Phase courses update English classes

A breakthrough by the English Department! This year the English Department offered a choice of courses. Except for freshmen, there were no structured classes geared to grade or ability.

Three phases made up the program. The Phase I courses were for those students who had difficulties with basic language skills. The most popular paired courses this year were Greek and Roman Mythology and Vocabulary Development, and Black Literature and the Short Story.

Twentieth Century American Writers and Modern Poetry, and Victorian Age and Nineteenth Century American Writers were offered in Phase II courses. Phase II was set up for those with an understanding of the basic language skills, who wanted to improve them.

The third phase of the program was for those who had an interest in language skills and who had a more mature understanding. Two of the courses offered were the Novel and Creative Writing, and English Grammar and Study Skills for the College-Bound.

The Phase Elective Program excited and interested teachers as well as students. Starting this year, students took a new interest in English. Three new ideas for classes next fall are animal stories, science fiction, and law and man.

More teachers, classes sum up math year

Numbers weren't the only things that counted this year in Tech's Math Department. Quality was just as important as quantity, and with new teachers, improved course offerings, and the continuation of established programs, the department had a most successful year.

The size of the department grew with the addition of two new teachers, raising the total number of instructors to 20. All teachers faced the challenge of teaching more students than ever before, as student enrollment was considerably higher than last year. In course offerings, "Geometry X" was introduced to Tech's list of mathematic course offerings. In only one way different from regular geometry classes, Geometry X did not stress the proving of theories and theorems, allowing students to concentrate more on pure geometry. Classes again offered this year were basic math, general math, algebra, geometry, probability and statistics, and unified math.

Programs continued from last year included the awarding of certificates for

A's earned during the six weeks and during the semester. The idea of using books only during class periods was also continued in freshmen classes, and in these classes homework was done on prepared sheets.

Mathematics, whether studied in basic math, geometry, or probability and statistics, is becoming more and more important in today's world. The successful programs in the Math Department provided Tech students a head start on that world.


Tech's Biology Department's objective is to teach students about the world, living things around us, and how we are affected by them.



Cooperative Office Education is a program that enables senior students to train at training stations throughout the Indianapolis business area, and get a credit for the experience. These training stations are various business offices where the COE student is taught office techniques, and is employed part-time after school.












ABOVE: Tom Howard makes his mark in the mile. RIGHT: A running jump and over he goes, but-did he make it?

school, except on Fridays or on nights when a game was scheduled.


Tryouts for the team produced a good turn-out, and the prognosis for next year's team shows a lot of potential in the underclassmen who made up the majority of this year's team.

Yearbook making includes the following:

PHOTOS MUST BE TAKEN. All color had to be sent to the publisher no later than November, 1973, as color processing takes time, and incidentally, is quite expensive. The title "photographer of the year" should go to Frank LaFara.

THEME COPY MUST BE WRITTEN. This year we are fortunate to have poetry-most of it composed by yearbook staffer Mary Wheeler, with Kris Weber writing page one and Lon Edison, Kris, and Mary composing the closing copy.

DEADLINES MUST BE MET. Charlotte Alexander selected the pages to be sent at each mailing, assigned the work to be done and persisted in seeing the work of photographers, reporters, and layout editors completed.

PAGE LAYOUTS MUST BE PLANNED. Lon Edison took the page one picture and came up with unique
