A COMMENTARY on the supreme Magistrates of the University of Oxford;

NAMELY,

Of the Chancellors, Commissaries, Prochancellors, or Vicechancellors, and Proctors.

TOTWITHSTANDING the Cantabrigians (1) have been so bold as to derive their Catalogue of Chancellors from Amphibalus the Martyr, who, as they say, was the first Rector of the Scholars of Cambridge City, An. Dom. 289, and from others who interruptedly succeeded, viz. Mauritius in the time of Constantine the Great, An. Dom. 310, Kynotus in the time of K. Arthur, an. 517, Edbertus in the reign of Cedwall, an. 678, Almericus in the reign of Cadwallader, an. 690, &c. and I know not whom, (all received upon uncertain trust by the first author of those matters, Nich. de Cantilupo, who died An. Dom. 1441) yet I shall not presume to do as they have done, but insert only those that I find from record, not in the least to be doubted by many.

To pass by therefore St. German, St. Gildas, Melkinus, Nennius, Kentigernus, and others, who lived in the times of the Britains and Saxons, reported by a very good Exemplar (as Camden faith) of Asserius Menevensis (2) to have studied in Oxford, and there to have made good

APPEND.

Orders and Statutes for the Academians, which they would not, nor could have done, unless probably they were the supreme Rectors or Governors of the Scholars there, I shall begin with St. GRYMBALD, whom sew or none there be, that will or can deny, but that he was Rector or Governor of the Schools of Oxford, and the Scholars thereof, and from him descend to others, as I find them mentioned in record. But before I begin, I think it sit to acquaint the reader with some things which may perhaps be necessary to be known by him before he enters upon the following Comment, and those are;

I. That the CHANCELLORS have anciently been written and stiled Rectors and Masters of the Schools, and Rectors and Masters of the Scholars, as

may be farther seen in this Comment, an. 1211, 1294, &c.

II. That their place and office hath been derived, so far as concerns their confirmation, from the Diocesan, the Bishop of Lincoln, and their nomination and election by the Regents and Non Regents of the University, continuing so till towards the latter end of Edw. III; and then they were always after elected and confirmed by the said Regents and Non Regents only.

III. That their confirmation by the Diocesan, and election by the Academians, was sometime every year, and for the most part every two. The like also was it, when both election and confirmation came into the hands of the said Academians, which continued till the office of Chancellor became per-

petual and for term of life.

IV. That the faid office in ancient time was only borne by such that were resident in the University, as by Masters and Doctors of Hostles or Halls and Colleges, Monks, Fryers, &c. afterwards by Bishops, and at length sometimes by persons of the laity, of whom Sir John Mason was the first.

V. That ample privileges have been granted to them by popes, kings, and bishops, as I have told you several times in this work, whereby their authority became great, and their persons much respected and honoured.

VI. That for their help in administering justice, and doing ordinary and common things belonging to their office, they have had Deputies allowed them (sometimes more and at other times fewer) called anciently Vice-gerents and sometimes Commissaries, by which last name I find them mentioned (1) in the 1st and 2nd of Edw. III. Afterwards they were altogether called so, but now and for many years since, Vice chancellors, and that too when the Chancellors have been residing in the University.

VII. That for the more honour of the office, have servants been allowed to wait upon those that bear it, within the precincts of the University, and to usher them in all public assemblies, such I mean that we call Beadles, each of them (in number six, besides a Vergerer) carrying a silver staff erected in their hand, which office is very ancient, and beyond record, mention being made of them (how many at one time I find not) in the reign of Henry III,

and before.

VIII. That in the vacancy of the Chancellorship, the Senior Theologus, called Cancellarius Natus, then resident in the University, did anciently exercise all jurisdiction within the precincts thereof, otherwise belonging to the office of Chancellor, by giving oaths, keeping the Court, setting the seal to public instruments, presiding in the election of succeeding Chancellors, appearing in suits commenced against the University, proving of wills, and granting administration of the goods of privileged persons, which continued till the reign of Edw. VI, at which time the office of Senior Theologus began to decline.

As for the Proctors (whose office is as ancient for aught that I know as that of the Chancellor) are men of great power and rule in the University, especially as to those who have not obtained the title of Master. Their election hath been anciently from the number of senior Masters, not by the Bishop of Lincoln, but by the Regents and non-Regents in Congregation, who also, with the Chancellor, confirmed and admitted them. And as they were taken from the said seniors, so also was there great care had that one should be a Northern and the other a Southern man, because of the constant discord between those parties, and especially that partiality against either party (if both Proctors should be of one party) should be avoided.

The matters that these officers were anciently to look after, and see that they were thoroughly executed, were these (as in our ancient books (1) it

appears) viz. to proceed and [exercise] their authority:

But in these things their power did not, nor doth, rest only; but in other matters, as in keeping the peace of the City, in having authority over and correcting the people of the Laity, if they are found guilty of stubbornness, irreverence, sauciness to them, of unseasonable tipling in public houses, and such like: of which matters, and other power that they have (though lessened by the new Statutes) being too tedious now to recite, I shall proceed in my work. In the beginning of which, though I am but slenderly accommodated with the names of Chancellors, Commissaries, and Proctors, such is the desect of our Records, yet the candid Reader I hope, (especially those versed in Histories and Antiquities) will excuse me, and not be apt to impute the fault on me, but time, the devourer of all things.

An. Dom. 883, or thereabouts, St. GRYMBALD occurs Rector or Chancellor of the University of Oxford, after it had been restored by K. Alfred, as is elsewhere shewed.

The names of which officers (for whom these places are left) appearing not for this year, neither for divers following, I shall spare their room till I find them occur.

An. Dom. 889. Chancellor Beategravius, if any faith or trust might be given to the Black Book (1) of Cambridge; for among certain observations that he hath of K. Alfred, I find this—'Videns ergo &c.' 'He seeing therefore that the Scholars, which he brought to Oxford, continually studied in the composition of the Laws, and exposition of the holy Scripture, appointed them for their Rector Grymbald, Rector and Chancellor of the City of Cambridge, who being burdned with old age, permitted him to cease from his office, an. 889, and in his place the noble Beategravius was made by the good will of the Scholars, Rector and Chancellor of Oxford.'—But let the truth of this remain with the Author, for if we consider that the Laws were not in being in K. Alfred's time, nor many years after, as may be seen in the Annals or History, an. 1149, and that also Grymbald was not Bishop of

Winchester.

Winchester, which he confidently reports (2) in the said Black book, there is no credit at all to be given to his observations.

These two ancient Chancellors of the University being thus produced, and said to be before, it remains that we should enquire of their successors after, the Norman Conquest, whether they are known by the names or titles of Rectors, or Chancellors, or Masters of the Schools, or any other name whether general or peculiar, and transmit their almost obliterate memories to Posterity. For which end therefore I shall do my endeavour by beating of obscure paths to obtain my desire, and give a succeeding series (though sometimes imperfect) of our Fasti.

CANUTUS, as in the History this year; which office of Rector being no other, as I suppose, than Chancellor, I shall here set him down as the first Rector of Oxford, or of the Schools of exercise there, after the coming in of the Normans. He by the Name of Robertus Crickladensis, Prior of the Monastery of St. Frideswyde in Oxford, did about this time(2) give to the Abbey of St. Mary of Cirencester, in which he before had taken upon him the habit of a Canon Regular, his land in Cricklade.

1134, or thereabouts, Chanc. Robert Pulleyn as it feems. See in the History this year.

1150, or thereabouts, a Chancellor occurs under that title only, without a a name, as it appears from the Chirograph (3) of one Robert Foliot, Rector of the Moyety of the Church of Rowlesham or Rouseham in Oxfordshire; wherein 'tis said, that the Chancellor of Oxford, with the Prior and Dean of Abendon, were delegated by the Pope to be judges of a controversy concerning part of the tithes of the said town, &c. Now in what time the said R. Foliot lived, appears plainly from another Chirograph (4) which speaks to this effect:

'Be it known to all &c. that I Robert Foliot give to Ofney that land of my fee which lieth in the great street in the borough of Oxford, in St. Michael's parish at Northgate, held of me by Austen, priest, &c. in knowledge of which gift Wygot the Prior gave to me half an ounce of gold, and to my wife one mark, &c:' which Wygot being made Prior of Ofney, an. 1138, and continuing in that office till 1168, (in which time Ofney from a Priory was made an Abbey) plainly shews the time of the said Foliot. See this matter more at large in the Latin Copy.

Dom. 1201.' Though the name of the said Chancellor occurs not in this Writing, nor in that an. 1150, yet the succession in the office is proved.

1211. Chancellor or Rector of the Schools Master Alardus, in the fame fense with Robert Canutus: the reason of which I have told you in my History an. 1294. As for this ALARDUS I find mention of him to this effect in an ancient writing (1) which I english thus: -- 'Know ye as R. Prior of Ofney, and H. Dean of Oxford faith, that the controverfy which is between Hugh the Lord Abbot and Convent of Abendon on the one part, and Master Eustachius, Rector of the Church of Cesterton(2) on the other, concerning certain tithes issuing from the 40 acres which are situated in Bruerio de Cesterton, (3) which Jeffry St. Maure holdeth of the fee of William de Lega fenior, in Cesterton, was by the authority of Pope Innocent III, controverted in our presence (Mr. Alardus Rector of the Schools, our brother judge in this matter, fufficiently excufing himfelf by his letters) and brought to a final concord after this manner, &c.' At the end of the faid writing it is thus faid, 'This composition was made before us in the Church of St. Mary in Oxford, on the morrow after the invention of the holy cross, in the 13th year of the Pontificate of Innocent III, that is, An. Dom. 1211. Which, that it may be the better understood, it must be supposed, that the faid Pope ordained upon this question of tithes three judges in England, namely, Mr. Alardus, Chancellor of the University, R. Prior of Ofney, and H. Dean of Oxenford; but Alardus for fear of the Bishop of Lincoln, his Diocefan, (then Hugh Wallys, who was too fevere and rigid toward the Academians) by whom perhaps he was no otherwife admitted to his office than by the name of Master of the Schools (though saluted in the Pope's bull the Rector) refusing to appear in the said cause, and therefore excused himself by his letters, the decision of the whole matter was left to the said two judges. And this I suppose was the true and likely cause of the excuse, as from that which I have elsewhere delivered appears. To these matters I shall add, that Robert Grosstest who succeeded the said H. Wallys in the see of Lyncoln, wrote one or two (4) Epistles to Brother Alardus Provincial Prior of the preaching Fryars in England, and that also about the same time Mr. Alardus, Subdean of Wells, (5) conveyed certain land in the parish of St. Mildrid in Oxford (in which parish he sometime living, or perhaps was born, was firnamed thence, as I elsewhere (6) find) to Thomas the son of Wydo,

but whether either of these two were the same with this our Alardus, Rector of the Schools, I cannot safely determine.

1214. Chancellor under a general name, mentioned in the buil (1) of Nicholas, Bishop of Fraschati; concerning the punishment inflicted on the Burghers of Oxford for hanging of certain clerks, &c. dat. 7 cal. Jul. this year. The originals of which transactions are, with their autographs, kept to this day in our Archives, and in certain Registers or statute books of the University, not only as a memory of that horrid fact, but to be made use of and taken out as occasion serves. Among them is the sirst composition (that I have yet seen) made between the Scholars and Burghers, esteemed a monument of so great an account by our predecessors that they decreed the original of it to be kept in the Treasury of Lincoln Church, as the only xsyaddies of the University. [See before in the Annals under this year.]

1220. Chancellor, Mr. Lewes de Chapirnay, D. of D. if any truth may be given to that inflrument of dotation of the Scholars of Mr. William of Durham, mentioned before in University College.

1221. Chancellor under a general name, as from a papal bull (and the process that thereupon followed) which partly runs under this form, appears.(2) 6 Honorius Episcopus, servus servorum Dei, dilectis filiis Archidiacono Wigorn, et Cancellario et Decano Oxon, Lincoln, Diocef, Salutem et Apostolicam benedictionem. Ex parte Abbatis et Conventus de Ofney, &c.' The Bull was for the defigning of the faid persons therein mentioned, to be judges for the examination of certain witnesses concerning the tithes belonging to the monastery of Osney: 'dat. Lateran. 3 cal. Apr. an. pontif. 5.' There is also another ancient writing (3) depending on it, wherein the said Bull is by way of inspeximus word for word recited, and what also the faid three judges acted in the cause, and what witnesses they examined, and such like, under their feals, all done in St. Mary's Church in Oxford, on the morrow after the octaves of the Apostles St. Peter and St. Paul, an. 1221: which is the fifth year of P. Honorius III. Two other instances of the fame kind, dated also at the same time, I could produce (4) to prove this Chancellor under a general name, to have undergone that office this year, but because I aim as much as I can at brevity, I shall omit them. However, what is here and before faid, doth make much as well for the antiquity as dignity of the chief Magistrate of the University, that he should be thus defigned a judge by the Pope in causes of so great weight. Now if any think that the Chancellor here mentioned was not of the University but of the Bishop of Lincoln, he or they do greatly err, for there never was any such perfon of this place different from the Academical Chancellor, that had jurifdiction here. Neither do I find among the Muniments of the University any

mention of the Chancellor that had belonged to the Diocesan of Lincoln, at least in that sense which used to be said of William de Monte, an ancient Chancellor of Lincoln, thus (1):

'Incipit hic nostri pulchrum numerale Magistri Et Cancellarii Nicol (2) de monte Gulelmi.'

I now come to two eminent and famous Scholars of this University (almost coetaneous) who from good right ought to obtain a place here, although when they bore the fasces of this supreme magistracy with us, I have as yet no certainty. One of them was St. Edmund, surnamed le Riche, whom Matthew Parys (3) stiles 'Prælector in Theologia Oxoniali.' But whether he did undergo the office of Chancellor before or after the obtaining his Lectureship it doth not appear, or that he was Chancellor an. 1234, in which year he was declared Archbishop of Canterbury (as in a certain old Catalogue of Chancellors is delivered) I scarce think it credible. The other is Robert Grosstest, whom, though I find not in any ancient Catalogue of our Chancellors to occur, yet that he bore the office under that, or the title of Master of the Schools, I have manifestly proved in my History, an. 1294. He became Bishop of Lincoln 1235, and was second to none of his predecessors or successors either for learning or piety.

1230. Chanc. under a general name.

Commissary or Vicegerent ELVAS de DANEIS.

The faid nameless Chancellor occurs in the Bull (4) of P. Gregory IX, directed to him the faid Chancellor, the Abbot of Evesham, and Dean of Oxford, for the decision of certain controversies, concerning tithes between W. the parson of Wdeton or Wood-Eaton in com. Oxon. and the Abbot and Convent of Malmsbury, dated at Perugia 4 cal. an. Pontif. 3. The Vicegerent occurs in the decision (5) itself, for the Chancellor being absent, or else waving that employment, it was performed by him and the Dean of Oxford, the principal judge of the matter, in All Saints Church, Oxon, on the Vigils of St. Peter and St. Paul, an. 1230.

1231. Chancellor, Mr. RALPH, Archdeacon of Chester, as in a certain rescript of K. Hen. III, in the Memorables of Rob. Hare, (6) dat. Jun. 23, an reg. 15. But the said Hare, who hath written the Catalogues (7) of the Chancellors of both the Universities, doth, for the respect to his Mother the University of Cambridge, insert St. Amphibalus as the first Chancellor or Rector thereof an. Dom. 289, with others following to the Norman Conquest, from the authority of the Black book, and such like frivolous stuff.

But the Oxonian Epoch of Chancellors he begins with this Mr. Ralph, with no memory had of those either before, or after the Norman Conquest, to his time. Whether he places him as the first in time, which he found among the records in the Tower of London, and no otherwise, I know not. However that he, and others of his opinion (if any fuch) are deceived, in placing, and supposing this Mr. Ralph to be the first Chancellor of Oxford, shall appear from that which follows. When the Bishop of Lincoln did argue with this Chancellor (or at least his successor Ralph de Semplyngham) concerning the use of the seal, (whether public or private I know not) and thereupon a troublesome question arose between him and the University, Adam de Marisco wrote an Epistle (1) to the Bishop about it. In which, among other things, be pleafed to take notice of these words following-'Signo illo quod dicitur Universitatis Oxon, quo in simplicitate sua sicut et plures antecessorum suorum, usus est, de cætero si jusseritis nequaquam usurus et ad'nutum beneplaciti vestri, suo cedet officio, &c.' Thus Marisco; but by the fequence of the words, it appears, he contends not about the matter. It feems it hath not been doubtful to any Oxonian and (I believe) others, but that several predecessors of this Chancellor used seals, and to me it plainly appears, that he neither innovated any thing in his feal, or used another or the form of another, but only that which his Antecessors in the fame office used. And yet notwithstanding from this Chancellor, as from the first of all, the said Hare did begin his Catalogue of them for the University of Oxford. This year also a Chancellor under a general name occurs in a certain fcript (2) dat. on the Vigils of S. Bartholomew the Apostle, whereby he, the Archdeacon of Worcester, and Dean of Oxford, were deputed judges concerning the composing of a difference between Osney and E. Rector of Horspath near Oxford concerning the lesser tithes thereof, &c.

1233, or thereabouts, Chancellor Mr. Ralph Cole, the same perhaps with Mr. Ralph, Archdeacon of Chester in the year 1231. The mention that I find of him is only as a Witness to a certain Charter (3) whereby Sir Vivian de Bray, or the son of Ralph, gave to Osney his land joining on the west side of the church yard of St. Peter in the East; which land did sometime belong to John of Oxford, Bishop of Norwich. Oein, Philip le Mulner, Stephen the Son of Henry the son of Simeon, Henry his brother, Master Maurice, Master Richard of Cornwall, Robertus Mercator, Laur. Halegod, Thomas Submuro, Laurence Wiard, and Mace, Provosts of Oxford.

1234. Chancellor the said Mr. RALPH COLE, mentioned in another Charter (4) dated this year on the Monday after Palm Sunday, whereby the said

Sir Vivian, or the Son of Ralph, doth free the Canons of Ofney from being troubled by the enjoyment of the faid tenement in the parish of St. Peter in the East.

- 1238. Chanc. Frater Simon de Bovill, Prior of the preaching Fryers in Oxford, who in the 22 of Hen. III, which is this year, was present (1) at the Submission of the Scholars for the outrage committed on Otho, the Pope's Legate, at Osney.
- 1239. Chanc. Mr. John de RIGATER, as from that Charter mentioned before in University College Schools, appears. Which Charter being dated 3 cal. Nov. this year, the said Rigater, with Jessry de Stocwell Mayor, John Sewy and Hugh Hardyng, Provosts of Oxford, were Witnesses.
- 1240. Chanc. Mr. RALPH de HEYHAM, Chancellor of Salisbury, as it appears in a writing of 25 H. III, mentioned (2) to be under the feal of him the faid Heyham, as Chancellor of the University.
 - 1241. Chanc, the same, RALPH de HEYHAM, as it seems.
- 1242, or thereabouts, Rich. de la Wyke or Wyche, P. of D. and Canon Law, as by some it is reported. (3) He was afterwards Bishop of Chichester, and canonized by the Pope for a Saint.
- 1244. Chanc. Simon de Bovill again, as in a composition (4) between the K. and the University, concerning the Chancellor's cognizance of Pleas in contracts of moveable things. To which are the seals of the said Simon, Thomas, Archdeacon of Lincoln, John, Archdeacon of Cornwall, and Fryer John de Bacun. After him I find several Chancellors under general names, which I shall now omit, and proceed to those that are under their own.
- 1246. Chanc. Mr. GILBERT de BIHAM, as appears by this writing: 'Omnibus ad quos, &c.' 'To all whom this writing (5) may concern, &c. Mr. Gilb. de Biham, Chancellor of Oxford, fendeth greeting in the Lord: Know ye, that I, in the year of Grace, 1246, at the Feast of St. Nicholas, have received of the Canons of Osney two marks from the church of Fulnell, to be distributed among the poor Scholars of Oxford, according to the Ordination of Robert, Lord Bishop of Lyncoln, &c.' This Mr. Biham was Chantor and Canon of Wells, (6) and living in a tenement in the parish of St. John Bapt. Oxon. opposite to the Church thereof, was from him called Biham Hall, afterwards corruptly Beame, and Boheme Hall.
- RALPH de Semplyngham, or Sempyngham rather, as in the life (8) of Gilb. de Sempyngham. The author of which faith, that one Ralph succeeded Gilbert in the government of the church of Sempyngham; but

whether it be the same Ralph, that we have put down for Chancellor, I know not.

1253. Chanc. Mr. RALPH de SEMPRINGHAM, as from part of certain annals (1) going thus is testified. 'Anno Mcclii, &c.' 'In the year 1253, on the seventh of the Ides of Febr. died William de Manchester, Archdeacon of Lichfield, to whom succeeded Ralph de Sempryngham, Theologist, Chancellor of Oxon.' And in another place I find mention of the said person thus—'Eodem anno, &c.' 'In the same year (1254) in the month of Febr. Mr. Ralph de Sempryngham was elected Dean of Lichfield church by the Canons thereof, and afterwards consirmed by the Lord Roger de Weseham, Bishop of Lichfield.' He died 1260; about which time he founded the Chantry of St. Andrew, in the Cathedral Church of Lichfield, valued yearly to be worth 51. In the Epistles (2) of Robert Grosstest, I find one written, before he was made Bishop of Lincoln, to Fryer Agnell, the Minister of the Minorities of Oxford, and to R. Archdeacon of Leicester; which R. whether he be the same with this Ralph I know not.

Nereby Gilbert the Abbot and Convent of Einsham, did grant to the Prior of Schyreburne, in the Diocese of Winchester, all their right in an house in St. Peter's parish in the East in Oxford, which was belonging sometime to Mr. William de Drochedathe, &c. The Charter is dated this year, on the tuesday after Quali modo geniti, and witnessed, besides this Chancellor, by Mr. Giles de Brudeport, Archdeacon of Berkshire, Adam Feteplace, Mayor of Oxford, and others.

