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


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

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"The Psalms are an epitome of the Bible adapted to "the purposes of devotion. They treat occasionally of the "Creation and Formation of the World, the Dispensations of "PROVIDENCE, and the Economy of Grace; the trans-"actions of the Patriarchs, the exodus of the Children of "Israel, their journey through the Wilderness, and settle-"ment in Canaan; their law, priesthood, and ritual; the "exploits of their great Men, wrought through faith; their "sins and captivities; their repentances and Restorations; "the sufferings and victories of David; the peaceful and "happy reign of Solomon; the Advent of MESSIAH, with "Its Effects and Consequences; His Incarnation, Birth, Life, "Passion, Death, Resurrection, Ascension, KINGDOM and "PRIESTHOOD; the Effusion of The SPIRIT; the Conversion "of the Nations; the Rejection of the Jews; the esta-" blishment, increase and perpetuity of the Christian Church; "the End of the World; the general Judgment; the Condem-"nation of the Wicked; and the final Triumph of the Right-"eous with their LORD and KING."

There are in these Sacred Hymns a character of Truth, and a communication of Wisdom, that cannot be too deeply studied, or too fondly cherished. To all Orders of Society and to every Age of Life, gifted with discernment, they are calculated to convey both instruction and delight, and impart both consolation and hope. Amidst the unequalled ricissitudes of his life this was David's experience, not only when an Outcast from his native Country, but also when

wearing the Crown and ruling all the Hosts of Israel. "In all "his troubles he had sought The LORD, and, so seeking, he "found in piety that peace, which he could not find in empire, "and alleviated the disquietudes of state with the exercises of "devotion."

"His invaluable Psalms convey those comforts to others, "which they afforded to himself. Composed upon particular "occasions, yet designed for general use; delivered out as "services for Israelites under the Law, yet no less adapted "to the circumstances of Christians under the Gospel; they "represent Religion to us in the most engaging dress; com-" municating truths which Philosophy could never investigate, " in a style which Poetry can never equal; while History is "made the vehicle of Prophecy, and Creation lends all its "charms to paint the Glories of Redemption. Calculated " alike to profit and to please, they inform the understanding. "elevate the affections, and entertain the imagination, "Indited under the Influence of Him, to Whom all hearts "are known and all events foreknown, they suit Mankind "in all situations, grateful as the manna which descended "from Above, and conformed itself to every palate.-The " fairest productions of Human wit, after a few perusals, like "gathered flowers, wither in our hands, and lose their "fragrancy: but these unfading Plants of Paradise become. "as we are accustomed to them, still more and more "beautiful: their bloom appears to be daily heightened. " fresh odours are emitted, and new sweets extracted from He who hath once tasted their excellencies will "them. "desire to taste them yet again; and he who tastes them " oftenest, will relish them best.

"The Psalms are adorned with the figures, and set off "with all the graces of Poetry; and Poetry itself is de-"signed yet further to be recommended by the charms "of Music, thus consecrated to the service of GOD; that

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"so Delight may prepare the way for Improvement, and "Pleasure become the Handmaid of Wisdom; while every "turbulent passion is calmed by sacred melody; and the "evil Spirit is still dispossessed by the harp of the Son of "Jesse." Bishop Horne, in the Preface to his Commentary on the Psalms.

"The Psalms go in general under the name of 'the "' ' Psalms of David.' King David gave a regular and noble "form to the musical part of the Jewish service. He was " himself a great Composer both in Poetry and Music, and " a munificent Patron, no doubt, of arts, in which he himself " so much delighted and excelled. The Psalms however "appear to be compositions of various Authors in various "ages; some more antient than the time of King David, " some of a much later age. Of many David was himself " undoubtedly the Author; and that those of his composition " were Prophetic, we have David's own authority, which may " be allowed to overpower a Host of modern Expositors. For "thus King David at the close of his life describes himself " and his sacred Songs, 'David, the Son of Jesse, said, and "' the Man, who was raised up on high, the Anointed of The "GOD of Jacob and the sweet Psalmist of Israel said-The "'SPIRIT of JEHOVAH Spake by me, and His Word was "' ' in my tongue.' It was the Word therefore of JEHOVAH's "SPIRIT, Which was Uttered by David's tongue. But it "should seem The SPIRIT of JEHOVAH would not be "wanting to enable a mere Man to make complaint of his own "Enemies, to describe his own sufferings just as he felt them, "and his own escapes just as they happened. But The SPI-"RIT of JEHOVAH Described, by David's utterance, What "was Known to That SPIRIT only, and That SPIRIT only "could Describe. So that, if David be allowed to have had "any knowledge of the True Subject of his own compositions, "it was nothing in his own life, but Something Put into his

"mind by The HOLY SPIRIT of GOD; and the mis-"application of the Psalms to the literal David has done "more mischief, than the misapplication of any other parts "of the Scriptures, among those, who profess the belief of "the Christian Religion.

