
Ah, here is another building in sight. It's a boarding house for bachelors. The proprietor is

ITEM IV. To the Juniors we give up our places of first rank; and the dignity of Seniors.


ITEM V. To the Sophomores, we leave our wisdom and high school spirit, hoping they will remember the 46's abiding faith in them.







President--Andy Dickinson Vice-president--Edward Bender Secretary--Margaret Ann Neville Treasurer--Garland Brown


The first project of the sophomore class was the selling of flowers and vegetable seeds. This task proved very unsuccessful due to a rushed season.


Those freshmen taking the general course had a taffy pull on Valentine's Day. They had as their guests the other freshmen group.


Two of our freshmen girls, Marjorie Callis and Dorothy Outten, are members of the Home Economics Club.





It is hoped by many students that the continuance of the club and its activities will be carried on next year.


# HOME ECONOMICS CLUB


On warm sunshiny days the high school girls practiced calisthentics that helped to make them stronger physically.


Basketball proved to be interesting to the girls and some of them enjoyed playing. No games were played with other schools however.
