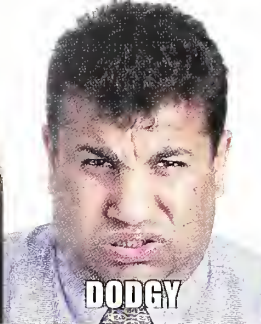

MOTILIUM 10 – ESSENTIAL INFORMATION

Presentation: Small film coated tablet containing domperidone maleate equivalent to 10mg domperidone base. **Indications:** For the relief of post meal symptoms of fullness, nausea, epigastric bloating and belching, occasionally accompanied by epigastric discomfort and heartburn. **Dosage and administration:** Adults and children over 16: up to one tablet (10mg) three times daily and at night when required. COMMENT

The Royal Pharmaceutical Society Council has this week been told that it is in danger of losing its control over pharmacy policy. In a discussion paper sent to Council members, immediate past president Hemant Patel warns that in future there is a risk that policy decisions could be entrusted to (unelected) individuals, but for which the whole Council will take collective responsibility. Isn't this what the Banks report on the ways of working at the Society suggested and isn't this what was agreed? Yes and no. As Mr Patel says, the theories in the Banks report are fine, it's the way they have been implemented. The membership is starting to think that Banks' is not working quite how it should. Above all, there is a worry that there is now even less transparency on how the 'democratically' elected Council is arriving at decisions that are impacting on the profession's everyday working lives. Could it be that the new ways of working are being manipulated to some other gain?

The thrust of Banks' was that the directorates would work up the details of policy that Council decided upon, so freeing Council to consider the bigger issues, rather than the nitty gritty. In calling for committees to oversee the policy unit and public affairs directorate, Mr Patel might be accused of wanting too much of a hands-on approach. He might counter this argument by saying there needs to be a more transparent system of checks and balances in place.

As an officer of the Society, you would expect Mr Patel's views to count for something. Hence, it would seem that a review of the new ways of working is on the cards. Only time will show if there is to be a good, honest, healthy and open debate about these proposals that will have a direct impact on the way Council conducts itself.

Web site lobbying to become UK on-line pharmacy

A UK internet site is seeking support from web users to be able to supply OTC medicines and even prescription medicines via the net.

The site at www.chemistore.com says that, despite being legal in many countries, UK regulations still prevent pharmaceutical sales over the internet. "We believe the public appreciate convenience and value and it is appropriate for certain products to be sold direct," says the site which asks visitors to register their views.

It sets out a three-phase plan. The first phase is information gathering. "Phase two will be live within three months to bring you cough and cold remedies and the kind of products you could expect to find in High Street stores, all at reasonable prices." These will include health and beauty products, cosmetics, contraception and perfumes.

However, it continues: "Only with the regulators' full approval will we progress to phase three - handling your repeat prescriptions and more complex pharmaceutical sales with the aid of our in-house retained pharmacists."

The company says that selling pharmaceuticals should be a serious business requiring integrity and trust. "Used sensibly, the internet need not be a barrier. We believe, unlike some other business, that chemist sales over the web should not be through the back door or around the regulations." It also says that it is working closely with regulators to become the UK's first and only legitimately approved on-line pharmacy. A patent for its business model and safety process has been applied for, it adds.

The site has come to the attention of pharmacy bodies, but as *C&D* went to press, Chemistore had not responded to an e-mailed request for more information about its set up.

Berks pharmacists' value discussed in document

A discussion document on community pharmacists' contribution to health improvement is to be distributed to all primary care groups in Berkshire to raise awareness of pharmacists' role.

'Improving health through Berkshire pharmacies' identifies ways in which the county's pharmacists can contribute in the four areas targeted in the 'Our Healthier Nation'. These are heart disease and stroke, accidents, cancer, and mental health.

It has been jointly produced by the Health Authority and Local Pharmaceutical Committee and has

No decision on Relenza

Media speculation that Relenza would not be available on the NHS was rife this week, although no decision had been made at the time *C&D* went to press.

Glaxo Wellcome was warning that pharmaceutical companies would question the wisdom of being based in Britain if the products of their research were not prescribable on the NHS.

The official word from the company and from the National Institute for Clinical Excellence was that discussions between the two were continuing and a decision would be made soon. Andrew Dillon, NICE chief executive, said it would be inappropriate to comment in detail: "What I can say is that we are approaching the end of our inquiries and we will be making our representations to the secretary of state and to the National Assembly for Wales in early October."

A full appraisal by NICE takes about eight months, but a rapid assessment procedure is available if the NHS needs guidance at shorter notice on the clinical- and cost-effectiveness of a medicine. Because of the potential

burden of flu this winter, NICE was asked to use the rapid procedure to offer preliminary guidance for early autumn. Both zanamivir and oseltamivir, a similar drug being developed by Roche, will undergo a full appraisal in the New Year.

The rapid assessment committee has prepared interim reports on which Glaxo Wellcome has been invited to comment before guidance is submitted to the health secretary.

A statement from the company said: "It would be inappropriate to comment on speculation about what that guidance might be," although "leaked" reports suggested the committee felt there was not enough evidence of the drug's efficacy in groups particularly vulnerable to flu complications, such as the elderly.

Although clinical studies involved a broad population of over 6,000 patients, the studies were not specifically designed to recruit patients with underlying risk factors. While there was evidence that Relenza benefited the population as a whole, the numbers in these vulnerable groups were

not sufficient for Glaxo Wellcome to make specific claims for them.

But the company, in appealing against NICE's initial assessment, has now presented data showing that Relenza's benefits are consistent in all age and at-risk groups. The drug attacks the virus which is the same in any host, a spokesman said.

He said press reports that the company was threatening to leave Britain if Relenza was banned from the NHS were not strictly true. The chairman, Richard Sykes, has written to the health secretary saying that if an innovative medicine could be blocked in this way, it made the country appear a difficult environment in which to operate and companies would have to look closely at the UK as a base for pharmaceutical research and development.

● The British Pharma Group, representing Astra Zeneca, Glaxo Wellcome and SmithKline Beecham, has written to prime minister Tony Blair to protest at the NICE recommendation to ban Relenza on the NHS, and asking for an urgent meeting with him before any government decision is made.

Dobson increases number of walk-in centres

The number of NHS walk-in centres is to increase by 17 to 36, health secretary Frank Dobson has announced.

Many of the new sites announced in Mr Dobson's speech to the Labour Party conference last week will be located close to or in hospitals. However, there are a few High-Street locations and one will be based near West Croydon station.

The other new locations will be in Nottingham, Loughborough, Harlow, Newham, Tottenham & Edmonton, Southampton, Weybridge, Woking, Slough, Bristol, Walsall, Coventry, Leigh, Bury & Rochdale, Wirral and St Helen's & Knowsley. Some of the first batch of centres should be opening by the end of this year, with most following by next summer.

Mr Dobson also used his speech to announce the first national service framework on mental health (see p7) and to announce that the top pay of nurses and midwives will increase from below £30,000 to £42,000.

Only one reference was made to pharmacy. After outlining the various proposed changes, he said: "People will understand that many of these improvements will take time because it takes five years to train a doctor, four years to train a pharmacist, and three years to train a nurse or midwife."

SPGC reviews endorsements

The Scottish Pharmaceutical General Council has reviewed its agreement on prescription endorsements for generic drugs with the Scottish Executive Health Department.

The previous agreement, which came into effect on August 1, allowed contractors to endorse prescriptions with details of the manufacturer/supplier and pack size used if they were unable to source a generic at *Drug Tariff* price (C&D August 7, p6). There were five suppliers for whom these endorsements were acceptable.

All contractors in Scotland have been sent a letter by the SPGC notifying them of changes to this agreement, which came into effect from October 1. The changes are listed below.

- The Pharmacy Practice Division will no longer accept endorsements of the five agreed suppliers.

- A list of patient packs for generic products has been added to the *Tariff*. For most of these products the new entry will run in parallel to the existing bulk pack entry. If pack size is not endorsed for these products, payment will be calculated from the bulk pack.

- If there is a shortage of a product, contractors will be able to supply and endorse a proprietary brand. A list of these is available at www.spgc.org.uk.

Non-prescriptions for colds for GPs

GPs are being issued with 'non-prescription' pads to give to patients, explaining why they do not need antibiotics for colds and flu.

The leaflet recommends self-help measures instead, including asking a local pharmacist about suitable remedies. It advises patients to phone or visit the surgery if they do not get better within a few days or are concerned about symptoms.

Community pharmacies are being issued with 50 leaflets explaining to the general public why "we must look after antibiotics... by using them carefully". The leaflets and a poster advising that antibiotics don't work on colds, most coughs and sore throats, are also being sent to GP practice managers as part of a government health education campaign on antibiotic resistance.

Category D for October

Pharmaceutical Services Negotiating Committee has issued the following list of Category D products for October not shown in the *Drug Tariff*:

Flucloxacillin oral solution 125mg/5ml 100ml; haloperidol tablets 10mg, 50s; lormetazepam tabs 500mcg, 28s and 100s.

PSNC said: "Please remember to endorse your Category D items with the manufacturer and your supplier."

- The number of categories for generic *Drug Tariff* entries has been extended to four. Category one contains drugs available from each of the three mainline wholesalers. Category two drugs are available from two mainline wholesalers. Category three drugs are available from only one of the mainline wholesalers, and the price will be as listed by that wholesaler. Category four products are those only available from a named supplier, or galenicals. Category three has been created to allow for a more detailed scrutiny of the marketplace. This will allow for a more rapid response to shortages, and the addition of new packs to the *DT*.

Drugs in mental health NSF

All health authorities should be monitoring and reviewing prescribing rates of antidepressants, antipsychotics and benzodiazepines by 2001, in local clinical audit programmes.

This is one of the "national milestones" to be reached under the new national service frameworks for mental health, published last week. The document sets out standards in five areas - mental health promotion, primary care and access to services, effective services for people with severe mental illness, services for carers and reduction in suicides.

One standard requires effective treatments for anyone who consults

the primary healthcare team with a common mental health problem, and there should be round the clock treatment for anyone who needs it. Looking at specific areas of mental illness, the document says that antidepressants are an effective treatment for depression, but are not always prescribed in the correct doses and may be over-prescribed. People with depression often feel they do not receive adequate information about their treatment. In anxiety disorders, benzodiazepines may be helpful but should be used for no more than two to four weeks.

In psychotic illness prompt assessment and treatment is essential as there is growing evidence that this can reduce morbidity. Better public and professional understanding, together with integrated mental health systems across primary and specialist services, should promote earlier intervention.

Side effects may lead people to discontinue treatment and there is no evidence that the standard dose of antipsychotic medication is less effective than a higher dose, with its increased risk of adverse reactions, in preventing relapse. Simple measures, such as written information, may help people continue their medication.

The NSF recommends that the severely ill should have a written care plan, regularly reviewed by a care coordinator, which advises the GP how to respond if additional help is needed.

One of the ways performance will be assessed in primary care will be by measuring the extent to which the prescribing of antidepressants, antipsychotics and benzodiazepines conforms to clinical guidelines.

Patel warns that Council is losing its control over pharmacy policy

Hemant Patel is calling for more clarity and greater pharmacist involvement in policy making decisions and public affairs activities at the Royal Pharmaceutical Society.

He has warned that the Society's Council still needs to be in control as a whole and "must guard against individuals with power and opportunity in the future to dictate policy and, more importantly, implement policy in a less than transparent way".

In a paper issued for discussion at this week's Council meeting, immediate past president Mr Patel proposes that committees should be set up to oversee the Policy Support Unit and the Public Affairs Directorate. This would help them achieve "clarity of purpose and increased effectiveness".

Mr Patel is concerned that the new

ways of working at the Lambeth HQ, implemented after the Banks Report, have seen a lot of work and decision making devolved to the directorates. But not much indication was given on how the Council would be involved. "This situation needs to be reviewed as it presents a potentially dangerous situation whereby it is only in crisis that Council members might become aware of what is required of them."

"Furthermore, I do not accept that Council can delegate its duties without supervising the systems/processes involved in professionally and diligently implementing agreed policies for agreed outcomes."

While saying that the theories set out in the Banks Report are "fine", the implementation has been the problem. "Banks needs a review rather than

tweaking," he said on Tuesday, warning that "people have played Machiavellian games" in implementing it. Mr Patel is worried that tasks are delegated to committees, but without any formal accountability procedures put in place. "I want to see a feedback mechanism to ensure there are checks and balances," he said.

Highlighting one concern, Mr Patel says that the previous head of the policy support unit, Jessie Torrance, was compelled to leave although she was doing a "great job". In part this was because she was too open and honest, he believes. The Society is currently recruiting for a new head of policy, but Mr Patel said that one of the reasons for issuing his paper is: "I want to make sure that we do not get a clone. We want someone who is independent."

Glover tells DoH 'we need our reforms'

Royal Pharmaceutical Society president Christine Glover has called on the Government to allow parliamentary time to let the Society implement disciplinary reforms.

Speaking at the Council dinner on Tuesday, Mrs Glover said that 'helping pharmacists achieve excellence' is the Society's *raison d'être*. "The Society is highly focused on ensuring the profession is accountable for its practice," and by working towards a new code of ethics and implementing a clinical governance framework, pharmacy will meet the Government's objective of ensuring clinical excellence.

"However, we need to achieve long-overdue reforms to our disciplinary machinery and that requires amendments to legislation," she told acting chief pharmacist Jeanette Howe. "I know parliamentary time is at a premium, but we need our amendments if we are going to put the Government's quality agenda into practice."

Mrs Glover picked up on the Government's interest in medicines management. "It goes without saying that medicines management would need proper public investment and support, but such investment would pay for itself many times over."

Maltby to be new secretary at PSNI

The Pharmaceutical Society of Northern Ireland has appointed a new secretary and chief executive. Sheila Maltby, a hospital pharmacist from Belfast, will start her new job in the New Year, and in due course should become the PSNI's registrar, a title which requires statutory approval by government.

Sheila Maltby graduated from The Queen's University of Belfast in 1977. She completed an MSc in Health Economics and Management at QUB in 1996. She is currently the pharmacy services manager for Green Park Healthcare Trust in Belfast.

She began her career with a split pre-registration year in Lisburn (community) and Royal Group of Hospitals (hospital). Having qualified, she joined the Royal Victoria Hospital. She was appointed to the Foster Green and Belvoir Park hospitals in 1980 and took up her current post in 1991.

Chairman of the Guild of Healthcare Pharmacists in Northern Ireland in 1991-1992, she was appointed as the N Ireland District member of the Guild Council in 1992.

She has been chairman of the Postgraduate Pharmaceutical Education and Training Committee (PPET), and she serves on the Eastern Health & Social Services Board Area Pharmaceutical Advisory Committee. She is also the pharmacist representative on the Eastern Health & Social Services Board Area Drugs and Therapeutics Committee.

Society bid for GSL restrictions

The Royal Pharmaceutical Society has written to the Medicines Control Agency emphasising the risks associated with the unrestricted availability of General Sales List medicines.

The letter, responding to an informal consultation on the use of medicines in children, suggests that advice available from pharmacies could help make young people more competent in medicines use, and so reduce adverse incidents. As pharmacies are easily accessible, there is no compelling argument against restricting all medicine sales to pharmacies.

The letter also proposes that education on medicines and common health problems should be part of the secondary school curriculum.

