The first project of the sophomore class was the selling of flowers and vegetable seeds. This task proved very unsuccessful due to a rushed season.

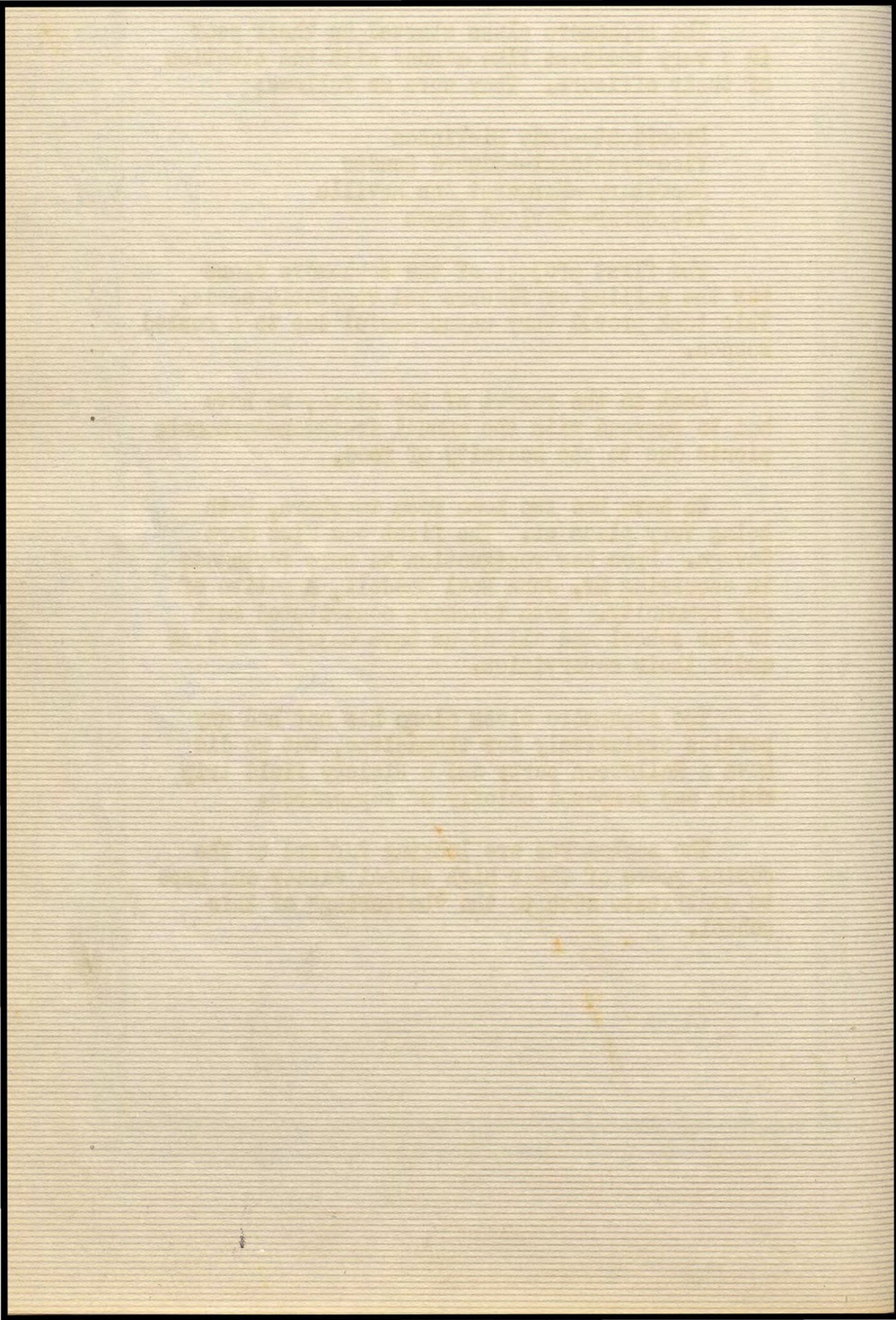
Much to the regret of the class, we have had to suspend with the annual freshmen-sophomore picnic due to the scarcity of food.