1256, or thereabouts, Chanc. Mr. RICHARD de SANCTA AGATHA, of whom I find mention in an Epistle to him, (4) written by Fryer Adam de Marisco; wherein the said Adam desireth him to promote the petition of Mr. Simon de Valencinis or Valentiis, Canon of Lincoln, to borrow 40l. of the money of Mr. William of Durham, kept in the hands of the Chancellor, Proctors and Masters. And 'tis probable, that he being thus courted by Marisco, might about this time either bear the Office of Chancellor or Commissary. One Mr. Robert de S. Agatha I find witness (5) about this time to divers evidences, his name being in the first place, and set before that of the Mayor of Oxford. Whether he was Chancellor I know not; sure I am that he was Archdeacon of Durham, and, if I am not mistaken, succeeded Mr. William, an. 1249.

1262. Chanc. Mr. Thomas de Cantelupo, as it appears in a certain writing (6) of the Abbot and Convent of Ofney, concerning the habitation of the brethren called Penetentiarians, or de Penetentia Jesu, made this year.

1263. Chanc, the same Thomas de Cantelupo, as it seems, who about this time was (as 'tis reported) Doctor of the Canon Law. In the year 1265 he was made Lord Chancellor of England; but that office he held but a short time. Afterwards he retired to Oxon, and lived there several years. Of this Chancellor you may be pleased to read these things following from a certain author. (1)—' Unde ad Universitatem Oxonie primo, postmodum Parisiis se transferens, rationalem scientiam aggreditur, et philosophie secreta rimatur, Magittralem Cathedram ascendens. Oxoniam demum rediens, Juris Canonici Doctor et Cancellarius Universitatis efficitur: in quo quidem officio in causarum discussionibus prudens investigator extitit, in judicio justus, in fententiis proferendis discretus, in omni actione compositus, et morum honestate preclarus, &c.' Thus the said Author, agreeing verbatim with another, (2) which hath this title, or these words following, written in the beginning of his book—' Explicit secunda pars in tertio volumine Legendarum collectarum per Fratrem Petrum de Calo de Calgia ordinis Prædicatorum.' But the aforesaid author, Capgrave, addeth, that he, when K. Hen. III was dead, returned to Oxford, and was created D. of Div. under Rob. Kilwarby, that was afterwards Archbishop of Canterbury, and in the year 1275 was confecrated Bishop of Hereford, and after his death canonized by the Pope. But before he was created, he did, according to the manner, study while he was young at Paris, under the tuition and special benefaction of John Peckham, afterwards Archbishop of Canterbury, as in certain letters of that Archbishop, (3) written an. 1281 to the Bishop of London, appears: For at that time he was by him pronounced excommunicated. After the death of the faid Thomas de Cantelupo, which was at Civita Vecchia in Italy, an. 1282, his body was carried to Hereford, but his heart to the Monastery of Ashrugg in Bucks, where by the care and cost of Edmund, Earl of Cornwall, Founder thereof, it was reposed in a tomb of admirable workmanship on the north fide of the choir, and afterwards had in very great veneration. By which tomb or near it the faid Earl was afterward buried.

1264, or thereabouts, Chancellor Mr. Henry de Cicestre, as in an indented Chyrograph (4) between him and the University on the one part, and Rob. de Stanton on the other, concerning the demissing of a tenement to the said Rob. in St. Giles' parish in the suburbs of Oxon. To which Chyrograph are witnesses Nich. de Stocwell, Mayor, Will. de Ew and Geoffry le Mercer, Provosts of the town of Oxford, [&c.]

1267. Chanc. (5) Mr. NICHOLAS de EWELME, as in a certain statute concerning Determiners, and elsewhere appears.

1268. Chanc. the fame, (1) N. de EWELME, as in the Annals under this year.

1269. Chanc. Mr. Thomas Bek, as in a certain Convention (2) between him and the University on the one part, and Wymund le Lyngedraper of Oxford and Agnes his Wife on the other, &c. to which are witnesses John. de Coleshall, Mayor, Jeffrey le Orfeure and Philip de Ewe, Provosts or Baillives of Oxford. In a certain charter, (3) dated on Monday next going before the feast of S. Matthias the Apostle, 51 Hen. III, Dom. 1266, I find that one Jacob, the fon of Mr. Mosey, a Jew of London, by Henna his wife, conveyed to Walter de Merton, fometime Chancellor to the King, his houses in St. John Baptist's Parish in Oxford, for the building of an Hall or College for his Scholars, that he had lately fettled at Meandon in Surrey. But because Mr. Antony Beke, and his brother Thomas Beke did then live and abide in the faid houses he therefore made this condition with the faid W. de Merton, that he should suffer the said Antony and Thomas to inhabit in the faid houses from the feast of St. Michael following 'till three years after were expired, by paying to his Warden and Scholars that he was then about to fettle in those, and other houses adjoining, an hundred shillings yearly. This is the effect of the Charter; and I thought fit to mention it, because the faid Antony (stiled in the Charter Dominus Antonius Beke) and Thomas his brother were then students in the faid houses, and that the former was afterwards Bishop of Durham, and the other Chancellor of this Univerfity (as before 'tis told you) afterward Treasurer of England, and at length, being very old, became Bishop of Lincoln an. 1319.

For in these times, and since, it was an usual custom for the Burghers of Oxford, to prefent the Chancellor with gifts, especially at his entrance into his office, as from divers places is evident. This Mr. WILL de Bosco was one of the first Fellows of Merton College, as in their writings I find, and so have I put him into the Catalogue of them, which I have with very great labour composed from multitudes of writings in that College Treasury and Chequer, and also from their Registers.

1276, or thereabouts, Chancellor Mr. Eustachius de Normanyzes, Master of Arts and Doctor of Decrees, as Leland (1) and others report. In a certain Charter dated 1251, I find these witnesses, viz. Mr. Eustachius de Normanysle, Frater minor, Mr. John le Noble, Mr. Roger de Barthone, &c. by which it appears that then he was a Minorite or Franciscan. About this time, (for the particular year appeareth not) John de Pontisara, who was Bishop of Wynchester, an. 1280, is reported to have borne the office of Chancellor of our University; but whether true or not, I cannot yet find; sure I am, that a little before his death he shewed himself a worthy Benefactor by giving (2) them a chest with 200 marks therein (called afterwards Winchester Chest) for the relief of poor Scholars. In perpetual memory of which, and for the health of his soul, the Masters decreed, that a solemn anniversary should be performed for him on the Vigils of St. Nicholas.

1280, or thereabouts, Chanc. Mr. Henry de Staunton, Professor of the Canon Law, as in University College is evident. (3). He was now or lately, as I suppose, Vicar of the Church of St. Peter in the East.

1281. Chanc. (4) the same, H. de Staunton, as in a writing, dated this year in die Jovis in septimana Penticostes, and in another on the second of the nones of May. (5)

Dec. this year; at which time John Peccham, Archbishop of Canterbury, appointed him his Commissary to hear and receive the accompts of Sir John, the son of Guy, Kt. the Executor of the last Testament of Maud D'Oyly, his mother.

The fenior Proctor was afterward Canon and Chancellor of Salifbury. By the first of which names or titles the University of Oxford faluted him in a certain (4) Epistle to implore his and the help of Mr. John Chelmeleigh in the Court of Rome for the terminating certain differences in the University.

1288. Chanc. (5) Mr. ROBERT de WYNCHELSEY, Archdeacon of Effex, and of his time a person most learned. He was at length Archbishop of Canterbury.

As to the assigning the time of this Chancellor, I find some contradiction, and that chiefly, because out of the Archives (11) of Lincoln Cathedral, 'tis faid that he was the next fuccessor to William de Kingscote, as in the admission of him by the Bishop's letters, printed in the Latin copy, is evident. Either therefore no Chancellor ought to come between Kingfcote and Monemuta, or else the faid Chancellor (Ludlaw) must be supposed to have borne his office in a small interval of time. (12) However it is, the Antiquary of Cambridge (13) (who hath stiled himself Londinensis) is deceived in that which he delivers concerning the confirmation of this Chancellor running thus: - " Episcopus enim ita confirmare tolebat; 'officium Cancellariæ Universitatis Oxoniæ tali Magistro in Theologia committimus, donec aliud dederimus in mandatis:' unde natum puto, quod diu is non

Cancellarius, nec ejus Vicem gerens Procancellarius, sed Commissarius deinceps vulgo dictus fit." (1)——Thus he, as if that office should only belong to a Theologist, and not a Decretist, which the Statutes of the University permit; or as if that Magistrate was not known or heard of among us by the name of Chancellor, who either dying or refigning, he that was next according to seniority, was called Cancellarius natus; his Commissary also being appointed by him the faid Chancellor, and not the Bishop of Lincoln. No wonder therefore it is that the said Antiquary is so blind in the affairs of Oxford, when in those of his own University he is so quick-sighted. That allo he is to ignorant of the difference between the Chancellor of this University may easily be understood from his own words, (2) which he hath of the chief Magistrate of the University of Cambridge.— 'Huic Academiæ qui præfuit (faith he) ad multa fecula Rector dicebatur: postea Cancellarius, nostra ætate Vicecancellarius, et Procancellarius appellatus est, Vicarius Cancellarii, de quo postea fusius, nam Cancellarius hodie privatus homo non est Academiæ, ut olim, sed ex Magnatibus aliquis, qui favet literis, cujus loco jam præficitur Procancellarius, &c.'——From whence we cannot but fee, how he doth confound together the Chancellor and Vicechancellor, or Prochancellor, when in the mean time he omits the ancient word Commiffary, which so often occurs in the books and muniments of each Univerlity.

1311. Chanc. (1) Mr. Henry de Maunsfello, D. of D. now or lately Fellow of Merton College. He was a learned person of his time, and seems to have published various matters of Theology and Philosophy.

His anniversary points at the 24th of June in the University Calendar. (4)

In the beginning of this year in the month of April (as it seems) the office of Chancellor of this University being then or fuddenly to be void, the Bishop of Lincoln (5) sent out his letters under **a** grievous anathema dat. 4 nones of April, that none either as Cancellarius natus, or otherwise, exercise the jurisdiction of Chancellor in the University until some person was admitted to that office by him. The reason why, he tells us not in those letters; and whether they at present were obeyed by the Academians is doubtful, because in the rescript of Edw. II, concerning the confirmation of the privileges of the University of Oxford, dat. March 11 following (an. 8 Reg.) is direct mention of Henry de Harcla, then Chancellor of the said University. And whether that inhibition of the Diocesan was in following years observed, especially as to the election of the Chancellor, feemeth not to be from one or two (6) statutes concerning elections, published by the Academians on the feast of St. Gregory, an. 1443. In which mention being made of the senior Theologist, we must understand him to be no other person than Cancellarius natus; who according to the ancient custom of the University, is to govern it when the Chancellorship is void, deduced and brought down even to the days of our grandfathers.

For therein among those mentioned in the libraries of Balliol, and Merton College, one hath this title, 'Nottingham Cancellarius Oxoniæ contra Errores Pelagii.' Which book, the faid Author not only ascribes to this Richard, but also to William de Nottingham, who flourished an. 1336, whereas Baleus remembereth not at all Richard de Nottingham, nor attributes that work to William.

when the Masters ceased from their Lectures, which was 'in feria tertia ante Pentecosten,' the Chancellor also would renounce his office, and another forthwith chosen for the two next years following.

1328. Chanc. (1) Mr. RALF of SHREWSBURIE. I find also mention of him in an ancient Catalogue (2) of the Bishops of B th and Wells, thus; 'An. 1329 died John (viz. Drokenesford) when he had sate twentie years three months and nine dayes, to whom succeeded Mr. Ralf de Shrewsburie, sometime Chancellor of the Universitie of Oxon.'

Commissary General this year, or thereabouts, was Rich. fil. RADULPHI or FITZRAUF, D. of D. or elfe of both the I aws, and Dean of Lichfield. He is reported by some (8) authors, ignorant of the names and distinctions of Magistrates and officers of the University, that he was Chancellor thereof, and that he, according to (9) another author, bore that office this year; though nothing of him occurs in the Archives of the Church of Lincoln, or the University. The Writer (10) of the Acts and Monuments, who sometimes reports things more true than the refl, concerning this person, tells us that he, being Archdeacon of Lichfield, was defigned Commissary (not Chancellor) of the University by K, Edw. III, but with no reference to the year when 'twas. The reason why his name occurs not with us, was without doubt, the constant residence of the Chancellors of the University in this age and long after. Under, and by whose name, (not by Commissaries) were all things in the University acted and done. His effigies in sacerdotal vestments over it, was not long fince to be feen in Lichfield Cathedral in the first window, on the south side of the Choir, with this inscription by it, 'Richardus Radulphi filius, Armachanus, hujus Ecclesiæ Decanus.' He continued Dean there till 1347, [when he became Archbishop of Armagh,] and then one Sin on de Grisely succeeded.

In his time the ancient prophecy of Merlin concerning the translation of the University to Stanford, did take effect: But in a short time by his endeavours annuiled, and the Scholars called back to their old feat, as in the Annals this year may be more fully feen. What remaineth to be spoken in his praise (which occurs in a certain Epistle (3) of the University to the Archbishop of York, [Wolsey] about the year 1514) I shall here insert:- ' habuerunt nostri majores suos Mecenates, tibi tamen longe impares, nec conferendos, ut reverendum Leyceltriæ Priorem (meaning Ph. de Repingdon) et præclarum Robertum Stratford Cantuariensem Archidiaconum, qui valentes plurimum apud suos augustos, sue memores altricis matris, eam quam plurimis decorarunt ornamentis et præclaris accumularunt beneficiis, &c.' Thus the University; and without doubt he deserved the said commendation, as certain Chancellors in some other respects did, namely, Tho. Gascoign and Henry Sever, for the scholastic discipline which they encouraged and promoted. Furthermore, as for this Chancellor, he, by reason of the troublesome factions between the southern and northern scholars, did for the reformation of them (as is by one (4) reported) appoint one of the Proctors to be always a Southern and the other a Northern man. This ROBERT de STRATFORD was brother to John de Stratford, Archbishop of Canterbury, both born at Stratford on Avon in Warwickshire, sons of Robert de Stratford and Isabel his wife, and both bred in Merton College.

Which controverly the Antiquary (9) of Cambridge takes not only an occasion to mention, but objects it as a great reproach to the Oxonians; as if (as 'tis probable) they were not so weil instructed as the Cantabrigians were about these times in making use of those seigned Diplomas or Bulls of P. Honorius, Sergius, and Eleutherius against the great power and injuries of their Diocesan. But let it be as tis, the Oxonians had no other designs now or before, but what were honest and simple, and were so far from counterfeiting any Bull, that they would rather lay their privileges at stake, than injure their consciences; though now if they had been minded, needed not so to

do, forasmuch as they knew that justice in their behalf would be done, and that the Diocesan's power over them, which was dubious, would shortly after come to nothing, as indeed it did. Six years after [Synewell] the Diocesan (Bishop of Lincoln) and [Islip] the Archbishop of Canterbury (great enemies to each other in this controversy) were voted benefactors, and their anniversaries (with those of other Bishops) decreed to be solemnized on the last of February. (1)

Lewes

Lewes de Charlton was Chancellor this year, is without doubt false; for if it had been so, his name would have occurred in the muniments or books of the University, especially in those several Charters that issued out this year relating to the great conslict. Furthermore also I doubt, whether the said Lew. de Charlton is not taken by the said Author and Baleus (1) for Lewis Caerleon, the most samous mathematician of his time; which Lew. Carleon, sometimes called and written by the name of Dr. Lewes, flourished 1482, under K. Rich. III, by whom, for the affection which the said Lewes bore to Hen. Earl of Richmond (afterwards Hen. VII) was spoiled of all he had, and cast at length into prison, as Chronicles do report.

But if he means another person of that name, then upon what account the said John Hotham, Bp of Ely, an. 1316, was Provost of Queen's Coll. (which was not then in being) I cannot discern. In the chancel of Chinnor church in Oxfordshire, I find one Joh. Hotham, Mr. or Dr. of Divinity, to be there buried under a stat marble, the epitaph on which you may read among the Provosts of Queen's College.

afmuch as he seemed now to favour Wycleve and his disciples, Mr. ROBERT RUGGE before mentioned fuce eded either about the latter end of May or beginning of June. He is the fame, whom (1) Fox in treating of the articles of Wycleve, stiles Ryggeus, and after his manner, as I have before obferved, calls him Chancellor, then Commiliary, Pro-chancellor and Vicechancellor. However it is, he by the name of 'Robert Rygge Chancellor of the University of Oxon,' was constituted (2) with John Lovell, Hugh Segrave and Robert Tresilian, Justices of the peace for the county of Oxford this year. Besides these two Chancellors authors tell us of two more this year, and those are, first, Nicholas Hereford (now or lately Fellow of Queen's College) as Walfingham (3) faith, but how it can be, I understand not, for at that time when the faid Nicholas, upon account of declaring his opinions, preached (4) at St. Frideswide's Cross in Oxford, May 15 this year, being then Ascension day, Mr. ROBERT RUGGE was Chancellor (the chief part of the fermon itself, which he delivered, entituled 'Sermo Mri Nicholai Hereford, S. T. Profess. contra omnes status et gradus Ecclesiasticos,' being examined and pronounced the same which he preached by a Public Notary, as his name to it testifieth) and therefore if so be the said Nicholas did bear that office, it was but a few days before that of the Ascension, because the Chancellors were in these times chosen according to the statute before recited, 'in feria tertia ante Pentecosten:' Furthermore also, 'tis not likely, that after the faid fermon was delivered, he should bear that office, because that for his opinions so declared he was centured, imprisoned and persecuted. The other Chancellor was, as the said Fox (5) conjectureth, William Rugge; but of him I know nothing, being the fame, without doubt, with Robert Rugge before mentioned. Thus you have in one year's space, four Chancellors, if the authors who report the two last, may be believed. However it is, so great was the difference in opinions, diversity in preaching, and change of Governors of the University about these times, that it gave occafion, without doubt, to an acute Sophister (6) now or lately studying in Oxford, to argue in his fophisms thus- Cras Cancellarius prædicabit; ergo qui est Cancellarius, vel qui cras erit Cancellarius, prædicabit &c.'

The names of which Proctors, with that of Rugge, Chancellor, I find mentioned in a certain composition (1) between the University on the one part, and the Prior and Convent of St. Fridelwide's on the other, dat. Mar. 9, 6 Ric. II, which is this year. One Walter Dish or Dash also, being reported by fome (2) to have been employed as a judge in examining the articles of Wycleve this year, I doubt not but that he is the fame with the junior Proctor here fet down, and the fame also whom Baleus(3) and Pitseus (4) do report falfely, and Leland (5) doubtfully, that he had received his academical education in Cambridge, [and was the Pope's Legate. (6)]

1383. Chanc. (7) Mr. ROBERT RUGGE again, D. D. Canon of Exeter, and Archdeacon of Barnstaple.

April 1, an. reg. 14, wherein that King, speaking of the manner of taxing the Parishes for tenths and fifteenths to the King by the Chancellor and Mayor together, and not severally, saith, that they shall have power, 'assidendi et taxandi quamcunque parochiam in villa predicta et fuburbiis ejufdem, juxta et fecundum quantitatem integram dicte ville et suburbiorum ejusdem, taxatam, limitatam, et assensam in scaccario nostro, ad hujusmodi quintamdecimam et decimam solvend. deductis et deducendis omnibus et fingulis allocacionibus et folucionibus que folvi et allocari debent in parte folucionis vel allocacionis hujufmodi quintedecime et decime, ratione aliquarum composicionum vel convencionum inter aliqua collegia sive alia loca quecunque infra villam et suburbia predicta, sive inter aliqua alia loca extra villam et suburbia ejustlem ex una parte, et Majorem, Aldermannos, Ballivos, et Burgenses ville dicte ex altera parte fact. sive fiend. &c.' The meaning of which words 'juxta quantitatem integram,' is, that this money for tenths and fifteenths should be raised according to the rate, wherewith the Town of Oxford is burdened in the book of his Majetty's Exchequer, and what that is, is well known.

Faringdon, the senior Theologist, or Custos (as 'tis said) of the University. Howsoever it was, sure I am that the Pope this year granted the Archbishopric of York to the said R. Hallum (he being then Chancellor) but being put by it, was afterward consecrated Bishop of Salisbury, and at length made a Cardinal.

of Cleveland. The other who was the Northern, and Canon of York, caused this year (1) the old book of Statutes to be transcribed (being the same which is kept to this day as a monument in the Archives of the University, distinguished by the letter C on its dorse.) 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verfity 100l. which, with another fum given thereunto by Mr. Rich. Billingforth, [lately] Mafter of Corp. Christi Coll. [and Chanc.] there, was put into a Chest, called afterward Bourchier's and Billingforth's Chest. For the keeping of which treasure, and lending it forth to Students that were necesfitous, two Keepers were annually chosen. Afterward Bourchier became Archb. of Canterbury, and at length Cardinal fub tit. S. Cyriaci in Thermis, in which great dignities he being not unmindful of his Mother, the Univerfity of Oxford, left many things thereunto, the particulars of which not appearing, I thall pais on, and only take notice of an (1) acquittance made by the University to John Yong, Bishop of Calipolie, for an 100l. of the money of the faid Archbishop, which by him was given to us, and by the faid Yong recovered long after, either of his Nephew or great Nephew, at which time Will. Warham, Archbishop of Canterbury, was Chancellor of the University. Hare (2) is pleased to tell us that Dr. Kymer was Chancellor also this year, when from many authorities it appears to the contrary. If he did bear that office at all, it must be in the beginning of this year, between the Annunciation and the third holiday before Pentecost, but that cannot be within, because Bourchier (3) was Chancellor in the latter end of the last year.

first, dated in the Congregation house Dec. 2, 1433, was, that he would be pleafed to lend his affifting hand to the faid noble perfon, Kinfman to the King's Majesty, Master of Arts of the University of Oxford, and one that was adorned with many gifts. (1) The other (2) dat. May 11, 1434 was, that he would be pleafed to confirm him (being then defigned to the faid Bishopric by the King) by his pontifical authority; the which, that he did, appears by a copy (3) of his Bull, which I have feen.

