### FOREWORD

We're pleased to bring you a large ancient coin section in this sale. It comprises collections assembled by two passionate coin collectors. The first is made up of high grade Greek coins of Thrace and Asia Minor, all purchased from prestigious auction houses and bearing excellent pedigrees, including beautiful tetradrachms of Lysimachos (1-6), a mint state tetradrachm of Mithradates IV (18) and numerous beautiful Ionian tetradrachms. Of particular note is a very rare piece of Philetairos, bearing the portrait of Seleukos I (35) and a rare Smyrna mint tetradrachm of Antiochos I (37). Also not to be missed is an exceedingly rare tetradrachm of Antiochos II (41) of which only one other is available to commerce.

Lot 51, the splendid Siculo-Punic tetradrachm, bears a fantastic provenance dating back to 1921 and is of splendid style.

The second collection was formed in the 1960s and contains mostly Roman Republican denarii purchased from Spink, along with some Roman Imperial pieces, Celtic coins and Greek and miscellaneous group lots. Most coins are accompanied with their original collection tickets.

We're also pleased to offer for sale a highly important Anglo-Saxon artefact. Lot 325 is an exceedingly rare sword pyramid mount, fashioned from gold and garnets, of the same style as artefacts found at Sutton Hoo and in the Staffordshire Hoard. Having appeared in the press and on Channel 4, the treasure has since been disclaimed, returned to the finder is and now available to the market, where it will surely see enthusiastic bidding.

The British section commences with Anglo-Saxon, although only 10 hammered pennies, they are all rare and pleasing condition, with Eadgar, Edward the Martyr and Harold II all represented. In hammered gold a superb noble of Edward III (336), a high grade Edward VI Sovereign NGC AU53 (344), an elusive mm 2 pound of Elizabeth I (348), an exceptionally well struck unite of James I (349) and perhaps the highlight of the whole sale and extremely rare 1643 Triple Unite of Charles I.

Certainly the highlight of the hammered silver is an exceptional Testoon of Henry VIII (341), following closely, a 'finework' shilling of Charles I and in Charles II Hammered Issue a super shilling (360).

In the milled gold two pieces stand out, very high grade two guineas of James II and Anne (365&371). The highlight of the milled silver is the key date 1705 Crown, encapsulated by PCGS as MS61.

In World Coins we are pleased to present some Chinese silver rarities, with special highlights being the high-graded Dragon & Phoenix 10 Cents and minor denominations of Fukien, Szechuan and Taiwan. In this auction, a highlight among the various Proof Sets on offer is the set with the First Coinage of the Republic of Congo. France is represented with a selection of Merovingian and Carolingian silver, with the rare Denier of Charlemagne included. From Greece, a couple of rare patterns of Constantine II make their appearance, with only a handful examples recorded. From Italian coins a rare Ducat of Federico III of Aragon (1496-1501) is a special highlight, seldom seen on the market. New Zealand is represented with a selection of last pre-decimal proof sets, as well as first decimal proof sets and the large medal of Royal Numismatic Society of New Zealand. From the Sultanate of Oman, we bring you an impressive gold Proof 5 Rials of the late Sultan Qabus bin Sa'id, one of the longest serving rulers in the Arab world. A Slovakian Pattern 20 Halierov featured in this auction is an extremely rare piece of which only a couple examples have ever appeared on the market in this century. The selection of fantastic gold coinage continues with South Africa which is represented by an impressive Five Ounce Krugerrand, issued to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Krugerrand. World Coins conclude with the USA, featuring examples of Seated Liberty Half Dollars, issued by the United States and the Confederacy. A rare Morgan Dollar, the famous 1895 New Orleans, and a seldomly seen set of Robert Bashlow Confederate Coinage Restrike Tokens are also included in this sale.

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#### Anglo-Saxon Gold Pyramid Mount, c. AD 580-630. 325.

An extremely rare Anglo-Saxon gold pyramid mount inlaid on four sides with foil-backed cloisonné garnets in two distinct complex styles of cell; arrow shaped and stepped with a square garnet top-set. Garnets are backed with 'waffle-stamp' foil. Bar across base. One cell is missing its garnet and of the remaining stones approximately half show minor chipping or cracking, however overall, the find is in pleasing condition. An excellent example of Anglo-Saxon metalwork.