Other decisions made by Council Committees in September included:

- the Practice Committee agreed that a one-day conference should be held late spring 2000 to launch practice guidelines on mental health, currently being developed by the Society's mental health task force

- the establishment of a task force to produce guidance on pharmacists' contribution to the treatment and prevention of CHD and stroke

- the Practice Committee agreed to work towards the production of regular updates to the Society's guidelines on pharmacy computer systems.

'Script switching close to fraud'

The practice of deducting prescription charges from contractors who have not received them from exempt patients is verging on fraud, believes Wally Dove, Pharmaceutical Services Negotiating Committee chairman.

He said this week that the Prescription Pricing Authority could easily validate prescriptions exempt from charges on grounds of age, so should not be switching them from 'exempt' to 'paid' bundles and taking the money from contractors.

"We have asked the NHSE to remove age-exempt prescriptions from this process and to make sure that switching is transparent to contractors. The matter will be put at the top of our negotiating list over the next few weeks."

PSNC has also made the point to the NHSE that its lack of action on this matter may have serious implications for pharmacists' co-operation with point of dispensing checks. A legal opinion is being sought on the issue.

Meanwhile, PSNC is reminding contractors that they have a right to inspect their priced prescriptions at the health authority's offices. If the pharmacist can show that a charge was not taken for an exempt prescrip-

tion, the health authority should authorise an appropriate adjustment. Mr Dove believes some health authorities are not being fully co-operative in this respect.

Category D objections: The NHSE is demanding some "fairly Draconian" measures to reduce the number of Category D entries in Part VIII of the *Drug Tariff*, including redefining a shortage as one week's stock in the supply chain rather than four. PSNC challenged this definition at a meeting with the NHSE last week and is pressing for a system that will not put contractors at a disadvantage.

Pharmacy prescribing: Pharmacist Wendy Harris, who has been advising South Derbyshire Health Authority on prescribing issues, is working with the NHSE on pharmacy prescribing initiatives of which the first wave is anticipated in early 2000. Over the next couple of months PSNC will focus in detail on the implications for remuneration, manpower and audit.

Health Act: PSNC was pleased to receive the NHSE's confirmation that local pharmaceutical committees will be consulted on the setting up of primary care trusts.

London weighting: PSNC agreed, at a meeting on September 22, to make a case for a London weighting allowance to be met from additional funding rather than from the existing global sum. The PSNC's negotiating team was sympathetic to a request from Merton, Sutton and Wandsworth LPC to ask NHSE for such an allowance but was conscious of the need to balance the demands made on the global sum by different contractors. Currently, distribution of remuneration relates more to the volume of prescriptions rather than the areas in which dispensing takes place.

Registration fees: After considering a letter from the NHSE, consulting on the Royal Pharmaceutical Society's proposals to increase pharmacy registration fees by over 3 per cent, PSNC has suggested a lower premises retention fee.

Superdrug proposals: PSNC is continuing to examine remuneration models to see if the present system can be improved, following discussion of the Superdrug document - 'The way forward' - which suggests abolishing contract limitation. The document was published to stimulate debate. "The

fact that it has failed to do so is an indication that, like PSNC, others suspect that the real motive behind the document is to promote Superdrug and its profits rather than a genuine desire to improve patient care," said PSNC.

Strategy meeting: PSNC's strategy committee is holding a special meeting this month to examine in detail the implications of the NHS changes and how strategy should be targeted to make the best use of opportunities and counteract threats.

Technician registration: PSNC remains open minded on the registration of pharmacy technicians with the Society, and will formulate a specific policy at a later date. While accepting the need for well qualified support staff, PSNC is concerned about the effect on manpower, the requirements for continuing education and the possible conflict of interests if the Society represents technicians.

Pharmacogenomics – a new discipline

These days, a lot of energy is being expended on horizon scanning, not quite crystal ball gazing, but similar. Why is it necessary?

Historically, the NHS has been poor at identifying and planning for new interventions, whether drug treatments or surgical procedures. The demands made by government for high quality care and evidence-based medicine must be balanced with value for money and equity of access across the UK.

The NHS can no longer afford to adopt ineffective or unproven interventions. Equally, it cannot allow patchy or slow adoption of beneficial developments. One area of new drug development is that of acute stroke. However, the drug must be given within three or four hours after the event.

The public need to be educated to dial 999 instead of the GP. Once in the A&E department, the patient needs to be diagnosed immediately as to whether the cause is ischaemia or haemorrhage and treated accordingly.

A great breakthrough? Possibly, but the infrastructure to allow this to work is not there, and until it is, the benefits of such drugs will not be realised.

After identifying the new interventions, there is a need to prioritise

them. This may involve comparison between similar technologies (drugs), or different technologies (eg surgical or drugs). Evidence will be required.

How will this evidence be collected? One way is the formal Health Technology Assessment process, part of the NHS Research and Development strategy. It will provide good quality evidence, but takes over two years to complete. So what is due to hit the markets within the next two years? Look out for COX-2 inhibitors, more anti-HIV drugs and nitric oxide scavengers.

In the longer term, the identification of the human genome could revolutionise drug development. Efficacy will be accurately predicted, toxicity will be avoided, and doses will be individualised. Some drugs previously withdrawn may return, and new applications for older drugs may be identified.

Topical Reflections

Losec MUPS leaves me feeling like a muppet

Omeprazole is soon to lose its patent, so it came as no surprise to learn that AstraZeneca has developed a 'superior alternative' to the existing capsule formulation, and has launched new Losec MUPS tablets (*Script Specials*, October 2).

It has always been an understandable practice (but only from industry's point of view!) to extend the range of product options as drugs approach the end of their patent life. If the newly introduced variant possesses genuine therapeutic advantages, then it deserves to succeed, but with Losec MUPS AstraZeneca has seen the greater financial advantage of introducing the new, while at the same time discontinuing the old formulation.

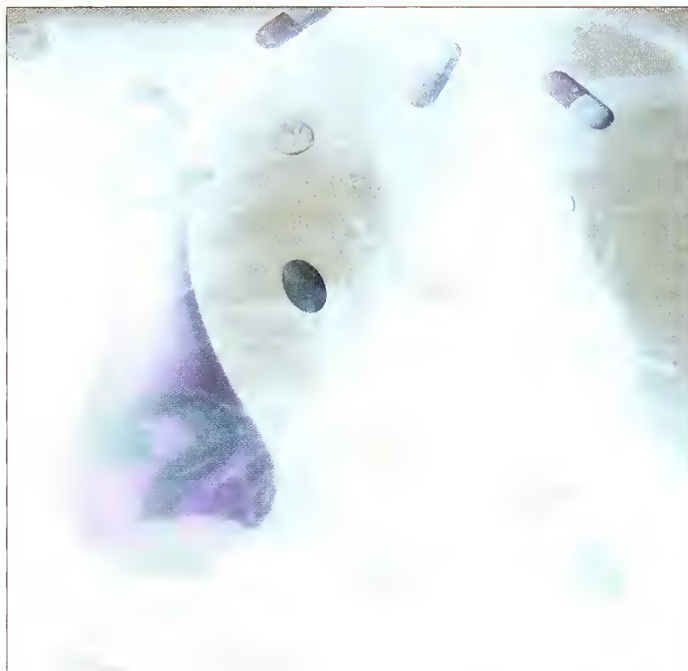
But I am left with problems that need clarifying. I assume that AstraZeneca's licence for UK Losec will be withdrawn once residual stocks have been used and replaced by the licence for MUPS, but parallel imported Losec and re-boxed omeprazole have PI licences held by the parallel importers.

These licences are not under the control of AstraZeneca, so can prescriptions issued for Losec or omeprazole capsules be satisfied by supplying the PI product and if so, on what basis will I be paid?

AstraZeneca is trying to manipulate the market to suit its own purposes, but the result could be much confusion for pharmacists, doctors and patients. Many patients prefer a capsule to a tablet and will request that the supply of their familiar medication be continued.

If the prescriber concurs and I am still able to legally supply the PI product, then that would also be best professional practice. And to actively change the patient to MUPS would not only be against their preference but would also be unwise, as other pharmacists may still be supplying capsules.

The probability of confusion is very real and all to the benefit of AstraZeneca. The company has discontinued the capsule formulation in order to make life difficult for



parallel importers and competitors entering the market on expiry of patent. However it has not thought through how prescribers and patients may respond, and left me the delightful task of managing the transitional chaos which this marketing ploy may cause.

NICE touch but what about the consequences?

The National Institute for Clinical Excellence has been quick off the mark in advising the health secretary that Glaxo Wellcome's new anti-flu drug, Relenza, should not be prescribed on FP10.

The reasons may be sound, and Glaxo Wellcome is lobbying hard for the decision to be reversed, and making all kind of veiled threats. If this filibuster fails, the company may have to invest even more resources in providing evidence of the benefit Relenza can provide to at-risk groups, as required by NICE.

However, this would still not guarantee Relenza's availability for FP10 prescribing because NICE not only assesses the efficacy of new drugs but also looks at their cost-effectiveness. This is a problem that does not just affect Glaxo Wellcome. It

potentially threatens the future of research and development of new drugs by the pharmaceutical industry.

Suddenly the goal posts have been moved. Now, not only do new drugs have to satisfy the Medicines Control Agency, but they also have to satisfy NICE. A licence may be granted, but a thumbs down from NICE on behalf of the NHS must effectively sound the death knell for any new drug.

It is the NHS market which, by almost guaranteeing a reasonable return on innovative drugs, has fuelled the growth of the British pharmaceutical industry. Drugs do cost the NHS, and therefore the taxpayer, a lot of money, but in return the pharmaceutical industry has become one of the country's largest exporters and employers.

The rejection of Relenza by NICE highlights possible future problems for the industry. I fear that the consequences of its decisions will only be presented in the narrow context of cost-effectiveness to the NHS, when the wider picture of economic benefit to the whole country should also be considered.

It may now be necessary to return to the drawing board, re-define the role of the MCA and perhaps introduce a new licensing system which takes account of both the requirements of the MCA and NICE, but which does not stifle at birth innovative research.

PIANA to visit Taunton

The next 'Over to you' roadshow will take place at the Somerset County Cricket Club in Taunton on October 20.

The Royal Pharmaceutical Society is plugging the roadshow series, backed up by feedback from the last show held at the British Pharmaceutical Conference in Cardiff last month. Two-thirds of attendees there said that the show exceeded their expectations, with a similar number saying there now wanted to become involved in the 'Pharmacy in a New Age' process.

Selected comments made about the Cardiff show included: "The roadshow was well run, slick and professional - this must become the norm for the pharmacy profession," and "I previously thought PIANA was a scheme dreamt up in the 'ivory tower' of Lambeth that had nothing to do with grass roots members. I now realise that all of our service innovations are PIANA initiatives."

The Taunton show kicks off at 7.15pm in the Colin Atkinson Suite at the SCCC with a light buffet.

SCC criticises PRODIGY skin guidance

The Skin Care Campaign has criticised dermatology guidelines for PRODIGY, the computer prescribing aid for GPs.

The alliance of patient groups, companies, and other organisations with an interest in skin health, says the guidance, "threatens good practice and quality of patient care by restricting prescribing choice". The Campaign has the professional support of the British Association of Dermatologists, the Primary Care Dermatology Society, the Health Education Authority and the Health and Safety Executive.

In treating skin conditions, clinical guidance must be broad, because of the wide variation in patient response to different preparations, claims the Campaign. "PRODIGY fails to offer any sort of range and, actually excludes some treatments that currently feature regularly in the GP's armoury of medicines to combat skin conditions."

While it is acknowledged that PRODIGY recommendations are not mandatory, the SCC claims that it will be a tool for disseminating guidance from the National Institute for Clinical Excellence. There is also a risk that primary care groups preparing formularies will rely on PRODIGY as their only official source of information.

NPA welcomes new Code of Ethics

The Board of the National Pharmaceutical Association has welcomed the overall shift in the new Code of Ethics away from obligations and onto responsibilities.

It added, however, that this needed to be reflected in the Code by use of the word 'should' rather than the word 'must'. The NPA, in its monthly Board report, suggests several amendments that it believes would improve the document.

It argues that the Code should not place greater responsibilities on pharmacist owners/superintendent pharmacists than on pharmacists providing professional services. Owners and superintendents should be allowed to rely on the professionalism of employee pharmacists.

The proposal to make pharmacists responsible for providing first aid would lead the public to expect a pharmacist - who might not be trained in emergency first aid - to assist in an emergency. This might result in a pharmacist doing more harm than good in an emergency.

Only allowing extemporaneous preparations in cases where no equivalent licensed product was available would be unpopular with pharmacists and would effectively end the extemporaneous preparation of methadone mixture, believes the NPA.

In a response to the RPSGB's discussion document on contraception and sexual health, the Board supported a role for pharmacists in the direct supply of emergency contraception. But this should only be as part of a comprehensive contraception/sexual health service that included counselling on the importance of safe sex and regular use of contraception. There was particular concern that women asking for PC4 would, by implication, have had unprotected sex and so could be at risk of contracting a sexually transmitted disease.

Issues that would have to be considered before pharmacists could be involved in direct supply include training and payment for pharmacists, accreditation, pharmacy premises, and whether there was public support for this role for community pharmacy. The Board also agreed that the Association should ask to be fully involved in any group established by the Society to develop such a role for community pharmacy.

In a meeting with the Department

of Health to discuss pharmacists' role in smoking cessation service, the NPA expressed its disappointment at the deregulation of nicotine 2mg gum. The DoH opinion was that NRT has a high safety profile and does not see a problem with wider availability. But it did say that further deregulation of NRT products was unlikely.

A further meeting will be held in five to six months' time, at which the NPA will update the DoH on the progress of pharmacy-based smoking cessation activities.

The Royal Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain has asked the NPA for its thoughts on what research is needed into pharmacy manpower for a report it is commissioning.

The NPA identified three areas in which research was needed. There is a need to investigate the problems employers are having in recruiting pharmacy managers and locums. There is also a need for a better understanding of the community pharmacy sector. This should include a reassessment of standard opening hours and an analysis of the different ways in which pharmacists can be employed in retail. Another aim should be to improve understanding of the community pharmacy workforce.

The RPSGB's audit fellow, David Pruce, made a presentation to the Board in which he outlined the key points of the Society's draft policy paper on clinical governance - 'Achieving excellence in pharmacy through clinical governance'.

He outlined how the Society envisaged clinical governance operating within pharmacy, including a role for a clinical governance 'lead' pharmacist within each health authority. He also explained that a Society working group would be established to develop a set of performance indicators for community pharmacists covering areas such as CPD, audit, PMRs, and procedures.

The Society's next steps in this area would be to develop performance indicators, give guidance to and support for lead pharmacists in clinical governance, and investigate long-term solutions to the problem of poor record keeping.

Customs and Excise have clarified the position regarding the VAT status of medicines and aids supplied on prescription to patients in hospitals or nursing homes.

Customs had introduced a VAT Order in January 1997 which meant that prescriptions intended for patients in hospitals or nursing homes, which had previously been zero-rated, would now attract standard rate VAT. The implementation of this order was delayed after pharmacy organisations pointed out difficulties it would cause for pharmacists.

Customs has now resolved pharmacy's difficulties. Now, any 'primary care' drugs prescribed by an NHS GP and dispensed by a community pharmacist remain zero-rated, even when the patient is resident in a nursing home or happens to be in hospital for the treatment of a different condition. Zero rating would not, however, apply to drugs prescribed by a GP (whether NHS or private) and dispensed by a retail pharmacist, if the drugs were intended to be used as part of a patient's treatment provided by the institution. Such drugs would form part of the exempt charge for care and would thus be outside the scope of VAT if supplied by an NHS institution.

