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PREFACE.

The period covered by this volume is one of peculiar interest, including, as it does, Maryland's transformation from a dependent

Province to a sovereign State.

The determined purpose of the British government to raise a revenue in America, and the violent invasions of liberty contemplated by Townshend's Act, plainly showed the people that they must offer a spirited resistance unless they were resigned to the loss of all political freedom. Resistance by arms was not at first thought of: it was hoped that energetic remonstrance, backed up by a show of resolution, might bring about a change of policy in the mother country. The plan adopted was that of a commercial war. To refuse to import British goods or to buy them if imported, could hardly be called treason; and such a course might enlist on their side the manufacturing and commercial interests of Great Britain, which could not but suffer from the loss of so important a market. But to do this effectually, it must be done by all and in an organised way. Hence non-importation associations were formed in all the colonies, and around these associations the whole spirit of resistance crystallised.

The partial recession of the government when it abandoned the duties laid by Townshend's Act, except that on tea, caused a considerable relaxation of the non-importation policy; but the Boston Port Bill and other violent measures rekindled the alarm and the spirit of resistance. The resolutions of Massachusetts, recommending a return to the strict non-importation system, but gave a voice to feelings that were spreading everywhere. It was seen that something more organic than the associations was necessary; and the people of Baltimore, assembled in a town-meeting held May 31, 1774, recommended that a congress of deputies chosen from each county should assemble in Annapolis, there

to determine on a plan of conduct for the whole Province.

This congress, or Convention as it was called, met for the first time in Annapolis on June 22, 1774, and organized with Matthew Tilghman as chairman. At no time in the history of Maryland did a representative body meet characterised by greater wisdom, truer patriotism, and more lofty unselfishness of purpose. Clearly declaring their real motives and aims, they resolved upon a general system of non-intercourse and appointed deputies to a Congress of all the colonies to insure unity of action.

The General Congress met in Philadelphia in September 1774, and agreed upon a definite plan of action. Public meetings to ratify this policy were held in all the counties of Maryland, committees chosen to carry it out, and delegates elected to a second Convention, which met in November, and before it the deputies to the Congress laid the report of their proceedings. This Convention passed a series of resolutions approving the action of the Congress, and providing more specifically for carrying out the non-importation policy, and especially for the organisation and drill of the militia, and the purchase of arms and ammunition.

It was now seen that the Convention embodied the spirit of resistance, and all matters and measures connected therewith came within the scope of its duties. Otherwise, the civil polity of the Province was unaffected: the courts were still open, the ordinary business of the government went on, and Governor Eden, an amiable and liberal man who was both liked and respected, was not only undisturbed in his office, but treated with undiminished consideration and social regard, notwithstanding all his efforts to dissuade the leading men from a course which he believed ruinous. In his correspondence with the Ministry he endeavored to act the part of a peacemaker, and to represent the conduct and character of the leading Marylanders in the most favorable light (vid. p. 342); and it was probably in consequence of his representations that the British cruisers, in the first year of the war, abstained so markedly from serious injury to Maryland.

The Convention met again in April 1775, and during this session the news arrived of the battle of Lexington. After its adjournment the

battle of Bunker Hill was fought, and open war had begun.

As so large a body as the Convention could not remain continuously in session, it appointed a certain number of its members a standing Executive Committee with the title of Council of Safety, which was the permanent administrative body for all matters and measures connected with the policy of resistance, within the limits provided in its constitution; and it had the power to call together the Convention whenever any matter should arise transcending the Council's authority, or demanding a wider responsibility. It was assisted by a Committee of Observation in each county, who kept the Council constantly advised, and carried out its orders.

There was thus a perfect democratic government existing side by side with the phantom of Proprietary rule; the Convention and the Council representing the people in their sovereign capacity, chosen by them and carrying out their will. Even the deputies to the Congress

were appointed by the Convention.

The next meeting of the Convention was on July 26, 1775. As in Green's published Journals of the Conventions neither the daily proceedings nor the names of members of this session are given, the Journal has here been reproduced in full from the original manuscript, as preliminary to the Journal of the Council of Safety.

The Proprietary government would probably have expired quietly by the return of Eden to England, but for a slight but disturbing incident. A certain Alexander Ross who had been granted a passport to visit (under color of collecting a debt) Lord Dunmore, then on board a British cruiser in the Bay, was arrested in Virginia on his return, and on his person were found letters to the Governor from Lord George Germain, Secretary of State. Copies of these letters were sent to the Council of Safety, who deputed a committee to visit Eden and ask his parole that he would not leave the Province until after the meeting of the Convention. He declined to give any such parole; but in consideration of the courtesy with which he was uniformly treated, he voluntarily assured them that it was his intention to remain until the Convention met; and this assurance was accepted as satisfactory.

But Gen. Charles Lee, commanding the Continental forces in Virginia, on seeing the letters, took a sudden fright, and wrote, not, as he should have done, to the Council of Safety, but to Saml. Purviance, chairman of the Baltimore Committee, sending copies of the letters, and urging him to arrest Eden immediately in his (Lee's) name. Purviance, an ardent patriot, but somewhat hot-headed, sent the copies to Hancock, President of the Congress, and with them an unsigned letter of his own, in which he charged the Council with timorousness and inactivity, and intimated that he would send on his own responsibility a secret expedition to Annapolis to seize the Governor's person. This letter, contrary to the writer's expectation, was read in Congress, and the Maryland deputies, highly indignant, at once notified the Council of Safety.

Congress, too prone, even at that early date, to magnify its powers, passed resolutions that the Council be earnestly requested to seize the person of Eden; and Hancock, in transmitting them, remarked that Congress relied on their zeal and diligence in executing them. The Council was too polite to remind Congress that it was not a Congressional Committee, but briefly replied that they were aware of all the facts, and had taken proper measures.

Purviance, however, determined to take vigorous action on his own account, and without his colleagues' authority ordered a party to go with speed and secrecy to Annapolis, arrest Eden and bring him to Baltimore. News of this plot leaked out, and Purviance was first censured by the Baltimore Committee, then cited before the Council, who examined and reprimanded him, and placed him under bond to appear before the Convention, when he was reprimanded again. They also, indirectly, gave Lee to understand what they thought of his meddling in a Province where he had no authority; and he apologised for his excess of zeal.

Eden left the Province on June 24, and went on board the frigate Fowey, the Council accompanying him to the barge, with every mark of respect; and thus the last phantom of proprietary government vanished.

Several of the colonies were eager that the Congress should take the decisive step of declaring independence; but the deputies from Mary-

land had been forbidden by the Convention to concur in such action without further authority. As this, however, seemed now to be the only possible course, the Council advised that meetings should be held in all the counties to test the sentiment of the people; and this proving to be strongly in favor of the step, the restrictions on the Maryland

delegates were removed by the Convention on June 28.

On July 3, the Convention adopted a Declaration, in which after setting forth, without sonorous generalities or superfluous rhetoric, the nature of their grievances, and their unavailing efforts to obtain redress, they declare that "the King of Great Britain has violated his compact with this people, and they owe no allegiance to him." Thus Maryland ceased to be a Province, and became an independent, self-governed State.

The sources of this volume are as follows:

The original journal of the Convention [C. J.] from which all the proceedings of that body have been taken; a later copy [C. J.*] which has furnished the appended documents Nos. 1-12; and a photographic facsmile of the Associators' engagement (p. 66) from the original at Annapolis.

The original journal of the Council of Safety [C. S. J.]. This is a little defective in some places, but missing words have been supplied

from a later copy.

The original letter-book of the Council [C. S. C.] has been used for all the letters written by the Council. Of these there is a later copy which has been collated. This later book contains also copies of the letters to the Council; but diligent search in the collections of the Historical Society has discovered nearly all the originals, and from these our text has been taken. Where the originals could not be found, the later copy has been used, as the margin indicates.

The original engagement of the Associators, preserved under glass at Annapolis, consists of two pieces, apparently torn apart, and pasted down on card-board. On our p. 67 the order of names and arrangement of columns have been preserved, though not the spacing; and the division of the pieces falls just below the names of Joseph Sim, Thomas

Dorsey, and Charles Ridgely.

On comparing these signatures with the Journal, 29 names will be found to be missing, viz: Philip Richard Fendall of Charles Co.; Alexander Somerville of Calvert; George Lee and Dr Richard Brooke of Prince George's; Thomas Tillard and John Dorsey of Anne Arundel; Walter Tolly, James Gittings, and Charles Ridgely of John, of Baltimore; Charles Beatty, Baker Johnson, Jacob Funk, Samuel Beall, and Wm. Deakins, Jr., of Frederick; Samuel Durham, Saml. Ashmead, John Beall Howard, Francis Holland, Benjamin Rumsey, and James McComas, of Harford; Joseph Gilpin and William Rumsey, of Cecil; Richard Lloyd of Kent; John Wallace and John Brown, of Queen Anne's; Robert Harrison of Dorchester; Benson Stainton of Caroline; Josiah Polk of Somerset; Peter Chaille of Worcester.

Now when we note that amongst these 29 were some of the most active and assiduous members of the Convention, and that 21 of them had, as the Journal shows, no leave of absence, it is impossible to resist the conclusion that a portion of the document has been lost. It will be observed that the arrangement is generally by counties, and the break in the paper comes between Prince George's and Queen Anne's, between Anne Arundel and Dorchester, and between Baltimore and Worcester; a fact which confirms the editor's belief that a piece has fallen out between the upper and lower portions as now joined.



This Convention being informed that a Brig of Christopher Lowndes of Prince George's County, lately cleared out from this Province for Barbadoes, was seised and carried into Boston by some Officer or Officers of His Majestys Ships of War, stationed there; and considering it as a matter of the last importance, that the truth of this fact be enquired into and known; Do recommend it to the General Committee of Observation for Prince George's County, immediately to call before them all witnesses who may have any knowledge of the said Transaction, and also to summon the said Christopher Lowndes to appear before the said Committee, bringing with him all papers relative to the said Vessel, and in particular a Letter said to have been Wrote to him by Henry Lloyd of Boston, concerning the same Vessel; and pass Judgment whether any collusion has been committed or not, and if the said Committee shall adjudge that there has been any collusion, that in such case the person or persons guilty thereof be sent with the Judgment and Evidence to this Convention, or in their Recess to the Council of Safety, hereafter to be appointed (N° 3)

On Motion, Resolved, That the value of £5900, common money be borrowed on the credit of this Convention to be laid out in the purchase of 48 Tons of Lead, one hundred pounds value in Gun-Flints, two Tons of Cannon powder, and the residue of the said sum in Musquetry powder, for the use of

this Province, to be repaid out of the first notes of Credit to be C. J. issued by this Convention.

Resolved, That Robert Townsend Hooe, Thomas Ringgold and James Lloyd Chamberlaine be a Committee to lay out the said money.

Resolved, That the Lenders of the said money when the same shall be lent in Bills of Exchange, be paid by the Treasurer to be appointed, out of the notes of credit to be issued, at such Exchange, not less than at the rate of one hundred & fifty pounds, in Dollars, at seven shillings and sixpence each, for one hundred pounds sterling, as shall be agreed on between the Lenders respectively and the said Treasurer. And if they cannot agree on the Exchange, that then the Treasurer shall with the said Notes of Credit, purchase good London Bills of Exchange payable at same sight as expressed in the Receits given to the respective Lenders, and pay the same to the Lenders, and that the public Treasurer indorse and be answerable, on behalf of the Province for the payment of such Bills of Exchange.

Resolved, That the Bills of Exchange borrowed for the purposes aforesaid, be drawn or endorsed payable to the said Robert Townsend Hooe, Thomas Ringgold and James Lloyd Chamberlaine, or some one of them, and that their or any of their Receipts for the Money or Bills so lent, shall be a sufficient voucher for the Treasurer's payment of the Money advanced.

Resolved, That the said Robert Townsend Hooe, Thomas Ringgold and James Lloyd Chamberlaine, be indemnified for their Indorsements of the said Bills of Exchange, as well as any loss they may sustain by negotiating the said Business, with which they are entrusted, or any expense they may be at therein.

A Letter from the Virginia Convention with a Resolve of said Convention therein enclosed was read and ordered to lie on the Table (N° 4)

Ordered that the said Letter and Resolve be taken into consideration early Tomorrow morning.

The Committee prepared the following Letter, to wit.

In Provincial Convention Annapolis 1st Augt 1775 Gentlemen.

The Resolution of your Convention, That no Flour, wheat, or other grain, or Provisions of any kind should be exported from your Colony, to any part of the World, after the fifth day of August, came to hand by your Express yesterday afternoon. The Delegates from this Province have communicated to this Convention, That the utility & propriety of stopping exports had been fully considered by the Congress, and that they had not thought proper to stop the exports before the tenth day of September. We have received information that the Congress intended to adjourn the beginning of this Week, so that this subject cannot again be brought before them.

This Convention on mature consideration do not see that the advantages to the common cause, by an immediate Stoppage of the Export of provisions, could equal the inconveniences and Distresses of individuals which would certainly be occasioned thereby nor that any Distress could be brought on the common enemy, by our coming into your Resolution without the accession of the Colonies of Pennsylvania and New York, which cannot be brought about sooner than the 10th of September, as the Convention of New York will probably rise about the same time as the Congress; and the Assembly of Pennsylvania hath already adjourned. For these reasons we have unanimously resolved not to prohibit Exports before that Day.

Resolved, that the resolution of this Province "that no person ought to kill Lamb, dropt before the first day of May yearly, or other Sheep, after the first day of January then next, under four years of age" be repealed so far as relates to kill-

c. J. ing of Lamb; but it is earnestly recommended that the Continental Resolve respecting the killing of Sheep be most strictly observed.

M' Gittings and M' Turbutt Wright have leave of absence. It being represented to this Convention that M' William Neale is prosecuting a scheme for importing about two Hundred Barrels of Powder, and that he is willing to dispose of the same to the Public on its arrival, at the Rate of sixteen

pounds common money per Hundred:

Resolved, that on the delivery of 200 Barrels of good Gun powder, or any less quantity, by the said William Neale, he be paid therefore at the said Rate, out of the Bills of Credit to be issued by this Convention: And further that if the said William Neale will import and deliver good and substantial Musquets, Bayonets & accourrements, for arming any number, not exceeding five Hundred Soldiers, then on the delivery of them he shall be paid a generous price therefor, out of the said Bills of Credit.

Resolved That this Convention will replace any arms, or powder or lead that may be delivered to the order of Mess¹⁸ Samuel Purviance Junior, William Smith and David Stewart, or any two of them, by the people of Bermuda; or will pay the just and full value thereof at farthest, as soon as America shall be in a settled State.

Resolved, That if any persons will lend and advance to the Public any sums of money not exceeding in the whole four thousand pounds common money, and will pay the same into the hands of Messⁿ Purviance, Smith & Stewart, to be by them laid out in the purchase and importation of Gunpowder and good substantial musquets, Bayonets, and accourrements for Soldiers for the use of this Province, the Lenders shall be

repaid their money out of the Bills of Credit to be issued, or C. J. if Bills of Exchange shall be lent, then the same shall be repaid in the same manner as the other loans of Bills of Exchange to this Convention.

The Petition of Richard Henderson of Bladensburgh was read the first time and ordered to lie on the Table (N° 8)

Turbutt Wright and Walter Tolley have leave of absence. On reading and considering the Petition of Richard Henderson of Bladensburgh, setting forth his apprehensions, that some people of the neighbourhood of that place, if not advised to the contrary by this Convention may do violence to his person or property, on account of his becoming security for the appearance of George Munro, who hath absconded. It is Resolved, to be the sense of this Convention, that all persons refrain from all manner of violence to the said Richard Henderson and his property, on the occasion before mentioned; And that the Committee of observation for Prince George's County are hereby empowered to determine and certify to this Convention, whether the said Richard Henderson did collude with, or in any manner promote the said George Munro in his said Escape; on which this Convention will take order therein. And this Convention strongly impressed with an idea of the confusion and disorder which must inevitably ensue, and the disunion which must necessarily follow, from the people at large being collected and inflicting punishments before a cool and temperate investigation of the case; and consequently the injury which may be thereby done to the common cause of Liberty, confide, that the Virtue of the people, and their attachment to the liberties of America, will guard them against a commission of the Excess apprehended.

The memorial of James Christie Jun' of Baltimore Town was read; and upon reading the Letter of the said James Christie therein referred to, dated the 22d of February 1775, to Gabriel Christie, Lieutenant Colonel of the 60th Regiment in which the said Christie represented the inhabitants of that Town, as concerned in measures, in his opinion, treasonable and rebellious; and that a number of Soldiers would keep them very quiet; the same was considered by this Convention and thereupon it is Resolved, that the said James Christie, by the said Letter hath manifested a spirit & principle altogether inimical to the Rights and Liberties of America; that the said James Christie by insinuating the necessity of introducing a Military Force into this Province, has manifested an inveterate enmity to the Liberties of this Province in particular, and of British America in general.

Therefore Resolved, that the said James Christie is, and ought to be considered as an enemy to America, and that no person trade, deal or barter with him hereafter unless for necessaries and provisions, or for the sale or purchase of any part of his real or personal Estate, of which he may at this time

be seised or possessed.

Resolved that the said James Christie be Expelled and banished this Province for ever, and that he depart this Province before the first Day of September next.

Resolved, That no punishment be inflicted on the said James Christie other than what is now directed by this Convention.

Resolved, That the said James Christie deposit in the Hands of this Convention, or into the hands of such person or persons as they shall appoint, the sum of five hundred pounds sterling, to be expended occasionally towards his proportion of all Charges and Expenses incurred, or to be incurred, for the defence of America, during the present contest with Great Britain; the overplus, if any, after a Reconciliation shall happily be effected, to be returned to the said James Christie.

Resolved, That the £500 Sterling is to be good in Sterling, or other money at par: That the Resolutions of the Committee of Baltimore County are, by the determinations of this Convention superseded; and that therefore the said James Christie may negotiate his Bills of Exchange, and that he may assign, or he, or any person for him, may collect the debts due to him in the same manner as other persons may negotiate their Bills of Exchange, or assign, or collect their Debts.

Ordered, That the Rules and Regulations established by the Continental Congress for the government of the Continental Army, be published with the proceedings of this Convention (N° 11.)

Ordered, That the Gentlemen appointed to receive monies for the purchase of Arms and Ammunition, return a list thereof

to the Treasurer of each Shore.

Ordered, That the Treasurer of each Shore pay the sums of money advanced, agreeable to such List, to the Residents of their respective Shores.

Ordered, That out of the public Arms in possession of Colonels Joshua Beall, Richard Lloyd, Edward Lloyd, and

Henry Hooper, a quantity of Arms with a proportion of Lead C. J. and Ammunition sufficient for a Company, be by them delivered to such Captain of Minute-Men, as the Council of Safety shall direct.

The Committee appointed to enquire into the practicability of establishing a manufactory of Arms in this Province, and the Expense and best mode to carry the same into Execution, bring in their Report, which was read a first and second time and referred for Consideration to the next Provincial Convention (N° 12.)

The Convention resumed the consideration of the Report which was read on Wednesday last, which was debated by paragraphs, several amendments made and the following parts agreed to.

Resolved unanimously, That the following Association be signed by the Members of this Convention, and by all other the Freemen of this Province (N° 13.)

Association of the Freemen of Maryland 26th July 1775. The long premeditated, and now avowed Design of the British Government, to raise a Revenue from the property of the Colonists without their consent, on the gift, grant and disposition of the Commons of Great Britain, the arbitrary and vindictive statutes passed under colour of punishing a Riot, to subdue by Military force, and by Famine, the Massachusetts Bay; the unlimited power assumed by Parliament to alter the Charter of that Province, and the Constitution of all the Colonies, thereby destroying the essential securities of the Lives, Liberties and properties of the Colonists; the Commencement of hostilities by the Ministerial Forces, and the cruel prosecution of the War against the people of the Massachusetts Bay, followed by General Gage's proclamation, declaring almost the whole of the Inhabitants of the United Colonies, by name, or description, Rebels and Traitors, are sufficient causes to arm a free people in defence of their Liberty, and to justify resistance, no longer dictated by prudence merely, but by necessity, and leave no alternative but base submission or manly opposition to uncontroulable Tyranny. The Congress chose the latter, and for the express purpose of securing & defending the United Colonies and preserving them in Safety, against all attempts to carry the above mentioned Acts into Execution by Force of Arms, Resolved, that the said Colonies be immediately put into a State of Defence, and now supports at the joint expense, an army to restrain the further violence and repel the future attacks of a disappointed and exasperated Enemy.—We therefore, Inhabitants of the Province of Maryland, firmly persuaded that it is necessary and c. J. justifiable to repel Force by Force, do approve of the opposition by arms to the British Troops employed to enforce obedience to the late acts and statutes of the British Parliament, for raising a Revenue in America, and altering and changing the Charter and Constitution of the Massachusetts Bay, and for destroying the essential securities for the Lives, Liberties and properties of the Subjects in the United Colonies.

And We do unite and associate, as one Band & firmly and solemnly engage and pledge ourselves to each other and to America, that we will, to the utmost of our power, promote and support the present opposition, carrying on as well by Arms, as by the Continental Association restraining our Com-

merce.—

And as in these times of Public danger, and until a Reconcilliation with Great Britain on Constitutional Principles is effected (an event, we most ardently wish may soon take place) the energy of Government may be greatly impaired, so that even Zeal unrestrained may be productive of Anarchy & confusion; We do in like manner unite, associate and solemnly engage, in maintenance of good order, and the public peace, to support the civil power in the due execution of the Laws, so far as may be consistent with the present plan of opposition, and to defend with our utmost power all persons from every species of outrage to themselves or their property, and to prevent any punishment, from being inflicted on any offenders, other than such, as shall be adjudged by the Civil Magistrate, the Continental Congress, our Convention, Council of Safety, or Committees of observation.

That the Committees of Observation, in every County, as soon as conveniently may be, appoint persons in each Parish, or Hundred, to offer or carry the said Association to all Freemen resident within their County, (the Household of His Excellency the Governor excepted) and require their subscription to the same, which Associations, when subscribed shall be returned by the Committees to the Convention. And in case any Freeman within their County, shall not subscribe upon application, or within ten days thereafter, his name shall be returned by the said Committee to the next Convention, to the

end that the Convention may take order therein.

Resolved, That there be forty Companies of Minute men enrolled in this Province, as soon as may be, each of which companies to consist of one Captain, two Lieutenants one Ensign, four Sergeants, four Corporals, one Drummer, one Fifer and 68 privates; and that the said forty companies be enrolled in the Counties and proportions following, to wit:

And that for the enrolment of every such Company, a proper person be appointed by the Committee of each respective County, to enlist a sufficient number of men, who shall voluntarily offer themselves to make up the non-commissioned Officers and privates of each of the said Companies, for their respective County, in the enrolment of whom, care shall be had, that the men be strong and effective, and live as convenient may be for their frequent and ready assembling and exercising together.

That the form of the Enrolment of Minute-men be as follows, to wit. "We whose names are subscribed, do hereby

enrol ourselves into a Company of Minute-men for

County, agreeable to the Resolutions of the Provincial Convention held at Annapolis the 26th day of July 1775, to continue such until the first day of March next; and engage that we will respectively march to such places, either in this, or the neighbouring Colonies, and at such times as we shall be commanded by the Convention, or the Council of Safety of this Province, or by our Officers in pursuance of the orders of the said Convention or Council, and that we will respectively fight with, and employ the Arms wherewith we are entrusted, for the preservation of American Liberty, against whomsoever we shall be commanded by such Authority as aforesaid, with our whole power. Witness our hands this

Day of

That each Company as soon as enrolled and viewed and allowed by the Committee of their County, or by such person, or persons as shall be appointed by such Committee for that purpose, shall elect and choose their proper officers by Ballot, who shall be appointed and commissioned by the Delegates of this Province sitting in Convention, or at any time when they are not sitting in Convention by the Council of Safety, in the

name of the Convention.

c. J. That the said Companies in Frederick County compose one Battalion, those in Baltimore and Harford Counties jointly another, and those in Saint Marys, Charles and Prince Georges Counties jointly another; and that to each of the same Batalions, there be one Colonel and Lieutenant Colonel, two Majors, one Quarter Master and one Adjutant, appointed and commissioned as aforesaid, by the Convention or Council of Safety.

That as soon as conveniently may be, after the Officers to the said Battalions on the Western Shore are commissioned, eight men be drafted from every Company of the said Battalions, to compose one Company of Light Infantry to each Battalion; to which Company, the Convention or Council of Safety, shall as aforesaid appoint and Commission, one Captain, two Lieutenants and one Ensign; and the Captain of each Company of Light Infantry may appoint non-commissioned Officers thereto.

That all the Officers of the said Minute-men rank according to their commissions, and the dates or priority thereof.

That the Minute-men be exercised two days in every week, and that for one of those days, each of the non-commissioned Officers and privates be allowed two shillings and sixpence common money.

That each of the said Battalions in Frederick and Baltimore and Harford Counties be exercised in Battalion at such convenient times and places as shall be appointed by the Field Officers of the respective Battalion, every of which times being accounted as one of the two days of exercise, and that the said other Companies of Minute-men exercise with some Battalion of Militia, at the times of their being exercised in Battalion, in their respective County; and as to this purpose, be subject to the commands of the Field Officers of such Battalion.

That until other Arms are provided, the Minute-men exercise with their own Firelocks, but that as soon as others can be provided by the Public, each Colonel have delivered to him, Firelocks, with Steel Ramrods and bayonets, Cartouch boxes, Worms Priming Wires and brushes fitted thereto, and flints sufficient for his Battalion, and he shall deliver to each Captain in his Battalion, sufficient for his Company, who shall deliver and distribute the same to his Company, Receipts of all which deliveries shall be given; the men being answerable to the Captains, the Captains to the Colonels and the Colonels to the Convention, for the Return of the said Arms and accourtements in good order, unless prevented by unavoidable accidents.

That the Companies of Minute-men not so joined in Battalion, be armed and provided, and the Captains and men of those Companies responsible for a return of the public Arms and accoutrements in the same manner as the men of the Battalions C. J. are to be armed and provided, and their Colonels and they are

as aforesaid responsible.

That every able bodied effective Freeman within this Province between Sixteen and fifty years of age, (Clergymen of all denominations, practising physicians, the Household of His Excellency the Governor, Minute and Artillery men, and such persons who from their religious principles cannot bear arms in any case, excepted) as soon as may be, and at farthest before the fifteenth day of September next, shall enrol himself in some Company of Militia, in the following Form to wit, "We whose names are subscribed do hereby enrol ourselves into a Company of Militia, agreeable to the Resolutions of the Provincial Convention held at Annapolis the 26th day of July 1775, and we do promise and engage, that we will respectively march to such places within this Province, and at such times as we shall be commanded by the Convention or the Council of Safety of this Province, or by our Officers in pursuance of the orders of the said Convention or Council; and there, with our whole power fight against whomsoever we shall be commanded by such authority as aforesaid. Witness our Hands day of 1775.

That each Company of Militia consist of such Officers as are recommended by former Resolutions of the Convention, and

of about 68 privates.

That each Company already formed, if it now is, or before the fifteenth day of September next shall be made up to fifty privates or upwards, and shall have subscribed the said form of enrolment, shall confirm their Election of Officers already made, or elect others in their stead, by Ballot, as they shall think proper; and that officers be so chosen for all Companies which shall be hereafter formed, as recommended by the said former Resolves; after which confirmation and Elections, and before the first day of October next, each Captain of Militia shall transmit a Roll of his Company to the Committee of Observation, which shall be appointed for his County, who shall as soon as may be, transmit a memorandum or certificate of the names of the Captain, Lieutenants and Ensign, and of the numbers of non-commissioned Officers and privates, to the Council of Safety, in order that commissions may issue in the name of the Convention, to those Officers, which shall be done by the same convention, or Council of Safety as aforesaid.

That no Company shall exceed the number of 74 Privates, or consist of less than fifty, and if a greater number than 74 shall be enrolled in any one Company, then the Enrolment of any, after the first 68 effective privates, shall be deemed void; and such shall enrol in some other Company; and if a number

c. J. of men shall be enrolled not amounting to fifty privates besides sufficient for non-commissioned Officers for any one Company, they shall not be considered as a Company: yet as the local circumstances of some neighbourhoods, may make it very inconvenient for a full Company of Militia to meet weekly for Exercise, on one and the same place, in such case, the Officers may appoint two places, at each of which, a several part of the Company may be mustered, not oftener than three times out of four, so that every fourth time at least the whole be mustered together.

That no Company be permitted to choose officers before a sufficient number of men be enrolled to make up 50 privates

besides non-commissioned Officers.

That after enrolment in pursuance of these Resolves, no man be permitted to leave the Company in which he shall have been enrolled without the consent of his Captain in

writing.

That the Committee of Observation in each County make diligent enquiry after, and transmit to the Convention, or Council of Safety, the name of every able bodied effective Freeman, as aforesaid in their respective County, if there shall be any such, who shall not enrol himself, either as a Minute, or Artillery man, or in the Militia, according to the preceding Resolves; to the end that the Convention may take order therein; against whom no further proceedings or measures shall be taken, but by the future order of the Convention.

That the Committee of observation for each County shall divide the Militia of their County into Battalions or Companies of Light Infantry, each of which Battalions to consist of such eight Companies of Militia, as the same Committee shall appoint; and the same Committee also assigning to each Battalion one Company of Light Infantry, which Light Infantry, shall be armed in such manner, as the Council of Safety shall direct, and that to each of the said Battalions, there be one Colonel, one Lieutenant-Colonel, two Majors, one Quarter master and one adjutant who shall be appointed and commissioned by the Delegates of this Province sitting in Convention, or at any time when they are not sitting in Convention, by the Council of Safety, in the name of the Convention; which Officers shall rank and martial the Companies of their respective Battalions.

That every Company of Militia be exercised one day in every week, and that every Battalion of Militia be exercised in Battalion, at such times and places as the Field Officers of the Battalion shall appoint; not oftener than once in every month, nor seldomer than once in every two months, the day of exercise in Battalion being accounted as the day of exercise for

that week.

That the Colonel of every Battalion of Minute-men and C. J. Militia, shall employ a skillful and able Adjutant for his Battalion, who shall train and Exercise the Battalion, and the several Companies thereof, according to the directions of the Colonel, and shall receive for a month of thirty days, sixteen dollars; and that the Companies of minute-men not formed in Battalion, as to the purpose of being trained and exercised by the Adjutant, be esteemed as a Company of the Battalion, with which they shall exercise as before directed.

That every Field and Commissioned Officer having no reasonable Excuse shall appear at the Time and place of Muster, and there do and perform his duty according to his Office and Station; and for every neglect or refusal, he shall be fined a sum not exceeding fifteen shillings, common money; to be adjudged, if a Field Officer, by the other Field officers present, or a majority of them; and if a Commissioned Officer, below the rank of a Field Officer, by the Commissioned Officers

present, or a majority of them.

That every non commissioned Officer and private, of the Minute-men and Militia appear at the time and place appointed for their respective appearance for mustering, with his Firelock and other accourrements in good order and then orderly, diligently and obediently to attend to instruction and perform his Exercise in Arms, according to the Commands and orders of his Officers; and if any Minute or Militia-man shall not appear at the time and place of Muster with his Firelock and other accoutrements in good order, having no reasonable excuse, or shall not there, after appearance, behave himself decently, or in a manner, suitable to the attention and care requisite in such Exercise, he shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding five shillings Common money, for every such neglect or misbehaviour; which shall be determined by the Captain, Lieutenants and Ensign, or any two of them either on their own View, or on Representation and proof thereof; and on non-payment shall be committed to the Custody of the Sergeant of his Company, till payment.

That if Complaint shall be made of gross misbehaviour, or Breach of Duty, of any Commissioned Officer, by any Committee of Observation, or any two Commissioned Officers of the Corps or Company to which such Officer, against whom complaint shall be made, doth belong, or by any one Officer of Superior or Equal rank to the Officer Complained against, then the Council of Sasety may appoint a Court Martial, to consist of not less than five, nor more than nine of the Commissioned Officers of the same Corps or County, who or a majority of whom shall hear, try, determine and give Sentence on such Officer, so that the same Sentence extend not further

than to a pecuniary fine, not exceeding Ten pounds common money, or to a public and solemn acknowledgment of the fault of the offending Officer, or to a Suspension or loss of his Military Commission; which sentence being transmitted to and approved by the Council of Safety, shall be accordingly executed.

That all Fines on Officers of inferior Rank to a Field officer and also on non-commissioned Officers and privates shall be to the use of the Company to which such person belongs, and that all fines on Field Officers be to the use of the Battalion to

which they respectively belong.

That if any Company or Corps of Minute-men, or Militia shall be called forth into actual service, the Officers and men respectively, who shall be so called forth, whilst they are in actual service, shall be subject and liable to the Rules and Regulations established by the Continental Congress for the government of the Continental Army, and shall for a month of thirty days, and so pro rato, be entitled to and receive the following pay to wit

That if a sufficient number of men shall enroll to make up a Company of Artillery-men they may choose their proper officers, who shall be commissioned as aforesaid and subject to the same Rules as the Militia.

And Whereas it is absolutely necessary in this Time of imment danger, that there should be some power existing which may superintend the execution of the orders and regulations of the Convention, and occasionally from time to time and necessary preparations for defence, and in case of necessity call forth a due proportion, or even whole of the Force of the Province in an orderly and regu-

lar manner, whereby the strength of the whole will be greatly C. J. increased in the common defence, and the Rights and Liberties of all better secured.

Resolved, That sixteen persons, eight of whom residing on the Western and eight on the Eastern Shore, shall be chosen by Ballot, by this Convention, and be stiled and denominated The Council of Safety of Maryland.

That any nine or more of the said Council of Safety convened, or the Major part of them, direct and regulate the operations of the Minute-men and Militia; and may as aforesaid, grant all Military Commissions, appoint and Commission Field Officers, and appoint and regulate the rank of all Military Officers; and in the recess of the Convention call forth the Minute-men into action in any place or places in this Province, or the neighbouring Colonies; and the Militia into action in any place or places in this Province, at such time and times, in such Proportions and on such occasions, as they may judge necessary, and do all such other matters and things for the securing and strengthening this Province, and for Providing for the defence thereof as they shall deem necessary and expedient, and execute such other powers as may be entrusted to them by the Convention of this Province.

That as at some times, a necessity for taking speedy measures may be so pressing that a delay till the Council of Safety could assemble together, would be highly dangerous, and many things of less moment, may well and more conveniently be transacted by a majority of members residing on the respective Shores; the members residing on either Shore respectively, or the major part of them, or of such of them as shall be in this Province, may not only grant Commissions for Court-Martials, when applied for, and hear, determine and punish high and dangerous Offences according to the Resolutions of this Convention, but may also in case of instant danger, or pressing necessity, call forth the Minute-men or Militia of their respective Shore; yet it is recommended, if time will permit, for the whole Council of Safety, or nine of them, to meet and consult together, that those of either Shore do not separately call forth the Minute-men or Militia; and that if time will not permit such meeting and consultation, then as soon after the separate act done as may be, the whole Council of Safety shall be summoned, and the orders and Resolutions of a majority of any nine, or more of them shall controul or govern; it being the intention of this Convention, that a joint Council, when the same can be held on things of moment, should have the supreme direction.

That any two or more of the said Council of Safety call a meeting of the members on their respective Shore, or of the whole.

c. J. That any officer of the Minute-men or Militia may be suspended from the Exercise of his Commission by the Council of Safety, or that Branch of it residing on the Shore whereon such Officer resides; or if the Council of Safety should think proper, they may upon full hearing displace any Field Officer, and appoint and Commission another in his stead; and that on the death, resignation or Removal of any Commissioned Officer, below the degree of a Field Officer, from his Office, the Council of Safety may appoint and commission another in his stead.

That the Council of Safety or either Branch thereof for Expenses incurred on its respective Shore, may from time to time draw orders on the Treasurer of their respective Shore for the Bills of Credit to be issued by Virtue of the Resolutions of the Convention, who shall accordingly pay such orders.

That the Council of Safety may, in case they shall think it necessary, summon and call the Convention to meet before the

day, to which it may stand adjourned.

That the Council of Safety continue such until the next Convention, and no longer, and that they render an account of their proceedings, and always be subject to the controul of the Convention.

Resolved, in order to prevent an abuse of power from a continuance thereof in the same persons, that at each Convention, eight members of the preceding Council of Safety, four residing on the Eastern and four on the Western Shore, shall be ineligible to the succeeding Council, and that the said eight persons immediately before the choice of the new Council of

Safety be ascertained by Ballot.

That for providing for the defence of this Province, and for encouraging and promoting the manufacture of Salt-petre, erecting of a Powder Mill and the several other purposes directed by this Convention, Resolved, that Bills of Credit of the denomination of Dollars, and parts of a Dollar, to the amount of 266,666 Dollars and two third parts of a Dollar be printed and struck with all convenient speed, under the care and direction of Mess¹⁸ Thomas Hyde and William Wilkins, Supervisors in manner and form following, to wit;

"This Bill of shall entitle the Bearer hereof to receive Gold and Silver at the rate of four shillings and six pence sterling per Dollar, for the said Bill according to a Resolve of the Provincial Convention of Maryland, held at the

City of Annapolis on the 26th day of July 1775."

That the said Bills shall have such devices and marks as the said Supervisors shall think proper, and the numbers of the said Bills as well as the denominations thereof, shall be the following and no other, to wit, Seven thousand and ninety six Bills of Sixteen Dollars each, Seven thousand and ninety six C. J. Bills of eight Dollars each, Seven thousand and ninety six Bills of four Dollars each; Seven thousand and ninety six Bills of Two Dollars and two thirds of a Dollar each; Ten thousand five hundred and twelve Bills of one Dollar and two thirds of a Dollar each; Ten thousand five hundred and twelve Bills of one Dollar each; Ten thousand five hundred and twelve Bills of one Dollar each, and Ten thousand five hundred and twelve Bills of two thirds of a Dollar each.

That the Supervisors shall use the best of their care and diligence that the said Bills according to their respective denominations aforesaid, and according to the manner and form aforesaid, be forthwith printed, and that the number of any of the Denominations thereof be not exceeded, or any clandestine or fraudulent practice used by the Printer, his apprentices, servants or others concerned in printing thereof.

That the Printer and all his apprentices and servants, which he may employ in the said work, before he or they enter upon the same, take before some Justice of the peace, in the presence of one or both of the Supervisors, the following Oath to wit: "I A. B. do swear that I will truly, faithfully and honestly perform the duty of Printer of the Bills of Credit, directed to be printed by a Resolve of the Convention of Maryland, and that I will not advisedly print, or Stamp a greater number of blank Bills of Credit than in that Resolve mentioned; or of any other denominations than therein expressed, except such sheets as may be so blotted, unfair, or imperfect in the impressing or printing thereof, that the same shall be unfit for use. So help me God"

That the Printer shall not by himself, servants or any other person by him Employed, print, stamp, stitch or bind the said Bills or any of them, but in the presence of one or both of the said Supervisors; and in every intermission of the work, the Supervisors shall safely and securely lock up the Press and Stamps, with which the work shall be performed, and the impressions that shall be then made, in the Room in which the Printing and Binding shall be done, and the Keys of such Room shall keep in their possession; and when all the said Bills shall be Printed and Stamped, the Stamps shall be delivered by the Printer to the said Supervisors, and by them to the Convention of this Province, or in their recess to the Council of Safety.

That Charles Wallace, Joseph Davidson, Nathan Hammond, Richard Tootell, James Brice, John Brice, Thomas Brooke Hodgkin, John Duckett, Robert Lloyd Nicols, Samuel Sharpe, Richard Tilghman Jun¹ James Hindman, Peregrine Tilghman,

c. J. William Perry, Jeremiah Banning and Joseph Bruff, be Signers of the said Bills.

That the said Supervisors, as soon as the said Bills shall be printed, stamped, stitched, and bound, shall deliver three fourth parts thereof in Value to the Treasurer of the Western Shore, and the other fourth part thereof, in Value to the Treasurer of the Eastern Shore, and the said Treasurers shall deliver out to the signers residing on their respective Shore, sufficient of the said Bills, to be immediately numbered and signed by them, not only for payment of the money immediately demanded from them respectively, but also to the Amount of 3000 Dollars over and beyond the same; and each of the same Bills shall be signed and numbered by some two of the said Signers, and returned again to the respective Treasurer, and so from time to time shall the said Bills be delivered out, signed, numbered and returned; either of the said Treasurers not keeping by him at any one time ready numbered and signed, more than 3000 Dollars beyond the said monies now payable.

That Receipts of every Delivery of the said Bills before and after the numbering and signing the same be given by the

Treasurers and Signers.

That Thomas Harwood Junior be Treasurer for the Western, and William Hindman Treasurer for the Eastern Shore, who shall from time to time, out of the said Bills of Credit pay off and discharge all such Draughts and orders as shall be made by order of this Convention, or the Council of Safety, or either Branch thereof as aforesaid.

That the Treasurer of the Western Shore, out of the Bills of Credit, pay to each of the Supervisors two Dollars and two thirds of a Dollar for each day's attendance as aforesaid, to the Engraver of the said Bills, one hundred and ninety two Dollars for his services, and to the Printer four hundred Dollars for his Services, and the Paper, Ink and other materials necessary for the said work. And the said Treasurers shall also respectively pay to each signer of every thousand of the said Bills, one Dollar and one third part of a Dollar for his Service.

That each of the said Treasurers shall retain for his services, at the Rate of one half per cent, on all monies by him paid

and delivered, and no more.

That the said Treasurer of the Western Shore shall give Bond in the penalty of Twelve thousand pounds sterling, and the Treasurer of the Eastern Shore shall also give Bond in the penalty of four thousand pounds sterling, both of which Bonds shall be with sufficient securities, to be approved of by any two of the Obligees in the said Bonds, and payable to the Honble Matthew Tilghman and Daniel of St Thomas Jenifer Esquires, and Charles Carroll of Carrollton and Edward Lloyd Esquires, conditioned for such Treasurer's faithful discharge of his Trust.

That he will keep a just and true account of all Bills of C. J. Credit and monies which he shall receive or pay; and of the names of those to whom the same shall be paid or delivered, and that he will render a true and perfect account of all payments by him made, to the Convention of Maryland, or the Council of Safety, or any other persons, by a Convention of this Province appointed to examine his accounts, and that he will be answerable for all Bills of Credit and monies which he may receive and pay, all orders drawn by the Convention or Council of Safety, or the Branch thereof residing on his Shore.

That torn and defaced Bills shall be Exchanged at reason-

able and convenient times

That the said Bills of Credit shall be redeemed and sunk on or before the first day of January 1786 by Taxes, or other Legislative provision.

That this Convention bind their Constituents and pledge the faith of this Province for the Redemption of the said Bills, on

or before the said first day of January 1786.

Resolved, That the Freeholders of each County in this Province and other Freemen having a visible Estate of forty pounds sterling, or qualified by law to vote for Burgesses, do on the second Tuesday of September next meet together at the Court houses of their respective Counties (except as hereinafter excepted) and do there under the inspection of their respective Delegates in this present Convention, or any three or more of them, to whom it is recommended, to attend for that purpose by a majority of the voices of such of the said Electors as shall be present elect of the most discreet and sensible of those, who are qualified as afd to vote, a Committee of Observation for each County respectively, for the term of one year then next following, to consist of the following numbers that is to say, for Saint Marys County, twenty four; for Charles County thirty two; for Calvert County fifteen; for Prince Georges County, thirty three, for Anne Arundel County, thirty four, for Frederick County fifty three; for Baltimore County thirty seven; for Harford County, eighteen; for Worcester County, twenty one; for Somerset County, twenty one, for Dorchester County nineteen; for Caroline County fourteen; for Talbot County sixteen; for Queen Anns County twenty one; for Kent County, twenty two, for Cæcil County, sixteen, and that from and after such Election the Committees of Observation in being at and immediately before such Election, in each County respectively, be and are hereby declared to be dis-

That the Committees so to be Elected, or a majority of any seven or more of them met together, shall have full power and authority to carry into execution the Association and Resolves c. J. of the Conventional Congress and Conventions of this Province, so far as the same shall relate to the commercial opposition to the measures of the British Ministry, in which the United Colonies are engaged, and to censure any person, or persons, who within their respective Counties shall be by them adjudged to have been guilty of any breach or breaches thereof, in such manner and degree as hath been or shall be directed by the said Congress and Conventions. And shall further have full power and authority on probable proof that any person has been guilty of any high and dangerous offence tending to disunite the Inhabitants of this Province in their present opposition, or to destroy the Liberties of America, to cause such person to be apprehended & forthwith sent together with the charge against him, to the Council of Safety, on that Shore, where the Offence shall be committed, who shall proceed to examine into the charge, and if the same shall be sufficiently proved, pronounce sentence thereon, that such person be imprisoned in such place and manner, and for such time as shall be adjudged, not beyond the rising of the next Convention who, if they think proper may take further order therein; or that he depart this Province within a certain time, to be limited.

That all persons pay obedience to and acquiesce in the determinations of such Committees of Observation and Council of Safety, and that no person whatsoever, other than the said Committees and Council presume to inflict any punishment for any such breaches or offence. And on the same day, or the next, to which the said Delegates are empowered to adjourn, the said Electors also choose by Ballot, five of the most discreet and sensible of such Freemen as aforesaid, of their County to be Delegates for the same, in any Provincial Convention to be held for this Province within one year then next following, with full power and Authority to such Delegates or any three or more of them, to appear and act for such County, in such Convention; and to consent and agree to, and bind such County to perform and execute all such matters and things, as such Convention, or a majority of the Counties of this Province shall determine to be necessary for the preservation of the Liberties of America.

And in case any of the said Delegates shall die or refuse to act, the said Committee of Observation for the respective County shall have power to appoint by Ballot, one of the said Committee to be a Delegate for the said County, with the like power and authority, in the place of any such Delegate, who shall die or refuse to act; provided that no such appointment shall be made unless two third parts of such Committee shall be present.

That each Committee of Observation shall as soon as con- c. j. veniently may be, after their appointment, choose by Ballot, five of their members to be a Committee of Correspondence for their County, for the said Term of one year, with power to any two or more of them, to act as such.