The senior Proctor was about these times Principal of Brasenose Hall, and the other afterward one of the Canons of the Cathedral of Lincoln.

1443 Chanc. the faid Dr. Henry Sever, in which year the Members of the University, who had great respects for this Chancellor, wrote a Commendatory (1) Epistle in his behalf to P. Eugenius IV, to the end that he would be pleased to write to the King (to whom the said Sever was Chaplain) that he would prefer him according to his merits; whereupon, being promoted, as I conceive, (2) refigned his office in February; for then Dr. West-KARRE, before mentioned, (3) became Cancellarius natus, and a little after upon his absence Mr. John Andevyr, (4) and likewise upon his, Dr. Tho-MAS GASCOIGNE, (5) the one occurring by that title the fecond, and the other the thirteenth of March this year. In the mean time the University (6) follicited Mr. Richard Praty, Bishop of Chichester (sometime an Oxford Student) that he would be pleased to take upon him the Office of Chancellor; but he refusing it, the faid Dr. GASCOIGNE was elected (7) the 14th of the faid month by the unanimous confent of all Doctors and Masters concerned in the intrinsic election of the Chancellor. As for the form of that and certain other elections in these times were thus: Four Masters in each faculty (called in fuch affairs by the names fometimes of Doctors) were by the Chancellor or Commissary and Proctors admitted into the public Assembly; and being so done, they for the election of two Astantes or Instantes did take the votes of all Non Regent Masters by scrutiny, three proclamations by the Beadle being in that time made, of which one was to alter or change (if any Matter whom before he had named pleased) which two Instantes, after they were elected and lawfully admitted by the Chancellor and Proctors, they named four other Masters for the intrinsic election; which being finished, the faid Altantes and the four Masters receded into some private place (suppose in one of the Chapels of St. Mary's Church) where the Chancellor and Proctors fearching into the votes, one after another, did at length pronounce him elected, to whom they found most suffrages given. And so after the same manner was Dr. GASCOIGNE (descended of a worshipful family, son and heir of Richard Gascoigne, Lord of the Manor of Hunssleet in Yorkshire) elected Chancellor. This year May 13th in Congregation then held, it was granted (9) by the Masters that the honourable Dr. Kymer might remain in his office of Chancellor for the two next years following. Henry VIII granting to the University power to elect a Chancellor (their liberties and privileges being now in his hands) by Sir William Fitzwilliams, their chief Steward, who intimated to them whom the King had desired, (3) and designed for that office, namely, Dr. John Longland, Bishop of Lincoln, they accordingly on the first day of the term following, (which was October 10) elected (4) the said person Chancellor.

John Cottisford, D. D. [again,] for the former part of the year under Archb. Warham. [About this time he became Canon of King Henry VIII his College.]

William Tresham, D. D. lately Fellow of Merton College, and Register of the University, also Canon of Cardinal College, and afterward of Osney [and Christ Church] became Commissary for the other part of the year by the designment of Bp Longland. After he had taken the chair Dr. Thornden beforementioned (stiled sometimes Commissary) (5) delivered up the Ensigns of his office Oct. 15, being the same which he had received before of the Proctors, and they from Dr. Cottisford, and what they were, were books, plate, goods &c. Soon after, namely 16 Cal. Oct. Dr. Longland sent a letter (6) of thanks to the University, and they in Jan. following (7) dispensed that he should not be bound to residence in the University, notwithstanding any statute to the contrary.

What I have observed of this Chancellor, who by many hath been accounted an eminent Scholar of his time, is, that he was born (1) in Buckinghamshire, bred in King's College in Cambridge, from whence coming to Oxford for preferment, was made one of the junior Canons of the Cardinal's College, an. 1525. And being then but Bachelor of Arts, was, with others, incorporated (2) at Oxford in the same faculty, Dec. 17, the same year: at which time, or foon after, (3) supplicating that he might answer at the Austen Fryery, and answer the Masters in formal disputations, had his desire granted, conditionally, that he oppose also at the said Fryery: That he proceeded (4) Mafter of Arts with us July 2, 1,326, having done his exercife for that degree partly at Cambridge and partly here: Also that he was one of those Cantabrigians that was forced to leave Cardinal College, for following and too much abetting the opinions of Luther: That he was afterward Master of Eton School, where by his doctrine the youth profited much: That he proceeded D.D. at Cambridge about the year 1540, being then or before Archdeacon of Ely: That he became Dean of the new erected Cathedral of Ofney Jan. 8, an. 1543, (4*) and from thence translated to Christ Church Nov. 4, 1546, at which time the faid See was translated to that place: That the next year he was chosen Chancellor of this University, being in great favor with the then King. By which election it fell out that as the Oxonians enjoyed a Cantabrigian, so was it with Cambridge in former time by their election of John Bromyerd, an Oxonian, and an eminent writer in the reign of R. II, and fince that Dr. Thomas Ruthall in the reign of Hen. VII. For the proving of the first to be an Oxonian, we need not go far, because (5) Leland, Bale and Pits tell us so; and for the other, who was Secretary to K. Hen. VII, and afterward Bp of Durham, divers Epistles (6) written to him by the University testify as much, (though said to the contrary by him (7) that hath written the book De Præsulibus Angliæ) among which is one (8) to crave his affiftance against the Oppidans of Oxford in a fuit of law with the University about the year 1516, and in it this passage-'Perge igitur sancte pater, perge ut cepisti tue illustrissime succurrens Matri ne ab infestissimis Oppidanis paciatur injuriam: nam immunitates quas munificentissimi Reges nobis concesserint, &c.' That while the said Dr. Cox was Chancellor of the University, he acted many things that have been odious to posterity, as may be fully discovered in the foregoing Annals. That by the favour of King Edward VI he became his Chancellor, Almoner, and Dean of Westiminster, having been before his Tutor. That upon the coming in of Queen Mary, he among others fled to Frankfort, and what he did there and ellewhere may be seen in a book called the 'Troubles of Frankfort.'

That after Qu. Elizabeth came to the crown he became Bishop of Ely, in which see he continued to the time of his death, an. 1581.

Vicechanc. or Commiss. Walter Wrycht, (1) LL. D. sometime Principal of Peckwater's Inn, now Head or Governor of Durham College, [Preb. of Sarum and Winchester,] and Archdeacon of Oxford, designed to his office of Vicechanc. by Dr. Coxe about St. John Baptist's time. For Dr. Tresham having borne that office 15 years (as Demetrius Phalereus had been Rector of Athens ten) did, by a dispensation (2) granted for absence from Exequies, Masses, Congregations, Convocations, and Scholastical Acts, (as one wearied out by his former trouble) retire in private 'till he had recruited and recollected himself: and then like an honest Governor, and one of a public spirit, retook the ensigns of authority upon him, as it shall be afterward shewed.

Proctors \ Edmund Cryspyn of Oriel Coll. Mr. (3) \ Henry Baylie of New Coll.

Elected a little after the new Chancellor had taken his place, the senior being then six years, and the other five years standing in the degree of Master; not altogether according to the order of K. Hen. VIII, an. 1541. They were soon after Doctors, and eminent Physicians of their times.

For truly in the Statutes (7) now made or to be made, I find that the office of Prochancellor was not to be void every year, unless on the next day after the Cal. of October; that also a new Prochanc. was not then to be elected before 24 hours were past after the time of the ceasing of the former, and that the said election was wholly to be finished by the major part of the Regents before three days

were past. But this, as it seems, could not be this year so suddenly, when as the faid Prochancellor Dr. WRIGHT did before, in the time of the Visitation in the month of May and after, enjoy his office. Neither is it that any may wonder, that the ancient and vulgar name of Commissary should be changed into the name of Prochancellor or Vicechancellor, for the change fprung rather from an affected purity of speech, than from the common use of speaking: yet in the King's rescripts at this time and in others, as also in common discourse, each name was used promiscuously, though signified but one and the same Magistrate, written in our first and most ancient statutes Cancellarii Commissarius and Commissarius generalis, and in certain Charters Cancellarii locum tenens. In the Edwardine Statutes, about this time made, he is written, as I have told you, Procancellarius, and in the Statutes of Cardinal Pole, Vicecancellarius; in which sense are the glosses of Will. Linwode on the Bonifacian Constitution de pænis, (which beginneth thus, 'Æternæ sanctio' &c.) to be understood, viz. that the Archbp of Canterbury hath in the College of [Bishops a Provincial] Dean, who is Bishop of London, a Chancellor who is [Bishop of] Wynchester, and a Vicechancellor who is [Bishop of] Lyncoln, &c. But from the High Chancellor of the University, the Vicechancellor doth receive his nomination or deputation, from the Convocation his approbation and confirmation, and from the Charters of the University his authority. He is also called the Chancellor's Vicegerent, as in the year 1230 and 1274 you may fee; and again in a certain (1) Commission concerning the peace, directed by K. Edward III, Dec. 1, an. reg. 32, to the Chancellor, 'ac gerenti vices ejus ibidem, nec non Majori Ville Oxon qui nunc funt, vel qui pro tempore erunt, &c.' The name of Vicechancellor which now began to take place before other, I have not as yet feen mentioned before the year 1448 as you may before under that year see, and then no more (as it seems) than the Commissaries Deputy. But worst of all in my opinion doth Bale err in the lives which he writes (2) of Walter Haddon and (3) John Young, Cambridge authors, (who in the time of K. Edward's Visitation there and a little after, bore the office of Vicechancellor) by confounding the name of Chancellor with Rector, and Rector with Vicechancellor, totally omitting the name of Prochancellor. Certainly he was altogether ignorant of the titles of the Governors of that University (though educated therein) or else he would not have committed such errors, neither have forgotten in the life of King Edward VI, to make mention of the Reformation of religion and learning by his Commissioners at the said place, and speak also of the Statutes that were then published there for that purpose.

Of these Proctors and their office I shall observe, First, that those for the year before going and these for this, remained in their places, and were not ejected by the Visitors: Secondly, that the time when they were elected appears not through the negligence of the Scribe that now was: Thirdly, that one Will. Lyngley occurs Proctor this year, and supplicated, (1) that whereas he was subject to sickness, Mr. Christopher Goodman, (now or lately of Brasenose College, afterward of Christ Church) might supply his office 'till the day after that of St. Michael, at which time according to the Edwardine Decrees was an election to be made of Proctors, Supervisors and Taxers. But in the faid supplicate, I suppose, is a miltake, for instead of Leon. Lyngbam the Scribe hath written Will. Lyngley, there being no fuch Master in the University, as in the Catalogue of them (which with great exactness I have composed from the Registers) may be seen: Fourthly, that the junior Proctor, Richard Hughes or Hewes was, when chosen, but Regent ad placitum, by which election the order of K. Hen. VIII, mentioned in 1541, was again broken: Fifthly, that he was not of Oriel, as our Antiquary (2) in his very imperfect Catalogue of Proctors tells us, but of Magdalen College, for that Hughes which he means, became Fellow of Oriel (3) 1529, and refigned 1534, being then Master of Arts, and about to marry.

1550 Chanc. the same, [Dr. RICHARD COXE.]

Vicechanc. the same, viz. Dr. WRYGHT, but he giving up his office according to the Edwardine Statutes in the beginning of Michaelmas term, Dr. William Tresham, who had been often Commissary before, was elected Vicechancellor after this manner, according to the said Statutes. (4) The office of Vicechancellor being void, the Beadles at the command of the Curators called a Congregation of Regents to be celebrated at nine in the morning, or one in the afternoon. They being assembled, the Proctors, with two senior Doctors, or in their turns two senior Bachelors of Divinity, stand in scrutiny, and after their own Suffrages are written, and at length the rest, the senior Proctor reads them openly and severally, and that person that had most, him they pronounced Vicechancellor.

As for the day when the faid Proctors were installed, is not, through negligence of the Registrary, entered, neither many Acts of Congregation and Convocation for some years before, and two years after this. Which negligence being noted by the Masters, as also the omission of several of their names when they proceeded, and the year, month and day when such

or fuch an act was passed by them, they put up several articles (1) against him; of which being found guilty, he by the name of Thomas Key, (a perfon of this age well learned, but almost distracted by the variety of times,) was deprived of his place an. 1552, and William Standish, Master of Arts of Magdalen College, succeeded by their Election, having before been recommended to them by the King's letters.

The faid Proctors, especially the Junior, were but past their Regency ad placitum when they were elected, the Senior having stood in the Act held Feb. 5, 1547, and the other July 16, 1548.

Vicechanc. or Prochanc. Audoen, (2) or Owen Oglethorpe, D. D. Prefident of Magd. (4) Afterward being often called away, Mr. RICHARD MARTIALL, [sometime Fellow of Corpus Christi Coll.] Bach. of Div. [and Student] of Christ Church, was his Deputy. [and Preb. of St. Paul's, &c.] was sometime also Deputy to the said Dr. OGLETHORPE, which I thought fit to tell the Reader, because in one or two places in our Registers (6) he is stiled Procancellarius.

Which Proctors following the steps of those in An. 1533, and others zealous in their office, were brought into trouble by evil men, (8) especially those that sided with the City, being encouraged so to do, because the University was now empty, and those knowing in the controversies, were either ejected by the Visitors, or else had left their places of their own accord.

Dr. RICHARD COXE, to whom it was by a Convocation granted (1) this year, July 19, that whereas he was about to refign his office of Chancellor within a short time, he should never after be burdened with the office of Vicechancellor. The 14th of Nov. following he refigned it, (2) and the 18th day the Congregation of Regents and Non-Regents (3) elected Sir John Mason, Knt. fometime Fellow of All Souls College, [lately Ambassador into several foreign countries,] installed Dean of Winchester, (in the place of Will. Kyngesmill the last Prior of S. Swithine's, and first Dean of the said Church of Winchester) 3 Edw. VI, Dom. 1549, afterward of the Privy Council to the King, and in great favour with him; which being in peace concluded, according to the faid Statutes, was the first and last that was so, for in the choice of Cardinal Pole, who succeeded Mason, the old Statutes were followed, and the name and authority of Cancellarius natus was then revived. As for the way, according to the faid new Statntes, by which Sir J. Mason was chosen, was thus: (4) The Beadles of the University having by command of the Prochancellor called a Congregation of Regents and Non Regents to be celebrated the next day at nine of the clock in the morning, the faid Prochancellor and the Proctors, with the junior Doctor in Theology, Civil Law and Medicine being called to them, did in the faid Congregation stand in scrutiny, and having given their own suffrages first in writing, took the others that were then in the House. Which being done, the fenior Proctor did read them openly and distinctly, and him that had most suffrages (which was Sir John Mason) they pronounced the Chancellor elected.

Vicechanc. or Prochanc. James Brokes, D. D. [sometime Fel.] of C. C. C. bore that office in July and before. [He was now Master of Ball. Coll. and at length Bp of Glocester.] Afterward Richard Martiall, D. of D. and one of the senior Students of Christ Church, who, having stood in the Act July 18 this year, was according to the new Statutes elected in Convocation (5) Prochancellor Oct. 3. In his absence Dr. Tresham officiated, and is sometimes stilled Procancellarius.

Proctors \{ Thomas Spencer of Ch. Ch. \} elected the day before Mr. (6) \{ Maurice Bullocke, of New Coll. \} the Cal. of Oct.

1553. Chanc. [the same,] Sir John Mason, Knt. with whom it was dispensed (7) by the venerable Congregation of Regents about the beginning of March this year, that he might marry, take his Master of Arts degree, and use the Robes and Habits of Doctors. Which being granted simpliciter, was contrary almost to what the Congregation had done 1546; for then one

George Clyffe, B. of D. (1) supplicating that it might be dispensed with him, that he might be admitted 'ad pelluram habitus Magistri Artium,' and use the said habit as competent to his degree, notwithstanding any Statute to the contrary, it was granted conditionally, that he pay to the University the sum of 10s, and another sum of 15s, and the lesser compositions to the Beadles.

Vicechanc. or Prochanc. (2) Dr. Martiall again, [now Dean of Christ Church] Dr. Walter Wryght occurs also Prochanc. (3) this year Apr. 4, and Dr. Tresham (4) (who was about the same time Prisoner in the Fleet) Commissary Nov. 6; but whether they were only Deputies I know not.

Proctors { Thomas Spencer Mr. { Maurice Bullocke } again.

Continued in their offices without any election as I conceive.

1554 Chanc. the fame, [Sir John Mason, Knt.]

Vicechanc. John Warner, [aforefaid,] Doctor of Physic, and Warden of All Souls College, (5) deligned to his office by letters from the Chancellor Apr. 15 this year, according to the renor of which, being about soon after to take his place, Dr. Martiall receded.

Proctors { Thomas Coveney of Magd. Coll. Mr. (6) { Christopher Hargreve of Linc. Coll.

Which Proctors taking their places on the nones of Apr. Mr. Maurice Bullocke, and Mr. Gilbert Mounson of Christ Church (substitute to Mr. Spencer) receded.

[The Senior became Prefident of his College 1558, proceeded Doctor of Physic 1559, and was admitted Preb. of the Church of Sarum 1563.(7)]

1555 Chanc. the fame, [Sir John Mason, Knight.]

Vicechan. (8) RICHARD SMYTH, D. D. sometime Fellow of Merton Coll. now Canon of Christ Church, one of Queen Mary's Chaplains, [and Regius Professor of Divinity,] admitted to his office in Apr. this year. [See more of him among the King's Professor of Divinity.] Dr. MARTIALL occurs Vicechanc. this year Oct. 16, at which time Ridley and Latimer were burnt in Canditch; for then, if I mistake not, Dr. Smyth preached to them. After whom Dr. Tresham succeeded in a little time following.

[The Junior was afterward Principal of Broadgates Hall, became Warden of Merton Coll. 1559, and was admitted D. C. L. May 26, 1560. (2)]

1556 Chanc, the fame, viz. Sir John Mason, Knt. who being about to refign his office, the University decreed (3) in a solemn Convocation, held June 25, that Cardinal Pole should succeed. Afterward the said Sir John refigning by his letters read in Convocation Oct. 26 following, the most noble REYNOLD Pole, sometime of Magdalen College, now Archbishop of Canterbury, Cardinal of St. Mary in Cosmedin, or in Schola Græca, in Rome, and Legate a latere in this kingdom, was then elected Chancellor. (4) A Codicil (5) of which Election dat. Nov. 2 following, was afterward sent to him, wherein 'tis faid, that he was elected perpetual Chancellor by the then Cancellarius natus, and the whole body of Regents and Non Regents. The faid noble Cardinal is also reported to have been Chancellor of Cambridge, but as to the time when I find it false; for in the published Tables of the Officers of that University, (6) the time of his election is referred to the year 1554, when as he came not into England till the month of September that year, (7) and that also Steph. Gardiner, Bishop of Wynchester, was then Chancellor, continuing in that office till the day of his death, which as Baleus fays, (8) was on the 13th of Nov. 1555. The faid Cardinal also being not confecrated Archbishop of Canterbury till March 22, 1555, tis unlikely that the Cantabrigians would receive him for their Chancellor before his confectation. There is also a certain (9) person that faith he begun the Chancellorship Mar. 4, 1556, and another (John Stokes, Orator of that University) the same year. For at which time he spake a speech before the Visitors that came to visit the said University Jan. 11, an. 1557, congratulated the Cardinal for taking the office of Chancellor upon him the year going before, he thereby, with the Students of that University promising to themfelves great matters that would follow. Which two persons, though they agree as to the year, yet from the aforesaid tables they diffent two years, making thereby the amphibiline succession defective as to this Chancellor, (as in others before) who now as Legate a latere, doth by his Commissioners or Visitors visit the said University which was for many ages before (as tis vainly reported) (10) exempt from such Visitations by the privileges granted by Pope Honorius the first, An. Dom. 624. Which exemption, with all

others that they had, whether true or false, Thomas Cranmer, Archbishop of Canterbury in the reign of K. Hen. VIII, (sometime a Student of the said University) caused them to be cancelled and yielded up as frivolous. An instrument of which act on, being made thereupon, and attested by many, was publicly read before K. Ch. rles I, and his Council at Hampton Court in the month of May 1636, by the then Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Laud, who at that time endeavoured to make his Metropolitan Visitation in both Universities.

Commissary, Dr. William Tresham, who performing his office till Nov. Thomas Raynoldes, D. D. Warden of Merton Coll. and Dean of Exeter, was then designed Commissary or Vicechancellor by the Chancellor's letters (1) dat. [10th] of the said month during only his pleasure. By virtue of which he took his place, and had for his Deputy Dr. Martiall, saforesaid, Dean of Christ Church and Preb. of Winchester.]

Proctors { Henry Wotten of Ch. Ch. Mr. (2) { Thomas Davye or Davys of New Coll.} elected April 15.

But Henry Wotton, being chosen Greek Reader, and Fellow of Corpus C. Coll. [and refigning] Aug. 14. (the Fellows of which College are disensibled by their Statutes from taking upon them the Procuratorial office) William Alyn or Alan, Master of Arts of two years standing, and Fellow of Oriel, was elected into his place (3) the [21st of the same month,] and served out the remaining part of the year. [Henry Wotton proceeded Doctor of Physic July 12, 1567, and became samous for the practice thereof. (4)]

1557 Chanc. the said Cardinal Pole.

Vicechanc. or Commissary, [the same,] Dr. RAYNOLDES, who holding his office till about Dec. 16, Thomas Whyte, LL. D. Warden of New Coll. and Archd. of Berkshire, succeeded by virtue of the Chancellor's letters (5) dat. 10th of the same month: which office he was to keep no longer than it pleased the Chancellor.

Proctors { Francis Babyngton of All Souls Coll. | elected Mr. (6) { William Allyn again, now Princ. of St. Mary's Hall } Apr. 28.

