February 9. a Warrant was figned to constitute him Secretary of Surinam in the East Indies. April 13. 1661, the King gave Orders to my Lord Chamberlain to fettle him as the first Herald, in case any dispute should happen. On February 17. 1665. Sir Edward Byfbe fealed his Deputation for the Visitation of this County, which was begun on the 11th of March following. On Jame 9. 1668. he was appointed by the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, to execute the Office of Accomptant General in the Excise, and Country Accomptant. On April 1. 1668. the Lady Mainwaring, his fecond Wife, died, and he was married to his third Wife, Elizabeth, Daughter to Sir William Dngdale, Kt. Garter King at Arms, by Dr. Lloyd, (fince Bishop of Worsester) in Lincoln's Inn Chapel. On July 9. 1669, he was by a Diploma created Doctor of Physick by the University of Oxford, which was presented to him by Dr. Tates, Principal of Brazen Note College, on Nov. 3. following. 1672 The History of the Genter was prefented to King Charles II. by the Author, on May 8. for which, on June 18. following

ing he received a Privy Seal for 400 Pounds out of the Custom of Paper. On Faly 25. 1671. he furrendred his Heralds Place. Upon the Death of Sir Edward Walker, Garter, on Feb. 20. 1677. a Controverfy riling between the King and Earl Marsbal, upon the Right of the disposal of this Office, Mir. Ashmole was of Opinion, That the Right was vested in the King, which was confirmed Merch 30. 1677. at a Hearing before some Lords of the Council, and some Knights of the Garter. After the Determination of this Matter, Mr. Ashmole was very much importuned to accept of this High Office, which he declined, to prevent suspicion of Partiality in giving his Opinion at first for the King, and to gratify his Father in Law, Sir William Dugdale, who was created Garter, Principal King at Arms, on May 24. following. In this Matter, though affistant to his Majesty in afferting his Majesty, he behaved himself with so much Circumspection and Prudence, that it gave no Umbrage to the Earl Marshal, who himself publickly applauded his Behaviour. But let his own Reasons, why he was unwilling to fue for GARTER's Place, answer for him, communicated by a Gentleman of Worth, and inserted at full length.

Feb. 21. Y Lord Bishop of Salubury
1675. In Aving been at my House
in Sheere Lane (which then stood empty,
I having some Time before retired into
the Country to dwell) and at my Chamber in the Temple, but missing me at both Places, heard at length I dwelt at South Lambeth, whereupon the next Day he sent me an obliging Letter (Feb. 22.) to acquaint me, That as foon as he heard of Sir Edward Walker's Death (which happened the 20th of Feb. preceding) he endeavourto find me out, but being not able, he immediately spoke to the Duke of Tork, and some other Knights of the Garter, to move the King on my behalf to succeed him, but the Duke wished him rather to move the Matter to the King, because he was pre-engaged, viz. to the Earl Marshal, and immediately gave him an Opportunity to do it. The King gave him such an Answer as caused him to believe and hope his Inclinations were very good to me; but it appeared after, that the Earl Mar-(bal had acquainted the King with a Claim himself had to the disposing of that Office, which induced his Majesty to give the Bishop no positive Answer.

This Letter his Lordship sent me by one of his Gentlemen, who found me at

home

home under a Fortnights ill Indisposition, by whom I returned my most humble Thanks, and informed him I had no Inclination to accept of the Place, and therefore desired him to press it no farther, and that I would attend him as soon as I was able to stir out of Doors, and then acquaint him with the Reasons of my resusal.

March 3. I went to give my Lord Bishop of Salubury my personal Thanks for fo real a Kindness, and told him I was retired into the Country with Resolutions to take upon me no new Employments, and had (to make my Retirement more comfortable and easy) resigned my Herald's Place, and thrown off all other kind of Buliness (except the Comptrollership of the Excise) and for that reason was not willing to enter again upon any other whatsoever; and that in case his Majesty should enquire of him, why he did not present his Suit on my behalf, he should be ready to answer, that my Employment in the Excise took up my whole Time, and I was doubtful, least my Attendance at Whitehall, the Herald's Office, or elsewhere, upon Matters relating to this Office, might occasion me to neglect that Service, which so nearly related to his Majesty's Profit and Advantage.

March 7. 1674. This Morning I went to wait upon my Lord Marshal, who told me, he heard I used Means to the King to obtain GARTER's Place, but conceived it was his Right, as Earl Marshal, to dispose of it; I repeated him the Reasons I had before given his Secretary, why was of Opinion it was the King's Right, not his, and denied that I so much as looked after the Place, and therefore acquainted him first with what the Bishop of Sahibury, out of Kindness to me, had done (though without my Knowledge) next, that I had entreated him to proceed no further; and lastly, gave his Lordship the same Reasons for declining the Employment, which I had before given to the Bi-Thop. He thereupon defired me to give him leave to tell the King so much, which I readily did. He then told me, he heard Sir William Howard made means to the King for it, and asked my Opinion whither he could be GARTER, who was not of the Office of Arms; I answered there had antiently been two Persons made GARTER, who had not been Officers of Arms, but I hoped the King would not fo far discourage the present Officers, as to chuse a Stranger in the Place; whereupon he asked me leave to let the King know this was my Sense, which he did; then I

acquainted him that the King had comtranded me to affift the Chancellor in making out his Right to the Nomination of GARTER, and though I refused the Place, yet I durft not deny him that Service: This he did not very well like, but I told him, I knew not which way to avoid it.