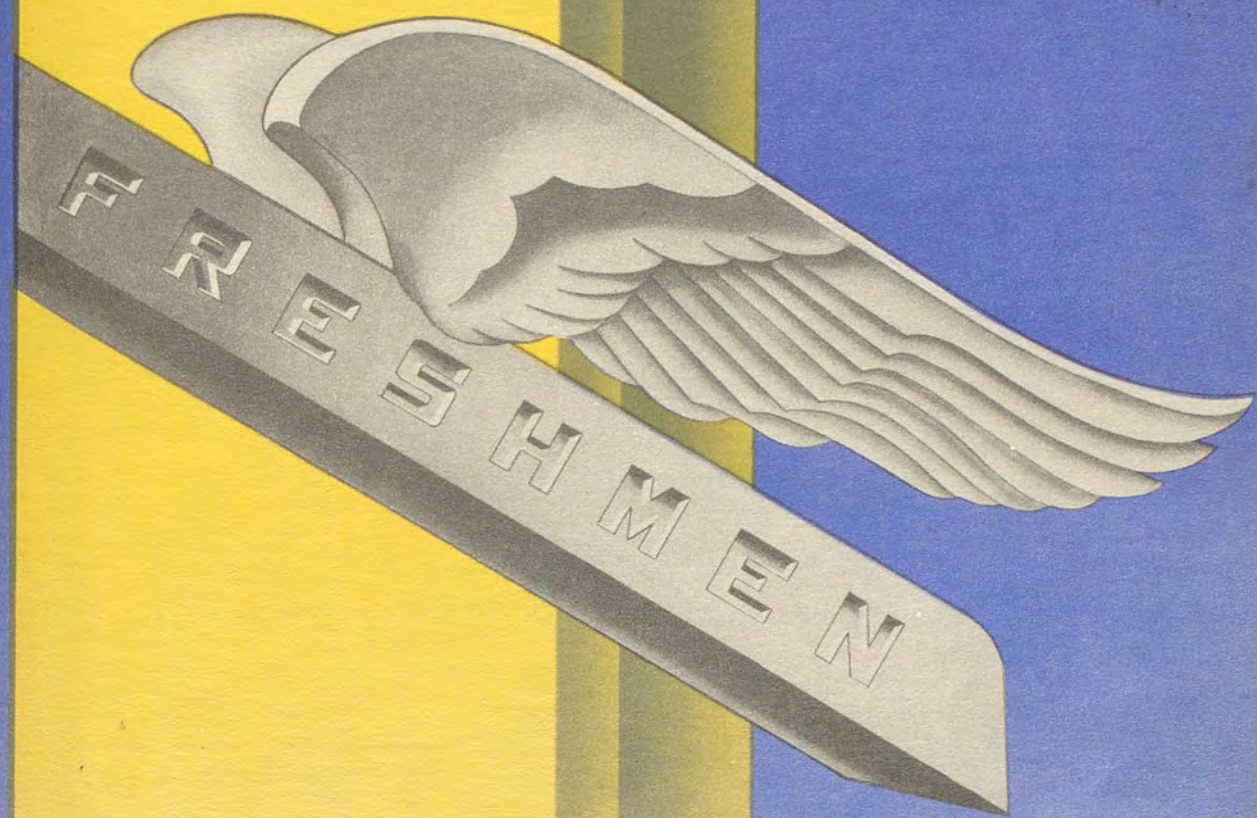
The sophomore class alone has not had any parties exclusively for themselves, but we did have a Halloween party and a Biology field trip which was composed chiefly of sophomores.

Two of our freshmen girls, Marjorie Callis and Dorothy Outten, are members of the Home Economics Club.