Of these Proctors, though some things be said of them in the Annals of this book, under the year 1557, yet of them I shall observe these things following; viz. That Babyngton stood in Comitiis (as Inceptor in Arts) in an Act celebrated July 16, 1554; that in the year 1557 he was unanimously

chosen Proctor; that in 1558 he was admitted Bachelor of Div: That in the year 1559, Feb. 19, he was the only Doctor of Div. that proceeded in an Act then celebrated, having before, in the same year, been elected Master or Head of Balliol College: Also that in 1560 he became Commissary or Vice-chancellor, Rector of Lyncoln College, and Margaret Reader. Which sudden promotions are not to be attributed to the deferts of the person, but that the University was very empty, wanted Theologists to perform offices and duties, and that any one proceeded as he pleased. Lastly, as for Allyn he was born at Rossall (near Polton) in Lancashire, and having run through various preferments was at length made a Cardinal of Rome, under the title of St. Martin in Monte at Rome, [Archb. of Mechlin in Brabant, and Librarian of the Vatican.]

This year in a Convocation, held May 5, were letters (1) read from Nicholas Ormanet the Pope's Datary, [D. C. L. of Padua, and incorporated in the same degree here Jul. 21, 1556, (2) also diplomated and made Dr of the Canon Law, and Henry Cole, LL. D. late Warden of New College, Visitors of the University, authorized by Cardinal Pole, commanding and desiring the Heads of Colleges and Halls to amend the grand negligence of the Scholars under their rule. This was the last matter, as it seems, that they did act in their Visitation, for this year also the said Ormanet, with Cuthbert Scot, Bishop of Chester, Thomas Watson, Bishop of Lincoln, John Christopherson, Bishop of Chichester, and Henry Cole, Provost of Eton, lately Warden of New College, did visit Cambridge according to the direction of a Commission from the Cardinal the last year.

TRESHAM became Cancellarius natus, who, afterward in a Conv. Jan. 21, (3) pronounced the place of Chancellor void by the death of him the faid Cardinal, did then make public to the Affembly, that the 24th of the faid month a new Chancellor was to be elected according to the Statutes then read over. The time being come, and a dispensation then proposed, that a laical person might be chosen to the office of Chancellor, (after which were Nominators of his Electors designed by the Proctors according to the Statutes and laudable customs of the University, as 'tis expressed in the Register for this time) Henry Fitzalan, Earl of Arundel, High Steward of the University, was chosen by the Suffrages of all the Electors (whether per Instantes, or according to the Edwardine Statutes, it appears not) and the 6th of Feb. following a Codicil of his Election was sealed and sent to him. For which great favour so expressed, he sent a kind letter of thanks (4) dat. 24th of the said month.

Commiss. the same that was lately Cancellarius natus, viz. Dr. WILLIAM TRESHAM, designed to that office by [the same] letters (1) from the new Chancellor, dat. Feb. 24, to continue therein till the feast of St. Michael next following.

Proctors { Alan Cope of Magd. Coll. | elected Mr. (2) { Walter Bailey of New Coll. } Apr. 20.

[The Senior in about two years after went to Rome; where, though he had before for the space of five years studied the Civil Law in this University, he was actually created (as 'tis faid) Doct. or Bach. of Divinity, and became one of the Canons of St. Peter's Church at Rome; where he died in 1580. (3)

The Junior proceeded Doctor of Physic May 21, 1563, being then Regius Professor of Medicine. (4) He died March 3, 1583, aged 63. See his Epitaph in New College Chapel.]

Queen Mary dying this year, a Convocation was celebrated the next (5) on the 1st of June, wherein that portion of her donation, which was yet undifposed, was distributed among certain Officers and Servants of the University, to be received by them yearly for ever. The other distribution was made soon after: She had endowed the University with several Rectories of Churches, which was an. 1553.

1559 Chanc. Henry Fitzalan, Earl of Arundel, &c. but he either from a forelight of some innovation that would suddenly happen in the University, or else some other cause, (whether upon any public or private offence I know not) began to entertain thoughts of quitting his office. The Academians understanding it, sent one of the Proctors to him with letters, (6) whereby he was desired in the name of the University to continue in his Chancellorship, and not deprive the destitute members thereof of his help, though according to his private opinion it might not, or would not succeed according to his wish. But, notwithstanding the said entreaties, and other ways whereby he was courted to continue in his office, he, on the 12th of June this year resigned, and on the 20th following (Dr. Tresham being in the mean time Cancel, natus) after a dispensation (7) was proposed for the electing of some noble Laic to the said office (which was granted, notwithstanding any Statute to the contrary) Sir John Mason, Knight, one of the Queen's Privy Council, was elected Chancellor again, [the day following.]

Commissary, Dr. Tresham, in one year's space twice Cancellarius natus, who continuing in his office 'till Michaelmas, Dr. John Warner, Warden of All Souls Coll. (1) [Archd. of Ely and Cleveland, and Dean of Winchester,] succeeded (as it seems) by election, mention being afterward made of his resignation. [He had borne the office in 1554.]

This year, [July 6,] a certain fum of money amounting to 121. 13s. 4d. which was owing to the University by Dr. Tresham, (as by his accompts appeared) was forgiven and remitted, (7) and the reason for it was because he had undergone the office of Commissary at least 20 years without any reward given to, or stipend decreed for, him; and also that by his great labour and pains, those great Benefactions were conferred on the University by Qu. Mary, (more than any Prince did before) as in my Annals may be fully feen. To this I must add, that by his endeavours in obtaining subsidies for learning, and Dr. RAYNOLDS his care in renewing the Schools, and doing other very beneficial offices, the Univerfity, which was almost brought to nothing, began to reflourish, though they themselves could not see the continuance of it. For Tresham being this year deprived of his Canonry of Christ Church by the Queen's Commissioners, because he would not take the Oath of Supremacy, retired to his Rectory of Bugbrook in Northamptonshire (being now all the spirituality that was left him) where living obscurely, died within few years after. RAYNOLDS also being deprived of his Wardenship

of Merton Coll. the last year, lived also obscurely in the West, (in or near Exeter) and died soon after.

Notwithstanding the junior Proctor (who stood in the Act Feb. 19, 1559) had lately left the Society of Mert. Coll. to prevent expulsion for what he had done in the proceedings concerning the admission of John Man to the Wardenship of the said College, (of which I have given you an account in the Annals 1562) yet, by his forrow (1) expressed to the Archbishop of Canterbury for what he had done therein, he became one of the Lynaker Lecturers in that College, twice Proctor, as 'tis here said, and this year about All Souls day Fellow of All Souls College. At length he was Doctor of Physic, Head or Governor of the College of Physicians in London, and Physician to Queen Elizabeth.

1564 Chanc. the same, namely, Sir John Mason, Knt. but he (by his letters this year dat. Dec. 26) resigning, (2) commended then to the Academians, who took his resignation very forrowfully, the Earl of Leicester, and the Archb. of Canterbury, [Parker] to make choice of either of them to be their Chanc. Whereupon (the Commissaryship of Dr. Whyte being also void, and Dr. Humphrey [President] of Magd. Coll. governing as Cancellarius natus) a Convocation declared by the senior Proctor was celebrated (3) the last of the said month for the election of a new Chancellor. In which, after the Doctors and Masters had proceeded according to the Statutes, Robert Dudley, ([fisth] son of John Duke of Northumberland) Earl of Leicester, Baron of Denbigh, Master of the Horse, Knight of the most noble Order of the Garter, and of St. Michael [in France,] one of the Queen's Privy Council, and Master of Arts of this University, was elected Chancellor. He was also elected Steward of Cambridge University 1562, on the death of the Lord Paget.

Commissary, John Kennall, LL. D. Canon of Christ Church, Residentiary of the Cathedral of Exeter, Chancellor of Rochester, and Archdeacon of the Diocese of Oxford, was chosen by Suffrages in a scrutiny on the last of Dec. (4)

Proctors { Roger Marbeck of Christ Church, [again,] } elected Mr. (5) } Roger Marbeck of All Souls Coll. } Apr. 12.

The fenior Proctor (chosen Probationer-Fellow of Magdalen College an. 1555, but soon after left it) was this year [Nov. 18, (6)] elected Orator of the University, being the first of all after that office was made standing or perpetual. [He was elected Provost of Oriel Coll. Mar. 3, 1564-5, made Canon of Christ Church 1565, admitted Doctor of Physic 1573, was Chief Physician to Queen Elizabeth, and died in 1605.](7)

Note, that fince this time, we never find in our Records any more mention of Cancellarius natus at the vacancy of any Chancellor, for he that was formerly Vicechancellor still continued in his place [ti]ll the time of the next succeeding Chancellor, as Dr. [Heton] did when Hatton was chosen an. 1588, and Dr. James when Sackville was elected an. 1591, notwithstanding the matter was then questioned by Lloyd, the junior Proctor, who took the said things that were done by him to be nullities, in regard that he still continued Vicechancellor after the Chancellor was dead.

The 21st of the said month there had been a Convocation for the election of a Commissary, (7) but the scrutiny in order thereunto being sinished, nobody was elected because the major part of Electors dissented. Whereupon the Chancellor, having notice of it, commanded the Masters to proceed to another Election (Dr. Humphrey being in the mean time Commissarius natus) and a Convocation being called Mar. 27, it was decreed by them, that he that had most suffrages, should, though he had [not] attained to the major part of the whole number, be elected Commissary. Which decree being passed without contradiction, and a scrutiny made thereupon, Dr. Cooper carried it, as before is told you; with whom it was about the same time

[This Edmund Campion, the junior Proctor, when Q. Elizabeth was entertained by the University in 1566, did not only make an eloquent oration before her at her first entry, but also was Respondent in the Philosophy A& in St. Mary's Church, performed by him with great applause from that Queen, and the learned auditory. The year after his Proctorship he went into Ireland, where he composed the History of that country, which was published in 1633 by Sir James Ware. But being discovered to have left the Church of England, and to labour for profelytes, he was imprisoned. In 1571, having made his escape, he came into his native country, where making but a short stay, he went and settled for a time in the English College at Doway, and became B. D. there. Thence he went to Rome, where he was admitted into the Society of Jesus in 1573, and was fent by that Order into divers Countries, and at last came with Father Persons into England in 1580, by the command of Pope Gregory XIII. But being foon taken, he was with other Romish Priests, found guilty of treason, &c. and was executed at Tyburn Dec. 1, 1581.] (5)

What I have to observe of the office this year is, that the Chancellor by the great power he enjoyed (as being the only favourite at court) took upon him the right of nominating the Commissary, under pretence of the trouble-some election of him last year, at which he took great offence: That also after the Election of such that were by him nominated, a Codicil thereof was to be sent to him: and lastly that the name of Commissary began now to be disused, and the word Vicechancellor brought into fashion, for the election of whom by scrutiny and suffrages, we have no Statute that I know of in our books before the time of King Edward VI.

How ancient the custom was for choosing Proctors per Instantes I find not. However the way was thus. At the resignation of their offices, were two Scrutators, called Procuratores nati, appointed. These for the election to come, designed by scrutiny two Regent Masters ad placitum for Instantes. That being done, the Instantes constituted six other Masters to be Electors of the new Proctors. Which six Electors with the Commissary or Vice-chancellor did name the new Proctors for the year to follow, and after nomination were pronounced elected by the Scrutators. Which way, having been the year going before, Nov. 2, taken away (2) at the request and command of the Chancellor, these Proctors for this year were elected by the suffrages of the Masters in a scrutiny, and no otherwise.

As for the senior Proctor he was first Fellow [and Master of Arts] of St. John's College, which place he leaving was made Fellow of Exeter College, and became very skilful in the art of delineating, and crawing the descriptions of places, of which some are extant, particularly that of the City of Rochester; [at which place, or near it, he was born.] (3)

The other Proctor being so well known to us already, 'twill be needless to make any more mention than what I have already done in this work.

Continued in their offices at the special request of the Chancellor May 12, without any election by suffrages in a scrutiny in Convocation. (1) And this was done, first, to prevent trouble and discord, and secondly, because the Statutes for their quiet election were but then newly settled and remitted into the books.

The Junior of which Proctors renouncing his office, because he was about to travel into remote parts, (in order to which he supplicated the Convocation(1) that he might have a faculty granted to him to preach the word of God throughout the whole world) Mr. Henry Beaumont of All Souls Coll. became his Deputy (2) Febr. 8. (3) As for the fenior Proctor he was one of a robust body and couragious spirit, and defended his office as well by force of arms as authority. In vindicating also the liberties of Northgate hundred and the Parish of St. Clements (both joining to Oxford) arose great controversies between him and George Brome, Esq. (4) lord of those places, (the first of which he held of the Crown) and continuing a considerable time to the great trouble and vexation of the faid Brome, did at length, to spite the University, who abetted *Crayne* in his proceedings, sell the faid hundred to the City, supposing thereby that the Citizens would be better able than he to manage and carry on any quarrel that should happen hereafter about liberties therein. In the year before or else this, the said Crayne with his brother Proctor, walking in the night time in St. Thomas Parish, took a certain person in the act of adultery; to quit the punishment of which, he was forced by them (as I have heard) to repair that wooden bridge (then ready to fall) that leads from St. Thomas Parish into the Castle, that is to say, that bridge at the Castle-mill head.

The Junior was born at London, entered a Student into University Coll. in the 19th year of his age 1574. Six years after he became Fellow of All Souls Coll. and being M. A. and in holy Orders was admitted Reader of Divinity in Magdalen College. Afterwards he became Canon Residentiary of Hereford, Chaplain to the Queen, [Rector of Pembridge in Herefordshire,] Dean of Windsor [1602, being then D.D. Registrary of the Order of the Garter,] and at length Bishop of Gloucester. He died Jun. 14, 1612, [æt. 59,] and was buried in St. George's Chapel in the Castle at Windsor.

Vicechanc, MARTIN HETON, D. D. (1) Canon of Christ Church, July 10. As for this worthy person, I find that he was born at London; that he was the fon of George Heton, Merchant, (one in his time of great piety and hospitality) which George while he lived at Antwerpe, where he was Master of the English Merchants, caused his house to be free and open for those that fled for religion fake in the reign of Qu. Mary. At his return into England he became Chamberlain of London, and giving this his fon that education which was fitting to his birth, fent him at length to Westminster School, where tarrying till 1571, was with Richard Eedes chosen Student of Christ Church. Three years after (1574) he became Bach. of Arts, and 'in 1578 Master in the same faculty, being then accounted an acute disputant in Philosophy. At length, after he had spent fome years in his Canonry of Christ Church, he became Dean of Winchester after the decease of Dr. Humphry, and Bishop of Ely after the death of Dr. Cox, [that fee having laid void 20 years.]

But that which I shall observe, that caused the contention to be very hot, was Dr. JAMES his denial of delivering up his office of Vicechancellorship in the time of the vacancy of the Chancellorship, according to the ancient manner. For so it was that the Commissary, upon the resignation or death of the Chancellor, refigned the Infignia into the hands of the Proctors, and they into the hands of the Cancellarius natus, that is, the fenior Theologist in the University. But now Dr. James denying so to do, the junior Proctor Mr. Lloyd would not be present at Congregations, especially that held Dec. 2: (4) for then divers being to be admitted to their degrees, he came into the House and protested against the matters then to be done. After which he departed, and would act no more 'till either a Chancellor was elected, or else that a Cancellarius natus should take place. In the mean time the Vicechanc. appointed Mr. John Tewer in his place for that time by giving him the Procuratorial oath.

Vicechanc. Dr. James again, Jul. 16, (5) designed by Chancellor Hatton. [He was Dean of Durham in 1596, and at length Bp of the same Church.]

Which Proctors were named by the King, as I have elsewhere told you. For certain new Ordinations (2) being transmitted to the University by the Chancellor in the month of April for the election of the Proctors, the Academians could not after their usual way meet together for the election of them, many Parsons and Curates having already resorted from several parts of the nation, nay, some from Wales, to elect Lloyd. Whereux on no small tumult arising in the University, the election of new Proctors was prorogued 'till such time that the controversies in the University were equally composed. At length, after all parties were satisfied, it was reputed unlawful for the Masters to nominate any to the Procuratorial Office but the aforestiad Candidates Williamson and Lloyd. Which being the sentence of the King and Chancellor, that ancient custom of choosing Proctors by suffrages in a scrutiny vanished, and another new form of election was introduced, as I am now about to shew.

He had been bred in this University, as he himself acknowledgeth. (3)

Dr. Prideaux again, [who had been Vicechancellor in 1619, &cc.] defigned to his office by the new Chancellor Oct. 7, and the 19th of December following was confectated Bishop of Worcester. But now Hierarchy daily declining, and Bishops not only ejected from the number of Peers in Parliament, but also divers ecclesiastical persons deprived of acting in secular affairs as alien from their profession, this our worthy Vicechancellor, both a spiritual and temporal Judge, next to the Chancellor, in Academical causes, being thereupon thought not sit (at least with safety) to execute his office, the Chancellor by his letters, dated March 2 this year, appointed a laical person Giles Sweit, LL. D. his Commissary or Deputy to supply his turn in the Courts and civil assairs of the University. Which office, though it was for some time performed by him (such were the times that required it) yet the like example we never before or since had.

This year that folemnity which should have been performed by the Citizens of Oxford Feb. 10. (St. Scholastica's day) in St. Mary's Church, (on which day the great Constitt began an. 1354) was by them, partly out of contempt, and because the rebellious Parliament favoured them, omitted.

Vicechanc. &c. The year of the Vicechancellorship of Dr. PRIDEAUX, Bishop of Worcester, being ended, and he about the feast of St. John Baptist not only quitting all right therein (without laying down the enfigns of his office, as the manner is) but rather leaving the University abruptly, as the advantage of time offered, the office for fome time laid void, and nothing of it was done but by Deputies. The which, for what reason it so happened, is perhaps at this time too great a trouble for me to tell. For now the University, the mother of togated peace, being affrighted with the unwonted rumours of a civil war, the Muses deserted, and the adorers of them every where dispersed, knew not (as if put between the anvil and the hammer) which way to turn itself, or seek rest. The administration therefore of its government, was fuccessively, according to the manner of our predecessors, committed to Deputies, of whom the first was Dr. Robert Pincke, Warden of New College, who for his loyalty in raising and settling the Univerfity Militia for the defence of, it from the common incursions of the enemy, and for endeavouring to make the City provide also men and arms for its defence, the Citizens being very backward in it, was afterward treacherously

(1) [Abraham Woodhead, after quitting his office (not without trouble, occasioned by the denying the Grace of Francis Cheynell, of which he complained to the Long Parliament) attended several young Gentlemen of his College on their travels. And fettling for a time at Rome, he was entertained by George Duke of Buckingham, wh m he instructed in Mathematics. After his return (being deprived of his Fellowship by the Visitors appointed by the Parliament for absence and non-appearance an. 1648) he lived for fome time in York House in the Strand near London, by the appointment of the faid Duke; but Arthur Lord Capell being informed of the great merits of the person, he entertained and learned of him the Mathematical sciences. In 1660 he was restored to his Fellowship by his Majesty's Commissioners, and remain. ed in his College for a time: But his opinion as to Religion being then altered (as it had

been fince he was at Rome, which he always very warily concealed) got leave of the Mafter and Society to be absent, as intending again to travel, with the allowance of 201. per an. So that retiring to London, he afterwards settled at Hoxton, alias Hogsden, near to that city, where he lived very obscurely and retiredly upon that allowance that the College made to him as a Traveller, all therein, except one, knowing not to the contrary, but that he was beyond the feas. And there being fettled, he not only caused youths to be trained up in the Roman Catholic Religion (of which certain Members of Parliament did openly make mention in the House, after the Popish Plot was discovered) but alfo wrote and published divers books in vindication of the Church of Rome. In this his retirement, he died at Hogsden in 1678, aged 70. ATH. Oxon. II, 613.]

feized on at Aylefbury, and committed Prisoner to the Gatehouse at West-minster about the 12th of September. Maplett of the same House succeeded Dec. 9. (1) [This John Maplett being made Doctor of Physic in 1647 (about which time he had the grant of the Principality of Gloucester Hall conferred on him, upon Degory Wheare's death) he attended the two Lord Falklands into France, &c. afterward practised his faculty at Bath and Bristol, and in 1660 was restored to his Principality of Gloucester Hall (from which he had been ejected) and soon after resigned it. He died in 1670, aged 55.](2)

So that being discharged of his office by Order from the Visitors (5) Oct. 8, because as they pretended he was neither nominated, nor lawfully admitted thereunto, yet, he taking no notice of it, supplied the place sometimes in his own person, and fometimes by Deputies.

> Proctors | Robert Warying of Christ Church | Apr. 29. Mr. (6) Henry Hunt of Magd. Coll.

Notwithstanding an Order issued out from the Visitors, authorized by Parliament, for the removal of the senior Proctor, Jan. 20, yet he continued therein till new Proctors were elected. [During his Proctorship he was elected Camden's History Professor, but deprived of it and his Studentship of Ch. Ch. by the Parliamentarian Visitors. He died in 1658.] (7) The junior Proctor was chosen into the place of Mr. Robert Bigge, who died in the (8) latter end of Feb. 1646[7], being some weeks after he had been elected by the Society of Magd. Coll. to serve in that office.

1648 Chanc. Philip Earl of Pembroke, &c. who took possession (1) of the Chair in his own person, in a Convocation held Apr. 12.

Viceckanc. Edward Reynolds, M. of Arts, sometime Fellow of Merton College, who being designed to this Office (through the recommendation of the Chancellor) by an Order (2) of the Lords and Commons in Parliament Feb. 18 1647-8, was in a Convocation held Apr. 12 this year, admitted thereunto (3) by Sir Nathaniel Brent, Warden of Merton College, in the presence of the Chanceller. He was just before declared D. of D. by another Order.

Proctors Joshua Cross of Lincoln Coll. admitted Mr. (4) Ralph Button of Mert. Coll. Apr. 12.