March 31, 1677. The next Morning after the Earl Markal's Pretentions to the Right of nominating GARTER had been heard before the Committee appointed for that Purpose, I had occasion to attend my Lord Treasurer Danby about some Business in the Excise Office. Mr. Ch. Bertie, his Secretary, feeing me there, asked me, why I did not feek after the Place? and intimated, that my Lord Treasurer thought me the fittest Person for it; but I told him, I had no ambition rowards it, and feared that my Attendance about this Place might occasion some neglect in the Excise Office; and though this Excuse stood me in some stead, and seemed considerable to others to whom I had made use of it, yet he presently reply'd, my Lord Treasurer would give me leave to execute my Comptroller's Place by Deputy. To which I had nothing to reply, but that I had many other Reasons that induced me to wave the Employment. Upon this he told me, eny Lord would speak with me in the [C] Park,

Park, where I attended till he came thither, who, when he came, began to ask me some sew Questions about the Preparations he was to make against his Installation, and who he should send for, to inform him therein; I answered, it was the Duty of GARTER to inform him, and that, that Affair being debated the Night before (where his Lordship was, and of the Committee) I presumed it would be known e'er long what was then determined. He answered, the Matter had that Night, before the Committee role, been determined on the King's side against my Lord Marshal, upon which I told his Lordship, I presumed within a few Days GAR-TER would be nominated; and in regard it was above a Fortnight to the Day of his Installation, it would be time enough both to attend him, and make all Things ready against that time. And here I presume (by what I gathered from Mr. Bertie's pressing me to make Friends to obtain GARTER'S Place) his Lordship expected I would have moved him to have spoke to the King for me, and pauling a little while, asked me, if I had any Thing to fay to him. I answered no, and so took my leave.

In the Afternoon Mr. Bertie meeting me again, asked me what Discourse passed

be-

between his Lordship and me: I told him, who wondered I would not move him to fpeak for me, and used many Arguments to induce me yet to do it, and told me how unfit Mr. Lee (whom my Lord Marshal intended for the Place) was for it, nor was capable of it, not being a Gentleman of Blood, as he heard the Constitutions of the Order required. I still shewed my un. willingness, and left him. Not with standing which, on Monday Morning, April 1. after, he fet more earnestly again upon me, and told me, he heard the Place must speedily be disposed of, because the Day appointed for Installation approached, and most earnestly pressed me to apply my self to the King to obtain it; but I told him, I was unfit for the Place, at which he wondered I should alledge that, when it appeared by my Book of the Garter, there was no Man fitter. I answered, my unfitness grew from Deafness encreasing on me, from decay of my Eye-light, and greater decay in my Memory, all which considered, did very much incapacitate me from that Service; to which he reply'd, he never knew any Man discommend himself before, when so fair a way lay open for his Preferment. I then gave him many hearty Thanks for his kind Inclinations to me, and so parted.

April 2. The next Meeting, my Lord Marshal coming out of the Lord's House, he told me the King had pitched upon my Father Dugdale to be GARTER, and believed that it would not displease me; I answered, I was very glad of it, and I thought it the best Choice; but he being in Warwickshire, his Lordship added, he would send for him up by that Night's Post.

I have been thus particular, because, after this Time, some of the Officers of Arms (Mr. Holford, &c.) my Lord Mar-shal, had said (and it was most certain) I fought underhand to get GARTER's Place, though openly I feemed to decline it, which I could not but wonder at, because I had been so clear with his Lordship in averring the contrary, so also because his Lordship had told my Father upon his coming to Town, that I had carried my felf very fairly in my managing the Business against him, though both Honour and Profit lay on this Occasion before me; yet God having taken from me both Ambition and Covetousness, I set more value upon the retired Life I was entred into, than all the Advantage and Honour I should reap by that Office,

In 1677, he was requested to appear as a Candidate for Parliament for the City of Litchfield, by the Bailiss, upon the Death of Mr. Dyost, their late Representative, but for some time defired to be excused, till upon repeated Letters he was prevailed on to stand, and then found it too late, and the Magistrates and Friends not so cordial as he expected, so that he drew off in time. This he had the more reason to refent, as having been a Benefactor to their Corporation, when at the beginning of 1666. he presented to them a Silver Bowl, for which their Bailiffs, in the Name of the City had made a publick acknowledgment of Gratitude, as you may fee in their Letter \*.

In 1678. Robert Plotz, L. L. D. was recommended by Mr. John Evelyn to Mr. Ahmole, who gave him ample Recommendations to the University of Oxford as a proper Person for their Reader of Natural Philosophy. This Lecture has been by many said to have been founded, and endowed by our Author, Mr. Ashmole; but this Mistake is built upon the Notion generally conceived, that he designed such a Benefaction, and an ample and generous

Assowance to the Keeper of his Musaum at Oxford; but this publick Principle was stifled in Embrio by the influence of a Person who was possessed of an eminent Post in the Church, and in some of his elegant and polite Writings had dropt some Expressions savouring of Socinianism, which being not undefervedly, and unanswerably attacked by a Member of this University. it was so highly resented, that his Interest with our Author stopt the Design, and the Place still remains unendowed. In 1682. he bestowed on the University of Oxford (who had erected a handsom Repolitory near the Theatre) a most considerable Collection of Natural and Artificial Curiofities, which were many Years gathering by the two Tradescants, Father and Son, both successively Physick Gardiners at Lambeth, of which there was a small Account published. This Benefaction Mr. Ashmole augmented much at his Death, May 18. 1692. by the addition of his Library, confifting chiefly of Manuscripts, and some printed Books relating to English History, Heraldry, Astronomy, and Chymistry, with a very great Variety of Pamphlets, part whereof had been forted by himself, and the rest are methodized fince, and a double Catalogue of all made, a Classical one according to their various Sub-