That as the Small pox is now at Queen's Town, and it will in all probability be dangerous to the Inhabitants of Queen Ann's County, to assemble there for Electing the Committee of Observation and Delegates for that County; the election of the Committee of Observation and Delegates for the said County shall be held at the house of George Hanson, instead

of the Court house of that County.

That for the ease and convenience of the people of Frederick County, there be three different places of Election; that the said County be divided into three Districts, to wit; Upper, middle and lower; the upper District to be bounded by the South Mountain, and the lines of the County westward of the South Mountain. The middle District to be bounded from the mouth of Monocacy with Potowmack to the South Mountain, with that Mountain to the temporary Line, with the lines of the County to the head waters of Patuxent, and with the lines of the lower District to Potowmack; The lower District to be bounded with Potowmack to the mouth of Monocacy, then with Monocacy to Bennett's Creek, and with the Creek to the head waters of Patuxent; that there be elected in the lower district one Delegate, two persons to act as a Committee of Correspondence and seventeen as a Committee of Observation; that in each of the other districts there be elected two delegates and eighteen persons to act as a Committee of Observation, and that three persons be elected in the Middle district to act as a Committee of Correspondence. That the elections for the Upper district be held at Elizabeth Town; those for the Middle district at Frederick Town; and those for the lower district at Hungerford's; and that no person residing or voting in one shall be admitted to vote in either of the other districts.

Resolved, That for encouraging the manufacture of Saltpetre, a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds common money be advanced, on proper security, for erecting one or more Salt-petre works, to be repaid in good merchantable Salt-petre at the Rates hereinafter mentioned; and that for all good merchantable Salt-petre, manufactured in this Province, and delivered to the order of the Council of Safety before the first day of October 1776, there shall be allowed at the Rate of half a Dollar per pound, according to the Resolves of the Continental Congress.

That a Sum not exceeding one thousand pounds common

c. J. money be appropriated for erecting and working a powder mill on the account of this Province; and that the said two sums of one thousand pounds each, be under the management

of the Council of Safety.

Resolved, That the Committee of Observation in each County appoint one or more person, or persons in their respective County, to receive all sums of money, which shall be voluntarily given to be applied towards the arming and defending this Province, or towards erecting Manufactories of any kind, or for the immediate relief of such of the inhabitants of this Province, as are or may become necessitous, from the present general Calamities; which persons shall give Receipts for the money by them respectively received, and keep and return accounts thereof to the Treasurer of their respective Shore, specifying and distinguishing from whom the same shall have been received, and if any, what part thereof shall have been given for either of the said purposes, particularly. And the said money shall be paid to the said Treasurer, and may be applied and laid out by the Council of Safety or that part of it residing on each Shore respectively for the purposes before mentioned, having regard in the application, to the intention of the Donors, and promoting the subsistence of the necessitous, rather by erecting Manufactories, and the Employment of such as labour therein, or in work of any kind, than by immediate Gifts, it being the opinion of this Convention, that such Charities may be rendered much more extensively beneficial, by having the same placed under a general direc-

Resolved, That the Council of Safety contract for, purchase and provide 5000 stand of Arms, including those ordered and contracted for by this Convention, giving a preference as far as they can to those manufactured in the Country, and also purchase and provide nine small brass field pieces, and carriages therefor.

And that the Council of Safety may also on proper security, and terms they approve of, advance a Sum not exceeding one thousand pounds common money, for erecting and carry-

ing on one or more Salt-Works in this Province.

Resolved, That the Committee of Observation in each County, as soon as may be, transmit to the Branch of the Council of Safety for their respective Shore, a particular account of all arms and Ammunition purchased in their County pursuant to the Resolves of the Convention in December last, and of all sums of money subscribed and actually paid in or contributed, and by whom, for the purchase of the said Arms and Ammunition. And that each Branch of the Council of Safety, order the Treasurer of their Shore, to pay to such

person as shall be appointed by each of the said Committees C. J. on their respective Shore, the amount of the money so paid in and actually expended in the purposes aforesaid, before the transmitting of such account, that the same as well as all other money paid in, not expended as aforesaid, may be returned to the Subscribers contributors thereof.

Resolved, That the Honourable Matthew Tilghman and John Beale Bordley Esquires, and Robert Goldsborough, James Hollyday, Richard Lloyd, Edward Lloyd, Thomas Smyth, and Henry Hooper Esquires, residents of the Eastern Shore, and the Honorable Daniel of S^t Thomas Jenifer Esquire, and Thomas Johnson Jun^t, William Paca, Charles Carroll, Barrister, Thomas Stone, Samuel Chase, Robert Alexander and Charles Carroll of Carrollton Esquires, residents of the Western Shore, or any nine of them, be a Council of Safety for this Province.

That every member of the Council of Safety before he enters on the execution of his Office, having subscribed the Association take before some Justice of the Peace the following Oath to wit: "You A. B. do swear, that any matter or thing, which shall come to your knowledge as a member of the Council of Safety, and which you shall know, is by a majority of the Council ordered to be kept secret, you will not divulge unless in a Convention of Delegates, or to the members of the Council of Safety, or with the leave of the Convention, or a majority of the Council of Safety. So help you God."

And that the Clerk of the Council of Safety, or of either of the said Branches thereof shall before he enters on the Execution of his Office, before some Justice of the peace, take an oath in the same Form; except, instead of the words "as a Member of the Council of Safety" inserting, "as Clerk of the Council of Safety" or "as Clerk of the Eastern or Western Shore Branch of the Council of Safety," as the case may be

The Convention resumed the consideration of the Report relative to the shutting of the Courts of Justice, which after debates thereon, was recommitted for Amendments, and the following parts of it were agreed to.

Resolved, That in all suits and actions, now depending or commenced within this Province, where there is no real dispute, the Suitors and Attornies proceed with all convenient Speed to settle the same by Judgment, Reference, or other Amicable way; and that all suits and actions now depending or commenced (where there are real disputes, and which cannot be settled in an amicable manner, or tried with justice to the parties) ought to stand and remain during these times of Public Calamity, in their present State and Condition; or be continued until otherwise ordered by Act of Assembly, or some

c. J. future Convention—save and except, only that bail may surrender their principals, in their own discharge and for want of other bail that the principal may be committed; and that hereafter proper provision ought to be made by Act of Assembly for reinstating, re-establishing and prosecuting the business of the Courts, and for barring the act for the Limitation of suits.

Resolved, That in all suits and actions now depending or commenced the Depositions of any witness or witnesses taken before two Justices of any County Court, or one of the Justices of the Provincial Court of this Province, in presence of the adverse party to him that requires such depositions to be taken, if upon due notice, he thinks fit to be present, or upon notice doth refuse to be present (the notice being proved) ought to be received as good evidence in any of the Courts of this Province, as if such evidence were personally present upon the Tryal, and should declare the same, viva voce; provided such witness or witnesses cannot be had at the Trial of the cause in which such depositions shall be taken.

Resolved, That no civil original writ, suit or action, shall be commenced or renewed in any Court of Law, or any Magistrate's warrant of a civil nature issued within this Province, after publication and due notice of this Resolve, unless in the following cases to wit. Actions founded in the wrong done to the person or property; such as Ejectment, Trespass, Trover, Replevin, Detinue; also all real Actions, also actions for wards, and for money or Tobacco actually had & received by one person for the use of another: Attachments under the late Acts of Assembly, and against persons non resident; actions, or process on Loan Office Bonds; without the license or permission of the Committee of Observation of the County, where the debtors and defendants reside, which shall or may be granted in the Instances and manner hereinafter mentioned & not otherwise.

That the said Committees respectively do upon application, give license for bringing or prosecuting suits in the following cases; that is to say; where debtors refuse to renew their obligations, or other securities; or to give reasonable security; or to liquidate and settle their accounts, and give Promissory notes for the ballances; or to refer their disputes, if any, to one or more indifferent persons, or are justly suspected of intention to leave the Province, or defraud their Creditors; and that the said Committees may, in their discretion, grant Licenses in the following cases to wit, for the bringing actions by and against Executors and Administrators, as such, and their Securities, and for the bringing actions against Guardians for the recovery of filial portions, or the Rents and profits of Orphans' Estates.

Resolved, That no execution shall issue upon any Judgment C. J. obtained in the Provincial Court after April Term last, or in the County Courts after the last March adjourned Courts, without such License as aforesaid, save only in the cases above specified, or where the original Actions shall be brought by License from the Committee of Observation.

Resolved, That the Committees of Observation now in being in each County, and the Committees of Frederick County in their respective Districts, meet as soon as they conveniently can, after publication and due notice of these Resolves, and that the Committees hereafter to be chosen meet as soon as they conveniently can, at the Court house, or some other place agreed upon by themselves, and appoint by Ballot, seven of their number to be a Committee for licensing suits, which said Committees shall meet on the first and third Mondays in every month, for the purpose of receiving applications, and give notice of the place where they intend to meet.

Resolved, That [it] is earnestly recommended by this Convention to all the Inhabitants of this Province, to make payment without compulsion, where they are able or give security as above mentioned, and particularly that they pay the public taxes, and interest money due in the Loan Office, it being the design of this Convention to prevent oppression and imprisonment of poor Debtors, but not to give any pretence of non payment to those who are of sufficient ability to pay their just debts

It appearing to this Convention that a person arrested by the Sheriff of Baltimore County, and in his Custody for debt, had been rescued by some disorderly people in that County, and that the Riot had been suppressed and the Prisoner so rescued, had been restored to the custody of the said Sheriff by the intervention and activity of Captains Buchanan and Gist, and the Companies under their command; and this Convention being fully impressed with the necessity, that the Civil power in the ordinary administration of Justice should be supported: It is Resolved, That this Convention do highly approve of the conduct of the said Captains and their companies, in the suppression of the said Riot, and support of the Civil Authority. And that this Resolve be communicated to said Captains and their companies by the Delegates of Baltimore County in this Convention.

Resolved that the late Committee of Observation for Cecil County be authorised to act as usual, until the second Tuesday of September next.

Doubts having arisen in this Province respecting the construction of the Continental Association, whether merchandise or other commodities taken on Board Craft or in any manner

C. J. water-borne before the 10th Day of September next, may not be considered as exported within the 4th Article of the Continental Association, altho' the said Merchandize or Commodities be not before that time taken on board the Ship or Vessel which shall export the same, Resolved, that where any such Merchandize or other Commodity whatsoever is or shall before the same 10th. day of September be laden on board the Ship or Vessel that shall actually export the same, such loading on board shall be deemed a sufficient exportation within the spirit and intention of said Article and not otherwise.

Resolved, That the Honorable Matthew Tilghman Esq^r and Thomas Johnson Jun^r Robert Goldsborough, William Paca, Samuel Chase, Thomas Stone and John Hall Esq^{rs} or any three or more of them, be Deputies to represent this Province in Continental Congress, and that they or any three or more of them, have full and ample power to consent and agree to all measures, which such Congress shall deem necessary and effectual to obtain a redress of American grievances; and further we do authorise our said Deputies to represent and act for this Province, in any Continental Congress which may

be held before the 25th day of March next.

Ordered that the Treasurer of the Western Shore pay to Thomas Johnson Jun^r Samuel Chase, William Paca, John Hall and Thomas Stone Esquires, or either of them, the sum of five hundred pounds common money, and that the Treasurer of the Eastern Shore pay to the Honorable Matthew Tilghman and Robert Goldsborough Esquires, or either of them, the sum of two hundred pounds, common money, to defray the expenses of their Deputation, to the next Continental Congress.

attended: the following Questions were ask'd him.

Quest 1st Whether the Brigg Harriott Capt. Will^m Scott Master clear'd out in May 1775 by Mr Lowndes out of this Province for Barbadoes, was seiz'd and carried to Boston by some Officer, or Officers of his Majestyes Ships of War there stationed.

Anser. She was not taken nor carried to Boston.

Quest. 2^d Whether M^r Lowndes ever receiv'd any Letter from Henry Loyd of Boston respecting the said Brigg Harriott or Cargo.

Anser. He never received any.

M^r Lowndes produced the following evidence in his defence.

Letters to M^r Lowndes from his Correspondants in Barbadoes, Dated July 1st 13th & 14th from Philip Lytcott & Comp^{ny}, were produced, from which it appears that 19 barrels of flour 2545 bushels of Corn 397 bars of iron, 20 barrels of Pork, 20 barrels of Herring, 19.865 Shingles and 2718 Staves were landed for M^r Lowndes, acco^t.

A Letter from M' Biddle of Philadel was produced by M' Tho Richardson of Geo: Town dated 31st July saying that Cap' Scott was arrived at Barbadoes, and that the Bread Ship'd by M' Richardson on board the Brigg Harriott was sold.

By the above Evidence & the deposition of John Tolson who was a Passenger on board the Brigg Harriott to & from

Barbadoes, it appears clear to this Committee, that there is not C. J.² the least foundation for the charge of collusion, propogated against M² Lowndes.

M' Lowndes prays these proceeding with M' Tolson's deposition at large may be publish'd in the Maryland Gazette for

his Vindication to the Public.

It is the opinion of this Committee that these proceedings be publish'd as soon as possible.

In consequence of its being recommended by the Provincial Convention to the General Committee of Observation for the County aforesaid to call all evidences before them who may be expected can give the proper information respecting a Report that prevails of Mr Christopher Lowndes having cleared out a Brigg from this Province for Barbadoes with Provisions that were thrown into the hands of some of the Officers of his Majestys Ships of War for the purpose of supplying the Army under the command of General Gage, this Committee summoned before them Mr John Tolson aged sixteen years & of good Reputation who being sworn on the Holy Evangels of Almighty God before Luke Marbury one of the Right Honble the Lord Proprietarys Justices of the peace for Prince Georges County, Deposeth and sayeth, that on or about the twentieth

c. J. day of May last he sailed from Alexandria on Board the Brigg Harriott Captain William Scott belonging to the said Christopher Lowndes, and that he went passenger on board of her to the Island of Barbadoes, where she discharged her cargo and that to his the said Deponents knowledge she did not discharge or dispose of any part of it till she arrived in the Road of Barbadoes, and that no part of the said Cargo was put into the hands of any Officer of His Majestys Ships of War for the purpose of supplying them, or the Army under the command of General Gage.

This Deponent likewise sayeth that in Hampton Road, on their way out they were boarded by some people who said they belonged to a Vessel of War who took one of the Hands from

the said Brigg, and this Deponent sayeth no more.

Petition of A. Campbell & W. Lilburn.

To the Honourable Provincial Convention.

The petition of Archibald Campbell, and William Lilburn

humbly sheweth.

That your Petitioners have undesignedly fallen under the censure of the Committee of S^t Marys County for a supposed breach of the Resolves of the late Provincial Convention; which censure they apprehend was grounded on a misconception of the Letter and spirit of the prescribed Regulations, and therefore beg leave to submit the same together with a copy of the proceedings of the aforesaid Committee to the consideration of the Honorable Convention.

They beg leave to represent that for a considerable time past they have been engaged in Mercantile transactions, the first as Factor for John Glassford and Company, and the other for James Buchanan and Company at their respective Stores on Potowmack River, which concerns have chiefly related to vending of Goods for Tobacco, and Shipping the same to their Principals in Great Britain; that many Persons have constantly dealt at their several Stores on Credit, and have been

c. J. supplied with such commodities as they imported for Sale; in return for which they have received Tobacco payments, and applied the same in loading such Vessels as were consigned to them by their Constituents. They further represent that in this Commercial intercourse their usual customers have always relied on them to supply their exigencies, and that Justice and Gratitude prompted them not to abuse the confidence reposed in them by disposing of their Effects to others, in prejudice of those with whom they constantly traded. That their conduct in this respect is not singular, but conformable to the general practice of these who are engaged in similar traffick, cannot be denied, and they are induced to think that on mature consideration it cannot be deemed an infraction of those Resolves which they are anxious to observe, but justifiable on every principle of reason & justice.

Your Petitioners shew, that in the present scarcity of British manufacture, they had not any greater quantity of coarse linens, than was sufficient for the use of those, who for the reasons suggested, they were bound to supply; and that the said Archibald Campbell had engaged all the osnabrigs remaining in his store, to the different customers who frequented it. From hence it will appear, that he could not consistant either with his express or implied contracts, furnish Mr Ruder with the articles he requested, the refusal of which is a

ground for the late Complaint against him.

Your Petitioner Archibald Campbell also sheweth that he had received advice of a Vessell intended to be consigned to him, and which shortly after arrived, to be laden with Tobacco; That he had no other means of procuring her Cargo, than by the sale of Goods to those who usually supplied him with that commodity. If therefore he was compellable to receive Cash for his merchandise, the Vessel must have returned without her freight, to the great injury and expense of his Employer: Add to this as an obvious consequence of such compulsion, that any Rival in trade with a command of Cash might buy up the goods of others, and thereby gain an undue advantage in this branch of Commerce. It may not be improper further to remark, that in the course of retail dealings, it is necessary to keep an assortment of merchandise, and that an uncontrouled liberty to the purchaser & an obligation on the Seller, to permit him to select all the saleable articles in a store, would be promoting the Interest of one at the ruin of the other; nor can a charge of partiality or oppression be with justice alleged against a merchant, who is desirous of preferring those who resort to him for general supplies, to him whose application is casual for a scarce and necessary article.

Your Petitioners further shew that they have endeavoured

to pay due deference to such regulations as were thought ^{C.} J.² necessary for the public Interest and have contributed with cheerfulness to the general service; they therefore feel with the most poignant concern their late (and flatter themselves) unmerited proscription.

They have however the consolation to declare, that if they have erred, it was without consciousness of guilt, and hope integrity of intention may not be imputed to them as wilful disobedience. On this subject the discernment of their present Judges renders prolixity of argument unnecessary, and to their

decision they submit with respectful acquiesence.

On what particular part of the Sixth Resolve the Committee have thought proper to ground their sentence is not certainly known; if conjecture is indulged the following words may be supposed to comprise the accusation, "that no merchant or other person ought to ingross any goods, wares or merchandise whatsoever." As laws should admonish before they condemn, it is difficult to conceive with what propriety this restrictive Rule could be applied to the case in question. Ingressing is a legal Idea, an unjust accumulation of property, with an intent to sell it again which by enhancing the price tends to the public injury. If the acquisition is lawful, one constituent part of the Offence is wanting, and the term in the Resolve is not properly applicable. To say that the word may have an extensive import to comprehend what is not expressed would be to confound language, and entrap the unwary. With submission permit us to observe that we ought not in these instances to substitute artificial for real conviction and thereby give footing to a Code of polity which may hereafter be turned to the destruction of that manly Freedom for which we are now contending. Who can be safe if we resort to subtle and criminal construction as the Glossary of common Life.

Your Petitioners therefore humbly pray that the proceedings of the committee may be re-considered. If they have erred let concessions deprecate Resentment, it is however hoped that rectitude of intention will shield them from imputed guilt.

At a meeting of the General Committee for the County of S' Marys held at the Court House in Leonard Town, on Tuesday the Eighteenth day of July Anno Domini seventeen hundred & Seventy five

M^r John Reeder (Jun^r) in the Chair.

Among other were the following proceedings (to wit) On complaint made by Doctor Henry Reeder, against M^r Archibald Campbell, Factor for John Glassford Esquire & Company, at their Store in Leonard Town for refusing him goods for ready money. And at the same time declaring, that he would not sell his goods for cash but for Tobacco only.

c. J. Resolved that M^r Archibald Campbell be required immediately to attend this Committee, to answer unto the matter

wherewith charged.

Whereupon M^r Archibald Campbell appearing, Doctor Henry Reeder, was, by and in the presence of the said Archibald examined relative to the complaint as aforesaid made. Who proved the fact as alleged to the general satisfaction of the Committee. Who thereupon proceed (after having first heard what M^r Campbell had to offer in his defence) to take into their consideration, the tendency of such a proceedure, which upon being fully debated, duly weighed & maturely considered was almost unanimously judged to be a manifest violation of the sixth Resolve of the Provincial Convention held at Annapolis by adjournment on the eighth day of December Seventeen hundred and seventy four.

And therefore Resolved for ourselves & Constituents, that no Gentleman of the Law, from this time forward ought to bring or prosecute any suit for any debt due to the Store of Jn° Glassford Esquire & Company at Leonard Town of which the said Factor Mr Archibald Campbell has the management.

Resolved also that the proceedings against the said Archibald Campbell, be published in the Maryland Gazette to the intent, that all persons concerned may have due notice thereof.

At the same time upon complaint made by Capt. George Cooke against M' William Lilburn Factor for M' James Buchanan & Company at their Store at St. Inegoes warehouse for acting in a similar manner, which the said William Lilburn here present admits to be true.

Resolved that the said Lilburn has violated the aforesaid Resolve, and that he also be published in the Maryland

Gazette, to the intent as aforesaid.

At a special meeting of the Committee at the Court House on Tuesday the 13th July at 4 o'clock P. M. present M^r William Smith in the Chair, and twenty eight members.

A Letter from James Christie Junior Merch' of this Town directed to Lieu Colo Gabriel Christie of his Majesties 60th Regiment at Antigua having been intercepted was laid before the Committee and ordered to be read, which was accordingly done, and the following Paragraphs are part of its contents.

"Baltimore February 22nd 1775 We are in such terrible con- C. J.² fusion here with our Politicks, here is no depending on any thing, and that added to other things makes me wish myself out of the Province.

We are little behind the New Englanders, Mustering, Pur-

chasing Arms, Ammunition &c

We have some violent Fanatical Spirits among us, who do every thing in their power to run things to the utmost extremity, and they are gone so far that we moderate people are under a necessity of uniting for our own defence after being threatened with expulsion, loss of life &c for not acceeding to what we deem treason and Rebellion."

The Prevost and Family are very well. Our Publick Affairs vex him, and he wishes himself away, but I know not when, or if ever that will happen. A part of yours or any other Regi-

ment I believe would keep us very quiet."

The Committee then summoned M'Christie to attend them, but being confined to his Bed he was unable to do it. They then sent Mess¹³ James Calhoun, William Buchanan, Tho³ Harrison, Tho³ Jones, Will¹¹ Goodwin and Isaac Vanbibber to wait on him at his house, and enquire whether the said Letter was wrote by him. The Gentlemen return and report, that M'Christie had been shewn the Letter, and acknowedged that it was wrote by him, but requested that any further proceedings thereon might be postponed, until his health would permit his personal attendance.

The Committee not thinking it proper to comply with his request, as M^r Christie had confessed he wrote the Letter immediately give him notice thereof. Upon which M^r Robert Christie attended on his behalf, but it growing late and many of the members being with drawn, the Committee directed a Guard of 9 men under the command of an Officer to be placed round M^r Christies House, and then adjourned till tomorrow

morning at 9 o'Clock.

Friday 14th July 1775.

The Committee met according to adjournment, present

M^r W^m Smith Chairman and thirty two members.

They resumed the business of yesterday. M'Robert Christie Jun' attended and declared that M' James Christie was very sorry for the Letter he had wrote Lieutenant Colo Christie, that he did not mean any harm by it, and that he was very willing to acquiesce in the determination of the Committee. On motion, Resolved that D' Jno Boyde, and M' John McLure (Members of the Committee) do wait on M' Christie and enquire of him who those moderate people were that united for their defence as mentioned in his Letter, and that they

C. J. take his answer in writing. The Gentlemen returned and Report that Mr Christie declared there never was any association between him and his friends for the purpose alluded to, or for any other purpose, and all that he remembers to have past on the occasion was, that some time last Winter he was informed, that he with some of his friends were to be made a publick example of, for not uniting with the Town in the present opposition, and this being spoken of accidentally among two or three of his friends, it was proposed, whether our association for mutual defence would be adviseable but no determination being then made, and they soon after being convinced that no threats worth notice had been thrown out against them, the matter dropt and was never afterwards thought of or attempted and that it was at this time of doubt and apprehension that he had wrote the Letter in question which accounts for that part of it alluded to in the Enquiry. The Committee proceeded to take Mr Christies conduct with respect to said Letter into further and deliberate consideration, and were unanimously of opinion, that by representing in said Letter the people of this Town, to be concerned in Treasonable and Rebellious practices, and that a number of Soldiers would keep them quiet, he has manifested a spirit and principle altogether inimical to the Rights, Privileges and Liberties of America. They do therefore think it their duty to advertise the said James Christie Junior as an enemy to this Country, and all persons are desired to break off all connection and intercourse with him.

The Committee further Resolve, that as the Crime of which the said James Christie is guilty is of so dangerous and atrocious a nature, they will lay the same before their Delegates at the Continental Congress for their advice, and in the mean time, it is ordered that as M' Christie is confined to his Bed and cannot be removed with safety to a place of security, the same guard be continued at his House to prevent any escape attempted either by himself or the Assistance of his friends, and that M' Christie pay each man five shillings for each twenty four hours, and the Officer seven shillings & sixpence.

A Report having been circulated that a number of Arms and a quantity of ammunition were secretly lodged in the House of M^r James Christie, and the same being mentioned in the Committee, they directed two of their members, Capt. Clopper and M^r James Cox to go immediately and search M^r Christies House which they accordingly did, and reported that they had examined the House attentively in every part attended by M^r Robert Christie Junior, and that they only found two Guns and a Pair of Pistols and no ammunition, and were convinced no others were in the House.

The following Letter was laid before the Committee.

"Sir. July 21. 1775.

I am now a little better, and the Doctor is of opinion, that fresh air and moderate exercise would contribute much to restoring my health. I have to entreat of you to represent this to the Committee and to request of them for me that if they think proper I may have my liberty for the above purpose on my giving such security as the committee may require for my appearance before them when required.

On considering the premises the Committee refer the determination to a fuller committee on Monday next, and in the mean time that M' Christie may be permitted to ride out attended by his guard.

At a meeting of the Committee 24 July 1775. Mr Sam' Purviance in the Chair. 40 members.

M' Robert Christie appeared in behalf of M' James Christie and requested that his Guard might be dismist on security being given to the satisfaction of the Committee for his appearance before the Committee or Provincial Convention when thereunto required, and that he would not depart the Province without their permission. Which being debated it was resolved to accept five Securities by a majority of 21 to 14, and accordingly the following security was entered into and signed.

The Committee being informed by Capt. Henry Downes, that he having been advised, that a certain John Williams had endeavoured to dissuade sundry persons enrolled in his Company from mustering, and had made use of many expressions which highly reflected on the Americans for having taken up arms in defence of their rights and privileges, which had induced him, assisted by many of the Sons of Liberty to take the said Williams on the 16th day of June last, and carry him to Tuckahoe Bridge, but after some enquiries had been made by the people then present, they judged it most expedient to refer Williams to the Committee of Observation for a discussion of his conduct, and the first Wednesday of August was fixed for a meeting of the Committee for that purpose, agreeable to which appointment the said Williams now appears.

Patrick Hart and James Walker being both duly sworne do C. J.² depose and declare that John Williams did censure them both for mustering and said they took up Arms against their King, and were Fools.

And it further appears to this Committee that when Companies were first formed agreeable to the Recommendation of the Provincial Convention, that the said Williams joined a certain John Cooper in forming a Company to act in opposition to said recommendation, and after Cooper had renounced those principles & resigned his post in said Company, he the said Williams did persist and endeavour to keep up said Company, and now declares that he never will exercise on the principles now adopted for the preservation of our Constitutional Rights.

Resolved, that he be kept by the Sheriff of this County, assisted by a Guard of a Sergeant & six men, in the Goal, until otherwise ordered, by the Provincial Convention or this Committee.

Resolved, that M^r Thomas Hardcastle be appointed to go to Annapolis and present a copy of this days proceedings to the Provincial Convention now sitting, and there beg their instructions in writing to this Committee respecting the above named John Williams.

To the Honourable Convention at Annapolis.

The Petition of Richard Henderson of Bladensburgh humbly sheweth.

That your Petitioner being in great hazard of his Person & property: thro' the means of another begs leave to lay before you the following facts, which are substantially true; altho' from the confusion usually thrown upon the mind in time of extreme and unexpected danger, they may not be in every minute point, fully related.

On Monday last the 31st of July, being for the day commanding Officer of the Bladensburgh Company, a letter from Colo Joshua Beall, was put into my hands to be read to the Company. Our Company was not full, wherefore I put the Letter into my pocket, intending to wait the coming of more men. But the Company being impatient I opened it, and to my astonishment found that it contained an intercepted Letter, written by a youth who assisted at my Store, expressing the strangest sentiments.

I called for the Clerk to read it, but he being absent, I was forced to read it.

c. J.' The Company then proposed to put the youth, whose name is George Munro, under arrest, unless some person would be answerable for his appearance before the Committee on the next day. I refused to be answerable, so he had sentries placed on him, but afterwards he being sick & it seeming to be the wish of the Company that I should become answerable,

I complied.

On Tuesday morning I saw him, & he expressed no apprehension about appearing before the Committee, and therefore, at the beating to Arms, I joined the Company, & never afterwards saw him being with the Company constantly till near evening, when I was sent for by the Committee & asked to bring Mr Munro, I went, but about noon a great number of men with loaded Arms having come to Town & declared their determination to Tar & Feather him, & having brought an old, lean, sore backed, dull horse, whereon to set him & drum him thro. the Town, whatever might be the sentiments of the Committee. The youth was struck with an agony of fear, and rode off. It must have been the fright, which induced him to go, for he had an opportunity in the night.

When it was found that he had gone, the people out of doors, having beset the Committee, became outrageous, and at last after I had done all in my power, with the utmost difficulty they allowed the Committee to grant me till Monday next to produce M' Munro. I had before this sent two active men, appointed by the people, after him, at my expense, and there are two men gone since to whom I pay a Dollar a day

each, pay their expenses and find horses

Notwithstanding all this, & that I made oath that I fully expected he would not have gone away before attending the Committee, the private animosity of some men, renders my property insecure & brings my family into the utmost terror. Jasper Wirt who built the house in which I have peaceably lived for these ten years has endeavoured to get people to join him in pulling it down, Alledging that when I drew the articles of agreement which he & I interchangeably signed & sealed, I read those parts only which I thought fit & passed over other parts, thereby deceiving him. Every part of which allegation I have already offered to Capt. Andrew Bealls Company to prove, and can at any time prove by authentic papers, to be utterly false.

At the request of your Petitioner the Committee have appointed Monday next to determine what course of conduct should be pursued, however there is reason to fear, from the temper & disposition of many who were present at the late examination that the attempts of the Committee to preserve peace & good order will prove ineffectual, unless this Conven-

tion will take the matter under their consideration and mani- C. J.² fest the impropriety and injustice of inflicting punishment on a person, no other wise culpable than by being incapable of producing the absconded party, whose flight was occasioned by a breach of that good order which was by a former Convention enjoined

M^r Hoggan asked him what the people would meet for, to which Jasper answered that he had not yet forgot the building of M^r Henderson's house.

To the Honourable the Delegates of the Freemen of the Province of Maryland in Convention now assembled.

The Memorial of James Christie Jun' of Baltimore County, Sheweth.

That your Memorialist did on the 22^d day of February last, write the Letter, a Copy of which is hereunto annexed to his friend and Cousin German Lieu^t Colonel Christie in the Island of Antigua. That at the time of writing the said letter, your Memorialist unfortunately could not approve, of the measures then pursued in this Province, as a Petition from the Honble Continental Congress, was then lying at the Foot of the Throne of Great Britain, the result of which was not at that time known in America.

That the said Letter having been intercepted by means to your memorialist altogether unknown, was on the 13th July instant, laid before the Committee of Baltimore County, who came to such Resolutions on the same, as will appear to this Convention, by Copy of the proceedings hereunto annexed. That in pursuance of the said Resolutions, your Memorialist has already suffered a painful imprisonment, and hath paid to the Guard appointed by the Committee, the Sum of Thirty

c. J. one Pounds Seventeen Shillings & Six pence Current money, as will appear by the Receipt for the same ready to be

produced.

That by a Subsequent Resolution of the said Committee, on the 24th instant the said Guard was discharged, on the application of your memorialist for that purpose, upon your memorialist giving an obligation with five securitys not to depart the Province without leave of the said Committee or this Convention, and your memorialist presuming with all deference, to say, that the Letter in question, the contents of which has excited so much uneasiness in the minds of the good people of this Province, could not be productive of any ill effect being wrote by a private individual to his friend and relative, a person who had not the power, if he had the inclination, and who from regard to his own private interest and from the Tyes of Blood (his Wife, Family and fortune being in this Country) cannot be supposed to be active in devising measures to crush the Libertys thereof, and in the most solemn manner your memorialist averrs, that he never harbourd a wish to introduce a Military Force into this Province for the purpose of enslaving the Inhabitants thereof, and your memorialist begs leave to add that he is extremely sorry that his private opinion should have given any offence he was far from intending any, he considered himself as writing to a friend in confidence, and had no expectation or wish that such private opinions would ever appear in publick, or be productive of any publick measures whatever.

That the said Committee having referred all further proceedings on your memorialist's case to the Gentlemen, delegated by this Province to the Continental Congress, and they having referred the same to the consideration of this Convention obliges your Memorialist to make this application, humbly to request that this Honble Convention will consider your memorialists' case, and discharge your memorialist and his securitys from the said obligation, and also grant permission to your memorialist to depart the Province with all conveni-

ence, without molestation in person or property.

Your Memorialist relying upon the Wisdom and humanity of this Honble Convention most chearfully submits his case to

their decision. Humbly praying,

That the blessings of Peace and Tranquility, may be restored to every part of the British Empire, that the Rights and Privileges of America may be established on a firm and lasting Basis, and a speedy and honourable reconciliation take place between the Parent State, and her Colonies, is the sincere wish of your memorialist

Gentlemen,

We are jointly with Mr William Russell and Mr Daniel Bowly of Baltimore Town Owners of the Brig Nancy, Capt. Lund; Sometime in the month of May last we chartered this Brig to Mess^{rs} Wallace Davidson & Johnson to load with Tobacco in Potowmack, for London. She is now loaded and ready to clear out on her intended voyage; but she having lain longer by a considerable time than was expected, in collecting her cargo, and the season having been remarkably dry the worms have injured her bottom to such a degree as to render her unfit to proceed to Sea: and before she can do so her Cargo must be relanded and her bottom sheathed. Work of this kind cannot be done where she lays. We must have her up to Baltimore. Under these circumstances, the work being tedious, we are apprehensive the Vessel cannot be finished previous to the 10th of September. It is our wish to make Rules formed for the benefit of the Community, our line of Conduct, nor would we, we assure you Gentlemen, under any specious pretences, endeavour to infringe them. Our situation is a very peculiar one. We beg you will take it into consideration, and allow us, if not in our power to do it before to reload the above Cargo after the 10th of September. The Vessel & cargo shall be cleared out before. To obviate every suspicion that may arise of intentions to counteract the general Resolves, we desire to be sworn as to the fitness, and condition of the Vessel to take in her Cargo at the time of her going from Baltimore to Potowmack.

We know the arduous business in which you are now engaged Gentlemen must take up much of your attention; We are sorry to be an interruption to it, but hope our situation will be a sufficient apology, as well as farther excuse us, in desiring your speedy directions in this business. The condition of the Vessel being such as to render some immediate Steps necessary to be taken with her.

Rules and Articles, for the better Government of the Troops raised, or to be raised, and kept in pay, by and at the joint expence, of the Twelve United English Colonies of North America.

In General Congress of the United Colonies, held at Philadelphia, on the 10th day of May 1775

c. J. Whereas his Majesty's most faithful subjects in these Colonies are reduced to a dangerous and critical situation, by the attempts of the British Ministry, to carry into execution by force of arms several unconstitutional and oppressive Acts of the British Parliament for laying taxes in America, to enforce the collection of these Taxes, and for altering and changing the constitution and internal police of some of these Colonies, in violation of the natural and civil rights of the Colonies.

And whereas hostilities have been actually commenced in the Massachusetts Bay, by the British troops under the command of General Gage, and the lives of a number of the inhabitants of that Colony destroyed: The Town of Boston not only having been long occupied as a Garrisoned Town, in an Enemys Country, but the inhabitants thereof treated with a severity and cruelty not to be justified even towards declared enemies. And whereas large reinforcements have been ordered, and are soon expected, for the declared purpose of compelling these Colonies to submit to the operation of the said Acts, which hath rendered it necessary and an indispensable duty, for the express purpose of securing and defending these Colonies, and preserving them in Safety against all attempts to carry the said Acts into execution. That an armed force be raised sufficient to defeat such hostile designs, and preserve and defend, the lives, liberties and immunities of the Colonists, for the due regulating and well ordering of which— Resolved, That the following Rules and Orders be attended to and observed by such forces as are or may hereafter be raised for the purpose aforesaid.

Article 1. That every Officer who shall be retained, and every Soldier who shall serve in the Continental Army, shall at the time of his acceptance of his commission or inlistment, subscribe these rules and regulations, and that the Officers and Soldiers already of that Army, shall also as soon as may be, subscribe the same, from the time of which subscription every Officer and Soldier shall be bound by these regulations. But if any of the Officers or Soldiers, now of the said Army do not subscribe these rules and regulations, then they may be retained in the said Army, subject to the rules and regulations under which they entered into the service, or be discharged from the Service at the option of the Commander in Chief.

Art. 2. It is earnestly recommended to all Officers and Soldiers diligently to attend divine Service; and all Officers and Soldiers who shall behave indecently or irreverently at any place of divine worship, shall if Commissioned Officers, be brought before a Court Martial, there to be publickly and severely reprimanded by the President; if non-commissioned Officers or Soldiers, every person so offending, shall for his

first Offence, forfeit one sixth of a Dollar to be deducted out of C. J.³ his next pay; for the second Offence he shall not only forfeit a like sum, but be confined for twenty four hours; and for every like Offence shall suffer and pay in like manner, which money so forfeited shall be applied to the sick soldiers of the Troop or Company to which the Offender belongs.

Art. 3. Whatsoever non commissioned Officer, or Soldier shall use any profane oath or execration, shall incur the penalties expressed in the Second Article; and if a non-commissioned Officer be thus guilty of profane cursing or swearing, he shall forfeit and pay for each and every such Offence, the

sum of four shillings lawful money.

Art. 4. Any Officer or Soldier who shall behave himself with contempt or disrespect towards the General or Generals, or Commander in Chief of the Continental forces, or shall speak false words, tending to his, or their hurt, or dishonour, shall be punished according to the nature of his Offence, by the judgment of a general Court Martial.

Art. 5. Any Officer or Soldier who shall begin, excite, cause or join in any Mutiny or sedition in the Regiment, Troop or Company to which he belongs, or in any other regiment, troop or company of the Continental forces, either by land or sea, or in any party, post, detachment or guard, on any pretence whatsoever, shall suffer such punishment as by a General Court Martial shall be ordered.

Art. 6. Any Officer, non commissioned Officer or Soldier, who being present at any mutiny or sedition, does not use his utmost endeavours to suppress the same, or coming to the knowledge of any mutiny, or intended mutiny, does not, without delay, give information thereof, to the Commanding Officer, shall be punished by order of a general Court Martial according to the nature of his Offence.

Art. 7. Any Officer or Soldier who shall strike his superior Officer, or draw or offer to draw or shall lift up any weapon, or offer any violence against him, being in the execution of his Office, on any pretence whatsoever, or shall disobey any lawful commands of his superior Officer, shall suffer such punishment, as shall according to the nature of his Offence, be ordered by the sentence of a General Court Martial.

Art. 8. Any non commissioned Officer or Soldier who shall desert, or without leave of his Commanding Officer absent himself from the Troop or Company to which he belongs, or from any detatchment of the same, shall upon being convicted thereof be punished according to the nature of his Offence, at the discretion of a general Court Martial.

Art. 9. Whatsoever Officer or Soldier shall be convicted of having advised or persuaded any other Officer or Soldier to

C. J. desert shall suffer such punishment as shall be ordered by the sentence of a General Court Martial.

Art. 10. All Officers of what condition soever shall have power to part and quell all quarrels, frays and disorders, though the persons concerned should belong to another Regiment, troop, or Company: And either order Officers to be arrested, or non commissioned Officers or Soldiers to be confined or imprisoned till their proper superior Officers should be acquainted therewith; and who ever shall refuse to obey such Officer (though of an inferior rank) or shall draw his sword upon him, shall be punished at the discretion of a General Court Martial.

Art. 11. No Officer or Soldier shall use any reproachful or provoking speeches or gestures to another; nor shall presume to send a challenge to any person to fight a duel; and whoever shall knowingly and willingly suffer any person whatsoever to go forth to fight a duel, or shall second, promote or carry any challenge, shall be deemed as a principal; And whatsoever Officer or Soldier shall upbraid another for refusing a challenge, shall also be considered as a Challenger; and all such Offenders, in any of these or such like cases, shall be punished at the discretion of a General Court Martial.

Art. 12. Every Officer commanding in quarters, or on a march, shall keep good order, and to the utmost of his power, redress all such abuses, or disorders which may be committed by any Officer or Soldier under his Command; if upon any complaint made to him of Officers or Soldiers beating, or otherwise ill treating any person, or of committing any kind of Riot to the disquieting of the Inhabitants of this Continent; he the said Commander, who shall refuse, or omit to see justice done on the Offender or Offenders, and reparation made to the party or parties injured as far as the Offenders wages shall enable him or them, shall upon due proof thereof, be punished as ordered by a general Court Martial, in such manner as if he himself had committed the crimes or disorders complained of.

Art. 13. If any Officer should think himself to be wronged by his Colonel, or the commanding Officer of the Regiment, and shall upon due application made to him, be refused to be redressed, he may complain to the General or Commander in Chief of the Continental forces in order to obtain justice, who is hereby required to examine into said complaint and see that justice be done.

Art. 14. If any inferior Officer or Soldier shall think himself wronged by his Captain or other Officer commanding the troops or Company to which he belongs, he is to complain thereof to the Commanding Officer of the Regiment, who is

hereby required to summon a Regimental Court Martial for C. J.² the doing justice to the complainant, from which Regimental Court Martial, either party may, if he thinks himself still aggrieved, appeal to a general Court Martial; but if upon a second hearing, the appeal shall appear to be vexatious and groundless, the person so appealing shall be punished at the discretion of the General Court Martial.

Art. 15. Whatsoever non commissioned Officer or Soldier, shall be convicted at a Regimental Court Martial, of having sold, or designedly, or through neglect, wasted the ammunition, arms or provisions, or other Military Stores, delivered out to him, to be employed in the service of this Continent, shall, if an Officer be reduced to a private centinal; and if a private Soldier, shall suffer such punishment as shall be ordered by a regimental Court Martial.

Art. 16. All non-commissioned Officers and soldiers who shall be found one mile from the Camp, without leave in writing from their commanding Officer shall suffer such punishment as shall be inflicted on him or them by the sentence of

a regimental Court martial.

Art. 17. No Officer or Soldier shall lie out of his quarters, or camp, without leave from the Commanding Officer of the regiment, upon penalty of being punished according to the nature of his Offence by order of a regimental Court martial.

Art. 18. Every non commissioned Officer and Soldier shall retire to his quarters, or tent at the beating of the retreat; in default of which he shall be punished according to the nature

of his Offence, by order of the Commanding Officer.

Art. 19. No Officer, non commissioned Officer or Soldier shall fail of repairing, at the time fixed, to the place of parade or exercise, or other rendezvous appointed by the commanding Officer, if not prevented by sickness, or some other evident necessity; or shall go from the said place of rendezvous, or from his guard, without leave from his commanding Officer before he shall be regularly dismissed or relieved, on penalty of being punished according to the nature of his Offence, by the sentence of a regimental Court Martial.

Art. 20. Whatsoever commissioned Officer shall be found drunk on his guard, party or other duty, under Arms, shall be cashiered for it: any non commissioned Officer or Soldier so offending, shall suffer such punishment as shall be ordered by

the sentence of a regimental Court Martial.

Art. 21. Whatsoever centinel shall be found sleeping upon his post, or shall leave it before he shall be regularly relieved, shall suffer such punishment as shall be ordered by the sentence of a general Court martial.

Art. 22. Any person belonging to the Continental Army,

c. J. who by discharging of fire arms beating of drums, or by any other means whatsoever, shall occasion false alarms, in Camp or quarters, shall suffer such punishment as shall be ordered by the sentence of a general Court martial.

Art. 23. Any Officer or Soldier who shall without urgent necessity, or without leave of his superior Officer, quit his platoon or division, shall be punished according to the nature of his offence, by the sentence of a regimental Court martial.

- Art. 24. No officer or soldier shall do any violence, or offer any insult or abuse to any person who shall bring provisions or other necessaries to the Camp or quarters of the Continental Army; Any officer or Soldier so offending shall, upon complaint being made to the Commanding Officer, suffer such punishment as shall be ordered by a regimental Court martial.
- Art. 25. Whatsoever Officer or Soldier shall shamefully abandon any post committed to his charge or shall speak words inducing others to do the like in time of an engagement shall suffer death immediately.
- Art. 26. Any person belonging to the Continental Army, who shall make known the Watch word to any person who is not entitled to receive it, according to the rules and discipline of War, or shall presume to give a parole or watch word different from what he received shall suffer death, or such other punishment as shall be ordered by the sentence of a general Court martial.
- Art. 27. Whosoever belonging to the Continental Army shall relieve the enemy with money, victuals, or ammunition, or shall knowingly harbour or protect an enemy shall suffer such punishment as by a general Court martial shall be ordered.
- Art. 28. Whosoever belonging to the Continental Army, shall be convicted of holding correspondence with or of giving intelligence to the enemy, either directly or indirectly, shall suffer such punishment, as by a general Court martial shall be ordered.
- Art. 29. All public stores taken in the Enemys Camp or Magazines, whether of Artillery, Ammunition, clothing or provisions, shall be secured for the use of the United Colonies.
- Art. 30. If any Officer or Soldier shall leave his Post or Colours in time of an engagement, to go in search of plunder, he shall upon being convicted thereof before a general Court Martial suffer such punishment, as by said Court martial shall be ordered.
- Art. 31. If any Commander of any Post, intrenchment, or fortress shall be compelled by the Officers or Soldiers under his command to give it up to the enemy, or to abandon it, the

commissioned Officer, non commissioned Officers or Soldiers C. J.² who shall be convicted of having so offended, shall suffer death or such other punishment as may be inflicted upon them by the sentence of a general court martial.