Pharmacy organisations had also highlighted that subjecting private prescriptions to standard rate VAT would disadvantage members who dispensed a significant amount of private prescriptions for private hospitals. Customs and Excise had, therefore, proposed that private prescriptions for items that do not form part of the package of care provided by a hospital or nursing home, would continue to attract zero-rated VAT status. The Association will be issuing appropriate advice to members.

The NPA responded to a request from the Low Pay Commission on the impact of the National Minimum Wage on community pharmacy. It said that there had been an impact, but it was too early to calculate the exact financial effect.

However, many pharmacy owners - particularly those in the independent sector who had used the National Joint Industrial Council agreement to determine wage levels - would face much higher wage costs.

The impact of these increased costs would result in pharmacist employers having to consider reducing staff and/or hours, and would prejudice their ability to invest in staff training. The NPA requested that any further increases to the NMW be made on an inflationary basis.

Synvisc is indicated for osteoarthritis of the knee and presents an alternative approach to using non-steroidal anti-inflammatory therapy. The hyaluronan derivative can also be used in people awaiting surgery or where an operation is delayed or avoided, for example, where a patient is too young or too old to have a total knee replacement.

Therapy involves a course of three intra-articular injections into the knee cavity. The injections are given once a week and the course may be repeated, with a minimum interval period of four weeks. Only six injections are permitted in any six month period. Synvisc can be administered by a GP trained in intra-articular administra-

tion, or by an orthopaedic or rheumatology specialist.

In trials, Synvisc was shown to relieve the pain and immobility associated with osteoarthritis of the knee. Over 75 per cent of patients treated with a course of Synvisc reported feeling 'better' or 'much better', with symptoms relieved for an average of eight months.

Because Synvisc is a non-systemic formulation, it has been classified as a medical device instead of a medicinal product. Synvisc has already been available in the UK privately and on a limited basis in some NHS hospitals. Synvisc has a basic NHS price of £205 for 3x2ml pre-filled glass syringes.

Hyaluronan is normally synthesized by the the synovium to form part of the synovial fluid. Its lubricant and shock-absorbing properties help protect against joint damage.

Strefen analgesic lozenges

Cardiovascular benefits of HRT queried

Claims surrounding the benefits of hormone replacement therapy in cardiovascular disease may be premature, says a study in this week's *British Medical Journal*.

Many retrospective studies have indicated that HRT reduces the risk of cardiovascular disease, but Swedish researchers believe the benefits seen may be because the women on HRT are already at lower risk of the disease.

In their prospective population study, some 1,201 women were studied over 24 years. HRT use was noted and confounding factors for cardiovascular disease, such as blood pressure,

body mass index, smoking and socio-economic group, were measured. They found 14.9 per cent of women had used HRT at some point in that period. Before these women had started HRT, they had significantly lower blood pressure, were less obese and were in a higher socio-economic group than women who did use HRT.

The authors conclude that women who are likely to use HRT represent a healthier cohort than women who remain untreated, thus more controlled studies are needed before recommending HRT for prophylactic use in women with risk factors for CVD.

A week in the life of ...

A senior pharmacy manager, and a veteran as far as the British Pharmaceutical Conference is concerned, puts this year's event into perspective

The British Pharmaceutical Conference is over for another year. Although last year in Eastbourne was not rated one of the best, a record number of people attended this year in Cardiff.

So what did they get out of their week, and perhaps more to the point, does a week-long Conference serve any particular purpose in these days of instant communication?

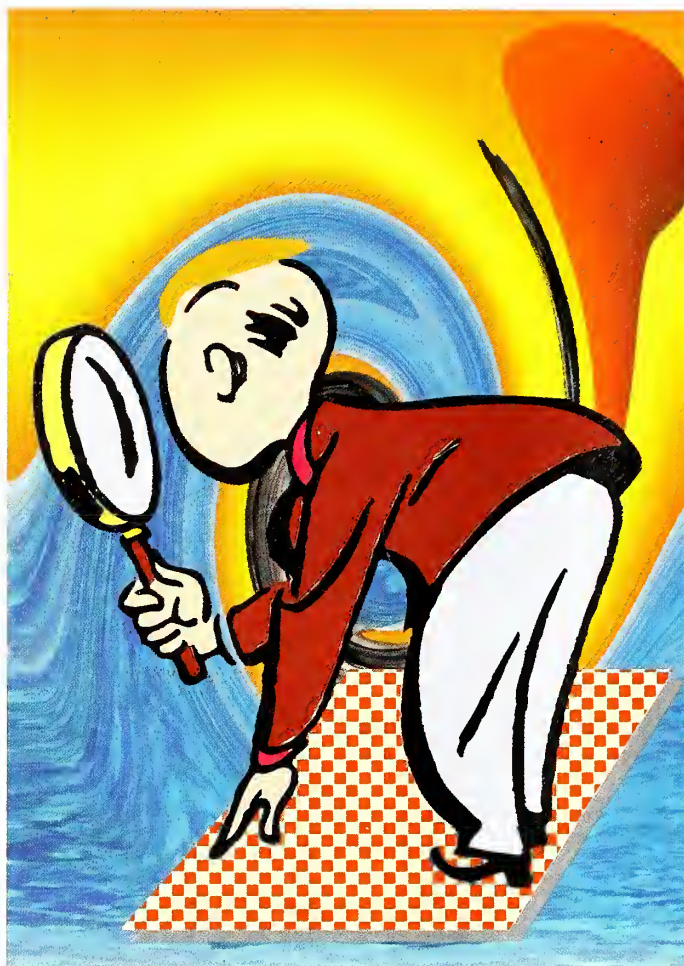
For a start, delegates were treated to a stirring speech from the Society's president, Christine Glover (and, unusually, a modestly funny one, too, at the formal dinner on Tuesday). Having demonstrated her penchant for the dramatic by resigning her seat on Council in 1998 then winning it back this year, Mrs Glover told delegates that the Society was full of positive energy which needed to be backed by enthusiastic pharmacists at all levels.

Unfortunately, the Conference was also the venue for a somewhat low-key launch of a consultation on the new Code of Ethics which, running to some nine pages of tight script in the Society's official organ, contains enough 'do's' and 'don'ts' to dampen the enthusiasm of any entrepreneurial pharmacist or manager.

It will also not be a Code of Ethics, since members of the profession have been invited to suggest what it should be called, with a magnum of champagne as first prize.

It seems everything is a quiz these days, and so one cannot blame the Society for wanting to jump on the bandwagon by asking the audience - although asking pharmacists to dream up something from scratch could be asking for trouble. It would definitely have been easier to give us a 50:50 ... and presumably if they don't like the audience's answer they will phone a friend.

The Society also does not appear to be full of enthusiastic pharmacists



when it comes to admitting that pharmacy owners and health service managers might be having a little difficulty recruiting pharmacists at the moment.

Was it fair comment by the delegate who suggested that the patronising attitude of some of the contributors to the debate might have something to do with any personal recruitment difficulties, when women are now in the majority at the sharp end?

Government insight?

Delegates were, as usual, treated to one of those neutral government statements, on this occasion from Jane Hutt, the health minister in the new Welsh Assembly. True, the differences in structure and organisation in Wales - the involvement of a pharmacist on every Local Health Group in Wales is one step up on England - provides a better opportunity for pharmacy involvement in the nitty-gritty of the NHS.

But what most pharmacists present wanted to hear was some insight into the fabled community pharmacy strategy that Frank 'Santa' Dobson promised over a year ago. For details of progress there we had to wait for

NHS chief executive Sir Alan Langlands to comment in an excellent session on Wednesday that, while six months ago the strategy document had been "imminent", it was now "very imminent".

But, then again, let's give Frank and Alan the benefit of the doubt. In this era of 'joined up' government, it may well be the case that those other groups with an interest, like the doctors and the nurses, need to be squared before any grand announcement of where the Government wants to see pharmacy headed.

Both the Royal College of General Practitioners and the Royal College of Nursing were present at the 'round table' meeting last September. At the Conference, there was enough in the 'New Age' roadshow multimedia presentation to suggest that these professional groups are prepared to view pharmacists as positive allies in delivering healthcare.

If the opening session was pretty much the usual, the undoubted successes of the week were the celebrity-led panel discussions. In the Community Pharmacists Group breakfast meeting, Welsh media

celebrity Vincent Kane kept the panel in order and the discussion flowing.

Even better, Crimewatch's Nick Ross demonstrated the value of employing professionals to do a professional job in the Wednesday session with, among others, Sir Alan Langlands and Jim Johnson from the Joint Consultants Committee. He handled the debate expertly, challenging the participants frequently in true 'Today' programme style, but also displaying a real grasp of the issues in many aspects of healthcare.

As the discussion inevitably turned to medicines management, I would rather Mr Ross hadn't asked for a show of hands of how many pharmacists felt they needed extra training for that kind of professional work. The forest of hands that grew in response showed a profession either significantly lacking in confidence in its own ability or completely missing the point.

That aside, it is a rare thing indeed for an all-morning Conference session in recent years to have seemed too short! More, please.

The Community Pharmacy Group's soapbox idea was also one which might be developed. Although it was surely no accident that Superdrug chose the previous weekend to provide everyone with its food for thought on contract limitation, pharmacy general manager Barry Simner appeared keen to add a personal justification from the soapbox, and the NPA's John D'Arcy was similarly ready with a rebuttal.

Disappointing delivery

Overall, however, a week may be a little too long and too busy. We seem capable of writing a good session title, but the delivery often disappoints. Something also has to be done about the exhibition, which was a shadow of previous years. Pity the exhibitors by day three! Maybe next year's experimental link with a managed show/careers fair will be more successful.

The consultation exercise following the Eastbourne debacle seems to have created a BPC moving in the right direction. The experiment of encouraging community pharmacists to attend on one day devoted to their interests should certainly be persevered with. *C&D* readers should look out for a similar programme format next year and make the effort for the day.

Room for consulting

Carmel M Hughes describes pharmacy services to nursing homes in the US and suggests how the UK could adopt this model of care. A lecturer in pharmacy practice at the School of Pharmacy, The Queen's University of Belfast, Dr Hughes is undertaking a one-year research fellowship in the US

Consultant pharmacy has become almost synonymous with nursing homes in the US, largely because of the legislation governing nursing home care and the requirement for pharmacists to review medication. While consultant pharmacy has existed for almost 30 years, a consultant pharmacist today is defined as a practitioner who provides services to long-term care facilities on a contractual basis.

Development

Consultant pharmacy developed from community pharmacy practice. Community pharmacists supplied medication to nursing homes, with some pharmacists offering more than basic dispensing. Legislation in 1965 to improve adverse conditions in US nursing homes gave added impetus to the consultant pharmacist role.

With the introduction of Medicare and Medicaid programmes (which reimbursed care in nursing homes), the federal government became closely involved in regulating nursing homes in an attempt to improve the quality of care.

Regulations were developed and implemented through the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA).

The first pharmacy regulations were concerned with labelling, storage, security and accountability,

To help standardisation of care, a 'minimum data set' looks at:

- the number of medications used in the previous seven days
- new medications started in the previous 90 days
- the number of days in the previous seven on which the resident received any injections
- the number of days the resident received an antipsychotic, anxiolytic, antidepressant, hypnotic or diuretic medication.

DRR reviews must be carried out monthly or quarterly by a consultant pharmacist. At the least, the DRR should evaluate the appropriateness of, and response to, each patient's drug therapy. The

pharmacist must report any irregularities to the attending doctor and director of nursing. They are not required to agree with the pharmacist's report, nor are they required to provide a rationale for their acceptance or rejection. But they are required to act on it.

For the first time, specific justification was required to prescribe psychoactive drugs. The regulations state that "the resident has the right to be free from any chemical restraints imposed for purposes of discipline or convenience and not required to treat the resident's medical symptoms".

Further regulations provide specific guidance on the use of unnecessary drugs and antipsychotics. An unnecessary drug is broadly defined as one used in excessive dose, for excessive duration, without adequate indication for its use or in the presence of adverse consequences that indicate the dose should be reduced or

and represented a landmark by raising the profile of pharmacists in nursing home care.

The American Society of Consultant Pharmacists (ASCP) was formed in 1969 to develop and promote medication policies and procedures and performance standards specific to pharmacy practice in long-term care settings. From an original group of 100, the ASCP membership now approaches 7,000.

Despite the early regulations, care in nursing homes still gave cause for concern. In 1974, revised regulations required a drug regimen review (DRR) in nursing homes at least monthly by a licensed pharmacist. Later legislation required this review

in intermediate care facilities which did not provide 24-hour nursing care.

One of the recommendations in the Institute of Medicine's report in 1986 was that "each resident is to receive high-quality care to meet individual physical, mental and psychosocial needs".

Further legislation was implemented in 1991 under the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1987 (OBRA 87). These regulations require a comprehensive assessment of the resident's needs, encompassing medical, nutritional, cognitive, functional and psychosocial status, sensory and physical impairments, rehabilitation and discharge potential, as well as drug therapy.

discontinued. For example, specified long-acting benzodiazepines should not be used unless an attempt with a shorter-acting drug has failed (Table 1). Exceptions are made for diazepam in neuromuscular disorders or long-acting benzodiazepines used to withdraw patients from shorter-acting drugs.

Further guidance is given on the use of short-acting benzodiazepines and other anxiolytic/sedative drugs, drugs for sleep induction (largely hypnotics) and miscellaneous agents such as barbiturates. Drugs such as amobarbital and secobarbital should not be started in any dose for any resident and patients already receiving them should undergo gradual dose reduction.

The regulations provide a wealth of information on the effective use of antipsychotics including guidance on dosage levels and monitoring for side effects. The facility must ensure that residents who have not used antipsychotic drugs are not given them unless necessary to treat a specific condition as diagnosed and documented in the clinical record. Patients who receive these drugs should undergo gradual dose reductions and behavioural interventions (unless clinically contraindicated) with a view to discontinuation. The medical conditions of note are detailed in Tables 2 and 3. The point of this regulation is that the use of psychoactive medication must be justified and documented, so it can still be prescribed if there is clinical need.

Employers

Many consultant pharmacists are now employed by large provider/consultant companies in the US. These large organisations have emerged through the acquisition of smaller groups of pharmacies which had been providing services to nursing homes and other forms of long-term care. Consolidation has resulted in a limited number of large provider organisations being responsible for delivering pharmaceutical care to most nursing home residents. Such provider/consulting groups are able to centralise purchasing which reduces drug costs. They also implement wide-ranging formularies and disease management programmes.

The provider side is concerned with the preparation and delivery of medicines – the more traditional activities identified with pharmacy. Consultant pharmacists provide wide-ranging services including the required drug regimen review, infection control, quality assurance and geriatric clinical research. Within

these organisations, a pharmacist will be associated with either the provider side or the consulting service.

Both provider and consultant services may be offered by the same company or undertaken separately. The separation of provider and consultant services is controversial. Some feel separation results in communication problems between the consultant and provider, while others feel that complete separation eliminates any perceived conflict of interest. There is potential conflict in the consultant's obligation to recommend the most cost-effective and therapeutically appropriate drug regimen for nursing home patients and the fact that the dispensing pharmacy's revenue is directly related to the number of prescriptions dispensed.

HCFA has developed standards to assist state agency surveyors in assessing the quality of DRR and in enforcing its performance. The present standards will be replaced in the near future by those developed by Beers (1997). State boards of pharmacy also monitor and enforce regulations, and the pharmacist is encouraged to practise according to guidelines issued by the ASCP.