Which Proctors were designed and admitted to their office by the same authority that the Vicechancellor was, without any regard had to the Caroline Cycle, which appointed New Coll. and All Souls to elect Proctors for this year: [and William Bew, or Beaw, Fell. of New Coll. (afterward Vie. of Adderbury in Oxfordshire, and at length Bishop of Landass) who had been chosen by the Society of New College, for their Proctor on the first Wednesday in Lent 1647-8, was put aside, as also one Ed. Allason, who (as 'tis said in the Visitors' Register) was chosen by those of All Souls College, yet whether he was of that House, or had taken the Degree of Master of Arts, I cannot yet sind.] (5)

[The Senior was elected, by Order of the Visitors, Reader of the Natural Philofophy Lecture in the place of John Edwards, D. of Physic, and Fell. of St. John's
Coll. ejected thence. (6) He was also appointed Fellow of Magd. Coll. and created D. C. L. in 1650. Soon after he left his Fellowship, because he took to him
a wife, but keeping his Reader's place till his Majesty's return, was then discharged of it by the Commissioners. He died in his house near Magd. Coll. May 9,
1676, aged 62 years, and was buried in the North Aile joining to the Chancel of
the Church of St. Peter in the East, within the City of Oxford. (7)

The Junior Prottor, while he bore that office, was made Canon of Christ Ch. and Orator of the University, upon the refusal of Edward Corbet, in the place of Dr. Henry Hammond, who had been ejected by the Parliament Visitors. After his Majesty's Restoration he was discharged of his Canonry and Oratorship, and retired to Islington near London, where he preached in Conventicles, and taught youths to the time of his death; which happening in the latter end of Ott. 1680, he was buried in the Church there. Vicechanc. Edward Reynolds, D. D. Dean of Christ Church, re-admitted Aug. 30, (1) having been nominated a little before by the Chancellor. [After the. Restoration he became Warden of Merton Coll. and at length Bishop of Norwich.]

Elected against the Caroline Cycle which appointed Exeter and Queen's College. But the last of the said Colleges being not in a capacity of yielding a person zealous and suitable to these times, All Souls therefore did (by recommendations of the Committee and Visitors) choose one that had been an officer in the Parliament Army, and lately put in Fellow thereof. [He was afterward Commander in Chief of the Parliament forces in the county of Tipperary in Ireland, knighted by the favour of Henry Cromwell, and chosen Burgess for Woodstock in Oxfordshire in 1658. He died in Ireland, about the latter end of K. Charles II.] (3)

[John Maudit, during some part of the Usurpation, was possest of Dr. Hammond's rich Living of Penshurst in Kent, but was ejected thence. He had also a Benefice in Devenshire, which after the Restoration be left to avoid conformity, and died soon after. (4)]

1650. Chanc. The place laying void, the Visitors assumed the power thereof into their hands till the first of January this year, on which day a Convocation being affembled, the then Members of the University unanimously chose (leave being first granted (5) by the Committee to make choice of a fit person) OLIVER CROM-WELL, (6) General of the Parliament forces. Which office (after he had been acquainted what the University had done by certain Dostors and Masters sent to him, then at Edinburgh in Scotland) he kindly accepted, and forthwith promised to be a friend to the University, by his canting letter sent thereunto, (7) dated at that place, Feb. 4, part of which runs thus: 'But if these prevail not,' (meaning some exceptions for the refusal of the office) ' and that I must continue this honour, until I can personally serve you, you shall not want my prayers, That that seed and stock of piety and learning (so marvellously springing up among st you) may be useful to that great and glorious kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ, of the approach of which, so plentiful an effusion of the Spirit upon these hopeful plants is one of the

Which being read in a Convocation held [22d] of the same month, the Members thereof made the House resound with their chearful acclamations. (1)

Vicechanc. Daniel Greenwood, D. D. Principal of Brasenose College, admitted (2) October 12, having been on the 12th of Sept. going before, nominated and designed to that office by the Committee for the reformation of the University, the Chancellorship being then void.

Proctors Thankful [or Gracious] Owen of Line. Coll. Apr. 24.

Mr. (3) Philip Stephens of New Coll.

It was ordered (4) in the beginning of this year [Mar. 13, 1649-50,] by the Visitors, with the consent of the Members of Queen's and Lincoln Coll. that Mr. Owen, Fellow of Lincoln Coll. be elected and appointed to be Proctor for the said year, and that Queen's Coll. should be enabled by the said Order to nominate and elect a Proctor the very next time it comes to Lincoln College turn, to elect according to the Cycle.

[The Senior in 1650 was appointed President of St. John's Coll. by the Committee for the reformation of the University; and was a noted Politician for carrying on the independent interest in the University. In 1660 he was forced to leave his beloved Presidentship to make room for the right owner Dr. Richard Baylie, who for 12 years going before had suffered much for his loyalty: so that retiring to London he took up his quarters at length in Hatton Garden, and was not wanting to carry on the Congregational way upon all occasions. He died in 1681. (5)

The Junior, sometime of St. Albans' Hall, being now Fellow of New College by favour of the Visitors, was appointed Principal of Hart Hall by the same authority in 1653. He proceeded Dr. of Physic 1656, was ejested 1660, and died in London. (6)

Which Proctors were, as 'twas by all the new comers supposed, elected according to the Caroline Cycle, but much mistaken; for whereas the time of admission is according to the Cycle most just, being in the beginning of every year, the present Academians thought that the election of them was right. Which election, according to the Statutes is to be in each College that is to have a Proctor, on the Wednesday next after the first Sunday in Lent, which is towards the latter end of the year according to the English accompt. By which mistake (notwithstanding the Colleges here mentioned were ordered by the Visitors (mistaken also) to choose Proctors) the Cycle which was altogether interrupted from the year 1648 to this, was kept back an year, and so continued till 1662.

The Junior not being of sufficient standing in the degree of Master, at which time he was elected Proctor by the Society of his Coll. the Visitors dispensed with it (2) by their Order dated March 22, 1650. [He had been entered a Commoner of Magd. Hall, (baving received some academical education elsewhere) about the latter end of 1647, in expectation of a Fellowship from the Parliamentarian Visitors, then about to sit in Oxon, under pretence of reforming the University. On the 14th of Apr. 1648 he was actually created M. A. in the Pembrochian Creation then made; about which time he was recommended by the Committee (fitting in Westminster) to the said Visitors for a Fellowship of All Souls Coll. but the Fellowships of that College having been supplied by them, they settled him in a Fellowship of Wadham Coll. Oct. 3 the same year. He became a frequent Preacher in and near Oxon, without any Orders from a Bishop, and was preferred by Oliver to the Ministry of St. Botolph's Church near Bishopsgate in London, but ejested thence by the Rump Parliament. At length he became Lesturer of Great St. Helen's Church in London. After the Restoration he was not silenced for Nonconformity, because he had no Preferment to lose, but lived on an estate of inheritance in Bicester, Oxfordshire, where he sometimes kept Conventicles. In 1678 be removed to Newington Green near London, and in 1686 he went with his family to New England. But in the reign of K. Will. III, returning to Old England, they were taken by a French Privateer near their journey's end, Nov. 1691: and being all conveyed to St. Maloes, this S. Lee was so overwhelmed with grief for his captivity and loss of his money and goods, that he died in a manner heartbroken.](3)

and perceiving how troublesome it was to the Academians to apply themselves to him about their concerns, he, by his letters or instrument (4) dat. Oct. 16 this year did commissionate, appoint, and delegate Mr. J. Owen, Dean of Ch. Ch. Dr. J. Wilkins, Warden of Wadham Coll. Mr. Thomas Goodwin, President of

Dr. Jonathan Goddard, Warden of Merton Coll. and Mr. Peter French, Prebendary of Christ Church, or any three or more of them, to take into consideration all and every matter of dispensation, grant, or confirmation whatsoever, which required his assent as Chancellor of this University. At the same time also be delegated his power of hearing and determining College differences to the Vicechanc. and Heads of houses for six months.

Vicechanc. JOHN OWEN, Master of Arts, Dean of Christ Church, admitted Sept. 26, (1) having been nominated by the Chancellor's letters dated 9th of the same month.

Proctors francis Howell of Exeter Coll. Apr. 28.

Mr.(2) Peter Jarley of Pemb. Coll.

The Senior [elected Reader of Moral Philosophy Mar. 5, 1654, (3)] was afterward Principal of Jesus College, [by the favour of O. Cromwell, but was removed at the Restoration.]

This year the fix solemn Lectures which Bachelors in the faculty of Arts were to read for the degree of Master, were put down, and Declamations appointed in their stead; and every Bachelor that intended to proceed was to declaim twice in the Natural Philosophy School.

The Junior, sometime of Emanuel Coll. Cambridge, in 1650 obtained a Fellowship in New Coll. from the Visitors, and in 1652 was incorporated M. A. as he had stood in Cambridge. After he had discharged his office, he went into Ireland, became B. D. in Dublin, and exercifed his Ministry till the Restoration, when being ejected from his public exercise, he returned into England, and was much known by his constant preaching in private Meetings. He died in 1680, aged 52.(2)]

by the Convocation. (1) But he dying in the night on Oct. 24, (2) (being then Duke of Somerset) Sir Edward Hyde, Knt. [and Baronet] sometime of Magdalen Hall, now Lord High Chancellor of England, and of the Privy Council to the King, was elected into his place the 27th of the said month [the Letters patent of which election were sealed by the University Nov. 7,] (3) and installed at [Worcester House, London, (4)] Nov. 15 following. (5) [He had been lately created Baron Hyde of Hendon.]

Vicechanc. PAUL HOOD, D. D. Rector of Linc. Coll. admitted Aug. 1, (6) having before been nominated by the Duke of Somerset.

Prostors Thomas Tanner of New Coll. Mr. (7) John Dod of Christ Church May 2.

The fenior Proctor, [B. A. of Pembroke Hall, Cambridge, incorporated in 1651,] being made Fellow of New College [by the appointment of the Parliament Visitors, (8)] was ejected thence in August by his Majesty's Visitors, to make room for those ejected in 1648 and 9: So that then retiring to Hart Hall, spent the remainder of his Proctorship there. [Afterwards he retired to Gray's Inn, of which he was a Barrister, travelled to Rome, &c. returning took Holy Orders, and became Minister of Colleton in Devon, and of another Church in Somerset; was Chaplain to Dr. Morley, Bp of Winchester, who gave him the Rectory of Brixstone, or Brightstone, in the Isle of Wight; which he exchanged for North Waltham near Basing stoke, Hants, having been presented by Mr. Rudyerd to Winchsseld in the same county, where he died in 1682. (9)]

The Junior of which Proctors, wanting time when he was elected, a protestation was openly read in Convocation (10) at the time of his admission by Mr. William Hawkins, of the same House, and Candidate for the office. The particulars of which being large, I will say no more of the matter, only that the same Proctor stood, and Hawkins appealed to the Court of Chancery.

[The scene of all things was now changed, and alterations made in the countenances, manners and words of all men. Those that for 12 years last past had governed and carried all things in a manner at their pleasure, did now look discontented, and were much perplexed, foreseeing that their being in the University must inevitably vanish. Those that had been under a cloud for several years behind, appear with chearful looks; while others that had flourished, drooped, or withdrew themselves privately, knowing very well that they had eaten the bread of other men, and that if they should

But justice being to be done, Commissioners were appointed by his Majesty, after his Restoration, to rectify all things in the University, who sitting several weeks in August, September, &c. restored all such that were living, unmarried, to their respective places; and many that were peaceable, and willing to conform, and renounce their factious principles, they kept in: &c.] (1)

But the Vicechancellor and Heads of Houses, being then and before inclined to reform it, and set it aright, Ch. Church and Brasenose chose also, [according to the true tenor of the Cycle:] So that from thence a controversy arising, it was on the 22d of March the last year decided at London in the Chancellor's house, by him the said Chancellor and the Bishops of London and Worcester, [viz. Sheldon and Morley,] that the Proctors chosen by Christ Church and Brasenose should stand and be admitted. (5) Which being the result of the matter made before the Members of the University then present, of which the President of Magdalen was one, and the Warden of Merton was to be another, but withdrawn when he saw how the business was carried, these persons following were admitted Proctors in Convocation:

THE STEWARDSHIP

OFTHE

U N I V E R S I T Y.

THE Office of STEWARD in this University concerning the capital and chief causes of Scholars and privileged persons, King Henry IV, by his letters (t) patent dated June 2, an. reg. 7, Dom. 1405, did institute. Of which grant and office I shall observe

First, that because of the great malice of the Burghers and Laicks of Oxford, by their unjust indicting the right and true use of the Franchises and Privileges of the University (of which the Scholars made grievous complaints to the King, in an Epistle to him, (2) which I have seen) did therefore make a Grant to the Chancellor and Scholars thereof, that they might have a Steward of their own, by whom they should be tried, &c. and that at the demand of the Chancellor, all Justices and other Ministers of Government should deliver them up to him sub pænå 200 lib.

Secondly, that for the revoking of the said Let. Pat. and Office which the Scholars obtained, several petitions were made to the Parliament, sail. one by the Commonalty (3) of England, 9 Oct. 9 Hen. IV, when the then Representatives of the Nation began to sit at Gloucester. Upon the reading of which the matter was referred to the King's Council, to hear the reasons given in by each party either pro or con; and in the mean time the said Let. Pat. or Charter was suspended till the next Session of Parliament: Another, when the Members met at Westminster 15 days before that of St. Hilary, 11 Hen. IV. Upon which the Chancellor of the University was by several breves cited to appear before the King's Council, and being at length referred to them for the decision of the matter, were several debates made

either for lessening or nulling the privilege. Two more petitions also in French, of which one (1) was put up in the said year by the Gentry of Oxfordshire and Berkshire, and another the 13th by the Mayor and Burghers of Oxford (2) to the King. Notwithstanding all which the business was so brought to pass, that the University and their friends did then take care that nothing of the said privilege should be lessened but rather confirmed, as they did in the reigns of succeeding Kings.

Thirdly, that though the Steward had and hath cognizance of some causes which doth exceed the cognizance of the Chancellor of the Univesity, yet he is to be nominated by no other person than by the said Chancellor, and confirmed by no other than the Convocation.

Fourthly, that the Steward had at first for his yearly pension but 4 marks, arising from the perquisites of Court leets kept by him or his Deputies, not reckoning those things that issue from the affize of bread and ale; but since, in the time of John Russel, Earl of Bedford, the Stipend was assigned to be 5 lib. yearly, to be paid out of the University stock.

Fifthly, that the said Steward, after his nomination and confirmation, was wont to receive his oath from the Chancellor in a solemn Congregation of Regents, as John Norrys, (3) and some of his successors did. But since, the Oath is taken before some appointed by the University to give it wheresoever the Steward is, without the ceremony of a Congregation or Convocation. The Catalogue of them, as many as I can yet find, take, as it sollows, for the first and second appear not; so imperfect are our Registers in the time of Henry IV and V.

JOHN NORRYS, Esquire of the Body to K. Henry VI, became Steward of the Liberties of the University of Oxford, for term of life, by the Letters pat. (4) of the Chancellor thereof, Mr. GILBERT KYMER, dated Mar. 4, 31 Hen. VI, Dom. 1452, confirmed by the University May 6 following. He was also confirmed in his Office by the Honourable Mr. George Nevyl., Chancellor of the University, and obtained confirmatory Letters from King Henry VI(5) for him and his successor in the said office, dated Feb. 15, in the 33d year of his reign, Dom. 1454. [He was also Master of the Wardrobe to King Hen. VI; Sherist of the Counties of Oxford and Berks in the 36th of his reign; Esquire of the Body to K. Edward IV: And residing at Yatenden, Berks, departed this life 1 Sept. 6 E. IV. (1466;) whereupon he was buried at Bray, in an aile of that church, built at his own cost. (6)

Sir Robert Harcourt, Knt. [of the Garter,] became High Steward and 1466, and took his oath in a folemn Congregat. (1) Oct. 11 the same year.

John de la Pole, Duke of Suffolk, [who was married to Elizabeth the fifter of K. Edward IV; Knight of the Garter, &c.] occurs Steward of the University (2) an. 1472. [He died 1491, and was buried at Wingfield.]

His or his fuccessor's Deputy or Under Steward was Sir RICHARD WYDE-VYLL, (3) Knight, the Son I suppose of Richard, Earl Rivers, and Brother to Lionel Wydevill, Bishop of Salisbury, Chancellor of the University.

JASPER [TUDOR,] de Hatfield, [Half-Brother to K. Henry VI; Earl of PEMBROKE; Knight of the Garter,] Duke of BEDFORD, Uncle to K. Hen. VII, seems from our Registers to have been Steward about 1485. To whom, or else his Predecessor, was that Letter of the University written; (4) wherein they stile him the high and mighty Prince, their special good Lord and Steward. [He was constituted by K. Hen. VII, Lord High Steward, at the Coronation of his Queen, Elizabeth of York, Nov. 10, 1487; Lord Lieutenant of Ireland 1488, and Earl Marshal of England 1489. He died Dec. 21, 1495, and was buried in the Abbey of Keynsham. (5)].

EDMUND HAMDEN, Esquire to the Body of K. Hen. VII, and of his Privy Council, occurs Steward (6) 1487. See more of him in the Annals, an. 1487 and 1491.

Sir WILLIAM STONAR, the most valiant Knight of his time, [Knight of the Bath,] became Steward (7) 1492, or thereabouts: He died 1494.

Sir REGINALD BRAY, Knight [Banneret, and Knight of the Garter,] one of the Privy Council to K. Hen. VII, and Lord High Treasurer [of England,] succeeded an. 1494. (8) He gave forty marks towards the reparation of St. Mary's Church, and died in 1501.

Sir Thomas Lovell, Knight Banneret, and Knight of the Garter, [Lord Treasurer of the King's Houshold, one] of the Privy Council to King Hen. VII and VIII, occurs Steward an. 1509. (9) He died at his house in the parish of Ensield in com. Midd. May 25, 1524, and was buried in a Chapel of his own erection, joining on the south side of the Chancel of the

Sir Thomas More, [sometime a Student of St. Mary's Hall, afterward of Lincoln's Inn, London, where he was called to the Bar;] Knight; one of the Privy Council to K. Hen. VIII; [Master of the Requests; Embassador; Treasurer of the Exchequer;] Chancellor of the Dutchy of Lancaster, afterward Lord High Chancellor of England, became Steward of the University (1) by the Diploma of William Warham, Archb. of Canterbury, Chancellor of the Univ. June 10, 1524. [In 1532 he resigned the Chancellorship, by delivering up the Great Seal, and was afterward committed to the Tower for not acknowledging the King's Supremacy over the Church of England, the Succession of the Crown from Anne Bulleyn, &c. and was beheaded for the same in 1535. (2)]

Sir WILLIAM FITZ WILLIAMS, Knight; one of the Privy Council to King [Hen. VIII; Chancellor of the Dutchy of Lancaster; Lord Treasurer of his Houshold,] and Knight of the Garter, afterward Lord High Admiral of England, &c. and Earl of Southampton, is mentioned Steward, in the King's Letters to the University (3) concerning the election of John Longland, Bishop of Lincoln, to the Chancellorship of the University, an. 1532. [He was afterward Lord Privy Seal, died in 1542, and was buried at Midherst, Sussex.]

HENRY NORRYS was his Under Steward for a time. (4)

JOHN RUSSELL, [Knight; Baron Russell of Chenys, Comptroller of the Houshold to K. Hen. VIII, Lord High Admiral of England, &c. Knight of the Garter; Lord High Steward of England at the Coronation of King

Edw. VI; afterward] Earl of Bedford, succeeded (1) upon the death of the former Steward Nov. 7, 1542. [In 1553 he was made Lord Privy Seal by Q. Mary, died 1555, and was buried at Chenys in Bucks.]

His Under Steward or Deputy was John Yates, Esq. against whom the Burghers of Oxford shut their Guildhall door, when he came to execute his Office in the business of Anthony Garnet, Scholar of Balliol College, guilty of selony.

Henry Fitz Alan, Earl of Arundell, Baron Maltravers, Clun, &c. fucceeded (2) upon the death of the former Steward, Mar. 30, 1555. Afterward Chancellor of the University [in 1559. He was Knight of the Garter; of the Privy Council to K. Hen. VIII, K. Edw. VI, Q. Mary and Q. Elizabeth; Field Marshal of K. Hen. VIII his army at the siege of Boloigne; Lord Chamberlain of his Houshold; Earl Marshal of England at the Coronation of K. Edw. VI, and Lord Chamberlain of his Houshold; Lord High Constable of England at the Coronation of Q. Mary; again for the day immediately preceding the Coronation of Q. Elizabeth, and Lord High Steward of England for the day on which she was crowned; Lord Steward of their Housholds; and Lord President of their Councils. He died Feb. 25, 1579, aged 68. (3)]

JOHN LUMLEY, Baron of LUMLEY, [Knight of the Bath,] fon in law to the former Steward, succeeded (4) Feb. 24, 1558-9, by the nomination of his said father.

His Deputies were Mr. WILLIAM STANDISH, [Register of the Univerfity,] and Mr. RICHARD CULLEN, of Magdalen College.

HENRY HOWARD, [M. A. of Cambridge, and incorporated 1568, (5)] Earl of NORTHAMPTON, Baron Howard of Marnhill, [of the Privy Council to K. James I.] Keeper of the Privy Seal, Warden of the Cinque Ports [Knight of the Garter; fecond] fon of Henry Howard, Earl of Surrey, fucceeded upon the death of the Lord Lumley, (6) by the nomination of the Chancellor Apr. 19, 1609; confirmed afterward by the Convocation. [In 1611 he was elected Chancellor of the University of Cambridge. He died in 1614, and was buried in the Church of Dover Castle.]

PHILIP HERBERT, Lord HERBERT, [sometime a Nobleman of New College, created Baron] HERBERT of Shurland, Earl of Montgomery, Knight of the Garter, afterward Earl of PEMBROKE, [and Lord Chamberlain of the

Houshold to K. Charles I,] became Steward (1) by the Chancellor's Letters. Jun. 10, confirmed the 12th of the said month by Convocation an. 1615. [He was elected in 1641 Chancellor of the University, and died in 1649-50.]

His Under Stewards, successively, were Sir James Hussey, [LL.D. Principal of Magdalen Hall, and Register of the University,] and Sir William Ryves, Knights, both formerly of New College; Sir Francis More, [sometime of St. John's College and M. A.] Serjeant at Law; and at length Unton Croke, of the Inner Temple, Esq.