Art. 32. All sutlers and retailers to a camp, and all persons whatsoever serving with the Continental Army in the field, though not enlisted Soldiers, are to be subject to the Articles,

rules and regulations of the Continental Army.

Art. 33. No general Court Martial shall consist of a less number than thirteen, none of which shall be under the degree of a Commissioned Officer. And the president shall be a field Officer: And the president of each and every Court Martial whether general or regimental shall have power to administer an oath to every witness, in order to the trial of Offenders: And the members of all Courts martial shall be duly sworn by the President; And the next in rank on the Court martial shall administer the oath to the President.

Art. 34. The members both of general and regimental Courts martial, shall, when belonging to different corps, take the same rank which they hold in the Army, but when Courts martial shall be composed of Officers of one corps, they shall take their ranks according to their commissions by which they are mustered in said Corps.

Art. 35. All the members of a Court martial are to behave with calmness, decensy and impartiality, and in giving of their votes, are to begin with the youngest or lowest in commission.

Art. 36. No field Officer shall be tried by any person under the degree of a Captain, nor shall any proceedings or trial be carried on, excepting between the hours of eight in the morning, and three in the afternoon, except in cases which require an immediate example.

Art. 37. The Commissioned Officers of every regiment may by the appointment of their Colonel or Commanding Officer hold regimental Courts martial for the enquiring into such disputes, or criminal matters as may come before them, and for the inflicting corporal punishments, for small offences, and shall give judgment by the majority of voices; but no sentence shall be executed till the commanding Officer (not being a member of the Court Martial) shall have confirmed the same.

Art. 38. No regimental Court martial shall consist of less than five officers, excepting in cases where that number cannot be conveniently assembled, when three may be sufficient, who are likewise to determine upon the sentence by the majority of voices; which sentence is to be confirmed by the Commanding Officer, not being a member of the Court Martial.

Art. 39. Every Officer commanding in any fort, castle or

c. J. barrack, or elsewhere where the corps under his command consists of detachments from different regiments or of independent companies, may assemble Courts martial for the trial of offenders in the same manner as if they were regimental, whose sentence is not to be executed, till it shall be confirmed by the said Commanding Officer.

Art. 40. No person whatsoever shall use menacing words, signs or gestures in the presence of a Court Martial then sitting, or shall cause any disorder or riot, so as to disturb their proceeding, on the penalty of being punished at the dis-

cretion of the said Court martial.

Art. 41. To the end that offenders may be brought to justice; whenever any Officer or Soldier shall commit a crime deserving punishment, he shall by his commanding Officer if an Officer, be put in arrest; if a non commissioned Officer or Soldier be imprisoned till he shall be either tried by a Court martial, or shall be lawfully discharged by proper authority.

Art. 42. No Officer or Soldier who shall be put in arrest, or imprisonment shall continue in his confinement more than eight days, or till such time as a Court martial can be

assembled.

Art. 43. No Officer commanding a guard, or provost martial shall refuse to receive or keep any prisoner committed to his charge by an Officer belonging to the Continental forces; which Officer shall at the same time deliver an account in writing, signed by himself, of the crime of which the said prisoner is charged.

Art. 44. No Officer commanding a guard, or provost martial shall presume to release any prisoner committed to his charge without proper authority for so doing; nor shall he suffer any prisoner to escape, on the penalty of being punished

for it, by the sentence of a general Court Martial.

Art. 45. Every Officer, or provost martial to whose charge prisoners shall be committed, is hereby required, within twenty four hours after such commitment, or as soon as he shall be relieved from his guard, to give in writing to the Colonel of the regiment, to whom the prisoner belongs (where the prisoner is confined upon the guard belonging to the said regiment, and that his offence only relates to the neglect of duty in his own corps) or to the Commander in Chief, their names, their crimes, and the names of the Officers who committed them, on the penalty of being punished for his disobedience or neglect, at the discretion of a general Court martial.

Art. 46. And if any Officer under arrest shall leave his confinement before he is set at liberty by the Officer who confined him, or by a superior power, he shall be cashiered for it.

Art. 47. Whatsoever commissioned Officer shall be con-

victed before a general Court martial of behaving in a scan- C. J.³ dalous, infamous manner, such as is unbecoming the character of an Officer and a gentleman, shall be discharged from the service.

Art. 48. All officers, conducters, gunners, matrosses, drivers, or any other persons whatsoever receiving pay or hire in the service of the Continental Artillery shall be governed by the aforesaid rules and articles, and shall be subject to be tried by Courts martial, in like manner with the Officers and Soldiers of the Continental troops.

Art. 49. For differences arising amongst themselves, or in matters relating solely to their own Corps, the Courts martial may be composed of their own Officers, but where a number sufficient of such Officers cannot be assembled, or in matters wherein other corps are interested, the Officers of Artillery shall sit in Courts martial with the Officers of the other corps.

Art. 50. All crimes not capital and all disorders and neglects which Officers and Soldiers may be guilty of, to the prejudice of good order and military discipline, though not mentioned in the articles of War, are to be taken cognizance of by a general or regimental Court martial, according to the nature and degree of the Offence, and be punished at their discretion.

Art. 51. That no person shall be sentenced by a Court martial to suffer death, except in the cases expressly mentioned in the foregoing articles, nor shall any punishment be inflicted at the discretion of a Court martial, other than degrading, cashiering, drumming out of the Army, whipping not exceeding thirty nine lashes, fine not exceeding two months pay of the Offender, imprisonment not exceeding one month.

Art. 52. The field Officers of each and every regiment are to appoint some suitable person belonging to such regiment, to receive all such fines, as may arise within the same, for any breach of any of the foregoing articles, and shall direct the same to be carefully and properly applied to the relief of such sick, wounded or necessitous soldiers as belong to such regiment; and such person shall account with such Officer for all fines received, and the application thereof.

Art. 53. All members sitting in Courts martial shall be sworn by the President of said Courts, which President shall himself be sworn by the Officer in said Court next in rank; the oath to be administered previous to their proceeding to the trial of any Offenders in form following, viz: "You A. B. swear that you will well and truly try and impartially determine the cause of the Prisoner now to be tried, according to the rules for regulating the Continental Army; So help you God."

c. J. Art. 54. All persons called to give evidence in any case before a Court martial, who shall refuse to give evidence, shall be punished for such refusal, at the discretion of such Court Martial; the oath to be administered in the form following, viz: "You swear the evidence you shall give in the case now hearing shall be the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, So help you God"

Art. 55. Every Officer commanding a regiment, troop or company shall upon notice given to him by the Commissary of the musters, or from one of his deputies, assemble the regiment, troop or company under his command, in the next con-

venient place for their being mustered.

Art. 56. Every Colonel or other field Officer, or Officer commanding any Corps, to which there is no field Officer, and actually residing with it, may give furloughs to non commissioned Officers and soldiers, in such numbers, and for so long a time, as he shall judge to be most consistent with the good of the service; but no noncommissioned Officer or soldier shall, by leave of his Captain, or inferior officer commanding the troop or company (his field officer not being present) be absent above twenty days in six months, nor shall more than two private men be absent at the same time from their troop or Company, excepting some extraordinary occasion shall require it, of which occasion the field Officer present with, and commanding the regiment or independent Corps, is to be judge.

Art. 57. At every muster the Commanding Officer of each regiment, troop, or company then present, shall give to the Commissary of musters certificates signed by himself, signifying how long such Officers noncommissioned Officers and Soldiers who shall not appear at the said muster have been absent, and the reason of their absence, which reasons, and the time of absence, shall be inserted in the muster rolls opposite to the respective names of such absentees: The said certificates shall together with the muster rolls be by the said Commissary transmitted to the general, and to this or any future congress of the United Colonies, or Committee appointed thereby, within twenty days next after such muster being taken; on failure whereof, the Commissary so offending shall

be discharged from the service.

Art. 58. Every Officer who shall be convicted before a general Court martial of having signed false certificate, relating to the absence of either Officer, non commissioned Officer or private soldier, shall be cashiered.

Art. 59. Every Officer who shall knowingly make a false muster of man or horse, and every Officer or Commissary, who shall willingly sign, direct, or allow the signing of the

muster rolls, wherein such false muster is contained, shall upon C. J.² proof made thereof, by two witnesses before a general Court martial be cashiered, and moreover forfeit all such pay as may be due to him at the time of conviction for such Offence.

Art. 60. Any Commissary who shall be convicted of having taken any gift or gratuity on the mustering any regiment, troop or company, or on the signing the muster rolls, shall be displaced from his Office, and forfeit his pay, as in the pre-

ceding article.

Art. 61. Any Officer who shall presume to muster any person as a soldier, who is at other times accustomed to wear a livery, or who does not actually do his duty as a Soldier shall be deemed guilty of having made a false muster, and shall

suffer accordingly.

Art. 62. Every Officer who shall knowingly make a false return to the Commander in Chief of the American forces, or to any, his superior Officers, authorised to call for such returns, of the State of the regiment, troop, company or garrison under his command, or of arms, ammunition, clothing or other Stores thereunto belonging, shall by a Court martial be cashiered.

Art. 63. The Commanding Officer of every regiment, troop, independent company, or garrison, in the service aforesaid shall in the beginning of every month, remit to the Commander in Chief of said forces an exact return of the State of the regiment, troop independent Company or garrison under his command specifying the names of the Officers, not then residing at their posts, and the reason for, and the time of their absence: Whoever shall be convicted of having through neglect or design omitted the sending such returns, shall be punished according to the nature of his crime, by the judgment of a general Court martial.

Art. 64. No sutler shall be permitted to sell any kind of liquors or victual, or to keep their houses or shops open for the entertainment of soldiers after nine at night, or before the beating of the reveilles, or upon Sundays, during divine Service or Sermon, on the penalty of being dismissed from all

future suttling.

Art. 65. All Officers commanding in the Camp, or in any forts, barracks or garrisons, are hereby required to see that the persons permitted to suttle shall supply the soldiers with good and wholesome provisions at a reasonable price, as they

shall be answerable for their neglect.

Art. 66. No officers commanding in any Camp, garrisons, forts or barracks shall either themselves exact exorbitant prices for either houses or stalls, let out to suttlers, or shall connive at the like exactions in others, nor lay any duty or impositions upon, or be interested in the sale of such victuals, liquors or

C. J. other necessaries of life which are brought into the Camp, garrison, fort or barracks, for the use of the Soldiers, on the

penalty of being discharged from the Service.

Art. 67. That the General or Commander in Chief for the time being shall have full power of pardoning or mitigating any of the punishments ordered to be inflicted for any of the offences mentioned in the foregoing Articles, and every offender convicted as aforesaid, by any regimental Court Martial, may be pardoned, or have his punishment mitigated by

the Colonel or Officer commanding the regiment.

Art. 68. When any Commissioned Officer shall happen to die or be killed in the Service of the United Colonies, the Major of the regiment, or the Officer doing the Major's duty in his absence shall immediately secure all his effects, or equipage then in Camp or quarters, and shall before the next regimental Court Martial make out inventory thereof, and forthwith transmit the same to the Office of the Secretary of the Congress, or Assembly of the province in which the Corps is stationed, or shall happen to be at the time of the death of such Officer; to the end that his executors may, after payment of his debts in quarters, and interment, receive the overplus, if any be, to his or their use.

Art. 69. When any non commissioned Officer or private Soldier shall happen to die or be killed in the Service of the United Colonies, the then commanding Officer of the troop or Company, shall, in the presence of two other Commissioned Officers, take an account of whatever effects he dies possessed of, and transmit the same, as in the case above provided for, in order that the same may be secured for, and paid to their

respective representatives.

By the Committee, appointed by the Honble Provincial Convention, to enquire into the practicability of establishing a manufactory of Arms within this Province, and the expense

and best mode to carry the same into execution.

Your Committee are of opinion, that the establishing a public Manufactory of Arms, in this Province, would be attended with great expense, much delay and would by no means answer the exigencies of the Province; but from the best information, in so short a time to be procured, do conceive that Arms may be furnished sooner, and at less expense

by engaging immediately all Gun Smiths, and others con- C. J.² cerned in carrying on that business. We therefore beg leave to recommend, that proper persons be appointed in each County to contract the Gun Smiths in their several Districts, and that a sum of Public money be lodged in their hands, to be advanced at their discretion to the Contractors (on Security) to enable them with greater expedition to fulfil their

engagements.

There are three Gun Smith Shops in Baltimore Town, one in George Town, four in Fredericktown, one near Frederick Town, two in Hagers Town, one in Jerusalem Town, in the whole amounting to twelve. We are informed that each of these Shops can in one month, complete twenty substantial musquets (the dimensions of which may be 42 inches in length, 34 of an Inch clear in the bore 11/2 inch diameter at the breech, and % of an Inch at the Muzzle) with Steel rammers and Bayonets 20 Inches in length including the Stock. The price of the Musquet with its Bayonet may be about four pounds, the Cartridge Box of 23 charges & Sling, the Sling for the Musquet, the Scabbard and belt for the Bayonet will altogether cost about 20/

So that by this mode 240 musquets may be furnished monthly. Besides we are informed there are several Gun Smiths on the Eastern Shore and in other places. And we apprehend that from the great encouragement Artificers in this business will receive, their number will soon be greatly increased, and therefore the quantity of Arms we want may be furnished in a much shorter time than the above calculation supposes. And we offer it as our opinion that a proportion of Rifles may be also had, if it should be found necessary. Should that be the case we recommend them to be three feet four Inches in length, and one half inch the Bore which we suppose may be had, well fixed, at about £5. each, and we apprehend that Swords and Tomahawks may also be manu-

factures in this Province.

If this mode meets with your Approbation, we recommend, that each Gun be proved before it shall be received, and when proved, that the word Maryland be stamped on the Barrel. We further offer our opinion that the Persons to be appointed to contract, shall from time to time advise the,

of the number of Guns by them received, to the end that some further Provision may be made in case this mode shall not be found to answer the purpose of procuring Arms with expedition. All this we humbly submit to the consideration of the Honble Convention.

ASSOCIATION OF THE FREEMEN OF MARYLAND

July 26. 1775.

THE long premeditated, and now avowed design of the British Government, to raise a revenue from the property of the colonists without their consent, on the gift, grant and disposition of the Commons of Great Britain; the arbitrary and vindictive statutes passed under color of punishing a riot, to subdue by Military force, and by famine, the Massachusetts Bay; the unlimited power assumed by parliament to alter the charter of that province, and the constitution of all the colonies, thereby destroying the essential securities of the lives, liberties and properties of the colonists; the commencement of hostilities by the ministerial forces, and the cruel prosecution of the War against the people of the Massachusetts Bay, followed by General Gage's proclamation, declaring almost the whole of the Inhabitants of the united colonies, by name or description, rebels and traitors are sufficient causes to arm a free people in defence of their liberty, and to justify resistance, no longer dictated by prudence merely, but by necessity, and leave no alternative but base submission or manly opposition to uncontroulable tyranny. The Congress chose the latter, and for the express purpose of securing and defending the united colonies, and preserving them in safety, against all attempts to carry the above-mentioned acts into execution by force of arms,

RESOLVED, that the said colonies be immediately put into a state of defence, and now supports, at the joint expence, an army to restrain the further violence, and repel the future

attacks of a disappointed and exasperated enemy.

We therefore inhabitants of the Province of Maryland, firmly persuaded that it is necessary and justifiable to repel force by force, do approve of the opposition by Arms to the British troops, employed to enforce obedience to the late acts and statutes of the British parliament, for raising a revenue in America, and altering and changing the charter and constitution of the Massachusetts Bay, and for destroying the essential securities for the lives, liberties and properties of the subjects in the united colonies. And we do unite and associate, as one band, and firmly and solemnly engage and pledge ourselves to each other, and to America, that we will to the utmost of our power, promote and support the present opposition, carrying on, as well by Arms, as by the continental association, restraining our commerce.

AND as in these times of public danger, and until a recon- c. J. ciliation with Great Britain, on constitutional principles is effected (an event we most ardently wish may soon take place) the energy of government may be greatly impaired, so that even zeal unrestrained, may be productive of anarchy and confusion; WE do in like manner unite, associate, and solemnly engage in maintenance of good order, and the public peace, to support the civil power in the due execution of the laws, so far as may be consistent with the present plan of opposition; and to defend with our utmost power all persons from every species of outrage to themselves or their property, and to prevent any punishment, from being inflicted on any offenders, other than such, as shall be adjudged by the civil magistrate, continental congress, our convention, council of safety, or committees of observation.

TO THE 19th MARCH 1776.

Constitution of the Council of Safety
in Prov¹ Congress June 14th 1775

Resolved

That the persons to be appointed to direct and regulate the operations of the troops and for other purposes be stilled and denominated the Council of Safety.

That it consist of thirteen members and such of the Delegates of this Colony as shall not hold Commissions, and are not entitled to receive Pay in the prov¹ Army.

That no military officer receiving Pay in the service of this

Colony be eligible to sit in the Council of Safety

That the said Council of Safety or a majority of such as may be in the Colony shall have power to issue Commissions for the Army as well to those elected by the prov¹ Congress as in Cases of Vacancy by Death or otherwise

That the said Council or a Majority of them be vested with full power & authority to suspend any officer in the army when they shall think it necessary and shall within a convenient time not exceeding forty Days after such suspension order a general Court Martial to sit for the Trial of such officer whose sentence shall be final unless it shall be otherwise determined by the provincial Congress.

That the said Council of Safety shall have the supreme Direction, Regulation, Maintenance & ordering of the Army and all military Establishments & arrangem¹⁸ subject always

to the Controul of the Congress.

That if upon any emergency it shall appear necessary to the Council of Safety to call forth the militia they shall have full power & authority to cary the acts of assembly for Regulating the militia of this Colony in all Respects into Execu.

c. s. J. as in time of alarm & that such of the Militia officers & Men as shall be draughted & employed shall be allowed a daily pay & Ration equal to the Pay allowed in the new raised Regiments of Foot: That if any just Complaint shall be made agt any officer in the militia or that there any vacancys in any of the Regiments or Companies of militia in this Colony, & that Commis. cannot be procured in the usual channel, the Council of Safety may in such Cases remove such officer & forthwith appoint another in his stead & appoint officers where there are or may be vacancies as afs^d.

That one Mode of Exercise shall be used by the Militia throughout this Colony, & that the Council of Safety do without delay fix on some proper manual Exercise & cause the

same to be printed & dispersed.

Council to invite 50 Catawba Indians.

That in general the Council of Safety be impowered & authorised to do all such Matters & Things relative to the strengththening securing & defending the Colony as shall by

them be deemed & judged expedient & necessary.

That upon any vacancy happening in the Council of Safety during the Recess of the Congress the general Commee shall be authorized to fill up such vacancy by Ballot after having given three weeks notice thereof in the Gazette.

May it please y' Ex.

We are persuaded that a proclamation wou'd serve only to enflame & irritate, there has already been sufficient Experience not only of the Inefficacy; but of the Impolicy of this Measure in the Colonies where it has been pursued & had the Effect of it been foreseen we presume it wou'd not have been recommended. We are aware of your Excellency's delicate Situation, for want of a full Information of the State of this Province, of the Temper of the people, & the principles by which they are animated, it may be expected in England that you take a part, w^{ch} on a just Information, hardly attainable at so great a distance, wou'd not, we imagine be desired, & an Address to the people in a Mode apparently less imperative than that of a Proclamation, we are apprehensive wou'd not be more conciliatory. We most sincerely deplore the present unhappy Condition of the Colonies, & looking forward to the consequences of rigorous coercive Measures, & a determined vigorous Resistance to them, are deeply affected by the prospect of dreadful impending Calamities. permit us Sir, to observe, that whilst the Ideas of Authority, & Dignity on the one side are so opposite to the Ideas of Justice, & Liberty on the other, whilst a military force is employed to support the former, and to vindicate the Latter, unhappy must be the Contest, unhappy must the issue of it be, whatever may finally be the contingent Decision We most ardently wish to see not only a Cessation of all Hostilities; but a perfect Restoration of peace, good order, & the just Authorities of Government, & a Renovation of that cordial Affection, Intercourse, & Confidence whence so many reciprocal Benefits have been derived to the parent State, & the Colonies, we can with the greatest Truth assert that Independence of G. Britain is not the Aim, or wish of the people of this Province, & that they wou'd chearfully, & in the most explicit Terms, Acknowledge their Subordination, as Instruments of the National Commerce, & the Authority of Parliament to bind them by Laws corresponding with & adapted to this Degree of Subordination; but we do not deny, nor can we reprobate, or disapprove of, their claim to all the Rights, and Privileges of British Subjects compatible with the check & Control exerciseable by the British Legislature for the important purpose of securing, directing, & regulating their commercial Instrumentality, the original view in settling the American Plantations, nor can we wish them to renounce that Right of Property, weh protects the owner's Enjoyment of it by securing it against the Disposal of others without his Consent, a Right wen we conceive to be inseparable from the Nature of Property, without w^{ch} Liberty can't exist, & our Charter notwithstanding the Energy & Precision of its Language, notwithstanding the royal Faith solemnly plighted that no part of the Compact it contains, shou'd be violated, or impeached, notwithstanding the various confirmatory Sanctions it has recev'd wou'd become a Delusion, so far our Sentiments correspond with the general persuasion, & in our present Avowal of them, we only repeat our Declaration on a former occasion, tho' we very much disapprove of the violences, w^{ch} some rash Men have committed & are not satisfied of the propriety, Utility or Expediency of some Measures that have been recommended, yet are we disposed to make favorable Allowances in the present general Perturbation of Men's Minds flowing from their firm persuasion that the Defence of Liberty requires extraordinary Exertions, & we observe with pleasure that tho' your Excelly cant approve, yet your Humanity inclines you to view them with Indulgence.

The not having sooner answered the letter, notifying the appointment of me to be one of the Council of Safety, is solely owing to the Pain it gives me to decline that Distinction, from the sense I have of my incapacity to answer the expectations of the Gentlemen of the Convention, in the execution of that office.

The bearer Joseph Woodfin will wait on you, requesting you'l do the utmost of your endeavour with the Committee at Frederick Town to procure him as much ammunition as the money he brings will purchase, as our present situation is well known to the gentlemen of your committee, I hope they will not be against supporting a defenceless People who does not know the hour they may be struck by the savages the Indians, the scarcety of money in our country at present prevents our sending for a greater quantity which if you'l please to send Ten pounds worth more I will see the money paid in two months from this time, I myself being a member of the Committee at Pittsburgh obtained a permit from that Committee to send for ammunision, but by accident has lost it or I wou'd have sent it down to you. But you may be assured that I have not sent without the consent of that Committee, please to write me what quantity you deliver to Mr Woodfin & likewise the price for the same. I have nothing particular to communicate to you but the fears of the people, by reason of information to our inhabitants that the Canadians & Indians intends to strike us, but if we can get powder & lead it will spirit the people much more than they are at present.

Dear Sir.

After a passage of 15 days, from Cape Henry we arrived here on the 10th ulto the day following (in the morning) a ship of war appeared in the Offing of this Road, which made Cap' Dickinson & I anctious to have the Cargoe landed from on Board the Schooner to effect, which we were both on shore endeavouring to make sales, or find a convenient place in which to store it. In the mean time to our great surprise we perceived the Schooner under way at the appearance of which I applied to some boat men to row me off, but before I could reach her, she was under the guns of the above mentioned ship of war who positively denyed to admit me on board of her, at my return on shore; I found three of the people who gave Cap^t Dickenson & I the following relation; that the mate & one man had cut the cables and delivered themselves with both vessel and cargoe up to the above ship that they were obliged to make their escape in the boat after many imprecations & threats from the Two villans who were each armed with a Broad ax. I consulted M' Jennings what to do who advised me to apply to the Governor of this Island to demand her again as Dutch property being anchored under the guns of the Fort & regularly reported. This I did and obtained a flag of Truce pass with letters to Adm' Young, giving a detail of the matters and demanding the vessell and cargo to be returned. I went to Antigua where the adml was supposed to be and delivered the governors letters when I received for answer that he could not comply with his request his orders being such it was out of his power; all I could obtain from him was an order for my cloths and that with difficulty whatever money I had in my chest was taken and confiscated along with the The schooner & Cargoe is now at Navis where they will be tryed & sold. I shall attend the tryall and if it is possible you may depend upon it to take any further step for your advantage I shall not fail to do it. There was neither letters nor papers of any kind left on Board that could argue any thing against us but that of not having a regular clearance what ever expence I have been at I was obliged to borrow here, being left without the means of procuring a dinner or a shift of cloths. I shall write you again after the trial of the vessel in the mean time I am Dr Sir Your very humb! Servt

The Council of Safety promise M^r William Whetcroft that [in case he will next Spring import] a sufficient number of Workmen, and [will deliver for the] use of this Province for every week for two [years] then next following, fifty good substantial proved Musquets 3½ feet long in the Barrel and of three Quarters of an Inch in the Bore, with good double Bridle Locks, black Walnut or maple Stocks, and plain strong

Brass mounting Bayonets with Steel Blades 17 Inches long, C. S. J. steel Ramrods, double Screws, priming Wires and Brushes fitted thereto, with a pair of brass Moulds for every 80 Musquets, to cast 12 Bullets on one Side, and on the other Side to cast Shot of such Size as the Musquet will chamber three of them, wholly made within this Province, the Public will, provided the Differences continue between Great Britain and the Colonies, take the said 50 Stands pr Week at the Rate of four pounds common money per stand, or for such part of the said two years as the said Differences shall continue: But if happily there should be a Reconciliation between Great Britain and the Colonies after the said Workmen shall embark, and before the End of the said two years, that then the public will, if the said Reconciliation shall take place before the said Workmen shall have been set to work, take an Assignment of the Contracts made by the said Whetcroft with them and pay him not only his actual Expences in procuring and importing the said Workmen, but also forty shillings Sterling for each of the [said workmen imported, for his] Trouble. And if such [reconciliation shall take place after any Delivery of the said [stands of arms] and before the End of the said two years, that then the public will make an Allowance to the said Whetcroft in Proportion to the part of the two years then unexpired, on such Assignment as aforesaid being made. It is agreed that it shall be at the Option of M' Whetcroft to fit 800 of the Musquets first delivered with imported Locks, provided the prime Cost of the said Locks be not less than five Shillings Sterling each. It is understood that the Importation of the said Workmen shall be at the Expence & Risque of Mr Whetcroft.

Camp at Cambridge October 24. 1775 Sir. My conjecture of the destination of the late squadron from Boston in my last has been unhappily verified by an outrage exceeding in barbarity and cruelty every hostile act practiced among civilized nations. I have enclosed the account given by M^r Jones a gentleman of the town of Falmouth of the destruction of that increasing & flourishing village. He is a very great sufferer and informs me that the time allowed for the removal of effects was so small that valuable property of all kinds and to a great amount has been destroyed. The orders shewn by the Captain for this horrid proceedure by which it appears that the same desolation is meditated upon all the towns on the coast made it my duty to communicate it as quickly and extensively as possible. As Portsmouth was the next place to which he proposed to go General Sullivan was permitted to go up and give them his assistance and advice to ward off the blow. I flatter myself the like event will not happen there as they have a fortification of some strength & a vessel has arrived at a place called Sheepscot with 1500'b of Powder. The gentlemen of the congress have nearly finished their Business but as they write by this opportunity, I must beg leave to refer you to their letter for what

c. s. c. concerns their Commission: We have had no occurrence of any consequence in the Camp since I had the honor of addressing you last But expect every hour to hear that Newport has shared the fate of unhappy Falmouth. I have the honor to be with the most sincere respect. Sir

Falmouth Monday October 16. 1775. The canceaux ship of sixteen guns, commanded by Capt. Mowatt, a large ship, schooner and a sloop armed, anchored below the town The 17th at 3 P. M. they weighed and came up and anchored within Gunshot and immediately chose a committee of three gentlemen and sent them on board to know the reason of that towns being set on fire, he returned for answer that his orders were to set fire on all the seaport towns between Boston & Hallifax and that he expected New York was then burnt to ashes he farther said that when he received orders from the admiral he desired that he might shew some favour to the town of Falmouth, which the admiral granted (I suppose, as Capt Mowatt was under particular obligations to some gentlemen at Falmouth for civilities to him when in captivity amongst them) and which favour was to spare the town till 9 oclock Wednesday morning in case he would send him off eight small arms, which the town immediately did. Wednesday morning being the 18th the committee went on board Capt Mowatt again in order to save the town, til he heard from the admiral in case we would send off four carriage guns deliver up all our small arms, ammunition & and send four gentlemen of the town as hostages, which the town would not do. about half past nine in the morning he began to fire from the four armed vessels, and in five minutes set fire to the several houses, He continued firing till after dark, the same day, which destroyed the largest part of the town he farther informed the committee that he should proceed to portsmouth and destroy that place also. The foregoing is as near the facts as I am able to remember. As Witness my hand.

Honourable Gentlemen

Having long foreseen the present Troubles I have endeavoured to provide against them as well as I coud and tried to prevail with all those I conversed with to do so too but to very little purpose—from what motives I shall not take upon me to declare. When the General Congress desired that all men should prepare against the worst, I put my Arms in order laid by what little powder and lead I had and purchased at an advanced price what Powder lead & flints I could conveniently get and powder run presently up to 20£ pr hundred. I have been offered by the People of Virginia at different times first

5/ then 7/6 and lately 10/ a pound for what powder I have it is selling currently at the South Branch at 2 dollars. I have refused parting with any because I think we shall very soon stand in great need of it here in Maryland. When the Convention of December desired all Men to enrol themselves into Companys, to provide a good firelock, Cartridge Box, half a pound of powder & 216 of lead, & to be ready to march upon any emergency I exerted myself greatly, put myself to a considerable expence, formed a company purchased a Lock Smith & Cutler at a great price on purpose, got 100 cartridge boxes made and would soon have had the Company in tolerable order; but I presently found my zeal gave offence and every rub and Mortification was thrown in the way, to destroy the Company, so that I threw up in disgust; from what Quarters and factions it is needless to say; but I am extremely sorry to see that very little regard has been since paid to the directions of the Convention as to Arms and Ammunition. a few officers and Privates have tolerable Pieces but for the rest some have none, some without locks or even ramrods nor are there 5 Cartridge Boxes in the Company and all the expostulations as a private man that I can make avails nothing. a fatal backwardness prevails and I lay a considerable part of it to the Account of the officers not obliging the Men to put their Arms into better order which I think they certainly might do.

In December last there was a good deal of powder and lead in the store: instead of the People providing themselves with some & keeping it ready, or in store, it has most shamefully been wasted in Xmas Guns, fired away at birds and squirrels so that now I fear there is very little in the County and that little growing less every day. Our Committee a few days ago applied to me for what I had to dispose among the People which I refused to part with, well knowing that it will go like the rest fired away at Ducks &c. What I have I intend to keep, till it is wanted, to defend us against the Enemy, and I make no doubt the Honorable Council of safety will make me full Amends for my Zeal & Care in the preservation of it. I have some powder, some lead, some Arms, 7 good light Iron Cannon that would carry Balls of 1 1/216 there are four other new ones at Pigg Point that will carry 316 balls. if these were put on travelling Carriages they might be of service to defend the Sides of the Rivers against the Tenders, and I suppose some arms and ammunition might be collected and procured, if a proper officer in each County was appointed for that purpose, and otherwise, I think there will not. My Opinion is that there should be a Commissary General of Stores appointed by the Council of Safety in each County, who, might employ proper deputys to every Company & Battalion and collect all the ammunition & arms into their hands and distribute them as wanted for Actual Service—that every man should be obliged to provide a good firelock and keep it in repair at his own expence and also the Accourrements named by the Convention—such as are poor to be provided by the County or Publick & lodged with the Commissary—those who are able & do not every day of Mustering appear with their Arms &c in good order to be soundly fined, and the officers fined for suffering such Neglect or degraded. The Commissarys to make a report every field day to the field officers of such Neglects. I am convinced that the Business of Commissarys & Quarter masters are necessary and may very properly be executed by the same persons and without them no Company, Battalion or Detachment will ever be equipped or enabled to March. the Captains & officers depend at present entirely on the Adjutant and the Adjutant teaches only the Exercise, so that the Arms & Ammunition, Accourtements &c are totally neglected, and if we were to be called out just now we are 9/10ths of us totally unprepared. This is a melancholy situation and surely requires a remedy immediately. The Council of Safety I apprehend might cure the evil by Instructions to the officers either in their Commissions or separate and by appointing such officers as I have named to see to the Execution, vizt the Commissarys of stores and Quarter masters. these would be a Check and also Assistant to the officers. all the old Arms shoud be collected and repaired without delay and new ones as fast as Possible provided. there are a great many good Arms in the Province if all were Collected and repaired &c put into proper hands & places, all which I apprehend would be the duty of the Commissarys & Quarter masters if properly authorized & Commissioned by the Council of Safety. Upon the whole my Zeal for the Cause induces me to offer my service as Commissary General of stores & Quarter Master General for Prince Georges County, and if the Honorable Council of Safety thinks proper to grant me those Commissions with such Orders and Instructions as are absolutely necessary to obtain the desired effect, viz' to arm & discipline the County for its safety and Defence, I will exert every Nerve to put Matters on a regular and good footing. I will draw up a sett of Orders & Instructions which I shall submit to the Honorable Council with all Speed. we meet with daily Alarms which freightens for the present & Immediately blows over and we remain in the same defenceless and supine state as if no danger was at hand or expected.

I have fitted all my Arms with good Steel Bayonets, all bright as from the Gunsmith, in new wooden cases, and in a Strong Arm Chest locks with handles proper for immediately transportation. all the Arms should be kept so and every Battalion ought to have a Close Ammunition Waggon and a Close Baggage waggon prepared ready to start:

Prince Georges County Nov^r 10th 1775 Gentlemen. It is at the request of several persons of Fortune and Character that I am induced to inform you how partially matters were Conducted with regard to the nomination of Field officers to the Battalion on the upper part of Patuxent, there are six Companies in the Forrest and but three below which gave them an advantage which they took of Nominating whom they pleased. I was present when the Nomination was made and objected strongly to their naming but four, by arguing that they would by that means give you no Alternative whatever, but as they had previously agreed on their men what I said avail nothing, I have now only to inform you that the persons polled for that day besides those recommended were Mr Barton Lucas, Mr Thomas Snowden, Mr Walter Bowie, Benjamin Ogle Esquire Mr James Mullikin, Mr Reason Beall, M' William Turnor Wootton & myself any of whom in my humble opinion are equally entitled to your Notice in every respect with those returned, therefore it is to be hoped you will pay no regard to such a recommendation.

Virginia, Gunston Hall, Nov 29th 1775.

Gentlemen. Having just received the following important intelligence, and not knowing whether you were apprized of the Character & dangerous designs of Maj^r Connelly, I thought it proper imediately to transmit it to your Board, together with a copy of a letter & Intelligence, respecting him, rec^d sometime ago from his Excellency General Washington. This appeared to me the more necessary as the prisoners being

taken up in your province, we could give no orders here for their safe Custody.

"Majr Connelly was taken above Frederick Town in Maryland, in his way to the Indian Country and with him a Doct' Smith from Charles County & one Cameron, they are all now fast by the heels in the Goal of Frederick Town. Connelly we are told, had with him a Commission from Gen¹ Gage to raise a number of Indians, & with them to penetrate, thro the Country towards Alexandria, in the spring, where he would be met by Lord Dunmore. Commissions for the other two were to be furnished hereafter."

Who this Doct Smith is I know not, Cameron I take to be the deputy Indian agent to the southward, from whom a letter was intercepted last July, advising the government to raise a number of the Creek & Cherokee nations, to fall upon the back Inhabitants, offering his service upon the occasion, & boasting of his Interest with these Indians. I make no doubt but your Board will take proper measures to prevent the escape of such dangerous men, and am, with the greatest Respect,

May it please your Excellency

Sir. I hope you will please to pardon my taking the liberty of laying these few lines before your excellency, but if I had not I should have thought it would have been doing a great injustice to my conscience, & I think every well meaning man who is a real friend to liberty would join in my sentiments to stop such outragious actions & rebellious works which are going to be put into execution please your Excellency I lived along with Major John Connelly of Fort Pitt have done this two years last July he was obliged to retire from Fort Pitt the Inhabitants had a suspicion of his being an enemy to his country from thence I went with him down to Portsmouth in Virginia where he got on Board his Excellency Lord Dunmores ship the Royal William where we staid fourteen days & from thence he sail in his Lordships Tender the Arundel for Boston with dispatches to General Gage from Lord Dunmore there we staid ten days from thence we sail to Newport Rhode Island conveyed by the Viper sloop of War of 12 guns commanded by Capt Thomas Greaves & from Rhode Island is to be conveyed to New York & there the Viper parts with her & she is to Portsmouth by herself. As I was one day with the Major in the State room just after we left Boston he asked me if I was willing to go with him into the Indian Country as he had been with General Gage to get a commission & orders to go into the Indian Countrys to raise the Indians & the French & there is some part of the royal Irish I think he said at Fort Chartres & they have orders from General Gage to join him & he told me they had nine twelve pounders. But as soon as he gets into Virginia & settles his business with his Lordship as he dares not go up the country he intends to take his Lordships Tender & to go to St Augustine & there to get guides to convey him through the Cherokees nation & from thence to the Shawneys mineoes & Delaways but he is to get Commissions from Lord Dunmore for Capt White Eyes & Cornstalk & other of the chiefs & to make them Presents he intends to stay at the Detroit all winter in order to get Boats & Canoes built to bring his Forces up the Ohio & the Cannon the first place he intends to fall upon is Fort Pitt & to take That & then he says that he thinks that most part of that quarter will join him as he says he has orders to give them three hundred acres of land to each man that will join him. and another scheme he told me he was going to put into execution that is in regard to convicts & indentured servants to set them at their liberty & to give them land to join him & when he has taken Fort Pitt he intends to proceed down for Alexandria & there he is to be reinforced by said Dunmore & some men of War & then to sweep all the Country before him. As Your Excellency knows what state that Country his in & I thought it most fitting to disclose it to your Excellency I wrote the letter in Rhode Island to send down lest I could not have had the opportunity of getting from the vessel but I made my escape one night by great chance & a young man that was pressed on Board who is now with his parents in Rhode Island which the Major wanted to go along with him I left all my cloaths & all that I had on Board but that is nothing so I could be of any service to my country & I hope every well meaning man god will reward for so doing I hope your Excellency will excuse my Freedom but I could not be at rest till I had disclosed the matter to your Excellency. please to permit me to subscribe myself,

Alex^a Jan^y 9th 1776 Hon^{bla} Sir. Cap^t Conway has never been able to get his Vessell ready to take in till this day tho' he has used great industry, the Weather, the Hollydays &c has been against him.

She is still a very fine vessell, now in the most compleat order and it gives me concern to inform you that, the Cap' one of the most active fellows in the world, is about leaving her. of this Capt Conway never gave me the most distant hint, till within these few days, as soon as he made known his intentions I expostulated with and endeavor'd to convince him of the impropriety of leaving the service without giving the Council of Safety due notice to provide another Master, but all in vain. He has had a little Vessell built some where in the lower parts of Virginia, she is finished and come up and he is going out in her. However he promises to stay by the vessel and see things carried on, till another master comes on board you'll therefore be pleased to appoint one and send him to take charge as soon as possible. He says he intended to give you notice at Annapolis, but the Council Room was always full & he never could find an opportunity. if you have not a proper person to spare, there is a Brother of Conways, who I believe to be an able seaman & a very industrious spirited man that has offered himself; He being well acquainted, could pick up men in a short time of wh the vessel is bare, having but 3 on board. Your favour of 14th is now before me the contents of which I note. you may be assured that I want no other indulgence in loading the Brig Friendship then others are intitled to by Similar contracts and without vanity can say that I can execute such business on equal terms with any other in Baltimore, but I wish not to sacrifice a commission in giving advanced prices above my limits, as am pretty certain has been the case with some since my writing to you last, I wonder my application has been the first to raise the price as I have been told by several that the Convention was wrote to on same head, but when I wrote you first, the matter was only beginning & that with people who were buying on some private acct & note, or that of the Convention, which disabled those employed by them from executing their commissions as the County people & millers will always sell to those who give them most; nay some flour that I had bought two days ago, was taken from my door & given to another private buyer, who gave 13/ pr Ct for it, under such circumstances, the market is at present; & unless some order is taken therein to put a stop to private buyers it appears that the public must be empeaded. I did inform the Committee that I had engaged between 4 & 500 Barr's which was the case but bad weather has I must suppose stoped the wagons; I have about 170 Barr's flour on board & the bread is ready but that must go in last, I shall go on with loading as fast as flour comes in, & follow your directions. I thought I could not do less then advise you in my former letter how matters were going on here. Which is still the case this week I think must bring much flour in. Capt Robert Forsythe Sir.

You are to proceed from hence to the Island of Martinico and there deliver the inclosed letter and your cargo to Mr Richard Harrison, if Mr Harrison should not be at the Island of Martinico, addressed to M' M'Creary and if he should not be there, You are in that case to open the letter addressed to M' Harrison sell your Cargo at the very highest prices you can get, the money arising from the sales you must lay out in gunpowder if you can get it, if not, in muskets fitted with good bayonets & if they are not to be had, salt petre and Sulphur & if you cannot get those articles, then lay out the whole in strong coarse linens & russia duck. And take care you are not imposed on in your purchases. As soon as you have done your business make the best of your way home, and avoid speaking with vessels on the Coast, when you come into the latitude of our capes if you have a strong fair wind in, push up the Bay as far as possible, and if you find it failing, run into some small Harbour & there wait till you have a favourable opportunity to get into Patomac, Patuxent or Annapolis. you find a better chance of getting into any of the inlets between cape charles and cape Henlopen than into our Bay, you may push into one of them, and send an express to the Council of Safety, letting them know where you are and what you have got but take care and land your goods under the care of a Committee as soon as you can for fear of being followed by the Tenders. In going out you had better take a brisk gale of wind, or get out of nights as Tenders commonly keep a strict watch at the capes in the day time, but hope you will behave with care and industry on this Voyage. If you are chased and find you must be taken throw all your papers overboard, with weights to sink them.

We have only engaged this Vessel to deliver her Cargo to you, as soon therefore as she is unloaded if you should have no further Use for her you may discharge her. Assurances to the Ministry that he believes they contain the real Sentiments of the People of this Province. The Governor has taken this measure in Consequence of a free Conversation with Messⁿ Matthew Tilghman, Thomas Johnson, Thomas Stone and James Hollyday and ourselves on the Subject. The Step cannot be productive of an ill effect; it may be of the greatest Service; it may possibly bring about some Overture to a general Reconciliation. He has promised you shall have the Perusal of what he has wrote, when you come to Maryland. We intimate this to you to prevent the Letter being stopt on Suspicion of its containing any information or intelligence unfriendly to America. We do not doubt but you will think with us that the sooner it reaches England the better in the present critical Situation of our Affairs, and that you will give Maynard the proper passports to New York.

We think it proper to inform you that we have resolved to build for the protection of Potomac River two row gallies one of them to carry one 24 pounder, the other a twelve pounder & both swivels, also three vessels carrying one of them four six pounders & some four pounders the other two vessels four pounders & swivels, we do not conceive this adequate to the importance of that great river, but as we have three other rivers to which we must extend the like care, and as your province is equally interested in the Safety of Potomac river we could not doubt but it would be the wish of your body to participate in its protection. Our determination on this head is yet subject to alteration and we shall chearfully consult & advise with you on this or any other subject conducive to the Interest of both & to our mutual defence.

I observe the Gentlemen of the convention have allowed the soldiers as a uniform hunting shirts, but no spatter dashes, which renders the regimentals incompleat, this they certainly have not adverted to, otherways am persuaded they must have c. s. c. seen the impropriety of allowing one & not the other, for you must be sensible that clean spatterdashes as well as hunting shirts must cover a multitude of blemishes in the dress & appearance of the regiment, which I would most earnestly wish to appear as respectable, & to become as formidable as might be, under our present disadvantageous situation respecting military matters; this therefore I hope you'll take under consideration, flatter myself as the expence will be trifling, you will be induced to purchase as much oznabs or whats much better (if to be had) Russia sheeting as will answer this purpose. I know the Public business is very pressing & that you will be much engaged, yet I must entreat you to purchase what cloths are to be had in Baltimore suitable for soldiers cloathing (also sail duck for Tents) the men inlisted must be very bare, as the Capt are continually pressing me to know how they are to be furnished with cloaths, urging that they cannot march them to their station till clad. Intrenching tools &c imagine may be made here at any time, I think you must judge it essentially necessary to request M^r Johnson or some other of our Congress members, to write Gen¹ Washington to send us a good adjutant or two, for the use of the Province in general, who as an incouragem' might be allowed more than the common wages. Gen: Stricker has accepted his commission & has had and I expect will have good success in inlisting he proposes to be very particular in the men he takes & much wishes his, the Light Infantry Company to be armed with Rifles both M^r Price & he think Rifles for a company may be soon got considering the difficulty of speedily arming our troops I think with them it will advisable to lodge a sum of money in the hands of some body here, no body will do more justice to the public than C. Beatty, to purchase up what Rifles can be got. My Brother this morning let Stricker have 100 of the 200 which he brought up for building the town Jail, to assist him in recruiting. Mr Ford will be a very proper hand to bring up what money you may think proper to send Stricker I imagine the 250 f he applies for is not too much as well as what you may think proper for Capt Barrett many of whose Company I expect will be very good Riflemen, if collected in his neighbourhood from where I think they may be best spared. Major Price tells me a good many public arms some of which have been repaired at the expence of those who have them may be collected with industry I should be glad youd send up an order for the committee to collect all they can and if you think as I do to allow the people the reasonable expence of necessary repairs where the musquets came to their hands out of order. I understand about 100 gunlocks fit for Rifles and that would do well

enough to put to repaired muskets are to be had in town I c. s. c. wish you^d send up about 60% to purchase them M^r Beatty my Brother or myself will do it if you please. Price tells me he gained an acquaintance with one Royston at the Camp of the Artillary, who was a very clever young man & desires to come to the south and from Prices account of him he would be very serviceable in our second artillery Comp^y & he would be well satisfied with a first Lieutenancy I wish if there's still room that he may be prefered to it, a trifling circumstance prevented his coming with Price and he even talked of following him. Maj^r Price writes to him that troops are raising in this province & that it is likely he will be employed which he says he dare say will bring him with a strong recommendation from Gen¹ Gates to whom he is well known.