Pyramidal mounts are found in Anglo-Saxon England and Continental Europe, particularly with the latter golden cloisonné types known from finds in Sweden. It is theorised that they were made to secure swords in their scabbards via a fastening bar. Whilst relatively uncommon as grave finds, mounts have become relatively more frequent as single metal detecting finds. This item itself was found geographically in an area which would have been part of the early-medieval Kingdom of East Anglia, one of seven kingdoms that constituted the traditional 'Heptarchy' of Anglo-Saxon England in academic literature. The constitute parts of the mount would have been incredibly exclusive at that time. Gold was used in other artefact types of high status such as Thrymsa coins, other sword furniture and brooches. The garnet gemstones would have originally come from the Indian subcontinent. Part of the allure then as much as now would have been to display status from the difficulty of acquiring the component parts or manufacturing the object due to its intricate nature.

Two such pyramid mounts were found at the famous Sutton Hoo burial mounds thought to be the resting place of East Anglian King Raedwald d. circa 630 AD. Other comparisons could be made with the famous Mercian Staffordshire Hoard, where several gold cloisonné artefacts are similar in style. Therefore, based on such evidence it is likely that this item also belonged to a high-status individual within Anglo-Saxon society of the time. In coverage from the numerous articles (BBC, Smithsonian Magazine, Treasure Hunting, Daily Mail Online etc) written on this very item, it was speculated by experts that the mount would have been owned by an Anglo-Saxon "King or Lord".

Today Anglo-Saxon pyramid mounts, especially those made of gold, are extremely rare metal detecting finds. The PAS database records approximately one hundred mounts of this period made of both copper and silver; both of which can be gilt, and less than a dozen solid gold examples extant that are analogous to this specimen.

Due to this rarity and archaeological importance, there is a dearth of solid gold mounts available on the open market. Some can be found in museums, such as the Sutton Hoo examples which reside in the British Museum. On the open market, a non-cloisonné gilt copper alloy filigree type sold for over £16,000 at Bonhams in 2016. Another fine example of a gold and garnet gold cloisonné mount of similar size from the John Moor Collection accumulated in the 1960s achieved £30,000 in late 2017 in the Frieze Masters Fair but was without provenance to prove it was a British rather than a continental find.

An Anglo-Saxon object of this quality and rarity, combined with an excellent provenance having passed through all of the required channels, will surely attract much attention.

Realistic portraits on British coins had only replaced stereotyped images of kingship in the last reign under Henry's father, Henry VII, whose portrait Testoon by the Flemish engraver Alexandre de Bruchsells was seminal. In Henry VIII's first coinage (1509-26) he continued to employ his father's effigy, however in the smaller coins of the second coinage (1526-44) his own young bust appears. Within the third and final coinage (1544-47) a Testoon emerged with a vivid depiction of his older self, a bearded crowned rugged bust facing forward, an image reminiscent and evocative of the famous Holbein portraits. Concurrently, this was a time of frequent debasement and from the traditional sterling 11 oz 2 dwt. this issue was progressively debased down to 4 oz. 2 dwt. At this low level the thin silver coating would often erode on the high points revealing the base core, giving Henry the byname 'old copper-nose'. This is an exceptional specimen despite a somewhat soft strike, extremely rare so well preserved, considered rare irrespective of their condition. The Testoon of Henry VIII is one of the key coins in English Tudor numismatics, but also qualify as European renaissance portrait pieces of art.

It would appear this coin was originally encapsulated by NGC in the Goldberg's sale as AU50. This certainly does not do the coin justice and hence most likely why it has since been removed.

This classic from the English Civil War, struck at the king's temporary mint at Oxford, which served as Charles' headquarters and principal source of money from 1642 to 1646, carries not only a powerful image of the frightened, pursued king but also his famous Declaration made at Wellington in 1642 in which he extolled the Protestant religion and laws of his kingdom as well as the liberty granted to his subjects and protected by himself and his parliament. This appears on the verso side of many of his coins, in largest form on the famed Triple Unites, which carried immense "face value" and served his army by purchasing supplies for war. Unfortunately for Charles, his parliament saw things through a different lens, one without him as ruler. The king's proclamation essentially was a declaration of war against his legions of Puritan opponents and parliament's army, led by Oliver Cromwell. Oxford and the other regional mints, quickly assembled as the king moved from one fortified locale to another, served the purpose of converting gold in other forms (older coins, jewellery, plate) into coins asserting Charles's kingship, and paid out to his armies as well as to suppliers. While technically not all of these are siege coins, most pieces struck at the temporary mints met exactly the same fate — melted in order to make newer coins after the war. Within six years of the minting of this impressive coin, Charles was captured and executed. At his demise, the ancient divine right of kings eff ectively ended in across the land, and upon the Restoration in 1660 England became parliamentarian in both name and power. The huge Triple Unites made of gold fared poorly. Few exist today. All are prized by numismatists as the ultimate artistic expressions in metal of their era.

