SUB seeks new members To begin plans for Fall

Student Union Board elections are rapidly approaching. With these elections new leaders will emerge to carry on the responsibilities of the organization. This year the Student Union Board will be accepting applications for five 1984-85 coordinators. Applications for coordinators will be due by April 11 with interviews being conducted on April 16 at 12:30 p.m. All applications are now available in the Office of Student Life.

According to the Student Union Board, the election rules are as follows:

1) The two Board officers shall be elected by the retiring officers and coordinators during the spring semester, assuming office two weeks after elections.

2) Coordinators of each of the five areas shall be appointed by the retiring Board and new officers within four weeks following the new officers' election. Coordinators shall assume office two weeks after selection.

3) All Board members shall serve one-year terms and may be re-appointed.

4) All Board members must be registered students of Avila and maintain a grade point average of 2.5; mem-

bership on Board committees is open to all members of the campus community, including students, faculty, staff, administration and support staff.

Providing extra-curricular activities through the areas of Dance, Social, Special Events, and Films, the Student Union Board provides quality programs for the campus. In all of its programs, the Student Union Board encourages selfdirected activities which promote opportunities for self realization in individuals. The Student Union Board's goal is to see the development of persons as a whole.

Positions are available for the following positions:

FILMS COORDINATORwho is responsible for the Friday night film series and for selecting films for the fol-

lowing semester. SOCIAL COORDINATORwho is responsible for planning a variety of extracurricular activities such as bowling, roller skating, ice skating, film events and other large group activities.

SPECIAL EVENTS CO-ORDINATOR-who is responsible for planning events such as mini-concerts, informative lectures, and the Photography contest.

DANCE COORDINATOR-

who is responsible for the Homecoming, Christmas, and Spring Dances.

PROMOTION COORD-INATOR-who is responsible for creative promotional ideas for all SUB events. This may include doing public relations work, distributing press releases and flyers. making posters, and keeping up the bulletin board and display cases.

All coordinators are responsible for the implementation of specific programs for the benefit of the entire campus community. Coordinators may form committees to collectively plan, promote, and product programs in their specific areas of concen-

Funded through the Student Activity Fee, Student Union Board programs are designed to provide amusement and issues for intellectual awareness and to increase student participation in SUB events. These events are free to Avila students, faculty, and their guests.