Subjects, and another Alphabetical. He also bequeathed to the same Place, two Gold Chains and a Medal, the one a Philigreen Chain of 90 Links, weighing 22 Ounces, with a Medal of the Elector of Brandenburgh, on which is that Elector's Effigies; and on the reverse, a View of Straellund, struck on the Surrender of that important City. A Collar of S. S. with a Medal of the King of Denmark, also a Gold Medal of the Elector Palatine, and a George of the Duke of Norfolk, worn by his Grandfather, when he was Ambasfador in Germany; all which were presented to him as Acknowledgments of the Honour he had done the Garter, by his Labours on that Subject. chives of the Bodleian Library, and prepapared for the Press, as appears by its Preface \*. IV. A Volume of King Charles the Second's Silver Imperial Roman Coins. He was interred at the East End of the North Ile of Lambeth Church in Surrey, in which Parish he led the latter part of his Life, and on a Black Marble Grave-stone placed over him are these Arms, viz. quarterly, Sable, and Or, the first Quarter on a Fleur de Lis of the second; Assemble empaling Dugdale, viz. Argent a Cross Malines Gules, and a Torteaux, with this Motto, Ex uno omnia, and the following Inscription.

## INTRODUCTION

# BERKSHIRE,

ERKSHIRE, or BARKSHIRE, is bounded by
Surrey on the East, Wiltshire on the West, on the
South by Hampshire, and on
the North, partly by Buck-

inghamshire and Oxfordshire, from which two last it is separated by the Rivers of Thames and Isis; it is in length from Colesbull to Windsor about forty Miles: within its bounds it takes in part of the South Suburbs of the City of Oxford, of which, in this [D 2] Work

Work there is no Account, it being left to some future Undertaker of the Antiquities of that City. It is likened to a Sandal, or Slipper; and to a Lute by Fuller. Affer Menevensis, and Leland, derive the Name from Berroc, the Name of a Forest in this County abounding in Box, or Berrock, a Bare Oak, under which Trees the English Saxons formerly held their Assemblies: It is termed in the Saxon Chronicle Bearuscire, and Barroscire, and in length of Time corrupted to Berocscre, or Baroc/cire. This was formerly the Seat of the Attrebatii, and may be, perhaps, a Colony removed from the Attrebates in Gaul. But passing over the Grounds upon which these Conjectures are built, let us descend to Ages of less Obscurity. In the Division of the Saxon Heptarchy, this County was included within the Limits of the Kingdom of the West Saxons; afterwards England being united under King Alfred, another Division was made, and when the Office of High Sheriff, or Vice-Comes, was instituted, this and the adjoyning County of Oxford were put under the same Person. The nearest Part of this County is about Twenty Miles from London, is in the Diocese of Salubury; the middle of it in the Latitude of 52 Degrees, and in Longitude 1 Degree and 20 Min. contains

22 Hundreds, 12 Market Towns, 671 Villages and Hamlets, of which 140 are Parochial, and 62 are Vicarages, and about 16906 Houses, and about 84530 In. habitants; sends 9 Representatives to Parliament; is in some Parts well wooded and watered by the Rivers of Thames. Iss, and Kennet, the two first of which are already Navigable, the last is now, by Act of Parliament, to be made so from Reading to Newbury, which is already accomplished up to Aldermarston. County may be rather valued for its pleafant Situation than its Fertility, the Air being generally healthy, even in the lowest Vales, which may be judged to be the reason of the high Price the Land of this County bears. Its Commodities are Wheat, Flower, Barley, and one particular Species of that Grain, called Palney Barley, and all Sorts of Corn, but exceeds many other Counties in its Malting. It abounds in Wood and Cattle, but has long lost its antient Credit for the Clothing Manufacture, which was the greatest in Newbury and Reading, and supplyed almost the whole Nation. The Parts which feem to be most fruitful and advantagious to their Lords, are situate on the Banks of Thames and Kennet, and the Vale of White Horse; so called from the Shape of a Horse fan(xxx)

fancied to be represented on the side of a Chalky Hist. Within this County is the Forest of Windsor, in which are several small Towns, taken Notice of by Mr. Astronolo, who has omitted Ockingham, perhaps because the Church stands in Wilt-bire, but the Town it self being in this County, I shall not judge it improper to give the following Account of it.

### OCKINGHAM,

Called also Wokingham, is pleasantly sithate on an Eminence, a large and handsome Market Town, the Parish is in Circumference twelve, and in Length five Miles, in Breadth three, and distant from London thirty Miles. It is bounded on the East by Easthamsted, on the West by Finchamsted, on the North by Barkham, and Southward by Hurst. Most of the Land in this Parish is Common, little arable Land, the Soil generally Sandy, some Parts clayey and (wampy, the Profits uriling to the Farmers chiefly from Pa-Sturage. Here are three Fairs kept anmually, I. On All-Saints Day. II. The Thursday after Shrove Tuesday. III. On Fine 11. St. Barnabas. Market Day is weekly, on Tuesday. Lord of the Manor

is Sir Robert Rieb, of Sunning, Kt. and Bar. Impropriator Scory Barker, of Chifweick in Middlesex, Esq; the present Vicar is the Reverend Mr. Benjamin Meody. The Parish Church is almost at the end of the Town, is antient, large, and well built, consisting of a Chancel, Nave, and two Iles on each fide of the Body, supported by neat stone Pillars: At the West End is a Tower containing Six Bells.