WILLIAM FIENNES, [Iometime of New College,] Viscount [and Baron] SAY and SELE, [Master of the Court of Wards,] admitted Steward July 9, 1641, having been nominated by

GEORGE DIGBY, Lord DIGBY of Sherborne [eldest fon of John, Earl of Bristol; sometime a Nobleman of Magd. Coll. created M. A. in 1636,] (2) Principal Secretary of State, nominated Steward by the Marq. of HERTFORD, Chancellor of the University, Oct. 31, 1643, and admitted Nov. 2, following, in the Chancellor's Lodgings at Christ Church.

WILLIAM FIENNES, Vitcount [and Baron] SAY and SELE, restored by the Parliament, 1646. [He was made Lord Privy Seal in 1660, died in 1662, and was buried at Broughton in Oxfordshire.]

GEORGE DIGBY, Earl of BRISTOL, restored by the King's Commissioners, an. 1660. He [was made Knight of the Garter in 1661;] soon after resigned, [and died in 1676-7, aged 64, or more, at Chelsea near London, and was buried in the Church there.] (3)

John Egerton, Earl of Bridgewater, Viscount Brackley, &c. elected May 14, 1663, (4) [son of John, Earl of Bridgewater, &c. Lord President of Wales, &c. and] Grandson to Thomas Egerton, Baron of Ellesmere, [Viscount Brackley, Lord High Chancellor of England, and] sometime Chancellor of this University. [He was also created M. A. by Diploma on the same day.]

The 20th day of the faid month RICHARD HOLLOWAY, Esq. sometime [Fellow] of New College, [Barrister at Law of the Inner Temple, being nominated by the Chancellor,] was constituted by the University the Under Steward. (5) [He was afterward called to be Serjeant at Law, knighted, and made one of the Justices of the King's Bench.

The faid Justice Holloway resigning this office, John Holloway, Esq. was constituted by the University Under Steward Dec. 15, 1684.](6)

The said Earl of BRIDGEWATER died in his house (in the Barbican) London Oct. 26, 1686, aged 63, and was buried at Little Gaddesdon, Hertfordshire.

HENRY HYDE, [diplomated M. A. in 1660,] Earl of CLARENDON, &c. [Knight of the Bath; Lord Privy Seal;] Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, [eldeft fon of EDWARD HYDE, Earl of CLARENDON, &c. fometime Lord High Chancellor of England, and also Chancellor of this University,] was elected Jan. 5, 1686, having before been nominated by [JAMES Duke of Ormonde,] the Chancellor of the University. (1) [He died Oct. 22, 1709.]

[LAURENCE HYDE, (fecond fon of EDWARD Earl of CLARENDON, aforefaid) diplomated M. A. in 1660; elected one of the Burgesses of the University 1661; Master of the Robes to K. Ch. II; Ambassador to Poland and Holland; created Baron Hyde of Wootton Basset, Viscount Hyde of Kenilworth 1681; Earl of Rochester 1682; one of the Privy Council to K. Charles II, and K. James II; Chancellor of the Exchequer and first Commissioner of the Treasury from 1679 to 1685; Lord President of the Council and Knight of the Garter 1685; one of the Privy Council to K. W. and Q. M. 1691; (2) created D. C. L. 1701; was nominated by the Chancellor James Duke of Ormonde, confirmed by Convocation Nov. 21, 1709, and admitted Nov. 28 following. (3) In 1710 he was appointed by Q. Anne Lord President of the Council. He died May 2, 1711.

HENRY HYDE, Earl of Rochester, (only fon of the former Laurence Hyde) nominated by the Chancellor, was confirmed by Convocation Jun. 14, 1711, and admitted Jun. 21 following. (4) In 1723, on the death of his Cousin, Edward Earl of Clarendon, he became Earl of Clarendon and Rochester. He died Nov. 10, 1753.

Upon the refignation of John Holloway, Esq. the Office of Under Steward was conferred by Convocation Off. 7, 1720, on Thomas Browne, Esq. (5) he being nominated by the Chancellor.

George Henry Lee, Baron of Spilsbury, Viscount Quarendon, and Earl of Litchfield, sometime a Nobleman of St. John's Coll. created M. A. 1737, D. C. L. 1743, was nominated and approved High Steward Aug. 19, 1760. He was elected Chancellor of the University Sept. 23, 1762. (2)

Hamilton Boyle, fometime W. Student of Christ Church; B.C.L. 1755; who on the death of his father Nov. 22, 1762, succeeded to the Titles of Baron Boyle of Youghall, Baron of Broghill, Viscount Dungarvan, Earl of Corke and Orrery, in Ireland; Baron Boyle of Marston, in England; created D.C.L. Jul. 6, 1763, was nominated High Steward. (3) He died Jan. 17, 1764.

EDWARD LEIGH, Baron Leigh of Stoneleigh, sometime a Nobleman of Oriel College; created M. A. 1764; being nominated High Steward, was approved Apr. 3, 1767, (4) and created D. C. L. by Diploma Apr. 29 sollowing. He died May 26, 1786.

John Morton, Esq. of Tackley in the County of Oxford, Barrister at Law; created D.C.L. 1749; Chief Justice of Chester, &c. 1762; Attorney General to the Queen 1770; nominated Deputy Steward by the Chancellor, was approved by Conv. Oct. 7, 1771. (5) He died July 25, 1780.

Hon. Thomas Francis Wenman, Fellow of All Souls Coll. Barrister at Law; D. C. L. Keeper of the Archives; appointed Deputy Steward by the Chancellor's Letter, dated Dec. 1, was approved by Conv. Dec. 17, 1781. (6) He is the present Deputy Steward, and also appointed the King's Professor of Civil Law in this University, 1789.

WILLIAM LEGGE, Baron of DARTMOUTH, Viscount Lewisham, and Earl of DARTMOUTH; D. C. L. nominated High Steward by the Chancellor's Letter, dated July 6, 1786, was approved by Convocation July 13 following. (7) He is the present High Steward, 1789.]

PARLIAMENTARY BURGESSES

OF THE

UNIVERSITY.

ROM the time that King James by his Diploma, dated March 12, and Reg. primo, Dom. 1603, granted to each University Parliamentary Burgesses (being first of all moved thereunto by the Chancellor of each place, followed with a great demur among the Parliament men, whether it was sit that they should have such or no, but was cleared by Sir Edward Coke, [the Attorney General, afterward Lord Chief Justice of the Common Pleas and King's Bench successively,] who then stood up in behalf of the said Universities) have been these following of this University, elected in Convocation by the Vicechancellor, Doctors, Regent, and Non Regent Masters:

But that Parliament wherein they sat, [which began Mar. 19, an. reg. 1, 1603,] being continued several years, after divers prorogations had been made, Sir Thomas Crompton at length died in Jan. or Feb. 1608[9].

In which year [this first Parliament of K. Ch. I, which held to July 11,] was adjourned to Oxford (2) to be held there Aug. 1; but dissolved about [12] days following. Afterward another Parliament being summoned to sit at Westminster Feb. 6, the same year, the aforesaid Burgesses were chosen again, namely,

But because Sir Thomas Edmonds was chosen in a tumult, the major part of the Convocation diffenting, a Command thereupon came to choose another. After the receipt of which they called a Convocation, and chose

Sir Francis Stewart, Knight [of the Bath, third] fon of [James the fifth] Earl of Murray, and sometime M. A. of Ch. Ch. Mar. 23, 1625.6. (4)

Afterward there was a statute made that the future Election of Burgesses should not be by scrutiny, but 'cum vivâ voce, et pedibus eundo in sententiam, &c.'

The faid [fecond] Parliament was diffolved June 15, 1626. Afterward a Proclamation coming forth for another to meet March 17, 1627[-8, anreg. 2,] were chosen

The faid [third] Parliament was dissolved the second of March 1628-[9,] by a Proclamation then dated, but that Proclamation was not published till the tenth day of the said month, and from that time till 16[40] we had no Parliament.

The first was chosen by the commendations of the Chancellor, and the other for the respect that the University had for his brother the Earl of Danby, Founder of the Physic Garden. But siding with the Parliament in the Rebellion that broke out an. 1641, was at length appointed to be one of the King's Judges in order to his beheading, and was known by the King, and (as is said) named before the Auditory when he was first brought to his trial. (2)

But this [fourth] Parliament then held, which began Apr. 13, 1640, [an. reg. 15,] being immaturely dissolved [May 5,] to the great damage of the public, upon troubles arising in the North by the Scottish invasion; another, afterwards called the Eternal or Long Parliament, was summoned to appear at Westminster Nov. 3, 1640, [an. reg. 15;] for which the University choice

And, being but an hundred and forty four in number, was called the 'Little Parliament,' and by some 'Barebones Parliament,' from one Praise God Barebones, a Leatherseller in Fleet street, and a notorious Sectary, one of the Members thereof, for the City of London. They had no Chaplain, but every one, especially those that were gifted, prayed (sometimes eight, sometimes ten) to the rest daily. Diffolved Dec. 12 following.

1654 JOHN OWEN, Doctor of Div. and Dean of Christ Church: Elected June 27 by virtue of a Writ fent to the University, to make choice but of one Burgess to sit in that Parliament began at Westminster Sept. 3, this year. (1) But his election being questioned by the Committee of Privileges, he sat but for some time.

1656 NATHANIEL FIENNES, Efq. The former had sometime received his Academical Education at Magdalen Hall; where, after he had spent two or three years, went to Lincoln's Inn, to study the Municipal Laws. Afterward going through all Degrees of his Profession, became, after the King's Restoration, [in 1666,] Lord Chief Baron of the Exchequer, and in the year 1671 Lord Chief Justice of the King's Bench, [and had the bonour of Knighthood conferred on him. A Person not only learned in his Profession, but also in Divinity, Philosophy, History, and Antiquity.

[The latter was restored to his Canonry of Christ Ch. by the Rump Parliament Mar. 13, 1659.]

The Parliament for which these were elected, was called Richard's Parliament; [and being dissolved by him in three months on Apr. 22, 1659, he was soon after turned out of the Protectorship.

The Rump Parliament, or the reliques of the Long Parliament that continued fitting from 1640 to Apr. 20, 1653, were invited by the Officers of the Army to fit again, May 6, 1659. According to that invitation they met the day following, but among them the University had not one Burgess to serve them; they being divers years since dead. They sat till Oct. 13, and then they were shut out of doors by the Army. But that action being disliked by General Monk in Scotland, they were by his power restored, and they began not only to sit again Dec. 26 following, but shortly after to have those Members added to them that had been secluded on the 21st of Febr. 1648. So that they sitting till March 16, 1659-60, were then dissolved; and another (1) Parliament being then summoned to be held at Westminster Apr. 25 following, we thereupon chose these following, viz.

But he never fat, because the first Session of the Parliament was still prorogued from time to time till it was diffolved [Jul. 2, 1687, an. reg. 3.]

Elected to serve for that Parliament that was designed to meet at Westminster Jan. 15 following; but the King withdrawing himself from Whitehall, and at length beyond the Seas, upon the defertion of his forces, to defend himself against the invasion of the Prince of Orange, the Writs were not half distributed through the Nation, and therefore a lawful-Parliament could not meet. To the left, attendant on the Founder, stand Religion and Prudence; behind which are two Monks retiring with countenances expressive of the utmost malignancy and indignation. In the upper part of the Piece appear hovering two small angelical figures, bearing a Laurel wreath, and a scroll containing the names of some eminent Members of this Society: 'R. Bacon. Scotus. Wicliffe. Linacre. Jewell. Bodley. Savile. Harvey.' At the bottom are these Inscriptions:

"RICHARD, King of the ROMANS, after his long paralytic illness, died Apr. 2, 1272, (56 Hen. III) at Berkhamsted, his heart was preserved in the Frier Minors' Church at Oxford, and his body interred in his own Ciftertian Abbey of Hales. He had been so great a Patron of Walter de Merton, that this munificent Prelate an. 1274, founded his College in Oxford, 'Pro falute animarum Henrici quondam Regis Angliæ, nec non Germani sui Ricardi Romanorum Regis inclyti et hæredum fuorum,' (1)

Worcester College, Oxford, 1726, was elected Fellow of this Society 1735; foon after which he took the degree of Bachelor of Physic, and removed to the city of Worcester to practice in that profession. He proceeded D.M. in 1759, and continued eminent in practice till his last illness. He died at Bath of a lingering disorder Jun. 27, 1776, and is buried in the Abbey church. His amusement was the fludy of the polite arts, particularly painting, and that branch of it which best besits a gentleman, the designing historical pictures, in which he fo far excelled. that it has been faid of him, that if he had not been one of the best physicians, he would have been the best painter of the age. Nash's HIST. of Worc. V. II, p. 126.

About 1425 five bells were put up in the Tower, Dr. Henry Abendon being then Warden. The tenor or great bell (on which the name of the faid Abendon was put) was supposed to be the best bell in England, being, as 'twas said, of fine metal silver sound.

In 1657 these sive bells were cast into eight by Michael Derby; towards which A. W. his mother, and his two brothers, Rob. and Christopher Wood gave 51. And in 1681 they were re-cast by Christopher Hudson of Lon-

Extract from an old Catalogue of Fellows.

This note which followeth concerning Walter Merton we find in the College Register book word for word:

Walter De Merton was Chauncellor of England in Kinge Henry the third his dayes. He founded this Colledge in Oxford named by his owne name: The House of the Schollers of Merton: and endowed it in effecte with all the lande that at this time we possess. He first gave Statutes to this Colledge under the foresaid king's seale and his owne, the yere of our Lord God 1264. But he gave those Statutes that be now used in the month of August the first yere of kinge Edward, under the king's seale and his owne, the yere of our Lord God 1274: in the which yere also he was consecrated Bishop of Rochester, and departed out of this lyse about November three yeres after in the yere 1277, 3° Ed. primi. Qui timet Deum faciet bona was his posse of his seale that he used before he was Bishop. The imaige of his seale was a kinge with a scepter in his hand. This inventorie of his goods came to 51101. 13s. 10d. ob. His Legacies were 27261. 5s. 6d. He hadde owinge to him 6221. 2s. 8d. He owed unto other 7461. 16s. ob.

'John Marshall, [Fellow,] occurs Principal of Colcell or Coleshill Hall, in St. John Bapt. Parish, Ox. 1447: Proctor of the Univ. under the title of Procurator borealis, an. 1455, Fellow of Eaton Coll. Preb. of York, Dr. of Div. Canon or Preb. of Windsor 1474, which Canonry he refigned 1477, and soon after [1478] became Bishop of Landass. In 1491 he gave 201. for the painting of the stalls in this (Merton) Coll. choir, and two books to the Library. In 1492 was finished, at this Bishop's charge, a new and fair stone cross in St. Frideswyde's churchyard, in the place, or near it, of one anciently standing there (which churchyard was afterwards converted into two or more gardens belonging to the Dean and two Canons of Christ Ch.) and the first person that preached in the pulpit at the said cross (which was on Ascension day 1492) was Mr. Rich. Rawlins, Fellow of [this] Merton Coll. In 1496

he bequeathed to the College 201. in Angels for the ceiling of the choir with boards, 8 books to the Library, and a standing gilt cup or bole, all received March 3, the same year. In 1497 the ceiling of the said choir was finished, which cost 90l. and about the same time the painting of the back part of the stalls in the choir. Every division or stall had the effigies from head to foot, with antique habits, and antique coverings for the head, of a greater or leffer Prophet, or Apostle, or some Saint: each having a scroll coming out of their mouths, winding over their heads, containing a fentence from the Belief, Pater noster, &c. till all was done, even to Amen. All these pictures were daubed out as I have heard temp. E. VI, but foon after appeared again. In the time of Oliver Protector they were daubed out again, but soon after appeared. At length in 1659 oil colours were laid upon them, and then they were quite lost. In 167-, when these old stalls were plucked down, being very substantial, and of heart of oak not at all perished, and new ones placed at the charge of Mr. Fisher; they were removed into the outward chapel, where they yet continue. In the last stall (or rather part of one) next of all to the vestry door, and in that opposite to it, was painted to the life the effigies kneeling of the said Bishop Marshall, habited in his pontificalia, and mitred, with his crofier leaning on his right shoulder, and this inscription under each picture:

Orate pro a'i'a D. Jo'his Marshall ep'i Landavensis, cujus a'i'æ propitietur Deus. Amen.

When these stalls were pulled down, Mr. N. Wight did at my desire put one of these boards whereon the picture was painted in the College Library, and hung it against the wall over the stairs; where continuing till 1683, at what time scassolds were set up to paint and gild the roof of the said Library, it was by the workmen used, and at length by one of them conveyed away. Bishop Marshall died 1496—buried in the Church of Landass.

On the Tower, over the Gateway:

The History of St. John the Baptist, &c. carved in stone; supposed to be a relic of the old Collegiate Church of St. John Baptist, Merton.

A Statue of King HENRY the third; whole length; crowned, &c.

"It appears by a French Copy of this Petition now extant in the Schools Tower, that Mr. Twyne, or the University itself, procured one in 1622 out of the Bundle of Petitions of Parliament in 7 Edw. III. This is testified by two Clerks or Keepers of those Records, Aug. Vincent and Geo. Robinson. Now Mr. Wood in his History does very truly observe, that there was no Parliament held at all that year, and therefore he has placed it under 7 R. II. But in this he is mistaken; for though there was a parliament held that year, yet it will manifestly appear, that this Petition could not be presented so soon; but in all likelihood the 11th of his reign, which begun Feb. 3, 1387; for all his Writs relating to this petition are dated in that year, or the following 1388." (1)

P. 40, N. 17—add

An Account of purchases made with WILL. of DURHAM's money.

"The first purchase that occurs out of the original deeds, all lodged in this College Treasury, is that of an angular, or corner House, standing in Schoolstreet, and is now part of the front of Brasenose College, which was bought of the Prior and Brethren of the Hospital of Brackle; who grant it, and four shillings quit-rent out of another house, to the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Oxon, for which the Prior and his Brethren received thirty six marks in Gersumam; that is, into their purse. There are a great many witnesses to this deed, but the date is not added, nor was much used before the middle or end of Henry the Third's reign; yet it happens, that this want is supplied by a letter of Attorney to give possession, dated the thursday after Midsummer day, an. Mcc quinquagesimo tertio, in words, and not in figures."

"The fecond deed is the purchase of a House from the Priory of Shire-burn, made to the Chancellor, Proctors, and University of Oxon, and was

fituated the first house in Highstreet, on the North side in St. Peter's in the east, and stands opposite to the front of the present College; with this also was conveyed 8s. quit rent in St. Mary's parish, now enclosed in All Souls College: there was some quit rent due out of it, and in order to its sale, the Abbot and Convent of Eynesham did quit their claim an. 1255, and it was granted to the University, as appears by the officers of the Town, the same year, and for which the University paid forty eight marks in Gersumam."

- "These two purchases being over, shortly after was held the great Council at Oxford, for reformation of Henry the Third's government; at which time, or shortly after, the University had lent some part of this money, lest by William of Durham, to the Peers, or great men of the land: However about the year 1262, they made a third purchase from Simon of Balinden, a Canon of Litchsield, on the south side of their first corner house in School-street: Whatever name it had then, 'tis certain it was called Brasenose Hall shortly after, in the survey 7 Edward I, an. 1279; it cost 551. 6s. 8d. sterling, and makes, with the former house, the whole front of that College, and had four Schools belonging to it."
- "The last purchase made, whilst the money continued in the hands of the University, was in the year 1270: for the then Chancellor, Thomas Beck, gave to one Wymond de Linge, Draper, and his wife Agnes, for a quit-rent of 153. out of two houses standing now west of the Angel Inn in St. Peter's parish, seven younds."
- "By confulting the Inquisition, 7 Edw. I, an. 1279, it will appear, that putting all the prices here mentioned together, the sum will amount to 1181. 63. 8d. and putting all the rents together, mentioned in that survey, the sum will be 111. 135. 4d." (1)

"As to where the College or Hall was first placed, it must in some meafure proceed upon probabilities, but yet of that nature, that there will be but few that will not readily assent to the reasons that shall be given; which are these, that they were placed in that Hall, which the first of all others was called University Hall, and now makes part of Brasenose College; the reason is this, because these Scholars being become owners of three Halls, viz. University Hall, Brasenose Hall, and Drogeda or Drowda Hall, it is likely they would rather chuse to live in one of their own houses, than in a Hall hired of the Townsmen; and there is no likelihood that they pitched on Brasenose Hall, for it was then let at such an high rent, that it would have funk more than two of their falaries; and as to their other Hall, called Drowday Hall, that was also of too high a rent for them; and upon this account they were most likely placed in the least of these three Halls; a second reason is, that probably they were called University Scholars for their living in University Hall; but thirdly, and more especially from the provision that obliged them to live altogether, and the Delegates had provided also, that none should turn them out, or make any Schools of their houses, without their own consent." (1)

P. 42, 1. 20—add

"An account of the purchases made with William of Durham's money, after the remainder of it was transferred into the hands of the Society (an. 1280) to be managed by them in buying additional estates to those the University had before purchased for them.

An. 1307, July 2. Two Houses that formerly belonged to Wymond the Linen Draper, lying in St. Peter's Parish. These houses are still in pos-fession of the College.

An. 1307, July 25. A house lying in Sckydiard (now called St. Mary lane) in St. Mary's parish, bought of William Leyghton, Vicar of Goddington. It was called St. Edward's Hall, and sold to Oriel College for ever, under a quit-rent, 1486. The same person also passed at the same time another house in St. Peter's, called then, or shortly after, Maiden Hall. In 1388 it was sold to Bishop Wickham, and now makes part of the South side of New College Cloister.

An. 1311. The fourth purchase was bought of Tho. Sowy, and confisted of one house and a yard in St. Peter's in the east, and lay on the south side of New College Lane, and is now enclosed into Queen's College. This house was sold May 19, 1340, D'no Roberto de Eglessield, Founder of Queen's.

An. 1332, June 22. The fifth purchase was that of Spicer's Hall, bought of the heirs of Adam Feteplace, by William Nadale, and Robert Paterington, where the College now stands.