All persons who are desirous to contract for supplying the Troops raised in this Province with the Rations allowed by the late Convention are requested to attend the Council of Safety at the City of Annapolis on the 15th Day of February next and deliver in their Proposals which will be duly attended to.

A Ration as settled by the Convention to consist &c. Ordered That 100 Hand Bills of the same be immediately printed.

c. s. j. M^r Purviance attended the Council and reported that according to the Requisition of yesterday the Committee had appointed Persons for the purposes therein mentioned.

Instructions and sailing Orders were given to Capt John

Martin of the Brig Friendship.

M' William Lux was requested to purchase up for the use of the Troops in this Province, all the coarse Clothes in Baltimore Town; also Blankets, and plush for Breeches and make Report of the Quantity and price to the Council of Safety, with all convenient speed.

M' Lux delivers to the Council the following Proposition.

The pilot Boat Chatham is bound for Statia with Money to purchase Goods to the Amount of £3000 more to the Consignment of M^r Thomas Russell who goes out in her. The Boat is valued at £300 and each Shipper is to pay in proportion to the Amount of his Property, in Case she is lost. M^r Russell will take One hundred Barrels light Flour on Account of the Province at 6/ per Barrel, and they to pay their proportion of the Value of the Vessel in Case of Loss.

Which was read & agreed to.

Instructions were accordingly given to Captain Thomas Russell,

Mr George Matthews, Cannon Founder in the Neighbourhood of Baltimore Town, being requested to attend the Council of Safety, and give what Information he could with Regard to casting of Cannon, and the Cannon now in that place, informed that there were two 12 pounders, six 9 pounders, six 6 pounders, eight 3 pounders and two Field pieces, 3 pounders, which in his Judgment and Opinion might be of some service, but not to be depended on till they were bored again. That they had been a long Time unused and were scaly within side of the Guns. That there were 7 or 8 of the Annapolis Guns left by Capt Stone, 4 pounders, all good except one which had lost a Trunnion, might be made serviceable by having Trunnions fixed on the Outside with an Iron Hoop.

M^r Matthews was also asked on what Terms he would contract for founding Cannon, thereupon expressed his Opinion that in his situation as a Factor, he could not incur the Expence necessary to be laid out in founding Cannon and boring the same, unless he had a moral Certainty that his Owners should be no Losers by undertaking the Business. That the Wheel for boring Cannon and other Apparatus was expensive and a work that would require some Time before it could be brought to perfection and that he did not think he could furnish 40

eighteen Pounders in less than four months from this Time. C. S. J. That he was going to Philadelphia at the Request of Mr Alexander in Expectation of hearing Proposals from the Congress on the Subject of founding Cannon and should be better able to judge whether it would be worth while to undertake the Business and would expect to hear from us on his Return.

Honourable Gentlemen.

I think it my duty to acquaint you that I have received a letter from Cap' Isaiah Robinson L' of the Hornet Cap' Stone dated off Annapolis desiring me to recommend him to your favour. I know him to be a very honest sensible faithful man, it will be seen how he behaves in his present station. He writes to me on another subject. I shall give you his words. "I have another request to make you about a matter that I am very anxious for viz^t that you will please to Countenance my Brother in law M^r Burgess he is come over at an unlucky time for himself as to what he Primarily intended, but as he is remarkably ingenious, and well versed in drawing, and in military matters he may be a very useful hand at this time, should there occur any thing in which he could be employed I'm confident his conduct would give satisfaction," so far Cap' Robinson, and as to the gentlemen in question Mr Burgess, I have seen him—he is a sensible clever middle aged man from Ireland brought his wife & children and is now at Hagars Town his intention was for Fort Chartres on the Ilionois in the view of a grant there where he has friends. I believe he is both a sea and land officer perhaps of the Marines. he appears to me to be a man of great spirit & understanding and if he was to engage in the American Service would be of Use. Capt Stull or some of the officers there might sound him, but I would rather wish that the Honorable Council themselves were to examine him. I inclose a letter to him which may be forwarded or not, as you Judge proper.

Last night about 8 oclock came here a drummer engaged by Col¹ Murdock for Cap^t Sims Company on foot, he had a letter for Col^o Sim and being resolute to proceed, I sent a servant & horses with him to Col^o Sims. The man informed me that one of the Minute Officers from Alexandria had wrote to his wife that Lord Dunmore was on his way up to Alexandria and would be up as soon as the River permitted. therefore desired her to remove. that 30 waggons were constantly employed at Alexa removing their effects &c. Col^o Sim wrote

me late last night that John Murdock from George Town wrote him by the Drummer that Dunmore was above or about S' Marys in his way up to Patomack and that they were there preparing to receive him—but whether the, there related to George Town or S' Marys I cannot tell, possibly George Town. this Intelligence I thought it my duty to Communicate.

When I was at Annapolis in December I received an order from the Committee of Secrecy to keep what Powder & lead I had for their use & they took an obligation from me so to do till they ordered a person to view it when I was to have an order for my Money. The Convention ordered Col^o Sim for that purpose who sent here Mess¹⁵ Crawford & Lee. they saw it took samples. sent them to Annapolis were proved & found good. Since then the same Gentlemen came here upon some disturbance on Patomack and desired in the name of the Committee of Observation that for safety it might be removed under their inspection to Marlbro'. accordingly the next day I examined and weighed it all, had it put into good tight barrels well coopered, carefully packed with hay in trunks well corded & sent to Marlbro' according to the Gentlemens directions. there the whole lies ready for removal and I desire to be paid, for which reason I send the necessary papers & authoritys. I have an immediate occasion for the money, or I should not just now have sent. I apprehend the trunks and cording are absolutely necessary for the safe keeping & transportation, but if thought otherwise, I will very readily keep them. I have been very exact and Careful in this Business which I hope the Honourable Council will approve of.

At a time when there is so much to be done as I think would employ every Zealous man I wonder to see so little stirring hereabouts and my own busy head & fingers without a Task. it is a very happy circumstance for me at this time, and I rejoice that matters are in other and abler hands. My good wishes and endeavours shall never be wanting on any occasion. with the greatest Esteem and Respect I am Honorable Gentlemen

I have just received a letter from your Brother in law Captⁿ Robinson who is gone out lieutent in an armed vessel in the service of the Province. I shall give you his words. "I have another request to make you about a matter I'm very anxious for vizt that you'l please to countenance my Brother in Law Mr Burgess, he is come at an unlucky time for himself as to what he Primarily intended, but he is remarkably ingenious and well versed in drawing and in military matters, he may be a very useful hand at this time, should there occur any thing in which he could be employed I'm confident his conduct would give satisfaction."

Gent^a Captain Joseph Robson who commands the minute company of this County, applied last week to us and informed

us that he had upon his receiving orders from the last Convention to March his Company to Virginia, examined the guns belonging to the men in his company, and could not make out more than ten that were in any sort fit for service. And as the Convention had ordered that the Company should be supplied with arms from Chester Town we advised the Captain immediately to make application to the Committee of that County for that purpose, which he has since accordingly done, but has been able to procure from thence only ten Muskets, wth three Bayonets and not a single Cartridge or Cartouch Box, of which articles the Company are also intirely in want. It therefore, under the Resolve of the Convention, became our duty to endeavour to borrow as many guns as will supply this Deficiency and this duty we would with great pleasure readily comply with, was it in our power, but the scarcity of all kinds of arms in this county is such, that we are convinced they are neither to be borrowed or bought, were we impowered to purchase them.

As this is the condition Captⁿ Robson's Company is in, and it is impossible for us to supply their wants, we have thought it incumbent on us immediately to lay the matter before your Honors, in order that you may give such orders as you may think proper on this occasion. We believe Capt Robson & his Company are ready & willing to march if they can be supplied with arms, and any service that is in our power upon this or any other occasion we shall also be ready with great chearfulness to perform.

Measures are now taken by Congress, which I trust will reduce Carlton & his few Troops before the End of February, had one third of the Succours been sent Montgomery, in all human probability, the Life of that brave & gallant Officer had been saved & Quebeck long e'er this in our Possession. the Instructions of the Convention are come to Hand, but not as yet laid before Congress. Franklin & shall with his assistance set the Engraver to Work in a few Days; as the Convention have ordered both Plates & Paper here, we submit to you, whether it would not be expedient to have the Printing also done by Hall or Sellers, of this we are certain, the Business would be done with much greater Expedition but in this, shall be governed by your Directions.

With Respect to Cannon, so far as we can form any Opinion from the short Time to make the Enquiry, none can be had here or from any of the Eastern Governments, they are very scarce thro' the whole Continent—a Committee of Congress of which M' Rogers is a Member, have been appointed to make Enquiry into the Quantity of Cannon on Hand & what will be wanted & where & on what Terms they can be had; no Report is yet made, but a Letter, from M' Chase to M' Paca mentioning that Hughes in Fredk had contracted with Convention to supply our Province at £32.10, being communicated to Congress, the Members of the Committee were immediately very desirous to see Mr Hughes & to know whether he would make the like Contract, for supplying the Demands of Congress; this will convince you that a Supply cannot be had from hence & that you must rely on your Resources, by casting them in the Province. M' Paca purchased from M' Morris 12 Guns of 6 pounds Ball for £600, by order of Mr Johnson, they would have been sent down, had not the Ice stopped the navigation.

Gentlemen:

Immediately on the receipt of Mr Alexander's of the 20th of Jany with the Resolution of the Congress we appointed Gentlemen in each County of this Province to collect all the Gold and Silver they could in their several counties, the amount of which you shall be acquainted with as soon as we are informed of it by them. We have also received a letter from Mess¹⁸ Paca and Alexander of the 2nd of this month and are sorry to find we are likely to be disappointed in our prospects of getting cannon from New York or Philadelphia as they were immediately wanted for carrying into Execution the Resolution of the Convention for fortifying the City of Annapolis and Baltimore Town and as we are not certain whether M^r Hughes, tho' he has already begun casting the nine pounders with some success, may be able to comply with the contract for the heavy cannon with the convention in time. Those purchased by Mr Paca are intended for the Ship Defence which is getting ready with all possible expedition. We are obliged to you for the attention you have given to our request and the resolution of the convention relative to the Plates and Paper for the New Emission of paper money and should most readily conform to your advice and agree to the striking the money at Philadelphia by the persons you mention, but we think ourselves in that particular ty'd up by the Resolve of the Convention which requires that the Bills be printed and struck under the direction of "two Freemen of the Province to be appointed as supervisors by the Council of Safety who are to receive 20/p day" and it would be difficult to get two that would attend at Philadelphia during the time of printing.

We have been long in the expectation of receiving the Powder from Mess¹³ Willing and Morris which they engaged to supply us with and for which the money was lodged in their hands but have not as yet been favored by them with any thing on that Head, we need not acquaint you that it is an

Article we stand much in need of and that the Convention, to C. S. J. relieve our present Necessity, had agreed to take five tons of that made at Philadelphia for the Salt Petre lately imported in part of what we were to have had from those Gentlemen; we shall be obliged if you will know of them when we may expect the five Tons and what prospect they have of procuring the rest contracted for by them and favour us with their Answer.

While the convention was sitting Mr Samuel Purviance sent down two Depositions to the purpose of what you mention in your last; the subject was considered by the Convention and it was resolved that no further notice should be taken of the Affair and that the proceedings should be kept secret; we suppose the two depositions sent you by Mr Purviance are in substance the same and we cannot but think it extraordinary that he should presume to trouble you with a matter that had been agitated and settled in Convention. If it be not too much trouble we request you will send us copies of them and a copy of his Letter enclosing them to you.

[Council to Virginia Committee.]

No. 10.

To the Committee of Safety of Virginia.

Gentlemen:

We are much obliged by your favour of the 27th ulto and shall most cheerfully cooperate with you in every Measure that may contribute to our mutual Defence against the invaders of our reciprocal Rights that may be in our power; and shall also be happy in keeping up a constant intimate correspondence which our common cause at this time renders necessary.

Our Inexperience in naval preparations, prevents us at present from either approving or disapproving your plan of Row-Gallies for the protection of Potowmack river. We have a ship which we call the Defence that mounts 22 six Pounders, besides Swivels and will be ready to proceed to her Station by the first of March. She will cruise in the Bay and the Captain shall have orders to contribute every thing in his Power to the common Defence on all Occasions. The Powder necessary for this Ship and for Fortifications which we are building will diminish our Stock so much as to prevent us from attempting an Increase of our Marine till we receive a supply of that necessary Article more than sufficient for our Troops & Militia on whom we chiefly rely for protection and when this happens we shall advise you of it.

We have adventured very extensively to procure Arms and Ammunition, but are fearful from the Advices that we have lately received, our Endeavours will not be attended with the Success we wished and had reason to hope for. C. S. C.

Gentlemen. According to your orders, I have examined and received into my care the medicines and shop of Doct Stenhouse for the use of the troops, the invoice of which I have thought requisite to inclose for your examination. The medicines are all of good quality, and saleable in case they

should not be wanted the price is less than what medicines at present sell for, and that considerable. I thought it was necessary to take the whole shop with its furniture, not only because the Drugs must be contained in something but more particular that they can be kept in a proper order and regularity, since, as they must occasionally be divided, there ought to be a proper repository for the whole, this furniture has encreased the sum to more then was at first expected it is still as saleable as the rest of the medicines. There are but few drugs which are useless for the army and some are in a greater quantity then what we may for the present want which can serve to exchange for others which we may want in future. I have likewise taken some necessary Surgeons instruments which likewise enhance the sum. Upon the whole it is my opinion that if the war should continue and consequently our troops take the field we shall find abundantly use for these medicines and not have enough, but should we be so happy as to conclude a peace and not want many of the medicines they will always bring the money laid out again another consideration is that the ship defence will most certainly want a considerable chest, and as it can be supply'd from this shop, will take off a good deal thereof.

Gentlemen. I had the Honor to receive from the delegates of the Freemen of this Province a Commission as Captain of one of the Independant Companies in the Regular service, no one would be more happy than myself in the acceptance of it, had the gentlemen who were appointed Lieutenants been known to the men I would wish to carry into action. It is twenty years since I first had the Honour to command a Company in Defence of my Country. since that time I have commanded many. And being apprehensive at the beginning of this unhappy, cruel, & unnatural Contest between the mother Country and her Colonies that I might be once more called on to stand forth in defence of our Liberties I had frequently conversed with and informed my Militia Company and many others of my neighbours and acquaintance that it was highly probable I might again solicit them to follow me to the field of Battle they in the general most chearfully agreed to march whenever I should call on them, but as it was possible I might fall if we went into action, they desired that two gentlemen which they had agreed on might be appointed Lieutenants, and as it had been customary with me to nominate the subalterns, I promised that those Gentlemen (did I accept of a Commission) should be my Lieutenants, and had wrote to M^r Johnson while at the Convention mentioning the names of the Gentlemen and informing him of my promises but unfortunately my letter miscarried. one of those gentlemen was a Lieutenant of mine in a late expedition against the Indians who behaved himself much to the satisfaction of my Company as well as to myself. I-have come this far in consequence of a letter from M^r Johnson, Who inclosed my commission with an intent to accept it and to return and enlist a Company of Riflemen, which I flatter myself I could have done at furthest in a week (not knowing but my letter had got safe to hand, and the Lieutenants (if appointed at all by the Convention) were the gentlemen I had mentioned, from this disappointment after my engagements I am reduced to the disagreeable necessity of betraying the confidence of my Company and

friends, or to reject the acceptance of my commission. To do either is highly distressing; but as one must be done, and it is too probable I may be much wanting in our own part of the County upon a similar occasion, I must beg you will appoint some gentlemen to command in my stead. my resignation I hope will by no one be imputed to a thirst after a more Honorable appointment than my present. I am ready and willing whenever my Countrys cause demands it, to march with my Rifle in the ranks whenever I am commanded. further is necessary, I must pray the favour of the Honourable Council of Safety to grant it the Powder & lead upon producing my receipt and their order will be instantly delivered. mean time it is under the care & eye of the Committee, the quantity 5751 powder, 16001 of lead & shot. As to gun locks, I was desired when I was at Annapolis to keep what I had & what cuttoe knives also. I sent up an account of both viz' 92 gun locks, price from 7/6 to 16/6 the avera. 13/3, which I believe you'l find among the secret committee papers. the qualities are various some plain, some S. bridle, some double, but all pretty good as those prices can afford. We have some locks hereabouts that cost 18/ stg. at London and I have seen some at 37/6 stg. those I have will I believe do pretty well. I could have sold them to better advantage to the Virginia Agents but as I suppose some time or other our people would prepare for defence and my Smiths repairing fire arms & wanting locks I kept them. I am very indifferent about selling them but if the Honourable Council of Safety desire it to have them they are at their service. I believe I may have 100. I bought most of them in the South Branch of Virginia. As to cuttoes, I have 231 as you'l see by the account My brimstone unhappily cost me more then the Publick offers. [I lost] not a moment in communicating the letter directed to T. C. S. W & W. T. W. and setting engines to work, and I believe we shall succeed but we want money to exchange—of this more hereafter. The public Papers will communicate all the Intelligence We have, except the arrival of 20 Tons of Powder and 3000 Stand of small arms in Connecticut. we shall send forward some Powder & arms to your Province but I am sorry to say if we rely on foreign arms & they are not better than the sample we have, our dependance will be like a broken reed, as I think if used, they will kill more of our Troops than the Enemy, what those imported for our Province cost I know not a parcel imported here on a private Adventure, have been purchased by Congress at £3. 25, every thing of this kind is exceeding high powder £17. 10 p Ct much of this Business passes through a Committee of which I am a Member. Patriotism sinks before private Interest, and I find many men here who rank themselves in that Class, generally exacts the most from the necessity of their Country hence the Publick is plundered. We have sent off 10 6 pounders for the Ship, & shall purchase 2 more. Congress have appointed a Deligation to Canada, the persons are Doct Franklin, S. Chase & Mr Carroll of Carrollton. Herewith you will receive directions for proper signals to enable you to know any of his Majestys vessels belonging to the squadron in America which you may happen to fall in c. s. c. with on the coast of America. You are to take care to keep such signals as private as possible and when you quit his majestys service as a store ship or transport; you are to deliver up the paper directing the signals to the admiral or commander in chief of the fleet in America. proper orders are sent to his majestys ships on that station, and by a strict observance of these rules you will perfectly distinguish your friends from any foes. You are take care not to go into Boston or any other port in America until you shall meet with some of his majestys ships who can conduct you in, direct you to the place where the Army is, and assure you that it is a port of Safety.

I apprehend Cap' Fulford is the best qualified to do it of any person here, it may be of consequence how soon it is done, as those if they stand Proof, might be speedily got down here, We have ab 50 hands at work on a battery since tuesday at Whetstone, and near 200 more employed in providing timber, Logs, Smiths work &c for the Boom. I hope we shall have part of our Battery ready to mount some guns before the end of next week, Mr Alexander writes me that M' Morris had promised our delegates part of some Powder wh was arrived at Philada & which they wd immediately forward to this Town.

We are not insensible of the natural Advantages we possess for manufacturing that necessary Article and have some Men skilful in promoting it residing among us, but are nevertheless greatly indebted to you for your kind and obliging Offer of instructing such Persons of our Province as may be thought necessary at your Public Works—An offer that may be of great Service to our Supervisors living distant from the Residence of our Men of Skill, to whom we shall communicate the same and press them to accept it.

Sir.

The Council of Safety have stipulated and agreed with a Contractor for supplying the regular Forces of this Province with Provisions, but as some Time must be given to provide the several Articles which compose a Ration and it cannot reasonably be expected he will be able to furnish them earlier than the 10th of next Month. the Troops must be subsisted on the 7/6 pr Week allowed for that Purpose in the Instructions enlisting them.

The Captains of Independent Companies agreeable to a

Resolve of the last Convention are to provide Houses for their c. s. c. respective Companies and such Sums of Money are to be advanced out of the Treasury of that Shore where the Company may be stationed by Permission of the Council of Safety, as may be necessary for the Purpose. Capt. Gunby will therefore procure Houses for his Men upon the best Terms he can, and advise us thereof that we may give him an Order for the Money on the Eastern Shore Treasurer if it should be necessary to advance any: but as it will be expedient the Station of that Company should be first ascertained, and as we are not so well acquainted with your County as to determine satisfactorily to ourselves and most advantageously to you upon a particular Place where it might reasonably be expected the Troops would render the greatest Service, so we should be glad if the Committee of Observation would take the Matter into Consideration and give us their sentiments upon it, and as in all Probability we shall approve of the Station recommended by them we would have the Captain engage proper and necessary Houses there immediately.

As Bedding is an extreme scarce Article, where we have had an Opportunity we have preferred the Captains of the several Companies to endeavour to furnish their Men with new Blankets, but where they were not to be had, with such as could be got in the Neighbourhood, tho' a little worn, upon reasonable Terms, the new not exceeding 15/ or the others 12/6. If Capt Gunby's men are yet unprovided we would have him adopt that Method as the best under our Circumstances & will answer his Drafts for them.

It is very ambiguous from any Thing that appears in the Proceedings of the Convention who are to find fuel for the Troops, and as we conceive the Captains respectively can most advantageously provide that necessary Article so we request Capt Gunby will take the direction of that Matter for his Company and occasionally advise us of the Expense that it may be properly defrayed.

We have confidence in your Recommendation of M^r James Geoghagan and therefore shall be obliged to him to supply the Company with Provisions until the Contractor (to whose notice we will recommend him) can do it.

Gent I had this morning some conversation with Dr. Weesenthal, and inclosed I send you what he wrote me in consequence of it. I do not recollect that we have any Power on removal of the troops to increase his saleary. The drugs

c. s. c. are he tells me valued at £150 pCt on the first cost. I mentioned to him that as he might have occasion for some assistants & there were many young gentlemen that offered themselves. We expected he would examine them, & pitch on such as he thought best qualified, Wh he agreed to do, I think therefore that it may not be improper to send him the names of such as stand on the list. as we have some men in Annapolis that were taken by Col^o Smallwood & Cap^t Thomas for the Annapolis Artillery Company I thought it would be necessary they should have some officer of that Company to overlook them, & spoke to Captⁿ Fullford to go to Annapolis as soon as he Possibly could or to send his second Lieutenant M' Nassenbaugh as it was not convenient to Cap' Fullford to go immediately. he told me he would send that gentleman, M' Harrison has since been with me & from him I understand that the gentlemen of the Committee of Balt' Town find that gentleman very necessary to them in erecting their fortification, & would be extremely glad his attendance at Annapolis could be for some time dispensed with. I know of no expedient we can fall upon to spare him to them for any time, but by directly appointing the third Lieutenant for the Annapolis Company, as some officer will certainly be wanting to take care of the men now in the City; Pray let me know your determination on this head, and I will immediately acquaint the gentlemen with it. I have consented that M' Nassenbaugh should stay at Balt Town till I hear from you.

In Committee of Correspondence. Queen Anns County 19th Feby 1776.

May it please your Honors. The Minute Company of this County consisting of eighty men marched the third instant, and by letters from Captain Kent the Commander, dated Snow Hill 9th Feb 1776 is the following, "I was always flattered that our orders and ammunition were lodged here but find there is neither. The C-v-n have so managed matters as to distress me exceedingly. We find there is no provision made for Camp Equipage such as cooking utensils &c. That no person is authorized to pay the men their wages, nor any provision made for getting back when relieved which the Convention recommend to be at the end of eight weeks after our encampment, not considering that these men enrolled only till the first day of March. I believe a request or recommendation from the Convention to stay eight weeks wou'd be agreeable provided proper accommodations were procured, but when ordered to stay six weeks longer than they enrolled for is looked upon as a stretch of Power, and taking from us what we are contending for, Liberty.

It is reckoned to be from 100 to 110 miles from Hansons to this place and we are told it is about 80 miles further to Northampton Court House, near which it is imagined we shall

encamp.

I have seen M^r Probart our Commissary who has nothing to do for us only to procure the Provisions agreeable to a Bill of Fare made out for the troops by the Congress or Convention. Utensils for cooking &c we must find or go without. This expence will be too heavy for me as I expect one hundred pounds will not carry us down. Many of the poor young men are bare footed and I am obliged to advance the money or leave them behind. I have also paid 5 or 6 for repairs to our Firelocks such as were absolutely necessary. We hope the necessary steps will be taken to relieve our brave country men from their difficulties and as speedily too as it can possibly be done.

In the line of Preferment generally adopted in the Military Department, on the promotion of the Captain the first Lieutenant succeeds him and the other commissioned Officers in like Manner, by which means the nomination of a new Ensign

The Council have thought it most expedient to follow this Mode, but look upon themselves at full Liberty to deviate therefrom on special and good Reasons. Gentⁿ:

We some time since informed you that we had appointed a Number of Persons in each County of the Province to collect

all the Gold and Silver Coin that can be got.

Within this Week or ten Days we have had Application from several of those who were appointed to furnish them with Cash to exchange, without which they tell us many People will not part with the Gold and Silver. We would willingly supply Provincial Money, but the State of our Treasury prevents us. the Demands are very considerable for raising, cloathing and paying the Troops, and furnishing Rations, to say nothing of other Disbursements. If you do not send us down the Plates and Paper soon the Treasury will be totally exhausted, therefore we take the Liberty again to remind you of forwarding them to us. With Regard to Gold and Silver we think something handsome might be collected but cannot say how much. Should the Congress approve of sending down Continental Money we will engage to return Gold and Silver for whatever they may send not exceeding £8.000 or to return the Money again, without this we apprehend Gold and Silver cannot be procured in any considerable Quantity until the new Emission of our Money, when we can supply the Collectors with Cash. We lay the Affair truly before you and must leave it to yourselves to move the Congress, or not as you may think best. We wish to hear from you on every important Occasion and are much obliged to Mr Alexander for the Intelligence he hath been so kind as to communicate to us from Time to Time. Our Troops are drawing together very fast, we should be glad to have the Arms intended for this Province as soon as possible that we may distribute them. The Manufacture of Guns goes on but slowly amongst us from the best information we can get. Pray purchase for the Use of the Province 50 Ream of Cartridge Paper and send to us by the first Opportunity. We will remit the money as soon as we are furnished with the Cost of it.

You will observe what he says about the kinds of Powder. I suppose that sent from Annap' to Frederick was proper for Cannon, if not I do not know that we have any, the only method then we can fall upon must be to diminish the quantity in proportion to the strength, this I collected from him was what he desired. I really do not know any person of experience & knowledge that we could appoint to attend the proving of them and trying of their Bores to find whether they were clear of material flaws. M' Hughes mentioned M' Steel & M' Baird, if they understand it and will be pleased to undertake it I am sure I shall not have the least objection to them. M' Cummings waits on you with his bond he has made some alterations if you agree to them I shall have no objection.

I am sorry to request that you will interfere in the business and order M' Steward down with the thirty men that he has enlisted, Information was lodged this day with the Committee that two men well dressed were passing thro this County who from their appearance & behaviour the Committee had reason to suspect, they therefore requested me to send after them, which I immediately did, but the two men that I sent were delayed a considerable time from the difficulty of procuring horses. I would beg you to consider whether as it will be frequently necessary to advise you of what may be passing here, and the numberless occasions we must have, whether it would not be proper to allow a horse for the use of the Company. If you think it proper be pleased to acquaint me by M' Neale who will deliver you this.

I have also to request that you will send me about one hundred pounds, the money that I last received being all expended in Board, Blankets, Clothes, and neither of the two last yet fully got. M' Neale also brings up seven gun locks sent by the Committee, and six purchased here by me the account of which M^r Neale will deliver. We have as yet received no powder, from Charles County, and from what I hear there is no reason to expect any. I am much afraid we shall be pushed for a Drummer & Fifer, I have been informed by Mr Davidson the second Lieutenant that there is a servant in Baltimore who has two years to serve who is a good fifer, which he will sell for fifteen pounds or thereabouts, as his Wages in one year would pay that sum and find him Clothes. I should be much obliged to you to allow me to purchase him. Of the several matters be pleased to inform me by M^r Neale.

to be advanced, this money I shall receive & transmit you by the first safe Conveyance. the Cartridge Paper I have purchased, 25 Reams part of the Quantity, shall be sent off by the Stage this Week, the residue will follow next Week, and I shall then furnish you with the acc' the price is 16/ by the Ream. I called on M' Morris to know the Quantity of Arms & Powder imported by him for the Province, he was from home, his Clerk informed me about 400 Stand of Arms & 3500 lb of Cannon Powder, I have directed a Gen' of Maryland now in this City to receive them & to forward them by the Stages to Elk from thence to send them in a Boat to Back River in Balt. Coty, with orders for the Skipper of the Boat to proceed to Balt. Town & there take Directions, in what manner to land them. I have taken this Precaution to avoid all Danger for should any Tender or armed Vessel be cruising in Patapsco River, the Boat can proceed to the Head of Back River & land the Arms & Powder within five Miles of the Town—if no Vessel of the Enemy, she can run round without any great Expence incurred by the Delay. last night a ship arrived here

from Bristol which she left the 17th of Decr she cleared out for Cork to avoid Suspission, notwithstanding which, she was strictly searched & a Letter being discovered, directed to a Merch in Philadelphia, the Ship was detained but the Letter being merely on private Business the Cap on his Petition, was discharged & permitted to sail. some News Papers & private letters are brought in they were stowed away by a Passenger

in the Bottom of a Barrel of Bread, which being placed in a careless manner, as if for the Ships use, it escaped the search, one of the Letters was directed to Willing & Morris, without any Signature. it contained a printed copy of my Lord North's conciliatory act by which all American vessels found on the Coast of Great Britain or Ireland are to be seized & confiscated on the first day of January—all American Vessels sailing into or out off the Ports of America after the first of March are to be seized & confiscated, all foreign Vessels trading to America after the first of June to be seized—all Communication between Great Britain or Ireland or the British West Indies with America to be cut off, all Captures made by British Ships of War or by the officers of the Kings troops in America adjudged by this Act to be lawful Prize, and as such Courts of Admiralty to proceed in their Condemnation all orders, for the Regulation of Courts of Admiralty in America, heretofore made by the King in Council or which may hereafter be made, are confirmed—the Boston Port Bill, the Fishery Bill, and the restraining Act are repealed by this Bill, the Colonies being in the like Circumstances & Situation—the last Clause of this more than diabolical Act enables the King to appoint Commissioners to grant Pardons & receive the Submissions of any Province, County, Town, or District. I shall make no Comments on this Act, it is only a further step in that System of Tyranny, hitherto pursued by that who under the influence of a Scotch Junto now disgraces the British Throne. what Measures Congress may pursue in Consequence of this Act, I know not with me every Idea of Reconciliation is precluded by the conduct of G. Britain, & the only alternitave, absolute Slavery or Independency, the latter I have often reprobated both in public & private, but am now almost convinced the Measure is right & can be justified by necessity. the Gent who inclosed the Bill to W. & M. writes that 26000 Troops are to be employed in America that a suff' Body of Men are to defend Boston, while diff' Bodies are to attack New York, Virginia & South Carolina, that Lord Cornwallis is destined for the last Place with 5000 Men & was to sail in

the Gent adds the Minority gains Ground, that some of the Bedford Party had desserted Adm^m, that the Scotch Faction headed by D^r G. Elliot ostensibly & by Lord Bute & Mansfield privately, directed & influenced the Councils & Measures of the Court.

I make no doubt you have heard M^r Chase is ordered to Canada. he sets off in a few days. M^r Rogers has Leave of Absence. should he leave Congress, Maryl^d will be without Representation. I mention this, to shew the Necessity of your

A Gentleman in this Town having lately purchased an assortment of goods amongst which (besides a sufficient quantity of deep blue Bd Cloth from 15/ to 15/6d pr yd to clothe about two hundred men, and six thousand good oiled gun Flints) he has about two hund of the best kind of French Match Coat Blankets which he will spare for the Countrys use at £1. 3/ pr that being (he says) the price the province of Pennsylvania allows him for them. I should be glad to know whether or not I may be permitted to purchase a sufficient quantity of the Blankets for the use of my Company at that price as I know of none else here to be had, and the Company cannot do without.

I have purchased Cloth for the use of my Company tho at a higher price than limited, but as the men are very agreeable the Overplus should be deducted out of their wages, hope you will be kind enough to be answerable for the full amount. I have likewise agreed for their breeches and they are all well armed, and as their clothes will be finished in about a week, nothing will retard our march after the expiration of that time but the want of Blankets.

Honble Gentⁿ Your much esteemed favour of the 14th Inst is now before us, the contents of which has given much satisfaction to us and our Companies in general, the Comp⁷ from Kent County arrived here the 12th and the Comp⁷ from Queen

Anns on the 14th Inst in good health and spirits.

Sunday night last a schooner that lay in Hungers Creek Loaded with provision was taken possession of by 13 negroes, who attempted to make their escape to Lord Dunmore, but the next morning she was pursued by a whale boat which over halld her upon York Spit, and returned with her monday night, the negroes are now under Guards, this is the only remarkable event has happened since our arrival here, we have not heard what officer is to take the Command over us, the Field officers of the regulars raised in Accomack and this County are on the Western Shore, but expected over every day. The militia and regulars here are in a very defenceless state and see no anxiety amongst them to get either Discipline or accrutred. The resolve under which we march mentioned our coming to the assistance of the inhabitants of Accomack and Northampton Counties. But we are persuaded should we have an engagement at this time we should have but little assistance from them, but hope in a few days some companies will arrive from the Western Shore. General Clintons arrival at Norfolk with 1000 Troops we imagine you are informed of, It is said Dunmore has many friends in this place, tho the Complexion of the Tories (we are told) changed much on our arrival here. however we can say with truth that we were recd here with every mark of esteem and friendship, and the Committee has spared no pains to procure us comfortable Quarters. We beg leave to observe your wish for our continuing here the time mentioned by the Convention, altho we had enrolled only to serve till the first of March, what you have said on this head & puting it in our power to draw on the Treasurer for money to pay Wages, we hope will have a good effect with the Companies,

but could wish the Convention had recommended our staying the time mentioned rather than ordered, the first of March is very near when we expect a few must return home from necessity. As each Company have brot a physician with them from home which we every day find useful and necessary, hope some provision may be made for them, otherwise they must be considerably out of pocket, as they have been and must be untill their return home at their own expence, besides finding every medicines and instruments necessary. And as you request the Companies to return in a Body to their respective Counties, hope some money will be paid us to defray the expence of our march back, tho our Companies was one only 15 and the other 12 days on their march to this place yet the £100.0.0 recd of the Treasurer was expended and our Commissary not prepared to receive us, which much distressed us for a few days. If an opportunity offers to this place should be glad to be furnished with the continental regulations relative to wages and victualing, the latter of which our Commissary either does not or pretends not to know any thing about. We shall endeavour whilst here to give all the satisfaction we can to the Inhabitants of this place as far as is consistent with our Duty. But more particularly the province to which we belong and shall cheerfully obey every command of our representatives as far as can be done by a people who are determined to preserve their Liberties. And hope the conduct of our Companies this Campaign will not reflect dishonour either on the province to which they belong, or themselves, We are with every mark of esteem and respect.

If it is not going further than your board may think themselves justifiable in I would submit it, whether it would not be expedient in order to save the trouble of frequent applications to the Council & expresses to the Treasury, to advance to the several Captains of independant Comp^{ys} such a sum of money as may provide their respective Companys in fresh articles as are to be proved by the captains & also to pay up the arrearages of subsistance money, each Captain to render his account with proper vouchers for the money by him expended for the use of his company. If the Board think this ought to be done, I should be glad to receive by M' Forrest your order on M' Hindman for such sum as you may judge necessary for the purpose. I am also to request of the Council that they will take such order as they think proper for furnishing the Company with Musketts Drum & Fife, as they are at present absolutely unable to exercise for want of arms. Sir. Yours of 19 Ult. came to my hands, and in answer, can advise that I have been sometime at work about the salt petre. I got a parcel of earths thrown up and the boards for erecting the sheds are cutting, and having a convenient copper in my own house I have been above two weeks at work tho with very little success having made but very little crude nitre, the reason I attribute to want of Judgment in the process, as I think from a view of the earths, used in York Town, which I went on purpose to see, that what I have is equal. the Persons in this county has greatly left of making tobacco but the houses they used are mostly standing and from such in my neighbourhood a large quantity of Materials can be procured. the man I have engaged is an industrious person and a little speculative tho very poor that dont dispair overcoming the difficulty. before I got your letter, on our Muarying I wrote to Do' Weisenthal by him, & sent him there for three or four days, he is not yet returned, what he can gather then I dont c. s. c. expect will be equal in sight with what he can see in Phila. I will send him immediately of these on his return and get him instructed all I can, it will be some expense if more than my commission which I will willingly spend that way hope to be reimburst in my accounts, the Council of Safety may be assured its my earnest desire to promote the business all I can and will from time to time advise of my success.

Gentⁿ Your fav^r is now before me, desiring my bakeing the remainder of your flour as quick as possible, which I am not able to do on acco^t of the low price you have allowed, this last three months we have sunk considerable money in bakec. s. c. ing for you, owing to the great advance in price of wood wages provisions &c that we have been oblidged to make an entire stop of bakeing your flour in my hands, which am sorry for, at the time, I began to bake for you, wood was bought from 8/ to 10/ p^t Cord, and most other articles in proportion, we have been obliged all this winter to give from 20/ to 30/ for wood, and much such prices for every thing else, however the bearer Mr Hollingsworth can inform you, better than I can of the rise of almost every necessary of life, and the impossibility of Bakeing now for you at 3/ pr hundd I immagine we have got baked of your flour ab' one thousand barrels, & have yet on hand about four or five hundred Barrels yet unbaked which wish was baked as its growing very bad. I have a Brig laying in Boston, New England that will carry abo' twelve hundred barrels of flour, a fine vessel & well found, have a good man as master for her that can be much depended on as to conduct and attachment to our cause I would perpose either selling her or chartering to you, which if we could agree would have her order'd round immediately, and as she is a small vessel and counted a very fast sailor, do think we could get her round with considerable safety for if the Kings Ships were in our Bay of which she could hear at the Capes, must then go into Chincoteague Sinnapuxent, or some other inlet there. You please take this into your consideration and give me an answer in two or three days, when I expect to be with you in Annapolis for that purpose, as also to see what is to be done with the rest of your flour in my hands.

Middle District of Fredk County March 7th 1776. Gentlemen. By the return of the Committee, of the Militia Companies in this District, you will observe that I was chosen Captain of a Company, which I believe was one of the first raised in the Province, and placed in the 4th Battalion; but my Commission has never come to hand, and to save your Honors the trouble of making one out it is necessary, to inform you that I decline serving in the above capacity, which I am induced to do for these reasons vizt I had the honor to command one of the oldest companies, in this province, and was recommended, by the Committee to the convention, as a proper person to be appointed Colⁿ of the 4th Battalion. They being representatives of the people, and a respectable Body of Men,

I was impressed with a grateful sense of the favor conferred c. s. c. The more so as it was unsolicited. But their recommendation, for reasons which I am in some measure at a loss to suggest, did not meet with the approbation of the convention. And a Lieut of a younger company in another Battalion, who was not recommended by the Committee to any office was appointed, whose experience was not conspicuous, and whose assiduity in promoting the good of the cause we are justly engaged in did not exceed my own, The first Lieut of my company was promoted to the appointment of first major in the same Battalion, by which means, was I to accept of the Commission I should be under the Command of one who was formerly an inferior officer in a younger Company, and of another who was an officer under me, These reasons I hope will appear satisfactory to your honors and Justify my resignation, especially as I find it impracticable for me, with Honor under those circumstances, to render my country that service which I was inclined to do I would not be understood, as it is far from my design, to cast reflections on the conduct of the Convention or that I suspect them of being partial in the above appointments. I rather am inclined to believe it has proceeded from their being deceived by persons who they may have depended on for information in this opinion I am the more confirmed, from the many resignations of Commissions, and from the complaints of the people on account of the appointment of Field officers in this district. I have received a Lre from Lieut Colo Henry Hollingsworth of the Head of Elk in Cecil County, relative to the guns in which he informs me that Mr Johnson had acquainted him that I had some credentials or orders from the Council of Safety to him relative to the making of Arms and praying that. if I had to dispatch them forward by the first opportunity as he had given the matter out, that the workmen were dispersed and must be collected again which he was willing to do out of a hearty wish to forward the service. I have wrote him in return that the Council had delayed to answer his Lre until they should be ascertained of getting of locks, that the Difficulty was in some measure removed by the expectation of importing a quantity of them and I did not doubt but the Council would answer his Lre on their getting to Annapolis that it would be necessary he should have a pattern as all the

C. S. C. guns must be made of one bore or calibar and length but that on inspection of my Memorandums I had it not in charge from the Council to make any agreement with him I have a Lre also from my brother Colo of the second Battalion in Cecil. Commissions for our companies in the Battalion are it seems made out the other four have none this creates uneasiness and he cannot altho very desirous of it review them. He says the people are much discontented at the right of election being taken away. There is a Lre from M^r Gilpin on that subject in one of the Bundles. He writes as well as I remember that M' Ramsay had made out the Commissions and left them at Mr Peals. Mr Duvall promised to get them and send them up it would answer good purposes and avoid a good deal of confusion to have the Commissions in this Battalion filled up. I inclose a commission resigned in Capt Stewarts Comy in the 8th Battalion with the name of a person indorsed that would be agreeable to the Company to have for their ensign in the Lieu of the ensign resigned and should be oblidged to you to expedite his Commission. There are a good many more vacancies in the 8th Battalion as soon as they can be collected together a list will be laid before you in order that they may be filled up indeed did I know how to do it properly I would do it now as I do not know how soon we may be called out to action your advice to the Commee of Baltimore County of the 5th Instant being laid before me last night with the Brigadiers order to hold ourselves in readiness. The men are undisciplined they therefore more especially require to be full officer'd. But as we may want time to do that I am determined to march with what we have and have wrote circular Lre to my Capt's to hold themselves & Companies in readiness to march on the first notice I wrote yesterday to M' Garrett about the Bayonets and shall communicate his answer as soon as received. In conversation with one of the officers of my Battalion he informs me M' Purviance has made a requisition of the guns which were in the hands of the minute Company in this County that twenty eight had been sent the other two have been carried off by two of the minute Companys who have inlisted in the regular service and are stationed at Baltimore he could not recollect their names. The letter from Mr Harrison would have sent by express instantly, but Col^o Ware informs me he is pushing for Annapolis & I concluded it would be as soon at hand by him. Mr Harrison writes me that Mr Wicoff of Martinicoe has consigned some medicine to Jeniser & Hooe for sale, I have not recd any directions from him about them, nor even an invoice, it seems his brothers at Philadelphia are to furnish directions about them, & if I find there are such as the province will want, shall delay the sale till I advise you thereof. I imagine Conway will be at Bladensburgh by this evening & some time to morrow I shall be there to receive your orders respecting the further destination of the vessel & the disposal of the powder. There came with Cap' Conway a French Cap' & 6 sailors by which means after he clears our coast, going out, the E. Men of War cannot sieze him, as he will shew F. Colours, F. papers & a french crew. I scarcely had time to ask either of the Capt^s any questions, thinking it unsafe to let the vessel lye here a moment, but if I find the frenchman tollerably intelligent I will bring him up from Bladensburgh to Annapolis, As M' Harrison seems to think he may be a servicable man, if encouraged. Scott it seems is seized, but Mr Harrison has hopes of getting the vessel & cargo again, under some little disadvantages. Cap' Conway says there is a great many troops in Martinico, the Frigates & Tenders are watching every Island, he fell in with one but gave her the slip in the night.

Our Information before your Letter came to Hand was that the Ship anchored short of the Mouth of Patapsco, but that the Tenders went forward; we have some Companies out to guard the Shore on this side of Patapsco & as low as the mouth of Magoty River, as yet we have received no Intelligence this Morning we can depend upon from that Quarter.

We doubt not your exerting yourselves on this Occasion for the publick Service and your own Preservation. Mr Carroll is on the Spot and will order Powder and Lead from Major Gaither's, should any be wanted. We yesterday ordered Colo Thomas Dorsey to march with the Elk Ridge Battalion and are making all necessary Dispositions to prevent their Landing in case they should return to Annapolis.

At 8 °Clock on Tuesday Night our two Pilot Boats returned to this Place with Intelligence that a Man of War and two Tenders were pushing up the Bay, that in the Mouth of Patuxent River they made Prize of a New England Vessel and that we might hourly expect them off our Harbours. We immediately dispatched Expresses to Baltimore Town and other Parts of the Province with Orders for the Militia to hold themselves in Readiness to march. The high Wind all day on Wednesday prevented these armed Vessels proceeding up the Bay. Yesterday half past three, post Meridiem they hove in Sight and pushed fast up the Bay, having taken several small Vessels on their Way. The Ship which we imagine to be the Liverpool, came to an Anchor last Night off the Mouth of Potapsco River, the Tenders kept under Sail. Early this Morning the Ship weighed and we presume proceeded up Potapsco to take or destroy our Ship Defence and a large Ship loaded with Wheat & Flour by Permission of the Congress. Whether the Ship Defence with a Battery hastily thrown up will be sufficient to defeat the hostile Attempt we cannot say but we are confident if a Landing is attempted either at Baltimore Town or this Place that the enemy will be defeated. We are with the greatest regard.

P. S. 9 oclock P: M: we have this Moment received certain Intelligence that the Man of War is the Otter Sloop with two Tenders, one of six Carriage-Guns and the other Swivels only; that they have taken the Ship loaded with Wheat and Flour which unluckily happened to be aground at the Mouth of Potapsco & that they are proceeding up the River to take or destroy the Ship Defence. Fresh Provisions also we believe is their Object.

Annapolis ten oclock at night Friday

My dear Barrister.