"The Psalms are all poems of the lyric kind, that is, "adapted to music, but with great variety in the style of " composition. Some are simply Odes. An Ode is a digni-"fied sort of song, narrative of the facts, either of public "history, or private life, in a highly adorned and figured "style. But the figure in the Psalms is that which is "peculiar to the Hebrew language, in which the figure gives "its meaning with as much perspicuity, as the plainest "speech. Some are of the sort called Elegiac, which are "pathetic compositions upon mournful subjects. Some are "Ethic, delivering grave maxims of life, or the precepts of "Religion in solemn, but for the most part, simple strains. "Some are Ænigmatic, delivering the doctrines of Religion " in Ænigmata, contrived to strike the imagination forcibly, "and yet easy to be understood. In all these the Author "delivers the whole matter in his own person. But a very "great, I believe the far greater part, are a sort of Drama-"tic Ode, consisting of dialogues between Persons sustain-"ing certain characters. In these Dialogue Psalms, the " Persons are frequently the Psalmist himself, or the Chorus "of Priests and Levites, or the Leader of the Levitical "Band opening the Ode with a proem declarative of the "subject, and very often closing the whole with a solemn "admonition drawn from what the other Persons say. "The other Persons are-JEHOVAH, sometimes as One, "sometimes as Another of The THREE PERSONS-"CHRIST in His Incarnate State, sometimes before, "sometimes after His Resurrection-the Human Soul of "CHRIST as Distinguished from The DIVINE ESSENCE.

"CHRIST in His Incarnate State is Personated sometimes "as a Priest, sometimes as a King, sometimes as a Con-"queror: the Resemblance is very remarkable between "This Conqueror in the Book of Psalms, and The Warrior "on the white horse in the Book of Revelations, Who "Goes forth with a crown on His Head, and a bow in His "Hand, conquering and to conquer. And the Conquest "in the Psalms is followed, like the Conquest in the "Revelations, by the Marriage of the Conqueror. These "are circumstances of similitude, which to any one versed "in the Prophetic style, prove beyond a doubt, that The "MYSTICAL CONQUEROR is The Same PERSON "in Both. It is no objection to this notion of Psalms in "dialogues that none of them are distinguished into the "parts of the different Speakers. In the works of any " profane Writer, the parts that belong to different Persons "in a scene, are usually distinguished by prefixing to the "beginning of each speech the initials of the name of the "Person to which the speech belongs; but this is a "modern practice. In the oldest MSS. of the ancient Greek "plays the Persons of the drama are not so distinguished "any more than the Persons in the Psalms; but these "distinctions have been supplied by Editors. But in pub-"lishing the Sacred Text it was justly thought, that it would "be too great a liberty, if the Editor were to insert marks "of his own, which the holy Penmen had not thought "necessary. It would be useful, however, if a paraphrase "were given with these distinctions in the proper places, and " yet the want of them is not very great; for I will venture to "say, that a Reader of ordinary penetration, who has once "had the hint that he is reading a dialogue, will easily per-"ceive to what Speakers the different parts of the dialogue "belong. The Part of JEHOVAH is sometimes indee "Supplied (but this will never make difficulties) by

"Oracular Voice, suddenly Breaking out from the Sanc-"tuary."

"Many of the Psalms are Commemorative of the Miraculous "Interpositions of GOD in behalf of the Chosen People; for, "indeed, the History of the Jews is a fundamental Part of "Revealed Religion. Many were probably composed upon the " occasion of remarkable passages in David's life, his dangers, " his afflictions, his Deliverances. But of those, which relate "to the public history of the natural Israel, there are few, in "which the Fortunes of the Mystical Israel-the Christian "Church-are not adumbrated: and of those, which allude "to the life of David, there are none in which The SON of "David is not the Principal and Immediate Subject. David's "complaints against his Enemies are MESSIAH's Com-"plaints, first, of the unbelieving Jews, then, of the "Heathen Persecutors, and the Apostate Faction in later "Ages. David's afflictions are The MESSIAH's Sufferings. "David's penitential supplications are the Supplications of "MESSIAH in Agony, under the Burden of the imputed "guilt of Man. David's songs of triumph and thanksgiving "are MESSIAH's Songs of Triumph and Thanksgiving, for "His Victory over Sin and Death and Hell. In a word. "there is not a page in the Book of Psalms, in which the "pious Reader will not find his SAVIOUR, if he read with "a view of finding Him; and it was but a just encomium of "It, that came from the pen of One of the early Fathers, "that It is a complete System of Divinity for the use and "edification of the Common People of the Christian Church." Bishop Horsley in the Preface to his Translation of the Psalms.

"The moral of Life, the Mystery of Redeeming Grace, "the Display of Almighty Power and Almighty Love, the "Spiritual history of the World, the Passage of JEHOVAH "through the Wonders of His Creation; All that can alarm

"the Wicked, and confirm the Faithful, is to be found in "the Book of Psalms. But in this same Book these "Subjects are often to be sought for, so much below the "shining surface of its poetical beauties, so deep in the "recesses of Spiritual Wisdom, and so near the border of "the Invisible World, that minds of the greatest grasp and "longest reach are never more usefully employed for Man-"kind, than when engaged in the interpretation of this Part " of Scripture. Lessons of Wisdom, as salutary as they are " intelligible, lie open in the Psalms to the ordinary Reader ; "the Attributes of GOD, the Rewards of Piety, the vanity "of Human cares, and the deceitfulness of Human councils, "are Enforced and Espoused by Examples, by images, and " by descriptions, so magnificent yet so familiar, so elevating "yet so natural, so suitable to common feeling, yet so com-"mensurate with our highest faculties, that All must "acknowledge their Excellence, and Few can wholly resist "their Influence; but to the mind inquisitively pious, and "ardent in the pursuit of Heavenly knowledge, these Seraphic "Songs present a path of discovery, continually opening " before them, refulgent with the Footsteps of The MESSIAH, " and resounding with the Promises of the Gospel."