Consultant pharmacy activities are not just confined to nursing homes but are offered in a wide variety of settings, including adult day care. Consulting services are also being offered to elderly people living independently in the community.

The value

Phase I results of the Fleetwood project, a research project supported by the ASCP, has shown that consultant activities are effective in nursing homes. Bootman et al (1997) estimated that the cost of drug-related morbidity and mortality with the services of consultant pharmacists was \$4 billion compared with \$7.6bn without these services. Phase II will seek to compare outcomes associated with retrospective DRR, with prospective DRR and formalised pharmaceutical care planning in elderly patients at high risk from medication-related problems. Phase III will be a definitive five-year study, carried out in nursing homes and assisted living facilities.

Qualifications

The only formal requirement needed to become a consultant pharmacist is a current pharmacy licence. Some states require completion of a specified continuing education programme, completion of a specified number of hours of pharmacy continuing education and/or successful completion of a qualifying exam. The ASCP, through its Research and Education Foundation, offers competitive traineeships in a range of topics such as Parkinson's disease,

HIV/AIDS, congestive heart failure, osteoporosis, wound care and Alzheimer's disease/dementia. An ASCP Commission in Geriatric Pharmacy oversees a certification programme in geriatric pharmacy practice. Successful completion of the programme and examination results in the award of Certificate in Geriatric Pharmacy (CGP).

Lessons for the UK

Clearly, the organisation and delivery of pharmaceutical services to nursing homes and other long-term care environments in the US differs from that in the UK. Remuneration for drugs differs and there are increasing pressures to reduce drug costs further.

Consultant pharmacy is generally perceived as a clinical speciality, and the separation of provider activities from clinical/consulting activities is another marked contrast to the current UK model of care. Perhaps most importantly, the UK does not have legislation which demands medication review by a pharmacist and justification of prescribing decisions.

At present the community pharmacist's involvement in clinical services to nursing homes is limited. As pharmacists are remunerated for the number of items they dispense, there is little incentive to rationalise medication. The current payment for providing advice to homes would not compensate for losses incurred through reduced dispensing.

It may be that a pharmacist, independent from the supply function, would be most suited to deliver a consulting/clinical service. Such a practitioner may evolve from GP practice pharmacists, some of whom already provide medication review services to nursing home patients. However, not all practices have such pharmacists and such a service may seem to be exclusive.

Although pharmacists may see an extension of services and responsibility to be highly desirable, the views of home managers and other healthcare professionals should also be sought. With discussion, it may be possible to develop a strategy which meets all professional and patient-related needs.

Long-term care is becoming a major issue in UK health policy, particularly regarding funding. A recent Royal Commission recommended a division between living costs and care costs for residents, with the government paying for the latter. Clearly, quality of care and prescribing must also be considered. The Royal College of Physicians (1997) has commended the role of community pharmacists in medicines management as part of its report on 'Medication for Older People'.

- Anxiety
- Depression
- Insomnia
- Unsociability
- Indifference to surroundings
- Fidgeting
- Nervousness
- Unco-operativeness
- Agitated behaviours which do not represent danger to the resident or others

To meet the philosophy of pharmaceutical care, community pharmacists will need to expand their activities in nursing homes. The US model is something from which we can learn and, perhaps by selecting those elements which are most adaptable to the UK, we can start to move some way towards a more holistic approach of care to a highly vulnerable group.

When your average prescription customer is spending only £0.40 in your pharmacy, drastic changes are needed. **John Kerry** reports

Turning pennies into pounds

This pharmacist opened his outlet in the late 1980s, in time to beat the deadline that would have prevented him from setting up a pharmacy anywhere he wanted. [The new system controlling entry into the pharmacy list was introduced in 1987.]

It was not a well planned, high budget entry, more of an opportunist gamble, using low cost fittings and signage and virtually no alteration to the existing shop.

Mr S' pharmacy is in a small, West Country market town that most of us would drive through without stopping. Yes, it has a centre of sorts, the local authority planners appear to have an 'anything goes' attitude towards new retail development, so the pretty market square is lost in a jungle of square glass and concrete 1960s horrors that Prince Charles would have had bulldozed away decades ago.

Eight GPs built their own health centre three-quarters of a mile away from the centre. The two town centre pharmacy multiples hardly noticed any difference, only the patients were put out. It was a long way to go to get a script - and it rains a lot here.

Mr S took the main road corner shop, 100 yards from the new health centre, about the same time that the only other pharmacist closed up shop. As the latter was on the other side of town, the GPs' move had virtually finished him. The new pharmacy took off almost immediately. Not surprisingly, patients pounced on the opportunity to have their scripts filled, without a trudge to the town centre. The two multiples in town are better lit, better stocked and have much more room to browse, but they are in the wrong place.

According to Mr S, neither of the multiples' stores have a clue how well his pharmacy is doing. It's on the small side, unattractive and very inexpensively fitted. They will have noticed an insidious loss in script numbers over the past decade, but neither would guess that Mr S' shop is dispensing 100,000 items a year, more than both of them put together.

Because his business has been frantic almost from the word go, Mr S hasn't had time or even the need to stop, take stock of the situation and

plan for the future. This pharmacy has grown without a master plan and without a defined direction. Some would say "who cares, so long as it keeps going and is profitable?"

However, anxieties are surfacing in Mr S' mind. Eighty-seven per cent of his £1m annual turnover is NHS and 78 per cent of the counter is for P or GSL medicines. This leaves a mere £30,000 of other counter sales. With 6,000 patients walking through his door each month, that's an average purchase of £0.40 each. So it's the same old story that every small independent tells, except it's more compelling in this case.

Not only is Mr S ruing 12 years of missed sales opportunities and profits, he now finds himself relying too heavily for income on a sector whose profits he cannot control. And these profits are falling every year.

This is neither a well fitted, well merchandised nor attractive shop internally. Two-thirds of the fittings are merchandised with non-medicines

and yield £600 per week. The other third is stocked with medicines, with a weekly turnover of £2,000. It makes little sense, but it is not atypical for a front shop to be left to run itself.

Mr S wants more sales of non-medicines from his thousands of loyal patients and customers. Not only because he should, but also because script profits are slipping and he believes his counter medicine sales will be hit hard if the proposal to remove resale price maintenance is enforced.

Mr S's objective seems possible in theory but, in reality, it will be quite a task. He has virtually ignored that feature and his shop does not 'look the business', unlike his well organised and spacious multiple opposition. His customers buy their toiletries, baby care and hair care products in the town centre and it would be difficult to change their buying habits. But it's worth a try.

Chasing more counter sales is an objective of most independent

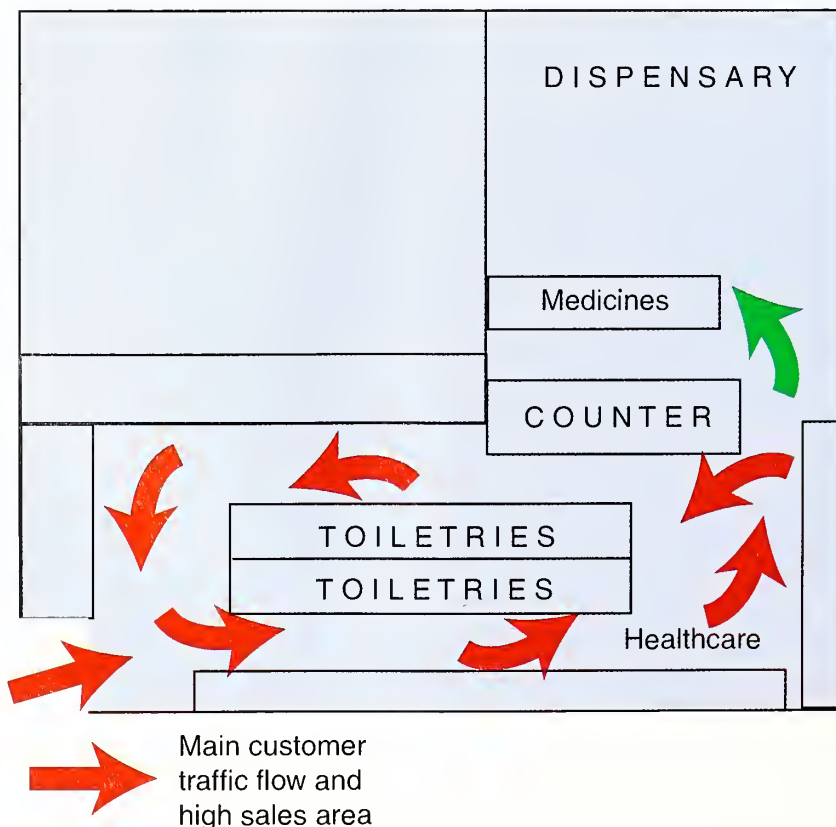
pharmacists. Mr S has another problem, or perhaps opportunity, to face. It's one that puts his low counter sales in second place. This sleepy market town of 15,000 souls is about to have a rude awakening. Around 6,000 new homes for 15,000 new inhabitants are to be built over the next three years on the same side of the town as Mr S's pharmacy.

A town poorly designed to serve the existing inhabitants will not cope with double that number. The health centre is already bursting at the seams and Mr S's pharmacy would be very hard pushed to handle another 2,000-3,000 items per month. As the new housing development starts less than a mile from his pharmacy's threshold, he can expect more scripts from the patients who either pass his main road shop or visit the health centre.

It certainly won't be that simple. Mr S isn't the only opportunist in his

region and 30,000 people means rich pickings for edge-of-town superstores, multiples and, of course, a new GP practice. Naturally, the existing surgery would like to accommodate the new GPs, but there isn't room. They could relocate to a much bigger building, but there's a tiny market for slightly soiled health centres in one of the seedier parts of a small market town.

Mr S and all of the other town centre retailers will have to accept that there are some traumatic times ahead. Serious competition will move in to serve the newcomers. Doubtless there will be an edge-of-town superstore, possibly a modest or bigger retail park, with free parking, cheap petrol and spacious, modern shops to lure customers away from the High Street. Mr S has not seen or heard of any retail development. Observing what the local planners have achieved already, perhaps there aren't any - yet. Once one of the big name store developers finds out about the opportunity, there soon will be. GPs looking for a chance to build a new practice, will find this situation tempting.

Recommendations

Mr S has two strategies to consider. First of all, he needs a plan to develop the counter sales of his high medical turnover pharmacy. He knows this won't be easy and he also knows that

whatever he does, he needs to protect his excellent prescription business.

The new population will want a convenient pharmacy, not one more than a mile away. In fact, there is the potential for two. Either or both could take business from Mr S. The most sensible strategy for him to consider would be to open a branch pharmacy to serve the new population.

Exterior

- New fascia signs - two required for this corner site. Emphasis on 'chemist' or 'pharmacy' rather than the business name, which means nothing in this town - it is not Mr S' name either.
- Illuminated cantilever 'green cross' sign.
- Window graphics and lettering.

All of the above should at least have a moderate specification to enhance the outlet's appearance.

Interior

- The front shop is too small because there is a stock room on the ground floor that could be made into a dispensary. The existing dispensary converted to retail would add 50 per cent to the shop space, and would create a dreaded 'L' shaped shop. But with careful management this should not be too much of a problem.
- The shop's fittings need to be re-planned and replaced. They've served their time and a business of this size deserves better.
- Mr S wants to develop counter sales, but has neither the time, expertise or inclination to do so

himself. Because the potential is high and because it is important, he should invest in an experienced retail manager, who is familiar with all front shop skills. Lifting sales from £0.40 per customer to, say, £1 would be a full-time job. But if they succeed, it will have been worth the gamble.

Other aspects to improve are:

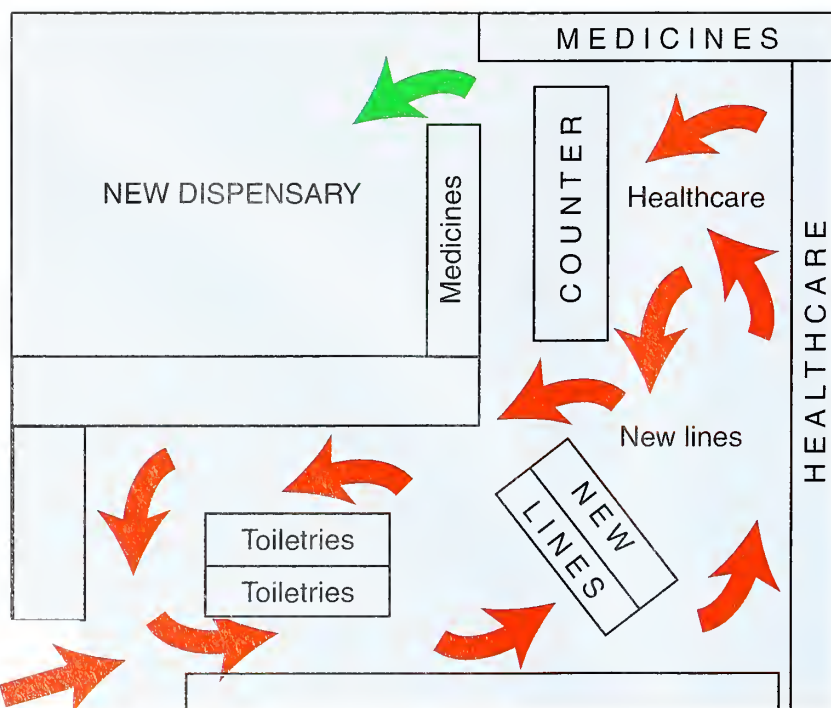
- purchasing
- stock rationalisation and category management
- merchandising
- promotions
- window display
- pricing
- staff training.

A potential new layout for the proposed L-shape front shop can be seen (see diagram), but much will depend on the influence of shop planners and any retail management.

This is a surprisingly successful business, wrapped in an extremely modest exterior. Even Mr S has been surprised and, as a result of the wonderful growth over the past 12 years, he has had little time to concentrate on the front shop. Now he is concerned and needs to spend more time and money on it to both attract new customers and to sell more to his patients. He should also consider opening a branch shop in the new housing development.

He could do nothing. He has worked hard to build this business and has earned the loyalty and friendship of the local population. It has paid off and Mr S enjoys a good lifestyle. But nothing lasts forever.

Some people would have you believe everyone in the industrialised nations suffers from some form of food intolerance. Statistically, this is not true.

If strict definitions of allergy are used, the number of sufferers is quite small. A study carried out in Wycombe Health Authority showed that 20 per cent of people thought they suffered from food intolerance. But only between 1.4 and 1.6 per cent of individuals showed a demonstrable reaction to foods. These are the true food allergy sufferers.

Food allergy

A true food allergy occurs when the immune system responds to a food by producing large quantities of IgE (Immunoglobulin E). Symptoms include:

- swollen lips and tongue
- itchy throat
- urticaria
- nausea
- explosive vomiting
- colic
- swollen abdomen
- diarrhoea
- anaphylaxis.

Food allergies can also trigger asthma attacks and/or allergic rhinitis (hay fever symptoms).

All of the following foods are known to cause allergic reactions:

- cows' milk
- eggs, especially the white
- cereals: wheat, oats, barley and other grains - coeliac disease is sensitivity to gluten, which is found in wheat, oats and rye
- fish and shellfish
- **fruit and vegetables especially:**
- apples
- pears
- peaches
- cherries
- bananas
- kiwi fruits
- **nuts including:**
- brazil nuts
- walnuts
- almonds
- hazel nuts
- pecans
- cashew nuts
- peanuts - these are not true nuts, but a member of the legume family that includes peas and beans.

