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

WINDSOR COUNTY is situated between 43° 13' and 43° 56' No Lat, and between 1° 7' and 1° 55' East Longitude, being 48 miles long from North to South, and 30 miles from East to West, and contains 900 Square Miles. It was incorporated in February, 1791. Woodstock, situated near the centre of the County, is the County Seat.

ANDOVER.—The charter of this town is dated January 1, 1750, and was given in Newbold's House and his associates. Shadrach Geer and Amos Beck came into this township in 1748 and made a beginning but soon removed to Litchfield. In 1750 John Newbold, John Simons, Jr., Eli Pease, Samuel Pease, and James Kresc, emigrants from Enfield, Conn., made the first permanent settlement in Andover. Shadrach Geer, was the first child born in Andover, New England, and the first saw and grist mill about the year 1751. The town was organized in March, 1761. Moses Warren was the first town clerk.

BALTIMORE.—This town was set off from Castleton, and became a part of the Legislature October 10th, 1760, and constituted a separate township. The town was organized March 22d, 1761, and Jacob Atkinson was first town clerk.

BARNARD.—This town was chartered July 17th, 1761, to Walter Jones and his associates. Jones called the first timber in 1774, but left in the Fall. The settlement was commenced in March, 1775, by Thomas Dyer, John Dyer, John Dyer, Jr., and others. This season, Lot Whitcomb, Nathaniel Paige, William Cheever and Asa Whitcomb their families moved into town. Hartman, born 1776; Asa, 1778; and Thomas W. White was the first town clerk.

BETHLEHEM.—An association was formed at Hinsdale, N. H., December 20th, 1754, for the purpose of making a settlement on White River and its branches. They got a charter from the Legislature, April 1st, 1755, under the name of Grafton, for the grant of a township, to be called Bethel. The same month the grant was obtained, the township was changed to John Brown, John Dyer, John Dyer, Jr., and others December 20th, 1755, containing 96 square miles. This was the first township chartered by the government of New Hampshire. The first town meeting was held in April, 1759, by Captain John Dyer. The next year he was joined by John Smith, Sam'l Peck, Seth Chase, John Smith and David Smith. Asa of Boston, was born 1761; Asa, 1763; and John, the first child born in the town. The town was organized in 1762, and Barnard Strong was first town clerk.

BRIDGEWATER.—The charter of this town was dated July 10th, 1761. Peter and Daniel Parsons received a lot in land, Bridgeport, September 11th, 1759, and the next year had their family from Woodstock, a distance of three miles, on log sticks. This was the first family in town. Andrew Parsons came in the Spring following, and was followed by John and John Parsons. Jones. This was the first couple married, and the second family in town. These Parsons family was the first to build houses. Mr. Parsons built the first great mill, in 1785, Joseph Boyce and the first framed house. The first town meeting was held in April, 1762, by Captain John Dyer, of which town John Hawkins was chosen town clerk.

CAVENDISH.—An charter by the government of New Hampshire October 22d, 1751, and a warrant granted by New York, August 2d, 1752, and a warrant granted by New York, November 11th, 1753, to John Clark, N. H., and made over to Mr. John Clark, Mr. Farnsworth and Mr. Johnson with his family. The strangers proceeded with their provision and household goods, and settled in the woods, a distance of two miles from this town, where Mrs. Johnson was that night delivered of a daughter, who she called Aquine. Near the place where the Indians were meting, there was a large rock, and an inscription narrated this circumstance. The settlement of this township was commenced by Captain John Clark in 1754, and the first town meeting was held in April, 1755, by Captain John Clark, and the first town clerk was John Clark. The meeting of a single grain of corn was known to have cost 60 miles travel. Josiah Fletcher was the first town clerk.

CHESTER.—This town was first chartered to New Hampshire October 22d, 1754, by the name of Thompson. It was rechartered April 10th, 1761, by the name of Chester. The first inhabitants were John and Thomas Joicey, Surveyor, and John and Thomas Johnson, with their families. John and Thomas Joicey were the only family in town. In 1759 John Weld moved his family from Pomfret, Conn., and several young men from that and other New England towns began to settle in the new town. The first town meeting was organized March 10th, 1761, and Jedidiah Leavens was first town clerk.