Against the East Wall of the Chancel, on a Black Marble Table, enchased in White, in Gold Capitals, is this Inscription.

the Town by Mr. Jay, 1717.

Memorandum, The charitable Legacy of 15 l. 5 s. per Annum, given to the poor of this Town and Parish by Bartholomew Bromley, Gent. being lost for many Years, was, at last, redeemed and recovered by the indefatigable Care and Paines of the Reverend Mr. Robert Gunnis, Vicar of Winckfield in the County of Berks.

Estate, with which this Hospital is endowed, lyes at Harlington, and thereabouts, near Ampthill in Bedfordsbire. Trustees of this Charity are the Company of Grocers in London, who elect and confirm the Chaplain, or Master, and Pensioners, the last of which are presented to them

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them by the following Parishes of this County, and Surrey, alternately, as they become vacant.

### LANGFORD.

This Town lyes partly in Oxfordshire, and partly in this County, bounded Eastward by Clanfield, on the North by Bradzwell, on the South by Kencot, all in Oxfordshire, and on the West by Letchlade in Gloucestershire. Part of this Parish is the Corpse of a Prebendal Stall in the Cathedral Church of Lincoln. The present Possessor is William Offley, M. A. Rector of Middleton Stony in Oxfordshire, who lets all Leases in Langford, and puts in Lives. Dean and Chapter of Lincoln are Visitors. Lords of the Manor are George Brodericke, of Cockerills, Esq; and Mr. Pye. Impro-priator, and Patron, is Mrs. Kechmie, Sister to Mr. Bray, of Barrington in Gloucestershire. Vicar is the Reverend Mr. Edward Davis, of Gloucester Hall (now Worcester College) in Oxford, to whom this Benefice is worth about Eighty Pounds per Annum. Part of the Church, and Camitery adjoyning, stand in this County, and part in Oxfordshire: The Apparitor of the Deanery of Witney, in the Diocese of Oxford, always Summons the Vicar to the Oxfordshire Visitation held by the Bishop or Arch-Deacon, but the Institution is given by by the Bishop of Salisbury, as in that Diocese, which seems to confirm the Position of this Place in Berkshire, where I venture to put it; and the dubiousness of this Assair seems to be the Reason of Mr. Assairs of Omission.

The Church is large and handsome, and has in it the following Inscriptions on

Monuments, or Grave-stones, viz.

He doth confess, that he saw divers Medals of Gold, Silver, and Brass, and other Pieces of Antiquity, as Iron Rings, and the like, but that he took nothing thence, and then delivered up the Key, and Custody of them, to Major General Ictom, and further he saith, That he never had or saw any Thing belonging thereto.





#### ALDERMARSTON, ...

This Town is fituate in Theale Hundred, in the Deanery of Reading, on the Banks of the River Kennet, and near it on a rising Ground, stood a fair Manor House: It was first given by King Henry I. to Robert Achard, from whose Posterity, by the Delameres, it descended to the late Owners, the Forsters, a very antient and gentile Family, one of whom, Humphry Forster, Esq; was High-Sherist of this County in 1475, a lineal Ancestor of Sir Humphrey Forster, last of that Race: It is now sold to the Lord Stawell and Sir..... Smith, but the Advowson is still in the Gift of Queen's College in Oxford.

At the Entrance into the Chapel, situate on the South Side of the Church, is erected a fair Alabaster Tomb, whereon are laid the Pourtraitures of a Knight in Armour, (his Collar composed of a Knot, and an S'S alternately, with a Portcullis pendant thereto) his Lady lying by him, drest in the Habit, usually worn in her Life time. The Crest, whereon his Head resteth, is a Fox's Head, issuing out of a Crown.

On the North Side of the Monument are the Pourtraitures of 8 Sons in Armour, standing; on the South Side of 8 Daughters in their usual Habits; and at the Feet are 3 Sons more; round the upper Ledge is this Epitaph engraved.

#### STRATFIELD-MORTIMER,

Is a Manor in the Possession of Eton Collège, in the Hundred of Theale, and Deanery of Reading, bordering on the same station at Silchester in Hampshire, and is under the Patronage of Eton Collège.

All the Sides of the East Window of the Chancel are bordered with the Royal Badges of the Star, and Welch Royal Arms.

On a Grave-stone placed in the North Isle, in a Plate of Brass fixed, having a Man in Armour graved thereon, is this Inscription.

#### COMPTON Hundred.

#### ALDWORTH.

Aldworth is a Vicaridge in the Deanery of Newbury, and in the Patronage of St. John's College in Cambridge, formerly remarkable for being the Lordship of the antient Family of De la Beche, who had a Castle here; and, whose Heirs Male R were

were extinguished in the Reign of Edward III. and are supposed to be interred under the Monuments underneath mentioned: One of this Family was High Sheriff of this County in 1313. The Heiress of this Family was afterwards married into the Name of Whitlock.

In the Wall, at the East End of the North Isle, is a Statue of one in Armour, in Free-Stone, lying on one Side, and one Arm-broke off.

In the middle lies another Statue, cross

legged, armed.

At the West End another Statue like the former.

Within an Arch on the South Side of the Church, is another like the former.

Within another Arch, next the last mentioned, lyes the Statue of a Woman holding up her Hands in a praying Posture. All these Statues are of a very large Size.