M' Eddis is this moment returned from the Otter Sloop of War and brought a letter from Capt Squire to the Governor, a copy of it I send you. As I expected so it has turned out that the man of war was detained three or four hours and in all probability will not be before Baltimore Town 'till seven or eight oclock in the morning. I therefore send you this express to apprize you and the Committee of Balt. Town that the Otter has 18 guns, one of the Tenders six guns and 4 swivels and the other armed with swivels only. The Capt is to send a flag in to demand the ship Defence, I wish with all my heart our stores were out and the ship at the bottom of the sea. Eddis left the man of war at 4 oclock, about which time Hudson's ship was taken. The Committee of Balt Town being apprized of these particulars will take their measures accordingly. Squire behaved politely to Middleton when in distress and was he to come here in peaceable times I should be glad to shew him the civility due to a gentleman but I think he will have better luck than I expect he will meet with if he purchases much provision in Annapolis. The Vessel burnt off the mouth of Severn Squire says was done without order and done by an inconsiderate midshipman. She was worth but little and had only two barrels of Flour in her I believe.

We inclose you an order for Capt. Stricker's company to march down to Baltimore Town instead of coming to Annapolis if you think it necessary. When the man of war leaves Balt Town and comes down this way you will be pleased to order them to Annapolis. Nothing new has happened since writing you last night. I hope in god by tomorrow night to furnish you a good accot of the tenders & Hudsons ship, & that the issue of this affair will reflect some little Honour on the spirit of Maryland: At 3 oclock yest^d our Militia companies in town were paraded at the Commee room when at the very Inst a false alarm came from the point that the ship of wars boats were standing up to cut of some empty vesl* we had collected & got ready to sink across the river at Whetstone in case the ship should come up before we could get our breast works & the ship defence completed. A deput of the Come were appointed to sit & give all orders before the alarm spread, but such was the ardor of the Militia that not a man w^d stay in commee room with me but M' Harrison; The ardor & spirit of our inhabitants has convinced me they

c. s. c. will behave bravely. I never was better pleased than at their conduct on the Alarm, I am convinced we shall in a very short time have our town in a very respectable state of defence, & that will be convinced the care of us will not be thrown away in our [case]. I never saw the Barrister in better spirits than yesterday, He was immediately at the point on the Alarm being spread. Capt Samt Smiths whole Company as I believe are gone volunteers on board Nicholson & many others w^d have gone had he room or service for them. By a proposal wh our Commee offered betwn 3 & 4 oClock yestd of giving 8 Dllr p week for two weeks to any brave sailors wh wd instantly go on board we in less than half an hour got near a dozen brave fellows & several masters of ships to go on board & in half an hour after had the ship under way: And several others offer to go in the Sch I found this bold stroke absolutely necessary as the ship was really poorly off for sailors & the Cap' seemed to have no great depend on his marines. Your letter with the thousd pounds by Cap' Hyde I recd before sunset. I hope you will be perfectly easy abt y Safety at Annapolis. Im certain Nicholson will at least give the otter a Convoy past y' post, for Gods sake let not the Cont's of my letter to the barrester be made too public, lest any Intellige should be conveyed to Capt Squire to apprize him of our designs

Leonard Town 8th March 1776. Gent On Tuesday last in the afternoon I received advice that three armed vessels were in and near the mouth of Patuxent, that one of them had taken a vessel laden with Flour bound to Casco Bay. On the above notice (as soon as it was possible) we marched down to the mouth of Patuxent but before we could do any thing we were obliged to borrow all the arms from one Company of the militia and those but very indifferent indeed so bad that twould be cruel to set men to work with them the company from whom I borrowed the arms are at this moment in the greatest want of them, as we have certain intelligence of a man of War a large armed sloop being at this time riding in Potomac. The militia are thro this county in a most defenceless state, and my Company if possible in a much worse one. I have therefore sent M^r Steward up to you requesting to have the arms allotted for us, if you have them not, M^r Steward says he can purchase them, besides the arms we want more ammunition, and it is impossible to do any thing without them, This County being so particularly circumstanced I intreat you to allow Mr Steward to look out for arms for us, under the exigency of affairs I submit it whether twould not be better to form my company into two and make them sixty eight non Com^d officers, privates, with the proper Com^d officers. If you should approve of this arrangement, I would take the Liberty to recommend to your notice, two young Gent who have entered Cadets in my Company and who will fill (in my opinion) it very well the stations of third Lieutenants. I have stationed half my Company at the mouth of Patuxent, and half (as soon as quarters can be got) will be stationed at the mouth of Potomac this will put it out of the power of M^r Ford, to provide for them. I have therefore contracted for a considerable quantity of Pork and Bread which will serve the men on Patuxent a month or more, and Mr Neal goes off directly to the mouth of Potomac to get Provisions and quarters for the troops there. As the exigency of affairs would not permit me to consult you I have in every step that I have yet taken consulted the principal Gent of the place who have unanimously agreed to the steps that I have taken, but if they are judged by you to be improper I beg to be immediately advised and you may rely that every order from you shall be strictly complied with: I mentioned in my last the necessity of having a horse for expresses and any other uses, I now see the necessity more than ever, the hiring of horses is attended with great delay, and frequently not to be got, I therefore request that you will let me purchase one I know the public will be advantaged by it. I also mentioned

c. s. c. to you the necessity of having two drummers and Fifers, indeed little can be done without them I beg you will allow M' Steward to get them at any rate if purchased they are the servants of the public and their wages (if they live) will soon pay for them, tho times are such that I hope you will not stand for trifles. Cartridge paper is indispensibly necessary I beg we may have some permit me to press you to consider the naked situation of the County and to request that Mr Steward may be allowed to look out for arms &c. The money you ordered me is all expended and the people not yet supplied or near it with Clothes & Blankets, I beg you will send me a sum of money immediately, the purchase of Provisions Clothes &c exclusive of the money already received will take at least between two & three hundred pounds. I hope I may not be stinted for I have but little Cash of my own indeed what I have has been expended in the service and the public is now considerably in my debt. The men are allowed rum & molasses neither of which articles can be got here, I wish some method could be fallen upon to get us some. If you think proper to form two companies I hope the Genln now in my Company will not be overlooked they well deserve your notice and the two young Gent Cadets, their names are Robert Chesley and Henry Carberry. For any particulars M' Steward will wait on you to give you any necessary information.

Gentlemen. On talking with the Gentlemen of the Committee of Observation for this town I find they will be much in want of Provision for the Men now here, as the Commissary is not to be found. They have I think made a reasonable agreement to have the Men supply with Victuals ready drest at I/pr Head. At their desire I sent the Inclosed Letter to Colo Tho Dorsey, my Reason for sending it to him was his having had Orders to hold his Men in readiness from the Council, I suppose therefore they would be prepared to March.

They have here about 300¹⁶ of Powder, if more should be wanting I shall give them an order for some on Cap¹ Gaither, as I recollect he has the keeping of some belonging to the Province. There was an immediate want of a Surgeon for the Ship Defence, neither the Surgeon we had thought of or his Mate being here, I therefore directed Doct¹ Wiesenthall to appoint M¹ Coulter or some other, and to get all the Lint Bandages &c he could, for the Payment of which he should have an order. Brigadier Buchanan finds himself much dis-

trest for want of Field Officers, as there is an Immediate necessity for them, he would be glad Blank commissions ready Signd coud be sent up for one Battallion. Think of it, and if it can be done, we will pitch on proper Persons here. They are in want of Lead about 1500 will do, they will be glad you will dispatch a Cart with it to Hammonds Ferry. They would be glad you coud spare the Large Rifles.

They confessed one of their Tenders was in great danger of being taken, but that Capt Squires bore away to prevent great Effusion of Blood. But we conceive that he will loiter about 'till he is reinforced. We perceived a small Vessel making down the Bay not unlikely with Intelligence to the King-Fisher who the Flag said, might be expected to relieve the Otter. Therefore you will be pleased to provide against the worst. We cannot sufficiently commend those brave Sons of Liberty who this Day stood forth so gallantly in Defence of their Country Be assured that we shall afford them every assistance in our power.

I let him know that the Committee had determ^d to fit out the Schr we talked of I hoped to have her ready to sail by 2 oClock & that our main design in it was to strengthen him with a fresh reinforcemt of hands should he be weakened by taking & manning any of the tenders or Hudsons ship. I thought it of much imported that Nicholson should immediately know of our intention to strengthen him. I recomm^d to him to tow all night in order if possible to be up or nearly so with Hudsons ship before day light, lest the tenders seeing him coming might have time to escape him. I am perfectly satisfied from every thing I have heard of the Otter, that Nicholson is very capable of taking her, if he can be so lucky as to catch the largest sloop of which I think there is the greatest probability. Gentlemen: The great length of Potomack River from its mouth to Alexandria where men of war can go & the probability of some attempts being made by the enemy in that Ouarter make it prudent in our opinion to erect beacons or signals for communicating intelligence of their approach up the river in a more speedy manner than can be done by land. We have therefore appointed Colonel Mercer of the third & Colonel Peachey of the fifth Regiment to examine the river & fix the different posts & mode of continuing these Signals, but as we are aware that the course of the river will make it necessary that many of them should be set in your Province, we hope you will approve the measure & name Commissioners on your part to co-operate with the above named Gentlemen in effecting it. We hear of no more naval arrivals & the former quiet as to depredations on shore & up the rivers, confining themselves to seisures in the Bay when they have an opportunity. We have had no intelligence of General Clinton since he went out:

Gent Since my last I have contracted for a number of Gun locks which will be sent up by the Post, In my last I mentioned my having stationed a Part of my Company at the Mouth of Patuxent River, and the rest will go to the Lower Part of the County on Potomack as soon as Provision can be made for them, which is here extremely difficult to be done, If I may be allowed, I will immediately go to the eastern shore and get a quantity of Pork and Hogs Lard, I suppose fifty barrels of Pork would be sufficient for my Company until the Fall, pro-

vided I could get a Siene for each division of the Company, c. s. c. and every mess furnished with a frying pan. My Company being stationed in a Fish Country a great saving to the public might be made by furnishing the men with materials for catching & dressing them. If you think proper that I should look out for Provision be pleased to inform me by Return of M' Steward and give me leave to draw on the treasury for the Purchase Money. I hope tis now in your Power to furnish us with more ammunition, and the Arms allotted for my Company When we get the Arms be pleased also to supply me with a quantity of Cartridge Paper. The Men are in great want of hats & Breeches be pleased to forward them to me as soon as possible. This County being in so very defenceless a situation obliges me to press you for the supply of arms and I hope will sufficiently plead my excuse for so repeatedly pressing you for them. If you should employ M' Steward in any way so that his return here, will be impeaded be pleased to fall upon some method of advising me as soon as possible. a letter sent by Collo Fitzhugh will quickly come to hand.

My dear Major. I write to the Council yesterday morning wh I hope they have received since that yours of yesterday evening came to hand at three oClock this morning I immediately dispatched it to the Committee of Balt Town and Mr Purviance tells me he wrote you an answer. We got the Ship

Defence into the river this morning and she has retaken M^r c. s. c. Hudson's ship and now lies in the river a little below her, under no great apprehension I fancy of the otter. We had intelligence this afternoon that Squires had run on ground on the Bodkin Point, I hope it may be true, if it should prove so we may perhaps add one more ship to our stock. We are getting a Tender ready that will mount 8 or 10 carriage guns 3 pounders she with the Defence will I think be a match for the otter and her Companions. I am Positive Nicholson & his ships Company think so, a set of finer or more spirited fellows I really never saw, & if we can, as I hope we shall, get the tender ready by to morrow more they will push for an engagement & I really am not in much doubt of success. I cannot conceive that the council of safety can be prejudiced in the opinions of the Gent of Baltimore by any insinuations against their conduct by M' Ruben or any other person, I have not heard them say a single word against the Governm' sending Mr Eddis on board the Otter (tho I confess I wish some other person had been pitched upon) on the Contrary I believe they think the delay occasioned by that step was advantageous to them. I am sure I think it was very much so, I really had myself extremely fatigued with this Constant Hurry of Business, Indeed I am almost ready to sink under it, however I will push for Annapolis if possible the moment things are settled here.

We have always considered Capt. Squires as a Man of Humanity and a Gentleman, and as such cannot account for the burning of a Vessel in full View of the People of this City, as if meant to add Insult to Misfortune already too severely felt by the People of this Province, who were always attached to his Majesty and his Family, And who cannot be reprobated for defending themselves against any Invasion of their native and Charter-Rights. We are willing to believe and shall be glad of being confirmed therein, that this Step was not in Consequence of any Order from him.

We are much obliged to your Excellency for the Paines you have taken to preserve the Peace of this Province and beg that you will still exert your Endeavours for the Restoration of those happy days that we enjoyed under a constitutional Dependence on the Mother Country.

Pray dispatch your orders to him directly. I understand from you that you are at Annapolis sufficiently prepared to oppose the landing of any men from the Otter or her The Commee of Balt County had likewise before receiving your letter directed their light infantry company to march to your assistance it is now countermanded but they will most readily send you on notice any assistance in their power as no orders have been sent to Capt Stricker to come to this town, I suppose he will continue his march to Annapolis. I am sorry to acquaint you that there is some probability that the powder and arms we expected from Philada are seized by one of the tenders. In the great hurry and confusion in order to furnish some of the militia many of the cartridge boxes were delivered out to them wh perhaps may not be got again. we must not mind these small losses, it is the

general sentiment of the people here that Cap' Squires should c. s. c. not be supplied with provision & I hope he will not be permitted to seize the new england sloop.

As by your orders I am to hold my Battalion in readiness to march at a moments warning I shall keep them or such part of them as can be tollerably armed, on duty till I receive your farther orders thereon: I hope by the return of this messenger I shall receive your orders as well with respect to my conduct in keeping the whole or a part of the Battalion on duty, as likewise with respect to the disposition of the powder, as it may not be altogether safe to keep the powder near the navigable waters; If there should not be an immediate call for it, I think Snowdens iron works would be a proper place to lodge it, as it will be nearly convenient to Annapolis Baltimore & this place.

To the Deputies of Maryland in Congress.

Gentⁿ

We received Intelligence by our Pilot Boats on Tuesday Evening that a Ship of War and two Tenders were under Sail on their Way up the Bay, and immediately issued our Orders for their Reception which was observed with amazing Expedition and Punctuality. We were much indebted to the spirited, active and good Conduct of the regular Officers and Troops. The Militia moved with astonishing dispatch, and as soon as the Vessels hove in Sight our Coast was lined with Men. At Baltimore the Celerity of their Movements exceeded Description and had very near proved more advantageous than they really have, for it was expected by the Vessels (the Otter of 16 guns, a Tender of 6 and the other armed with Swivels only) that the Ship Defence was altogether unprepared, which led them to conceive themselves in a State of Security which had

like to have been attended with Consequences very disagreable C. S. C. to them. The Residue of our Guns for the Ship arrived only Wednesday Night and on Thursday Morning was wanted. On Friday Night she was towed a little Way down the river manned with a Parcel of Buckskin Heroes and other brave Fellows. Several small Vessels were crowded with Men to assist in case of an Engagement, which would have been dreadfull, as we understand Capt Nicholson intended to grapple at once. She got under Way very early in the Morning, resolved to retake Hudson's Ship and engage the Otter, which was 4 or 5 Miles below, if she moved to her Relief. Hudson's Vessel was guarded by the Tenders-the morning was thick and hazy and the Defence got nearer to them before she was discovered than was agreeable to them. They were much alarmed (not having any Idea our Ship was in Readiness to venture out) and pushed off with the utmost Expedition, leaving the Ship and 4 or 5 small Vessels which had fallen into their Hands. The Tenders would probably have been taken if the Otter receiving a Signal-Gun had not sent off men to double-man their Oars. The Defence stretched backward and forward below her Prizes and at length, seeing the Otter get under Way, came to, close by Hudson's Vessel and prepared for Battle expecting she was coming up to her, but to the amazement of our Brave Countrymen she bore away and anchored in the Afternoon off Annapolis. Nicholson continued his Station thinking it inexpedient to risque an Action, as he had such a valuable Prize under his care. In the Evening a Flag was sent in. The Gentlemen behaved very politely and on some subjects were free and communicative—they know every thing which is transacted here and to the Northward. The Flag brought a letter to the Governor from Capt. Squire Commander of the Otter desiring Provisions for his Sloop & that a Tender might be permitted to take unmolested a New-England Sloop loaded with Bread and Flour which we had sent up Severn. The Governor laid this Letter before us. We refused a Supply of Provisions and took no notice of that Part of his Letter which related to the New-England Vessel thinking it rather an Insult, but ordered a Guard of about 50 Men to be immediately put over her. We received two other Flags in the Morning, one of them for our Answer and the other with Prisoners who say they were treated with the greatest Humanity and Tenderness. The Otter and her Tenders with some Prize-Vessels sailed down the Bay yesterday, but we expect they will return again soon reinforced, as from what we can collect they are bent upon taking or destroying the Defence. 5782 lbs. of our powder is arrived in Potowmack and safe landed at Bladensburg.

Cap^t Chew discharged his company at twelve OClock last night after being very much tired with their march from South River, and down again. They are now under arms a little below Fishing Creek and will continue so, till they are gone below Patuxent. Cap^t Makalls company are 10 miles below and the alarm all through Calvert that they are on their way down. they weighed about 12 oclock and came too again about 4 in the afternoon as the wind was directly a head.

Inclosed you have a Narrative which will fully inform you of the Transactions of the Otter Sloop of War and her Tenders, which have lately paid us a short Visit; they are much chagrined, we believe, at losing a large Vessel belonging to Mr Hudson, that was loaded with Provision by Order of the Congress, and had been made a Prize of, but a Day or two before, c. s. c. and at their Disappointment in accomplishing their Design of taking the Ship Defence, which by all Accounts they made sure of effecting and was their grand Object. Just before they weighed Anchor, a Flag came on shore with some Prisoners, who said they had been treated with great Humanity and in Return it was thought proper to compliment the Officer with two Quarters of Beef. As soon as they can get a Reinforcement, which we imagine they have gone after, we expect to have another and more important Visit and are making the best Preparations in our Power to receive them.

[Kent Committee to Council.]

Chester Town March 13th 1776.

Sir. It appears from the best information that can be obtained that a return of the Ship of War with reinforcements, may be soon expected & their Business being avowedly to get fresh provisions they will probably make the attempt on the most defenceless shore. on the last alarm a very commendable spirit was manifested by every Company in the County but spirited as they are their resistance must be very ineffectual without the proper means. Most of the small number of good arms in the County were supplied to the minute company now under duty in Virginia and on an examination into the arms at present in the County scarcely any company of Militia have above thirty guns of any kind and most of these are unfit for any service. The two companies of this town cannot produce above twenty good arms.

In this truly defenceless state of this County and we believe of this shore in general, The Committee for Kent County humbly submit it to the consideration of your board whether it will not be adviseable for you to order the arms imported in Cap' Tippet to this place for the use of Cap' Veazeys & the other Independent Companies on this shore & to order back our Minute Companies from Virginia. The Committee having delivered out to the orders of the Convention & of your board most of the public powder under their care & the whole being but a very small quantity for the use of this shore think a supply of that article necessary: The Committee presume you will hardly think it adviseable to trust the arms & ammunition on the water after the late alarm & as they can conveniently have such part as you may think proper to order here brought by land without any trouble to your board, they would only wish to have an order for the delivery in Philadelphia. The Committee beg leave further to represent to you as their opinion that as the Brigadier General for this district is very c. s. c. distant & as no Field officers are yet appointed for the two Battalions of this County in case of an attack some temporary power ought to be vested to direct the operation of the several companies. They submit it to your wisdom to determine whether this temporary power might not be lodged by you in their body who you may depend will exercise it for the good of the Country in General to the utmost of their power and abilities. Capt Veazy has now got all his company collected here and no provision has been made for them by the Commissary, the Committee think it their duty to mention this circumstance that you may give the necessary orders therein in the meantime the Committee will cooperate with Capt Veazy & do every thing in their power to supply the men with provisions.

[Baltimore Committee to Council.]

In Committee Baltimore March 13th 1776. Gentlemen. I am directed to inform you that Messⁿ Jn^o Smith Benjamin Nicholson, Capt™ Nicholson Boucher & myself having this day examined the state of the Batteries already made & making at Whetstone & Fells Point, & reported the same to the Committee. They are induced to believe & hope that there is every rational prospect of securing the town of Baltimore in Case of the Otter returning with any other Frigate that can come up this River. And as the ship defence may be so stationed as to support the Batteries & Boom at Whetstone it will be of the greatest importance for the preservation of both the Town & ship, that she should not be ordered out of this harbour. The attention of our workmen being entirely engaged since last week on the Batteries at Fells Point, the Boom is of consequence less forward than it otherwise would have been, But to avoid every possible hazard of its being too late, It is agreed (with the advice of Captⁿ Nicholson) to sink all the vessels now collected at Whetstone Point; which will serve the purpose untill the Boom now executing is compleated. We have got the vessels all valued & ballasted, and Persons are appointed to begin sinking them to-morrow. The Battery at Whetstone will be ready to mount several guns in a few days; even now it can be used on emergency. At Fells Point the Breast Works fit for 19 or 20 cannon will be nearly compleated tomorrow. General Buchanan has ordered away the militia of Harford this day. Our worthy friends of York County have raised a select company of Riflemen, commanded by Mr Joseph Donnaldson to be held in . readiness to march to our assistance on any emergency: The Committee beg leave to submit to your consideration whether (as you have no artillery at Annapolis) it would not be adviseable to station Cap' Fulfords Company of matrosses in this place. That gentlemans knowledge as a gunner may be of much service to us. Either one or Two wagn loads of Powder sent us by our delegates on the first alarm are arrived in Town this evening. We shall calculate on another visit from the vesl' of war & use every means in our power to be prepared for it.

Gentlemen. I find I was mistaken in my information to you respecting the Nottingham Company, indeed the circumstances had escaped my memory. The choice of officers that had been made was well known to be disagreeable to the ComC. S. C. pany in general, and that many had declared if those gentlemen were promoted they would not continue in the Company. It was therefore thought best to give the people a new election, which was the sole reason why there was no appointment in Convention. On the second meeting of the Company for the purpose of Choosing their officers, the gentlemen I mentioned to you, and which I was desired to do by them, were named, however since receiving your letter inclosing Capt Bowies Commission, they have had & lately a full meeting of the Company, and in order to reconcile and satisfy all partys, they have agreed, and that with the Consent of Mess¹⁵ Dorsett & Haye, and of which I am particularly requested to inform you, that Mr Robert Bowie be appointed first Lieutenant, Mr Wm N. Dorsett second Lt & Mr Thomas Haye Ensign, this I am well assured will give general content, but if M' Bowie should not be appointed first Lieutenant to this Company I am satisfied they will be in the utmost confusion, and as it is intirely agreeable to Messⁿ Dorsett & Haye, who desire nothing more than their first appointments, I shall hope to receive their respective Commissions by the return of this post.

Calvert County 15th March 1776. Gent I left the mouth of Patuxent Wednesday, where I saw Cap' Thomas, who requested me (as he had no materials then to write with) to inform the Council of Safety, that he thought a Virginia Pilot Boat which was stopped by our guard some days ago, would be very usefull, either for conveying the troops from Calvert to S' Mary's, or for taking any small Tenders which might come in our river That the owner was very desirous of selling her & that he would take a reasonable price sooner than return to Virginia, as he was apprehensive of being taken. If you should be of opinion that such a vessel will be of any advantage to the province, hope you will inform me or Capt Thomas by the first opportunity. The committee of observation for this County met on Monday last, in consequence of your last letter, and impowered me to appoint a number not exceeding 100 men, to watch our Coast, & as the man of war and Tenders then lay at anchor off the Clifts, I thought it necessary to station a guard of 78 men exclusive of officers to prevent their landing. Those men continued under arms till Wednesday, when I discharged all but 2 Lieutenants and 25 Privates, who are now stationed at Drum Point there to remain until Capt Bealls Company of Regulars comes down. The man of War and Tenders pass^d the mouth of Patuxent Tuesday Evening:

Cambridge March 15th 1776.

Gentlemen. From the sudden alarm which the sloop of war and her Tenders have this week occasioned it was thought

necessary to order the Militia of this County on duty to guard c. s. c. the frontier on the Bay Shore &c. which they chearfully complyed with but previous thereto were under a necessity of making application for arms & ammunition. We were in hopes that when it came to the test we should find many of them prepared with private property in ammunition, but in this find we were deceived. There remained with us a barrel of powder and some ball sent from new town last fall by the Council of Safety, which we have distributed the it appears to be very indifferent and not such as we think men ought to hazard their lives with this has gone but a small way in supplying the Companies. The people grew exceedingly clamorous. We have been under a necessity of distributing what little we have of private property, but the whole put together would scarce make three rounds a piece for the companies. To what lengths they may go if not shortly supplyed we cannot say, but fear when they find that upon repeated applications, they are not supplied with the means of defence they may despond & tamely submit to such ravages as these Barbarians may think proper to commit. From the late conduct of the men of our County we have not the least doubt of their spirit and firmness and are fully satisfied they will make a bold and resolute stand in defence of the liberties of their country if properly furnished with Arms and ammunition. We are dayly in expectation of another visit from the enemy and have therefore thought it our indispensible duty to lay the weak & defenceless state of our county before you not doubting but that on your being thus truly informed of our situation vou will immediately order us such a supply of Arms & Ammunition as may be necessary for the defence of the County as without it we shall be under the dreadful necessity of submitting to such depredations as our enemies may think proper to commit, It is currently reported and believed here that the arms and ammunition for this province are arrived at Philadelphia and if this report is true, and we cannot (in our distressed situation) be more expeditiously supplyed we would undertake by your direction to send a Waggon or two to Philadelphia for arms and ammunition if you think proper to give an order for the delivery of them to us: Captain Woolford has now upwards of eighty men of his Company enlisted, are a daily expence to the province and in their present situation of no real service there being but one man of the whole that has a gun. We beg leave to report to you that M' Thomas Ennalls nominated as the supervisor of our Salt Petre works has refused to act. We have advertised for another and as soon as the vacancy is filled shall inform you.

We are Gen' with regard & Esteem Your ob' hum Serv' Signed p order of the Committee of observation. James Murray: c. s. c. We have given Cap' Woolford an order on Cap' Robinson for the province, arms which he recd from the Committee of observation of Kent County and we hope soon to be able to compleatly arm his & the other Independ' Companies stationed on your shore. Upon the late alarm some powder was given into the hands of the militia on this side the Bay & we fear it will be difficult to collect the greatest part of it again & that too much of what may remain with the people will be lost to the public. We recommend it to you therefore to deliver to the Capt' on the Water side as much as you may conceive will be sufficient (taking their receipts) with orders not to distribute it among the respective companies until there is a real necessity & to keep the residue in some convenient part of your county where upon any emergency the other companies may be readily supplied:

Virginia, Fairfax County March 15th 1776. Being employed by the Committee of Safety for this Colony to fit out three armed cruisers, & two rowgallies, for the protection of Potomack River, we have, in Consequence thereof, bought three sloops; the largest of which (called the American Congress) will mount 14 Carriage Guns. 6 & 4 pounders, & be man'd with about ninety Men. are now raising her Company of Marines, which will be compleated in a few Days; she has most of her Guns mounted, the shot are now casting, at a Furnace in the Neighbourhood, & if we had Powder, she would be very soon fit for Action. We wrote to our Delegates at the Congress to purchase for us in Philadelphia twenty Barrels of Powder, & forward it to us by Land, to serve 'til we could get a larger supply, which they promised to do, so soon as it could be procured there, but none has yet come to Hand, & we are very uneasy, least some of the Enemies Cutters should come up this River, to destroy our Vessels, before they are in a Posture of Defence As this Equipment will be as beneficial to the Inhabitants on the north side of Potomack as to those on this side, we doubt not the Disposition of your Board to promote it; and under these Circumstance, we take the Liberty to apply to you for the Loan of ten Bar of the Powder lately imported for y Province, in Capt. Conway's Vessel now in the Eastern Branch of Potomack; which shall be replaced out of the first Powder we receive from the northward, or elsewhere; if ten Bar' can't be spared, even five or six Bar wou'd be very serviceable, & might answer our Purpose, until the supply we expect from

Philadelphia arrives. We beg the favour of an imediate Answer & hope that the urgency & Importance of the Business will excuse the trouble we have taken the Liberty to give you.

Prince Georges County 15 Mar. 1776.

Dear Sir. Permit me to trouble you with these lines, on the arrival of Gun powder in Potomack for the public use to inform you of the great desire and expectation of the people, that a part of it will be allotted to the use of this county particularly the Potomack part of it, where the people much wish to be proved as well as may be, from the apprehension of an armed force soon proceeding up the river to Alexandria, which you know lays about opposite to the centre of this County on the Potomack side. We have 5 Companies on this river in the Piscattaway district, and 4 or 5 in that of Bladensburgh. The wisdom of the Council of Safety will direct the quantity, and how to be ordered in the disposition; but I will take leave to submit, whether it may not be thought best to have it lodged under the direction of the Committees of observation at Bladensburgh and Piscattaway; presuming it will not be thought proper to deliver it into the hands of the people, for obvious reasons; I think there is some of the Captains on whose undoubted care dependence might be had, but I fear there is some others whose prudence on such occasion may be doubtful, this causes me to think of its being under the direction of the Committees of observation in each neighbourhood where it is lodged, as the most proper method. The people had began to be somewhat dispirited, on acc' of want of arms & ammunition (especially the latter) there is an obvious change on the arrival of this powder (the article most wanted) from the expectation of their being furnished therewith; this being done, I make no doubt the inhabitants in these parts will prove as spirited as in any part of the province; they are on a sudden more active in getting their fire arms in order on this prospect of having powder. We are busy casting Bullets & Buckshott; of which I believe we can make out 15 or 1600 b We are also tolerable well of for gun flints; the Committee having last summer purchased all the lead & Flints they could lay their hands on. I am in hopes we can manage to have better than half of our people provided with firelocks, but then several of

c. s. c. them can only be used for want of better; I wish we could be happy enough to be better furnished. But we must do the best we can I know the gentlemen of the Council of Safety, and with a real pleasure can say, I have a confidence in them, and that they will do the best, in this, as well as every other part of their duty, I freely express these sentiments to the people. Your candor will not think there is any flattery in this declaration, there is really none, but I think it not at all improper to express myself freely, and shall do more so from your last letter; the information you there mention to have received from this county, I think must have a very slight foundation, should the Council think it convenient to allot a pound of powder per man for the numbers in the several Potomack Companies, I believe it would have a great & good effect on the spirits of the people, as the Companies on Patuxent lay less exposed there may not be thought so great an allowance necessary as on Potomack where we must expect any attack on these parts most like to be. I would wish to be understood, as to my sentiments of the powder being lodged. under the direction of the Committees of Piscattaway & Bladensburgh, not to mean jointly but that a part to each place under the direction of those of the Committee of observation in each neighbourhood, that no obstruction to the use when required may take place, but, after takeing the freedom to trouble you with so much, submit the whole to the determination of Council. Please offer my best compliments to the worthy members of y' able Council, and be assured (to you and them) I am with real esteem,

But it is required that neither the said Brigadier General, or the said Committee proceed to act without receiving their Orders from the Council of Safety, or the said Committee without having their Instructions from the Council or the said Brigadier, where the Circumstances of the Case will admit an Application for such Orders or Instructions without hazarding the public Safety; and that in all Instances, where the said Brigadier shall act without particular [Instructions, that he immediately convey Intelligence of the Cause and Manner of their Proceedings to the Council and where the said Committee act without applying to the Council or the said Brigadier, that they also communicate with the utmost Dispatch, the Cause and Manner of their Proceedings to the Council as well as to the said Brigadier, where it may be conveniently done And the Militia of the said County are required to obey all such Orders as shall be made by the said Brigadier or the said Committee in Pursuance of this Resolve.

Copy of Letter Nº 62 was sent to the Deputies in Congress. The Gentlemen appointed the 21" of January last to make a Chart of the Land, and Water at the Mouth of this River

specifying the Width and Depth of the Channel between Horn c. s. J. Point and Greenbury's Point, returned a Chart thereof and delivered the same to the Council, which was ordered to lie on the Table.

Our Minute Companies have wrote us for Copies of the Continental Regulations, & Pay to their Troops, and as we are not provided with them, we request you will send them to us, or if a favorable Opportunity should offer, transmit them to Accomack immediately, as we are sometimes at a Loss for Conveyances from hence, Pray send us an Account of the Continental Pay of the Officers and Men in the Navy; we are informed there have been some Alterations lately made in them by Congress and shall be glad to see them—they will be useful to us in settling the wages for the Defence—the inclosed is a Copy of a Letter we have received from Mr Harrison our Agent in the Foreign West Inds

[Baltimore Committee to Council.]

Baltimore 16 March 1776. Gentlemen. This Committee on the first alarm of Cap^t Squires being coming up to this town, met and took into the C. S. C. serious consideration the unprepared state thereof to repel any attack, and therefore thought it necessary to throw up two Breast Works at Fells Point, as well to preserve the town, as to cover the ship defence, who was then without the chief part of her guns; the accot of the expence, as soon as it can be liquidated, will be laid before you, and as the necessity was urgent, we hope you will readily support us. We also undertook to fit out a schooner as a Tender, and to support the operations of Capt Nicholsons & have proceeded some lengths in equiping her, and we beg to know from you, whether it is your intention that we shall proceed to finish & compleat her for the service of the province, or whether you would desist from prosecuting the matter any farther. We judge, the purchase of the vessell and her out fit may amount to £2000, and we are of opinion, she will be very useful in scouring the coast from the incursion of the Tenders, as she will mount 10 guns, and carry 70 to 100 men; she is in such forwardness, as to sail immediately on geting her men. One of the brest Works, which was mostly calculated to cover the ship, mounts 6 guns, and the other 10, and they were particularly requested to be done by Capt Nicholson. Our Fort at Whetstone is ready to mount 8 guns, and we shall use every exertion to expedite it.

You have inclosed a List of the Goods imported, all of which, will be forwarded by the Stages, except the Duck. We have retained this, till your Orders, it is an Article very scarce & dear in this City, if you do not want the whole Quantity, we can sell it, at a Price that will leave a considerable Profit—Congress have advanced 22000 Dollars, to be exchanged for Gold & Silver in your Province, this Money would have been sent you had any convenient Opportunity offered. R. A. who intended for Maryland last Sunday, prevented our writing, by the Saturdays post as he proposed going to Annapolis, and could give you fuller Information of the state of Affairs, than can be contained within the Compass of a Letter. We make no doubt you have heard various reports relative to a M^r Temple, who came passenger in the packet & is now in this City, before his arrival here it was asserted, that he was charged with Dispatches from the Minority to Congress, that Courts were appointed with full powers, and that if on their arrival in America, the different Assemblies refused to treat, they were to treat with Congress; Temple on his arrival, delivered his Budget, which was truly farsical, being only a Button of his Coat, in which was contained a Scrawl from Arthur Lee informing Congress that Troops were to sail from Ireland & for other Particulars referring to Temple, who could give Information, as he Lee had

acquainted him with the state of Affairs & the Designs of Administration. We have never seen Temple, it is said, he is sick, some say he is mad, from his conduct in taking this Journey to deliver such a trifling Letter, if this is his sole Business, the latter Opinion seems well founded. The Packet Letters are put on board the Asia Man of War, the Postmaster it is reported has refused to deliver any Letters unless the Postage of the whole is paid. We are in Expectation of an Express from Boston; Gen' Washington took possession of Dorchester Parish which commands South Boston it is said by letter to Congress that Howe was embarquing his

Personally appeared before me one of his Majesties Justices of sd County Thomas Kell master of the Schooner Dolphin of and from Baltimore Robert Bailey mate & William Cunningham seeman and made oath on the holy Evangely of Almighty God, that on the 12th day of February 1776, they sailed from Baltimore bound for the Island of Martinico, and on the 26th ult being betwixt the horse shoe, and Cape Henry was chased by two of the Kings Row boats & one tender, which caused them to bear away & run into Cheristone for the Safety of Vessel & cargo, & there waited for a favourable opportunity to run to sea, & farther these deponents declares that on the 4th of March a sloope tender attempted to come in to said harbour in order to take them out but was prevented by running aground, & farther declare that on the 18th Instant a sloop tender came in & took possession of said Schooner Dolphin, hove up her anchor and made sale in order to run her out & at the esterne of the harbour they run aground, after which said Tender plundered & took from said Dolphen salt & fresh provisions togeather with cordage cabbin furniture &c, and on the 19th the said Tender made another attempt to carry out the Schooner Dolphin but was repulsed & prevented by two companies of minute men, one Company of Regulars, & several of the Militia, and finding that said Schooner Dolphin could not get out with safety and consulting the Committee in the County of Northampton, which their advise was to land the sd cargo & then for the sd Capt to proceed up to the owners for further orders from Council of Safety and the Deponents protests against the said Tenders & Row boats for their detention, Damages &c. which they and their owners have or may sustain from the said Tenders & Row boats

Harrison, this Boat went to Christiana Bridge, from whence the powder was sent to Balt in waggons, of this transaction, we advised you by the Return of the Express, that brought the Intelligence of the Otter & her Tenders arrival in Patapsco. The q^{ty} of Powder that was private Property in Tibbet, was very small, part of it was owned by a Gent. in Accomack County in Virginia, the Residue about 6 or 8 q^r Casks, Mr Bowley informs us, is the property of a Gentⁿ in Balt, to whom it was sent. Powder is an article that cannot be purchased in this City. Mr Johnson had a Sum of Money lodged in his Hands by Col Hollingsworth of Cecil County to purchase a small qty of powder for that County, the Money being raised by Subscription for that Purpose: this he could not accomplish and at the pressing Instance of that City, we procured from Congress 5 Barrels which is sent down.—the Demand from the Eastward being very great, and our Magazine almost empty, prevents our making any further Application.

We doubt not but that the same noble and generous Spirit which induced them to step forth on the late Occasion in Defence of our just Rights and Privileges and those of their Fellow-Citizens, will support them under every Difficulty they may have to encounter. You may be assured that the Council will give them, as well as every other Part of the Province all the Assistance in their Power. We have ordered the Arms & Powder imported by Capt. Tibbitt for the Use of the Province down to Chester Town, from whence the Arms will be distributed among the regular Troops stationed on the Eastern Shore, and a Proportion of the Powder sent to the Committee of each County. Inclosed we send you an Order for the Distribution of the Powder which we have ordered to be sent to Cambridge to M' Hanson's Care by the Committee of Kent County and we hope will reach you by the Middle of next Week as also an Order on the Treasurer of the Eastern Shore for the Payment of the Expence of sending forward that for Worcester and Somerset Counties. Upon the late Alarm some Powder was given into the Hands of the Militia on this Side of the Bay and we fear it will be difficult to collect the greatest Part of it again and that too much of what may remain with the People will be lost to the Public. We recommend it to you therefore to deliver to the Captains on the Water-side, as much as you may conceive will be sufficient (taking their Receipts) with Orders, not to distribute it among the respective Companies, until there is a real Necessity and to keep the Residue in some convenient Part of your County, where upon any Emergency, the other Companies may be readily supplied. We wish to prevent the Militia's being harassed, and apprehend when Capt Beall arrives at his Station, which we imagine will be by the last of next Week there will not be any occasion for them to move unless a more formidable Force should come up the Bay than has yet appeared, which we have no Reason to expect for some Time; under which Circumstance the Number you speak of would not avail, and the Militia would be under a Necessity of taking the Field.

We have renewed our Orders to the Committee of Observa-

c. s. c. tion for Charles County, and if they are not shortly complied with, will send you some Powder from hence. As to furnishing you with Arms, tho' it would afford us the highest Satisfaction, yet from our Inability we cannot experience the Pleasure of gratifying you, not having a Sufficiency for the Regular Forces.

We received a Letter of the 15th Inst. from Mr Mackall advising us that you thought a Virginia Pilot-Boat which the Calvert County Guards had stopped some Days past would be very useful, as well for conveying the Troops from one County to the other, as for taking any small Tenders which might come into your River, and that the Owner would sell her on reasonable Terms, and requesting our Opinion upon the Expediency of purchasing and arming her for the Use of the Province. We cannot conceive a Pilot Boat properly calculated to transmit Troops across a narrow River in which upon an Alarm given, unless the Wind should suit, they cannot sail from one place to another with that Expedition the Service might require, and as to repelling any hostile Attacks which may be made by Tenders, we do not think that Boat would be sufficient for the Purpose as nothing less than an eight or ten Gun Vessel would offer to run up our Rivers to commit Depredations. These and other reasons will not justify our pur- c. s. c. chasing her for the Services suggested.

Gentⁿ Two Ton of Powder or near that Quantity we believe has been lately received at Baltimore Town from Philadelphia, one Ton of which M' Alexander wrote us, was intended for Virginia, but given up by their Deputies on Occasion of the late Alarm. we wish to be informed whether we are indebted to Virginia or to Congress for that last Ton, if to Virginia we can easily settle the Account, because we have already lent them 12 Barrels—2 for the lower Counties—10 for their Sloop of War at Alexandria. Musketts by Captain Tibbitt not yet come to Hand, they are much wanted, our Independent Companies are very importunate for Arms, which we have not as yet been able to supply them with. Our Gunsmiths go on very slowly, and we want small Arms very much, permit us to request you would remind the Congress of those lent for fitting out the Hornet and Wasp. We are anxious to have all the Powder secured we can, and should be glad to know what Quantity Mess¹⁵ Willing and Morris sent, and whether any more is to be expected from that Quarter soon. We are satisfied so far as relates to the Province with the sale of the Vessell called Wild Dick, W Lux seems not altogether pleased and talks that he had some Claim, but we think he ought to be contented, all things considered. Some Gold and Silver have already come in, and more might be got had we Cash to exchange, we are in daily Expectation of the Arrival of the Continental Money; as also of our Plates and Paper for the new Emission; we admire much at your Silence on that Head, and can account for it no otherwise than by taking it for granted that your Attention is engaged on Subjects of more Importance. We have heretofore requested you would let us know the Pay of Officers and Seamen engaged in the Continental Navy, and must again remind you of sending it to us that we may settle the Pay in our Province. We can spare fifty Pieces of the heaviest Duck and most unfit for Tents, the rest you will pleased to forward to us by the Stages. All is quiet here at Present, nothing new only that the Man of War in her passage down plundered Sharp's Island and carried off some Stock and had taken a small Vessell belonging to Colo Tayloe; a flying Report by Charles Landsdale this Day, that they were lately seen at the mouth of Potowmack. Your

- c. s. c. information with regard to Mr Temple falls much short of the great Expectations raised by the Public Papers, and by private Letters heretofore received; be pleased to send us the earliest Intelligence which way Lord Howe steers his Course from Boston, that if he comes this way we may be prepared to receive him.
 - P. S. If the Lead be not already sent off please order four Ton to Chester Town for the use of the Eastern Shore.

Calvert is greatly oppressed and ought not to be without a proper supply of Ammunition. You may be assured it is our Wish to provide equally for the Defence of every Part of the Province and that we will not reduce your Stock below your Proportion. It appears by a Report of the Committee appointed by the last Convention to enquire into the State of the Arms and Ammunition that there were 1205 1/2 lbs Powder in your County, and from them there have been but 250 sent to St. Mary's, so that you have now 955½ remaining. We desire you will therefore immediately dispatch the Barrels of Powder and Lead ordered to Calvert. When a further Distribution is made we will supply you with a full share.

On the Receipt of your Letter of the 13th Instant pr Mr Houston, we took the Subject-Matter thereof into our Consideration, and resolved to send Houston to Philadelphia with Orders for all the Powder and Arms imported in the Wild Duck, Capt Tibbitt, to be sent to Chester to your Care for the Use of the Eastern Shore.

We are much pleased with the commendable Spirit which the Militia of your County manifested on the late Alarm, but are concerned to hear they are so ill provided with Arms. The Council think it unnecessary to order the Minute-Companies up from Virginia, as they will soon return from their Station.

We are much obliged to you for the Assistance you have given Captⁿ Veazey in accommodating his Company and wish you to continue your good Offices to him. We expected our Commissary would have furnished Capt Veazey's Company with their Rations of Provisions before the Date of your Letter; since then he has assured us he would immediately send a sufficient Quantity of Provisions to Chester for the Company.

As soon as the Arms and Powder which we have ordered by Mr. Houston from Philadelphia to your Care, arrives at Chester, we request you would send immediately to us an Account of the Number of Arms; that we may order a proper Distribution to be made among the Troops Stationed on the Eastern-Shore—inclosed we transmit you our Order requesting you to send the Powder therein mentioned to Queen Ann's, Talbot and Dorchester Counties, and also an Order on the Treasurer of the Eastern-Shore for the Payment of the Carriage of the Arms and Powder from Philadelphia to Chester as well as for the Expence of sending the Powder ordered to Queen Ann's, Talbott and Dorchester and what Arms we may also order to those Counties, tho' we desire you would not send the Powder untill we have given Directions how the Arms are to be distributed, that they may also be sent by the same Conveyance

That your petr on Wednesday the 7th of this instant February being in company at Lower Marlbro (not then being sensible of the engagement he then had entered into and being over persuaded) entered inadvertantly into the thirteen united colonies service not considering the danger and distress his aged mother would be involved in by his engagement with one Frizby Freeland to perform work for him which he cannot under his present situation do: That your pet wo always be ready to serve his country in defence of Freedom, but at this time it will be the total ruin of his aged parent, as she now lives in the house hired by him of the said Frisby Freeland who will distrain for rent unless he is able to perform his agreement with him: That your pet¹⁸ mother is upwards of sixty years of age and has no dependance for support but by your pet labour: Your pet most humbly pray you would consider him in your kind compassion as a dutyfull child and grant him his discharge, And your pet as in duty bound will ever pray &c.

Head Quarters Northampton, Virginia 23th March 1776.
Honble Gentⁿ We Imbrace this opportunity by Captⁿ Kell, who has been some weeks blocked up in this harbour by Tenders, on Monday evening last a Tender came into Cherriton Creek and carried out a sloop belonging to Isaac Vaughn and got Captⁿ Kells schooner under way but luckily run aground

our Companies who are stationed at the Courthouse got down c. s. c. a little after dark; and as there was a ship and 5 small craft in the offing that we supposed to be the man of War and Tenders that were up the Bay with you, we planted centinals along the bay shore, and went to heaving up an Intrenchment opposite to Cap' Kells schooner, we discovered nothing of the Tender till the morning when she weighed anchor & came too opposite our little breast work & an engagement ensued which lasted about an hour, when we obliged the Tender to retreat without carrying out the schooner. We shall be exceedingly thankfull for the continental regulations relative to victualing and paying off troops; We were oblige to send Mr Bruff to the Treasurer for the money to pay one months wages to our Companies. We hope your honors will make some provision for get^g the companies home, as also for our surgeons, we are very respectfully

[Minute of Northampton Committee.]