This 'Fine Work' shilling differs from the regular issues in a number of respects; the coin is neatly round, the engraving of the die is more sharply and intricately engraved and the striking is strong and central. There has been a fair amount of conjecture as to what these very rare, so-called Fine Work issues are that occur at this period and it is supposed that they might be trials to showcase the strength of the mint at the time and the quality they could produce.

These 20 shilling Gold pieces were made in March to April of 1662, records show that Thomas Simon had been instructed to create the dies, after the initial Gold had been supplied, roughly 3,400 were struck. Mechanical failures shortly followed, other specialists have mentioned this may have led to the fracturing of the dies. Insofar as the designs and arrangement, these imposing Regal pieces mirror the earlier hammered coinage series. All dies were created from the same puncheons, with slight modifications. It has been argued that three of the eight dies display signs of cracks and fractures, in turn these cracks will present and appear on several of the coins, as part of the initial strike.

The young head Crowns of Victoria by William Wyon are and remain difficult to grade, what can be said is that in true uncirculated state with mint bloom and brilliance they are unquestionably very rare coins. Offered in four key years; the Proof of 1839, then a short sequential run from 1844 to 1847 with a combination of star or cinquefoil stops on the edge. There are also some patterns available for commerce [see, Baldwin's Auction 42, lot 1163 – Linecar and Stone 36]. A true uncirculated example would comfortably retail for £5,500 plus in today's market, by uncirculated they would need to show all of the design elements on both obverse and reverse in a sharp and consistent manner, probably an impressive tone with mint bloom would go hand in hand with the above; ideally one would hope or presume a provenance would also be latched on to a coin of this hypothetical grade. At a lower to middle and upper middle grade they are invariably batched together, the disparity of pricing is considerable and disjunctive. The coins in and of themselves are ambiguous to grade due to the way in which they are struck, not least gauging the relief and mint brilliance on these types is also a difficult task. Thus, many of these coins in both auction itineraries and within dealers stock trays will inevitably be in between grades.

# New 'Fatman' Dollar subtype - only recorded example on NGC

The 1914 date for silver Dollars of Yuan Shih Kai brings a lot of varieties that were thoroughly recorded throughout the years, such as the 'circlet in ribbon bow' and 'curved ribbon end' to name a few. However, the 'hooked ribbon on the right' is a previously unrecorded variety and currently the only known example of this subtype in NGC coin census.

Charles "Chuck" Reginald Burkill (1874-1950) was a British businessman trading in silk and a member of a prominent family residing in Shanghai. His father, Albert Robson Burkill (1839-1913), was the Chairman of the Shanghai Municipal Council from 1897 to 1898. Both father and son were highly influential in the Shanghai horse racing scene. According to F. H. May (Colonial Secretary for Hong Kong from 1902 until 1911 and steward of the Hongkong jockey club), "I saw Mr. 'Chuck' Burkill win nine races last Hongkong meeting. Of these I calculate that he stole two, if not three. I have never seen a man sit quieter on his mount, or ride with nicer judgment [...] he is indeed a "rum 'un to follow and a bad a 'un to beat." (Notes on Pony and Horse Racing in Hongkong 1845-1887, published in 1909, page 38). Chuck Burkill's masterpiece was the 1933 race club building, now the Shanghai Art Museum. His name is still inscribed on the foundation stone.

For this reason, we do not automatically accept and are not bound by the opinions of third party coin grading services for any purposes including before and after the sale of a Lot.
- 2.4. If you are interested in a Lot, we strongly recommend that you view it in person before the Auction and form your own opinion of the description of the Lot.
- 2.5. We reserve the right to change any aspect of the published description of a Lot prior to the auction. Any change may be published on our website, displayed at the auction, announced by the auctioneer prior to the sale and/or communicated in any other manner.
- 2.6. All copyright in Catalogues including images belongs to Baldwin's.