Alcohol can induce symptoms in many people: it is a vasodilator and can cause flushing, especially in fair skinned people. Some types of alcohol can trigger asthma and rhinitis, usually because they contain high levels of sulphur dioxide and histamine. Sulphur dioxide is naturally present in some wines, but is also added as a preservative. All wines contain some histamine, but some Italian wines contain very large

Food allergy and food intolerance are two distinct conditions, but there is still confusion among sufferers.

Siobhan Hamilton, allergy nurse at the Greenwich Natural Health Centre, explains the difference

amounts. The body produces histamine when allergic reactions occur, but ingesting large quantities can induce symptoms in only mildly allergic persons.

All of these foods and others will cause symptoms from between a few seconds to 30 minutes following ingestion of the relevant food.

Reactions are usually drastic and potentially fatal if not treated quickly. The treatment of choice is dependent on symptoms but can include:

- antihistamines for mild symptoms
- bronchodilators for asthma symptoms
- injectable adrenaline for severe or anaphylactic reactions.

All cases of anaphylaxis and severe asthma should be treated by a visit to the nearest accident and emergency department, if necessary by ambulance.

Food intolerance

Food intolerance is a more imprecise condition and diagnosis can be difficult. It is thought to affect 15 to 20 per cent of the population. Although not life threatening, symptoms can be very distressing and triggers are frequently difficult to identify. Typical examples of food intolerance include irritable bowel syndrome, migraine and lactose intolerance.

The mechanism of food intolerance is poorly understood. Some clinicians believe it may be due to 'leaky gut syndrome', where an abnormal intestine allows larger than usual molecules of food to leak into the blood stream and travel to affect other parts of the body. Food additives, colourings, dyes and preservatives are associated with a range of symptoms, including hyperactivity. Symptoms of intolerance can be slow to appear, ranging from a couple of hours to 72 hours after eating.

Diagnosis can be problematic and although there are a range of tests available, including Vega testing, kinesiology and blood tests, these have not been shown to be very accurate. As with many other conditions, there is little substitute for a good clinical history with a qualified practitioner. The gold standard for proving intolerance is the elimination diet, which should be undertaken under the supervision of a state registered dietician, preferably one with experience of food intolerance.

Diagnosis through an elimination diet is a slow process and involves keeping a diary and noting symptoms caused by foods. A limited diet is taken for a period of days, single foods are then reintroduced into the diet every two to three days and a careful check is kept for symptoms. Once a suspect food has been identified, then it must be avoided. Some sufferers find that after a period of avoidance the food can be reintroduced into the diet, but usually in small quantities and infrequently. Identifying a problem food is reassuring and enables the sufferer to manage the condition.

Irritable bowels

Although IBS is a very common condition and frequently considered inconsequential, it can seriously disrupt the lives of sufferers. It is thought to affect 25 per cent of the population at some stage in their lives. Its cause is unknown but altered bowel movements, such as diarrhoea

constipation, bloating and pain are common symptoms. Diagnosis is difficult, as doctors have to exclude other diseases with a full and careful clinical history.

● Symptoms

There are two main types of IBS: spastic colon and functional diarrhoea. Spastic colon causes colicky pain in the abdomen and constipation, which typically leads to passing 'rabbit-like' pellet stools. The pain can affect any part of the abdomen, but is often on the left side.

Functional diarrhoea causes attacks of diarrhoea mostly in the morning. These attacks may be explosive and urgent - it is not uncommon for a shopping expedition to be planned around which stores have toilets, so that embarrassing accidents are avoided.

Other symptoms of IBS include discomfort and bloating after eating food.

● Treatment

Treatment is symptomatic and includes drugs such as antidiarrhoeal agents like loperamide. Bulking agents including bran and fibre, and antispasmodic treatments such as buscopan and peppermint oil. Diet is considered to play a very large part in IBS, but it is not always a significant cause of symptoms.

Constipation can be helped with regular meal patterns, plenty of fluids - especially water - and a high fibre diet. Some sufferers cannot tolerate bran, but find fruit and vegetable fibre an acceptable alternative.

Diarrhoea is often lifestyle related, as in busy people missing meals and then eating a large meal late at night. Fluid intake can be a major factor; excessive quantities of fluids can lead to diarrhoea because the bowel cannot deal with the volume of drink. Sorbitol, which is used in some diabetic and diet products, can induce symptoms in some sensitive systems.

Bloating can either be a main symptom or a factor along with either diarrhoea or constipation. Some foods can cause excessive wind. Although IBS sufferers do not produce any more wind than the average person, it does seem to linger and, if trapped in the gut, can cause pain. Common wind causing foods include onions, artichokes, baked beans, lentils, cabbage, brussel sprouts, under-ripe bananas, cold potato salad and pasta which is cooked and then cooled for salad.

Mechanical factors may exacerbate symptoms - eating too fast, talking while eating so gulping down excessive air. If these are factors, then slowing down and keeping conversation until after the meal may reduce symptoms.

Lactose intolerance

Lactase is the enzyme which helps the gut digest milk products. Lactose

is milk sugar, and low levels of lactase cause intolerance. There are numerous reasons for this happening, including genetic factors and infection.

Some races do not ingest any dairy products once weaning is complete and their lactase levels markedly decrease; therefore, ingestion of dairy products will induce strong symptoms including diarrhoea, vomiting and pain.

Food poisoning or intestinal parasites like Giardia can cause the gut to reject dairy products, however this is usually self-limiting and dairy products can be slowly re-introduced once symptoms have stopped, following treatment or at the end of a self-limiting bout of illness.

Migraine

Migraine is another common condition, which can severely affect the quality of life: about 10 per cent of sufferers will have symptoms that are precipitated by foods. These include alcohol, where different drinks affect different people; some people can drink white wine but not red, some can only tolerate champagne! Chocolate is a classic migraine trigger, even small quantities can cause symptoms.

Cheese is another well-known trigger and mature cheeses such as Brie, Camembert and Stilton are more likely to induce symptoms in sensitive individuals. Citrus fruits and unripe green apples are potential triggers, as are fried and fatty foods, onions, pork, pickled herring and Marmite.

Blood sugar levels are a significant factor in migraine attacks and eating like a diabetic with small regular meals can significantly reduce the number of attacks. Cravings for quick fix foods like chocolate may be the body's way of trying to avert an attack. High carbohydrate foods are a better option for maintaining blood sugar levels.

Intolerance is a wide-ranging subject and diagnosis is often difficult. However, the use of a food and drink diary can help establish probable triggers.

If this leads to the avoidance of one food such as chocolate or red wine, it is merely inconvenient, if large numbers of foods are to be avoided, this can severely limit one's diet, and advice should be sought from a dietician. Such a referral can be made by a GP and is especially important for children and young adults.

Irritable bowel syndrome is still under-treated over the counter.

Manufacturers are now devising their own strategies to bring in new users

As many as one in five people in the UK suffer from IBS symptoms. IBS remains an 'untapped' market for pharmacy, despite the availability of POM to P switched medicines, because up to 70 per cent of sufferers are thought not to be treating their condition.

Symptoms include lower abdominal pain, bloating, excess wind, diarrhoea and/or constipation.

Chefaro, maker of Equilon, thinks it knows the answer. Embarrassment is one factor often overlooked.

Consumers shy away from discussing their symptoms with the pharmacist and consequently turn to self-selected GSL remedies.

Another reason is ignorance about their condition - sufferers do not recognise their symptoms as IBS and so do not treat it appropriately. However, the most important reason for non-treatment, as far as Chefaro is concerned, is the high average rsp of IBS products.

In a recent survey by Chefaro, 63 per cent of pharmacists agreed that over the counter IBS medicines were

priced too close to the prescription charge. In addition, the average IBS pack is up to £1.50 more expensive than for other GI areas. Chefaro believes that the high price point of OTC products for IBS does not encourage sufferers to purchase the correct treatment for their symptoms.

With this in mind, the company has decided to reduce the price of Equilon from £4.99 to £3.59 (effective from October 1). Caspar van Dongen, general manager of Chefaro UK, says: "Equilon is committed to driving category growth and we believe that adjusting the rsp of Equilon will give the IBS market the impulse to turn current non-OTC treaters into treaters."

Chefaro also plans to support the brand with an advertising campaign - In Touch with IBS - which kicks off in November in the national and regional newspapers, women's magazines and on the radio.

Empowering moves

While Chefaro has gone down the price reduction route in its attempt to

increase uptake of IBS products. Pharmacia & Upjohn's efforts have centred around raising awareness of the condition among sufferers. In July it launched the Colpermin web site at www.colpermin.co.uk with information on IBS and on self-management through diet and lifestyle.

An IBS Forum is also included to encourage sufferers to communicate with each other and share experiences.

Information on Colpermin also includes a guide to help consumers find their nearest pharmacy that stocks the product.

The company launched a comprehensive portfolio of PoS to coincide with the start of a consumer advertising campaign in August which went into weekly and monthly titles and national newspapers. The national consumer spend is £1m.

Since its OTC launch two years ago, Colpermin has achieved the biggest share of the OTC IBS market. Pharmacia & Upjohn is now hoping to expand the category further next year.

United front

Fybogel Mebeverine entered the over the counter IBS market in May under the slogan 'Two Greats United', referring to the combined ingredients of mebeverine and ispagula husk.

The combination which has been available on prescription for the past 14 years, works on the principle that IBS is improved with fibre. One study found a 67 per cent improvement in abdominal pain with the combined formulation compared with 40 per cent with a regime of mebeverine and a high fibre diet. Bowel function improvements were 61 per cent compared with 30 per cent.

Imodium goes GSL

Imodium has just had the go-ahead to launch a six-capsule pack GSL, two years after loperamide was deregulated from Pharmacy. The new packs are expected to be available from mid-October.

J&J.MSD says commercial pressure from sales of GSL own-brand and generic loperamide has inevitably led

to leading branded loperamide products, such as Imodium, also moving in this direction.

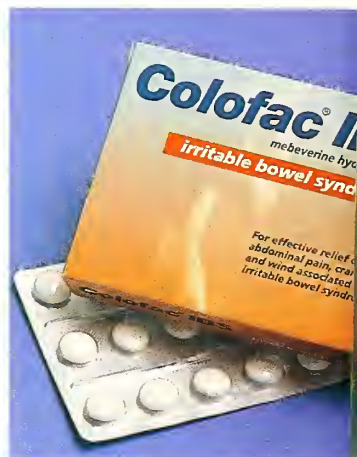
Ghislaine Robson, J&J.MSD group product director, says: "The decision to market a GSL Imodium has been made to counter the threat to the market share of Imodium by generic, branded or own-label GSL loperamide introductions."

The company says it is still committed to the Pharmacy products Imodium Plus (loperamide/simethicone), Imodium Liquid and larger packs of Imodium. Imodium Plus is an anti-diarrhoeal which also addresses the symptoms of gas, wind and bloating. "Pharmacy-only

Imodium Plus has proved in clinical trials to offer superior relief to diarrhoea sufferers than loperamide alone, in terms of speed of relief and abdominal symptom relief. Pharmacists could best serve their own and their customers' interests by recommending Imodium Plus."

Support for Imodium, focusing on Imodium Plus, will continue into the year 2000, including TV advertising and educational initiatives.

In November, J&J.MSD plans to bring together medical experts from Europe and the US to debate and review treatment guidelines for acute diarrhoea in adults.

On the right digestive tract

Reckitt & Colman's Gaviscon is sponsoring its National Heartburn and Indigestion Awareness Week in the same week as Rennie. The focus of its 'Know the Difference' campaign is on educating consumers on the difference between the terms and on the different approaches to treatment.

Reckitt & Colman is supporting the

awareness week with a series of radio interviews and a re-run of the 'Fire' TV advertising between October and December. Digestion-friendly Celebrity Chef recipe cards, featuring the likes of Jamie Oliver and Nigel Slater, have also been produced.

For pharmacy, educational packs and Gaviscon-inscribed prescription bags are being distributed together with comprehensive PoS.

Packaging changes planned for Gaviscon at the end of September include new graphics and a fold-out label on the 100ml pack.

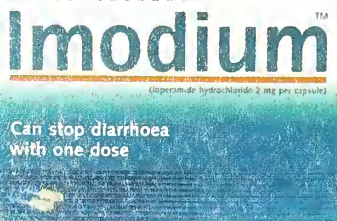
J&J.MSD is also concentrating on pharmacy to drive the 'dysmotility' message home in relation to Motilium, which was switched to P last year. The company is focusing its promotional plans specifically on educating pharmacy assistants. A training programme has been produced on CD-ROM to help the sales force train assistants.

Pharmacists also need to understand the term dysmotility so that appropriate treatment can be recommended. extension in the history of Rennie.

Rennie Duo is a move from the traditional, milder antacids in the Rennie range, says Mr Wines. "There comes a point when consumers want to trade up to something more efficacious, one that has different properties." Rennie Duo, he claims, with its dual rafting and antacid properties, fits that bill.

Due to its unique formulation, Rennie Duo forms a clinically effective raft with less sodium alginate than some other alginate-based remedies.

Rennie Duo is being supported by a £5m TV campaign that began this month. Roche is also targeting the trade with PoS and educational material. The company will also be investing in category management initiatives in pharmacy next year, along the same lines as those that were carried out for VMS.

The indigestion market continues to grow steadily year on year. Andy Wines says this is because more people are suffering indigestion as a result of a stressful lifestyle and more are seeking better remedies. However, there is a lot of confusion in the indigestion market over symptoms and terms used. People don't understand their symptoms very well and pharmacists can help.

Hot air

The trapped wind market is not full of hot air. According to Andy Wines, products for trapped wind represent the biggest area of growth in the indigestion market with year on year growth of around 47 per cent (Nielsen). The market is worth around £5.3 million.

Mr Wines believes the sector could easily grow to five times this size. "The trapped wind market has enormous potential, but growth is not going to happen overnight. Bringing in new users through advertising and through better education will be crucial in achieving this."

Pharmacy has already played its part in educating consumers and this has been reflected in its relatively strong share of the trapped wind market against grocery - 43 per cent

IBS health issues

Everyone seems to agree that stress is a big culprit in indigestion and, in particular, in IBS. Work-related stress is on the increase and psychologists are now wanting it to be taken more seriously. Professor Cary Cooper, from the University of Manchester Institute of Science and Technology, says: "Inflexible working conditions, diminished job security and long hours are taking their toll on the British workforce, with major implications for our general health and emotional wellbeing." Pharmacists have been found to have one of the highest stress levels among the workforce.

Another medical concern for IBS is that it can be mistaken for gynaecological problems in women. Mr Michael Smith, gynaecologist at Queen's Hospital in Staffordshire, warns that many women suffering from IBS are being put through the trauma of gynaecological tests instead of being tested for the GI disorder. This is because women with IBS often report worsening of symptoms during their periods. "It is a recognised fact that IBS is one of the commonest causes of lower abdominal or pelvic pain in women, particularly those of childbearing age. However, at each clinic I see of least one woman who has been referred for exploratory tests who has absolutely nothing wrong gynaecologically and whose symptoms turn out to be those of IBS instead."

The problem arises when the GP asks the woman if the pain is worse during her period and she answers "yes". Mr Smith argues that any pain will seem more intense when a woman is menstruating and this inevitably leads to referral and on unnecessary laparoscopy. "This leads to greater anxiety and stress on the patient's part, which in turn can make the IBS worse."