"The title of the Book of Psalms to a place in the "Sacred Canon of Scripture has never been controverted. "As a Work of Inspiration its claim has been established "by CHRIST and His Apostles. Many of them have "had their Application to the Great Mystery of Man's "Redemption settled and determined in an express manner "by the Inspired Writers; and the probability is, that "none of them can be properly understood as confined "to temporary events and occasions. The Jews them-"selves, by making them a part of their daily service, "plainly discover their own conviction of the Prophetical "and Mystical Character of the Psalms in general; for,

"if understood only in their literal sense, few of them could "be considered as applicable to the Nation at large, but "rather to the circumstances of some particular Person, "and therefore improper to form a part of a perpetual "system of worship. They considered the shell of the holy "Minstrel as full of Oracular Virtue, and as recording the "Whole of GOD's Dispensations in respect to themselves; "but still as comprising only a Scheme of Mercy and "Deliverance limited to their earthly Jerusalem. Many of "the Psalms they referred to MESSIAH and His KINGDOM; "and though in respect to the Person and Character of "The ONE, and the nature and meaning of the Other, "they entertained ideas infinitely below the purity and truth " of Scripture; yet in the principles of interpretation they "have agreed with the primitive method of the Christian " Expositors."

"It was impossible in the earliest periods of the Church "of CHRIST, for those, who studied His Word, not to learn "from Him and His Apostles the proper use to be made "of the Psalms. Succeeding Ages have improved that use. "Time, that impairs and obscures the works of Human "intellect, consolidates and illustrates the Bible, developes "Its Harmonies, and brings It into closer union with our "understanding and our affections.

"Those Psalms wherein the Person, from whose mouth "they appear to issue, describes his sorrow, his sufferings, "and his triumphs, represent with such fidelity the History "of The SON of GOD, that we need scarcely seek for "any other application. For the circumstances of David "or Solomon, or any Human condition, they will generally "be found to be too great in depth, and breadth and height. "A Pre-Eminence in Suffering points to The MAN of "SORROWS; a more than Mortal MAJESTY points to "The KING of GLORY: Girding His Sword upon His

"Thigh we see The WARRIOR of Salvation, Surrounded "with the Trophies of His Victorious Grace : Anointed with "the oil of gladness above His Fellows, we see The Blessed "BRIDEGROOM of the Church. Nor shall we do justice "to the pen of The Ready Writer, unless we put Solomon "and his nuptials out of our view; and fix our thoughts "upon Him, Whose Sceptre is a right Sceptre; and upon "her, who comes forth in her odoriferous garments, the "Consort of CHRIST, in the beauty of Holiness. Even "in the penitential Psalms, where complaint is made of "the burden and number of sins and iniquities, oppressing "and weighing down the Speaker, we still hear the Voice "of The MESSIAH. We hear Him Complaining that "'innumerable evils have compassed Him about, that His "' iniquities have taken such hold upon Him, that He is "'not able to Look up, that they are more in number than "'the hairs of His Head, and that therefore His Heart hath "failed Him.' Doubtless these were not His Own sins. "but the sins of Mankind, of which He Took upon Himself "the Burthen and the Atonement, and which He Bare in "His Own Body on the tree; He, Who Knew no sin, being "Made a Sacrifice for our sin. That The MESSIAH is The " PERSON That Speaks in some at least of these penitential " Psalms, we have the authority of the Apostles to assure "us, who, in their quotations from them, constantly refer "them to our Blessed SAVIOUR, Who Took the sins of the "World upon Himself, that He might Explate them upon the "Cross, and Cover them with His Personal Righteousness."

"It will occur to Observation, that the distribution, which "prevails in some of the Psalms, of the parts of them into "questions and answers, is frequent in Hebrew Poetry, and "the remembrance will arise of the 63rd chapter of Isaiah, "which derives much of its sublimity from the same form "of composition."

"In the reciprocation and divisions of parts, in the chant-"ing or recitation of the sacred songs of the Israelites, we "discern, according to Dr. Lowth, the immediate cause of "the disposition of the verse into equal strophes or stanzas; "and why these consisted, for the most part, of distiches, "in a sort of parallelism to each other, the last line re-"sponding to the first, and seconding, drawing out, and "enforcing the sense."

"The beautiful manner in which Dr. Lowth has illustrated "this peculiar structure of the Poetry of the Hebrews sur-" passes all praise; and the delicate observance of this same " characteristic by Dr. Horsley, in his division of the Psalms " into parts, with his appropriation of them to the Chorusses "and Interlocutors, has wonderfully relieved the Psalter "from the difficulties under which it has hitherto lain in-"cumbered, and supplied a method so natural, and so easy, "that, to use the words of Jeremiah, 'the wayfaring Man "' may understand it.' Much of that mystic allegory, to "which former Expositors have resorted, is now become "unnecessary to the sense and effect : allusions to Human "and temporary events less frequently obtrude themselves. " and the colours of mortal misery and grandeur fade away "in the Presence of The INCARNATE GOD. In this "species of scenic poem the Ineffable AUTHOR of our "Salvation Performs in general the Pre-Eminent Part; and "we are in a manner Made to hear Him Speak His Blessed "Oracles. Thus the Psalms not only Prophesy, but Repre-"sent; not only Describe, but Personify: they are all Full "of The MESSIAH, and show only the Glory of His "KINGDOM, and talk of His Power." From a Criticism on Bishop Horsley's before quoted work, in the 11th No. of the British Review for August 1815.