#### COMPTON,

Is in the Deanery of Newbury, formerly belonged to the Pyles, one of whose Family, Francis Pyle, Biq; was created a Baronet, September 12. 1628. In the middle of the Body of the Church, lies a Grave-stone, whereon is a Plate of Brass, cut with the Figure of a Man in a Gown, and his Wife in her usual Habit, and at their Feet this Epitaph.

#### East HILDESLET, alias HESLET,

In the middle of the North Isle, on a Grave-stone is fixed a plate of Brass, and thereon the Figure of a Woman engraved, and these Verses.

#### STREATLEY,

So called from Stratum, the Roman Road running through this Town to Spine, or Speen, in this County,

Is in the Hundred of Morton, Deanery of Wallingford, and Patronage of the Bishop of Sarum.

On a Plate of Brass, set in a Marble, laid at the Entrance into the Chancel, are the Figures of a Man in a Gown, and his Wife, habited according to the Times, and thus.

Here lyeth the Body of THOMAS BURITON, of Streatly, in County of Berks, Esq; Son and Heire of WILLIAM BURITON, who was third Son to THOMAS BU-RITON, of the City of Hereford,

in the County of Hereford, Esq. This Thomas bere buried, took to Wife IOHAN WIER, Gentlewoman, by whome he had fix Sons and two Daughters; the Sons dyed all in the Lyfe of the Father, the which JOHAN surviving ber sayd Hasband, in Testimony of her intire Affection, which she did beare to him living, placed this Stone in his Memory being dead; intending as she lived with him, so after. her Death, by God's Permission, to rest in the same Grave. The said Thomas dred the exth of July, An. Dom. MDCIII. and the faid Johan dyed

Credo videre bona Dom. in terra viventium.

In the Chancel is the Figure of a Man in a Cloak, and his Wife in her usual Habit, engraven in Brass upon a Marble Grave-stone, and beneath them this Epitaph.

Here has buried Thomas Clarke of Streatley, Gent. and Elizabeth bis Wife, one of the Daughters and Coheires of Griffith Barton, Eff. they had Iffue betweene them one Sou, called Griffith, and three Daughters, Agnes, (40)

Agnes, Elizabeth, and Margaret; fhe died the xth of Sept. MDXCVIII. and he dyed the viith of May, MDC.

At the Feet of Thomas Clarke is the Figure of his Son Griffith, and under his Wives Feet of his three Daughters, all likewise engraved in Brass Plates.

On a Grave-stone near adjoyning, whereon is the Picture of a Woman cut in a Brass Plate, with this Inscription.

# WALLINGFORD Town.

This Town borders on Oxfordshire, about a Mile from the Isis, which parts the Counties of Berks and Oxford; said to have been the Metropolis of the Attrebatii, and called by Antoninus, Calleva; by Ptolomy, Callena; whereas, according to Mr. Cambden, it is called Gallena, and to be derived from Guallhen, a Word fignifying in the old British, The old Fort. It is faid to have been the Royal Mansion of Comius, constituted King of the Attre-batii by Julius Casar; and to prove this Hypothesis, much weight is laid on two Coins, said to have been discovered here, bearing the Inscriptions of REX CALLE. and REX COM. and upon the Authority of this, the Place is supposed to have been of Note in the Roman Days, as it was certainly in the Times of the Saxons and Danes. This Notion of its Grandeur in the Roman Times, has been sufficiently, and learnedly confuted by Dr. Gale, who has proved, without Contradiction, Henley, a Market Town on the Borders of Oxfordshire, to be the true Calleva, p. 109. of his Edition of Antoninus's Itinerary. Others have fixed this Calleva at Oxford, G 2

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but with as little shew of Reason: But to proceed to Times less dark and obscure, we are assured, that this Town was destroyed by Danish Power in 1006. and that afterwards, in the Confessor's Days. it was esteemed a Borough, mentioned in Domesday Book, and at the Norman Conquest, the Seat of one Wigod. Here the Conqueror accepted the Submission of Stigand, Arch-Bishop of Canterbury, and married Wigod's Daughter, Aldith, to his great Favourite, Robert d'Oyley, who by her had Issue one Daughter, named Maud, whom he married to Miles Crispin in 1984. and endowed her with this Caftle, Town, and Honour. She was married a Second Time to Brian Fitz-Count, a brave Loyalist, who held out a Siege of this Castle for his Mistress, the Empress, or Queen Maud, against the perjured Usurper Stephen, till a Peace was concluded here between Stephen, and her Son Henry II. Not long after King Henry's Accession to the Throne, These two entered on a Religious Life. Upon which this Estate and Manor was seized, and by Richard I. given to his Brother John, whose second Son, Richard King of the Romans, celebrated his Espoufals with Senchia, Daughter to Beatrix, Counters of Provence, in this Place, where on St. Cacilia's Day, he entertained the King, 1. (

King, Queen, and Nobility. This Msnor he left to his Son Edmand, Earl of Cornwall, on his Death in 1271. who in 1281. founded in this Castle a Collegiate Church, dedicated to St. Nicholas, and endowed it with an Estate for the support of a Dean, 6 Prebendaries, 6 Clerks, and 4 Choristers: It fell in the general Havock, and at the Dissolution was ra-

ted at 147 l. 8 s. # Az.