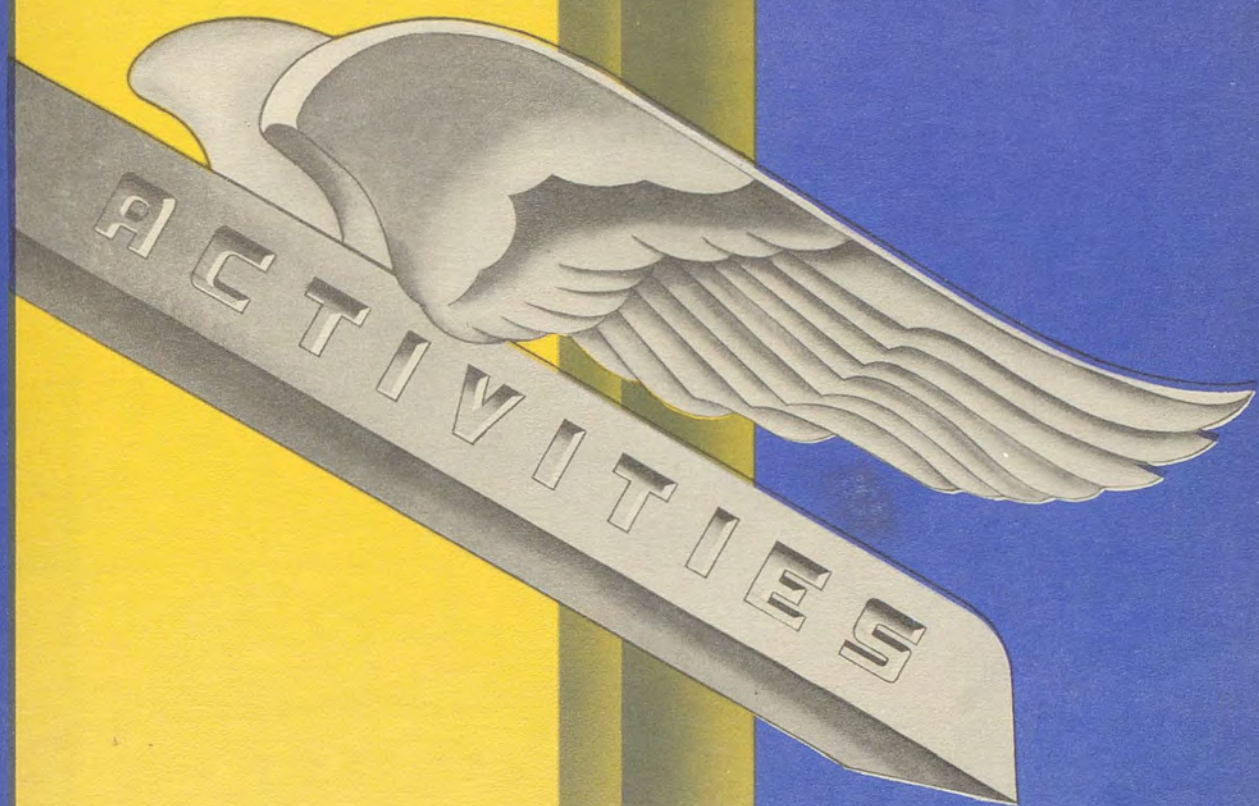

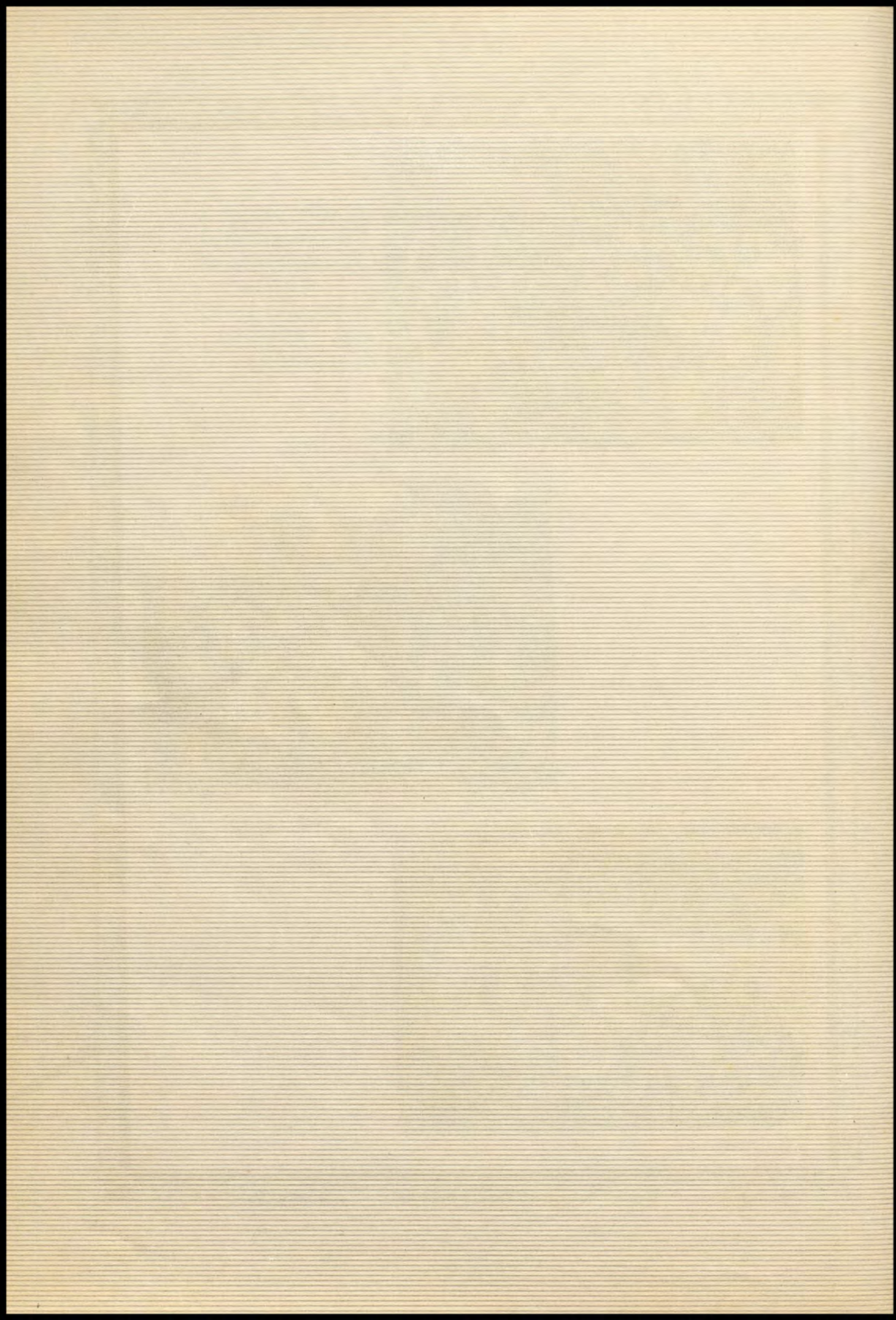

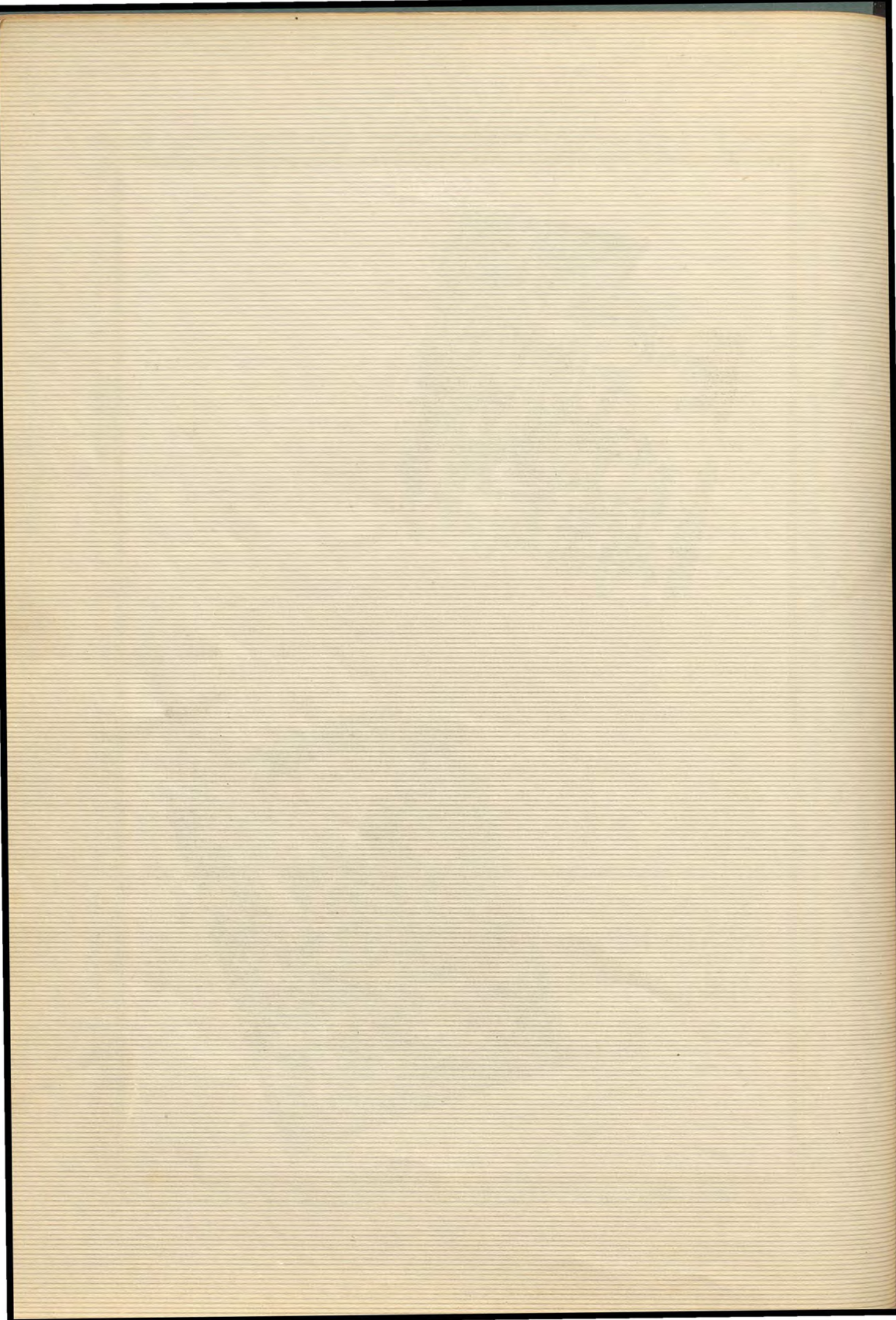