This Version has been constructed upon the principle recommended by the before noticed high Authorities, and with

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deep attention to the Commentary and Translation of the respective Bishops; in some instances the variations of Bishop Horsley being adopted, as assisting towards a more intelligible demonstration of Texts of acknowledged difficulty. Yet as it is admitted that a Version of the Psalms should embody as much as possible of the Text, in order that it may present a lively image of the Original, a prevailing desire has been felt, and an anxiety exercised to embrace as much as seemed practicable of the exact Language in our Bible Translation of the Psalms. The expositions and additions indispensably necessary for filling up the measure, it has been an endeavour to make accordant with the most approved interpretation of the Original; and the precise Wording of Scripture has in some instances been used, though at some expense of the strict rules of emphasis and rhyme; but in other respects these ornamental, though certainly secondary, properties of the Version, have not been disregarded.

Of the variety allowed in English versification the Author has availed himself; and, though the iambic, or foot of two syllables (having the first short, or unaccented, and the last long or accented.) will be found generally to prevail, yet almost every other measure is interspersed through the work. in order to sustain the paramount principle of incorporating as much as might be of the Text; as the spondee, or foot of two long syllables; the pyrrhic, or foot of two short syllables; the dactyl, or foot of three syllables, having the first long and the last two short; and in some instances, as in the first version of the 104th and 148th Psalms, the anapæst, or foot of three syllables, having the first two short and the last long; and the amphibrack, or foot of three syllables, having the first and last short and the middle one long, will be found. But much care has been taken to confine the trochee or foot. of two syllables, having the first long and the last short, to the beginning of lines, or of sentences occurring in the middle of

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lines; since according to received opinion that measure is only there admissible in English verse.

Whatever tunes have been used with either of the Versions of Sternhold and Hopkins, and of Brady and Tate, will adapt themselves to one or other of the measures in the corresponding Psalms of this Version. And any other tunes appropriate to Psalmody, may be applied to this collection, on attention being paid to the distribution according to the number of lines in each stanza, and the number of syllables in each line, discriminating as to the character of the air, in reference to its fitness for the Psalm, according to the quality, whether penitential, jubilant, or otherwise.

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PSALM I.

INSTRUCTIVE.

This Psalm was placed first, as'a preface to the rest, from its exciting so concisely, yet so forcibly, to a deep study of the Holy Scriptures generally, and consequently of the Book of Psalms as a part of them; and inviting to a due application of their Precepts for the governance of the heart and conversation, by their encouraging Promises, which imply all attainable happiness; and by the influence of their Threatenings, which denounce that "there is no peace "for the Wicked."

The Psalmist to the Congregation.

- 1. **BLEST** is the Man, that walketh not Where impious Council guides; Nor in the way of Sinners stands, Nor sits where Scorn presides;

It is cited however by the Apostles, who with one voice "declared it to be Prophetically descriptive of the Exaltation of "JESUS CHRIST, and of the opposition raised against His Gespel "both by Jew and Gentile." Acts iv. 25, 26.-xiii. 33. Bishop Horne.

The Persons taking part in this Psalm are, 1st, JEHOVAH, Represented in this, as in all other Psalms, by the principal Singer, as an Oracular Voice. 2nd, The Psalmist as Priest or Prophet. 3rd, the Chorus of the Faithful.

## PSALM VI.

#### PENITENTIAL.

"The supplicatory Psalms may be generally divided into two "classes according to the prayer ; which in some regards the Public. "and in others the Individual. In those of the latter class, which "is the most numerous, the Suppliant is always in distress. His "distress arises chiefly from the persecution of his Enemies. His "Enemies are always the Enemies of GOD and Goodness. Their "enmity to the Suppliant is unprovoked. If it have any cause, it "is only that he is the faithful Servant of JEHOVAH, Whose "Worship they oppose. They are numerous and powerful, and "use all means, both of force and stratagem, for the Suppliant's "destruction ; an object, in the pursuit of which they are incessantly "employed. The Suppliant is alone, without Friends, poor and "destitute of all support, but GOD's Providential Protection. When "the great inequality between the Suppliant and his Enemies is "considered, with respect to their different rank and fortunes in "the World, it seems strange that one, so inconsiderable as he is "described to be, should at all attract the notice of Persons so " greatly his Superiors, or that having once incurred their displeasure, "he should not be immediately cut off. But although their malice "is perpetually at work, their point is never carried. They keep "him in perpetual alarm and vexation; but they seem never to "advance a single step nearer to the end of their wishes, viz. his "destruction. The Suppliant, on the other hand, often miraculously "Relieved, is yet never out of danger, though he looks forward with "confidence, to a period of final Deliverance. If at any time he be "under an apprehension of death, it is by the Visitation of GOD in "sickness: 🧐 🏣 at those seasons the persecution of his Enemies and "always makes a considerable part of the affliction. They exult in "the prospect of his dissolution : upbraid him as Deserted by his "GOD; and in the end feel the highest disappointment and vexation " at his recovery. From these circumstances, which in the aggre-" gate will not apply to any character in the Jewish history, there "is good reason to conclude that the Suppliant is a Mystical Personage; "sometimes The MESSIAH; sometimes the Church; sometimes "an Individual of the Faithful. The Enemies too are mystical; "the Devil, and the Evil Spirits, his Confederates, and Atheists and "Idolators (and spiritual Pride and carnal Sensuality might be added) " considered as associated with the rebellious Angels. The sickness "too is mystical. When The MESSIAH Himself is the sick Person, "the sickness is His Humiliation, and the Wrath which He Endured "for the sins of Men: When the Church is personated, her sickness "is the frailty of her Members. But in some Psalms the sick "Suppliant is the Believer's Soul, labouring under a sense of its "infirmities and anxiously expecting the Promised Redemption; "the sickness is the depravity and disorder occasioned by the Fall " of Man." Bishop Horsley.