Nearly one in five of the population are known to suffer from IBS at some time in their lives, with more women likely to suffer than men. This makes the confusion of IBS with gynaecological problems particularly pertinent.

compared with 26 per cent for indigestion, excluding Boots (Nielsen).

The educational message Roche wants to get across for Rennie Deflatine is that trapped wind products are not simply anti-flatulence products. "There is a lot of misinformation on trapped wind and pharmacists can play a strong role on advising on the most appropriate remedy."

Roche plans to continue its support for Rennie Deflatine with a projected £2m spend next year. In addition, a six-tablet trial packs are being introduced in the run up to the Christmas period.

Self selection

Stafford-Miller has expanded its Setlers range with a new Heartburn and Indigestion Liquid, available as a GSL product. Each 5ml of the aniseed-flavoured pink suspension contains calcium carbonate 80mg, 133.5mg

sodium bicarbonate and 250mg sodium alginate. The new liquid neutralises excess acid in the stomach and protects against heartburn.

The launch is supported by PoS and consumer information. Stafford-Miller's total marketing support for the Setlers brand this year is £3.5m.

Plans are also afoot for Zantac 75 to be made available GSL to increase consumer self-selection.

Andrews Salts, although already GSL, has attempted to increase self-selection through repackaging. The range has been relaunched in eye-catching, oval-shaped plastic containers with a measuring spoon. New pack sizes and more prominent logos are aimed at creating greater shelf impact and attracting new users.

The change from the tin format has proved popular with consumers both in terms of overall rating and propensity to buy. SmithKline



A new Setlers GSL product

Beecham Consumer Healthcare is supporting the launch with a national press campaign which will run in eight women's titles including *Woman*, *Woman's Own*, *Best and Chat* during October and November. The adverts will carry 'an evolution' theme showing how the pack has evolved but the content has stayed the same. A national press campaign is also planned for December.

The new packs were being phased in from the beginning of September.

Tony Hampson, managing director of Potter's, says the best way to maximise sales from herbal remedies for indigestion is to site them with other indigestion remedies and with licensed herbal products. "Merchandising by therapeutic category brings in the first time buyer," he says.

UniChem looks for diagnostic pharmacies

As part of its plans to increase consumer awareness of pharmacy services, UniChem is looking for more pharmacists to feature in the consumer press.

Two articles about pharmacy diagnostic testing services have already appeared in September's *Now* and *Woman* magazines, reaching a combined readership of 3.2 million people. Coverage was positive, says UniChem, with the magazines describing the services as a first line for people who can have a quick, reliable screening before seeing the doctor.

UniChem sales and marketing director Martyn Ward said: "Through continuing to secure coverage on diagnostic testing in consumer press, we will increase consumer knowledge about what is available and subsequently fuel demand."

Pharmacist support for IT grows, suggests survey

Research among community pharmacists indicates "there is a positive attitude towards electronic communications and electronic prescribing".

While recognising that pharmacists have to balance their roles as shopkeeper and health professional, the survey says that there is a feeling that more communication with GPs would bring pharmacists closer to the primary care team. Half of those interviewed said they would be unwilling to pay for electronic prescribing.

The main concern remains, however, security of electronic prescribing. In addition, some pharmacists were concerned that there may be a decrease in personal contact as a result of relying on computers to communicate. "The importance of this issue should not be underestimated, as personal contact is often considered one of the features of good healthcare service," says the report issued by PharMed.

The survey of face to face interviews of 20 pharmacists throughout the UK was conducted on PharMed's

behalf by Kember Associates. Among the findings were that 60 per cent of the pharmacists had used the internet, with home use more common than at work, and primarily for e-mail.

The pharmacists generally accepted that any electronic system would be reasonably secure, but many still had reservations. They felt, though, that electronic prescribing would allow faster service provision, reduce paper work and allow greater communication with the GP. Lesser perceived benefits include giving better stock control and reducing data input errors.

Benefits to patients were that there would be less time spent for them waiting in the pharmacy, and fewer visits to the GP surgery. There was less acceptance that there would be safer, less error-prone prescribing. It would also help pharmacists reduce prescription fraud and it may reduce pricing costs.

For pharmacists to make better use of an electronic system, 80 per cent said they would like to access patient records. Within that, slightly more

wanted access to relevant information when a patient visits the pharmacy as opposed to wanting full access. All the respondents felt it would be useful to GPs to know if medication had not been collected from the pharmacy and 80 per cent would be willing to send information back to the GP.

PC4 clinics on January 1 not ruled out by DoH

Special clinics supplying emergency contraception on New Year's Day have not been ruled out by the Department of Health.

Last week *The Independent* carried a story saying that health ministers are drawing up contingency plans for the clinics. A DoH spokesperson said that all Health Authorities have been sent a winter information pack warning that contingency plans may be necessary to cope with the extended holiday. One of the areas highlighted was availability of emergency contraception but there was no specific recommendation for special clinics on January 1.

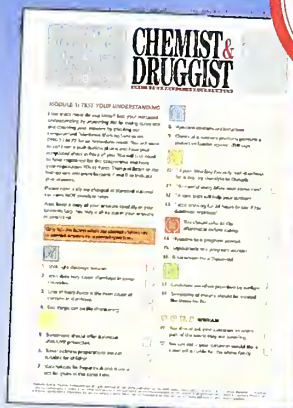

UniChem aims to have 1,000 pharmacy members of its Community Pharmacy Initiative in the year 2000. It currently has over 900 and expects to exceed its target by the end of the year.

UniChem has teamed up with The College of Pharmacy Practice to hold its first pharmacist development weekend for Pharmacy Alliance members on November 5-6, at the NatWest or Bank of Scotland management training centre in Heythrop Park, the Cotswolds. The wholesaler said pharmacists had responded so well to this initiative that it plans to hold another two similar events next year.

Government may cut tariff price on bulk generics

Norton Healthcare is advising pharmacists not to stock pile bulk generics because it has heard that the Government may discourage this practice by setting the tariff price for bulk much lower than that of patient packs.

Nick Foster, Norton's sales and marketing director, said the MCA is not prosecuting anyone who does not comply fully with the patient pack directive, but the Government is looking for ways to ensure that patient packs are implemented.

Lack of government direction over the initiative has not helped. "Labour has done nothing to ease the situation. Companies have been left to work out their own direction," he said.

Regent Laboratories' suspended licence is a commonly known cause of some of the generic shortages - Mr Foster said Regent will probably be back in business in the New Year.

The shortages also partly stem from the bureaucracy of the Irish Medicines Board, whose paperwork and validation is putting a strain on the resources of manufacturers there, such as Norton. Mr Foster said these compa-

nies are expected to have cleared these issues with the IMB by the end of October. And Norton will have overcome the transitional teething problems associated with moving manufacturing sites there.

"I cannot comment on whether

people will still speculate or hoard, but, if they do, they are likely to get their fingers burnt," he said.

The generic shortage situation, he added, will probably stabilise by the end of the year. And by then pharmacists need not worry about the 'millennium bug' because all their suppliers are Year 2000 compliant.

Norton's research suggests that patients want quality generics and packs and leaflets that inform, not confuse. Pharmacists could achieve this consistency by ordering from one or two wholesalers, instead of many sources. "This moving from cherry picking - looking for that extra penny in discount is very important. My fervent hope is that the improved supply of product to the market does not create a return to the crazy pricing and consequent fall in tariff price that we have seen in previous years," he said.

While seeking the lowest price available may seem attractive, he added, it only encouraged the end of the generic supply chain, the short-liners. And that hastens the plunging tariff prices.

Optimistic about ostomy market

Keith Filmer, commercial development manager of ConvaTec, says pharmacists should pay more attention to the ostomy market for the following reasons:

- Ostomy market is worth around £100 million at drug tariff prices - 700,000 scripts per year worth an average £140 per script. Almost all the £100 million market is community funded, which is probably why the Community Pharmacy Executive is currently reviewing the appliance contractors remuneration
- Hospital ostomy market is driven mainly by samples. Around 90 per cent of ostomy patients stay on the products they are discharged on
- About 80,000 ostomists in the UK and around 18,000 new patients every year. These are split between: colostomates - 48,000, ileostomates - 24,000, urostomates - 8,000
- Colostomists and urostomists are worth £1,100-£1,600 per year, ileostomists are worth £700-£1,000
- One-piece appliance: the flange and pouch are attached and changed more frequently. Two-piece: body size flange can remain on skin for up to four days and pouches are changed as necessary
- 16 years ago, 80 per cent of Surgicare (now ConvaTec) ostomy business was through retail pharmacists and 20 per cent through surgical wholesalers and dispensing appliance contractors (DAC). Today, DACs and dispensing manufacturers account for 65 per cent of ostomy scripts and retail pharmacists for the remainder
- Ostomy margins, up to 40 per cent, including on cost and manufacturers' discounts (even higher for dispensing manufacturers). Improved service for patients, eg free delivery, free wipes, flanges cut to size
- ConvaTec is the significant ostomy manufacturer that does not deliver direct to patients
- There must be a level playing field in terms of pharmacy contractors and appliance contractors - if there isn't, pharmacy contractors will always be earn less for offering ostomy products and associated services
- UniChem has a surgical adviser and all ostomy manufacturers have helplines - ConvaTec's is staffed 12 hours a day six days a week

Which pharmacy symbol scheme do you like?

Delegates were given the chance to vote on a series of pharmacy marketing/franchise schemes from around the world. Tim Roper, chief executive officer of UniChem (*sic*), a New Zealand based pharmacy symbol group, gave an overview of pharmacy marketing/symbol groups in his country and in Australia.

Tim Hardy, vice president international franchising of Medicine Shoppe, the US pharmacy franchise giant explained the benefits of the franchise system. Medicine Shoppe has 1,200 independent pharmacy members in ten countries.

And Richard Rowlands, chairman of Rowlands (Lemington) and a non-executive director of Numark, examined the impact his membership has made on his pharmacy. Nick England, managing director of Pharmacy Alliance (PA) and Chris Martin, a pharmacist who joined PA, discussed

how this system benefited their members.

Delegates were asked which of these schemes was ideal for the challenges their pharmacies faced in the UK:

Total franchise	7 per cent
Front shop marketing/ branding scheme	6 per cent
Dispensing/counselling scheme	13 per cent
Combination of schemes 2 and 3	72 per cent
Complete independence	2 per cent

Delegates were then asked to what extent they felt their business could benefit from any of the above marketing schemes. Using remote controlled keypads to register their votes, 35 per cent said the schemes were essential; 34 per cent said 'very important'; 28 per cent voted for 'some benefit' and 1 per cent said 'not at all'.

Meanwhile, delegates were asked if

they thought the Medicine Shoppe concept was an acceptable route for UK pharmacy. [This scheme offers the benefits of a huge group buying power at the expense of a financial fee and a total commitment to the group - its members have to sign up for 20 years.] Sixty-four per cent of delegates voted 'no', and the remainder 'yes'. Chris Etherington, UniChem's managing director and chairman of the voting session, said he was surprised by the result.

When delegates were asked what was the main concern about the franchise concept, 60 per cent chose 'loss of independence', 30 per cent chose its 'total adherence to the concept' and 10 per cent chose its investment cost.

As for marketing schemes that highlight aspects of the pharmacy business, such as the Community Pharmacy Initiative, 84 per cent of delegates said such scheme's most vital

component must be 'long-term business growth through enhanced image/customer recognition and 16 per cent said it was 'financial incentives that reward adherence to set criteria'. Mr Rowlands was applauded when he said the Numark scheme offered both rewards.

Ninety-four per cent of delegates said that schemes that increase their normal incomes and increase the pharmacists professional role of interest, such as the Pharmacy Alliance concept, were worthwhile.

Superdrug gains supporters in RPM debate

Barry Simmer, Superdrug's pharmacy superintendent, persuaded some delegates to favour the abolition of Resale Price Maintenance following a debate about the issue.

Mr Simmer presented the case for abolishing RPM, while David Sharpe, chairman of the Community Pharmacy Action Group, argued the case for its retention.

Before their respective speeches, 87 per cent of delegates voted to retain RPM, 9 per cent were against it and 4

per cent were unsure. After the speeches, 80 per cent of delegates remained in favour of RPM, but a sizeable 20 per cent now believes it should be abolished.

One delegate pointed out that as the vote was compiled with touch key pads, which did not show whether the voter was a manufacturer or pharmacist, people should not conclude that some pharmacists were swayed by Mr Simmer's speech.

Meanwhile, relatively few delegates (25 per cent) believe the loss of RPM is the biggest threat they face. Sixty-one per cent chose the shrinking dispensing margin and 14 per cent cited other retail competition.

Just over half the delegates said the removal of RPM would have a significant effect on their business, 46 per cent said it would create some effect and 2 per cent said it wouldn't affect them. Narrowing the poll only to pharmacy delegates, 64 per cent voted for 'significant effect', 31 per cent for 'some effect' and 5 per cent for 'no effect'.

Forty-seven per cent of pharmacy delegates 'agree' that medicines are price sensitive, 17 per cent 'strongly agree', 28 per cent 'disagree' and 9 per cent 'strongly disagree'. In a similar poll for manufacturing delegates the result was more mixed: 34 per cent agreed, but another 34 per

cent disagreed, 18 per cent 'strongly agree' and 13 per cent 'strongly disagree'.

Revlon warns of big losses

Revlon, the US-based cosmetics company, has given up trying to find a buyer for the entire company, according to a report in the *Financial Times*. Revlon also warned that losses for the rest of the year would be worse than predicted, bringing the full year losses up to \$70m-\$80m.

Redundancies at BB

British Biotech is making 45 redundancies across its Research, Development and Corporate departments. The loss of jobs is a result of a restructuring programme and the number of pasts will be reduced further to 235 (a loss of a further 21 jobs) as the ongoing commitment to the marimastat Phase III programme reduces.

BASF Pharma closes Beeston site

BASF Pharma is to close its manufacturing site at Beeston. This will affect about 230 employees, with job losses commencing early next year. The company has made this decision following a business review and "in light of difficult trading conditions and market pressure on pharmaceutical ingredients".

Heptodin launched in China

Glaxo Wellcome has launched Heptodin (lamivudine), the world's first oral anti-viral treatment for chronic hepatitis B, in China, where there is the highest prevalence of the disease in the world.

FDA concerned about Abbott QA

The US Food and Drug Administration has raised its second non-compliance concern in a year with Abbott, according to the *Financial Times*. The FDA is concerned about quality control at Abbott's Chicago plant that manufactures diagnostic testing kits. It has said it will file for an order forcing Abbott to stop the production and sale of certain kits because of concerns about quality assurance at the plant.

Switch used a billion times

In the last 12 month period Switch cards were used one billion times, making debit cards, after cash, the most popular method of payment in the UK. Over the past year Switch and Solo cardholders made transactions worth £28 billion.

Progress for RA treatment

British Biotech has formally moved BB-2827 into development as a potential treatment for rheumatoid arthritis. It is absorbed orally and has been shown to reduce inflammation and prevent joint destruction in pre-clinical models of arthritis.

Glaxo to shed 1,700 UK jobs

Glaxo Wellcome will be shedding 1,700 UK manufacturing jobs as part of a global restructure in which it is aiming to save £370 million a year from 2003.

Around 1,500 jobs will be scrapped at GW's secondary manufacturing operation in Dartford, Kent, over four years. GW said it would still invest in the site's primary manufacturing plant.

About 200 jobs will be cut over the next four years at the company's site in Speke, Liverpool.