#### 3. ABSENTEE COMMISSION BIDS

- 3.1. If you are unable to attend the Auction personally, you may submit a Commission Bid and we will endeavour to purchase the Lot on your behalf for the lowest price possible. You must submit this in writing using the Commission Bid Form and send it to us by post, fax, email or delivery to our offices at least 24 hours prior to the Auction.
- 3.2. For all Commission Bids, you must supply your name and address, contact telephone number and email. You must also provide the Lot number and description of the Lot, the amount of your Bid and any other information requested in the Commission Bid Form or by us. It is your responsibility to provide the correct information and to ensure that we have received your Commission Bid.
- 3.3. We do not charge for this service and therefore we will not incur any liability for executing (or failing to execute) the Commission Bid.
- 3.4. If you submit a Commission Bid verbally (whether by telephone or otherwise), we shall not be responsible for any misunderstandings (by either us or our agents or you) in relation to your Bid. All bids made in this way must be confirmed in writing before the auction
- 3.5. If we receive two Commission Bids for equal value for the same Lot, the Bid received first by us shall take precedence.
- 3.6. "Buy" commissions [and unlimited Commission Bids] will not be accepted.

## 4. AUCTION SALE

- 4.1. Before the auction, all potential Bidders must notify their name and address to the auctioneer and if required provide proof of identity to our satisfaction and bank or other credit references.
- 4.2. The highest Bidder for each Lot shall be the Buyer. If there is a dispute, the auctioneer shall have absolute discretion to determine the dispute including re-offering the disputed Lot for sale.
- 4.3. A Bidder must submit a bid for an entire Lot and each lot constitutes a separate sale. The auctioneer shall however have an absolute discretion to divide any Lot, to combine any two or more Lots, or to withdraw any Lot from the auction without giving any reason (including after the hammer has fallen). Bidding shall be regulated at the absolute discretion of the auctioneer. The auctioneer has the right to refuse any bid.
- 4.4. Subject to Condition 4.2, the contract for the sale of the Lot is concluded on the fall of the hammer.
- 4.5. All Lots are offered for sale subject to any Reserve.
- 4.6. You cannot cancel your purchase of a Lot once the hammer has fallen.

## 5. PAYMENT

- 5.1. The Purchase Price payable by a Buyer is the Hammer Price plus a Buyer's Premium of 20% of the Hammer Price. VAT is payable in addition unless the Lot is exempt or zero-rated.
- 5.2. Any lot marked with G next to a lot in this catalogue denotes the item is 'Investment Gold' and, therefore, a VAT-registered trader can submit a claim to H M Revenue and Customs to recover the VAT element of the Buyers' Premium.

- 5.3. Any lot marked with a X next to it is subject to import VAT at 5%, this will be added to the hammer price and is payable by the buyer if resident in the UK. If the lot is being exported outside the UK, this import V A T can be waived or refunded on proof of export.
- 5.4. The Buyer of a Lot shall pay the Purchase Price in full before the Lot can be delivered to the Buyer.
- 5.5. Except where Condition 5.4 applies, any part of the Purchase Price outstanding after the Auction shall be payable by you within 14 days of the date of the auction, the due date.
- 5.6. The Purchase Price is payable by you in full. You are not entitled to set-off any amounts that you claim are due from us or anyone else or make any other deductions.
- 5.7. Unless we have agreed in writing otherwise, you shall act on your own account as principal in respect of the sale and therefore if you accept a commission from a third party to bid on their behalf, you do so at your own risk and will remain personally liable (jointly with your principal) to us for the Purchase Price in accordance with these Conditions.
- 5.8. The methods of payment and surcharges are set out in the Catalogue.
- 5.9. If the Purchase Price has not been settled within 30 days of the auction date a £50 late payment fee will be added and interest will be charged at 2% per month from the due date of payment to the date that cleared funds are received whether that is before or after any legal judgment. This is without prejudice to any other rights that we have for non-payment.
- 5.10. If you fail to comply with your obligations under these Conditions, the Lot, in respect of such non-compliance, may at our discretion be put up for sale at auction or privately and resold. In this case, you will be liable in full and will indemnify us for all losses, costs and expenses (including legal costs) incurred as a result, including the costs of the resale and the amount (if any) by which the Hammer Price obtained on the resale is less than the Hammer Price obtained on the original sale of the Lot to the Buyer.