## PSALM IX.

#### OF THANKSGIVING AND INSTRUCTION.

"On comparing this Psalm with the 10th, so great a similitude "appears between the two, both in the sentiments and the expres-"sions, it seems reasonable to conclude, that the Subject of this "as well as of the 10th, is general; and that this is indeed an "appendage of the 10th, and is inaccurately put before it; being "the Believer's thanksgiving for that excision of iniquity, which is "promised to him in the 10th. The transitions from triumph, "as a Person delivered, to prayer and complaint, as a Person in "distress, and the contrary, are very remarkable at the 13th verse "and throughout the sequel of the Psalm; and may seem to an "inattentive Reader to give an air of inconsistency to the whole "composition. But in truth they are natural and necessary to the "Psalmist's circumstances, whose actual situation was that of the "deepest distress, while he looked forward with the utmost con-"fidence of hope to a distant period of ease, enjoyment and glory. "A Person, so situated, could not but talk this mixed language of "dejection and triumph, as his mind transferred its thoughts from "the sense of present distress to the contemplation of future "happiness.

"This whole Psalm seems naturally to divide into three parts. "The first ten verses make the first part; the six following the "second; and the remaining four the third. The first part is "Prophetic of the utter Extermination of the irreligious persecuting "faction. The Prophecy is declared in the form of a Song of "victory occasioned by the Promise given in the 15th verse of the "10th Psalm; and through the whole of this Song the Psalmist, "in the height of a Prophetic enthusiasm, speaks of the Threatened "Vengeance as accomplished. The second part opens with an "exhortation to the People of GOD to praise HIM, as The Avenger " of their wrongs, and The Watchful Guardian of the Helpless ; and "as if the flame of Prophetic joy, which the Oracular Voice had "Lighted in the Psalmist's mind, was beginning to die away, the "strain is gradually lowered, and the notes of triumph are mixed "with supplication and complaint; as if the mind of the Psalmist "were fluttering, as it were, between things present and to come, "and made itself alternately present to his actual condition and his "future hope. In the third part the Psalmist seems quite returned " from the Prophetic enthusiasm to his natural state, and closes "the whole Song with explicit but cool assertions of the future "destruction of the Wicked, and Deliverance of the Persecuted "Saints; and prays for the event." Bishop Horsley.

Many parts of "the Psalm however have so striking a reference to the Case of our "LORD in the days of His Incarnation, that I cannot but think the "Whole belongs to Him, and that HE (the Humanity of CHRIST) "is the sick persecuted Suppliant. If the sickness may typify gene-"rally His Humiliation, (as I think it may.) and the heat, which reigns "in the sick Man's loins, the fery Trial of Wrath, which He Endured "in the garden of Gethsemane, when His Distress, though principally "such an interpretation of the sickness being admitted, there is not "a sentence nor a word in the whole of this extraordinary Com-"position, which is not applicable to our LORD, as Man, with "more strictness and propriety than to any other Person." Bishop Horskey.

This naturally "brings to his mind the Great Deliverance from the Egyptian bondage, "the Providential Support of the Army upon the long and toilsome "march through the Wilderness, the Settlement of the People in "Canaan, the choice of a Place for the Temple, and the Display of "The DIVINE GLORY in the Sanctuary. EMINENTLY PROPHETICAL.

"This Psalm, though literally and historically descriptive of the inauguration of Solomon, is Spiritually and Prophetically Allusive to That of CHRIST." Bishop Lowth.

"So little of this Psalm is at all applicable to Solomon, and the "greater part of it so exclusively belongs to The MESSIAH, that "I think the Mountains and Hills (mentioned in it) allude to the "nature of the Land of Judea; and the general sense is, that in the "Times of the Great KING the Inhabitants of that mountainous "Region shall live in a state of peace and tranquillity. The Thing "intended is the happy condition of the natural Israel, in the latter "day, Restored to GOD's Favour and to the peaceful possession "of their own Land. It is a great confirmation of this sense that "Righteousness' is mentioned as the means of the peace, which "shall be enjoyed." Bishop Horsley.

"This is a Psalm of David, written, as most of the ancient and "modern Commentators allow, upon Solomon's being anointed to "be his Successor by Zadok, and his solemn inauguration thereupon. "Ist Kings i. 39, &c. And herein David recommends him in this form of prayer to the Blessing of GOD upon this undertaking. "But by some imperceptible Motions of The HOLY SPIRIT his "mind is carried off to speak of The MFSSIAH: upon which ac-"count many of the Jewish Writers explain this Psalm, as spoken "mostly of The MESSIAH. So says Rabbi Obadiah and Rabbi "Eben Ezra. The Midrash upon the words—'Give the King Thy "Judgments,' &c. say—This is The KING MESSIAH. And in the "Talmud, when the question is asked---What is the Name of The "MESSIAH! It is answered--'llinnon,' from verse 17 of this "Psalm, His Name shall Endure for ever. And Rabbis Solomon "Jarchi and Kimchi say---That their old Rabbins explain this of The "KING MESSIAH; and Kimchi particularly says---That this is "properly to be understood of CHRIST, but hyperbolically only of "Solomon." Dr. William Nicholls.

The feast of Trumpets "seems to have been the occasion for which it was composed. The "new moon in the month of Tisri, when this feast of Trumpets was "celebrated, was the first day of the Jewish year, in which time the "World was supposed to be created, the fruits being then ripe. "Which consideration, together with that of the harvest being now "gathered in, made this to be the most joyful and glorious festival " of all the year." Dr. William Nicholls.