We sincerely hope that the high school girls of America continue to participate in sports which help to make for healthy, clean living.



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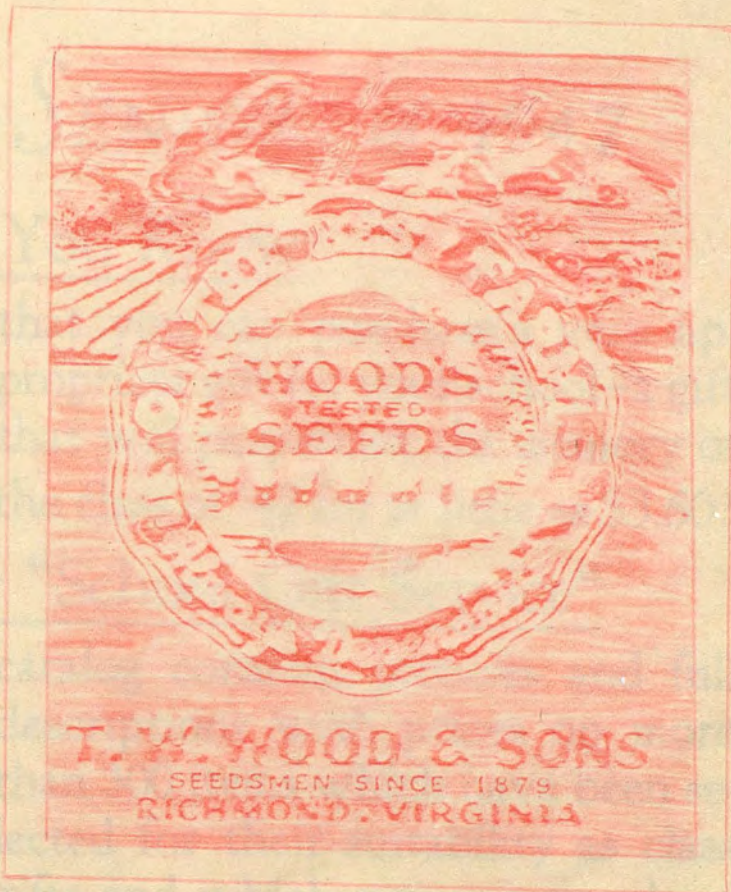