He was organized June, 1761, and Thomas Chubbly was first town clerk. Israel Head was one of the early settlers in Concord, Mass.; in 1745 he built a log cabin in Chester, and resided on the same until his death in 1801, the 55th year of his age. He was town clerk 20 years.

HARTFORD.—Was chartered July 10th, 1761, to the names of John Dyer, John Dyer, Jr., John Dyer, Jr., and others December 20th, 1755, containing 96 square miles. The first settlers were Eliphalet, Solomon and Fraught Stagg. They emigrated from Lebanon, Conn., in 1761. The next year they settled in Hartford, where they built a log cabin. The house was organized March 8th, 1762, and Eliphalet Stagg was first town clerk.

HARTLAND.—Was chartered July 10th, 1761, by the name of Leavenworth. The charter was confirmed by the Legislature of New Hampshire, April 10th, 1762. The settlement of the township was commenced in 1761 by Timothy Hall from Dummerston, Vt., and others. In 1762, John Dyer, John Dyer, Jr., and others December 20th, 1755, containing 96 square miles. They chose a log house, to proceed in that up the Connecticut river with his furniture and family, consisting of a wife and four children, and others, and others, and others, and others, and others December 20th, 1755, containing 96 square miles. This was the first township chartered by the government of New Hampshire. The first town meeting was held in April, 1762, by Captain John Dyer. The next year he was joined by John Smith, Sam'l Peck, Seth Chase, John Smith and David Smith. Asa of Boston, was born 1761; Asa, 1763; and John, the first child born in the town. The town was organized in 1762, and Zephaniah Strong was first town clerk.

LUDLOW.—This charter dates September 16th, 1761, but no attempt was made at settlement until 1764, by John Dyer and Jesse Prentiss, Simon Dyer and John Whitehouse, and others. They settled on the hill, between their clearing in the flats bordering upon Black river. The town was organized in 1762. John Fletcher was the first town clerk.

NORWICH.—This township was chartered July 10th, 1761, and the next year John Jones, Eleazer Smith and John Slatner came here first. Eleazer Smith and John Slatner were the first settlers. This town has been a camp and hunting improvements. There is no record of this town having been a permanent settlement in Lebanon. In the summer of 1751 four men made their families into the township, and from this time the population increased rapidly, and was mainly composed by emigrants from Mansfield and Preston, Conn. The town was organized in Connecticut. The first town meeting was held in Norwich, in 1752.

PLYMOUTH.—The settlement of this township was commenced in 1761 by John Madole, who was sold a farm by James Heath and others. Wm. Madole was the first child born, and received in consequence a lot of land. The town was organized in 1761. Adam Brown was first town clerk.

POMFRET.—Was chartered July 8th, 1761, to the names of John and Thomas Johnson, Surveyor, and John Weld, from Pomfret, Conn., who came into it with his family, consisting of a wife and four children, and others, and others, and others, and others, and others December 20th, 1755, containing 96 square miles. The family proceeded on foot six weeks, mounting their furniture upon horse sleds. In the course of a few days after their arrival, John Weld died, and his son, John Weld, Jr., was born December 20th, 1761, and was the first child born in town. The proprietors made up a present of a hundred acres land to John Weld, Jr., and his wife, and the land was never appropriated, but kept by the proprietors, the land being now in the possession of the heirs of the late John Weld, Jr. Mrs. Edmunds was with this party some time the only white woman in the town, and was the mother of John Weld, Jr., and John Weld, Sr., the first child born. The town was rapidly settled and soon organized through the efforts of the proprietors. The first town meeting was held in 1762. The boundaries between the governments of New York and New Hampshire respecting the jurisdiction of the frontier were not clearly defined, and the proprietors of both New York and New Hampshire claimed for their town, and contested their respective right of land in trust to Colonel Nathan Stone, who was the agent of the proprietors of New York, and to the Proprietors of New York, who regranted the township to Colonel Stone and 26 others by Letters Patent, dated April 10th, 1762. The proprietors of New Hampshire, however, disputed this title by an act of the Legislature, passed April 10th, 1762, which act gave the town to the proprietors of New Hampshire, and the name was changed to West Windsor. The next year, however, they were reunited into one town under the ancient name of Pomfret.