## 6. RISK, TITLE AND DELIVERY

- 6.1. The risk of damage/loss to the Lot will pass to the Buyer on the fall of the hammer. Title in a Lot will not pass to the Buyer until the Purchase Price has been paid in full.
- 6.2. Unless agreed by us, you should collect the Lot within 7 days of the date of the auction. We reserve the right to charge for storage and to resell by auction or privately without notice to you, if a Lot is not collected. Alternatively we will send the Lot to you by recorded post. Postage and insurance costs will be charged as additional costs.
- 6.3. Except in relation to Forgeries, you must satisfy yourself that the correct Lot has been delivered to you at the time of collection/delivery. We will not be responsible for any discrepancy which might be discovered after the Lots have been collected. If we have shipped the Lot to you, we will not be responsible for any discrepancies if you fail to notify us within 24 hours of receipt.
- 6.4. It is the Buyer's responsibility to obtain any necessary import, export or other licences required in relation to a Lot.

## 7. GUARANTEE FOR FORGERIES

- 7.1. Baldwin's is a member of the International Association of Professional Numismatists and in accordance with the conditions of membership, provide a guarantee to the Buyer for all Lots against Forgeries on the terms set out in these Conditions ('Guarantee').
- 7.2. For the purposes of these Conditions, a 'Forgery' means an imitation that has been created with the fraudulent intent to deceive in respect of the authorship, origin, date, age, period and the correct description does not correspond with the description in the Catalogue and as a result has a value significantly less than it would have been had it been genuine.
- 7.3. You must notify us in writing within one month of you becoming aware that the Lot may be a Forgery. The Lot must be returned to us in the same condition as at the time of sale and you must submit evidence that the Lot is a Forgery, the onus being on you to prove that it is a Forgery.
- 7.4. You acknowledge that:
- (a) we reserve the right to re-assess the Lot or engage at our expense any expert or authority considered by us at our sole discretion to have the necessary expertise to undertake a re-assessment of the Lot;
- (b) following our re-assessment of the Lot, you agree to be bound by our decision as to whether or not the Lot is a Forgery.
- 7.5. You shall not be entitled to a refund for a Forgery if:
- (a) the grounds for claiming that the Lot is a Forgery is based primarily on a difference of opinion between us and a third party providing coin grading services:
- (b) the grounds for claiming that the Lot is a Forgery is by reason of any damage and/or restoration and/or modification work of any nature;
- (c) the description of the Lot in the catalogue was in accordance with generally accepted opinions of numismatic specialists as at the date of publication or the catalogue indicated that there was a conflict of opinion.
- (d) it has been proved that the Lot is a Forgery by applying a method that was unavailable or not generally applied within the industry of numismatics as at the date of publication of the catalogue or was disproportionately expensive, in both cases as determined in our absolute discretion.
- 7.6. If we agree that the Lot is a Forgery then subject to:
- (a) you being able to confirm in writing that you can transfer legal and beneficial title to the Lot to us or as directed by us free from all encumbrances or third party claims of any nature; and

(b) the exclusions in Condition 7.7, then the sale of the Lot will be rescinded so that it is cancelled and we will

refund the Purchase Price to you in full.

- 7.7. Your right to return the Lot and receive a refund of the Hammer Price under the Guarantee is your sole remedy against us, our agents and sub-contractors and/or the Seller for a Forgery. You will not be entitled to claim interest on the amount due to you. Neither we, our agents or sub-contractors nor the Seller shall be liable for costs, expenses, damages or any other liability however it arises relating to a Forgery.
- 7.8. In accordance with the restriction in Condition 10.2, the benefit of the Guarantee is personal to the original Buyer and is not transferable to a new owner of the Lot or any other person.