An. 1336. July 7. The fixth purchase was that of Rose Hall, and White Hall, lying in Kybald street, in St. John's parish, passed by Alice, the daughter of Walter Crendon, to Robert Patrington and Jo. Pokelington, and now makes the south part, or Grove of the College, formerly planted with walnut trees, but now cut down.

UNIVERSITY COLLEGE.

An. 1336, July 21. Ludlow Hall, the feventh purchase, in St. Peter's parish, was then passed to the aforesaid Robert Patrington and John Pokelington, now included in the College.

An. 1353, May 30. The eighth purchase was that by which Roger Lodelow passes Olysant Hall, otherwise Unicorn Hall, to Mr. Laur. Radeford: it lay in St. Mildred's, between Brasenose and Lincoln College.

An. 1353, May 30. The ninth purchase was that by which John Stillego of Hereford passed to Mr. Roger Ashwardby a tenement called Staple Hall, in St. Mildred's parish: this Hall stood the most east of the three Halls the College had together: it was also sometimes called St. Thomas's Hall.

An. 1353, the tenth purchase was that of Aula Scuti, or Sheld Hall: this, as appears by another deed relating to it, stood between Oliphant Hall on the west side, and Staple Hall on the east.

An. 1357, after March 25, the eleventh purchase was passed by John Hertwell and Alice his wife, under the name of a tenement called Stanton Hall, in St. Mary's parish, to Roger Aswordly and Laur. Radeford: This stands the next house but one to the College, and is called the Three Tun Tavern.

An. 1357, May 1, J. Bereford and Agnes his wife, passed a tenement called Hampton Hall, in St. Mildred's parish, to Roger Ashwardly and Laur. Radeford.

An. 1360, Aug. 15, John Bereford passed a tenement, afterwards called Sykle Hall, in All Hallows parish, to Mr. Wm. Wilton and Henry Hopton: These two last tenements, though in several parishes, stood next to one another, and are now part of the lesser quadrangle of Lincoln College, where their Chapel stands. Here (at least in part) ends the sisteen or sixteen Halls, and one Introitus, which Scholars rented and lived in; of which, three were bought by the University, and 13 by the Fellows of the College, before the great purchase made by Laur. Radeford, &c. in the 1360."(1)

"As to Laur. Radeford's purchase, the first true Deed I meet with (not to mention counterfeit Charters) is from Jo. de Gonewardby to Mr. John de Wormenhale and John Mahu of Whathamstede, dated after Sept. 1, 1359: These two persons afterwards pass the same lands to three Masters, viz. Laurence Radeford, William Wymundam, and Henry Hopton, dated Apr. 25, 1360. Wymundam and Hopton might pass over their right to Laur. Radeford afterwards."

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"Laur. Radeford passes the same houses and lands to the Scholars of University Hall in Oxon June 5, 1361, under the names of 7 messuages, 8 shops, 12 acres of land, 25 of meadow, and 11.45.5d. quit rent, with some other gardens and granges: the worth of all which, as found in the Burfar's Roll 1381, by their rents amounted to 15% odd money: The deed was for two parts in possession, the third was in reversion after the decease of Robert Mansall and Maud his wife, relict of Jo. Goldsmith. I have put all the lands together, though devised in the deed; and must take notice that no person is appointed to be prayed for, but Robert Caldewell, for whom there was a Chaplain to be appointed at first; and also the deed gives half a mark to every Fellow yearly, and what remained was to go toward the increase of more Fellows in the Society." (1)

"But no benefit accrued to the College from this purchase; for after a long suit between Edmund Fraunceys and Idonia his wife, they were forced to buy or redeem their right with a great fum of money." (2)

P. 42, 1. 30—add

"This opinion of the College having no Seal before 40 Edw. III, (an. 1366) is far out of the way; for certainly it had one before the year 1320, and the Author himself had seen and quoted a deed made to Queen's College, and fealed with the College feal, 14 Edw. III, 1340." (3)

P. 43, J. 16—add

ROBERT RIPLINGHAM was also Fellow of Mert. Coll. and in the Author's MS Catalogue of the Fellows of that College, among Ballard's MSS in Bodl. Lib. Vol. 46, are the following particulars of him as well as of this Benefaction.

1284 Mr. Rob. de Riplyngham com. Ebor. Installed Chanc. of York 8 Id. Jul. 1297—ob. 1332.

In a certain Reg. in the possession of the Dean and Chapter of York, I find the will of R. de R—. probat, 3 kal. Sept. 1332. He bequeaths his body to be buried in majori Ecc'a B. Pet. Ebor. (si fuerit reconciliata) near to the body of Mr. John de Nassington, who was buried before the altar of St. Nicholas. He bequeaths 100% to certain Priests that should celebrate divine service for his foul, for the souls of his father, mother, brethren and sisters, and for the foul of Walter de Merton, Bp of Roch. Hen. de Newark Archbp. of York, for one, two, or three years—100l for mending the pavement or causway between York and Bubwith, Beverley and Wagham, York and Acklum—401. to poor Scholars that are Artists and Theologists studying in Oxon.

Oxon. legatas in test. prædicti desuncti. — They were ready to pay the same; but because there was a great dissention in the Univ. between the Australes and Boreales, which was not then sedated, and that the boreales to whom Replyngham did chiesty in his will bequeath the said money, could not securely live there, they therefore thought it not sit to pay it till the Boreales were safely settled there. (hoc suit 16 Apr. 1635)—sol. 9.)—In that year, or a little before, the Oxonians upon some difference translated themselves to Stamford in Lincolnshire.

REPLYNGHAM'S Arms are in the windows of Beverley Church, Yorkshire, viz. Arg. three Brushes Sab. on a Chief Az. a Lion passant, Arg.

He seems to have been related to William de Melton, Archbp of York; for one Thomas de Replyngham is stiled in Melton's Reg. his kinsman. This Archb. Melton being about to live out of his diocese appointed Riplyngham, Chanc. of the Church of York, his Vicar General during his absence, 6 cal. Mar. 1323. He was Prebendary of Southwell and York.

The lands which Philip of Beverley gave, were either all, or most, swallowed up by the River Humber. (1)

"The first letters patent that the College had were granted in 1317, Jan. 27, 11 Edw. II: in which 'license is granted to Philip of Beverley, that he may assign one mill, sive bovates and a half, and three acres of land, and two

tofts, and their appurtenances in Paghel and Kayngham in the county of York, to the Masters and Scholars continuing and studying in the Hall of the University of Oxford; to have and to hold to the said Masters and Scholars of the said Hall of the University, for the augmentation of the number of Scholars, and sustaining of them for ever.'

" A like grant from Philip of Beverley with this difference, that he gives, grants and confirms to the Masters and Scholars of that Hall of the Univerfity of Oxon, who should be commorant, and studying at Oxford, or any other place in England, if it should happen that the University of Oxon should be transferred to some other place: He also appoints the Masters, Scholars and their fucceffors, to pray for his own foul, and the fouls of Robert Ingleberd his father, and Alice his mother, Mr. William Burnel, and John le Grass, and the Lady Devorgull Balliol; and obligeth the Society to chuse and maintain two Scholars, or Masters born near Beverley, &c. and to pay Sibil, formerly the wife of Stephen of Pagula, yearly, for her life, fixty fhillings; and whilft she lived he only obliged them to maintain one Scholar, and pay or exhibit to his Scholars as they do to themselves; and leaves half a mark to the Senior Master, and also to his Scholars; and the remainder to be divided amongst the rest of the Scholars or Masters. Sealed with his own feal, and the feal of the faid Masters and Fellows dated 'Wednesday after the feast of the Trinity A. D. 1320.'(1)

P. 43, N. 29, l. 1—add

"Betwixt King Edward the First's survey in 1278 or 1279, and the time it was purchased, there were three or more owners of it. First, Andrew of Durham, who was one of the Aldermen of the City when that survey was made, and from whom it bare the name of Durham Hall; afterwards it was called Selverne Hall, and at the time it was bought, which was in the year 1332, it was called Spicer's Hall, except that Selvern and Spicer should prove the same person, the one derived from his name, the other from his trade; for, in the interval of the time above mentioned, Adam Feteplace, who had been many years Mayor, was become the owner of it, and it was bought of his three daughters, who were then heiresses.

Now this being but a fingle house, and of no greater length forwards than two rooms on a floor, nor of greater length backward than what the present quadrangle contains, one can icarce think they removed into it, till they had purchased two Halls (White Hall and Rose Hall) that lay behind it, and reached as far southward as a certain street called Kybald street, now quite shut up and inclosed.——These two Halls came together to the College by purchase in the year 1343, with Ludlow Hall, which lay in St. Peter's parish, and was not taken into the College till some time after; and by the taking that in, the east part of the old quadrangle lay in St. Peter's, and the gate and the west part lay in St. Mary's."(2)

" This Society having long borne the name of 'University Scholars,' it was not possible to shake off that name on a sudden; and therefore upon their removal, I suppose, they called their new lodgings by the name their old ones were vulgarly known by; and to prove this there are several deeds or leases, in which they stile themselves (and others stiled them also) 'The Master and Scholars of the University of Oxon;' and all the difference put between their old and their new Hall was this, the one was called 'Aula Universitatis in vico Scholarum,' and the other 'Aula Universitatis in Alto Vico;' but how long this continued I cannot be certain to a day, or a year, but shall acquaint the reader about what time I find a variation; for, till the year 1631, it certainly kept its old name of 'Aula Universitatis Oxon,' as it appears by Lau. Rudeford's deed, dated that year, which conveys a confiderable estate to the College (bought, at least in part, with the last remains of what was owing of William of Durham's money): From that year, and for several years after, the leases run in the name of 'The Master and Fellows of the Hall of William of Durham, commonly called Aula Universitatis.' And the first time I find 'Magna Aula Universitatis' added to the other, was in the year 1381, and after that year both the names were promiscuously used, till the title was changed by a later Charter from Q. Eliz. What I have writ hitherto is borrowed from deeds and leafes; but from the year last mentioned 1381, we have most of the Bursars Rolls remaining with us, and then the stile runs thus, 'Computus, &c. of the Bursar of the College of Mr. William of Durham, commonly called Mickle University Hall, and this title continued till the 14th of Rich. II, 1390, when the stile was fometimes changed into 'Collegii Magnæ Aulæ Universitatis,' but in the 23d of Rich. II it returned to the former title of 'The College of William of Durham, &c.' and then again, after some years, to 'Micel Hall of the University,' and so mutably as the Bursars pleased; but in Q. Eliz. time, till the year 1572 it is oftner stiled the 'College of William of Durham,' than barely 'Magna Aula Universitatis,' as well in leases, as in the Bursars' accounts."

"And it is almost manifest, that the third 'Little University Hall' derived its name as a difference from the 'Great Hall' (one single House, or Hall standing betwixt them, and that was Ludlow Hall) and in an old deed belonging to that Hall, I find this Little University Hall called the tenement of John de Hasele, in the year 1315, and in the year 1343 the tenement of Michael, the son of Andrew de Pyrie; and the first time I find it in any deed called Little University Hall is in the year 1379. This Little University Hall was afterwards bought by the College in the year 1404, and became part of the Master's Lodgings; and is made part of the New Buildings, erected with the 5000l. given them by the late samous Physician Dr. Radcliffe."(1)

Her right name was Eleanor. She was fecond daughter of Ralph Nevile, Earl of Westmorland by his fecond wife Joan, the daughter of John of Gaunt and Katherine Swinford (the relict of Sir Otho Swinford) daughter and coheir to Sir Payne Rouett, Guienne King at Arms.

N. B. Eleanor had a former husband, viz. Richard Lord Le Despencer.

P. 49, 1. 33—add

"Sir Simon Bener had been formerly educated in the College, and died about the year 1635.—But his estate came not to the College before the death of his Lady, and was fettled in Chancery about the beginning of the war, 1640, by a certificate from Archb. Laud, who advised, that it should be disposed of for four Fellowships, four Scholarships, and several other benefits to those of the old foundation. But some of Sir Simon's female relations, by the power of their husbands, Mr. Hambden and others, in the Long Parliament 1649, got this decree reversed, the number increased, and half the places to be so reserved to the Founder's kindred, that no other could be chosen, till after three months notice to come in, and make their claim: But before the year 1660, all the members of this new foundation were difpersed or broken up, by the failure of their tenants, &c. so that both the foundations, the new as well as the old, petitioned in Chancery to have the fecond fettlement revoked, and the first ratified afresh; in which last decree there was a provision made for a yearly anniversary festival, in memory of their honourable benefactor, as was usual, says the decree, in other Colleges, and eight pounds a year allotted for that festival, and Simon and Jude's day appointed for the keeping of it: And this was partly done because Sir Simon borrowed his name from one of those Saints, but more especially because he himself, who annually cloathed 22 persons, some in one place, some in another, ordered that they should have their cloaths given them upon Simon and Jude's day yearly."(1)

He was at the whole expense of both making and setting up this Statue over the Gate towards the street: It is not certain what year of our Lord this was done in, but the year of its removal, and what it cost, may be given, because it was at the College charge, and was done an. 1686, and cost the College in removing it 3l. 1s. 5d. For Dr. Plot being removed to his own estate in Kent, and Mr. Obad. Walker having procured at his own, or some other Roman Catholic's expense, the Statue of St. Cuthbert, to whom this College Chapel is dedicated, to be placed over the Chapel door, he caused K. Alfred's Statue to be removed from the place it stood in, and to be set over the Hall door. (2) The Statue of K. James II was presented by a Roman Catholic, and placed over the inside of the Gatehouse when Mr. Obad. Walker was Master." (3)



In the year 1766, the infide of this Hall received a confiderable alteration and improvement, by the removal of the fire-place from the centre of the room, which was the usual mode in our Halls; erecting a chimney on the south fide; ceiling the roof; putting up a wainfcot, with a screen at the lower end; and ornamenting the whole in the Gothic stile. The floor also was new paved. The expense, amounting to near \$200l. was defrayed by the generous contribution of the Master and Fellows, and also of many others, who were then, or had been, Members of the Society; most of whose Arms are placed on the wainscot. The chimney-piece, which is an elegant Gothic stone work, was the donation of Sir ROGER NEWDIGATE, Baronet, D. C. L. sometime Fellow Commoner, and one of the Burgesses for the University; whose Arms, impaling his Lady's, are suspended thereon:

This correction we owe to Bishop Kennett's Parochial Antiquit. as also the rectifying of A. Wood's affertion that the advowson of Blechingdon church came into the hands of Hen. III, as an escheat by the forseiture of Richard and William Grenevill. In the year 1228, 12-13 of Hen. III, Sir

Richard de Prescote presented to the church of Blechingdon. (1)

In 1234, which was the 18-19 year of Hen. III, the same Sir Richard Prescote presented to the church of Blechingdon. (2) In 1261, the 25-26 of Edward I, Thomas de Capella was Parson of Blechingdon, and being a Clerk in Chancery was excused his attendance by a letter from the King; (3) and this same year he resigned it: whereupon Hugh Musgrave and Maud his wife presented Richard Musgrave to it, and Nicholas Trimenell and Mabil his wife also presented another person to the living; but on a trial de jure Patronatus, the latter persons withdrew their presentation. (5) In the year 1311, the 4th and 5th of Edward II, there was a trial at law for the patronage of the church of Blechingdon between the King as plaintiss, and Henry de la Wade, John son of John de Croxford, Maud de Musgrave and John de Lou, on the calends of May, and the King recovered his right of presentation; yet on the 13th of the calends of April 1317, Thomas de Musgrave presented a Clerk to the church of Blechingdon, which was then vacant. (6)

By this it clearly appears that the advowson was vested from and before the 12th and 13th of Henry III in the family of Pressecote, and continued with his descendants till the 4th and 5th of Edward II, when it came by lapse to the King, who presented for that turn, and on the decease of the Minister it fell again into the family of Musgrave, (in the 10-11 year of the

Jame King) who presented to the Living.

If this had ever been escheated to Hen. III, it would have continued in possession full to the Crown, and Edward II would have had no need of

The following Account of the FOUNDER is taken from Gough's SEPULCHRAL MONUMENTS in Great Britain, Part I, p. 102; who quotes Burn's HISTORY of Westmoreland, Vol. I, 566—568; and MSS of E. R. Mores.

IN the Treasury of this College is a brass plate, found in the old Chapel, which Mr. Mores ascribes to ROBERT EGLESFELD.

It represents a priest in a cap and rich rochet powdered with sleurs de lis in lozenges, and faced and hemmed with a different border, and fastened on his breast with a jewel. The sleeves of his black gown are faced with fur.

This munificent man was a native of Eglesfeld, a small village in Cumberland, and Chaplain to K. Edward III, who presented him to the Rectory of Burgh in Westmoreland 1332, in the person of Adam de Eglesfeld, his proxy, and he was ordained priest at Carlisse in Lent following. This church was appropriated to the College by Pope Clement VI in 1344. Dr. Todd says he was the son of John Eglesfeld and Beatrix his wife, and he is probably the person who held the manor of Ravenswyke, 1 Edw. III; which he afterwards granted to his College to hold of the King in capite. From the inquisition taken 14 Edw. III, 1341, it should seem he, or some relation of both his names died on or about that year.

The old Liber obitalis of the College dates his death 2 cal. Jun. 1349.

The first mention of his successor in the vicarage is 1369; for we have no other circumstances of his life or death but his most beneficial institution for the emolument chiefly of persons born within the counties of Westmoreland and Cumberland; which counties, above all others, were overrun with ignorance and barbarism, by the perpetual hostilities between the borders on both sides; and which has been productive of infinite advantage, not only to the said two counties, but the kingdom in general, in surnishing many able and learnedmen, both in church and state.

I shall not meddle any farther with the time of his death, than the proofs I shall bring to ascertain the place of his interment will allow; which, though they are not positive evidence, yet will make it appear at least highly probable that he was buried in the Chapel of his own College. They are these:

1. In the computus of Sir John de Hoton, from the 13th of Oct. 1351, to

the 13th of July following, is this article:

Notwithstanding which, some people say that he might have been buried elsewhere, as for instance, at Burgh; to which I reply, that had he been buried at Burgh, or indeed any where but here, this article would not have been placed amongst the expenses of the Chapel, but under the title of expense. for instead.

2. The fecond argument I shall offer is a negative proof of his not being buried but at his own College; for had he been buried any where else, doubtless some of his Fellows would have been present at his funeral; and if so the expenses of their journey would appear among the exepens. forins, of the year; but no such expenses are mentioned.

3. There was formerly a tradition that he was buried here; and that the plate under the communion table in the old Chapel was defigned for him.

This Dr. Shaw has often told me.

4. All the pictures of Robert Eglesfeld are exactly like the effigy reprefented by this plate; they were taken from it, as Dr. Shaw told me."

L. then Moral Philosophy Reader in this College, of whom see more among the King's Professor of Civil Law, and the Principals of New Inn Hall. He printed it at Oxford in 1602, 4to. and dedicated it to Nicholas Bond, D. D. then President. It was reprinted in 1681 in Bates's Vitæ selectorum aliquot virorum, &c. 4to. In the Archives of this College Library there is preserved a MS (No. 227) entitled 'Wainslet's Memoriall, or a true Historiographicall Narration of the Life, and Actes, and Death of that samous Prelate W. of Wainslet, B. of Winchester,' &c. a Poem, written by Peter Heylin in his younger years (first a Demy, afterward Fellow of this College, and D. D.) and dedicated 'to the right worshipful and reverend Mr. Dr. Langton, the most worthy President of Magdalen Colledge.' It has no date; but as it mentions the death of Q. Anne, and yet speaks of K. James as still on the throne, it must have been written between 1619 and 1625. Heylin was born Nov. 29, 1599.

(50)—add The celebrated Stamford Antiquary, Francis Peck, tells a story of Dr. Humphrey out of a Life of Robert Earl of Leicester, 8vo. 1727, to this effect: Queen Elizabeth coming to Oxford in the year 1566, was received at Wolvercote by the Chancellor, Vicechancellor, certain Heads of Houses, and others of the University, who came out to meet her; and one of them having made a speech, 'she then held out her hand to the Orator and Doctors; and as Dr. H. drew near to kifs it, "Mr. Doctor," fays the Queen fmiling, "that loofe gown becomes you mighty well. I wonder your notions should be so narrow." This Humphreys, it seems, was at the head of the Puritan party, and had opposed the Ecclesiastical habits with great warmth.' (DESID. CURIOSA, lib. VII, N. 18: and Q. Eliz. Progresses collected by Nichols.) A copy of Latin Verses by Humphrey is prefixed to the Martyrology of John Fox, who in 1545 had refigned his Fellowship of this College, 'merely, as 'twas thought to prevent expulsion,' says A. Wood. Humphrey however was a learned man, was author of a Life of Bishop Jewell, and several other works. Towards the end of his life he was likewise more conformable. See the ATHENÆ, Vol. I, 231, 241.
- P. 317—on John Harding note—He was Hebrew Professor, in the University.
- and Tutor to the Earl of Clarendon, when a Student in Magdalen Hall. (1bid. F. 280.)
- on John Wilkinson note——In August 1605, when Henry Prince of Wales was matriculated as a Member of this (Magd.) Coll. the King being then at Oxford, this Wilkinson, B. D. and Fellow, had the honour of being nominated his Royal Highness's Tutor; 'I mean that Wilkinson (adds A. Wood, ibid. Vol. I, F. 173.) who most ungratefully sided with the Rebels, that took up arms against the younger brother of the said Prince, King Charles I, of ever blessed memory.'