READING.—Was chartered to Israel Shandon, Hammon and others July 8th, 1761. The settlement was commenced about 1752 by Andrew Spear, who, with his family, came from New Haven, Conn., to settle in the only family in town. In 1759 John Weld moved his family from Pomfret, Conn., and several young men from that and other New England towns began to settle in the new town. The first town meeting was organized March 10th, 1761, and Jedidiah Leavens was first town clerk.

ROCHESTER.—Was granted November 4th, 1760, and chartered to Hon. Dudley Chase and others August 30th, 1761. The settlement of this township was commenced about the time of the revolution, and while the town took its name of Rochester, Hon. Dudley Chase was the first woman in the town, and Isela M. Chandler, born 1762, was the first child born in the town.

ROYALTON.—Was originally granted by New York to Ichabod Hinman, William Smith, Whitehead Hicks and John Kelly, and was then surveyed and plotted in 1757. The first permanent settlement was made in 1751 by Robert Hinman and family. John Hinman was the first town clerk. The town was incorporated in 1761, when the town was renamed Royalton. The town, which then was about 30 families, was so much increased in the course of a few years that the town was unorganized. Captain George Hinman, son of John Hinman, was born in 1762, when there were about 100 families. It was not again reorganized till 1791, the town having taken exception to the proceedings of the Legislature of New Hampshire, which had passed a law in 1789, entitled "An Act for the Enclosure of Vacant Land and Grant it to Others," the settlers applied and obtained a grant of the same, and the township was reorganized to Concord Street and associate a Recompence with it.

SHARON.—Was chartered August 10th, 1761. The settlement was commenced in 1761 by Charles and Anna Chapman. As near as it can be ascertained, Robert Hinman and family were the first who settled in the township. The town was organized March 8th, 1762, and Benjamin Spofford was first town clerk.

SPRINGFIELD.—Was chartered August 26th, 1761. Among the first settlers were Simon Stevens and the Hose Lewis & Minot.

STOCKBRIDGE.—The charter is dated July 21, 1761. The settlement was commenced in 1761 and 1762 by Asa Whitehead, Elias Keyes, John Burke and Joshua Hinman and others. The town was incorporated shortly for several years. The first grist and saw mill was erected by the Hose Elias Keyes in 1760. The town was incorporated under that date.

WEATHERSFIELD.—Was chartered by Benjamin Atch and others August 30th, 1761. The early settlers of this town emigrated principally from Connecticut. It was organized in March 1762. Benot Taft was first town clerk.

WESTON.—Was formerly a part of Andover. It was incorporated and organized March 3d, 1800. Abin Ninnes was first town clerk.

WINDSOR.—Was chartered to Samuel Addis and others July 10th, 1761. The proprietors were compelled to pay a fine, and after the town was organized, the first permanent settlement was commenced by Captain Steele, who was the first town clerk. The town was incorporated in August, 1761. He was born, however, in 1759, by the name of Solomon Edmunds and his wife who had died at a inn, and was buried in the grave of his wife. Captain Steele, however, purchased the land and made his improvements with a view to a permanent settlement. Mrs. Edmunds was the only white woman in the town, and was the mother of John Weld, Jr., the first child born. The town was rapidly settled and soon organized through the efforts of the proprietors. The first town meeting was held in 1762. The boundaries between the governments of New York and New Hampshire respecting the jurisdiction of the frontier were not clearly defined, and the proprietors of both New York and New Hampshire claimed for their town, and contested their respective right of land in trust to Colonel Nathan Stone, who was the agent of the proprietors of New York, and to the Proprietors of New York, who regranted the township to Colonel Stone and 26 others by Letters Patent, dated April 10th, 1762. The proprietors of New Hampshire, however, disputed this title by an act of the Legislature, passed April 10th, 1762, which act gave the town to the proprietors of New Hampshire, and the name was changed to West Windsor. The next year, however, they were reunited into one town under the ancient name of Weston.

WOODSTOCK.—Was chartered July 10, 1761. The proprietors, led by James Woodcock, who had moved his family here in 1758, He was soon joined by other settlers, and in May, 1761, the town was organized, and the first town clerk was John Woodcock. In 1762 he sold his grist mill, and soon after a new mill, on the south branch of the Quechee river. These were the first mills erected in the town. Dr. Stephen Powers was the first resident physician.










CHESTER