GW said the cuts would be phased in after 2000 and that they would have "no material effect" on its remaining UK manufacturing sites in Beckenham, Kent; Barnard Castle, County Durham; Montrose, Angus; Ulverston, Cumbria; and Ware, Hertfordshire.

It will use a variety of means to shed the jobs, such as early retirement, voluntary redundancy, re-training and re-deployment. It said it recognised the impact these job losses will have on local communities and it will be working with local representatives to minimise the effect.

The UK is bearing the brunt of GW's rationalisation - the company will also shed 1,700 production jobs around the world, which will cut its global manufacturing workforce to around 18,000.

GW said it needed to close secondary manufacturing sites around the world to consolidate its production network. These sites take the raw material produced by the company's primary manufacturing plants, and

transform it into the finished product.

The company will also introduce initiatives to save costs on its raw material purchases and to make the system more efficient.

It said the restructure, estimated to cost around £520 million, would be earning enhancing in 2000. Around £170m of the costs will be charged to its 1999 profits, and the remainder will be spread evenly over the years 2000-2003.

The timing of the UK announcement may not help GW's public battle to make Relenza, its anti-flu drug, available on the National Health Service. The company is currently negotiating Relenza's case with the National Institute for Clinical Excellence (see News p6). GW said the timing was coincidental and due purely to "internal decision making".

Industry observers, however, would agree that the changes are necessary. GW has been struggling, by its standards, in the first half of the year. In August it admitted it was unlikely to honour its promise of double digit growth by the end of the year. Cutting production costs is the classic route to a leaner, fitter company.

Its production restructure, meanwhile, follows a year-long strategic review of its worldwide manufacturing and supply organisation. GW has 54 manufacturing sites, and has decided to focus these on specific product areas and specialist technologies to make them more efficient.

Its new manufacturing network will be based on three main categories:

- highly flexible plants that will concentrate on new product launches and products in early stages of development to ensure they are introduced quickly onto their respective markets.
- high-tech sites responsible for the high speed, large volume production of a broad range of established brands
- sites to manage older products and brands targeted at local markets.

Sir Richard Sykes, GW's chairman, said the restructure would significantly shape and improve the way it conducts business. It is "vital to sustaining and strengthening our competitive position in the rapidly changing global pharmaceutical industry. We very much regret the effects of these proposals on employment levels over the next four years, and are committed to providing support to affected employees," he said.

AAH to run managerial workshops for pharmacists

Statim Finance, the financial arm of AAH Pharmaceuticals, is setting up a series of interactive workshops that will advise independent pharmacists how to run their businesses.

The workshops are tailored to suit pharmacists considering running their own business, and for those who are buying or expanding their businesses.

AAH said the courses follow a successful pilot seminar in the West Midlands. This involved nine pharmacists and covered the basics of running your own business, from keeping management accounts to how to get the best deal.

Robert Andrews, a director of Statim Finance, said the company began the pilot by asking pharmacists to consider a vision of their business. They also discussed the various managerial roles the pharmacist has to take on, such as personnel manager and financial director. "By looking at the various roles, we highlighted a variety of business skills, for example, delivering profit, budget-

ing and forecasting and price volume relationship," he said.

Delegates were also set practical exercises, such as choosing whether to buy 12 products to get three free, or buying 12 at a 25 per cent discount.

Congratulations to Edwin Bessant and Annette D'Abreo, joint managing directors of Ceuta Healthcare who were runners up in the national finals of the Entrepreneur of the Year Award, after winning the Business Services Entrepreneur of the Year Award category in the South Region competition in June. The Ceuta team were not too disappointed with their placing behind the overall winner, Mark Dickson of the Regus Group, who had a company turnover of £1 billion.

The Entrepreneur of the Year is a major international award programme, founded and produced by Ernst & Young and sponsored by The Citibank Private Bank and The Times



CP Pharmaceuticals announces highest ever operating profits – up 50 per cent

CP Pharmaceuticals has announced its highest ever operating profit, up almost 50 per cent to £2.5 million, as well as a sales growth of 5.1 per cent to £25.2m for the year to June 1999.

In the company's annual report, chairman and chief executive Charles Savage described 1999 as a "game of two halves". The overall turnover masks a slow first half, where brand, contract, and export sales were hit by the closure of the company's sterile products manufacturing facility and a weak UK market for tablet-form gener-

ics. A rapidly accelerating second period was 29 per cent up on the first six months.

The company has obtained 26 new marketing authorisations during the year, and products introduced in the past four years accounted for 28 per cent of 1998-99 sales. CP's development investment has increased 22.7 per cent on last year.

Mr Savage said: "1999/2000 will be a year of very strong growth. It has certainly started that way and we are looking to the possibility of floating the company in late 2000."

Sales in the first few weeks of the new financial year are "well up" on last year. Sales of Migril, which was acquired from Glaxo Wellcome last week, will add to CP's branded business this year. The company expects further growth to stem from its commitment to manufacture and supply its natural and porcine insulins to diabetics whose existing medicines have been withdrawn.

With the main producers of animal insulins withdrawing some of their products from the market, CP has said that it is prepared to continue to man-

ufacture and supply natural animal insulins for the foreseeable future".

To address the UK generics shortage, CP is increasing its high speed manufacturing facility. It expects output of solid dose products in December to approach three times that of the final quarter of 1998.

In the area of contract manufacture, the company has signed commercial and technical supply agreements with Amylin Pharmaceuticals Inc, Senetek plc and Smith & Nephew plc, and the benefits of this will soon be seen, claims CP.

Growth has been achieved across all sectors – private label, brands and direct marketing. The launch of Cellasene has been successful and the direct marketing of Nature's Best and Lamberts "continue to make excellent progress". Systems are being developed to enable the company to use the

internet for direct marketing.

The company announced an increase in profit before tax of 18 per cent, to £10.4 million for the half year to the end of July. Sales growth of 6 per cent to £93.5m has been driven by organic growth and two months contribution from the acquisition of the footwear division of Fii Group.

This growth rate is expected to continue said Gordon Black, chairman. "Our confidence that the pattern of growth can be maintained is based on

our broad customer base in the UK and continental Europe, the new product initiatives in place and the strength of our balance sheet", said Mr Black.

An increase in the personal care division's operating profit of 18 per cent has been partly due to its ability to trade with major retailers on a category management basis. Gains in efficiency have come from low cost production and improved speed of response.

The interim dividend is 2.2p, and earnings per share were 11.12p.

Cox Pharmaceuticals opens plant extension with £10m investment

Cox Pharmaceuticals, part of the International Pharmaceuticals Division of the Alpha Group, has opened a three-storey extension to its Barnstable plant, which will enable it to increase production by 25 per cent next year.

The latest extension, the fifth since Cox moved to the site in 1979, is needed to ensure compliance with the EU Labelling Directive with the full introduction of patient packs across its

product range. The additional space is needed to house blister packing machines and storage of the finished packs, which take up to four or five times more space than bulk packs. Investment costs include £4 million on buildings, £5m on equipment so far, with new blister pack lines costing up to £1m.

Even though the UK is lagging behind most of Europe in the intro-

duction of patient packs, a timetable for implementation has now been drawn up at Cox Pharmaceuticals and most products will be available in patient packs by the end of the year. With the introduction of patient packs, Cox says it has largely refocused its activities on supplying its generics through major wholesalers, so retail customers can benefit from frequent deliveries.

Customer gets the Horne

Aliens have landed in a Manchester pharmacy and upset locals with the size of their "umbilical cords"

The appropriately named Hornes Dispensing Chemist in Manchester has received a complaint about toy aliens it was selling. A young mother complained about the size of the appendage attached to a 'Baby World Alien' toy purchased for her five-year-old daughter.

Trading Standards have investigated the complaint, but found the toy meets all legislative requirements. The Manchester warehouse that supplies the toys described the appendage as an "umbilical cord" and saw no reason for withdrawing the line.

Made in Taiwan, the toy carries the equivalent of a 'parental guidance' certificate: "CE (certification). Not suitable for children under six. Use only under adult supervision". The aliens come encased in a clear plastic egg and in four varieties. Female life forms, lacking the offending organ, are apparently inoffensive even to the most sensitive dispositions.

But proprietor James Robinson is not sitting on a nest of pornographic alien eggs waiting for a Mary Whitehouse-style backlash. A media studies student has bought all the remaining toys for an undisclosed purpose. And after all the controversy, Mr Robinson said, "we did not feel like putting them back on sale".

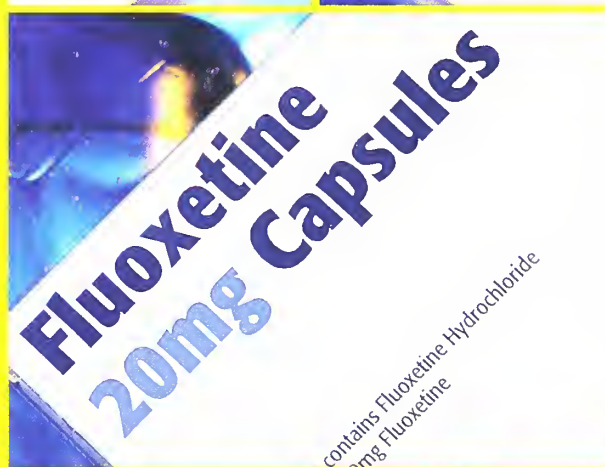
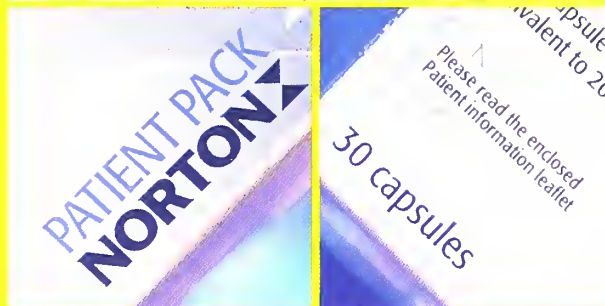
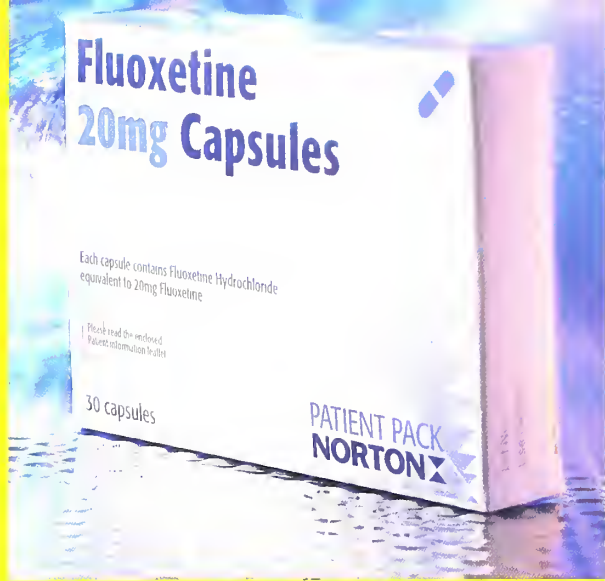

Uses
Depression: Treatment of the symptoms of depressive illness, with or without associated anxiety symptoms.
Obsessive-compulsive disorder. Bulimia nervosa: For the reduction of binge-eating and purging activity.

Serious, sometimes fatal reactions (including hyperthermia, rigidity, myoclonus, autonomic instability and mental status changes that include extreme agitation, progressing to delirium and coma) have been reported with concomitant use or when fluoxetine had been recently discontinued and an MAOI started. Some cases presented with features resembling neuroleptic malignant syndrome.

Warnings Rash and allergic reactions: Angioneurotic oedema, urticaria and other allergic reactions have been reported. Upon appearance of rash, or of other allergic phenomena for which an alternative aetiology cannot be identified, fluoxetine should be discontinued.

Pregnancy: Use of fluoxetine should be avoided unless there is no safer alternative.

Precautions Fluoxetine should be discontinued in any patient who develops seizures. Fluoxetine should be avoided in patients with unstable epilepsy; patients with controlled epilepsy should be carefully monitored. There have been rare reports of prolonged seizures in patients on fluoxetine receiving ECT treatment.

A lower dose of fluoxetine, eg, alternate day dosing, is recommended in patients with significant hepatic dysfunction or mild to moderate renal failure (GFR 10-50ml/min).

Caution is advisable when fluoxetine is used in patients with acute cardiac disease.

Fluoxetine may cause weight loss which may be undesirable in underweight depressed patients.

In diabetics, fluoxetine may alter glycaemic control.

There have been reports of abnormal bleeding in several patients, but causal relationship to fluoxetine and clinical importance are unclear.

Drug interactions: Increased (with lithium toxicity) or decreased lithium levels have been reported. Lithium levels should be monitored.

Because fluoxetine's metabolism involves the hepatic cytochrome P450/D6 isoenzyme system, concomitant therapy with other drugs also metabolised by this

system, and which have a narrow therapeutic index (eg, carbamazepine, tricyclic antidepressants), should be initiated at or adjusted to the low end of their dose range. Greater than 2-fold increases of previously stable plasma levels of cyclic antidepressants have been observed when fluoxetine has been administered in combination.

Agitation, restlessness and gastro-intestinal symptoms have been reported in a small number of patients receiving fluoxetine in combination with tryptophan.

Patients on stable phenytoin doses have developed elevated plasma concentrations and clinical phenytoin toxicity after starting fluoxetine.

Adverse Effects Asthenia, fever, nausea, diarrhoea, dry mouth, appetite loss, dyspepsia, vomiting, rarely abnormal LFTs, headache, nervousness, insomnia, drowsiness, anxiety, tremor, dizziness, fatigue, decreased libido, seizures, hypomania or mania, dyskinesia, movement disorders, neuroleptic malignant syndrome-like events, pharyngitis, dyspnoea, pulmonary events (including inflammatory processes and/or fibrosis), rash, urticaria, vasculitis, excessive sweating, arthralgia, myalgia, serum sickness, anaphylactoid reactions, hair loss, sexual dysfunction.

Overdosage On the evidence available, fluoxetine has a wide margin of safety in overdose. Since introduction, reports of death, attributed to overdosage of fluoxetine alone, have been extremely rare. One patient who reportedly took 3000mg of fluoxetine experienced 2 grand mal seizures that remitted spontaneously.