This Manor in after Times became the Plunder of the two Favourites of Edward II. Pierce Gaveston, and Hugh de Spenter. after whole Death Queen Isabel posses'd it, and foon quitted to her Son, Edward IIL who bestowed it on his Brother, John Barl of Cornwall, upon whose Death, in 1224, it was, by Act of Parliament, annexed to the Duke of Cornteall, and in that Quality was held by the Black Prince, and his Successors, Princes of Wales, and Dukes of Cornwall. Upon a Design hid of erecting Christ Church in Owford by Cardinal Wolfey, the true and real Founder, (however that Society may call themselves Royal) this Manor and Castle was made over by Hen. VIII. to that Great Man, upon whose Attaintment, that facrilegious Prince re-annexed it to the Crown, which he afterwards severed, and annexed to the Manor of Expelme

Eiselme in Oxfordbire. The Castle indeed still continued, as the Cardinal defigned it, in the Possession of Christ Church, as it does to this Time. b This Castle, according to Leland, was surrounded with three broad, deep Enerenchments, and in it were contain'd several Buildings; and five Streets, cal-led Thamesserest, Fishfreet, Breadstreet, Woodstreet, and Goldsmiths-Row, in its By him we are antient Magnificence. also informed, Wolfey suppressed a Priory of Black Monks, here standing within the West Gate, which belonged to the Abby of St. Albans: The Suppression of this, and other small Religious Houses, was a Presage of that more general Sacrilege that soon followed, and gave a coverous Prince too just a handle for the Seizure of the rest of the Ecclesiastical Revenues of this Nation, (though Deodands, and dedicated to facred Uses) when he saw a Church Man, encouraged by the Infallible Head of his Church, not scruple at such Alienations to gratify his Vanity. In this Town were of old four Churches, viz. St. Peter's, St. Mary's, St. Leonard's, and All Saints, (the Three first of which are now united) most of which were destroyed in the late Times of Confusion." It is at prefent a large, handsome Town, in which are

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are two principal Streets, and a handsome Guild, or Town Hall, built about 42 Years fince It is a distinct Jurisdiction from the County, and has Quarter Sessions in it; on Friday weekly it has a Market; and yearly, on April 5. and June 24 Fairs, and sends two Burgesses to Parliament.

Twyce High Sheriff of the County of Berks, (Husband of two Wives, both in the said County; the former, JANE Essex, Widow of THOMAS ESSEX, of Becket-house, E/q: the later KATHERINE Younge, Widdow of WILLIAM Young, of Bastledon, Esq;) Knighted in the Campe before Roan the xvith of November, MDXCI. by the Hands of the French King, Henry the Fourth of that Name, and King of Navarre, who after his Travailes in Germany, Italy, and France, and the Execution of Justice to the Glory of God, and the good of his Countrye, ended this Pikgrimage at Bastledon, the xxvth of April, MDXCIX.

At the Head of the aforesaid Gravestone lies another, whereon is engraven in Brass, a Figure of a Man in Armour, his Head Piece lying in the Place of a Pillow for his Head, and about the Verge of the Stone is written.

# KINGSTON BAKEPUZE,

Alias Kingston Baptist, alias Kingston Inn, is in the Deanery of Abington, and Hundred of Oke. This Manor was given to St. John's College in Oxford, by their Founder, Sir Thomas White, Kt. Alderman of London; and confirmed to them by Letters Patents, dated May 1. 1555. They are also Patrons of this Rectory, of which, the present Incumbent is Richard Blechingdon, L. L. D. Provost of Worcester College in Oxford, Rector of Newnham Courtney in Oxfordshire, and Prebendary of Gloucester. In it is the Seat of .... Bland, Esq; who married the Heiress of Fety-Place.

Near his House stands the Church, where against the South Wall is a Monument, on which were the Statues of a Man and Woman, kneeling at a Desk, but these are now destroyed, and only this Inscription remains.

About a Mile from this Place lyes the small Village of

# FTFTDE, alias FTFEILD,

Which is situated in the Hundred of Oke, and Deanery of Abington.

This Manor was formerly in the Posfession of the Golaste's, a Family of no small Note in this County, and the adjoining County of Oxford; where I find them particularly mentioned in the larger Register of Einsham Abby, cap. 159. that one Hugh Golaste, who lived in 1181. with the consent of Sybella, and his Sons and Heirs, Roger and Thomas, gave to the Monks of Einsham his Chapel of Serchesdune,

(Saresden) with all its Appurtenances, as well the Tythes of Hay, as the Tythes of his Mill there, and unum borderium quod Alardus tenuit, quod jacet juxta terram Ecclesie in dextera exitus ville, teste Radulpho de Cheisne. About the time of the Reformation, it was bought by Sir Thomas White, Kt. LordMayor of the City of London, in 1555. and Founder of St. John Baptist College in Oxford, on which Foundation he settled it; at first Leasing it out to his Brother, in whose Family, in a direct Line, it has continued to this Day, and is now vested in Francis White, Esq; St. John's College are Lords of the Manor, and Patrons of the Advowson, and out of the great Tythes of this Vicaridge, in 1711. settled 30 £. # Annum, on the Vicar, who is, at present, Moses Wiles, D. D. and Fellow of that College.

Near the Church is the old Manor House, belonging to Mr. White. The Chancel of this Church belongs to the Family of Perrott, of North Leigh in Oxfordshire, an antient and genteel Family, who are obliged to keep it in constant Repair.