## 8. EXCLUSION OF LIABILITY

- 8.1. Except where these Conditions expressly state otherwise, no warranty is given to a Buyer concerning a Lot and each Lot is sold as shown with all faults, imperfections, errors of description (including authorship, origin, age, size, condition or value) or lack of authenticity or genuineness and neither we nor the Seller nor any of our agents or sub-contractors will be liable for any damages, costs, expenses or any other liability arising out of the same whether or not caused by negligence.
- 8.2. Our maximum liability under these Conditions is the amount of the Purchase Price paid by you.
- 8.3. Neither we nor any of our agents or sub-contractors shall be liable, whether in tort (including negligence or breach of statutory duty), contract, misrepresentation or otherwise:
- (a) for loss of profits or business, depletion of goodwill and/or similar losses; loss of contracts; or
- (b) any special, indirect, consequential or pure economic loss, costs, damages, charges or expenses.
- 8.4. We shall not be liable to you or be deemed to be in breach of these Conditions by reason of any delay in performing, or any failure to perform, any of our obligations in the Conditions, if the delay or failure was due to any cause beyond our reasonable control.
- 8.5. Nothing in these Conditions excludes or limits our liability for any matter which it would be illegal for us to exclude or attempt to exclude under English law or for our fraud or fraudulent misrepresentation.

## 9. DATA PROTECTION

9.1. By agreeing to these Conditions, a Bidder acknowledges and agrees that we will use personal information of a Bidder for the purpose of the auction and ancillary matters, including providing a Buyer's personal details to any other person where necessary to enforce our rights under these Conditions.

#### 10. GENERAL

- 10.1. These Conditions and the Seller's Conditions constitute the entire agreement between us. All other terms, warranties and representations, express or implied by statute or otherwise are excluded to the fullest extent permitted by law. No variation to these Conditions shall be legally binding unless agreed in writing by us.
- 10.2. All rights and benefits granted to a Bidder under these Conditions are personal to him and may not be assigned or in any other way transferred to any other person. Any such assignment or transfer will be invalid and unenforceable against us.
- 10.3. A notice required or permitted to be given by either of us to the other under these Conditions shall, in the case of a Bidder, be to the last address notified to us and in the case of Baldwin's, shall be to its registered office.
- 10.4. No failure or delay by us in exercising any of our rights under these Conditions shall be deemed to be a waiver of that right, and no waiver by us of any breach of these Conditions by you shall be considered as a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or any other provision.
- 10.5. We may perform our obligations and exercise our respective rights through any of our group companies or assign our rights under these Conditions.
- 10.6. If any provision of these Conditions is held by any court or other competent authority to be invalid or unenforceable in whole or in part, the validity of the other provisions and the remainder of the provision in question shall not be affected.
- 10.7. English law shall apply to these Conditions and we both agree to the English courts having exclusive jurisdiction.

## 11. INTERPRETATION

11.1. In these Conditions:

'Baldwins', 'auctioneer', 'us' or 'we' means A H Baldwin & Sons Limited;

'Bidder' and 'you' means a person making, attempting to make or considering making a bid for a Lot including a Buyer;

'Buyer' means the person who makes the highest bid for a Lot which is accepted by the auctioneer and if the person is acting as an agent, will be a reference to its principal only if Baldwin's has accepted the agency in writing;

'Catalogue' means a catalogue, price list or other publication or price list; 'Commission Bid' means an instruction from a Bidder to us to bid on

their behalf at the auction;

'Conditions' means these conditions of sale and any other additional terms notified to Bidders in writing in a Catalogue or otherwise (which includes notices displayed at the Auction) or as agreed in writing between Baldwin's and the Bidder;

'Guarantee' has the meaning set out in Condition 7.1;

'Hammer Price' means the amount of the highest bid for a Lot accepted by the auctioneer;

'including' or 'include' mean including without limitation and include without limitation, respectively;


'Lot' means any item deposited with us for sale at auction including items described against any Lot number in a Catalogue;

'Purchase Price' means the Hammer Price plus buyer's premium and VAT where applicable;

'Reserve' means a confidential price below which the auctioneer will not sell a Lot or will re-purchase on behalf of the Seller or for the account of Baldwin's. Unless otherwise specified at the time of Lot consignment, this will be set at approximately 80% of the Lot estimate at complete discretion of the auctioneer;

'Seller's Conditions' means the terms and conditions of sale between Baldwin's and a Seller for the sale of a Lot as displayed in the auction room, on our website or available from Baldwin's.

11.2. Headings in these Conditions are for convenience only and shall not affect their interpretation.



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