"This Psalm seems addressed to the Court, which condemned "our LORD, Who in His State of Humiliation is here described "under the names of the Poor, the Fatherless, the Afflicated, the "Needy. They are reprosched with the folly and injustice of their "sentence; they are threatened with Punishment, and in 'the last "verse our LORD's Exaltation is Predicted. The Psalmist, I "think, poetically imagines the Celestial Court, Assembled for the "business of This Review of the proceedings of the Earth's Judges, " and GOD in the Midst of His Angels, Taxing their iniquity and "Awarding their Punishment." Bishep Hortley.

Amidst this variance of view, as to the application of this Psalm, taken by such respected Authorities, an adoption of that of the former of them has not been made without much hesitation and some self-distrust. Such construction however seems to offer the best sense, especially when considered in connection with the 6th verse. In the opening of the Psalm the Psalmist in effect appears to invite attention generally to the Omnipresence of The DEITY and to His Consciousness of the deliberations and decisions of Human judgments. Quoting from Bishop Horsley's own translation of the Psalm it acknowledges that-"GOD Standeth in the assembly (of the People). "GOD in the Midst of the Gods Giveth Sentence." This is a general position. THE ALMIGHTY is not only Present in the councils of Elders and Magistrates and Judges, but also in those of the Princes of the Land and of the Kings of the Earth : and all that is therein determined is under His. Guidance, if tending to immediate good, or under His Permission, if administering for a season apparently to evil of a partial nature, but from which some general good will doubtless eventually flow : and All therefore, who assume the high office of judging others, should bear uppermost in their minds, that they stand disclosed before The SUPREME JUDGE of Quick and Dead in all their motives and dispositions and wills, and eventually will assuredly answer, without power of appeal, and under the conviction of their own consciences, to An ALMIGHTY POWER, and be Dealt with according to their own measure of dealing. Having thus offered his caution in the spirit of Pastoral Charity; and witnessing the total disregard of Such High and Important Truths, by observing the very reverse of such conduct prevailing among those, who had temporal power allotted to them, the Paslmist in the 2nd verse bursts out into an expostulating enquiry —" How long will ye patronize the Oppressor "and respect the Person of the Impious?" and still aware of the utter disregard paid to his advice, he breaks forth in the 5th verse, under feelings of mingled accusation and regret, into the following exclamation-"They take no notice! They will not understand! "They go on in darkness! All the foundations of the Earth are "disordered!" In this manner, either addressing the People behind him, or, wrapt in abstracted reflection, soliloquizing himself. Then, resuming his address to the unrighteous Judges or Governors, he says-"I have said-Ye are Gods, all of you Sons of The HIGHEST !" adverting to the assurance he had before given them, that GOD was both Ready and Willing to Assist them, as their Counsellor and their Father, if they would but yield to His Gracious Suggestions in the judgments they pronounced ; and that in so doing they would lay up for themselves a crown of glory and honour, that fadeth not away, imperishable as the Heavens. But since this Doctrine they cast from them and heed not the Things that belong to their Everlasting Peace, he predicts that they shall be left to their miserable fate, and, amidst the pride and vanity of their heart, cut off like the most abject of their Subjects or Dependants. Despairing of producing true wisdom in the exercise of Human power the Psalmist then, in the concluding verse, invokes the immediate Interposition of The DEITY to Execute Judgment upon the Earth, and to Enforce the observance of Righteousness among the People; Asserting His Universal Supremacy. Some allusion may be indeed

It setteth "forth His Glory, Wisdom, Goodness and Power, Displayed in "the formation of the Heavens and the Earth; in the various "Provisions Made for beasts and birds, and for Man, the Lord "of all; in the Revolution of the Celestial Bodies, and the con-"sequent interchanges of day and night, of labour and rest; in "the Sea and every thing that moveth in or upon the Waters. "The dependance of the whole Creation upon GOD, for its being "and well-being, is beautifully represented with the Glory, Which "The CREATOR Receiveth from His Works, the Pleasure which "He Taketh in them, and the Power which He hath over them. "The Psalmist declareth his resolution ever to praise JEHOVAH, "and predicted the Destruction of those, who refuse or neglect "so to do." Bishop Horne.

"AN HYMN FOR THE SABBATH DAY."

"This Hymn celebrates the Power of JEHOVAH Displayed "in the Creation of the Universe, the Destruction of the Earth by "the deluge, and the Restoration of beauty and order after that "calamity; and describes the dependance of all Nature, animated "and vegetable, upon His Providence for sustemance and preserva-"tion. For regularity of composition, richness of imagery, sub-"limity of sentiment, and elegance and perspicuity of diction, it "is perhaps the principal Poem in the whole collection of these "Inspired Songs. As there is no allusion in it to the Mosaic ritual, "nor any mention of the Deliverance of the Israelites from Egypt, "it should seem it was of an earlier age than Excous. It commands "of parts alternately sung by two Companies. The parts are easily "distinguished, inasmuch as one Semi-Chorus always speaks of "GOD in the third person, the other addresses Him in the second." Bishop Horsley.

"This Psalm has no title to it in the Hebrew, but the Greeks "inscribe it—'A Psalm of David upon the Creation of the World;" but whoever be the Author of it, it is one of the most exalted "pieces of poetry extant in antiquity." Dr. W. Nicholls.

HISTORICAL.