### ABINGTON Town.

About five Miles from the City of Oxford lyes Abington, a neat Town, very antient and remarkable for its famous Abby, one of the Glories of England, and Reproaches of Sacrilege. This Place was formerly known by the Name of Sheoveseukesham; which last Way of writing has been confirmed by a M. S. in the Cottonian Library, in Claudius, B. VI. Some have taken this Place to be the Cloveshoe. fo famous for feveral Synods, or Councils. To proceed, the Monastery of the Benedictine Order in this Town, was founded by Heane, Nephew to Cissa, Father to King Ina, about 675. In the Days of King Alfred, Restorer of the University of Oxford, the Danish Inundation drove the Monks away, who returned again upon the Encouragement of King Eldred 955, and Ethelwoldus their Abbot, Bishop of Winchester. Soon after the Norman Conquest, the Abbey was in so slourishing a State, as to be able in 1084. to receive William I. at Easter; when he left his youngest Son

Son Henry to be educated here, under the Tuition of Robert d' Oyly, a great Benefactor to this Place. Many Men eminent for their Quality, Learning, and Virtue, lye interred in the Church of this Abby: but all Memorials of them were destroyed by the Enthusiastick Fury of the Times of Reformation, when this Mona-Rory fell a Sacrifice to Lust and Avarice, and was rated at 1876 l. 10 s. 9 d. Degdale, at 2042 l. 2 s. 8 d. ob. Burten. This Town was made a Free Borough and Corporation, by Queen Mary, at the Request of Sir John Malon, a Native of this Place; and by its Charter it consists of twelve principal Burgesses, viz. a Mayor, 2 Bailiffs, and Nine Aldermen, who only, and their Successors, have Votes in an Election in Parliament., The Manor, Lordfnip, &c. were formerly Demesnes of the Abbey, and are now vested in the Corporation. In this Town is a Free School, founded in 1563. by John Royse, which has produced some eminent Men. Leland and Camden both take Notice of a Cross formerly in this Town, built of Free-Stone, and not inferior in Workmanship to any in England; but Triumphant Rebellion has deft us no Remains of it. Henry the Sixth. by his Charter dated 20 October, Anno Regni 20.... under the Great Seal of

England, authorized William, Bishop of Sarum, William Earl of Suffolk, Thomas Bekinton, Clerk, John Golafre, John Nores, Esquires, Thomas Plesance, Philip Ripe, Hugh Mayn, and Nicholas Goulde, or any 7, 6, 5, or 4 of them, Affociating to themselves others. Wen or women, to the Ponour of God and the Poly Ciols, to make and ordain a Brotherhood, or Gride in the Parity Church of St. Elyn in Abingdon, which would be called the Matter, Brethren and Differs of the Fraternity, or Gylde of the Holy Cross of Abingdon. By the same Charter an Authority was given of purchasing of Lands of 40 Pounds yearly Rent, for the Repair of the Road between Dorchester and Abington, for the Maintenance of 13 poor Men and Women for ever, and for a Chaplain to officiate in St. Helen's Church. To them, as appeared from the Arms of the Trustees of this Charity, was owing the stately Cross mentioned before.

In this Town are two Churches; the first dedicated to St. HELEN, has in it the following Monuments.

On the South Side of the Church is an Isle, and therin are 2 Arches in the Wall, which I suppose were the Sepultures of the ancient Lords hereof.

The North Isle is dedicated to St. Thomas, and the South Isle to St. Catherine.

At the West End of the Church is the Ruins of a Manor anciently belonging (as a Cell, or Place of Removal, as some report) to the Monks of Abington. At the Dissolution, the said Manor, or Lordship, was conveyed to one.... Owen (I believe) the Possessor of Godstow then.

In the Hall over the Chimney I find Abington Arms cut in Stone, viz. A Patonee between 4 Martletts; and also another Escotcheon, viz. A Lion Rampant, and several Miters cut in Stone about the House. There is also in the said House, a Chamber called Dudley's Chamber, where the Earl of Leicester's Wise was murder'd; of which this is the Story following.

Robert Dudley, Earl of Leicester, a very goodly Personage, and singularly well Featur'd, being a great Favourite to Queen Elizabeth, it was thought, and commonly reported, that had he been a Batchelor, or Widower, the Queen would have

have made him her Husband; to this End, to free himself of all Obstacles, he commands, or perhaps, with fair flattering Intressies, delires his Wife to repole her felf here, at his Servant, Anthony Forfer's House, who then lived in the aforefait Manor House; and also prescribed to Sir Richard Varney, (a prompter to this Defign) at his coming hither, that he Thould first attempt to poison her, and If that did not take effect, then by any other Way whatfoever to dispatch her. This, it feems, was proved by the Report of Dr. Walter Bayly, fometime Fellow of New College, then living in Oxford, and Profesion of Physick in that University; who, because he would not confent to take away her Life by Poison, the Eail endeavour'd to displace him from the Court. This Man, it feems, reported for most certain, that there was a Practice in Campor among the Confpirators, to have poisoned this poor innocent Lady, a little before she was killed, which was attempted after this manner. They feeing the good Lady fed and heavy (as one that well knew by her other handling, that her Death was not far off) began to perswade ther, that her present Disease was abundance of Melancholy, and other Humours, etc. and therefore would needs counfel her