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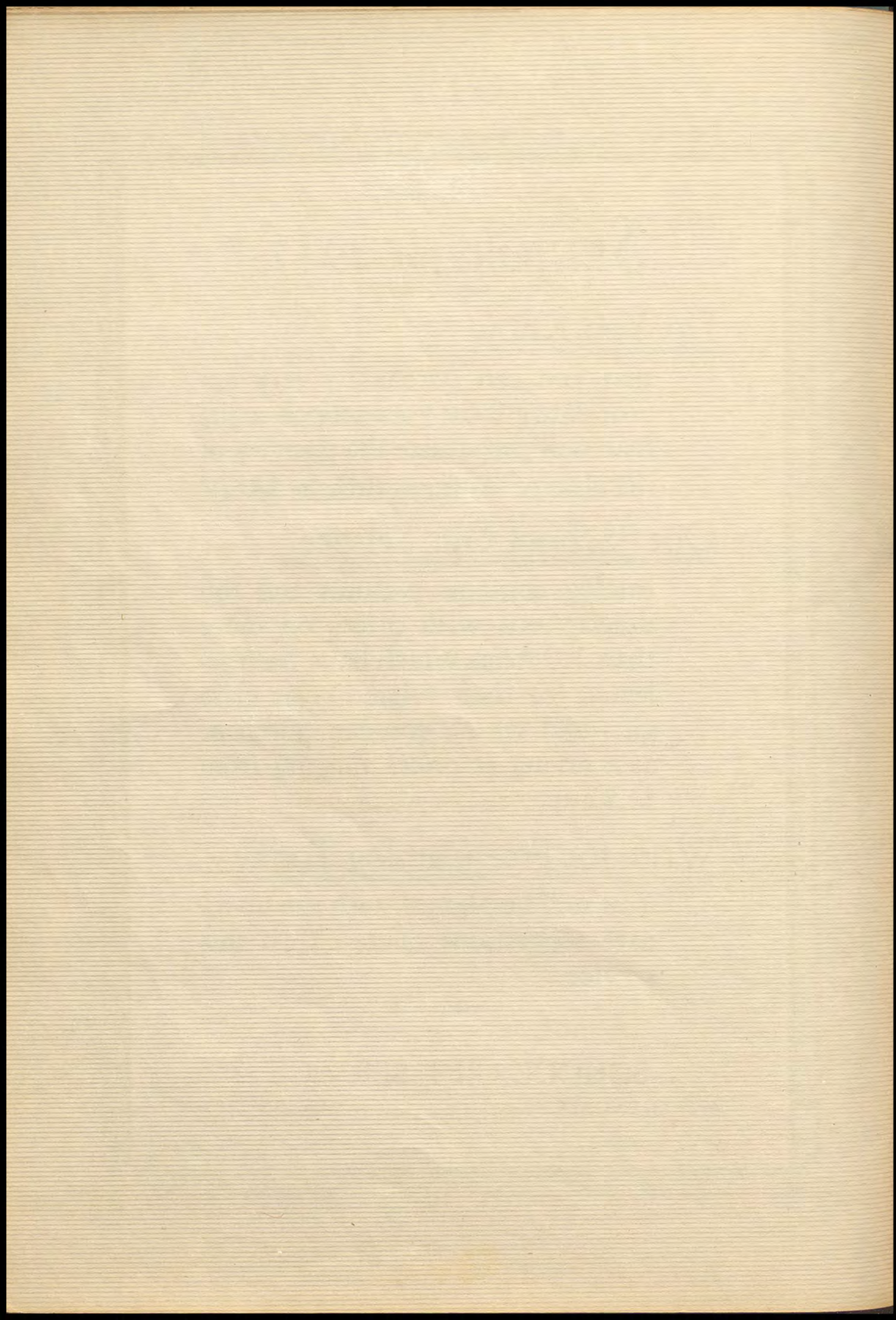