"The Psalmist again commemorates The DIVINE Benefits, "upbraiding withal the ingratitude of those who received Them. He "exhorteth Men to the Praise of JEHOVAH; proclaimeth the "Blessedness and longeth for the Felicity of the Saints; confessent "the sins of Israel, and giveth a detail of their rebellions, at the Red "Sea; when they lusted for flesh in the Wilderness; in the matter of "Korah; in that of the golden calf; at the report of the Spies; in "the affair of Baal-Peor; at the waters of Meribah; in not destroying "idolatry, but being seduced by it. GOD's Frequent Judgments and as Frequent Mercies are related. A prayer is made that JEHOVAH "would Gather Israel from among the Heathen, which shews the "Psalm to have been written during some captivity or dispersion."

The Curses, that follow, as clearly "describe the Judgments Which have Fallen upon that miserable "People. So that the whole is a Prediction of His Sufferings and "of their Punishment Delivered in the form of complaint and impre-"cation. Nor is there any thing in it, if rightly understood, more "offensive than in the Prophetic curses of the Patriarchs."

"This Psalm being full of very bitter imprecations, as some "others likewise are, it has been thought by Some to have discovered "too much of the spirit of the Law, to be used now for a form of "devotion under the Gospel. "I tis initialed 'A Psalm of David ' and is thought to be an invest-"tive sgainst Doeg, that wicked Agent of Saul, who did so much "mischief to David and His Friends, under the countenance of that "Prince, The HOLY GHOST so Managing the composition, that "it should likewise have a regard to Judas, the wicked Betrayer of "our LORD, as St. Peter affirms, Acts i. 16. For as David was a "Type of our SAVIOUR, so the Betrayer of David was a "Preordained to figure out the Betrayer of CHRIST."

"This Psalm, like the 110th, seems to be altogether Prophetical "of the joy that all the World should conceive at the Coming of The "MESSIAH, to Give Salvation, first to Jews, and then to all other "Nations, according to His Faithful Promise." Patrick.

"This Psalm is employed by St. Paul (Romans xv. 11.) to prove "that the Gentiles were one day to praise GOD for the Mercies of "Redemption." Bishop Horne.

"This and the 118th are in truth but one Psalm, of which this "is nothing more than the exordium. The whole Poem is a tri-"umphant processional Song. The scene passes at the front gate of "the Temple. A Conqueror, with his Train, appears before it, and "demands admittance to return thanks for his deliverance and final "success, in an expedition of great difficulty and danger. The "Conqueror and his Train sing the 117th Psalm, and the first four "verses of the 118th, as they advance to the gate of the Temple in "this manner. Psalm 117th-Chorus of the whole Procession, "Psalm 118, verse 1.—A Single Voice. Verse 2.— Another Single "Voice. Verse 3.—A third Single Voice. 4.—Chorus of the whole "Procession. Arrived at the Temple gate the Conqueror alone "sings the 5th, 6th and 7th verses. The 8th and 9th are sung by "his Train in chorus. The Conqueror again alone sings the 10th, "11th, 12th, 13th and 14th verses. His Train in chorus the 15th "and 16th. The Conqueror alone the 17th, 18th and 19th. The "20th is sung by the Priests and Levites within, while they throw "the gates open. The 21st by the Conqueror alone. The 22nd, "23rd and 24th by the Priests and Levites within in chorus. The "25th by the Conqueror alone within the gates. The 26th by the "Priests and Levites in Chorus. The 27th by the Conqueror's "Train in Chorus. The 28th by the Conqueror alone. The 29th "by the united Chorus of the Priests and Levites and the Con-"queror's Train, all within the gates.

"Now the Jewish Temple was a Type of Heaven. The gate of "the Temple therefore is the Gate of Heaven; the Priests within "represent the Angelic Host attending round the Throne of GOD in "Heaven; the Conqueror is MESSIAH; and the Train the Re-"deemed." Bishop Hursley.

"In this Psalm a King of Israel appears leading his People in "solemn procession to the Temple, there to offer up the sacrifice of "praise and thanksgiving for the Marvellous Deliverance from his "Enemies and a glorious victory gained over them. After inviting "the Nation (verse 1 to 4) to join with him upon this joyful occasion " he describes at large (5 to 18) his danger and his Deliverance from "it, Which latter is attributed wholly to the Power and Goodness of "JEHOVAH. After this, as Mr. Mudge has rightly observed, "there ensues a kind of sacred dialogue. Being come to the Temple "the victorious Monarch speaks the 19th verse; they that open the "gate the 20th; he again, as he enters, the 21st; they with him "seem to speak the four next verses to the 25th; the Priests of the "Temple the 26th—the first part to the King, the other to the "People; the People the 27th; he the 28th; the 29th is the chorus "verse concluding as it began. The repeated application made of "the 22nd verse in the New Testament (being six times quoted as "spoken of JESUS CHRIST) and the appointment of the Psalm by "the Church to be used on Easter Day, lead us to consider the "Whole as a Triumphant Hymn Sung by KING MESSIAH at the "Head of the Israel of GOD on Occasion of His Resurrection and " Exaltation." Bishop Horns.

"This Psalm, though it bears no title, is generally by Ancients "and Moderns, attributed to David; and it was probably an "Inauguration Hymn after he was recognized King of all Israel and "Judah. It was written in a dialogical form, in which there are "several Interlocutors, viz. David, the People and the Priests. "The Psalm seems to have been sung in these parts, in a public "procession to the Tabernacle up Mount Zion. That there are "many Prophetical Expressions therein, Which Relate to The "MESSIAH, not only the Writers of the New Testament, but many "of the ancient Rabbies affirm, as St. Jerome says." Dr. W. Nicholts.