Northampton County Virginia 20th March 1776. In Committee. Capt Thomas Kell commander of the schooner Dolphin having put into Charriton Harbour being chased by one of the Tenders who have made several attempts to take possession of her since and the said Capt Kell having appeared before the committee and desired their opinion what part to act, and there appearing no probibility of getting safe out, and thinking it would be attended with fatal consequences to suffer such a valuable cargo to fall into the hands of the enemy, Recommend to the captain to unload her without loss of time and run her up the creek, and wait the farther direction of the owners.

M' Houston just now returned from Philadelphia and delivered me the inclosed letter which I should have sent unopened but he told me he had directions from M' Alexander to deliver the letter to either M' Smyth or myself if in this town and to desire us to open it and see the contents and carefully to transmit it to you, as it might be imprudent to c. s. c. intrust it to a casual conveyance I have engaged a person to take the care of it to you by way of Rock-Hall with orders that should he be pursued in the bay and be in danger of being taken to sink the letter with weights. Mr Houston brings no intelligence worth communicating.

I received yours of the 19th instant, with the committions for the majors and other officers in the 25th Battalion; requesting me to recommend proper persons as a second Lieut and ensign in Capt Warrings company, and an ensign in Capt Richardsons Company. As to the first, Mr Baruk Duckett was commissioned by the convention & has acted as ensign in that company; I am therefore at a loss about recommending a second person till I know whether you intend to remove, or leave him out of that company M' Joseph Carlton who has acted as first serjant to that company ever since it was formed, and is very capable of acting in either of those offices, would be very agreeable both to the officers & men of that Company: I am not yet well enough acquainted with Capⁿ Richardsons company to fix on any particular person in that, but will in a few days inform myself and send up his name. inclosed you have some acct for wood and candles furnished the guard at this place, as also for the hire of an express to Annapolis, to acquaint you with the arrival of the powder. I have received your order for the delivery of ten barrels to the Gentlemen in Virginia, which will be delivered this day. And I sincerely wish there may be as speedy dis-

tributions of the remainder, the Militia in this neighbourhood C. S. C. has attended on guard pretty well as yet, but I find they begin to grumble much since, the delivery of the 22 barrels to the wagons for Annapolis, I have got it all in one house, and keep only a serjeant & 12 men as a guard over it, in order to make the duty easier to the people and cheaper to the province. At the time of calling my Battalion together by your order; I furnished one company, with powder lead & flints in proportion to the armes they had fit for service out of the ammunition purchased in Bladensburgh and have given orders to the Cap¹¹ of the distant companys to receive thirty pounds of powder lead & flints in proportion, that may have it ready on any sudden alarm to furnish such of their men as have arms fit for use, and as no one but those who have expearanced it can tell the time it takes to furnish a company on any sudden immergency I think if we have a sufficient stock of ammunition, it would be highly necessary in our present situation to furnish every Capⁿ of a malitia in the province in the same manner, however I shall submit this to your determination, and give no further orders without your approbation therein: pray send me the money for the inclosed acct and likewise some money for the further support of the guard, or, let me know in what manner those expenses are to be paid, otherwise I am afraid I shall not be able to keep up a guard much longer.

Willing and Morris still assure us they daily expect an arrival of powder to enable them to furnish us with the Quantity they contracted for they were but partly interested in the Salt petre which arrived & had not the management of it nor was it in their power to procure any of it to be manufactured for us the Congress having immediately on the arrival of the Salt petre taken up all the Powder Mills If you think it necessary we have no Doubt but that we can borrow a Ton of powder more as it begins now to come in from the mills we should be inclined to borrow & forward it but that we think the additional Expense and Risk cannot be justified but by necessity. We should have got a Return of the Musquets furnished the Hornet & Wasp with the powder but the Congress have it not in their power. Mr Rittenhouse has been pressed to get the plates done he has been lately chosen into the Assembly which has been sitting a good while past he promises to let us have plates to begin, enough for one Sheet, next week, the paper was to be finished about this Time. Inclosed you have the pay in the Marine Service and for the 3 independ Companies you'll be pleased to attend to the memd. at Bottom. There is no getting Camp Kettles or Canteens on any Terms or at least such Terms as you could submit to—instead of Canteens the Congress has been obliged to substitute little Keggs there's no Arrival here of any Tin. The price of Duck & indeed every kind of Linen exceeds here what it does with you any Thing of the kind cannot be got at scarce any price nor could it when T. J. got to phila wherefore no attempt was made to get Knapsacks & Haversacks buying proper materials might arrive in pot^o or from Vanbebber Time enough we hope what was sent down of Vanbebber's Cargoe will answer for there purposes & for tents. The duck is too heavy for

any use about our Troops we have sold the Holland Duck at 8. 10. & the Russia at 7. 10 a pt the sale was to the Congress for the use of the Frigates and to the Virginians for their armed vessels. Immediately on T. J' coming to phil he & R. A. mentioned the Defence to the Marine Committee either to sell or have insured they seemed not very fond of taking her off our hands before the matter was totally given up Capt Squires Expedition was defeated T. J. confirms our Opinion that if any Depredations should take place after we had parted from the vessell it would be imputed to the sale of her and there's no Idea of the Congress taking her off our Hands but on subjecting her to the uncontrolled orders of the Congress we have therefore thought it best to let this Matter rest till the Convention. We have sent an Express with Order to Capt Burgess to try Hughs's 18 Pounders, and request you will order Bullets to be cast as soon as you know the proper size.

We wish to have this affair cleared up to our Satisfaction. M' Lux knows Nothing of the Matter. We request you would converse with some of the Committee and let us know how every Thing has been conducted. T. Smyth is going to the Eastern Shore on Friday or Saturday; the Meeting of the adjourned Provincial Court next week, and a day appointed for hearing the Elk Ridge Petition prevents our coming to Baltimore; we wish to have both yourself and Colo. Rumsey without you there will be no Meeting of the Council of Safety on Monday. Pray send an Express to Rumsey to let him know our Situation. J. Tilghman goes off to the Eastern Shore on Munday or Tuesday.

To the honble Convention or Council of Safety of the Colony of Maryland.

Gentlemen. The Congress taking into consideration the urgent importance to the Sasety freedom & wealth of the United Colonies, that the manufacture of Salt petre & gun powder should be established in all of them, in addition to their former resolves on that subject, have passed those herewith transmitted & appointed the Committee therein mentioned, in persuance of this trust the committee inclose you the resolves, & being deeply impressed with their importance to our common cause, think themselves in duty bound to urge upon you the immediate & vigorous execution of them the erecting public works as mentioned in the resolves, will be the first step to promote this useful business, if prosecuted with skill & diligence it will ensure the making Salt petre in large quantities & will also afford the best method for suitable perc. s. c. sons to learn the process & from thence be sent abroad to teach those who have not opportunity of learning from these public works; for it is thought an object of the greatest concern that private families should be induced to make it; the inconsiderable expense attending the making it in families, when the method is once understood, & the quantities that each family may make, should remove all objections to their putting it in immediate practise. When we consider the great consumption of Salt petre, used in medicine, in preserving meat, & in gunpowder, even in times of peace, it should seem a sufficient inducement to private families to learn & practice this art, but most of all when so large quantities are wanted for our necessary defence, & when it will in a great measure supply the want of Salt which the rage of our enemies may render scarce, it should not reasonably be supposed, that any true American will neglect it, as there can be no doubt but that every colony may produce Saltpetre enough at least for their own consumption, it is necessary that powder mills be erected & skillful persons provided to manufacture gunpowder & proper regulations established for preventing their explosion. it is supposed that sulphur may be found in many colonies, & it is necessary that it should be collected, trials may be made at places supposed to contain it at no great expence: it must afford great pleasure to find that some colonies have already in a measure anticipated the design of these resolves, from the good effects of which it is clearly evinced, that we can never want the most abundant supply of ammunition from our own manufacture, but through inattention and neglect: We doubt not you will consider these proceedings as designed to promote the best welfare of the colonies, & that you will as soon as may be & from time to time inform the congress of the state of these manufactures in your colony, of the quantity of Salt petre already made, the preparation for & prospects of encreasing it, what quantity of gunpowder is already made, & the state of your powder mills, & also what discovery is made of sulphur mines & the progress in working them: supposing the most approved method of making Salt petre may not have reached you, we have inclosed such as experience in some colonies has recommended: the laying together suitable composts either in fences or beds in order to collect nitrous matter, seems necessary to be immediately attended to, as the earth from under old buildings may soon be exhausted: it is hoped this effort of the congress will have the desired effect, without which we have reason to fear, it will ere long be said of us, that we are become slaves because we were not industrious enough to be free by order of the Committee I subscribe Your humble Servant

Gentⁿ We have heretofore wrote you with Regard to the Station of Cap^t John Allen Thomas's Company, not receiving any answer we expected the Station allotted him at Leonard-Town would have been agreeable to you and to him; and indeed to every Body else, as being the most centrical Place, and from whence the Company might march on short Notice to any Part of the County. He informed us by his Letter of the 18th of March, "that he is positive that 'tis the Opinion of every Gentleman in the County that the Troops should be stationed at or near the Mouth of Patuxent and Potowmack": which we are surprized at. This would not only divide the

c. s. c. Company but leave a very great Extent of Country along the Water in a manner defenceless. What is to become of Wicomico, Clements and Britons-Bay and all down to the Mouth of St. Mary's River in Case the Men of War should pass unnoticed in the Night or in foggy hazy weather? When the Company gets well disciplined, perhaps some of them may be stationed to Advantage at or near the Mouth of Patuxent; we think best to keep them together at present 'till further advanced in military Knowledge, and that Leonard Town is the proper Station. Should you think otherwise, we should be glad to know your Reasons, that we may concur with you; we wish to harmonize in every Thing that is for the good of the County.

Yours of the 18th ultmo we only received the 30th We cannot conceive that any Letter that we wrote to you can justify the Inference that you have drawn, that if your Station is to be at Leonard-Town that your Company is to defend that Place only. It was preferred because it was more centrical than any other in the County; that you might be within a Day's March of any Part of it. But if the Committee of Observation should be of Opinion that any other Station is more convenient, we shall readily confirm and order you to it; or if they should be of Opinion, that your Company should be divided and stationed at the Mouth of Patuxent and Point look-out, we shall concur with them, when we know their Reasons for it, if we approve of them. But we presume that let your Station be where it may, that you will nevertheless march to any other Part of the County wherever it's Defence requires it. And why you should want positive Orders to do your Duty we cannot conceive; if you take Care to walk within the Line of it, you need not be under any great Difficulty to excuse yourself to the People of St. Mary's or the Public in general or to justify yourself to the whole World. Our Care has and shall be as diffusive and extensive all over the Province as it's Funds, and our Abilities will allow; and therefore we are not under the least Apprehension, but that our Endeavours will meet with the Approbation of our Constituents.

We sent you by Lieu' Steward £150, if that Sum is short of what ought to have been sent, you have only to make up your Accounts to the 3rd of this Month and every Shilling that will be due to that Day shall be paid. We are determined to have

Vouchers for whatever Sums of Money we may pay out of the c. s. c. Public-Stock, and therefore you will excuse us for not advancing

large Sums in gross.

We are surprized that the Contractor has not employed some Persons before this to furnish your Company with it's Rations; surely he will soon do it: in the mean Time, you must do as well as you can towards supplying them. We expect to receive Hats and Breeches every day. We ordered 2½ Barrels of Powder to you from Charles County, which we suppose you have received. Lieutenant Steward had 50 Muskets and Bayonets delivered to him with 100 Cartouch Boxes &c. and as soon as we get more Arms, you shall have your Proportion.

The two Row Gallies goes on very well and will soon be built, though am apprehensive of being at a loss for heavy cannon, our choice would be one 18 pounder the other 24

Coll^o Mason and myself in particular and the community at large, thought ourselves highly obliged by the kind indulgence of your Committee of Safety, in lending us Ten barrels powder, it happened just as we had got it down, one ton came from Phild^a for us, that we immediately returned it in the same order.

Resolved [that] the same be rejected; and that Commissions be made out to those Persons of said Company, who were chosen by the People on the 9th Day of September last, as Captain, first and second Lieutenant, and Ensign. Commissions issued accordingly to John Burgess elected Captain, Davidge Warfield 1 Lieutenant Basil Burgess second Lieutenant, and William Simpson Ensign.

The Proceedings of the Committee of Observation for the Middle District of Frederick County against Robert Gassaway together with the Charge against said Robert Gassaway were laid before the Council and read in the following Words to wit.

"At a Meeting of the Committee of Observation for the Middle District of Frederick County on April 1st 1776."

"M' Robert Gassaway, according to Order, being brought before the Committee in Custody of Cap' Philip Smith, the Charge exhibited against him (a Copy whereof is herewith sent) was read, and he was informed by the Chairman that the c. s. j. Committee would hear any thing he had to say in Negation or Mitigation of said Offence; the said M^r Robert Gassaway acknowledged the Allegations to be substantially true, and offered nothing in Mitigation of the Charge."

"The Committee then taking into Consideration the Charge exhibited and proved against Mr Robert Gassaway by his own Confession, and being of Opinion that his Offence is of a high and dangerous nature, and that his Behaviour tended as far as his Influence would extend, to disunite the Inhabitants of this Province in their present Opposition."

"Resolved That the said Robert Gassaway be immediately sent to the Council of Safety at Annapolis under a Guard of four men, and that Capt Philip Smith and three men to be

procured by him, be a Guard for that Purpose."

" p' Order John Hanson j' Chairman"

The following is the Charge exhibited against him.—

"On the twenty sixth Day of February One thousand seven hundred and seventy six, at a meeting of Capt. Valentine Creagar and Philip Smith's Companies of Militia, the said Robert Gassaway when at Exercise as a private man in Capt Smith's Company, stepped out of his Rank, and publicly and loudly declared before the aforesaid two Companies, and in the Presence of several other Spectators, that it was better for the Poor People to lay down their Arms, and pay the Duties and Taxes laid upon them by the King and Parliament, than to be brought into Slavery and to be commanded and ordered about as they were, he was asked who he meant had brought the People into [slavery, he said it] was a Parcel of great men. That at first, they destroyed the Tea at Boston, and then knowing they had done wrong, did not know what they should do to save themselves, therefore ordered all America to be brought under Arms, and say now my brave Boys fight away (clapping his Hand to his neck) for Fear their necks should be stretched, That this is as only done to save themselves, when they had done wrong, and were in Fear of suffering for it. Mr Gassaway was told, that this was only his own Opinion and that he had better keep it to himself. He Gassaway said he was satisfied he was right, and further said, the best way was for the People to lay down their Arms, and petition the Congress to petition the King and Parliament, and if the Congress would not do it, then the People ought to petition the King and Parliament themselves, letting them know that they had laid down their Arms; that this was the best Method of having a Reconciliation.

And further said that he wished the Eyes of the Multitude



c. s. j. were opened. That Mr Gassaway had been told of this Misbehaviour sometime afterwards, and been advised to retract and make proper Concessions; That he then repeated his

Opinion and declared that he was right."

Robert Gassaway being brought before the Council of Safety and having satisfied them that he had signed the Association and had duly enrolled himself in a Company of Militia in Frederick County; and at the same Time having acknowledged that he had greatly misconducted himself, and was sorry that it should be thought he would do anything to disunite the People of this Province, and having promised that he would be very careful of his words and Actions for the future.

It is therefore Resolved that he acknowledge that he was guilty of an Offence that might have been of dangerous Consequence, and ask Pardon at the Head of Cap' Smith's Company. And upon Payment of all Expences attending the Guard and otherwise complying with the above Resolve that

he be discharged from Custody.

Capt Veazey as well as some other of the Independent Captains on this shore are very uneasy that they are not yet furnished with any arms nor amunition, more especially as they understand the troops on the W. Shore are generally well armed & provided with Cloaths. I am surprised that the arms &c which the Council determined before I left them to order from Baltimore to this place for the use of the E. Shore are not yet arrived. I am fearfull some accident has happened to them.

I have been told that the militia on this shore begin to be dissatisfied that they have not some proportion of ammunition sent them. I hope there is some on its way before now, since my return home I have purchased of the Gunsmith in this Town 10 Riffles at £5. each which will be ready to be delivered in two or three days & ten more may be had in about two weeks more. I have also bought 80 pr shoes for the troops at 7/9 pr pair and if the Council would have me contract for the 200 pr which was talked about I can do it at 10/ & not under, of this they will please to write me:

Cap' Veazey has bought as much cloth in the County as will make 80 sutes & hopes to get as much more as will cloath his whole company. if the Council should not have procured Blankets enough for the troops some may be had in this County.

M' Cummins has not yet sent an ounce of provision for the Company quarted at this place notwithstanding his promisses. I propose joining the council the last of next week and hope my attendance will not be wanting before, if it shoud they will please to write me, my long absence from home makes my stay in the County for some time very necessary but if the public Business calls I will obey and am Gen' with the greatest Regard & respect,

Original.

Annapolis April 10th 1776. Gentlemen. I take the Liberty to lay before you the following remarks concerning the future treatment of the Sick in our Troops. Soldiers, from their way of life being exposed to Heats and Colds both day and night, are liable to numerous Complaints, and Sickness of the severest kinds, which if not a proper precaution taken, will bring on an infection, and bring the greatest Havock in an army even more then the Sword, this having been so often experienced, all nations have taken the greatest care to prevent this by separating the Sick from the healthy, and furnishing them with more comfortable Lodgments and diet, besides sufficient attendance with both Physic and nursing. As long as Troops are in Garrison it suffizes to have but one Hospital, called the Garrison or Regimental Hospital into which the sick are removed from the Barracks and which is properly furnished with Bedding &c.; but whenever the Troops take the field another hospital must be established, which is called the moving or flying Hospital which attends the army wherever it marches, and is placed in the Rear on the next plantation to receive both sick and wounded having sufficient Bedding carried after with other necessarys besides a Carriage with a convenient Chest of Medicines and Bandages. But as many sick and wounded would not admit of following the army in its march, another Hospital is erected in some secure place called the fix't Hospital into which those sick and wounded are removed, which have not the appearance of a speedy Recovery. These Hospitals are furnished by a commissary besides proper Bedding, with sundry articles of diet, such as Rice, Oatmeal, Vinegar cyder, Shelled Barley, Sugar, fresh Meat, &c &c in order for the Physician to prescribe the proper diet for the different Disorders. The Physician or Surgeon General has the whole direction of these Hospitals and has a power to appoint additional mates or discharge them, according as they may be wanted or not since the mates of the Troops can not often attend the Hospitals, and the troops together. in this fixt hospital the medicinal shop is generally deposited with a proper person for preparing the medicines under the direction of the Surgeon General who procures those medicines from time to time which become deficient, (if to be had)

This small plan I would recomend to your Deliberation or to lay it before the Convention that proper directions and orders may be issued I have the honour to be with the greatest respect, Gentlemen,

Memorandum. in the beginning of February I attended some of our soldiers so as they arrived but not general since my appointment was not known to all the officers but since the middle of February I attended the whole. Mr Wm Augustus Dashiell whom I recommended as mate under me did attend the same time, but he has not got a commission yet. Dr Budd arrived 2 days after the ship Defence returned when he went on board. Mr Nathan Dorsey arrived the evening the Defence set off from the wharf and thus went on board. Mr Dashiell was one of those that went out with the ship Defence in place of Dr Budd. Dr Coulter and Beard went likewise out with the Defence. C. Wiesenthal.

Copper Mine 10th April 1776. Gentlemen. When you met at Baltimore last March I presented you with a Memorial informing that eighteen Hands at my Mine were idle for want of Gunpowder and that the Baltimore Committee had taken 200 be out the Public Magazine which I had purchased last Fall and which has greatly impeded the carrying on my works at the Copper Mine. then pleased to take my case into consideration and grant me some relief. However since that I had procured 100 lbs of Powder at a very great expence and charge in Philadelphia which coming down in the Packet with sundry other things for the Committee they likewise seized and will not deliver up. What I have to request of the Honourable the Council of Safety is either to order my last 100 b powder to be returned me or if the public Safety requires it should not be given up to order me money to replace the same quantity. I have purchased very good powder manufactured in the country at 10/ p' lb. and can be supplied with a sufficient quantity to carry on my works at that price and not under, the powder I have experienced to be of as good a quality as any imported from Europe, therefore I flatter myself you will take it into your consideration either to order me the powder or money. Dear Sir. I have just now recd your favor of the 6th & am much pleased that our committee are able to Justify their conduct to your satisfaction. I believe they all mean to do right,

but its quite necessary to keep them within Bounds, because their Zeal will sometimes outstrip their prudence. I intend down the last of the week or beginning of next with the accot of the Defence and will then bring the schooners accor so far as I am concerned. Mr Hollingsworth has not got any cloverseed, the Flaxseed, Oil & Lead you shall have by the very first conveyance. I am afraid Hackles cant be got, but I will try. I must beg you to send by Mr Chase £800. Mr Alexander has never come down, & I must Pay off all the Ships accos before I come down I hear the Convention is adjourned if so I wish to know. We have got 3 of the 18 Pounders come down, 6 more were to set off yesterday. M' Hughes has drawn on me for the carriage & hopes you will place some Money in my hands for that purpose. I have paid £30 for these 3 & wrote to him to send an order on the Council, as I imagined they would indulge him when they saw him exerting himself M^r Trumbull tells me you have appointed Cap^t Nicolson Agent & Paymaster of the defence, please to let me know, & whether we are to be any further concerned in furnishing any thing on the Ships acco^t as we may close it finally; I wish the acco' in the Papers of the surrender of Quebec could be true, but it will come presently. I have been hard at it disputing the point of Independency, two to one against me. I wish you Health & Happiness & am,

Gentlⁿ When I was in Annapolis you were kind enough to promise me 50 stand of Arms, if you think it safe shall be much obliged to you to send them over by the Miles River Packet, with the accoutrements necessary for them, I shall be able am in hopes to get 30 or 40 Blankets, hope you will spare me as many as you can, am very anxious to get to my station; Potts or Camp Kettles please to send at same time, Hatts you also promised me, and Cloth if you have any to spare, as many of my people are very bare of Cloathing and begin to grumble about not having their Cloathes; in our present situation it is impossible to keep the Company all together, as many of them cannot get their board nearer than seven or eight miles which makes it impossible for them to meet as regularly as they

ought for which reason am very desirous of getting Arms & Blankets to remove to my station.

As we would not willingly interfere with any Gentlemen. person's private Character unless obliged so to do on a matter of the utmost consequence, which in the present case we are under the necessity of doing, so far as is consistant with our opinions and safety; yet far be it from us, and sorry indeed we should be to do the smallest injustice to any person whatever, nor will we in any respect condesend to do it. We are apprehensive that Mr William Hamilton may be appointed Captain in place of Captain Andrew Beall, by the recommendation of Col^o Joshua Beall through prejudice to our late Captain, who would not condesend to serve as Captain under him. There has been great confusion in the Company since our Captain resign'd, and it will be much more so if Hamilton should be appointed Captain, as a great majority of the Company are determined not to serve under him, he not being a proper person in any respect whatever for that office; and sensible we are, in the event of his being appointed (should it so happen) that a Company inferior to none in the Province, in the Militia, must inevitably come to nothing, wholly from the dislike they have of his filling that station: We therefore hope, and entreat your honours, not to be the cause of distroying so good a Company, which you might innocently be induced to by the recommendation of the Colonel, but we trust, that you will take the matter into your serious consideration, and reflect that we are free people, and have a right, to the choice of our own Officers, under whom we are to risque our lives and fortunes with theirs, which we will most chearfully and readily do when ever called upon, provided we have Officers agreeable, and such only we will obey. We therefore pray your honours would gratify us in granting a Commission to M' Andrew Beall Jun' as our Captain in place of his Father, a young man that we choose in preference to any man in the Company, and who is Balloted in by a great majority, having thirty odd votes out of fifty, and there were four candidates. And we further entreat you, to give us the liberty of choosing our other officers, which will give great satisfaction to the whole Company. We are for ourselves, and in behalf of the rest of the Company, with much respect, Gentlemen.

To Thomas Smyth, Esq^r

Sir We are sorry any uneasiness should prevail among the Independent Captains on the Eastern Shore from a Supposition they have not equally the Attention of the Council of Safety, with those on this side the Bay. We aim at doing what is right and wish to avoid every appearance of Partiality. The Companies here are unhappily circumstanced both as to Arms and Cloathing, as they are with you.

We were disappointed in having as many Guns at Baltimore as we expected, and as there were a good many on Hand in Annapolis and we had a Probability of receiving sixty or eighty more from Fred^k within a few Days, we thought it most

advisable to wait a little while for them, that you might be c. s. c. furnished at once with at least as many as we had in View to send when you were with us. The Hatts, Blankets & lead did not get down until three or four Days ago, and we were obliged to send a second Messenger to Baltimore before we could learn the quantity of Muskett-Powder they had there, those matters prevented our supplying you so early as we were anxious to do.

We have sent you from hence by M' Waters's Boat 94 Musketts 21 Rifles with Bullet-Moulds, Pouches and Horns, 510 hatts, 3 p. Oznabrigs, 1500 Gun Flints, 20 Muskett Bullet Moulds, 40 Blankets, 21/2 Reams of Cartridge Paper, 50 ps Check, 15 ps of Russia Linen, & 45 ps of Cruger, and have ordered Major Gist to send from Baltimore 1 Ton of Muskett Gun Powder, 4 Ton of Lead, 454 Cartridge Boxes & Belts, 454 Bayonet-Belts, 300 Gun Slings, and also 60 of the Musquetts and Accoutrements now in the possession of Captⁿ Nathaniel Smith's Company. The Oznabrigs is for Captⁿ Veazey's Company, the Blanketts for the others, & the Arms & with 40 Musketts and Accoutrements and 20 Rifles, which we have purchased from M^r Thomas Ringgold with those you have bought, and also the Linen are to be equally distributed —to avoid all Complaints, if you have Leisure, we request you will parcel out the Arms for each Company. Cecil County is already sufficiently supplied with Powder and Lead. The gentlemen from below say the Addition of one Barrel will not be enough, we therefore would have you send them each another, and to keep up an Equality which may prevent Uneasiness we desire you will also add one to each of the other Counties except Caroline. We desire you will contract for the other Rifles, but think the Shoes too dear.

If Mr Hands can come over with you the last of next Week it will be a great Relief to us. Mr Carroll is fearful of a Fit of the Gout, Mr Tilghman anxious to get to the Eastern Shore and the rest of us are much fatigued.

Annapolis 17th April 1776. Gentⁿ However unwelcome might be your Errand your polite Behaviour to me Yesterday merits my Acknowledgments: And on mature Consideration of the Proposal you made to me, I find it incumbent on me to tell you that I will not accord to it, nor can I, whilst I act, in any Degree, as Governor of this Province, give my Parole to walk about in it, a Prisoner at Large, under any Obligation whatever; the Necessity must be obvious of my ceasing to act as Governor, should I become a Prisoner; neither will I voluntarily give you any Satisfaction on that head, further than that I had, and have, no Intention during these Times, of leaving the Province, whilst my continuing here can in my own Opinion, tend to preserve its Tranquility. My Resolution was, as the Letters you have of mine show, to continue here whilst I could serve the Province; nor shall the Indignity now offered to me alter it. I shall persevere in my line of Duty by what I think the Rule of Right, but not without some Chagrin at knowing myself unmeritedly the Object of Suspicion, altho' I have the Satisfaction to think that a considerable part of the most respectable Persons in the Province entertain a very different Opinion of me, than is to be inferred from your proposed Arrest.

May I not challenge you to say to the World if any Troops have arrived at, or any hostile Measures been proceeded in against, this Province, from any Request of mine, or Information from me, to the Secretary of State? I have above told you my Resolution of continuing in my Station, as long as permitted, or the ostensible Form of the established Government can contribute to preserve the Peace of the Province; and I will add one further Assurance, in hopes it may be satisfactory to you, that as your Convention is to meet shortly they shall find me here, and willing to continue acting in the same Line I have hitherto done, so long as Maryland can reap any peaceful Benefits from my Service, provided I can have Assurances that my peaceable departure shall not be impeded, whenever I find my remaining any longer here unnecessary, or that my private Affairs at home indispensably demand my Return:

Consistent with my Honour, and insulted Station, I cannot add more but that, if made a Prisoner, I shall consider myself treated as an Enemy, and such a proceeding as a Breach of that Confidence I have implicitly reposed in you, which I thought my Conduct, and the public Declaration of the Convention justified. In Times of public Distress and Convulsion when a free People are threatened with a deprivation of their civil Liberty, Exertions for it's Preservation influenced by the purest Principles and conducted with all possible Attention to Form and Ceremony, we hope will not be considered as an Indignity or Insult to any Rank or Station in the Community. The Proceeding which your Excellency reprehends in your Letter addressed to Ch' Carroll, John Hall, & W^m Paca Esq^{rs} and communicated by them to our Board, arose from an Impression that we who are intrusted with the public Safety, should pursue with Vigilance every effectual Measure, tho' the Danger to be guarded against may rest only in Possibility. The intercepted Letters from Administration to your Excellency, we own, furnish Grounds for Conjecture and Apprehension only of your having held an injurious Correspondence; and whilst we reflect on the general Tenor of your Excellency's Conduct, the friendly Disposition you have often manifested and the several favorable and impartial Representations, you have

made to Administration of the Temper and Principles of the c.s.c. People of this Province, we sincerely lament the Necessity of the Times, which urging us to guard against every Possibility of Danger, forced us to a Measure so disagreeable to us and which may prove an unmerited Treatment of your Excellency.

We acknowledge Sir, we know of no Information you have given Administration, countenancing or encouraging the Introduction of Troops into this Province: nor do we know of any measures whatever to have been concerted or pursued by your

Excellency injurious to this Province or America.

We thank your Excellency for your Resolution of continuing in your Station as long as permitted or the ostensible Form of the established Government can contribute to preserve the Peace of the Province, and we cheerfully acquiesce in your Excellency's Assurance that as the Convention is shortly to meet, they shall find you here. As far as our Influence extends with that respectable Body, it shall not be wanting to remove every Obstruction to your peaceable Departure, whenever your Excellency's Continuance here shall become inconsistent with your Instructions or your private Affairs shall demand your Return.

Gentⁿ We have had an Alarm here of a very interesting Nature. We think it advisable to communicate the Intelligence by express, at the same Time letting you know what we have done therein, and we are induced to expedite our dispatch because we do not know but that the Congress may have taken some steps in the same Affair; Copies having been forwarded to them from the Committee of Observation for Baltimore County, to whom the whole Packett was transmitted by the Committee of Safety of Virginia, we think very improperly, as the address ought to have been made in the first Place to us.

Some Time past Alexander Ross (a great Scound—we fear) applied to our Board for a Permit to Lord Dunmore under Pretence of private Business, and getting some Money that was due to him as he alledged; he brought us a Letter from two Gentlemen of the Congress, Mess's Alexander and Rogers, which no doubt R. A. remembers. We refused to give him

c. s. c. any other Permit than to the Committee of Safety of Virginia, thither he went we are told, but could get no Permit to Dunmore, he got a letter 'tis said to the Committee of Hampton they declined giving him any Passport; he went to Lord Dunmore without, and on his way back was stopt by Captⁿ Baron, who took from him some Letters to Governor Eden and particularly a circular Letter, also a private Letter from L^d G. Germaine, which we take it for granted you have seen. some of the Committee of Baltimore assuring us that they forwarded Duplicates to the Congress. On Receipt of these Letters Monday Afternoon, we immediately gave orders to apprehend Ross, and the next Morning a Deputation from on board together with W: Paca Esq' then in Town waited on the Governor, shewed him the copies of the intercepted Letters, and requested a Sight of his Letter of the 27th of August to Lord Dartmouth. The Governor declared to us that he had sent away the Copy of that Letter with all his other Papers of Consequence last Fall, and could not remember the particulars, but observed we might be convinced there was Nothing of a Nature unfriendly to the Peace of this Province, because the Troops going to the Southward were not ordered here. He asserted also upon his Honour that he had not endeavoured to enflame the Ministry by traducing the Characters of Individuals, some he had spoke well of, others he had recommended as Sufferers. The Gentlemen of the Congress he had spoke of as acting within the Line of Moderation.

The deputation informed him they were instructed to ask his Parole that he would not leave the Province 'till the Meeting of the Convention; he complained of being unjustly suspected, gave us his Letters from W^m Eden Esq^r his Brother, one of the Under-Secretaries, also from Lord Dartmouth (Copies of which we had Leave to take and herewith transmit you)—he desired Time 'till this day 12 oclock to give his definitive Answer: he has given it, and we send you a Copy thereof; we look upon it as giving his Parole in Effect that he will not leave the Province 'till the Convention, and will endeavour to promote the Peace thereof in the mean time: he wishes to continue in that Line of Conduct as long as he can consistent with his Station, and will not leave the Province, after the Convention, provided they will assure him that when he finds he can no longer stay with Peace and Consistency he may have Leave to depart and carry his Effects—this we promised to recommend to our Friends in Convention. agrees with us in Opinion that we may rest satisfied with this Answer and not call the Convention sooner than the 27th of May, unless some thing further should intervene. You have probably heard that our convention did not meet agreeable to

their late Adjournment; on Friday evening 26 Members who c. s. c. were collected agreed to seperate and that G. Duvall should write a circular Letter informing the Delegates that the Members assembled recommended the Holding a Convention on the 27th of May. We inclose also a Copy of their circular Letter.

The Indignity offered our Board by the Committee of Safety in Virginia, and the Want of Confidence in the Balt. Committee, to say Nothing more harsh, we cannot help complaining of. We know of no good Cause for this Insult in passing us by, nor can we conceive what Motives could induce such Treatment. We send you by Mr Green who will hand you this £1372.0.7 Currency in Gold for the Continental Service. W. P. has delivered in the Money he brought from the Treasury. Be pleased to forward the Money-Plates by Mr Green if not already sent.

P. S. The last Ton of Continental Powder if not already sent to Chester we would have ordered to Baltimore having already sent Powder to the Eastern Shore. The Copies of the Governor's Letters &c are sent in Confidence, and are not to be printed. Our Answer to his Excellency's Letter you shall receive by next Post.

Sir. Your Brother has been so obliging as to communicate to me from Time to Time such Intelligence, as you have transmitted to him respecting the Affairs in Maryland, and about 10 Days ago I had the Satisfaction to receive your Letter of the 5th of May. I sincerely wish you may not have been too



sanguine in your Hopes, that the Time is not far distant, when Peace and Harmony will be restored & confidence re-established on a permanent Basis; at the same Time I observe with Satisfaction what you say of the Temper and Moderation of the Persons chosen to represent the Province of Maryland in the Continental Congress, & I am not without some Reason to believe that there may be others in that Congress of the

same Disposition.

At present however the rebellious Proceedings of the People in most of the Colonies wear the appearance of an actual, Revolt, & it is his Majesty's firm Resolution in consequence of the Advices, which he has received, that the most vigorous Efforts should be made, both by Sea & Land to reduce his rebellious Subjects to Obedience, and the proper Measures are now pursuing, not only for augmenting the Army under General Gage, but also for making such Addition to our naval strength in North America, as may enable Admiral Graves, to make such a Disposition of his fleet as that, besides the Squadron necessary for the New-England Station, there may be seperate Squadrons at New York, within the Bay of Delaware, in Chesapeake Bay & upon the coast of Carolina. After what has passed there can be no Doubt, what ought to be the plan of operations for the squadron upon the New-England Station, & I think it necessary to acquaint you, for your own Information, that Admiral Graves will be instructed to exert the most vigorous Efforts for suppressing the Rebellion now openly avowed & supported in that Country & to seize and obtain all ships & Vessels belonging to the Inhabitants thereof, such only excepted, as are the Property of Persons, who are Friends of Government & have shewn an Attachment to the constitution: There is still some Room to hope that the Colonies to the southward may not proceed to the same Lengths with those of New-England; it is however his Majesty's Intentions that the Commanders of the separate squadrons I have mentioned, should be instructed to prevent all Commerce between the Colonies within their respective Stations & any other Places than Great Britain, Ireland, or his Majesty's Islands in the West Indies, that they should receive on Board & give Protection to any officers of the Crown, who may be compelled by the Violence of the People to seek for such an Asylum, and to proceed, as in Case of a Town in actual Rebellion, against such of the Sea Port Towns, being accessible to the King's Ships, as shall hereafter offer any Violence to the Kings officers, or in which any Troops shall be raised, or military Works erected, other than by his Majesty's Authority, or any Attempts made to seize or plunder any public Magazine of Arms or Ammunition:

With Regard to the Plan of Operations to be adopted by General Gage, it must depend upon his own Judgment and the Opinion of the able Generals with him, & I have only to add that it is his Majesty's Express Command, that you do exert every Endeavour, and employ every Means in your power to aid & support him and admiral Graves in all such operations, as they may think proper to undertake for carrying the King's Orders into full Execution & restoring the authority of his Majesty's Government:

The attention you appear to have given to the Preservation of Peace and good Order in your Government is very much approved by the King & I have his Majesty's commands to assure you of his royal Acquiescence in your wish to return to England, when the state of affairs in your Government will admit of it. In the mean Time I hope your private Affairs here, will not suffer by the very honorable Resolution you have taken of remaining in Maryland so long as the present Disorders continue:

L^d Rochford has retired on honourable and amicable Terms, we are removing to his Office as Senior, but retain the Northern Department, L^d Weymouth succeeds to the Southern, the other smaller Promotions you will see in the Papers. About four fifts of the House of Commons continue as blindly devoted as your humble servant to a system of Exertion, that this Nation can make beyond any Nation in the World and that we are Fools enough to think the Nation thoroughly disposed to make. You who are a moderate Man, and wish well and kindly to both Parties, at the same Time that you dislike the Extremes of the Language and Conduct pursued by both, will distinguish Truth from Falshood in the strange Jumble of misrepresentation with which our News-papers are stuffed. Deputy Governor of Maryland Sir. It was not till the 27th of Novr that your dispatch to Lord Dartmouth of the 27th of August was received here, when I had the honor of laying it before the King; & I have it in command from his majesty to express to you his majestys approbation of your Zeal for the Public Service & of the unalterable attachment you have shewn to his person and Government from the first commencement of the present unhappy Disputes, which have involved his majesty's faithful servants in the Colonies in Difficulties & Distress that are only to be equalled, by the Fortitude with which they are borne.

Your letter contains a great deal of very useful information, & your Confidential Communication of the character of Individuals more especially of such as come over into England is of great advantage; And you may rest assured, that every possible precaution will be used that no part of your letter

shall transpire.

An armament consisting of seven Regiments & a Fleet of Frigates & small ships is now in readiness to proceed to the Southern Colonies in order to attempt the Restoration of legal Government in that part of America. It will proceed in the first place to North Carolina & from thence either to South Carolina or Virginia, as circumstances of greater or less advantage shall point out;—if to the latter it may have very important consequences to the Colony under your Government & therefore you will do well to consider of every means by which you may in conjunction with Lord Dunmore give Facility & assistance to its Operations.

To Robert Eden Esq' Deputy Governor of Maryland: Sir, The King being determined in concurrence with his

Parliament to pursue the most vigorous Measures for reducing his rebellious Subjects in North America to Obedience and for restoring legal Government has given the Royal Assent to the enclosed act, which I am commanded by his Majesty to transmit to you and at the same time to signify to you his Majesty's pleasure that you do exhort all persons upon whom the Execution of this Law shall depend to pay a due attention thereto, and to use their best endeavours for carrying the provisions of it into Effect; And I trust that when his Majestys deluded Subjects in the Associated Colonies are better apprized of the fatal consequence of the conduct they have adopted, and see the determined spirit of the Nation to maintain its Constitutional rights they will avail themselves of the means which the justice and benevolence of the supreme Legislature have held out to them of being restored to the Kings grace and peace, and that a happy & lasting reconciliation and union will be effected. And I have the satisfaction to acquaint you that in order to accelerate this desireable Object that proper steps have been taken for passing a Commission under the Great Seal in conformity to the last section but one of that act, And that the Commissioner or Commissioners to be appointed for that purpose will have full power to enquire into the state and condition of the Colonies and confer with proper persons upon such points as may be necessary for effecting a restoration of the I am sir y' most ob' hble. serv' public tranquility. "Provided always nevertheless, and it is hereby enacted by the Authority aforesaid, that in order to encourage all well affected persons in any of the said Colonies to exert themselves in suppressing the Rebellion therein, and to afford a speedy protection to those who are disposed to return to their duty, it shall and may be lawful to and for any person or persons appointed and authorized by his Majesty to grant a pardon or pardons to any numbers or description of persons by proclamation in his Majesty's name to declare any Colony or province, Colonies or Provinces to be at the peace of his Majesty.

My dear Brother:

I am very unable to say a tenth Part of what I ought to say

to you this Evening when there is so much to be said, & so few Opportunities of saying it, but my Head is disabled by this Influenza, which has disabled us all by Turns, and my Attention, as far I am competent to employ it, is engaged by official Business.

Our Campaign this Year has certainly not been brilliant, and the News (reported a few Days ago and confirmed this Morning) of the taking of S' Johns compleats our Disgrace. We have wanted a few hard Knocks to rouse us, & I trust that we are roused (at least we have had the Knocks) I also trust that we are not stunn'd by them, but animated to a just sense of the Contest, in which we are engaged & determined (and let me add able) to take Measures equal to its Difficulties. You have rather a Predilection for America, let me repeat to you however what I have always said, and what the chearful Disposition of the People of this Country under all their Disappointments in this Business confirms. "We are too steady and too resolute to give Way, & either you or we must give Way, if we were less steady than we are, we could still be too much for you by the relative Advantages which we enjoy, and which we shall still enjoy in spite of the great Expences, to which you are putting us, in great naval Equipments, and in more numerous Armies, than have ever yet been seen in America. It is a cursed Business—we may be mistaken, but we think you in general in a State of Frenzy. You will neither hear Reason, nor act reasonably, & the only Question now is, whether you will be brought back to common Sense and general Happiness, or whether you shall succeed in destroying both us and yourselves. As for your Excellency individually, you are behaving in a Manner to deserve great Credit you are acting the dignified determined Part, and are shewing yourself a Friend to both Sides of the Atlantic. You have all due Honour for it here, and I hope you will be treated with equal Candour on your own Side of the Atlantic.

The Bill which had the Royal Assent yesterday puts an end to all commercial Intercourse between us. I hope the Southern Countries will begin to see the Consequences of continuing upon themselves the Miseries which that Bill must bring on them & that they will learn what they might have learned longer ago, that if they succeed in their present united Enterprize, they will immediately find themselves in a state of subjection to the New-Englanders, & that the longer they persevere in that Enterprize (if they are fortunate enough in the end to fail in it) the more they must suffer. For other Matters I must refer you to the Papers from the Post-Office & remain very affectionately

Philadelphia 17. April 1776.

Gentlemen. Yesterday morning just before the meeting of Congress the letters from Balt. which occasioned the Resolution of yesterday came to the hands of the president. By the same express, and as I believe under the same cover came an Anonymous letter referring to a copy therein inclosed from Gen! Lee to Mr Samuel Purviance. I saw and read the copy which was in Purviances hand writing. Lee strongly urged the immediate seizing and securing of the Gov. After the minutes of the preceeding day were read the President began reading the Anonymous letter, but he had not proceeded far before he came to a part desiring that it might not be made known to the Congress but, as I think, to such only as the President might think proper to trust with the contents, the President hesitated, for he had not before read the letter, and seemed desirous of running his Eye over it but on being desired to read out he did so, from the inclosure above mentioned as well as many expressions in the letter and Mr Purviances being the Heroe of the tale which was told in the first person I had not the least doubt but that Purviance was the Author and Mr Andrew Allen who saw the letter and is acquainted with Purviances hand writing says it was his.

The letter informs that the writer of it had impressed on Gen1 Lee, in his way to Virga an Idea that the Council of Safety was timorous and inactive and represents the Council of Safety and Convention too as being afraid to execute the Duties of their Stations, his own and the conduct of the Convention on an affair that you must remember he contrasts to the Disadvantage of the Latter whose inaction he imputes to want of spirit. He speaks of the orders he gave Capt Nicholson on the late alarm and how the Council of Safety was alarmed and frightened at the spirit and boldness of them represents himself as an object against whom the intentions of the Council of Safety are levelled and in proof recites a conversation with, or saying of one of them to the effect that he was a warm man or a hot headed man whose power must be pulled down or he would throw things into Confusion. heard the letter read but once I cannot undertake to repeat expressions with exactness but I think I have preserved the sentiments and have not exaggerated in any thing and on the whole I esteem it a vile injurious calumny calculated like his conversation with Gen Lee to spread suspicion and distrust of the only executive in our province. If I am not mistaken the letter mentions further that some Gent were sent from Balt. or were by him proposed to be sent to Annapolis, who should engage the officer commanding the troops there to secrecy under Oath and their endeavour to get his assistance to execute what you are requested to do by the resolution, this I

suppose may be easily traced.

As soon as the letter was read a motion was made to send the original or a copy of it to you which was warmly supported but it was put off till to day to make way for the Consideration of the subject of the Express and in the meantime all was ordered to be secret. Mess¹⁹ Stone and Alexander who had been delayed in writing letters for the post, came into the Congress, in this stage of the affair and are, as well as myself, privy to the after transactions:

Your letter of 19th Febr did not come to hand until Friday last, I am very sensible of the honour the Convention did me, by appointing me Supervisor to the Saltpetre works for this District, but being myself a stranger to the Process, necessary for making that Article, & not knowing any person who understood it, that would undertake to carry on the Business, I thought it my duty to Resign, in hopes the Committee for this District might know, & would appoint some Person qualified for the Undertaking, accordingly some time before the rising of the Convention, I delivered Mr John Murdock, (one of our Committee) a newspaper in which was the Resolve of the Convention, concerning Saltpetre Works, desiring him to shew it to the Committee, & inform them of my Resignation; but have not heard of any other persons being appointed Having this Occasion to trouble you, must beg leave to intrude as much further on your Patience, as to inform you, that the Convention having appointed M' William Deakins, to a Majority, & M' Aquila Johns to the naval service of the Province The Geo. Town Company of Militia was left without any Subaltern Officer. The Company have nominated M' Alex' McFadon 1st Mr John Peter 2d Lieutenants; and Mr Edward Gale Ensign, if those Gentlemen should meet your approbation, I hope you will honour them with Commissions. conveyed safely to Congress.