The figure of Moses is mentioned as being habited 'togâ carolcâ:' and 'Medicus purpuratus' occurs in a few lines after. The fame expressions are to be met with in Mr. Recks's Œdipus Magdalenensis, Explicatio viz. Imaginum, &c. MS in the Archives of the Colege Lionary, written when Dr. Henry Clerk was Prefident, between 1671 and 1187 Thefe figures are executed in a style superior to most works of scalptule of their age; and it is highly probable that they were done from defigns by Holbein. It is certain that there is one figure, profesfedly by Holbein, in the Moriæ Encomium of Erasmus, which is precisely the same in point of attitude and drapery with that which is here supposed to represent a Physician. As for Mr. Reeks's Explication, the substance of which is printed (but not quite accurately) in the Oxford Guide, from the MS above cited; though it may in the main be right, yet in some inflances perhaps it is not fo. Particularly, 'the Dog, the Dragon, and the Deer,' on the East fide, are made to fignify 'Flattery, Envy, and Timidity;' but it feems more probable that thefe three Figures, and perhaps a few of the others, were placed here on an Heraldic account. The collared Grevhound (for the Dog is of that species) is known to have been borne as a Supporter by K. Henry VII, and by K. Henry VIII, in the beginning of his reign; the Dragon was constantly one of the Supporters, and the favourite badge of the Tudor branch, then on the Throne; and the Antelope was that of the House of Lancaster, and particularly of K. Henry VI, the Founder's especial Patron. Now that the beast which Mr. R. calls a Deer is in reality no other than the Antelope of the Heralds, is very evident from the form of its head and horns, and especially from the gilt Coronet with which it is gorged, and the Chain which is reflexed over its back: which furely are no very characteristic emblems of timidity, and which as certainly are the Decorations of the Royal Antelope.

pronounced it to be by the hand of Ludovico Caracci. Most of the Cognoscenti have likewise thought that it came from the Bolognese School. The little figures in the back-ground have puzzled them all. These figures have certainly the appearance of coming from another hand: and it is remarkable that they very nearly resemble some in Guido's Martyrdom of St. Andrew, a samous picture which he painted at Rome in competition with Domenichino. This perhaps is what has induced several judges to suppose the picture a work of that Master. Guido was a pupil of Ludovico.

The whole of the Antechapel a few years fince was adorned with an elegant new Pulpit, Lecturer's Seat, and other feats, and also a new pavement.

A. and Fellow Commoner; and were of French plate, of a very elegant form, after an antique, highly wrought and double gilt, with Sir Bryan's Arms, and a short Inscription on them. They cost 70 Guineas.

His executors accordingly purchased the Manor of Stow (Stow Nine Churches) in Northamptonshire, and other estates there, and at West Wratting in Cambridgeshire, amounting to above 1000% a year, and fettled them, A.D. 1716, agreeably to his will; and moreover erected a fumptuous monument in Stow Church, to his memory, which may be seen in Willis's Surv. of Ely Cath. p. 390. (Bentham's Hist. of Ely Cath. p. 263.)



At the first foundation there were but three besides the Saints and Litany Bells, but by Abbot Leech encreased to the number of feven (ex MS Anonimi Oufney de vitis Abbatum ejusdem penes ep'um Oxon): which, as I find out of an old Rationale (inter vet: Chart: Oufney) fometime belonging to the Church, and which speaks of the office of every bell-in ringing on feveral Festivals and tolling of knells, were christned and called by the names of Hauteclere, Douce, Clement, Austyn, Marie, Gabriel, and John: All which for the most part toward the suppression (being before broken and recast) had gotten new names, which

which by tradition we have thus——Mary and Jesus, Meribus and Lucas, New bell and Thomas, Conger and Goldeston: which Thomas, now commonly called Great Tom of Christ Church, had this inscription not long fince remaining upon it: 'In Thomæ laude refono Bim Bom fine fraude.' It being one of the biggest of their bells, was accounted fix feet in its diameter, which is 18 feet in compass, and therefore reputed to be as big as Edward Bell at Westminster, or Dunstan Bell at Canterbury, spoken of by Bishop Godwin—(Com. de Præsul. Angl. in Cant: et in Vita H. Chichele.) Dr. Tresham, it seems, baptized this bell when 'twas transported to Christ Church (of which place he was Canon) with the name of Mary, for joy (as Dr. Humphreys faith—Vita Juelli, part. iii. f. 81) of Q. Mary's reign; and being about that time Vicechancellor of the University, and hearing it accidentally ring when learned Juell was with him about other business, burst out into these words—'O bellam et suavem harmoniam, O pulchram Mariam, ut sonat musice, ut tinuit melodice, ut placet auribus mirifice'—thus he and so much was the old man delighted with the noise of it, that he promised the Students (Fox in Q. Mary, f. 1648) if they would come to mass, which was then restored in Q. Mary's days, to get the Lady bell at Bampton, of which place he was Vicar, and others added to it, and make it the sweetest ring of bells in England."

The following explanation of the last line has been communicated by Mr. WARTON.

Before the Reformation, it was customary for our Bishops to constitute Suffragan Bishops, who had in many things full episcopal powers: these had their Titles from places in partibus Infidelium, where they could not, and where it never was intended, they should exercise authority. Thus Ep'us Lidensis was from a place under the Patriarch of Jerusalem. Of this Patriarchate, see the Geographia Sacra of Carolus a Sancto Paulo, with L. Holstein's Notes, Amstel. 1703, p. 299. 'Nec tamen, id, &c.' It had 'tres Sedes [Sees] subjects, nimirum, Bethleemitanam, Ebronensem, et Lyddensem.' Ibid. p. 302. Lydda was sometimes called Diospolis, 'quæ Lydda. Ælius 'episcopus Lyddensis intersuit Consilio Nicæno primo.' Ibid. p. 305. See also ibid. ad calc. Parergon. p. 59. 'Patriarchatus Hierosolymitanus habet subse hos Metropolos instra annotatos; et hos Suffraganeos, quorum primus est Lydda, &c.' Again, this Patriarch has 'hos Suffraganeos, Ebronensem, Lidensem, &c.' Ibid. p. 72. And here we have the spelling Lidensis, as on this Foundation stone.

The Ep'us Lidensis is John Holte, Suffragan, under that title, to the Bishop of London. He was successor to T. Bele, who was living about 1520. A. Wood says, 'In that titular See succeeded one John Holt, but whether educated in this University I cannot tell. He lived mostly in the Town of Bury

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Bury St. Edmund in Suffolk; where dying about the 12th of Aug. 1540, was buried in the Church of our bleffed Lady S. Mary there, in our Lady's Isle near to the head of John Holt, Gent.' Ath. Oxon. I. 666. He was employed on this occasion, as living at no great distance from Ipswich. He is thus mentioned in Henr. Wharton's MS List of English Suffragan Bishops, in Lambeth Library: 'Johannes Holte, Ep'us Lyddensis, obiit 1540.'

Our Author no doubt reserved his recital of the ancient sepulchral Monuments in this Church for his intended History of the City of Oxford; but having left nothing relating to them in his MS Collections for that History, which are deposited in his Study at the Ashmolean Museum, the following account of them, and also of the Church, is chiefly taken from Willis's Survey of this Cathedral.

The Church is built in the shape of a Cross, with a Spire Steeple in the middle. The Nave and cross Ailes were raftered under in brackets and pannels like some of our best wrought parochial churches; and the Choir and Ailes on each side all vaulted or arched with stone, by the Cardinal beforementioned: which stone work was brought from Osney Abbey. The length from east to west is only 154 feet, though before the Cardinal pulled down three pillars or arches of the west part, it was 50 feet longer. The length of the cross Aile from north to south, excluding the old Clock house is 102 feet, and including it is about 120. Height of the Roos, in the western part, is 41 feet and a half; and in the Choir part 37 feet and a half. Breadth of the Nave and side Ailes 54 feet; and height of the present Steeple 144 feet. The length of the Choir 80 feet.

The Builders of this Church were chiefly the Priors, who began it in K. Henry the first's reign. The Latin Chapel, dedicated no doubt to the Virgin Mary, was built about the end of K. Henry the third's reign; as the Chapter House seems to have been; and which opens into the east Cloister.

To

To whom the old Gravestones belonged I cannot pretend to ascertain; though I am satisfied, five or six of them that have crosses cut on them, were in memory of ancient Priors, or religious persons of this Convent, and that

others were laid over especial benefactors.

I have met with an old will of Christian, daughter of Ralph Paddy, wife of Jordan Rufus, a benefactress of some lands 1242, who bequeathed her body to be interred here; as did EDMUND de LUDLOW, Rector of Beckley, temp. Edw. III, whose name is yet visible on one of the gravestones. I also find that Nicholas Carent, Dean of Wells, willed anno 1467 his sepulture here; as did likewise Henry Noers and Julian his wife, daughter of Henry Caldre, bequeath their demeasnes at Churchill to this Convent, together with their bodies to be here interred. I have also seen that John Peg-GIE appointed to be buried in St. Mary's Chapel in this Priory Church : And in an account of persons interred here (besides the aforesaid) I find it mentioned, that WILLIAM ASTELL, Burgess of Oxford, BAWDINUS de Partes and his wife, and William de Stratford, who with the confent of Benet or Benedicta his wife, gave Elsfield to this Convent temp. Edv. I; and also John and Richard Hamond, and John de St. Frideswyde's, who lived temp. Edv. III, were all of them buried here. Wherefore that many of the eighteen old Gravestones now lying in that part of the Church. called the Dean and Canons' Ailes (removed thither feveral of them from other parts of the Church) belonged to them I make no question; especially as there are on some of them the very impressions of men and women, and others of fingle men; the largest of which, being seemingly of an Ecclesiastic, I should judge to have belonged to Dean CARENT.

As to the ancient raifed Monuments or Tombs before Queen Elizabeth's

time, these being only five, I shall thus account for them.

The first placed under the great window in the north cross Aile, which had on it the effigies of a person in brass praying, and an inscription at bottom torn off, was, as I am not only fatisfied from the fashion of it, made in King Henry the feventh's time, but almost assured that it was erected in memory of James Souch or Zouch, who died 1503. For in the Prerog. Office, London, I have met with a will dated Od. 16, 1503, and proved Febr. 12 following of the faid Souch; who appoints to be buried under this very window, and a Tomb to be erected over him in the midst of the said window, and for licence to do fo bequeaths 30l. to the Convent to the vaulting or adorning this part of the Church, and 40s. to the Prior for his grave, and as much to the Convent and University to pray for him. (1)

Stowe, in his Hist, of London, p. 48, speaking of the proceedings of the infurgents under Wat Tyler in the reign of King Richard II, says, 'They took in hand to behead all men of law, as well apprentices as utter barristers

(1) This Tomb has an inkhorn and pen- and old justices, with all the jurors of the country whom they might get into their hands. They spared none whom they thought to be learned, especially if they found any to have a pen and inkhorne about him: they pulled off his hood, and all with one voyce crying, Hale him out, and cut off his head.'

The other four ancient Tombs are all between the respective arches, dividing the Divinity or Latin Chapel from the middle north Aile.

The lowest of these is of a man in armour, and is reported to belong to Sir Henry de Bathe, a Justice of the King's Bench; Justiciary of England, temp. Hen. III, 1238, who died 1261. It contains his efficies lying on his tomb, with whiskers, gorget of mail, and helmet pointed, terminating in a nob. (1)

Under his head a Bull's head Gul. and at his feet a Hound couchant Argent, collared: upon his breast 3 Garbs Or. With these Arms about the

The next above him is the effigies of an Ecclesiastic lying on a Tomb, supposed to be one of the Priors of St. Fridelwyde's, and was probably in memory of Prior Philip, who died about 1190, or Guymond the first Prior, by whose care this Convent was re-established an 1111, and the present Church began to be edified. He died about 1149.

At his feet is a Lion, but neither Inscription or Arms. (3)

(1) How could any one conceive the effigy of a man in armour to have been intended for Sir Henry de Bathe, a Justiciary of England. Surely this is the first instance of a Judge being laid in armour on a Tomb. If he had been habited similar to Sir John de Stonare, (Chief Justice of the King's Bench 1330——ob. 1355) whose sigure is on a table tomb in the church of Dorchester, Oxfordshire, there might have been room for such a conjecture; if the Arms had not proved otherwise: but

in this case neither Armour or Arms will admit the report to be true.

The next contains the effigies of the Lady ELIZABETH MONTACUTE, sometime wife to William Baron Montacute, son and heir of Simon de Montacute, ancestor of the Montacutes earls of Salisbury, and high in favour with Edw. II. (1) She afterwards was married to Thomas Lord Furnival, and was daughter of Sir Peter de Montfort of Beldesert Castle in Warwickshire. She died and was buried here in 1353 (27 Edv. III) having founded in this Priory Church of St. Fridefwyde a Chantry for two regular priests, to pray for her foul, her two husbands, and other relations' souls. It was assigned to two fecular priests by the Bishop of Lincoln, 1380, (PAT. Ric. II, P. 3, m. 23:) who were to celebrate near St. Frideswyde's Shrine in the Chapel of the Holy Virgin. For its endowment she gave Stockwell meadow, now belonging to this College, that is, about one half of Christ Church meadow, parted from the northern half, or Frideswyde's meadow, by what was called Sheerlake: (2) (PAT. 19 Edv. III. REGISTR. Priorat. S. Fridesw. MS. f. 293, 294, 295.) On the Tomb lies her statue set in marble with two angels supporting her head, and at her feet a hound couchant. The slab and figure lie a good way back from the ledge of the altar tomb, on whose south front are figures in pairs, and between them shields on which are these Arms:

Argent, three Lozenges in Fess Gules.

Montacute.

These Arms occur three times.

In the middle are two arches siding a larger containing one figure, and on the spandrils the above Arms and also the following:

account of her life and miracles. He died before 1225, but in what year is uncertain. Bishop Tanner and A. Wood (MS. 49——) make him shourish 1180; Bp Kenner (Paroch. Antiq. p. 144) and A. Wood (Annals, an. 1180) 1189. In this diversity of opinions we may suppose the Monument to have been erected to one or other of these Priors in a late period, to which Mr. Lethieullier assigns it, whose drawing is copied in Gough's Mon. of Barking, Essex. Dugdale, (BAR. I, 644) gives her only one son, William, created earl of Salisbury, 2 Edw. III, and buried in the Whitesriars, London, 17 Edw. III. Gough's Mon. Inscript. p. 105.

(2) These two meadows are surrounded by an agreeable walk, lately much improved by plantations judiciously disposed. They are also bounded on the east by the Cherwell, on the south by the river Isis, on the west by a branch of the same river, and on the north by the White Walk, which was made in the beginning of the year 1717, and is a terrace upwards of two surlougs in length and sisty feet wide, shaded on each side by losty elms.

and Bull (the symbols of Mark and Luke) with scrolls, on the latter of which can just be distinguished Lucas &——: the Arms here are gone. Her head dress is of a reticulated pattern, and her sleeves embroidered with Roses and Fleurs de lis alternately in rondeaux.

This Lady Montacute was also a Benefactress to building the Cloisters of this Monastery, and a shield of her Arms, the same that appear on her Tomb, are yet to be seen, among the ramifications of the eastern extremity,

on the vaulting of the eastern pane to the west.

The uppermost or last is the Shrine of St. FRIDESWYDE. This is a neat and elegant structure erected over a Tomb, which had on it the effigies of a man and woman in brass, which are torn off, said to be in memory of Di-

dane and Saffride, the faid St. Fridefwyde's parents.

About the year 730, Didane, a petty king in these parts, is said to have founded a Nunnery here to the honour of St. Mary and All Saints, which confisted of twelve religious Virgins of noble birth, under the government of his own daughter Frideswyde, who being buried here, and afterwards canonized for a Saint, this Monastery in process of time was dedicated to her memory, and called almost always by her name. (In some few of the old Charters temp. Hen. I, it is called 'the Church of the holy Trinity in Oxford,' as Brian Twyne, O-C° p. 115, ex Registro S. Fridiswidæ.) But the Nuns having been dispersed by the Danish wars, this Church came into the possession of secular Canons, and was burnt to the ground A.D. 1004: afterwards it was rebuilt, and better endowed for them by King Ethelred. A certain King, before the Norman conquest, is said to have expelled these Canons, and to have given this Monastery to the Monks of Abbendon, (Capgrave in vita S. Frideswidæ) for some few years, and then to have restored the Canons. This may perhaps account for that in Leland's COLLECT. Vol. III, p. 72, out of the Rochester Chronicle, viz. A. D. 1049, restitutio Canonicorum S. Frideswidæ.'

St. Frydeswyde died Oct. 19, 740, as Cressy tells us; on which day here

was a celebrated fair kept before the gates of this College.

Her Shrine was at first placed in a Chapel on the south side, where it continued for some ages almost forgotten, and defaced by fire and age: but in 1180 (though another says in 1179—Fox's Acts and Mon. Lib. IV, Vol. I, p. 299) it was with great pomp and solemnity in the presence of the King and many of the Nobility translated hither, where, according to the pretences of those times, it worked many miracles. In 1289 this old Shrine being again almost worn out, a new one was prepared, in which her bones were laid by William (De la Corner) Bishop of Sarum, Edmund Earl of Cornwall, &c. And being adored till the dissolution of the religious Houses, it was then, 30 Hen. VIII, amongst others taken down, and all the offerings were conveyed into the King's Treasury; so that the bones left behind were only seigned, which laid there till the beginning of Q. Elizabeth: for we read (Ibid. Vol. II; and Hist. de exhumatione Katherinæ nuper uxoris Petri Martyris,

Martyris, by James Calf hill, D. D. 1562, 8°.) that Peter Martyr's wife, who was burned here 1552, was taken up at the command of the Visitors (1556) and buried in a dunghill, she being then esteemed an heretic: but when Q. Elizabeth came to the crown she was taken up again, and her bones so mixed with St. Frideswyde's, and both buried together, that if it should happen she should hereafter be taken up they should not distinguish her bones from St. Frideswyde's: upon which this epitaph was laid:

'Hic requiescit religio cum superstitione.'

A. Wood was told in 1661, by Barten Holyday, D. D. Archd. of Oxford, that this Monument stood on the north side of the Choir, in the middle between two pillars, where the singing men sit: That it was surrounded with iron rails, with her essigles on it, in the manner of a Votaress, and her head supported by two Angels, &c. That in Dean Duppa's time it was taken away, and in the removing was opened, where they saw a perfect essigles, with many ribbons about it, as also bay leaves and other things. He said afterwards, that the monument so removed was one of those standing in the Divinity Chapel. If so, it cannot be St. Frideswyde's, but Lady Montacute's; for of those that stand, there is not any with the essigles of a woman, but the said Lady's. Probably St. Frideswyde's Monument stood on the north side of the Choir at the upper end, where is some sign of an arch, &c. (1)

At the upper end is a Portrait of Sir Thomas Pope, the Founder; three-quarters length; in a gown of black fattin, faced with luferne spots:

Motto—' Quod tacitum velis nemini dixeris.'

In this College there are five Portraits of him, all of the same dimensions, dress and attitude. A fixth, a most high-finished old portrait, was lately given by the College to the Picture Gallery at Oxford, instead of another now in the Library. One of these six, and the oldest, came to the College 1596— Ex Comp. Anni. Another is mentioned as hanging in the Chapel 1634— Ex Comp. Anni. One of all these which is now in the Hall, was painted by Francis Potter, a curious Mechanic and Mathematician, and a Member of the College, about 1637. Another, mentioned above, was painted in 1665, at the expense of the College, for the Picture Gallery. This is now in the College Library. Another lately purchased, a copy of Holbein, the painter unknown, is in the Burfary. There is a feventh at Tyttenhanger in Hertfordshire. They are all supposed to be copies from a valuable picture by Hans Holbein, in the possession of the Earl of Guildford at Wroxton. It is not, bowever, quite improbable that Holbein might have painted some of the d impofed i supposed copies.—Sir Thomas Pope sate to Hans Holbein, for his picture, in the chamber within the gallery gate-house at Whitehall, designed by Hans Holbein, and lately demolished. Hans Holbein painted many of his pictures in this chamber, which was used by King Henry the eighth as a study or library.' (Warton's Life of Sir T. Pope, 2d edit. 8vo. p. 164, N. m.)

In the Bursary of this College is an old Portrait of Dame ELIZABETH POWLETT, relict of Sir T. Pope, Founder, and afterward wife to Sir Hugh Powlett, Knight of the Garter, &c. painted, as I judge from the drapery and the age of the countenance, about the middle of Q. Elizabeth's reign; by which she appears to be handsome. This picture was in the College at least before 1613. It is mentioned in Comp. Burs. Coll. 1612-13. I have been told that this picture was painted by Sir Antonio More, portrait and history painter to Philip and Mary. Several of his pictures were in the collection of K. Charles the first, and at Sir Philip Sydenham's at Brympton in Somersetshire, a family nearly related to Lady Powlett. More had one hundred ducats for his common portraits. He died in 1575. I rather think this picture is a copy of an original by More.' (Ibid. p. 210, N. f.)

In the Bursary also are half length Portraits of RALPH KETTELL, D. D. President, in a brown furred gown, and of RALPH BATHURST, D. M. Presi-

dent; and also Dean of Wells.

In the centre of the Hall is a brass Column and Pedestal with this Inscription round it:

Parish Church in Oxford—By him had ten sons and five daughters—among the rest John George living in Oct. 1680, aged 76—at which time she reckoned 39 Great Grand children.' Vol. XIV, f. 122. Also in A. Wood's Life, written by him-

felf, and published in 8°. 1772, at Oxford, the Editor gives this Note:

'Mother George was a very ancient Dame, living in Black Boy Lane, which leads from the north end of St. Giles's to Rats and Mice Hill: The perfect use of all her faculties at the age of 120 years, occasioned a great resort of company to her house. It was her custom to thread a very fine needle, without the help of spectacles, and to present it to her guests, who, in return, gave her some gratuity towards her support. In the latter end of her life, she removed into St. Peter's in the Bailey, and died there by an accidental fall which injured her back.'

In the Oxford Almanack for 1730, is an outside view of it. It is known by the two doors in front, a window with three lights, and as many brackets underneath.—Goodwyn attended Cromwell, his friend and patron, on his death bed, and was very consident that he would not die, from a supposed Revelation communicated to him in a prayer, but a few minutes before his death. When he found himself mistaken, he exclaimed, in a subsequent address to God, 'Thou has deceived us, and we were deceived!' (Burnet's Hist. of his own Times, B. I.)

The wainscot appears from its irregularity to have had some removals: probably the apartment was enlarged for the accommodation of his Highness, and afterwards contracted again. The wainscot of all the upper rooms on the north side of the Quadrangle is much more adorned with carved work than that of any room on the east side. Probably these were occupied by the Prince's attendants.