David must undoubtedly have "been the Author. He describes in a series of devotional meditations "the Instruction and the Comfert, which through all viciositudes of mind and fortune he had ever found in the Word of GOD. The " many strong expressions of love towards the Law, and the repeated "resolutions and vows to observe It, will often force us to turn our "thoughts to The True DAVID, Whose Meat and Drink it was "to Do the Will of Him, That Sent Him. Between the verses of "each portion a connection is frequently to be traced, but it doth "not often seem to extend from one portion to another. The many "words employed to express the Revelations of GOD's Will have "distinct significations, denoting different parts or portions of the "Scriptures, which it hath been at sometimes found of great use to "take into consideration, while at others the terms appear to be "used promiscuously in a general sense and for the sake of variety." Bishop Horne.

They seem to be services "sung, some upon special, but the greatest part upon stated "occasions, upon the steps of the great gate of the Temple. Some "have the form of Prayers to be used by the Worshippers as they "ascended the steps; others of benediction, with which the "Worshippers were saluted by the Priests. I much doubt whether "the 120th Psalm ought to have a place in this set." Bishop Horsley.

"In this Psalm the Author, most probably David, complains of "the falsehood, the treachery and the violence of Men, amongst "whom he grieves that his pilgrimage is prolonged." Bishop Horne.

"This and the fourteen following Psalms are intituled in the "Hebrew, 'Songs of Steps or Degrees.' Some think they are called "so, because they were sung by the Levites, as they went up the "steps or stairs of the Temple: others think it refers to some gradual "rise or exaltation of the voice in singing. Both opinions have "their probabilities, wherefore it is not easy to say, which of these "two reasons gave occasion to the compilation. It seems to have "been first composed by David, upon the information of Doeg (1st "Samuel xxii), but was made use of afterwards by the Jews in "remembrance of their captivity." Dr. W. Nicholls.

Bishop Home.

"The occasion of this Psalm was probably the placing of the "Ark in Solomon's Temple. It was sung by the Priests and Levites "as the Ark was carried up the steps. I divide the Psalm into parts "thus:--part 1st verse 1 to 5, High Priest alone...-Part 2nd verse "6, First Semi-Chorus...-Part 3rd verse 7, Second Semi-Chorus.--"Part 4th verses 8, 9, 10, Full Chorus.--Part 5th verses 11 to 18, "High Priest alone." He beseeches GOD to Perfect His Work, and Subde "the remaining Adversaries by the Weight of His Power. He breaks "forth again into a strain of thanksgiving, and again returns to bis "prayers for the Complete Redemption and Prosperity of Israel. "If we substitute in our minds MESSIAH for David, the Church "for Israel, and Spiritual for temporal Blessings, the Psalm will "present itself to us as a noble Evangelical Hymn." Bishop Horm.

"Thanksgiving for some National Deliverance. Bishop Hare, "after Le Clerc, imagines that from the end of the 11th to the middle "of the 15th verse the Pealmist rehearses the boastings of the strange "Children; to which he replies in the last line of the Psalm, [Nay "but] "Happy is the People, whose GOD is JEHOVAH." I "rather think that the 12th, 13th and 14th verses contain the "Psalmist's prayer that the happy effects of Peace and Prosperity "may be visible in the flourishing state of Agriculture and the arts of "Peace. In the 15th verse he reflects on the great happiness of a "people in such circumstances, and declares that that happiness "must be an Effect of GOD's Special Favour." Bishop Horsley.

"The voice of complaint hath sometimes been succeeded by that "of thanksgiving; and praise at other times hath terminated in "prayer. But now, as if the days of mourning in Zion were ended, "we hear no more of MESSIAH as a Man of Sorrows, or of the "Church, as despised and afflicted, after the same example in the "World. Henceforth we seem not to be upon Earth, but in Heaven, "mingling with the Celestial Spirits around the Throne, and singing "as in the following Psalm the Praises of our GOD and KING, "extolling His Greatness, His Might, His Glory, His Justice, His "Mercy, the Majesty of His KINGDOM and All His Adorable "Perfections and Wonderful Works. Bishop Patrick mentions a "saying of the Ancient Hebrews, taken notice of by Valentine "Schindler, 'that he could not fail to be a Child of the World to "' Come, who would say this Psalm three times everyday.' Perhaps "they, who while they chaunt it in full choir enter thoroughly into "the spirit of it, do experience as lively a foretaste of the next "World as can be experienced in this." Bishop Horne.

"The title of this Psalm is 'David's Psalm of Praise,' the only "Psalm in the book with this title. It is not manifest upon what "occasion it was written. The verses begin with the alphabetical "letters in order, only Nun is wanting." Dr. W. Nicholls.

## MUSICAL DISTRIBUTION.

Towards the musical application of this Version, the following distribution and classification of such portions of those Psalms, as are calculated for Singing, may assist. The varieties of measure will adapt themselves to any tunes used for the same Psalms, in the Versions either of Sternhold and Hopkins, or Brady and Tate. But still further to extend its ready adaptation to any other music, appropriate to Psalmody, the general division by the character of sentiment in the Psalm (as that of penitence or prayer, of instruction, of thanksgiving or praise,) is formed, whence according to the fitness or taste of the occasion, a tune. agreeing with its tendency, may be selected. The subdivisions of each head of distribution, varying in the first instance with the number of lines in the stanzas, and secondly with the number of syllables in the lines. will additionally allow of a more extended application of the verses to familiar tunes, and almost to every variety of sacred music, suited to metrical composition. To illustrate this rule of choice of music for a Psalm (and which may be mutually applied in choosing words for a tune) it is only to let the music agree in its character of jubilant, plaintive, or otherwise with the sentiment, in the Psalm, and as near as may be in the number of its emphatic notes, with the number of syllables in the stanza.


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