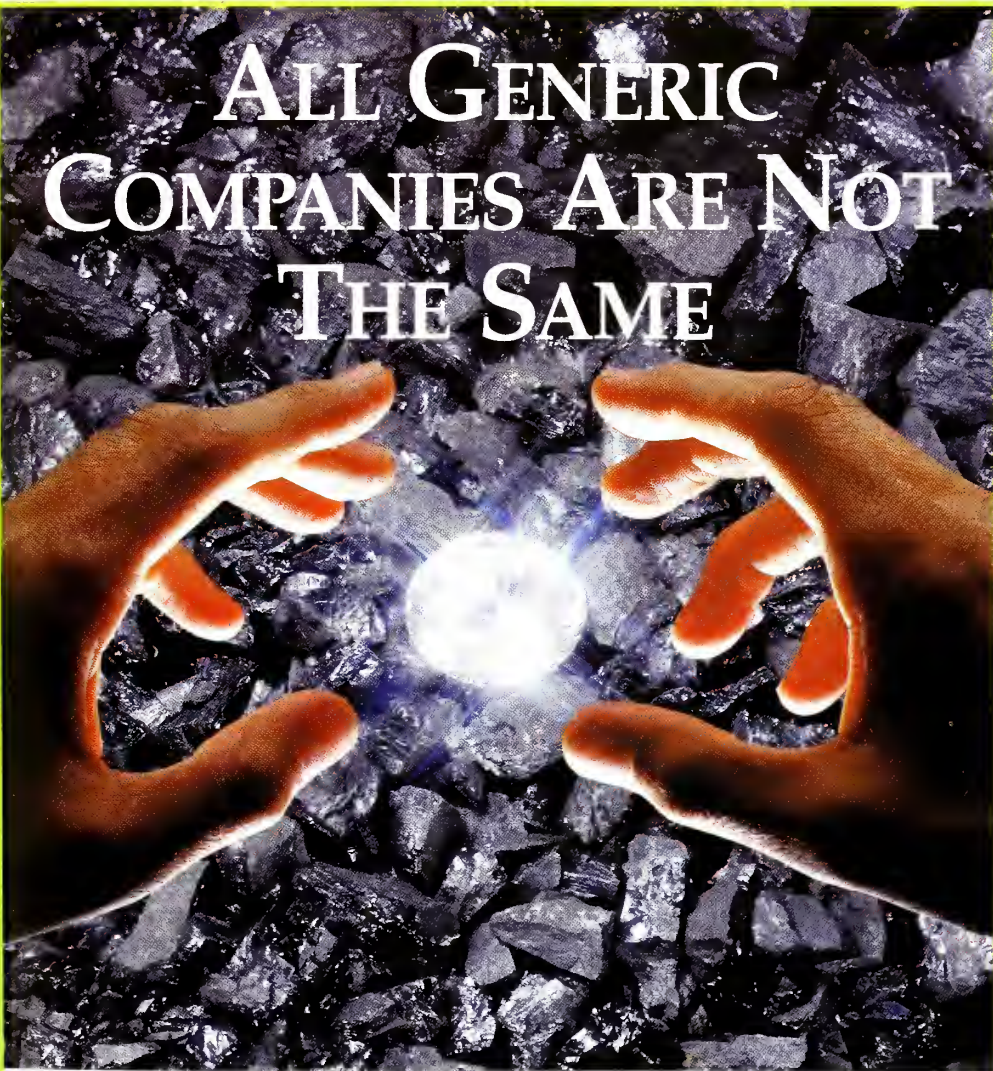

Who makes what: a unique source list

This C&D Generics Supplement not only lists the seven-digit PIP Codes, but also provides buyers with a unique source list for unbranded lines in pack sizes ranging from counter and dispensary to small-scale manufacture.

The list is arranged so that users can trace alternative suppliers easily, and at the same time have the relevant PIP Code for ordering and product identification. Entries are updated in the weekly Price List Supplement when changes are notified to C&D by manufacturers. C&D would be pleased to receive details in writing, of any packs not currently listed and for which codes are required.

As far as possible, the following compilation rules have been observed:

1. When the PIP code was converted from six to seven digits, a zero was placed before the old number, so retaining the existing check digit.

2. New PIP Codes are allocated randomly as under the six figure system and start with "1".

3. In the interest of continuity, priority in re-allocation of existing codes has been given to suppliers whose products carry the PIP Code on their packs.

4. Entries are generally under pharmaceutical name in order to bring all suppliers together for maximum buyer choice. However, counter packs will often be labelled with a popular synonym (eg Gee's linctus, Whitfields ointment). A cross-reference has been provided whenever products are shown under a synonym in suppliers' lists.

5. The "DT" symbol indicates Drug Tariff pack sizes.

The PIP Code

History

The benefits of a common code for pharmacy products have been long recognised, and over the years various working parties recommended the creation of such a code. In 1982 the National Pharmaceutical Association, in conjunction with Benn Publications (publishers of *Chemist & Druggist*), created the PIP Code in which they now hold joint copyright. This move had the support of several major pharmaceutical wholesalers.

Definition

The PIP Code is a product identifying number which has been allocated to goods distributed through pharmacies. All types of products are included and every pack size and colour or other variation has its own unique PIP Code number. The codes are published alongside each product entry in the *Chemist & Druggist* monthly Price List and weekly supplements, ensuring that a readily accessible and up to date PIP Code reference is widely circulated.

Initially, a six-digit code was chosen for ease of keyboard entry, but demand for the PIP coding system has necessitated the introduction of a seven-digit code. The last of these digits is a check digit (see p5) to minimise errors in recording.

Uses

The individual computer systems operated by manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers can be interfaced to recognise the PIP Code, which therefore provides a common language. This enables the retailer to

retain a freedom of choice of supplier and makes it possible for all involved in the distribution chain to benefit from streamlining their communications and merchandise handling systems.

Initially the PIP Code was used mainly as an interface between retailer and supplier for the purpose of placing and receiving orders, and virtually all pharmaceutical wholesalers can now recognise PIP Code when transmitted electronically. However, within retail pharmacy it is used increasingly for stock control and point-of-sale data capture. Most computer bureaux handle PIP Code data for clients, and many EPoS and dispensary systems make use of the PIP Code facility.

Computer users who choose to adopt the PIP Code as the primary code for their systems can avoid the time and expense of maintaining their own database. This is a considerable advantage to smaller businesses and pharmacies which have only limited clerical resources.

PIP Code principles

The Pharmaceutical Interface Products Code Regulatory Authority is the National Pharmaceutical Association, which takes advice from a technical panel representing retail and wholesale PIP Code users, plus *Chemist & Druggist* (who maintain the NPA's master PIP Code file).

The code is based on computer codes used to maintain the *C&D Price Service* but has been augmented to incorporate a number of product categories not considered appropriate for publication in the *C&D* monthly Price List (such as some watches, confectionery, stationery).

Code users may find the following points of policy helpful:

General

1. Manufacturer and distributor codes are published in Section 2 of the *C&D* monthly Price List.
2. Within the seven-digit PIP Code, codes have been reserved for users' own requirements (see para 12), but some wholesalers have allocated part of the series to "service" items such as bags and bottles. Retailers should obtain details of such allocation from their usual suppliers before using this series as dump codes etc.
3. Discontinued items are deleted from the *C&D* Price List upon notification by the manufacturer but remain on the master file for reference. If a product is re-marketed by the same supplier within that period, every effort is made to use its former code.
4. Where there are minor adjustments to pack sizes the existing code is generally retained to help retailers monitor sales performance. When the trade unit alters there is no requirement to issue new codes.
5. Both branded and generic product codes can be issued in advance of product launch with full security and confidentiality. The allocated numbers are reserved on the *C&D* computer pending advice of launch. Manufacturers of ethicals are particularly asked to use this facility so that codes can be notified on their standard letter to wholesalers. Intercontinental Medical Statistics (IMS) and *Chemist & Druggist* have available a joint form (approved by ABPI and BAPW) for prior allocation of both SDA and PIP codes.

Variants

6. Products which have no variants (colour, flavour, etc.) are identified by a separate "main" code for each pack size, representing singles wherever possible. This code appears immediately before the trade price column in the *C&D* Price List.
7. Where products include variants the "main" code does not appear - instead there are individual codes in italic type beneath the entry. However, the "main" code is allocated to a variant (e.g. neutral, normal, white, original, small etc) in order to reduce confusion for code users.
8. Where variants are added to an existing range the "main" code will normally be retained as the variant code for the

original version. If this variant is subsequently discontinued its code will remain the "main" code but will no longer be published.

Special cases

9. PIP codes for unbranded products are shown in the *C&D* Generics Reference Book, distributed free to all *C&D* subscribers, additional copies are available on request. This supplement also lists wholesalers accepting PIP Code for ordering purposes, Generic Suppliers and Disallowed Dressings and Appliances section.

Note: Branded generics (ie, where a prescription calling for the brand name alone is sufficient to identify absolutely the product required) are to be found in the *C&D* Monthly P. L.



10. Certain surgical/sundries groupings are at present not fully covered by PIP Code. This applies particularly to products where the multitude of size and type variations is great and/or product developments are frequent, so that retailers are likely to rely on manufacturers' product number or full description for ordering from a wholesaler. However, some of the more standard and frequently prescribed brands and generic items (eg many NHS appliances) are coded in the *C&D* Price List and the Generics Supplement. With the introduction of a seven-digit PIP Code the product areas covered by PIP Code will be extended as soon as possible.

11. Products normally restricted to hospitals are indicated in the Price List with HP. Products are coded if manufacturers anticipate them being prescribed to out-patients.

12. Promotional, temporary and seasonal packs are not coded: retailers should use the 900-0000 series, and wholesalers use the 800-0000 & 700-0000 series.

Check-digit calculation

The check (seventh) digit of the PIP Code is arrived at by the following calculation:

1. Take each digit starting with units position then tens position and so forth and multiply by 1,2,1,2,1,2, etc.
2. Add up resultants of 1. (Add the digits not the products ie if resultant is two digits then add them together).
3. Subtract the figure at 2 from the next highest multiple of 10.
4. Answer is the modulus 10 check digit. If no remainder then check digit is zero.

To check

1. Take each digit (including check digit) and multiply by 1,2,1,2,1,2 (starting in units position).
2. Total resultants as before.
3. Answer should be an exact multiple of 10.

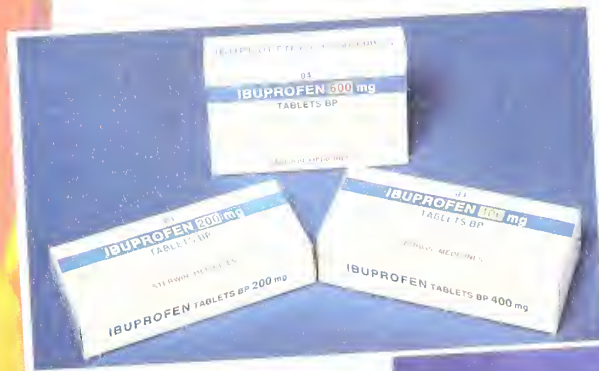

Abbreviated Prescribing Information

Presentation
Capsules containing 20mg fluoxetine, as the hydrochloride.

Uses
Depression: Treatment of the symptoms of depressive illness, with or without associated anxiety symptoms.
Obsessive-compulsive disorder: Bulimia nervosa: For the reduction of binge-eating and purging activity.

Dosage and Administration
For oral administration to adults only.

Depression, with or without associated anxiety symptoms: Adults and the elderly: A dose of 20mg/day is recommended. Obsessive-compulsive disorder: 20mg/day to 60mg/day. A dose of 20mg/day is recommended as the initial dose. Bulimia: Adults and the elderly: A dose of 60mg/day is recommended. Because of the long elimination half-lives of the parent drug (1-3 days after acute administration) and its major metabolite (average 9.3 days), active drug substance will persist in the body for several weeks after dosing is stopped. Children: Not recommended.

Patients with renal and/or hepatic dysfunction:
See Contra-indications and Precautions sections.

Contra-indications Hypersensitivity to fluoxetine. Fluoxetine should not be administered to patients with severe renal failure (GFR <10ml/min). Usage in nursing mothers: Fluoxetine should not be prescribed to nursing mothers. Monoamine oxidase inhibitors: At least 14 days should elapse between discontinuation of an MAOI and initiation of treatment with fluoxetine. At least five weeks should elapse between discontinuation of fluoxetine and initiation of therapy with an MAOI.

Serious, sometimes fatal reactions (including hyperthermia, rigidity, myoclonus, autonomic instability and mental status changes that include extreme agitation, progressing to delirium and coma) have been reported with concomitant use or when fluoxetine had been recently discontinued and an MAOI started. Some cases presented with features resembling neuroleptic malignant syndrome.

Warnings Rash and allergic reactions: Angioneurotic oedema, urticaria and other allergic reactions have been reported. Upon appearance of rash, or of other allergic phenomena for which an alternative aetiology cannot be identified, fluoxetine should be discontinued. Pregnancy: Use of fluoxetine should be avoided unless there is no safer alternative.

Precautions Fluoxetine should be discontinued in any patient who develops seizures. Fluoxetine should be avoided in patients with unstable epilepsy; patients with controlled epilepsy should be carefully monitored. There have been rare reports of prolonged seizures in patients on fluoxetine receiving ECT treatment.

A lower dose of fluoxetine, eg, alternate day dosing, is recommended in patients with significant hepatic dysfunction or mild to moderate renal failure (GFR 10-50ml/min).

Caution is advisable when fluoxetine is used in patients with acute cardiac disease.

Fluoxetine may cause weight loss which may be undesirable in underweight depressed patients.

In diabetics, fluoxetine may alter glycaemic control. There have been reports of abnormal bleeding in several patients, but causal relationship to fluoxetine and clinical importance are unclear.

Drug interactions: Increased (with lithium toxicity) or decreased lithium levels have been reported. Lithium levels should be monitored.

Because fluoxetine's metabolism involves the hepatic cytochrome P450106 isoenzyme system, concomitant therapy with other drugs also metabolised by this

system, and which have a narrow therapeutic index (eg, carbamazepine, tricyclic antidepressants), should be initiated at or adjusted to the low end of their dose range. Greater than 2-fold increases of previously stable plasma levels of cyclic antidepressants have been observed when fluoxetine has been administered in combination.

Agitation, restlessness and gastro-intestinal symptoms have been reported in a small number of patients receiving fluoxetine in combination with tryptophan.

Patients on stable phenytoin doses have developed elevated plasma concentrations and clinical phenytoin toxicity after starting fluoxetine.

Adverse Effects Asthenia, fever, nausea, diarrhoea, dry mouth, appetite loss, dyspepsia, vomiting, rarely abnormal LFTs, headache, nervousness, insomnia, drowsiness, anxiety, tremor, dizziness, fatigue, decreased libido, seizures, hypomania or mania, dyskinesia, movement disorders, neuroleptic malignant syndrome-like events, pharyngitis, dyspnoea, pulmonary events (including inflammatory processes and/or fibrosis), rash, urticaria, serum sickness, anaphylactoid reactions, hair loss, sexual dysfunction.

The following have been reported in association with fluoxetine but no causal relationship has been established:

aplastic anaemia, cerebral vascular accident, ecchymoses, eosinophilic pneumonia, gastro-haemorrhage, hyperprolactinaemia, immune-haemolytic anaemia, pancreatitis, pancytopenia, thrombocytopenia, thrombocytopenic purpura, vaginal bleeding after drug withdrawal, violent behaviour.

Hyponatremia (including serum sodium below 110mmol/l) has been rarely reported. This is reversible upon discontinuation.

Overdose On the evidence available, fluoxetine has a wide margin of safety in overdose. Since reports of death attributed to overdose of fluoxetine alone, have been extremely rare. One patient reportedly took 3000mg of fluoxetine experiencing 2 grand mal seizures that remitted spontaneously.

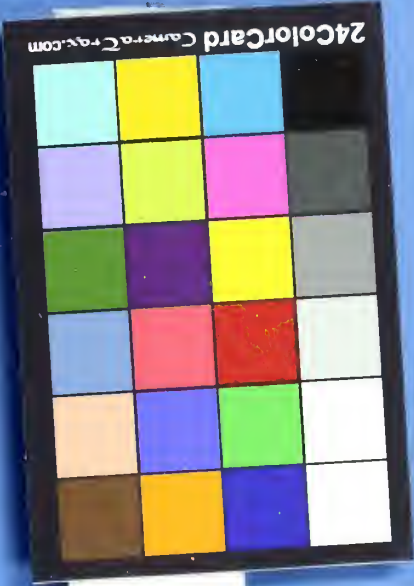