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her to take some Potion, which she absohitely refuling to do, as still suspecting the worst; whereupon they sent a Messenger on a Day (unawares to her) for Dr. Bayly, and intreated him to perswade her to take some little Potion by his Direction, and they would fetch the same at Oxford, meaning to have added formething of their own for her Comfort, as the Doctor, upon just Cause and Consideration did suspect, seeing their great Importunity, and the small need the Lady had of Physick, and therefore he peremptorily denied their Request, misdoubting (as he afterwards reported) least if they had poison'd her under the Name of his Porion, he might after have been hanged for a Colour of their Sin; and the Doctor remain'd fill well affured, that this Way taking no Effect, the would not long escape their Violence, which afterwards happened thus. For Sir Richard Varney abovefaid (the chief Projector in this Defign) who by the Earl's Order remain'd that Day of her Death alone with her. with one Man only, and Furster, who had that Day forcibly fent away all her Servents from her to Abington Market, about 3 Miles distant from this Place, they A fay, whether first stifling her, or else Arangling her) afterwards flung her down

a pair of Stairs, and broke her Neck, uling much Violence upon her; but however, though it was vulgarly reported that she by chance fell down Stairs (but yet without hurting her Hood that was upon her Head) yet the Inhabitants will tell you there, that she was conveyed from her usual Chamber where she lay, to another where the Beds Head of the Chamber stood close to a privy Postern Door, where they in the Night came and stifled her in her Bed, bruised her Head very much, broke her Neck, and at length flung her down Stairs, thereby believing the World would have thought it a mischance, and To have blinded their Villany. hold the Mercy and Justice of God, in revenging and discovering this Lady's Mur-der; for one of the Persons, that was a Coadjutor in this Murder, was afterwards taken for a Felony in the Marches of Wales, and offering to publish the Manner of the aforesaid Murder, was privately made away in the Prison by the Earl's appointment. And Sir Richard Varney, the other, dying about the same Time in London, cried miserably, and blasphemed God, and faid to a Person of Note (who hath related the same to others since) not long before his Death, that all the Devils in Hell did tear him in Pieces. ster

fer likewise after this Fact, being a Man formerly addicted to Hospitality, Company, Mirth, and Musick, was afterwards observed to forsake all this with much Melancholy and Pensiveness (some fay with Madness) pin'd and droop'd away. The Wife also of Bald Butter, · Kinsman to the Earl, gave out the whole Fact a little before her Death. Neither are these following Passages to be forgotten, That as foon as ever she was murdered, they made great hast to bury her, before the Coroner had given in his Inquest, (which the Earl himself condemned as not done advisedly) which her Father, or Sir John Robertsett (as I suppose) hearing of, came with all speed hither, caused her Corps to be taken up, the Coroner to sit upon her, and further Enquiry to be made concerning this Business to the full, but it was generally thought, that the Earl stopped his Mouth, and made up the Bulinels betwixt them, and the good Earl, to make plain to the World, the great Love he bare to her while alive. what a Grief the Loss of so Virtuous a Lady was to his tender Heart, caused (though the Thing by these, and other means, was beaten into the Heads of the principal Men of the University of Oxford) her Body to be re-buried in St. Maries

ries Church in Oxford, with great Pomp, and Solemnity. It is remarkable, when Dr. Babington (the Earl's Chaplain) did preach the Funeral Sermon, he tript once or twice in his Speech, by recommending to their Memories that virtuous Lady-fo pitifully murder'd, instead of saying pitifully slain. This Earl, after all his Murders and Poisonings, was himself poisoned by that which was prepared for others (some say by his Wise) at Cornbury Lodge, before mention'd (though Baker in his Chronicle would have it at Killingworth) Anno 1588.

#### South HINXSET.

So called to diffinguish it from Laurence Hinxsey adjoining, is a Chapel of Ease to Cumnor, and lyes on the Borders of this County, about 2 Miles from Oxford.

In the Chancel, on a fair Monument, is this Epitaph.

#### BESSILS-LEIGH,

Lyes about a Mile from Cumnor, in the fame Hundred and Deanery, and is so called from the antient Family of the Befills, joyned to the antient Name of Leigh, one of whom was High-Sheriff of this County in 1431. Upon failure of Male Issue of this Line, it came to the Fetiplaces, one of which Line, Befill Fetiplace, was High-Sheriff of this County in 1583. Many Years after it was purchased by that weak Tool of a rebellious Parliament X 2

(William Lenthall, Esq; Speaker,) who at his Death was an eminent Instance of fincere Repentance, when he signed a Recantation and Abhorrence of his former Errors, which in some Measure may be rather imputed to his Folly, than any ill Design: From him in the Third Generation, it came to the present Possessor, and Lord of the Manor, John Lenthell, Esq; In this House was preserved a Picture of Sir Thomas More, Kt. and his Family, drawn by the Hand of the celebrated Hans Holben, which is now removed to his Seat, the Priory of Burford, in Oxfordsbire, and is by length of Time, and Negligence, much decayed. Of this Family hangs the following Pedigree on the South Side of the Altar in St. George's Church in Southwark.

## FARINGDON Hundred.

On the Western Side of this County lyes

FARING DON, or Farrendon,

Which is pleasantly situated on an Eminence. In it was formerly a Fortress built by Robert Earl of Gloucester, during the Usurpation of Stephen Earl of Bloys, who after some Opposition took it, and levelled it with the Ground. In 1202. The Usurper sounded a Priory of Cistertian Monks, subject to the Abby of Bealieu in Hampshire. This, with the Castle, are entirely ruined; nor are there remaining the smallest Relicts of their former Grandeur. This Church is a large, handsome Structure, in which are the several following Monuments.

In an Isle, or Chapel on the North Side, commonly called *Unton's* Isle, under which is a Vault where several of the Family have been interred.

On a Marble Grave-stone lying in the middle of the said Isle, are Three Figures in Brass Plates, of a Man armed, and two

Incumbent the Reverend Mr. Collier.