And that Copies of the intercepted Letters from the Secre-

tary of State be enclosed to the said Council of Safety."

Resolved That the Council of Safety of Maryland be requested to cause the Person and Papers of Alexander Ross to be immediately seized and secured and that the Papers be sent safely to Congress."

Your Letter enclosing the Resolves of Congress was this

c. s. c. Day delivered to us: we were furnished with the intercepted Letters some Time before the Receipt of your's, and had taken such Measures, as in our Judgment were competent to the Occasion. To dissolve the Government and subvert the Constitution by the Seisure and Imprisonment of the Governour, we conceived to be a Measure of too much Delicacy and Magnitude to be adopted without calling and consulting the Convention of this Province: we saw no Necessity urging us to such an Extreme, and were therefore determined not to expose the Province to immedate Anarchy and Convulsion, if an Assurance could be obtained from the Governor, that he would not depart before our Convention met to decide upon this important Business. He cheerfully gave us this Assurance and that we feel no Apprehensions of Danger from him. Under these Circumstances we cannot comply with the Request of Congress in any other Manner than we have done, and flatter ourselves they will rest satisfied and consider us excusable.

We have apprehended M' Ross and shall keep him in Cus-

tody and examine him fully.

Permit us, Sir, to assure you that we are determined to maintain the Rights and Liberties of this Country at every Hazard of life and Property, and will vigorously procure every Measure which the defence of America shall require.

Bladensburgh 18th April 1776.

Gentlemen. It is with reluctance I take up my pen to address you on a matter I would wish to be silent on, was I not urged to do it by the strongest entreaties of a Company inferiour to none in the province, whom I respect, and who I have the highest satisfaction in obliging. My resigning has thrown the Company into great confusion and concern for fear M' William Hamilton, my first Lieutenant, should take place as Captain, who they look upon not to be worthy, or in any respect proper for that office; but perhaps may be recommended by the Colonel through prejudice to me, as I would not condescend to serve under him; if it so happens that he should be appointed Captain, it will be the utter distruction of the Company, as they are determined not to serve under him. I would not willingly interfere with this Gentlemans private character, therefore shall only relate the matter to your Honours how he came to be appointed Lieutenant, which was, as he had been a soldier several years in the last war, I imagined he must have been better quallified than any other person I had the opportunity of getting at that time, however found myself much deceaved for he was as ignorant as those who had never seen a musket thrown in their lives, and surprizingly awkward in every respect, and still continues so. There are many young men in the company who are much better qualified in every respect, and I believe as many so as in any Company in the Province. M' Hamilton is a poor man and has a wife and several children, and no person to work for them, but himself, therefore cannot make the appearance that an Officer ought to make, is a person of no Education, neither is he qualified in any respect whatever to keep company with the other Gentlemen Officers, which is a material objection by the Company, as they would not choose to serve under an officer who could not keep company with, and be looked upon by other officers but more particularly, as he is esteemed a very improper person in other respects, and of more consiquence to those under him. There are other objections which I do not choose to meddle with, yet I hope have said enough to evince to you, how very displeasing he is to the Company, and the ill consequences that might arise, in case of his appointment, and what I can with much truth and certainty assure would come to pass (i. e.) the breaking up of a Company of much consiquence. Relying on your Honours wisdom in not appointing a person so disagreeable (as nothing but my particular desire to have the Company kept together and to be satisfy'd, could have induced me to write in this manner) I remain with the utmost respect Gentlemen,

Gent. We moved yesterday in Congress, that the letter referred to by M^r Johnson, should be immediately transmitted to you that you might have an opportunity of vindicating your Honour against the malitious charges made by the writer, this produced a warm debate which lasted for several hours, we insisted (and were supported by several Gentlemen) that the letter containing the most severe reflections upon you as a publick Body ought not to be concealed; that it was absolutely necessary in the present state of our Affairs that the Dignity of the Executives of every province should be supported if properly conducted and if there rested a suspicion that any publick Body either from weakness or want of integ-

rity omitted or refused to execute the Trust committed to them it ought to be made known to their constituents that the power might be placed in more safe Hands. That the exertions of the Letter Writer had already produced in part of the Council of Virginia distrust and suspicion of you: That we had the most convincing proofs upon all occasions of your integrity, Vigilance and Activity in the common cause: And therefore esteemed it our duty to insist that justice might be done, to your injured characters. It was argued against the motion that the letter was confidential, that it had raised no suspicions in the congress of your zeal or integrity, because they had reposed the highest confidence in you, immediately afterwards by the recommendation sent by the return of the express. And that the mischief which would be produced by communicating the letters would be greater than any benefit which could be expected from it And that the President was not obliged to produce the letter for the Congress to take order thereon, Altho it had been read in the House Upon the question whether the President should be requested to lay the letter before congress five colonies voted in the nege three in the affirm and one divided. We conceived this treatment to you & our province to be cruel and ungerous to the last degree, the obligation to secrecy expired yesterday and we immediately determined to give you such a state of this Transaction as our memories supply us with; and Mr Johnson committed to writing what passed on the first day. We this morning waited on M' Hancock to demand the letter, but he refused to see us, Thus the affair rests at present, & as we cannot delay communicating it to you longer, We have ordered an express immediately to set out for Annapolis and have not the least doubt but you will take the proper steps to vindicate your Honour against the foul Calumny of Mr Purviance who has dared to detract from your Patriotism & spirit. We are determined at all hazards to support you, and tho very sorry for the occasion hope you have complied with the recommendation of Congress, by securing Mr Eden and his papers. If he has conducted himself fairly an Examination will do him credit if otherwise we ought to know it and guard against his unfriendly endeavours. We shall write you by the Post and are Gent Y' most obt Serts Th. Johnson Jun' Phil* T. Stone. R. Alexander.

To the Deputies of Maryland in Congress

Gentⁿ

We received the Honble Mr Hancock's letter of the 16th Inst. yesterday Afternoon inclosing a Recommendation of Congress that we should immediately cause the Person and Papers of Governor Eden to be seised, and secured and convey such of the Papers as relate to the American Dispute, safely to Congress; and also the Person and Papers of A. Ross and to transmit the letter likewise to Congress. Previous to our Receipt of the above we had fully investigated the Charge that the intercepted Letters imported, in which we conducted ourselves agreeable to what we wrote you by Mr Green, and finally concluded the Affair with our Answer, a copy of which

we now inclose you.

The extraordinary Manner of communicating the Intelligence by the Council of Safety of Virginia to us with the Behaviour of the Committee of Observation for Baltimore give us Cause to complain of the Indignity offered our Board, and we cannot suppress our Suspicion that matters have been concerted so as to preclude all Information which might otherwise have been laid before you from hence. The Letter from the Council of Safety of Virginia is dated the 7th Inst and was conveyed thro' Baltimore to us on the 15th about 3 o'clock P. M. by four Gentlemen deputed by that Body to wait on us with it, whose Conduct was very disingenuous, and exceptionable, and the Resolves passed on the 16th We are at a loss otherwise to account for the Length of Time the Letter was passing from Williamsburg to us, and the Expedition with which the Dispatch appears to have been transmitted from Baltimore to Philadelphia. The instructions given Capt Sam! Smith by the Committee of Baltimore and those given by Captain Nicholson to his Lieutenant, copies of which we likewise send you; the Originals came into our Hands accidentally, and the whole of the Proceedings of the Baltimore Committee were kept from us. Whence this unmerited Treatment has sprung we cannot conceive, as we ever most chearfully co-operated and assisted the Colony of Virginia in such Measures as we could justify from our Situation, and have always considered the Interest and Security of Baltimore as essential to this Province, and acted correspondently with those Ideas—reflecting upon these Circumstances and being fully persuaded the Congress would have determined differently if they had been furnished with the same Evidence upon which we proceeded—we cannot but hope they will rest satisfied with what we have done—more especially as a Convention is

shortly to be held, and we are firmly persuaded the Governor c. s. c. will not stir from his Station or do any Thing to disturb the Peace of the Province between this Time and the Meeting of that Body. We consider the Congress as having the supreme Authority over the Continent and look up to them with Reverence and Esteem, but that they cannot interfere with uncontroulable Power in the internal Polity of this or any other Province, and herein we are supported by the Resolves of the late Convention—if unhappily however they do not approve our Conduct we are determined to call a Convention with all convenient Speed and lay our whole Transactions before them, that they may judge of the Propriety of what we have done.

We omitted informing you before that the Governor assured us on his Honour, that he had received no other Letters from the Ministry at Home but those he delivered to us and of which we have heretofore sent you Copies: he has also given us leave to search all his Papers if we think proper. We are not convinced that he has carried on any Correspondence with the Ministry unfriendly to America; if on Suspicion only we seize the Head of the Civil Government all Commissions of Magistrates, Sheriffs and other Offices flowing from him must be at an end, and the Council of Safety have no Power to fill the Vacancy—the convention have this Power inherent in them as Representatives of the People, they have not communicated it to us, that we can find—on seizing the Governor therefore the Convention ought to be immediately called together to take the State & Condition of the Province into their Consideration, and make Provision for the civil department. If you recommend calling it earlier than the 27th we shall pay due attention to the Day you fix on—we have done every Thing in our power to promote the Interest and Peace of the Province, and are firmly persuaded that if this Storm blows over, that we shall continue to enjoy quiet some Time longer, if not the whole Campaign; and perhaps before another, all will be settled happily.

We write to the President by this Opportunity, and we think ourselves fortunate in having W. P. with us and approving of all we have done, and we doubt not you would have acted in Substance as we have done, had you been here on the Spot. Our Council consisting of D. J. C. C. J. H. B. R. and J. L. were unanimous in their Opinion, and if we are suffered to go on our own Way all will end as it should do—if on the other hand the Governor is treated with Ignominy and Rigour and laid under Arrest and guarded &c we cannot tell what will be the Consequence—this we are certain of our Government will be shaken to its very Foundations, and in what Form it would be settled again we know not. A. Ross was taken by our

- c. s. c. Order last Monday and brought before us yesterday, but as we had not then Time to enquire particularly into his Offence we deferred it until we had little more Leisure and committed him to the Custody of a Guard; if upon Examination he should discover any Thing which we may apprehend will be of Service, we will immediately disclose it to you—we should have been glad to have had a Line from you by the Express, we have received the Money-Plates &c.
 - N. B. A. Ross was represented in the Letter to the Baltimore Committee as inimical to America, but not a Word said of him in that addressed to us—we inclose you Copies of a letter from J. R. & R. A. and our Passport in consequence thereof.

The Governor having desired Mess¹⁵ Charles Carroll, John Hall, James Tilghman and William Paca would attend him at 10 O'Clock this morning, they waited on him accordingly; and he delivered them the Original in his own Hand-Writing of which the following is a Copy.

"Gentlemen,

I took the Liberty of sending for you this morning and hope the Motive of my so doing, will not be disagreeable. Your polite Behaviour to me and the Confidence you have reposed in me, which evinces your good Opinion of my Past and present Conduct, deserve the best Return I can make; I see that your personal Safety and future Respect from your Constituents are involved in my meriting that Opinion, and not disgracing that Confidence, therefore what you could not, by Requisition however respectful, or your Representation of probably a more disagreeable Proceeding, obtain from me, my Parole not to leave the Province till the Convention met, I voluntarily now give you, as your Conduct towards me justly entitles you to it."

M' Allen Quynn was appointed Messenger to the Council. Ordered That M' Samuel Purviance junior Chairman of the Committee of Observation for Baltimore County attend the Council of Safety at the City of Annapolis on Monday the 22^d Instant.

Ordered That M^r William Lux Deputy Chairman of the Committee of Baltimore attend the Council of Safety at the City of Annapolis on Monday the 22^d Instant.

Ordered That Alexander Ross be brought before the Council at 3 O'Clock in the Afternoon

Adjourned till 3 O'Clock & met accordingly.

Gentlemen: I have by your orders been in close confinement since last Wednesday morning, during which time, I have had feelings far beyond the Power of expression: Altho I am yet ignorant of the charge you have against me, I am persuaded nothing can appear, that was not more the effect of necessity than inclination, my wish therefore, is to be heard by you as soon as possible, when I doubt not you will act, and determine for me, with that temper and moderation which has hitherto been the result of your deliberations I doubt not of convincing you that my plan of life had been long settled before this unhappy affair, and that my Views were very different to what I am charged with: Maryland has always been my favorite Province, and it has always had my warmest & best wishes, and if I may be believed, I did it all the little service in my power while with Lord Dunmore.

M^r Sam^l Purviance appeared and delivered in the following Answer in Writing agreeable to his Promise on Saturday

April 22, 1776

Gentlemen

Agreeable to my Declaration to the Committee at last Meeting the 20th Inst that I exculpated all the Members of the Committee from any Concern in the Orders, which I gave as Chairman of the Committee to Capt Samt Smith the 14th Inst I am now to inform you the Circumstances of that Affair, & the Reasons on which I ventured to give those orders

The Dispatches reced from the Council of Virginia, with a Letter written by General Lee & directed to me as Chairman of this Committee, I considered as sufficient Reasons to justify the Committee in using their best Endeavours to sieze Governor Eden, his Secretary and Mr Alexander Ross, should they or either of them be found attempting to escape from Annapolis; a Suspicion founded on the certain Knowledge, that M' Ross had gone from this to Annapolis a few days before, and that it was highly probable, he would alarm the Governor with the Account of the Secretary of States Letters to Gov Eden being siezed & taken from him on his way up from Lord Dunmore. On considering those Papers at my House on Sunday Evening, it seemed to be the general opinion of the Gentlemen there assembled, that if Cap' Nicholson's Tender was here, it would be proper to dispatch her with some Men to Annapolis to wait the orders of the Council of Safety. On Monday morning I was informed, that Cap' James Nicholson was returned in his Tender from Chester: on which I sent for him and communicated to him the Purport of the Dispatches received from the Council of Virga and Gen1 Lee's Letter, and told him the Sentiments of the Gentlemen who met at my House the Evening before, that it would be

proper to send his Tender with an Officer & some men to Annapolis, observing to him, that if the Governor had made his Escape from Annapolis, she would be the properest Vessell to pursue after him, as she could both row & sail. Capt Nicholson agreeing with me in the Propriety of the measure he consented at my Request to get his Boat ready for the Purpose, and to send one of his Officers in her. As I could not attend the Committee that day, I spoke to most of the Gentlemen, who had been at my House the Evening before, and to Gen! Buchanan, and told them, I had spoke to Capt Nicholson for his Tender, which measure they all approved of. I accordingly applied to Major Gist, to whom the Dispatches from Virga had been shewn, and obtained his Consent to let Cap' Sam' Smith with a few Men of his Company go in the Tender to Annapolis.

Capt Saml Smith accordingly met me in the street just at Dinner Time, told me he was ready to go, and waited for Orders. I had not thought before on the Propriety of Orders. The Committee was then broke up for Dinner, and consequently I had no opportunity of consulting them immediately; and for the Sake of Secrecy which so important a Business required, I thought it improper to communicate the matter to any others, than the Gentlemen who had seen the Papers already, of whom three were gone off to Ann^a to wait on the Council, Mr Wm Buchanan had rode out of Town, & Mr Wm Lux & Mr Harrison, with whom I had engaged to dine that day, were gone out of Town. In these Circumstances I sat down & without the Concurrence or Advice of any Person wrote very hastily those Orders, which I delivered to Major Gist, & which I signed as Chairman of the Committee.

I do candidly acknowledge to you, I had my own Doubts whether I was to consider Gen' Lee's Letter directed to me as Chair of the Com. as a private Letter to myself, or as a Letter to the Committee: Yet the Contents of it together with the Dispatches reced from the Council of Virga I considered as a sufficient Call upon me & every Person well affected to the Interests of America to use the best Endeavours to sieze Persons, of whom there were such strong

Reasons to believe their being inimical.

I hope, Gentlemen, the Circumstances I have mentioned, which are all strictly true, and the extreme Importance of the Occasion will at least palliate my offence in taking (what may be deemed by some) a very rash Step; but which I hope the Necessity of the Case will justify me in to you & the Publick.

Which being read Resolved That this Committee do highly disapprove of the Chairmans Conduct in presuming to Act in any matter, without their Concurrence & Approbation, especially in Things, that so evidently do not come within their Jurisdiction. And with Regard to the Instructions given to Cap' Sam' Smith upon a late Pressing occasion, though the necessity of the Case may be urged as an Apology for them, yet this Committee always willing to move in the strictest Line of Duty, and desirous to preserve due Subordination and Order in the Community, do totally disavow and disapprove of them, knowing that the Power necessary in such cases is not vested in this Committee; But nevertheless we are fully persuaded, that the Chairman in issuing these Orders was actuated only by that uniform warm and zealous Attachment to our distressed and perhaps betrayed Country, which otherwise would have merited the Thanks of every spirited Friend of our Invaded Rights; And we trust, this well meant Excess in so interesting a Crisis will find a more easy Pardon with his vigilant Countrymen, than if he had been chargeable with a criminal neglect, or with a Timidity still more dangerous and blameable.

Lieutenant William Sterrett appeared before the Committee and produced an Order from the Council of Safety for taking into his Possession the Portmanteau & Papers of M^r Alexander Ross, and convey the same to Annapolis to the Council of Safety, on which M^r Thomas Harrison and D^r John Boyd were appointed to proceed to M^r Grants and examine the Seal of the Door, they returned and report, that the Seal was perfect, and the Papers and Effects were delivered according to order.

To the Deputies for Maryland in Congress.

Gentⁿ

You have our Thanks for the Anxiety you express on our Accounts, if the Thanks of such blackened insulted (but we think injured) Characters are worth your Acceptance. We must say that if the same Justice were done to us, that we would do unto others in similar Circumstances, a Copy of the anonymous Letter you mention traducing our Reputations would not have been refused us by the Congress—for we sincerely declare to you and the World, that were we in possession of any Paper reflecting in so gross a Manner on that or any other respectable Body on the Continent, we should think it unjust and ungentlemanly to withhold it from them, and by thus secreting prevent the Discovery of the Author of so foul a Calumny, and shelter him from the Censure, not to say, Punishment he deserves.

We wrote you fully in our two last Letters, and sent Copies of all such Papers as we thought material—the Governor voluntarily gave us his Parole in the fullest Manner, and has since confirmed it by Letter, assuring us that he will not leave the Province 'till the Convention sets; we are firmly persuaded he will not stir, or do any Thing against the Peace thereof—he also assured us in the most explicit Terms, that he had

received no other Letters from the Ministry but what he gave c. s. c. us up and which we sent you Copies of; We examined his Bureau and Closet and found several Letters in them from him to Administration and his Friends in England wherein he represents this Province in a favorable Point of View.

We were not without our Suspicions that a Plan had been concerted by the two Persons you mention, and have determined, if possible, to get to the Bottom of it—and for that Purpose on Saturday last, before the Receipt of your Express, issued our Order to M' Samuel Purviance Chairman, M' W'' Lux, Deputy Chairman, and M' George Lux Clerk of the Committee of Observation for Baltimore County, to appear before us this Day, and to bring with them all the Proceedings, papers, Letters, orders, Entries, Instructions & relative to the intercepted Letters—we are resolved to have a full and open Examination of the Affair and shall then cheerfully submit our Conduct to the Public.

We consider the Authority of the whole Province trampled upon and insulted (if not conspired against) and having your Letters holding forth the same Sentiment, we have thought it advisable, as we know not to what Lengths this Matter may be carried, to call a Convention to be held at the City of Annapolis on Tuesday the seventh of May next, at which Time we shall be glad to see all the Gentlemen-Deputies, that can be spared from Congress. We shall endeavour to have all our Proceedings ready to lay before them on the first Day of their Meeting, and shall submit to them whether our Conduct has been either timid, inactive, or in any other particulars unjustifiable.

Our Proceedings with the Governor are such, as are in our Opinions in every Respect defensible; we are convinced from his Declarations and Answers & from his Manner of behaving to us, that he will not leave the Province. little Minds might have been gratified with actual Imprisonment and further Severities, but we do not imagine the Congress meant any such Outrage on Humanity. We have all the Advantages we could have had, if we had committed him to the public Goal, and we are persuaded many more. Nobody can believe that we are courting the Governor at present: 'tis the Peace and Happiness of the Province we wish to preserve, and we are persuaded that it will be best done by keeping up the ostensible Form of our Chartered Constitution. I have now to inform you of the armed Schooner Resolution being equiped agreeable to your directions she wants principally the Commissions for her officers, who refuse acting out of the Harbour until their commissions are confirm'd. After which shoud be glad of your permission to go down the Bay as far as you think proper, in order to exercise our men & Consult with Cap. Boucher. The Schooner has about 40 hands now shipt, but is capable of carrying 70 with great Conveniency. If you think proper to have that number compleat you'll please to let me know The officers that has been acting aboard are William Waud Cap. Henry Auchinlick Lieut Bennett Johnson Master, and as far as I can discover are proper persons. Mr Dorsey one of the ships midshipmen I understand has made application for a Lieutenancy of marines, I think him very capable. I am Gentⁿ with much sincerity.

Board, will excuse the Incorrectness, with which they are copied, as it is caused solely by my sickness, for I am at this moment hardly able to hold my pen;

Mr William Lux in Obedience to the Order of the 20th Instant appeared before the Council and delivered to them an attested Copy of the Proceedings of the Committee of Observation for Baltimore County in Consequence of intercepted Letters from Lord George Germain to Robert Eden Esqr Deputy Governor of Maryland, which were transmitted to them by the Honble Committee of Safety of Virginia.

Adjourned till 3 o'Clock & met accordingly.

M' Hands attended.

M' Samuel Purviance Jun' Chairman of the Committee of Observation for Baltimore County, in Obedience to the Order of the 20th Instant appeared before the Council, and was informed by the President that, Instructions of a very extraordinary nature from him as Chairman of the Committee of Baltimore County to Cap' Samuel Smith and other Matters of great Importance had come to the Knowledge of the Committee of Sasety, for which they had thought proper to call him before them to answer the Charge which they imported.

The Instructions were then read in Presence of Mr Purviance, and are as follow.

"Sir

You are requested by the Gentlemen of the Committee to proceed in Cap' Nicholson's Tender with any Officer he may

c. s. J. send to assist you and such a number of armed men as may be necessary, and therewith proceed as speedily as possible for

Annapolis.

Should you before you get there meet the Governor's Boat or Barge, you must by all Means endeavour to board her. And in Case Governor Eden, his Secretary M' Smith, or M' Alexander Ross are found on Board, you are by all means to seize their Persons and Papers and instantly return with them under the strictest Guard to Baltimore, for doing which you may depend on being protected and justified by the Committee and held blameless. In Case you should not meet such Boat or Persons, you'll please to proceed immediately to Annapolis and use every Precaution to prevent Alarm by obliging the men not appear in numbers on Deck, and causing the Boat to ly at Distance, whilst you go ashore with the Letter delivered you for the Gentlemen of Baltimore Committee who may be at Annapolis, whose Directions you'll please to follow after your Arrival there. You'll please to take Blunderbusses and any Onty you see necessary of Arms out of Cap' Nicholson's Vessel which he will readily furnish. Please to consult in every thing with the Officer wh Capt Nicholson sends with you and let your measures be kept as secret as possible from the Men at least until it comes to the Execution. A. Not by Commee of obsn for Balto County. Q. Have they not been assumed (generally)

They have.

Have the Comme of Balt any right to accuse C. S. of Timidity, inactivity or neglect of Duty.

A. No. the Commet think y' conduct meritorious.

Had Gentⁿ of Balt^o Comm^{ee} that were delegated to wait on us any other commands or inst¹⁸ than the delivery of let to C[ouncil] of S[afety].

A. None. they thot the delegation the most respectful

mode of proceeding.

c. s. j. Q. 'Why send let' from Comme of S[afety] of V[irginia] to us by a deleg" and not M' Hancocks let'

- Q. How can you account for y' Gent' not shewing all your instructions.
 - A. They had no instructions. none were ever thought off.
- A. Copy of the clause in the act (restraining Bill) of Parliament referred to by Lord George Germain: Provided always nevertheless, and it is hereby enacted by the authority aforesaid, that in order to encourage all well affected persons in any of the said colonies to exert themselves in suppressing the rebellion therein, and to afford a speedy protection to those who are disposed to return to their duty, it shall and may be lawful to and for any person or persons appointed, and authorized by his majesty to grant a pardon or pardons to any number or description of persons by proclamation in his majestys name to declare any colony or province, colonies or provinces or any county town, Port, district, or place in any colony or province to be at the peace of his majesty:

Examination of M^r Samuel Purviance junior Chairman of the Committee of observation for Baltimore County:

1. Q. You have a letter from General Lee directed to you as chairman of the Committee of observation for Balt^o County, Will you produce it.

A. It is a doubt with me whether I can produce it in public

with Honour. I will shew it to you in private:

2. Q. Do you refuse to produce that letter to us in council.

A. If I do, I expect a copy will not be taken.

3. Q. Will you produce it to the Council, Yea or nay.

A. Delivers it. The letter was read.

- 4. Q. Who made up the Packet to the Congress from your Committee.
 - A. Mr Lux I believe, I was not present when it was done.

5. Q. What letters were in it:

A. I do not know. there were very few:

6. Q. Was there any other Packet sent to Congress.

A. Not that I know of.

7. Q. Do you know any thing of an anonymous letter inclosed to M^r Hancock in the Packet:

A. No.

- 8. Q. Do you know of no anonymous letter or paper sent to Philadelphia.
 - A. I know of none:

9. Q. You know of no anonymous letter to the following C. s. J. purport (reading a recital of it)

A. No.

10. Q. Nothing in your hand writing to that purport.

A. I wrote a private letter in my own name, & signed therewith, to Mr Hancock as a private person, & which I desired he might not shew to congress, It was principally relative to the letter I recd from Gen! Lee. I mentioned likewise to him that three Gent" of our committee were to wait on the council next day with y' dispatches received from Virginia; That I would gladly go as one; but that I had reason to believe I did not stand in a favourable light with the council, who I understood had taken great offence at a letter or order I had written to Cap' Nicholson at the time the Otter was in our river. I likewise told him my opinion, that I did not expect or had doubts whether the Council would take so spirited a step as to seize the Governor, And the event proves I was not mistaken. I believe I likewise mentioned to him y' design of sending y tender to Annap to prevent the Governor's escape should he attempt it. A measure which appeared to me strictly proper, both from y' tenor of the Secretary of State letters & General Lee's letter to me:

11. Q. You know of nothing sent from you, representing yourself as an object against whom the Council of Sasety had

levelled their power.

A. I had good reason to know I was disliked by the Council, but never had any apprehensions of their power

against me.

- 12. Q. Have you ever represented yourself as thought by the Council of Safety, a warm hotheaded man, & that your power must be pulled down, or you would throw things into confusion.
- A. I was well informed I was considered in that light by y' Council & I have mentioned it in conversation to many of my friends
 - 13. Question repeated.

Makes no answer.

- 14. Q. The question was asked again, & M^r Purviance desired to recollect.
- A. It is very possible I may have made such representations in letters written to some of my friends, as well as in private conversation.
 - 15. Q. Were they inclosed in the Packet to Congress.
 - A. I never wrote the congress upon any such subject.
- 16. Q. How long has it been since you wrote such letters. A. I cant say. I never wrote any thing with a view to prejudice the Council of Safety:



17. Q. Were they written within a week past.

A. I believe not.

- 18. Q. Do you remember that you impressed Gen¹ Lee with an idea that the Council of Safety were timid & inactive:
- A. General Lee seemed as well acquainted with public affairs in Mary as I was: And it can't be doubted that we conversed on many public subjects. That I ever took pains to impress him with an ill opinion of the council I deny.

19. Q. Do you know of a single instance of inactivity in

the Council of Safety with respect to Baltimore Town.

A. I do not know that I was called here to give my opinion of the Council of Safety, to their Faces But I know that I have heard many complaints, some of them perhaps I thought illfounded: If I think otherwise of any other part of them I have a right to exercise my Judgment.

20. Q. Did we not give you the earliest intelligence on the late alarm.

A. You did every thing in your power. I have passed many encomiums on you for it, in private letters to my Friends.

Did you not give instructions to Cap' Samuel Smith. 21. Q.

Α. Yes.

Were they under an oath of Secrecy.

They were not.

Why was not Cap' Smith to consult the Council of Safety when he came to Annapolis:

A. It was my intention he should.

24. Q. Were his instructions to be shewn to the Council.

A. I did not tell him to shew them, but presumed when he got to Annapolis, he would be under their directions:

25. Q. Was Cap' Smith to consult the commanding officer

and lay him under an oath of Secrecy:

A. I gave him no such orders, I expected he was to take directions from the Council.

26. Q. Did you expect the Governor was going down the

Bay when you sent the tender:

- A. My expectation was that the Governor would attempt to escape upon being informed his letters were intercepted, otherwise I should not have sent the tender, a letter I wrote to the deputation of the Committee will explain my conduct on that head:
 - 27. Q. Have you a copy of that letter.

A. I have the letter itself.

- 28. Q. Your instructions were that the Governor should be carried to Baltimore Town. Why not del^d to the Council of Safety.
- I will give you my ideas of the matter. I conceived, that at the seat of Government he would have numerous

friends & partizans, a clamour might be raised & a rescue c. s. j. attempted. I proposed carrying him to Baltimore & to put him on board the ship of War, where he would be treated like a Gentleman, and there to wait the directions of the Council of Safety, or Congress, whose prisoner I deemed him:

29. Q. Why were troops ordered from Baltimore and Captain Smith not to consult the commanding officer here.

A. The Committee were well informed that A. Ross was come to Annapolis and were afraid he might alarm the Governor, who would very probably attempt to escape, therefore troops or armed men were thought necessary should Cap' Smith find the Gov attempting to escape, before he got to Annapolis:

30. Q. Were there any marines on board:

A. I believe there were either sailors or marines.

31. Q. You say the troops were sent to intercept the Gov-

ernor should he have attempted to escape.

A. That was my intention, and my letter to the deputation from the Baltimore Committee, will explain the reason of sending the tender:

32. Q. You say you have the letter, produce it.

A. Delivers it, explains the reason of his sending the boat by referring to Gen¹ Lee's letter, directed Cap¹ Smith to apply to the Gen¹ of Balto who, I thought would carry him to the Council of Safety to confer upon the measure.

33. Q. Why was the Governor to be carried to Baltimore if taken at Col. Fitzhugh's, would not the Commee of Calvert

have taken care of him:

A. I gave no directions whatever on that subject, on condition that Cap' Smith found the Governor attempting to escape before he got from Balto to Annap' and I had not the least design of any thing save to prevent the Gov" escape.

34. Q. Did you not know the Council of Sasety were

sitting:

A. I expected they were:

35. Q. Was any other letter than the above wrote by you to the Balto deputation.

A. Not a scrape.

36. Q. Some Gent were sent to Annapolis to engage the commanding officer by oath to secrecy, do you know any thing of this:

A. No. I never entertained the most distant Idea of that sort. The Gen^t of the Commee and myself thought the intimation in Gen^t Lee's letter improper, and were doubtful whether it was a public or private letter.

37. Q. Do you know of any such intimation contained in

an anonymous letter.

c. s. j. A. I do not. I neither wrote any such, nor ever heard of any such:

38. Q. Do you know of any letter to the commanding

officer here on the subject:

A. No. I did not suppose the commanding officer here could execute such an order, while the Council of Sasety were sitting:

39. Q. Was this the reason that the picked men were

sent:

A. No. the intention of sending them, is already explained:

40. Q. What time did you receive the dispatches from Virginia:

A. Sunday Evening:

41. Q. What time did you send them to Congress.

A. 4 OClk. Monday morning:

- 42. Q. Why was not the same dispatch used with respect to us.
- A. We thought it most respectful to appoint a deputation to wait on the Council & the Gen' could not go till the morning:

43. Q. Did you know what was contained in the packet to

the Congress.

- A. There was no packet for the congress. There were two or three private letters, & the let to Mr Hancock was in Gen! Lees handwrit.
- 44. Q. In your letter to the Gent from Balt. why was Capt

Smith directed to go to Col. Fitzhugh's.

A. I did not order him to go there. I expected he would have orders from the Council to proceed there, in case the Gov^r had escaped before Cap' Smith got to Annapolis:

45. Q. Did you give any directions to Capt. Nicholson

verbally or in writing.

- A. I had conversed with Cap' Nicholson on the propriety of sending the tender, he concurred with me, & at my desire ordered the tender to be got ready.
- 46. Q. Did you see Capt Nicholson's Instructions to his

Lieutenant.

- A. Not till after the return of the officers & tender to Baltimore
- 47. Q. do you know of any intention to seize the Governor at Col. Fitzhugh's.
- A. I gave no such instructions and know nothing of any such save what is hinted in Cap' Nicholsons orders to his Lieutenant:
- 48. Q. If seized at Col. Fitzhughs why not sent to Commee of Calvert.
- A. I have already informed you I gave no such orders to Capt Smith.

- 49. Q. The instructions are dated on the 14th & the Let C. S. J. also. how account for it.
- A. It was a mistake they ought to have been dated on Monday the 15th
- 50. Q. By your letter to the Gent of Baltimore the tender was to be under their direction did you expect they were to mix with the Council:
- A. My letter to the Gentlemen of Baltimore will shew that was not my intention, I imagined that on so important an affair they would confer with them on the subject:

51. Q. Why was Capt Smith to consult with the Gent of Baltimore

A. I refered him to those gentlemen, expecting they would carry him to the Council under whose direction I expected he would be after his arrival at Annapolis.

52. Q. You say you wrote to your friends that the council behaved with spirit on the late alarm.

A. I am certain I did to several & observed the happy effects of it in rousing the whole province.

53. Q. M^r Carroll. the instructions were got by Chance to my certain knowledge.

A. I neither gave Captⁿ Smith directions to shew his orders nor forbid him to do it.

54. Q. Did you inclose the Packet to Phila in a letter of yours.

A. No.

55. Q. Why was so much respect shewn to the Council of Safety of Virginia & not to the President of the Congress.

A. A single Gentleman was very sufficient to carry a packet to the congress & bring back their dispatches. It was thought probable the Council of Safety would choose to confer with the members of the Baltimore committee on so interesting a subject as that contained in the papers which they carried. And it was to them, not the Council of Virginia the respect was intended.

56. Q. did you not cover the letter from the congress:

A. I did, & my reason was, that the packet from congress being endorsed with Mr Hancocks name & the public curiosity being at that time great to know what was in agitation I feared the express or some other person who might see the packet would be tempted by curiosity to open it; therefore put it under a new cover, directed to the Council, expecting it would pass as an ordinary Packet from the Committee. To obviate all suspicions of my having opened it, which I presume is implyed in yr question, I could have no temptation to do so base an action. The dispatch from congress to our committee informed us, they had sent orders to the Council

c. s. j. to seize the person & papers of Governor Eden & M^r Alex Ross.

56. Q. Asked again: A. Recollected he did:

Mr Purviance acknowledges the Instructions were given by himself & not by the Committee:

Gentlemen: Baltimore 14 Ap 1776.

Cap' James Nicholson having returned yesterday even^g with his Tender, We have dispatchd her to Annap' under the Comm^d of Lieu^t Nicholson & Cap' Samuel Smith with a number of picked men well armed, to be at your & the Council's Command in case the Gov^r should have escaped before you got down. As this Boat can both row & sail, we judged her much fitter for the Pursuit than any ves^l that could be found at Annapolis, and we are of opinion that it may still be possible to overtake the Gov^r before he may leave Col^o Fitshugs where it is probable he may call.

Cap' Smith has directions to use every Precaution that no alarm may be given by the boats going down, & we confide in his Prudent Managem' of the matter. in case theres no occasion for his Service the vesl can instantly return back. This measure has been detmd on by General Buch Mr Lux Wm Buch Doc' Boyd Mr Harrison & myself, but they being now all gone to Din' cant find them to sign this.

Sir. You are immediately to proceed with the Defence's Tender off the harbour of Annapolis and there to Land Captⁿ Smyth; while he is ashore, you are to stand off and on the Harbour and examine every Boat, that comes out Annapolis or thereabouts (taking care to distress no Boat unnecessarily) and if you find Governor Eden and Secretary Smyth, or either of them, you are to make them Prisoners. if Captain Smith has Orders to deliver them to the Council of Safety, you'll in that case deliver them up to him for that purpose; if not, bring them on Board the Defence. If upon Captⁿ Smith's return you find they are not at Annapolis you are then to proceed down to Colonel Fitschew's and assist Captain Smith if necessary, in examining the Colonel's house in making them Prisoners. Provided they are not to be found in either place, and

you have Reason to think you can overtake them in standing further down the Bay, in that case you'll proceed as far as Prudence will direct you. You must be particularly careful in your watch while off Annapolis, take care to consult Capt. Smyth in all cases. Given from under my hand this 14th April 1776 at Fells Point Baltimore.

Mr Dear Sir. Mr Johnson wrote to you yesterday by Post and I wrote to Mr Hall, nothing is done since in consequence of your letter and resolution to the Presdt We have been very much engaged for some days in attending to the affairs of Canada, having recd late Intelligence from that quarter. I presume the Canada department its connections and Dependencies will ingross our attention for a few days, and then some ans' will probably be given to your Letter, what it will be I can't guess, with any degree of certainty but I am inclined to think every thing will be left to the Convention: we shall attend the meeting of that assembly. Gov Eden's letter is published in one of the papers here and various are the Comments on it. Independant of every thing else it is very suspicious, but taking Mr Eden's conduct, the letters from his Brother, who must know his sentiments, into consideration, I think lessens greatly the charge which the intercepted letter would of itself import. If the Commissioners do not arrive shortly and conduct themselves with great candor and uprightness to effect a reconciliation, a seperation will most undoubtedly take place and then all Governors & officers must quit their posts and new men must be placed in the saddle of power. I wish to conduct affairs so that a just & honorable reconciliation should take place, or that we should be pretty unanimous in a resolution to fight it out for Independance, the proper way to effect this is not to move too quick, but then we must take care to do every thing which is necessary for our Security and Defence, not suffer ourselves to be lulled or wheedled by any deceptious declarations or givings out. You know my hearty wishes for Peace upon terms of Security and Justice to America. But war, any thing is preferable to a

surrender of our rights. You may rely on my friendship on all occasions. My Brothers are all steady friends to your council, and we have not the least doubt but when your conduct comes to be tried by your country you will receive its thanks for your great attention to the publick good. You have been steady firm and determined in the present opposition to ministerial Tyranny and I hope will persevere to the end, bearing all Blasts with unshaken constancy and resolution. Nothing new here. I shall set out on Saturday or Sunday next to meet my wife. Be pleased shew this to your Brothers in council to whom I present my most respectful regards

Instant having also appeared before the Council in Consequence of his Instructions to Captain Samuel Smith, and alleging he gave the same in a Hurry and through Inadvertency, and declaring upon his Honour that he apprehended that Captain Samuel Smith when he came to Annapolis was to take his Orders from the Council of Safety. Capt Samt Smiths Narrative.

On Monday the 15th April I was on the field exercising the three companies stationed in Baltimore when M' Samuel Purviance (Chairman of the Committee) came out to me & begd I would immediately attend the Committee: That an affair of the greatest consequence demanded my attendance; That there would be occasion for eight or ten of my men under my own comm^d to go in Cap^t Nicholsons Tender. He then found it necessary to inform me of the business, & enjoined the strictest secrecy. I kept the troops about a quarter of an hour longer on duty, and discharged them all except my own company, out of which I chose ten good men & a sargeant and ordered them to be in readiness at half past one. I waited at M' Purviances (on the Committee as I thought) but found only the Chairman there, He shewed me the different letters respecting the Business I was to go on, and I agreed with him that too much dispatch could not be made. I then went in quest of Major Gist, but could not find him About one oClock M^r S. Purviance passed by the barracks, I spoke to, & told him that I was ready & waited but for orders. He said I should have them immediately. I again went in search of the Major & found him at dinner. I told him my men were ready. As soon as he had finished dining, he went to Mr Purviances, where I followed him in about ten minutes, & found him reading my instructions (†Mr Purviance mentioned that if the Governor was still at Annapolis I should have nothing to do, as he supposed the Council of Safety would put him under guard before I should get down+). I received my instructions from the Major, & with my men went immediately to the point, where I went on board the defence's tender commanded by Lieu Nicholson, after taking proper stores from the Defence we proceeded down, arrived & came to Anchor off the Harbour of Annapolis at ab' 3 oClock on Tuesday morning. at day break I went ashore & delivered a letter to Mess¹³ John Smith, Benjamin Nicholson & John Sterrit. me what had passed between them & the Honbi Council. I asked them whether I might not inform the Col¹ of my business. They said the Council had enjoined the strictest secrecy, and advised me not to mention it till I had their (the Council's) leave. (I shewed them my orders, they advised me not to shew them to any other person, as it was their opinion they were in some degree improper. They said they were to wait on Major Jenifer after breakfast & would let me know when they returned how I was to act. on their return to the coffee House they told me he highly approved of the tender's being sent down; and that they were to meet the Council at 10 oClock who would give me orders.) About 11 oClock I observed the Governor's boat hove out & clearring. thought it my duty to make it immediately known to the Honble Council, & accordingly waited on them & was refused admittance. I with difficulty persuaded the doorkeeper to ask Mr B. Nicholson (who was with them) to come out. After an half hours attendance he came. I told him what I had seen, & begged he would tell the Council that I waited their orders whether to remain with the tender or return home. They answered by Mr Nicholson, That they desired me to remain with the boat & act according to the orders I had received (or words to that amo') a short time after sunset I went on board. The midshipman who came on shore for me, pointed at a schooner lying off the Governor's wharf, wh he said had come out, and on seeing the tenders boat rowing tow^{ds} her, put back immediately, and came to, where she then lay. On my return to Annapolis next morning, (Wednesday) we knew her to be M' Sprigg's. About eleven she hove up, and attempted going out, but was brought to by the tender. About twelve the Governors boat also got under way, and the tender brought her to. I saw what was done, & thought it my duty to go on board. I search the last mentioned boat narrowly & found Porter & Claret, which made me suspect his excellency intended making his escape. I put a guard on board with some of the Defence's People, and am sorry to say that 2 bottles Porter & one of Claret were drank by them. Mr Sprigg came off to us, & seem^d much surprised that we should dare to stop his boat, & asked what orders we had. I thought his question impertinent, and answered it as it deserved with silence. I went ashore with him, he grumbling all the time. Secretary Smith was on the wharf he asked M' Sprigg what was the matter; who answered that by order from the Council of Safety his schooner was stopped. Mr Smith immediately replyed, that he could assure him the Council of Safety had given no such orders. I said it was sufficient I had my orders' for what was done. I then went to Dinner, and there understood by verbal orders from Mr Duvall, that the affair was settled & I might return home. M'Sprigg came in & I promised to send his boat up to Annapolis according to his desire. I went down to the wharf with intention to go on board, where I met Lieut: Nicholson with a pass from the Governor for his Mullattoe, to pass unmolested in Chesapeake Bay. We thought proper to deliver it to some member of the Hon! council; and seeing M' Carroll talking with M' Sprigg, we went up to him, and Lieut. Nicholson delivered it. Mr Sprigg complained of ill treatment. Lieut. Nicholson told him, he only did what he had a right to do. He replied, he supposed that he (Lieut' N.) might think he was right. I answered that he not



- c. s. J. only thought so, but was so. M' Carroll said that the Council had given no such orders. Both Lieut Nicholson & myself assured him that we had orders; And on being asked to shew them, we did so & promised to have copies of them. About two oClock we went on board & returned to Baltimore town.
 - N. B. The paragraph's marked () I recollected since I, Sam¹ Smith, wrote the narrative delivered to the Hon¹ Council. I wrote it in a great hurry or I might then have remembered many other circumstances relative to this affair:

Saturday 27th April 1776.

To accomplish which we have advanced the sum of thirteen pounds & four Pence half Penny, a Moiety of the Charge for a Boat and Hands, together with a -man exclusive of our own Expences which I flatter myself will be allowed. We have likewise agreed upon the Form of the Alarm-Post, which is to be a kind of Iron Grate suspended by a Chain on the end of a Sweep fixed with a Swivel so as to be turned agreeable to the Wind. And as a further sum of money will be wanting to have them erected (which with Submission to your Honors I think may be done with greater Convenience of Despatch by the Committees of Observation under our Direction) hope you'll order the same into their Hands or otherwise as you may think proper. I am warranted to say so by the People Officers & Soldiers from your City. I send you one much better finished than that you have got and I desire that it may be compared with those you get. I defy all your People to produce such a Bayonet, Rammer, or a barrel so well turned off, or such a Barrel of their make, light, plain well poized and Proof, yet these Barrells are by no means so good as the rest that I have which are larger and better, if my opinion was worthy of notice I woud deliver the

lightest Arms to the Officers, the largest and heavyest to the Privates for very obvious reasons but you cannot expect good Arms or the Art to be carried to perfection unless you give liberal Encouragement. I have many that will be worth 5 Guinnies at least, and those I send you really stand me £5... 7... 6 without a great Profit or allowance for my own time, Expence, and Collecting Materials. Your Rammers and Bayonets of your Country-made Arms I am told are rough Trash, & the Rammers fly out in Exercise, mine will not, they are kept by a fine spring in the lower pipe, people who are good Judges declare that my Arms on an Average are well worth fitted & finished as I do them 4 Guinnies, my own Carbine from London, not equal any way to the one I now send you cost me 4 Guinnies out of Inº Baziers shop. We cannot make them so cheap as they do, the price I have asked to indemnifye me is 6 f, of our Paper not equal to 3½ guineas, here, and I affirm in the face of the sun they are well worth it: I prove all the locks, and if any way defective finish them with the best steel. many Guns that I have seen are fitt only to beat Homminy with, not for men to trust their lives to. pray have you summed up the price your Musketts will come to, from piece work from your favourite Harriss try them fairly and see what they will amount to and then when they are really finished as well as mine which I do not believe all your workmen together can do, please to sum up the amount.

