

DECLARATION OF ERIC. M. LIEBERMAN

I, ERIC M. LIEBERMAN, declare:

1. I reside at 280 Riverside Drive, in the City of New York, State of New York. I am an attorney in the law firm of Rabinowitz, Boudin, Standard, Krinsky & Lieberman, P.C. My law office address is 740 Broadway, New York, New York 10003.

2. I am an attorney in good standing duly admitted to practice in the following courts: The United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, since 1974; the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Division, since 1974; The Supreme Judicial Court of the State of Massachusetts, since 1971; The United States Courts of Appeals for, inter alia, the Second Circuit (since 1973) and the Ninth Circuit (since 1985); and the Supreme Court of the United States, since 1974. I currently am not and never have been under suspension nor been subject to any disciplinary actions.

3. In the preceding two years, I have filed an application to appear as counsel pro hac vice in the following case: Vicki J. Aznaran et al. v. Church of Scientology of California, et al., No. CV 88-1876 JMI (Ex) United States District Court, Central District of California). The application was submitted on June 17, 1988 and was granted on June 20, 1988.