Williamsburg May the 6th 1776. D' Sir. I find that I am extremely censured not only by your board but by a multitude of others for my letter to M^r Purviance with respect to the seizure of Mr Edens person and papers, but I really think when the circumstances are explained, that the censure will appear unjust, and that I was neither violent assuming nor precipitate. When the Secretary of States letter to your Governor was put into my hands, I naturally concluded that could we possess ourselves of all M' Edens papers, the whole machinations of the ministry might be discovered, that this discovery might enable us to prevent their effects, and perhaps defeat the whole plan. the possession of these papers could not be hoped for without previously securing his person and to accomplish this the utmost secrecy and expedition were necessary, now sir, as I imagined you had no troops at Annapolis to execute the purpose (but in this I find I was mistaken) and as I knew there were troops in readiness at Baltimore, and as there was no continental General or other officer in Maryland, Mr Purviance chairman of the committee on the spot where I had conceived troops alone to be stationed, occurred to me as the only person to whom I could with propriety and effect make application, had I known Sir, that a Regiment or any troops were stationed at Annapolis, I should undoubtedly, Sir, have addressed myself to you as President of the Council of Safety:

It is said Sir, that Maryland was out of the district of my command that consequently to intrude myself into the busi-

ness and concerns of that province was assuming and arro- C. S. C. gant. I really conceive Sir, that when the safety or very being of the whole community appears at stake, the part I have acted in this affair cannot with justice be esteemed arrogance. I did not presume authoritatively to order but as one servant of the Public earnestly to entreat and consider another servant who alone appeared to me to have the means in his hands, to take a certain step of the best importance to the public cause. I must repeat sir, that my reason for addressing myself to M^r Purviance at Baltimore proceeded entirely from my ignorance of there being any troops at Annapolis, and not (as I have been told has been thrown out) from any diffidence in your virtue and decision. I suppose the Committee of Safety here viewed it in the same light, for I read my letter to them and it was approved of. In times like these Sir, I conceive, that when we have received sufficient evidences of any treasonable practices being carried on, and that when it appears to us that the immediate seizure of a particular traitors person may lead to discoveries on which the salvation of the state may depend that when the utmost secrecy and expedition are necessary to the seizure of his person, it is the duty of a good citizen not to delay a single instant, if a single instants delay may prevent the execution, this was the manner I thought it my duty to proceed in the case of M' Wormley. On the discovery of his correspondence with the Enemy, I gave orders for the security of his person and papers and then refered the affair to the proper tribunal, the Committee of Safety. the measure was so far from giving umbrage or creating jealousy that it met with their unanimous approbation if this method is proscribed, at a juncture like the present, the great check on dangerous correspondence and conspiracies will be taken off if councils are to be held previously to the seizure of any traitors person or papers, notwithstanding the strongest evidences against him I am much mistaken if every traitor does not slip through your hands. I must now, Sir, conclude with assuring you, and the respectable Body over which you preside, that if they suppose me capable of aiming or wishing to extend the military authority, or trespass on the civil, They do me the most cruel injustice, altho I was bred in the army I thank God, the spirit and principles of the citizen were ever predominant, and I solemnly declare that if I thought it possible I should ever be so far intoxicated by military command, as to harbour a wish injurious to the civil supremacy in all things, I would now whilst I retain my senses beg leave to divest myself of my present office and serve as a volunteer in the glorious cause in which I have embarked my person fortune and reputation. What I did in this affair, I did

c. s. c. in the character of a common zealous member of the community, not of an officer. What appeared irregular or offensive in the mode, I hope I have explained to your satisfaction and I entreat that it may be entirely attributed to a mistake for which I am heartily concerned, as it has prejudiced me in the opinions of men whose esteem I am most ambitious of obtaining.

I received your favour of the 3^d Inst. by Cap^t Fulford and observe the contents, and never was so much surprised as on the Receipt, on your Informing me that you never heard from me since the 9th Feby which was the time I Contracted with you for the Brig Rogers, and also that it does not appear to you that I have done any thing, In the purchase of her cargo, it certainly must appear to you, that when the Committee took the Vessells here, to sink for the Safety of this Town, that mine was detained as well as all others, & I do suppose that Charles Carrol Esq^r must Know that was the Case, however soon after the Otter was here M' W' Lux was going to Annapolis, & I requested him to let you know, that my Brig was detain'd, and the Cargo ready to put on board her, and requested your further Instructions, on his Return he told me you had not any further orders to give me but if you had any further you would send them to me hereafter on which account I thought it was unnecessary to give you any more Trouble but Resolved, to load the Vessell as soon as Possession was given to me, unless orders had come from you to the contrary.

Last Monday they gave me Possession, & I now have Nine Hundred Barrells on board her, and I shall have her ready for the sea this Week, and I hope in the end shall give you every necessary Satisfaction, tho you seem to think by what you say in your letter, that I have not laid out the publick money properly, if I had been one of those kind of men, M' Thomas Jones of this Town, would not have given me a letter to any friend he had, & that time I contracted with you he gave me a few lines to Dan¹ of St Thom¹ Jenifer Esq¹ your President. However I must confess I was to blame to trust any man, & see now I should have wrote you in Preference of sending by M' Lux, but if he has Deceived me I cannot help it now, but

shall for the future never Depend on him or any Man, on such Business.

That it was perjury to such as had ever taken the oath of Allegiance

That the King and Parliament had a right to Reclaim the American Charters as forfeited:

That the American opposition to great Britain is not calculated or designed for the defence of American Liberty or Property, but for the purpose of enslaving the Poor People thereof:

That Americans were wrong in disputing the matter with Great Britain so far as an appeal to arms for which they had

neither Officers, Men nor discipline.

That it was owing to the Lenity & forbearance of Great Britain why she had not convinced us of our Error ere now, two years being hardly sufficient to rouse her to a War with France or Spain much less with her own Subjects, but that after the great slaughter we should suffer the ensuing Campaign those who survived would think better of it:

That he (Magee) would join the Kings troops if he had an

opportunity.

That signing a paper did not alter the heart & he knew there was thousands among us who had enroled that was still of his way of thinking:

That he would never pay any fine as a non enroler & would shoot any person who should attempt to execute his effects for that purpose

To the Honble the Convention of the Province of Maryland now sitting:

The memorial of Henry Ridgely of Elkridge, in Anne Arundel County most humbly sheweth, that your Memorialist did early in Life quit a Domestick Happiness to commence soldier, and had the Honor of Commanding a Company of Rangers on the western Frontiers of this Province, soon after the defeat of General Braddock in the year 1755, at which time the cruel savages were laying waste the Country & murdering the Inhabitants, & that your Memorialist's Conduct & Behaviour in that service was approved of by Col¹ Sharp then Governor of Maryland, and on your memorialists quitting the Ranging service was promoted to the Command of the Elkridge Troop of Horse, which station he filled many years, to the entire Satisfaction of his field officers; Whereupon the late Governor Sharp promoted him to be a Major of the County aforesaid, in the year 1761, & he was continued as such until the year 1773 when the present Governor Eden raised your Memorialist to the office of Lieutenant Col¹ in said County. Your memorialist further begs leave to inform your Honours, that after perusing the Proceedings of the Convention held in the latter part of the year 1774, he was one of

the first men in the Elkridge District, that requested a meeting of the people, to form themselves into a Company of Militia, which was accordingly done & Mr John Burgess chosen Capt, your Memorialist having declined that Honour, altho unanimously offered to him, knowing he could be of more service to the cause in assisting in the formation of other Companies; And accordingly in the month of June last, your Memorialist went into the neighbourhood of Mr Thos Dorsey who had been six months unsuccessfully striving to raise a Company; and after advertizing a Meeting of the Inhabitants a number of them met & would have chosen your Memorialist Captain, but were prevailed upon by him to chose M^r Tho^s Dorsey their Capt who appeared exceedingly desirous of the Command. Your memorialist conceives that agreeable to the resolves of the late Convention he is exempt from serving in the Militia as a private, or in any station lower than he hath heretofore filled, nevertheless, as the Honble Convention did not distinguish between the officers commissioned under the legal or old Form of Government, & those under the authority of the Convention, your Memorialist did enroll himself as a private in Cap' Tootell's Company altho at the distance of twenty miles from his Habitation, rather than be harassed by the Committee of Observation composed entirely of Militia officers except one man, And to avoid the indignity of being commanded by the first officer of the Elkridge Battalion who most shamefully & cowardly quited his post when under your Memorialists Command twenty one years ago. Your Memorialist hath nothing more to ask of your Honours than a candid Consideration of this Memorial & pass a resolve for his Exemption from further Duty as a Militia man, at the same time he most solemnly assures your Honors that he doth not desire or intend to withdraw himself from the service of his native Country but on the Contrary will stand forth as far as in his power layeth as (a Volunteer or an Independent with the stoutest champion for American Liberty: In full expectation of a favorable issue, the above is most chearfully submitted to the consideration of your honble House by your Memorialist: Elkridge May the 20th 1776. [Resolutions of Virginia Convention.]

Virginia. In Convention Wednesday May 15th 1776. Present 112 Members: For as much as all the endeavours of the united colonies, by the most decent representations and petitions to the King and Parliament of Great Britain, to restore peace and security to America under the British Government, and a reunion with that people upon just and liberal terms, instead of a redress of Grievances have produced from an imperious & vindictive administration, increased insult, oppression, and a vigorous attempt to effect our total destruction. By a late act, all these colonies are declared to be in Rebellion, and out of the protection of the British Crown, our properties subjected to confiscation, our people when captivated, compelled to join in the murder and plunder of their relations and countrymen, and all former rapine and oppression of Americans declared legal and just. Fleets and armies are raised, and the aid of foreign troops engaged to assist these destructive purposes. The Kings representative in this colony hath not only withheld all the powers of Government from operating for our safety, but having retired on board an armed ship is carrying on a piratical and savage war against us, tempting our slaves, by every artifice to resort to him, and training and employing them against their masters. In this state of extreme danger, we have no alternative left but an abject submission to the will of those overbearing tyrants, or a total separation from the crown and Government of Great Britain, uniting & exerting the strength of all America for Defence, and forming alliances with foreign powers for commerce and aid in war, Wherefore, appealing to the searcher of hearts for the sincerity of former declarations, expressing



c. s. c. our desire to preserve the connection with that nation, and that we are driven from that inclination by their wicked councils, and the eternal laws of self preservation, Resolved, unanimously, that the delegates appointed to represent this colony in General congress be instructed to propose to that respectable Body to declare the united colonies free and independant states, absolved from all allegiance to, dependence upon the crown or Parliament of Great Britain; and that they give the assent of this colony to such declaration, and to whatever measures may be thought proper and necessary by the Congress for forming foreign alliances, and a confederation of the colonies, at such time and in the manner, as to them shall seem best provided, that the power of forming Government for, and the regulations of the internal concerns of the colony, be left to the respective colonial Legislatures: Resolved unanimously, that a committee be appointed to prepare a declaration of Rights and such a plan of Government as will be most likely to maintain peace and order in this colony, and secure substantial and equal Liberty to the people:

All is quiet at Annapolis, the Governors boat is just returned from Virginia with Secretary Smith, and brings a Letter from Commodore Hamond of the Roebuck to the Governor which we have seen, he is to be sent for shortly, the letter is dated at Gwinns Island, (which we take to be near Pianketank between the mouth of Potowmack and Rhappahannock) the letter informs they came there to compleat their wood and water; private intelligence says the Island is of some miles extent and has stock of Cattle, Sheep & thereon; and that they are casting up intrenchments to defend themselves against the militia—how long they will remain there is uncertain, our Islands will probably be plundered next, and they

will move we conjecture up the River Potowmack, or our Bay. c. s. c. We should be exceedingly glad to have our military stores particularly Cannon and small arms lent the Congress for fitting out the Wasp and Hornet—inclosed we send you copy of the particulars, and wish you would apply when there is

probability of succeeding.

M' Smith informs that a vessel under Spanish colours was lately taken in Delaware Bay with 14000 Dollars on board, the boxes that contained them are marked W. M. from whence he thinks they belong to Willing & Morris, and that there may be more money on board—he confirms the report of Stock on the Island and says a Commissary is appointed to see that the people are paid. Mr Smith also says that Commodore Hamond and Lord Dunmore both assured him that they had certain Intelligence that Commissioners were coming over and that he inferred from their conversation, they were to treat with the Congress, he also says that they told him a very powerful fleet was expected with the troops from England, that Hudson's Ship was with the fleet now at Gwins Island, that she was not yet condemned a witness being wanting that was on board the Liverpool Frigate, whom Dunmore told M' Smith, could prove that the Congress had papers on board concealed in a Log of wood which probably would condemn her. We wish to hear from you by every good opportunity.

[Commodore Hamond to Eden.]

Roebuck at Gwin's Island 30th May 1776.

Dear Sir. I have received your letter of the 26th Instant by M^r Smith, who arrived here yesterday and am sorry (tho' not surprized) to learn that you think it necessary to leave Annapolis. The Province of Maryland has hitherto been looked upon, as having acted with a degree of moderation in the present unnatural Rebellion subsisting in the Colonies, and I had some expectation from your continuing in your Government, that you might have been able to have convinced the people of the impossibility of their succeeding in the plan that America is now pursuing (which is the only motive, I fear, that will have any weight in bringing them back to their allegiance) but as you have certainly now given this a very fair trial, and it is become apparent that the matter can only be settled by force of arms, I confess, that I think your remaining longer among them would only be exposing yourself to insults, and would answer no good purpose to his Majesty's service; I shall therefore very soon send one of the Kings Ships to receive you on board, until a passage can be provided for you to England, which I believe will happen very shortly; I shall c. s. c. also not fail to give orders to the ship, that she shall commit no hostilities at Annapolis whilst on that service, but as no officer in his Majestys service can be supposed to suffer patiently the smallest insult to be offered to the British colours, it will be necessary for you to inform the Persons that assume the Government of the People, that if the peace, is not as strictly observed on the part of the Provincials, both with regard to the Boats, as well as the ship, during the time it may be necessary for her to stay on the coasts of Maryland, that any orders which I may think proper to issue for the purpose, will not restrain the Captain of the ship from acting as he shall think proper and necessary upon the occasion: Had I not received your letter, you would certainly have heard from me in a few days, to have acquainted you, that His Excellency the Earl of Dunmore & myself, with the joint forces under our command left Norfolk on the 23d Inst and put into this Harbour on the 28th in order to compleat our wood & water, where we at present remain. To the Deputies for Maryland in Congress.

Gentⁿ We received M^r Stone's Letter of the 4th instant and are obliged for the intelligence therein contained. We have heertofore wrote you by Mr Steuard, which doubt not you have received—the Governor is not yet gone; we expect he will leave the Province in a few days, what interruption the Virginians will or can give him in his passage down the Bay, time will discover. We send you enclosed a copy of their resolves, which came by express this day directed to C. Carroll Esq^r Chairman of the Convention, and appear to have been fabricated sometime after our Convention had broke up. You will see clearly the intention is to stir up the people against the powers now in being, Deputies in Congress, Convention, and Council of Safety, for which they deserve to be properly rewarded.—how far such proceedings tend to promote union and harmony amongst the colonies, you will judge as well or better than we can. We intend returning them a short answer, and leave to the Convention when they meet again to give them the payment they deserve.

Should the Congress think proper to request us to march our militia in the manner T. S. hath intimated, we must be under the disagreeable necessity of calling the Convention, tis not with us to say they shall march out of the Province; and we doubt the militia themselves will be backwards in so doing 'till all danger of invasion here be at an end for the season—3400 militia would take all the arms we have that are serviceable, and then what condition would our own province be in? we should become an easy prey to the Men of War and tenders that will swarm in the bay during the summer, and perhaps the ministerial Troops may be tempted by our weakness to do what they would not otherwise have attempted—this we say upon supposition that we must furnish them with arms &c.

We shall hear more fully however hereafter.

The intelligence with regard to 7000 men rising and

declaring for independence is without foundation; we take it c. s. c. to be news from some incendiary;—M' Purviance got off with a severe reprimand, as you will see by the proceedings of the Convention, a copy of which we shall hereafter inclose to you when they are printed. We all join in compliments and best wishes.

Gentlemen. We have received your Letter by M^r Steward also that by the Post of the 7th of this month. We have confered with M^r Steward, assisted him in changing his provincial money for continental and procured a recommendation from M' Morris to those who have been concerned in fitting out the Gallies here to give him all the Information in their power respecting them We shall make Application for the arms lent the Congress but we do not see any probability of obtaining them, none having been made or having arrived but what were immediately disposed of among the Continental Troops. It seems to be taken for granted that our Province will not be attacked, and upon this supposition we presume it will be thought unnecessary to strengthen us even by returning the warlike stores which we lent. When the scheme for marching the Militia was agitated we informed Congress of the circumstances of our Province and of the Impossibility of marching the Militia out of the Province without their consent. how-

ever our Quota for the flying Camp was struck at 3400 as you will see by the resolve inclosed by the President, but it was not understood that the Militia were to be drafted or compelled to march. And it is left altogether at large how they are be collected. Some additions to the resolutions on that subject are talked of but not formally proposed. We are astonished at the ungenerous and malevolent Turn given to the Proceedings of our Convention by that of Virginia, and hope they will be as unsuccessful in their nefarious attempt to stir up the People of Maryland against their representatives, as they have hitherto been in their Endeavours to render the Councils of that Province suspected. We are exceedingly sorry to observe this unfriendly disposition in a neighbouring sister Colony, but hope there will be found spirit enough in the Convention of Maryland to resent this most injurious Treatment in the manner it deserves. The proposition from the Delegates of Virginia to declare the Colonies independent was yesterday after much Debate postponed for three weeks then to be resumed, and a Committee is appointed to draw up a Declaration to prevent Loss of time in case the Congress should agree to the Proposition at the day fixed for resuming This postpone was made to give an opportunity to the Delegates from those Colonies, which had not as yet given Authority to adopt this decisive measure, to consult their constituents; It will be necessary that the Convention of Maryland should meet as soon as possible to give the explicit sense of the Province on this Point. And we hope you will accordingly exercise your Power of convening them at such Time as you think the members can be brought together. We wish to have the fair and uninfluenced sense of the People we have the Honour to represent in this most important and interesting affair and that it would be well if the Delegates to Convention were desired to endeavour to collect the opinion of the people at large in some manner or other previous to the meeting of Convention. We shall attend the Convention whenever it meets if it is thought proper we should do so. The approaching Harvest will perhaps render it very inconvenient to many Gentlemen to attend the Convention. This however must not be regarded when matters of such momentous Concern demand their deliberation. We beg you will inform us as soon as may be of the Time you fix for the Convention to meet, and we should also be very glad to receive the Proceedings of the last Session. We see with the deepest concern the attempts from various Quarters to throw the Province into a state of confusion Division & Disorder, but trust, the Exertions of those who are the true friends of Virtue & the American Cause will be adequate to the surrounding

Difficulties & Dangers. From every account and appearance. The King and his ministers seem determined to hazard every thing upon the success of the Sword without offering any Terms to America which she ought to accept. That Peace & Security which every virtuous man in this Country has so earnestly desired seems not attainable in the present disposition of the ruling powers of Britain. We wish we had any reason to suppose, there was any foundation for what M^r Smith reports to have been told him by Capt Hammond & Ld Dunmore, but all circumstances strongly oppose the Supposition of Commissioners, as Messengers of Peace. However we know not more of this matter than you & the public do, and it is impossible to speak certainly upon this or any other subject without more full information than we have. We will send the Gun carriage, Instruments & paper by Mr Steward who informs us he has sundry articles for the Province to be sent from hence. We begg to be informed frequently of the State of the Province and of your Proceedings; and assure you of our readiness to attend your Commands. Our hurry and necessary attendance in Congress must apologize for this Scrawl. The question for postponing the declaration of Independence was carried by seven Colonies against five:

My dear Sir. I received last night Mr Tilghmans letter of sunday last Inclosing the resolves of the Virginia Convention and I assure you I would most willingly ride down to Annapolis to be with you for a day or two were I in a condition to do it or to be of much service but I am so unhinged and relaxed by my attendance & confinement that I am plagued with almost constant little fevers and 'tho I keep about I am apprehensive such a ride would lay me up & it is with difficulty I now hold a Pen to write to you. I will however with as much precision as I can, give you my sentiments. If you are fully convinced of the propriety of the present Council of Safety, Entering into a vindication of the conduct of the convention and the proceedings of the former Council, by letter to the Committee of Safety of Virga against aspersions thrown out by the convention of that Colony in their Resolves, I think you have the matter and the grounds for the conduct of the Council of Safety fully set forth in our letters to the Congress and our several letters to our deputies on the intercepted letters and our proceeding with the Governor and I think the more concise and pointed such letter, is, the better—they may be told that the Council of Safety proceeded in a matter to wh, they were competent on testimony that they the Convention of Virga could not be Privy to, that they were happy in having their conduct approved of by that convention of the Province, and that you would not condescend to enter into a discussion of

c. s. c. their conduct with any Public Body that has not authority to interfere in our Provincial concerns and to weh we are not accountable. That the readiness, with wh this Province on a late occasion ordered some companies of their minute men down to their Eastern Shore Counties of Virginia for their protection, and the readiness disposition the Council of Safety have on every occasion demonstrated to cooperate with their colony in every measure proposed by them will evince to the world their regard for the Safety & Welfare of that Colony and clear the convention from the unjust imputation of having promoted Gov' Edens passage to assist in the destruction of the Colony of Virga under pretence of his returning to England. I have not the letter or what they call the address to Gov' Eden here but by what I recollect of it I think they may be told that the Council cannot conceive the letter or address to Gov Eden can support or justify him in assuming any Public character or enable him to promote any measures that may tend to disunite the Colonies, or be productive of the danger apprehended to the Common cause of America. N. B. Would it not be proper to omit the address. If you incline to say any thing in the clause in the Resolves relating to the reasons assigned for his departure, you may I think well tell him, that when we consider that the president of the Council of State on whom by act of Assembly of this Province in the absence of the Governor the Government is to devolve, is a native of the Province and his connexions, fortune and family in it, we cannot apprehend he will consider himself under equal obligations to execute the ministerial mandates, with a Governor who is a native of England, & who has his family connexions, and fortune in that Country, or if he should unfortunately, be equally ready to obey them—do we apprehend that he will have equal influence or power to carry any measures proposed by them into execution, We therefore are persuaded the convention acted with the greatest discretion & prudence in continuing the Government in its old and at present established form till they should themselves be convinced that there was no probability of a reconciliation with Great Britain and should find themselves under an absolute necessity of altering it, and we are convinced that in their proceedings they were neither deceived by any professions of friendship to Am² made by Gov^r Eden, or influenced by any dependance or proprietary power, but actuated by strict justice and honour only, and we are satisfied their conduct has met with the approbation of their constituents, who we are convinced will treat in a manner becoming their good sense, and spirit, every attempt of any external provincial Body whatsoever that may presume to dictate to them or to interfere with the administration of Government or internal

Business of the Province, and altho we cannot but be in some C. S. C. measure affected by the injurious insinuations thrown out in the resolves of the convention and Council of Safety Insinuations in our opinion continued and circulated to lessen in the estimation of our Countrymen the credit of those in whom at present the public authority in this province is placed, and are satisfied they will not tend to promote the harmony that at this critical period should subsist between the two colonies but may in our apprehension be attended with the most disagreeable and perhaps dangerous consequences, yet we shall with the spirit & firmness of men superior to little contrivances, and such provocations, disregard the injurious treatment these bodies have received or any that may ever hereafter be offered to us as a Public body, and shall steadily to the utmost of our power pursue every measure that in our opinion may conduce to the Safety protection and defence of ourselves & our neighbours or promote the General interest of America:—I have thus thrown together my thoughts, whether you may think of writing to the Committee of Safety of Virga or whether you may think of publishing any thing as a declaration to the people, I must repeat it, I think the shorter and more peremptory it is the better effect it will have, we are not accountable to them, for our conduct & therefore I am not for entering into a discussion of the matter with them. This letter has been wrote two or three days & I have not had an opportunity of sending it till now by Mr Lux I did intend to have set off for Annaps to morrow as I am a little better than I have been, but M' Lux informs me that the convention is to meet on the 18th if so it will be impossible for me to go down and be up here again & return again to the Convention without hurrying myself too much so I shall stay till I hear from you by Mr. Lux. I think as the convention is to meet shortly you need not hurry your answer or declaration but defer it for a post or two, pray present my compliments to all my brothers of the Council:-

[Betton's Petition to Convention.]

Original.

To the Honble the Delegates of the Province of Maryland now met in Convention. The petition of Turbutt Betton Junior of Queen Anns County sheweth: That since the inhabitants of this Province, have been reduced to the disagreeable necessity of taking arms in defence of their injured liberty your petitioner hath relied on the resolutions of the Convention of this province from time to time made as a means in a great degree whereby redress of grievances may be obtained and Anarchy and confusion happily avoided, under those impressions your petitioner heretofore enrolled as a private in Captain Thomas Wrights Company of Militia in Queen Anns County and chearfully submitted to do duty in that station being firmly resolved to support the authority of the Convention to the utmost of his power. That the said Thomas Wright hath been appointed Colonel of the Battalion to which the said Company belongs since which the Honble the Council of Safety of this Province have appointed James Bordley Captain John Kent first Lieu' James Earle second Lieu' and Nathan Brown Ensign of the said Company, but a majority of the same Company regardless of the resolutions and appointments of the convention & Council of Safety have refused to acknowledge the field officers of the said Battalion appointed by the Convention or to Act under them and have nominated acted under and appointed other field officers in their stead and have also refused to acknowledge and act under the said second Lieu and Ensign appointed by the Council of Safety but have also nominated, and act under others, appointed

Your petitioner further sheweth that he is by themselves. still desirous of conforming to the resolutions and orders of the Convention and Council of Safety, and is ready to join in defence and support of their authority at the utmost hazard but your petitioner hath refused to muster either in Battalion or the company aforesaid under other officers than those appointed by the Convention and Council of Safety conceiving that it is his duty to discountenance as much as he can any authority set up in opposition to and in defiance of their power. That the said Captain and first Lieu' notwithstanding they have received their own Commissions from the Council of Safety yet openly and avowedly countenance the irregular proceedings aforesaid by refusing to acknowledge the officers appointed by the Convention and Council of Safety and acknowledging and acting with those appointed by the people in opposition to their authority yet under colour of another resolution of the Convention have proceeded to fine your petitioner the sum of fifteen shillings for refusing to muster under other officers than those appointed as aforesaid by the Council of Safety. That your petitioner conceiving the said fine to have been irregularly and unjustifiably imposed on him refused to pay the same whereupon the said Captain Bordley applied to the Committee of observation in this County who have granted him a warrant (a copy whereof is hereunto annexed impowering him to destrain and sell your petitioners effects, for the payment thereof which said warrant is now in the hands of one of the sarjeants of the said Company to be executed, and your petitioner is apprehensive his effects will be taken and sold by virtue thereof immediately on the recess of this Convention and therefore humbly hopes your honors will take the premises aforesaid into consideration and take such order therein for your petitioners relief as in your wisdom shall seem meet & so forth: Turbutt Betton.

In Committee of observation 13th June 1776. Captain James Bordley having certified that Turbutt Betton Junior had been fined the sum of fifteen shillings for his non appearance at the muster field on four several days, and had refused to pay his fines at three shillings and nine pence each day: These are to authorize and impower you to lay the sum of fifteen shillings current money by distress and sale of the said Turbutt Betton Junior his goods and effects in the same manner that goods may be distrained and sold by law for County levies, and the same when distressed as aft to pay into the hands of Mr Joseph Potter. Fail not this being your sufficient power:

We have received your letters with regard to the vessels sunk at Whetstone point, and altho' you declined acting in your first letter, we are pleased to find you have since accepted of the trust reposed in you by the Council of Safety, and we find by your last letter that you have in part executed the same by raising several of the vessels.—You are desirous of having some further instructions about repairing and valueing the vessells after they are raised. We must beg leave to refer you to the proceedings of the last Convention page (13) where you will see what we are directed to do, and also we refer to our former instructions by which you are requested after raising the vessels to cause them to be rigged and put in same state they were in before they were sunk, as near as may be and then you or any two of you are to cause them severally to be reappraised on oath by persons you may appoint—to which we shall add nothing further at present, only request you to advise with Captain Nicholson in all your proceedings, and to take care your men appointed be free from any partiality or just objection, and that they make regular returns of appraisement to us; we doubt not you will do what is right and then the owners cannot complain, or if they do, their unjust allegations will be little attended to, we believe, by the Convention who are shortly to meet.

To the Deputies for Maryland in Congress.

Gent

Your favour of the 11th inst we recd at 10 o'Clock this morning—we have already complied with almost every thing you request^d, and we wish we had time to collect the fair and uninfluenced sense of our people on the most important point of Independence before the meeting of the Convention; but as the assembling of that body is already fixed on the 20th of this month, it will be impossible to [send express to the Delegates who are distant so that they could make the necessary enquiry before that time. We presume the first business of the Convention will be regulating the movement of the militia, and that if necessary in the mean time the several committees of observation may be directed fairly to collect the sense of the Province on the subject of Independence, and make report thereof to the Convention. Any mode their Representatives may think proper to point out would be better relished by the people, than for us to put them into a violent ferment in a way that might not be approved of—'tis a point of great magnitude, and we think it's best, the shortness of time considered, to leave it untouched until the meeting of the Convention on thursday next. Mr Paca no doubt is with you before now, Mess¹⁵ Johnson & Goldsborough still with their families we hear—we wish to have you all down when the grand question is decided, we leave it however to yourselves to judge whether you can be spared from Congress, and hope whatever is done will be generally agreed to.—from the Virginia paper we learn that Clinton left Cape Fear with his Troops on the 29th of May, this comes to that colony by express in a letter from General Lee to their Convention. General Howe's house was burnt and some of his domestics illtreated, no other damage of consequence, say the papers; and Clinton published a proclamation warning the people of N° Carolina to flee from the wrath that was hereafter to come upon them, and exhorting them to return to duty; where he is gone is not ascertained, the paper says that the prevailing opinion is that they are gone to the Southward, Gen¹ Lee writes he thinks they are coming round to Virginia. If they are coming this way we shall soon hear of them and will let you know.

Gent^a When last in Annapolis in conversation with one of y^r Hon^{ble} Members M^r Ramsey, I said I was informed by some of the inhabitants of this County near to the Clifts that the Clifts were in places full of a saline matter that they took to be salt Petre in a native state & I promised to examine therein on my return.

I have been under those Clifts & find saline matter in some parts in great abundance of a vitriolic aluminous Taste but have made no experiments therewith yet, from the calls of my profession hindering me, but on the clift at Mⁿ Hollands about three miles below this town on the E. side of Patuxent River we have discovered a salt Lick & the Earth very strongly impregnated with common salt insomuch that a tub of that Earth being put up & water run through it as they draw off Ley from ashes or nitrous earth is so rich as to yield by boiling 14th part of its quantity good clean fine salt as you may see by the small sample I have sent you by M^r Peregrine Fitzhugh.

Various are the opinions how this is produced: Dr Jas Bate says as its on the east side & exposed to the most violent heat of the sun in the afternoon he believes it to be no more than from the sprays of the sea's meeting this Clift & the sun exhaling the more moist whilst the saline particles are left behind & retained in the earth for about 4 inches deep. I am of a contrary opinion as the water of the River is only brackish at that place none are ever biting there or within 12 miles of it & think that the earth is impregnated with salt in a native state which is perpetually ouseing & the sun exhales the moist & fixes the saline particles behind, be this as it may it is a valuable discovery & the Tenants on that land can easily get whatever salt they may want & now only repine that it was not discovered early enough to salt up fish with which are caught there in the spring in great abundance:

The Salt Petre manufactory under my superviser ship I have the satisfaction to inform you emproves much & tho we were so unsuccessful in the first 8 Hhd^s of earth we drew ley from as to get nothing when last at Annapolis other earth has in the last three weeks given us between fifteen & eighteen pounds pure crude nitre but expect a week or two more to have drawn off the ley &c from all the earth I have there in a proper state & shall then proceed to lay in my shed this earth that has been drawn off trash Tob° lime brickdust &c as a matrix for to receive more agt the fall

Yours of the 10th Inst was delivered to us yesterday, it has happened very well that you have called a Convention on the 20th, tho for the purpose of complying with the resolve of Congress we think your own powers are fully adequate. It never was intended that any part of the militia was compellable to march out of the Provinces; no do we know of any Power in ours, even tho' the Convention was sitting, to order the militia upon Service out of the Province, It was intended that the flying camp should be formed by voluntary Inlistments of the militia, and it was supposed that the People of the respective Provinces would readily and voluntarily march to the head quarters of this flying camp, which was ordered principally to defend the middle Colonies. It will be necessary however to appoint officers and give directions to the body of militia when raised, and this may be done by your council or the Convention. We wrote you a few days ago requesting a call of the Convention to deliberate upon matters of the last Importance, and we are glad that an earlier meeting than we expected will afford an opportunity to our constituents to communicate to us the sense of the Province upon the very interesting subjects mentioned in our Letter The session will be a very important one and we wish to attend, tho we know not whether it will be agreeable to our constituents to leave the Province unrepresented in Congress, it being a matter of much consequence to keep up the representation at this and all other times. We shall wait to hear from you and them upon this head, indeed we can't quit the Congress without Leave which

will not be given here unless our attendance in Convention is desired. M' Tilghman left us yesterday, M' Paca is here. I have got my works erected and materials collected for going on with it, I have been sometime at work but whether owing to the extra. wet season when I raised the earths or its not rising so plentifully in our flat clayey lands as in those more Hilly and dry, I cant tell, but cant find the quantitys contained in the earths I have tryed, as has been published,—I think I shall now produce six or eight pounds per day and have hopes of more. I have three Boilers 70, 60 & 30 gallons which we use more or less every day. I have weighed what is made and fit for sending away this

Lux for £90 Cy. & have got in safe the goods you sent us by the wicked Dick, Capth Tibbett, also by the Pilot Boat Chatam, and some powder we hear is arrived in No Carolina not yet got to hand, we would caution you against sending any more that way as yet—the coast there is too dangerous at present, full of Men of War and Tenders—we shall be glad to hear

from you by every good opportunity.

P. S. The Brig Nancy Captⁿ Wise addressed to you, has been unfortunately taken by a Tender in Annamesseck road, in a Fog which prevented the Captⁿ from seeing her approach, until she was so near, that he could not avoid the misfortune.

May it please your Honour's, Inclosed you have a state of the Arms in the hands of the 29th Battalion of Militia under my Command, so far as I have been able to obtain it, It may not be amiss to inform you, that although Capt Samt Wade Magruder had received my orders to meet in Battalion on the day appointed (which were given out before I received the orders from the Brigadier General to transmit an accot of the Arms &c) and had likewise afterwards heard of the Generals orders, yet neither he nor his Company did appear in the Field, which has rendered it impossible for me to furnish his list with the rest. I should have been more speedy in transmitting this account, had I not before, I heard any thing of the matter, given orders for the Battalion to meet, as I have told

you before, in short I did not receive the Generals letter until last Thursday. near three months ago I employed an Adjutant for the Battalion, who is greatly in want of money; should you think proper to send any for the purpose of paying him, it may be done by the Bearer M' Edward Gale whose receipt shall be good, Cap' Edward Burgess has requested me to mention his name as willing to receive a commission for the Flying Camp: In my opinion, I think him a proper person & that it would be in his power to raise a good company, in and near the place where he lives. The following memorial was presented to the Convention,

by the Council of Safety.

"To the Honorable Matthew Tilghman Esq' President, and

the other members of the honorable Convention.

"The memorial of the Council of Safety Sheweth, that at last December Session it was resolved, "that the sum of five thousand nine hundred pounds be appropriated to fortify the City of Annapolis, and place obstructions in the Channel of the river and that the same should be laid out for the purposes ass^d by the Council of Safety thereafter to be appointed, if it should appear practicable to them to erect such fortifications, and lay such obstructions for that sum, exclusive of the Cost of Cannon, powder, and the like, as would prevent men of war approaching the said City.

"The Council of Safety have not raised any fortifications, in consequence of said resolve, because it was not practicable in their opinion to fortify the City, and place obstructions in the channel of the river, for the sum to which they were limited by the resolve they conceived it could not be done effectually without a much more considerable sum. the river Severn between the two points, at the mouth thereof, is near fifteen hundred yards over, the channel upwards of eight hundred yards, in some places the water twenty feet deep and more, as will appear by a Chart thereof, to which your memo-

rialists beg leave to refer, no obstructions have been thought C. S. J. of by them proper to be placed in the channel of the river, but Chiveaux de frise, or piles, both these are liable to be soon destroyed by the worm. if large piles could be driven down headed with Iron, they would be eaten so much with worm, in the course of one season, that they would be easily born down by men of war, coming up under full sail with a brisk wind. all obstructions of wood are liable to this objection, and therefore in their opinion not to be depended on.

The Council of Safety endeavoured soon after their appointment to procure Cannon from Philadelphia or New York, but were disappointed, Mr Hughs hath not yet complied with his contract. the want of heavy cannon was a further reason, why they could not proceed. when they can be procured, your Memorialists are of opinion that Batteries may be erected on Greenbury's Point, the Wind-mill Point, Horn Point, and places adjacent, between that and the city on the South side of the River, which may be of service, to prevent Landing, altho' they might not fully answer the purpose of preventing men of war approaching the place.

"Your memorialists further observe that at the late Convention, it was thought expedient to appropriate part of the money for building three Row Gallies, or Gondolas, so that there will not remain more than three thousand pounds currency, or thereabouts to be applied to the erecting fortifications.

"Under these Circumstances your memorialists submit to the Honble Convention, whether they will direct the Council of Safety to endeavour to procure Cannon, and also buy up materials for erecting Batteries, giving them a discretionary power to draw on the treasury for such expences, as may be necessary, not exceeding a certain sum, or whether your honors will direct the residue of five thousand, nine hundred pounds, to be laid out in throwing up breast-works, and making other defences within the city, to prevent the Enemy landing, and taking possession thereof"

Militia at one time on alarm, I have it in instructions from the General, to throw each compy of the Battalion in certain divisions, one of which only is to be ordered on duty at the same time, except on an extraordinary emergency. the mode adopted you have inclosed for your Government the advantages resulting therefrom will I make no doubt sufficiently recommend it, however you are to take the sense of your

company therein, and advise me as soon as possible, that the General may be enabled to lay the plan before the Council of Safety for their approbation, without which it will not perhaps be put in practice. you are to have the effective arms in your company valued by the Commissioned officers or any three of them and marked B.1.&c and so progressively upwards taking a list thereof with the owners names, opposite its number that the same may be replaced or paid for by the Publick if lost or rendered useless in the service. It would be adviseable to place the best of these arms in the first division to be delivered over occasionally to the second, third & fourth, you will be pleased to loose no time in arraining your Compy and acquainting each person to what division they belong, if your Company should be incomplete the deficiency should fall in the last division as it can be easily supplied from those who have been in service before them &c.

Oxford June 27th 1776.

Gentlemen. At one o'Clock yesterday your letter came to hand inclosing a Resolve of Convention giving information of Capt Montague's Conduct, with directions to be prepared to

repel any violence offered by him, and to prevent his procuring provisions, should have been very happy to have received your commands three hours sooner, by that means I might have prevented Mr James Dickinson, Wm Thomas, John Stevens & Nicholas Martin going on board the Fowey man of war with several head of sheep & hogs, some as a present to the Governor others for sale, Mr Dickinson informed me some time before he set out that the Governor had permission from your Honors to take live stock on board the Man of War whenever she should come up and that he was to procure it for him, this Step has been taken by those Gentlemen without the Permission or Knowledge of the Committee of the County. Immediately on the Receipt of your letter, I hired a Boat put 20 men on board and sent in pursuit of them with orders to bring those Gentlemen with their sheep and hogs back again, about 8 oclock in the evening my boat met with them on their return having safely lodged all their Stock on board the Man of War I informed them of the Resolve of Convention and your orders to me, they have given me their Honor to attend at any time and place you may direct to answer for their Conduct. As I thought it necessary to inform you as soon as possible of this matter have hired a boat for the purpose in which Mr Anderson goes over & can fully relate to you every particular respecting those Gentlemen, shall be much obliged to you to send me by him an order for £100 or 150 as am getting the soldiers cloathes made up, and frequently purchasing little necessary articles.

The said Elisha Tyson having already made a Dam over the said stream and dug a Race for the purpose of building a



Water Grist Mill proposes instead thereof to erect a powder mill and retain the property in the premises on the sum of one thousand pounds Convention money being advanced to him without interest for the space of four years to be repaid in the following manner:—one fourth part thereof in Gunpowder at the price given by the Continental Congress at the expiration of one year from this date; one other fourth part thereof in the same Commodity at the expiration of two years from the date hereof, one other fourth part thereof in the same Commodity at the expiration of three years from the date hereof and the other fourth part thereof in the same Commodity at the expiration of four years from the date hereof.

The said Elisha Tyson proposes to appropriate a large part of the above £1000 to the purchase of Salt petre and other materials from private hands in this and other colonies.

He also proposes the province shall furnish him with one half of the salt petre imported into or manufactured in this Province as also one half of the Sulphur that shall become their property.

He will engage to manufacture powder at as cheap a rate at it is in the Province of Pennsylvania and in equal quantities in proportion to the quantity of materials found him for the use of the Province of Maryland.

He will give bond with good security for the performance

of the above propositions.

Gentⁿ

On Saturday the 25th Ulto. I received information by Express from Co¹ W^m Travers (of the Corps of the lower part of this County) that there were five Tenders then in Hoopers Straights, that they had landed on Hopkins's Island & had taken upwards of sixty head of Cattle from that place, together with two young men and every thing else that was valuable on the Island, that they had committed considerable depredations on the Somerset Shore, and thrown that County into the utmost confusion, and he expected they would commit further ravages in this County. In consequence of this information I ordered Col. John Ennalls & Major Robert Harrison to go down to that neighbourhood (it being forty miles from this place) to get further information respecting these circumstances and to take such steps as should appear to them to be necessary on the occasion. They immediately went down and I am informed by them that on their arrival there, they found affairs circumstanced as above related. The Tenders had gone down the Bay wth their plunder a few hours before they arrived but the Militia of that Corpse were still upon duty, many of them being much fatigued and anxious to go home, they were all discharged except about forty who were left to keep a look out. In the evening of that day there appeared in Nanticoke Sound, one large Ship and seven other Vessels supposed to be tenders. This gave the Inhabitants great uneasiness and anxiety, they therefore ordered such part of the Militia as cou'd readily be collected to assemble to prevent the Enemy from committing further damage. I am further informed by them that they found many of the people in that part of the County very lukewarm in the opposition, difficult to be got together, and when collected in such bad discipline they are not (in their opinion) to be relied on, paying but little regard to the instructions of their Officers. being in this situation, I have thought it advisable to order part of the Militia under my command to march down to their assistance, & I flatter myself we shall be able to prevent their

landing in that quarter, but should the enemy continue there c. s. c. a few days, and keep the Militia on duty numbers of the Inhabitants must unavoidably lose a considerable part of their crops, their Wheat being now ready to cut.

Capt. Woolford is at this time with his Company on the Borders of Nanticoke near the mouth of that River, to guard that neighbourhood, where his assistance is much wanted.

I must further beg leave to inform you that our Militia are badly fited with Arms, I am clearly of opinion, that not one half of them have effective Guns, neither have we a sufficient quantity of Powder & lead (particularly the latter) should we have occasion to make use of those articles.

I have this moment received an Express from Hoopers Straights by which I am informed that the Ship of War is now in the mouth of Nanticoke, two of the Tenders in Hungar River & one in Fishing Bay close to the shore, that the people are in great confusion, and much harassed by them. I have not the least doubt but they are in the like, or a worse situation in Somerset County. I think it my duty to give you this information as early as possible, and doubt not you will give such assistance as the exigency of our affairs require.

I have sent the Bearer John Barnet express to Annapolis to request that you will make application to the Council for a Sum of Money to defray the expenses of providing food and other necessaries that are requisite for the soldiers under inoculation here. the Doctors tell me that it will not be proper for the soldiers to eat the Ration provided for them by the Commissary for three weeks at least, in which time their expenses will amount to near 150 pounds or there about, be that as it may a true and just account shall be rendered of the expenditure of the money in case the Council think proper to advance it. May do this business as quickly as possible, I have expended almost all my own cash and when that is gone we may whistle for provision until we can get a fresh supply. The People here follow a very good rule, not trust us farther than they can see us. Please apply also for our Subsistence from the fifteenth of March last and let me know it whether it will be granted agreeable to account rendered by

c. s. c. Capt Beall some time ago, if it should you will send it by the Bearer, as I promise you I want it much. I would have wrote to the Council, but did not know whether it would be agreeable to them to receive it from among the Small Pox. be kind enough to dispatch Wirt down immediately, let no excuse stop him. I hear that he wants to stay, You may tell him he is to return again. Please write me and enclose a list of the Officers of the Flying Camp. I have nothing now to write, but am Dr Sir,

I never entertained the most distant thought that you had any intention of giving me offence, and am happy to find you have had no insinuations to my prejudice. What I complain of is your very concise order whereby I was superceded without a line from your Honors signifying what part I was to act, or whether I was to remain there a cipher, where I stayed with impatience twenty four hours, expecting further orders. I never attended to the Rank between Officers of the Militia & Regulars, as adjusted by the Convention, or should not have accepted off the Commission I held, for that and the reason already given, did enclose you my commission for the flying Camp. Having tendered my service to the Publick in a different line of duty, (viz. the Civil Department) wh requires my presence 'till my Offer is accepted or rejected, prevents my complying with your repeated request of giving you a Personal conference, until Monday next, when I have reason to believe I shall have the pleasure of confering with your Honors on the subject.

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
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
